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

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'F' Is for Flower Power

----- Cover Story • Country Joe McDonald

If there's one thing Joe McDonald knows about, it would be how to write a good protest song. Or maybe it's Florence Nightingale. Could be Woodstock, though, that simultaneously seminal and terminal event, the hurrah and last gasp of the 1960s where nearly half-a-million people gathered in the mud for "breakfast in bed," as Wavy

Gravy famously announced, and where Country Joe and the Fish followed Richie Havens' opening impromptu performance with their own impromptu performance and got the 400,000-plus throng to chant the infamous Fish cheer that begins with "gimme an f!" and doesn't spell "fish."

One thing is certain: Country Joe McDonald has lived a full life and has plenty of stories to tell and songs to sing, and he'll be doing both on stage Friday at the third installment of the 2011 Botanical Roots Outdoor Concert Series. The activist singer/songwriter Otis Gibbs will open.

McDonald, who spoke and played with fellow 60s icon Tom Rush earlier this year at the IPFW Omnibus Lecture Series, has been on the road off and on for the last 35 years, mostly doing solo gigs and talks. The Botanical Conservatory performance will no doubt be a must-see for anyone with an interest in the music and history of the 60s.

"I'll be doing a lot of my own material and will tell some stories from the 60s," he said in a phone interview from his home in Berkeley. On the phone, McDonald was reserved and spoke softly and slow-

ly, a far cry from the rabble-rousing persona he wore in the 1960s "I'll probably do about 25 shows this year. They're not all the same. I do a Heroes of Woodstock package and the Woody Guthrie Show."

Along Florence Nightin-

gale, the putative mother of modern nursing, about whom McDonald became interested after meeting Vietnam War-era nurses and subsequently put together a 50-minute tribute to her using spoken word and song, Woody Guthrie has had a huge influence on McDonald. In 2001, the National Steinbeck Center asked McDonald to perform as part of its display of the Smithsonian Institution traveling exhibition, This Land Is Your Land: The Life and Legacy of Woody Guthrie.

'This served as a reason for me to revisit my connection with Woody Guthrie and the state of Oklahoma," McDonald wrote on his website. "My father, Worden 'Mac' McDonald, grew up in the little Oklahoma town of Sallisaw, 100 miles from the Woody's birthplace of Okemah. My father was a farm boy and hobo like Woody. He talked about this in his autobiography, An Old Guy Who Feels

McDonald's connection to Guthrie was already strong. In 1975 Guthrie's former manager asked McDonald, who was play-

Wall Street and released on McDonald's Rag Baby label.

McDonald was born in Washington. D.C. in 1942 but grew up in Los Angeles. He moved from the Los Angeles suburb of El Monte to Berkeley in the early 60s and quickly joined a number of local bands, most of which he started. In 1965, after completing a stint in the United States Navy, he formed Country Joe and the Fish, partly as a

political device, in time to play at a war protest at the Oakland Induction Center. The band was rousingly received and quickly decided to take itself seriously. Country Joe and the Fish signed a record deal with Vanguard Records in December of 1966 and the next year released Eclectic Music for the Mind and

As a solo performer and leader of Country Joe and the Fish, McDonald has released nearly 50 albums and continues to work on new projects. He has a new album scheduled for a December

"It's sort of a jug band theme," he said, "It's been about 20 years since I've done this kind of album. I'm working with Greg Dewey, the drummer I played with at Woodstock. We haven't worked together for 40 years."

Otis Gibbs, originally from Wanamaker, Indiana, is cut from the same cloth as Guthrie and McDonald. Part Johnny Appleseed, part hobo, part spiritual seeker, Gibbs, according to his website is "seen by most people as a folk artist, but that is a simplistic way to describe a man who has planted over 7,000 trees, slept in hobo jungles. walked with nomadic shepherds in the Carpathian Mountains, been stripsearched by dirty cops in Detroit and has an FBI file.

of which had never been recorded. "That was the first time that was done," McDonald said. Nilly Bragg and Wilco later did the same thing on two Mermaid Avenue records. As Bragg has said, "Like no one of his generation, Country Joe McDonald carries on the mission of Woody Guthrie."

In the 80s McDonald produced a record for Guthrie's son, Joady, called Spies on

"Otis has played everywhere from labor rallies in Wisconsin, to anti-war protests in Texas. Austria and the Czech Republic, Feed & Seed Stores in the Midwestern U.S. and in countless, theaters, festivals, bars and living rooms. Much of his work concentrates on the world that is ignored by pop culture. Sometimes forgotten, obsolete or simply marginalized, it is a world that doesn't fit into a 20-second sound

Mutual Admirers

To those who have only heard their iconic hit "96 Tears" on the radio, Question Mark and the Mysterians is just the cool name of an awesome band. The song never ages, and once it's in your head it's there for days. But for those who have gone beyond the superficial familiarity with the band's biggest single, it will come as no surprise that the group's exalted leader, Question Mark (or is that '?'?) is a fascinating and enigmatic guy. He's been known to tell interviewers that he's from Mars, that he roamed the planet with dinosaurs – and it's hard to know if he's telling the truth or pulling your leg.

Bad experiences with those in the media and music business have made him wary, not surprising since he and his youthful band-

mates – very young teens at the height of their fame – were taken advantage of, a story too often told by too many.

But eccentricities aside, Question Mark can sing, and the music he made 45 years ago is still incredibly vibrant. One local musician has a long history with the man and his band, one which has helped bring Question Mark and the Mysterians back to Fort Wayne for a benefit concert in Auburn.

The concert proceeds will help Serenity House which provides assistance dealing those with issues of addiction. The outdoor concert provides a perfect setting not only for Question Mark, but for the kid who grew up across

the street from him: Joey O.

A local legend himself, the blues guitarist grew up in Saginaw, Michigan before moving to Fort Wayne, and it was there that he first met and came to admire Question Mark and the Mysterians.

"The house my parents lived in when I was born and through my grade school years was right across the street from Question Mark," Joey recalls. "My older brother was the band's road manager during those years, from 1966 to 1967 when they had those hit records and were touring the world. It was my first exposure to rock 'n roll, and it was really exciting to see these local guys making it big."

Michigan was a hotbed of music in those days, producing acts like Bob Seger, Ted Nugent and the band Joey remembers most fondly, the Frost. It was a situation unlike anything that could happen today, Joey admits ruefully.

"Back then all those bands were getting record deals, all those bands were getting local airplay, which would never happen in a million years now. When the Joey O Band released our first CD 10 years ago, we sent CDs to all the DJs and programmers in Europe, and we were playing in places like Germany and getting on the blues charts. But nobody in America was playing us – not even in Fort Wayne!

"Now the market is so saturated – everybody and their brother has a website, everyone is on YouTube. If you want to find good music, you really have to look for it."

Through his ups and downs in the music industry, Joey has stayed in touch with Ques-

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"B o b b y, of all of the guys, has kept tabs on me the most. He seemed to enjoy seeing me rising through the ranks. But Question Mark and I always got along. He's really different, and he doesn't always get along with people—or he makes no effort to get along with people, if that's how you want to look at it—but he's a tremendous talent and a really nice guy. And I think he likes me because of my sincerity. We play tennis together, and we've stayed friends over the years."

Question Mark is reluctant to play shows in many situations, but when his friend Joey calls he listens. Joey O. has been playing shows with the band for years. In fact, his final performance while living in Michigan was a show they both played together.

Sometimes it's true; good musicians with music we enjoy and respect sell out, Just look at Kiss.

Gene Simmons plastered his face on every imaginable product from flavored lip balm to caskets, and we've all been let down by bands we once loved who lost their way and their foothold in musical history. Maybe they've changed their lineup so many times the original band and their sound is obliterated, or their music starts to sound increasingly like the flavor of the month. They get lazy and write songs that are simple and void of depth.

Insert 10 Years here – the musical antidote and a rock-solid band that, after more than a decade of playing together, has managed to stick it out with nearly their entire founding lineup and put out albums that continue to showcase their devotion to the craft. Whether or not you've heard of these guys, you've definitely heard their music. Catchy hits like "Wasteland" are all over the radio whilst being unceremoniously belted out at karaoke bars across the nation.

When I asked drummer Brian Vodinh

how it was that they kept a consistent lineup over the years, he said, "It's the most difficult part." Keeping the peace isn't easy.

"If you have a girlfriend, or wife, think about how difficult it can be with that one person. Now imagine that with a bunch of people." It's more than just band members they are on the road with. "Right now we have nine people living on this bus together. You need a crew you respect."

Before there was a tour bus, there was a garage in Saint Louis. Vodinh on drums and Lewis "Big Lew" Cosby on bass, played

together in a high school band that booked gigs with guitarist Ryan "Tater" Johnson's band. Add in vocalist Mike Underdown and Vodinh said.

"Let's all meet in my parent's garage and write some songs and just see what happens." They began booking shows and tumbled down an unstoppable path towards fame

released for another three years, while the

They recorded their first album, *Into The Half Moon*, independently in 2001. Soon after, vocalist Underdown left and was replaced by Jesse Hasek. The band recorded another independent album, *Killing All That Holds You*, in 2004. This time they caught the attention of Universal Records and signed with them, making *The Autumn Effect* in 2005. Their first two singles off Autumn Effect, "Wasteland" and "Through The Iris," were certified Gold, with "Wasteland"

Fort Wayne in the Rear View Mirror

I'm downstairs at Hyde Brothers Booksellers, lost in the endless aisles, on the hunt for a used copy of Francois Truffaut's *Hitchcock* book. With me is singer-songwriter Jon Keller, who is sneaking sips of whiskey while looking at issues of something called Armchair Detective.

"What's an armchair detective?" Keller laughs. He pulls out a new issue from the endless stack; on it is an older, oddly thin man sitting in a wheelchair, holding a magnifying glass and looking serious. He's wearing some sort of leather hat. Keller erupts into laughter. "Okay, I see." Another sip.

Twenty minutes prior to the armchair laughs we'd been upstairs at the West Central apartment Keller keeps with his wife, Amy. After playing me some new songs he'd been recording in the corner of his bedroom, Jon disappears. Minutes later he resurfaces with a goofy smile. "I couldn't find my flask." He takes a drink and looks at me awkwardly. Jon Keller has spent the afternoon drinking some dark booze he and his friends brewed, and is now onto the cheap whis-

For the week or two leading up to this day, Keller had been working two jobs, essentially keeping him busy from 4 a.m. until the late evening each day. After work he'd come home, spend time with his wife and maybe work on a new batch of songs for his second album, Deceiver. Today, though, was different.

'Are you going to keep the second job?" I ask, know-

ing that it'd been cutting into his recording time.

"I actually just quit it," he laughs.

Amy, in the other room, overhears this news. "You quit it already?" she asks.

"Yeah. Just now," Jon says, smiling at his flask. "Over

We all laugh our middle-finger laughs as Jon takes another swig from his flask and looks out the window; someone is outside, calling his name repeatedly. "Hey man," he says out the window before turning back my way.

'So, we're just now telling people about this. Friends and stuff. We haven't even told our families yet," he says to

me. "But we're gonna move soon."

The rest of the afternoon we drive around, looking at books and talking. At some point Keller tells me that, thanks to the nature of Amy's work-at-home job, they could move pretty much anywhere they wanted. They chose Nashville. Later, and now with red face, he tells me about how by happenstance he discovered his songwriting hero, Elliott Smith, by listening to a jazz record of contemporary covers. Before I drop him off back at his place, I ask two things: (1) "Why Nashville?"; and (2) "Do you think Elliott Smith killed him-

The first answer is easy. "For my music, I guess," he

says. "Er, my career," he laughs.

We pull up to his place, feeling weird. I realize, suddenly, that I won't be seeing too much of this guy I've come to admire quite a bit – mostly due to the unimaginable quality

of his new songs.

"I hope he killed himself," Keller suddenly says, now outside my car window. "I think it'd be more tragic if his girlfriend killed him. If he did it himself, if he decided that he was done, then that's okay. But if someone else killed him, then I'd be sad because he probably would've made more albums. And they probably would've been good.'

Before walking off, Keller tells me that he has the home address and phone number of Jennifer Chiba, the woman some suspect stabbed Smith in the chest. "Maybe I'll call her

and ask," he says with a goofy smile, next stumbling towards his front door.

The Great Fort Wayne Record

After releasing his first solo album, Down In a Mirror, late last year, Keller found something he'd never had an abundance of: self confidence. No, he didn't like Mirror as a whole, but he saw many others flip for it, and it changed

"There are a few songs on [Down in a Mirror] that I think are pretty good, and I am proud that I made it and got it out there," Keller recently told me in an e-mail. "However, I don't think the songwriting on most of it is very good. I know that I hadn't really learned how to use my voice yet, which I think is something I'm improving on all the time. And, back then, I really didn't have confidence in my songwriting, or myself in general."



Since the release of that album Keller has been working, pretty much every day, and constantly, on his second album, a record called *Deceiver* that he plans to release before heading to Nashville at the end of August.

"I knew before recording this new album that I didn't want to rush it, and that I wanted to spend time creating all sorts of different instrumentation and sounds for the songs," Keller said, also explaining how he initially intended to have as many of his musician friends on the record as possible.

"I had completely written most of these songs before I started recording them, which helped me out with some of the formats of the song," Keller continued. "Right now, I'm working on mixing. Of course, when I say that, I should state that, when I mix stuff, I often find things I have to go back and re-record. So I'm mixing and recording all at the same

"I've been imagining recording solo albums since I was around 12 years old or so. I remember thinking that I'd at least have one out by the time I was out of high school, and I'd already have a name for myself in college. But, of course, that didn't really happen. I didn't even write a song till I was around 21 years old.'

When asked about the record, Keller says that it's the first thing in his life that he's been proud of. Along the way, he's played me his demos as they've changed from voiceand-guitar cassette recordings to big, thick productions, some featuring over 60 tracks. And his very serious, very dedicated approach to making the record has paid off.

'Once I finish the album I'm going to have a release show at the Brass Rail on August 26. It'll sort of be a going away party as well," Keller said. "I'm sure it's going to be a very emotional show. The Brass Rail has been a Fort Wayne staple for me."

Movin' On 'After the album release show my wife and I are moving to Nashville, Tennessee so that I can work on music there. he said. "If I were to be completely honest about my aspirations, I hope that I manage to get some sort of record deal and I have enough money to not work a day job. That's it, really. I just want to support myself financially while doing something that I love. Of course, I hope people like the music and it means something to them, but that is probably a loftier goal than supporting myself by making music. I realize that is the exact same goal that thousands of people move to Nashville with. It may work out, it may not. If it doesn't, we're only tied down as long as our lease."

But really, why Nashville? I couldn't help but ask

"Nashville is obviously a Mecca for musicians around the world. And, of course, it is the country music capital of the world. I mean come on, they have Taylor Swift and Miley Cyrus," he laughed. "But really, I don't care at all about the modern day country music that comes out of Nashville. Most people don't know it, but there is actually a pretty big. thriving non-country music scene there. So that's what I'm going there for.

"After deciding on Nashville, it was a bit chaotic. I mean, where do we live, how do I find a band down there and so on. We don't really know anyone that lives there. We are excited that it'll be a new adventure, and we're sort of stepping out into unknown territory. It was hard telling our parents, but they were both really supportive, which made things easier. The hardest part was telling our friends. though. I've got a really close-knit group of friends here. and I was dreading telling them that this is our last summer in Fort Wayne. But we finally did, and as sad as they were. they were very supportive and excited for us."

Once settled, Keller plans to continue to take his writing, recording and playing seriously, referring to his music

as "my career" repeatedly.

"The first few things that I'm going to do down there is try to put a band together, find places to play and try to meet other musicians and bar owners. I don't know what else I would do there," he explained. "My music isn't exactly open mic/coffee shop material, so putting a band together will be my first priority.

"I think leaving is definitely bolstering my confidence. I'm at a place in my life and career that I finally have confidence in what I'm doing. This seems to be the only foreseeable time in my future that an opportunity like this is going to present itself. I'm young, don't have kids, and have the freedom to move. Of course all of this freedom and moving and whatnot is really stressing me out. I'm constantly thinking about what happens if nothing takes off. If, after a year or two, I'm at the same place with nothing to show for it. It definitely is scary. But I'm trying to just ignore those feelings and feel confident about everything.

The Streets of West Sin

'Man, this city has been great for me. I love Fort Wayne," Keller said without any lack of sincerity. "I'm sure as long as my friends and family are still in Fort Wayne I will always be thinking about it. I know I will always cherish West Central, specifically Wayne and Berry streets. I did so much growing up and discovering who I am on those streets."

Of Saints and Scarabs

"Drawing is not an exercise.

Exercise is sitting on a stationary bicycle and going nowhere.

Drawing is being on a bicycle and taking a journey.

For me to succeed in drawing, I must go fast and arrive somewhere.

In the Dos Equis TV ads the Most Interesting Man in the World is, among other things, "allowed to touch the art at muse-ums." So too is award-winning local artist and gallery curator Justin Johnson.

At 6-foot-three and 200 pounds, the 29-year-old could easily be imagined hanging from a rim on a basketball court. Instead he has made a career creating beautiful, intriguing images and hanging the works of other artists in the gallery spaces like Artlink and the University of Saint Francis where he

Currently Johnson has his own richly colored 43-piece installation Saints & Scarabs on view through September 11 at Gallery

G in the Student Union Building on the campus of Manchester College. The recent works-onpaper exhibition can be viewed Monday through Friday from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. and on Sunday

from noon to 3 p.m. and are well worth the

Drawing upon his undergraduate studies at Saint Francis and the influences garnered from several stints abroad in Italy, France, England, the Netherlands, Sweden and Russia, the artist has fashioned a collection of superbly drafted and imaginative pieces that both delight the eye and challenge the mind.

Describing his technique, the artist writes: "When approaching the surface of the paper, I first manipulate it by adding patinas or textures. Then I begin the central composition, usually drawing the forms traditionally in graphite. Upon completion, I apply liquid gold to the interior surface of the glass overlay which is placed on top of the original work. This interplay between the gold on glass and the mixed media drawing creates a visual depth between the two.

"When displayed, the gold creates an aesthetic that is reminiscent of such sacred works as Byzantine icons, Renaissance manuscripts and Chinese screen paintings.'

Incorporating such techniques - including graphite drawings, mixed media works and digital imaging - Johnson attempts a contemporary reinterpretation of religious iconography mixing the symbolism of the sacred scarab sometimes with mundane objects like hand tools and locks. Sounds like a tall order, but he manages to bring it off surprisingly well.

"I am very influenced by historical works such as Byzantine icons, illuminated manuscripts, classical sculpture and scientific texts," explains Johnson. "I am constantly asked what my fascination is with beetles

> and insects ... and honestly, for the most part, they scare me a little and that I think is what keeps my interest.

> "Obviously there is such a wealth of symbolism to reference from the scarab theme that it allows me to keep reinventing it as I proceed artistically."

> Johnson's influences are as diverse as the media he employs. Among his top picks he cites the pop artist Jim Dine; Ed Paschke, the flourescent Op painter from Chicago; Swiss glass magician Bertil Vallien; and the modernist Guatemalan photographer, Luis Gonzalez Palma.

> Growing up in rural Indiana near Garrett,

the artist was not inspired by the surrounding pastoral landscape but later found refuge and motivation at Saint Francis where he took classes from the likes of Rick Cartwright, Maurice Papier, Karen Thompson-Pequinot and Alan Nauts.

"More than anyone, Cartwright (Dean of UFS's School of Creative Arts) is the person who has most influenced my work both as the gallery director and as an artist," says Johnson, who has directed the USF campus

galleries and some 200 exhibits for nearly a decade. "I always look forward to the next big exhibition, event or project because I know I will learn something new from him, and I know the bar will be set very high."

Johnson, whose fine arts work are displayed in numerous private, corporate and public collections, actually began his career as a graphic designer and art director, skills

"We played on a Saturday night – it was the Joey O Band, Question Mark and the Mysterians, Joan Jett, Loverboy and Edgar Winter. How's that for a lineup? Then I packed up my things and moved to Fort Wayne that Sunday and gave my first guitar lesson on Monday."

Although the band often sends Joey messages through his brother, they still manage to get together for performances when opportunities present themselves, and Joey O Band will once again appear with Question Mark and the Mysterians in Auburn.

"Our wives are all friends so they start telling us we have to book something so we can all hang out together. And one of the things I love about this is the chance to play with these guys again. But I also love that we can bring a show like this to Auburn. It's a great situation for us and for them."

One reason Joey looks forward to it is

that he limits the venues where the Joey O. Band will play.

"I had been playing at high school dances and bars since I was 14-years-old. At some point, it just didn't feel like I belonged at high school dances anymore. Now I just don't feel like I belong in bars anymore. I love playing shows like the one in Auburn – outdoors, fresh air, all-ages shows are what I really want to do from now on."

His desire to play music for himself and to make the music he wants to play is remarkably similar to the attitude of Question Mark, a man who decidedly marches to his own beat and is clearly happier that way.

"Question Mark and the Mysterians have always done what they've wanted to do, and you can't help but admire that. Question Mark once said to me 'If I release an album and 10 people buy it, then I've made 10 people happy.' And you have to love that."

some time off from recording, writing and touring.

When 10 Years reunited prior to recording to their latest album, *Feeding The Wolves*, they had already made the decision to go with a more aggressive sound this time. "When we first started ... we were a bit heavier ... influenced by bands like The Deftones and Tool. We had an edge to us. Then we went melodic and dark and heavy. With this last album we made things a little bit edgier," Vodinh said.

The edge was in part due to a promise 10 years made to fans that they would make an album that went back to their earlier days of rougher, edgier rock. But with record execs breathing down their necks, the decision to go that direction was difficult. "They would say, 'We need a hit. You guys should look at the charts and see what's hot," Vodinh said. "It was bleeding our creativity."

It's at this point musicians have to choose if they will sell out or go their own

way. But the decision is about more than just the music. "It's weird when you start making music, and your livelihood and other people's livelihoods are depending on the music you write," Vodinh said – other people like crew, managers and the families of everyone involved. "The wolves were preying on us."

10 Years made the decision to be true to themselves and their fans, and it paid off. *Feeding the Wolves* soared on the charts, reaching No. 3 on the U.S. Alternative Chart and kicking them off into a headlining tour.

"We try not to follow a fad to make a quick buck. We're lucky enough to make the records we want to make." Vodinh said, admitting that it's the fans who made this stroke of luck possible, especially those "in your neck of the woods ... They're huge supporters of our music."

Supporter or not, you have to agree it's a rarity to find musicians who stand up to threats and persuasion and continue to make the music they love.

Well then, I ask, why leave the place you love?

"I wouldn't say Fort Wayne was holding me back, per se. Not yet at least. I think that if I had stayed here another year or two then that would have certainly been the case. But I think it's been more of a town to grow in and work out what I want in music and in a music community. Of course, I'd be lying if I said I didn't have anything negative to say about it, but I'm not going to get into all of that."

As any fan of local music already knows, Keller, at age 24, has already long been a staple on the city's best stages, playing guitar for many of our best bands before going solo.

"I've been helped by so many people," he said. "All of the musicians I've ever played with up here in Fort Wayne have helped and inspired me so much. Lee Miles, Mark Hutchins, Josh Hall, Kevin Hambrick – those guys.

"Also my close friends are always encouraging me and backing me up. And my parents were huge in helping me pursue music when I was growing up. I don't think they could have stopped me if they had wanted

to, though. My brother helped me a lot with teaching me some guitar stuff early on, and continues to be an inspiration. Amy, my wife, is of course my biggest help and inspiration. She is always pushing me creatively and musically. She is really the reason we get to move to Nashville. If it wasn't for her and her job freedom, we couldn't afford to move.

In closing, I ask Keller if he has any words for the city that has been so good to him through his early 20s.

"Well, I guess maybe I want people to know that I'm not as weird as I seem," he says with one of his signature creepy smiles. "Or maybe I am.

"Also, I guess I want to say that I made this music all by myself, and I'm really proud of it. So if you have any interest in local Fort Wayne music, please come out August 26 for my show at the Rail. Or even August 27 for the free Dessert show after Taste of the Arts, which I'm also playing at."

Having heard his new batch of songs, I can't help but also offer a big, shining endorsement. Keller's new record will get plenty of "Best Fort Wayne Album Ever" talk amongst the scenesters. Deservedly so.

which have helped him in terms of marketing and designing the identities of the individual installations.

Once, while still in high school, he was told by a coach that he would have a better chance of making it in the NBA than having a career in art.

Johnson was, however, an accomplished prep distance runner. "That was a great outlet for me because it cleared my mind to focus on art," he related. "While out on a run I would think about the art I was doing ... it also taught me self-discipline and to see something through to the end.


"Creating art can be a lot like running a marathon and usually in the middle of it you

The second, *ICONology*, is a solo exhibit at the Mount Memorial Gallery at Grace College which opens October 3 and runs through November 4.



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

Wendy Lynne Living My Truth

"I want to do what I want to do now and take that risk that is involved in everything that comes with it." This is a quote from Wendy Lynne's promo pack, and it seems she's following her dream with the release of her debut CD Living My Truth. The CD was really well produced



locally by Sweetwater Sound and consists of three original songs and four covers of tunes made famous by Reba McIntire, Crystal Shawanda and Martina McBride.

Lynne has been through the challenges that come with multiple sclerosis and surviving stage 2 breast cancer. Big time props to her for battling through everything and fulfilling her dream of writing and recording her own music.

The first original track on the *Living My Dream*, "Sometime Down the Road," has found a bit of success on the indie charts, making it to No. 23 on the Indie Country Music Charts and No. 175 (out of 500) on the Indie Top Song Charts. The song is a really laid-back, duet-style love song collaboration with Buffalo, New York singer Mark Valentino. The second original, a mellow and heartfelt song called "Shadow in the Dark," has a very melancholy feel, enhanced with lots of violin that canvasses the whole song. The third original song on the CD is "Hard Heart" and seems to be a kind of autobiography. It doesn't take a trained ear to hear the obvious drum machine taking on the percussive duties, and there's a total lack of bass holding the bottom end. The vocals are good, but this is the least likable effort on the entire CD.

Lynne does a good job on all four of the covers on *Living My Truth* and shows lots of range and an ability to adapt to various artists' styles and make them her own. On the remake of Reba McIntire's "Pink Guitar" she captures the rocking feel of the song, and it's easy to tell she really has fun singing this one. On Martina McBride's "Broken Wing" Lynne gets to show off her extraordinary range.

Overall, Living My Truth is a well-produced CD that showcases Lynne's vocal and songwriting chops. I'd like to see her write something with a bit more energy that would show her diversity in the future, but it's obvious that Wendy Lynne definitely has talent, and I'm sure this isn't the last we'll hear from her. tUnE-yArDs whokill

Merrill "tUnE-yArDs" Garbus' first record, 2009's experimental *Bird-Brains*, was recorded using only a single voice recorder and shareware recording software. Comprised mostly of voice, programed beats, ukulele and field recordings, the lofi record at times seemed like a masterpiece. Initially available as



a name-your-price download, the album was eventually picked up by 4AD, who soon sent Garbus off on tour with the then-hot Dirty Projectors. By the end of 2009 *Bird* stood as the rare career-launching home-recorded record, not unlike Silver Jews' first songs, which were recorded using an answering machine.

Two years later Garbus is back with her sophomore record, W H O K I L L, an incredibly eclectic, studio-recorded LP that sounds big and, more than anything else, bold.

Take the loopy (and epic) tendencies of Animal Collective, the beat-focused production of M.I.A., the fractured arrangements and oddball female vocals of The Dirty Projectors and the cut-and-paste production style of Jay Dilla and you have, for the most part, Garbus' new record. Tying all that together is an anything-goes spirit similar to musicians like David Byrne. All that said, WHOKILL somehow plays through cohesively, an artsy pop record that approaches style, structure and melody in a way unlike any current artist known to me (though Garbus does have her clear influences). The result is a banging outsider record full of brains, humor and endless imagination that nods to nearly every genre out there, especially folk, hip-hop, pop, jazz and indie rock. The work of today's youth: scatterbrained

Johnny and the Hurricanes

Stormsville (1960)

It's difficult to understand the evolution of rock n' roll. Was it born out of the Delta blues or the Memphis sound? What about Motown's influence? How about a Catholic high school in Toledo?

With the bawdy sax of John "Johnny Paris" Pocisk and several of his classmates, Johnny and the Hurricanes arranged

50s style music with fat horns, twangy guitars and amazing organ. They just couldn't find anyone to sing for them.

So they soldiered on without a lead singer, and in 1959 (five years before The Ventures) recorded "Red River Rock," which landed in the Top 5 on both the American and British charts. The band released *Stormsville* just eight months later.

Stormsville opens with "Reveille Rock," a funky track with a huge saxophone and the Hammond organ intertwined over an even pace and tempo. "Milk Shake" follows and sounds like something you heard at sock hops, while "Travelin" features the soft key strokes of the classic organ. "Rockin' T" be-bops its way around the mid-50s, and "The Hungry Eye" goes into the blues a little more. "Time Bomb" and "Corn Bread" are also remnants of the American Graffiti era, and the record closes with the delightful "The 'Hep' Canary." I don't know how instrumentals get named, but this record captured a whole genre of music without being too pretentious about titles or images.

The Hurricanes went on tour in the early 60s and were opened by a little-known English band called The Beatles. They toured for a few years until the British Invasion made their sound obscure, finally breaking up in 1965. Johnny Paris moved to Germany and reformed the Hurricanes around 1970. The group had over 200 members through November of 2005. Paris passed away at the age of 65 in 2006. (*Dennis Donahue*)

"Es-So," one of the many instant standouts on the record, sees Garbus in fiery mode, coughing up often funny lyrics over a composition that reminds most of classic-era De La Soul (no joke), back when Prince Paul was king. Switching back and forth between a weirdo falsetto and awkwardly spoken lyrics, Garbus brings the laughs with lines like "I gotta do right with my body's type" and "I can't believe I ate the whole thing." The cut is, without doubt, a crossover-ready tune that I could easily hear on the radio, hidden between Katy Perry, Lily Allen and Lady Gaga tracks. All she needs is a viral video or, I dunno, maybe a deal with Target for their next hit in a line of hip commercials.

"Gangsta" – driven by a blaring bass line, loopy saxophone riffs and Garbus' knack for big hooks – is another standout, offering maybe the biggest sound on the record, coming in and out, exploding at the 3:12 mark into an all-out mess of beauty and noise (mostly, that wicked bass line, those, err, sexy sax loops and Garbus' overpowering bark). One of the best songs of the year? Oh yeah. So is lead single "Bizness," an intricately produced pop song with an incredible music video. I'd try to describe the song to you here, in printed word, but it wouldn't do justice to Garbus' wild sound. Look it up.

What surprises most here is the above-mentioned "endless imagination" which seems to seep through at every moment over the record's 10 impressive tracks, nearly wearing the listener down before track eight comes into focus. Here's what happens when you put a big mind in a studio and offer it endless candy. Big, huge productions that jump from genre to genre without hesitation, without a single trip

It would be easy to say that Garbus is the natural progression of popular outsider taste, the culmination of her very hip influences. But let's not cheapen W H O K I L L. After all, it's the best record released thus far in 2011, a year already stuffed full of great releases. This is it, the bold new artist I'd been waiting for, fully developed and not afraid to go big and loud. And beautiful. (Greg W. Locke)



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Hand it to the folks at Planet Bordeaux. They're a creative bunch.

As I've mentioned before, Planet Bordeaux is the marketing arm of the winemakers who produce Bordeaux and Bordeaux Supérieur wines. These

are the wines that often get lost between the more inexpensive "vin de pays" table wines and the "classified growth" wines that can go for hundreds of dollars apiece. These mid-priced Bordeaux (which aren't that much more expensive than the vin de pays) are designed to be solid, everyday values. The Planet Bordeaux folks were looking for spokesmen. They found a bunch of unexpected takers – a bunch of loud, muddy, sweaty, normally beer-swilling men and women.

Planet Bordeaux is now an official sponsor of USA Rugby.

The Rugby World Cup will be held in New Zealand in September. Planet Bordeaux decided to support the Eagles (the U.S. team, currently ranked 17th in the world) on their path to the event. I was fascinated by this choice of sponsors, largely because, after my remarkably brief and utterly unimpressive career as a rugger, wine was just about the last thing I associate with rugby. Beer, blood, public nudity, beer, and beer ... sure.

Apparently, however, the Bordelais are absolutely bonkers about their rugby, and at least some of them are willing to trade national loyalty for commerce and visibility.



"Planet Bordeaux and the Eagles are both dedicated to excellence and contributing to the game of rugby beyond the field. The partnership will help to prepare the Eagles for their build-up to the world's largest rugby stage in September," said USA Rugby CEO and President of Rugby Operations, Nigel Melville.

In celebration of this partnership, the good folks at Balzac sent me another set of Planet Bordeaux samples. My enthusiasm for these bottles was much greater than my desire to put on my old kit again. I'm much better gallivanting in front of a wine tasting than I am running for my life as an overmatched outside centerback.

Here's the latest rundown:

Chateau Raynier 2006 Marc Lurton Bordeaux – This is an exceptionally easy-to-drink Bordeaux. It has the requisite earthiness and "vegetal" nature, but for the most part, it's just smooth and balanced. The merlot and and cabernet grapes strike an accord, and you can uncork this one with any number of foods. In our case, we had it with some beef kabobs, also skewered with pine-

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

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

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












Diary of a Wimpy Kid: Rodrick Rules

Sequels usually take all the stuff we thought we liked about the first movie and then cynically cram super-sized portions of the same stuff down our throats, to the point where we feel embarrassed we ever responded to the first movie to begin with. This sequel to the surprisingly entertaining (and, as I remember, frequently hilarious) Diary of a Wimpy Kid is a bit like that: more of the same, but not nearly as

As the title of the sequel suggests, the main conflict here is between Greg and his bullying, dimwitted, drum-playin' older brother Rodrick after their clueless mother (Rachael Harris) begins an incentive program in which she basically pays the two endlessly bickering boys to spend "quality time" together. (The movie does a nice job of skewering well-intentioned parents' attempts to get their kids to do what they want them to through a system of what amounts to bribery, a system which Rodrick and Greg both quickly learn how to game.)

Devon Bostick so winningly played Rodrick in the first movie that he stole every scene he was in, and in the sequel he's still the standout: snarly and mean to his brother one minute, then pathetically begging him not to tell his dad that he's wearing black eyeliner the next. (The joke

about Rodrick is that, although Greg looks up to and fears him, we know he's not nearly as cool or scary as he lets on.)

Greg still gets into some minor misadventures with his friends, in prototypical middle school milieus (roller skating, watching scary movies during sleepovers, etc.), but here they're definitely peripheral to the Rodrick story, and they often fizzle. (The subplot in which Greg pretends his Indian friend Chirac is invisible is especially tedious.) The sequel's funniest moments have to do with social outcast Fregley (Grayson Russell), but they

are few and far between.

As the hero, Greg was never completely likeable, even in the first movie. He's much too insecure and disloyal and changeable to win our affection. (He is, in short, a perfectly believable early adolescent.) But here he often comes off as too hatefully smug one moment, too much an embarrassed patsy to the screenwriters' sadistic whims the next. The Wimpy Kid is now just a product, a franchise, and he's ill-served by director David Bowers.

Rodrick Rules tries to be twice as funny and wisecracking and painfully relatable as the first movie, but is ultimately only a fraction as charming. Although the first movie seemed quite at home within the tame confines of a family-friendly PGrated movie, the sequel strains against such predetermined tameness: the Rodrick-heavy storyline (he's a badly-behaved teenager, remember) calls for something with a bit more edge, honesty, and teeth. The whole movie is, in a word, wimpy.

Transcendent Man

According to inventor and technologist Ray Kurzweil, reports of your inevitable death have been greatly exaggerated.

Kurzweil, 63, takes 200 pills a day in order to stay healthy enough so that he's still around when science and medicine have come up with a way for humans to live virtually forever. According to Kurzweil, this will happen in the next 15-20 years. We've rationalized all kinds of ways of coping with the fact that we will one day die. Without intimations of our own mortality, much of the art and philosophy and religious thinking of the past several thousand years wouldn't exist, but deep down we all know that death is actually a profound and tragic - and to

Kurzweil completely unnecessary - loss. Our bodies have evolved to reach their maximum physical peak at around 25 or so, after which it's all downhill from there, but this doesn't need to be the case: if we humans can boost our own collective lifespan by tinkering with our genes, then by all means we should do so, right?

Transcendent Man, a documentary about Kurzweil directed by Barry and Felicia Ptolemy, isn't your standard talking heads documentary. First, Kurzweil's ideas are extremely intriguing, extrapolated as they are from solid scientific principles. Kurzweil is no fringe lunatic; he helped to invent the flatbed scanner, and one of the two dozen patents he holds is for a revolutionary handheld "reader" of print for the blind.

Second, Kurzweil himself is an interesting man whose ambition to help usher humans along into the "Singularity" (on this, more shortly) stems from a deeply personal grief over the loss of his musician

father. Kurzweil makes no bones about the fact that he would one day like to use his father's bones to extract his DNA and create a clone of him, essentially bringing him back to

If this sounds outrageous and delusional, that's because, Kurzweil asserts, we don't properly understand the ramifications of exponential growth: it took humans tens of thousands of years to invent the very first simple tools, but the rate of technological progress over time increases twofold (or more) every few years, to the point where we now buy things knowing full well they will likely be obsolete in mere months. If

things continue at the rate they've been going, by around 2040 humans (Kurzweil predicts) will have arrived at the Singularity, the point at which computers and humans merge, and what follows from there will literally be beyond our current ability to conceive of it.

We will no longer be bound by our biological bodies. Computers will be smarter than humans, and the rate of exponential growth will only increase from there. We will be able to download the contents of our brains to computers and become almost god-like in our ability to know virtually everything, be virtually everywhere and do virtually anything.

To most of us, this might sound terrifying, but Kurzweil loves the idea of such a future. He is so uncomplicatedly optimistic about these things to come that he doesn't acknowledge any possible downside. The movie, to its credit, interviews several artificial intelligence specialists and biologists who aren't quite so optimistic. (Even I found myself wondering how, for instance, Kurzweil would deal with the fact that if nobody died our exponential population growth might collide with the world's exponential diminishment of resources.)

That some kind of Singularity will occur, unless some unforeseen worldwide calamity derails our current rate of progress, seems inevitable. When it will occur and what it will look like isn't quite so clear. Kurzweil's very human (and quite poignant) need to see his beloved father again has perhaps colored his predictions, making him think (hope?) it will happen in his lifetime. What starts off as a movie about fascinating theories and predictions becomes, finally, an unforgettable portrait of a brilliant but flawed man whose grief for his lost father has perhaps led him astray from his heretofore uncanny ability to predict where mankind will go next.

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Treasure Hunter's Guide

KILLER STUFF

Killer Stuff and Tons of Money by Maureen Stanton, The Penguin Press, 2011

Antiques and collectibles are hot. If you don't believe me, take a look at cable TV. Cable channels are full of reality shows that follow the adventures of collectors and dealers as they search for treasures among heaps of un-treasure-like stuff. Shows like "Pawn Stars" and "American Pickers" are some of the most popular programs on cable, and it seems that viewers can't get enough of watching guys sifting through piles of garbage, hoping to find a few gems buried underneath. Now Maureen Stanton is making a contribution to the genre with Killer Stuff and Tons of Money, a

treasure hunt for those who'd rather read than watch television.

TONS OF MONEY Stanton follows around Curt Avery, an old friend from college who deals in antiques and spends his time alternating looking for things to sell and selling the things he finds for, hopefully, a considerable profit. Avery got his start in antiques by starting a collection of old bottles when he was 12, and when he found out that

he could make money by selling the rarest and finest of his bottles, he was hooked and on his way to becoming a serious antique dealer. These days, Avery is nothing if not serious; although he's still attracted to the little things, he knows that he can't waste his time buying and selling antiques that will only make him pocket change. He frequents the biggest antiques shows, and he trades in the goods that true antique afficianados are looking for.

Stanton tags along with Avery as he circles through flea markets and massive antique shows, relatively unknown auction houses and exclusive shows where dealers are allowed in only by invitation. She learns to appreciate the extensive knowledge of dealers; they must know their subjects inside and out or risk losing big, paying way too much for something that isn't valuable or letting a treasure slip away for much less than it's worth. Antique hunting is about getting lucky in that it's about stumbling upon the right object at the right time, but there's no luck involved in making the right deal; the deal is all about knowledge and skill.

Stanton's admiration for Avery and dealers like him lies not just in their expertise, but in their almost ineffable love for the objects they



pursue. They're in it to make money, but they chose this way to make money because they love antiques. They love the objects - their quality, their history, their beauty - and they have disdain for opportunists who chase dollars with no real appreciation for the antiques, or the buyers who want the "look" of an antique but don't really care if the object is the real deal or not. The dealers Stanton admires are purists. and they're overflowing with ethics and standards.

That's not to say that Stanton's book ignores everyone else. She takes a look at the world of forgers and unscrupulous dealers, and she examines the mainstream antiques taste makers like Martha Stewart and the clamoring hordes of buyers and sellers on eBay. There's much more to the antiques market than the serious dealers and collectors at the

loftiest shows. In fact, most of the market never goes near a dealer like Avery.

Killer Stuff makes one wonder exactly who makes up the mainstream antiques market and what they're buying. At the shows attended by Stanton and Avery the best stuff is snatched up by other dealers who make deals before the show even opens to the public, often in direct defiance of rules designed to keep them from doing so. When they're not selling, dealers roam through the shows looking for new things to buy, and one gets the sense that retail consumers are something of an afterthought in these circles. In the end, that's probably the

truth. The appeal of a show like "American Pickers" or "Antiques Roadshow" is its ability to serve up a dream, a chance to envision yourself finding a dusty, unappreciated object and then selling it for 10 times what you paid for it. In this economy, it's a little easier to buy things vicariously than it is to actually buy things, and it's likely that the thrill of watching a picker dig for gold has replaced the thrill of putting your own money on the line. Antiques dealers are the ones trading money and antiques; the rest of us are just enjoying the

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

Going to the Movies More Discretionary These Days "I'm going to the movies" That's a phrase I love, a phrase I sharing the evening, why leave the house?

used to say more often. This week I am far away from hustle, bustle and movie theaters. No hustle and bustle is bliss. No movie theater makes me as itchy as the mosquitoes, about the only creatures involved in hustle and bustle where I am.

Why don't I go to the movies more? That's the question I'm turning over in my head. It isn't because there aren't movies out there that I want to see. As soon as I'm back in the land of movie theaters, I'll be eager to see several films "now playing."

I admit I often whine about a shortage of quality among the big budget spectacles Hollywood produces, but filmgoers aren't limited to blockbusters. Since the financial meltdown of 2008, Hollywood has drastically reduced the number of midrange pictures it makes. (Mid-range pictures are movies without huge stars and their fees, a franchise or a lot of expensive special effects.)

But because there was a boom in theater construction a decade ago, there are screens to be filled! I'm as desperate a Gleek as anyone, but I won't be heading out to see the concert film of "Glee" when it hits screens, and I doubt that "movie" would have been made a decade ago.

There are so many movies, I can't keep up with seeing half of what is released. And though I'm not a summer blockbuster devotee, every time I've wanted to see a movie this summer, there has been something I wanted to see. I attended a screening this summer where the audience applauded at the end. No, it wasn't *Harry Potter*," which, when it ended, seemed to leave a melancholy pall over the audience. "The End" was really the end for Harry. Midnight in Paris is the movie that inspired the audience to applaud.

There are so many screens available, independent films are creeping back into the multiplex. You may not think of Woody Allen as an independent filmmaker. But with Midnight in Paris, he followed his formula. He makes movies with modest budgets. He brings them in on budget and on schedule. That's why people keep financing them. Midnight in Paris happens to be a real charmer and has been playing in multiplexes na-



What is on my "now playing" list? Cowboys & Aliens has been on my list since I heard about it – what a cool premise - a mash-up I can believe in. Plus, it stars Harrison Ford as a cowboy, which is kind of full circle for him. What is Han Solo but a space cowboy? Crazy, Stupid, Love sounds like just the kind of "how we love now" tale I'm sure I'll enjoy.

For this weekend, The Tree of Life, Terrence Malick's new philosophical treatise expressed as a film, is at the top of my list. I'll probably love it a lot and hate it a little. That's my guess going in. Whatever happens, I am eagerly anticipating the experience. (That's the best reason to go to the movies eager anticipation.)

Why don't I go to the movies more? Time is a factor, but it is and always has been a factor, so I can't use that excuse. I can watch movies at home? That's been true most of my life and hasn't really slowed me down. Plus, I'm a snob. Watching a movie at home, no matter how big the screen, just isn't the same as the event of going out and sitting in the dark, undistracted, with other moviegoers. Filmmakers make movies for the theaters; at least the good ones do. That's where they should be seen.

Television – great shows made for the small screen and the rhythms of home viewing - just keeps getting better. That's a factor in my viewing equation. That big decrease in midrange pictures produced by the studios has sent a lot of talented screen actors onto the small screen for regular work and

Broadcast television gets goofier. A casual surf of what's on includes relentless ads for shows that seem to consist entirely of dimwits doing dumb deeds. But there are exceptions. Sunday night used to be my favorite night to go out to the movies, a way to extend the week-end, but with "The Simpsons" and "Masterpiece Mystery" or "Masterpiece Classic"

Once you get to basic cable, the quality begins to escalate A recent episode of "The Closer" had many wonderful, humorous Chinatown riffs. Even if you didn't get them, there was Adam Arkin as a funny criminal and the comedy routine that is Flynn and Provenza.

When you get to premium cable, many shows are excellent. For my eyes, the current wave of great television began with "The Sopranos." From the first episode, "The Sopranos" gave me chills I usually need to go to the theater to get. HBO has been able to consistently produce great, varied series ever since, and that very positive formula has spread to other networks. There is no "Mad Men" (a show that bores me) without "The Sopranos."

Sadly, I think the main reason I don't go to the movies more lately is that between the cost and the atmosphere in the warehouse-like plexes, I feel a little underwhelmed by the experience as compared to other entertainments. Movies cost real money these days. Enough – \$9.50 for an evening ticket more if you indulge in 3D or IMAX - that I don't run out to see something (like The Smurfs) just to check it out. (Yep, I know, there is a discount house in town, but for me it is very inconveniently located, and there is still the issue of concession pricing and atmosphere.) If you want to add popcorn, candy and/or a beverage, that about doubles the price of your

For that kind of investment, are you going to check out a movie you kind of maybe want to see or pick another activity? There are plenty of local venues where for the cost of a movie with popcorn and a pop, you can hear great live music. eat decent food, have a beer and chat with your friends. That is real entertainment competition.

I'm going to the movies. I'll see you at the movies, the ones that look like they will tickle my fancy (but not on Sun-

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The Reboot of the Apes

Opening This Weekend: Two should-be-big flicks open this weekend, starting with sci-fi franchise reboot Rise of the Planet of the Apes, directed



director Jon Favreau's Cowboys & Aliens, despite very mixed reviews, took the No. 1 spot over last weekend, bringing in over \$36 million over its first three days. And while a No. 1 spot is never a bad thing, industry insiders predicted much higher sales for the film, which cost almost \$200 million to produce and promote. Starring box office studs Daniel "James Bond" Craig and Harrison "Indiana Jones" Ford, the film is slated to open soon overseas where, as a result of one of the most competitive box office lineups of all-time, it should very easily pick up some of the slack it's seeing now. We've not yet seen the flick, but probably will - once it hits either the dollar theater or the Red Box. Looks kinda formulaic and thin, despite boasting some obviously great production values.

More From the Box: Raja Gosnell's The Smurfs film, maybe the most universally panned major release yet of 2011, took the No. 2 spot last weekend, bringing in \$40 million worldwide and right around \$36 million in the U.S. over its first three days. You dummies. Captain America: The First Avenger, took the No. 3 spot, bringing in another \$25 million in the U.S., upping its 10-day total to \$117 million (\$170 million worldwide). Taking the No. 4 spot was Harry Potter and the Deathly Hallows Part 2, which brought in \$22

million over the weekend, upping

it's 16-day U.S. total to just under \$320 million and it's worldwide total to just over a billion. As it stands, Part 2 is already the No. 8 all-time grossing movie; before it's said and done, the film will easily take the No. 3 spot, passing The Return of the King and maybe even making a run at No. 2, Titanic. It's a great movie that will also likely win some awards come February. Rounding out the Top 5 at last weekend's box office was newbie comedy Crazy, Stupid, Love which brought in just under \$20 million in the U.S. over its first three days. We ScreenTimers checked out this flick over the weekend, this because we go to every movie starring Ryan Gosling. Unfortunately, we regret to tell you that Crazy, Stupid, Love is largely stupid, save for a few scenes involving Gosling and Emma Stone. Bummer. This stands as the first bad Goslingrelated flick ever. Ever. Dude's got taste. Look for him in Nicolas Winding Refn's very promising crime drama, Drive, in a few months. That film, which made quite the impression at this year's Cannes Film Festival, also stars Carey Mulligan, Bryan Cranston. Albert Brooks, Ron Perlman and Christina Hendricks. New to Home Video: Finally,

lots of great DVD releases are set to hit stands this coming Tuesday, August 9. Well, maybe not lots, but three pretty great comedies that all go quite well together: David Gordon Green's Your Highness, Greg Mottola's Paul and James Gunn's Super, starring Rain Wilson and Ellen Page. We've seen all three movies and, while none of them really offer any universal appeal. we think all three will obtain cult followings over the next few years. especially Green's Your Highness. a stoner/buddy/romantic fantasy comedy starring Danny McBride. James Franco, Zooey Deschnael, Natalie Portman, Justin Theroux and Toby Jones. All-star cast alert! We saw the flick the day it was released and were convinced it was awful upon first impression. Then we sat with it and, over time, came to feel much love for its Princess Bride-meets-"Eastbound and Down"-meets-Pineapple Express appeal. apple, tomato, mushrooms, onions and green peppers. Also, a salad of greens and basil leaves with balsamic vinaigrette. At 12.5% alcohol, nice and light – just uncomplicated, friendly, and pleasant. About \$14.

Chateau Le Grand Verdus 2009 Bordeaux Rosé – The English translation of the back of the label reads: "Crisp, voluptuous, aperitif, fruity, femininity, passion, lustrous, relaxation, pleasure, fragrant, candy, warmth, temptation, intensity, seductive, summer, modern, raspberry, aromatic, energy ..." (Jeez, I need a smoke.) While I won't cop to every term on that list, I will say that this is an exceptionally pleasant rosé. Made from cabernet sauvignon, cabernet franc, and merlot, this is a hearty rosé with plenty of fruit and a pleasant minerality. We grilled turkey burgers alongside some mushroom and Parmesan couscous and it went splendidly. Also was quite tasty on its own. An absolutely smashing deal at \$9, as well.

Chateau Ballan-Larquette 2009 Bordeaux Blanc – This one takes a hard but not unpleasant turn when you get to sipping it. It starts out with a very tart lemony zing but quickly mellows into a nice balance of mineral and fruit, which further mellows and finishes creamily instead of acidically. It's medium-bodied for a white Bordeaux, so it can handle some richer foods easily enough. We did mustard- and pretzel-crusted chicken breasts with some new potatoes sautéed with pancetta. Very tasty. Very interesting value and an excellent dinner white at \$10-14.

Chai de Bordes 2008 Bordeaux Rouge – Cracking this one, the nose was floral, almost lavenderish, to go along with some light berry scents. It's light bodied and fairly acidic with a cherry and mineral flavor. The finish is quite dry – tannic, but not harshly so. Reminds me a little of a Montepulciano d'Abruzzo, actually. A very pleasant and approachable Bordeaux. \$15-18.

Chateau du Cros 2009 Bordeaux Sauvignon – They call this a "field blend," which is a blend of two grape varieties planted together in the same vineyard. In this case it's largely Sauvignon blanc with a little Semillon and Muscadelle thrown in. It starts you with a fairly strong nose of apples and lemons. I found it to be minerally and sharply acidic, like a shot of "lemon juice light." Finishes slightly astringent. To me it seemed like a Bordeaux winemaker was trying to make something that tasted like Italian pinot grigio and just missed. It's a decent quaff and would go well with shellfish, especially raw ones, but at around \$16 you could likely find a better sipper.

Chateau Le Calvaire 2007 Bordeaux Superieur – I didn't really care much for this one at first sip. I opened it about three hours in advance and was hit with an "alcohol and grape." As a little of the alcohol dissipated, however, the wine opened quickly. The Calvaire had a really interesting nose of graphite and blackberries. Fairly full-bodied. On the tongue, more of that mineral to go with a substantial dose of dark fruit and some tannins that linger for a half minute or more. A good, big choice for Bordeaux if you're looking for something with a little more punch. It does seem to call for bitter and dark flavors alongside – grilled meat, dark chocolate, that kind of thing, especially after it's been open for awhile (a day wouldn't be bad, if you can wait that long). Pretty good deal at \$16.

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
