Cover Story • Indiana Dulcimer Festival -----

Like the people who play them, Appalachian (or mountain) dulcimers come in all shapes and sizes. They can look like teardrops, hourglasses, trapezoids, rectangles, violins or even fish. They can also have anywhere from one to 12 strings. What all Appalachian dulcimers have in common, however, is how they're played – by draping them across your lap and plucking the strings. The resulting sound is lilting, complex and completely

"The mountain dulcimer is native to North America," said Nick Young of Folkcraft Instruments in Woodburn, Indiana. "It's the oldest native instrument. and the reason it's often called the 'Appalachian' dulcimer is because it originated in that mountain chain among the people who settled there."

If you want to learn more about this haunting and storied instrument, mark your calendar for Saturday-Sunday, July 23-24 when Folkcraft will play host to the second annual Indiana Dulcimer Festival. The festival will include live performances by some

of the most respected dulcimer players in the U.S., as well as workshops and demonstrations of how the instruments are made. There will even be courses on the ukulele, another instrument Folkcraft has begun to design and build.

Folkcraft itself has a pretty colorful history. It began as two dulcimer companies - Folkcraft and Folkroots - in California and Connecticut, respectively. In the late 1970s the owner of Folkcraft, David Marks, met Virgil Hughes, a man Young describes as "the Johnny Appleseed of the dulcimer." Soon, thanks to Hughes' knowledge and passion, Marks fell in love with the instrument, its cultural roots and the people who kept that culture alive. In the 80s, Marks acquired Folkroots and moved its inventory from California to Connecticut. Fast forward to 2007 when Woodburn's Encore Music Company was looking to change its focus from instrument sales, lessons and sheet music to something completely different. The folks at Encore heard that Folkcraft was for sale, and, according to Young, it was a matter of right place, perfect

"We had the people here with the right knowledge to make the instruments, and we had the perfect space for a wood shop," he said. "We thought it was the right time to move the Folkcraft name and business to Indiana.'

And last summer, says Young, was the perfect time to bring dulcimer enthusiasts to Indiana.

"We were already going to a lot of festivals, to dulcimer and folk events run by other people, and we thought, 'No one else has the facility that we do or the capability to run a festival right here on the grounds where the instruments are made," he said. "Here we can have workshops right in our wood shop, so you can watch a luthier crafting a dulcimer while someone plays it right next to him. It's a unique setup, and we wanted to share it.'

Share it they did, with three professional instructors and 35 participants. This year's festival has already grown by leaps and bounds. At press time they had 85 committed registrants eager to learn from IDF's now six-strong group of instructors, which includes international superstar Bing Futch.

Futch first picked up the dulcimer in 1986 when he was working at Knott's Berry Farm theme park in California. Since then he's made a name for himself as a master of the instrument and the founder of the awardwinning Americana band Mohave.

which has the taken dulcimer into places like the House of Blues at Walt Disney

World, Hard Rock Live Orlando, the Orlando Fringe Fest and the Bamboo

Dulcimer Festival.

Futch will lead several classes at the Indiana Dulcimer Festival, including ones on How to Play a Baritone Dulcimer, How to Write Songs. How to Play the Songs of Lead Belly and How to Play the Blues.

He'll also headline two concerts open to the public - one on Saturday starting at 3 p.m. and another on Sunday starting at 6 p.m. The concerts will take place under a tent in the Folkcraft Instruments parking lot and will cost non-festival registrants \$10

The festival itself begins with an open jam on Friday, July 22 at 6 p.m. when there will also be an open house, shop tour and bonus class for anyone who has preregistered. The cost of the entire weekend is \$140 per person, and Young emphasized that people will want to secure their place prior to Friday night, as workshop space is limited and the begin-

ning dulcimer class is already full.

Things really begin in earnest on Saturday morning when classes start. Anyone who signs up for the festival will be glad to know that Folkcraft worked hand in hand with the Woodburn Chamber of Commerce to plan the festival to coincide with the Woodburn Day in the Park BBQ and Music Fest, whose all-day Saturday activities are free and open

It's a pretty full slate, but still the founders of the IDF have one more trick up their sleeve. Young decided several months ago that a dulcimer festival would be an ideal story for the CBS Morning Show, and he and his colleagues have been campaigning ever since to bring them to the festival, even going so far as to create a CBS Morning Showthemed dulcimer and send it to New York, in hopes a beautiful instrument might lure them to northeastern Indiana.

The word so far?

"We know they've received the dulcimer, and Bing and others have persuaded a lot of their friends to e-mail CBS, requesting their presence, but no one's made any commitments," Young said. "If they come, great. I think they'd love it. If they don't, well, we tried. It was fun, and there's always next

There isn't always next year, however, to bask in the beauty that results when a uniquely American instrument is strummed

Teardrops, hourglasses, trapezoids, fish. It doesn't matter. What matters is the music.

A Radio Station for the Rest of Us

Let's be honest here for a moment: Fort Wayne radio stations lack variety. They paint our fine city as a place stuck in the past, too conservative to take chances – the least hip big city in a country known for its progressive arts culture. If you're a fan of indie rock, you're just flat out not going to hear a band you like on the city's biggest stations, The Bear and Rock 104. The only modern music you'll hear on a big station in this town, really, is poppy hip-hop, cheesy modern country, tasteless pop and generic metal. Mostly, of course, you'll hear all those obvious classic rock songs you've already heard 10 million times.

Through the late 90s and the naughts, this was my experience. If I was to judge our city simply from what I heard on the radio, well, I'd have to call it a cultural wasteland, run by old dudes who stopped caring about new music long ago.

Eventually relocated in Seattle a few years ago, I started regularly listening to live broadcast radio for the first time in years. There were at least three stations that not only played music that mattered, they often even managed to put me – a big 'ol music nerd with all 10 fingers on the pulse – onto some new bands. The stations played local bands and had a huge impact on the city's arts culture. For the first time in my life I was excited to get in the car and see what came through the speakers. It was blissful.

When talking to Seattle natives about my hometown, the example I always gave was simple: "I've never once heard my all-time favorite band, Pavement, on the radio while living in Fort Wayne," I'd tell them. They were shocked; after all, this was the band that Rolling Stone, Spin and many others have called "The Best Band of the 90s." I'd also not heard a Radiohead song on the radio since the early 90s. Even

obvious bands like Wilco and My Morning Jacket couldn't get a spin in Fort Wayne, save for maybe on NPR's Little Brother Radio program, a show that runs for only three hours each week. And so, like most big music fans in Fort Wayne, I'd forgotten all about the joys of listening to live radio.

Forced to move back to Fort Wayne after only a year away, I was greeted by something new and fresh. It happened because I found myself regularly driving a car with a broken CD player. I'd flip around, looking for anything tolerable, usually settling on a jazz station or listening to a Cubs game or some stuffy talk on NPR – anything but AC/DC. Then one day, out of nowhere, I heard this song called "Cut Your Hair" coming through my speakers. Pavement. Pavement, on the radio in Fort Wayne! Since that day, almost two years ago now, I've not changed the dial away from the station that played "Cut Your Hair": 91.1, WCYT.

For those not familiar with 91.1, it's Homestead High School's station. In addition to Pavement, they play countless other great bands – everything from Radiohead to Yuck to Bon Iver and more. New, obscure stuff that you maybe haven't even heard of yet. They play the kind of progressive new music that you'll hear in pretty much every other city the size of Fort Wayne or bigger but never heard in Fort

After two years of faithfully listening to WCYT on my half-broken car stereo, I finally met the man behind the music, WCYT General Manager Adam Schenkel. After a tour of the station I also met Andy Dunn, one of the station's former music directors, who was hanging around for the summer, helping Schenkel to establish a social media presence. (Oddly enough, Andy and I used to work at a record store together some years ago.)

"I was hired in as the general manager the fall of 2004," Schenkel told me. "I'm from around this area, but I didn't go to Homestead. I knew a guy who worked here before, so I knew what I was getting into. The huge amount of student involvement amazed me right away, and the music they had around was great."

After going on the air in 1995, the station functioned loosely for years before going to 24 hours on February 2, 2002. They played this and that, mostly focusing on alternative music but not entirely committed to any one style.

"Two years before I was the music director the station was more of an adult alternative station," Dunn said, "but



that changed by the time I graduated."

"I'm not sure how the whole indie thing started though, because at first we were more commercial. We played things you'd hear on the Bear," Schenkel explained. "Then we started adding bands you wouldn't hear elsewhere in Fort Wayne, and that's when we started hearing things back from listeners. So now we just consider ourselves to be alternative, indie and rock. We'll play big bands and bands you've never heard of. And some local bands."

Curious as to how the station morphed into the indiefocused unit it is today, I asked Schenkel about the involvement of the students. After all, how many high school kids out there are slamming to the new Yuck record, let alone all the early 90s grunge the station is also known for?

"I tell the kids every year that it's their station, but they have a few guidelines to follow," Schenkel said. "First and foremost, it's alternative rock or guitar-based music. Indie rock or whatever. There are a few bands that are staples that we're not going to get rid of. That starts with the 90s Seattle thing – Nirvana, Alice in Chains, Soundgarden. Those bands will always be on our station because I think that's kind of what started the whole genre we play."

At the beginning of each year Schenkel chooses a music director. It's a coveted job that has a big impact on the new music the station takes on through the school year.

"I consider myself to be a pretty big music person, but some of the kids I've inherited as a music director already know so much more stuff than I do," Schenkel explained. "My last director, Brady, for example, brought in a lot of new stuff, including this band Yuck. I was, like, 'Who is this? I love this stuff.' I don't know where these kids find this stuff. Choosing the director is a tough thing to do because you

have to let some people down, but you'll get these great kids who run with it, and then you just sit back and watch them do their thing. I love thinking about these kids learning all of these things so young, getting real experience. I mean, I don't think they realize how much experience they're getting, how great their job is. To have this kind of experience as a 17- or 18-year-old kid is amazing."

At first hired in as the station's general manager, Schenkel soon enough found himself getting deeply involved with the students.

"I'm a teacher now, but I wasn't when I first started; I was just the station manager," he said. "Coming here, I

was amazed by how good the station was here compared to other high school stations, or even compared to the student station at IU, where I went to school."

"That said, I have 120 kids every day, and 80 percent of them want our station to be all hip-hop, so not many of the kids really love the music we play," Schenkel laughed. "I mean, we could switch genres; it wouldn't be a huge deal, but we're not going to. We're going to stick with what we've been. There are already other stations playing that stuff in Fort Wayne; we're the only ones playing this indie and alternative stuff, so we're going to stick with it because we know it means a lot to a lot of people."

The main reason WCYT sticks with it's format? Well, someone *has* to play this indie rock stuff, right? That, and the format does appeal to many of the students.

"Working here was the by-far highlight of my high school experience. Definitely," Dunn said about his time with WCYT. "By my senior year I was in the station three periods each day. I'd come here during lunch. I mean, this was it for me; this is what I loved. Opening up those promos – and we got a lot of them back in those days. We'd get full bins and tear into them.

It was like Christmas everyday. So here, in this station, is where I realized what I wanted to do. I'm still looking for a place like this to work. Not a corporate station run by people who don't know about new music. Something like this where the music is chosen by how good it is, not by what's in the mainstream."

Though they've been playing the goods for a few years now, WCYT is still fighting to find its listeners. Unlike the corporate stations, they don't have an advertising budget. No billboards, no half-naked girls wearing their T-shirts.

"I mean, we have certain disadvantages because we're a non-profit station running out of a high school, operated by kids working for free. And even though we don't make money from it, we are still trying to compete with the big boys. And we have fun competing. So yeah, we want people to call us and we make it easy to get in touch with us."

Additionally, WCYT has a notably weak signal compared to, say, The Bear. Their tower, located near the GM plant, is only 125 watts. According to Dunn and Schenkel, it can reach as far north as the Dupont area while also hitting as far east as New Haven. So no, you might not always be able to tune in, due to the low-wattage signal.

When I asked Schenkel about these shortcomings, he was ready with an answer.

"First and foremost, this is all for the sake of education. That's what it's here for. That's why we have a station, so the kids at Homestead can learn how to work in broadcasting – how to do different things on the air, be it weather music or sports. So that's how I approach my school day, as an education," he said. Fort Wayne will never be Seattle, but with guys like Schenkel around, we just may be on our way to better days.

C2G A Matter of Tastiness

You know a culture's been around a long time when it begins to celebrate its own trappings, elevating them – or trying to – into the realm of fine art. To do so is a major component of the style or trend in modern art known as kitsch. Part nostalgia, part social commentary, it usually incorporates a visual reference to contemporary pop culture irregardless of whether the inclusion is in good taste. In fact, the more tacky and jarring, the better. This is not your grandmother's sofa painting (although hers, by way of being one of those mass-produced sentimental landscapes purchased in a department store, might well be considered kitschy, too.)

When you think about it, kitsch in the 20th and 21st centuries is as natural as a Carravaggio still life in the 1500s. Back then all artists had to work with were organic, natural motifs: apples, oranges, grapes, nudes, rivers, trees.

Today's artists have a more varied visual palette to draw from, and most of it, for better or worse, is of man's own making. Much of it can also be considered quite trashy, yet irresistible: advertisements, fast-food and retail architecture, toys, chachkas, electronics, etc. Grandma's reproduction is just another bit of flotsam on the pile.

However, it would be disingenuous for the contemporary artist to totally ignore all this junk laying around and not try to do something with it. The pop art movement in the 60s put it all front and center. But kitsch can be a bit more layered and nuanced in its

Degrees of departure from the original is also kitsch factor. For example, Michaelangelo's original statue of David equals fine art, no question. A small-scale plastic reproduction of the heroic statue acquires a modicum of kitsch because it has reduced the work of art to essentially a toy. A five-foot tall cast-resin reproduction for the garden would seem to merit some good taste points, until it is painted in lifelike realistic colors whereupon it becomes kitsch in the extreme. Bad taste is very kitschy. Congratulations!

So who better to represent in the name of kitsch than the artists of Fort Wayne's Wunderkammer Company? This younger generation of artists has grown up under an onslaught of rapid-fire graphics and imagery and consumables. Who better to process and incorporate all these disparate images into contemporary artwork?

Wunderkammer, according to founder and president Dan Swartz, was created to address the lack of alternative exhibition spaces within Fort Wayne, as well as the very large and thriving (and young) underground arts

"We are not in opposition to any of the established organizations like FWMoA or Artlink, but would like to think that we offer

a different taste," he says. Surprisingly, one of the "alternative" exhibition spaces for Wunderkammer happens to be the upscale bistro known as Club Soda,



located on Superior Street in Fort Wayne.

"Club Soda is a really great supporter of the arts in our community in general," says Swartz. Wunderkammer and Club Soda have partnered for a series of annual summer shows called Summer Set. "So far their patrons and staff seem to be very open to the concept and we have brought hundreds of people into Club Soda, some for the first

It's a swanky place to hold an event, and the opening night parties for the Summer Set shows have been eagerly attended. A nice win/win for both the artists of W< (as Wunderkammer abbreviates itself) and Club Soda, which gets an influx of new potential regulars with every opening.

"For the purposes of this exhibition," Swartz says, "we just asked artists to explore the intersections of kitsch within their work, not necessarily creating something kitschy, or even claiming to have an interest in the concept of kitsch, but being open to pushing its definition even further."

Participating artists include Bambi Guthrie, Dominick Manco, Audrey Riley, Rebecca Stockert, Amanda Joseph, Emma Downs, Jeffrey Melton, Portley, and Shaun

Manco exhibits three of his digital photographs in which he depicts barefoot, faunlike lads in the forest who peer knowingly back at the viewer. We feel we have interrupted and intruded on their play, but are forgiven. Wait a minute - those are doll's

"In this series, 'Boys of Summer," explains Manco, "I layer a number of different narratives and themes. On one level, I created pop-surrealist, nostalgic images of children at play, acting out real-life adventures in an era before video games and the Internet. It's about the importance of a boon companion, a playmate, a partner in crime with whom children can make discoveries about the world one skinned elbow and dead bug at a time. The children are aware of us as viewers, calling into question our role in their play. At this deeper level, I want to remind us that, as adults, we are interlopers in the sacred and secret world of a child's imagination as they play alone or with other

On paper such reflection and purpose does not sound very kitschy. However, Manco hits a home run with his combination of pastorale and Kewpie, dark symbolism and his choice of framing which hits the perfect note of Vegas smarm by being overly or-

Rebecca Stockert presents two tender studies of stuffed toy monsters (see cover thumbnail), one acquired locally from Clare Tarr, who has made a whole series of them.

"The small monster pieces are a reflection of my time as a parent and an artist," Stockert says. "They are nostalgic and domestic, but with a sprinkling of something sinister. When I set out to make the paintings my idea was to reflect on myself as a rural/ urban hybrid (being reared in the country and living now in the city), hence the contemporary art objects situated with elements from nature.

Significantly, the pieces are actually archival quality reproductions of her paintings which are mounted on panels and given a protective encaustic finish. As stated earlier, degrees of departure from original is important. So is darkness.

"My pieces are kitsch in the sense that they hold on by their ease of visual consumption, much like mainstream visual art," Stockert adds. "They are very tasty. The colors, shapes and images make them rather cute and unobtrusive. But, like I said previously, there is something a little sinister once you look closer."

The exhibit runs through August 18 during Club Soda's regular hours. Look sharp.

Adventures With Rocket Boy

What do 80s children's movies, pulp novels, an obsession for learning and a gifted drawing hand have in common? Jeremy McFar-

ren. Just don't call him an illustrator. He prefers the term storyteller.

"I'm not a writer because my writing needs pictures, and I'm not an illustrator because I want to tell the story. Comics are the perfect harmony of both - the ultimate art of storytelling for me," McFarren explained.

McFarren's Red Rocket Comics was born in 2010 with his first publication, Rocket Boy and the Space Ghosts, a fun, alliteration-packed ABC adventure story. Rocket Boy started out as a graduate school project and was prepared specifically for the first Summit City Comic Con in 2010.

McFarren was born and raised

in Fort Wayne and earned his bachelor of fine arts degree from University of Saint Francis in 1998. It was at USF that McFarren's calling to comics solidified.

"My favorite class was print making. I realized that I preferred not to be limited by a singular picture because I always wanted to tell more story than a single frame allowed," said McFarren. "That class showed me that I was fighting with myself by not making comics."

McFarren also discovered a passion for teaching in 2001 after

instructing art workshops with kids. Inspired, he went back to school and obtained his teaching license. McFarren has been in the Fort Wayne school system ever since - most recently at Carroll High School where he teaches art.

> Though he has a degree in fine art, McFarren is mostly self-taught when it comes to comics. When he graduated high school the digital world that we know today didn't exist. The Internet and computers revolutionized how art was seen, done and learned. McFarren has taken advantage of this, learning through online tutorials and conversing with other artists about their styles and methods.

The Internet has also been a place for supportive artistic community. McFarren takes part in a website called Summit City Ink, a blog-style collaboration of local artists who participate in a weekly design challenge. These challenges encourage the artists to tackle subjects they might otherwise leave

untouched. McFarren challenges himself technically as well, examining his own artwork with a critical eye in comparison to others. "I look at

what other artists are doing and think, 'That's what I was going for - how do I make mine look like that?' I try to incorporate the skill of

Flamingo Nosebleed Headbanger

When I was lucky enough to meet the guys in Flamingo Nosebleed two years ago, frontman Jake Emissions told me that all they really wanted to do was (a) set the bar for punk rock in Fort Wayne and (b) maybe take it on



the road. Lofty goals, but let's face it – mission officially accomplished. These flamingos – Emissions (guitar and vocals), "Philthy" Phil Nieswender (bass) and Mike Singleton (drums) – have set the bar high. All told they've been around for four years and during that short span have helped define the punk sound in Fort Wayne three chords at a time.

It was during that same, long-ago interview that Emissions also said they wouldn't mind growing old playing punk (these fresh-faced 20-somethings have a way to go before they collect Social Security) and maybe, just maybe, make enough cash to pay the rent. After a few listens to the band's sophomore effort, *Headbanger*, I'm convinced that they'll be doing more than just paying the rent. Rent? Hell, they own the place.

Headbanger opens with, pardon me, a bang, thanks to "Zombie Daze" which showcases Emissions' husky yet somehow boyish vocals and Singleton's talents with the sticks. Next up is "Stag Party!" a track that earns its exclamation point. "Do You Wanna" is filthy with Niewender's bass, and is it just me or does "Wake Up Today" quite naturally follow the question posed in the previous song? If this album's playing on the stereo or even the neighbor's stereo (it is, thank the punk gods, on the loud side), my answer is a resounding "yes!" Next up is my favorite track and one of the band's most popular hits, "Alcoholic Teenage Queen." This song, like most alcoholic teenage queens, is simply irresistible, and, unlike alcoholic teenage queens, will not puke all over your shoes. The PBR-fueled "Like a Rocketship" follows in all its Ramones-esque glory, leading into the title track, which double dog dares you not to sing along. In fact, every single song on this 11-tracker, including "Feelin' Fine," "Reanimator" and "Brain Surgery," is infectious, but not in a poppy, heard-it-all-before way. The album closes with "Dance to the Stereo," the perfect end to a practically perfect punk album. These tunes are original in every sense of the word, and it's wonderful to see the boys staying true to the motto printed inside the CD case (which, incidentally, features the gorgeously clever art of local painter Jake Sauer): "Death to false pop-punk, dude!" Indeed.

There's nothing false about Flamingo Nosebleed. When they head bang they do it right. They sweat. They spit. They rock. They make a lot of noise and they do it well. So get to the Brass Rail Friday, July 22 when the boys'll be headlining their CD release party with openers the Give Ups. Give up? I say give in. (Deborah Kennedy)

Cults Cults

Way back in 2010 two NYU students – Madeline Follin (lead vocals) and Brian Oblivion (vocals, guitar, percussion) – started a band and called it Cults. Before the end of that year they released a three-song 7" that went on to gain quite a bit of buzz, thanks to the



duo's Bandcamp page. By early 2011 Cults had not only already recorded their fully realized eponymous debut, but they'd been signed to Columbia Records and had become one of the most buzzed about new bands in a good while. (Aside from MGMT, when's the last time you heard of a new – and actually interesting – indie band getting signed to a major label? The Strokes in 2001?) With Cults' 33-minute, 11-song album now out on record store shelves, we, the audience, can see why Columbia so readily snatched this duo up. After sleeping on Yuck, Girls, tUnE-yArDs, Bon Iver, Best Coast, Sleigh Bells, Antlers and all the other next gen bands of today, the majors are starting to look closer at some indie bands; thus the big release of *Cults*, one of the year's finest debut records.

The sound here is both simple and big. It's two musicians making a Spector-inspired wall of sound without ever leaving the hypothetical bedroom. (In truth, the album is produced by the studly Shane Stoneback). Most of the weight falls on Follin's powerful lead vocals, which are achingly sweet and poppy at every moment. Oblivion's clever arrangements don't scream New York, instead call-

Bruce Springsteen

Greetings from Asbury Park (1973)

Asbury Park is a small town on the Jersey Shore, a seaside community whose claims to fame include hometown boys Danny DeVito and Bud Abbott as well as the Morro Castle disaster. But it was a little club called Mrs. Jay's that put Asbury Park on the (rock n' roll) map.



Mrs. Jay's house band was Southside Johnny, and when the joint changed names to the Stone Pony, a 23-year-old kid named Bruce Springsteen used to play there. The Boss grew up a few miles north in Long Branch and decided to name his first album after the town that gave him his start.

The record opens with "Blinded by the Light," a song made popular when covered by Manfred Mann in the winter of 1977. Ironically, the Springsteen version never charted. "Growin' Up" follows and is an imposing track about adolescence and coming of age in the late 1960s. It's still one of my favorite Bruce songs.

The album slows down a little with "Mary Queen of Arkansas." It's one of those Dylanesque, country tracks that made critics appreciate the Boss. "Lost in the Flood" is about a Vietnam vet, a cause Springsteen still fights for almost 40 years later.

"For You," also covered by Manfred Mann (and Greg Kihn), is one of those Springsteen tracks that starts off slowly and finishes strong. Lyrically it could have been written by Dylan himself. "Spirits in the Night," a jazzy-rock number featured Clarence "The Big Man" Clemons and his immense saxophone. This too was covered (very well) by Manfred Mann.

Debut albums don't get much better than this. I love The Boss (and don't take this the wrong way), but I don't own anything he released after 1982. Sadly, Clemons passed away last month at the age of 69. (Dennis Donahue)

ing out to the summer-all-year vibes of the duo's hometown of San Diego. These bright, shiny pop songs build and drop and chug, reminding me at times of Los Campesinos, though not nearly as over the top or cutesy. The mood here is party time, summer party time, with hip boys and girls and big speakers.

What strikes me most about the record is how much crossover appeal it has. Sure, the indie rock kids who buy brand new LPs and drink PBR and spell every word incorrectly will love it and see it as a subtle extension of just about everything else going on in the indie pop world right now. Hip kids aside, I could very easily see an older listener, maybe someone who loved or loves 60s pop, falling hard for Cults' retro appeal. Or how about the busy mom who hasn't had time to listen to new music for a few years? Yeah, I think she may also love these 11 songs. They're happy works full of bright imagery, bells, familiar riffs, goofy key arrangements and those soaring vocals – what's not to love?

A few songs in particular feel like new classics, starting with "Go Outside," one of the three tracks that helped score the duo their record deal. In a different time this would be not just the song of the summer, but a track not even Amish ears could escape. It'd play in supermarkets, pubs and over some energetic montage in either a romantic comedy or an art house hit. Another favorite, "Most Wanted," offers a very authentic 60s girl group sound, with Follin singing some of the most precious vocals put to wax since Isobel Campbell left Belle & Sebastian all those years ago. "Bumper," another favorite that features both Oblivion and Follin on vocals, also feels like a new classic, bouncing along in an adorable, energetic fashion. Oh, and let us not forget closer "Rave On," a new post-party anthem made perfect for summer nights with friends and strangers.

Cults is a record that could easily fit on a playlist featuring bands like She & Him, Girls, Los Campesinos, Richard Swift (the only featured guest on the record) and, well, pretty much anything else that's girly, trippy, poppy, pretty and fun. With their big-yet-simple sound, Cults have made one of the most consistent and listenable records of the year. The real accomplishment is the duo's ability to take a fairly simple and played out schtick and spread it out over a collection of 11 songs that's at once cohesive, diverse and endlessly interesting. Someone here, be it Oblivion, Follin or both, really knows his/her indie pop stuff. The best new duo to hit the mass market since The White Stripes? Just maybe. (Greg W. Locke)





others into my own repertoire," he said. When asked what his weak points are, he said perspective drawing and women. "I do what I call 'pretty girl practice,' practice drawing cute girls who don't look like burly men."

The skills McFarren learns in his personal work feed into what he is able to teach students in the classroom. He currently teaches Cartooning I and II, digital design and art history. McFarren even introduced the cartooning program to Carroll High School, a unique

aspect of their art department. He constantly

looks for new things to teach his classes, seeking value in what can be passed onto his students.

Above all else, he teaches exploration through art. "I love watching kids find something that speaks to them. I get to help them make connections to the bigger themes in life," said Mc-Farren. "Some of my first students still tell me today what a profound effect my class had on them and how they view their lives."

McFarren has an infectious zest for life that shines through in his illustrated adventures. He looks at ordinary people and places with a childlike wonder, incorporating them into these fantastical tales. He stands by the advice to "write what you know" and often draws upon family and local places for inspiration. Smith Air Field makes an appearance in his work, as does his wife and chil-

Story, for McFarren, comes irst.

Story dictates the flow and direction. The precise mix of story and element can take the reader on a trip to nearly anywhere. McFarren cites Steven Spielberg, Neil Gaiman and Pixar as his inspirational storytellers. "They are masters at building up a story and then taking away pieces in order to draw you in." he said. "By the time you get to the last fold,

they can let go because you're so personally invested in the story."

How does McFarren get an idea or decide what story to tell? "An idea has to sit in my brain long enough and keep my attention because if it doesn't keep my attention, it won't keep anyone else's," he said. "I think about what I enjoyed as a kid, wondering about a magic just on the other side of reality."

Comics allow McFarren to play with the real world while creating another that may or may not exist. "Kids are open to a lot more than adults are," he said. "Take the movie *Coraline*, for example: it's a story about a real world with a fantastical element that kids love." McFarren's work runs this same vein.

He describes his latest published story *The Cauldron in the Back Cabinet: Book One* as *The Goonies* meets *Harry Potter*: "Eleven-year-old Livi gets bored one day – and all kids get into trouble when they're bored – but her boredom opens up a whole new world of magic." McFarren likes to incorporate the theme of kids finding themselves into his work, and *Cauldron* is no exception. Livi learns about herself and discovers some of her mother's secrets, too.

Book one introduces all of the characters and major plot points. You can read the first 30 pages for free on the Red Rocket Comics website, where you can also purchase the entire comic. Purchases made through the site with PayPal receive a free original black-and-white drawing bonus. This first installment of Cauldron can also be picked up at Clem's Collectibles and Discount Comic Book Service in Fort Wayne.

A follow-up book two is in work and will take readers deeper into the story. McFarren hopes to have book two available for purchase by Summit City Comic Con 2012.

What's next for McFar-

"I've got about four stories going right now. I'm working on this 12-page spy adventure, practicing for an even bigger spy thing," he said excitedly. "I'm also working on promo packs for *Cauldron* to gauge publisher's interest."

McFarren and his wife Erin will be featured artists at Freshly, an eco-friendly art shop in Denver, North Carolina, on July 18. He will be selling one-of-a-kind paintings and drawings; she will be marketing her line of up-cycled goods called Polly Esther Threads.



Marwencol

It's hard to believe that any person over the age of, say, 12 would be able to create art while remaining completely unselfconscious about its creation and completely free of any aspirations to have it shown, sold or publicized. But Mark Hogancamp, the subject of the extraordinary documentary film *Marwencol*, is one such individual.

Hogancamp has been doing what he's been doing for years, and until recently he didn't even consider what he was doing to be art at all. Someone - in this case the editor of an art magazine who happened upon it by accident - had to tell him. All Hogancamp knows is that he has created an incredibly detailed, elaborate fantasy life in his backyard, one that helps him get through the day. He's deadly serious about it, though he doesn't seem to have any confusion about the fact that the fictional town of Marwencol - which he's created out of scrap wood, hobby shop supplies, lots of meticulous care and various dolls and action figures - is fantasy, and that his real life is his real life. (He's brain-damaged, but he's not delusional.) The place also offers him a much-needed outlet for his rage and fear.

One night 10 years ago, Hogancamp, then a full-blown alcoholic in his mid-30s, was attacked by several men outside a bar and was beaten so badly he went into a coma. When he emerged from the coma two weeks later, he reported having complete amnesia about his past. He also had significant, permanent brain damage. Thanks to a journal he kept before the attack, Hogancamp knows about the depths of his previous alcoholism and suicidal depression, and he is grateful that he feels absolutely no desire to touch alcohol now.

What he does feel a desire to do, though, is to construct a detailed WWII-era Belgian town in his backyard, one he keeps adding to as the years go by. The level of detail in the town is sometimes astounding. Realism is a high priority with Mark. To get the tires on the Jeep his soldiers ride around on to look worn, he regularly hitches the Jeep to a string and takes it on extended walks on the country roads near his home.

Mark doesn't want to drink alcohol again or revisit the person he once was before the attack. He does, however, wish he could at least remember what married life was like. In one scene he admires pictures of his ex-wife and talks about how pretty he thought she was. Mark hasn't had a girlfriend since the attack, though one friendly neighborhood woman, Colleen, becomes the object of his romantic obsession until she reminds him she's happily married and has no intention of becoming his girlfriend. Several landmarks in Mark's 1/6-scale town of Marwencol are directly inspired by Colleen. (Indeed, the "-col" part of the town's name comes from her.) Hearing him talk about her now, one can tell he's still not over her.

When Mark is "discovered" as an artist (he's taken countless 35mm close-up photos of his town over the years) he's not sure how to respond to the sudden recognition. He seems wary of exposing the details of his precious fantasy life to others. He fears he may not be hip enough for a gallery opening in Greenwich Village. He doesn't seem to care about the possibility of making money from the show. (Although that could just be the product of judicious editing on the part of director Jeff Malmberg.)

Hogancamp also has a secret that goes even deeper than his Marwencol fantasies – a secret that also possibly ties into the reason he was brutally attacked – which we don't learn about until relatively late in the film, though there are some hints along the way. In the portrayal of how he decides to deal with this secret, the movie's final



moments are poignant and quietly triumphant. *Marwencol* is a wonderful documentary about the darkest recesses of the creative mind, and fans of landmark artist's documentaries like *Crumb* and *The Devil and Daniel Johnston* should not hesitate for one second to check it out.

The Dilemma

Energetic businessman Ronny (Vince Vaughn) hearts his brilliant inventor/business partner Nick (Kevin James), though strictly in a straight way, of course. Ronny admires Nick's creativity and brains, and though he doesn't necessarily want Nick to know it, he considers Nick's marriage to his wife Geneva (Winona Ryder) to be the romantic ideal he hopes to emulate someday.

So imagine Ronny's shock when one day, completely by accident - he's at a botanical garden to arrange the perfect wedding proposal for his long-term girlfriend Beth (Jennifer Connolly) - he comes upon Geneva kissing another, younger, handsomer man (Channing Tatum). And this isn't one of those "maybe she's just being chummy with a male co-worker" smacks on the cheek either. This is a long, lusty, unambiguous, tongue-thrusting kiss. In order to get a better look, Ronny tramps through some exotic flora, coming into contact with a poison plant that gives him rashes and "challenging" urination for the next few days. (Comedy is intended to ensue, though I did little more than halfheartedly smile a few times the entire movie.)

Ronny isn't sure what to do. If he tells Nick, it'll break his heart, and besides, Nick is hard at work designing an electric car that "isn't gay" (his words) by having it mimic the roaring sounds of an old 70s muscle car whenever the accelerator pedal is pressed. (This idea is every bit as stupid and unappealing as it sounds, though I'm pretty sure we're supposed to think – along with Chrysler, who has commissioned the project – that it's cool.)

When Ronny confronts Geneva about her adulterous ways, she at first denies it, but then, seeing she's been busted, reveals damning details about her "everything is not as it seems" marriage, details Ronny refuses to believe. This leads Ronny into a string of covert activities – following his best friend to a "happy endings" massage parlor; sneaking up to the window of Geneva's lover with a camera – that just get him further and further into trouble. And since he keeps all of this stuff from Beth, she begins to suspect that he himself is up to no good.

Vaughn's performance is spot-on - he has more acting chops than even he sometimes gives himself credit for - and it's great to see Ryder playing a desperate viper like Geneva. Still, the pleasures offered by *The Dilemma* are extremely modest. I had to remind myself that, although this is directed by Ron Howard, the same guy who made Parenthood, The Paper and Apollo 13 great movies, all - it's also directed by the same guy who made Gung Ho, How the Grinch Stole Christmas and The Da Vinci Code. The characters are all over the map, especially James' cuckolded Nick, who is temperamental and cocky one minute, meek and insecure the next. The movie gives us the credit of having an attention span and unfolds in a leisurely and patient way, but to what end? Ultimately, the movie has as much roar and heat as the ersatz noises emanating from under the hood of Nick's ridiculous prototype car.

Data Versus Emotion

The Social Animal by David Brooks, Random House, 2011

New York Times columnist David Brooks has always wanted to write a book about how the human brain works, but he's been busy writing about politics instead. I'll leave aside the jokes about the conflict between politics and a working human brain and simply say that with *The Social Animal* Brooks finally has had the chance to complete the project he's wanted to undertake since college. This sociological study looks at how people move through world, how they think and interact with others, how they travel down one path and not another.

Brooks' premise is simple, but

he's pretty sure that it's controversial.

Human behavior is not controlled by logic and rationality, he argues, but by emotions and passions. It's not the ability to reason that separates man from THE beasts, but the abil-SOCIAL ity to navigate the world while looking ANIMAL through the unfocused prism of feelings and intuition. Most impor-DAVID tantly, he insists, we are not alone in our heads; we BROOKS are not chemical machines programmed to execute instructions independent of everything but our own brains. We are social creatures, and we are affected, shaped, defined and altered by our surroundings, our culture, our history and, significantly,

In order to lay out his ideas, Brooks taps into a broad body of biological, psychological and sociological research, but he doesn't just cite studies by reciting their cold, dry facts. Such an approach would be antithetical to his whole idea. Instead, he writes what amounts to a sociological novel. He creates characters and uses them to illustrate the scientific points he wants to illustrate. The characters behave according to the findings of the studies, but they do so with charm, with names and backstories to go along with the data.

the other people we encounter along

The characters Brooks creates are named Harold and Erica. They are American success stories. Harold is a middle-class boy whose success is pretty much predetermined by the world into which he's born, while Erica has a shakier start. Harold is white and privileged, but Erica is biracial - Chinese-Mexican - and she fights to rise above her lower-class roots. She succeeds, and eventually she and Harold are married. The way that they become who they are - and they become completely unlike the people they were when they're born - is what interests Brooks, and he studies their life paths meticulously.



There are a few problems with the way Brooks tackles his project. Perhaps most significantly, there's a problem with credibility. Everyone knows that you can't draw scientific conclusions from anecdotal evidence. If you try reaching a conclusion while examining only a handful (or less) of results, you can't be sure that you're getting an accurate, objective look at the data. Imagine how much less accurate your conclusions will be if you make up the anecdotes to fit the story you want to tell. That's essentially what Brooks is doing with his fic-

tional characters. To be fair, he only claims to be using them to illustrate conclusions that have already been drawn, but the whole thing has the air of the misleading about it.

Then there's the odd tem-

All of it, from the first meeting of Harold's parents to the very last day of the relationship between Harold and Erica, takes place right now, in the very culture in which we live. The

story is strangely compressed, and that's probably because Brooks wants to show us the universality of it. He wants to point out that any of it could be happening right now, to anyone. But that notion seems to contradict Brooks' thesis. It matters when Harold's parents met. They would behave differently if they met yesterday than if they met 60 years ago, and Harold would be different because of it.

There's also Brooks' tendency to look at things through a narrow lens: the lens of the American upper middle class. He likes to poke fun at the frivolity of the American bourgeois suburbanite, but he doesn't seem willing to look very hard at any other segment of the American population. Even when he tries, as he seems to be doing with Erica, he's quick to pull her out of poverty and deposit her in the realm of the well-to-do, explaining that no one really understands why poor Americans act the way they do, so he's not going to try to figure it out.

What we have here, essentially, is an ostensibly conservative commentator's take on the sociological/biological underpinnings of contemporary American behavior based on the current consensus among researchers. That's not quite as broad and universal as Brooks wanted his book to be, but I think it's the most we can expect from it.

Celebrating Flower Power

Makes perfect sense really. Where better to celebrate Flower Power than the Foellinger-Freimann Botanical Conservatory gardens?

There are more than flowers at work here, and the conservatory has chosen a fitting time to make the connection. During the late 60s the flower came to symbolize peace and love, and certainly the bold, bright, beautiful colors of those blooms have come to represent our visual impressions of that time. Clothes, cars, art and décor all reflected the way our senses

seemed to come alive during a new era in which new freedoms battled it out with new and heightened fears. Looking back on that time through the prism of our current era of war and changing social norms provides a context while allowing the conservatory to do what it does best – share their beautiful gardens with northeast Indiana.

Adding to the fun is a performance that should attract a great crowd and will also invoke the spirit of the 60s. Country Joe McDonald will perform at the Botanical Roots Outdoor Concert Series on Friday, August 12. Those of us who attended his appearance at IPFW's Omnibus Lecture Series in April will not soon forget the songs and commentary he shared that night. He captured the crowd from the first "Give me an F!" and held them in his grasp for the rest of the night. Now with an opportunity to share even more of his music, Country Joe – who performed at Woodstock and whose music captures the decade perfectly – will absolutely delight. And from the packed house in attendance at IPFW that night, it's clear there will be plenty who will gladly enjoy the night.

There's also plenty of time ahead to enjoy the Flower Power exhibit. It's set to remain open at the Conservatory through November 13.

Woody Allen is Back and Better Than Ever in Paris

Who knew that the perfect stand-in for Woody Allen would be a big blond guy from Texas? There are many pleasures in Allen's new film Midnight in Paris, and one of them is watching a charming and sympathetic Owen Wilson struggling with what he will make of his life as he sorts out his desires.

Wilson floats through this charming fantasy with a very believable sense of wonder and confusion. Wilson play Gil, a successful Hollywood screenwriter engaged to the beautiful Inez (Rachel McAdams). They are on vacation in Paris with Inez' parents (Kurt Fuller and Mimi Kennedy) who have oodles of money and are on a business trip.

This trip comes at a crucial crossroad in Gil's life. He's wild about Inez, but he's growing tired of the social whirl of Los Angeles and the high paying work of script fixing and screenwriting. He's a little nervous about his impending marriage and the life his fiance and in-laws have planned for him. He's working on a novel about a man who owns a "nostalgia

Gil himself is suffering the grip of nostalgia for his early life, when he lived in Paris and immersed himself in the city that, during the 1920s, attracted literary and artistic giants like Hemingway and Fitzgerald.

Gil's nostalgia for this golden age of artistic and literary flowering doesn't match his situation. His future in-laws appreciate that he makes a decent living, but they think he has a screw loose. They're also on the opposite end of the political spectrum and can't join in his admiration for things French or artistic. Gil's sight-seeing companion, Inez' old friend, Paul (Michael Sheen), is a know-it-all. Paul prefaces nearly every remark he makes with "If I'm not mistaken" and pays too much attention to Inez.

I don't think I'm spoiling anything when I reveal that one night, while Gil is alone and contemplating his life, a clock strikes midnight and a magical cab pulls around the curve of



a narrow Parisian street. It stops and the passengers invite Gil

Desperately seeking adventure Gil hops in, and off he and his companions go to a swinging party where, curiously, everyone is dressed very retro and Cole Porter songs are being sung by the piano player. When the vivacious Southern belle and dapper gentleman who picked Gil up introduce themselves as Zelda and Scott, Gil thinks it's a joke.

They decide to flee to another party and they pick up their piano playing friend Cole on their way out. It slowly dawns on Gil that he's slipped through some magic door to the age he admires most. He wastes little time questioning and starts

Gil begins taking what he tells his fiancé are long walks for inspiration, when he's really slipping back and forth in time for a few hours between midnight and dawn. Wilson shines in the role of Gil. He has a wide-eyed fascination with the people he's meeting. Allen originally wrote Gil as a New York writer who has an adventure in Paris, but when Wilson expressed an interest in the role, Allen rewrote it, turning Gil into a successful Hollywood screenwriter. The changes help make the

What fun Allen and his actors are having! This is Allen's best screenplay since Hannah and her Sisters. He has given his actors wonderful, witty dialogue. (The only obviously amateur performance in the film is France's first lady Carla Bruni as a museum guide. She's lovely, but undeniably wooden.)

The actors who get to play the famous denizens from Paris

past are having the most fun. Alison Pill and Tom Hiddleston make a great Scott and Zelda. Hemingway is gently made fun of and Corey Stoll delivers his lines in a perfect deadpan. Marcial Di Fonzo Bo is a raging Picasso. Kathy Bates is too perfect as Gertrude Stein. Perhaps my favorite is Adrien Brody as Dali. (Slap your chest when you say that.)

Gil takes his novel back to the past, and Hemingway gets Gertrude Stein to have a look at it. In Stein's home one night Gil meets Adriana, an aspiring costume designer, model and muse to many of the artists of the day.

Marion Cotillard is quite believable as muse, and Adriana becomes smitten with Gil's novel after hearing just the first few sentences read aloud. He is equally smitten in return. He gets pulled more and more into the past, taking long walks with Adriana, but jumping back and forth in time is stressful on the mind, and Adriana almost unwittingly helps Gil recon-

If you are unfamiliar with the stars of the past who are the butt of gentle jokes in Midnight in Paris, I think you could still easily much enjoy the movie. While remaining light and funny, the movie does make you consider how to appreciate the past - your own or the larger, cultural whole - without being captive to it. Gil realizes that ostalgia can enslave the imagination, and he eventually finds balance.

How well does Midnight in Paris connect with audiences craving a kind of smart, adult fantasy? Cinema Center is now showing Midnight in Paris. Many audiences have applauded at the end. I'm thrilled that that kind of enthusiasm is alive and well and not something I'm forced to remember fondly.






