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

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Building Frights & Character

------Cover Story • Haunted Castle/Black Forest

'Tis the season of the witch, and as All Hallow's Eve fast approaches it creates an anticipation for all that comes with Halloween. Area haunted attractions do their best to give the people what they want and are ready to scare and delight their hundreds of nightly thrill seekers.

One such haunted attraction doubles the fun and fright by operating two separate haunts on the same grounds. They are, of course, the Haunted Castle and Black Forest.

Now entering its 32nd year, the Haunted Castle began simply enough as a way to earn money to pay for activities of the St. Vincent's Boy Scout troops. As any parent can tell you, the amount of money parents can be asked to pay for a child's extracurricular activities can be overwhelming. Scouting is no different. Hiking trips to New Mexico and summer gatherings at local camping grounds can cost a lot of money. With the Haunted Castle and Black Forest, area scouts have had for more than 30 years a way to help defray some of the costs of their activities while learning a few life les-

sons and having a lot of fun while they're

Originally part of the old St. Vincent de Sales Church, the new Haunted Castle build-

opened last year. Built with future growth in mind and an emphasis on safety, it conforms to every conceivable building and fire code and is likely to be easily adaptable to future regulations.

"We truly embraced the scout motto of 'be prepared' when we built this building," says Keith Hedrick, one of the many adult volunteers at the haunt. We felt we were very lucky to be able to open the new building last year because it took a gigantic effort from a lot of people. It was truly a huge undertaking.

The new Haunted Castle was well received by the public last year, some rating it as the top haunt in the area. The leaders of St. Vincent's don't want to rest on their laurels, however. "We know we had a good haunt last year," said Hedrick, "but this year's is even better because we have put thousands of dollars more into the building and the forest" to make them even scarier.

The forest Hedrick alludes to is the Black Forest, a parallel attraction operated by the St. Vincent Scouts on the same grounds as the Castle. Opening in 1997, the Black Forest's beginnings came out of necessity, as the

Haunted Castle was becoming a victim of its own success.

"The lines for the Castle were getting so long every night we felt we had to do something to help alleviate the problem," says Hedrick. "The idea of opening up another haunt came up, and since we already owned the property, it made sense.'

Spread out over a ¾-mile trek, the Black Forest is one of the area's more unique haunts in that it takes place entirely outside. According to Hedrick and others, the walk through the haunt can take anywhere from 25 to 45 minutes, depending on how lost one gets in the maze.

"We feel we have a real value for patrons here," says Hedrick. "You can go to haunts in Detroit, Chicago or Louisville and pay \$25 to go through a building that takes 15-20 minutes to complete."

One of the most amazing parts of any haunt, and in particular these two haunts, might not be fully apparent to those who line up each year to get frightened. The scouts and their adult helpers put in a tremendous amount of time preparing to scare people every season, with work being done on

the haunt year round and intensive nightly work beginning as early as the hot month of July.

The kids, parents and volunteers help with pre-haunt construction as time allows during the summer, but during the Halloween season all bets are off. On an average night, the Forest needs about 60 kids to operate properly while the Castle needs another 45-50. That's 105 or so kids per night needed for 15 or more nights in October. But that's not all. Hundreds of other workers, including a lot of patient and loving parents, are needed to run concessions stands, provide security, direct traffic, help with scheduling, organize costuming, apply makeup, provide food for workers and ensure that every visitor has the best time they can possibly have.

Making it all appear seamless takes a lot of teamwork, and the St. Vincent Cub Scouts, Boy Scouts and Venture Scouts work together as one unit while asking for and getting a lot of help from other scouting troops, including some from as far away as Ohio. The visiting scouts sometimes dedicate full weekends at the haunt, camping out and "roughing it" in order to help the haunts operate properly, while earning money for their troops and themselves in

"Without this activity for the kids to participate in, we would have to resort to family funds to pay for various activities," says Hedrick. "Needless to say, not every parent can fund every activity their child wants to do, so this helps defray the costs and allows the kids to participate in more activities

with less of a burden going to their fami-

Making money for the kids is not the only goal the scouts and their parents achieve while operating the Haunted Castle and Black Forest.

"One of the amazing dynamics about operating these haunts," says volunteer Stacy Digman, "is that it teaches the youth some valuable life lessons. It teaches them about responsibility and about all the hard work it takes to create and operate a real business."

The scouts also learn about the importance of being on time and coming to work when you are scheduled, acting in a professional manner around customers and other co-workers and about the importance of having a good work ethic.

"The kickback for these kids is not only do they learn life skills at a younger age than most," says Digman, "but they get the bonus of putting the money they earn into their coffers" to help them do things and go places they might not otherwise get to enjoy.

The scouts themselves all agree every

When looking for a way to indulge in the spirit of Halloween, a trip to Huntington should decidedly be on the agenda. With a history dating back more than 40 years and an elaborately detailed narrative to accompany the experience, the Haunted Hotel has become one of the most recognized and acclaimed haunt attractions in the area. In the years since Brett Molitor has been overseeing its design, the venue continues to grow, earning praise from publications dedicated to the business of spooking people.

A one-time Jaycees project, the Haunted Hotel continues to use the name and makes contributions to the organization each year thanks to its remarkable success. But it was after time constraints made continuing the tradition difficult and Jaycee hands-on involvement impractical that the Haunted Hotel found a permanent locale (after years of bouncing from one spot to another) and its unique niche.

"It was in 1999 and 2000 that we started with the hotel theme," says Molitor of the current location on North Jefferson Street in downtown Huntington. "The building really lent itself to that, the

layout with all the doors in the hallway and the lobby area. Plus it's 100 years old, so it has that feel to it. The hotel has given us themes we can use because it's not enough anymore to just have a haunted house."

With its creepy 13th floor setting and variety of scary turns throughout the rooms, the most distinctive part of the Haunted Hotel is the intricately woven narrative which provides context for the scares. The story, concerning the fictional Warwick Hotel with a creepy bellhop named Eldon, is detailed on the venue's website (www.hauntedhuntington.com) but suffice to say it includes the hotel's owner, Damian Warwick, his daughter Lilith, the hotel guests (which included members of a traveling circus) and a blazing inferno which claimed their lives. Not surprisingly, mystery continues to surround the incident which took place more than 100 years ago. And that's where the fun begins.

The story allows for constant reworking, with new characters as hotel victims appearing from year to year. While favorites are likely to return, a new element to the tale is

always possible.

"The story allows for new characters to be developed as long as it's in keeping with the 1904 theme," says Molitor. "We have to be careful to remain true to that era, which is why we don't have a chain-saw – because they didn't exist in 1904. We get asked about that one a lot, but we really stick to the time when these guests would have been in the

Keeping people on their toes is part of the challenge too, with repeat customers thinking they know from room to room what to expect.

"It keeps evolving," says Molitor. "There are certain elements that are classic, that we can't change, like the lobby and elevator. But other things can change anytime. We may add a new room or we have a twisted hallway which has to be seen to be really understood. But people think they know where they're going and then realized they've been sent in a different direction altogether. It adds to the suspense."



Suspense is the key ingredient, and Molitor says the Haunted Hotel is designed to provide plenty of it. What it doesn't provide

is blood and gore, leaving the terror to the imaginations of those who dare enter.

"It's the same way Alfred Hitchcock used to do his films. You don't have to use blood and gore to scare people; it's the fear of what you don't see that really scares them."

The approach is clearly working, with praise not only from those who attend but from reviews in national magazines. Always looking to expand the reach, Molitor promises an Apple app – HH13 – which will likely be available by the time this article goes to print. The website is also available in a Spanish version, an effort which further increases its appeal for the masses. Of course, it can be found on Facebook as well.

Though there may not be blood and gore in the halls of the Haunted Hotel, the sense of smell has been added to the means of repulsion, providing the hotel with what it's calling "a fourth dimension." With 3D and UV visuals long part of the equation, the Haunted Hotel continues to forge ahead with new ways to scare the bejeebers out of those who check in to the hotel, hoping they survive to ultimately check out.

"We're always looking for ways to make it better, to lead the industry," says Molitor. "We want to stay ahead of what everyone is doing and make sure the hotel is constantly evolving."

The history of the Green Center begins, not surprisingly, with a school. But when Smith-Green Community Schools incorporated three decades ago, combining districts from both sides of the Whitley and Noble County divide, it left the Albion site emptied and without a purpose. But the community stepped in to preserve the building, deciding to turn it into a community center.

"At the time of closing, we were told 'We can either tear it down or sell it to you," recalls Bill Pappe who has overseen the Haunted Schoolhouse each year. "So we had a big pow-wow and decided to keep the building for a community center. The township purchased the building for a whole dollar"

Further construction of the building helped provide a new element in recent years. The twin A-frame was bridged, providing a new level to the building. The schoolhouse had already expanded from one side of the hallway, which had once had two classrooms, to the other which was the size of three classrooms. The move to another level of the building attests to the growth of the project since they first launched it almost 30 years ago.

Pappe says he starts working on the schoolhouse a couple months in advance, though he is always on the lookout for new ways to better the effects.

"One time I saw a big door which had been part of a house that was being torn down, so I just asked if I could have it. And I look around at antique stores all the time and

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

Mind, Body & Music

Wade Imre Morissette has been called something you might think no one would ever be called: yoga's rock star. And how does one come to be yoga's rock star? It's not a title that is bestowed upon a new rock star annually, it's not anything close to an official designation, and before Morissette earned it the title didn't even exist. It's just that what he's doing is so innovative, it's not easy to figure out how to classify him.

First of all, he's a student who's studied iyengar, classical ashtanga, ashtanga-vinyasa, vinyasa, anusara and kriya yoga, zazen, vedic chanting and active movement. Next,

he's a teacher who leads workshops that touch on Phoenix Rising and Vinivoga therapy and Reiki. He's also an author whose first book, Transformative Yoga:

5 Keys to Unlocking Inner Bliss, was published in 2009. Finally, but perhaps most importantly, he's a musician whose combination of folk-pop songs and yoga-inspired chants have captured the attention of musicloving voga enthusiasts. It's an impressive resume, and it came together almost by ac-

"My first concerts were in India, and people would come up to me and say that my music touched their hearts. I decided to take my music to different yoga studios across the world," Morisette says.

He'd begun making his yoga-influenced music after a trip to India when he spent some time studying devotional yoga and discovered the calming, transformative power of music within the context of yoga.

Born in Ottawa in 1974 to a teacher and a high school principal, Morissette was musical from the start. He played piano when he was very young, guitar and djembe as a teenager. He was eager to find a way to bring his mind and his body together in a non-musical way, though, and he looked to the East, trying out karate and tai chi before settling on yoga in college. The meditative focus of yoga turned out to be what he'd been looking for.

In case you're wondering, yes, Wade is related to that other famous Morissettevery closely related, in fact. He was born 12 minutes before his sister, Alanis, making him the elder of the Morissette twins. While Wade was busy trying to find inner peace and happiness, Alanis was occupying herself by becoming a globally famous pop music superstar.

Wade has comes to terms with Alanis' fame now - he cites her as a major influence in his life, and he has even shared the stage

but in the beginning it wasn't so easy. Motivated by his hunger for learning as well as a need to get away from the pressures of having an immensely famous twin sister and find himself, Wade began traveling, and his path ultimately took him took him to India. He was still seeking personal growth, and he delved deeply into yoga. He studied with Baba Hari Das, Sri K Pattabhi Jois, Sri Sri Ravi Shankar, T.K.V. Desikachar and the Krishnamacharya Lineage, and he developed a nearly encyclopedic knowledge of a multitude of yoga styles. Perhaps inspired by the educational background of his parents, he dedicated himself to learning and teaching yoga once he understood how much the art had helped him personally.

It's when his love of music came back to the foreground, however, that Morissette began to truly gain the notice of the yoga community. One important person who noticed was Terry McBride, CEO and co-founder of Canada's Nettwerk Music Group, a label and management company behind artists such as Sarah McLachlan, Coldplay, Barenaked Ladies and Avril Lavigne. In 2006 McBride was looking to revive Nutone Records, a world music label he'd started years earlier, and he liked the idea of yoga-inspired mu-

Morissette's fusion of Sanskrit and English chants with smoothly flowing music was just what McBride wanted to hear; he first heard Morissette's music while taking a yoga class in Vancouver, and when he discovered that the album wasn't readily available for purchase, he decided to change that. Morissette became the first artist signed to McBride's new label, and Strong as Dia-

Just in time for Halloween, Fort Wayne will get a double treat at the Embassy Theatre on October 29th.

The Fort Wayne Philharmonic will support Jeans 'n Classics in performing the symphonic rock of not one but two pop icons with The Music of The Police and Sting. Jeans 'n Classics is a Londonbased group of rock musicians who teamed up with The Phil last season to give us ABBAmania.

The Music of The Police and Sting marks the Sweetwater Pops Series debut for newly appointed Associate Conductor Sameer Patel. Patel previously served as the Zander Conducting Fellow at the

A fan of both Sting and The Police, she says symphonic rock is a new way for fans to experience their favorite music. "Symphonic rock shows are immensely popular with The Phil audiences – both loyal and new patrons. These high-quality shows give audience members a chance to experience their favorite songs by their favorite artists like The Police and Sting, ABBA and Queen in a symphony setting."

"These larger than life musical arrangements are not only reminiscent of the original tunes - complete with professional vocalists, bands and rock concert lighting - but serve as an opportunity to expose new audiences to the sounds of a full orchestra" Shaw said. "Hopefully new audience members will like what they hear so much, they will come and experience one of our incredible classical concerts."

After the success of past Fort Wayne Philharmonic symphonic rock shows like Music of Led Zeppelin, The Music of Pink Floyd and The Music of Queen, she says the Phil booked this Jeans 'n Classics show as soon as it became available.

"Those shows were incredibly popular for us. There are so many positives in producing symphonic rock shows like The Music of The Police and Sting. The music is timeless and beloved. It invites a whole new audience to experience the Fort Wayne Philharmonic and what it has to offer. Our musicians are classically trained, but that doesn't mean they don't love to rock too," Shaw laughed.

This is where Jeans 'n Classics comes in, she says. "Jeans 'n Classics delivers a completely professional symphonic rock experience to orchestras throughout North America. They honor the original performers while keeping the concert experience exciting and entertaining. It's a great blend with the Phil."

Since its inception, Jeans 'n Classics has been a star performer in the arts and entertainment scene.



"They are an exceptional group of rock musicians that perform with the orchestras, not only providing vocals but Tix.: \$25-\$65 thru Philharmonic box office, guitar, drums and keyboards," praised Shaw. Their concept

of combining rock musicians and headlining stars with world-class symphony orchestras like the Phil has drawn record setting capacity crowds.

But what did you expect? The Fort Wayne Philharmonic doesn't take partnerships with any performance groups lightly. They book the best talent and work tirelessly behind the scenes to make big shows like this memorably outstanding for patrons.

"There is a tremendous amount of work that takes place on the front end of a large concert like this well in advance of the guest artists arriving in Fort Wayne," Shaw said. She went on to describe how the Phil's operations staff works closely with the artist's management to determine all of the performer's sound, lighting and staging requirements months before the artist ever gets here. "All of this must be carefully planned and executed so that when the artists arrive, we are ready to go with rehearsal."

For The Music of The Police and Sting, Jeans 'n Classics vocalists Neil Donell, Kathryn Rose and guests will be backed by the Phil on all the hits from "Every Breath You Take" to "Fields of Gold" to "Roxanne" and "Message in a Bottle." While Shaw says she is excited about the performance as a whole, she's especially looking forward to two ditties in particular.

"I can't wait to hear 'Every Breath You Take' and 'Every Little Thing She Does is Magic.' Adding the orchestra to these classics will make for an unforgettable evening of music for anyone who loves the music of The Police and Sting - and who doesn't?"

Sting is currently in the middle of a North American solo tour. His appearances have consistently been selling out, and the closest his tour comes to Fort Wayne is Detroit and Chicago. Shaw says that fans needn't put on the red light to get their Sting fix. "Audiences can experience all the best music of The Police and Sting at the Embassy with an incredible band, powerful vocalists and a full orchestra - all without driving cross-country or going broke on the tickets."

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----- Feature • Straight No Chaser-----Rock Me, a Cappella

Some people like frou-frou drinks – lots of pretty-colored fruit, a little bit of booze and an umbrella topper. Some like frou-frou music – lots of synthesizers, ambient noise and a dash of Auto-tune. What audiences will get when Straight No Chaser take the stage at the Allen County War Memorial Colise-

um, Sunday, October 30, is the kind of classic cocktail that's hard to come by these days: 10 male voices served neat. No fuss. No muss. All good.

Straight No Chaser got their start in 1996 at Indiana University in Bloomington. Back then they were just 10 friends who liked to sing, but they were also putting a new twist on an old formula. Male a cappella groups have for years been synonymous with either barbershop quartets (think puffy shirts with arm bands, white straw hats and "Camptown Races") or navy blazer-wearing

preppies serenading bouffanted coeds eager to hear anything by Bobby Darin. The guys in Straight No Chaser, however, had a very different sensibility.

Your first clue that these aren't your typical Ivy League stiffs is the name. Straight No Chaser, in addition to a very cool thing to say to your bartender, is an homage to a 1967 Thelonius Monk record. A Monkian a cappella group? I'm going to need a drink to ponder that properly.

From the beginning, the guys from SNC preferred to perform contemporary songs, and while they take the music very seriously, they take themselves much less so. The aesthetic of current hits sung with a sense of humor proved popular in mid-90s Bloomington, earning them, among other accolades, an invitation to perform at the home of Hoosier legend John Mellencamp.

The original members of the group began graduating in 1999, and Straight No Chaser became an IU-based group, with students rotating in and out during their time as undergrads. Roughly 50 men have worn the Straight No Chaser mantle since those early days, but five original members - Randy Stine, Charlie Mechling, Jerome Collins, David Roberts and Walter Chase - still remain.

the top brass, and the rest of the group gathered in NYC soon after to ink a five-album contract.

Because Straight No Chaser struck gold with a Christmas song, it only makes sense that their first two albums - 2008's Holiday Spirits and 2009's Christmas Cheers - would be holiday-themed as well. Both albums were hits on the holiday and adult

contemporary charts. This spring, the guys released their first non-Christmas album, With a Twist, which climbed to No. 29 on the Billboard Albums Chart and includes such modern hits as "Wonderwall" and "Tainted Love." But, of course, with a twist.

The tour that will bring them to the Coliseum is following on the heels of SNC's summer gig, a residency at Harrah's Resort in Atlantic City, where they performed 40 shows in just eight weeks.

When they perform at the Coliseum on Halloween eve, they'll be joined by fellow crooners Michael Luginbill, Ryan Ahlwardt, Seggie Isho, Don Nottingham and Tyler Trepp.

The current incarnation of SNC came about in part thanks to YouTube. A video of the group singing its signature hit, an intriguing and vastly entertaining mashup of "The 12 Days of Christmas" and Toto's "Africa," grabbed the attention of Atlantic Records Chairman/CEO Craig Kallman. Kallman hunted down past members of the group and invited them to New York City where, 10 years after their formation, they signed their first major record deal.

According to the group's web bio, the boys at first thought Kallman's email to original member Randy Stine was a prank. Then Stine flew to Los Angeles to meet with

According to Ryan Ahlwardt, a tenor from Indianapolis, becoming a part of SNC was a life-changer, and now he and his mates work very hard to keep each live show fresh and full of joy for the audience.

There are a few essential elements in country music these days, and if you want to be successful as a country musician you have to be able to serve 'em up. You have to be able to sing about your country roots, and you have to be able to party. On their new EP, Hubie Ashcraft and Allan



Miller have those bases covered with room to spare.

"Cornfields," the EP's lead track, takes care of the down-home portion of the program, with a landscape painting of Indiana's particular kind of countryside, with those fields stretching as far as the eye can see and "power lines cuttin' across the sunset." It also touches on the pillars of family and ancestral tradition, although the revelation that grandpa is buried under an oak tree in the backyard is a little too close to a horror movie for comfort.

"Let's Get Gone" has the fun covered. It's a mid-tempo rocker that encourages the singer's girl to put her "sugar pants" on in preparation for a road trip to the Gulf of Mexico. With winter just around the corner, I have to admit that doesn't sound like a bad idea.

The other two originals on the EP explore the ups and downs of love. "Way Down" is surprisingly melodic given how much it talks about graves and drowning, but "These Days" is an unabashedly cheerful declaration of love. Meanwhile a cover of Buckcherry's "Sorry" makes it clear that Allan & Ashcraft know that today's country fans are more likely to have grown up listening to Bon Jovi than to Merle Haggard. The song's original modest growl has been traded for a modest twang, but there's no steel guitar or fiddle anywhere to be found. Without a doubt, Allan & Ashcraft know what it takes to make today's country music lover happy. (Evan Gillespie)

Alice Gooper *Welcome 2 My Nightmare 2*

Welcome 2 My Nightmare is the album for which diehard Alice Cooper fans have been waiting for years. Coinciding with Alice Cooper's induction into the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame, this album marks the first time Alice Cooper, the man, has written and recorded with the living members of Alice Cooper, the band.



members of Alice Cooper, the band, these being bassist Dennis Dunaway, drummer Neal Smith and guitarist Michael Bruce.

Over the years Alice Cooper the man has overshadowed Alice Cooper the band, but let it not be forgotten that many of their hits were written not by "the man" but by the above-mentioned members. Alice's first solo album, the landmark *Welcome To My Nightmare*, featured many songs co-written with guitarist Steve Hunter and Dick Wagner. After many years apart these men also lend their wonderful skills to this project. On par with reuniting with former bandmates is the fact that for the first time since 1983's creepy overlooked masterpiece, *DaDa*, Alice is working with producer Bob Ezrin, in my opinion the genius behind the best albums put out by Alice Cooper, the man and the band. Ezrin was also at the helm for such classics as *Destroyer* by KISS and Pink Floyd's *The Wall*. A good producer will bring out the best of an artist, sending them back again and again to rework an idea, forcing an artist to reach new creative heights.

And what amazing new heights these are! While not as creepy or achingly lost as the original, there's something about the songs on 2 that immediately stand out. There's a quality and a completeness to these songs that has been missing on past Cooper albums. It's a reunion of many friends and periods, and the joy comes through. Joy isn't exactly a word that goes with "nightmare." In fact, there's tons of humor on this album, contrasting to the eerie factor of the original. Of the songs on 2, only the brief "The Nightmare Returns," sung in the Steve little boy voice, and "When Hell Comes Come" can be characterized as spooky, and the second is more of a reality-based horrific. The rest of the album tells the story of Alice himself, Mr. Celebrity, having a nightmare about being in Hell, a topic he has covered in various forms at least twice.

The album opens with the familiar spooky piano figure from the original album, morphing into the song proper of "I Am Made of You." This is an outstanding song which sets up the rest of the album, a kind of "Hello, Hooray" where Cooper sings of how in the past quarter century his own persona and that of the Alice Cooper

Throwing Muses

The Real Ramona (1991)

The Pixies, Smiths and R.E.M. carried the torch for indie pop in the 80s and early 90s. Throwing Muses jumped in the pool around 1981 but were never really played outside of college rock stations. This, their fourth studio album is really, really good.



Kristen Hersh and step-sister Tanya Donelly had the trippy vocal range and look to make them darlings of the indie scene, but the shy and sometimes edgy Hersh made them unapproachable. The alt-rock guitars worked very well, yet maybe this album was too good, as it would be the last with co-founder/guitarist Donelly.

Abstract lyrics are plentiful in tracks like the opener "Counting Backwards" which did get some airplay via MTV. "Red Shoes" has Hersh in all of her awkward shyness. and the hip guitars bust out in "Golden Thing." The two-part harmony of Hersh and Donelly capture the Muses sound, along with the preppy drumming of David Narcizo who now is focused on his graphic design firm.

"Ellen West" is a dark alternative track with Cure-like guitars, and Donelly gets the nod for lead vocals on "Not Too Soon," a track that also got some airplay on college radio and boasted a video as well. "Honeychain" slows it down a tad before erupting with brooding guitars and snarky vocals. The album closes with the graceful "Two Step," one of the 'prettiest' songs they ever released.

I was lucky enough to see them a couple of times during their peak. After 2- years their indie pop still works for me. Check out some of their videos on You Tube that, though a bit dated, still have a great presence.

villain have blended to where distinctions are blurry. Or it's one of the best and most beautiful worship songs I've heard in years. Either way you decide to take it, the song is gorgeous and easily one of the best of his solo career. "Caffeine" is, appropriately, a turbo-charged, heavy, guitar-driven rocker that finds the protagonist attempting to avoid sleep and the nightmares that will surely follow. Not only does this song have a hooky chorus, but it's got MORE COWBELL!

"The Nightmare Returns" has Cooper/Steven falling asleep, and the first nightmare is finding himself on a train full of the damned and bound to Hell ("A Runaway Train") with a rocketing beat and guitar solos by Vince Gill. "Last Man on Earth" is a swaggering song with non-traditional instrumentation that could easily find a home on a Tom Waits album. "Disco Bloodbath Boogie Fever" is almost a parody of itself, though still quite engaging, that either takes a swipe at or pays homage to Lady Gaga before dissolving the disco beat into a metal crescendo. "Ghouls Gone Wild" is also a tongue-in-cheek, energetic outing, this one channeling the 50s classic "Summertime Blues."

Ke\$ha, who called Cooper "dad," sings a duet on "What Baby Wants." Since I'm not 12, I haven't knowingly heard any songs by Ke\$ha so don't know how this song fits in with her music, but for Cooper I'd say this song is a bit poppier and more danceable than usual, but, dang, does it ever have a stunning sound and a catchy chorus. The album is summarized in "I Gotta Get Outta Here," although with the usual Cooper twist, and ends with "The Underture," a symphonic and guitar instrumental that resurrects musical themes from both Welcome to My Nightmare and Welcome 2 My Nightmare.

Alice Cooper and Bob Ezrin are a match made in, well, it's a good thing. While *Welcome 2 My Nightmare* may not have the uneasy, heart-rending sorrow or the orchestrated rock of the original, it more than makes up for it in quality music packed with memorable melodies. Nearly every song is a birdie and a couple even rank as a hole-in-one. (*Jason Hoffman*)

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

look for lighting to use. I guess I'm always looking for new things to use."

His plan to shift from his role as the Mad Chef to a Nutty Lab Professor was similarly aided by an assist from a local school.

"I needed to change the cafeteria to a lab and had to find some things, and I was wondering how I was going to make it look like a lab. I was hanging some posters at West Noble schools, and two guys from a science classroom in West Noble High School helped me with what I needed to decorate the lab."

Such community spirit proves the success of the building acquisition, and Pappe says the center hosts more conventional activities as well, including a game room, fish fries, a craft room. But of course it's the Haunted Schoolhouse – with its yellow bus, horrifying nurse and all the trappings of a schoolchild's nightmares – which has provided the Green Center with its claim to fame. Pappe has enjoyed a bit of his own fame as a result.

"Every year I take a few days off of work to go around hanging up the posters for the schoolhouse, and people remember you," he laughs. "I'm always surprised how many people will see me and say 'It's that time of year again, isn't it?' and know me from the other times. I think everyone gets a kick out of it."

monds: Om Vajra Kaya Namaha, the follow-up to his self-released debut album, Sargam Scales of Music, was the result.

"This release is more about celebrating, gratitude and lifting one's spirit," Morissette says of *Strong as Diamonds* in comparison to his debut. "It has a lot more energy and it's sunnier, but it's still soulful."

A sponsorship from a yoga apparel company, a world tour, his fortuitous discovery by McBride – everything converged to lead some commentators to call Morissette yoga's rock star. His energy remained focused on teaching, however, and he continues to maintain an ambitious schedule of traveling all over, conducting workshops and retreats.

Morissette's workshops are very much an expression of his desire to bring together movement, meditation and music to allow participants to get in touch

with their bodies and their spirits at the same time. He teaches vinyasa, a style of yoga that links movements with breath in a way that approaches dance, and he leads participants in what he calls "bliss dance," a form of musical meditation that can be as structured or as free-form as participants want it to be. And, of course, he chants and sings, often wrapping up with kirtan, a style of audience-participation chanting that he refers to as "singing around the campfire."

Considering how positively the yoga world has responded to Morissette's music, it's surprising that there haven't been generations of yoga rock stars before him. For his part, Morissette knows that he's simply stating the obvious when he says that music can tap into something powerful inside.

"It's a natural way to tune into the frequency of love," he says.











Hesher

Hesher (Joseph Gordon-Levitt) isn't just some lovably scruffy, foul-mouthed anarchist with a poorly concealed heart of gold. No, he truly wants trouble, just for the sake of trouble, and he's not concerned with consequences. His tattoos alone – artless homemade scrawls – tell you all you need to know. He's mean – and by mean I mean really, really mean – to T.J. (Devin Brochu), the middle-school aged kid whose house he decides to crash in uninvited for the foreseeable future.

T.J.'s dad (Rainn Wilson) is so zapped out on the meds he's been taking since his wife died four months earlier that he scarcely notices they have a new lodger. (I'm not sure I completely bought the passive role T.J.'s father plays in the boy's life, even when you factor in his drug-addled state.) "He's T.J.'s friend," T.J.'s sweet but slightly dotty grandma (Piper Laurie), who also lives there, explains. Nobody really questions the fact that Hesher is at least twice T.J.'s age. (In truth, Hesher threatens to kill T.J. if he even so much as hints that he didn't invite Hesher to live there.) To Hesher's credit, he is always kind and respectful to Grandma, or at least as much as he is capable of being. (He doesn't seem to realize that Grandma may be shocked by his crude language.)

T.J. also befriends Nicole, a mousy, insecure grocery store cashier (played by Natalie Portman who also produced), after she helps protect him from a school bully in the store parking lot. When Hesher finds out about T.J.'s innocent crush on Nicole, he crudely intrudes into Nicole's relatively placid (but hapless) life, too.

In interviews, writer/director Spencer Susser has said that although he's always liked Gordon-Levitt as an actor, he first actively resisted the idea of him in the title role. He just seemed too sweet, too accessible. But then in the audition he saw Gordon-Levitt transform himself into the long-haired anarchist, and he knew he was perfect.

And he is perfect. The way he struts away after setting fire to something without once looking back, or pulls his greasy hair out of his face before dipping his spoon into a big bowl of cereal, or drunkenly pushes a charcoal grill into a swimming pool, is just perfect. Rationally, I know this is the same actor playing the cancer-stricken nice guy in the new bromance 50/50, but it sure doesn't seem like it.

Hesher (the character, not the movie) turns out to be more complicated than he at first seems, and though director Susser risks having him become too sentimental near the end, overall I think he lands it. *Hesher* (the movie, not the character) navigates its way through some tricky tonal changes and acquits itself quite well in the process. As a never-boring character study, and as a peculiar portrait of grief in a family, it's a dark, profane and weirdly touching ride.

Meek's Cutoff

The wagon train moves across the frame slowly, slowly, always moving from right to left: west. It is 1845. There are three families, each with their own team of oxen pulling their own covered wagon. They set out weeks earlier for the Oregon Trail,



to make their fortunes out west. They are clearly lost, and have been for days. When they come upon and then ford a river, they gather as much water as their barrels can hold; who knows when they'll next see more? They are desperate, but they never forget to address each other with polite kindness. There is some talk of hanging their paid guide, a long-bearded braggart named Stephen Meek (Bruce Greenwood), for having led them astray. "I don't blame him for not knowing," the always stoic Emily Tetherow (Michelle Williams) says, of Meek. "I blame him for saying he did."

This is a quiet, slow-moving movie. There are rifles, and some of them even get fired, but this is not about that. As an old-fashioned western, *Meek's Cutoff* will be found wanting by many. Director Kelly Reichardt isn't concerned with telling a traditional adventure story. Instead, she is concerned about the ways that being lost and increasingly desperate, day after day, can play on one's sense of trust. There are lots of starkly beautiful shots of women walking together behind the wagons, their feet carefully stepping over the ruts in the dirt from the wagon wheels.

Reichardt's movie *Old Joy* was about two contemporary American men, old college friends trying to escape modern life for a few days by going out to the wild. In *Wendy and Lucy* the protagonist was a young woman (also played by Michelle Williams) who seemed completely unequipped to live in the modern world. Now she dispenses with modern life altogether, and in so doing she raises the stakes considerably. These people could die, actually die, of thirst, if they don't get back on track – or at least find more water – soon.

Emily's older husband, Soloman (Will Patton), is always looking ahead, always hoping for and expecting the best. When Meek finds and captures a lone member from what Meek guesses to be an extremely fierce tribe of "Indians," the tiny fissures of distrust among the families begins to widen. Meek believes they should kill the Indian immediately. Soloman believes he can lead them to water, if they can figure out a way to communicate with him. (The Indian is played by Rod Rondeaux, and how Rondeaux manages to give him such humanity and yet such maddening impassivity is beyond me. If anyone deserves a best supporting actor nomination at next year's Oscars, he does.) They decide to hold the Indian captive and force him to lead them on, but is he leading them to an ambush there are signs he's communicating with someone by scratching symbols on rocks (or is this just part of his religion?) – or is he leading them to the only thing that's going to keep them alive, namely water?

So they move. Some discussions occur. Other times, there are long patches of suspicious, wary silence. *Meek's Cutoff* plays out like a western version of *Waiting for Godot*, complete with sparse scenery, only with movement. The experience of watching it is riveting, hypnotically beautiful, and utterly original. It is, without a doubt, one of the best movies I've seen all year.

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Tales of Truth – Or Fiction

Travels With Charley by John Steinbeck, Penguin, 2011

Even when John Steinbeck took to the road in 1960, the idea of setting out to discover America via an extended road trip wasn't new. The ability to travel quickly and relatively easily all over the country, however, was still novel, and when Steinbeck felt the need to get out into the world and reconnect with the country, it felt revolutionary to him to get into a truck and drive. A half-century later, the exploratory-yet-introspective road trip has been done to death, but Steinbeck's reasons for his journey and the conclusions he reached because of it are still surprisingly relevant.

In 1960 Steinbeck was ill and tired, and he felt as if he needed to see again firsthand the country that he had spent his life writing about, to talk to people and see what America was all about after the mid-point of the 20th century. He bought a pickup truck, put a camper shell on the back of it and put into place a plan to drive from his home on Long Island all the way across the country. He'd sleep in the back of the truck, living simply and simply observing the people he encountered along the way.

Steinbeck felt the need to establish some rules for himself before he began his trip. Because he was at this point a famous writer he thought he might have some trouble going unrecognized while he was out in public. His friends thought he might be recognized because of the author photos on his books, but Steinbeck himself was not worried about that. He did, however, know that his name would be recognized, so he resolved not to sign hotel registers with his real name and not to admit to anyone who he was. He wouldn't be able to interview anyone or even ask probing questions; everything he learned from the people he met would have to come from unassuming interaction, the simple friendliness between two ordinary strangers.

There was one more eccentricity about Steinbeck's trip: he would travel with Charley, his poodle. Trips with dogs are also not unheard of at this point, and they're usually unappealingly precious. Steinbeck wasn't terribly sentimental in choosing to take Charley with him, though. He wanted the dog along for companionship, sure, but he also was thinking that the fair-sized dog with an intimidating bark would offer some protection. In those days, the open road still seemed a little bit like the frontier, and Steinbeck had some concern that he might be attacked by bandits. So the man and his dog set off on their expedition.

Steinbeck had concerns about America, and those concerns were reinforced by what he observed and thought about as he traveled. The Cold War was raging at the time, Kruschev was making a spectacle of himself at the U.N. and life seemed precarious. Steinbeck fretted about the dangers of the Atomic Age, and although he was no protohippie, he had misgivings about America's



military posturing.

He also was worried about the environment, and he does come off as a particularly pragmatic early environmentalist. We waste too much, throw too much away, he thinks and when there's no more space to throw things away, we'll have nowhere to go to get away from all the garbage.

Like most Americans in 1960, though, he's not personally motivated to do

too much about it, and as he putters across the country in his polluting pickup truck, he generates plenty of garbage.

There has been some discussion lately about the possibility that Steinbeck fabricated many of the details of his trip. Writers have examined Steinbeck's account of the journey and compared it with other records, in the process discovering that much of what Steinbeck said happened couldn't have happened.

He may have stayed in hotels much more than he admits, and he may have been accompanied by his wife more than he lets on. Once these details are called into question, it becomes more difficult to believe anything that Steinbeck writes in the book. That's particularly problematic because many of his interactions with people along the way feel stilted and unreal; that could be because they didn't happen at all.

Fifty years ago the possibility that a nonfiction book could be largely fictional didn't occur to anyone, and if it had there's not much chance that it would have caused an uproar. Even now, Steinbeck mostly gets a pass from critics who argue that even if he made up a lot of the book, we're lucky to get even disguised fiction from one of America's greatest novelists. The important thing is that Steinbeck's insights into American life were accurate and prescient, even if he had to fabricate details to make his point.

A Portrait of Strength

I'm getting used to the one-person shows that feel, in some ways, like Biography Channel biographies. One great thing about them is that they educate as they entertain. First Presbyterian Theater's production of *Hi-Hat Hattie*, about the life of Hattie McDaniel, an actress/singer/comedian best known as Mammy from *Gone with the Wind*, teaches us about the life

of this extraordinary woman while reminding us of both the power of determination and the level of racism in this country's history, no matter how much we sometimes seem to choose to forget or deny it

This play, like *The Lady with All the Answers* (about the life of Ann Landers), from FPT's last season, tells the intimate details of one woman's life. McDaniel, the first black woman ever to win an Academy Award as well as the first to perform on the radio, exhibited strength, determination and grace as she faced countless challenges during her lifetime.

Although she suffered other disappointments (including the death of her much-loved first husband), most of those challenges related to her race. In a time when roles for black women were, at best, limited, she was both applauded and ridiculed as an actress. The latter stemmed from criticism of the roles she played. Most were maids or slaves. It was not, though, as if she had a wide variety of characters available to her. The play, written by Larry Parr, suggests that McDaniel knew she would necessarily be typecast due to being a woman who was large and black. McDaniel said, "Why should I complain about making \$700 a week playing a maid? If I didn't, I'd be making \$7 a week being one." This, though,

drew criticism from many in the black community, as did her decision to play Aunt Jemima in advertisements, because groups such as the NAACP said that she was perpetuating stereotypes of African-Americans. McDaniel, however, as one of 13 children of a former slave, said that she was honoring her ancestors rather than insulting her race.

For me, a white guy from the Midwest, it's hard to imagine that there was a time when racism was as extreme as it's shown to be in Hi-Hat Hattie. The fact that Hattie was banned from the Atlanta opening of Gone with the Wind due to her race, after giving an award-winning performance in her much-coveted role, is unimaginable to me. Racism isn't dead, of course, as we still see today even here in Fort Wayne. None of it is acceptable, but this play shows how much progress has been made since Hattie's day when crosses burned in front of houses with greater frequency.

Racism may be with us forever to some degree, but it was good to find during online research about McDaniel that the Hollywood cemetery that refused her a plot upon her death later offered to have her body moved there. Her family declined, saying they didn't want to disturb her remains after

Really Desperate Criminals

What do you do when your perfect scheme begins to fall apart? When your sure-fire, this-will-work plan to make money and get ahead turns out to be nothing but a big pain in the ... neck? Bill and Sam are asking themselves that question in O. Henry's classic short story, "The Ransom of Red Chief," which has been adapted for the stage by Anne Coulter Martens.

It's a simple scheme: (1) find a likely young boy, "likely" meaning he has a wealthy family and he's young enough to be manageable; (2) kidnap him; (3) demand a ransom; (4) collect money, return boy, skip town. But like so many best-laid plans, this one goes awry from the beginning.

While still set in a kinder, gentler time (we've updated the setting from the 1880s to the 1930s), Martens' adaptation takes into account a modern sensibility. O. Henry's story portrayed Red's father as not too concerned with his absent progeny. The stage play makes "Red" an orphan being raised by a less-than-sympathetic rich uncle. This fleshed-out retelling also adds a cast of townspeople, including a constable, a gossip and her daughter and Red's aunt and cousins, all of whom add color, humor and a sense of community to the story.

Sam and Bill refer to themselves as "two desperate men," but they never seem to the audience to be a real threat to Red – rather the reverse! Red, on the other hand, just wants a place to feel he really belongs and is appreciated. This light-hearted and hilarious

Experiencing LIGO

Although I like to think of myself as being smarter than the average bear, I must confess that science was always the one school subject

which eluded me. To prove this point, when a student at IPFW many years ago, I sought to fulfill one of my science requirements by taking the class that everyone and their brother promised me was the easiest A I would ever earn: Physics of a Stereo System. I got a B. And frankly, I'm not even sure how I managed that, since most of it zoomed right over my head in spite of my passion for the function of a stereo system.

Needless to say, once freed from the rigors of academia, I made it a point to avoid most areas of science whenever possible. But having said that, I must admit that one of the coolest places in the city of Fort Wayne has to be Science Central where they have a sneaky way of convincing you that it's fun to learn about science.

One of my favorite experiences at Science Central was the *Memory* exhibit a few years back, which let me take quizzes and play with a series of games that challenged my thinking. For many years Science Central has provided great outings for families as well as educational opportunities for schools – a place where educators and parents can have fun and learn alongside their students and children. It's insidious, really, this plot to make science entertaining and accessible to all.

One of my favorite forays into the sciences as a kid was a telescope given to us by our grandparents, a neat little instrument that let us look into the stars and try to see what we could of the constellations. Tapping into that love of our universe, Science Central has recently opened an exhibit with an amazing telescope called the Laser Interferometer Gravitational-wave Observatory. Mercifully, they generally refer to it as LIGO. LIGO is being called a "revolutionary" instrument by people far less easily



astounded than I by such things, and Fort Wayne is fortunate to be the only place in Indiana which is sharing it with its community. Like all of the great Science Central exhibits, what makes this so alluring is the interactive, hands-on opportunity to experience the world around us and find out what makes it tick. The promise of the exhibit is the chance "to observe, for the first time, ripples in the fabric of space-time caused by massive cosmic events." Say what? How can you resist an invitation like that?

While the LIGO exhibit, which runs through January 8, is a great example of the special, limited-time exhibits which come to town thanks to Science Central, many of the venue's permanent exhibits provide great reasons to visit often as well. The newest of these is Gears, another handson experience which provides insight into how gears work and what the relationship is between gears and torque. Now, I have to admit, I never really gave that one any thought before, but now that they mention it, how does that all work? Everything from watches to cars have gears which means we're navigating those issues on a daily basis. Here's your chance to see how it all works and have a lot of fun along the way. You can see both of these exhibits and more by visiting Science Central. To learn more check out their website at www.sciencecentral.org

When Science Central Executive Director Martin Fisher says that "Science Central is serious about creating a scientifically literate community," he also acknowledges that the approach is informal, allowing for visitors to have fun while learning along the way. As I said, it's all pretty insidious. But it's so crazy it just seems to be working.

A Better Life Shines a Bright Light on Life in the Shadows

Taking my first (very gentle) walk through the desert near San Diego, I was appalled to see many empty water bottles, some discarded clothes and other garbage in convenience store bags. I don't litter, and I don't like people who do it. The terrain is stark, beautiful and tough: rocks, canyons that seem to lead nowhere, very little vegetation (and I was there after massive rains that made some blossoms and colors pop) and the huge emptiness of the landscape made me slightly dizzy.

I was walking with three conservationminded lovers of the environment and a very happy dog (who won the lottery when his owners adopted him), and I expressed my distress at the mess. My companions, sweet thoughtful souls that they are, politely hid their embarrassment at my ignorance. The debris we were seeing (and picking up and carrying out) is, duh, left by people walking into our country, not by careless American tourists. I had no idea we were so close to the

Looking at the empty landscape and the empty plastic water bottles, I longed to see the people who were trying to be as transparent as the bottles they were carrying. Of course, you can't come strutting into town covered in dust carrying empty water bottles. At some point, you have to shed your survival gear and try to blend in.

I didn't see a soul that day who fit the profile the left-in-the-sand gear suggested, but I have thought often of the courage, grim acceptance and perseverance of the people who could make that journey. I gasp at the enormity of the task they set for themselves. How awful it must be, how persistent the feeling of fear must be to live with the moniker of "illegal" in your daily life, even if you are just trying to make a better life. Litter is just the beginning.

There is an image in A Better Life that made my heart stop because it captured that snapshot of the horrible reality I only imagined that day walking safely with experienced hikers. A group starts walking and you can only hope they make it.

A Better Life is the story of an undocumented worker and his hope to make a better life for his son. Carlos (Demian Bichir) works dawn to dusk as a landscaper in Los Angeles. The baggage of his status follows him everywhere. He must be cautious. One wrong move and he could be discovered.

His son Luis (Jose Julian) is very American. He has a birth certificate and talks and acts like a very American teenage boy, embarrassed by his father's very Mexican demeanor, the work he does and the lack of money in the household. They don't have much in common, and they don't see each other much. Mom left them both years be-

Luis could use more guidance and supervision. He skips school sometimes and may be drifting towards joining a gang. He taunts his father with the possibilities of behaving badly to get the kinds of things American



teenage boys want. He's not a bad kid, just a kid on the edge of manhood with lots of questions about how to get there.

Carlos is given the opportunity to buy the truck, equipment and client list of the man he works for, who has saved enough to move back to Mexico and tend his own small farm. The proposition is fraught with risk, but he sees it as a way to get that highly sought after better life for his son. He has to borrow money from his sister to have a chance at this opportunity. And, since he has no driver's license, any random stop by the police could ruin everything.

But things go from precarious to disastrous when the truck is stolen. For fans of The Bicycle Thief, this may sound vaguely familiar, and the two films do share a sensibility. The theft brings father and son together because they need to find out who stole the truck and try to get it back. This leads them on a tour of neighborhoods, events and characters that don't look anything like the Los Angeles we usually see in movies.

The anxiety of their situation is palpable and uncomfortable. It is relieved periodically by the people they meet and the normalness of life as they land periodically in places that are safe. Their home may be run down, but the garden is packed with plants Carlos is growing for customers, and it has a homey feel. Despite the dangers faced by all the characters we meet, there are recognizably loving families and friends around every corner as well.

The plot is predictable here and there but A Better Life doesn't present the people and places with a heavy-duty agenda. We're not being fed a diet of immigration politics. though its right there for us to observe. Rather, we're along for the ride as well-meaning everyday people get on with their lives.

A Better Life is directed by Chris Weitz from a screenplay by Eric Eason from a story by Roger Simon. Weitz has directed some gloppy blockbusters - The Golden Compass and The Twilight Saga: New Moon. He's also the director of About a Boy, the wonderful and intimate screen adaptation of Nick Hornby's novel. A Better Life is thankfully more like About a Boy.

A Better Life doesn't hit you over the head with political messages, but it is a powerful rebuke to voices seeking to demonize and generalize about the "criminality" of people living and working in our country who came here to find a better life.

Opening This Weekend: Four new films open wide this coming weekend, starting with Summit Entertainment's hopeful blockbuster The Tree Mus-

Despite a strong handful of very negative reviews, the film is already doing quite well overseas, taking dead aim at the Pirates of the Caribbean and Sherlock Holmes crowds. You suckers! Looks pretty snoozy for a big budget action flick. Paul W.S. Anderson (not to be confused with Paul Thomas Anderson), the guy behind such classics as Mortal Kombat, Event Horizon, Alien vs. Predator and Resident Evil, directs.

Paranormal Activity 3 also opens wide. Looks very, very, very bad. The Mighty Macs, a feel-good sports drama starring Carla Gugino, Marley Shelton, Ellen Burstyn and David Boreanaz, opens wide. The film, considered a filler release, was completed over two years ago, then put on the shelf. We'll likely watch this movie at some point, if only because we've had a screen crush on Gugino ever since Son In Law was released in 1993 (Marley Shelton isn't too hard on the eyes either). Last but not least, we have what is likely the best new release of the week, Rowan "Mr. Bean" Atkinson's long awaited sequel to Johnny English, titled Johnny English Reborn. The flick has been doing very well overseas thus far, selling over \$85 million in tickets while also scoring great reviews. Looks super funny, in a light, probably very stupid sort of way. Will be interesting to see how this movie does in the U.S.

Tops at the Box: For the second consecutive weekend, Buena Vista's fighting robot flick, Real Steel, took the No. 1 spot at the U.S. box office, selling another \$16 million in tickets. Thus far the flick, which stars Hugh Jackman, has sold about \$52 million in tickets in the U.S. over its first 10 days. Oh, and the movie has also sold about \$57 million in tickets outside the U.S., making it a \$100 million movie in just 10 days. Yikes! Not bad for a ridiculously cheesy looking flick. This means, of course, that there will be more robot movies. Bad ones.

More From the Box: Paramount Pictures' Footloose remake took the No. 2 spot over its first weekend, selling \$16 million in the U.S. Look for this totally awful film to continue clocking midrange numbers for another month or so; then, soon after that, look for the flick to do quite well on DVD



No. 3 spot was Eric Heisserer's remake of John Carpenter's classic thriller The Thing, which brought in just under \$9 million over its first three days. Also of note: newbie comedy The Big Year, starring Steve Martin, Owen Wilson and Jack Black flopped big in its first week, selling just over \$3 million while opening wide. Yikes! With the holiday season coming, I figured now would be a good time to encourage you, the film fanatic to man up and consider picking up a Blu-ray player and some Bluray films. By doing so, you'll also be setting yourself up to watch a movie at home that, for the first time ever, looks just as good as it does at the theater. (Note: you'll also need an HD television and some high-quality cables, but most seem to have those things by now.) Rather than go into all the details. I figured it best to simplify the difference between DVD and Blu-ray by speaking in numbers. DVDs. at most, can hold just under eight gigs of memory; Blu-ray discs can hold 50 gigs per side. 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that Blu-ray discs can hold either more material or, in most cases, a higher-quality picture and sound. DVD resolution (the number of pixels that show up on your screen) is, at best, 720 by 480 pixels while Blu-ray is 1,920 by 1,080 pixels. When you play a DVD the picture from the original film transfer you see in theaters is compressed down to at most 345,600 pixels per frame. Blu-ray, on the other hand, puts well over 2 million pixels on your screen per frame, about six times more than a DVD. It's something you just have to see to believe. I doubted the technology at first, then saw Terrence Malick's Days of Heaven, Criterion transfer, on Blu-ray. Then, after that, Kick-Ass. And I'm not kidding you when I say that Kick-Ass looked better in my living room than it did at the theater. Just saying. Blu-ray is for real, if you're the cinephile type, that is. Also, the players and discs are finally becoming affordable and will become even more so as the holiday season draws closer. If you're still not convinced, consider this: both Pulp Fiction and Citizen Kane were just issued on Blu-ray, and Criterion's transfers of both Rushmore and The Royal Tenenbaums are in the works as we speak. Sold!

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
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
