Wooden Nickel Music Stores.....

Two years ago, despite years of releasing top-shelf indie rock hotness, Mark Hutchins (formerly of Vandolah) was a little known artist in his hometown Fort Wayne scene. He was the hot stuff in Toledo due to his Ohioan roots, and the biggest music geeks around Fort Wayne knew many of his songs by heart, but the majority of players and fans around town knew of Vandolah as little more than a cool band name they'd sometime see on fliers.

Then, in January 2010, came Sleepy Furnace, Hutchins' first solo record and most fully realized work to date. One of the most adored Fort Wayne records ever released? Absolutely. Probably one of the best indie rock albums released in 2009, anywhere. For the release of that richly layered, sweetly nostalgic songwriter opus, Hutchins played a sold-out acoustic show at the One Lucky Guitar offices. Soon after that he played a second release show, loud and proud at the Brass Rail, electric guitars turned upside down and blazing. Another hit show. What happened from there, well, no one saw it coming.

Amongst his pre-Furnace fans and friends, Hutchins, a family man with no need for scene gratification, was known for putting out a record, hardly promoting it, playing a show or two and then, for the most part, disappearing for another year or more, until the next record came out. We'd all show up to the shows and take in as much as we could - fun while it lasted. Not this time, though. After the blazing Rail set, Hutchins just kept on playing. Different venues and different towns, with different players here and there, all playing slightly different versions of the Furnace songs. Too many shows to count. Eventually Hutchins was even picked up by a small Ohio-based label called Old West End Records, who've been helping him out ever since, even releasing a single a few weeks ago. This past spring, nominated for a few local arts awards, Hutchins played one of the longest and best Whammy Awards Show sets ever. His band for that show? Scenester all-stars with names like Jon Keller, Jon Ross and Josh "Thunderhawk" Hall. Not a bad year.

"Sleepy Furnace was the first time I tried to make a real effort to push something, to get it out there, to get a little attention for the album," Hutchins said when asked about his big year and even bigger record. "Granted, on a really small, microscopic scale, but some folks responded to it and that was really rewarding. It motivated me to play more shows and play with different people.

Now, seemingly out of nowhere, Hutchins has surfaced with a second fully baked solo record titled Liar's Gift, out in October and celebrated with a house show release at his New Haven abode on October 7. The record, twangy and produced in a far more minimal way than *Furnace*, is another cohesive and consistently good offering of golden-voiced indie rock, a record that Wilco and Pernice Brothers fans alike should fall hard for.

The question for me, after hearing the album, was probably similar to what most fans were wondering: How did this Guided by Voices-obsessed garage rocker dude end up a making clean, twangy songwriter record on par with Jay Bennett's late-era work?

"That's a good question. I don't listen to country music. Somebody else asked me this a while back, and I didn't have an answer for it, but it made me think about it," Hutchins laughed. "I grew up in this area, so I've been exposed to country my whole life. Never actively listened to it, but it was always there. I've listened to things like Old 97's and Wilco and the Mekons - and Neil Young, definitely. I mean, it's still me. It's not like I'm trying to mimic country tunes or make fun of anything. These were just fun songs to write and play, and they felt right when I wrote them, and they're a bit of a change from the last batch. I mean, 'Old Rodeo Frontman' from Sleepy Furnace was pretty twangy too. Listen to a good chunk of the songs on the first Vandolah album: there's definitely twang going on. Maybe not to the extent of some of the songs on Liar's Gift, but it's always been there.'

When Hutchins, by day a copywriter at Sweetwater, originally told me that he was working on something new, he at first called the project a single, then an EP, then maybe a mini album. Needless to say, I was quite happy when he handed me a 10-song, 30-plus-minute record of fully realized music. First coming to know him as an overly prolific rocker who churned out bedroom production after bedroom production (mostly short, simple, awesome rock n' roll songs with weird lyrics, amazing vocals and jagged guitars), I realized that, with the kind of all-out record Sleepy Furnace was, Hutchins wasn't going to be releasing a record every few months anymore. Still, knowing his history, I had to ask if there were hard drives full of unreleased Vandolah-era songs stacked in a closet somewhere.

"I've slowed way, way down in the last few years. There's not really much to speak of sitting around. In fact, a few of the tunes on the new disc had been around for quite a few years, just waiting for the right home,'

Hutchins explained. "These days, it's just as valid to put out singles and EPs as it is to do albums. It may be more interesting to move in that direction because you catch your creative spark and follow through instead of assembling ideas and saving them for a full-

One thing to keep in mind is that Hutchins has a full-time job, a rowdy handful of kids, a wife, a house, a reading habit and so on. That in mind, I asked Hutchins about recording at home, off in the suburbs of New Haven.

'We tracked the drums and the banjo at Jon Schafer's place. He's a friend and co-worker, a drummer and a really good engineer. He's also been great for feedback throughout the process because he'll tell me if something's not working," Hutchins said. "I did all the other parts at my place. The local pool had just opened when I started the album, so I'd get to work as soon as the kids left to go swimming. Not exactly a rock star setup, but it got done. Outside of Jon Ross's drumming and Casey on banjo, John Hubner from Goodbyewave added some piano tracks and ambient guitar to a few tunes. His contributions were completely via e-mail. I'm shocked at how well that works. Everything else was me."

Since the release of Sleepy Furnace, Hutchins has become a favorite amongst local musicians. Many of those folks have found themselves on stages, playing Furnace songs. One time, Jon Keller, a scene favorite who recently moved to Nashville. stood on a stage ranting about how lucky he felt to have the opportunity to play with Mark. When I recently suggested that another musician I know consider moving to New York, he simply replied, "There's no Mark Hutchins in New York."

So, about his, er, band ...

"I don't have a regular band, per se, but there is a group of guys over here who I've been working with and, hopefully, will work with for a while. Casey Neal played a ton of banjo on the new album. He's getting in on quite a few of the shows, doubling up on banjo and Nashville-strung guitar. Jon Ross played drums on it and has been doing live

A Toga Party

Last year Victoria Adams-Zischke thought she was officially trading in her life

on the stage for one behind the desk. Adams-Zischke, a veteran actress whose resumé includes off-Broadway work and national tours as well as a recurring role on the soap opera "An-Victoria Adams-Zischke

other World," took a position as assistant professor of acting at IPFW in the fall of 2010, eager to begin her

teaching career. "I knew that I wanted to be a teacher, but there was also the fact that work in the theatre down for women when they reach a certain age," she said. "I didn't want to sit around and wait for the

perfect role. Instead, I wanted the chance to pass on what I'd learned in my experience as a working actor, to prepare others for how hard it is and rewarding also."

Now, in the kind twist of fate loved by loyal theatre-goers, she'll be back on the boards, strutting her stuff as part of the opening show of the IPFW Department of Theatre's 2011-12 season. Adams-Zischke is playing the role of the outrageous and hilarious Domina in the Stephen Sondheim musical A Funny Thing Happened on the Way to the Forum, and, having appeared in the zany, raunchy comedy four times before, she said she's thrilled to be revisiting her Roman stomping grounds.

"It's one of those shows that never gets old," she said. "It's so well-written and clever. I've probably done a year's worth of performances of this show and it still surprises me. It still makes me laugh. And this time around it's particularly pleasurable because I'm trying to teach my students what I know about acting, and they have a chance to see my work. It's a really good opportunity for us both, I think."

A Funny Thing Happened on the Way to the Forum will run September 30-October 9 in the Williams Theatre. A perennial hit since its Broadway debut in 1962, Forum is arguably Sondheim at his most clever, and Sondheim fans know that is saying something. A mash-up of the work of Roman playwright Plautus and classic vaudeville, Forum tells the story of a slave who schemes his way to

freedom by helping his master woo the girl next door. There's nary a serious moment in the entire show, and Adams-Zischke said she thinks it's the perfect season opener.

'It's an outrageous show. It's all-out funny and joyful and a great note to hit for the start of the season.'

The next show on IPFW's docket is, on the other hand, a serious drama about love, loyalty and the pitfalls of the so-called American dream. Arthur Miller's All My Sons will run November 11-20 in Williams Theatre. The Tony Award-winning play tells the story of the Keller family, whose lives are torn apart when it is discovered that the family patriarch sold faulty parts to the government during World War II.

> Following on the heels of All My Sons will be IPFW's annual festival of movement and

grace, Purely Dance, a showcase that gives both current faculty and former students

> in the school's dance minor program a chance to take center stage. The dances are as varied as the season itself and are guaranteed to please lovers of everything from classical ballet to jazz and contemporary styles. It runs from De-

cember 2-11 in Williams Theatre.

After the holidays the lights will come on in the Studio Theatre for a few evenings of melodrama, mystery and mayhem. The double bill of The Potboiler by Alice Gerstenberg and The Real Inspector Hound by Tom Stoppard will play from February 17-26. The Pot Boiler is a satirical one-act that pokes fun at playwrights who traffic in melodrama. The Real Inspector Hound, also a one-act, takes on theatre critics by making two very harsh ones, Moon and Birdboot, who unwittingly become the stars of a show. Both plays are sure to have audiences simultaneously questioning the very nature of theatre while enjoying its spectacle.

IPFW's season will come to a close with The Good Person of Szechuan, one of Bertold Brecht's most celebrated pieces of his Epic Theatre school. In it, three gods come to Earth in search of a truly good person. They encounter a prostitute with a heart of gold, Shen Teh, who, given enough money now to set up her own shop, becomes overwhelmed by the demands of her fellow citizens. She then creates a male alter-ego so she can survive the evil world in which she lives. The play will run from April 13-22 in the Williams Theatre.

'With this season we're trying to offer both our students and the community a varied theatre experience that is both entertaining and educational," said Adams-Zischke. "I think, given the offerings, it's clear we've done that."





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Striking His Own Chord

Not everyone has the luxury of knowing what they want to do with their lives at the ripe old age of 15. Then again, not everyone is Peter Case. Part blues, part folk, part punk,

part straightforward rock n' roll, Case varies his style to suit the story he wants to tell. And he has a lot of stories.

As a member of the proto-punk/power pop bands The Nerves, The Breakaways and The Plimsouls in the late 1970s and early 80s, Case had a hand in fomenting the underground music scene on the West Coast. And as a solo artist Case has built a reputation as a nimble yet forceful artist with descriptive storytelling and strident opposition to political tomfoolery. His recently released CD, The Case Files, is a retrospective of studio outtakes, rarities and demos spanning his 25 years as a solo performer.

Case makes his debut performance in Fort Wayne October 9 at Columbia Street West. He'll be performing solo acoustic and electric versions of his vast songlist.

Case dropped out of school after the ninth grade because what he wanted to learn was not part of the Buffalo, New York school curriculum. He would have quit a year earlier, but that would have been too soon.

"When I was 14 I was definitely too young," Case said in a phone interview. "But when I was 15 I knew that's what I wanted to do. I wanted to play music, so I just went for it. My parents were teachers, and they didn't like it. They weren't happy. I just took off and that's the way it was."

Growing up in the late 1950s and early 1960s with a pair of sisters roughly a decade older than he, Case fell in love with the music they were listening to: Elvis and the Everly Brothers, Chuck Berry, Fats Domino,

Link Wray, Richie Valens, Ray Charles, the big names of the time. The first record he bought for himself was a Beatles 45.

"I was just captivated by the music," he said. "That's what I wanted to do."

At this point in the conversation he

house. Then they also turned me on to Bob Dylan and Joan Baez, especially Bob Dylan. I loved The Beatles and the Stones. From there I found out about everybody from Jimmie Rodgers to Arthur Rimbaud."

Case eventually found his way to the


early blues masters, guys like Mississippi John Hurt and Lightnin' Hopkins. When he was 16 Case hitch-hiked to Boston to see Hopkins play. Back home Case started playing coffee houses and church basements, anywhere he could. In 1973 he moved west, based himself in San Francisco and began busking up and down the coast, from Portland, Oregon to Mexico.

In 1976 he joined Jack Lee and Paul Collins in The Nerves, a band that helped launch the protopunk scene at the famous Matrix in San Francisco. Later that year The Nerves recorded "Hanging on the Telephone," a tune that was later made famous by Blondie. The Nerves had a short run, and Case moved to Los Angeles where he formed The Plimsouls. The Plimsouls scored some hits with the songs "A Million Miles

Away," "The Oldest Story in the World" and "Play the Breaks," all three of which were later featured in the 1983 movie *Valley Girl*. But by that time The Plimsouls had broken up and Case was on his way to a solo carreer.

Case has a history of going against the grain. He rarely found anything interesting in the big rock bands of the early 70s, and if he did stumble onto some group he liked, he refused to let them rest on their laurels.

"I was really into Zeppelin's first record, but when I saw them play, they did like an



asked me, his speaking voice devoid of the rasp that de-

fines his singing voice, if I was recording the interview. I told him I wasn't.

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"Well recording is the best way to go because with a lot of people the way they talk is important. The syntax is kind of everything with people. If there's no recording a lot of times I end up saying stuff I didn't say."

Case's sister came back from college and brought with her music by the some new folk artists and some early British Invasion stuff.

"My sisters turned me on to original rock n' roll. Those were my first musical touchstones. I grew up with that around the

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Unlikely Alibi

Live at the Mill

If you're reading this review, live in Fort Wayne and have never heard of Unlikely Alibi, you obviously need to get out more. Founded by former Heavy Step member Todd Roth back in 2005, Unlikely Alibi have been packing rooms ever since. I've seen them live myself and high-



ly recommend them if you like a really fun, entertaining atmosphere, but maybe that's just me.

Unlikely Alibi are one of those "feel good" kind of bands, and it's no wonder their calender is always filled to the max. With obvious influences from acts like Elvis Costello, Madness, Bob Marley, Santana and Squirrel Nut Zippers, Unlikely Alibi mesh together ska, reggae, funk, swing and traditional rock to create their own wall of sound. Their use of horns, both trumpet and sax, is brilliant and prevalent, but never over the top.

The followup to their debut CD At The Ready is a live six-track disc that was recorded at the Gin Mill in Fort Wayne and, oddly enough, is called Live at the Mill. It was recorded, mixed and brilliantly mastered, by Randall Yeager of Moontower Productions and produced by Todd Roth.

The first track on *Live at the Mill* is the pelvic thrust-inducing new original titled "Whatever You Do" which opens with a disclaimer from Roth himself: "some dirty, nasty, don't-tell-your-parents-about, reggae." This one is my personal favorite, one I'm sure is bound to be a colossal success, and features vocalist Jake Wilhelm, whose voice meshes well with Roth's. The only non-original of the recording is a cover by fellow locals Cookiepuss called "Refugees Us," on which Wilhelm also sings and which features the MC stylings of Aaron King who adds lots of *flava* to the track. The horns on this tune play a dominant role with amazing sax and trumpet solos.

All in all, *Live at the Mill* captures the essence of Unlikely Alibi. It's a really fun recording that is certain to be a monstrous success amongst fans everywhere and will no doubt drive new fans to catch a show. For a live recording in a local club, the mix is stellar and the sound is very full. Every nuance is captured, and the energy of the band is projected through the recording.

You'll be hard-pressed to find a physical copy of *Live at the Mill* since they were only given up at the release party. Roth told me that Unlikely Alibi are trying to "divert sales to digital/online, to spark some Internet buzz for the band. Just trying to adapt to the times." Current fan or no, check out the sample tracks and purchase any or all of them at cdbaby.com. (*Michael "Myke D" Deaton*)

Clusterfolk Circle the Wagons

It's been four and a half years since James Ellsworth & the Dynasorrows released *Heart on Sleeve*, a collection of songs tracing Ellsworth's breakup with his former girlfriend. As breakup records go, *Heart on Sleeve* surely ranks with Bob Dylan's *Blood on the Tracks*



and Beck's *Sea Change*. (Everyone has their own list, of course. Though universal, breakups and the albums that people sob over are very personal.)

After *Heart on Sleeve*, Ellsworth and his Dynasorrows became Clusterfolk, a name that better suits band's diffuse style and influences. With *Circle the Wagons*, which comes out October 1, Clusterfolk cleave musically to the template of the earlier release but abandon glorious misery in favor of hope, oddballs, canines and cowboys.

The disc starts off with "Dusk," one of four instrumentals on the record, a short song that serves nicely as a prelude to "Circle the Wagons." The title cut opens with Ellsworth playing a rolling guitar riff that churns up images of dusty Conestoga wagons jostling across the prairie. A fiddle (courtesy of Sean Hoffman) glides in momentarily, and the tension builds as the playing slows to a few strums per measure.

The lyrics tell of the aftermath of relationship gone bad. The suffering has peaked and it's buck-up time, pardner. When Ellsworth sings "I'm gonna circle the wagons / and shore up my heart / I'll drown my dreams and dragons / and conjure a new start," you just

The Yardbirds

Roger The Engineer (1966)

The Yardbirds were a band that featured guitarists Jeff Beck, Jimmy Page and Eric Clapton (just not at the same time). This was the album that featured Beck and was released within months of records from The Small Faces, Rolling Stones and The Animals. The British Invasion was just two years

Mostly blues and rock with a little psych-folk, this was the first record of all-original tunes from the Yardbirds. It opens with "Lost Woman," a funky little number, almost punk, with the influence of Elvis and the Chicago blues (harmonica included).

More late-60s noisiness and electric guitars follow in "Over Under Sideways Down." "The Nazz Are Blue" has Beck on the vocals, and his incredible guitar wails away for three minutes. There's also three minutes of roadhouse rock n' roll in "Rack My Mind." Nobody could do the blues like the Yardbirds; in fact The Who started getting away from this sound because everyone told them they weren't as good!

I can't even describe how cool "Hot House Of Omagarashid" is. It may be the strangest, yet catchiest song from 1966. "He's Always There" definitely has an Animals vibe to it, but "Turn Into Earth" slows things down and appears to be an attempt at a poppy mod ballad, perhaps to get radio play. "What Do You Want?" is one of my favorite YB tracks, even more than 1965's "For Your Love."

The Yardbirds were only around for five years, but are clearly responsible for millions of kids picking up a guitar. They also spawned three of the greatest guitar players ever. Vocalist Keith Relf died in 1976 of electrocution while playing a badly grounded guitar.

Fun Fact: When the Yardbirds finally broke up in 1968, their song "Dazed And Confused" was re-worked by Page for Led Zeppelin's 1969 debut album. (*Dennis Donahue*)

know the storm is over and better days are here.

Nearly all of the elements that make Clusterfolk such a unique band appear in the title cut: Duane Eby's spectral acoustic guitar work, with his brilliant E-bow and effects use, hovers and swoops. Dave Kartholl provides a yeoman's acoustic bass line throughout most of the song, a fitting clip-clop. Sarah Ellsworth handles backing vocals and percussive elements with aplomb.

The departure of Dan Halferty a year or so ago left Clusterfolk bereft of a drummer, but through well-placed handclaps, shakers, mouth noises and a frame drum here and there, the percussion manages to fill in all the right spots. The end of "Circle the Wagons" opens into free-form psychedelia. Kartholl's bass quickens, Eby soars off, Hoffman works his bow and Ellsworth keeps it all tied together. I didn't want the jam to end, and live the band could easily stretch it out indefinitely if the mood were to strike.

Ellsworth is an inventive lyricist, to say the least. On songs such as "Never Kill What You Can't Eat," "Meth Lab Dog" and "Mongo Floyd" (with Susie Suraci on accordion), his interesting take on practical philosophy, tweakers and ill-fated excursions is always entertaining. "Never Kill" features Kartholl's nimble mandolin playing, a treat found on the band's recordings but rarely during live gigs, where he sticks to the bass.

"Inis Mor" sent me to the Internet to find out that Inis Mor is the largest of the Aran islands in Galway Bay near Ireland. The Celtic lilt is spot-on. Joyce Fry's light hammer dulcimer touch adds further authenticity to the tune.

"Meth Lab Dog" is simultaneously hilarious, sad and threatening. "Well he's wild-eyed / Bones and skin / He looks just like his master / Lean, mean, scarred and singed / A meth lab dog disaster." The songs hits like it should. Eby cranks up the distortion and Hoffman menaces with his fiddle.

Sarah Ellsworth takes over the lead vocals on "It's Not Enough" and shines in the spotlight. Her voice is bell-clear and delivers the exasperation of the lyrics with certitude. Elements of her voice bring to mind Natalie Merchant's finer moments.

"Odd Sounds at Midnight" is another instrumental ditty, with Jon Gillespie sitting in on the harpsichord.



shows with me. Josh Hall has been helping out on bass, and another co-worker named Lee Andrews is playing mandolin. Dan Greunke from Toledo has been playing guitar and singing with me whenever I can get him. He's been totally essential to the Ohio shows. Most of his band (the Fairly Handsome Band) backed me up at a Toledo show a few weeks ago. I'm hoping to play with those guys when I go over there again in October," Hutchins said.

"I love changing up the format whenever I can. We played an outdoor show a couple of weeks back that started out with me solo. Then Casey and Lee came up. A couple of numbers later Jon and Josh came up. By the end of the set it was full-out loud electric. So I did my best to cram all the different formats into one set. Yeah, it may have been a bit of a challenge for the audience, but you have to ask, 'Would I want to check something like that out?' I thought, 'Yes,' so that's why I did it. We played as a six-piece at the Brass Rail the other night. It was ridiculous. I loved it. But I'm also going to do solo shows, acoustic shows with Casey and Lee and full-electric shows. I'm spoiled, man. I want it all."


What can we expect at this upcoming house show? Another intimate affair or a call-the-cops loud set like no other ever heard in the New Haven 'burbs?

"Well, I really liked the vibe of the Sleepy Furnace release show at One Lucky Guitar. People were there specifically to hear the music, and I really appreciated that I could do an unplugged acoustic show and pull it off," Hutchins said. "Not that there's anything wrong with a noisy bar, mind you. I just like a less-conventional venue for a release party, and this one's going to be at my house. Hey, I get to throw a party for myself, invite my friends over, play music and sell CDs. I'd say that at my age that's a pretty cool gig.'

Before letting Hutchins get back to his busy life of secretly recording while the kids go for a dip, I had to ask about the family dynamic. Does Mark, like every other musician I know, listen to his demos and rough mixes constantly while recording? More so, does he subject his family to the process?

"They're really, really supportive, but it's not like my songs are blaring out of the speakers at my house or out of the family car on a regular basis," Hutchins laughed. "I have a hunch that, by the time I've done the umpteenth mix on a single song, they've overheard enough to have gotten their fill by the time the album comes out. But they're great about it. They know this is just what I do. There's nothing weird or mysterious or precious about it to them. I like that.

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


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

Speaking of Mushroomhead, be sure to get to their November 6 show at Piere's early enough to catch each one of the three opening bands. Though they aren't as well known, I've two of the openers - Psychostick and Motograter - several times and would recommend them to any fan of hard rock music. It should be a great night.

The band calling itself Guns N Roses, now nothing more than singer Axel Rose and a bunch of hired guns, has announced it will tour soon. In true Rose fashion, no dates have been announced and no one knows when they will be announced. So basically, Rose just wanted to tell us there is nothing to report. And here I am re-reporting it. Good grief.

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Blood on the Tracks

Train Dreams by Denis Johnson, Farrar, Straus and Giroux, 2011

Denis Johnson's Train Dreams begins with a group of construction workers trying to throw a Chinese fellow worker off an unfinished railroad trestle. It's 1917 in Idaho, and the Chinaman has been accused of stealing from the railway company whose tracks the workers are extending to the west. Robert Grainier, the novella's protagonist, is a good, peaceful man, but he gets caught up in the excitement of the attempted murder

and helps the other men as they try to toss the accused into the river below. Fortunately for everyone involved, the Chinaman escapes, setting in motion what Grainier is convinced is a curse that will follow him the rest of his life.

Even without a curse, Grainier's life isn't easy. He's an itinerant worker who spends his winters scraping by at his cabin and his summers in the north woods, helping build the railroad that is reaching toward the Pacific and cutting timber in the seemingly endless forests. He does what he has to do to get by, keeping

his goals modest and his willingness to work strong. There's always something for him to do, whether it's subsistence farming or leasing a wagon so he can hire himself out as a freight hauler. Life in the West in the early 20th century is hard enough that everyone needs help, and a man who's willing work can always find someone to pay him to do

The closest Grainier comes to happiness is when he manages to build a family with his wife, Gladys, and their daughter, Kate. The trio eke out a living on their acre, building a cabin and feeding themselves as best they can. But one hot summer while Grainier is away, a forest fire sweeps through the valley where he's built his cabin, and Kate and Gladys are not quick enough to get out of its way. When Grainier returns, the cabin is gone, his wife and daughter gone with it.



At first he holds out some hope that they've escaped, and he looks for them and waits on his acre. When it's clear that Gladys and Kate aren't going to return, Grainier settles

> into a bleak, despondent life on his acre, eventually building another cabin but never breaking free of the grip of the tragedies in his past.

Grainier is a haunted man, and he lives in a haunted country. The woods are full of ghosts and spirits, wolves and wolf-girls. Grainier is not afraid of them, though: he welcomes visits from these specters if they can bring him a resolution to the puzzles and doubts that trouble him. For others, these spirits might be a source of terror and danger, but for Grainier they're his only hope

of finding the answers he needs to find.

More terrifying to Grainier are the trains that push unceasingly though the night and through his dreams. Their lonely wails are everywhere, and when they echo through the dark woods they push their way into his dreams, bringing back everything he wants to forget. He came to Idaho on a train when he was six or seven, an apparent orphan sent to live with his aunt and uncle. He doesn't remember where he came from, only that he came to the life he knows now via the railroad, as if his first train trip had been his birth. He remained tied to the railroad, helping to build its trestles and bridges, and as he lives out his life as a near hermit alone in the woods the trains still won't leave him in

The trains are, in fact, changing the world around him. They're making his way of life disappear, and even before the end of

hour-long version of 'White Summer.' I found it boring. I went to a number of rock shows; I found them all to be wanting. I saw everybody play in the early 70s and nobody really impressed me."

When it came time to record his first solo record, it was clear, however, that Case had impressed a lot of somebodies. The self-titled disc, which came out in 1986 on Geffen Records, was produced by T-Bone Burnett and Mitchell Froom and featured Victoria Williams, Gurf Morlix, Warren Tornado Klein, Mike Campbell, John Hiatt, Jim Keltner, Jerry Marotta, Roger McGuinn and Van Dyke Parks. The song "Old Blue Car" was nominated for a Grammy. In 1989 Case released The Man With the Blue Post-Modern Fragmented Neo-Traditionalist Guitar. That record included David Hidalgo, Ry Cooder and Benmont Tench. More than a half-dozen releases and compilations followed, including 2010's Wig and this year's

The Case Files.

A confirmed autodidact, Case's range of interests include musicology (in the late 90s Case curated a music program for the Getty Museum in Los Angeles) and teaching songwriting workshops. He also maintains

The Plimsouls reunited for some shows in the 1990s, and Case is currently planning a reunion with The Nerves.

"I'm working on stuff all the time," he said. "I've got stuff written on scraps of paper, the backs of tickets, all sort of crap. Today I'm picking up this Belgian singer named Eva [De] Roovere, and we're writing some stuff. She's like a pop singer in Belgium. I'm writing some songs with Bob Neuwirth, got a Plimsouls record from live show in 1983, the last of a series we're releasing. I'm doing a reunion of the Nerves, considering making that a record. To me it's all part of the same thing. My style grew in different ways according to my influences. Just plugging away making music."

Stake Land

Every vampire story is ultimately a plague story. Enough necks get bitten, what you eventually wind up with is a full-blown apocalypse. Stephen King knew this when he wrote Salem's Lot, though he confined the societal collapse to one remote town in Maine. Justin Cronin explored the implications of a vampire plague in more epic detail with last year's bestseller The Passage. Even the über polite Twilight vampires, given enough time, would probably end up creating a world of glittering ghouls.

I've heard director Jim Mickle's Stake Land described as The Road with vampires. This seems unfair to the aims and themes of both movies. Whereas The Road is a grim and solemn fable about the love of a father for his son in a world without

hope, Stake Land is a clamorous, gory action-adventure film about dispatching bloodsuckers before they dispatch you.

A man who goes simply by the name Mister (played by Nick Damici) roams the countryside in the wake of a plague of the undead, killing as many of the nasty creatures as he can, then pulling their fangs out afterward so he can use them as something to trade when he encounters a rare outpost of survivors. Under his tutelage is teenager Martin (Connor Paolo), whose parents were killed by vampires. The two form a strong bond, though Mister is much too jaded and stoic to ever admit how much Martin means to him. The two eventually hope to get to a place up north called New Eden where, rumor has it, a band of survivors have found sanctuary.

Perhaps even scarier than the vampires that have taken over the world is a growing cult of religious extremists who see the vampires as a blessing sent by God to purify the human race. Led by a skinhead named Jebediah (Michael Cerveris) – creepy cult leaders can never be named something like Dave or Tim, can they? - the Brotherhood actually sics the vampires on humans whenever it can. After Mister and Martin save a nun (played by a nearly unrecognizable Kelly McGillis) from being raped by two members of the Brotherhood, Jebediah seeks revenge, and the two become locked in a battle of good and evil.

The movie's tone is dark and brooding, but essentially this is an action movie freefor-all, with the vampires not really acting very vampire-like at all. (They're essentially zombies with fangs, mindless and endlessly hungry for flesh.) Like many apocalyptic films, the movie concerns itself with the de facto family units that are formed by disparate (and desperate) survivors in the wake of horrifying events, and the way we continue to hope even when hope would seem to be a bygone notion. Stake Land isn't a masterpiece by any means, but for what it is, it's not half bad, either.

Win Win

Mike Flaherty (Paul Giamatti) is a decent enough guy, a good enough father in a happy enough marriage, with an upstanding enough job. (He's a lawyer who specializes in representing the elderly.) He

also moonlights as a mediocre high school wrestling coach for a team of teenage boys who are perfectly content to hold onto their near-perfect losing record.

One day Mike does something that he knows is wrong. In the grand scheme of things it's not exactly evil, but it is unethical and morally dubious. That Mike does it to generate a little extra income to help support his family and law practice - he hasn't really shared with his wife Jackie (Amy Ryan) how financially strained things have become of late - doesn't excuse him, and

he knows it. Still, he's satisfied that nobody is getting hurt and that nobody will find out.

Writer/director Thomas McCarthy's previous film, The Visitor (one of the best American films of the past five years) was about what happens when one seriously depressed college professor collides into the lives of several unlikely people. Win Win is also about interpersonal collisions, only this time the catalyst is a teenaged runaway named Kyle

(Alex Shaffer) who shows up one day on the front porch of an old man's home. (Kyle's senile grandfather, played by Burt Young, is one of Mike's clients.)

With his bleached blond hair, back tattoos and his penchant for going exactly where he wants to go, Kyle is initially a little frightening to Mike and Jackie, but eventually they let him into their home and their hearts. (It doesn't hurt that Kyle turns out to be an extremely talented wrestler.) Everything seems to be going swimmingly for all involved, until Mike's past misdeed comes back to haunt him.

McCarthy's chief talent as a filmmaker is his ability to make it all look so easy. His films have such an amiable, unpretentious grace, they seem almost to exist as a product of the natural elements, like ripe fruit on a tree. And just like fruit, you take one sweet bite and there's no way you're not finishing the thing. Win Win is occasionally laugh-out-loud funny, but never at the expense of being honest about its characters' lives. You want these people to do well more than you want them to be funny.

This is a movie that's crazy in love with its characters, which I suppose is another way of saying that it's a movie in which great acting carries the day. Has Giamatti ever been better than he is here as Mike? Maybe, but never so apparently effortlessly. Does Amy Ryan ever make a misstep? Certainly not here. Even newcomer Shaffer, once a high-ranking high school wrestler in real life, is impressive here, displaying a combination of vulnerability and danger highly reminiscent of Sean Penn's early performances.

Win Win is the kind of movie you'd happily wade through a hundred mediocre movies to see. (It seems I have waded patiently through a hundred mediocre movies in recent months.) It is, I must say, an unmitigated joy to watch.



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

A Difficult, But Well-Told Story of the Holocaust Sarah's Key is a film with a high dif-Marais district into the indoor bicycle racing there are locked cupboards. And that's okay.

ficulty factor, the cinematic equivalent of a complicated Olympic dive. And while it may not get every twist or turn exactly right, it is an impressive accomplishment, a storytelling feat that wins our admiration and respect. And the ending is a perfect, splashless finish.

Sarah's Key is based on a very popular novel, so the potential to disappoint looms large. It is a multi-generational story, so the film has to back and forth between the present and the past, not an easy task. It is a story of the Holocaust, so we're prepared for the horrific. The bad guys are French, countrymen of the victims. Unwinding the mystery of the story is complicated. And, like all tales of the Holocaust, the events at the center of the story are inhumanly awful. The movie also takes place in two languages and two cultures, French and American. The French portions are subtitled. I think this degree of difficulty equates with a reverse two-anda-half somersault with a tuck and maybe a twist as well, off the high platform.

Sarah's Key is based on the international bestseller by Tatiana de Rosnay. At the center of the contemporary story is Julia Jarmond, an American journalist living in France with her husband, daughter and her husband's extended family. Through her investigative efforts, we learn the story of Sarah.

The film begins with events that took place in the Marais district of Paris on July 16, 1942. On that date, French police and political figures forced Jews living in the arena, the Velodrome d'Hiver. Eventually the Jewish detainees were sent to a camp, Beaune-la-Ronde, where the family is separated. First the father is taken; then mothers are separated from their children.

We see these events from the perspective of 10-year-old Sarah. When the police arrive to forcibly remove them from their apartment, Sarah is playing with her brother. Their father is not home. They are told to pack for a few days and leave most of their possessions.

Sarah locks her brother in a cupboard in the bedroom, telling him to be quiet until she returns. Sarah lies to the police about the whereabouts of her brother and father when she sees that her mother doesn't seem to know what to do. As they are being carried away, their father returns home. They are taken away and spend days in horrible conditions in the Velodrome. As Julia explains to her very young colleagues, "Imagine the Superdome after Katrina, only 1000 times

Scenes of these events are harrowing, realistic, chaotic and frightening. They are the most powerful in the film. Sarah, at 10 years old, is played by Melusine Mayance. Her character is smart, fierce and determined, and so is the performance. Just when the ugliness of past events threatens to overwhelm, we are given some breathing space in our world today.

Sarah has covered the story of the detention and imprisonment of the 13,000 Jews



taken away in 1942. The old story begins to intersect her life when she and her husband begin renovations on an apartment that has been in his family since 1942. She is able to turn her curiosity about her husband's family's possible connection to Sarah Starzynski's family into an assignment with the magazine where she works, and she dives into finding out what happened to the family forced out of their apartment.

The contemporary story is not as dramatic or compelling as the early story. For some, that will be a complaint. To my eyes and mind it is a reminder of how safe and easy life is today. There are those that who claim that "9/11 changed everything." Sarah's Key makes that claim ring hollow.

Kristen Scott Thomas plays Julia, and she keeps the contemporary scenes interesting, even when the storyline is gentler. She is as smart, fierce and determined as Sarah. Her caring and intelligence are truly engaging. Honestly, as long as she is on screen, I'm happy in any movie.

When the story moves to Brooklyn, we get this familiar taste of how, in our country, in our century, inconvenient family histories are not available. I imagine that in every family there are chapters that go undiscussed. Of the families with whom I claim any intimacy, A slightly phony element of Sarah's Key

is the surprise that the families, well, some branches of them, feel when the doors of those cupboards start rattling. But that quality of "I'm shocked, shocked to discover that there is intrigue and mystery in my family!" is also quaint.

Director Gilles Paquet-Brenner (who co-wrote the adaptation with Serge Joncour) is usually a very commercial filmmaker. He has done good service to this story, making it engaging and watchable while communicating serious themes.

I have seen many films about the Holocaust, and it does require taking a deep thoughtful breath to know, walking into a film, that horror and heartbreak await - not the fake horror of monsters or vampires, but the real horror of what people still living have survived, of what we are capable of doing to each other.

I'm very glad that I saw Sarah's Key. I recommend it to all audiences, especially to viewers who are young and maybe haven't seen many accounts of the Holocaust. Sarah's Key connects the past and the present with believability, confidence, a sense of compassion for what has passed and a sense of possibility for a better future.

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

The Frye Family Band Under Indiana Lights

Do not be alarmed, gentle reader. You may see that *Under Indiana Lights* is a "family band" and have your head filled with images of Partridge Family buses and charming but less than professional instrumental performances recorded on a Tascam in what was formerly the sewing room. While I have no doubt that Tom



Frye is a devoted family man and loves little more than playing music with his wife and kids onstage during local performances, when it came to recording his songs he hightailed it down to professional studios in Nashville, Tennessee. And who wouldn't, if they counted among their friends such heavy-hitting Christian musicians as Andrew Peterson, Andy Osenga (formerly of Caedmon's Call), Jeremy Casella, Matt Pierson and Phil Keaggy? So in this case "family band" means backing vocals. Nothing personal, kids – it even happened to Ringo Starr.

In an effort to make his lyrics more personal, Frye spent some time away, reflecting and writing and polishing and writing some more. The effort is evident because these songs shine like stars with broad, open melodies and solid hooks, all solidly based in a pure heartland Americana sound. The opening track, "Consume Me," is an upbeat invitation to Jesus to take control of his life and use it for His glory, a song which could easily find a home in many churches with its endearing, singable chorus and cheery lyrics. "Where Is God?" asks the age-old question of why evil exists if God is good, although it's difficult to think of bad things with such sweet background vocal harmonies. "The Greatest Gift" is a perfect glimpse of Christmas morning, capturing the eager excitement of this magical time through the eyes of a child and yet directing the meaning of the season back to The Child for which the holiday is named.

A number of the songs on *Under Indiana Lights* tell stories. One such gem is "Sarah Danced," a song inspired by a family Frye met on tour whose daughter, Sarah, suffers from spina bifida and is dependant on her father to carry her around but dreams of the day when she'll be able to dance with her Heavenly Father. Frye's gift at unfolding a story will bring a tear of joy to your eye, and if that doesn't do it there's plenty of piano, acoustic guitars and real strings to coax the song to life. "Blue Silos" is about Tom's childhood, staring out across the fields at some neighbors' blue silos and wondering if life in that household was peaceful and warm instead of the broken, tension-filled home in which he lived. The joyous melody is a suitable companion to the events that happened when, as an adult, Frye visited that family and they welcomed him as one of their own. Songs like these are indicative of the album where his intent was to "reflect the pain of living in a fallen world" but revealing the "joy of recognizing the little glimpses of Heaven foreshadowed in everyday life."

Under Indiana Lights is an album that should be in the collection of every fan of Andrew Peterson, Caedmon's Call, Pierce Pettis, and Mark Heard. Frye is as gifted a storyteller as he is a songwriter, wrapping memorable tales and characters around impressive melodies and vocal harmonies. He didn't need an army of Nashville's finest to bring these songs to life, but that added extra touch of professionalism makes Under Indiana Lights an album you'll return to time and again. his long life America is a much different place than the place he was born in. When he happens to take a ride in an airplane in the 1920s, he knows immediately that the new world is not for him.

Johnson's novella manages somehow to be grand in scale despite its small size, and its methodical prose effortlessly navigates the boundary zone between enthusiasm and hyperbole. He infuses the book with Twain-like color without ever moving into the territory of the tall tale. There are strange things in Grainier's world, but he is not a strange man, and Johnson tells us about all of it in a way that is both pragmatic and haunted, just like his protagonist.

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
