Whole Lotta Zeppelin

Moser Woods' Rick Kinney has some big ideas when it comes to the Fort Wayne

music scene. One of those ideas was Zoso, the Ultimate Led Zeppelin Experience.

Kinney is the go-to man for this year's Zoso show at the Foellinger Theatre. He's slinging tickets, working promotions, making sure the band and sound are operating at maximum capacity – all on top of playing drums for Moser Woods, Zoso's opening act for the September 10 show. Why? A contagious love of music.

The goal, he said, is to build capital for the local music scene and bring great bands to Fort Wayne. "I played it a little safe with Zoso. They are a household name, nationally known," said Kinney. "Zoso's not a cheap imitation - they are the closest thing to the real deal that I've ever seen. That's one of the reasons I signed on for this project and put Moser Woods out in front of it."

Zoso are hailed around the nation as being *the* best Led Zeppelin tribute band out there today in both appearance and sound. With an aggressive tour

schedule averaging more than 150 gigs a year, they have played more live shows than Led Zeppelin ever did. And all that touring has led to new Zeppelin fans being recruited into the fold.

"I've seen a lot of bands, and Zoso is top-notch," praised Kinney. "They have their niche figured out. They perform as a representation of the band members. It's not about them; it's about Zeppelin."

Tribute bands, by their very definition, are a portrayal of the band being paid tribute. Every nuance is captured from clothes to hair to sound. But they tend to get mediocre reception.

Kinney agreed. "Tribute bands are not my favorite kind of band, especially tribute bands who are out there touring while the band they're paying tribute to is touring. That's not a tribute. That's competition."

That's where Zoso is unique.

"Zeppelin is not touring anymore, and they never will again. [Drummer] John Bon-

ham died," explained Kinney. "This is one of the few times that fans will get to experience this – a recreation for people who will never be able to see or feel the original Zeppelin's

music."

No one can deny Led Zeppelin's profound impression on the music scene. Zoso singer Matt Jernigan stated simply, "If you like rock n' roll, you have to like them." Zeppelin's music has been likened to a cultural experience more than just another rock band from the 70s.

"Zeppelin did a lot to change music," said Kinney. "A lot of the music from bands that we hear these days, in one way or another, wouldn't exist or exist in the same capacity if it weren't for Led Zeppelin. That band is one of the most influential bands in

Led Zeppelin's music has been called timeless. It has been appealing to the masses since their formation in 1968. "They weren't just rock musicians; they were great com-posers," Jernigan said. "They

wrote a body of work that was ahead of its time, and that's why it stands up today."

Those who were fortunate to see last year's Zoso show in Fort Wayne know what to expect. For those less familiar the line-up, Jernigan claimed that there's "something for everyone" in their setlist, including Zoso exclusives.

"We do extended jam sessions of songs, like 'Dazed & Confused' and 'No Quarter' which a lot of other Zeppelin [tribute] bands don't do. It's virtually unheard of. Nobody really does it, but we do. We kind of took a chance in doing that, and it's worked out.'

A Zoso fan himself, Kinney said that the setlist is a balanced mix of new, old, well known and lesser known tracks. "They play the stuff that fans come to see like 'Kashmir' and 'When the Levee Breaks.' They'll do all the stuff that people come to hear, but then they'll do the stuff that you wouldn't expect."

Similarly, Kinney's band Moser Woods will be a unique experience as the opening act.

A harmonious melding of many different genres, Kinney described their sound as "an all-instrumental, heavy, mellow explosion." Their influences include names like King Crimson Rush, Tool, Pantera, Hendrix and (of course) Led Zeppelin Kinney was also quick to cite a classical influence along with a

dash of jazz and tribal.

Moser Woods have been winning the hearts of northeast Indiana natives since 2004. Some members have come and gone, but founding members Kinney (drums) and Lance Hoeppner (keys) have remained constant and focused.

"Lance and I have been working hard as a two-piece. We practice from 8 or 9 in the morning until noon during the week and then all weekend long," Kinney said. "We're your typical starving artists - we put every extra ounce of everything into our music.'

Kinney is dedicated to more than just his own band. I've never met anyone who eats sleeps and breathes music like he does.

Tired of hearing people complain that "there's nothing to do" in Fort Wayne, Kinney decided to put his production background and audio engineering skills to work "I figured, 'You know what? I live here. I'm

Fruit of the Vine Brews on Parade

There are probably as many ways to pick a wine as there are varietals. Those of us on the poorer side of the tracks tend to look at price tags. (Incidentally, a bottle of Winking Owl from Aldi will set you back \$3 and it ain't half bad.) Other quaffers are lucky enough to receive a great bottle from a good friend. (Try Orleans Hill Cote Zero if you know what's good for you. Zero sulfites and mucho flavor). Still others rely on the advice of experts, and the good news for amateur wine connoisseurs living in northeast Indiana is that it's a very good year for guided wine tastings.

Such educational events are, according to wine columnist Dan Stockman, growing in popularity and the reasons for the tasting boom are quite simple.

"People are often nervous when it comes to trying new wines," he said. "It can be an expensive gamble, and what tastings do is allow you to sample a large number of sometimes unfamiliar and even obscure wines in an economical and fun way. You can try lots of different kinds of wines without breaking

Stockman should know. He and his wife, Krista, have been writing a wine column together for seven years, and they also routinely share their hard-won knowledge with others at tasting events held throughout the year. They're currently planning the third in a four-part series offered by the IPFW Department of Continuing Studies that's one part tasting, one part workshop. The third installment, which will focus on how climate affects grapes around the world, will take place from 7-9 p.m. Thursday, September 15 at the Continuum Art Gallery in downtown Fort Wayne. The fourth tasting, with its focus on holiday wines, will also be held at the gallery on October 27.

"There is a lot of question-and-answer at these events," he said, "a lot of give and take. We'll sample six different wines, and they won't be the usual suspects. Big tastings are nice because you have a chance to see a lot of different wines, but smaller, more intimate affairs are great too. That's when you'll sample wines you've probably never heard of, and Krista and I are always advising people to try something new. Try a Gewurztraminer. Even if you can't pronounce it, if it's on the shelves here, chances are very good it's been Americanized and you'll like it. Plus, you'll have just had a

Speaking of something you've most likely never heard of, ponder this odd pairing: sports bar and fine wine. Champions Sports Bar recently launched one of the city's most popular (and cleverly named) tasting events. Wine About Wednesdays gets going at 5 p.m. every hump day in the courtyard shared by the bar and the downtown Marriott Hotel. According to Champions' Restaurant Manager Sharon Ballard, Wine About Wednesday started back in April as a way to give the city's wine lovers something

"At first we were just sampling our house wines for \$4 a glass - our Merlot, Cabernet, White Zinfandel and Chardonnay - but now we're featuring special wines for \$6 a glass," she said. "A wine rep comes in and talks to our customers about the wines, and we have live music and a great ambience. It's really growing. It's just a relaxed, nice way to spend an evening."

During the spring and summer months the tastings are held outside, allowing patrons to sniff, swirl and sip in the sun. As Wine About Wednesdays grows and the weather turns colder, the tastings will most likely be moved inside Champions. Don't think for a moment, though, that the event will lose one iota of refinement.

"Marriott is an upscale brand," Ballard said. "Our tastings are classy, down-toyet earth affairs.'

Jennifer and Jeremy Lutter know all about keeping things down to earth. The owners of The Blueberry Patch in LaOtto, this husband and wife dynamic duo recently opened Country Heritage Winery, full-service vineyard and winery where

patrons can sample everything from fruitbased wines (blueberry, cherry, red raspberry, black raspberry, cranberry) to a long list of whites and reds and even an ice wine made from grapes taken frozen from winter

Jennifer Lutter said opening the winery only made sense, considering that they always had extra blueberries at the end of harvest. It was also something Jeremy dreamed of doing ever since inheriting his 120-yearold family farm nine years ago. The winery is open daily, and patrons are welcome to sample the wine of the month for free. It only costs \$2 to sample five additional wines, and at the end of the tasting you get to keep your glass as a souvenir.

'Our showroom is nice and large and airy," she said. "It has a country theme. People can come in, sample the wines and even have some cheese if they like, or maybe some pickles or chocolate. Everything we stock is made locally. We also have homemade blueberry jam and honey for sale."

Wine tasting and wineries obviously go together like grapes and vines, but another natural place to find a tasting going on is at a local liquor store. Gary Gardner, operations

Ah, September. You wouldn't be complete without your cooler weather, kids being back in school and Mad Anthony Brewing Company's Oktobeerfest.

Oktobeerfest has become an annual staple of the downtown and beer brewing scenes. Each year, hundreds party under the big tent in a parking lot at the corner of Broadway and Taylor.

Now in its 13th year, Mad Anthony Brewing Company co-owner Blaine Stuckey said it all started with an infectious enthusiasm for craft beers.

"When we first opened the [Mad Anthony] brewery in 1999, we wanted to educate Fort Wayne on what craft beers

are out there," Stuckey said. The local craft beer and homebrewing scene have exploded with new enthusiasts, part thanks to events like Oktobeerfest.

This year's event features more than 50 draft fresh

If the event sounds kind of like a big deal, it is. This event is a must for any beer enthusiast.

'Compared to a lot of beer tasting events, Oktobeerfest is set apart because the brewers who produce the beer are actually here and can talk about their styles and why they brew the way they do," Stuckey said. "And you're getting a fresh draft - not just a bottle like most tastings offer. You'd have to travel to each brewery across the state of Indiana to get this experience. We're making it a one-stop event to try all of these types of beers."

Need something more than beer to entice you? No worries. Local award-winning BBQ company Shigs in Pit will be slinging their BBQ and German fare. The brats, sauerkraut and pale ale mustard alone draw a crowd.

Fort Wayne's Heartbeat City will be supplying the tunes during Oktobeerfest, playing a crowd-pleasing mix of rock and pop from the 70s and 80s. Their covers include Billy Joel, Fleetwood Mac, Steely Dan, and Queen among other favorites.

Still not sold?

"Outside of the entertainment and grub, everyone walks away with a totally sweet shirt and sampling glass. We wanted them to walk away with something unique to remind them of the great time they had,"

Stuckey said. The T-shirt is a limited edition with all of the breweries listed on the back.

You've heard of an afterparty; Oktobeerfest is so big, there's a pre-party too.

The event kicks off right with a golf outing Fri-

day, September 9 at Bridgewater East Gold Course in Auburn. This outing gives beer enthusiasts the opportunity to golf with brewers. Mad Brew beer, BBQ, and prizes round out the super-fecta. Registration is due September 5.

Tickets to Oktobeerfest are limited. The 300 available usually sell out, meaning the early bird gets the beer. They can be purchased at Mad Anthony Brewing Company and various Belmont Beverages around town for \$30.

Thirty bucks for unique fresh draft beer, unbeatable food and rockin' tunes? And an exclusive T-shirt and tasting glass? Sounds like a steal.

Everything you've come to know and love about Oktobeerfest will stay the same for this year's event.

"It's just a lot of beer enthusiasts who really, really, really enjoy the event," Stuckey said with a chuckle. Who can say no to that?"

And those aren't just the big boy brewers either. "We'll have two 8-foot tables rockin' out the local brews," Stuckey beamed. Several members of Northeast Indiana's MASH (Mad Anthony Serious Homebrewers) and the Brewers of Indiana

Baseball, Jim Crow Style

As summer begins to wane and signs of fall become noticeable, baseball fans closely follow pennant races and start looking ahead to October's playoffs and World Series. But baseball is as much about its history as it is about its present, and in recent years the Negro Leagues have been a significant part of baseball's rich history, a piece of the puzzle too long overlooked. With the retirement of Jackie Robinson's number throughout the major leagues and with a greater focus on the players who toiled not only in anonymity (at least compared to the white players of the Major Leagues) but in the racist conditions that faced them as they traveled and played ball, there are more opportunities to celebrate the Negro Leagues and learn from that era of our history.

The Fort Wayne Museum of Art currently offers an informative and entertaining way to pay respect to the Negro Leagues while enjoying a remarkable exhibit of the work of Kadir Nelson. Nelson has had his work on display at the museum before. As one of

the most respected illustrators in children's literature, Nelson was featured several years ago when the Fort Wayne Museum of Art featured an exhibit of children's literature and the artful illustrations that make them as popular with adults as with the younger set. His visit to Fort Wayne in conjunction with that exhibit established a relationship which the museum has wisely nurtured.

"We had featured a book he illustrated in the exhibit, Ellington Is Not a Street, about the Harlem Renaissance," says Sarah Aubrey, curator of American art at the Fort Wayne Museum of Art. "It featured people like Duke Ellington and Langston Hughes, and we brought him to the museum during that exhibit for a lecture and a book signing and had him talk to kids about it. He was wonderful to work with, so we kept in touch with him, and when we heard about this book that he had written about the Negro Leagues, we were very interested.

"He was really inspired by the Ken Burns series ["Baseball," which aired on PBS in the 90s] and wanted to delve further into the subject. The paintings which illustrate the book are just wonderful, and

dignity of the players but also capture many of baseball's subtle charms - playing ball in shadows and under the lights, making the close play at home plate and catching the train to the next town But they also capture the era's indignities

reminding us of the Jim Crow laws that made such leagues necessary in the first place and which often belittled the very men who were heroes on the diamond.



Taylor Fredricks

... And Then the Hearts Suffered EP

Taylor Fredricks began playing Christian-based music at the tender age of nine and hit the coffee shops as a solo act by 13. Shortly after, he lost the urge to musically "spread the word" and formed a band of other musicians full of teen angst. He also picked up a pen in 2010 and signed with DMI Entertainment Group. The Taylor Fredricks Band was born. To date, the band has shared the stage



with acts like Pop Evil and Hawthorne Heights. Ranging in age from only 17 to 22, these guys are already well on their way to being seasoned musicians.

The band's debut EP, ... And Then The Hearts Suffered, was recorded, mixed, edited and mastered locally by Dan Middleton of Digitracks. The production captures the kind of feel the lyrics of each song want to convey – loneliness, anger and heartache. The lyric "I don't wanna be the one to see us go up in flames, but if it has to, then burn!" (from the chorus of the EP's second track, "Electricity and Water Don't Mix") encompasses the vibe and mood of the entire

The very first song on this five-track EP is a Gothic-style, beautifully sullen piano composition titled "Prologue." I would love to hear Fredricks, who is credited with writing every song on Suffered, continue utilizing more of the same on future endeavors. From this stem of thorns flowers the rest of the disc which is sure to fill the teen masses with awe and produce even more fodder for their youthful anxieties. Every track on the EP is composed and arranged as if it was written by artists with several decades worth of experience under their belts. (Michael "Myke D" Deaton)

Devin Townsend Project

Deconstruction

Devin Townsend is either a genius or insane probably both. His latest album, Deconstruction, was released at the same time as his other latest album, Ghost, both of which cap off a four-part music cycle that includes Ki and Addicted, a glorious metal-pop album that would easily rank as one



of my top 25 albums if I were the kind of person to make such lists. Somehow these four extremely different albums fit together but I'm not enough of a genius to figure out how. Heck, I can't even figure out some of the songs on Deconstruction. As best as I can cipher, it's a concept album about God, Satan, the human ego and a cheeseburger.

Musically the album contains some of the heaviest stuff Townsend has ever committed to bits, and that's saying something coming from a guy who was in the band Strapping Young Lads. The cover of Deconstruction is a spooky kid in front of a demented Alice in Wonderland-like carnival world constructed completely of metal. That about sums up the album. Dark, heavy and demented with a skewed sense of humor. As much as I loved Addicted I almost threw in the towel on this one. It is 70 demanding, punishing minutes of chaos that only now, after dozens of listens, is starting to fall into place. It's the kind of album where you need a nap halfway through.

But I kind of like it – especially the shorter songs, shorter here being those under nine minutes, of which there are five. My favorite on the album, and the one that first grabbed my attention, is the simplest. "Praise the Lowered" begins with a quiet techno beat, more space than notes, and appropriate introductory lyrics of "Close your eyes, get ready," placidly sailing along until halfway through, with Devin angelically basking in his sobriety ("I'm so sober"), the music takes a mean turn, bringing the hammer down with a massively heavy version of the earlier easygoing melody and screamingly anguished lyrics of "Gimme that wine / Gimme that acid / I wanna lose everything that's policing us." I'm not sure who "Juular" is, but the song seems to be about putting away childish things, though for all the triple-kick-drums and symphonic choirs it's a bit difficult to tell why "Nothing ever bothers Juular." While I'm not a fan of noise for the sake of noise, the chaotic smear of distortion that ends the song gets the adrenaline flowing.

The choir serves as a Greek chorus in "Pandemic," a frantic song

The artwork on the front of this 1990 release was originally a Raymond Pettibon drawing taken from a photograph of witnesses driving to the 1966 trial of the Moors murderers. It also reads, "I stole my sister's boyfriend. It was all whirlwind, heat and flash. Within a week we killed my



parents and hit the road." Sonic Youth were - and still are - the hipsters we all want to be. They knew things back at the beginning of a musically bland decade. They used alternative tuning on their instruments and were inspired by The Carpenters, Joan Crawford and Public Enemy. And they were coming off their 1988 masterpiece, Day-

Goo opens with "Dirty Boots," a guitar-driven number with Thurston Moore on lead and wife/bass player Kim Gordon on backing vocals. Lee Renaldo tears up the guitar, and Steve Shelley holds it all together on the drums.

'Tunic" is the dedication track to Karen Carpenter and has Gordon at the microphone while hammering her bass. "Mary Christ" is one of the last punk songs that SY ever recorded. "Kool Thing" was the first single from the release and featured Chuck D. It's Gordon's take on an interview she did with LL Cool J.

On "Mote" the eternally cool Renaldo takes over on the vocals. He gives the band a completely different sound. "Mildred Pierce" is old school Sonic Youth and, at just over two minutes, one of the shorter tracks (as is "Scooter + Jinx"). The record closes with "Titanium Expose," a song that tears it up for six-plus minutes and one of the best videos they ever did.

that packs 10 minutes of notes into three and a half minutes. And though Townsend claims the album is not a joke, it's difficult not to wonder if this itself is a joke when he has this orchestral choir singing "I farted." Oh, to have been at the recording sessions of this

The final song, "Poltergeist," opens with Townsend shouting "Let's finish this!" before ripping into your ears with everything he's got, throwing angular rhythms on top of choirs and some of the heaviest riffs I've ever had the pleasure to hear. As best as I can tell, this song is about how, even though an addict may put his addictions behind him, the past and the old ways tend to come back and cause

Now for the big ones. "Stand" takes its time moving through its sections, sedately pacing for three minutes before becoming Mr. Hyde and adding a symphonic backing (with a real symphony, rented from some small European country) with lyrics of "Change the world? / You better change yourself, boy!"

Although nearly 10 minutes long "Stand" is, for the most part, an easy listen. Not so for the remaining three behemoths. "Planet of the Apes" magically mixes a ragged de-tuned guitar riff with symphonic backing, somehow keeping up with the non-rhythmic blank verse that Townsend has created, coming together for a mini chorus of "I stay heavy for my God." The 16-minute "The Mighty Masturbator" and the almost 10-minute title track are likewise all over the place. One moment they are just voice and clean guitar, then for five seconds it's a barrage of sweeping metal arpeggios, and then it's a full choir for half a minute, and then it's a carnival in 34-time, and then screaming and double kick drums for two measures before somehow ending up as a beat-heavy rave-up held in a stadium stocked with a marching band. It's all very Zappa-like and ADHHHHD and very complex. The lyrics seem to be a kind of argument or internal conversation that probably should be read as a kind of opera with parts performed by different characters. Oh yeah, there are 10 famous guest musicians singing the different parts (name them all and win a cheeseburger.)

Townsend keeps his grounding in humor, though, with Canadian-voiced parts and snobby theologians discussing deconstructing cheeseburgers and whatnot. Much like the human mind, it's just a





Donny Osmond's 53 years old. Really. Those syrupy ballads like "The Twelfth of Never" and "Go Away little Girl" were Top 40 hits all the way back in the 70s. And



"The Donny and Marie Show," in which he starred with his equally ubiquitous sister, finished its threeyear run on CCC all the way back in 1970.

Or maybe you recall that guy who auditioned for Jeff Beck's band in the 80s, or the guy who recorded "Soldier of Love" with Peter Gabriel way back in 1989, the guy who who wasn't really a teen idol anymore but, yet, wasn't all that "rock n' roll" either.

Like other iconic stars of his - and earlier generations (think Cher, Elton and Elvis), Donny Osmond spends a lot of time these days headlining in Vegas, but he's taking some time off from his long-running show (again with sister Marie) at the Flamingo Hotel to do a whirlwind North American tour, and one of his stops along the way is at the Honeywell in Wabash on Saturday, Sept. 3.

Expect an intimate, highly personal retrospective that includes not just the greatest hits from one of the longest-running acts in show business, but lots of audience Q&A's and song requests.

If you're one of the millions of fans who have spent the past 40 or so years wishing they could get up close and personal with Mr. Puppy Love himself, this could be the best time you've had all year.

ERNIE HENDRICKSON

Like a lot of us, Ernie Hendrickson grew up on a steady diet of Willie Nelson, Bob Dylan, Neil Young, Cat Stevens and Jerry Garcia. The native of Wisconsin, now turned Chicagoan, dove into American roots music body and soul and began forming bands around his then-hometown of

Rockford, Illinois, ERNIE HENDRICKSON while still a boy of

16. At Illinois State University, he found himself the leader of The Seed Band, a group that would release three independent records and gain a cult following in and around Normal, Illinois.

Eventually Hendrickson migrated to Chicago where in 2007 he self-released a solo record, Down the Road, that wedded the classic balladry of his roots with the blues and tribal beats he discovered in the Windy City. He followed that up with 2009's Walking With Angels, which spent more than 25 weeks in the Top 20 on the Roots Music Report's folk charts.

The 33-year-old Hendrickson, a frequent visitor to the Fort (he lists Little Brother Radio among his Facebook "likes"), is making a quick stop at CS3 on Thursday, Sept. 8 en route to some weekend gigs in New York. If you, too, grew up listening to the likes of Dylan, Nelson and Garcia, this is a show you probably shouldn't miss.

Their recently released follow-up, Vices and Virtues reached No. 9 on Billboard's Hard Rock Albums chart, and the single "Die Trying" is currently riding high on the Hot Mainstream Rock charts. I stopped a stranger on the street the other day, whose name I learned was Anyone Johnson, and asked him if he could remember a day without Henry's.

"Without Henry's what?" he snapped and proceeded on his way.

To say Henry's is the place where neighbors meet would be to steal their motto. Strangers meet there also, even though the strangers may be neighbors as well. I have a feeling neighbors weren't strangers when neighbors began meeting at Henry's.

I've been no stranger to Henry's and in fact at one time was a neighbor. I once met myself there and was shocked to see what had become of me.

Henry's is a great place to knock back a few drinks and yuck it up with friends. Whether parked at the wonderfully ornate and ancient bar or at one of the cozy highbacked wooden booths, it's easy to forget about the time at Henry's

For years now Henry's has also been a great place to get a fantastic Reuben or a platter of fish and chips. I was in a melancholy mood when I stopped in a few weeks ago to have drink and a nice steak. I was nearly alone, accompanied only by the spirit of Jacqueline, who loved spending nights flitting from booth to bar to table chatting with folks.

It had been a while since I'd been there, and I was happy to see Michelle and Donna and Cindy doing what they've done for years: giving fast and

competent service. I picked a booth in the new section, which is probably more than a decade old now but it's still new to me, and asked what kind of single malt Scotch I should order.

"Oban," she said. "Neat?"

The menu offered three steak choices: filet, Delmonico and New York strip. I wanted to order all three but thought better of it and opted for the Delmonico 10-ounce English cut, medium rare, with cheesy mashed potatoes and a house salad with blue cheese. I also ordered a big salad because I figured, what the hell. A friend always liked the big salad, with its avocado, egg, tomato, red onion, and spicy croutons. She liked it because it's the salad Elaine from Seinfeld always ordered - except she called her Ellen and refused to believe me when I corrected her.

"Look it up," I'd say. "It's Elaine."

"Who has the name Elaine? That's some sort of cream puff."

There's nothing quite like ignorance swirled with obstinance.

The salads were good as always. The spicy croutons added a dimension than made the familiar blend of vegetables spectacular. The bread that came with the meal was warm and soft and delicious.



come out and see what we're tasting that day. There's always something going on," Gardner said.

That is likewise true of WineTime, the now six-year-old wine store owned and operated by Jeff Armstrong. This intimate store, having recently moved from its Jefferson Pointe location to its current headquarters on Covington Road, regularly plays host to wine tastings that Armstrong said are all about taking the mystery and pretension out of wine.


"The whole wine experience can be intimidating," he said. "My objective is to make it approachable. When I host wine tastings here at the store or if I'm leading one at a corporate event, I try not to use wine geeky terms and I'm always aware of price point. Wine should be fun. It should be enjoyable. It shouldn't be something that makes people anxious or stressed."

To remove some of the mystique surrounding the wines he sells at the shop, Armstrong places a piece of paper over each bottle, listing the name of the wine, the country it's from, the region, a brief description of its flavor profile and aromas, a good food and cheese pairing suggestion, the price and a fun, wine-related quote, often from Thomas Jefferson or the Bible.

The next tasting Armstrong is leading will take place at the National Automobile and Truck Museum of the United States in Auburn on September 23, from 7-9 p.m. Wine lovers can look forward to being brought out of their imbibing ruts.

"Say a person comes to me and tells me he really loves New Zealand Sauvignon Blancs," Armstrong said. "Well, I know that New Zealand Sauvignon Blancs tend to be very citrusy. So are Chilean Sauvignon Blancs, and those are just as good, but much cheaper. I can steer a wine drinker in a new direction."

The opportunities to take in a wine tasting in northeast Indiana are clearly abundant. You might even say they're like low-hanging fruit. Why not go out and pick one?





Too Much Sex in *Holes*

Nicholson Baker, Simon & Schuster, 2011

I have to believe that, for Nicholson Baker, part of the fun of writing House of Holes

was contemplating how much trouble reviewers would have writing about the book. It would seem to be impossible to write about a book in which nearly every word is an extremely explicit sexual reference without being extremely explicit in the process. Fortunately for me, it's a task that's not nearly as impossible as it might seem. House of Holes is so extreme that it's beyond extreme, and it's so immersed in sex that it ceases to be sexual. It proves that if you try too hard to go too far you end up going nowhere at all.

Baker subtitled House of Holes "a book of raunch," which is handy because otherwise it would be hard to know what to call it. It's not a novel because novels usually have plots and characters,

neither of which does this book really have. Although it's a collection of short vignettes, they couldn't really be called short stories because they don't develop on their own very satisfactorily. And it's not poetry be-

cause it doesn't rhyme.

Allow me to provide some context. The House of Holes of the title is a sort of fantastical sexual resort in the business of charging men lots of money in return for allowing them to act out their strange sexual fantasies. Women are allowed to take

they usually get in at a discounted rate. Other visitors are taken into a work-study program, where they work part-time sexual jobs and are able to use the House's services for a substantially lower charge.

advantage of the service, too, and

Visitors enter the House of Holes in this manner: they are approached by a stranger who makes some bizarre and very raunchy sexual comment; they are not at all shocked by the comment and, in fact, show their interest by engaging the stranger in bizarre, raunchy sexual conversation; they are then sucked through some tiny, circular orifice, such as the hole in the tip of a pen or the pierced hole in the stranger's ear, into the House of

Once there, the visitor engages in bizarre, raunchy sexual behavior which often involves the removal of body parts (which, in the House of Holes, does not do permanent harm to the person who loses the body part, and it's usually tempo-

rary). Every sexual fantasy is fulfilled, no matter how weird (and they are all very weird), although the fantasies are usually fulfilled at a high price.

Baker uses two (and only two) techniques in House of Holes: sexual explicitness and absurdity. Every sentence refers to sex acts and anatomy in the most unambiguous terms possible, and most sentences contain some matter-of-fact reference to a situation that is nothing like the real world. For example, the first chapter involves a young woman who becomes infatuated (and, of course, develops a sexual relationship with) a disembodied and fully animate and sentient – arm that was removed from a visi-

tor to the House in exchange for the fulfillment of his sexual

Most of the time, Baker combines the two techniques and engages in sexual absurdity. Not only are most of the situations in the book beyond the realm of credulity, Baker makes up a language to describe them, a vocabulary of silly terminology related

to the anatomy of sex that's so ridiculous it's not funny.

Don't be fooled by the blurbs on the book's jacket that allude to Baker's debut novel, Vox, which managed to be both sexually explicit and touching. House of Holes manages only the former. It fails to be touching mostly because there are no humans in it, and its over-the-top raunch is not even remotely erotic. Baker has always had a penchant for head-scratching sexual fantasy (it was the basis of his novel The Fermata, and it showed up in Vox as well) but here there's really nothing else to be found. Sure, there's commentary about our society (we're all harboring fantasies, the fulfillment of which we're certain would make us happy at last) and slightly paranoid politics (there's at least one ham-fisted complaint about the intrusiveness of airport security), but it gets lost in all the ludicrous

After his enjoyable last novel, The Anthologist, I had some hope that Baker had begun to regain his form after a series of disappointing books. House of Holes, however, is perhaps his most disappointing book to date.

Strong Cast Saves *The Help* From Movie Cliche Hell

Caricatures, stereotypes and cliches, oh my! In The Help these three things are flying at you so thick and fast, especially during the first half of the movie, it is hard to imagine the film will ever settle down enough to tell its story. Only for a few moments here and there does it settle down, and then it drifts off into cheap laughs territory. But the laughs are funny, the performances are wonderful, and The Help doesn't tie everything with up with a big bow at the end.

I was bracing myself to feel squeamish at the premise of a white woman deep in Mississippi, deep in the civil rights struggle, telling the stories of African American women. So when the stuff starts flying, I was ready. Good thing too, because The Help is nauseating early on in its deep dive into caricatures, stereotypes and cliches.

The filmmakers are very lucky they cast the lovable and talented Emma Stone as Skeeter, the "rebel" who expresses her rebellion by wanting to write. She has freckles, red hair and curls, bludgeoning details to prove her "otherness." (I didn't pay attention, but I'll bet she is left-handed too, a sure sign at the time that you are "other"). One problem is, her curls are as plastic and produced as the other white women's shellacked hair. Skeeter's hair transformation isn't from natural to manufactured; it is strictly manu-

factured to manufactured. Maybe Chris Rock's Good Hair has made me too sensitive, and I know I have no cultural credibility to comment on black hair. But as a woman who has never colored her hair, the phoniness of hair in The Help is noticeable. Among the African-American women, there isn't a nappy head in sight. The African-American maids have do's or close-cropped naturals. Cicely Tyson sports a quieted, braided hair effect.

The dialect has been calmed down from the book, which I tried to read but disliked, in part because of the dialect. Language leaps have happened, but you can still write a film with scenes of Stepin Fetchit dialogue. You can give characters "era appropriate" dialogue, but you cannot give those characters

That brings me to a topic the film addresses well without bludgeoning the audience. The Help is scary-real about what a misery it was to be a white woman in midcentury Mississippi. Sexism and racism: the "isms" that keep on giving.

I can't comment on racism from a credible reality, though I did experience a sob when Medgar Evers appears on screen. I know where that is going, and it is a horror that will never be undone.

Nor can I comment much on the sexism of the time, but the sexism in The Help is ferocious and ugly and rings familiar. Sexism is a powerful tool used to divide women, and the display of how race is used to divide women in *The Help* is excruciating.

As ugly and unsympathetic as the white women are in *The Help*, I felt sorry for them. In The Help, kids run home to "moms." They just don't run to their real moms. I found that depressing. Kids are easily forgiven for seeking solace from safe arms, any arms. Society is not so easily forgiven for creating norms



that celebrate having babies but not taking care of them. It is painful to watch women ignore their children, no matter what the rea-

The Help shows "Southern" life as a miserable existence for women. The white women are lost in a neurotic haze of man pleasing and society straddling. I can't comment on the validity of this portrayal. I can only say, thank God, I'm a Midwestern woman brought up by Midwestern women who had a very different parenting style at the same time the "ladies" of *The Help* were still turning their daughters over to the help.

Don't get me wrong; The Help is a lot less embarrassing than Mississippi Burning because it doesn't pretend to be directly related to civil rights. Politics disguised by social realities is lighter, and The Help has

The Help does offer much to enjoy, most of it from its actresses. Tyson is great, but God grant her a non-Jim Crow role of beauty someday! Sissy Spacek is fantastic as the mom rebel with a cause. Alison Janney does that transformative thing - beginning as a louse and ending as a sympathetic character. Bryce Dallas Howard is fearless in portraying white ugliness and social nastiness.

Two women steal the show. They are Octavia Spencer and Viola Davis. Each of these actresses takes excruciating predictable material and makes it work in ways that amaze. Somehow they offer us both the genuine sense of the material and a picture of themselves today, women who can conquer

Both women are in jeopardy of being nominated and winning various acting prizes. It isn't that they both don't deserve honor for these roles. Their feat of translating this nonsense into a human reality we can all see and appreciate is award-worthy. But either of these women could play race-neutral roles and take my breath away – I'm sure of it.

Davis, as Aibileen Clark, weathers the unfortunate fame of being part of Skeeter's book The Help, but it doesn't protect her from being scorned and treated with obvious unfairness. She just walks off to make her own fate, in the way brave gunslingers in the Old West used to. She is far braver than

More genuine female voices of the South will make their way to the screen. Being white, I look to Eudora Welty for truth and perception in the Southern style, as it sounds true to me. She expects us to live it. The Help illustrates two of my favorite aphorisms of Ms. Welty's: "A good snapshot keeps a moment from running away"; and "We are the breakers of our own hearts." Both statements work for The Help.



Bellflower (dir. Evan Glodell; out now, very limited): The press on Bellflower, the first feature from director/director/actor Evan Glodell, has been very interesting. The film is basically about two guys who build weapons and mess around, eventually finding themselves in the middle of an apocalyptic love story. Noted for its unique look, Glodell built his own camera for the project, thus offering his film a one-of-a-kind look. The trailer begs us to believe that the film is not just great, but one that will introduce us to a great new talent in the film world.

Contagion (dir. Steven Soder-

bergh; Out Sept. 9, wide): Unlike the very small and modest production that was Bellflower, Contagion is a huge production that features an almost endless number of noted Hollywood talents. The irony here of course, is that the film is made by Steven Soderbergh, who started his career making bare-bones films. Every once in a while, when he's not doing a small film or an Ocean's film, Soderbergh does a passion project like Contagion. For this thriller about a disease outbreak that threatens to end humanity, Soderbergh has cast Marion Cotillard, Matt Damon, Laurence Fishburne, Jude Law, Gwyneth Paltrow, Kate Winslet and many more. This movie will either be a box office hit, an awards type of picture or both.

Drive (dir. Nicolas Winding Refn; out Sept. 16, wide): What we have with this action film from little known director Nicolas Winding Refn is, I believe, the start of a new era. Having received standing ovations, awards and plenty of buzz following this year's screening at Cannes, Refn's film marks the first of three already-planned productions with Ryan Gosling (who handpicked Refn to direct the film). I've read all the press. watched all the clips and studied the trailer ... all I can say is wow. A lot of movies receive a lot of hype, but Drive, from what I can tell, probably deserves even more than it's already seen. My most anticipated film of the upcoming season.

Moneyball (dir. Bennett Miller; out Sept. 23, wide): Bennett Miller has now made three movies: 1998 low-budget documentary The Cruise; 2005 Oscar-winning drama Capote; and now Moneyball, a biographical sports dramedy about Oakland A's GM Billy Beane. Starring Brad Pitt, Philip Seymour Hoffman, Jonah Hill and Robin Wright, the film was also written by Oscar-winner Aaron Sorkin. Should be very good.

Take Shelter (dir. Jeff Nichols; out Sept. 30, limited): This is one of those rare movies that sees multiple up-and-coming talents coming together in what looks to be a star-making harmony. First we have director Jeff Nichols, a Terrence Malick disciple whose excellent debut, 2007's low-budget hit Shotgun Stories, starred Michael Shannon. Shannon also stars here as a young husband/fa-

It's all just crazy talk. But good crazy talk. Besides, where else can you hear an orchestral choir sing "All beef patties / Pickles, sauce on a sesame seed bun"? Totally whacked. (*Jason Hoffman*)




