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# Strumming Vour Soft Spot

Alan Parsons. BT. Dave Ellefson of Megadeth. Frank Bello of Anthrax. George Harrison's guitar.

These are just a few of the stars of the show that is Sweetwater's Gearfest 2011, scheduled to rock out Friday-Saturday, June 24-25 on the campus of Sweetwater Sound. Other highlights of this festival of everything amped, strung, sung and mixed include workshops on wide variety of topics, including songwriting, choosing the right keyboard, the power of Pro Tools and the way to record your way to a Grammy.

All together, Gearfest will offer music lovers more than 40 workshops to choose from, not to mention 200 manufacturer exhibits, a musician's flea market and live performances from some of the best in the biz.

Since the inaugural event in 2002, Gearfest has grown into one of the biggest music trade shows in the country – and perhaps the only such gear smorgasbord that welcomes the general public.

"Most trade shows are for manufacturers and their constituency stores and are private affairs," said Sweetwater Director of Program Development Christopher Guerin. "Gearfest is a very unique event with an enormous amount of participating vendors that's completely open to the public at large. And it's happening right here in Fort Wayne."

It's also free. Of course, if you want to purchase a Gretsch or Gibson guitar you'll want to bring your wallet, but there is no charge for admission to the festival, and that includes not only the ware tents but the workshops as well.

One of those workshops will be conducted by none other than Alan Parsons of The Alan Parsons Project fame. His session, entitled "The Art of Sound Recording," is taking place at 9:30 a.m. Saturday in the Sweetwater Performance Theatre.

And while it won't cost you a dime to learn the ins and outs of recording from a man who's worked with the likes of The Beatles and Pink Floyd, you might want to pre-register by going to www.sweetwater. com/gearfest. Pre-registering gets you to the front of the line, and by the looks of this year's lineup the lines could be long.

Sure to draw one of the biggest crowds of the weekend is BT, aka Brian Wayne Transeau, a music producer, composer and singer-songwriter who holds the Guinness World Record for largest number of vocal edits in one song. His tune "Somnambulist (Simply Being Loved)" contains 6,178 vocal edits. That might sound extreme and even odd until you consider the fact that BT is known for creating, hand-in-hand with iZotope, the so-called Stutter Edit plug-in which makes BT's patented editing techniques available to even amateur audio technicians.

Stutter Edit takes audio fragments and repeats them at rhythmic intervals to create an entirely new sound, and BT, who's been at the forefront of such technology since it began, will demonstrate the software for the Gearfest audience at 4 p.m. Saturday. This Grammy nominated artist (his album *These Hopeful Machines* was up for the 2010 Best Electronic/Dance Album) is also a movie

really, who doesn't love George? "He was my favorite Beatle," said Guerin, "and it's a beautiful exhibit."

The items in the exhibits are not for sale – "You can look but not touch," Guerin

soundtrack composer whose work is heard in the films *The Fast and The Furious* and *Monster*.

According to his website, BT has three main motivations in his life as a musician and recording technician: (1) to bend the collective human narrative to the positive; (2) to inspire untold small leaps of

faith that germinate and grow in people he will never know; and (3) to make music that makes people feel connected and less alone.

Lofty goals. Why not see them in action?

And while you're at it, why not also treat yourself to a little eye candy too? Sweetwater will play host to two much sought-after exhibits that music fans of all stripes will not want to miss. One is of 10 museum-quality, custom-made Gibson guitars, sure to thrill anyone with a soft spot for the six string. The other exhibit is a traveling George Harrison tribute that will include, among other memorabilia, famous photos, posters, documents and a Gretsch guitar based on the model Harrison used to play. It's basically a dream come true to any Harrison fan, and

said – but almost everything else on display at Gearfest is up for grabs, and this year's deals are designed to please even those with somewhat depleted pocketbooks.

"We're really going overboard with our deals this year," Guerin said. "There will be hundreds of discounts that are pretty much once in a lifetime opportunities. If you're in the market for anything music related, now is your chance to snatch it up."

It'll also be your chance to have your old guitar restrung if, to borrow from Lucinda Williams, you have real-life bleeding fingers and broken guitar strings. Sweetwater employees will be on hand to repair your precious Lucille, should she be missing a few strings, and this service, like the festival is absolutely free. Rock on.

Being a Deadhead and an accomplished keyboard player has landed Rob Barraco some pretty juicy gigs, but there was a time when being the go-to guy for any Grateful Dead cover band that needed someone to play the keys was the last thing he wanted.

"For years, no matter how hard I tried to get away from it, it always sucked me back in," he said.

"I was a Deadhead in my early 20s, then I got into jazz and tried to move away from the Dead thing – but every year someone called and said ... " His voice trailed off.

Barraco is no

stranger to having someone call. A keyboard and guitar player since the age of six and a professional musician most of his life, Barraco spent a good part of the 1980s and 90s playing keyboards for "The Cosby Show" and "It's a Different World." In the late 80s he toured with Freddie Jackson, then joined the Zen Tricksters in the early 90s and toured with that band for the rest of the decade.

The Tricksters played Dead covers and their own brand of jam band music, but all the while Barraco longed to get back to playing jazz.

"Jazz goes hand in hand with the Dead thing because of the improvisation," he said. "Throughout the whole tenure with the Tricksters we were doing our own stuff. Then Phil Lesh calls. Don't get me wrong. It was an amazing thing. I'm thinking a white boy from New York playing jazz really can't make a go of it."

Lesh played bass with the Grateful Dead throughout the band's long career. Af-

ter Dead guitarist Jerry Garcia died in 1995 Lesh continued playing Dead music with a variety of other musicians, including the other members of the Grateful Dead.

"When I started working with Phil he was hellbent on bending the rules of Grateful Dead music," Barraco said. "People were aghast, but playing with him I saw the music was so open-ended. Obviously, with Dark Star Orchestra we try to recreate Dead shows

from a particular era, so it's kind of stepping back from where Phil was taking it."

A n o t h e r call. Dark Star Orchestra. Dark Star Orchestra began in Chicago in 1997 with the premise that they would take

a particular concert from the 30-year pile of Grateful Dead performances and recreate the show as closely as possible – not a note-fornote reproduction, but a broader emphasis on using the same equipment and the same instrumentation the Dead used at the time. The concept worked well, and DSO found a following of Deadheads (surprise surprise) who have kept the band on the road for 14 years.

Barraco, following a stint with the Other Ones and Chris Robinson's New Earth Mud, got a call to sit in with DSO for a couple of nights. He wasn't exactly bowled over.

"When I first heard Dark Star I thought well, Dead cover band trying to do Dead shows. It was okay, but I wanted to do other things. When Scott (Larned, original DSO keyboard player) passed away in '05 their manager called and asked me to help for a month. I went out, and right from the very

Pat Dailey doesn't have to get drunk to have a good time. At least not anymore. But don't worry. The singer/songwriter from Put-in-Bay, Ohio can still inspire people to tip a glass or two and have a good time. It's just that after some six decades of playing in bars and enjoying them too, the septuagenarian has decided to slow down a bit.

"I've dropped out of the game," Dailey told me in a recent phone conversation. "I was leader of the pack for so long I began to secretly wish my doctor would tell me I had to stop drinking."

The writer of numerous funny drinking songs such as "You Don't Have to be Drunk," "Nymphomaniac" and "I've Got to be Drunk to Do That" – as well as many songs of a more thoughtful, reflective nature – Dailey has led a life some people only dream about: the life of a vagabond singer bouncing from resort town to

resort town, quietly, or not so quietly as the case may be, building a reputation as a fun guy to see and a following that earned him guaranteed gigs across the country. Eventu-

ally he became great friends with a famous and equally carefree poet and songwriter (more on that in a second) and together they wrote songs and had fun. Lots of fun. And there's nothing wrong with that.

Born in Nebraska in March of 1941 and raised outside St. Louis, Dailey and some high school buddies formed a small combo called Pat and the K-tones that played sock hops and school dances. In the late 50s Dailey was in the service and found himself stationed in Hawaii where his playing landed him a spot opening for the great Don Ho. After leaving Hawaii in 1960, Dailey realized he's found the life he wanted to live.

"In my late 20s I gave in to the idea that I would be a rambler and go where life took me," he said. "I also realized Hollywood wasn't going to call. I made up my mind to travel where I could and pursue jobs in other cities."

For about 10 years in the 70s he lived on a boat in the San Francisco Bay area and spent winters at various ski resorts around the West. But then a trip across the Mississippi River changed all that.

"I like travelling the West a lot, but once I came east I found that my stuff was going over better here. The farther east I went, the more people got what I was doing, so I figured why not go where the people get it?"



Dailey then based himself in Chicago and began working the bars and resort areas around the Midwest, eventually settling in Put-in-Bay on South Bass Island in Lake Erie.

"What happened was I was living in Chicago and got a job in Cleveland, and the people there told me about this place called Put-in-Bay. It turned out to be a great thing."

There, in the summer of 1978, he played the Beer Barrel Saloon for a weekend gig, and instincts told him there was magic in the place. He played the full summer in 1979 and has been packing the place every summer since. The Beer Barrel burned to the ground in 1988 and was rebuilt in time for the 1989 season. It went into the Guinness Book of Records as "The World's Longest Bar."

But seeing as Put-in-Bay was a summer resort, he needed to have a place to play during the winter. "I had to find out where the tourists went when they weren't here," he said. "Turned out to be Key West."

Dailey made his first trip to the southernmost point in the United States in 1984, playing at Ernest Hemingway's old watering hole, Sloppy Joes, on the north end of Duvall Street. It was in Sloppy Joe's that first winter that Dailey met the poet, playwright and songwriter Shel Silverstein, who lived in Key West during winters away from his home in Martha's Vineyard. Silverstein, who

### ----- Feature • Herman's Hermits ------New Suits, Same Sweet Sound

When Herman's Hermits hit the Foellinger stage this weekend, it will likely seem as if time has stood still for the group's perennially young singer, Peter Noone. There may be a few vague signs of age, but he appears very much like he did almost 50 years ago when, as a teenager, he rode the wave of the British Invasion and charmed thousands of screaming girls while filling the airwaves with infectiously catchy hits like "Mrs. Brown You've Got a Lovely Daughter," "I'm Henry VIII, I Am" and "I'm Into Something Good."

The band was a sensation in 1965 and 1966, keeping pace with their countrymen and a little band known as the Beatles. Like the Fab Four before them. Herman's Hermits made the rounds in America, appearing on stages and television shows while their records climbed the charts. Also like the Beatles, they found themselves on "The Ed Sullivan Show," clips of which continue to air all these years later. Noone still remembers working with the legend and has a particularly special memory of that relationship.

"He was a lovely guy," Noone said in a call from California, just days before heading to a show in Green Bay, Wisconsin. "He was really nice to us because he thought Herman's Hermits were gentlemen. And we were - all the British acts were in those days. He even invited me to go to Mass with him one time, and how could I say no? He knew that I was Catholic and thought I'd like to go along with him. I was only 16 at the time, so it was really a nice thing for him to do.

"I remember walking with him that day, and he was a big star - the Elvis of television - but no one bothered him. There were no paparazzi back then to bother us, no autograph hunters. People just left us alone to walk to church."

That may sound like pretty heady stuff for a young kid who was also fighting off hysterical teenagers and traveling in a foreign land as a budding superstar, but Noone remains remarkably down to earth and gracious. Of course, the British accent does much to bolster the image, but his approach

to the music that made him popular also helps cement the devotion of his fans. Though other acts will sometimes feel trapped by their old material, Noone has learned to embrace it.

"That's a period that everyone goes through, feeling like you want people to listen to your new music instead of something you did years ago. But you eventually realize no one wants to hear that music because it's probably not as good as your old music. I'm lucky because I like my old stuff, so I keep it the same whenever I perform it now. We play it exactly like it was on the records.

His respect for his fans has made Noone's fan club, the Noonatics, a growing phenomenon. Last vear they launched the first

Fab FunFest, a weekend of activities to honor the man and the music. It proved so successful that the second one will take place on October 15

at St. Charles, Illinois. Friday evening activities will build to the main event - dinner and a concert on Saturday.

"It's a day all about Herman's Hermits. We have hotels and restaurants involved, so it's quite a big thing. Last year was the first year for it, and we sold out the place without any advertising, so this year it's going to

be even bigger. We have legions of fans, and every year our fan club has more and more people.

They're extremely loyal. One woman named Rose from Windsor, Ontario has come to 500 concerts, and several others have come to more than 100. We're starting to see a lot of people who come to many of our shows, so in that way the fan club has become part of the show itself."

Typically the band maintains a schedule of 100 shows per year, but in the next

year they'll add significantly to that number with an additional 60 shows in Europe as well. Noone happily maintains that pace, though he admits he never expected to still be doing this at his age.

"I never really imagined I'd be healthy at this age. I'm 63, and when my father was my age he wasn't healthy, so I assumed I'd be the same. But I always say that I feel like a 17-year-old in a 63-yearold body. I do act much younger on stage, which means I get to be 17 around 100 times a year. I mean, it wouldn't make much sense for me to be singing 'Mrs. Brown, You've Got a Lovely Daughter' as a 63-year-old."

Given the plan to actually increase the workload in 2012, Noone admits he has no plans to retire. saying he plans to follow his parents' example and work "until my last breath." Of course, his parents weren't traveling the world singing songs for giddy fans - which is one more reason he plans to keep going.

"I'm just grateful I have a job that I like. It helps when you have a hobby that becomes your job. Music would be my hobby if I hadn't been able to do it for a living, so it's very fortunate that I can keep doing this and people are still interested. Most people retire when they can't do it anymore, but this job requires you

to be like an athlete - if you want to stay in the major leagues, you have to stay in shape and keeping hitting home runs so you can keep playing.

Having visited Fort Wayne five years ago at the Three Rivers Festival, where he was only able to perform to an audience 21 and over, Noone will now be able to enjoy an all-ages venue where his cross-generational appeal will melt away the years.

"We're actually better now than we were before. We have a whole new energy. And we have new suits!"

# **Big Hearted Fest**

The residents of Warren, Indiana like to describe their home as "a small town with a big heart." Sounds quaint and sweet and a little too good to be true, but if you make it out to the Salamonie Summer Festival, running July 1-4 in various locations around Warren, you'll see that at least once in a great while there is truth in advertising.

According to Adam Kiel, drummer for local country act BackWater and the music booker for the event, the Salamonie Summer Festival is designed to appeal to families. That's why on Friday night, married country duo Cook and Belle will entertain crowds at 9 p.m. on the festival main stage, following

an hour-long set by Back-Water.

"Cook and Belle are from Yorktown, Indiana," Kiel said. "They

only play festivals. They don't play clubs and bars. And lately they've been bringing their two boys into the band, and we thought a family act would be a good fit for a familyfriendly festival."

Prior to BackWater's performance will be the annual parade, which Kiel said will feature the usual suspects – firefighters, policeman, veterans, all of Warren's ball teams and little leaguers.

"We have a huge parade for a town our size. People love it. They line the streets. It's truly a community-wide effort."

As is the three-on-three basketball tournament that gets going on Saturday at 9 a.m. The tourney has apparently taken on a life of it's own in recent years, and Kiel predicts it will last far into the afternoon.

"We have to bring in temporary goals and paint the parking lot to have enough space to accommodate all the people who want to compete."

Other Saturday highlights include a fishing derby, a Zumba-thon, a presentation by Mark's Ark Amazing Animals, a mainstage performance by brother-sister Muncie duo Mix Factory, a book sale and the Firecracker Motorcycle Run.

Saturday has a car theme, and in keeping with that there will be a car and bike cruise-in following the Firecracker Run, and a demolition derby at the Knight Bergman Center grounds.

Closing out the evening will be a performance by oldies favorites Junkyard Band.

"We've never had the Junkyard Band before," Kiel said, "and given that we have a car theme for Saturday, we thought 50s and 60s hits would keep that theme alive."

Likewise harkening to days gone by will be amusement rides for kids located downtown near the main stage. When Kiel was

a kid, heading to the Midway was one of the most thrilling parts of the festival, but it was shut down years ago be-

cause of problems with the carnival ride workers. This year the rides are back, and Kiel

said he's sure kids will be excited they are. "There's only so much kids can stare at

"Rides will keep them interested and entertained."

Sunday will get started with a worship service on the main stage, a cornhole tournament, water ball fights and a barbecue cookoff. At 4 p.m. contemporary Christian acts Live 4:1 and Atta Boy will take the stage.

Following the concert will be a fireworks display at Tower Park.

Most activities at the Salamonie Summer Festival, including all the concerts and Monday's volleyball tournament, will be free to attend. There will be a charge for the demolition derby and the rides, as well as for food and beverages.

# We Are Everybody

Apparently they don't make hippies like they used to, and anyway, everyone knows they do things a little differently in Texas. With their propensity for wearing black and getting tattoos in both expected and unexpected places, the guys of Texas Hippie Coalition do not remotely resemble your typical tree-hugging, hemp-wearing, astral plane-traveling hippies who just hope everyone will give peace a chance.

In fact, this fivesome is perhaps best known for the single "Pissed Off and Mad About It," a hit off their 2010 sophomore release *Rollin*'.

Texas Hippie Coalition, or THC for short (okay, the hippie part is making a little more

sense now), formed in the latter 2000s in Chickasha. Texas when then rivals Big Dad Ritch (vocals), Randy Cooper (guitar) and John Exall (bass) decided to bygones let bygones be and become a band.

In 2009 they put out their self-produced debut, *Pride of Texas*, and began touring on the strength of the release, which helped establish their unique sound, a little something they like to call "red dirt metal."

According to

the band's website, THC are as Southern as Southern can be.

"Lynyrd Skynyrd, Molly Hatchet, ZZ Top, Waylon Jennings and Willie Nelson – we're as outlaw as we can get, while at the same time having the power of that Texas groove, like Pantera," says Ritch. "We're metal with a southern rock n' roll spirit. We are a band of outlaws."

The band eventually got bigger by adding Crawfish on guitar and Ryan Bennett on drums. And even outlaws sign with a label once in a while. THC did just that in 2009 when they teamed up with veteran producer David Prater to record *Rollin*' in his Oklahoma-based studio under the Carved Records division of Sony.

The album rolled to the top of the CMJ Loud Rock Chart in no time flat, fueled mostly by the appeal of "Pissed Off."

"Loud rock" is right. When Texas Hippie Coalition take over the Gin Mill Lounge Friday, June 24 with show openers Trip Wire, there won't be a quiet corner in the place.

But that's not to say that THC's sound isn't nuanced. When they call themselves "outlaws" they're not necessarily referring to their bad boy-ness. (Although look at them. You do not want to run into them in a dark alley. Or do you?) The outlaw image they've embraced is much more about music sensibility than it is about rebellion without a cause.

Ritch claims that his father's eclectic musical taste helped shape him into the musician he is today, which in turn has guided THC onto unbeaten musical paths.

"My dad raised me on cool stuff like Jimi Hendrix, Steve Miller and Alice Cooper, and he took me to see Johnny Cash

"The way [Cash] talked to the crowd between songs and the way he communicated with the audience, he left no separation. He

made people feel like he was part of them and they were part of him. Ever since, that's what I've always wanted to be."

For an idea of what THC are exactly, one need only take a quick look at some of their song titles. In addition to "Pissed Off," there's "Cocked and Loaded," which Cooper describes this way: "we're fired up, we're gonna hit it"; "Groupie Girl," about cowboying up and letting a girl know that hey, you're only in town for a day or two, so don't get too attached; and "Intervention," which, counter-intuitively, perhaps, is about trying to stand up to your demons alone, rather than relying on outside support.

So much for the music. What about when Ritch and company have some down time? In other words, what are these hippies like when they're not on stage?

"You'll probably find us in an armchair, drinking a beer, fishing on the river," Exall says. "We're not too good for anybody. We are everybody."

#### Sloan **The Double Cross**

To celebrate 20 years of making and recording music Sloan have released The Double Cross, their 10th album. While many would be phoning it in at this point in their career, these songs do not suggest a band coasting on memories of earlier success. Instead one hears

a well-oiled musical machine. If any egos ever existed in this democratic band, they've been left in the dust decades ago.

Democratic? Oh yeah, I forgot to mention that each of the four members of the band writes and sings at least two songs on every album. And rather than putting out disjointed mishmash, these skillful maestros make it work, thanks in large part to a solid grounding in the music of the late 60s and all of the 70s. For instance, the opening track, "Follow the Leader," is a galloping rocker with jagged drums, hints of The Zombies and the kind of melody that will keep you company for days. If the first song gets your engines rumbling, the next one, "The Answer Was You," will send you to the moon on a gorgeous, effortless, soaring power pop melody that a band like Muse would kill for. This song sounds like young love. The third punch comes courtesy of "Unkind," a chunky, pounding rocker with a gutsy, classic riff and cheerful melody that will elevate your mood while bringing to mind thoughts of early Stones and The Kinks.

While these three songs alone justify the purchase of The Double Cross, the members of Sloan joyfully give you the jangly "Shadow of Love" in which Keith Moon and Nick Lowe seem to cross paths. The Turtles poke their head out with "She's Slowin' Down Again," a masterful song of swirling guitars, relaxed background vocal harmonies and just the right amount of electric piano. Two songs -"It's Plain To See" and "I've Gotta Know" - take your breath away with their energy and brevity, but sandwiched between them is the stunning "Your Daddy Will Do," a catchy foot tapper of strings and jangly guitars that effectively combines a light disco beat with a bridge by Brian Wilson. Sure, it's a bit odd, but it totally works.

Sloan write the kind of effortless, intelligent, instantly enjoyable rock music that makes you want to pick up a guitar and learn how to play. How I managed not to hear of this engaging, talented band for the last 20 years is a mystery, though I can assure you that I shall soon be buying up their earlier albums. I suggest you do the same, starting with The Double Cross. (Jason Hoffman)

#### Boris Attention Please & Heavy Rocks

If you saw Nine Inch Nails on their last trip through the Fort, you likely also saw Boris, a Japanese trio who opened the show with a 25-minute barrage of structured noise and feedback. Their live show wasn't unlike their records, brimming over with long, feedback-drenched

tunes, short on lyrics but loaded with ferocity. On May 24, Boris dropped a pair of albums that mark a departure from their noise rock/ metal roots - and the results are simultaneously jolting and engross-

The fact that both albums are entirely in Japanese might be a deal breaker for some, but the sonically adventurous will be treated to two albums that both start in one place and evolve into something completely different. We'll start with Attention Please, which marks the starkest departure from the earlier Boris efforts, starting out with a club beat and vibe on the title track and hops into the Metric-esque "Hope." Fuzzy bass pedals "Party Boy" to noise-pop supremacy. From there, Attention Please melds atmospheric with industrial to craft an amazing album that shifts gears constantly, but never gets boring. Attention Please shows that while Boris might be famous for being noisy, melody isn't lost on them.

Heavy Rocks - my favorite of the two - has a completely different feel. It opens with four minutes of Melvins-style sludginess (appropriate since Boris takes its name from a Melvins tune). The rest of the record takes the melodic elements of Attention Please and lays it on top of raucous noisy rock. A much more straightforward rock record than other Boris albums, there's still enough chaos injected into the songs that Boris diehards will still find enough to keep them engaged. There's punk and hardcore in there, along with a little Superfuzz Bigmuff-era Mudhoney thrown in for good measure. This album is solid from front to back, with the epic 12-minute "Missing

#### **Velvet Underground** Loaded (1970)

Loaded, the last Velvet Underground record with Lou Reed, is one of my favorites. It isn't as heavy as the older stuff and is certainly the weakest one of the bunch, but I really love this record. It would have been better with



drummer Moe Tucker on it, but she was taking time off to have a baby That said, it's still a great release.

It opens with "Who Loves the Sun" sung by the multi-talented Doug Yule (who replaced John Cale in 1968). Yule drummed on this release for a lot of the tracks and played five other instruments as well. "Sweet Jane" follows, and while it might be their most recognizable song, it wasn't exactly a favorite of the diehard VU fans. ("Too commercial," they said.) Next up is "Rock & Roll," one of the greatest songs of the VU catalogue. 'Cool It Down" has a T. Rex, early-70s, hard rock vibe, and side one finishes out with the folksy-psychedelic "New Age."

Side two opens with the alt-country blues of "Lonesome Cowboy Bill," a tune that's reminiscent of New Riders of the Purple Sage. The album closes with the seven-minute jam "Oh! Sweet Nuthin." This is one of the songs that represents the direction the Underground took after Reed left. You've probably heard this song done by Phish, My Morning Jacket or the Black Crowes.

The Underground were around from 1964 until 1973 and have influenced numerous artists and bands including David Bowie, The Cars, Beck and The Pixies. In 1992 the original 1968 lineup reformed and toured Europe with dates scheduled in the United States for the summer of 1993. Unfortunately, Cale and Reed had another fallout, and plans for the tour were scrapped. They did appear together for the Hall of Fame induction in 1996. (Dennis Donahue)

#### Pieces" being an amazing centerpiece of this 10-song collection.

The descriptions of these albums might make Attention Please and Heavy Rocks seem derivative, but they're anything but. Boris are stretching out into new realms, and we get to reap the sonic benefits. Boris have always defied classification, and their eclecticism is in full display here. I'll stop short of calling this Boris for the masses, but despite the language barrier, these albums pull you in and don't let go. (Jon Schafer)

"We so much enjoy sharing our hospitality with people," said Schmidt. "We love to feed you, to make you feel warm and welcome. Anyone who comes to the festival will feel that. They will feel part of our family.

Greek Fest is put on by members of the Holy Trinity Greek Orthodox Church and is overseen by a committee of only 20 people. What many who attend the festival might not comprehend, according to Father Paul C. Bebis, the church's presiding priest, is just how hard the congregation works to make Greek Fest a reality each year.

"It's amazing what the committee and our members accomplish," he said. "They're so dedicated, so hard-working. This festival doesn't start on the 23rd. It starts on the day it ends. That's when we begin planning for next year. And everyone is happy to do it. It's a labor of love. We don't do it for ourselves. We do it for our community, for our faith, for the glory of God."

And for the glory of a good time. Schmidt said that Greeks know best how to eat, drink and be merry, and that anyone who makes it out to the festival will have a chance to experience what it's like to be Greek for a day, or even for just a few hours.

"We take a tremendous amount of joy in life. We celebrate the good times and we experience the bad times too, but we make sure to do it together. We don't hide our emotions. We share them with others. When you're with us, you're Greek."

For the second year in a row, Sunday will include a divine liturgy service, something Bebis said he hopes non-Greeks attend so they might understand Greek culture in a fuller way.

'So many people don't know what orthodoxy even is. They know Catholicism, Protestantism, but they've never seen an orthodox service, and it's a shame because they're really beautiful, with the iconography and music and fellowship," he said. "We encourage people to come out and witness a service for themselves. It's an education all in itself.'



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

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

first day it was a whole different experience. The first show was a '77, and it was awesome. Before I knew it I was hooked, and in '07 they asked me if I would join full-time. I was still doing some stuff with Phil, but Phil is a fickle guy. DSO offered me a steady job with a steady paycheck and part of the company. I love playing with them, and I haven't looked back."

Part of the attraction for Barraco is the presence of former Zen Trickster guitarist Jeff Matteson who joined DSO in 2009 when original guitarist John Kadlecik left to join a new band started by Lesh and Grateful Dead bandmate Bob Weir called Furthur. While he's happy for Kadlecik and calls him a great player, Barraco is happy to have Matteson in the band because of his knowledge of early 70s-era Grateful Dead, the stuff Barraco grew up with, the stuff that shows a band learning to stretch its improvisational wings, more along the lines of the jazz Barraco likes. "When we do '72-, '73-, '74-era Dead, that's the stuff I grew up with. They only had Billy (Kreutzmann) playing drums. The one-drummer thing ... he was really swinging. With Jeff we can really get it into that context."

Barraco's jazz jones get fed by DSO in a way he never expected.

"We're really taking this music to a whole other level," he said. "There have been times when I've walked off that stage and thought I was tripping. It gets that psychedelic. That's how I feel. This show is not to be missed We are playing in the moment, improvising 100 percent in the moment. It's not about playing a Dead show note for note. That would be a good college thesis for someone, to recreate a Grateful Dead show note for note, but it would be so mindnumbingly boring to play it that way. Can you imagine?"

wrote the children's books *A Light in the Attic* and *Where the Sidewalk Ends*, among many others, was also known for writing "A Boy Named Sue," made famous by Johnny Cash. Silverstein's free-ranging brain meshed with Dailey's, and the two became fast friends, hanging out and writing many songs together until Silverstein's death in 1999.

"We just hit it off so well," Dailey said. "At first I was awed by his presence, but we were so alike in so many ways it became a friendship of equals. I got used to criticizing his work and telling him what sucked, and he appreciated it. It became that kind of rare friendship."

Dailey told me stories of how he and Silverstein would wander around Key West and other places and how Silverstein, who dressed like a "bum or a hippie" was often mistaken as such. "He was standing outside this nice restaurant one time, waiting to go in, and some lady from inside came out and gave him a sandwich. She thought he was homeless. She had no idea who he was. He was a funny guy to be around."

As far as funny guys go, Dailey is no slouch himself. Whether on the Bob & Tom Show or writing things like "for mature adults and boaters" on posters advertising his shows, Dailey has a laid-back approach to life. He enjoys the madness during the tourist season at Put-in-Bay, but he enjoys the quiet off-season too.

"It's a quaint little fishing village with a drinking problem," he said. "On the weekends in the summer it's crowded and all that, but that's only for eight weekends. The rest of the time it's quaint and all that crap. I live out in the woods by the water. When the time came for me to drop out of the drinking and the partying, I had a nice little hideout to go to. It's really quite a place to see."

#### You Will Meet a Tall Dark Stranger

There are almost as many good things to say as there are bad about Woody Allen's umpteenth film You Will Meet a Tall Dark Stranger. On the plus side are some wonderful performances - by Gemma Jones as an elderly woman who, after being left by her husband of 40 years, takes emotional refuge in the blandly optimistic foretellings of a hired psychic; by Naomi Watts as her unhappily married daughter who begins falling in love with her boss; and by Antonio Banderas as her boss, who smolders even when he doesn't seem to be trying to.

On the minus side, you have curiously horrible performances: by Anthony Hopkins as Jones' character's ex-husband, who (in the most ridiculous and unfunny of the film's many subplots) takes up with a much younger woman; by Lucy Punch in the absurd role as the aforementioned much younger woman, a vulgar money-grubbing prostitute whose heart is not remotely gold, though somehow Hopkins's character can't see that; and by Josh Brolin, who breaks an extraordinary run of good films (No Country for Old

Men, W., True Grit, etc.) with this unfocused role as a married novelist who becomes besotted by a beautiful musician (played by Freida Pinto) whom he espies from his kitchen window.

On the one hand, several characters here are reasonably engaging, and there are a few scenes that surprise with their warmth, their romantic/erotic tension and their depth of insight. On the other hand, the movie is wildly uneven in tone, and contains too many silly subplots. Despite a pleasant enough (at least at the time) mosaic story structure, the movie doesn't really add up to much.

Allen has always been famous for directing his actors in a very casual, non-controlling way. To hear some tell it, he does little more than shout "action" and "cut" on the set. This casual approach has led, in the past, to some incredible performances in some incredible films, so who are we to question it? (Allen, at his best, is just about as good as it gets.) Here, though, some of his actors seem positively cut adrift. In one scene Brolin's character is roaming around on the city sidewalks aimlessly, his shirt unbuttoned. Brolin seems to have no idea how to play this scene and therefore looks about as clueless as his character. He all but calls out for a little help and guidance here.

I've self-importantly claimed to have given up on Allen in the past (the period from 1993 to about 2004 was a severe creative dry spell for Allen, despite the fact that he kept cranking out one film every year as always) but Match Point (2005) and Vicky Christina Barcelona (2008) showed us an aging artist still willing to make interesting and daring movies. You Will Meet a Tall Dark Stranger is poised almost evenly between his solid mid-level works and his slapdash worst. If you want to skip it, I won't try to change your mind. If you decide to watch it, however, there's enough that's decent here for me to offer up my (tepid) recommendation.

#### Another Year

Mike Leigh's previous film, Happy-Go-Lucky, was about a woman who was so irrepressibly joyful that she confounded and enraged many of the people she came into contact with. Leigh's latest, Another Year, concerns an aging married couple who are so happy and well-adjusted that they confound and enrage the people they come into contact with too. (They also enrich these people's lives, but that can sometimes be the most infuriating thing about a happy couple of all, can't it?)

Tom and Gerri - yes, they acknowledge the irony of this comical pairing of their first names - have been married so long they're beyond finishing each



other's sentences. Many times, between them, there's no real need to talk at all. Tom (Jim Broadbent) is an unfailingly good-natured man who loves his wife and grown son, loves a good bottle of wine, loves mucking about in the garden with his wife and loves his job (he's some sort of geologist). Gerri (Ruth Sheen) is a therapist. The movie opens with her providing counsel to a profoundly unhappy woman (Imelda Staunton) whom we never see again but whose almost toxic depression looms over the rest of the film. Gerri never seems at a loss for what to say, how to say it and, in some cases, what not to say.

The two of them together make a great pair. When company comes to visit - which is often - they are good hosts. They dearly love their 30-year-old bachelor son Joe (Oliver Maltman), but they give him

plenty of space and privacy and would never dream of criticizing him now that he's an adult. As it turns out, he loves to visit them fairly often too. Who wouldn't? Their hospitality is irresistible.

Another person who visits often is Gerri's co-worker Mary (Lesley Manville). Mary's a bit of a mess, flitting about town in a crappy used car she's just bought (but, hey, at least it's red) and drinking way too much wine at every given opportunity

Perhaps in even more dire need of intervention than Mary is Tom's old college friend Ken (played by

Peter Wight, one of my favorite character actors) who lives alone in the suburbs and whose only constant companion is drink. Tom, seeing how bad off Ken is, gently tells him he can't keep living this way and proposes a walking tour with Ken in the fall. Ken demurs with a drunken burp.

If you're thinking that Mary and Ken might be a good match for each other, I would respond by pointing out three things: a) Ken is, pathetically, thinking the same thing, b) Mary isn't - she's secretly in love with Tom and Gerri's charming son Joe - and c) as it soon becomes abundantly clear, no, they wouldn't.

The movie takes us through four seasons in the life of Tom and Gerri, beginning in the spring and ending in the winter, and over the course of this full year's cycle we see them responding to the various lives of those around them. (Or, rather, we see those around them responding, like a swirling tempest of discontent and confusion around the calm eye of their marriage, to them. The difference is subtle but important.)

The strongest set piece occurs in the summer section of the movie during a backyard cookout. At one point in this scene, I felt almost like an acquaintance who'd been invited to the occasionally lively, occasionally desultory and occasionally awkward barbe-

Sometimes, for all their pleasantries and good intentions, Tom and Gerri are resented by their friends. The truth of the matter is that we, the audience, are also occasionally annoyed by their lame jokes, their blandly agreeable chatter, their refusal to be argumentative, their almost smug-seeming contentment.

It's interesting to note that the very final lingering shot in the movie isn't of the happy couple at all. It's of one of their friends, and this friend doesn't look at all contented. It's in this moment that we realize that Another Year isn't really about Tom and Gerri, or at least not solely about them. It's about the fallout that comes from being around them, or rather, that comes from not being them. Some are blessed with a natural gift for happiness. The rest of us sometimes have to struggle just to get through the day.

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#### The Lonely Travel Guide The Tao of Travel by Paul Theroux, Houghton Mifflin Harcourt, 2011

I was never quite sure why Paul Theroux's travel books didn't appeal to me, but the question has finally been answered conveniently by The Tao of Travel, a tidy encapsulation of Theroux's thoughts about travel and travel writing. He lays it all out here clearly, with help from lots of other travel writers who think similarly about the endeavors of professional travel, and now it's clear to me why Theroux is not my kind of traveler or travel writer.

The Tao of Travel is not a travel book. It's a book about travel books, or rather a book

about travel writing. In it, Theroux collects bits of travel wisdom from his favorite travel writers, gathering snippets of commentary by everyone from Dickens to Nabokov, all of it designed to support his own views about the travel writer's career. He includes bits of his own wisdom too, drawn from his own travel writing, and as you might expect if you're familiar with Theroux, his own wise snippets outnumber those of the other writers in some sections of the book. In other parts Theroux writes thoughtful analysis of some of his favorite journeys by other writers, grouping them into thematically coherent chapters.

The reason that The Tao of Travel is so useful as the final word on Theroux's attitude about travel is that it so handily uses the thematic chapters to reduce that attitude to a fixed number of bullet points. "Fear, Neuroses, and Other Conditions"; "Travel as an Ordeal"; "Perverse Pleasures of the Inhospitable"; "Evocative Name, Disappointing Place"; "Dangerous, Happy, Alluring" The negative permeates the book, as it does all of Theroux's travel writing. The point he wants you to take away from it all is that travel is hard, and it's fun precisely because it's not fun. Even when he presents something that is ostensibly enjoyable, it's framed in the negative. "The Pleasures of Railways" explains the desirability of train travel by comparing it to air travel, which, of course, is terrible (it's not really travel at all, actually).

And it's not just travel that's hard. Writing about it is hard too. Maybe even harder. In "Travelers on Their Own Books," Ther-



oux includes excerpts from other writers who whine about how difficult, impossible, futile, silly and otherwise excruciating it is to try to write about a place you've been. It's a ridiculous career, travel writing, the chapter seems to say. We are foolish to try it, but aren't we truly amazing when we succeed?

This is the essence of Theroux' view of travel and travel writing, and as he shows in The Tao of

Travel it's shared by many other travel writers. In order to feel that he's not a mere tourist, or even a journalist documenting his experiences in a particular place, he must feel that he's doing something that no one, or at least not very many people. can do. He has to feel that he's doing something trying, unpleasant, some-

thing that a typical person would either not be able to do or would not consider because of the task's tediousness. It's a desperate quest for inclusion in a special club, the club of erudite travelers who are better at traveling than you are.

Theroux is a grumpy traveler. and he likes to do his traveling alone. A traveling companion is a distraction, a barrier between the traveler and the place in which he's traveling. Take someone with you and you'll give at least some of your attention to that person, taking it away from what's around you. There's some wisdom in that, to be sure, but Theroux's emphasis on isolation is so extreme that you have to wonder if there's something to it that goes far beyond solitary travel. In an excerpt from The Old Patagonian Express, he writes, "Alone, alone: it was like proof of my success. I had had to travel very far to arrive at this solitary condition.'

This book, like all of Theroux's travel books, is not for the traveler who is able to go someplace pleasant and love it. It's not even really for the traveler who wants to discover the world. It's for the traveler who sees travel as a form of penance, the price he must pay to remove himself from the world, to pass through space unnoticed, to become the exceptional ghost that he hopes himself to be.

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## **Love for 20-Somethings**

I am very excited to produce Melissa Dowty's Beta Launch at the Allen County Public Library. It has been a long journey for this never before seen piece of theater, and it has grown into a fabulous collaboration. We also couldn't have done it without Reuben Albaugh, my co-director (but he really did most of the work). His time, talent and determination shine throughout the play.

Melissa and I are both graduates of the IPFW Department of Theatre and have been in several shows

together. While I was visiting her a few years back, she asked me to read a new script of hers. Some thoughts from Melissa: "Beta Launch is the result of my efforts in my writing group, DAWG (Deadline Actors Writing Group - the idea is that unless we have a deadline, we'll never finish anything). We're comprised of

actors and writers living in New York City. I started with the desire to write something for people my age that I didn't feel was condescending (enough with the vapid 20-somethings, Rebeck and LaBute!). The play is about communication: how we choose to do it, when it's a useful tool and when it becomes a weapon, and why that process breaks down. Most importantly, it deals with how much intimacy and love, or the absence of it, can impact your world."

Of course, I was delighted by the script. Melissa has captured contemporary experiences, dialogue and **Director's Notes JANE FRAZIER** 

action perfectly, and that is one of the reasons why I felt the need to produce this piece. While we have amazing theaters in town, and while I love the classic plays and musicals, I've been thinking for a while that

She agreed, the ball started rolling and here we are now. Theater can educate, entertain and enlighten, and I feel blessed that I've experienced all three while working on this collaboration. Again, from our playwright (and all of us), "thank you for supporting independently-produced theatre and local artists."

There's one more show to go, and that's on Saturday, July 16 when the Festival's entertainment plaza signs off for another year with three bands from northeast Indiana – Cougar Hunter, the Tone Junkies and Dash Rip Rock. After a week like that, we can expect anyone within a mile or two of downtown Fort Wayne to have ringing ears for a week. All the better to keep memories of TRF alive for a little while longer.



## Super 8 a Sweet Homage to Film and a Better Time

A movie game I like to play is "best use of ... " or sometimes "last use of ... " For instance, "best use of a swimming pool in a movie" would include Sunset Boulevard. It's a Wonderful Life, Almost Famous, The Graduate and, of course, Swimming Pool. Super 8, J.J. Abrams' sweet, nostalgic new film, lets me play this game with one of my favorite movie props - trains. In fact, it shoots nearly to the top of my list of "best use of a train as a romantic backdrop."

Trains have been used for romantic meetings and partings for decades. A quick list would include Now Voyager, Brief Encounter, The Lady Vanishes, The Silver Streak, Since You Went Away (and almost every World War II picture) and North by Northwest. But the greatest props sometimes become obsolete. Who travels by train these days? The last two really quality films I can think of that used a train realistically are 1975's Three Days of the Condor – that's quite the dramatic parting between Faye Dunaway and Robert Redford - and 1976's Silver Streak, a lovely, humorous homage to North by Northwest.

The very best scene in Super 8 happens at a railway station. The film is set in 1979, and though no passengers use the dilapidated station in question, freight trains still pass through. More importantly, a gang of 12-year-old aspiring filmmakers are making a zombie movie for submission to a local film festival. Nerdily obsessed with the grammar of filmmaking, the writer/director Charles (Riley Griffiths) knows that a tormented goodbye between husband and wife should take place at a train station.

Charles has talked the lovely 14-year-old Alice into playing "the wife." He tells the crew he added her character to create sympathy for the detective hunting the zombies, so the audience cares whether or not the zombies get him. This is a plausible story, but one look at Alice and it's clear that Charles or any boy interested in girls would say anything to spend a



little time with her.

Elle Fanning plays Alice, and in this one scene she makes an enormous impression. Those Fanning girls can act! One minute she's the rebellious Alice, putting on a show of toughness. When rehearsal begins, she's "the wife," movingly distraught at the prospect of losing her husband. She's so effective that the boys surrounding her choke up and brush away tears. If they all weren't under her spell before, they are now.

Joe (Joel Courtney) was always under her spell. He hasn't been able to concentrate since he heard his friend Charles had the guts to speak to her and get her into the film. As the crew prepares to shoot the scene, a train approaches. Charles, eager to take advantage of this moment to up the production value of the scene, gets the crew to scramble to catch the passing train.

Joe sees a truck drive on to the track in front of the train, and the whole crew runs for cover as a spectacular train wreck ensues. Charles' Super 8 camera keeps filming through the crash. The camera sees what the kids do not. Something escapes from the wreckage.

The kids survive the crash. They rush to the truck that caused the crash and find their science teacher, badly wounded. He warns them to get away from the site and mention the crash to no one. "They will kill you," he tells them. He insists that they and their parents will die if they don't keep the crash a secret. And they do, the best they can, until, of course, events get too big for kids to handle.

Going in to Super 8 I knew it was Abrams' homage to the

early films of Steven Spielberg. Spielberg produced the film. and his name appears as large and often in connection with the film as Abrams' does. I don't want to spoil any of the surprises of Super 8, but if you're familiar with early Spielberg films, there won't be any surprises in this movie.

I don't mean this as a slam on the picture. I was more than content to sit back and see little bits of what is lovable about Jaws, E.T., Close Encounters and more all rolled into one. Abrams, like Spielberg, makes the innocence and freedom of being a kid in the 1970s look and feel and sweet as it was. Tunes, clothes, slang and gadgets are all right on.

Bike riding is another thing Spielberg and Abrams get right. Bike riding was synonymous with freedom back in the day. Time on a bike was time to dream and explore, not just get around.

Abrams takes mystery, suspense and magic from Spielberg, but his kid dynamics share more with Stand by Me in tone. The friendship between kids about to go through the big changes of adolescence is at the heart of Super 8. Martin (Gabriel Basso) is a nerdy member of the crew. Cary (Ryan Lee) is the budding pyromaniac who is the "special effects" man for this gang.

In the mashed up world of all these genres, adults are present but not very important. They show up to cause trouble and later, to understand and help save the day.

The young filmmakers in Super 8 display a precocious, charming passion for the movies. Don't leave your seat until you see The Case, the film the kids made. They have a bright future. They are behind the camera of the film you are watching. And a good time is being had by all.

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### Midnight & Memories

Last week I regaled readers with my thoughts on J.J. Abrams' new classic Super 8. This week I'd like to talk about

Woody Allen's Midnight in Paris and Terrence Malick's The Tree of Life.

I won't say nearly as much pseudo-fantasy/comedy about Midnight in Paris as I have the other two, so as not to detract from Woody's surprisingly effective storytelling device. By mixing elements of Owen Wilson's classic Dignan character from Bottle Rocket and the historical time travel stuff from the Bill and Ted movies with a romanticized version of Paris, Allen tells the story of a Hollywood writer who dreams of a low-key life spent writing novels while living in Paris. At midnight each night Wilson's Gil hits the streets to hang out with his heroes, all of whom spent much time in Paris in the 1920s. There are subplots and scenes inserted just for humor, same as in any Allen film, but the meat here is the story of a writer who is in love with two things: 1) his idyllic version of Paris; and 2) writing a great novel that can rank alongside the work of his many literary heroes. Maybe I liked the movie because Gil and I share many of those same heroes, or because I consider myself an artistic soul longing to do better work. Or maybe I just enjoyed seeing Dignan's more literate brother mix it up with fantasy versions of Man Ray, Luis Bunuel, Salvador Dali, Pablo Picasso, Ernest Hemingway, T.S. Eliot and so on (complete with plenty of geeky in-jokes for obsessive art appreciators). And then, of course, we have the plentiful visuals of Paris - set in both the modern day and 1920 - to enjoy. Needless to say, I liked the film very much. Considering all the major intellectuals portrayed in the cast, Midnight comes off as quite light and accessible. Because of that, it's doing quite well at the box office right now. Bravo, Woody! B

The Tree of Life. Rather than offer a standard form review of auteur/poet/man-of-mystery Terrence Malick's fifth feature film, the Palme d'Or-winning The Tree of Life, I figured I'd offer some stray thoughts on the movie - this because Malick's film pays no mind to any definable variation of standard form in the realm of filmmaking or storytelling as a whole. The film is big and wide open, poking the brain to think and remember, question and ponder – in ways it often skirts around - the hard memories of youth. That, and the meaning of the universe and

our existence.

Thought No. 1: I can't imagine how a theater full of females or non-Americans - or even African-Americans - will respond to Tree, but for me (a young white male raised by a protective mother and a hard-as-nails father, circumstances similar to what we see on the screen), the movie was as poignant as any I've seen ever. Malick somehow remembers the most profound seconds of his youth - a collection of single moments that made him the man he is today. He uses his memory of those moments to create a story about a Waco, Texas family going through some serious growing pains. Dad is nature and Mom is nurture, or in Malick's case, Mom is grace.

The family's three young boys (led by the eldest, Jack), struggle to find the balance between the two often opposing lessons their parents teach them. My words on your paper or computer screen can't begin to express the poignancy Malick puts into his poetic movie. Many moments in the film prompted me to remember childhood moments I hadn't thought about since they happened 20 or more years ago. Those moments of discovery - and the painful process of trying to figure out day-to-day life as a member of an intellectual society - deepen Malick's movie, which is basically an open-ended questioning of our existence. Poignancy defined.

Thought No. 2: Supposedly there are people walking our earth who booed The Tree of Life when it premiered at Cannes a few weeks ago. To those people, I say this: Iron Man 3 will probably be out before you know it. For now, you have Thor, The Green Lantern, Wal-Mart and "American Idol."

Thought No. 3: I believe this film will go down as a deserved all-time classic, as well as one of the more cerebral and visually poetic movies ever made. I can't think of a better movie about youth and the adult act of pondering it all as we look back and figure out how we came to be the people we are. Malick brilliantly juxtaposes wide-eyed children discovering the small things in life against a perplexed adult looking back on simpler and better days, even if those "better days" were as complex as any he's seen as an adult. It's a moving and profound device that any moviegoer living a con-

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
