



----- Cover Story • Sol Fest----The Sun'll Come Out

To paraphrase a little Edgar Allen Poe, once upon a morning dreary, while I pondered weak and weary the world's worst forecast – well, for spring at least – I realized why I and everyone I know seemed to be suffering from a chronic attack of ennui. To paraphrase a little Homer Simpson, well, duh. I hadn't seen the sun for days.

Luckily, there is better weather ahead, at least so says the Farmer's Almanac and the fact that Sol Fest, that glorious weekend of sun and fun and music, is almost upon us.

Sol Fest, which will take over Fox Island County Park from 12-8 p.m. Saturday-Sunday, April 29-May 1, began as a way to celebrate Fox Island's silver anniversary. The organizers of the event soon realized they had pure gold on their hands. Here was a two-day, outdoor event offering fun for the whole family on a weekend when the park was at its most beautiful. It was destined to be an annual thing.

And so it has been for 12 years now. According to Fox Island Park and Education Manager Ron Zartman, the blueprint for Sol Fest 2011 is similar to that of past festivals, but regular attendees will notice some differences that Zartman hopes are for the good.

The main change is in the layout of the festival itself, which prior to this year was divided into roughly two areas, with the live music stage and beer tent located in one spot and the kids' activities area in another. This division put some families in a bind. What's a mom to do if she wants to stay up front and sip a brew while listening to Unlikely Alibi and her beloved firstborn is pulling her toward the arts and crafts tables? That problem is solved. The music and beer have been moved next to the kids area near Bowman Lake, and now everyone can have their fun and drink their beer too. (Beer, by the way, will be supplied by Mad Anthony Brewing Company.)

"It's a little more unified and compact this way," said Zartman, "and now the adults won't have to skip a band to make sure their

children are having a good time."
Children's good times will come that weekend courtesy of several local organizations, including Mark's Ark, Soarin' Hawk and All-Star Martial Arts. All will be onhand treating kids and their parents to a wide variety of shows and demonstrations. There will also be hayrides, kayak rides and opportunities to test drive bicycles from Summit City Bicycles. Kids can even get their faces painted and then take a walk on the Moonwalk

It's a veritable wonderland for the young and young at heart, which makes sense when you consider the fact that the proceeds of Sol Fest directly benefit underprivileged children in our area. The money collected from ticket, beer and beverage sales will go toward the parks department's youth schol-

> arship fund, which pays for field trips to the parks for schools that might not otherwise be able to afford such an experience. The fund also makes it possible for several children to attend parks department summer day camps each year.

> "It really furthers our mission of getting kids out in contact with nature so they can understand their environment a little bit better," said Zartman.

> Helping them further that mission will be 20 local musicians ranging in genre from folk to punk to progressive rock hammered dulcimer. Yeah. I'm serious about that last

> Saturday's lineup begins with singersongwriter Mike Conley. He'll be followed by the Mimi Burns Band, Shade Jonze, The Distractions, Jill Mozena, Sunny Taylor Band, Ted Yoder (the hammered dulcimer guy), Freddie and the Hotrods, Dan Dickerson (the harp guy) and Sketchbomb.

> Sunday gets going with Anthony Gaff, followed by Unlikely Alibi, String Theory, The Wailhounds, Cathy Serrano and Mike Patterson, The Revisitors, Marnée, The Pillars of Society and Q-Tet.

> The performances are staggered so that electric bands follow acoustic ones and vice versa. This obviously cuts down on set-up time and keeps the festival moving quickly and smoothly from act to act.

> Mark Burris, the frontman for Pillars of Society, took over booking duties from Cathy Serrano this year and said, while it was a challenging job at times, both because he had a limit on how many bands he could



book and because musicians are notoriously bad at getting back to you, he said it's been his pleasure both to perform at Sol Fest and to play a pivotal role in bringing some of Fort Wayne's favorite bands to its stage.

"I've been doing original music for 25 years, and Sol Fest is one of the only places in town where we can play our own stuff for a supportive audience," he said. "Musicians love Sol Fest because it's a chance to play outside in this great environment for a bunch of people who want to hear original, eclectic

Let's hope the Farmer's Almanac is right and April 29 dawns warm, sunny and ready

"That weekend is probably the best weekend to visit the park," Zartman said. "The wildflowers are in full bloom, the birds have migrated back, there are no mosquitoes to worry about. We hope people get out and take a walk through the woods while they're

Andy Powell doesn't remember the last time he was in Fort Wayne, but that's okay. Guitar heroes shouldn't be required to clog their heads with archival data. Arcane knowledge like that is best left to zealous fans tapping away at their keyboards, and if the fans of Powell and his band, Wishbone Ash, are anything, it's zealous.

Wishbone Ash emerged as one of the more influential bands from the explosion of groups in late 1960s Great Britain. Though not entirely unscathed by the intervening four decades, Wishbone Ash have, under the

guidance of Powell, continued their progression down the long and bumpy rock n'roll road.

That road will bring Powell and Wishbone Ash to Fort Wayne for the first time since –

let's say 1974 – when the band hits the stage at 4D's Wednesday, May 4 at 8 p.m.

"Nineteen seventy four, huh?" Powell said when reminded of their appearance opening for ZZ Top at Memorial Coliseum roughly 37 years ago. "We were just kids. I think we'll stir a few memories."

Back in 1974 this was a different band personnel-wise, but the power of Wishbone Ash's pioneering twin lead guitar sound remains. As one of the first acts to utilize two lead guitar players (in '74 it was Powell and Laurie Wisefield trading solos) Wishone Ash took their blues-influenced rock in a progressive direction, much like contemporaries such as Yes and Jethro Tull. They reached their chart pinnacle with their 1972 release *Argus*, still considered by many to be one of the top 10 dual-lead guitar albums,

along with The Allman Brothers Band's At Fillmore East, Derek and the Dominos' Layla and Other Assorted Love Songs, Television's Marquee Moon and Thin Lizzy's Jailbreak, among others. Argus reached No. 3 on the UK charts and was named top album of 1972 by Sounds magazine, no small feat in 1972, which was the year Exile on Main St., to name one of many great albums, came out.

The story of Wishbone Ash fits perfectly in the realm of rock n' roll cliché. A couple of guys get together to play blues-based rock covers and, through fits and starts, form a band, change lineups, change names, begin

> writing their own material, develop a sound and hit the road opening for bigger names. In the case of Wishbone Ash it was Powell, Martin Turner on bass and vocals, Ted Turner (no relation

to Martin and certainly not that Ted Turner) sharing lead guitar with Powell and Steve Upton on drums who formed the core of the band and remained so through 1973, when Ted Turner left and was replaced by Wisefield. Martin Turner left in 1980, replaced by John Wetton, who left a year later, and on and on. Over the years the band has had eight lead guitarists, not counting Powell, seven bass players (Martin Turner returned two more times and Andy Pyle did two separate stints) and four drummers, with Ray Weston manning the stool twice.

On the controversy front, Powell, according to some accounts, trademarked the name Wishbone Ash without the consent of either Turner, which spurred Martin Turner

The Power of One

I dare you to go up to Aaron Lewis and tell him he's not a country boy. So what if he's from Massachusetts? So what if he's spent the majority of his musical career bringing down the house with his hard rock outfit, Staind? Lewis, with his Popeye-like forearms (muscles, check; tattoos, check) is an intimidating dude. If he wants to

go country, I say good for him.

And he obviously has traded in his electric guitar for a twangy acoustic, at least for his first solo effort *Town Line*, which came out March 1 on the label Stroudavarious Records. Fans of Staind and of Lewis the solo artist will want to mark their calendars for Thursday, May 5 when he'll be performing hits from *Town Line*, as well as a few reworked versions of Staind standards, at the Honeywell Center in Wabash beginning at 7:30 p.m.

Lewis, whose ethnicity makes his country conversion even more surprising – his mother is Jewish and his father is a Catholic of Italian, Welsh and English descent – was born in Longmeadow, Massachusetts, the birthplace of Johnny "Appleseed" Chapman, but I digress. Perhaps more to the point is that Joey Santiago, lead guitarist for the Pixies, likewise grew up there. Later Lewis moved to neighboring Springfield where, at the tender age of 17, he be-

gan playing acoustic shows around town. It was during this time that he composed some of his slightly lesser-known but still beloved tunes like "Angel," "Something Like Me" and

"Bonghits for Breakfast." (It is, as they say, the most important meal of the day.)

It was likewise in the early and grungy 90s when Lewis' first band, J-CAT, folded, and out of those ashes rose Staind, an act Lewis launched with the help of former J-CAT drummer Jon Wysocki. Johnny April joined them on bass and Mike Mushok came in on lead guitar. This was 1995. Lewis had himself a real rock n' roll band.

In just a year he also had himself his first album, *Tormented*, which, until recently was pretty hard to get your hands on. Only 4,000 copies were sold during the first printing, but Staind fans will be glad to know that they can go to the band's website and purchase the CD that helped Staind make their mark. They followed that up with 1999's *Dysfunction*, team-produced by Fred Durst and Terry Date (Soundgarden, Deftones and Pantera). Soon the dudes from Staind were joining the dudes from Limp Bizkit and The Crystal Method on the Family Values Tour. It was a heady time. Staind's third album, *Break the Cycle*, debuted at No. 1 on Billboard's Top

200. Lewis was compared to Eddie Vedder. It was, as they say, on.

Success bred more success. In 2003 Staind released 14 Shades of Gray which likewise debuted at No. 1 on the charts, as did 2005's Chapter V. Then, in 2006, Lewis made it to No. 49 on metal mag Hit Parader's Heavy Metal's All-Time Top Vocalists. Not bad. Not bad at all. Staind's most recent

But what about Lewis sans Staind? Lewis on his own is unapologetically political. Many are calling his new solo hit, "Country Boy" a Tea Party anthem. Why? Consider these lyrics: "This is me. / I'm proud to be American and strong in my beliefs. / I've said it before and I'll say it again. / I've never needed government to hold my hand."

Heavyweights George Jones, Charlie Daniels and Chris Young joined him in the recording of "Country Boy," so obviously Lewis' crossover is being blessed not just by right-wing causes but by several Nashville gods as well.

In an interview with MassLive, Lewis summed up his political beliefs as being founded on the concept of personal responsibility, something he takes very seriously both in life and in music: "Life isn't fair. It's not all roses. It's hard work. Life is commitment; life is diligence."

Vive Le Rouge Part Deux. Vive le what? Red. Long live red ... part two. It's French. But in Fort Wayne-speak, I think it means one great part party is about to throw down at Headwaters Park. Talking to Jessica Henry, who serves on the Board of Directors for

the AIDS Task Force, confirmed my hopes.

"It's gonna be creative, artsy and fun! This is the 15th year we have had an awareness walk ... and it won't be your average walk. It's a Carnavale!"

And a Carnavale it will be. Be prepared on Saturday, May 7 as Headwaters Park overflows with red shirts, red balloons and red bicyclists in the concerted effort to raise \$50,000 for the AIDS Task Force, which serves all of Northeast Indiana. It may not sound like m u c h VIVE LE ROUGE PART DEUX money, but times like these grassroots

tions are the

hardest hit, especially ones that represent the interests of those affected by such a misunderstood disease.

Currently, there are over 9,000 people in Indiana known to be living with AIDS and 611 people in Northeast Indiana alone. This year so far, the task force is serving 13 new clients, five of which are under the age of

"There is a misconception that AIDS is no longer an issue, but it is up to our generation to stay vigilant and protect our loved ones," Henry said. "We are

to create Martin Turner's Wishbone Ash, which from the evidence appears to be more of a nostalgia circuit act than Powell's band. In any event, the Wishbone Ash headed by Powell has Powell as the 40-year thread. "I've been here everyday," he said.

The current lineup is Powell and Muddy Mannenin on twin lead, Joe Crabtree on drums and Bob Skeat on bass. And for Powell's

money, this lineup does the trick. "I wouldn't still be in this band if it weren't stimulating," he said. "Can't really use the term 'progressive' if we're not progressing. I've got the band of my dreams at the moment. Can't really rank it among the others because they were different bands, but this is a dream team. We play our new stuff and then shift back to the older work like a well-tuned Mercedes."

Wishbone spent a few weeks in 2009 in the French countryside

with a French documentary crew and emerged with a rockumentary dubbed "This is Wishbone Ash." The DVD chronicles the Wishbone Ash creative process which, Powell said, ended up following the eating schedule of the filmmakers.


They're French," he said. "Their day revolves around food. That gave us the framework for our days.

In keeping with a trend among touring acts these days, Powell and Wishbone Ash will play Argus in its entirety at 4D's.



Black Jet Radio

Sex Sex Riot

Former Sacred Broncos guitarist Brian Jenkins and his wife Danisha form the core of Black Jet Radio, a new Fort Wayne-based band. Born in December of last year, Black Jet Radio were completed when Shelby Siefring and Danielle Teagarden were added to the mix. They wasted no time in re-



cording their first album, Sex Sex Riot, which will be available April 29 during the band's album release party inside the Tiger Room at

While many may describe Black Jet Radio as a fresh take on The Kills, that's too easy. Sex Sex Riot's songs, though mostly short, show a complexity not prevalent in a lot of bands, even many with years more experience. One listen to the album's outstanding single, "Dead Wine," leaves you with no doubt as to the validity of that last statement. Hauntingly beautiful but edgy, "Dead Wine" is the type of song that grabs you from the start, puts you through the emotional turmoil you undoubtedly deserve, hangs you out to dry and still leaves you wanting more.

The rest of the album, with the exclusion of opener "Haunt Me Now," is decidedly more punk-oriented, reminiscent of femalefronted bands like Bikini Kill or Lunachicks rather than say, The Distillers. Blondie come to mind as well. Frontwoman Danisha Jenkins sings with a rare combination of both edge and maturity while still managing to appear vulnerable when the occasion calls for it.

My favorite songs, other than "Dead Wine," are the more unconventional "Ugly" and "Love Me So." Both of these songs are wellcrafted and have hooks you'll find yourself repeating in your sleep.

As a whole, Sex Sex Riot is a tough album to put a label on, and that's a good thing. It's not necessarily prepackaged and manufactured for mass consumption, but I would count that as one of its selling points. It's also not "like" any other album I have listened to recently, although the comparisons to artists eluded to earlier give you an idea of what the band sounds like. Regardless, there's no doubt that the album's raw energy mixed with clever writing makes Sex Sex Riot one of the standout local CDs of the past year. The only drawback is that it's a bit on the short side, clocking at just less than 23 minutes. Wasn't it Walt Disney who said, "Always leave them wanting more?" Well, I certainly want more. Bobby Bare Jr.

A Storm, A Tree, My Mother's Head

Sure, the title seems esoteric at first. And, if you're not the curious type (or don't have web access), you won't get clued in to its succinct, obvious, painful literalness until the title track rolls around.

Needless to say, Bobby Bare Jr., the Nashville-based iconoclast, pulls

off with this song what he's always done best: throw a weighty emotional uppercut after a series of high-energy, country-informed, often playful indie rock jabs. A Storm, A Tree, My Mother's Head is the kind of album that covers the gamut of emotions without ever losing an ounce of entertainment value.

Perhaps his uncompromising, genre-jumping style and wartsand-all voice are what keep this gifted songwriter out of the big time. Perhaps it's his unfashionable depth. All I know is that one song like "Don't Go to Chattanooga," with its weeping pedal steel and flaw-less songcraft, blows away pretty much anything on today's "country" radio.


There's a bit of coiled Springsteen vibe inside "Sad Smile," along with signature BBJr. lines like, "Last night I got busted for acting just like myself." The bravura chorus, which would do (a younger/more sane) Phil Spector proud, releases the taut windup of the verses. It's not too difficult to see how much Bobby Bare Jr. benefited from his pop, Bobby Bare Sr. (and late friend and author/songwriter Shel Silverstein); Junior's songwriting and arrangement chops are absolutely impeccable – when he wants them to be.

BBJr. is also perfectly comfortable to let the loose ends dangle when appropriate: If you ever wondered what a slightly more energized J Mascis fronting the Shins would sound like, witness the opening "Your Goat Is on Fire." It's the perfect entry point to a consistently rewarding listen.

Tom Petty & The Heartbreakers

Damn the Torpedoes (1979)

After achieving some success with radio-friendly singles "Breakdown" and "Listen to Her Heart," Tom Petty and his band released the outstanding Damn The Torpedoes, an album that really launched what is now a remarkable career.



Petty wasn't going to complicate

his music with a lot of sound. It was simple chords, modest drumming, keyboards and great rhythm guitars. It was garage-rock sandwiched between the disco/punk era and the new-wave hair bands of the 80s. It was a little bit of luck and perfect timing.

Opening up with the rigid guitars and colorful keyboards of "Refugee," Damn the Torpedoes showcases the vocal range that Petty was known for but has since toned down in later years. "Here Comes My Girl" follows with Petty more narrating than singing, before segueing into the rocker, "Even The Losers," one of the best songs the Heartbreakers ever wrote. "Shadow Of A Doubt" and "Century City" should have gotten more air time, given that they're just as good as anything on side one.

"Don't Do Me Like That" again puts the keyboards of Benmont Tench center stage. It became the band's first Top 10 hit. With the classic guitars of Mike Campbell, along with Stan Lynch's drumming, this song sounds as good today as it did more than 30 years ago. The record closes with a few above-average tracks, including the alt-country ballad, "Louisiana Rain."

Tom Petty & The Heartbreakers have won numerous Grammy Awards, received a Hollywood Star in 1999, were inducted into the Rock & Roll Hall of Fame in 2002 and have sold more than 50 million records. Their 12th album, Mojo, came out last June. (Dennis Donahue)

If straight-up indie rock is up your alley, you'll love "Swollen but Not the Same" and "Lost in a Puzzle." Like your laments served straight up? Witness the stark "One of Us Has Got to Go." Sung through clenched teeth, this tune reminds us why BBJr. can bring an entire room to its knees with just his voice and a guitar. Then there's the title track, which bluntly recalls a near-tragedy with unflinching unsentimental details. There's plenty of fun to be had on this album. but Bobby Bare Jr. doesn't let you off the hook too easily. And this is one big hook you'll be glad to chomp down on.

Yuck

Yuck

Every year it seems there's that one great newish nostalgia-aping band that just flat out does it right. Years ago it was The Strokes' rap-rock killing, Iggy Pop-loving introduction; last year it was Best Coast's Liz Phair-inspired stoner/slacker/girlfriend debut; the year



before that it was The Pains of Being Pure at Heart's Stones Rosesand My Bloody Valenting-loving pop debut; and this year it's Yuck's Dinosaur Jr.- and Teenage Fanclub-indebted eponymous debut.

Built on a solid set of 12 fuzzy rockers, this very young London quartet's sometimes loud, sometimes sweet sound arrives so developed, so good you can easily play it next to any classic-era records from college rock's classic-era bands - bands like Dinosaur Jr (minus their metal influences), Chavez, the Fannies, Pavement, Sonic Youth. Sebadoh, even The Jesus and Mary Chain. Unlike most derivative records, Yuck manages to be just unique enough that it stands alone, a rewarding debut that has at least six songs that I'd rank among the 50 best from the first quarter of 2011. Opener "Get Away," for example, comes off like a young and accessible Thurston Moore singing over some seriously soaring J Mascis guitar riffs. It's the kind of song made for blowing speakers and angering neighbors. "The Wall," a song that should be a hit single, feels so much like a Pavement single







Lear Wows Audiences at IPFW

Expect to be thinking "wow" when the lights come up after IPFW Department of Theatre's production of King Lear, running now through May 1 in the Williams Theatre. Well-acted, impressively staged and energetically paced, this John O'Connell-directed King Lear transports us to a time and place where folly is king and devotion is a rare treasure.

The language in King Lear is more convoluted than that of Hamlet or the comedies, but then much of the exposition is political, legal and even philosophical, as Lear struggles with the suddenly disordered world resulting from his decision to divide his kingdom among his two older daughters.

What makes this play as timely now as it was in Shakespeare's day is the question of how one generation transfers power, assets and control. It's what we talk about when we talk about Social Security, the retirement of the Baby Boomers and even what the government will look like in post-Mubarek Egypt.

Lear, played here by Thom Hofrichter, is easily blinded by the customary flattery of daughters Goneril and Regan. Hofrichter is mesmerizing as the king, portraying him as a man so utterly confident in his own power that he can imagine no harm as he tears a map of his nation apart. Lear is deaf to Cordelia's message of true love and in response throws a royal tantrum – a fit that marks the first steps of his descent.

A subplot involving treachery and sibling rivalry in the House of Gloucester adds much to the action. Scott Hess is excellent as noble, fugitive son Edgar who takes as his disguise mad Tom O'Bedlam, Meanwhile, Kevin Torwelle as the bastard son Edmund is

every bit as much the villain as Lear's faithless daughters. Scott Maughmer, as their easily manipulated father, suffers mightily at the havoc of the times.

While the action pivots around their cunning wiles. the daughters' parts are actually rather shallow. Crystal Cully's portrayal as evil daughter Goneril gives her a predatory snarl, and Amanda Prater's Regan almost

needs an exorcist. Good daughter Cordelia is sweetly played by Kearstyn Keller.

Corey Noble as loyal Kent and Brian Ernsberger as the Fool are notable as men who manage to stay with the King to offer common sense, decency and even wisdom.

Building on the repeat-

ed references in the text to drums, O'Connell has used the taiko-like drumming of Bryan Nellems, assisted by Wil Brown, to add another layer of rich dramatic depth and pacing to the play. Mark Delancy's raked set design is a perfect palette for the action, and the physical space is further defined and mood set by Miriam Morgan's subtle lighting design, with particular kudos for amazing storm effects in Act Two.

The Elizabethan-inspired costumes by Craig Humphrey, Jeanne Pendleton, Amber Klinker and crew are also quite impressive, particularly the King's beautiful robes and Goneril's dress, which she swirls with a villainous flair at every opportunity.

Humor & Heartache

Not long ago in the last century, before tweets and apps and Youtube and iPads, there was radio. From the 1920s until the early 1950s, radio informed and entertained millions of loyal listeners, making household names of such legendary comedians as Burns and Allen, Bob Hope, Jack Benny and Edgar Bergen. Having spent countless hours huddled around the family's Philco radio,

this was the comedy that inspired young Neil Simon and his older brother, Danny, growing up.

In his semi-autobiographical Brighton Beach plays, the 20th century theatre's most beloved writer of American comedy looks back on his humble origins via the semi-fictitious Jerome family in a trilogy of plays that are as entertaining alone as they are together. Set in the waning years of the Great Depression, Brighton Beach Memoirs is the childhood story of Simon's alter-ego, Eugene Morris Jerome, a wisecracking kid observing and chronicling his own young life in his memoirs. Its sequel, Biloxi Blues, follows Eugene as he takes his first tentative steps toward manhood in a Mississippi boot camp at the end of WWII.

The final chapter of the trilogy, Broadway Bound, now being presented by First Presbyterian Theater, picks up 12 years after Brighton Beach, as an older and somewhat wiser (but just as funny) Eugene and his brother Stanley (a thinly disguised version of Danny Simon) set their sights on making a living in the medium that has energized them their whole lives - radio comedy. And yet change is in the air and in the air-

Just as the new medium of television and pioneering entertainers like Milton Berle and Sid Caesar are changing life in living rooms across the country, the Jerome household is bracing for even more profound changes. Simon recounts the story of his family grappling with the newfound prosperity and possibilities of life in post-war America.

Now a young man, Eugene has given up baseball for writing, but he is still obsessed with un-gettable girls - and what were once the musings of a teenage boy are now the bread and butter of his profession. When Eugene and Stanley get their big break as radio writers, the family's struggles become comical fodder for anyone to hear, and Eugene is forced to face the reality that, even while living at home, with adulthood come consequences.

Recounted with a brilliant mix of humor and heartache, this is Neil Simon's story. This is the story of the beginning of a career, the beginning of an era of comedy and the beginning of a major American artist. Equal parts laughter and tears, it is a tale that rings very true and very human, even in a world dominated more by Wi-Fi than radio signals. In revisiting his own start in showbiz amidst such family turmoil, Simon traces how he became king of the one-liner by finding comedy in even the most heartbreaking moments of everyday life.

The cast features Larry Bower as Jack Jerome, Patrick Fruchey as Stanley Jerome, Peter Manges as Eugene Morris Jerome, Suzan Moriarty as Kate Jerome, Manny Silverman as Ben Epstein and Jan Venderly as Blanche Morton.





A Film That Wrestles With Real Life and Real Families

Maybe there is a dumber title for Tom McCarthy's wonderful new film *Win*, but I doubt it. Who wants to go see a movie with a bit of dopey business jargon for a title? Thankfully, this is a very satisfying, uplifting film that defies its name.

McCarthy makes movies in which characters who don't seem to belong together end up forming unexpected friendships, and those friendships evolve into special families. In *The Station Agent* those bonds form between a lunch wagon proprietor, a train fanatic and a grieving mother. In *The Visitor* the players are a reclusive widower professor and an African family of immigrants. In *Win Win* unique relationships form between a family living in New Jersey, an older man, his estranged grandson and assorted friends.

Paul Giamatti plays Mike Flaherty, a lawyer struggling to make ends meet while taking care of clients who are anything but wealthy. He's good to his wife and kids. He's kind to his needy, recently divorced friend Terry (Bobby Cannavale). He and Stephen (Jeffrey Tambor), the accountant he shares on office with, get along well and coach a high school wrestling team together. They're not up for coaches of the year, but they do it. Mike is a mostly decent guy who doesn't want his wife to know how precarious their financial situation is.

Mike complicates his situation further when he tells a judge he would like to become legal guardian to an elderly client, Leo Poplar (Burt Young), who is on the verge of being committed to a nursing home. Instead of helping Leo remain in his house, he puts him in the nice retirement home the state would have confined him to and collects a monthly check from Leo's estate.

Mike is not proud of what he's doing. It is one more thing



to keep from his wife, Jackie, a formidable character played with gusto by Amy Ryan. One day Leo's grandson, Kyle, shows up from Ohio. He's come to live with his grandfather, whom he has never met. Kyle looks like he's in trouble, and but claims he has nothing to admit to Mike.

Mike knows better and invites Kyle to move into his basement while he tries to find Kyle's mom. Mike eventually finds out she's in rehab and won't be out for weeks. Slowly, Kyle opens up to Jackie.

And because Win Win is a movie, it turns out Kyle is a very good wrestler, the very sport Mike coaches. He was kicked off his team in Ohio for stealing a car, which, he admits to Jackie, was "really stupid." Kyle enrolls at the school where Mike coaches, and he makes friends with the guys on the team. Kyle is so good that Mike's struggling friend Terry, who was a terrible wrestler in high school, begs Mike to let him be an assistant coach.

Kyle is played by Alex Shafer. This is his first film. He is a New Jersey 2010 state wrestling champion, but he's also a wonderful presence in the movie. Kyle is hard to figure out. He's done some dumb stuff, but, as everyone gets to know him, they can't help liking him. We can't help liking him. He's quiet and kind. He's disciplined. He has bleached hair and cool tattoos.

There's something wonderful about seeing a male teenage

character who isn't a moron or a thug or a vampire or a hottie or any other type you see in movies for teens. Kyle seems to be settling in so well with Mike and Jackie that we can't help but wonder about the source of his past troubles.

Then his mom (Melanie Lynskey) arrives, and it all becomes clear. As Terry says, "not for nothing, Kyle hates his mom." She's not a nice person. She wants her dad's money. She wants her son back. Kyle behaves badly at a wrestling match because she stresses him out. Mike's shenanigans come to light. Jackie is furious with him. Kyle is furious as well. When the dust settles – and it takes some time and apologizing and compromising – we get a happy ending.

The joys of *Win Win* don't come from a twisted or unexpected plot. Rather, the real joy is in the moments between the characters that feel genuine. Jackie talks and acts like a real mom, like someone we know. She deals with Kyle in a way his own mother never has, and he drinks it in. Mike and Terry talk to each other the way real friends talk to each other.

These characters have flaws, failures, and lapses in judgment. In other words, they are human, but as Jackie says to Kyle, "Well, we all deserve a second chance." The characters here think about what they are doing. They don't always get it right, but they try.

Life is confusing, complicated, full of changes and challenges. Win Win acknowledges all of that. If I were naming this film, I might suggest Wrestle With It.

Also at the Box: Tyler's Perry's new flick, Big Happy Family, brought in over \$25 million over its first weekend, landing it at last weekend's No. 2 spot. (right down to the overly simple drum and bass tracks) that I can't help but wonder what Mr. Malkmus thinks of the song. Lead single "Rubber" is a reverb- and feedback-layered haze of a song that borders on stoner rock. After a few listens the "Should I Get In" hook feels as accessible as anything, and damn if that haze doesn't make my mind feel smoky and relaxed, just like any number of great Jesus and Mary Chain tracks. The track ends up being a perfectly long, perfectly washed-out, guitar-stuffed closer for what is an otherwise poppy record.

"Shook Down," another of my instant favorites, reminds very much of Bandwagonesque Teenage Fanclub, playing through like something of an indie rock ballad, floating by with jangley guitars, honey-sweet vocals, a solid melody and a classic hook that couples will play for each other for decades to come. "Georgia," another mid-tempo banger with a big riff, uses boy-girl vocals perfectly in a way that almost reminds of The Pixies,

What comes through on every song is how much this crew adores music – good music. Shoegaze. Indie Rock. Punk. College rock. Stoner rock. Whatever. When I hear a record like Yuck it makes me want to argue that the 90s was the best decade for music. It probably wasn't (a lot of those sludgy rock records, not to mention all that Fred Dursty and Master P-y stuff, haven't aged too well), but if you take the best bands and albums of the 90s - pretty much all of which seem to be represented here - you have a pretty damn good case, making this record feel like something of a musical dissertation on the period. Even the less impressive works, such as "Suicide Policeman" and "Operation," are cool cuts.

It'll be interesting to see what this band does next. I doubt if anyone will complain if they continue making these 90s college rock-influenced boy-girl indie pop jams. But, my hunch is that, as they're still all very young (around 21 on average, I think), Yuck will grow and grow and grow, this eponymous debut standing as their A.M. sort of starter record. Whether or not they have a Yankee Hotel Foxtrot or Summerteeth in them remains to be seen. Of all the new bands out there, these guys seem like a very good bet for the "Next Best Thing," already displaying an amazing understanding of pop craft. Yuck, I'm in love. (Greg Locke)


