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Masked and Dangerous

For anyone not familiar with their music or their stage show, Mushroomhead are one of the most unique and consistently interesting bands in the metal genre. They combine a menacingly costumed image, an elaborate stage show and a sound that incorporates el-

ements of numerous genres alongside an industrialmetal core. from hip-hop and Goth rock to punk and techno. The band will playing at Piere's on Friday, Nov. 4 along with Psychostick, Ventana and Felix. Blue Tickets are \$15 in advance and \$18 same day.

Mushroomhead's origins lie in the music scene in Cleveland, Ohio in the 1990s, the same locale that features the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame and later spawned

the likes of Chimaira. The band, founded by drummer Steve "Skinny" Felton in 1993, was originally conceived as a side project for its members, who were already playing in the band Hatrix. Mushroomhead's first show was actually opening up for Hatrix, and the band's members wore masks and costumes to conceal their identities and prevent any confusion amongst concertgoers about which band was Mushroomhead and which was Hatrix.

The newly-formed band gained exposure very quickly, however, when another costumed monster band, Gwar, asked Mushroomhead to open for them at a Cleveland performance just days after the band had played their first show in 1993. The band continued to gain steam and quickly became Cleveland's top local attraction, eventually releasing their eponymous debut album in the spring of 1995. They released two more independently-released album, Superbuick (1996) and M3 (1999) before the band signed to Island records in 2001.

Over the years, Mushroomhead's membership and stage antics evolved and grew. The band currently consists of eight members whose masks are highly articulated caricatures (think monster masks from horror films), whereas previously the masks were relatively simple black masks with white

paintings of X eyes and long fangs (think of the Venom character from Spider-Man comics). Their most prominent stage prop is their use of water drums - drums lit from underneath with multi-colored lights from underneath that spray water upwards when

In late 1999 the band and its fans became

tion counter-sued, citing that the fictitious band featured in the commercials was a general parody of masked bands of which many examples existed (e.g. Kiss and Mr. Bungle) and that it bore little resemblance to Slipknot other than that its members wore masks. The ad campaign and lawsuit were eventually dropped.

Additionally. Slipknot frontman Corey Taylor claimed in a 2005 radio interview that bands had "started at the same time neither one of us knowing anything about the other." Taylor either has a very loose definition of the word "time," or is misstating the chronological facts. Mushroomhead had clearly been

gigging for two years prior to Slipknot's formation in 1995 and had released its debut album (albeit on a minor label) nearly six months before Slipknot existed. While it's plausible that Slipknot members knew nothing of Mushroomhead, to say that they began at the same time is simply false.

Still, the feud seems to have officially ended between the bands and has apparently died down amongst even their supporters. In 2009, co-lead vocalist Waylon Reavis told the website Noisecreep that they were no longer interested in feuding. "It's been 10 years at this point, and we're still here and they're still there. And we still don't sound like each other," said Reavis. "They're not the first masked band; we're not [either]." Mushroomhead also made a conciliatory gesture after Slipknot bassist Paul Gray's tragic death in 2010 by posting a statement on its website expressing its condolences and calling for the feud to end.

In 2010, their tenth album, Beautiful Stories for Ugly Children, debuted at number 44, and their 2006 album, Savior Sorrow, landed at No. 50 on the Billboard charts. Most recently, the band's co-lead vocalist Jeffrey Nothing released his first solo album, The New Psychodalia, on October 11 of this year

Over the years, the collective has built up a fervent cult following through constantly headlining club tours as well as sharing the stage with the likes of Ozzy Osbourne, Rob Zombie and Slayer. As turntablist and percussionist ST1TCH (real name: Rick Thomas) said in an interview with Noisecreep, "With us, it's always been about the fans. Without them, we wouldn't be sitting here right now."

> their image. Mushroomhead, which formed in 1993, wore jumpsuits and masks on stage (one of which was a pig mask), issued their debut album in the spring of 1995 and at one point was discussing a record deal with RoadRunner Records, which they eventually turned down. Slipknot formed in late 1995, signed with RoadRunner in 1998 and released its debut album in 1999, featuring a strikingly similar image to Mushroomhead's (including one band member in a pig mask).

> Members of Mushroomhead accused the Iowa-based band of image theft and engaged in a verbal battle, primarily through the media. Members of Slipknot responded by acknowledging the similarity between the two bands' images but essentially dismissing it as a coincidence. The feud became especially intense between fans and raged for almost 10 years, much of which found its expression on Internet discussion boards.

> While the members of the Slipknot camp have mostly steered clear of actively engaging in the feud, they have indulged in some peculiar behavior in light of the accusations. Despite shrugging off the charge of image theft from Mushroomhead, the band later inexplicably sued Burger King for similar reasons, claiming the corporation had ripped off their image in a 2004 spoof ad campaign that featured a masked band. 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'Glistening, Silvery'

It may sound like Over the Rhine's latest album, *The Long Surrender*, is the result of a meticulous process of getting every last detail just right, but from the time the duo first stepped into producer Joe Henry's home studio until the album was finished only five days had passed.

"We walked away feeling like we had just experienced the week of a lifetime," says pianist/bassist/singer/songwriter Linford Detweiler. "A significant number of the tracks on the record are first takes. We landed 'em like glistening, silvery fish."

The recording process was typical Joe Henry style, in which the most important thing is to find the right musicians to play the songs and trust that they'll get it right the first time. That put pressure on vocalist Karin Bergquist, who was usually singing live with the band and needed to hit the mark with her vocals in the first couple of takes. She says that she knew she had to be on her game, but after doing this for more than 20 years, if she wasn't on her game now, she never would be.

After all, this was just an intensified version of what she and Detweiler, her husband and musical partner since 1989, had been doing for decades. Of his own songwriting and producing, Detweiler says he tries to create "spaces where good things can happen.

"Karin and I write songs that allow her voice to bloom, and we

find musicians who know how to take what we do and make it spark and breathe, twitch and moan." he says. "We try to work with musicians who inspire us, people whose company we enjoy."

The couple's musical collaboration began at the end of the 80s when they were living in Cincinnati's Over-the-Rhine neighborhood, a historic district squeezed between downtown and the hills surrounding the city center. A 19th-century neighborhood built by German immigrants, Over-the-Rhine has cultural and architectural significance, but by the time Detweiler and Bergquist lived there it was one of the most troubled parts of the city, infamous for its poverty and crime. The heady energy conjured by the neighborhood's contradictions were not lost on the budding band in need of a name.

"The phrase evoked images of going over the rainbow, being drunk with joy, getting high on leaving home or whatever was keeping us up at night," he says. "We were young. We were free to do anything or be anybody. We needed to pick a new favorite dilemma. We needed a name. We were Over the Rhine."

From there, it was years of songwriting, playing, recording and touring. Originally a quartet, Over the Rhine eventually settled into an identity that consisted of Detweiler and Bergquist and whatever musicians could bring the music they wrote to life. It was a formula that worked, and the duo's nearly unclassifiable music – "post-nuclear, pseudo alternative, folk-tinged art-pop," as they describe it – gained a large and enthusiastic following, first in and around Cincinnati and then everywhere that Over the Rhine went around the country.

Although Detweiler and Bergquist resist compiling a discography, preferring to focus on their most recent recording, Over the Rhine have recorded close to two dozen albums since 1990, and most of them have been informal self-released projects. In 2007 De-



tweiler and Bergquist founded their own label, Great Speckled Dog (a reference to the couple's Great Dane, Elroy), but un-

til then the duo's albums were produced and released in a DIY fashion, staying determinedly and successfully outside of the corporate establishment of the music business.

Ironically, Over the Rhine's long history of operating outside of the traditional music business is what put the band in the position to make an ambitious, polished album like *The Long Surrender*. As they approached the project they reached out to their fans in a way that's possible only when a band has an unmediated connection with its listeners – a way that's available now to an independent band thanks to the Internet – and asked for financial help to produce the album. Nearly a thousand fans responded, and *The Long Surrender* became a joint project of the musicians and the people who would ultimately enjoy the music. It's a very 21st-century method for making music that insists on looking backward.


"We're really only reflecting what we've already heard," Detweiler says, "a mix of all the music we grew up with and were drawn to – old gospel hymns the country and western music on WWVA, the rock n' roll records the kids at school passed around, the symphonic music that my father brought home, the jazz musicians we discovered in college, the Great American Songbook performers that Karin's mother loved and, of course, the various singer-songwriters that eventually knocked the roof off our world. But when this music is reflected back to the listener through the filter of our own particular lives, hopefully it becomes a much different experience."

After spending the early part of October opening for Lucinda Williams, Over the Rhine will spend some time in the Midwest (including its Fort Wayne show) before heading out to the West Coast in November and

Nashville in the Rear View

Raspy-voiced, alt-country crooner Matthew Ryan is packing up. He's moving on. He's joining the swelling and increasingly star-studded crowd of singer-songwriters who've made the tough choice to leave Nashville behind for good. You might think

that, like many before him, Ryan's skipping town out of bitterness or disillusionment, but actually he's making the move from Music City for one reason:

"I can't complain," he said during a recent phone conversa-tion. "Nashville's been wonderful to me, but the bottom line is it's an industry town. I've been here six years. It's time. I'm not leaving in dejection or anger. It's just that there are a lot of ambitious people here. It can be kind of exhausting, and I've been wondering what it would be like to live someplace that's just beautiful."

So he's headed back to

his home state of Pennsylvania – this time to Brighton Township, miles from where he grew up on the east side of Pittsburgh – with a song in his heart. Several songs, in fact, from

his new album, I Recall Standing as Though Nothing Could Fall, and he'll share these tunes with local audiences Thursday, November 3 when he returns to Calhoun Street Soups, Salads and Spirits' Tiger Room with his band, The Red Needles, for the first time since a chill-inducing 2009 performance that earned him a fort's worth of loyal fans.

And if you can safely say that Ryan is alright with Nashville, he's a bona fide champion of all things Fort Wayne.

"I've traveled all around the world and it's so unpredictable, where you'll find the love. I've been to little villages in Italy and tons of people will show up and sing along, tiny places most people don't even know exist. It's the spirit of the room, I guess, and whatever it is, Fort Wayne has it," he said. "Every show I've played there has the same spirit, the same cool energy. There's nothing worse than playing for a room full of cynics who could care less about each other, let alone the guy on stage."

It's difficult to be cynical in the face of Ryan's sometimes romantic, often political and always haunting oeuvre. He burst onto the alt-country scene with 1997's May Day, an album put out by A&M records that showcased Ryan's Tom Waits/Bruce Springsteen side. It seemed to Ryan that he'd made it. After all, here he was, a kid from working-class stock with a major record deal and some serious buzz. Then he put out his second album, East Autumn Grin, and when it failed to chart, A&M dumped him.

Instead of giving up or crawling back home with his proverbial tail between his legs, Ryan pressed on, putting out Concussion on Nashville's WaxySilver label. The record features Ryan's first duet with songstress Lucinda Williams, and in 2001 he went out on the road to open for her at sev-



The next four years saw five selfreleased records, including Dissent from the Living Room, Happiness and Regret Over the Wires. That's a lot of conflicting emotion in a short

time, but anyone who's had the pleasure of hearing Ryan, either on the stereo or live, knows he can juggle it all. That includes being part of a band. In 2004 he and some buddies teamed up to record Strays Don't Sleep, his first big break since his debut. One of the singles from Strays, "For Blue Skies," which Ryan wrote in response to his brother being sent to jail for life, was featured on the CW hit teen soap One Tree Hill. Perhaps more importantly, the whole album received rave reviews from both critics and fans.

The band broke up shortly after, but Ryan's career was on a roll, even as his personal life seemed to be on a downward spiral. In 2006 he put out From a Late-Night High Rise, his most acclaimed album to that point. The success was bittersweet, given that many of the songs dealt with his brother's incarceration and the death of a close

Ryan put out Matthew Ryan vs. the Silver State two years later and Dear Lover a year after that. He described his latest effort, I Recall Standing as Though Nothing Could Fall, as his most overtly political record, as well as his most misunderstood.

"It's very direct in its dealings with social issues, without, I hope, being heavyhanded or preachy," he said. "It's basically in defense of our shared humanity. We're in the midst of incredible social upheaval. We're living in a very partisan America, so I

World-renowned British choral ensemble The King's Singers will make a stop in Fort Wayne as part of their 2011-2012 tour. They will perform at First Presbyterian Church downtown on Wayne Street.

Founded in 1831, First Presbyterian has maintained the oldest working congregation in Fort Wayne. The concert will be given in the Sanctuary, a beautiful ivory hall with excellent acoustics and ample seating for hun-

Heralded as a "superlative vocal sextet" by The Times in London, there have only been 20 members in The King's Singers since the group's inception in 1968. This extremely low turnover has helped them maintain their celebrated sound, leading Primarily A Cappella Records to label them

"arguably the most popular a cappella group

of all time."

The group is named after King's College Cambridge in England where its founding six members were choral scholars. Al Hume, one of those found-

ing members, sang with The King's Singers for an impressive 25 years. Upon his departure, Hume imparted these words, "I have seen it grow from nothing. Some say that we provide pleasurable, if detached, entertainment; others that our obvious personal enjoyment expands to involve the whole audience; even more describe our concerts as a great outpouring of fundamental humanity.

"[And] then there are those who feel that the group's recordings and concerts demonstrate that vocal music ... can be enjoyed rather than endured, that 'classical' formats and music can be fun, not stuffy," wrote Hume. Judging from the incredible success the group has enjoyed, I'd say that's right on

Their sound is rooted in musical repertoire found in the group's early student days. "From a medieval Magnificat in chapel to a madrigal, glee, part song or pop song arrangement away from chapel, The King's Singers were to go on to build a successful career," their press release touts.

Their musical stylings have expanded to include over 2,000 works from both young and established composers and singers. From Gesualdo and György Ligeti to expect a harmonious blend of both classical

The King's Singers have had a prolific career with 18 releases under the Signum Classics label and more than 150 recordings in their discography. They have received critical acclaim and numerous awards, including a Grammy in 2009 for their album Simple Gifts.

The group is currently made up of two countertenors (David Hurley and Timothy Wayne-Wright), one tenor (Paul Phoenix). two baritones (Philip Lawson and Christopher Gabbitas), and one bass (Jonathan

Howard describes his career with The King's Singers as his dream job. "I still find it arresting that it's now my job to sing as part of the best male a cappella groups in the

world. I felt like I had so little control over the selection process: suddenly, one day while at work, I received a telephone call, asking me if I'd like to audition. Five months later, I was at

the tailor, being asked for my King's Singers suit measurements.

"As I imagine is the case with all dream jobs, you just turn up at interviews with no serious belief that you might be chosen," Howard reflected. "I distinctly remember smiling inanely throughout in a vain attempt to disguise my nerves.'

That enthusiasm and lucky feeling is contagious. Phoenix, who sings tenor, also has the bug. He says that time really does fly when you're having fun.

"It feels like a lifetime ago since I was a freelance tenor, learning so much about singing in different styles: from pop sessions, to singing arias in Handel's 'Messiah'. and even longer since I sang as a chorister in St. Paul's Cathedral," Phoenix mused. "Yet here I am 13 years after joining what I think is the world's finest vocal group, and I still enjoy every second of it. I feel lucky to stand along side the most generous and skilled musicians, who have taught me so much and given me such pleasure."

The group credits its success in part to their tightly knit relationship. Finding the

Keeping 'Summer' Alive

There's a thing that music snobs like to do. Say you're out to dinner with one of them, and you make a reference to how much you adore Bryan Adams. The snob might say, "Don't you mean *Ryan* Adams?"

Even after you've made it perfectly clear that you are, indeed, talking about the gritty-voiced rock star behind such hits as "Heaven" and "Summer of '69," there's a good chance said snob will blather on about the seminal differences between *Gold* and *Easy Tiger*. It's too bad because I, for one, can say that it's possible to love both Bryan and Ryan. Really. Why can't we all just get alone?

Of the two Adamses, Bryan was, of course, my first love. He was responsible for my childhood soundtrack. Those of you who grew up in the 80s know what I'm talking about. The summer of 1985 just wouldn't have been the same without "Summer of '69" playing on every radio known to man and woman. And I'm pretty sure most of my impressions of adolescent romantic love were shaped by "Heaven," "Run to You" and, later but perhaps even more crucially by, "(Everything I Do) I Do It for You." (So what if I had unrealistic expectations when it came to relationships? It was nice to believe, if only for a little while.)

The thing to remember about *Bryan* Adams, who'll be taking the Embassy Theatre stage Wednesday, November 2 as part of his Bare Bones tour, is that the 80s didn't really do him justice. This talented Canadian not only writes and records music capable of defining a generation – he's also a dedicated philanthropist and photographer, a veritable Renaissance man, if you will. What say you now, snobs?


He's so busy and important, in fact, that we weren't able to connect for a phone interview, so I e-mailed him a set of questions instead. The main problem in securing a phoner actually came down to the fact that Adams, who grew up the child of an ambassador and has lived all over the world, currently resides in Europe where he continues to tour and perform on a regular basis.

Adams has never really stopped playing music since he bought his first Fender in 1975. His fame might have ebbed a little in the 90s following "Have You Ever Really Loved a Woman," featured on the sound-track for Johnny Depp's sweet bit of fluff, Don Juan De Marco, and a sold-out performance at Wembley Stadium, but Adams is an artist whose greatest joy comes from making music, not from adulation.

"The best part of [that early fame] was becoming independent and being able to pay my rent, and other best moments were always the artistic ones and knowing that I'd be able to take care of my family going forward," Adams said. "The worst things were realizing how bad the contracts were that I signed as a young songwriter looking for a

That break came rather quickly, when

you consider that Adams started fronting the Vancouver-based rock band Sweeney Todd at the tender age of 15. Soon he and his mates put out their first album, If Wishes Were Horses. Apparently wishes, if not horses, really do come true because two years later Adams was discovered by A&M records. In 1980 he put out his self-titled debut songwriting help from friend Jim Vallance. Later came You Want It You Got It, which he recorded in just two weeks' time in New York City, but it wasn't until 1983's Cuts Like a Knife that Adams really made his mark on the music industry. ladies loved

his passion-filled, raspy vocals, and MTV's camera-happy video world loved his chiseled good looks. Everyone seemed to love the singles "Straight From the Heart," "Cuts Like a Knife" and "This Time."

Adams' next album, *Reckless*, hit No. 1 on the Billboard 200. Soon kids all over the U.S. and Canada thought they knew exactly what made the summer of 1969 so important. Mass protests calling for the end to the Vietnam War? The beginning of Richard Nixon's tenure as president? The moon landing? Nah. What mattered was that Jimmy quit and Jody got married.

An onslaught of love followed, as well as another album, *Waking Up the Neighbors*, which peaked at No. 6 on the Billboard chart when it dropped in 1991. It featured "(Everything I Do) I Do It for You," the theme to the wildly popular Kevin Costner vehicle *Robin Hood: Prince of Thieves*, and young women and teen girls continued to swoon the world over for Adams who said that even today he relishes the opportunity to perform those old songs.

"I love them," Adams said. "They have stood the test of time. I put that down to the way they were written and recorded, guys in a room jamming. We kept it simple ... They never fade and are always fantastic to sing."

In fact, the purpose of the Bare Bones tour is to shed new light on old favorites, to strip them down to their essence and remind fans why they fell in love with the songs in the first place.

"It's my acoustic rendition of 30 years of songwriting squished into two hours, and usually I mumble lots of nonsense inbetween songs too," Adams said.

It's a common misconception on the part of pop culture observers that when a singer witnesses his star power fading a little he must be unhappy about it. We've all watched flash-in-the-pan acts like Lindsay Lohan and Britney Spears implode in very public ways. First comes fame, then comes backlash, then comes rehab. But for Adams, first came fame, then came backlash, then came giving back. Instead of retreating into himself or making his life a public spectacle, Adams created a philanthropic foundation to benefit underprivileged children around the world, focusing primarily on access to education. He continues to champion a wide variety of causes, including animal rights and world peace.

"Creating a foundation is probably one of the best things I've done, as the requests to be involved in other charity functions come in and are so varied. It's been great to focus and concentrate on one or two things, mostly the needs of children," said Adams.

So you see, loving Bryan Adams – I mean *Bryan* Adams – not only shows good taste. It's good for the planet as well. Sorry, snobs. You lose.

New Digs for Artists

After 20 years of enlivening the east end of Berry, Artlink, Fort Wayne's not-for-profit contemporary art gallery, has bid farewell to the Hall Center and eased on over to the new Auer Center for Arts and Culture at 300 Main Street. The move places the gallery directly across the street from the Fort Wayne Museum of Art and the Arts United Center.

Now, standing on Main Street and pivoting between all three imposing buildings, one gets the distinct feeling that the mothership has landed: Fort Wayne has a fine arts district.

The Aner Center, formerly known as the Wave Fourth building, once housed several businesses within its spacious, modern interior. It was purchased last November by Arts United

and renamed in recognition of a \$1 million grant from the Edward D. and Ione Auer Foundation. That gift, combined with other donations, enabled Arts United to land this particular piece of real estate, crucial to its master plan of creating an "arts campus" downtown. More development is already on the horizon with a 5,000-square-foot "Art-sLab" to be built next as a multifunctional facility.

The Fort Wayne Ballet moved into the Auer Center earlier this year and, after a summer's worth of remodeling, Artlink began moving during September. Gallery director Deb Washler is delighted with the new digs.

"We now have twice the running wall space for exhibitions," says she. In fact, the new space is so large that it is divided into four galleries. The Betty G. Fishman Gallery honors the former Artlink director. A second is named for Fort Wayne Art School instructor and artist Russ Oettel. Two more are named for staunch patrons: the Sauerteig Family Gallery and the Mirro Family Foundation Gallery.

And now all sorts of options have opened up.

"We can have one huge show and two smaller ones, or three small and one midsize show ... many possible combinations," Washler predicts. Flexibility is achieved by changing the positions of 12 adjustable display panels, five more than the former gallery could accommodate.

Running several exhibits at a time ups the revenue generated by sales, entry fees and admission donations and will help meet new operating costs. Another important source of revenue will come from events and classes offered to the public in brandnew classroom and studio space.

"We will be offering 143 educational programs starting in November" staffer Suzanne Galazka said. This is more than three times what was offered at the old location. Everything from yoga to kid's art classes to life drawing and holiday craft workshops will be available. Information on all scheduled classes will be posted on the website,



direct mailed to members, or can be picked up at the gallery.

Artlink's small, hardworking staff of four is visibly pleased at having better operating conditions. In the past the staff struggled to uncrate and store pending artwork in their cramped back room. Galazka enthusiastically shows off the roomy new receiving and storage areas. And she and Washler now enjoy actual private offices.

"With doors," beams Washler.

As it's inaugural Auer exhibit, Artlink presents 100 Years of Connectivity: George Kessler Park and Boulevard System, sponsored in part by Friends of the Parks. Kessler is the visionary behind Fort Wayne's thoughtfully designed network of beautiful boulevards, parks and adjacent neighborhoods. He was hired in 1911 to devise longrange plans that would preserve for citizens much of the area's natural beauty despite inevitable urbanization. His original map of the plan is part of the exhibit.

For this show Artlink extended an open call to the community for artworks that celebrated the continuing utility and scenic appeal of Kessler's vision. This has netted more than 60 works depicting scenes that will be familiar to many who visit Fort Wayne parks and drive Kessler's boulevards to get there. These range from paintings to prints, from sculpture to photography and include all styles and interpretations. The exhibit nicely demonstrates how Kessler's legacy continues to be enjoyed by the community for which it was designed.

The show runs through November 30. New gallery hours are Tuesday through Saturday from noon to 6 p.m., Thursday noon to 8 p.m., and Sunday noon to 5 p.m.

Just for the Fun of It

I always thought we were all in it for the same thing – everyone, everywhere, doing whatever it is they do. We're all in it for the glory and probably the money. That's not to say I assume the entire human race is a bunch of money-grubbing glory-hogs, but who wouldn't appreciate a little extra respect from the people around them and maybe a couple of quarters left in their pocket the Thursday before payday?

I was wrong. Here to prove me wrong is the band Edible. They're a cover band and absolutely nothing else – and that is intriguing.

Edible came to life in 2003 with Jennifer Hitchcock as lead singer. Hitchcock, who was running karaoke at the time was approached by a drummer to sing for the band, and she jumped at the chance. It was a short run though, as after a few years Hitchcocks's pregnancy forced a hiatus from performing. When she resurrected Edible in 2007, she was the only original member from the band's first run.

After a few auditions and a little poaching, she put a lineup together. The new crew includes Shad Stahlman on bass; Steve Grodrian on lead guitar and vocals; Bryan Hitchcock on keys, guitar and vocals; and Seve Sullivan-Doyle on drums, with Hitchcock still belting lead vocals. Bryan Hitchcock, was playing in another band when Edible re-formed; when he and Jennifer got engaged, he decided it was time to change his allegiance to Edible.

One of my first questions to the band when we sat down to talk was about their own original work. To my surprise, Jennifer told me, "We only do covers. We don't do anything original."

The reason is simple, according to guitarist Grodrian: covers and originals are hard to jam into one show.

"Mixing cover material in a cover band and original material never works," he explained. "It's basically two separate crowds. And if you try and mix in good original stuff in a cover band, you drive away the people that want to come out and hear cover stuff and just party. And you also turn off the people that are looking for original material because they're not interested in coming to hear covers."

Jennifer Hitchcock provided another reason the bands sticks to covers. "We're just trying to have fun. We're not trying to be famous," she says.

This is an interesting concept to me: a band that's not interested in gaining notoriety but just wants to play some tunes on the weekend. They love to play together and get a crowd going, and that's what the music is about for them, not climbing the charts.

While Edible are out having a good time, they're also paying homage to some great artists. With a huge dose of modern rock infused with some classics, they whip out favorites from artists like Theory of a Deadman, Buckcherry, Alanis Morissette, Joan Jett, Tool, Little Big Town, Three Days Grace and Black Stone Cherry to get the crowd on their feet and moving. Though they doesn't have original material, Edible still give a unique performance.

"We put our own sound into what we're playing," said Grodrian.

"We've been playing the covers so long they kind of morph into our own songs, and we've kind of changed them to suit us," added Jennifer Hitchcock. "Then you hear the original on the radio and you're like "Oh that's how that sounds?"

With their collection of covers in tow and their passion on their sleeves, Edible head out weekend after weekend to spur crowds of expectant listeners to their feet. And that's enough for them.

"The whole goal with this band is just for the people that come to hear us to have a good time and party," said Grodrian. "To me that's the biggest thing. I get a huge kick out of seeing everybody out there having fun."

Mastodon

The Hunter

The level of speculation and curiosity surrounding the release of Mastodon's fifth LP, The Hunter, seems to have reached a peak for the band. Not that any release since 2004's Leviathan has been likely to arrive without a great deal of attention, but the band's announcement



that they were taking a different direction from the rather linear, increasingly complex and refined path they have taken their entire career seems to have left not just their fan base but the band members themselves with a case of high anxiety.

The basic approach Mastodon takes on The Hunter, relative to the work that precedes it, is less ponderous and weighty, more direct and succinct, and occasionally left-field. While the band doesn't abandon entirely its signature sound of monster riffs and throaty vocals, the songs here are relatively brief: there are 13 tracks weighing in at just 53 minutes, with only two songs extending past the five-minute mark, and one clocking in under three minutes. No more seven-minute epic jams. Their guitar tone, too, sounds a little less weighty and more acid-fried than on albums past. Beyond that, the formal differences are, for the most part, negligible.

So what's a fan to think? Much of the band's commentary that has made its way into the press via interviews has been pre-emptively defensive of what they perceive the criticisms of the album will be, and bands taking new directions with their music have tradition-

ally run the risk of alienating much of their fan base.

The truth is that fans needn't have worried. While The Hunter may be less pummelling than their landmark albums and less refined than 2009's Crack the Skye, but it is also their least cumbersome work to date. In fact, the band sounds like it's just loosening up and rocking out a bit more than they have in the past.

The only track here that might estrange some listeners is "The Creature Lives," a spaced-out song with an unusual (for Mastodon) chorus that sounds like it could be either a mash-up of late-era Beatles and the Steve Miller Band or a lost track from Brian Eno's Taking Tiger Mountain sessions. For those who enjoyed the more out-there tracks from Crack the Skye, though, the song should serve as a more anthemic counterpoint to the soulful but often tragic content of so much of the band's work.

For the most part, though, "The Hunter" comes across as a band nearing veteran status taking a victory lap. After coming to a certain level of mastery over the course of five albums and more than a decade of churning out increasingly difficult and weighty material, cutting loose and letting things rip may just be what the band (and their fans) needed to show off their chops and engage in a bit of revelry. It makes for an immediately-compelling and exhilarating listen, and one that fans old and new should take pleasure in. (Ryan Smith)

Boston Spaceships Let It Beard

Every now and again former Guided by Voices frontman Robert Pollard, known for his overly prolific approach to releasing records, works quite a bit harder on one of his records than he does his many others. A few years ago he released a double record called From a Compound Eye; he worked kinda/



sorta hard on that one. Then he released Normal Happiness a few months later, which he also seemingly worked more on than most of his other post-Guided by Voices records. Since those two albums, he's released at least another 20 albums under a number of different monikers. Not joke, 20, maybe even 30 full length records.

Now, don't get me wrong, I love Pollard (especially Alien Lanes, Bee Thousand, the last three GBV albums and the above mentioned Compound Eye and Normal Happiness), but I find him to be an almost always infuriating artist to love. (Why, you ask? Because a man with his pop craft ability could and should be releasing 12 amazing songs – and no more – every year or two.) Coming up to date, Pollard has already released four or five albums this year (I stopped counting), and so, when I heard about a new release called Let It Beard, to be released under his Boston Spaceships moniker, I just wasn't all that excited. I mean, Pollard has undeniably put the most work

Napalm Death

Harmony Corruption (1990)

With Halloween right around the corner, I thought I'd try to find a disturbing rock n' roll album. Alice Cooper? Black Sabbath? How about Napalm Death, one of the creepiest bands around since 1981?



Napalm Death's third album was produced without singer Lee Dorian and guitarist Bill Steer. You would think that it would change the sound of the band completely, but it didn't. Jesse Pintado took over on the guitar, and the band went from grindcore to death metal. Fans knew the difference, but to me it's all speed-metal.

The record explodes with "Vision Conquest." Lightning fast drumming and filthy guitars make this music understandably angry and confusing. I don't know what Mark Greenway is singing behind the three minutes of frantic buzzing, and I probably don't

Each track runs into the next, as if it were just several verses of the same song. I'm not being critical, as I think all Dave Matthews sounds alike as well.

"Unfit Earth" has a metal vibe and may be the most "mellow" song. It's also the longest, clocking in at over five minutes. "Mind Snare" is about heroin ("Reasoning poison in the vein / chasing the dragon that's frying your brain / the stuff that once gave you the high / now controls your escape from proverbial cloud nine") It may not be very deep, but at least it carries an anti-drug mes-

This isn't music for everyone - and you have to listen to it loud. Pintado died in 2006, but Napalm carried on, with now 14 records to their credit. I think if Hell had a house band, it would be Napalm Death (and Mayhem).

Fun fact: Napalm Death hold the Guinness World Record for shortest song ever recorded: the one-second "You Suffer" from 1987. (Dennis Donahue)

into the Boston Spaceships stuff over the last few years, calling it his 'core project," but I just figured we'd get another 20ish-song record with three or four good/great tracks.

Not the case. Not exactly. We get a pretty damn long album this time, clocking in at 26 songs and over 76 minutes, a proper double album. And sure, there are some not-so-hot songs here and there, but for the most part Let it Beard is a very good, very complete-sounding album. It reminds me of Guided by Voices quite a bit, a mixture of one-, two- and three-minute songs that all pass quickly and hang heavily on their stylized lo-fi ornamentation, indie rock classicism and, mostly, their beefy hooks, most of which are pretty great, if often somewhat redundant in the scope of Pollard's endless catalog. So, of these 26 new songs, I challenged myself to pick 10 favorites, next burning those onto a disc to listen to as a short, solid pop rock record. I did this because I've been telling friends (and myself) for years that, if Pollard had an editor and took a little more time to construct great albums like he did through the 90s (and even the early 2000s at times), he'd be releasing the best indie-pop-rock albums on the planet.

And so I constructed such a list, and it went like this: 1. "German Field of Shadows"; 2. "Speed Bumps"; 3. "Blind 20-20"; 4. "Tourist UFO"; 5. "Make a Record fo Lo-Life": 6. "Tabby and Lucy"; 7. "The Ballad of Bad Whiskey"; 8. "Christmas Girl"; 9. "Let It Beard"; 10. "Chevy Marigold." After burning the disc and listening a few times I took a look at the track list. My first thought was: "Dang, some great titles, Bob." My next thought was: "I missed a lot of my favorites; maybe I'll make a disc of 10 b-side worthy songs." And so I did. Then I listened to that second 10-song disc a few times, then the first again. Repeat. All 20 songs were pretty great, offering a whole lot of variety, some pretty cool guitar tracks and, of course, Pollard's signature pseudo-British howl. None of the songs felt like fragments or half realized ideas. They all felt very full and real. My next thought, of course, was: "20 outta 26 ain't bad!"

Soon enough I tossed those two discs and just stuck with the 26song Let It Beard, listening to the record as Pollard and his noteworthy bandmates - drummer John Moen (former Jicks, The December-



I did see this line-up, which at the time consisted of Buckethead on guitar, in Columbus, Ohio back in 2002, and I enjoyed every minute of it. If I remember right, a few dates later they ended up canceling the remainder of the tour. On Thursday, December 8 the band will be coming to Axl's native Indiana to per-

form at the Conseco Fieldhouse in Indianapolis. This marks the first time the band has played in Indiana in 19 years (in 1991 they performed at Deer Creek Music Center and in 1992 at the Hoosier Dome).

Of course, Fort Wayne has never been a GNR tour stop, but original axe man Slash has played Piere's on a couple of solo tours and one of GNR's current guitarists, DJ Ashba, played Piere's on a couple of occasions with his band Beautiful Creatures. Current drummer Frank Ferrer and rhythm guitarist Richard Fortus were once in a band named Honky Toast which never stopped here, but I did have the pleasure of catching them live in '99 up in South Bend. You might remember their "Shakin' and a Bakin'," a tune that Rock 104 used to have in rotation that was pretty darn good. Other current members - Chris Pitman, Tommy Stinson, Ron "Bumblefoot" Thal and Dizzy Reed (GNR alum from Use Your Illusion era) - have been a part of some established acts over the years like The Replacements, Alice Cooper, Soul Asylum and Tool, but to the best of my knowledge have never come to town with any of those acts. One crazy fact is that Pitman and Stinson have now been in the band longer that any of the original members except Axl.

If you would like to see the current GNR line-up. tickets for the show range from \$30-\$75. I'm sure it will be a superb show, although most of you are probably like myself and holding onto hopes for a reunion some day.



then back to the East Coast in December. The touring doesn't stop, but it's a price the band is willing to pay to be able to bring its music to as many people as possible.

"We try to write music that in little ways helps to heal the wounds that life has dealt us or the wounds we've dealt ourselves," says Detweiler. "We try to write songs that can hum joyfully at the stars when something good goes down. We try to write tunes capable of whispering to a sleeping child that in spite of everything, somehow, all is well. We try to write words that help us learn to tell the truth to ourselves and others. That's a big part of all this. Music is a wonderful platform for discovering what we believe is true."

wanted to make an album that attempts to reclaim our future, to take it away from the more strident, divisive voices and give it back to the people."

Given that this moment in time does seem to be so polarized, perhaps it's not surprising that Ryan's album has managed to upset fans on both sides of the political spectrum. Ryan stresses, though, that *I Recall Standing* is not about the left or the right. It's about truth.

"This record is about perseverance and useful activism," he said. "A lot of the media voices want to tell us that we're not capable of adjusting to our new realities, but I know that's not true. We just have to engage with it, to understand that democracy is dependent on people vocalizing themselves persistently."

The same could be said for somehow keeping a music career alive, despite a fickle industry and a constantly changing technological landscape. Ryan

credits his upbringing with helping him navigate the increasingly unpredictable world of music for the last 15 years.


"I'd like to say I figured it out and that I'm a genius, but that wouldn't be true," he said. "The truth is, I was lucky early on to have a major label take a chance on me. That helped a lot. And also I think a great deal of it comes from my blue collar, working-class background. I was raised in a family that believed in the value of hard work and honesty.

"It was a tough decision to continue with music after I lost the A&M record deal," he continued. "It was scary, and I didn't know what the world would look like, but I was already motivated to do the best work I could ... I think I just do honest work and that finds its own water level. A lot of people still value that. I just try to write the best songs I can at the time and make sure those songs come from a genuine place."



Hanna

Hanna has as much action as the new Transformers movie, and as much smarts as the most recent Jane Eyre adaptation. It's way better than both those movies to boot.

As the movie opens, our title heroine (Saoirse Ronan, The Lovely Bones) is hunting a deer in the Arctic Circle when suddenly she is attacked by a bearded man (Eric Bana). The man turns out to be her father, a former intelligence operative named Erik. The fighting that ensues is half-rehearsal, half-real. Dad is training daughter very, very hard. When Hanna feels she is finally ready, and not one moment sooner, she has been instructed to flip the switch on a transmitter in their shack in the woods, a transmitter that will instantly reveal their location to the CIA and thus put into play the elaborate act of vengeance Erik has been hatching since Hanna was a baby.

The target of his revenge is Marissa (Cate Blanchett), a higher-up at the CIA who, for reasons that aren't immediately clear, killed Hanna's mother and attempted to kill Erik and Hanna, too, before Erik escaped with infant Hanna and disappeared into the wilderness for over a decade.

Hanna is no normal girl. Even at the genetic level there's something unusual about her. She has lived her entire life separated from the rest of society and been trained hard by Erik to become an efficient killing machine.

Directed with great aplomb and grace by Joe Wright (Atonement, Pride and Prejudice), Hanna is chock-full of terrific action set-pieces, lovely cinematography, a scenery-chewing villain unlike any other (Blanchett must have had a great time playing Marissa) and a heroine who is as scary as she is charming.

But back to those action set-pieces: wow. Hanna's escape from the CIA interrogation room. The chase scene in the shipping container yard. The interrogation scenes conducted by Marissa's slimy hired toad Isaacs (Tom Hollander). One long tracking-shot that follows Erik from the city street down to a subway platform while being slowly followed by one or more pursuers had all the neurons in my movie-geek brain firing in overdrive. (I watched this one scene several times in a row, marveling at the technical mastery that must have gone into the shooting of it.)

I could devote a thousand more words just to writing about the incredibly energetic, thumping techno soundtrack by the Chemical Brothers. It's everything that the much-anticipated Daft Punk score for the new *Tron* movie was supposed to be, but fell woefully short of. I haven't felt such an intense need to buy a soundtrack album immediately after watching a movie in a long, long time.

Having heaped on all this praise, I probably should add I never felt all that emotionally involved in the story. I loved it, but mostly on a technical and intellectual level. I delighted in the pure vileness of Marissa, and I cheered the sheer badassedness of Hanna, but I never felt actual hatred or love, respectively, for either. The movie falls just short of greatness for this very reason, but that shouldn't prevent you from seeing what is, hands down, the best action movie of the year.



Scream 4

It's hard to believe now that the "Ghostface" mask made famous by the Scream movies was ever scary, or that the concept of meta-horror was ever refreshing. I remember seeing the first Scream movie at the theater way back in 1996 and being alternately terrified and delighted by the sheer novelty of the whole thing. Scream 2, which came out a year later, was even scarier and had even more refreshing things to say about not just the slasher subgenre but about sequels in general. Scream 3 showed considerable diminishing returns. And now Scream 4, still directed by Wes Craven and written by Kevin Williamson, seems so tired and uninspired that I marvel I ever bought into any of it at all.

Scream 4 begins with a handful of traditional slasher opening scenes, each ending with a murder, each nested inside the other, each self-consciously commenting on the preceding scene, each lacking anything close to a scare (though one or two segments are mildly funny). The opening scenes are actually part of the latest installment in the Stab Franchise, meta-horror films based on the "real life" murders that took place in the quaint hamlet of Woodsboro way back when. Finally we get the actual opening, which is not a whit more realistic or chilling than the silly openers that preceded it, but which at least has the virtue of being one scene closer to the end.

Sidney Prescott (Neve Campbell) has just written a triumphant memoir about surviving the horrifying events portrayed in the first three movies, and she has decided to end her book promotion tour in Woodsboro. At the same time, her teenaged niece Jill (Emma Roberts) and Jill's teenage friends begin receiving some creepy phone calls: the voice on the other end is that of "Ghostface," though of course the identity of the latest killer isn't known.

Among the attractive (but fated-to-die) teenagers are the sweet but innocent niece Jill; Jill's more savvy best friend Kirby (Hayden Panettiere); and, supplying the requisite fourth-wall horror commentary, film buffs Robbie and Charlie (Erik Knudsen and Rory Culkin). One or two or more of these teens may actually be the killer(s); I couldn't spoil it for you right now if I tried, since I have frankly already forgotten who it ... oh yeah. Just remembered.

The only interesting subtext going on here (and I'm not even sure it's intended) has to do with the ongoing tension between the self-consciously hip teenagers and the desperately-trying-to-remain relevant older characters from the original film. Although no doubt the cougar's share of the paychecks are lopsided in favor of the older generation, it would be a mistake to say anyone here is really earning their money. They're not given a chance to. Unless Craven and Williamson can think of an interesting way to give a knowing, ironic wink to the franchise's own washed-up obsolescence, I don't hold out any hopes for Scream 5's being any better.

Finding MacGuffin

Locke & Key: Keys to the Kingdom by Joe Hill with art by Gabriel Rodriguez, IDW Publishing, 2011

There's a lot going on in *Locke & Key*. Joe Hill's graphic-novel saga is packed with plot, and most of that plot is good, solid, suspenseful stuff. The story takes familiar conventions and stacks them together in a way that makes them seem, if not fresh, at least freshly resurrected, and each episode's storyline twists and turns just enough to keep you turning the page, not entirely sure what's going to happen next. *Keys to the Kingdom*, the latest installment in the story, flirts with jumping the shark, leaning a

little too heavily toward TV-style melodrama, but the underlying structure of the narrative remains strong. I, personally, reached the end of *Keys to the Kingdom* optimistic that the story's next chapter would be entertaining and eager to find out what's going to happen next.

Locke & Key starts out with a burst of violence that's completely in line with the style of contemporary thrillers. High school guidance counselor/farmer Rendell Locke is murdered by a deranged student during a bloody home invasion. His wife and three children survive, and after the tragedy the fatherless fam-

ily moves to the Locke family's ancestral home, an eerie mansion with a name of its own: Keyhouse. Keyhouse sits on a rocky island off the Massachusetts coast; the small town on the island is called Lovecraft, a sure sign that life in Keyhouse is not going to be ordinary for the Locke children.

The creepy house aside, the Locke kids have their own issues to deal with. The eldest, Tyler, is a burly, moody teenager who blames himself for his father's death. Middle child Kinsey is a quirky girl who has to decide whether she wants to fit in or stand out at her new high school. Bode, the youngest, is an imaginative, overly curious kid who immediately begins to seek out Keyhouse's secrets. Meanwhile, mother Nina is a budding alcoholic who teeters on the brink of self-destruction in the wake of her husband's death.

If personal problems were the Locke children's only obstacles, they might have a chance at a peaceful life. But Keyhouse won't have it. Bode discovers a strange being trapped in a well, a pitiful woman who he helps to escape, only to find out that she's not a pitiful woman at all, but rather the story's bad guy. He also discovers that Keyhouse hides a multitude of magical keys (hence the name, apparently). These keys open doors that magically transform those who pass through them. One door might change a person's gender, another might turn him into a ghost, yet another might let him see into another person's mind, still another might let him teleport to any place he can imagine. More keys keep turning up, and each does something either helpful or



dangerous – and usually both.

The story's MacGuffin (that narrative object that every character will risk everything to find) is a special key with apparently world-changing powers. The bad guy who eventually resurfaces as a mysterious teenager at the kids' school, wants it badly.

and that murderous psycho who killed the kids' father wants it too. The kids want to find it in order to keep it from the bad guys. The search for the Special Key is the plot's driving force.

The episodes in *Keys to the Kingdom*, the fourth installment in the series, have settled into a rhythm: deal with the problems that arise when a new key is found, keeping in mind that the quest for the Special Key is what's really important. Unfortunately, that rhythm also includes resorting to some lightweight plotlines: teenage ro-

mance between Kinsey and the disguised bad guy; bullying of odd little Bode; racism that arises when a key allows the white Locke kids to become African-American for awhile; etc. It's sad to see the otherwise well-crafted story get hijacked by the temptation to use the key device to introduce hot-button topics to the series.

For the most part, though, Hill keeps fairly close to his more admirable muses. He throws his kids into a forbidding, foreign environment the way Dickens or Roald Dahl would, and he lets them fight back the way Joss Whedon would. He uses the idea of a deceased parent with a supernatural past in the style of J.K. Rowling, and, of course, there's the specter of Lovecraft hovering over all of it. It's a potent mixture, and it keeps the saga chugging along nicely.



Windy City Mayhem

One of the fun aspects of directing a show is the fact-finding research. In digging into the content of the musical Chicago, I discovered some Indiana connections to one of our two murderesses and the playwright Maurine Dallas Watkins.

First, the playwright Maurine Dallas Watkins was born in Louisville, Kentucky, a stone's throw away from Indiana. She attended five different colleges, one of which was Butler University in Indianapolis, but it was

when she was attending Yale University that she wrote The Brave Little Woman, then Chicago or Play Ball and, finally, Chicago. She covered two 1924 murders and the subsequent trials of Belva Gaertner, a twice-divorced cabaret singer who used the professional name Belle Brown, and Beulah Sheriff Annan. Watkins focused on the sensational aspects of the two cases: two "jazz babies" corrupted by men and liquor, characterizing Beulah as "beauty of the cell block" and Belva as "most stylish of Murderess Row." Belva Gaertner became "Velma Kelly";





Finding the Humanity in a Politically Volatile World are real. This terrorist attack happened, and

Anita, as a character, needs special attention. Anita, the film, deserves special consideration. The film is a compelling depiction of the terrorist bombing of the Association Mutual Israelita Argentina in 1994, just a year after the first World Trade Center bombing here in the U.S. This act of terrorism in Argentina killed 85 people and wounded over 200. Anita is a powerful depiction of the devastation and mindlessness of terrorism, and it is also an equally powerful testament to the forces of love, benevolence and confusion that stalk us daily.

Anita is a young Down syndrome-afflicted woman who loses her mother in the bombing and has no choice but to wander into the wider world of Buenos Aries to survive. The film has won numerous festival prizes; the character will win your heart.

The first scenes of Anita create a warm family-friendly world in 1994 in Buenos Aries. Mom and daughter visit the grave of their lost husband and father. Together they make a Sunday dinner for their son and brother Ariel and his wife. Life is loving and normal at this particular family dinner, with normal familial tension, in this case over watching the World Cup rather than taking Anita to the zoo. The two women work together in the family business, a stationary store on the first-floor storefront of their home.

Though I knew going in that tragedy was about to disrupt this family, I jumped in my seat when the bomb goes off. This scene is handled with great sensitivity and subtlety, but as the smoke rolls down the street, the images seem designed to mimic footage taken not quite 30 or so years later when the World Trade Towers were destroyed.

At the moment of the bombing Anita is doing something she was expressly told not to do. She's up on a ladder counting pencil cases. In her mind the devastation she experiences is simply a punishment for her behavior. She "fell off the ladder." She was told not to get on the ladder, and that is her only frame of reference. A few scenes later as she wanders the streets, she stops in front of a store with many television sets in the window. Most are tuned to footage of the bombing, but one is tuned to a nature channel which features an elephant. Others gaze at the destruction in horror. Anita watches the elephant trumpet with delight.

Her mother has gone to the epicenter of the bombing to pick up a support check for Anita and is killed in the bombing. At this point in the story we are treated to the fragmentation and despair that gives terrorism

Anita, unable to tell the people that she meets any helpful details about who "Mummy" is or where she lives, wanders the streets looking for what she has known her whole life; kindness, humor, food, shelter and warmth. Her information is limited to "Mummy will come home when the big hand is on the three" and "I fell off the lad-

Her brother, his wife and the authorities do the best they can to organize a response to the tragedy. Their responses seem inadequate at best. And the people Anita meets seem clueless as to how to help her.



After a few of these encounters I started to get agitated. Why is no one asking her better questions? Why is everyone so afraid to contact people who can help Anita? Oh so slowly it sank into my brain that my frustrations - which I initially attributed to basic narrative conveniences - were rooted in something much deeper.

Anita is lost in Argentina, a country with political problems, where getting involved with the police is a potential death sentence. The terrorist attack is not the first time Buenos Aries has been bombed. The Israeli embassy had been bombed two years earlier. The country is recovering from a sickening culture of assassination, colonialism, disappearances and political horror.

Anita is two stories, and neither of them smacks you with overt lessons. One is political; one is personal. Both get your blood flowing. Director Marcos Carnevale has said that his film is "born from a personal concern ... Anita, the character in the film, is lost in a world that lives in constant confusion, in a world where men hate men, where fights over their territories happen on a daily basis, over economic interests, over their ideologies, be they religious or politics."

He has created the character Anita to defy this nonsense. The bombing of the Cultural Center and the deaths and wounds years later politicians apologized in the face of possible prosecution.

Anita is a fictional character, but without ever backing down into cliché, she expects people to be human. Confronted with Anita. few fail to rise to this challenge. She meets many who are imperfect and scared. She is ignored often. Anyone who pauses to consider her is impressed with her honesty and directness. These are two virtues not rampant in Argentina at the time of the bombing.

Cinema Center is presenting Anita with community collaboration from the Harry W. Salon Foundation, the Down Syndrome Association of Northeast Indiana and the Fort Wayne Jewish Federation. All shows this week for Anita are just \$3 thanks to our sponsors.

How societies treat the vulnerable in their midst is the measure of any society. Argentina was slowly recovering at the time of the bombing from a long nightmare of human rights violations and political violence. but average Argentinians were (and I'm sure still are) people who care about each other and live lives that nurture each other.

Anita is a film that unites us all around common traits of humanity and displays these virtues in a language of compassion and humor that is universal. What's not to

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A Puss for Shrekkies

Opening This Weekend: Three big movies open this weekend, starting Paramount/Dreamworks' Shrek spin-off, Puss In Boots, featuring the

voice talents of Antonio Banderas, Salma Hayek, Billy Bob Thornton and Zach Galifianakis. Odds are, if you like the Shrek flicks, you'll probably like this movie.

Now that that's out of the way, two additional very promising flicks open this weekend, starting with Andrew Niccol's high concept sci-fi adventure, In Time, starring Justin Timberlake and Amanda Seyfried. Reviews, thus far, are very mixed, but we trust Niccol when he's in sci-fi mode if only because his 1997 film, Gattaca, was so good. From what we've read, it sounds like In Time has a great script and is very well made, lacking mostly in the acting/casting department. Certainly worth checking out.

Last but not least we have Withnail and I director Bruce Robinson's comeback film, an adaptation of Hunter S. Thompson's first novel, The Rum Diary. Starring Johnny Depp, Aaron Eckhart, Richard Jenkins, Giovanni Ribisi and Amber Heard, this gonzo adventure comedy has been on the ScreenTime radar for over two years, as Robinson hasn't released a new film in nearly 20 years. Our guess? This movie turns out to be something of a breakout hit, selling better – and offering bigger laughs - than anyone expected. And, if Robinson's track record tells us anything, this will be a strange film with a whole lot of cinematic style points sprinkled into every frame. Stoked. With a director like Robinson, a writer like Thompson, an actor like Depp, a looker like Heard and a tagline like "absolutely nothing in moderation," how could we not wet ourselves a bit? Tops at the Box: Franchise

flick Paranormal 3 took the No. 1 spot last weekend, selling over \$54 million in tickets in the U.S. over its first three days. It's the huge success of movies like 3 that illustrate the low IQ of the common man. A prequel set 18 years before the first two Paranormal Activity films, 3 continues to milk the original idea and concept, offering nothing new other than the period piece set design (which could've been extremely cool but isn't). What did impress about the film is the clever camera work and the acting of the two young girls. But mostly, Paranormal 3 is cheap scares and an already worn-thin gimmick. I mean, maybe it's worth seeing at some point, but \$54 million in three days while there are

plenty of other good options at the theater? Huh? The masses are more or less paying top dollar for a straight-to-video quality of film. More From the Box: Real

Steel, last weekend's No. 2 film with \$11.3 million in sales (\$67.2 million total over 17 days), isn't doing huge business, but it's definitely holding onto the box office in a way no one expected. Look for this one to drop off slowly over the next two or three weeks, then sell decently on DVD, then possibly be considered a so-bad-it's-good cult film that gets reissued 20 times. One of those movies where the people who should hate it the most (snobby cinephiles, mostly) are the ones who keep it alive. Funny how that works. Paramount Pictures Footloose remake took the No. 3 spot last weekend, selling another \$10.8 million in the U.S.; meanwhile newbie adventure flick The Three Musketeers took the No. 4 spot, selling only \$8.8 million over its first three days. Musketeers, a wannabe blockbuster featuring a big money cast and a big name studio director, might go down as the bomb of the year. Looks about as bad as every other film director Paul W.S. Anderson has made so far. Rounding out the Top 5 in the U.S. last weekend was the George Clooney-directed The Ides of March, starring Clooney, Ryan Gosling and many other huge acting talents. The film sold another \$5 million last weekend, upping it's 17-day total to just under \$30 million. A lot of money, sure, but far below expectations for the awards-chasing ensemble thriller Newbie comedy sequel Johnny English Reborn also bombed, selling only \$3.8 million over its first three days. Can someone explain to me why the studio spent over \$45 million making a Rowan Atkinson film? It's his face that's funny, not the explosions or babes or whatever else cost the additional \$44 million after Atkinson's paycheck was cashed. Regardless, looks like a possibly very funny movie to us just not one we'd pay top dollar to see. Also of note: Moneyball has become something of a small financial surprise, holding on to its Top 10 spot week after week, recently surpassing the \$64 million

ists, Perhapst) and former GBV member Chris Slusarenko – intended it be experienced. Not only did I come to the conclusion that *Beard* is the best Pollard record in years, but it became quite clear after a dozen or so listens that the record is a big one for Pollard, a record he clearly spent much time with and worked very hard on. He even called in a number of guests – Steve Wynn (Dream Syndicate), J Mascis (Dinosaur Jr.), Colin Newman (Wire), Mick Collins (The Dirtbombs) and more – a move that I'm sure added an extra push of energy while arranging and recording.

So here's the thing: Let It *Beard* is probably a new Pollard classic, but it's probably not an new all-around indie rock classic. This not because the record isn't good enough to be considered in such high regard, but, rather, because Pollard is repeating himself and playing it quite safe here. The adventurous spirit of his two major records, *Bee Thousand* and *Alien Lanes*, can hardly be found on *Let It Beard*, even if the three albums clearly all come from the same mind. Pollard is just far too deep into his career at this point; he knows exactly how to make great songs, and he rarely strays from that formula in successful ways. So here we get, more or less, the best of the Robert Pollard we've come to know over the last 20-plus years. He's given us reason to hold onto hope – reason to keep buying his many albums and learning his many, many hooks.

Dare I say Let It Beard is the third best Pollard-related album ever? Dare I do. Too bad the man claims that this will be the last Boston Spaceships album, just as they were hitting their creative stride. Maybe, though, it means that Pollard plans to start recording with GBV full-time again. Hold onto hope. (Greg W. Locke)

tle of gin and a gun lying beside him. Belva, found later at her apartment with blood-soaked clothes on the floor, confessed that she was drunk and was driving with Law but couldn't remember what happened. She was acquitted in 1925. Later on, Gaertner claimed his wife threatened to murder him after he found her with another man.

Beulah May Annan was a suspected American murderess, and her life closely resembles that of the character Roxie Hart. She had moved to Chicago with her second husband, Albert Annan, a car mechanic, and began having an affair with Harry Kalstedt. On April 3, 1924, in the married couple's bedroom, Beulah shot Kalstedt in the back. According to her initial story, they got into an argument and there was a gun on the bed. They both reached for the gun, but Beulah got it first and shot Kalstedt. All along, Albert Annan stood by her side until after the trial ended in acquittal. In 1926 she announced, "I have left my husband. He is too slow."

It has been a true pleasure directing this production and having the opportunity to work with such an incredible cast and production/design team. Two individuals worked extremely long hours: Abigail Ehinger in bringing back the dance styles of Fosse; and Eunice Wadewitz in capturing the music inflections of Kander and Ebb.
