So get reading, get out of the house, get into the spirit of spring and have yourself some fun. Oh, and be sure to tell one and all that whatzup sent you.

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

Martha Graham, one of the principal vanguards of modern dance, described the art of deliberate, fluid movement as a reflection of our varied and vacillating emotions: "Every dance is a kind of fever chart, a graph of the heart," she said.

From April 1-3, The Indiana Dance Festival will elaborately offer, through many expressions of movement in various forms, a blueprint of the nebulae that moves inside

Fort Wayne Dance Collective will be sponsoring the Indiana Dance Festival this year. Hubbard Street II, a dance company from Chicago, will be headlining the festival. Hubbard Street II is a group of six dancers who, according to the troupe's website, perform "works by some of the nation's most promising young choreographers." Each year, HS2 performs for more than 35,000 people.

According to Liz Monnier, co-founder

and artistic director of the Fort Wayne Dance Collective, the purpose of the festival is to "inspire collaboration among Indiana dancers and allow the Fort Wayne Dance Collective to promote its mission, to provide people of all ages and abilities a respectful environment to learn

collaboration and performance, using movement, rhythm and language."

The festival was initiated by FWDC in 2006 and was repeated in 2007.

"Our hope at the time," Monnier said, "was that the festival would travel. We encouraged other organizations to [host the festival], because a festival reflects your values, and we hoped that [an organization] with different values might do it differently so that we could learn from them, but it didn't happen. It is still a hope of ours."

FWDC began planning this year's festival about 18 months ago when they wrote a grant to Lincoln Financial Foundation. The values of FWDC correspond well with the values of the foundation. FWDC offers programs for non-traditional dance students, including range in diversity from practical instruction ("Grant Writing for Dancers and Dance Organizations" and "Social Media for Arts Organizations") to thematic training ("Dances of Universal Peace" and "Soulfully Salsa"). The festival will also feature a showcase

ballroom dancers from Easter Seals/ARC. There is also a steering committee of approximately 20 people who brainstorm, accept proposals for the showcase and solicit sponsorships from Fort Wayne businesses.

"[Organizing the festival is] a lot of work," said Monnier, "but it's fun to do, we enjoy putting it together and we get to learn from other instructors and meet a lot of people."

The festival will offer 30 workshops. which will be held at various locations, and performance, which will exhibit the choreographic talent of eight Indiana and regional dancer-choreographers, chosen from 22 entries, who will perform pieces set to a range of different music including that of Germanborn British composer Max Richter and popular American singer-songwriter Natalie

FWDC has staged two flash mobs to promote the festival, and one more is still in the works. The latest happened at Glenbrook Mall, where onlookers were surprised by a spontaneous, choreographed performance.

Registration for the entire festival costs \$190 for professional/adults, \$175 for students and \$155 for groups of five or more. Those prices include a ticket to the Friday night gala dinner, the Hubbard Street II per-

Raining Down Rock

As names of multi-act rock shows go, the one sweeping through Fort Wayne March 29 nails it. Dubbed the Avalanche Tour, the five-band hard rockfest features some big names in the biz. Joining forces to test the Allen County War Memorial Coliseum's ability to withstand a prolonged sonic onslaught will be Stone Sour, Theory of a Deadman, Skillet, Halestorm and Art of Dying. With acts like these, the inaugural

Avalanche Tour will not fall short of expectations.

And if the lineup isn't enough to entice fans of these bands to plop down their 32 bucks (cheaper than a tank of gas!), then the contests associated with the tour just might tip the scale. First off is the FYE Avalanche Tour Pit Reporter Paparazzi Contest, which gives winners a pair of tickets and one pass to the photo pit at the front of the stage.

Stone Sour are giving their fans a chance not only to win tickets but to meet the band. Art of Dying are giving away tickets also, and the Avalanche Tour is giving some lucky person the chance to interview one

of the bands. That's not just tweedling Dixie. Contest info is available at avalanchetour.com.

The thundering 32city tour, which was scheduled to kick off in Chicago March 24 until that show was recently cancelled, concludes in Jacksonville, Florida, May 8. In the meantime it

zigzags its way through 23 states from Texas to Maine and Minnesota to Georgia. The schedule is grueling, but nothing these bands aren't used to.

Stone Sour have been pounding the pavement since 1992, when singer Corey Taylor and the band's former drummer Joel Ekman got together in Des Moines, Iowa. The group took a while to fill out, with Shawn Economaki playing bass and a series of guitarists plugging in for club dates and through two demo tapes until Jim Root joined full-time in 1995. Just two years later Stone Sour went on hiatus when first Taylor and then Root started working with fellow Des Moines rockers Slipknot. Stone Sour were not dead, however, and in 2002 reunited and immediately got to work in the studio, releasing an eponymous effort in 2002, Come What(ever) May in 2006, and Audio Secrecy in 2010.

Ekman left the group in 2006. Josh Rand came on board as rhythm guitarist in 2010, and Ray Mayorga replaced Ekman. But before Mayorga's departure, Stone Sour began to find their groove, racking up three Grammy nominations for Best Metal Performance, a certified Gold album and a handful of Billboard Top 10 singles.

Theory of a Deadman formed in Delta, British Columbia in 2001 when Tyler Connolly, Dean Back and Dave Brenner decided to try their hand at the music business. Turns out it was a good hand. Currently signed to both Roadrunner and Island Records, the band - with Connolly on

lead vocals and lead guitar, Brenner on rhythm and Back on bass - has three CDs out and a fourth on the way. It's the third album, Scars & Souvenirs, that these Canadian rockers seem most proud of. The band bio quotes Connolly as saying, "I always try to remind the guys and myself that there are 20 bands lined up behind us just waiting


for a chance to take our place. So that means we had to go in there and make a great record."

The record has 13 tracks, the majority of which display Connolly's softer side as a lyricist.

Again, from the band bio: "For awhile there, every song was, 'Get the **** out! I don't need women! Screw them!' That's kinda how I felt at that point," Connolly says with a self-effacing laugh. "But I've grown as a songwriter, and as a person. I wanted to write some different, nicer songs for a change.'

Christian rockers Skillet - John Cooper, Korey Cooper, Ben Kasica and Jen Ledger - formed in 1996

Big Bang Theory

After a few years of lineup changes, lengthy tours, spotty hype, all sorts of goofy Canadian award show nominations and two studio records on two different labels (that both almost crossed over into the indie mainstream), Montreal-based art-rockers Young Galaxy just released their third – and already best reviewed - record, Shapeshifting, to much attention in the U.S. Founded by Stars' Stephen Ramsay (vocals/guitar) and his girlfriend, Catherine McCandless

(vocals/keyboards), the Youngs started their band out proper-like, releasing their debut record on the much-loved Arts & Crafts imprint, home to acts like Bro-

Social ken Scene, Stars, Feist and The Stills. (Arts & Crafts are also the Mexican distributing arm for indie heavyweights Girls, Pave-ment, Yo La Tengo, Metric, etc.).

So why then, you may ask, are Young axy coming to Fort Wayne, which is usupassed ally over by such shows due to our proximity to, well,

everywhere? Easy: If you haven't been paying attention, Fort Wayne has been landing a number of great indie-level bands as of late, pretty much all of them doing very well. (The Strange Boys recently called our city their "favorite place to play.") But this show, more than others, came about in a particu-

larly interesting way.

"We played a very poorly attended show in Detroit last year, but there were two people who came early to see the show, Eric and Patti Frank, who'd come all the way from Fort Wayne to see us," Ramsay said. "They bowled with us before the show at the adja-

cent bowling alley."

For those who might unfamiliar with his work, Eric Frank is the drummer with local indie favorites Wooden Satellites.

"Eric kept saying how Fort Wayne would be a great place to play and that he would organize the show personally if he had a chance. So, really, we all have him to thank for the show! We're really looking forward to it. The Franks are wonderful people, and we're excited to play somewhere we've never played before."

Nice work, Eric and Patti. But let's get back to the Youngs. After getting signed in 2006 Catherine and Ramsay expanded their lineup to become a sextet, mostly for the purpose of touring. Then they cut down to five, then four, then back to five again. For most of the trip bassist Stephen Kamp has fleshed out the nucleus of Young Galaxy, covering the U.S. back and fourth with Ramsay and McCandless since 2007, sticking mostly to the East Coast.

Luckily for us, when the band rolls into town to play The Brass Rail on Saturday,

March 26 they'll do so with a 10 - day old record, the above-

mentioned



Shapeshifting, to support. If you've not yet heard the record, it's something of a doozy, taking from 80s dreamy/dance-friendly bands like New Order and The Eurythmics and all but leaving their more-rocking days behind (for now, anyway).

'We wanted to change our sound completely," Ramsay explained. "Not just a token few sounds here and there, but a wholesale shift We figured that, as a band, we were just beginning to understand ourselves as musicians by our second album - and as fans of music we'd barely scraped the surface of our influences. We contacted [producer] Dan Lissvik on MySpace back when it was still a useful tool and not just a spam machine.

"We loved his music in the band Studio, a duo he's a part of," Ramsay continued. "I thought the production was particularly brilliant - super groovy and dense and soulful. Timeless. So we kind of approached Shapeshifting as a scriptwriter might when they have a role in mind for a particular actor. So we had Dan in mind as producer the whole

The Fort Wayne Philharmonic's performances of A Rodgers and Hammerstein Celebration might begin on April Fool's Day but these shows, made up of classic tunes from the legendary pair's award-winning career, are no laughing matter.

In fact, for conductor Bradley Thachuk the productions are quite serious, given that they signal his last as the Phil's associate conductor. When his baton falls after Saturday, April 2's show, he'll be on his way to

a new post as music director at the Niagara Symphony.

Thachuk, a native of Canada, has called Wayne home for almost a quarter of his life and said that he's

glad his swan song will be a Rodgers and Hammerstein tune.

"This is a very special weekend for me," he said. "It's bittersweet. Fort Wayne has become my home, and my career trajectory has been formed by my experiences here. It's really fitting that for my last concert I'll be conducting a Pops show, and the fact that it's this particular program makes it even better.

That's because Thachuk has admired the work of Richard Rodgers and Oscar Hammerstein since he was a kid He's especially fond of their work on The Sound of Music, just one of the many Rodgers and Hammerstein's popular musicals whose songlist will be sampled during the celebration. Musical theater fans can also look forward to hearing hits from such beloved Broadway and regional theater mainstays as South Pacific, The King and I and Oklahoma!

Thachuk said Rodgers and Hammerstein's contributions to the American song-

book are simply without peer "When you think about American musical theater there are no greater contributors to the genre than Rodgers and Hammerstein," he said. "The sheer number of musicals they wrote is astounding, and these are songs that transcend fans of musical theater. You'd be hard pressed to find anyone who doesn't recognize at least one of their songs."

The work of these two legends will be brought to the stage - and to life - by not only the Fort Wayne Philharmonic orchestra, but also the university choirs of IPFW

and Broadway veteran singers Vroman Lisa William and Michals, an accomplished pair in their own right. Vroman.

who made her Broadway debut in Aspects

of Love in 1990, is perhaps best known for her Theatre Critics Circle Award-winning turn as Christine in Phantom of the Opera. Michals's resumé is likewise impressive and includes his appearances as both the Beast and Gaston in the Broadway production of Beauty and the Beast. He's currently working with Sarah Brightman, Josh Groban and Charlotte Church on a new CD set to come

Thachuk, who directed Vroman and Michals in this same production in Reading, Pennsylvania, said A Rodgers and Hammerstein Celebration is guaranteed to be a crowd pleaser


"Those men were really good at selecting stories people could relate to and that would work well on stage," he said. "Rodgers' music seems to have touched a chord with people. There's a familiarity to it, and it's clever writing as well, with a folksy humor that's very accessible and almost impossible to resist."

Dinosaur Bones DINOSAUR BONES MY DIVIDER

My Divider

I first heard Dinosaur Bones as a fluke. They were playing in the Indie Lounge in Indianapolis after I'd just seen Another Year. (I was drinking a \$6 Blue Moon and loved the film, if you're wanting to know all the deets.) My first impression of what I heard was that maybe the guys in The Whigs all had wimpy younger brothers



who also formed a band. Never mind that. I ended up intrigued, seeking out the record within a few days.

The record's cover – simple, timeless and cool – also helped sell me on My Divider, the excellently titled debut record from Toronto's unfortunately named indie rock studs, Dinosaur Bones. Produced by Jon Drew (Tokyo Police Club, among others), the 11-track debut is instantly reminiscent of Chavez, but without Matt Sweeney's sometimes too big guitar play (blasphemy, I know!). The vibe here is 90s New York indie, where the boys play it cool and fuzzy, warm and detached - a band trying to make accessible songs that Lou Reed would like if Lou Reed liked anything other than Lou Reed.

But, really, my first impression was the one that mattered. Dinosaur Bones are a more Canadian - and less lively - version of The Whigs but with an added layer of cool-guy drone. It all works just fine, the result being a record that would've done very well on college radio in 1998, back when cool was still cool and fuzz wasn't always a click away. A keyboard, the non-typical element of sound here (for pseudo-garage stoners, that is), works well enough, though at times it distracts from the faux lo-fi fuzziness more than it aids it. Singer and lead guitarist Ben Fox has his eye on American pubs, writing the kind of late-night songs the hipster kids love to hear after a few very expensive craft beers wear off – the kind of songs they play at places like The Indie Lounge, made perfect for post-Das Racist dance-offs.

Me? Well, I can't call this a bad record, but hearing it after watching Another Year, a film about both happiness and unhappiness toward the end of life, made for a strange juxtaposition. My Divider is the kind of record that young guys make and listen to, and feel is important. It's also the kind of record that older ears (29-plus, in rock terms) find overly derivative and, at best, a form of pleasant nostalgia. While the songs are generally pleasing and Fox and friends seem to have good intentions, My Divider just isn't the kind of record that will last. It's New Era bar band music sans the strange appeal of bands like The Hold Steady and The Black Lips. But hey, today's youth generation (mostly kids who hear everything and get to know almost nothing) may just love it. You know, in between Tweets, then on to the next new thing. As always, thanks for the effort, Canada, but The Whigs (an already incredibly ignored band) have it covered. (Greg W. Locke)

Ghostface Killah

Apollo Kids

On October 29, 1996, six months after getting my driver's license, I set the path for my future. By skipping school that day in order to pick up a record called Ironman, the debut - and now classic - record from Wu-Tang Clan emcee Ghostface Killah, I took the first big step toward a life in the gutter of obsession. I was a



music fan before then, but by putting myself in the way of a harmless kind of danger I'd married myself to the music. Recorded music. Ever since, things haven't gone so well. Just last week, for example, I emptied my basket of food at Target, putting all the items back on the shelf when I spotted the latest Ghostface record, Apollo Kids. I told myself I'd prefer to spend my last \$15 on new music and starve than eat and listen to old music.


So now, arriving full circle and against all odds, I sit here listening to Ghostface once again. And while I don't think Apollo is his best record, I'd easily put it in his top four, up there with 2000's Supreme Clientele, 1996's Ironman and 2006's Fishscale. After his last solo record, 2009's R&B-influenced misfire Ghostdini, it's something of a return to form. Apollo sees its maker doing what he

Disraeli Gears was the second al-



Baker and Jack Bruce, Cream may have been the best rock n' roll band of all time until Led Zeppelin formed a year later.

Album opener "Strange Brew" gave the band its first charttopping single in England, but it was "Sunshine of Your Love' that broke the American charts and made them more than just another one of those "Clapton bands." "Sunshine" still contains one of the most recognizable riffs in the history of rock. "World of Pain," written by producer Felix Pappalardi (who later went on to form Mountain), features the now familiar and Clapton signature wah-wah pedal. "Dance the Night Away" has a Doors feel to it, and side one closes with Baker's "Blue Condition."

Side two blows up with "Tales of Brave Ulysses" and the 150-second masterpiece "SWLABR," which stands for "She Walks Like a Beard Rainbow." "We're Going Wrong" is folkblues-psychedelic, and the band covers the 1929 blues standard "Outside Woman Blues" by Blind Joe Reynolds. "Take It Back" is harmonica-laced blues that comes from the roadhouses of the Southwest. It's pure and simple, yet it sounds like it could have been on playlists 60 years ago during the advent of American ra-

Cream created their unique sound when the Beatles were transforming from a pop to a psychedelic band, and the heavy rock movement was aided in no small part by Jimi Hendrix and Blue Cheer during the same period.

Singer Jack Bruce just released a new record, and Baker still plays as well. The trio performed at the Royal Albert Hall in 2005. Clapton is currently touring in Europe. (Dennis Donahue)

does best: rapping baffling, interesting and abstract verses over dirty, hard beats produced by some of today's best beat makers. Unlike Ghostdini, the record features a number of fitting guests, many of which are Wu-affiliated and most of which contribute great verses (not exactly the norm in the land of hip-hop guests these days).

Opener "Purified Thoughts" works as something of a segue from Ghostdini, featuring a blast of R&B which quickly fades out, only to return as a big, brash Wu-styled banger beat that does everything it can to keep up with a furious Ghost verse full of witty and strange punchlines and tongue twisters. The other two best Wu writers, Killah Priest and GZA, stop in for excellent guest verses, quickly establishing Apollo as an album to get excited about, especially if you're a fan of classic-era Wu-Tang records. The beat, produced by Frank Dukes, feels cohesive with the old RZA sound, perfectly offering that grungy, back alley appeal the crew has forever been known for.

Next up is "Superstar," a song obviously aimed at the BET music video market. The samples are a bit on the obvious side, the hook is repetitive and R&B-laced, the guest (Busta Rhymes) is a confirmed commercial success and even Ghost's writing and performance is tame. But that's okay. It's a solid single that doesn't annoy too much - not something that a hard-boiled artist like GZA or MF Doom (two of Ghost's favorite collaborators) would make, but not something I'd skip during a full-records spin either.

"Black Tequila," featuring a strange intro and a hard, underground-friendly beat, picks up the slack, coming off as one of the most purely hip-hop Ghost tracks in some time. Produced once again by Frank Dukes, the song is the kind of banger that underground fans will play, talk about and rip off for years and features a classic Ghost verse and plenty of off-the-wall ornamentation. The next track, "Drama," however, is a bit of a letdown, featuring a mediocre beat from Sean C and LV and awful guest verses from The Game and Joell Ortiz. A misstep for sure.

Other favorites include "2getha Baby," which sounds straight off of Ironman and features a tasty vocal sample as a hook; the very simple, verse-driven "Starkology"; and "In the Park," a new classic produced, once again, by Dukes. The song also features The Roots







after vocalist John Cooper and former guitarist Ken Steorts met while touring with other bands. Over the past 15 years Skillet have undergone several lineup changes, leaving founder John Cooper as the only original member remaining. On February 14, 2011, the band announced that longtime guitarist Kasica had left the band to pursue other interests. Exactly who will be filling that spot is unclear. But one thing is certain: If you like your Christian music rockin', this band is for you.

Halestorm are a brother/sister act from Pennsylvania who've been playing music together since they were 10 and 13 years old. Arejay and Lzzy Hale both started on the piano when they were five. Now the pair, along with guitarist Joe Hottinger, bassist Josh Smith, Arejay on the drums and Lzzy handling the singer/guitarist bit, churn out uncompromising rock n' roll anthems. The way Lzzy puts on the band website is this: "I approach my timing and singing like a blues singer. I'm very influenced by blues and soul. For me,

it's always about making sure I have feeling in my voice." In 2010 the band put out a live album, *Live in Philly*, to augment their one full-length record and two EPs.

Art of Dying lead singer Jonny Hetherington has his own line of barbecue sauce, which he may or may not serve at the poker tournaments he stages. To some such a side project might seem like a diversion from the main business of being Canadian rockers, but Art of Dying seem to make it work. The band – Greg Bradley on guitar, Tavis Stanley on guitar and vocals, Cale Gontier on bass and vocals and Jeff Brown on drums – takes a philosophical approach to their music and their lives.

"From the moment you're born, you're on an eventual path to death," Hetherington explains on Art of Dying's website. "We all embrace life and enjoy it and make the most of every minute. Our art of dying is living and doing it with as much enthusiasm as possible. That's sort of our code."

Really, Ramsay said, the band just wanted to make a modern psychedelic pop record that felt of its time. Feeling that their previous records were more traditional rock albums, the Young crew aimed to simultaneously update and streamline their sound and, once done with the recordings, send them off to Lissvik, then thousands of miles away in Gothenburg, who immediately set out to "reshape" the songs. Nine months later the band finally heard their album.

Despite Ramsay claiming that they attempted to streamline their sound, *Shapeshifting* is one of those huge-sounding records that fills the room. It's the kind of record you play at night when you're not sure if you want the party to wind down or keep going until morning. It's beautiful stuff, and thanks to some bowling

balls, a Frank and some luck, a Fort Wayne crowd will get to see the record played just days after its release and before the band takes a brief hiatus.

"Catherine and I are expecting our first child at the end of April, so we will have an inevitable break for that," Ramsay said. "But then we will record a new EP with Dan this spring. After that we'll resume touring in the fall in the U.S., Canada and Europe. With the baby, it will be an experiment to say the least."

I know we should be past cheerleading at this point, but damn, it feels good whenever we land a show this size. Be at the Rail on March 26 for the big sound or be the guy/gal who has to hear others incessantly talk about the amazing show he/she missed because, I dunno, you had to watch some basketball tourney game. Don't be that guy, gal.

emcee Black Thought who offers up one of his best verses in years, matching the intensity of Ghostface – a feat very few not named Raekwon have managed since the release of *Clientele*. For the Pete Rock-produced "How You Like Me Baby," Ghost keeps things to himself, not letting any other emcees pop up, instead riding the bass-heavy, boom-bap friendly production front-to-back with an eye on classic era emcee/producer chemistry. The song isn't a full success, due mostly to a bad hook, but keeps things going just fine. Oh, and the closer, "Troublemakers," produced by Jake One and featuring Raekwon, Method Man and Redman, is a new classic, absolutely.

All in all, the record is pretty solid, featuring maybe a few too many guest verses and a couple of iffy tracks. But, as of this record, Ghost is still the Wu-Tang member with the most consistently great solo career. By far.

It all comes down to two things for Ghost: (1) Beat selection, which he's always been excellent at; and (2) how abstract his lyrics are and how confident

and original his delivery and style are. If he keeps up at this pace the Wu might end up being the group that Ghostface came from, instead of vice-versa.

So did my dirty *Ironman* outlaw move work out? Yes! I loved the record and listened to it often for years. Even to this day I dig it out from time to time. Did my hungry *Apollo Kids* fall hurt? Not really. I'd gone hungry before for worse records. Far, far worse records. I don't think Apollo is a quite a classic record. It's one hell of a hip-hop listen that is reminiscent of classic-era Wu-Tang, but it lacks any inventiveness outside of Ghost's usual verbal trickery. Clocking in at 12 short-to-average length tracks, this is a powerful, economical hip-hop record that rarely takes a breather. Recommended, for sure, even if only for the seven or so great tracks. (*G.W.L.*)

A Collector's Collection

reader should know, I'm a huge fan of the folks at the Criterion Collection. If you're not familiar, Criterion is a home video distrib-

uting company that specializes in what they call "important classic and contemporary films," taking dead aim at the cinephile market. Primarily, they offer a bulletproof catalog that one can easily work their way through if they desire to learn about the many great films modern society has produced. One thing they don't offer is exclusivity to their titles. While most of the titles they release are only available on the market via their collection, once those titles go out of print, other distributors can release them (depending on who owns the rights). Also, in most cases, you can find older releases of Criterion Collection films.

But there is a difference between a Criterion release and a non-Criterion release. A big difference. The folks at The Criterion Collection take great time and care in restoring films to insure that you are getting the very best quality of the movie available (save for maybe a first-run celluloid print). They use the best available resources to do this and, in many cases, have not only restored films, but improved them by using new technology and, of course, working with the director and the cinematographer directly. Early versions of their films came with comparisons, showing frames from their version compared to other version. So, in short, the picture, sound and overall presentation of a Criterion release is always the best you'll find. And, if you're still not con-

vinced, they also go all out with the packaging and, even more so, the extra material they supply for their releases. So, if you have a film that you love love love and just can't get enough of, check to see if there is a Criterion Edition of the film available. If so, buy it and see it in the best quality you've ever seen it. After that, watch and read through all the extras and bask in the glow of the amazing packaging. If nothing else, with almost every film you get at least one (if not a few) commentary tracks, usually by the director. Almost every other DVD producer out there has copied Criterion's commentary track feature, but none - and I truly mean none have done it nearly as well.

Okay, enough about how great the Criterion company is; let's talk about the collection itself. Every so often the Criterion website asks a celebrity or filmmaker to supply a list of their Top 10 Criterion ti-

tles, also urging the contributors to write a little something about each film (something with a personal connection, if they're willing). Sometimes these lists are very telling (Rian Johnson); sometimes they're incredibly educational (Ramin Bahrani); sometimes they will help you to further believe in someone's passion for film (James Franco); and sometimes they're very likely full of cred-seeking fibs (Bill Hader). Either way, if you're a film fan, they're almost always a real treat to read. (Note: I must admit that I have a hard time believing that so many people prefer, say, Max Orphus, for example, to say, Albert Hitchcock or Stanley Kubrick.)

I thought that, since I'm a such big fan, I'd make a list of my own. My list, however, is a little bit different. Rather than rank our 10 favorite films that the Criterion Collection has issued, I figured I'd list my 10 favorite Criterion titles. And by that, I mean that I will consider more than just how much I generally like the film - I'll consider how good the restoration looks. how nifty the packaging is and how rewarding the extra features are. In some cases, if the film has only ever been available as a Criterion Edition, then I'll also take that exclusivity factor into account. You'll notice that the majority of the films are 70s- through-currentera American films. This because I deduce, most American films are surrounded by a lot of hoopla (and thus a lot of bonus material).

Here goes:

New Batwoman Still a Bit Too Familiar

Batwoman: Elegy by Greg Rucka, J.H. Williams and J.G. Jones, DC Comics, 2010

There are no vampires in *Batwoman: Elegy*, and I'm grateful for that. This graphic novel compilation of several issues from the Detective Comics title is an amalgamation of many familiar elements from popular culture, but the one popular hot topic that you might expect in a story about a brooding Goth girl who dresses up like a bat

and lurks in the dark, spooky corners of Gotham City doesn't make an appearance. I'll give writer Greg Rucka credit for showing restraint when it comes to vampires, especially considering that there are plenty of other popular temptations that he wasn't able to resist.

Like many other DC Comics superheroes – especially the female ones – Batwoman has undergone major adjustments over the years. Since she first appeared decades ago, Batwoman has been transformed from a frivolous potential mate for Batman into a moody, nonconformist lesbian who barely knows Batman. The transformation has been painful and confusing, with a multitude of references and storylines that make it terribly un-



clear if the original Batwoman ever existed and, if she did, just how this new Batwoman is related to her. The story arc in *Elegy* lays out the origin story of the contem-

porary Batwoman in a manner that fits cleanly into the mold of the modern superheroine, and we can only hope that this version holds steady for awhile before cultural evolution forces another revision.

Flegy incorporates a frame story that encloses the revelation of Batwoman's origin. The frame concerns the appearance of a mysterious figure named Alice, a queen of crime who speaks in quotations from Lewis Carroll stories. Alice is worshipped

by a cult called the Religion of Crime, a collection of criminal monsters (including a werewolf but not a vampire) who also happen to believe in a prophesy that seems to call for the death of Batwoman. In the course of her attempts to stop Alice's reign of ter-

ror, Batwoman makes a shocking discovery that triggers flashbacks which, conveniently, bring us up to speed about how our heroine came to be who she is.

Batwoman's backstory is somewhat familiar. The daughter of a military couple. young Kate Kane has a fairly happy life that is suddenly touched by tragedy when her mother and sister are murdered by mysterious commandos. The violent death of her loved ones leaves Kate determined to dedicate her life to the pursuit of justice, but instead of immediately donning a cape and mask she joins the army and enrolls at West Point. Her military career comes to an end. however, when her sexuality is brought to the attention of her superiors. Hemmed in by the injustice of "don't ask, don't tell" and unwilling to lie about her identity, she drops out of the academy.

After an encounter with both a mugger and Batman on the dark streets of Gotham. Kate decides that the best way to continue to pursue her quest for righteousness is to put on a costume and leap down upon criminals from rooftops. Her own stab at a costume is mundane, but, fortunately, she has a techsavvy special ops expert for a dad – and he is only too happy to supply her with fancy gear once he finds out what she's up to – and a rich stepmother able to unwittingly finance

Mother and Child

Anyone who thinks that Annette Bening turned in one of the best performances of 2010 for her role in *The Kids Are All Right* is all wet: Bening actually turned in two of the best performances of last year. That so many fewer people watched her performance in writer-director Rodrigo Garcia's *Mother and Child* than her performance in *Kids* is more a testament to the fickle and unpredictable nature of indie cinema than anything else. Both movies are terrific; both deserve wide audiences. With a cast that includes not only Ben-

ing (and this isn't some brief cameo on Bening's part here; this is a solid, meaty co-starring role) but the likes of Samuel L. Jackson, Naomi Watts and Kerry Washington, it's surprising more couldn't have been done to promote this movie as well-crafted, high-caliber, Oscar-worthy drama.

Perhaps part of the reason could be the complex mosaic-like structure of Garcia's screen-plays. Like two of his previous full-length efforts – 2005's Nine Lives and 1999's Things You Can Tell Just By Looking at Her – Garcia spins several separate but thematically connected storylines, then gradually weaves them together, showing their unexpected connections.

In one story we have Karen (Bening). Having given her one and only child up for adoption when she got pregnant at the age of 14, physical therapist Karen now lives



at home with her frail and elderly mother (Eileen Ryan) and fends off the advances of a charming co-worker (Jimmy Smits) by purposely taking offense at everything he says.

Meanwhile, elsewhere in the same city and unbeknownst to Karen, Karen's

37-year-old daughter Elizabeth (Watts) has made a name for herself as a highly successful attorney. Elizabeth's adoptive parents died long ago, and Elizabeth has constructed a life in which solitude and personal freedom are prized above all else. Elizabeth makes an exception for her boss at the firm where she works, Paul (Jackson), a decent man who has no idea how to respond when

she begins seducing him.
(Watts is very good here
as a sensual, complex, not
completely likeable woman resolved
to keep her distance even while drawing
Paul closer.)

A third storyline, involving an infertile woman (Washington) going through the emotional minefield of trying to adopt a newborn baby from another woman, would seem to have no connection to the other two storylines, but it does in a way that took this viewer, at least, by surprise.

As Karen and Elizabeth begin to take

the initial steps toward finding each other, they begin also to find a side to themselves – a warmer, more hopeful side – that wasn't there before. Corny on paper, yes, but in execution it's actually quite emotionally incisive, subtle and unpredictable. (Garcia almost willfully seems to skip past the scenes this kind of story is often rife with – typical cathartic moments we've seen a million times – and instead dwells on the dramatic moments in between.)

In lesser hands, the inclusion in nearly every scene of some palpable friction or conflict would seem like an apprentice screenwriter's crutch, but Garcia is most decidedly not a lesser hand, and so many scenes here invest an unusual degree of tension surrounding everyday objects: a bag of Oreos, an underwear drawer, fresh tomatoes, a heart-shaped necklace. The movie is never dull. We never feel taken hostage by

Garcia's story has more breadth of scope and largeness of heart than many a 500-page novel. It's truly impressive how much he manages to include here without ever making us feel rushed. Mother and Child is not a tearjerker (the very word connotes something wheedled or manipulated out of us), but it does prompt strong emotional responses in several scenes. What I'll remember more than any individual details about this movie is the way it describes the lives of essentially good people doing their best to be kind to each other in a frequently cold universe. Garcia possesses the all too rare gift of being able to make kindness interesting.



Rabbit Hole Poignantly Portrays Parents' Grief

"Somewhere out there I'm having a good time," muses Becca, and a wan smile plays across her face.

It is the first bit of hope she's had up to that point in the marvelous screen adaptation of David Lindsay-Abaire's play Rabbit Hole. She's sitting on a park bench talking with an unlikely friend, a teen-age boy who is showing her his comic book work-in-progress named Rabbit Hole." He believes it is only logical to assume that there are parallel universes populated by different versions of ourselves. This is comforting to Becca, who could use a different version of herself.

Rabbit Hole tells the story of Becca and Howie Corbett, a nice couple living in suburbs, who have had their happiness destroyed by the death of their son. Danny was four when he chased his dog out into the street and was hit by a car and killed. That is the frame of this picture. When we meet the grieving parents they are eight months into the agonizing reality of losing a child in a senseless accident.

While the idea of watching a film about people grieving sounds grim, Rabbit Hole is not. The film has humor and a modest dose of hope. It is beautifully written and expanded by its author from the stage play for the screen. It isn't maudlin or melodramatic which is remarkable and welcome. We share in Becca and Howie's lives for a brief time, a crucial time, in their grieving process, and then we leave them.

Becca and Howie seem frozen when we meet them. They are coping by keeping busy and faking normalcy. He plays squash. She gardens and bakes. They barely talk to each other. They don't touch. Neither is blaming the other. They are just drifting, and drifting apart.

Becca and Howie are played by Nicole Kidman and Aaron Eckhart. Kidman received and Oscar nomination for her performance, and this is the most interesting work she's done in some time. She has a tendency to seem stiff and reserved, and that works for her here. But she melts that stiffness as the movie progresses. Director John Cameron Mitchell keeps the camera on her face, and she conveys lovely shifts of emotion just changing her expression. Mitchell is known for direct-

ing much more provocative material, Hedwig and the Angry Inch and Shortbus, but he handles this sensitive material with

Eckhart, with his square jaw and regular guy handsomeness, plays strong for those around him, but he's broken inside. He is also excellent here, with a couple of powerful scenes, one neurotic and another heartbreaking.

I was extremely moved by Rabbit Hole." I thought the movie handled the subject of grief with subtlety and accu-

Just after seeing it, I was very lucky to participate in a discussion of Rabbit Hole led by counselors from Visiting Nurse and Hospice and Erin's House. It was reassuring to hear from them that they agreed that the subject had been handled well and thoroughly. I will also say we are very lucky to have these organizations in the community. It is clear from their thoughtful comments about the movie, they are doing valuable, excellent work with their clients.

Everyone grieves differently and at their own pace. That is on display in the film, and the grief counselors leading our discussion said that was one of the best and most accurate aspects of the film.

Becca stops going to the grief group. She can't take what she calls the "God-freaks" and the long time grievers. Howie keeps going and develops a friendship with one of the longtimers, Gaby (a wonderful Sandra Oh), who has been coming to the group for eight years.

Becca wants to clean out Danny's room. She wants to sell the house and move. Howie wants the dog back because Danny loved him. Becca has exiled the dog to her mother's house. Becca's sister is pregnant, and Becca struggles with a jumble

Becca's mom wants to be helpful, but mostly she irritates Becca with her stories of losing her son. Becca snaps because the lost son was a 30-year-old heroin addict, not a helpless 4-year-old boy. Diane Wiest plays mom, and when Becca finally seeks out advice and sympathy Wiest uses her unusual voice to comfort and caress in a particularly beautiful speech about living with loss.

Becca and Howie have neighbors who want to be nice, but Becca and Howie are sick of the sad glances they get. Becca has a friend who won't call her since the accident.

Slowly and carefully they negotiate each issue. They face a crisis of trust when Howie discovers that Becca has befriended the boy who was driving the car that killed Danny. That friendship starts out on a creepy note, but develops in a way that feels real. It helps Becca, and we want her to be helped.

We never get to know Becca and Howie. It is as though their life before the accident has been completely obliterated. When we leave them they don't have a new life yet, just signs of one. Throughout the movie the world around them is beautiful and inviting. Family and friends seem real and normal. They are not. We do get a taste of life coming back to them.

'What are we going to do now?" Becca asks mournfully. "About what?" Howie answers. "About anything," Becca pleads. She keeps asking that question over and over as Howie outlines a few very mundane activities, including a cookout. We watch the cookout as their voice-over Q&A continues. This communication is warmer and more direct than any we've seen, and after a tiny gesture of affection the screen goes dark. Have your tissues handy. Maybe you can get the tears - they'll be hopeful tears - out of your eyes before the lights come up in the theater.

So now you Criterion Newbies are online, looking these titles up, right? You're noticing the price tags, right? These movies are, to say the least, not exactly cheap. Well, consider this: in some cases Criterion Editions will also come with an entire bonus film, or at least a short film or a documentary about something having to do with the film. With most of the movies you buy, you get the 90- to 120-minute film, maybe a two-minute trailer and maybe one or two other small, tossed-off extras. When you buy a Criterion disc (most come as either dual-layer discs, Blu-ray or in two- or even three-disc sets), you're pretty much always getting hours and hours of extra goods to watch. No filler extras, either. Just sweet, sweet cinephile-friendly beauty.


her high-tech crime fighting. Dad outfits a secret room under the house with powerful computers, deadly weapons and a cool motorcycle. He comes up with a wicked costume in a mostly arbitrary red-and-black color scheme and emblazoned with a stylized bat logo because ... well, just because.

If you feel like you've heard all this before, it might be because Batwoman's backstory is an awful lot like that of her male Bat counterpart. A young person is traumatized by the murder of her family members and turns that trauma into a single-minded life of bringing criminals to justice. She uses her wealth to acquire sophisticated tools of her trade, and she is assisted by a loyal older man who stays back at the secret hideout, managing the equipment and protecting her identity. Given the similarities, it would be ridiculous for Kate Kane not to have a bat on her chest.

DC Comics wants Batwoman to be different, however, and they want her to appeal to the readers of today. So she has ivory skin and bright red hair, and she dresses in a self-consciously rebellious way (a style that already seems a little dated). As if that's not enough, she also boasts a fashionably non-standard sexuality and sassy bad attitude. Even the military angle pulls her into today's headlines. A little digression suggests that her father fought in the poppy fields of Afghanistan 20 years ago (even though the U.S. has had a military presence in that country for less than 10 years), and seven years ago Kate herself was drawn into the controversy around gays in the military, an issue that has, coincidentally, been in the news lately.

Yes, it does feel like DC is pandering a little bit here in an effort make itself seem young and edgy. The publisher probably wants to be congratulated for having the guts to prominently feature an openly gay character, but it has been suggested that DC would be taking a bigger risk if it created a superhero that wasn't rich and beautiful. In a time when the real billionaires of Gotham are more interested in inventing risky financial instruments that will increase profits and their own bonuses than in fighting crime, bringing heroes and heroines into line with the reality of today might require more of a populist touch.

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
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
