Cover Story • Fort Wayne Civic Theatre --

It's popular to note that there are only two things you can count on in this life - death and taxes. But in truth there are a few other reliable bets, and one of them is that the Fort Wayne Civic Theatre will announce an exciting lineup of productions for the coming season. This year is no different, with another eclectic and crowd-pleasing slate of musicals and plays ahead.

The 2011-12 season's most recognizable offerings include Hairspray (July 23-August 7), Chicago (October 29-November 13) and Gypsy (March 3-18). Rounding out the season at the Arts United Center will be Alive & Dead in Indiana (June 1-10, 2012) and the winning play from the Third Annual Northeast Indiana Playwright Festival, performed for the first time at the Arts United Center June 2-9. Two additional shows - A Tuna Christmas (December 2-18) and The Farnsworth Invention (March 30-April 15) - complete the season and will be staged as part of the Civic Off-Main series at the Allen County Public Library.

When looking ahead to 2011-12, it was important to not only find shows that would sell tickets but ones that would appeal to a broad range of audiences, says Civic Theatre Executive Director Phillip Colglazier.

"We tried to make a season as diverse as our community is, but we also wanted to take advantage of what was

Availability is a large factor in determining any theater season, since not all shows are up for grabs at the local level. This year the Civic is taking advantage of some shows outside their grasp in previous seasons, even though it might mean putting forth a little extra effort to make it hap-

"Hairspray just became available for community theaters, so we jumped at it," says Colglazier. "Hairspray appeals to a younger generation and is popular with high school kids, particularly since the release of the movie. Gypsy, on the other hand, has been around forever and is a classic piece of musical theatre. Gypsy has one of the best musical theatre scores, and generations of audiences are very familiar with it."

Gypsy may be a classic, but like all classics it ages well, even for a generation of theater fans who may or may not remember Ethel Merman's lauded turn as Mama. A popular new biography of Gypsy Rose Lee (American Beauty, written by Karen Abbott, who also wrote the tantalizing Sin in the Second City a few years ago) has kept the legend of Gypsy alive, and revivals on stage and screen - including a Bette Midler performance on CBS in 1993 - meant that the memorable Jule Styne/Stephen Sondheim songs haven't faded from memory. A Broadway revival with eventual Tony Award winner Tyne Daly two decades ago even provides an amusing memory for Colglazier

"When I was working in New York I was rehearsing for a show in a theater next to where they were rehearsing Gypsy. One day I came out of rehearsal with a castmate, and as we walked onto the street a limo pulled up and I joked 'Our limousine has arrived!' Just then Tyne Daly zoomed by me, got into the limo and called out to us 'You snooze,



you lose!' That's a great memory, but Gypsy was also the first show I did at Ball State and the one that really started it all for me, so it's very special for a lot of reasons.

While Hairspray may lure the kids and Gypsy may strike a chord with older audiences, bridging that generation gap of sorts is Chicago, a longtime favorite among Broadway fans but revived a few years ago not only with Bebe Neuwirth's legendary performance on Broadway but with the 2002 film that brought movie audiences back to theaters for musicals. Starring Richard Gere, Catherine Zeta-Jones and Renée Zellweger, Chicago's dazzling dance numbers demonstrate why Bob Fosse is still relevant more than 20 years after his death.

Colglazier had to fight hard to bring Chicago to Fort Wayne and happily took advantage of some old connections to do so.

"Chicago is an interesting story because they're notorious for not offering the rights to community theatres, preferring to let Broadway and touring companies do it. So when we first applied for the rights to do it we were denied, but I was told 'You can appeal it if you want.' And I said, 'Then I do want to appeal!' I had worked with Kathleen Marshall in theme parks many years ago, and it was her brother, Rob Marshall, who directed the film Chicago a few years ago. So when I appealed I made those connections, and it worked; we were given the rights to stage the show here."

Making connections is helpful in many areas of entertainment, and this year the Civic Theatre is making some significant Indiana connections with their choice of plays. The Farnsworth Invention, written by Aaron Sorkin (of "West Wing" and The

Social Network fame), highlights the historic and very familiar story of Philo T. Farnsworth as he vied for the rights to one of the most important inventions of all time - the beloved television - and is sure to draw Fort Wayne audiences who take pride in our Farnsworth connection. While Fort Wayne is never mentioned in the play, Colglazier says local interest of the suspenseful and even tragic story of Farnsworth will hold special appeal to anyone interested in Fort Wayne his-

Alive & Dead in Indiana is an entirely different sort of story but one that also connects to Fort Wayne and Colglazier in many ways. Based on a story by Fort Wayne native Michael Martone and adapted for the stage by Doug Long. Alive & Dead in Indiana required that Colglazier work to obtain rights a play yet again, and he was helped out by a lucky coincidence.

'I was talking to Doug Long, and I thought his name was familiar. And then he heard my name and thought it was familiar. Then we realized we had gone to Ball State together, so it was another case of 'small world.' We're very excited to have this play during our Playwright Festival because both Michael Martone

and Doug Long will be joining us to talk about the playwright and author adaptation relationship during the week which will also feature next year's winner of the playwright contest."

Also significant to that process will be moving the winning playwright's work to the big stage of the Arts United Center. That show will run concurrently with Alive & Dead in Indiana.

One added bonus to the 2011-12 season will be the September 17 fundraiser performance of Fractured Fairy Tales featuring local celebrities and company CEOs giving their laughs and star power to a clever way to raise funds and friends for Fort Wayne Civic Theatre. Colglazier says that, like the old "Carol Burnett Show," these performances are often better when something goes wrong, and he says audiences have enjoyed the relaxed and fun environment created when non-theatre professionals try their

Imagine a full-on audio assault, basically the equivalent of a kick in the pants, only for the ears. At the risk of mixing a few too many metaphors, we're talking about a no holds barred cage fight between rock n' roll in one corner and the heaviest of heavy metals in the other.

Obviously, we're talking about the Raid the Nation Tour, which will be hitting Piere's Wednesday, May 18 for an evening sure to punch you right in the face, in a good way. Headliners Papa Roach will be joined on the million-dollar stage by Escape the Fate and Pop Evil.

And "raid" is right. Papa Roach haven't sold 10 million album copies worldwide by being

shrinking violets. This quartet from Vacaville, California has a sound that pounds and drives and takes no prisoners. All it takes is a few short listens to some of their highest-charting hits -"Kick in the Teeth," for instance, and "Burn" to understand that this Jacoby Shaddix-fronted act likes to make a big

impression. These songs cover the gamut of emotion from anger to fury to broiling resentment.

Actually there's a lot of love in there too, and even though it's often of the unrequited variety (see their incredibly popular single "Forever"), Shaddix and his mates - Jerry Horton on lead guitar, Tobin Esperance on bass and Tony Palermo on drums – know quite bit about the subject. This is evident when you consider that Shaddix, a very inked-up guy, has the Chinese character for "love" tattooed on his neck and the English characters for "love" on his right hand. And while I've got you going all mushy on the guy, he married his high school sweetheart, Kelly, in 1996, and the lovebirds have matching star tattoos by their right eyes. I know, right? Awwww ...

Papa Roach got their start way back in Shaddix' high school days when he met drummer Dave Buckner during a football game and the two started talking music. Shaddix and Buckner recruited bassist Will James and trombone player Ben Luther, and together they entered their high school talent show where they performed their own version of Jimi Hendrix' "Fire."

They lost the contest, but you could safely say they won the war. Having gone through a couple lineup changes (they ditched the trombone player after only three months; Buckner left, came back, left again; James left and stayed gone) Papa Roach soon had a fan following to match their own drive to tour and create. In 1999, under the DreamWorks Records label, they released their full-length debut, Infest. It sold 30,000 copies in its first week and made Papa Roach (named for Shaddix' step-grandfather William Roatch, who committed suicide in 1996) an almost overnight success. Soon the guys were hopping on the Vans

Warped Tour and playing with the likes of Limp Bizkit, Eminem and Ludacris.

They followed Infest with Lovehatetragedy, which, while not selling quite as quickly as Infest, did chart higher and marked the band's transition from nu metal rap (that's right - these white boys can rhyme) to

a more traditional rock sound. It also introduced the world to one of their most beloved tunes -"She Loves Me Not" - and got them into a Pepsi commercial.

You might think that selling one of the country's top cola brands is the pinnacle for many rock bands, but Papa Roach had more tricks up their collective sleeve. The year 2003 saw them release Getting Away With Murder, and, boy, did they. The single from that album, "Scars," sent the Getting Away With Murder straight to Platinum, and while fans whined about what they considered the softer side of Shaddix and company displayed on the release, it propelled the band onwards and upwards and road-wards. In other words, the dudes hit the tour bus for pretty much all of 2005, hanging out with Slipknot, Dead Poetic and Unwritten Law, among others.

The next year they went right back to the

Are you cool with waxing your backside before heading out to the county fair? Do you do a little yoga on your bass boat?

If you've answered yes to any of the above questions, you just might be a Metro Jethro.

According to the official definition on comedian Jon Reep's website, a Metro Jethro is (1) anyone who was born and raised in a small, rural area and now has to function in a big urban area (or vice versa); (2) anyone who understands and appreciates both small town life and big city life; or (3) Jon Reep.

There's even an artist's rendering of a

prototype Metro Jethro above the definition to clear up any confusion. The rather c o m e l y gentleman decked out in a crisp

white shirt, tie and black jacket on top and cutoffs and flip-flops on bottom. At his feet is a jug of moonshine; in his hand, a martini.

This gentleman, minus the mullet, represents Reep, who was born and raised in Hickory, North Carolina but now spends much of his time in Los Angeles, where, since 2000, he's doing the whole standup comedy thing. It's paid off. After sweating it out in audition after audition, dank, smoky club after dank, smoky club, Reep eventually landed the part of the pot-smoking farmer, Raymus, in the comedy Harold and Kumar Escape from Guantanamo Bay. You can also see his pale mug on the ABC sitcom "Rodney," where he plays the dimwitted cop, Gerald Bob.

Perhaps his biggest claim to fame, according to his website anyway, is his work as the redhead hillbilly "Hemi Guy" on the Dodge Ram commercials. He had one line, but it was a big one: "That thing gotta Hemi?"

If you don't recognize him yet, you will when I tell you he was the top finisher in season five of NBC's "Last

Comic Standing." Known for his bits on the many splendors of life in the country and his sage advice on how to survive these crazy times, Reep recently created Nakediquette, rules for how to conduct



yourself when nude in a locker room. (Ladies, these only apply to men; women, Reep says, can whatever they want na-

ked, as long as he gets to watch.)

The guiding principles of Nakediquette include: you only get five minutes to be naked; no nude talking; and do not blow dry your butt.

So far, so solid. What about his take on the country pastime of tubing? "I like it because I can drink and pee in the same spot." His ideas on marriage? "Me and my wife are trying to make marriage gansta. You got the Bloods, the Crips. We're the whips."

Like what if the lyricist Hal David had been able to excise the word "raindrops" from his head when writing the song "Raindrops Keep Falling on My Head" with Burt Bacharach? But the more pertinent question is whether B.J. Thomas would be the cultural touchstone and beloved tugger of nostalgic heartstrings he is now had he not been the man who eventually got the "Raindrops" gig. Would people

still be buying tickets to his shows, including his May 21 concert at Foellinger Theater? The answer, of course, is ves.

At least that's what Thomas thinks. And he's had 40 years and countless hours riding in a tour bus and waiting in airports to think about it. In fact, he's thought about it so much I didn't even have to ask the question when he called me from a hotel room in Nashville, where he was waiting for his midnight bus to whisk him and his band off on yet another swing through the country.

I had been searching recent news items for mention of his performances and what kept popping up were not reviews or schedules but things like obituaries and columns. There was a story about a funeral in South Carolina in April where a friend of the deceased talked about how the two played Thomas's second Top 10 hit, 1968's

"Hooked on a Feeling," over and over until the needle wore out. The guy even sang a few verse at the service.

When I mentioned the funeral story and another about the recent National Record Store Day where the reporter invoked his name, he seemed surprised "That's unbelievable, I can't explain that."

"Your music seems to touch people in a powerful way," I said.

In his teens he sang in the church choir and then joined the Houston-based group The Triumphs. The first record The Triumphs released was a cover of Hank Williams's "I'm So Lonesome I Could Cry," and it was a hit. Thomas left The Triumphs and signed

with Scepter Records. His first big solo hit was "Hooked on a Feeling." Then came "Raindrops," which had tremendously broad appeal and brought him not only equally

broad fame but a load of money too. Sudden stardom did to Thomas what it does to a lot of people, and after a struggle with drugs in the early 70s he dropped off the Top 10 lists for a few years.

Then in 1975 he came roaring back with the smash "(Hey Won't You Play) Another Somebody Done Somebody Wrong Song" which, in addition to being

one of the longest song titles in history. crossed the adult contemporary boundary where it rose to No. 1. It also became a No.1 country hit at the same time. Thomas' subsequent coun-


try hits included "Whatever Happened to Old-Fashioned Love," "New Looks From an Old Lover" and "Two Car Garage." In 1988 he recorded "As Long as We Got Each Other," the theme song to the family-based sitcom "Growing Pains."

It's those songs and many others that keep Thomas in demand He and his longtime band just wrapped up a 29-day tour in Australia and they're back on the road again.

"This year is going to be our busiest in four or five years," he said. "We'll be doing about 100 dates."

Even after all these years, Thomas is still hooked on the feeling he gets while perform-

"As long as I feel I'm doing it to a certain standard I'll keep it up. I still have a burning desire to do it. I'm very fortunate to have worked with great composers and to have had great audiences."



"I get that a lot about my gospel music," Thomas said, "but it's mostly 'Raindrops.' I think I would have been okay without it, but every couple of years when I run into Ray on the road I thank him for turning it down. We laugh about it.'

What made Thomas the star he was, and remains, is his unmistakable voice - a warm tenor imbued with assured emotion. He has credited his style to Jackie Wilson and the other great Motown and R&B singers of the late 60s, many of whom he toured with. It was his voice that enabled him to sell 70 million records over his career. He's had 15 Top 40 hits, won five Grammys, two Dove Awards and 10 Top 40 country hits. In 1981 became the 60th member of the Grand Ole

studio, only the studio was a mansion, to record The Paramour Sessions. The album had roughly 45 different titles - Days of War, Nights of Love was one of the rejects, as was Forever, after the single - but the band eventually settled on the homage to the historic home in L.A. where they laid down

It was right around this time when Buckner left the band for good. According to Shaddix, Buckner's departure was necessary for everyone involved. Shaddix told Launch Radio that Buckner had to go to rehab "to clean up his act 'cause he was out of his

Luckily for Papa Roach and their now rabid fans, Tony Palermo stepped up to the kit, and the guys, tireless, always writing, put out Metamorphosis in 2008. Again almost titled Days of War, Nights of Love, Metamorphosis was so christened to acknowledge the many changes the band had gone through during their 10 years with the DreamWorks label. After more tours with brothers in arms Nickelback, Buckcherry, Avenged Sevenfold and Burn Halo, they put out Time for Annihilation, which includes revenge tunes "Kick in the Teeth" and "Burn."

The plan now, following the Raid the Nation tour, is to head back to the studio or mansion or whatever to work on a new album that will explore "new electronic sounds.'

One thing is for sure. Papa Roach aren't going anywhere, unless you count the Sonisphere Festival in Finland where they'll headline with Slipknot this summer.

As Shaddix said to a writer with the Dallas Music Guide, "We're a band that tries to walk that line between metal, hardcore, punk rock and pop music, and we do our best at trying to make it all cool."

Times New Viking Dancer Equired

Times New Viking's first really nationally noticed album, *Rip It Off*, rolled the Columbus, Ohio trio's stripped-down melodies in noise and tape hiss. And that was cool. Then 2009 brought us *Born Again Revisited*, also unapologetically noisy (and actually recorded to VHS tape).



Just when you think this

whole lo-fi thing might be turning into a played-out gimmick, the drums/guitar/keyboard combo throw you something of a curve – or, at the very least, a change-up. *Dancer Equired*, TNV's first effort for the iconic indie label Merge, certainly can't be called pristinely recorded, but it's definitely a step up in accessibility.

Smartly, TNV retain their playful looseness and Velvets-worthy angular hookiness as they ditch the more overt sonic dirt that coated previous efforts like an applique. Good for them. Now, you can hear most of the words, and in songs like the rolling, almost stately "Downtown Eastern Bloc" you really get the sense that these kids are growing comfortable enough with their songwriting chops to let the songs stand for themselves.

The tight, prettily propulsive "Don't Go to Liverpool" contains all the verve and vibe that initially made TNV an indie sensation, while the lower-key "Somebody's Slave" points to where the band might be heading next time they hit the studio.


Unison vocals and Moe Tucker-style pounding by drummer/singer Adam Elliott push "No Rumors" along, despite its lack of an obvious hook. Another tune (which I'll prudishly leave unnamed in this family paper ... buy the album and you'll know right away which one I'm referring to) brims with punk energy and undeniable pop smarts; it begs to be cranked up. The GBV-meets-Shins "Good" consists only of keyboardist/vocalist Beth Murphy's voice and a strummed guitar, but it — like nearly every other song on this album — delivers the goods in a compact way that's easy to listen to but not at all slick.

You know you're in the post major label age when you consider that the Merge roster includes both TNV and the chart-topping, Grammy-winning Arcade Fire. Consider *Dancer Equired* Times New Viking's coming out party. (D.M. Jones)

James Blake

James Blake

The son of famed English session musician James Litherland (Leo Sayer) and a former Goldsmiths music student (Goldsmith, is, incidentally, a program known for producing some of the most successful English artists), 21-year-old electronic musician James Blake is the new hot buzz of 2011. Having pushed his new



name last year with an acclaimed trilogy of EPs that made their way around the hip ear circuits late in the year, and now, with his self-produced eponymous debut out on shelves, Blake has brought in even more listeners, thanks in part to the blog and web chatter his cover of Feist's "Limit to Your Love" has seen since being released as a teaser last November.

Listing his genre as "post-dubstep" and citing the xx as his primary influence, Blake if one of the strangest new artists to see universal buzz in a good long while. He is, if nothing else, perhaps the most modern indie-level musician in the years, sounding not only like the xx at times, but also taking quite a bit from Bon Iver, Antony and the Johnsons, Mount Kimbie, Jens Lekman and Bon Iver side project Volcano Choir – all *very* modern-sounding indie acts. Using auto-tune on every song so much so that it's a defining element of his sound, Blake has constructed oddball minimalist electro-pop songs that almost always feel mechanical and cold, only warming when Blake's deep, simple piano chords kick in from time to time.

My first two listens confused me, to be honest. I insisted that this was an Antony side project, and that Antony had just slapped a picture of some handsome young man on the cover to deepen the myth of some new moniker he was using to grab some new ears. But, supposedly, this is truly *not* Antony singing, though I have no doubt that

Reckoning (1984)

Following the college radio success of their debut *Murmur*, R.E.M. hit the studio to begin work on their new project, *Reckoning*. Some of the music produced for *Reckoning* was written in 1981, but after touring with it the band



felt that it would make sense to record the songs for this sophomore release.

The album opens with "Harborcoat," an alt-country pop song with spacious guitars and up-tempo drumming behind the crisp vocals of Michael Stipe. "7 Chinese Brothers" follows with a mellow vibe of a warm Georgia evening and the hefty guitar arrangements of Peter Buck. "So. Central Rain" is up next with its Southern, toe-tapping charm and college-rock blues (for 1984 at least). The faster "Pretty Persuasion" has all of the harmonies and beats of the *Murmur* sessions with the refined thumping of drummer Bill Berry.

Side two (or should I say "side L?") is a little more sober and starts off with a couple of tracks that clock in at under three minutes. "Camera" is a tribute to a friend of the band killed in a car accident near the University of Georgia. It's a great track, but sort of throws the whole vibe of the record out the window.

The best track, possibly one of the best songs they ever wrote, is also on this album. "(Don't Go Back to) Rockville" was rumored to have been written in 1980, and Stipe and company said they had been playing it for almost two years before they ever thought about putting it on vinyl. Bassist Mike Mills wrote it about his girlfriend who was considering moving home to Maryland after a couple of semesters in Athens.

R.E.M. occasionally "play some shows" with their original lineup (Berry retired in 1987). They just released the respectable *Collapse Into Now* in March. (*Dennis Donahue*)

Blake himself would even admit the influence. The music, however, is not reminiscent of Antony or Bon Iver, instead sometimes sounding like an offbeat, minimalist take on Mount Kimbie's excellent 2010 record, *Crooks & Lovers*, and even bringing to mind Fourtet's recent record, *There is Love in You*. But what makes Blake's record so worthwhile, what makes it work at all, is how drop-dead serious his youth allows him to take himself. This is, by far, one of the most dramatic- and morose-sounding records I've ever heard, even when it's taking time to hint at dance floor rhythms.

"Limit to Your Love" is, for sure, one heck of a song. Blake breaks the mostly simple song into distinct sections, adding touches here and there that don't seem probable but somehow do fine as a complete work. Despite being a true minimalist composition that mostly relies on a keyboard, a voice and a mess of computer tinkering, the song is so drenched in ideas that it just might be the kind of song people talk about and reference for years to come. Another standout track, "I Never Learnt to Share," further displays Blake's minimalist mastery, creating an argument that he is as much an Ideas Man-type producer as he is a young kid playing around on a computer with a bunch of hacked programs and – we have to assume – an at least somewhat stellar voice.

Two weeks worth of listening. That's what it took for me to admit to myself that there is in fact something special about this record. Does it deserve to be the best reviewed album from the first quarter of 2011? Heck no it doesn't. But *James Blake* does have a second-generation Bon Iver appeal that makes it one of the Top 5 or so must-hear records so far of 2011. The real question is, "Will I be laughing at myself for standing up for this record come December, or will it continue to grow on me and maybe even possibly go down as one of my very favorites of the year?" That's the rub ... I really can't begin to guess how this record will age. It could go either way. No doubt about it, however. If you like forward-thinking music and don't mind an excessive amount of auto-tuner action (and blips and ticks), give this record the few spins it takes to sink in. (*Greg W. Locke*)



Manga-ling Shakespeare

Othello, illustrated by Ryuta Osado Amulet Books, 2011

In the old days, if you didn't want to read the Shakespeare play assigned by your high school English teacher you'd buy the CliffsNotes for the play and use the synopsis to make it seem as if you'd read the original text. It's not that easy any longer, apparently, and kids who want a shortcut to Shakespeare have some unusual options.

Of course, it's no new thing for classic literature to be adapted into new, theoretically more accessible forms. Film versions of novels and plays have been around for a long time, and when it comes to Shakespeare, setting these film adaptations somewhere other than 17th-century Europe has been a popular approach. These days a production of a Shakespeare play with actors in Elizabethan dress would seem hopelessly quaint and dull. It's 2011, though, and reaching kids today is going to take something flashier than Leonardo DiCaprio. So Amulet Books has taken the logical path and combined an

a solution for today: manga Shakespeare.

Othello is a good test case for the

- with a contemporary style to come up with




manga treatment. Although full of intrigue and exciting in its own way, it's not one of Shakespeare's most action-packed

plays. Set in Venice, it's the story of Othello, the Moorish commander of the Venetian army. Othello has recently promoted Cassio to be his right-hand man, in the process angering Iago, who thinks that he himself deserved the job. Othello has also recently eloped with Desdemona, the daughter of a local nobleman. The scorned and devious Iago decides to construct his revenge against Othello with a plot that is simple on the surface but quickly grows complex.

The details are somewhat confusing, but essentially Iago plans to convince Othello that his beloved Desdemona is engaged in an affair with the treacherous Cassio, thereby turning the general on his new lieutenant and his new wife at the same time and resulting, no doubt, in a tragedy

Freakonomics

What do cheating sumo wrestlers, inner-city kids with "black-sounding" names, the hidden reason behind the steep drop in crime during the 1990s and the efficacy (or lack thereof) of bribing teenagers to get better grades all have in common? The answer: economist Steven Levitt. Levitt has used statistics (or, rather, his close analysis of a mountain of data) to either prove or debunk certain long-held assumptions of all of the aforementioned topics. And if all this doesn't sound like the ingredients for a dynamic, funny, fascinating and highly entertaining documentary, then I haven't explained it well enough, because Freakonomics is all of the above and more.

Levitt, who along with journalist Stephen Dubner wrote the mega-bestselling book of the same name, is a quiet, unassuming family man who, he fully confesses, had trouble potty-training his own toddler using a system of tried-and-true incentives (M&Ms), but who also unpacked a hidden (and controversial) explanation for why crime rates plummeted across the country at just about the same time that politicians were pledging to get tough on crime. (Hint: It had nothing to do with sentencing laws or increased enforcement.)

Freakonomics is split up into several segments, each directed by a different acclaimed documentary filmmaker. Super-Size Me director Morgan Spurlock does the segment on "black" names, and his breezy but brisk style takes potentially thorny subject matter and makes it instead something quite light and insightful. Jesus Camp director Heidi Ewing follows several under-performing ninth grade students as they enter an experimental program in which they get paid cold hard cash for getting better grades. (The results are, overall, somewhat surprising.) And, in the strongest segment of the entire movie, Alex Gibney (Taxi to the Darkside) explores the hidden world of sumo wrestling, a sport that is just as much about honor and ritual and "purity" as it is about wrestling. It is also a sport that is, as Levitt proves by examining the numbers, rife with cheating. The Japanese scenes are beautifully shot, and the story of how these wrestlers make it to the top ranks in their field is surprisingly riveting.

One of Levitt's core assumptions is that if you provide people with incentives for doing something, then people will find a way to game the system, find the loophole or out-and-out cheat. Another is that people too often mistake correlation for causation. When children who are given bizarre names like Temptress or Loser end up making less money than their conventionally-named counterparts, it's not necessarily the name itself that has spelled out their fate so much as it is that a child whose parents would give someone such a name in the first place tend to be low on the socio-economic ladder and so have several strikes against them at the outset.

The biggest danger of an anthology movie such as this one, with each part directed by a different person, is that the whole might somehow end up being less than the sum of its parts, or that, at the very least, the movie won't hang together as one cohesive film. *Freakonomics* falls into neither of these traps. The movie is uniformly excellent, and the fact that the very likeable team of Levitt and Dubner appears throughout the film in little interim pieces that are often just as interesting as the longer pieces, gives the movie a real feeling of cohesion and consistency.

Freakonomics is one of the strongest new documentaries I have seen in some time.

Hereafter

Do not let what you've heard about the first 10 minutes of *Hereafter*— the fact that they're the most intense and awe-inspiring part of the entire film by



far - put you off from giving the rest of the movie a try too. It's true that the movie opens with some rather impressive CGI imagery of a tsunami hitting an exotic seaside paradise and killing thousands. It's also true that the movie never manages to reach those high levels of intensity again, but then director Clint Eastwood is not really trying to outshine those first moments either. The waves sweep in impassively and do their thing - nature is so cruel precisely because it's so lacking in intention, malicious or otherwise - and then the rest of the movie happens, and many viewers, having gotten the wrong idea about what kind of movie this is based on its opener, will inevitably be disappointed. That, however, is their problem, not the movie's, and certainly not Eastwood's, who as far as I can tell is one of the few directors in Hollywood who gets to do exactly as he pleases. (Who

else could get away with, in the space of just a few years, making (1) a WWII drama from the point of view of the Japanese in 100 percent subtitles (*Letters from Iwo Jima*), (2) a multi-cultural drama starring himself (*Gran Torino*) and (3) now *Hereafter*, a quiet and slow-paced meditation about what, if anything, awaits us after we die.

Eastwood turns 81 next month, and so it is no surprise that the ultimate questions might be at the forefront of his mind. Eastwood's films often seem to me to be straightforward, workmanlike, fairly staid affairs, with no real telltale stylistic touch on the filmmaker's part. This isn't a

criticism, only an observation. Eastwood arose out of a pre-1970s, pre-"auteur" Hollywood, and he's never seemed all that interested in making a "Clint Eastwood Joint" per se. And yet, in *Hereafter*, which he didn't write (Peter Morgan did), the movie has a quiet urgency and personal feel to it that I found myself responding to, even as many others around me began snoozing off. (I wonder: If the movie had dispensed with the amazing tsunami sequence altogether, how many would be complaining about the rest of the movie now?)

Hereafter tells three separate stories taking place in three separate countries, though all three strands do meet up at the end. Matt Damon stars as George, a man who from a young age has possessed the gift (the curse, as he sees it) of being able to communicate with the deceased. He has renounced his gift and settled into a low-paying blue collar job, even though his brother (Jay Mohr) is constantly urging him to capitalize on his powers. Meanwhile, French journalist Marie (Cécile De France) is haunted by her near-death experience in the tsunami a few months earlier, and two precocious twin boys in London (George and Frankie McClaren) deal with a severely alcoholic mother and do their best to avoid being put into the custody of social services. Just how these stories come together I will not say, beyond pointing out that the "climax" of the film, as it were, occurs at the London Book Fair and that no CGI effects were

You've got to hand it to a filmmaker brave enough to open a movie with a watery catastrophe and end it in a place where the most violent thing that happens is that highly literate people ask noted authors for their autographs. I really liked *Hereafter*, albeit in a low-key sort of way. I admire movies that ask big questions, that take the audience's collective intelligence for granted, that don't follow structural rules and don't seem to be aware of mainstream audience expectations. Come for the tsunami; stay for the book fair.

Letting the 70s Shine

Theatre's exuberant presentation of the musical Godspell is as light and joyous as a Ukrainian Easter egg. I had to agree with the Catholic priest sitting to my right who said, when all was sung and done, that it is clearly the product of a great deal of teamwork graced by some very talented, dedicated people.

Guest director Doug King, music director Eunice Wadewitz, and assistant director/stage manag-

er Nan Durant have returned to the original early-70s version of this now venerable classic. It's back to the "clowns in a schoolyard" concept, but with upbeat musical arrangements and some impressive multimedia presentations, not to mention engaging dance numbers.

From its beginnings as college student John-Michel Tebelak's reaction to a stuffy mainline church's Easter service in Pittsburgh, Godspell earned Broadway acclaim thanks in part to music and lyrics by then-newcomer Stephen Schwartz. The costumes and sweet songs were often linked to the hippies of the day. Hippies and







Lunafest Offers Unique Look at Women's Lives

Lunafest is like a box of chocolates. You never know what you are going to get. I'm not one to invoke *Forrest Gump* often, if ever, but in this case the reference just fits. Lunafest is an annual festival of short films "by, for and about women." Luna bars are a healthy choice for women, and the company uses Lunafest to raise money and awareness about breast cancer prevention and charities in the communities where the festival plays.

This year, the 10th anniversary of the festival, Lunafest will be in town for one night, next Wednesday, May 18 for shows at 6:30 and 8:30. The films will be presented at Cinema Center. The festival is being brought to town by Fort Wayne Feminists and is supported by Cinema Center. There is no set admission fee. Organizers are asking for a donations from \$5 to \$25. All funds raised will benefit the Breast Cancer Fund (www.breastcancerfund.org) and locally the Fort Wayne Feminists and the Women-in-Need Fund.

I enjoy short films, but sometimes a whole program of them gives me whiplash when films differ dramatically in content and style. This year's Lunafest not only features wonderful films, but it is arranged to flow very naturally from one film to the next. The films are a mix of live action and animation, feature and documentary, English and foreign language. The entire program runs about 90 minutes, which feels just right.

The program begins with *The Translator*. A filmmaker looking for a little inspiration leaves her editing system reluctantly to meet her boyfriend to go out to the movies. Their subway ride together helps her finish her film and alter her life.

Getting a Grip is set on a trolley car in San Francisco. We hear the story of Fannie Barnes, the first and only woman to become a cable car operator. She accomplishes this amazing feat at age 52. Fannie is a strong, proud and delightful charac-

Touch, the last of the films involving vehicles on tracks, is set on a subway platform. A woman who seems quite melancholy feels the rush of the train go by. A young woman arrives on the platform. She's very chatty, and this is just what the other woman needs. I love any movie that invokes Wings of Desire, and Touch does so beautifully.

There aren't many men in any of these films, but the men in *Tightly Knit* share a love of knitting. This gang of knitting nuts freely admit that knitting is almost an obsession. Their creations are hilarious. Their philosophies of knitting and bonding are formed out of much quality time spent together.

Top Spin is a look into the life of Ariel, a 14-year-old table tennis phenom who wants to become a world champion. She practices and trains six hours a day. She is a marvel to watch. The film is a look into a world I didn't know existed. Ariel and her parents work together to strengthen her skills and find balance between life and table tennis.

Thembi's Diary is the first animated film in the program. Based on the true story of a young woman with AIDS, the film follows Thembi, who was given a tape recorder when she was 19. The narration is courtesy of Thembi's real voice acquainting us with how she became infected and how she fights the disease and fights to enjoy every day. The animation is handsome, but it is Thembi's lilting voice that makes the film memorable.

Emma Lazenby made *Mother of Many* as a tribute to her mother who was a midwife for many years. Babies are born in this film, but don't be squeamish. It's an animated film, highly

stylized. It's basically just a day in the life of a midwife who is calm, cool and collected as nervous moms and dads await the babies.

Irene is also a family affair. Director Lindsay Goodall is

the granddaughter of Irene, who is suffering from Alzheim-

er's. Irene's daughter is in need of a vacation, and Irene must go to stay in an assisted living center for a week. Irene wants to stay at home, but with the care and patience of her family, this bump/twist in the road turns out okay. Irene is home in time to celebrate her 92nd birthday.

Miracle Lady is the story of two women who wait. They

Miracle Lady is the story of two women who wait. They each have an odd story behind their waiting. The animation style used to tell this rather whimsical and strange story suits the story well.

Love on the Line is also animated. It is the story of a young man and a young woman longing to be together. Their form of communication is the telegraph. While there are lots of dots and dashes and a very period feel in the drawings and settings the pair could be on Twitter.

That's 10 films altogether. None is longer than 12 minutes. Some are as short as five minutes. But like good short stories, these films get you into their worlds quickly and completely. Not one of the films is a strict comedy, and oddly for me the films that work at a sense of humor aren't quite as moving as the films that tackle something tough head-on.

Lunafest is "for" women according to the official language of the festival, but the films are appropriate for men. I can't imagine that anyone wouldn't be inspired by these stories and the lives of the women living them.

of Shakespearean proportions. It does just that, but not quite in the way that Iago planned.

Sorting out the confusion is where the manga comes in, right? Not quite. The book uses the play's original text, so we don't get any help from simplified modern language, and the jumpy, flashy style of illustration doesn't give many visual cues that help us follow the action. The biggest problem is that the play has a large cast of characters, and the action takes place largely in the text, so without visual handles to hold on to, it's very difficult to keep track of who is doing what to whom. Here, the manga style hinders rather than helps, with most of the characters, except for Othello, being rendered as those big-eyed kids that populate all of Japanese manga and anime. Despite their costumes and affectations, they all look alike.

There is, to be fair, a handy guide at the front of the book with color illustrations of each character, and with some flipping back and forth, it's possible to remind yourself how to identify each player. Iago is the taller, skinny kid with an eye patch. Cassio is the cute little dear with a funny hat and a bushy tail. Roderigo, for some reason, is either a dog or a fox. Among the women, Montano

has bat wings, while Emilia has butterfly wings. Desdemona is the one with dainty little ram's horns.

Othello has some powerful subtext. The general is a black man who has shaken up the order of things by secretly marrying a white woman. Iago's plots are based in his questions about this outsider's legitimate and effective use of his power. Race is at the center of the play's conflict, but this manga version sidesteps the question almost entirely. Aside from being tinted a light gray, Othello shows no sign of being anything other than the bland, very white race of all manga characters: his features are idealized European, and he is whitehaired and dressed all in white. His skin might be a little darker than Desdemona's, but she has horns, after all, and Roderigo is a blue canine, for goodness sake.

I'm all for helping kids to enjoy classic literature, and I have no problem with taking creative liberties in order to open the door to enjoyment. But sometimes trying too hard can make things worse, and attempting to put a pretty, modern façade on the original only clutters things up and makes it all less fun than it was in the beginning. That, I'm afraid, is what's happened with this version of *Othello*.

references to current culture as well as the freedom from a defined stage set has kept it fresh. Plus, the fact that the content is pulled from the parables of the Gospels of Matthew and Luke gives it the religious draw that keeps audiences coming back for more.




