Kings, queens and jacks make any poker hand look good. But even a hand full of royal faces will bow to one filled with aces. That's a fact Ace Hood and his family, looking across the flat landscape of southern Florida, could see for miles. And since 2007 the hiphop world has seen Hood shuffling fast out of the Florida sun with as strong a hand as anyone in the business.

Ace Hood brings his hot Florida show to the cool of Piere's Friday, October 14.

Though a lifelong fan of rap, Hood had other plans while growing up in Broward County. Born Antoine Mc-Colister, Hood figured he'd have a career as a professional football player, but an injury in high school turned his focus toward his first love, rapping. Either way, his family knew he would be successful.

"I got the name 'Ace' as a child," Hood says in his website's biography. "My family always thought that I would be the one who would succeed in whatever I did. I feel like I'm an army in myself. I carry my own weight, and since I represent for the hood, why not attach that to my name?"

At 17, Hood hooked up with the Broward Countybased label Dollaz & Dealz to record his first hit, "M.O.E (Money Over Everything).'

Despite the positive response to that first recording, Hood knew it was going to take lots of hard work to get beyond local success and move on to the regional then national recognition. He kept pushing himself and promoting his rapping at local clubs and events. Eventually he caught the ear of South Florida's DJ Khaled.

"We was outside the radio station not even trying to get a deal, just hoping to perform at his (Khaled's) birthday bash. We just figured we'd try and perform. He had a contest going on where you had to give a certain amount of reasons why you should perform at the birthday bash. So I was going to rap for him on camera and show him why I was worthy. Although he had to go to a meeting, he came out, looked at me and said, 'I love his image.' We handed him a CD, and once we did that he listened to it and called my manager that night. He said, 'I love his swag, I hear starvation in his music, and I want to take a meeting with him.'

Khaled was in the process of starting his own label, called "We the Best." Khaled liked what he heard from Hood and made Hood the first artist on his new label.

> With help from South Florida artists T-Pain and Rick Ross, Khaled and Hood released Hood's single "Cash Flow." The success of "Cash Flow" led to the release of Hood's first CD, Gutta. The disc featured a slew of rap's elite including Trick Daddy, Flo Rida, Akon, Plies and production from Cool and Dre, The Runners, Danjahandz and J.U.S.T.I.C.E.

A lot has changed for Hood since those early days. He's released two more albums, become a father of twins and has moved well beyond the flatlands of Florida. In 2007 he released Ruthless and then took a couple years off. It was during that downtime that he became a father and began to turn his rapping toward the more personal side. When he returned to the studio in 2011, the result was Blood, Sweat & Tears a disc featuring the single "Hustle Hard." Hood reached a milestone with the single, performing it with Lil' Wayne, Rick Ross and DJ Khaled at this year's BET Awards show.

"It was big," Hood told theboombox.com. "I felt like that definitely had to be the highlight of my career. That's a day I'll never forget especially with artists like Lil Wayne or Rick Ross, it kind of like was an introduction to what the next generation has to offer. Me stepping out there and having everybody arrive and show me a lot of love was really big."

Life has moved pretty fast for Hood. Fame, fortune love and death have come into his world in quick succession, and with songs like "Lord Knows" and "Memory Lane," both off Blood, Sweat & Tears, Hood raps about how all of it has affected him.

"Blood, Sweat & Tears is a whole different type of music for me. It's my life testimony," he told boombox. "It's a different album for hip-hop in general; it's not so much glorifying women or cars or whatever. It's really telling the struggle, what's really going on in the streets. I feel like this album is definitely a phenomenal project. Timeless music, as I like to

Hood has been spending a lot of time on the road supporting Blood, Sweat &

Tears. For the health-conscious father of two, that time has meant learning to deal with keeping in shape and finding ways to stay connected to his daughters.

"I played ball in my high school years and what not. I just kept working on it. Every once in a while I would go on different diets. I would go on a protein diet, eating tuna fish, eggs or chicken breast or things of that nature. Being that I'm not able to work out so much on the road, I do 500-600 push-ups a day. I do a couple hundred before the show; in the morning I wake up and do push-ups during the day. Anytime I am able to do that I get 'em in. I do sit-ups as well, just to keep it right, so that when I do step up it's on a different level. That and being on stage, it keeps me fit; I sweat a lot. I have a fast metabolism. People look at me and think I workout everyday, but I just got a dope method. You gotta take care of that

"As for my daughters, for me it's a blessing for me to do what I love and to be blessed with a gift of two beautiful little girls. It's amazing. I feel like the greatest dad on earth. I'm not able to see my girls as much as I would like to, but thank God for Skype!"

There was a time when Halloween was largely considered a kids' holiday. In fact, adults often were left to grumble about the constant knocks on the door, the aggravation of dressing the young ones in costumes and carting them house to house in typically undesirable weather, even the temptation of leftover candy hanging around for several days thereafter. But those bygone days seem a dim memory now, as kids seem almost beside the point when it comes to Halloween revelry. The adults have clearly gotten on

Perhaps the switch isn't really that surprising. Those who grew up loving Halloween - the costumes, the treats, the spooky fright night elements - may not have entirely grown up after all and have simply brought the fun along with them into adulthood. And, as it happens, the horror aspects can be amped up a bit now, now that they're at an age to handle the terror. For the most

Ironically, Russ Gusching admits he was never a big fan of the holiday, not one to get excited at the prospect of dressing up and all that accompanied Halloween. But now, as he oversees the popular Haunted Cave, now open for its 14th season, he finds himself spending most of the year thinking about October 31. What began as a diversion for college buddies and a private party celebrated as an annual tradition, once the Haunted Cave opened to the public, that's when the fun really

"It starts out as a business, but after awhile it gets into your blood," says Gusching. "It becomes part of who you are.'

Although he says he tries to take a couple months off from Halloween every year - right around the time that Christmas and New Year's come into focus - the planning of the Cave has become a year-round endeavor, something he never completely shuts off.

"A lot of times I'll be sitting at the table eating dinner and I'll have an idea and will have to get up and write it down before I forget. It's hard to shut it off, and I'm making plans for it all the time. I actually have a layout for what we're

going to do through 2015 already."

From the first year to this year, at-

tendance has doubled, testimony to the growing popularity and word of mouth recommendations for the Haunted Cave. While Gusching is always mindful to keep it fresh and make changes along the way, he often finds the visitors are aware of the layout from year to year and hope each visit will be like the last. When they tried to remove one of the rooms a few years ago in an effort to add some surprises, popular demand

Gusching says he's surprised how carefully return visitors study the layout.

"I don't know how they remember where

each room is after a year away, but they do."

No doubt some kind of sensory memory is at work there, given the carefully plotted thrills and chills which opens with one of the Cave's most popular features - the elevator ride. Actually, the Haunted Cave website (www.hauntedcave.com), through the words of Creeper, best describes the fun that ensues after that.

'Your adventure will begin with a 60 second ride down our Mind Shaft. Where you will be transported from our toxic storage facility into the bowels of the Haunted Cave. Once you've hit bottom, the real journey begins, as you enter a 2,000-gallon underground cesspool where Eddie resides. and he hasn't eaten in nearly a year. From there you will traverse nearly one-fourth mile of pathways in and out of 16 more rooms, covering 10,000 square feet and ending in our Vortex, which will spin you back up to the surface. From spiders and clowns, morgues and the Old West, dot rooms and door rooms to fog rooms and more, we have a little something for everyone."

The aforementioned "toxic storage facility" is this year's newest attraction, and Gusching promises a "waste dump feel." While most days that wouldn't be a selling feature, on Halloween it's pretty much what the doctor ordered. The 2,000 gallons of water used to fill the swamp makes it one of the Cave's favored rooms, further proving how standards of fun shift in the month of October.

It's hard to imagine that Halloween will ever again only be about little kids in boxed princess and superhero costumes. Now, with demands for real, sensory, imaginative activities demanded by people of all ages, traditions like the Haunted Cave are here to stay. After 14 years, the fun seems to have only begun, and Russ Gusching has plenty more in store for Fort Wayne Halloween fans.

"We try to change at least one or two things every year. We look for ways to keep investing in the Haunted Cave, and we pride ourselves on our ability to improve upon it year after year."

It's not easy being the voice of a generation, especially when most people saddled with the responsibility by writers and commentators never asked for the job. Bluesman Billy Branch is no exception. He didn't intend to be charged with carrying the blues torch and passing it from the generation that came before him to the one that's coming after, but when he realized that many onlookers were expecting him to do just that he rose

In fact, in the beginning Branch didn't intend to play the blues at all. He was born in Chicago, but his family moved to Los Angeles when he was young, well before the Windy City's blues scene could have any influence on him. In L.A., Branch grew up – even learning how to play the harmonica – completely unaware of the musical destiny that lay before him. He remembers a point in high school when a teacher encouraged him to do a project about a musical revolution; he and his partners on the project put together a musical report on Jimi Hendrix, Janis Joplin and Chuck Berry. His teacher was surprised.

"Afterwards, we went to the teacher and I said, 'So how did you like it?" Branch recalls. "And he said, 'Well, it was cool. But I thought you were going to do, like, Muddy Waters and Howlin' Wolf.' And I said, 'Oh man, we're not into that."

He wouldn't be into it until after he went back to Chicago in 1969 and began pursuing a degree in political science at the University of Illinois' Circle Campus. That's when he happened to attend a festival in Grant Park produced by Willie Dixon. There he heard Junior Wells, Muddy Waters, Koko Taylor and all the big names. He was blown away. He ran home and dug out the only blues record he owned –a John Mayall and the Blues Breakers album that he got as a free gift when he'd had some film developed – and tried to play along with it on his harmonica. It didn't go so well.

"I couldn't figure out why I couldn't play along with that record," he says. "I didn't know that harmonicas came in different love."

Branch would learn quickly, though, and it wasn't long before he'd caught the attention of some very important people in the blues world. He started spending time with Lucius Barner, who happened to be the stepson of harmonica great Junior Wells, and Barner introduced him to Wells. Wells was skeptical of the nerdy honor student with the big Afro, but before long Branch was part of the scene, hanging out at Theresa's and Florence's and Alice's Revisited, listening to

Carey Bell and Charlie Musselwhite and occasionally sitting in. He had his foot in the door, but he didn't have a reputation yet.

"What I would do is, I would go for awhile, and then I would disappear for maybe a couple months

so they'd forget who I was," he says.

They'd start to remember him after an encounter he had at the Green Bunny in 1975 with Little Mack Simmons, a well-known harmonica player who offered \$500 to anyone who could beat him in a harp duel. At the encouragement of his friends, Branch took the challenge. After some back and forth during which Simmons put hurdle after hurdle in front of Branch, the new kid seemed to have gained the upper hand. That's when Simmons cut the competition short by claiming the club's boss said it was closing time. Not until years later when they ran into each other on an airplane did Simmons admit that he had been beaten that night, but

the rest of the Chicago blues scene knew that there was a new harp player in town whose talent needed to be acknowledged.

The next step in Branch's ascension came courtesy of

Willie Dixon, the same blues legend whose festival in Grant Park had turned Branch on to the blues. Branch got Dixon's number from a girl he knew on the UIC campus who worked as Dixon's secretary, and he gave Dixon a call. Dixon invited Branch to Chess Studios the next day, where he'd fill in for Carey Bell on a recording of "The Last Home Run," a song commemorating Hank Aaron's breaking of Babe Ruth's home run record

Off-and-on contact with Dixon continued for a while until, around 1979, Dixon asked Branch to come on tour with his All-Stars. Bell was thinking about leaving the band, and Dixon was offering Branch

a spot as an apprentice harmonica player. When Bell finally left and Branch became the band's full-time harp player, there were some growing pains as the young kid learned how to fit into a seasoned band, but eventually Branch earned everyone's respect, not just as a live performer but as a studio musician who would go on to record with many blues greats.

It wasn't just his replacement of Bell, however, that put Branch in the role of the new generation's harmonica ambassador. In 1977 the Berlin Jazz Festival was looking for just that – a group of young players who would come to the festival as a representation of the new face of the blues.

Branch and 12 other young musicians were recruited to play at the festival, and they liked playing together so much that they kept doing gigs after they got home. The new band, Sons of the Blues, was truly the next generation in the lineage of Chicago blues; it included Lurrie Bell, Carey's son, on guitar and Freddie Dixon, Willie's son, on bass. Branch played with the SOBs while he continued with the All-Stars, providing a bridge between the old and the new.

Even as he was taking the torch from his elders, Branch was preparing to hand it off. He and the SOBs founded Blues in the Schools, a program dedicated to teaching young people the importance of this fundamental American music. Through outreach to kids, Branch hoped to give other African American young people something he missed out on: an early appreciation of their cultural heritage. The program has been so successful that it has drawn the participation of dozens of musicians, historians and organizations across the Americas and Europe.

And it, along with playing, has kept Branch busy for over 30 years. It's been three decades of passing on wisdom he gained from Willie Dixon.

"Willie always preached that the blues are the facts of life and the roots of America's music," he says.

From Dixon to Branch to the next generation of blues players, the torch gets handed off, and the roots of America's music stay

They Say It's Your Birthday

Julia Meek has been rather prolific in the Fort Wayne art and music scene. She's been involved in so many different organizations and projects around Northeast Indiana, you're likely already familiar with her. That beautiful mural on the side of Hyde Brothers Booksellers on Wells? She painted it. Listened to NIPR in the past three decades? You've heard her.

Julia Meek is also the woman behind the curtain working all the magic and pulling all the strings for the local public radio station program Meet the Music, which celebrates its first anniversary this month with a live performance celebration at C2G Music Hall.

Meek is a Fort Wayne native and graphic artist whose love for storytelling becomes evident in everything she touches. "I love to tell a good folktale, and I've never met a medium I didn't like. For many years, that medium has been public radio. We're so blessed to have our local public station."

Meek's first commercial art job came right out of high school designing presentation slides for a member of her church. Her self-described "explorer nature" led her to own and establish a screen print and design business. After successfully running that for many years, Meek followed her love of folktales and got involved in local and regional history fieldwork and co-founded the Canal Society of Indiana.

Meek got on board at NIPR when its first station WBNI switched from being a college station to a community one. She was asked to do her first radio show in 1981, and she has been on air and coming up with ideas for great shows ever since. She began working on Meet the Music in the summer of 2010, seeking to shine a light on the "above average amount of music in the "

"Fort Wayne is a cultural arts and entertainment highway through the Midwest," said Meek. "We have an incredible amount of geographically and demographically diverse music. The chance to showcase that is a dream come true for all of us. I knew the listeners would love it and the artists would appreciate such a venue. It has exceeded our wildest expectations."

What is Meet the Music? Each artist segment is 27-minutes of mostly music (roughly 21 minutes) with a dash of talk (6 minutes), all designed to getting to know the musician(s). Typically, Meet the Music runs for two hours, meaning you get to whet your musical palette with four different tastes. It takes place in NIPR's new performing studio

that Meek says is ideal for such a show.

Once she obtained approval for the show in August 2010, Meek had roughly three and a half weeks to get everything together for

a September 2010 premier. She relied upon her extensive network to put together the

"I really want to share every single type of music," Meek said. "We have such much in this area—it makes it easy to be as diverse as possible every single week. No genre gets left behind."

"We've had just over 500 session recordings from roughly 500 musicians going into October. And they ain't seen nothing yet – it just keeps getting bigger and better," enthused Meek.

She cited examples such as the Ty Causey Band – a soul/R&B band known both locally and nationally – and Hikaru & Yoko Tamaki performing classical Japanese music on koto and cello. "There wasn't a dry eye in the house," she remembered. "It's those moments that allow us to expose Fort Wayne's best kept secrets."

Other featured genres on the show have

included Native American, spoken word, gospel rock, swing, funk, rap, rock and jazz. Meek says her next goal is to secure some Latin, Greek, Burmese and classical sub-genres as well. "We've just hit the tip of the iceberg. We're constantly looking for ways to expand our genre offering."

Due to syndication and copyright issues, you must catch Meet the Music on air Thursdays from 7-9 p.m., with an encore presentation on Sundays at the same time. Not near a radio? NIPR is available to stream online.

To celebrate Meet the Music's first anniversary, NIPR and Meek have coordinated a live show on October 13 for the public at C2G Music Hall. This event also marks the receipt of a grant that allows NIPR to live remote broadcast.

"What better way to celebrate a milestone anniversary than to test this equipment out?" Meek said. "It changes our mantra that we are 'long on audio and short on video.""

Musical guests for the Meet the Music anniversary celebration include Sunny Taylor and Ben Porter, the Afro-Disiacs and recent *whatzup* Battle of the Bands winners Elephants in Mud.

Between musical sets, behind-thescenes photos from Meet the Music sessions will be shown on a big screen for fans to enjoy. Meek said one of the goals for the celebration was to pro-

goals for the celebration was to provide a complementary visual experience to the typically aural one.

During the event, NIPR will be giving away a collection of outtakes called *After the Fade*, which Meek described as "all of the stuff you didn't get to hear during the sessions. Twenty or more of this year's groups will be featured on this compilation, with all original content and the best fadeouts of the first session of Meet the Music."

The Meet the Music anniversary celebration is free to the public. Meek assured me that there would be plenty of good food and drinks, with Mad Anthony Brewing Company manning a cash bar. Doors open at 6 p.m., with showtime from 7-9 p.m.

Can't make it to the show? You can tune in to nipr.fm to listen to the live broadcast. In the meantime, you can help celebrate Meet the Music's one-year anniversary by liking them on Facebook. Meek said their goal is to close out this season with 1,000 fans.

80s Rockers on Wheels

Right about now I'm wondering what the glue is that holds a band together? Music is so personal, and when you spend night after night trying to take five different efforts and jam them together, shape what you've made to please the ear of your audience, and maybe somewhere in there send a message, it can take a toll on an artist. It's little wonder so many successful bands disintegrate into petty squabbling. For Troy Shifflett a band is about friends making music they love. Everything after that just falls into place.

Shifflett, lead guitar and co-founder of the local band Teaser, says of the group, "We're just really tight. Even if we weren't in a band, we would still be hanging out together at a bar."

This friendship began amid clouds of fluffy hair and mountains of tight spandex when metal was king – high school in the 80s. Shifflett and Mike Snider, under the influence of the increasingly popular Mötley Crüe, decided to take on the metal.

"We tried to spit fire like Kiss and dressed like Mötley Crüe." But the band, like love on prom night, was short-lived. They broke up, its members pursuing separate musical ventures though still remaining friends

In 2003 Shifflett and Snider reunited, adding long-time friend Scott Clark on bass. Together they breathed life back into Teaser, this time without the Mötley Crüe get-up. It quickly became a foursome when Scott's son Jaron, a choir singer at the time, belted out a couple of tunes while sitting in on a practice session. A few years later, in 2006, Ken Bebout joined as a second lead vocalist. "With two lead singers the opportunities are endless," said Shifflett. "It gives us way more variety. Ken sings that deep baritone,

The release of their self-titled first record, came in 2009. Shifflett and Bebout wrote the album together and kept to their 80s roots. They churned out the loud rock anthems while keeping their personal lives out of the music, save for one song. Like most of the members of Teaser, Shifflett is a biker through and through. Longing for the road and cooped up inside, he penned the song "A Million Miles Away" about the unquenchable thirst for the open road. This was a

and Jaron will get the high 80s sound.

first for him – a song about a personal subject matter. He was putting himself out there for band members and audiences to see and ridicule. The idea made him nervous, but his fears were extinguished; audiences loved the song, prompting a different approach for writing the next album

Hollywood Ending, released in 2010, was comprised of songs written almost entirely by Shifflett and dealing with much more personal subject matter. "It's all true. Every song is a personal experience." he said of his music on Hollywood Ending. Shifflett wrote "I Want to Thank You" in memory of his grandparents, with whom he was particularly close. "We've gotten a lot of response off that. People always have something to say about it. Everyone can relate somehow because it's about losing someone you love."

Of course, Teaser shows are filled with a lot more than just original work. They play the classics, the crowd pleasers and the new hits. This is where their vocal range comes in, because their musical repertoire spans artists like Nickleback, Theory of a Deadman, AC/DC, Kid Rock, Toby Keith, Big and Rich and Rob Zombie.

As hard as it seems to imagine an 80s rock band full of edgy bikers appealing to everyone, that's what Shifflett loves about their music. "It brings families together. We have a mother who comes out to a lot of our shows with her daughter, and [she] meets up with her son there too."

There are a couple of theories as to why they get such a warm reception from a wide audience. Sure it's about the variety of music, and it helps that they've got some hits on the radio too. Local radio station 98.9 The Bear got the word out about Teaser when they featured the song "In My Dream" on their Local Licks program. That's one song Shifflett thinks could easily make it nationally, but he retains his humility, saying, "As soon as we start playing ["In my Dreams"], there are people singing along with it. I'm just a local guy and people are singing along with my song. That's pretty cool."

But the big reason Teaser keeps the audiences coming back is the same glue that holds them together. This is just a group of friends who like to hang out and jam. "We really genuinely love playing music together. That shows. I think that's why people come out and watch us. They see we're having a good time."

Serendipitous Finds

One of my great wine tasting joys is discovery. That's the kind of experience that made me start writing this crazy thing to be-

gin with. This bolt from the blue can take lots of different forms. I might be impressed by someone's advice on a wine, I could find a random pairing that works, or I could run into something unexpected. Let me share a few of those fun times with you.

My newly-certified sommelier buddy, James V., turned me on to the Domaine Sautereau Sancerre. This is a French sauvignon blanc from the eastern part of the Loire. He gave it two thumbs up and I trust his palate, so I gave it a run. This is simply a pretty smelling wine. "Flowering cantaloupe" was my first thought. Yes, I know. That's an odd description, but I like it better than "floral with melon undertones." The flavor was intriguing. Like most Sancerre, this is a light bodied, acidic, minerally wine. This one, however, had a wonderfully balanced creaminess I'd never tasted before in one of these wines. Made me light right up.

When James first tried this wine, he had the good fortune to visit the property. He told me that they served it with chevre (goat cheese) and hard salami on crackers, so I tried to duplicate the experience. I was initially a bit skeptical. With the cheese alone, the wine developed an odd flavor, but adding the crackers and meat - unearthly good as a pairing. I experimented by replacing the water crackers with a rosemary-flavored Triscuit, and it turned into one of the best "appetizer pairings" I've had. The wine is into the 2010 vintage now. It's \$22 from Bond Street Wines (http://www. bondstreetwines.com), and I highly recommend it.

Another day, the Sweet Partner in Crime and I cooked up a pot of turkey chili, which was an interesting concoction. I ran out of cumin, one of my base spices, so I substituted garam masala, an Indian spice blend, and a little bit of coffee (rule of good chili: just keep throwing things in until it tastes right).

With this amalgamation we were at a loss for a wine. After reviewing our on-hand options, I rolled the dice and cracked the Bodegas Salentein Killka Collection 2008 Malbec, a \$12 Argentinean number I'd picked up on a whim. I love it when a plan comes together. The Killka turned out to be a fruity, fairly complex wine that went down nicely on its own. Plenty of blackberry and vanilla to start, and flavor of this medium-bodied wine stays quite smooth throughout. There's that yummy smoky quality a good malbec has, but it lingers in the background and stays subtle on the finish - a fin-

ish with a good, firm fruity flavor and enough tannin to be interesting.

Alongside the chili, the malbec's tannins worked nicely with the spices, revealing some very interesting complementary flavors. The Indian spices deepened and the chili powder had a "fuller" flavor. Also, since tannin is an acid and capsaicin (the molecule that makes chili hot) is a base, the malbec tamed the fire a bit. I don't know if I could duplicate it, but we sure liked it

On a recent trip to the wine store, K2, one of my wine pals, recommended the Highflyer 2009 Grenache Blanc, saying it was his "favorite white wine of the moment." The Highflyer is a Napa Valley creation. I don't think I'd ever tried a white Grenache that didn't come from the Rhone or Spain, so I was, on one hand, really looking forward to the experience. That said, I was also somewhat wary of a white wine from Napa, since I'm not usually a big fan. I had the heavy oak and heavy butter of Napa chardonnay in my head, but I was trusting. I poured and swirled.

Bottom line? It's a tasty, tasty bottle. My first reaction was, "This is California chardonnay, dialed way back." There's oak and butter, but they're really nicely balanced with some pear and berry. The body is medium with a nice evenness of oak and pear. The finish is oaky and lasting, but softly so. Very enjoyable. It also turned out to be a killer choice with some spice rubbed, grilled chicken breasts and a green bean salad. The Highflyer will run you around \$20, but it's worth it.

Sometimes I get lucky with something utterly mundane. It's not always tasting central around Vine HQ. Sometimes one of us just needs a glass of wine to throw down without thinking. We usually have a box of white wine lingering in the fridge for just such a purpose. I'd snagged Big House Wines "The Birdman" Pinot Grigio at around \$18 for three liters. I was aware of Big House red and white, but I hadn't tried one of their "single varietals" before. In past experiences, box pinot grigio is normally one step above flavored water. The Birdman was a very pleasant find. (Somewhere, Chris Anderson is smiling.) Light and pleasant with actual structure in its pear and lime flavors, it's a simple, easy quaffer that's certainly not a flabby, watery mess you might expect. For a box wine, that's pretty much all you can ask for.

Wilco

The Whole Love

The anticipation leading up to this, Wilco's eighth full-length, has been palpable. In the months leading up to the release of *The Whole Love*, Wilco have artfully deployed singles, tantalizing video clips, limited-time audio streams and artwork—can you tell they're putting this one out themselves?



But such buzz building could easily lead to anticlimactic "ho hums" if the record doesn't live up to the hype. Thankfully, *The Whole Love* measures up, and then some. Almost exactly a decade after they finished the landmark *Yankee Hotel Foxtrot*, Wilco have produced what is arguably its rightful followup, though the challenging *A Ghost Is Born* was nothing to sneeze at. *Sky Blue Sky* and *Wilco (the Album)* had their moments as well, but they didn't have the sense of challenge and forward momentum that charged every Wilco disc up through *Ghost*.

The Whole Love, however, feels different. Vital. It sounds like it wants to take you somewhere. You get that unbeatable combination of energy, giddy inventiveness, jarring emotional honesty and telegraphed wordplay — sometimes all wrapped up in the same song. "Found a fix for the fits / come listen to this / it's buried under the hiss / and it glows / like a powerful smile / car radio dial / as intimate as a kiss / over a phone / and it goes" may not stir the less-clued-in punters at the live shows, but it's emblematic of the kind of nuanced, non-obvious lyrics Jeff Tweedy sprinkles throughout the album. Elsewhere, Tweedy eschews logical lines entirely, reveling in the pure sounds of the words on the garage-poppy "I Might": "Magna Carta's on a Slim Jim blood brutha! / The sunk soul with the coal clean toe, is the mutha!" Yes, weird. But the elation — abetted by the clever inclusion of a Stooges sample in the midst of the line — is infectious.

The current lineup is now seven years and three albums old, and they fully exploit their chemistry and talent here. The opening cut, "Art of Almost," is full of keyboard atmospheres, sonic glitches and tripping beats, but it's still recognizably Wilco. It's the kind of heartening departure any longstanding fan will appreciate. The midsection of the album may be more "conventional," but it's consistently rich and full of subtle aural surprises. Listen to the folky, melancholy "Black Moon" or the joyous call home of "Dawned on Me" and you're instantly engaged but aware that further listens will allow these songs to unfurl over time.


"Capitol City" invites Sgt. Pepper's-era McCartney comparisons, with its jaunty music hall vibe; it's a great example of the kind of playfulness on display here. "Born Alone" juxtaposes its jangle with Nels Cline's supercharged guitar work, while Tweedy manages to turn loneliness and sadness into some kind of triumph. "Standing O" may sound like a slight, poppy Nick Lowe homage, but it fits perfectly in the album's song sequence. "Whole Love" catches Tweedy in bouncy falsetto mode, replete with sun-dappled guitar arpeggios and an irresistible series of hooks.

But the real accomplishment on *The Whole Love* belongs to its 12-minute closer, "One Sunday Morning (Song for Jane Smiley's Boyfriend)." Initially sparse and never exceeding a measured pace, this song presents Wilco at their mature, subtle best. That a 12-minute, mostly acoustic song with a hushed and Dylanesque approach to verse can hold the listener's rapt attention throughout is a small victory in itself, but it also drives home the realization that, hey, this is Wilco (the Band), not Jeff Tweedy and an impressive collection of gifted sidemen. *The Whole Love* marks a world-class band living up to its potential. (*D.M. Jones*)

Eddie Vedder

Ukulele Songs

Like his solo debut, Eddie Vedder's second solo record, *Ukulele Songs*, is a brief and subtle collection that focuses on words and voice, rather than rock n' roll. That first record, a soundtrack for Sean Penn's excellent *Into the Wild* film, proved to be a pleasant surprise full

Wild Gift (1981)

I'm amused when I hear people call X a punk band. Sure, the music had some punk elements, but they were more rhythm and blues/new wave than say, Black Flag, the Dead Kennedy's or Fugazi. This, their second album, is



33 minutes of crunchy pop with clever hooks and the delicious vocals of Illinois natives John (Duchac) Doe and (Christine) Exene Cervanka. I shouldn't forget to mention Billy Zoom (born Tyson Kindell) and his skills on a Gretsch. Oh yeah, and Ray Manzerek from The Doors produced it.

Most of the tracks come in at around two minutes, but they all seem to fit perfectly in this collection. Quick riffs and straightforward chords make this one of my favorite albums from high school.

It kicks in with "The Once Over Twice," and by the time you get to "Adult Books" you are three songs into the first side in just under eight minutes. It's like watching a cartoon. "Universal Corner" is the longest track (4:33) and is grungier than most X. "I'm Coming Over" follows at the quick pace of just 75 seconds.

"White Girl" may be the most familiar song from X, but it isn't even the best song on this record. On the raucous "When Our Love Passed Out On The Couch," the punk vibe is unmistakable, but it still has a romantic vibe behind the snappy drumming of DJ Bonebrake and the channeled Ramones sound from Zoom.

X are currently on tour with their feature documentary, X – The Unheard Music, followed by a set playing their first release, Los Angeles. You can now get both of these albums on one CD. I say go for it.

storied career. For the *Wild* record, Vedder was challenged to make moody music that fit the youthful and wandering spirit of the film's real-life protagonist, Christopher McCandless. To say Vedder pulled it off would be an understatement. With *Ukulele Songs*, Vedder again challenges himself, this time in a much different way. Rather than limit his moods or topical range, Vedds is here limiting himself to two elements: voice and tiny guitar (aka ukulele).

A popsmith at his core, Vedder has no trouble finding his way through the record's 15 vocal tracks (and one short interlude), almost all of which come and go before they have a chance to get old. Opener "Can't Keep" would, I imagine, be the record's lead single if rock artists still released singles in 2011. It's an instantly accessible and upbeat track that sees Vedder dropping his quiver and wail in favor of a thick, nuanced vocal that highlights his strengths in a way similar to *Into the Wild* but not too much like his performances on the recent Pearl Jam record, *Backspacer*. It's a lovely opener that's more or less worth the price of admission.

After the near-perfect opener the challenge sets in. Can the Ed Vedd find a way to keep interest with only voice and ukulele? Many reviewers have been saving "no." I'm saying yes. There are songs that take a while to grow, but Vedder has become such a strong writer and melody maker over the years that he pulls it off. Well, mostly. There are, as you'd expect, a few songs that feel like retreads, and a couple that just don't quite hold up as well as the bulk.

The collection hits its stride over four particular songs, starting with "Longing to Belong," a truly beautiful cut featuring some fleshing out by the way of cello. Also, Vedder invites some guest vocalists along for the ride and plays a number of different ukuleles in a number of different styles – all in the name of keeping things interesting. Another favorite, "You're True," is so well written and sung that the ukulele fatigue doesn't begin to register.

"Sleepless Night," a duet with The Frames frontman Glen Hansard (the guy from *Once*), is a short and memorable song that will someday be used during a pivotal moment in some hip rom-com movie. And then there's the other big duet, a cover of "Tonight You Belong to Me," for which Vedder cashes in a favor Chan "Cat Power" Marshall has owed him since the duo's collaboration on Cat Power's great 2004 record, *You Are Free*. On a record with a number of serene moments, this is maybe the best, Marshall's smoky voice

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

One of the biggest Christian music events of the year takes place Friday, October 7 when the One True God Tour hits Wabash, filling the Honeywell Center with Christian rock from Kutless, Newsong, Anthem Light and Dara McClean.



The Oregon-based quintet

Kutless, which just dropped a Christmas EP, entitled *This Is Christmas*, on October 4, has sold over two million records worldwide. The band's 2009 release, *It Is Well*, spawned the hit "What Faith Can Do," which reached No. 1 on the U.S. Christian Music charts and achieved cross-over success as well, reaching No. 14 on Billboard's Heatseekers Songs chart. While riding the charts, "What Faith Can Do" was tracking more than 8 million impressions per week, and the album was nominated for a Dove Award for Rock/Contemporary Album of the Year.

The success of *It Is Well* was nothing new for the band, which first appeared on the Christian rock radar as the opening act for Audio Adrenaline and Mercy Me in 2003. Their 2005 CD, *Strong Tower*, was certified Gold, and the song "All of the Words" from 2004's *Sea of Faces* was featured on "My Bright Idea," an episode of the TV show Scrubs that became one of the first such episodes that could be downloaded on iTunes.

Co-headliners Newsong are one of the most loved

bands in Christian music. They have eight GMA Dove Award nominations and are the founders of the Winter Jam Tour Spectacular, the United States' largest annual Christian music tour which began in 1995 and has included such guests as Steven Curtis Chapman, Jeremy Camp, Newsboys, MeryMe, TobyMac and Skillet. *One True God*, hit No. 1 on the U.S. Christian charts.

Anthem Lights, formerly known as Yellow Cavalier, is a boy band from Nashville, Tennessee, that has toured with MercyMe, Jars of Clay and The Afters. Dara Maclean is a rising singer-songwriter from Fort Worth, Texas, whose music is heavily influenced by classic Motown as well as contemporaries like Adele, Natasha Bedingfield and Marc Broussard.

Sublime only released three studio albums before lead singer Bradley Nowell's untimely death in 1996, but the ska-punk band's impact continues to be felt worldwide, particularly here in Fort Wayne where bands like Unlikely Alibi and Elephants in Mud



thrive and songs like "What I Got," "Santeria" and "Badfish" are heard on dance floors and blaring from jukeboxes all over town.

One other indicator of Sublime's impact on this area is the number of visits to Fort Wayne by Badfish, the tribute to Sublime named for the song from the band's debut album, 40 Oz. to Freedom.

Badfish aren't just frequent visitors to Fort Wayne; they play hundreds of shows nationwide each year, both as the Sublime tribute band and the non-tribute act going by the name of Scotty Don't.

If you're a badfish, too, you'll want to save the date and head to Piere's on Saturday, October 15. If you're completely clueless as to what a badfish even is, here's a hint: if you like bass-driven grooves and reggae rhythms – and who doesn't – you're gonna want to be there too.

I hesitate to write about this for fear it will give our own politicians an idea for something else to do, other than focus on the never-ending Harrison project, of course. We all know how the smoking ban has put many small business owners in Fort Wayne out of



work, so I would hate for this issue to come up here as well. This news, however, is so appalling I had to share it and see what you think: Cleveland, Ohio, the home of the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame, is attempting to provide one more reason to avoid bars and taverns by prohibiting them from providing music and entertainment

The proposal currently before Cleveland's city council is one of the most ridiculous I have ever heard. Yet the people behind it are completely serious. Ordinance 347-11, if passed, would limit entertainment in "local retail districts" to that of an "unamplified acoustic instrument or other entertainment that produces noise levels no greater than that produced by unamplified acoustic musical instruments." In other words, if noise is heard outside your club or bar, you're in trouble.

In addition, if you can afford the expensive soundproofing and choose to have "entertainment," you will be subject to new taxes on each event. The taxes include a \$200 base fee per event, potentially hundreds of dollars more if your venue is over 400 square feet, a tax on bowling alleys levied on a "per lane" basis, taxes on roller rinks and taxes on pool tables, pinball machines, video games and any other "amusement" device, thus taking any chance of having fun in these public places completely out of the equation and likely putting hundreds of small business owners out of work in the process.

Will this ordinance get passed? I doubt it. But the simple fact that it exists is cause for concern to any person who has ever enjoyed a night out listening to local and national musicians or simply playing pool or video games in our taverns and bars. With local elections coming soon, make sure you choose the people who truly represent your interests, especially when it comes to City Council. I'm just sayin'.

Hoosier Values

of Daydreams

The Luxury of Daydreams by Amy McVay Abbott, WestBow Press, 2011

There's a quietness to living in Indiana that some Hoosiers detest. Having lived

here my entire life, I can say with some acquired authority that it takes a certain kind of resolution to be satisfied with staying here in the Midwest, especially the part of the Midwest that's removed from a large urban area, and over the years I've struggled to keep that resolution in place. It comes and it goes; some days this place is unbearably tedious and lacking, and some days it seems like the perfect place to

Abbott's book is the appealing kind of essay collection in which a writer's life comes into view gradually, gaining focus with each piece of the puzzle that falls into place, revealing a picture little by little, slowly rather than all at once. Her story isn't uncovered chronologically, and it almost seems unfair to summarize her biography in a straightforward way here. I'll do it, though. She grew up in Whitley County, went to college at Ball State University, worked as a journalist, moved to Florida for a bit, got married and had a child, returned to southern Indiana and reclaimed her life as a Hoosier. She writes about each of these experiences and how they shaped the woman she is today.

There are themes that run throughout *The Luxury of Daydreams*, and they are the essential values of the Midwest, the kinds of values that everyone thinks of when they think of the virtues of the Heartland. Family, history, faith, compassion, self-sufficiency,



a respect for the land. You couldn't write a more concise textbook with which to teach someone about the things that characterize the better parts of the Midwest than Abbott has written here, and the book doesn't do much to shake up any preconceived notions an outsider might have about this place.

That's not to say it's all smooth sailing and smalltown quaintness. There is struggle and difficulty here, too. The whole impetus to write the book begins when Abbott loses her job, but what is the Midwest about these days if not unemployment? She deals with personal challenges (her son has Asperger's Syndrome, and her mother suffers from dementia) and she

helps other people cope with their own tragedies (she loses a good friend to leukemia, and she does what she can to be supportive to the woman's family). But Abbott gets over these hurdles with the help of Christian faith and an impressive stockpile of old-fashioned Midwestern resilience. There's never any doubt whether she'll be all right in the end.

Part of what helps her keep looking ahead with optimism is her ability to look backward with clarity. She learns about - and teaches us about - her ancestors, Indiana farmers who never wanted to be anything other than what they were, men and women who stood up to the vagaries of nature and the economy, untimely death and every other hardship that came their way with steadfastness. Abbott treasures the objects they passed down to her - a quilt, a mixing bowl, a photograph - as a means to remember where she came from and as an example of how she should keep going.

She writes all of this in a manner that's evocative and engaging. The best Midwestern writers can find poetry in what looks mundane to the unimaginative, and Abbott occupies a space firmly within that tradition. It's not always easy to look around Indiana and see what Abbott sees, but it's good to be reminded that all the good that she finds in this place is here if you're willing to notice it.

Whenever I watch an "extended version" of a movie on DVD I'm always initially conscious of the fact that I'm going to be watching some additional material somewhere, material that was for whatever reason originally deemed unnecessary when it was released theatrically. But after a few minutes I can forget about it and just accept the movie as it is. Not so with *Paul*, which is so meandering and tepid and tentatively paced from start to finish that the entire time I was watching it I constantly kept asking myself, "So, is this the filler material? Or is this? How about this?"

This, of course, implies that I did not like Paul. That's not the case. I (mildly) enjoyed the movie, and found myself (mildly) chuckling every few minutes or so, and was just invested enough in the characters to find out what happened to them in the end. Not the most ringing endorsement in the world, to be sure, but you could do worse.

Graeme (Simon Pegg) and Clive (Nick Frost) are British sci-fi fanboys who have flown all the way to America to attend Comic-Con. After the convention ends the two rent an RV and set out on a long-planned odyssey across the American Southwest with an itinerary that includes stops at all the famous "alien" hot spots like Roswell, New Mexico and something called the Black Mailbox, in Nevada (I had to Google that one).

In their travels, as luck would have it, Graeme and Clive encounter a real, live, actual alien. His name is Paul. He's CGI-generated, and he looks exactly like the standard alien you've seen countless times before. He's voiced by Seth Rogen. As you might expect, he says some funny, off-color stuff. He also smokes weed. (I couldn't get the image of Rogen standing alone in a studio and speaking into a microphone, delivering his trademark stoner's laugh on cue, out of my head.) Considering the momentousness of the occasion - this should be a dream come true for them - Graeme and Clive take Paul's existence remarkably in stride. Maybe they keep picturing Seth Rogen standing alone in a studio, too. Before long, the three are on a road trip.

Frost and Pegg also co-starred the justifiably revered zombie-comedy *Shaun of the Dead*. It has to be said, though, that whereas *Shaun* seemed truly inspired and had gags and scenes that verged on genius, the screenplay (by Frost and Pegg) here seems lackluster and rote. I won't say *Paul* is completely lacking in laughs (it's not), but I will say that at no point will you have any difficulty whatsoever catching your breath between jokes.

The comedic potential for the trio to just simply explore contemporary American culture, each of them a fish out of water in their own way, is huge, but remains largely untapped. Instead, we get not one, not two, but four government officials (plus two rednecks) pursuing them throughout. The final 20 or so minutes devolve mostly into loud explosions and crashes and people swearing at each other. (The award for Most Hilarious Potty Mouth of the Year goes to Kristin Wiig who plays Graeme's love interest.)

It's hard to imagine how some of the scenes here were deemed by director Greg Mottola (*Adventureland*) to be more crucial than others for the final theatrical cut. The entire movie, mildly charming as it is, feels somewhat slapdash, casually executed and, frankly, unnecessary.

Something Borrowed

I watched Something Borrowed on the same day I heard author Thomas L. Friedman being in-

terviewed on the radio about his new book, *That Used To Be Us*. This turned out to be a mistake. Friedman's comments about how America is now populated by people who don't really know how to make things, or build infrastructure, or innovate, or contribute anything of real worth to the global marketplace, rang in my ears as I watched the movie's rich heroine, Rachel (Ginnifer Goodwin), flit about from ritzy Manhattan nightclub to ritzy Manhattan apartment worrying over some trivial romantic problem of her own making, while other 20-something millionaires around her fretted over problems resulting from their own poor discipline and adolescent

self-mythologizing. Turns out that a mildly crappy, warmed-over rom-com combined with concern about the fate of the entire country does not make for an enjoyable

experience.

that much.

Rachel is a lawyer. We know this because she tells us so, not because we get any sense she knows what real work is. Her plight is this: she's in love with her best friend's fiancé. The best friend, Darcy, is played by Kate Hudson, whose reputed highwattage charisma I have been apparently immune to ever since her Oscar-nominated appearance in *Almost Famous* in 1999. Rachel and Darcy are supposedly best friends, but they have nothing in common (except money and connections) and they don't even talk

Darcy's fiancé, Dex, is played by Colin Egglesfield, who looks like a *Top Gun*-era Tom Cruise action figure come creepily to life. When I realized, about half an hour into Something Borrowed, that Dex was go-

ing to be the male romantic lead instead of the infinitely more likeable everydude John Krasinski, I got very annoyed. As a character, Dex is completely passive, wimpy, duplicitous, lacking in integrity and devoid of even the faintest whiff of sincerity. (How much of this is Dex as written on the page and how much is Egglesfield's bland performance is unclear to me.) But, hey, at least he states at one point (oh so sensitively!) that he really wishes to be a teacher to children. This one comment literally charms the pants off Rachel, launching the two into a path of deception that is almost as inane as it is easily resolved.

About Ginnifer Goodwin: she's really good at looking like there's something of actual consequence going on with this wisp of a fragment of a character she's playing. (She played a similarly frustrating doormat in *He's Just Not That Into You*, too.) But the lion's share of the blame goes to Krasinski, whose presence here – if I'm honest with myself – was the only reason I let myself be talked into seeing this to begin with. In his role as Ethan, Rachel's best friend and confidante, Krasinski squanders a good deal of the good will he's built up over the years in his role as Jim in "The Office." For shame, Krasinski, for shame!

I could actually go on much longer about how very deeply I hated this movie. I could almost write an entire book about how execrably bad it is. But then I think that book's already been written ... by [cue ominous music] Thomas L. Friedman. Something Borrowed is a harbinger of nothing less than the collapse of American civilization as we've come to know it. You heard it here first.

sounding as good as ever. Here's to hoping these two perfectly matched vocalists find the time to someday record a full record collaboration.

By keeping the songs short and adding the variety of collaborators, strings, various ukuleles and some cover songs, Vedder has passed his self-imposed challenge with flying colors, creating a soulful and sweet chill-out record that flies by. Long known as an album-maker able to mix art and accessibility in interesting ways, Vedder here continues to make most of his 90s peers look lazy and stale. No, *Ukulele Songs* might not be better than *Into the Wild* was, but, in my opinion, they're both minor classics that are far more interesting than anything Vedder's band, Pearl Jam, has done since *No Code* almost two decades ago now. Jack Johnson's favorite record of 2011, no doubt. (*Greg W. Locke*)

Wu-Tang Clan Legendary Weapons

With the renewed interest in Raekwon following his mediocre *Cuban Linx II* release, the continued success of Ghostface and the movie star-like celebrity of Method Man, it's no surprise that the money-making minds behind the Wu-Tang brand push projects like *Legendary Weapons* into production. Less a proper Wu-Tang record than it is a reminder of the legendary crew's mere presence and



the legendary crew's mere presence and aesthetic, the album belongs in the compilation category, similar to 1998's *The Swarm* album, as well as all the *Swarm* albums released since. So, no, this is not a new Wu-Tang group album, despite what the great-looking packaging implies.

For the compilation, seven of the Wu's key members show up, drop-

For the compilation, seven of the Wu's key members show up, dropping a verse or two apiece, all seemingly half-hearted and disconnected, save for maybe Ghostface. The low points on the record, ironically, come from crew leader RZA, who seems to have lost his artistic hunger long ago. For starters, RZA offers no hand in the production duties, leaving that task to a band called The Revelations, who specialize in organically constructed beats inspired by RZA's early production style. What really stands out, though, are the five or six verses RZA has recorded for the release, all of which sound uninspired and amateurish. RZA was never a great emcee, per se, but he was at one time a big personality with overflowing amounts of love and energy for hip-hop music and his artistic projects. He was, as we remember, "tossin' and flossin'," and his style was awesome.

The real stars here are GZA and The Revelations – GZA because he had the sense to not be involved (same goes for Masta Killa, a far lesser emcee) and The Revelations for putting together some inspired music. Just two years ago the Revs released another record, titled *Chamber Music*, with a similar format and sound to *Legendary Weapons*. Basically, the band played RZA-inspired music while Wu emcees (and seemingly just about any other worthwhile NYC emcee looking for work) dropped half-baked verses. What's interesting about these records is that they look and sound better than any proper Wu group album since 1997's *Forever*. That this group of outsiders are at one paying homage to *and* working with the Wu-Tang Clan seems almost pathetic, as we can only assume that the paychecks involved – and not the love of music or creating – is the reason these discs exist. My question is this: why don't The Revelations get some of their own emcees and release records for The Roots crowd? I think they'd be highly successful, Wu name be damned.

With five studio albums and now 19 compilations credited to the Wu-Tang group name, we can no longer take the crew (when working as a unit, at least) seriously. What was once an artistic force that defined the sound of early- to mid-90s New York City is now nothing more than a brand, up for sale with no quality control in sight.

All that said, the music The Revelations come up with is often great, and, of course, Ghostface is always interesting. RZA, once a hero, has become one of the great disappointments of his genre and generation. It seems that, in 2011, the man can't produce a worthwhile beat, let alone write or record a single solid bar. That he has the gall to plaster his name (and always in lager font size than anyone else) all over such an album only further paints him as an egotistical, clueless and greedy has-been. The Wu Era, officially, is over. And seriously tainted with greed and ego. (G.W.L.)



are no deep messages or true insights in this play, but there is a great deal of well-crafted entertainment, and there are countless laughs.

In the nearly 50 years since its Broadway debut, Forum has been much performed, but I realized that I hadn't seen a production of it since I was very young. When new plays are written every year, and because I've seen quite a bit of theater, I'm sometimes disappointed to see plays such as Oklahoma, Fiddler on the Roof and South Pacific listed when new seasons are announced. A few plays just seem so worn that I wish they would be studied by students of theater but not performed. This play, though, as produced at IPFW's Williams Theatre, makes me rethink my bias against standards. It's that good.

The plot centers on the complications of a Roman slave's scheme to become a free man through assisting his young master in securing the girl of his dreams. Stock characters abound in this play. There's a young hero. A virginal heroine. A henpecked old letch. A shrew of a wife. A peddler of young ladies. An arrogant military man. They are all to be found here. as are a couple of incredibly funny Roman slaves.

There isn't a disappointment in the cast of this production, but there are standouts. As Pseudolus, the slave who longs to be free, Reuben Albaugh is fantastic. So, too, is Michael Bartkiewicz as Hysterium, the head slave of Senex's household. Many should remember Bartkiewicz from First Presbyterian Theater's The Underpants. Both Albaugh and Bartkiewicz manage to take often over-the-top material and draw maximum



Coogan & Brydon Make for a Trip Worth Taking Caine. I have to vote for Brydon. He does

The Trip, a comic, scenic road trip of the Lake District of England and some fine dining establishments, stars Steve Coogan and Rob Brydon and plays like a documentary. The two actors are playing themselves, and I really didn't want to know too much about which parts are true, which are close to true and which are pure invention. The whole is quite entertaining. I keep thinking of a line from the Roche Sisters song, "The Train," "It's a trip and a half."

The premise of *The Trip* is that Coogan has been hired by The Observer to visit the Lake District, take in some of its best restaurants and write a story about them. Coogan conceived the idea as a romantic getaway with his girlfriend. Somewhere along the way from conception to execution, the couple has decided to take a break, so Coogan needs a traveling partner.

Brydon is hesitant to join him, not so much because Coogan makes clear that several of his first choices turned him down, but because Brydon has a new baby and isn't sure he wants to leave his wife and child for a whole week.

What is true of this setup is that Brydon and Coogan have a kind of a friendship, a professional history of working together. I've wanted to see The Trip since I heard about it because the two were so very funny as rivals and colleagues in Tristram Shandy: A Cock and Bull Story.

In that movie, which took one of the most unusual and unconventional English novels ever written, a novel I didn't think could be successfully translated to the screen, director Michael Winterbottom interspersed the 18th century story of the novel with contemporary scenes of the complications of making the period film. Brydon and Coogan engaged in adolescent contests throughout those scenes,

Winterbottom is the director of *The Trip*. He saw a pairing that worked in Tristram Shandy and turned it into a very funny romp. The threesome did work together years earlier in 24 Hour Party People, and the fame of each of them has had ups and downs since then. The director's hand is nearly invisible in The Trip, which only shows his total understanding of the material he is shaping.

Coogan and Brydon travel through some of the wildest, most beautiful landscapes to be found anywhere. For most of the movie they barely seem to notice. Sure, they pay their respects to the beauty and history of what they see, but the camera clues us in to just how dim their appreciation of their surroundings is in comparison to their odd fascination with themselves and each other. They'd rather recite Wordsworth and Coleridge to each other and imagine themselves as geniuses and poets than spend much energy considering the lives and works of these literary giants.

Winterbottom is also wonderful photographing the food. The gentlemen on the food tour make scant comment about it -Brydon orders scallops almost everywhere, and I longed for some mention of one scallop dish versus another – but the filmmaker slips into the kitchen to show us the skill and precision behind the plates created.

The creation of the food is precise and serious. The presentation of the food is sometimes hilariously pretentious. The gentlemen make some fun, but the real ridi-



cule is expressed in reviews Brydon downloads and reads in the car to Coogan. Still, The Trip does make you want to run out for something delicious.

I mention the food and the scenery because this is a trip worth taking. People taking this trip not in the company of raging narcissists could have a stunning, wonderful adventure, especially if someone else is paying for it. These two bicker about their accommodations and order whatever they like. Sometimes you want to smack them or get them to shut up. They have their own "shut up" moments, as travel companions inevitably do.

I may have buried the lead too deep, but you kind of need to push everything off the table first and then focus on what is at the heart of the film - and that is two unique performances. Coogan and Brydon are very funny and very brave. Because they are playing themselves there can be little question that many of the barbs, taunts, confessions, competitiveness and insecurities come from someplace real.

On the lightest side, these two spend much of the film doing impressions, mostly of Brits, but with hilarious imitations of Pacino and Woody Allen as well. Of course, they do Sean Connery as James Bond. Their most obsessive impersonation is of Michael Caine. They come back to him over and over, arguing over who does the better a young Caine and then ages the sound as Caine has aged. Brydon's Hugh Grant, his star impersonation of choice when sexing up his wife on the phone, is also excellent. Coogan is desperate to be a big movie

star. Brydon is slightly more content with his level of celebrity. They mock each others most famous characters, Brydon's "small man in a box" and Coogan's Alan Partridge. They both share an envy of Michael Sheen younger, handsomer and with more acting chops than either of them.

Coogan picks up women along the way. all the while talking on occasion with his girlfriend, Mischa (Margo Stilley), taking calls from his ex-wife and gently parenting his teenage son.

Any trip tends to give the mind opportunity to reflect and question. These two do plenty of that. It is touching and more than a little melancholy. When they return home Coogan makes a lonely but loving decision. Brydon's embrace of his wife will make happy loving couples smile.

Funny non-stop dialogue, tremendous scenery, and fancy food all delivered in a very natural camera style at a lazy vacation pace trick you into thinking The Trip isn't packing a punch. But the ending will bring your heart up into your throat. There is no big drama, just the little drama of a couple of souls, funny souls who use humor to help them persevere.

Also opening everywhere is George Clooney's fourth directorial effort, The Ides of March. Starring Clooney, Ryan Gosling, Paul Giamatti, Marisa Tomei, Jeffrey Wright and Philip Seymour Hoffman, this political thriller is sure to be one of the best displays of acting talent out of Hollywood all year. Word is that both Clooney and Gosling are great here, in a film most definitely aimed at the Oscar crowd. We'll see it, but not with bells on.

Tops at the Box: Warner Bros.' new family film, Dolphin Tale, had a strong second weekend, taking the No. 1 spot while selling \$14.2 million in sales. The film, budgeted at \$37 million, has now sold just over \$37 million in the U.S., and that's just in 10 days time. Score one for the feel-good guys! And big props to all the Hollywood dolphins out there who made this fine piece of cinema possible; we're hoping to see you soon in a psychological thriller. Or maybe a 3D horror flick! We love those!

More From the Box: Bennett Miller's Moneyball took the

No. 2 spot last weekend, bringing in another \$12.5 million in sales, upping the film's 10-day total to just under \$40 million in sales. Definitely not what the studio was hoping for, but certainly a film that will do well come DVD time and probably awards season. Highly recommended (look for star Brad Pitt to possibly get two Oscar nominations this year, one for Moneyball and the other for The Tree of Life). The 3D reissue of Lion King continues to roll, taking the No. 3 spot in its third week, selling \$11 million in tickets, bringing its 17-day total to just under \$80 million. Rounding out the Top 5 last weekend were newbie dramedy 50/50 (\$8.85 million in U.S. sales) and Christian drama Courageous (\$8.5 million in the U.S.). Jim Sheridan's Dream House also opened reasonably strong, selling just over \$8 million in tickets over its first three days. Doesn't sound like much, but for an art house guy like Sheridan, that's a whole lot of money. For the film, Ayoade clearly nods to his influences (Wes Anderson, Ken Loach, Mike Nichols, Jean-Luc Godard, Hal Ashby and even Nick Hornby) in a notso-subtle way while spinning a high-art teen comedy web as good as any since Anderson's breakout film, 1998's Rushmore. Great movie, beautiful cinematography and worthy of being mentioned right up there beside the best movies of 2011. I think we might have a great new auteur on our hands in Ayoade.

Also look out for Blu-ray reissues of some great films, including Pulp Fiction, Almost Famous and Jackie Brown, all new to shelves. New to home video this com-



The musical numbers of Forum, by Stephen Sondheim, whose work is generally much more complex, are as light as the plot. A few, such as "Comedy Tonight," "Lovely," and "I'm Calm," are hummable. All are fun and advance the farce.
