Read, learn, conquer and when you do, don't forget to tell 'em whatzup sent you.


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# Always Moving Forward

It's a little ironic that Egypt Central's self-titled debut came out on the Fat Lady Music label. You know the saying: "It ain't over till the fat lady sings." Considering that roughly six years passed between the band's formation in 2002 and the official release of Egypt Central the album, it would seem like the fat lady did indeed have a chance to sing. Either that, or it was over.

According to Egypt Central frontman John Falls, whom I caught up with via phone last week, we can blame the delay in dropping the debut to the rise of the Internet.

"It was a tough time for everybody," he said. "People were leaving labels, labels were collapsing. We got caught in the middle, and it was scary for a while. We thought playing music as we knew it might be over forever. Nobody knew what music would look like after the Internet."

Luckily, music survived, and so did Egypt Central, although fans might have started to fear that EC as they knew them might be over forever as well, given that the release of their sophomore

effort, White Rabbit, has likewise been delayed time and again. But we're here to tell you that the 12-track opus that Falls claims is Egypt Central's best work yet will hit shelves May 31. And here's another piece of good news. Thanks to an exclusive deal Egypt Central struck with Best Buy, EC lovers will be able to purchase White Rabbit for just \$7.99, and, with a coupon Best Buy will be offering to customers, will get \$2 off that already low price.

Have I brought a smile to your face yet? No? Then consider this. Egypt Central, who over the years have felt their fair share of Fort Wayne love, will be at Piere's Friday, May 27 with local support from Kill the Rabbit and Krimsha.

Egypt Central began as a quartet in Memphis in 2002. Even before that there were two, specifically Falls and the original lead guitarist Heath Hindman. Falls met Hindman in a rock club and approached him about starting a band, mostly because Hindman looked the part of the rock star.

If Hindman brought the rock star looks, Falls brought the street cred. Abandoned at age eight by his abusive parents, Falls spent the majority of his childhood in and out of foster homes. At 15 he even joined a gang and started selling drugs. Then this young troublemaker was saved, not by a bell, but by music. It was in singing and rocking out that Falls found his center.

Falls said his difficult childhood helped shape him as a man and a performer.

"It gives you tough skin. I think that, rather than becoming some frail human being who's obviously beaten down by life, you have to take that adversity, face it headon and just move forward," he said. "And that's the message of our music. You have to keep moving. Life is basically a people mover moving backwards. If you stand still, you're just going to get pulled back. You have to move forward fast enough to break the cycle.'

Park and Staind, among others) signed on to produce the first album.

It would appear that Egypt Central had made it. There they were in Los Angeles with a record contract and a big-time producer. but deals floundered, ties frayed, the Internet messed things up royally for a while and in 2006 the band decided to release Egypt Central on their own. It became the No. 1 independent release in Memphis and earned them a shout-out from WWE wrestler Stone Cold Steve Austin on account of the single "Over and Under," which was featured in the film *The Condemned*.

Egypt Central hit the charts in 2007 with

their still popular single "You Make Me Sick." Perhaps it was the song's complex and often contradictory lyrics ("I don't care if you walk away / I'm here to stay"; "You make me sick, but I love what we're doing here") that won Egypt Central its loyal following, or maybe it was frontman Falls' trademark braids, which he's since shaved off. Either way, "You Make Me Sick" had a soothing effect on many metalheads and the band had a viral hit on their

hands. They also had a record deal with Fat Lady Music (this one stuck) and slots on the Ozzfest and Family Values tours. Falls said that the success of "You Make

Me Sick" probably saved their self-titled album, which, considering that many of the tracks were five years old when they were finally laid down, really speaks to the power

And speaking of power, fast forward to now. EC, having gone through a one major lineup change (Jeff James now plays lead guitar in Hindman's stead) went back into the studio in October 2010 to work with uber-producer Skidd Mills on what would become the record of Falls' dreams.

"Skidd was perfect for us in so many ways. He's the easiest dude in the world to get a long with. Also, he's a family guy and we're family guys. It was a great atmosphere. We felt completely supported creatively. It was his job as the producer to take our ideas and make our record the best it could be, and Skidd did that," Falls said. "When you're a kid and you're thinking of being a musician. you have this dream record in your mind, the record you dream of making. White Rabbit is that record for us.'

Want to hear what dreams come true sound like? Then get to Piere's. Go down the

Regardless of their determination and drive, Falls and Hindman were reportedly about to call the whole thing off when, walking down the hallway of a Memphis music studio one day, they heard the sonic booms emanating from Blake Allison's drum sticks. They begged Allison on the spot to join their band, but Allison was hesitant. He came as a packaged deal with bass player Joey Walser, who was deep into the jam, funk and jazz scene in Chicago. It took a few months of cajoling to convince Walser to leave the Windy City for Bluff City, but at long last he agreed to become part of the newly christened Egypt Central, named for a particularly rough stretch of road in Memphis.

The four guys rocked and rolled around Tennessee for a while before being discovered by Lava Records and industry veteran Jason Flom in 2006. Another veteran, Josh Abraham (who's worked with Korn, Linkin

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# Putting the 'Art' Back in Music

Do you feel it in your finger bones that you just might be the second coming of Bob Dylan, Lucinda Williams or even Taylor Swift? Then consider attending the next gathering of the Fort Wayne Songwriters' Showcase Wednesday, May 25 at Don Hall's Canal Tap Haus.

This new group, formed by local guitarist and songwriter Jon Durnell in March, meets monthly to network, share tips and, most importantly, play their freshest work for each other and an audience eager to hear original music.

According to Durnell, the Songwriters' Showcase grew out of a seminar at Sweetwater Sound.

"A Nashville songwriter came in and gave a workshop to a group of us local songwriters, and I was blown away by how many people were there," said Durnell. "I saw a lot of familiar faces, but I saw a lot of new ones as well, and I thought, 'We should get together on our own. We don't need someone from Nashville to bring us together."

What brings this group together each month is a shared passion for creating original music and a desire to help others improve their craft. The meetings begin with an informal dinner, during which the songwriters, who cover a wide age range and play everything from pop to progres-

sive rock to country, get to converse with like-minded people and trade some of their industry knowledge. After dinner it's time to play.

Dave Hilts, who likes to say he's been playing and writing music for about as long as water's been around and who's penned hits for a number of country legends, including Buck Owens, said

that anyone who comes out to the showcase, be it for a chance to play or just to listen, is sure to get an earful of something good.

"The creative ability of some of these writers is just phenomenal," he said. "I'm in awe of the talent. I really am."

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her song, critique forms are passed out to the other songwriters and members of the audience who are then asked to tell the writer what they liked best about what they heard and what they think could use improvement.

When the musician finishes his or

Jen Fisher, frontwoman of all-girl country act Sugar Shot, said the format of the meetings is incredibly helpful to writers like her who want to try out their material on a small,

supportive group before premiering it for a large audience that's prone to be more critical.

'As a songwriter it's neat to have a chance to work on new material in such a safe venue and to be able to bounce ideas off people and get their feedback," she said. "It's a great way to craft a song and is a lot less nerve-racking than playing a brand new song for a huge number of people who may or may not like it."

Durnell said the anonymous critiques have been uniformly constructive and helpful.

"It's a very relaxed, very friendly environment. We're here to have a good time. Everyone's really laid back," he said. "At first I think people were a little nervous about the peer critiques, but nobody's butchering anyone. Mostly what we're seeing are comments like, 'I loved your song. Maybe the second line in the bridge could use some work.' That type of thing.

For her part, Fisher has found the critiques to be incredibly useful.

"It's difficult when you're writing by yourself. You might think something is completely clear, but maybe it's just clear in your head, and the audience and the other musicians are there to tell you, 'Hey, you probably have to fix that."

About six to 10 songwriters have shown up to the first two meetings of this new group, and Hilts said he hopes those numbers keep growing.

"Don't be afraid, don't be bashful," he said. "Everybody's welcome, from the novice to the pro. This is what it's all about. Sharing ideas and experiences, figuring out how to resolve problems in our writing, expanding the music scene a bit. It's with groups like this that it all starts.'

Perhaps one of the most important aspects of the Songwriters' Showcase is that everyone is encouraged to play their own original work, something that's not always welcomed during weekend bar gigs. You will not hear a single cover all night long. Even during the breaks, Durnell plays CDs of original music from some of Fort Wayne's most beloved songwriters, including Mike Conley and Sunny Taylor.

For Durnell, who, in addition to his solo acoustic gigs. plays in April's Alibi and What She Said, it all comes down to art. Music is not just for entertainment, he said, although that's a large part of it. It is - like painting, writing and sculpting - an art form, and our lives are made richer by the work that songwriters do every day.

"The art part of it can get a little lost if all you're doing is playing in cover bands. And sure, cover bands make the money and it can be artistic, depending on how you arrange the covers, but nothing beats hearing someone playing something from their soul. That's what it's about to me. And everyone in our group sounds different. They all bring something new and different to the table."



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# C2G An Edgy & Glamorous Riot

You might be forgiven for thinking that the members of Black Jet Radio are out-of-towners. They unabashedly pursue a sense of visual style on stage. They aren't handing out CD-Rs marked with a Sharpie. They're pimping vinyl 45s and professionally produced CDs. They're hitting town only

briefly and touring extensively. And yet, they're all from Fort Wayne.

Consider this indie-meets-dark-glam foursome a bit of a throwback to the glory days of the business, when bands were completely committed from day one.

"We're putting out a record and playing as close to 100 straight shows as possible," says guitarist Brian Jenkins. "I'm not saying this will guarantee our success, but it is our step into doing this for a long time. We've quit our jobs and made this our career for now."

Jenkins (formerly of departed local faves The Sacred Broncos), vocalist Danisha Jenkins, bassist Danielle Teagarden and drummer Shelby Siefring are all in. While most local bands take baby steps and try to develop a defined style over time, Black Jet Radio burst out of the starting blocks with a fully formed sound and image in place.

Says Brian Jenkins: "In terms of sound, we're inspired by how rock n' roll should have evolved in the 1980s. Pop music kept its sex appeal but lost its edge. Our music centers around sensually emotive melody, with tough raunchy guitars and a solid rhythm section."

As for the image element, he adds, "The way we dress and the way we perform is a visual reflection of the record we made [the recently released *Sex Sex Riot*]. The record's themes are sex, religion and death, and I think its important that we personify that in the way we look and act."

A tall order to be sure, but don't mistake Jenkins' confidence in his new band for cockiness. It's all in the approach — an approach that involves the band knowing what they *don't* want to do.

"I think the performance and the image of a band is just as important as their music," he says. "People go to 'see' a show. Give me a band that says their shows are about the music solely, I'll give you a band that doesn't sell records."

Packaging notwithstanding, what really drives this band is the music. BJR's potent

blend of buzz saw garage rock, early era Blondie new wave and modern alternative glam is sure to appeal to a wide audience, all the while making sure never to abandons its indie heritage.

Jenkins notes that his band's sound "centers around sensually emotive melody," but the tough raunchy guitars and solid rhythm section let BJR retain the "edge" that's es-

ber has an instrumental role in some part of the writing process."

The band's music and "get out there" approach stemmed at least partly from lessons Brian learned while playing with his former band. During the recording of the Sacred Broncos' swan song, *Analog Ocean*, he realized how much he loved making records.

"We had previous releases, but that was

the first with any clear conceptual direction. During that recording session I decided that I wanted to start over by creating something completely freshnew and intentionally conceived."

His decision was fortified by an understanding of indie rock reality.

"A lot of my decision to leave the Sacred Broncos was around wanting to tour," Jenkins says, adding, "I felt like all the energy put into writing, and putting out a record to have it heard by 50 people max was

pointless. I also admit that I had a false hope/ misconception that the right person would hear it and then we would be on our way to touring the country. All of us in Black Jet Radio decided that we weren't going to play the lottery."

Jenkins takes some cues from the modern DIY movement. "It's inspiring to see other artists invest in their work and hit the road to promote it," he says. "We don't need the permission of the record industry to put out music and tour."

Speaking of touring, BJR's first leg kicks off in May and will take them through Cleveland, St. Louis, Nashville, Washington DC, Baltimore, Philadelphia, Brooklyn, Boston and "many other stops along the way," says Brian. "We booked it entirely on our own, and as we added more dates it got easier to book others."

A second leg has BJR hitting Milwaukee, Madison, Chicago, Des Moines, Kansas City, Omaha, St Louis, Baton Rouge and New Orleans. After that, they'll decide whether to head west or east.

What's next for this ambitious band?

"Our goal now is to focus on each day individually and make the most of these gigs," says Brian. "We'll be releasing two more videos for 'Rock n Roll' and 'Rooftop' during the summer, both being done by Kasey Lee and Mike Griffith of Kids on the Couch." He adds, somewhat cryptically, "Be on the lookout for another 45 RPM recorded with a rock legend — to be announced soon."



sential to his musical ideal.

The band's formation was as serendipitous as its sound is innovative.

"The band started with Danisha Jenkins and I recording the 45 RPM *Dead Winel Ugly* in December 2010 over a two-day weekend."

Brian points out that he "didn't have a name for the band yet, just an idea through these two songs." Soon after, he saw Shelby Siefring playing drums with Fort Wayne indie faves Thunderhawk.

"I contacted her about getting together to try some songs" he notes. "After our first practice, Shelby brought Danielle to our next practice and we went from there. I think they understood what we were trying to do through listening to the tracks we'd already recorded, and they ended up bringing so much more to the table."

What followed was a flurry of writing and recording activity that transformed BJR from a band that didn't exist at the end of 2010 into a tight four-piece with a professionally recorded album (it was tracked by Jason Davis at the all-analog Off The Cuff Sound studio in Fort Wayne) and a booked tour ready to kick off a scant five months later.

"We started writing new songs immediately. The record features the first two songs 'Dead Wine' and 'Ugly,' along with six more. We worked the six new songs out through January and February and recorded them the first weekend of March. We credit all our music to Black Jet Radio, each mem-

#### Down on the Upside

It takes nerve to not only open your album with a cover, but to open your album with, essentially, a cover of a cover. Case in point: the first tune on Future X's rocking Down on the Upside CD is Stevie Wonder's classic, "Higher Ground," performed in high style á la the Red Hot Chili Peppers. Do they get a pass? Yup, given that



this version kicks heinie the way a great bar band version should.

With big guitars, a thunderous rhythm section and the mysteriously named The X providing spot-on vocals, "Higher Ground" makes a great album starter after all. The strutting "Right Next Door" follows, with low-slung riffs and passionate vocals from The X that recall a bluesier version of Journey's Steve Perry. Craig Turner slices through with guitar leads that artfully weave their way around the

singer.

"Right Next Door" seamlessly transitions into "Shade of Gray,"

"Vesterday may become a new towhich adds nuance to the crunch. "Yesterday may become a new tomorrow," sings The X, while keyboard string flourishes and a melancholy piano break punctuate the song and complement the chugging guitars with a dignified air.

Future X flex their clean pop chops on "Holding My Own," which is driven by piano, spare guitars and a classy saxophone solo. "Wounds will heal/this much I do know," intones The X, giving the song an uplifting, hopeful vibe to go with its sunny tone. Then it's back to big-time rocking with "Cry Just a Little." Oh, yeah, there's actually a flute solo in this one. Forgive me, Rick Brown, for only being able to picture Will Ferrell playing that very capable solo. The title track opens with gossamer keyboards before it moves into a stirring, anthemic rock tune.

If ballads are your thing, you'll love the acoustic-fueled "The Letter" and the sweet, lighters-aloft-worthy "Whisper Your Name." Whether they want to admit it or not, Future X are just as tender as they are tough. As befits a band that puts an electric guitar on the cover of their album, the boys close this solid, professional-sounding effort (tracked in Fort Wayne at Tempel Recording) with the rollicking "Don't Believe a Word" — which should be sonic heaven to the ears of Thin Lizzy fans. The album's title is only half right; there's plenty of upside to be found on *Down on the Upside*. (D.M. Jones)

#### Big Jaw Appetite for Construction

From note one of Big Jaw's Appetite for Construction disc, it's obvious that this Clint Roth fellow possesses massive recording chops. Not such a surprise, considering that the Fort Wayne native had a hand in tracking big-time albums by such luminaries as The



Donnas, the Isley Brothers, Third Eye Blind and Barenaked Ladies, (just to name a few).

But, it's one thing to know your way around a mixing board and another thing entirely to make a great-sounding album of your own — complete with, you know, songs and stuff. Here, Roth (with help from monster drummer Adam Aaronson) delivers on all fronts. The album's title may or may not be a sly nod to Roth's time spent in L.A., but it certainly gleams like a sleek sports car in the sun.

There's also a strong hint of SoCal songwriters/producers extraordinaire Jon Brion and Michael Penn seeping through, from the polished harmonies to the deceptively complex progressions in "One Thing." Roth manages to pull off here what the best pop (and by "pop," I mean "listenable, accessible rock" in the best possible way) songwriters do: create well-crafted, passionate songs packed chock full of hooks — and make it look easy.

Remember one-hit wonders Fastball and their, uh, one hit, "The Way?" There's a starting point for you. In a perfect world, driving-yet-jangly gems like "Wait" would be blasting out of convertibles everywhere this summer. But, see, the vocals aren't robotized and injected with auto-tuned sterility. There's no hip-hop guest appearance in the middle. There is, however, an undeniable hook and a simple and universal sentiment ("I'll wait for you") at the center of

#### Pretty on the Inside (1991)

Before Courtney Michelle Harrison "Love" was metaphorically run out of Los Angeles following the death of her husband, Kurt Cobain, she had a pretty damn good rock n' roll band.



Love, who at the birth of Hole was 27 years old, had a colorful past to match her promising present. She'd been a world-traveling juvenile delinquent living in New Zealand, Japan, Ireland and Liverpool before returning to Portland. She lived a tough life as an underage stripper and developed quite the drug habit. She also had the energy, talent and life experiences to start her own band, Hole (and this was before she even met Cobain). Produced by Sonic Youth's Kim Gordon, Pretty on the Inside was Hole's first album.

In Hole, Love's ego got wrapped around some pretty solid musicians, and *Pretty* is both solid and confrontational. It gave the world punk-emo-thrash-alternative at a time when the Seattle scene insisted on spitting grunge music in the faces of teenage America.

The record opens with some angry reverb in "Teenage Whore" and continues with "Babydoll." It's grunge, but with the strong vocals of Love, it oozes feminine angst. "Sassy" carries the Black Flag sound, while "Good Sister/Bad Sister" has Kim Gordon's Sonic Youth sweat all over it.

"Berry" resembles The Stooges, as Love screams over the searing guitars of Eric Erlandson and the hard bass of Jill Emery. The album closes with the title track and leaves you fatigued and a little angry.

Hole released a couple more records, including the extraordinary Celebrity Skin in 1998. Their latest release, Nobody's Daughter, is more of a solo record (her second), as Love is the only original member of the band.

Love has transformed her image several times, and her bad girl persona is regrettably commanded by her addiction to drugs and alcohol. Although her talent has been overshadowed by her sometimes larger than life antics, I have always considered her to be the queen of the genre. (Dennis Donahue)

And, as a bonus to you indie-cred scorekeepers out there, you even get some Sparklehorse-ish weirdness at the end. Bonus! Roth shifts gears on "Number 8," which somehow simultaneously calls to mind Peter Gabriel's "Sledgehammer," Stevie Wonders' "Superstition" and maybe even a touch of "Bad Company" - yet it sounds

Big guitars are all over this album, and they're especially prominent on the closing track, "We Can Have It All." Kids, here's proof that you don't have to play metal to sound huge; this is absolutely arena-ready stuff. Let's welcome this accomplished slice of L.A.style power-pop into the heartland with open arms. (D.M. Jones)

The artistic collaboration of Silversmiths emcees Stephen "Sankofa" Bryden and Tom "JON?DOE" McCauley dates back 12 or so years, when Sankofa dropped a guest verse on an album called DNA-Lysis that was released by a JON?DOE's then-group Double Helix. Two years after that, re-



cord Indie Pennant Records released JON?DOE and Sankofa's first full collaboration, a record called *Invest-Mentality* that they recorded under their now defunct White Collar Criminals moniker. That record went on to be a mid-level indie hip-hop hit at the national level, jump starting the since-prolific solo career of Fort Wayne-based emcee Sankofa. The decade or so since has seen the two emcees keeping in touch (JON?DOE lives in San Luis Obispo, California), dropping guest verses on each other's projects here and there and, most





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

# Going All Out for Grenache

I owe my earliest memories of Grenache to my folks. Back in the day, they usually kept a jug of Gallo white Grenache around for entertaining visitors. (In case you're wondering, Mom, I never snuck any.)

Almaden, Rossi, Franzia – all of the major jug wine producers cranked out inexpensive, sweet blushes made from Grenache. White Grenache was what White Zinfandel eventually became in the wine market – a "refreshing" wine. (Gallo actually tried to market White Grenache as an upscale alternative to White Zin in the late 80s. That campaign didn't last long.)

Since pink, sweet wines were never really my thing, I put Grenache out of my head for a long time. Along came the Sweet Partner in Crime. In our wine-appreciation infancy, we powered through many a bottle of Rosemount Estates' Shiraz blends from Australia. When the weather got warm, we'd replace our bottle of Rosemount Shiraz/Cab with their Grenache/Shiraz blend, since it was lighter. Once our wine preferences began to broaden a bit, our ever-present bottle of Rosemount got replaced with other stuff and Grenache again retreated to an afterthought.

Fast forward a bit. I started seeing Grenache as a varietal more and more, especially as French and Spanish wines became more common in my rack. But what is it? There's only one way to find out.

Grenache is a high-yielding grape that's extremely common in the world's hottest, driest wine regions. It's best known as the backbone of the wines of the

Southern Rhone region, especially Chateauneuf-de-Pape and many Cotes-du-Rhone. It's the primary grape in Tavel, one of the best regions for rosé in the world. In Spain it's known as "Garnacha," and the wines of Rioja, Priorat and Navarra simply wouldn't exist without it.

Post-Prohibition winemakers in California grew a lot of Grenache. The sturdiness and drought-resistant properties of the vines (not to mention the high yields) made it a natural match for many of the growing areas. The wines, however, were often of the aforementioned jug variety. This began to change with the advent of the "Rhone Ranger" movement, where many winemakers started putting together high quality Frenchstyle blends in the late 1990s.

Rarely used as a single varietal, Grenache yields a fruity, low-tannin, medium-bodied wine. The French Grenache-based wines tend to be quite earthy, since the bitterness of the tannin doesn't get in the way of the "funk." Spanish Grenache tends to be on the smoky side. American Grenache blends usually are

It's no secret that my husband Jon does most of the cooking at our house. I am more of a food consuming expert, but on occasion, when his studies consume his time, it's up to me to choose the menu and prepare our meals. I never thought I'd enjoy the task, but I have found the process of planning the week's slate of dishes quite enjoyable, especially when I stumble upon something different.

People often ask me, "Do you and your husband ever prepare normal food?"

"Normal food?" I ask. "What constitutes nor-

They never have an answer, though I suspect that this dish doesn't qualify.

One of our favorite restaurants is Saigon, located on South Calhoun Street in Fort Wayne. The menu is chock full of Vietnamese Pho and noodle bowl selections, and we've been known to make several trips there in one week to satisfy our craving. Much to our dismay, the restaurant closes every summer for an extended period of time so the owners can travel to Vietnam to visit family, and we are always faced with the daunting question: What do we do now to get our fiv?

The answer: Banh Mi. Saigon doesn't serve it, but the ingredients and flavors of this dish echo those we enjoy. Don't let the liverwurst scare you. I'd never had it before and contemplated leaving it out, but it adds that extra something to really give this sandwich a signature taste. The combination of zest from the slaw and the kick from the cilantro and jalapenos make it worth adding to your repertoire. It's even good left over, using sandwich bread. Looking for something different, something easy? Give this dish a try. It's something you won't soon forget.

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




more fruit-forward. Most good Grenache is easy to drink and extremely food-friendly. As a pairing, Grenache works in almost any instance where you'd normally choose a pinot noir. I've seen Grenache described as "pinot with a punch," and that's accurate - similar flavors, slightly heavier body and a more fruit-forward flavor.

The SPinC and I did a side-by-side with a pair of Grenache-dominant wines. The first was the Writer's Block 2008 Grenache from Lake County, California. The other was Penelope Sanchez 2009 Grenache/Syrah from Campo de Borja, Spain. The Penelope is 80/20 Grenache/Syrah and the Writer's Block is over 80 percent Grenache with some Syrah and Conoise blended along. Both retail for \$12-\$15.

Both wines improve greatly with a little decanting. The Penelope, especially, was very "tight" initially. It took a few minutes, even after some heavy swirling, for the smokiness and tannin to start balancing with the fruit. Once it had a few minutes in the air, it opened into a nose laced with herbs and vanilla. The body is light to- medium and is a well-balanced mix of cherries, smoke and vanilla. Those flavors all twined through a

The Writer's Block (one of my favorite names for a wine) was heavier. Like most American wines compared to Euro-counterparts, the Lake County Grenache wasn't as subtle and had a much "stronger" profile. Everything tasted "bigger," even though the color of the wine itself was lighter. The nose was cherries and bubblegum with much less smoke. Very straightforward. There's more of a "leather and cigar box" flavor on the finish. The SPinC thought it tasted like black licorice.

For dinner we grilled some salmon and roasted some cauliflower with garlic and balsamic vinegar. When we tasted the two initially, our first reaction was that we liked the Spanish version better. The flavors in the food made the wine taste bigger and smokier. After a few bites, though, we came to the realization that we weren't observing closely enough.

The Writer's Block was better with the fish. There was more tannin (as would be expected from a Lake County wine), so the wine's flavors cut much more easily through the oiliness of the fish and stood up better to the grilled flavors. The Penelope was better with the cauliflower. The roasting and the balsamic brought out the sweetness in the cauliflower, which was a much more harmonious pairing with the complexity of the

Both wines were quite good. They're excellent values and either would be fine with almost any food, short of something really heavy like a cassoulet or a meal dripping with cheese.

One last point about Grenache. I've mentioned grapes like Alicante and Cannonau a few times in this space as varietals with which I wasn't very familiar. Turns out that I was more familiar than I thought – both of them are actually Grenache. Whatever name's on the bottle, it's well worth your time getting acquainted with this wine. I'm certainly glad that

**Preparation:** Preheat the oven to 350°F with rack in middle.

Shred daikon and carrot in a food processor fitted with medium shredding disk. Stir together vinegar, sugar and 1/2 teaspoon salt and toss with shredded vegetables. Let slaw stand, stirring occasionally, 15

Meanwhile, heat baguette on rack in the oven until crusty, about 5 minutes. Cut off and discard round ends, then split baguette. Mix together oil, fish sauce and soy sauce and brush on cut sides of bread. Spread liverwurst on bottom layer of bread and top with jalapenos, onion and cilantro. Drain slaw in a colander. Arrange chicken, slaw and lettuce on cilantro. Spread top layer of bread with mayonnaise and cut sandwich crosswise into fourths.

#### Black Swan

There are lots of mirrors in Black Swan - not surprising for a movie about ballerinas that largely takes place inside a large ballet rehearsal studio - and occasionally you see something startling in those mirrors. One particularly disorienting shot shows ballet company director Thomas Leroy (Vincent Cassel) standing straight in front of a giant bank of mirrors. The camera centers on him, then pans slowly around him, and it takes several seconds to realize why what you're seeing is so unsettling: the camera itself. Or, rather, the utter lack of any visible camera equipment in the mirror at all. We've seen it all on screen now, CGI-wise, but perhaps there's still new ground to be broken in the realm of what CGI can leave out. There are lots of other sneaky, creepy effects in Black Swan (to reveal any of them would spoil half the fun of what is actually an incredibly enjoyable experience) but this camera-less effect might be the most unset-

Natalie Portman won the Oscar for her leading role here as Nina, an intensely devoted ballerina who has just landed the much-coveted lead part in an upcoming production of *Swan Lake*. Leroy knows she can play the innocent, pure-hearted White Swan perfectly, but, he tells her, he's not so sure about her ability to play the impulsive and dark-hearted Black Swan. Nina, though, wants the role, both for herself and also to make her clingy ex-ballerina mother (played by Barbara Hershey) proud.

Nina, it soon becomes clear, isn't quite as mentally balanced as she initially appears. She sees her double on the subway on her way to work. She glimpses strange things (hallucinations?) in mirrors and pictures. And what's with this nasty looking scratch that keeps appearing on her right shoulder-blade?

Meanwhile, Leroy is aggressively pushing her in the studio (and is possibly working on seducing her), her mom hovers and nags and a seductive fellow ballerina (Mila Kunis) may or may not be actively sabotaging her in order to steal her part.

Black Swan is a gorgeously shot fever dream of a movie, equal parts showbiz melodrama and psychosexual horror show. One moment it reminds one of All About Eve, the next it recalls the grotesque surrealism of Requiem for a Dream, and the next the epically ridiculous Showgirls. Director Darren Aronofsky (The Wrestler, the aforementioned Requiem) modulates all these elements so well – dialing up the horror just when you're getting comfortable, then presenting something almost gasp-inducingly beautiful when you're at your tensest – you eventually learn to sit back and enjoy the ride.

There's not much here to take all that seriously, but with performances, cinematography and the effective mashing-up of genres like this, it scarcely matters. *Black Swan* is so fun, it's scary.

#### Rabbit Hole

There's a scene in *Rabbit Hole* in which 30-something businessman Howie (Aaron Eckhart), who lost



his son eight months earlier, is attending a grief support group with other parents. His wife Becca (Nicole Kidman) has stayed at home, refusing to attend any group in which parents utter inane platitudes in order to make themselves feel better. Howie is still attending, and has gotten close to Gaby, a recently separated woman who's also attending (played by Sandra Oh). The two have gotten so close, in fact, that they have taken to smoking weed in the car before going into the meetings, which leaves them in a mood that is not exactly, shall we say, appropriate for a grieving parents' support group. In the middle of one man's very sincere moment of tearful sharing, Howie and Gaby start giggling uncontrollably, and so do we. The scene is uncomfortable and borders on being tasteless, which is, of course, the point.

Rabbit Hole is directed by John Cameron Mitchell, who also directed the 2001 cult favorite *Hedwig* and the Angry Inch as well as the wonderful (albeit extremely sexually graphic) 2006 movie *Short Bus*. I think we can safely call *Rabbit Hole* a turn for the more serious and accessible in his career.

Rabbit Hole focuses on Howie and Becca's increasingly fragile marriage as they both explore separate avenues of healing in the wake of the unimaginable. Howie's relationship with Gaby moves from friendship to dangerous flirtation; for her part, Becca befriends a high school boy for reasons that aren't immediately clear, but are revealed in due time.

Miles Teller turns in a brilliant performance here as the high school boy, as does Dianne Wiest as Becca's mother. (In writing the preceding sentence, I kept trying to think of a good adjective to describe the mother, but she's a complicated, flawed woman, and no single adjective does her justice.) Kidman's performance as Becca is fierce and intelligent, while Eckhart, as Howie, hits all the marks, and yet falls just a little shy of extraordinary. (I like Eckhart best as a scoundrel or out-and-out villain.)

The movie is well-written (the screenplay is by David Lindsey-Abaire, adapting from his own stage play), and Mitchell's directing is straightforward and sure-footed. The movie takes us into unsettling territory – parents of young children might especially have a hard time contemplating what Howie and Becca are going through – and it does so with honesty, grace and even occasional wit. There really aren't many more irreverent moments like the one described in the first paragraph of this review, and I sort of wished there had been. (I love it when movies elicit conflicting emotions from me.)

The world has no shortage of conventional films about grieving the death of a child, and though this movie is nothing if not conventional, it's still an undeniably solid, intimate film about love and loss and forging ahead.

work and the sadness of watching most of her family die. She was a tiny, shy woman who didn't shout her opinions, though she had many and defended them well when necessary. She was a devout believer and an independent thinker. Her most famous novel, Jane Eyre, is an amazing stew of ideas, romance, suspense, eroticism, Gothic darkness and humor.

I imagine Brontë would also be overwhelmed by the numerous interpretations of her novel. There have been more than half a dozen film adaptations made in the past 20 years.

Lasting pleasure and durability are two qualities that define a classic. Flexibility is another. How flexible is *Jane Eyre*? In the film "Definitely, Maybe," the character April (Isla Fisher), a lovely, smart, free-thinking young woman and a worthy descendent of Jane, spends the film in search of the copy of Jane Eyre her father inscribed to her just before his death. It was inadvertently given away. April searches for the book with the persistence Jane searches for freedom.

Accept that no movie can translate to the screen all the qualities of a great novel and you are on your way to enjoying Jane Eyre. This adaptation, written by Moira Buffini (Tamara Drewe, a quirky pleasure) and directed by Cary Fukunaga (Sin Nombre a sobering pleasure), condenses the story and rearranges the chronology, but hangs on to cherished elements of the novel.

If you don't know the novel and its story, Jane's honesty and quest for independence will offer more than sufficient appeal. In this new version we meet Jane as she is fleeing Thornfield Hall in extreme distress. She is taken in by a clergyman and his two sisters who nurse her back to health and ask few

In this state of distress, her early life flashes before us. We see the young Jane (a precocious Amelia Clarkson) mistreated by her nasty aunt (an almost unrecognizable Sally Hawk-



ins) and her spoiled cousins. Eventually she is sent away to Lowood, just the kind of horrific, sadistic girls' school that fits the definition of "Dickensian." At every turn, Jane questions authority, which makes her unpopular with authority but beloved by victims of mindless authority. This continues even as she assumes the job of governess at Thornfield Hall as a voling woman.

Thornfield Hall offers her the friendship of housekeeper Mrs. Fairfax, a delightfully understated Judy Dench. She is also soon beloved of her young pupil, Adele, the ward of the master of Thornfield, Mr. Rochester.

Enter Mr. Rochester. Enter trouble. Enter the original bad boy, or rather a variation on the naughty but interesting man.

There is little point in detailing what happens next. You either know the outline or you don't. Either way, the results are satisfying. If, however, you are looking for the most faithful of adaptations, you may be disappointed. As a tease, I will say fortunes are won and lost. Fortunes are reversed. Fires burn. Thornfield seems haunted. Things go bump in the night.

Jane, described as "poor and obscure, and small and plain" in the novel is played by Mia Wasikowska. The filmmakers plain her up well, but that sharp collar bone showing out of her white collar is sexy. Wasikowska is young enough to be Jane, and she is talented enough to make you believe in the unique combination of virtues and weaknesses that make Jane so appealing

Mr. Rochester is played by Michael Fassbender. He's still

a bit young to be Rocheser, but the age difference here is real and obvious, as it is described in the book. Many adaptations make Rochester way too young and attractive. Fassbender can only be described as rugged, nothing like Rochester in the novel. Both leads are Hollywood "plain" and "unattractive," not real life plain and unattractive.

But this new Jane Eyre gets much right. The leads may be sexed up a bit, but they have chemistry and they portray the nature of their characters much as the novel describes them.

Movies can do in an instant what novels must take chapters to do, and that is convey a sense of place. Jane Eyre is photographed on the moors and there is a palpable sense of loneliness and isolation the minute we are outside the grounds of the wealthy. The colors are pale and plaintive.

Jane Eyre was considered coarse in its day. It was criticized by many and adored by many more. Today it may feel a bit tame, but there are so many modern elements and themes that I think it translates easily into a story that still resonates.

A later addition of *Jane Eyre*, the edition Isla Fisher seeks in the used book stores across Manhattan, reprints Charlotte Brontë's own introduction to her novel. She addresses her critics "in whose eyes whatever is unusual is wrong," " in whose ears detect in each protest against bigotry - that parent of crime - an insult to piety." Her response to such critics? "Conventionality is not morality. Self-righteousness is not religion." You don't have to look hard to see these truths playing out in our world, but neither Jane Eyre the novel, nor this new entertaining screen adaptation, dwells on big philosophical ideas. They're there, but and on top of them is a titillating, juicy melodrama.

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# Argh, Pirates Return

Out This Weekend: This weekend will, without a doubt, be all about one flick: Pirates of the Caribbean: On Stranger

Tides, starring Johnny Depp and Penelope Cruz and directed by Rob Marshall (Chicago, Memoirs of a Geisha). Each year American audiences get four or five epic studio productions like this one, movies so big that no one else will release anything to compete with it (check back for the new Harry Potter flick in a few weeks).

With many of the major players from the first three films gone (including director Gore

Verbinski and stars Keira Knightly and Orlando Bloom), Stranger Tides something of a reboot, here focused almost entirely on the unique swagger and star power of Depp. So far the reviews are solid. With Marshall at the Helm and both Depp and Cruz involved, we have to assume that the starting point - the script was pretty damn good.

Also of note this week, the international Cannes Film Festival will be wrapping up, and Jodi Foster's horrible looking new directorial effort, The Beaver, will see an expanded release. What will win this year's coveted Palme d'Or award, we wonder. The Tree of Life, we hope.

**Tops at the Box:** Thor took the No. 1 spot at the U.S. box office for the second consecutive weekend, bringing in another \$34.5 million, upping its 10-day total to \$120 million in the U.S. and \$318 million worldwide. Daaaang! This technically well-made blockbuster from director Kenneth Branagh (Dead Again, Frankenstein) has also been receiving some solid reviews.

We at the ScreenTime shed/ office saw it and, well, we just couldn't get into it. In fact, Thor marked only the fourth time that we ever left a theater before a movie ended. We made it through Sex & the City 2 but not Thor. It's not that it's that bad; it's just lacking in many, many ways. And damn if the back and forth between realities isn't handled in an aggravating - and, we think, nearly unwatchable - manner. Some solid moments, for sure, but, to us, Thor was/is a big, expensive, profitable

Coming in at No. 3 last weekend was Fast Five, bringing in another \$20 million, upping its 17-day total to just under \$170 million in the U.S. and about \$440 million worldwide. Daaaang Rounding out last weekend's Top 5 were lamies Priest and Rio bringing in \$14.5 million and \$8

million, respectively.

After years of not releasing a record together JON and Sankofa released their Silversmiths debut, The Algol Paradox, this past January. Now we have A Tandem of Giants, a record that is, for this writer's money, the best work this duo has done together. Featuring cohesive, organic production from Agent Orange, the album's 72 minutes/17 tracks (plus two bonus cuts) pass surprisingly quickly, feeling like a classic-era record that could have come out in 1993 (maybe the best compliment I can give a hip-hop record these days). JON?DOE is here – and long has been – one of the most charismatic and overlooked underground emcees around, enunciating every syllable with an indescribable twang in his voice. And while JON has surely released his share of solid material over the years, this is the first record I've heard him on where the majority of the beats live up to his fully developed style.

As for Sankofa, he's been blessed with solid production over the years, dating back to his excellent 1999 SA-2 EP with the now defunct Suspended Animator production team (who were also members of The White Collar Criminals). That said, I think the Agent Orange's cinematic production on *Tandem* is not just maybe the best set of beats JON?DOE has had to work with, but probably also the overall best Sankofa has had at his grasp. Compositions like "What a Way to Go Out," "Come On," "Sister Jones," "Hard Eight" and "Tried" feel like instant classics that at times even remind of classic-era Primo.

I'm not quite sure what the process for putting this record together was, but, from the little I do know, I've come to the conclusion that the three involved parties communicated via e-mail and phone, recording in different states and at different times, Postal Service style, piecing things together in a way that never makes distance seem their foe. In fact, there are even some solid back-and-forth vocals between the two emcees, and damn if both JON?DOE and Sankofa don't perfectly play to every nuance of Agent Orange's beats. The end result is an incredibly solid, super verbose boom-bap sound that features soul-influenced beats and the kind of vocals and verses that only experienced emcees can conjure.

My only real gripe (aside from the record maybe being a tad-bit too long for my taste) is that A Tandem of Giants is self-released and will inevitably fall between far too many cracks, never finding the audience it deserves. In this confusing era for music, I understand why a crew like this would chose to self-release. They're beyond proven: JON?DOE has shared stages with KRS-One, ATCQ, Eminem, the Alkaholiks, Ras Kass and many more, and Sankofa was once included in URB magazine's prestigious Next 100 feature, amongst other accolades. But with stellar production, amazing vocals and chemistry from JON?DOE and Sankofa, a killer guest verse from AthenA and the excellent album design of Eric "EDS" Stine, A Tandem of Giants is the complete package – a record that deserves to be heard by hip-hop fans worldwide. A Tandem of Giants is easily one of the best indie level hip-hop releases I've heard in ages and maybe the best all-around project yet for all involved parties. Highly recommended. (Greg W. Locke)
