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The Prince of Blues

Blues guitarist Chris Beard has led a charmed life. As the son of Joe Beard, a legendary blues guitarist who grew up on Beale Street in Memphis and who played with a who's who of blues legends, Chris "Prince of Blues" Beard got to sit and learn at the feet of players like Matt "Guitar" Murphy, Luther Allison and Buddy Guy. Beard remembers one time when Murphy visited, he fell asleep while playing and slept all night with his guitar in his hands. When Beard saw Murphy in the morning, guitar still in hand, he asked him about it. Murphy told him the guitar had to become an extension of your body.

Beard eventually moved from pupil to peer, sharing the stage with his heroes and forging a successful career leading his own band. But that's not what makes his life charmed. What is fortunate about Beard's life is in 2005 he survived a life-changing stroke, which left his right side paralyzed, and emerged not only as a better player but as a more grateful per-

Beard brings his newfound vigor to The Philmore in Fort Wayne Friday, August 5, along with his band - Richie Valentino on bass, John Tucker on keyboards and Fort Wayne's own Kimball "Kimbo" Glaspie on drums. Beard will be supporting his latest release, 2010's Who I Am and What I Do.

Beard had just released Live Wire, a collection of live and studio recordings, and was getting set to take his band on the road to support the record when he had his stroke.


"The new CD came May 5th, and on June 5th I had the stroke," he said in a phone interview from his home in Rochester, New York. "I had a bunch of dates lined up and ended up having to cancel most of the sum-

Beard recalled feeling strange that day, drunk even, though he had quit drinking more than a decade earlier. He went about his business and things deteriorated as the day went on. He wound up in the hospital with his right side totally paralyzed.

"I had to learn how to walk and to talk and sing and play again," he said. "The day after my stroke my father came to the hospital with an acoustic guitar. I couldn't play

Beard spent the next few months relearning not only how to play but how to deal with life. He had progressed in his playing to the point he was as fast as anybody out

"I had been playing since I was five," he said. "The first song I learned was that Booker T song 'Green Onions.' When you're

learning, it's all about speed. It's all about who can play faster. I grew up with Buddy Guy in my house. I told my father I wanted to play fast like him. My dad told me to take my time and the speed would come."

The speed did come eventually, but the stroke took it all away in an instant. Instead of spending five or six nights a week on the road with his band, Beard ended up in therapy five or six times a week.

Beard eventually got to the point where he could sing and play a little, but he felt he needed someone to do what he couldn't. He had lined up some dates in September of 2005 and hired a guitar player for the gigs while continuing with his therapy.

"I went to an occupational therapist in Rochester. Rochester has two of the best music schools in the country, and this therapist was used to working with horn players and cellists. This therapist told me I was using this other guitar player as a crutch and that, if I wanted to really get it back, I had to do it

The advice was the best Beard could have gotten. And instead of learning to play like he had before, with blazing fast solos and runs up and down the fret board, he had to develop a new way.

"I was thinking about it and talking with my father and realized that the greatest player, B.B. King, can do more with three notes than most can do with 10," he said. "Buddy Guy can take four notes and do more with that than anyone. So when I had my stroke I reflected back on all of that. I needed to get the most out of the notes I play, not just play as many notes as possible."

Within six to eight months Beard was at 85 percent. By 2007 he was back to full power. His current shows are as wild and fiery as ever. Beard is fond of taking his guitar off the stage and into the audience.

"Get ready for a great show," he said. "Gonna be like no other. Tell the women to wear their skirts 'cause I'm gonna be sittin' on their laps. It's all about havin' a good

Okay. So maybe the stroke didn't change Beard that much. It just made him look at things a bit differently.

"I just appreciate it more," he said. "It helped me appreciate the old players."

Nuge is Still Huge

Given that the man has played more than 6,000 concerts, written bestselling books,

hosted a variety of television reality shows plus provided more than a few titillating guest appearances, released more than 34 albums and given countless interviews over his 40year career, what else can be written about Ted Nugent that hasn't been said many times before? Apparently not much. My work here is done. Good night. Be sure to lock the doors behind you when you leave.

What? Still here? If you insist, we'll crank up the ol' dog and pony


Ted Nugent, or "The Nuge" as his friends call him, grew up in Detroit where he earned the moniker of Motor City Madman. No, not mad as in angry, even though liberals like to characterize conservatives as angry.

Rather "mad" as in "crazy," which I guess is still a label the left likes to paint on the right. And yes, Nugent unabashedly conservative. Just ask him. In fact, if you see or hear an interview with the man you'll

be struck by two things. One, that maybe he really is crazy, and two, that the man is completely passionate about his beliefs. Oh, and three, you cannot win an argument with The Nuge, at least by using logic, as he has facts to back up his positions. Whether you agree with his view or not, you have to admit that Nugent is entertaining to watch. Have to. Don't argue with him over this point. He will surely win.

After playing thousands of concerts over four decades and having an immeasurable influence on early and current metal guitarists via his Gibson Byrdland guitar, Nugent is most certainly larger than life, a living legend really. He started his career in the mid 1960s with a band called Amboy Dukes. Their big hit was "Journey to the Center of the Mind" (totally psychedelic, man), but after a number of years of constant band member changes Nugent found himself the lone original member and decided to go solo. Or maybe he was tired of playing songs like "Good Natured Emma" and "Why Is a Carrot More Orange Than an Orange.'

What this man wanted to do was to write songs like "Yank Me Crank Me," "Wango

I knew instinctively that if I were to honestly pursue my American R&B&R&R dream that I had to be absolutely healthy and aware of everything. That's when I promised myself I would never miss a hunting season ever."

With more than 35 years of recording, touring and hit-making already behind them - not to mention thousands upon thousands of rabid fans who call themselves "Airheads" to their credit - Air Supply are completely immune to passing fads. Regardless of what musical genres may currently be fashionable, their lush melodies, impeccable harmonies and romantic lyrics have proven remarkably timeless. It would be easy for the band led by Russell Hitchcock and Graham Russell to rest on its laurels and

sit pretty on its stack of Gold records, but with last year's new CD, Mumbo Jumbo, and Hitchcock's own recent solo release, Air Supply keep moving forward even as they constantly revisit their past.

Having met in 1975 when both were starring in a production of Jesus Christ Superstar, the Australian duo quickly became friends and discovered an immediate musical rapport. Both devoted Beatles fans, their harmonies quickly became their ride to a recording contract in their native country. But they always wanted more.

"We were offered the world if we didn't leave Australia, if we stayed there and kept recording and stayed successful there," says Hitchcock. "But we didn't want to be the biggest act in Australia - we wanted to be the biggest act in the world."

That became possible in relatively short order. Thanks to a gig opening for Rod Stewart, Air Supply soon gained recognition outside their backyard. By the time music industry giant and Arista Records president Clive Davis heard them, history was in the making.

"We had recorded Lost in Love in 1978 in Australia, and when Clive heard it he called and said, 'I want to sign you guys.' So it took two years for Lost in Love to move from Australia to the United States."

Responsible for signing acts as diverse as Barry Manilow and Whitney Houston. Davis was able to steer Air Supply toward songs that, in addition to those that Russell was writing, soon formed their repertoire. At times the band questioned his choices, but in the end he was usually vindicated.

"I still believe he's the most influential guy in the recording business, and he was always able to put us with the right songs," Hitchcock says. "There were times we'd fight with him about songs, but we'd always

> give in, and they'd become big hits. And he'd always say 'I told you so."

Air Supply's first two albums provided an impressive list of singles, more than

many bands have in a full career. "Lost in Love," "All Out of Love," "Even the Nights Are Better" and "The One That You Love" provided the romantic soundtrack of the early 1980s. But even with that quick success. Russell and Hitchcock were surprised when their manager suggested a greatest hits package so quickly - and more surprised when it led to a meeting with Jim Steinman, best known for his work with Meat Loaf.

"We said, 'Are you out of your mind? We've only released two albums!' But the idea was for us to take the hits we'd already had to that point and add a new song. He said we should meet with Jim Steinman, so we flew to New York to talk with him," Hitchcock says. "I remember he was a very eccentric guy. We met him in this ice cream shop, and he was wearing these elbow length motorcycle gloves as he ate his ice cream. But he said he had a song for us, 'Making Love Out of Nothing at All.' It was like a

Ortega started the guitar festival last year in part because his main focus in life, apart from music, of course, is giving back to the community. He saw an opportunity to put on a very special event for his students and so he did it, and families of the almost famous will be glad to know that admission to the festival is absolutely free.

"My whole idea was to get all my students in a nice, big venue with professional

sound up in front of all their friends and families," he said. "It's a really personal thing for me, putting this on in my own backyard in Auburn. A lot of kids just play in their parents' basement. That's what I do. I'm so blessed."

After slogging it through another work week, Friday always finds me desperately needing a change of pace. That might mean camping, the movies or perhaps a night full of screaming, rage and tribal body paint. Really, whatever fits my mood. And since Motograter will be in town Saturday, August 6 at the Gin Mill Lounge, it looks like I'm in

With a sound that has been compared to a wide array of artists from Mushroomhead to Breaking Benjamin, Motograter are certainly worth listening to. But they've also got that little something extra

that makes them a must-see band in concert. By "a little something extra," I mean tribalstyle, full body paint. And, if you make it out that night, you'll also have a chance to cast your eye on a completely original instrument crafted by one of the band's founding

Motograter's namesake is a unique instrument originally created and played by Bruce "Grater" Butler. The motograter - made of industrial cables, guitar pieces and various other metal odds and ends - is coupled with custom pickups to give a deep, ground-shaking quality to the band's music. This is music that has undergone quite the evolution since the band first formed, according to lead vocalist and frontman Michael "Angel" Woodruff.

We got a hold of Woodruff by phone during an ever-so-brief reprieve from touring. The band had ended its last tour early in Phoenix barely two weeks before, and in a few more short weeks they would be back on the road, leaving band members with little time to enjoy home life or family. But the life of a musician is rarely as glamorous as it looks, and long months on the road are a reality. Woodruff just says, "We can't afford to take long breaks."

Motograter's long and torrid history began in San Antonio in 1995. In 2002, after seven years of making music together, they

lost their lead singer, Zak "The Waz" Ward, as well as lead guitarist Neil Godfrey. They replaced both quickly with Ivan "Ghost" Moody on vocals and Matt "Nuke" Nunes on guitar for their studio album debut in 2003 and

subsequent tours with Ozzfest and bands such as Killswitch Engage and Korn. They would be forced to find a new vocalist yet again after Moody left shortly before joining 5 Finger Death Punch. And Motograter went through three more lead guitarists before they found the right fit.

Founding members floated in and out of Motograter for years, in different roles with different instruments. The band went on hiatus in 2005, and when they emerged again in 2009 it was with a new lineup that didn't include any of the founding members except Butler. Before they had a chance to get on the road and tour, Butler bowed out.

After Butler left, it looked as though the motograter would be lost from the band and, along with it, their most unique claim to fame. The market wasn't necessarily in need of talented motograter players strum-

Drink Up New Haven

The art of craft beer is growing in the Midwest.

Want proof? Northeast Indiana is home to MASH (Mad Anthony Serious Homebrewers club), and Trion Tavern, a quaint bar in New Haven with more than 55 different beers on tap. On Saturday, August 6, Brew Haven also comes to town.

Brew Haven, cleverly named for both beer and the city of New Haven, is not to be missed. Ticket holders will get the chance to sample well over 100 different beers from more than 30 breweries and 50 local homebrewers who won a combined nine awards last year.

MASH partnered with Trion Tavern to "expose people to the fun, easy and rewarding hobby of craft beer," said Adam Lepper, Chairman of the Brew Haven Planning Committee and MASH spokesman. "Some of our brewers are the best in the area." These state ribbon winners will be at the event, pouring their own brews and answering questions about how they craft their beer.

And really, that's what the festival is all about – the art of craft beer.

"We have a passion for craft beer, and we wanted to bring that home. The Fort Wayne area deserves this. It's obviously

a strong, growing market," said Lepper of the local craft brew following.

Trion Tavern owner Greg Jacquay agreed.

"We want

people to come out, have a good time and try some really one-of-a-kind beers, all while we're shedding light on the craft beer experience."

Brewers Art Supply of Fort Wayne will be at the event to explain home-brewing and answer questions about the process.

Other names you might recognize include Bell's Brewery, Three Floyds Brewing Co., Goose Island Beer Co., New Belgium Brewing and Samuel Adams. Five Star Distributing will also have a 20-tap trailer as part of the event. Jacquay and Lepper wanted to keep a regional focus, scheduling approximately six Indiana and three Michigan breweries to attend, including local favorite Mad Anthony Brewing Co.

Brew Haven is unique in that there is no single distributor focus. It's a true beer tasting festival where no brand, style or taste is favored over another. Some of the scheduled beers on tap are so unique and seasonal that Brew Haven may be a once-in-a-lifetime experience for festival-goers.

"Northeast Indiana can definitely support and appreciate something like this. There is no similar event within 100 miles or so," said Lepper. "Instead of sitting around wishing for an event like this, MASH and Trion decided to make it happen and make it happen here."

Attendance is limited to the first 500 ticketholders. Jacquay and Lepper want to ensure a quality experience for Brew Haven festival-goers, coupled with a community feel and focus. They strategically chose New Haven for that reason, and a portion of the proceeds from Brew Haven will be donated to improve the city's downtown.

What does a ticket get you? Unlimited craft beer sampling from 2-6 p.m., delicious Trion Tavern food, Old Crown coffee, a magnet with next year's date and a limited edition tasting glass. Oh, and the bragging rights are pretty sweet too.

Doors open at 1 p.m., but no beer will be served until 2 p.m. due to permit restrictions. Brew Haven ends promptly at 6 p.m., but after the event, head over to the Trion Tavern for the unofficial after-party. Brew Haven is a non-smoking event. The tent, tap trailer and tavern will be non-smoking the day of the festival. Smokers are still welcome in a designated smoking area.

"We are very confident that this event will sell out, maybe even before the day of the festival," Lepper warned. "Get your tickets early to make sure you don't miss out."

Tickets can be purchased at Trion Tavern or online at www.triontavern.com. They are \$25 in advance and \$30 day of event. The \$5 designated driver tickets can be purchased at the door.

When you pack the family up to see The New Familiars at the second of this year's Botanical Roots Concert series, don't bother offering a buffalo burger to the mandolin player. He will politely decline.

"We had buffalo tacos the other night," Justin Fedor told me from Fort Worth, Texas. "That was too much. We've been in beef country too long, eating too much beef and too much buffalo."

But do shout out requests. The stranger the better. Chances are good this four-piece from Charlotte, North Carolina will know it and play it in a style you've not heard before. The New Familiars are aptly named.

Formed roughly five years ago, The

New Familiars are Josh Daniel on vocals, guitar and resonator; Fedor on vocals, guitar and mandolin; Daniel Flynn on vocals and drums; and Patrick Maholland on bass. Largely a touring band, The New Familiars draw from a vast

variety of styles – rock n' roll, roots, Appalachian, bluegrass, soul, back-porch; in short, Americana – and they do it with vigor.

"We have a big drum sound," Fedor said. "Daniel is a heavy hitter."

Fedor said their sound grew out of their love of all types of music and a need to toss convention aside in favor of the spirit of the song. And after several years of traveling around the country playing festivals and bars and backyard hoe downs, the spirit of the song is as flexible as they are.

"We've played just about every type of gig you can think of," Fedor said. "We draw from all kinds of sources."

Fedor said his folks were big Beatles, Led Zeppelin and Moody Blues fans.

"My parents had an awesome vinyl collection," he said. "It was all over the place. REM was huge for me. Pearl Jam, Nirvana. I really started to fall in love with the acoustic music MTV was playing."

The acoustic versions of familiar electric songs opened the door to a broader take on what rock n' roll could mean. Fedor went

through that door.

"We like doing a wide variety of popular songs in totally new ways," he said. "We do bluegrass and straight rock. We opened for Del McCoury a while back. Ronnie McCoury came out during our set, and we traded mandolin licks. We're taking the roots instruments and crossing them over to rock n' roll.

For example, they do a cover of "My Girl," the Smokey Robinson-penned tune from the 1960s, that will knock your socks off if you happen to be wearing any. "We were at South by Southwest a few years ago, and who did we run into there? Smokey Robinson. We played him our version of 'My Girl,' and he loved it. We like to do the oddball covers. Phil Collins, Talking Heads.

Random stuff."

If The New Familiars had to claim one musical influence however, it would be The Band. The equally hirsute progenitors of alt-country rock or whatever you want to call it, can be heard clearly in TNF's style.

"We opened for Levon Helm too," he said. "That was incredible." Helm, the drummer with The Band, has had a resurgence in recent years, playing on a number of projects with other musicians as well as releasing his own CDs.

"He slapped our banjo player on the chest and said, 'Yeah man,'" Fedor told me. "I guess The Band would be a huge influence in our stuff. They didn't have just one lead singer. Their body of work is amazing."

The amount of time The New Familiars have spent on the road has simultaneously tightened and loosened up the band, Fedor

"We've had to play under all sorts of conditions and for all sorts of audiences. We got to Wichita and it was 107 degrees, and on top of that a thunderstorm was rolling in. There's just nothing you can do about that. At least we're not camping this year. Last year we camped out a lot. Now we're staying in hotels. I guess there's something to be said for that."

Elky Season Has Arrived at Last

For the better part of the last decade I've done my best to ignore the small town whispers concerning this or that artist - the weakling game of Nothin' Doin'. Inevitably, childish rounds of telephone slip through to the place where intrigue digs down below the frontal lobe, off towards the temporal place of frightened emotion. "Punk" was the word used to describe The Elky Summers singer/songwriter Kay Gregg. A real punk, I was told by some forgotten buffoon who spoke with a strange fear. Middle fingers and attitude. I ignored the mixed review trash talk of peers – some fawning, some frightened - despite my simultaneous urge to both investigate and hide. Hey, I like "real punks," if they exist.

Yeah, I knew Gregg's old punk rock band, The Beautys, and I'd seen her screen-printing work here and there over the years, most of which I've quite liked. I'd also seen her drum for the now-defunct post-rockers All Nite Skate and maybe even Rockefeller 4 – and I knew other bits of

information, all from afar, mostly speculative.

And then, finally, I met the mysterious rocker/artist on a fluke. Whip-tired and possibly delirious, I approached a small and smiling Gregg at a gas station in North Manchester following a Damien Jurado and John Vanderslice show at The Firehouse. I said something insipid and watched as she played nice, saying "Okay, Greg" in a way that sounded like an internal punchline, pumping her gas loudly, possibly to avoid the flaming odor of my beef jerky dinner. Well, good enough.

Some weeks and an e-mail or two later, Gregg let me watch her band, the above-mentioned Elky Summers, as they practiced two songs for an upcoming recording session with Detroit producer Jim Diamond, known worldwide for his sessions with bands like The White Stripes, The Ponys, The Go, Left Lane Cruiser and so on. Later that night, back at my cave, I told my girlfriend that I'd finally seen a proper bandleader in action, describing the way Gregg led the Elky practice with poise and humor. The next day I woke up with two songs circulating in my temporal lobe, taking up the space of former lore. Two great songs

For two or more weeks I watched the Elkys off and on as they prepared for not just their upcoming Detroit ses-

sion, but for what they called "Elky Season" – or maybe it was "Elky Summer." I can't recall. I watched bassist Jana Johnson talk with Gregg about ordering new merch and picking out outfits to wear on stage. I sat in keyboardist Ooona Hackbush's rock n' roll basement as the band jammed, practicing vocal harmonies and downing beers; I watched drummer Jackie Davis pound away in the back corner of Gregg's basement studio. Two or more weeks well

Along the way I fell for a band. The more I learned about Elky Season, the more excited I became. The plan was to practice, record, mix, master, package and promote. Then, on Friday, August 5, play an EP release show at CS3. A big summer-ending blow-out sort of show. The

band's biggest to date, no doubt. "Part of what makes playing in a band so much fun is that you are able to see the tangible results of your work. You learn songs, practice, record – all that stuff is foundation for shows and events," Gregg explained. "I look at it as an

arc. The story is: we work hard; we overcome obstacles; we strive towards a destination. Our intent was to record a two-

song EP and release it with a big party.

'So much planning has to happen to pull this off. The party on August 5 is the ultimate deadline. Not only do we have to make a good-sounding disc, but we also have to design, manufacture and package the final project, all the while collecting the merch, promotional items and event decorations. Then we throw this big party where all our friends are invited to come and help us celebrate."

Down in Gregg's basement studio I watched as she handprinted the artwork for the new Elky Summers EP. While showing me shirts and posters she'd designed, Gregg also gave me a quick introduction to the art of screen-printing, next elaborating on her above-mentioned "arc" and later sharing with me an incredibly detailed and impeccably organized recording itinerary. With all of that planning, as well as her solid band leading, in mind, I had to ask about the band's so-far success.

> we are not particularly successful by that standard," Gregg said. "We are not signed to a label. We don't have an agent to book us. We have not played a national tour. We have not recorded nor released a full-length album. There are bands in this town that have done all of these things. I wanted a yardstick that reflected what we could realistically do. It is important to me to set goals that are attainable. It is one thing to dream. Dreams can happen in the quiet moments at night, but pragmatism must rule the day if you ever want to get anything

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"We are solid because we work together to attain goals we can achieve. I want the women working with me to feel proud of themselves for having the skill and perseverance it takes to do what we set out to do, because we have and we will. We also have very talented and giving friends like Kendra Johnson, who helps us with our hair and makeup, and Steve Linsenmayer, who helps us with our photos. We are lucky to have such supportive families too."

Success, as subjective and relative as it is, is something The Elky Summers have had. From what I'm told, they've sold every copy of their first EP that they've printed thus far. Not a small feat in 2011.

The Elkys have a solid foundation. I am the one with no prior experience, and it has been fascinating watching everything come together," Davis told me. "The other girls really know what they're doing; they have contacts all over, good reputations, knowledge of what it means to be committed to a band and the desire to make this happen. We all work really well together and get along great."

Next, naturally, I had to ask about the Diamond known

"Jim came about through a friend I had made in Chicago, Sheldon, who owns a unique and fun store in Wrigleyville called Strange Cargo," Johnson told me. "I gave him an Elky Summers EP right after they had come out and he had asked me if we had ever thought about recording outside of Fort Wayne. He said he had a buddy who had a studio up in Detroit – Jim Diamond.

"He started telling me about the studio and how Jim was in a band called The Dirtbombs and had recorded a lot of girl bands and how he had the best studio ever. He showed me pics of him and the guys in The Dirtbombs. So I brought the idea to Kay and she went to Jim's website. On Jim's website all Kay found was his name and phone number, so she called him up and the rest is history.'

Thus far, Gregg feels the band's plan has been going according to schedule, including Elky Season/Summer.

"We've hit every mark we've set for ourselves," she told me. "Every six months or so we have an impromptu band meeting where we sit down and free-form about what we'd like to achieve, then we set those ideas down as concrete objectives. We cross off stuff that we've done as a reminder of how far we've come. Seeing that list pile up is a great way to keep myself motivated.

"When we started out we wanted to have eight songs that were presentable enough to play in front of an audience. That was it. That's all we were working towards. We did it, we pulled it off. Then we added more wishes: record two songs; play a show out of town; get some press; write a few more songs; record out of town; make over the Brass Rail into a fairyland. All those things we did by working together. The challenge right now is that we have these two weeks to record, master and manufacture enough EPs for the party at CS3. We've really set a high bar and nothing can go wrong between now and then. So, no stress there."

One element of the Elkys not yet discussed is, as Hackbush puts it, the set design at their shows.

'Kay is an artist who brings the CD and poster designs. as well as the T-shirts and buttons, screen printing it all, Hackbush said. "We have had shows where we all contributed to set design. Glitter, lights, fabulousness.

"And we are girls who like fashion. [Shows are] an excuse to wear fun clothes you don't have the opportunity to wear day to day, so getting girlie is a fun aspect of this thing, and I think it adds a fun twist to the show.'

During these Elky days, it seems, the girls are certainly all finding fun in the busy times.

"My pre-Elky Summers life was not as busy as Elky life is now," Johnson said. "Now I have a band practice every Monday and one to four shows a month. We are traveling out of town and meeting new people, playing with awesome bands. I have the three best friends in the world ever now. We have all formed a special bond with each other. Before I was playing bass alone while drinking beer."

Davis, too, has taken much from these busy days of Elky

"In my pre-Elky days I was a stay-at-home mom who

You know an article on Ted Nugent can't go to print without some mention of his ardent support of the NRA, hunting and the Second Amendment. According to Nugent, the framers of the American Constitution believed that guns are a great way to keep the government from overstepping its Constitutionally set limits and taking away rights from their citizens, so much so that they enshrined this belief as an amendment in the Bill of Rights. These rights, says the Nuge, are granted not by some benevolent government but by a benevolent Creator. Nugent believes this protection is needed today more than ever because the "government is out of control. The corruption is absolutely vulgar. There's so much corrupted power." He lovingly refers to our current strong Federal government as "Fedzilla," noting that "the rest of the world sucks, and America has always sucked less - but we're catching up fast." The man has a certain way with words, does he not?

Ted is also quick to point out that, in addition to keeping politicians at bay, guns can be used to hunt, and hunting helps you master playing guitar. Sayeth the Nuge, "Killing animals helps you play guitar because killing animals is the purest, most perfect form of environmentalism a man could possibly partake in."

Like the Native Americans, Nugent doesn't waste a single bit of the animals he kills. What he doesn't eat or preserve is donated to local food banks and charities. Nugent also sponsors the charitable organizations "Ted Nugent Kamp For Kids" and "Freedom's Angels."

To facilitate his mission to become a better guitar player Nugent has created private hunting grounds in Michigan and Texas where he and others can hunt exotic animals. Far from "living" and pacing in small enclosures as in a zoo, these beasts run free and live naturally until they are shot and eaten, which per Nugent is also a very natural part of the life cycle. In creating these hunting grounds Nugent is also carrying on a long tradition of the hunter as conservationist. While liberal groups today seem to be the ones spearheading efforts to create and preserve animals and natural resources, this wasn't always the case. Nugent is quick to point out that the first conservationists in America were hunters. Consider, if you will, Teddy Roosevelt who established the national parks system. Instead of preserving lands and animals for aesthetic reasons, hunters have a much more practical purpose: You can't hunt what isn't there, nor is hunting any fun on a parking lot that used to be a forest.

Attend a Nugent concert and you'll surely hear that, for all the whining of the left, few have planted as many trees as he has. After all, even though he could afford a big energy-guzzling house like Al Gore's, Nugent chooses to heat his homes with wood from trees that he himself has planted, nurtured, cut, split and cured.

"When you plant a tree," says Nugent, "and then get heat from it years later, I promise you that the heat's warmer." Say what you will about the man's viewpoints, you can't argue that he's a hypocrite.

Look at me, prattling on and on about Nugent's view of America. You probably want to know what to expect if you go see him in concert. For instance, for you young whippersnappers who have barely completed two decades, the thought of seeing someone three times your age probably brings to mind a dried-out geezer sitting in a wheelchair playing hits he wrote before you were born. However, thanks to all his clean living Nugent is just as energetic as he was in his 20s (he could probably outrun most of today's flabby twenty-somethings in a hundred yard dash) and he's constantly writing new songs.

"Killer new songs blow up from my hands and spirit on a daily basis! It is fascinating really. Yes, there are many more killer grinding songs coming ASAP."

I don't know about you, but it's been a while since I heard a song that "blew up" from someone's hands. Perhaps Nugent had some residual gunpowder left from packing his own ammo.

But I kid the Nuge.

Ted Nugent concerts are energetic, wild affairs. You'll hear good old-fashioned classic rock n' roll brimming with loud guitars, thumping bass and massive drums. These will be set alongside newer songs that will one day become old favorites. Expect a lot of red, white and blue, plus a double helping of patriotism. You may even see a grown man in a Native American costume *not* singing about the YMCA. Even cranky people have a great time at a Nugent concert, though it's not exactly family fare unless your family is the kind that sings along with songs like "Put Up or Shut Up" while driving around in the minivan. It's been said that attending a Nugent concert leaves one encouraged and proud of this great country, and I'm inclined to believe these rumors.

Don't take my word for it. Check out Ted Nugent at Piere's on August, 6 for his I Still Believe tour and see for yourself how much fun a human can have without firearms.

lot of his songs, just an epic piece that ran seven minutes, but we later returned to New York to record it. And the biggest thrill of it was that we recorded that with members of Bruce Springsteen's band. We had Roy Bittan on piano and Max Weinberg on drums, and we also had Rick Derringer on guitar. It was a lot of heavy hitters. The song was a huge hit and was at No. 2 on the charts for several weeks and would probably have gone to No. 1 except for Bonnie Tyler, who had also recorded a Jim Steinman song." (Tyler's song is, of course, "Total Eclipse of the Heart. Tough competition.)

Since that time, Air Supply continue to record regularly and tour almost constantly. Hitchcock says he and Russell are often asked about how they keep working together for so long, and as it turns out, it's been an easy and extremely compatible partnership.

"People don't believe it when we say we haven't had a disagreement in the 36 years we've known each other. He's like my brother, and I love him a lot. We've seen each other through various crises – I've been married four times, and he's always looked after me when I'm down in the dumps."


Although work with Air Supply keeps him busy, a recent opportunity to record in Nashville – and add a country twist to his exquisite vocals – allowed Hitchcock to spread his wings a bit. And he did so far more than he had originally intended. The result – *Tennessee: The Nashville Sessions* – was released this past May.

"When I first decided to record, my producer Rob Rappaport asked if I wanted to record in Nashville. At first we had 200 songs we listened to, and we eventually ended up recording 24 of them. I had thought we'd narrow that down to one disc first to see how that was received, then maybe release the others, but it was so hard to pick from all of those so we narrowed it down to 20 and released it as a two-CD set."

Now, just a few months later, Hitchcock is back on the road with Russell, doing what they enjoy doing the most. They'll be at Fort Wayne's Foellinger Theatre Saturday, August 6 playing for a crowd of local Airheads.

Grateful for the fans who keep coming back and remain interested in what they're doing now as well as what they've done before, Hitchcock still enjoys performing in front of the Airheads. Although he admits he no longer enjoys the travel, he still loves to get up in front of an audience with Russell and the band.

"I've always said if it's not fun, it's not worth doing. It's a lot of early mornings, late nights, long travel delays, lost equipment ... but people pay a lot of money to see you, and these days that kind of money is hard to come by. But I still enjoy the shows and still love seeing our fans."

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My Morning Jacket Circuital

To be honest with you, dear reader, I feel it necessary to admit that I had to look up the exact definition of the word "circuital," the title of Louisville rockers My Morning Jacket's sixth studio album and first since 2008's ballsy misstep, *Evil Urges*. The word means, basically, "a circle form," or



means, basically, "a circle form," or in this case, "to come full circle." The implication is that, with this record, the band is returning to where it came from – back to the light-as-a-feather folk rock that feels as if it may have been recorded in heaven, with angels plucking strings and God spilling vocals. As good as that last sentence fragment may sound, *Circuital* isn't quite the return-to-roots sound of *The Tennessee Fire* and *At Dawn* that the MMJ crew has implied. I suppose that, when compared to the strange, scattershot sound of the above-mentioned *Evil Urges*, it may demand such a reaction, but to fanboy ears the album is a continuation – if only slight – of frontman Jim James' mission to never fall stale.

Comprised of 10 very focused tracks, the record plays through as if it maybe should've come out between 2003's It Still Moves and 2005's Z, but with a more seasoned self-editor at the helm. In fact, after only five or so spins, I already feel comfortable calling this the most bulletproof set of songs the MMJs have yet released, each song working in its own, often surprising way, none coming off as overly obvious or painfully meandering. Focus, that's the key element here, as it should be for a band that made a weirdo folk-pop record like the great Z.

All that said, I do think that songs like "Circuital," "Outta My System," "Slow, Slow Tune" and the breathtaking "Movin' Away" should appeal very much to fans who stopped liking the band when they became more experimental with said great Z. This set, for the most part, is straightforward-ish singer/songwriter fare, but covered in James' itchy fingerprints and fleshed out with hallmarks from past records.

The vibe I get here is poppier side of a rock opera-era The Who, minus all the pretension and self-important stuffing. And while there are undeniably moments here and there on *Circuital* where the influence can be clearly pinpointed, My Morning Jacket have trotted through studios enough in recent years that, when they release a record, it's through and through an original work. For starters, no one sings like James. No one writes like James. Sure, the ornamentation on a song like "Wonderful (The Way I Feel)" can be mapped and devised, but it still manages to stand alone. Another favorite, "First Light," is one of MMJ's most accessible songs to date, feeling almost like a radio hit that could play next to some stale Kings of Leon track. Same goes for "You Wanna Freak Out," a killer pop tune. Most of the songs here, to be honest, build to a very radio-friendly place, especially the epic "Outta My System," a song that could easily work as the youth anthem of our time.

Circuital's cover art, a close-up photo of a magic tuning eye from a 1930s radio, may be ugly, but boy does it fit the framework of the record. Tuning eyes were used to help listeners find the strongest frequency point for the station they desired to hear. The brighter that green eye was, the more focused your signal was. So, in this case, that bright green eye is MMJ's way of telling you that, hey, we really focused in on what we do best here. And damn, the proof is in the pudding: the songs here feel laboriously perfected. The work of masters. As time passes and listener familiarity grows, I imagine Circuital will see a boost in reception, so much so that I could see this little comeback record standing as the highlight of the band's already legendary studio catalog. (G.W.L.)

Beastie Boys Hot Sauce Committee: Part Two

Steve Miller Band Sailor (1968)

Forget all of the Steve Miller Band that you hear in heavy rotation on local radio stations. *Sailor*, the band's second album, is a real treasure.

I know you've heard "Living in the U.S.A.," as it is packaged on a couple of Miller's greatest hits releases (he has seven of them). But this album has nine other remarkable tracks.



Opening with "Song for Our Ancestors," the album immediately transports you back to 1968. If you told someone they're not hearing Pink Floyd, you might get into an argument. It's not the best way to open an album, but the psychedelic vibe will at least grab your attention. "Dear Mary" is a nice folk rock song with a great piano arrangement, and "My Friend" turns it up with eccentric guitars and organs. It's sort of a '68 hybrid between The Moody Blues and Jefferson Airplane. "Quicksilver Girl" appeared on the original (More Songs from) The Big Chill soundtrack, but strangely wasn't on the reissue.

"Lucky Man" is blues folk with an almost soul vibe to it, and Miller covers "Gangster of Love" a song originally recorded in 1957 by Johnny 'Guitar' Watson. Also covered is Jimmy Reed's "You're So Fine." "Overdrive" was written by bandmate Boz Scaggs, and the arrangement reminds me of The Band or even Dylan in its arrangement. The record closes with the electric "Dime-A-Dance Romance."

Steve Miller has released more than 25 records and 30 singles in his successful career. He had a brief hiatus in the 70s, but 1981's "Abracadabra" gave him his third No. 1 single. On *Bingo* (2010), and *Let Your Hair Down* (2011), the 67-year-old covers Muddy Waters, Willie Dixon, Robert Johnson and others in what I can honestly say are a couple good albums. (*Dennis Donahue*)

definitely. What we get is a 16-track cycle that breaks down into 13 full-blown tracks and three interludes, a set that makes for the first worthwhile Beasties record since 1998's *Hello Nasty* (two additional records were released in between, neither really worth your time). Said to be the extras from *Part One*, you'd think the record might have something off an odds-and-ends feel. Not the case.

The sound here is instantly less polished than *Nasty*, though not quite as organic sounding on a whole as the band's pre-*Nasty* material. (Those records were dusty loops and simple live playing put together mostly on 8-tracks and MPCs, held together by back-and-forth vocals and, often, the cuts of Mix Master Mike.) There are nods to past records, such as the robot voice on "OK" and pseudo-electronic vibes that pop up here and there. Mostly, this is a boom-bap-minded hip-hop record made by three 40-something emcee/producer/musicians who now know their way around a studio as well as, or better than, any hip-hop artist *ever*.

That said, the inventive nature of *Nasty*, *Paul's Boutique*, *Licensed to Ill* and *Check Your Head* is seemingly gone forever, and now the Boys are more focused on making very listenable and fluid records that appeal to their solid-as-a-rock fanbase, mostly comprised of skaters, underground hip-hop fans and fans of skate and boom-bap culture. The rhymes, as always, get passed around like a hot potato amongst the members while the beats are dusty and often grimy, ornamented with funk loops, scratches, break beats, original bass lines and electronic flourishes. If you know the classic Beasties catalog, you already know the sound of *Part Two*. A good thing.

The vibe feels somewhat cinematic, playing through almost like a musical accompaniment to a skate video. Songs like "Long Burn the Fire," "Say It," "Too Many Rappers" and "Here's a Little Something for Ya" will be instant classics amongst fans, while "Make Some Noise," "Ok" and "Don't Play No Game I Can't Win" (featuring Santigold) could all, with powerful videos and some viral marketing, become summer hits. Some of the lesser tracks like "Funky Donkey" and "Tadlock's Glasses" have a gritty appeal that will grow with time, adding to the cinematic vibe of the record with their strange minimalism and atmospheric production. The only tracks that seem lacking (aside from the borderline sellout Santigold track) are "Here's a Little Something" and instrumental "Multilateral Nuclear Disarmament." Even those works are better than everything

ming away in coffee shops and looking for a tour bus to hop on, so the band was forced to replace Bruce's brainchild with a bass guitar. Fortunately, the '09 lineup brought with them Mark Nosler, the brave soul who picked up the mantle of motograter player and now plays alongside Mylon Guy on bass for a depth of sound unattributed to any other metal band.

The Motograter lineup on tour today has been together roughly two years and is comprised of Guy on bass, Nunes and Tyler Hole on guitar, Nosler on the motograter, Jeremy "Twitch" Scheller on drums and Woodruff on vocals.

Woodruff has been the vocalist and frontman for Motograter since the summer of 2007 when he stepped in to replace Moody after being introduced to the band by a mutual friend. Motograter kept their music and lineup underground for the rest of that year until they could get a feel for what would turn out to be almost an entirely new band.

"There were more original members involved back then," says Woodruff. And there is still potential for change, but nothing is set in stone. What is certain is that Motograter has been touring with what Woodruff called "a really strong lineup" dedicated to the music and the fans.

Such a massive restructuring for the band meant more than just new faces on stage. It meant a new way to write their music, a new kind of stage presence and most of all, a new sound. Nunes was the main songwriter for Motograter for a number of years, but as the new members got comfortable with each other and the sound they wanted to produce, songwriting became a communal effort. One member would come up with a riff, a lyric or a melody, and the whole band would take it and jam with it until they had produced something that resembled a song. Not everything made the cut, and many songs ended up in the garbage even after long sessions spent working on them. But the music that resulted from the sessions was something Motograter members could be proud to share with fans.

Motograter released a five-song demo a few years back, the first recording the band put out since its '03 album, and the guys finished it sans glamour or polish.

"It wasn't in an L.A. recording studio, just a basement with the recording equipment," Woodruff explains.

These songs should have been the base for a whole new album, but time elapsed between recording and as they toured they became increasingly dissatisfied with the tracks. The music just wasn't good enough anymore. They knew each other and their fans much better after years on the road, and they decided that a new CD would have to be made to reflect that newfound understanding.

Woodruff knows how patient fans have been so far in waiting for a new album. He says, "It's not lack of material holding us back at this point. It's just financial issues and schedule issues." And he, along with the rest of Motograter, want to put out an album that's "what the fans deserve and what we deserve."

Although Motograter have been touring extensively, with little time or money to throw into studio recording, they have been busy behind the scenes writing music and putting together loads of material for an the new album. And though they plan to give out teasers at some live shows prior to releasing the album, the material will be largely new and unknown, so fans will have a whole new set of tracks to feast on.

If you're not a Motograter fan yet, head to the Gin Mill to check out this uniquely colorful band. Maybe you're a fan already and are hoping to catch a little bit of new material at their show, or perhaps you want to pick up some tips for the next time you ring your motograter to soulfully strum at open mic night. Either way, you're bound to like what you hear.

had never been to The Brass Rail before!" She joked. "I was completely unaware of the whole band world of Fort Wayne. I was just someone who was taking drum lessons without a thought in the world of ever joining a band. My life is completely different now. I see it as a wonderful, wonderful gift."

As the good times roll, most definitely to a new high on August 5, the band seems to know that someday the arc will end.

"May it never be so," Davis joked. "No, really, I think we are all aware, sadly, that one day all this fun will end. I'm certain I will cry and will probably do a lot more air drumming in my car to music. I will really, really miss getting together with the girls on a regular basis. I didn't know any of them when I joined the band, and now I am crazy about them. They made me feel a part of their group from the start. The thought of not having them in my life on a regular basis makes me tear up even now."

For now, and until whoknowswhen, we have this great, all-female indie-garage-pop band, fronted by one of Fort Wayne's all-time great creative talents. They remind me, at times, of classic-era Guided by Voices, but with touches of The Breeders/Amps,

Throwing Muses and early Liz Phair. All bands who were – aside from The Breeders – gone too soon. Here's hoping that's not the case with The Elky Summers. But, even if it is, we're not there yet. We still have this big show to look forward to, as well as a new EP, some cool merch and even some more shows in the near future. So, you know, don't fret.

In closing, as it had many times before, fashion once again came up.

"We joke that 65 percent of the band is talking about what we are going to wear onstage, and only 35 percent is playing shows and writing music," Johnson said, rather seriously. "Sometimes you'll find Kay and I running around the mall or Jefferson Pointe, trying to find a new outfit or accessories. We see every show as an excuse to buy a new outfit. I have quite the polka dot dress collection, and I'm always looking for an excuse to buy another. Oona and Jackie and I will text back and forth our ideas on what to wear with each show we play."

Bands that have fun, accomplish their goals, record with killer producers, get along, look good and play great songs don't come along every season/summer, you know.

on the spotty *To the 5 Boroughs*, a record many thought was the end of the Beasties.

Mostly, to me, this album works as something of a time capsule, taking me back to high school and the summer of 1994 when Spike Jonze's video for "Sabatoge" was huge and the first half of Ill Communication was on constant replay for anyone interested in hip-hop, punk or skate culture. The grouping of that record, along with the band's back catalog and Larry Clark's Kids film, had a huge influence on many from that generation, celebrating an authentic urban culture that was at the time still something of a far-off mystery to most young Americans. Assuming that Hot Sauce Committee, Part Two makes it to the young ears of today, I suspect it will have a similar effect on the right ears, despite the sterile, technologyobsessed nature of today's youth.


Notorious for their long breaks between records, here's to hoping that the supposedly already completed *Part One* comes out soon – maybe even this year. And hey, we have to assume that, since *Part Two* is mostly leftovers, that the next record will be even better. Red White & Blue

The opening few minutes of Red White & Blue will alienate half of the audience immediately. The other half, however, probably won't be able to stop watching until the closing credits. In this brilliantly edited montage, we hear no dialogue or background noise - instead we get a strikingly simple, dissonant piano melody - but we understand what's happening anyway: a 20-something woman (Amanda Fuller, in a brave and nuanced performance) goes into a seedy Austin, Texas bar alone, and after a few hours (and more than a few drinks) she leaves with three men in tow. What happens next we do not have to imagine. We're shown it. We get the impression this isn't the first time the woman (whose name, we eventually find out, is Erica) has gone home with a strange man (or men), and it won't be the last, either, and the next few scenes bear this

Erica's extreme promiscuity disguises deep pain and loneliness. Then she forms a friendship with a strange, honorably discharged Iraq war veteran, Nate (Noah Taylor) who lives across the hall from her. Nate gets Erica a job at the same building supply store where he works. He treats her with respect. He even protects her from a bad-

die who assaults her. Over time, Erica seems to settle down a bit (though she refuses to go to bed with Nate).

We also get a parallel story involving Franki (Marc Senter), one of the three men Erica beds at the beginning of the movie. Franki is in a rock band on the verge of success - there's talk of a European tour - but his mother (Sally Jackson) is dying of cancer. And then, from out of nowhere, Franki gets some very bad news indeed, news that brings him back to the night he and his bandmates went home with Erica ...

Written and directed by Simon Rumley, Red White & Blue begins as something of a sober indie drama and then curdles, degree by degree, into a full-blown nightmare of vengeance and counter-vengeance (and, if we think about it long enough, counter-counter-vengeance). It is a smart, unpredictable and uncommonly empathetic exploration of how violence begets violence.

One gets the sense it's a horror movie almost by accident. With just a bit better luck on anyone's part, things could have ended much better for these wounded souls. Everyone who makes a fateful decision in this horrific daisy-chain of retribution is acting out of very deep anguish. It's not scary in the haunted house sense of the word. What it is is highly disturbing. It's difficult to watch, but because we care about the characters, it's difficult to avert your eyes (although, wimp that I am, I couldn't watch the penultimate scene, beyond a few quick glimpses to get the gist of what was happening).

I am glad I saw Red White & Blue - because I've never seen anything quite like it before and because I always like intelligent, original filmmaking, especially in the horror genre, which so seldom offers anything worth seeing. I am haunted by it still, nearly a week after watching it.

Having said that, I hesitate to recommend it in any general, unqualified way, as well put-together as it is. I can't predict how anyone else will respond to it, though I'm confident that if you've read this review carefully, you already know whether or not you're up to giving it a try.

I'm not sure Luke Wilson and Jason Sudeikis make for a very good traditional comedy team: their acting styles are too similar - heavy on the breezy



and mild-mannered, light on the brash and loud. On paper, neither is a good foil for the other. They both require someone like Vince Vaughn to come in and stir things up. And yet in Hall Pass their non-chemistry chemistry seems nearly perfect, especially since the men they are playing - decidedly mediocre middle-aged married men whose wings (if they ever had wings to begin with) were clipped a long time ago - don't deserve a good foil.

Take the scene in which the two men sneak away from their wives for a moment during a dull social engagement at the garishly decorated home of a rich jerk and his wife. The two murmur a bunch of obscene insults about their hosts like a couple of shy middle-schoolers who perpetually wish they could once and for all do something truly outlandish to get expelled from school. The moment is so funny and so delicious precisely because the men are so apprehensive and tentative in their naughti-

ness. Vaughn would have ditched either one of these losers in bored disgust years ago.

Of course, we've seen diminished manchildren bucking their domestic responsibilities as grownups many times before in recent years, perhaps most memorably in the Will Ferrell/Vince Vaughn vehicle Old School. These comedies always imply that lurking within the hearts of such delayed adolescents is something grand and extraordinary. The twist here, though, is that neither of these men is grand or extraordinary in the least. The crudely funny scene in which Sudeikis' character Fred sneaks out to his car to pleasure himself is made all that

much funnier because we already know what he's fantasizing about - we saw him taking mental snapshots of the young barista behind the counter at the coffee shop earlier - and his sexual fantasies are as bland and sad as the rest of his life.

They say that by the time we reach 40 we wind up with the faces we deserve. Rick and Fred have wound up with the lives they deserve. Wilson's character Rick seems like a good father, but he's a disconnected husband, and he works at a job he doesn't care about one way or the other. Though he's discontented, he can't really imagine anything better for himself, so he lets himself think that if he could "play the field" a bit he'd be happier. After his wife (Jenna Fischer) calls his bluff and gives him a week-long "hall pass" in which he is free to pursue whatever hedonistic delights he wants, Rick does what any red-blooded American man would do: He half-heartedly goes to Applebee's for a

When, later in the movie, a beautiful 20-something woman agrees to go out with Rick, we really have no idea why, since he's such an unimaginative square. It's not that Wilson is ugly or uninteresting: it's that his character is. For his part, Fred, also given a hall pass by his wife (Christina Applegate), is content to let a case of mistaken identity be the reason why a woman goes to bed with him. He's a small-minded, semi-sleazy man, and the only reason he isn't an out-and-out monster is because he's too much of a wimp to give in to his own dark im-

This isn't the Farrelly Brothers in their prime, but it's still pretty sharp, funny and engaging, and it has some interesting and quietly subversive things to say, not just about middle-aged disappointment, but about comedies featuring married men who refuse to grow up.

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Savior Turns Soldier

The Heart and the Fist by **Eric Greitens, Houghton** Mifflin Harcourt, 2011

Compassionate people who advocate the use of military force when necessary face an ethical dilemma.

When you value human life for its own sake and you think that violence is wrong, how do you justify, or even participate in, violence and killing as an institutional policy? Eric Greitens' memoir, The Heart and the Fist, is a book-length attempt to answer that question from his point of view, using his own experiences as an explanation for how a man can be, foremost, a humanitarian, but also a special operations soldier trained to kill. He does a reasonable job of making his case, although the rationale he has used to reconcile these THE two very different Heart AND aspects of his life

entirely satisfying or hopeful. Greitens is a Navy SEAL, and he begins his story as a truck bomb explodes outside his barracks in Iraq, nearly killing him and his fellow soldiers and setting the tone for his story. The bombing and his survival of it, along with the later combat death of a comrade, are the catalysts that spur him to humanitarian

falls short of being

activism, but his path to that end began long before when, as a young college student, he was repeatedly exposed to other cultures and people in other places who faced obstacles to health and happiness that most young Americans would never even His first stop was China, where

he wandered, taught English and studied kung fu. He met survivors of the Tiananmen Square protests and got a close-up look at an authoritarian society. Then he went to Bosnia, where he worked for a relief agency and met survivors of the region's horrific war. After that he spent time in Rwanda, where he encountered the aftermath of an even more heinous genocide. Later, in Bolivia, he saw how poverty could be just as destructive as war, especially to the lives of the innocent.

Meanwhile, as he was being immersed in the harshness of the world beyond the boundaries of the place where he grew up, he was forming his own identity. He was a bright, curious young man, and his academic work took him to Oxford as a Rhodes Scholar. At the same time, he was learning to appreciate the virtues of physical discipline. He took up boxing, and after he found a coach at a run-down gym well away from his college campus, he de-



voted himself to the sport, learning about the almost spiritual power of dedication, restraint, honor and self-

His humanitarian work had left Greitens feeling frustrated. What he was doing was important, but he was disheartened to think that the suffering he was trying to ease had happened in the first place. The lives of the innocent, the weak, the children were destroyed by the atrocities of war - he could be part of an effort to repair the damage, but where were

the defenders, the strong who could protect the weak before the damage was done? There was a time, he decided, when force was necessary. before it was too late. He decided to join the military. And he didn't

up to become ERIC GREITENS part of the most highly trained force in the American military, the special opera-

just join the mili-

tary. He signed

tions commandos of the Navy SEALs. That meant he signed up for the most grueling training program the military had to offer, and the discipline he developed as a boxer would serve him well.

The section of the book that documents Greitens' SEAL training is the most entertaining, if the lightest. It's tough stuff, and Greitens does an excellent job of making the reader understand why such a small percentage of candidates actually make it through the program and become SEALs.

What Greitens doesn't explain so well is whether he's happy with the path he decided to take. His humanitarian work made him feel less effective than he wanted to be but his military deployments didn't have a significant effect on the suffering in the regions he visited either. He does his best to bring compassion and cultural understanding to the situations he encounters, but the military institutions he's a part of continue to struggle through their missions, stepping heavily on local cultures and not clearly understanding what needs to be done. One has to hope that Greitens remains hopeful, because we all need people who will step up and do what needs to be done, even when it's an ugly job. and do it with the motivation of a compassionate heart.

Big Hair, Lotsa Talent

last weekend of Civic Theatre's rendition of *Hairspray*, there's enough feelgood music and energizing dancing (not to mention silly hair) to lift anyone's hairdo, with or without the spray can spritzes that helped make 60s-style tall hair famous. It's a bubble gum-colored treat that will have you laughing and tapping your toes in no time flat.

Guest Director Harvey Cocks has brought zest to several recent summer shows at Civic, including Curtains, The Producers and Beauty and The Beast. He is quoted in the program as saying Hairspray is his favorite show. With bouncy 60s-style songs like "Good Morning, Baltimore," "I Can Hear the Bells" and "You Can't Stop the Beat," it's easy to love the show, and with the complete package of great singing, fresh dance routines, wacky sets and costumes, this one is well worth coming in out of the hot to enjoy.

Harvey (as everyone calls Fort Wayne's much loved No. 1 theater-enthusiast, Mr. Cocks) has assembled a terrific cast of 43, about half of whom are Civic newcomers, which isn't to say they aren't well-skilled, talented young performers. As Harvey noted in the Sunday afternoon talk-back after the performance, they not only can sing but they learned some delightfully complex dance numbers from Guest Choreographer Melissa Duffer very quickly and well. Chicken legs? Motion of the ocean? Split leg lifts? No problemo!

The show is Broadway gold, with a traveling trunk full of Tony awards from the 2002 season. Tracy Turnblad, an "ample American," is not about to let being a fat girl keep her from her dream of dancing on the famous teen dance show on Baltimore television in 1962. She's proud of her bouffant, which has put her in detention at high school often enough that she picks up some new dance moves from the black students she meets there. Tracy sets her sights beyond just getting on the show to meet her crush, the shallow crooner Link; she intends to integrate the Corny Collins show.

Mick is a Civic favorite, and his Edna is a treasure. One might even say he is divine! Edna's so sweet and sensible and repressed, but I kept wondering how she might do as Rose in Gypsy next spring? His Edna blossoms right along with Tracy, lovable dolls no one should underestimate. I loved the comments overheard at intermission: "Isn't this role usually played by a man? Why did they not do that this time?" and "That's a man? No

Richard Marchbanks is hilarious as Corny Collins, the slick TV host who isn't as dim as we might think. Ken Low admirably fills several sets of shoes as the stern high school principal, enthusiastic Mr. Pinky and the smarmy hairspray executive. Kearstyn Keller really belts some songs as Penny Pingleton, Tracy's loyal best friend. Never mind how she frustrates her mom, Mrs. Pingleton, one of several roles played by Lori Leonard.

The "Negro Day" stars are also delightful. Ennis Brown Jr. invested Seaweed Stubbs with smooth charm and smooth moves. Arrie Hill is terrific as Little Inez and here's hoping that we see a lot more of her on the Civic stage after this excellent debut. C. Lovey Marshall gives Motormouth Maybelle a short but strong presence, building as the show goes along. Her voice is amazing - a classic gospel style that is just right for the "big, blonde and beautiful" char-

Office Space It Ain't, but It Ain't Horrible Either

The title says it all. The bosses in *Horrible Bosses* are truly horrible. They aren't just jerks or idiots like Lumbergh in Office Space. No, these bosses are horrible, each in their own special way. And so, rightfully so, they are loathed by the employees they torture. The harassed employees want revenge, and Horrible Bosses is full of mean, stupid, coarse, vulgar and selfish behavior by all involved. There's no redemptive dose of humanity anywhere, but Horrible Bosses does have a certain integrity as a result. And it has plenty of funny of the rude and vulgar varieties. Stay away if you hope for subtlety.

Because this isn't a nice movie, it is more fun to watch the bosses revel in their horribleness than the trod upon employees responding. Kevin Spacey is the boss of Nick (Jason Bateman.) Mr. Hardin has been dangling a promotion in front of Nick for months. He berates him for being just a couple of minutes late, makes fun of his personal life and delights in finding humiliations large and small as sport.

Jennifer Aniston is the boss of Dale (Charlie Day.) Aniston plays a dentist who is perfectly content when sexually harassing Dale as a patient sits in the chair blissfully asleep on gas. Hers is a brazen performance that made me squirm. Dale is a meek schlubby little man with a fiance, not the kind of man who gets chased anywhere, let alone around the office.

Jason Sudeikis is Kurt. He works for a company he likes and a boss who likes him. Since he's a good boss, Donald Sutherland is only on screen for a few minutes before he dies of a heart attack, leaving control of the company in the hands of his greedy, lazy, coked-up son.

Underneath that gloriously awful comb-over is Colin Farrell. It took a minute to sink in. That's Colin Farrell! He is very funny, playing it straight and seeming all the funnier because of it. He's a shameless mess who wants only to siphon all the money he can out of the company to finance his own wayward

Nick, Kurt and Dale hang out after work, drink beers and



swap stories of their horrible bosses. Eventually, they hit on the idea of killing each other's bosses in the style of Strangers on a Train. In part because this is a tasteless comedy and in part because the abuse at work seems to have tarnished their intelligence, they have some trouble putting the plan in to ac-

They go looking for a hit man, providing Jamie Foxx with the funniest cameo he's had in years. His name is unprintable, and the way the boys invoke it is hilarious. Actually, Foxx is a murder consultant, and these guys need help. It just doesn't

I went to Horrible Bosses in part to see how the movie would treat the grim job climate. But making some kind of comment or reflection on current times is not what Horrible Bosses is all about. The economy is really terrible – that's why these guys can't quit their jobs. That's about as deep as it

Dale, at least, has a better reason for not quitting his job. He is a convicted sex offender, though the offense is more embarrassing than offensive. He is doomed to explain his crime over and over, which is punishment enough. Dale being sexually harassed by Jennifer Aniston is so over the top and unbelievable it blunts some of the offensiveness of the behavior. That's good because Horrible Bosses illustrates all too well how awful it is to be the victim of sexual harassment. If *Horrible Bosses*, which pulls few punches, hadn't switched the typical harassment arrangement, it would be very hard to watch. Dale behaving towards Jennifer Aniston in the same way – I can't imagine what the response would be.

As workplace comedies go, Horrible Bosses won't displace movies like 9 to 5, Office Space (featuring Aniston in a more sympathetic role) or Working Girl. I haven't seen Larry Crowne yet, but I imagine it is a feel-good story, the flip side of Horrible Bosses. This movie is more gross-out comedy than workplace comedy, which will probably make it more durable. (Up in the Air and its ilk seemed dated and preachy right out of the gate. Who will want to watch that movie again?)

Rated R, with some truly vulgar behavior and language that is frequently, flamboyantly profane, Horrible Bosses is another flavor entirely. (If you think you want to see it, don't wait for broadcast television. I can't imagine how they'll have to edit to make it acceptable.

We've reached that time in the summer when most of the blockbusters are out and the market is flooded with movies that are hoping to appeal to a summer audience as an alternative to the steady stream of action and adventure. I wanted to go to the movies this week. Captain America? Given the stupidity of our political leaders at the moment, I couldn't stomach it. Friends with Benefits? That sounded even more predictable than Horrible Bosses. I am waiting for Crazy, Stupid, Love, so Horrible Bosses seemed like an option, a kind of

I was hoping for some workplace fun. As horrible as the bosses are, they are not as fun as Dabney Coleman as 9 to 5's Franklin Hart, who is, as is noted repeatedly, "a sexist. egotistical, lying, hypocritical bigot." Those are the personal qualities of all horrible bosses. Mr. Hart was also greedy and dishonest, which, in one form or another, all horrible bosses are. Maybe, because we see that so much in real life today. these horrible bosses are a better goof.

Opening This Weekend: Three sure-to-be-huge films open this weekend from three different studios, starting with the Jon Favreau-directed Cowboys

& Aliens, starring Harrison Ford and Daniel Craig. As stupid as it sounds on paper, I can't help but be stoked for this one. Looks like some old school movie magic mixed with some of the new school high production value beauty Favs has given us over the last few years with his Iron Man movies. Should be pretty great and will absolutely sell huge despite having less of a marketing push than most of the season's other blockbuster-type films.

Also out is a great-looking rom-com called Crazy, Stupid, Love. Starring ScreenTime's favorite working actor, Ryan Gosling and quite a few other big talents (Steve Carell, Julianne Moore, Emma Stone, Marisa Tomei, etc.), the movie looks like the rare romcom worth getting genuinely excited about. That John Requa and Glenn Ficarra, the dudes behind I Love You, Phillip Morris, directed doesn't hurt. And last but not least, we have the first film from Columbia's new live action/animation hybrid, The Smurfs, directed by hack Raja Gosnell. Looks totally dumb, but I'm sure it'll do big dollars regardless.

Tops at the Box: Joe Johnston's Captain America: The First Avenger took the No. 1 spot at the box last weekend, bringing in just under \$66 million over its first three days in the U.S. Add to that another \$4 million or so in overseas tickets and the film has already made back half of its production budget.

If you're not familiar with Johnston, he's responsible for two really good films (October Sky and The Rocketeer) and a whole lot of terrible movies (The Wolfman and Hidalgo, to name just two). Word is that Captain America is a damn good super hero flick that features some solid set design, a beautiful retro look and some classic era Spielbergian blockbuster appeal. As much as I dig all the art design and marketing, I just can't get too excited about this one. Maybe it's the cast, fronted by the unproven Chris Evans, who you may recognize as Human Torch from those mediocre Fantastic Four flicks. We'll check it eventually, but probably not any time soon.

More From the Box: Taking the No. 2 spot last weekend was the final Harry Potter flick, which brought in another \$48 million, upping its 10-day total in the U.S. to \$274 million, \$835 million worldwide. At this rate, Deathly Hal-

lows, Part 2 will most likely pass the final Lord of the Rings film in the all-time gross category, making it the No. 3 grossing film of all time behind, you guessed it, James Cameron's two crappy flicks, Titanic and Avatar. If you've not yet seen the Potter screen conclusion, we highly recommend it. Our No. 2 film of the year so far, falling behind the probably untouchable The Tree of Life (which just this past weekend became a profitable film. finally surpassing its \$32 million production mark in sales).

Taking the No. 3 spot last weekend was newbie Friends with Benefits, the heavily-promoted rom-com starring Justin Timberlake and Mila Kunis, which brought in \$18.5 million over its first three days. I know everyone is gaga for Kunis all of the sudden (she's always looked like this, by the way), but I just don't get the appeal. She's a super skinny Fran Drescher who plays slight variations of her Jackie character from "That 70s Show."

Taking the No. 4 and No. 5 spots were Transformers: Dark of the Moon and Horrible Bosses. bringing in right about \$12 million each. Michael Bay's third Trany cash cow is now up to \$325 million in sales in the U.S. and just under \$900 million worldwide. making it an official summer classic - no matter how bad it may be. And last but not least for dol-

lar talk, we have, of course, a Midnight in Paris update. The film, which absolutely no one thought would be a big indie hit, continues to bring in the bucks, taking the No. 10 spot last weekend with another \$2 million in U.S. ticket sales. Thus far the film has sold just under \$45 million in the U.S. and over \$33 million overseas. making it by far the biggest selling film ever from legendary art house director Woody Allen. New to Home Video: Once

again, not too many home releases this week. Grr. In addition to season 4 of "Eureka" we get DVD and Blu-ray editions of 13 Assassins, Of Gods and Men, Hobo with a Shotgun and something called BloodRayne: The Third Reich. So, aside from 13 Assassins, not a whole lot worth checking out. In fact, for the next two or so months. there's rarely more than one good release per week, and sometimes none. This, folks, is the "industry" attempting to force us out to the theater.

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
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
