Three Girls Going Places

-----Feature • Those Darlins -----

Of the couple hundred or more local shows I've attended as a Fort Wayne resident, very few - maybe 10, definitely no more - hold any place at all in my pocked memory. Yet another victory for the makers of cheap, tasty, intoxicating beverages.

One of those very few, a barn-burner performance by the Nashville-based Those Darlins, comes to mind as clear as day. At the time, the three-girl-and-one-dude lineup was on a seemingly never-ending tour in support

of their 2009 eponymous debut, a twangy record with standouts like "Red Light Love," "Wild One" and "Snaggle Tooth Mama." By the time the girls made it to Fort Wayne, they were a different band than the one heard on said record. They had a whole new batch of songs and had, for the most part, become something of a rowdy rock n' roll band. That night the Darlins kicked and spit and partied, playing a blow-out set that captivated and energized everyone in the room.

Fast-forward to March 29 of this year. The Darlins are on the road somewhere, still going from town to town in their old van. On this day, their sec-

ond record, Screws Get Loose, hits iTunes and record stores shelves everywhere. The write-ups are great, and the record, released by the band's own Oh Wow Dang label, takes the No. 1 spot on one of the many Billboard charts. Suddenly, this little self-made band seems anew. No longer are they the folk-influenced Southern Belle types. Not hardly at all. In their places rises a garagepunk crew with a record full of hit songs.

Four months and many cities since, I find myself on the phone with Kelley Darlin, one of the best-spoken rocker types you're likely to come across. She is, once again, in a van somewhere in America, going from town to town with her bandmates, Nikki Darlin, Jessi Darlin and drummer Linwood Regensburg (who has seemingly played a big part in the band's fuller studio sound, playing not just percussion, but a fair share of guitar throughout the record).

"Yeah, we're in the van," Kelley laughs. "I think we're in the middle of the desert, driving through Arizona. It's only 94 here and it's 96 in Nashville, where we're mostly

Two weeks prior to our talk, I'd heard "Red Light Love" coming out of my television, playing over a Kia Sorento commercial. This, of course, would have to be my

"Our family members and friends get really excited when they see that commer-

cial," Kelley said with as much twang as a voice can handle. "In a way it's a big deal to them. It makes it more real to them, what we do. And I guess having your music played over and over again on national television is a nice perk we can't complain about."

Next up, I ask about the new Screws Get Loose, an album I've listened to many, many times since its still-recent release. Kelley, who has been talking about the record to phoners like myself for months, had very little to say. Call it phone fatigue. She told

me that the band drove down to The Living

Room Studio in Atlanta to record with Jeff Curtin who produced their first record. Atlanta? Fitting, I suppose, when you consider the current garage-rock-heavy reputation that town has.

Then, predictably, I ask Kelley to tell me about the week the record was released. I ask this because the Darlins are a true DIY band. They own their own label and leave their fingerprints on every piece of the puzzle that's gotten them where they are today. So, that DIY backbone in mind, I was curious to know how the huge amount of recent success felt after years of tireless work.

"Well, we were on tour when the new album came out. When our first album came out we did a big hometown release show with the Black Lips that was really hyped up. All our family and friends came and it was a big deal," Kelley explained, talking loudly over the howl of a nearby GPS unit. "But the new album just sort of came out while we were on the road. So even though the album made a bigger splash with national press and stuff, it didn't feel like as big of a deal as the first album. So it was just kind of like: this is what we do, I guess."

Eight of the record's 11 tracks were written or co-written by Jessi, the band's fiery little lead guitarist. Not surprisingly, Jessi had always come off as the most rock n' rollcentric member of the band, giving off some serious punk rock vibes in the band's music videos and live performances. (Kelley comes off as an indie rock/country belle hybrid while Nikki has a slacker/stoner/rocker appeal.) This in mind, I next ask Kelley about the band's new sound, another question I'm

sure she's been answering

"When we were playing out in support of the first album, it all just kept getting louder and more distorted. I think we kind of got tired of playing all acoustic, too," she said. "And after a while we added a drummer, which changed things, so it was just a natural progression to go from more country stuff to more rock n' roll type stuff. And we'd all been in rock n' roll bands before. But I think we still love to play old country music too.'

For those unfamiliar with the Darlins, the band started off as an all-female trio based out of Murfreesboro, Tennessee - a place

I'm told may be one of the most interesting small towns in the country.

"Most of our band lives in Nashville now, but I still live in Murfreesboro. It's just a college town, really, with a big school and a great music recording program," Kelley explained. "So there are a ton of musicians. And since it's a college town, more people there can afford the time to be creative. But things have maybe dropped off a bit. Ten years ago or so I think Murfreesboro had a better rock n' roll scene than Nashville, which is like 45 minutes away. But now Nashville has a great underground rock n' roll scene."

Living in two different towns after years of living together, in the same house, in Murfreesboro, Kelley told me, hasn't really changed anything. For the most part, she says, the band lives together in vans and hotel rooms, spending almost all of their time on the road over the last few years.

With a TV commercial that plays seemingly on the hour, a hit record and a solid touring reputation, I was curious to know what was next for the band.

"Well, we've been road testing some new songs already. Looking forward. I'm not even sure what genre you'd call the new stuff, but I think it's probably more girl group-y than the other stuff we've done."

A Side of Brogue

If you like your music fast and furious with a side of brogue and maybe a whiskey or two, then The Tossers are the band for you. Hailing from the Irish neighborhoods dotting Chicago's south side, The Tossers pile traditional Irish music into a blender, toss in healthy dollops of punk and rock and hit puree. What pours out is a flavorful concoction that will surely get your feet moving in ways you didn't think possible.

The Tossers bring their Celtic/punk fusion to the Botanical Roots Outdoor Concert Series Friday, August 19. Local Celtic/punkers The Staggerers open.

Named for the Shakespeare-era term for "throw-away" (the word also means commode, drunk or the bunk British currency the Irish rejected after their independence in the 1920s), The Tossers got their start in Chicago in 1992 when lifelong pals Tony Duggins, who plays mandolin and sings, and Bones, the band's drummer, decided to team up. They quickly pulled in bass/accordion player Dan Shaw and began playing bars and other venues around Chicago.

"They just started playing out wherever they could," guitar player Mike Pawula told me in a recent phone interview. "They played some all-ages clubs and eventually got more and more exposure."

The band released a couple of tapes (as in cassette tapes, for those of you too young to recall such ancient technology) in '94 and '95, when they signed with Thick Records, a Chicago label.

Pawula, who joined in 1999, said the years between the band's formation and roughly 2002 saw a number of lineup fluctuations. "There have been a lot of life changes in the last 18 years," he said. "People started families, moved, that sort of thing. But since about 2002 the lineup has been the same. That's when our violin player left and we got a fiddler."

Though not really looking for a replacement on the violin, Pawula said he and his bandmates had just finished a gig in Madison, Wisconsin and were at a party when a student from the University of Wisconsin introduced herself

"We met her and everyone liked her," he said. "We weren't really holding auditions, but she told us she was a fiddler and we asked to come on down and play. She really worked out well."

Rebecca Manthe, now in her ninth year

with The Tossers, is the only member of the band without Irish roots. Aaron Duggins, tin whistler and brother of Tony, rounds out the lineup. The band used to have a banjo player too, but he left to start a family.

The Tossers are often linked with other Celtic/punk/folk bands such as Flogging Molly, Dropkick Murphys and The Popes, bands that came along after The Tossers. Pawula said The Tossers' version of Celtic/punk is more roots-based than those other bands. "When it comes down to it we could play everything like the traditional music. We are more in line with traditional Irish music than some of the other bands. We feel very true to it, but, of course, we let our own influences permeate what we do."

In 2007, they opened for The Pogues on St. Patrick's Day in New York City. But the

As you walk through the city, you can feel the anticipation.

No, it's not anticipation for the upcoming football season, although that anticipation is obviously sweeping through the city

as well. The anticipation we're talking about is for the Rage on the River all-day concert at Headwaters Park on August 20.

Sponsored by the soon-tobe-opened downtown club New York, New York, Rage on the River features six national rock bands along with one nationally known local band and two local bands with a lot of upside potential. It's a full day's worth of rock worthy of cities twice the size of Fort Wayne, but taking place right here in our own community and without that dreaded two-hour commute home.

According to event organizer Dino Zurzulo, one of the great things about Rage on the River is that it's not just another rock concert; it actually fills a need. "There haven't been any rock shows scheduled downtown for a long time. We thought there should be. We have Country Fest, tribute bands and the occasional rap or hip-hop show downtown, but rock seems to have been missing for a while. We wanted to fill that void and at the same time give people an-

other reason to come downtown for a day."

This isn't Zurzulo's first shot at presenting a rock show. He also runs the Original Beer Tent on Columbia Street that brought Egypt Central, Ricochet and several others into an

outdoor setting last year. This is the basically same thing but on a much larger scale. "We're going to have vendors, food and booths to create a festival-type atmosphere," Zurzulo said. "It's an all-ages event, so we want there to be something for everyone to do. It's not just a beer tent. It's one of the biggest parties of the summer."

Headlining the event are Fort favorites Halestorm. Hailing from Pennsylvania, Lzzy Hale and company have played Fort Wayne several times, even before the release of their 2009 self-titled debut album. Now touring in support of their live CD/DVD, Live in Philly, and their EP of cover songs called ReAnimate, Halestorm continue to grow their fan base and build anticipation

for their upcoming sophomore effort, tentatively scheduled for an early 2012 release. In a recent interview with Revolver magazine, Hale said, "The new songs sound amazing! We're experimenting with different guitar tones and pushing ourselves outside of our comfort zones so there will be many weird



little nuances and surprises for you!"

As for a covers album being released so early into their career, Hale says it's all part of the process for the band.

"It's amazing how much

you grow as a musician and a songwriter by learning some of the greatest songs ever written. What I'm applying to our new record is the resistance to settling and the confidence in knowing that there really is no limit to how much you can actually pull off"

Though no new songs are likely to be played at this show, you can count on Hale bringing one of the best voices in rock to the stage and melting many faces while she belts out "I Get Off," "It's Not You" and possibly Skid Row's "Slave to the Grind."

Also on the bill are All That Remains, fresh off their Piere's appearance opening

C2G The Year of Giving Generously Music Hall

If it ever feels like basic civility is sometimes lacking in this world, or that the desire to help is made difficult by a problematic economy, it may hearten you to know that opportunities abound to make the world a better place. If you doubt it, look no fur-

ther than Lending a Hand, an organization begun by area realtor Julia Fiechter to help facilitate giving to local charitable organizations. Although Lending a Hand has wellestablished itself in the community, partnering with 10 local agencies, its profile is about to get much higher when on August 18, the official kickoff to the Year of Lending a Hand takes place downtown.

Taking center stage that Thursday at the weekly Lunch on the Square at Summit Square, a regular gathering of food, music and information sponsored by the Downtown Improvement District, Lending a Hand will feature the official sanctioning of the city (via an appearance by Mayor Tom Henry) and the launch of the official theme song

of the endeavor as well. That's right – the official theme song. Not only will the song play live that day, but most of Fort Wayne's radio stations will debut "Everyday People" at the noon hour, providing an unusual bit of media synchronicity. It figures to be a song heard around town a lot in the weeks and months ahead.

"I approached Jen Fisher from Sugar Shot about writing a song for the program," says Fiechter. "She works at the Chamber of Commerce in addition to playing in the band, and she just really understood what I wanted. When I heard the song, there wasn't one word that had to be changed. It was perfect. It's been a gift, nothing but a gift."

The song avoids the usual trappings of charity efforts, maintaining the band's country rock sound which features Fisher's edgy vocals. The message is there, that "Everyday People" can make a difference in their community, but it manages to be presented in a remarkably upbeat musical format. Appropriate for the various formats of Fort Wayne radio, Fiechter has been pleased with how the local stations have embraced it.

"I just had a sit-down conversation with

all of them – Summit, Federated Media, Majic – and they were on board from the start. I was so happy with the way it's been received."

Even the recording of the song has brought out the best in local businesses, with Sweetwater Sound providing studio time and talent pro bono to help the cause. A



video will premiere in the weeks ahead, one which will feature the celebration downtown on August 18. But more than providing music to the area. Fiechter's real mission is one which has fueled her entire career - make it possible for people to help local agencies through these challenging economic times. With a base of 10 organizations involved - the Carriage House, Community Harvest Food Bank, Erin's House for Grieving Children, FWFC/FWPD Fallen Hero Fund, Fort Wayne Habitat for Humanity, Special Olympics of Allen County, Mad Anthonys Children's Hope House, Project Linus, SCAN and Turnstone Center for Children and Adults with Disabilities - Fiechter found an easy way for businesses to get involved.

Keytags. That's the program in a nutshell. Just as similar tags work to provide discounts at stores around town or help to identify you at fitness centers and service agencies, those little things can help move mountains for those in need. Participating businesses (a list can be found at the Lending a Hand website, JFLendingaHand.com) will swipe the tag, which will result not only in a donation to one of the organizations but may also provide the user with specials and discounts, providing an added incentive to participate. It really has been as easy as just getting the businesses to participate.

"When we started out planning this whole thing, it was going to be a week, one week of giving back," says Fiechter. "But we started coming up with all of these dif-

ferent ideas, and the week was just so packed. Finally, as we were trying to figure out how to make it work, I said to everyone 'Forget it, we're scrapping it.' They looked at me like I was crazy and said 'But we've done all this work how can you forget it?' I said, 'We're not going to do a week; we're going to do a whole year.' I figure if we do this right there won't be anyone who won't know about Lending a Hand. You'll have to be living under a rock to miss it."

The big kickoff should provide the initial lift, but Fiechter knows that it takes more than one big day to start a movement. And make no mistake, while Fiechter may be looking at the next 12 months, her contagious enthusiasm, effusive personality and intense passion for what she does suggests

much more than a year of giving. She's already imagining what might happen if she takes this effort nationwide.

In the meantime, she awaits Thursday's celebration and unveiling of the musical effort Sugar Shot has provided. With a live performance at Summit Square that day, and an opportunity for folks to get to know the music of Sugar Shot better along the way. Fiechter sees this as a chance for everyone to win. She encourages the community to join the fun that day, where keytags will be available, or to visit the website to find out how you or your business can enjoy both the perks and the opportunity to give back afforded by Lending a Hand.

"The name of the organization comes from the quote 'The measure of a man is one who lends a hand.' It's printed on the keytags, and it just resonates for me. I just want this to be a really positive thing for everyone, and no one will be left out of this. This is a great chance for kids to learn the power of giving, for them to carry the keytags and to see how easy it is to make a difference. People just need to see that it can be so easy to help, that everyone can really do it."

Kelley then stops herself. There's some noise in the van. A lost GPS signal, maybe. Some sort of confusion and chatter. When Kelley returns she starts talking, unprompted.

"We toured Australia this last December. There's a label there that's releasing our albums to the Australian market," she tells me, "so we're taking on Australia just as we have the U.S. – touring and touring and touring. So next I suppose we'll go somewhere else and keep working towards world domination."

Lastly, I'm curious to know if the dynamics have changed. From the outside it seems as if the three-headed monster of Nikki/Jessi/ Kelley has shifted, replaced by a full band dynamic that appears to be fronted by Jessi, a great songwriter with amazingly bratty vocals. "The dynamics haven't really changed. Jessi just had a lot of songs when we were ready to record," I'm told. "Nikki had some great stuff, but she was recovering from a broken arm, so that was a setback in a way. I think for the next album we'll all really contribute as we always have. So it's the same creative dynamic."

Kelley continues talking as the signal comes in and out, most of her words lost in the bad cell reception of the Arizona desert. Before hanging up she offers me a parting pleasantry I'd never before received

"So just call me back whenever if you need to ask me something," she says, twangier than ever. "I'll probably just be in this van, going somewhere."


Nancy DeVincent, noted WOWO personality, dies

For better than 50 years, from 1941 to 1995, 1190 WOWO was heard not just in immediate vicinity of Fort Wayne, but up and down the eastern seaboard of the United States. The AM station broadcast continuously at 50,000 watts of power, and from sundown to sunrise the stations directional antennas were aimed at the eastern United States. (This newspaper's publisher, in fact, remembers the station as one of the few he could pick up on his transistor radio while attending school in Virginia's Shenandoah Valley during the late 60s and early 70s.)

WOWO personalities like Bob Sievers, Jay Gould, Earl Finkle and Dugan Fry were known not just in Fort Wayne but throughout the eastern half of the U.S., and the station's "world famous fire escape" was, in fact, world famous.

World famous, too, was "The Little Red Barn Show," which aired from 1945 to 1994. The show was hosted by music director Sam DeVincent and his wife, Nancy Lee, of Nancy Lee and the Hilltoppers. The group – Sam on accordion, Nancy on guitar, Jack Carmen on violin and Roy Hansen on bass - regularly performed on "The Hoosier Hop," which was broadcast coast to coast on what was then known as the NBC Blue Network (later to become ABC). They also recorded a number of records and appeared with such national stars as Gene Autrey, Roy Rogers and Hoagy Carmichael.

Nancy Lee DeVincent passed away pm Thursday, Aug. 4, in Fort Wayne at the age of 92. Her husband, Sam, died in 1997. She is survived by a son, Larence S. DeVincent, a daughter, Lori P. John Minton

The Hills Are in Bloom

I have a very long and extensive love for metal, so when I first popped in *The Hills Are in Bloom*, the CD from Indiana University professor John Minton, I thought, "Oh boy. another boring bluegrass disc." But my early childhood ears were saturated with bluegrass and country music,



and I have a very open mind, so I gave it a shot. I'm glad I did. *The Hills Are in Bloom* is a very polished production, and John Minton is a masterful songwriter/lyricist with a grand vision and killer sense of humor. The CD is loaded with lots of witty phrases and one-liners throughout.

On this, his third solo album, Minton takes everyday, mundane subject matter and crafts it into something fun and, at times, a bit unusual. He spins every track on the disc into a short story that can easily be played out and seen in the mind's eye – kind of like a little movie. Minton covers everything from DUI's to greed to heartbreak and lust with great ease and a simplistic flow. The hooks are very catchy and well thought out, especially on the songs "Your Brain Has Got A Mind All It's Own" and "Pick Poor Robin Clean."

The musical stylings are absolutely bluegrass, but mixed with obvious influences that combine Bill Monroe, a young Elvis, Johnny Cash, dirty blues and rockabilly. Minton has a real talent for taking you back in time, and the entire CD has a very "old school" feel and utilizes a plethora of different instruments and sounds without being overwhelming. Every sound has a very subtle feel, like a cool breeze on a lazy Sunday afternoon in the sunshine.

The Hills Are in Bloom is the kind of CD that targets lovers of all things old and from a simpler time, but can be enjoyed by fans of most any kind of music, and that's by no means an easy task to accomplish. (Michael "Myke D" Deaton)

Antlers

Burst Apart

The record that broke Brooklynbased indie rockers Antlers, 2009's *Hospice*, was simultaneously a perfecting of their early sound and hint of something bigger. The record, essentially high concept art-rock approached in a minimalist fashion, ended up doing quite well after Frenchkiss



Records cleaned it up and gave it worldwide distribution, earning some of the best reviews of 2009. Now, just two years later, we have *Burst Apart*, a 10-song make-or-break epic full of grand ideas, surprises and ... well ... an oft-debilitating problem.

Let's start with the bad, the blanket issue with this very good record: the production. On past records Peter Silberman (the head Antler) made somewhat lo-fi, modest recordings of songs that seemingly always wanted to be bigger than the limitations of being a struggling band would allow. It was a sound/formula that worked very well for the songwriter, especially on Hospice. For Burst Apart, a record bound to see quite a bit of attention, Silberman could do just about anything he wanted – and, thus, the sound is different. It's bigger and cleaner, at times resembling contemporaries like Grizzly Bear, Mercury Rev and even Radiohead. And while the music benefits from the improved recording approach, Silberman's vocals suffer dearly. Previously buried in the mix and coming off a bit rough, Silberman here almost sounds like a show choir kid, howling away in a sometimes off-putting manner that can only be described as overly dramatic, even effeminate. I suppose the same thing could be said about Radiohead's Thom Yorke, but there's something about the vocals on Burst Apart that I just can't get over. It's almost as if Silberman is attempting to keep his artsy credentials while also taking aim at the abandoned Coldplay fans.

After a few spins I found that *Burst Apart*'s vocals neither grew on me nor ruined the record. Mainly, I'd been absolutely won over by the compositions on *Burst Apart*, easily some of 2011's most interesting. Best described as "electronic chamber pop," the sound here is actually quite organic, feeling very hypnotic and dense, at times carrying the songs as Silberman, thankfully, falls into the background, singing wordless melodies as horns blow in the distance and countless layers of subtle piano and guitar twist into a haunting mix. The playing and mix is very intricate and detailed, making for a re-

Melvins

Bullhead (1991)

From the opening riffs in "Boris," you stumble and crawl around this audio battlefield for eight minutes trying to figure out who they sound like. Is it Sabbath or a slowed-down version of Deep Purple? It doesn't matter; most



Melvin fans don't care if you can't fit them into a genre. I don't think it matters to the band either.

Formed in the mid-80s, these were the guys who started the grunge revolution in the northwest United States. *Bullhead*, their third release on Boner Records featured Dale Crover on drums, Roger 'Buzz' Osborne on guitars and vocals and Lori 'Lorax' Black on the bass. About the record: it's really, really good. After "Boris" you are treated to the usual two- to four-minute Melvins songs that you are more accustomed to.

"Anaconda" is Soundgarden with a dash of Dead Kennedys, and "Ligature" is dark and metallic in its taste. "It's Shoved" starts off with a fat bass and drums until you get the guitars and feedback you think you rightly deserve. "Zodiac" follows and is an introduction for anybody who wants to start a band – simple chords, changes and stiff 70s punk arrangements with a little acid rock. It would sound great in your garage.

"Your Blessened" starts off like a sound check and then riffs away for five minutes. Sure, it sounds like the rest of the record, but it has a Black Flag vibe to it – not a bad thing. The album closes with "Cow," a heavy jam that comes with what I would describe as a drum solo on mushrooms.

The Melvins have had a lot of members since the beginning (Lorax left in the mid 90s), but I would take this record over anything else they ever did. Fun fact: Lori Black's mother is 1930s child star Shirley Temple. (*Dennis Donahue*)

cord that rewards familiarity.

Opener "I Don't Want Love" is a hook-filled, left-field chamber pop tune that feels very much like the kind of hip song you'd hear during a tender moment on a show like "Grey's Anatomy" or "Gossip Girl." If Antlers are destined to have a breakout single, this is very likely the one that will do it. Standouts "Tiptoe," "Hounds," "Parentheses," "Rolled Together" and "French Exit" wisely don't rely on Silberman's voice, using vocals only to add to the powerful playing and arranging —not vice-versa. Playing these five songs together, outside the structure of the album, brought to mind Sigur Ros, a much different sounding band who have had similar issues with recording and mixing their vocals over the years.

What we end up with is a very good record that could've so easily been great. Imagine a bigger, more organic version of Boards of Canada mixed with Grizzly Bear and you'll have an idea of what the compositions on *Burst Apart* sound like. Now, if only we could mute those cheesy sex vocals, or at least bury them in the mix, similar to how they were treated on *Hospice*. Find a way to do that and you just might have the best record of 2011 on your hands. Either way, *Burst Apart* is most definitely worth getting to know. (*Greg W. Locke*)

more important dates came when The Tossers finally made it to Ireland and Europe in 2008. "We played Belfast and Dublin," Pawula said. "The crowd in Dublin was fantastic. We had a good old time."

The Tossers have released seven full-length albums, the most recent being *On a Fine Spring Evening*, which came out in 2008. An earlier record, 2000's *Long Dim Road*, made the Illinois Entertainer's 2006 list of the best 25 CDs from the previous decade. Others on that list included records from notables such as Smashing Pumpkins, Alkaline Trio, Disturbed, R Kelly and Mavis Staples.

The band's bio says that, while The Tossers live shows are "fueled with a little bit of blood and sweat and a whole lot of whiskey and beer, their albums are dedicated to musical elegance and provocation." For Pawula, the "provocation" may come from the Jameson's Irish Whiskey he prefers, but the elegance comes from a love of the traditional melodies and lyrics of Irish music.

"We find ways to reinvent it and have fun with it," he said. "We've been at it so long we don't know what else to do."







Insidious

There are parts of director James Wan's Insidious that are so scary you briefly question your judgment in having chosen to watch it for, you know, the purposes of "light" entertainment. In fact, there's a brilliantly staged and edited 10-minute sequence about a third of the way in, taking place in the middle of the night, that manages to terrify us in at least half a dozen ways. And by "terrify" I mean the old-fashioned, slow-building kind of dread and fear that has largely been replaced with simple "gotcha" moments in most modern horror movies. It's a scene that rivals anything in The Strangers and even Poltergeist, even if it doesn't come close to generating the kind of deep-seated terror found in The Exorcist or Paranormal Activity. (Insidious is co-produced by Oren Pelli, who created Paranormal Activity, though the two movies rely on a completely different bag of tricks to raise our collective goose-bumps.)

Insidious starts soon after the Lambert family has moved into a new home. While explor-

ing up in the attic, 8-year-old Dalton (Ty Simpkins) falls and hurts himself. Even though he seems okay at the time, within hours he has slipped into an unexplained coma that lasts months, with no sign of improvement on the horizon. Dalton's stay-at-home mother Renai (Rose Byrne) is at her wit's end as increasingly strange and upsetting events begin to occur around the house, while Renai's husband Josh (Patrick Wilson), a teacher, spends more and more time away from home, in denial that anything is wrong. Dalton's brother Foster (Andrew Astor), meanwhile, claims to have seen Dalton walking around the house in the middle of the night ...

Things get worse from there, and I don't want to spoil the fun by even suggesting some of the chilling events that await. You'll just have to trust me when I say that, for the better part of its first hour, Insidious is top-notch horror.

The second half of the movie, though, goes too far in the direction of outlandish explanations and silly more-is-more imagery. The climax elicits something closer to laughter than gasping - too many ghosts, too much everything-but-the-kitchen-sink surrealism - and though the movie as a whole isn't as ridiculously over the top as, say, 1408 from a few years ago, its still a little too much Disney Haunted Mansion in its set design, with not nearly enough stuff left to our imagination.

If you think about the plot too long, certain weaknesses and unanswered questions begin to emerge, questions that make you realize the whole is substantially less than the sum of its parts. But I hesitate to steer any horror aficionados away from Insidious. I don't normally recommend a movie just for a few scenes, but I do here, because any horror movie that makes your flesh crawl like this one does, at least in parts, is worth checking out.

The Spanish horror film [REC] was a surprise hit when it came out in 2007, and the faithful American remake, Quarantine, was only slightly less wellreceived than its predecessor. (Both are excellent.) They did so well, in fact, that the Spanish language sequel has just been released on DVD, and the English language Quarantine 2 will be arriving straight to DVD any day now. The two sequels have very different plots, though, and it's hard to see how Quarantine 2, which takes place on an airplane, could measure up against [REC] 2, which takes place in exactly the same tenement building as the original.

Not only does it take place in the same building, it picks up within moments of where the first [REC] left off. (For this reason, I wouldn't recommend seeing the sequel until you've first seen part one, the more recently the better.)

As the first movie came to a close, you'll recall, intrepid TV journalist/heroine Ángela (Manuela Velasco) finds herself in some very deep doo-doo indeed in the building's attic. (The attic is where the contagion that has turned everyone around her into frenzied zombies originated.) [REC] 2 opens with

a heavily-armed SWAT team entering the blood-drenched building after being given only the vaguest of debriefings as to what actually awaits them within. (Everything we see comes from the small cameras affixed to their helmets.) Once they're inside the building the men are introduced to the mysterious man who's been placed in charge of the operation (Óscar Zafra), and within minutes one of the SWAT officers is being attacked by one of the

At one point during this intense first act of the movie, the officers encounter a group of teenage kids, one of whom is holding a camcorder of his own. The second act of the movie shows what these kids see, from their camera's point of view, until the two storylines converge for the climactic third act. What the teens go through is much more disturbing to us because we get to know each of them a lot better than we do the SWAT officers, who never really differentiate themselves in our minds enough for us to care about them when they start getting killed off. [REC] 2 explains more about how and why the rabies-like contagion came to exist in the first place. (Hint: the Vatican is involved, and the contagion

creepy-as-hell zombie creatures. And things only get

worse from there.



Malick's Sweeping Vision of Life, Death & Humanity in Jack's childhood we are told that there are two paths in life

The title *The Tree of Life* suggests that any work bearing this name is a work of ambition and probably some seriousness. These are not qualities in vogue in the world of moviemaking in our time, so it may be easy to discount or ignore the title as you head off to the theater. But do keep in mind, this is not a Brad Pitt movie, though Pitt gives a bracing, memorable performance. The Tree of Life is a Terrence Malick movie.

What does that mean? A lot. It means you are watching a film directed by a man who studied philosophy with Stanley Cavell at Harvard, graduating with highest honors. He became a Rhodes scholar but never finished his studies. This didn't stop him from publishing his own translation of Heidegger, "The Essence of Reasons."

With this training he became a filmmaker, making films unlike the films of anyone else working today. He doesn't make many films. He doesn't make just any film, and he doesn't make a film that isn't completely his to shape. Watching his movies is to be in the world of a real artist. That's not always

I've seen three of his previous four commercially released films. His first two films, Badlands and Days of Heaven, are two of my favorite films. I found The Thin Red Line maddening. I loved it and hated it. I saw it twice in the theater. I loved how brilliantly it evoked the tremendous waste and sickness of war. I hated how Malick's gorgeous and visual language sometimes went off the track indulgently breaking the spell.

Because of my love/hate relationship with The Thin Red Line I dilly-dallied when The New World was released. I knew I should see it, but I fretted that what I hadn't liked would loom large in a retelling of the relationship between Pochantas and John Smith. The picture didn't linger in town, and I missed it. (Malick's films are so visual I can't bring myself to rent it and watch it, not how it was made to be seen.)

I have vowed never to miss a Malick film in theaters again. Seeing The Tree of Life makes it easy to know I will keep that vow. I experienced some twitchiness and frustration, but mostly I was thrilled and delighted to be caught up in Malick's vision and expression of the world. I see so many mov-



ies. It is very relaxing to be in hands of someone who really knows what he is doing and makes almost impossibly beauti-

The Tree of Life is the first Malick film to include characters living today. Most of the film is set in Waco, Texas in the 1950s (it was shot in another Texas town, Smithville). But, as I had read, and you may have heard, the film includes the beginning of the world, a glowing essence that seems to be God, the end of the world, dinosaurs, volcanic eruptions, cells splitting, birth, decay and, everywhere, the hint of death.

I watched, worrying that I might find the lapses into natural phenomena an irritating distraction. Instead, I found these glorious and a welcome bit of breathing away from the cosmic questioning, the nearly silent pleas for understanding. Every frame of this movie is gorgeous, and the soundtrack by Alexandre Desplat and sprinkled with Brahms and Berlioz adds to

The film begins with a quote from Job, "Where were you when I laid the foundations of the earth?" Then we meet Jack, an adult businessman, played by Sean Penn, working in and among gleaming office towers in Texas. He is grieving and remembering. We are told that Jack's younger brother died many years earlier at the age of 19. This tragedy still haunts Jack, and we spend much of the film in the world of childhood

I don't think any filmmaker working today is as good as evoking innocence as Malick. With almost no words (many of the words are heard in quiet mumbled voice-over and dialogue is sparse) the world from a child's point of view is achingly, accurately portrayed. Life is safe and lazy, full of discovery, running around outside and tussling with friends and family.

What we see are little snippets of life. When we first arrive

- the way of nature and the way of grace. In this family, Dad is nature, and Mom is grace. We see bits of the parents together. bits of the brothers together and bits the boys with each par-Just because narrative and words aren't primary doesn't

mean the actors aren't essential. Though it is a mostly happy family, there are bits of turmoil and upset, and the actors have to express a lot without many words. Pitt is especially good. With his crewcut and modest ap-

pearance, he affects a middle-aged, slightly beaten down stance and walk that tells us a lot and is the opposite of the smooth demeanor he wears as a con man in any of the Ocean

His eruptions of temper, disappointments and passions are mysterious to his sons, Hunter McCracken as the young Jack and Laramie Eppler as R.L. The dynamic of being part of a family and still not really understanding what is happening and why is eloquently realized. Jessica Chastain is an angel of a mom, keeping the happiness and peace of the family by paying close attention to what everyone needs.

There is no driving narrative in The Tree of Life. Ideas. events and questions flow back and forth, and because they are so sharply observed and expressed, I could, for the most part, suspend my usual need for narrative. But by the end the weight of the sorrow coming – and becoming the sorrow that is always there – was exhausting and almost unbearable.

I knew that in Malick's world there was no resolution to this calling out to the universe, "Why all this beauty and love if it all disappears into suffering and death?" So when the beauty and mystery give way, what's left feels frustratingly hollow. But most of The Tree of Life is beautiful and strikes such a resonant chord that I'm sure I'll be haunted by its images and the struggles of one Texas family.

The End of Summer

Opening This Weekend: With the summertime competition finally slowing a bit, four new films are set to see wide distribution this week, none of which feeling too much like huge sell-

ers. First is 30 Minutes or Less, a Ruben Fleisher (Adventureland) adventure comedy starring Jesse Eisenberg, Aziz Ansari and Danny McBride. It will be funny and probably kinda dumb and predictable. Franchise flick Final Destination 5, directed by Steven Quale, opens, as does Tate Taylor drama The Help, starring Emma Stone, Bryce Dallas Howard, Sissy Spacek and Viola Davis. The flick, based on Kathryn Stockett's novel of the same name, looks good enough and will probably see quite a bit of attention for its subject matter. If it weren't for the involvement of producers Chris Columbus and Mark Radcliffe, I'd have written the film off long ago, as I came to know the director, Tate, as a mediocre face actor who once upon a time directed an F-minus piece of trash called Pretty Ugly People.

Tops at the Box: Director Rupert Wyatt's Planet of the Apes prequel, Rise of the Planet of the Apes, opened big last weekend, bringing in \$54 million in the U.S. over its first three days and an additional \$24 million abroad. Starring James Franco, John Lithgow, Freida Pinto and Brian Cox, this future blockbuster is getting great reviews and will thus, unfortunately, probably have a sequel in preproduction before the end of the year. We didn't see the movie this weekend, instead opting for a second viewing of Terrence Malick's beautiful, poignant fifth film, The Tree of Life. We'll check out Apes eventually, though not with baited breath - and not before a third viewing of Tree. Why not? C'mon, those apes look like the straight-up cheese sauce.

More From the Box: Taking the No. 2 spot last weekend, unfortunately, was The Smurfs, selling another \$21 million in tickets, upping its 10-day total to \$76 million in the U.S. and \$130 million worldwide. Reviews are about as bad as they come for this one. Taking the No. 3 spot last weekend was Jon Favreau's Cowboys & Aliens, an under-performing wannabe blockbuster starring Harrison Ford and Daniel Craig. The film brought in \$16 million over the weekend, upping it's 10-day domestic total to \$67 million - still a far cry from becoming a profitable movie. Rounding out the Top 5 were newbie comedy The Change-Up, starring Ryan Reynolds and Jason Bateman, and comic book flick Captain America: The First

Avenger, selling \$13.5 million and \$13 million, respectively, in the U.S. CapAm has already sold \$143 million in tickets over its first 17 days in the U.S. (\$246 million worldwide). ScreenRant: Most folks, stud-

ies say, pick the movies they watch due to three things: (1) advertising and acclaim; (2) actors starring in the film; and (3) the story/style of the film depicted in the trailer or clips seen on TV. There's also, of course, buzz to consider. Cinephiles, while every bit as aware of these factors as casual moviegoers, often have a different set of criteria. First, actors and directors matter very much. Especially directors. Then there are writers, producers and studios to consider. And, probably most importantly (though they'll never admit it). there are the reviews. The most serious cinephiles consider all these things and more. And when I say more, I mean editors and cinematographers. We at the ScreenTime offices very often find ourselves watching movies we wouldn't otherwise watch simply because of who held the camera. Trust us, it matters. It really matters. While we're not going to go into deep detail about our all-time favorite cinematographers, we will list a few to get you geeks and future geeks started. First off is Christopher Doyle who has shot many of the most beautiful movies of the last 30 or so years, including Hero, In the Mood for Love, The Limits of Control and Chungking Express. Also brilliant is Roger Deakins. who many know for his nine Oscar nominations and 11 collaborations with the Coen Brothers. Other movies shot by Deakins include A Beautiful Mind, Sid and Nancy, The Shawshank Redemption. Jarhead and more. A few more cinematographers with bodies of work worth looking into: Janusz Kaminski, Sven Nykvist, Robert Richardson, Tak Fujimoto, Nestor Almendros, Wally Pfister, Vilmos Zsigmond, Emmanuel Lubezki. Michael Ballhaus and Robert Yeo-New to Home Video: Com-

ing out on DVD and Blu-ray this coming Tuesday, August 16: Jane Eyre, Hoodwinked Too! Hood vs. Evil, Meet Monica Velour, Priest, Something Borrowed, That's What I Am, The Bang Bang Club, The Ward, The Grace Card and The Conspirator. Holy mediocrity!

for Hollywood Undead a month or so ago; additional Fort favorites Sick Puppies and Nonpoint; a rare appearance by Powerman 5000; and upand-coming Canadian rockers Redlight King.

In addition, Rage on the River has a distinct local flavor. The local/national band mentioned earlier is Downstait, while the other two bands are Kill the Rabbit and Soma. According to Jerrdog, host of the Local Licks show on 98.9 The Bear, "We, along with Dino, thought it would be cool to have some local bands on a big show like this because it shows people that The Bear supports the local scene. We sometimes hear complaints from bands that want to open for national acts at other venues, but contrary to popular belief, we do not pick the bands at shows we sponsor. This is one of the rare chances to show off some local talent, and I think these three bands will do a great job."

Local bands were chosen for the show by looking at the Fort rock scene as a whole and picking out a few of the bands that are having the most impact at the moment. "Downstait was a pie-in-the-sky dream," Jerrdog said. "They currently have three songs featured every week on 'WWE Monday Night Raw' and another song on MTV's 'Road Rules/Real World Challenge.' We actually didn't think they would want to play this show because, as you know, local bands don't get paid. But to their credit, they were like, 'Hell yeah, we'll do it!""

Kill the Rabbit, playing second on the bill, are one of the hottest bands in the area right now, having won the *whatzup* Battle of the Bands last year and being voted Performer of the Year by *whatzup* readers. Jerrdog says "KTR are one of the most diverse and popular bands in the scene and have a great fan base that always comes out and supports the band."

The addition of Soma to the bill provides a high-energy, up-and-coming band from the area with a frontman, Johnny Soma, who promotes his band like no other band in the area. "Truth be told," Jerrdog continued, "there were a lot of other bands we would have liked to ask as well, but we only had three slots, so these are the ones we chose."

Shows like Rage on the River don't come to northeast Indiana very often, so the opportunity is here to show promoters and national bands that The Fort can rock out with the best of 'em.

"We're planning on doing this every year," said Zurzulo, "as well as doing another show on Columbia Street next summer, so we're hoping this show will be a success" and a beginning point of even bigger shows to come. "I like downtown Fort Wayne a lot so we want to use it as much as possible for whatever we have going on in the future."

wasn't exactly cooked up in Orville Redenbacher's test kitchen.) This might be the only movie I've seen that combines tropes from both zombie movies and movies about demonic possession.

I missed the slow build-up that helped make the first [REC] so good, a build-up which allowed us to laugh along with the characters' bantering and flirting, and which also provided us with a sense of realism and normalcy before the horror began. In part two, there is no descent, no downtime; the stakes are never anything less than extremely dire from the get-go. After awhile this gets a bit exhausting, especially since we don't really ever get to know the characters that well. Still, filmmakers Jaume Balaguero and Paco Plaza employ even more formal ingenuity here than they did in their first movie, and so much loving care has been given to the sheer visual cleverness of the whole thing (and the terrific if modest special effects) that it seems churlish to complain.

Compared to part one, [REC] 2 is a distinct disappointment, but compared to 98 per cent of the other horror movies out there, it more than holds its own.
