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

# Master Class

Fall classes have begun on the pretty campus of the University of St. Francis here in Fort Wayne and that means one thing to art lovers in the area: "It's gala time!"

Nobody throws a gala art opening like USF. Held annually to celebrate the Weatherhead Gallery's first show of the academic year, attendees can expect music, wonderful food, fancy dress, and an elegant, yet festive atmosphere. It is just about the most fun you can have in an academic setting without get-

ting expelled. Further, in keeping with the high standards of the gala celebration itself, which also functions as a homecoming party for returning faculty and students, the artwork for the gallery is always carefully chosen to present an extra special show. This

year's gala brings us the figurative and representational work of distinguished Chicago painter Bruno

Surdo's large, realistically painted works are a throwback to the traditional style of painting by classical, renaissance and even baroque masters such as Poussin, Michelangelo and Caravaggio, respectively. They have a grand scale like the colossal murals once commissioned for cathedrals and palaces. They similarly aspire to grand themes. But while Surdo may owe his fine technique to the Italian masters, his eyes are firmly fixed on his own century. At first glance you may think you are looking at a mural on loan from a Venetian palazzo - until you notice the frank inclusion of modern everyday goods such as electronics and plastic ware. Like the great masters in their own times, Surdo addresses unfolding history.

It is no accident that the Bruno Surdo exhibit opens to the public the same weekend during which our nation will be reflecting upon the 10th anniversary of the 9/11attacks. The centerpiece of his exhibit is a monumental (nine by 35 feet) commemoration of the event which the artist has titled "Tragedy, Memory, and Honor."

"He is a very well-known artist, espe-

cially in Chicago," says Weatherhead Gallery Director Justin Johnson." Many of our faculty, including myself, have seen his work over the years. It has been our goal to invite him, and this year it worked out perfectly. It was especially timely, due to the fact that his 9/11 memorial piece was available for display."

Shorty after September 11, 2001, Surdo, who was deeply moved by the catastrophe, visited the spot in lower Manhattan that has come to be known as Ground Zero. He was urged to go by community leaders in Chi-

cago who perceived that perhaps the best way for us all to emotionally process such a momentous and tortuous national tragedy might just be through art.

On arrival the artist was granted special access to the site, was able to speak with witnesses and was able to collect some of the scraps of paper that fluttered unforgettably through the air as the World Trade Center collapsed. Feverishly executed in less than five months, Surdo's dramatic mural spans five nine-by-seven-foot panels. The pictorial image itself is divided into thirds. To the left, office workers are shown reacting to the impact of the strike, the middle third is occupied by lost souls and the right third shows the harrowing recovery efforts.

Surdo is careful to make the point that he was not trying to create an historical record as much as he was trying to achieve catharsis. One can almost see his emotional struggle, not only in the narrative image but also in the painting's surface which changes

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# Minor Key's Reigning Queen

Royalty can take many forms. There is, of course, the young British couple whose modest, under-the-radar ceremony almost slipped by unnoticed this summer. Then there's so-called Hollywood royalty – your George Clooneys, your Brangelinas, your Meryl Streeps. Arguably the hardest working members of the royal class are those who give their blood, sweat and tears to music, aka the King of Rock n' Roll, the Queen of Soul, the King of Pop. Massachusetts-based singer-songwriter Eilen Jewell was recently dubbed "the Queen of the Minor Key," and heavy is, as they say, the head that wears the crown.

Especially when you're known for songs about the sad side of the street. Jewell, who'll be a C2G Music Hall Thursday, September 15, got the nickname "Queen of the Minor Key" on account of her fascination with songs and stories mired in the melancholy. Her new moniker also serves as the name of her latest record, her fourth major studio release, following on the heels of 2009's *Sea of Tears* and last summer's album of Loretta Lynn covers, *Butcher Holler*.

Jewell said she can't remember a time when she didn't love songs that twist toward darkness.

"I don't know what it's about," she said. "I've always felt this magnetic pull to the minor key. Even as a little girl learning piano I always wanted to play sad songs. Chopin's nocturnes were my favorite. It's odd, but when I hear an album by one of my favorite artists, it's always the song in minor key that I respond to. I hear it on a different level. It draws me in. I guess I tend to like more mysterious and dif-

ficult things, the hidden rather than the obvious."

Given Jewell's taste for the subtle, it's perhaps only fitting that her career trajectory would likewise be a study in quiet triumphs. For years she worked as a street musician, first in Santa Fe, then Los Angeles and finally Boston, where both critics and music fans really started to pay attention to the EILEN JEWELL

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husky-voiced, wide-eyed singer whose intriguing and addictive mix of Americana, country and 60s-style beehive pop set her apart from the crowd. She put out her first full-length, *Boundary Country*, and by the time 2007's *Letters from Sinners & Strangers* hit the shelves it wasn't uncommon to hear her name mentioned by the NPR and South by Southwest crowd. Her first two albums leaned heavily toward Americana and

country – she often cites Johnny Cash and Lucinda Williams as influences – but she switched gears with *Sea of Tears*, letting her sexy side show and suddenly folks were saying that Jewell was like the second coming of Dusty Springfield, the love child of Billie Holliday and Roy Orbison on maybe Bessie Smith and Bob Dylan.

Jewell attributes the groundswell she and her band – Jason Beek or drums, Jerry Miller or guitar and Johnny Sciasa on upright bass – have experienced to something that seems increasingly rare in today's fast-paced download-heavy music culture: hard work.

"We don't have a gimmick. There's nothing terribly novel or trendy about what we're doing and we don't have anything super-commercial

to offer," she said. "There's no highpowered manager behind the operation, calling the shots. We just work very hard. We're consistent. We're always on the road.

"There are so many ways to get music out to people," she continued. "that in a way it's harder than ever to be heard. You have to wade through it all to find us, but it's okay. We've made a lot of friends on the road. We're

made a lot of friends on the road. We're mostly a word of mouth kind of band."

While being on the road is great for building a fanbase, Jewell found, after Sea of Tears came out that it wasn't so great for her writing. So last summer she traveled home to Idaho (she grew up in Idaho City) and rented a cabin without electricity or running



# Purposeful Theater

I'm a theater addict. I'll devour anything playing in the area, or take an eighthour road trip to Ontario so I can enjoy its Shakespeare festival, or just hang around backstage of a local production. That's why it's always such a shock when I discover a production company in town I didn't know about. Just when I think I know all there is to know about Fort Wayne, I find someone new who adds their own variety of colorful selections to the local theater collective.

All for One productions is my latest discovery in a long line of great theater in this city. AfO is an independent company that performs in the auditorium of the main library and strives to give the local community meaningful productions that other theaters in town rarely or never show.

The season kicks off in just a few short weeks with Ruth 2, a completely original take on a classic Bible story told in two one-act plays. The first is The Redemption of Ruth, an original script by afO's Lauren Nichols that combines blank verse writing and readers theater performance to present a creative re-telling of a well-known story. Readers theater is a style of performing that allows for minimal stage production in favor of the simple, dramatic reading of a script. Blank verse-style writing was the dramatic and rhythmic writing style that you might recognize from Shakespeare's works, as it was the bard's chosen style.

My Name is Ruth then takes that story to the 1940s. Naomi has just lost her husband and two sons, but her daughter-in-law Ruth, now a widow as well, vows to stay by her side as they travel to New York to find work. With only each other for comfort in this new city, the pair must rely on the grace of a stranger - Boaz - for help, but Ruth and Boaz find more than just friendly feelings beginning to develop between them. Even if you're not familiar with the story of Ruth, you'll enjoy this charming and romantic

AfO's next production bring us the story

of a little boy lacking any charm whatsoever, so be prepared to laugh out loud when crime and punishment take on all new roles in The Ransom of Red Chief. A couple of petty criminals looking to get some start-up money for a new scam decide to get involved in a crime that's out of their league. Bill and Sam kidnap the young son of wealthy Ebenezer Dorset, but the boy, a torrent of energy and pranks, is more than either criminal know how to handle. While Bill and Sam are pulling their hair out, the boy insists they call him Red Chief and appears to think they are all playing a big game of pretend. Red Chief's parents refuse to pay the ransom, knowing quite well what a handful their son is. If you've been waiting for a show that's appropriate for everyone and will entertain younger kids, this play is a good chance to get the whole family to the theater.


Planted right over an early Valentine's Day weekend is a show you can bring your sweetheart to: Jane Austen's Emma, an adaptation by Jon Jory. Few have ever had the ability to spin heart warming love stories like Jane Austen. Her novels tell of the subtle, yet powerful impact of love while providing biting, accurate social commentary that still rings true today. Emma fancies herself quite the matchmaker after a single matchmaking success. Using her newfound gifts, she proceeds to drag a friend under her wing and through several misconstrued matchmaking attempts. While Emma has never been in love, and doesn't imagine she ever will be, she somehow finds herself embroiled in a confusing web of hidden intent, unrequited love and romantic aspirations.

After floating on the wings of love, we close out the season with a show that brings a tremendous amount of gravity to the same subject. The Women of Lockerbie offers a touching story of how several women use love to heal the immeasurable grief of a

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### Joey 0

#### From the Vault

Gather 'round, children. It's time for another release from Joey O, one of the area's premier guitarists. For many a moon Joey O has been dazzling audiences with this fantastic tone and impressive bluesy chops, working with members of bands like King Crimson, The Verve Pipe, Mr. Mister,



David Bowie and The Rembrandts. To say that this man has a strong resume is like saying that Coney Island makes good chili dogs.

His latest album, *From The Vault*, appears to be a retrospective album, but my many phone calls to the man mysteriously get forwarded to his lawyer who insists that I stop pestering Mr. O immediately. However, it seems as if the album is split into two parts, with the first nine being recordings from his days in California, those days numbering from 1989 and upward. While Joey O is currently known for his impeccable guitar prowess, the first thing you notice on these early songs is that you aren't noticing any guitar. Could it be because he had only recently (at this time) started to learn the guitar (this time being 1988), and prior to this he was all about the keyboards, winning numerous awards and honors? DING! DING! Survey says YES!


So while there isn't much in the way of guitar on these nine California songs, there is tons of glossy, gushy keyboards adorning well-crafted pop songs, pure children of their time. Some sport hints of the 70s, many include strong background vocal harmonies, and one even features a saxophone solo. All are tasteful with mostly love song lyrics ("Kiss me the way you kissed me yesterday") and vocals, true to the time, absolutely drenched in reverb. This is radio rock at it's finest, folks: bright and clean and optimistic.

The second half of his album was recorded and mixed at Electric Joeyland, presumably in some well-concealed cavern in Northern Indiana. This sounds more like the Joey O we all know and love, still maintaining the national caliber, radio-friendly songwriting but adding in more of a guitar-driven feel. "Living In Disarray" contains a nice mix of keyboards and guitars, sounding almost like a solo-era John Lennon. However the Beatles influence is out of the bag and playfully flaunted in "Can't Hide The Pain," starting with a Rutlesesque variation of the opening riff of "Sgt. Pepper's Lonely Hearts Club Band" and ending with a chanting of "Everybody hides the pain" to a slight variation of the ending chant from "I Am the Walrus." Definitely one to bring a smile to your face. "Perfect Stranger" is a mournful anti-ballad full of rich, weepy keyboard sounds, while "Ooo Baby" is a spot on syrupy sweet 70s piano ballad. "The Ghost of You" lifts its feel from Revolver-era Beatles, leading to the final track, "Memories Fade," which is rife with solid guitar tone punctuating the melody with well-timed guitar licks.

Whether you prefer the keyboard-saturated first half of the album or the more rocky second half, *From The Vault* is a worthy summary of Joey O's career, showcasing his mastery of popular songwriting and his elegant, restrained, always tasteful production and playing style. I, for one, am glad these 17 songs have been freed from their shackles. (*Jason Hoffman*)

# **Beirut** *The Rip Tide*

At age 25, Zach "Beirut" Condon has already released five acclaimed EPs and three full-lengths, the latest of which, titled *The Rip Tide*, is his best – and certainly his most focused – to date. Featuring nine tight songs over 33 minutes, the record feels like a perfecting of the Balkan folk/indie rock hybrid sound the band has be-



come known for since its excellent 2006 debut, Gulag Orkestar.

Along the way, Beirut (which remains mostly Condon, though others have become quite involved) have flirted with other influences from around the world, most notably with French pop (inspired mostly by the late, great Serge Gainsbourg). More recently, Condon and Co. have sunk their roots into Brazil, both taking influence from

# **Grateful Dead**

Workingman's Dead (1970)

Opening with "Uncle John's Band" and closing with "Casey Jones" (both from the genius that is Robert Hunter), this is the record that came out right before the Dead's magnum opus, *American Beauty*. On this release, the Dead



captured the folksy layered vocal sound that Crosby, Stills, Nash and Young had mastered.

Bluegrass might be a better way to describe this release, as it does have a musical vibe that stems from the roots of Americana But don't be fooled, it still is a great rock n' roll album, and just the band's fourth effort.

"High Time" has Jerry Garcia on the steel guitar and continues the great harmonies of this San Francisco-based band. Acoustic and electric, the track was creative and friendly. Mickey Hart (who would quit the band in 1971 for a few years) and drummer Bill Kreutzmann laid down the rhythm section, and Ron "Pigpen" McKernan contributed on keyboards and harmonica (he'd pass away in early 1973). And, of course, the vocals and rhythm guitar of Bob Weir can never be overlooked.

"New Speedway Boogie," a foot-stompin' jam, is one of my favorite songs from the record. Great guitars and a blend of harmonicas over percussions make this one of the standouts from the early part of the Dead's career, and Garcia's voice was golden then.

"Cumberland Blues" features Garcia on his other favorite instrument, the banjo. "Black Peter" comes across as blues-fusion and also features McKernan's harmonica and a nice keyboard arrangement. "Easy Wind" is sung by Pigpen, and oozes the 70s hippy-vibe that the Grateful Dead made famous.

I would say that between 1969's *Aoxomoxoa* and 1975's *Blues For Allah*, the Grateful Dead were at their best. The band's legacy is also based on their live performances, and I guess there's nothing wrong with that. (*Dennis Donahue*)

the unique country and also influencing young Brazilian musicians (the band, no joke, is so big in Brazil that they have a festival full of Beirut tribute bands each year called Beirutando). Known as a globetrotter and cultural sponge, Condon returned to the U.S. to write and record the very focused *The Rip Tide*, recording the record in his current hometown of New York City.


What's initially striking about this record is the lack of heavy world influences, the vibe instead feeling very poppy, though in a still-very-cultured sort of way. Sounding quite a bit like pre-69 Love Songs-era Magnetic Fields for their last release, 2009's March of the Zapotec/Holland double EP, Beirut drop the bulk of that wandering spirit here (though a bit of it can be detected on songs like "Santa Fe") in favor of a focused approach. Where Condon had been picking up new instruments here and there over the years, for The Rip Tide he settles into his core, focusing mostly on piano, ukulele and of course, trumpet, for the backbone of the record. And while Condon will claim that The Rip Tide's sound is stripped down, these ears of mine can't agree. Any record featuring a howler like Condon regular horn swells and overly detailed compositions cannot be classified as "stripped down" or "simple." Focused, once again, is the word here. Focused but still elaborate.

What we do get this time around from Beirut are some seriously clever pop compositions that make fellow world music-influenced indie poppers like Devotchka, Vampire Weekend and even Grizzly Bear seem more poppy than authentic in comparison. All of Condon's world – and music – tourism is on display in the corners of his compositions, as usual, despite the change in his writing approach. The result is a very tight, very accessible record that, while not as forwardly interesting as his past releases, is by far his most successful overall record yet. The irony here is that *The Rip Tide* is a very modest record when compared to the back catalog, dropping the oft-pretentious tones of past sessions.

Released on Condon's own Pompeii Records, *The Rip Tide* is short and for the most part not at all promoted – a fans-only record in release approach that, due to its instant accessibility, should prob-

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



ably be on sale for \$7.99 at Target. To say that this very beautiful, very accomplished and very melodic record is the pinnacle of the still very young Condon's career isn't enough. At 25, Condon already has a deep, memorable and unique catalog; and at 25 he's now released a record I'm not afraid to call a new indie classic. The sad smile here, though, is that the album, at best, will be a slow brewing cult record when it should be a *High Violet*-like crossover release that even the Rolling Stones and Spins of the world can't ignore. # Anthrax Worship Music

It would be nice to be able to say that Anthrax need no introduction, given their status as one of thrash metal's Big 4 bands along with Metallica, Slayer,



and Megadeth. That may not be the case, however, since it's been eight years since their last studio album, We've Come for You All, and almost 20 years since they started to lose traction after 1992's Sound of White Noise. In fact, the only thing keeping the band in the public eye in recent memory has beenthe inordinate amount of chaos surrounding the making of Worship Music – namely, recruiting a new singer (Dan Nelson), touring and recording an entire album with him for two years before canning him, then rehiring heyday vocalist Joey Belladonna and re-recording the entire album with him in tow.

And so it is that in 2011 the final version of *Worship Music* finally arrives with an odd combination of mystique and excess baggage. The album consists of 10 bone-rattling tracks (plus one intro) centering loosely around the concept of heavy metal music and the idea that fans worship it (hence the title – not so much music for worship as music that is itself to be worshipped). The song titles and lyrics directly or obliquely reference songs and persons of heavy metal past.

What might come across as a gimmick in less capable and seasoned hands works well in some cases but puzzlingly in others. (On an album-long tribute to heavy metal, why would you name a song that is not about the band Judas Priest, "Judas Priest"?) On a whole, though, the lyrics are generally more consistent and solid than they have been on several of Anthrax's releases; maybe guitarist and lyricist Scott Ian's time as a scribe for DC Comics has given him time to hone his chops.

Concepts and lyrics be damned, though – Anthrax are and always have been about the riffs. While the band may not reach the exuberantly thrashy heights of *Among the Living* (1987) and *Persistence of Time* (1990), they also seem to have abandoned the commercial reaches of albums past (e.g., "Safe Home" from 2003's *WCFYA*). For most of the album the band works in a stuttering, hammering groove (continuing the streamlining process it has followed since 1993's *Sound of White Noise*).

While *Worship Music* may never reach the bludgeoning pitch of their classic 80s and 90s mosh pit classic albums, it is a more consistent affair than the erratically brilliant but uneven *WCFYA* and 1998's *Volume 8 – The Threat is Real.*" In fact, every minute detail on the album is so deftly arranged that it makes one wonder if the re-recording of the album was a good thing, giving the band an opportunity to polish every nook and cranny until the damn thing gleamed.

The much-ballyhooed return of Belladonna on vocals works better than many would have expected. He turns in a warm and nuanced performance that sounds as if he's picking up right where he left off in the early 90s, alternating melodic choruses and bilious verses with guitarist Ian's hardcore-style chants.

Neither a return to their previous incarnation or a direct evolution from recent albums, *Worship Music* stands as something of a summation and restatement of the band's purpose. Possessing neither a clear high nor low point, the album delivers on a consistently thrashing metallic groove, perfect for new- and old-school headbangers a decade into the new millennium. And for a long-struggling thrash band 30 years into its career, you couldn't ask for much better. (*Ryan Smith*)

If you're looking for a CD with lots of catchy hooks and choruses, guitar solos, or other pretty things, *Roar* by Dromemord, the beast created by a singular local



musician named Phil Arbogast, is not it. This obviously twisted and talented individual wrote, performed and produced the entire CD and even designed the artwork for the disc jacket. When he's not creating obscure music, he plays drums for All Night Skate, Castles and Suck At Sports. Busy guy.

Roar is a trip. Mixing sounds and tempos influenced by world, experimental and industrial music genres, it gives the listener the feeling of being lost like Alice in Wonderland while being chased by every memory of your first gym class wedgie as it's being reminisced to you by horror maven Dario Argento. Throughout its seven tracks, Roar offers up a plethora of sounds created by both traditional and non-traditional instruments and effects – among them static and laugh tracks. That being said, Roar is not an instrumental CD. There are vocals, but they don't follow traditional songwriting structures. Nor are the vocals aren't shouted at you; Arbogast actually sings and even lightly kisses the genres of rap and reggae vocally on a track or two.

For Roar's first track, "Perpetual Storm," Arbogast wrote the lyrics of the first verse in English, but then manipulated words to make it sound as if he was singing in a foreign language. Track four, entitled Busted Instinct Machine, features dialogue from the documentary Quiet Rage: The Stafford Prison Experiment. Pretty creative stuff!

The closest thing to "traditional" on *Roar* is track six, "Skeleton Fell Down," although even this song starts with the sound of static in the background, making the listener immediately check the connection of his speakers to his hard drive. My connection was fine, by the way.

Roar is the kind of creation not normally attempted with this level of success by Fort Wayne musicians. It's obvious that it took a lot of creative thinking, resources and time to make such a production come to fruition. If you're looking for something a bit different – okay, a lot different – search out Roar. (Michael "Myke D" Deaton)

Smashing Pumpkins, these days consisting of Billy Corgan and a bunch of hired guns, have announced the launch of an online record club. Corgan promises to give away "lots of free stuff" to anyone who joins the club. First up is a demo version of the band's 1992 single "Drown." Since it's free, the price is right, though I'm not sure anyone cares about the Pumpkins these days. I guess we'll find out when they go on tour this fall hitting Chicago and Detroit in mid-October.

From the "they might not be done yet, especially if they can make a lot of money" department: Fleetwood Mac may tour soon. Guitarist Lindsey Buckingham says there is a chance the band may reunite to record an album and tour in the near future, and singer Stevie Nicks has hinted at the possibility as well. That sounds like enough to get promoters in a frenzy. Look for an album and tour of the summer sheds in 2012.

If you have been waiting for the long-rumored Van Halen album, you may have to wait a little longer. Rumors are circulating that the album is done, but guitarist Eddie Van Halen is not happy with the vocals. Of course, temperamental vocalist David Lee Roth, rejoining the band for the first time since the 1984 album, is not pleased and is likely throwing a hissy fit. Like the Fleetwood Mac album, look for differences to be ironed out and a new Van Halen album to come out just in time for the lucrative summer touring season in 2012.

In other rock legend news, Rush have signed with Roadrunner Records to release their long-awaited Clockwork Angels, now set for early 2012, after Roadrunner releases yet another Rush live album. The good news is Rush is now on the same label as Dream Theater and Megadeth. Could a mega-tour featuring these bands be far behind?

We'll leave you with this bit of information. Do with it what you please. The Outlawz recently told a media outfit they celebrated Tupac Shakur's death by throwing a party on the beach and smoking Shakur's ashes. "We twisted up some of that great grandaddy California kush and mixed the big homie with it," said Noble, one of the group's members. They claim those were their leader's wishes, based on one of his lyrics. A representative for Shakur's family told TMZ "... no one in the family would ever approve of the act" and that the Outlawz would have had to steal the ashes from the family's urn, but they currently don't plan on pursuing any action against The Outlawz.

from smooth, to impasto, to collage of the paper relics he gleaned from the ruins.

The result is a powerful piece that has received national attention, including receipt of an award from Chicago's Mayor Daley.

In a 2008 interview, the artist had this to say about his painting: "With my 9/11 painting, it was not like I had an innovative statement about what happened. I just wanted to echo what I felt from the people around me. Yes, we all felt pain and we are all angry, and I was just facilitating that through my work. The meaning wasn't to say more than what happened. I didn't have this huge political purpose in doing it; I just wanted to state that this happened and how people were feeling at that moment, not just in New York but all over the country and the world. It was a horrible incident. I felt my purpose was to take my talents and express what I was absorbing and feeling around me.'

Born in 1963, Surdo grew up in the Chicago area. He spent one high school year in Italy with family and thus gained firsthand an exposure to the Italian masters at a young age. A fan of comic book action heroes and brother to two bodybuilders, Surdo's nascent interest in the human figure gave him an edge in his first life classes at the American Academy of Art in Chicago. He began to realize his technical powers when it came to figurative work

Painting the human form continues to be his main focus and, regardless of the title, one feels that the true purpose of each Surdo tableaux is mainly to provide him with more figures to paint. And that's just fine, because in today's era of ubiquitous digital hanky-panky, it's terrific to discover contemporary artists who are still interested in old school figure painting. Surdo believes in this tradition so strongly that in 1992 he founded an academy devoted to it, the School of Representational Art in Chicago. In an interview posted at the SORA site, he talks about the philosophy behind this mission:

"It all starts with the fundamental skills of drawing and painting. Even in our high-tech world today, these skills are still in demand because [they are] rare. You can teach anything, but to really learn this tradition takes time, dedication and appreciation and I think a deep understanding of how art links to the past. You know, it took 500 years to master the art of naturalistic imagery, and somehow, once they mastered it in the 19th century, there were and are still ways to keep re-inventing, or else we would not keep doing it. Thank goodness for that."

The Bruno Surdo exhibit runs September 10 through October 23, with the gala opening reception on Saturday September 10, from 6 to 9 p.m. The artist will give a public lecture at 7:30 p.m., Sept. 27 at the North Campus Auditorium.

water.

There she wrote all but a few of the songs on *Queen of the Minor Key*, an album that, according to American Songwriter Magazine, is a "layered, shimmering pearl of an album that shines like cut crystal"

"I'd been to that spot before when I was younger and it's one of my favorite places in the world," she said of her Idaho retreat. "I figured if I went somewhere familiar I wouldn't be distracted by obligations to explore, and I knew it would be beautiful and inspirational, yet very much like home."

Jewell clearly doesn't mind a little ruggedness. In her song, "Cupid," the love bandit is armed not with an arrow but a sawed-off shotgun. It seems not much frightens her. When I interviewed Jewell two years ago, we talked about an enormous scorpion that visited her in her hotel room on the road. This time we talked spiders.

"I was on stage in Bozeman singing an eerie song a few months ago when a spider crawled onto my face. It was very big and very red, and I tried hard not to freak out," she said. "I don't mind spiders, but having one that huge on my face is a different story. I tried to be nonchalant, and I don't like killing things, so I kind of flicked it off, but I thought about him all the rest of the show."

Queen of the Minor Key, yes. High-maintenance princess, no.

1988 and picks up seven years after the incident. Madeline Livingston, whose son was on the fateful flight coming home from school for Christmas, travels to Scotland in search of signs of her lost son, or at least something she can take home. Livingston is met by the women of the town near the plane crash who are petitioning the government for the right to wash and return the clothes from the flight's victims and return them to their grieving families. While the women of the Scottish town of Lockerbie selflessly search for a way to help the grieving families, they end up helping Livingston find her answers in unexpected ways.

The selection of shows may seem diverse, but they all have some common ele-

ments

Nichols says, "When we're looking for plays we're looking for something beyond just entertainment; [we are looking for] shows that are values rich." In addition, most of the shows are Fort Wayne premiers and offer audiences the chance to see rare, unknown shows or old favorites that don't normally get picked up by area

Finally, the last thread that ties it all together is hope.

Says Nichols, "No matter what you go to see, there's going to be a compelling storyline and a hopeful message. If there's one thing that's common in all of our shows it's an uplifting, hopeful ending."

# The Adjustment Bureau

When they first meet under strange circumstances in a men's public bathroom it seems like an unplanned fluke. Congressional candidate David Norris (Matt Damon) has gone into the bathroom to rehearse a concession speech after suffering a major electoral defeat; ballerina Elise Sellas (Emily Blunt) is also in there, "on a dare," in one of the stalls, when she hears how upset David is. When she embarrassedly emerges, the two trade some amusing banter and, soon after, spontaneously lock lips. Then she runs away, and he has no way to track her down and get her number ...

Three years later David happens to run into Elise again after getting on a city bus. He's not even supposed to be on this particular bus on this particular day; a shadowy figure named Harry (Anthony Mackie) was supposed to have arranged it in such a way that David was delayed after spilling his coffee on his shirt before the bus arrived, but Harry accidentally fell asleep on the job, and now it's too late.

But wait, what's going on here? It seems there is a team of fedora-wearing agents shadowing David, choreographing his every move in such a way as to ensure that certain things happen to him in a certain order, and that certain other things never happen. If even one of these pre-planned events doesn't go off without a hitch, the ripple effects - not just for David but for the world - could be enormous. Who these people are, and what their exact nature is, we don't at first know. We only know they seem to have the power to manipulate reality, to step through certain doors that lead to certain hidden places in the city and to wipe away the memories of people whenever the secret of their existence is in jeopardy of being compromised. They are not nefarious, exactly; the worst threat they make to anyone is to "reset" their brains. (One or two punches get thrown, too.) Whatever their reasons, they most definitely do not want David and Elise to reconnect ever again. David, who has a magnetic attraction to Elise (the two are clearly soul-mates) is determined to evade them, to assert his own free will, to have love and happiness on his own terms.

Damon's performance is a little anemic here (surprising, for such an intelligent actor who so rarely disappoints) and Blunt seems a little too blasé to be convincing as the passionate romantic interest. Their onscreen romantic chemistry falls disappointingly short of their repeated verbal proclamations about how in love they are. Directed and written by George Nolfi, the movie is unapologetically sentimental, to the point of being a bit sappy.

Based on the trailers, I had expected *The Adjustment Bureau* to be, I don't know, a bit darker, not so self-consciously cuddly-cute. (It is, after all, based on a story by Philip K. Dick.) I had been thinking that the titular Bureau would be something sinister but solidly human, something like the secret organizations that conspiracy theorists love to talk about as having orchestrated major world events like 9/11 and certain political assassinations. Instead, the Bureau is supernaturally powerful, and what we get would not be out of place in a Frank Capra film from the 1930s. (The aforementioned Harry might as well be trying to earn his wings.)

In retrospect, it seems unfair to hold it against the movie that I had been expecting one thing and ended up getting another.



Judged on its own terms, as a light romantic sci-fi tale with a few interesting thematic ideas thrown in for good measure, *The Adjustment Bureau* is mildly entertaining, I suppose, though still decidedly not top drawer.

#### Trust

To Annie, of course, it's true love, and the laptop her father gave her for her 14th birthday is merely the portal by which she has found it. Soon after trying out for - and making - the volleyball team at her high school, Annie (Liana Liberato) befriends Charlie, a teenager from California, via an online chat room. Her parents see nothing wrong with it (how can you be worried about a boy named Charlie who lives on the other side of the country?) and soon Annie and Charlie are texting and talking and flirting with each other throughout the day - and then whispering late at night behind closed doors on their cell phones. This is Annie's first boyfriend, and it's no less real just because they're separated

And then, on the very weekend Annie's parents happen to be out of town, Charlie suggests they meet in person. Wisely, Annie arranges the meeting in the middle of a busy shopping mall. Wisely, she freaks out when she finds out that Charlie isn't the fresh-faced high school boy she'd thought he was but, rather, a grown man in his 30s. Not so wisely, she lets "Charlie" (played here with scary charisma by Chris Henry Coffey) talk her into at least having a milkshake with her so he can explain why he's been lying to her this whole time. Very unwisely, Annie relents, and soon finds herself in a motel room with a grown man.

It's at this point that Trust, directed with restraint and honesty by David Schwimmer, opens up to show us not only the hell that Annie goes through in the wake of this event, but also the torment undergone by Annie's workaholic father Will (Clive Owen) and terrified mother Lynn (Catherine Keener). Vengeance is all Will can think about - as the father of a 14-year-old girl myself, I understand where he's coming from - but Lynn wants them all to move on and begin healing as a family. Annie, meanwhile, is still in love with Charlie, and not even her therapist (Viola Davis) can help her see that she's been raped. As Annie, Liberato delivers a completely - almost unsettlingly - believable performance, displaying a brave willingness to explore themes few actors her age could.

Trust eschews cleverness, visual stylishness and narrative tricks and instead shows us the portrait of a family in crisis in a straightforward, linear manner, from virginal Annie's volleyball tryouts to her final, cathartic scene, and everything in between. We believe in this family, and we care about their plight. The theme of revenge in movies is a tricky one, rife with potential cliché and moral complication, but director Schwimmer and the cast don't ever take it overboard. As for what happens to Charlie, I'll only say that Trust is more like real life than the movies, and leave it at that. I saw Trust five days ago; I'm thinking about it still. It's one of the strongest dramas I've seen this year.

Tix.: \$24-\$18, 260-422-6329 pair of full-length plays William Shakespeare wrote about the tumultuous reign of Henry IV (played by Thom Hofrichter), an early 15th-century king of England. The first of these plays (commonly called *Henry IV*, Part 1) has been one of the most oft-staged of Shakespeare's works. Its popularity over the past 400 years is usually attributed to the character of Sir John Falstaff (Virginia Relph), an aged and debauched knight who is an unlikely mentor to the king's eldest son, Prince Hal (David Kaehr). The indelible character of the rebel Hotspur (Scott Hess), along with a number of rich supporting roles, make the Henry IV plays the liveliest of all the Bard's historical dramas.

I know what you're thinking, though: a history play sounds about as exciting as tofu. Shakespeare, however, transformed the dusty historical events surrounding Henry IV into funny, profound and moving theatre. He certainly wasn't going to let the facts get in the way of a good story! Since Shakespeare intended his Henry IV plays to entertain (rather than lecture) the theatre crowds, knowledge of English history is not necessary for a modern audience. In fact, given all of the ways in which Shakespeare veered from the historical records, it may be an advantage to not have a deep understanding of this era of English history.

Everyone who comes to this production, however, should be prepared to laugh. They also should be prepared to consider questions such as: What do lofty terms such as "honor" and "responsibility" really mean? What is worth fighting - and dying - for? And is there a liquor store nearby that sells sack (Falstaff's drink of choice)?

# Eleven 11-Minute Films To Mark 9/11 Anniversary

When the World Trade Center was attacked in 1993, I was living in New York City. My office was in the Village near the corner where Waverly meets Waverly. (I love New York! Sure, one is Waverly Street and one is Waverly Place, but it is still fun to say. I'll meet you at the corner of Waverly and Waverly.) I worked on the seventh floor near a large window that faced south and had a great view of lower Manhattan and the Towers. Our company made videos and had MTV on most of the time. When the bomb went off, the TV went off, since almost all television and radio communication for the city was located in the towers. There was one television station left to let us know what was happening while a big, continuous pillar of black smoke drifted out towards

Our office was just a few blocks south of St. Vincent's Hospital. For hours and hours we could hear ambulances race up from the towers, drop wounded people at the hospital and race back down to pick up more of those who had been hurt. It was an awful day, though mercifully on that day, the terrorists' dream of bringing down the towers failed. Only a few died, and a few thousand were injured. Mostly, New Yorkers showed how tough they were. People rushed down

When the World Trade Centers were attacked on September 11, 2001, part of what broke my heart when the towers came down is that I knew that many people who went towards the disaster to help would die. I was in my office in Fort Wayne, paralyzed in front my television set, talking back and forth with friends in New York and friends I'd played with in New York.

Sunday, as we all know, is the 10th anniversary of the attacks. There are thousands of stories to be told, still. I understand that there are many ways to commemorate the attack, and I understand that simply being quietly observant of the anniversary may be as wise a choice as participating in any of the special events the country and our community are presenting.

For movie lovers I can recommend the film September 11. Eleven international filmmakers were asked to make films 11 minutes long in response to the terrorist attack of September 11. Together they are September

This film will be screened twice, once on September 11 at 4 p.m. and again Tuesday, September 13 at 6:30 p.m. Both screenings are free and open to the public. They will take place at Cinema Center at Indiana Tech. Sunday's screening will be followed by a discussion, for any who wish to stay and

The filmmakers who contributed to this truly fascinating project are Samira Makhmalbaf, Claude Lelouch, Youssef Chahine, Danis Tanovic, Idrissa Ouedraogo, Ken Loach, Alejandro Gonzalez Inarritu, Amos Gitai, Mira Nair, Sean Penn, and Shohei Imamura. The films are set in New York and all over the world.

I won't pretend it is an easy experience to watch September 11, but it is rewarding and moving. Inarritu's contribution is espe-



cially difficult. The screen is dark for much of the film, but the sounds of the film make you want to turn away from the screen anyway. The bits we see are some of the most difficult images in the film, but you've surely seen them before.

Lelouch's film is almost completely silent in contrast. It is viewed from the perspective of a deaf woman who believes the man she fell in love with a year before September 11 no longer loves her. The film combines silence, images of the attack and the pain of a breakup with gorgeous delicacy. This is one of three films set in New York. Nair's film depicts a mother and family dealing with the disappearnce of her son on September 11, and accusations that because he is Muslim and was born in Pakistan he was somehow involved.

A breath of fun and gentle humor comes from Ouedraogo. School boys, being school boys, think they have seen Osama Bin Laden and will collect the \$25 million reward.

Ken Loach does what Ken Loach does. He pulls no punches. His film is a letter from a Chilean who fled his home country after years of imprisonment as a terrorist after a very different, much earlier September 11. His film has the most graphic images and descriptions of torture of the group.

Surprisingly, Penn's film is the least po-

litical of all of them. It stars Ernest Borgnine. probably the only actor in the collection that is both known to audiences and an Oscar winner. (The cinematographer for Penn's film is a guy I used to work with in that office in New York.) I saw Marty recently, the film that earned Borgnine his Oscar. As they say, they don't make 'em like that anymore.

The films do not all refer directly to September 11. There are several that simply refer to the ravages of violence in all its forms. The contrasts in style and subject are welcome. Together they are a stirring portrait of how much work we humans have to do before we get ourselves civilized. Several of the films are loaded with different but potent political messages. A snake utters a message that suits all the films, "There is no such thing as a holy war."

Mark September 11 however it suits you. And after, if you need a soaring lift, watch Man on Wire. It is the amazing true story of a different kind of terrorist at the World Trade Center. It is the story of Philippe Petit who. with a gang of co-conspirators, strung a wire between the towers in 1974 and walked between them high in the air. As humans, we can often be crazy in stupid and ugly ways. Sometimes though, our craziness is brave and brilliant. Petit's form of crazy will send a much more thrilling tingle through your

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7 That May Be Good

Last week, in Part 1 of ScreenTime's End of the Prediction/ Year Movie Rant/Preview Extravaganza we listed the 20 best movies we've seen so far

in 2011 and wrote up previews for another seven films we're greatly looking forward to. This week, we tell you about eight more upcoming movies we're excited about. After the "Extravaganza" I'll list out my prediction of what the Top 25 Movies of 2011 will be. Let's get to it ...

In Time (dir. Andrew Niccol; out Oct. 28, wide): In Time is one of those high-concept scripts people around Hollywood have been talking about for what feels like years. Written and directed by Andrew Niccol, who established a cult following with his similarly high-concept 1997 film, Gattaca, this sci-fi/fantasy flick is set in a future where people stop aging at age 25 and must work (or steal) to buy the minutes/days/years of their future. Whether or not this clever concept is fleshed out enough to warrant a two-hour narrative feature remains to be seen. My worry has long been that the script was so appealing that the studio idiots got their hands in deep. Thompson, The Rum Diary has all the makings of a future cult classic. The trailer, however, makes the movie look less than great.

Melancholia (dir. Lars Von Trier; out Nov. 11, limited): This movie is a storied one, certainly, especially if you consider the antics of director Von Trier at this year's Cannes festival. But I'll let you look up all those deets yourself. If you're curious about the film, which earned lead Kirsten Dunst the Best Actor award at this year's Cannes Film Festival, I suggest you watch the amazing trailer online. I've watched it a good 20 times myself, mostly for the ... um ... visuals. Really, it looks great, and will hopefully get Dunst a much-deserved Oscar nomination.

The Descendants (dir. Alexander Payne; out Nov. 23, limited): Despite starring King Clooney and being the first work from Alexander Payne since his hit comedy Sideways, The Descendants is currently listed as a limited release, set to test in New York City and L.A. before maybe going somewhat

Hugo (dir. Martin Scorsese; out Nov. 23, wide): The trailer for Scorsese's new flick - featuring an all-star cast led by Chloe Moretz. Jude Law, Emily Mortimer, Michael Pitt, Ben Kinglsey, Ray Winstone and Borat - looks great. And the movie will be great, no doubt. The Sitter (dir. David Gordon Green; out Dec. 8, wide): David Gordon Green, the man behind such films as All the Real Girls. He's diverse and unique and seems to be something of a Wes Anderson/Terrence Malick/Barry Levinson mash-up (amongst other things). With The Sitter he's once again in full-on commercial mode. directing the hilarious Jonah Hill for this raunchy night-out comedy about a suspended college student who has a wild evening while babysitting. Looks hilarious and also stars Sam Rockwell, Max Records, Method Man and Ari Graynor. Could very be the No. 2 breakout comedy of 2011 after, of course, Bridesmaids. The Girl With the Dragon Tat-

too (dir. David Fincher; out Dec. 23, wide): Yeah, I know, you saw the original and are mad that it's being remade by the Hollywood jerks. I saw it too, and I loved it. What I didn't love were the second two Dragon Tattoo films. I mean they were good but nowhere near as masterfully realized as the first film. And so when I heard that David Fincher, one of the best living filmmakers, was going to remake all three films, I was excited. The casting is great; the script (written by the great Steven Zaillian) is solid; and Fincher is pretty much a sure thing at this point. berg; out Dec. 28, wide): There's a chance that this, the second holi-

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
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
