When I first called Sunny Taylor to talk to her about her new EP and her CD release party at C2G Music Hall, she was in the Target dressing room, trying on tops.

"It's a tradition," she said. "A new CD, a big show, a new shirt."

Anyone lucky enough to have been in the audience at C2G the night Taylor and her band - Ben Porter (electric guitar), Dan Willig (drums) and Pete Jacobs (bass) - treated fans to her newest songs can tell you that Taylor has excellent fashion sense. They can also tell you that Taylor's self-titled, four-song EP is exactly what followers of this 32-year-old singer-songwriter and Fort Wayne native have been craving since her last full-length, Lock the Door and Leave, came out four years ago: emotionally complex tracks that explore every facet of human relationships, from the ties that bind us together to the betrayals the break us apart.

Taylor said she feels like her new songs are more mature and less selfcentered than those found on Lock the Door and Leave and her two live al-

bums. And while it's clear that her fans have not tired of her older hits - the woman has more than 25 Whammys to her credit - she sometimes has a hard time listening to the songs she wrote when she was just starting out (which, for anyone who's been asleep for the late-90s and the early aughts, was as a precocious high schooler - name a coffee shop in Fort Wayne and Taylor was there, transforming a simple caffeine-pushing venue into a place of intimacy and warmth).

"I feel like with a lot of those songs I was focusing on a particular situation and how it affected me instead of taking into account everyone else and their perspectives. It was like I had one of two feelings. I was either happy or sad, and usually the sad songs were 'this boy doesn't like me' kind of stuff. I'm much more interested in other people now, in turning my focus outward."

And the great news is that she has enough material to record another full-length album. The EP, which includes the tracks "Trucker," "Highview Drive," "Paper Tiger (Getting Over It)" and "Break My Heart Please," was produced by the respected and accomplished Mark Hornsby in his Java Jive studio in Nashville. Mike Ross, vice president of sales and marketing for Sweetwater Sound, put Taylor in touch with Hornsby - "Mike helped me out a lot on Lock the Door and Leave ... and last winter I called him up, said 'Hey, let's make another album" - and Taylor is working on raising enough money to partner with him again.

How does a mother of three and guitar teacher living and working in a relatively unknown town plan to get her hands on the cash required to record a professional, studio album? Through a series of in-home concerts and intimate shows. Basically, if you weren't lucky enough to attend the CD release party. don't fret. You can hire Taylor to perform for you and your friends in the comfort of your own home or business, and for a little extra you can have the whole band bring the house

It's an innovative approach to recordmaking and one that Taylor hopes succeeds. because the time she spent recording the EP was not only productive but inspiring.

"On one of my trips down to Nashville I took my good friend Meghan King and we talked about how we were in heaven, surrounded by all these people who get what we

Dickens With a Twist

Fort Wayne is undoubtedly a great city to live in during the holidays. I can't step a foot out of my door without hearing of more fun holiday attractions and activities. I can go skating at Headwaters Park, escape to the History Center and see fantastical gingerbread creations, then catch some tunes at

the Embassy while ogling the spectacle of trees. There are some holiday traditions however, that are nothing short of mandatory. A Christmas Carol is one of those.

For some, It's a Wonderful Life is their sign that the holidays are here, but for me, I can't wrap a single pair of pink bunny slippers until I've seen that crotchety old man's heart turn to melted butter. Whether it's the old 1930's version in black and white, or A Muppet Christmas Carol, it's magical. This year, the Fort Wayne Youtheatre will

be performing A Christmas Carol on stage just for me. And also for the rest of Fort Wayne.

This Christmas with a twist though, as Harvey Cox has taken Dickbeloved

tale and put his own special spin on it for the Youththeatre audience. The idea to change up the traditional play came far back in the summer, Cox says.

"I was talking to some kids ... and I asked what they would think if we did A Christmas Carol. Oh, it's a frightening thing, they told me. I talked to a couple adults, and they're frightened too," Cox said. So he began work on rewriting the story to fit the spirit of Youtheatre and its bright-eyed volunteers. The resulting script was still the story of Ebenezer Scrooge as envisioned by Charles Dickens, but, says Cox, "I have added comedy to it. It's a version for young people and adults."

With an injection of light-heartedness and laughter, Scrooge finds himself in some slapstick-type situations trying to fight his way out of the midst of happy carolers played by members of the Fort Wayne Children's Choir and the Memorial Park Choir. In addition, the ghosts are all referred to as spirits, and even the frightening spectre that shows Ebenezer the wake of his death has been changed to a charming flower girl.

Like most Christmas traditions, this show is a family affair with on-the-set families who are off-the-set families as well. The cast is still largely supported by youth, though, despite some adult involvement, so Cox still needed to make changes to accommodate his young actors. His rewrites to the original play don't diminish the parts played by youth but rather explain why youngsters are playing some adult roles.

The show will open up with a sparse stage and a family desperately fighting to find set-pieces to put on a showing of A Christmas Carol after their stage coach has veered off the road on its way to the theater. Before the audience's eyes, the set will be scavenged and put together, then played by



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> such as the ghost of Jacob Marley, played by the 14-year-old Andrew Bower. Cox said of Bower, "He's marvelous. He does a better job than what an adult might have done in his place."

> Cox admits his background in theater, having spent his entire life on or around stages and many years on Broadway, lends to the Vaudevillian feel of elements of this show. But it's his experience that helped him muddle through the murky waters of writing and directing a script, which is a tricky busi-

> "Having been on stage in New York and done original plays, writers sit there in the front row and defy you to change a word of their masterpiece. Sometimes when you're writing you have visions, and you have to erase all those when you start directing a play," Cox explained.

do," she said. "We immediately felt right at home. Everyone had a great sense of humor and it was clear immediately that these were our kind of people. It's not that I haven't felt that here with my friends and family. I have, but there's just something to being in a studio, working with people who want to help you bring your songs to life."

And while for her EP Hornsby brought in a handful of award-winning Nashville session players – Tom Hemby on electric guitar, Phil Naish on grand piano and keyboards, Scott Williamson on drums, Dirk Darken on percussion and Brian Beller on bass – Taylor said she owes a great debt to her band whose feedback and support have made her new batch of songs possible.

"They helped me develop the new songs. I've never felt more comfortable bringing songs to the table than I do with these guys," she said. "It feels like exactly the right combination. I love my bandmates."

Many who have heard the new EP are predicting great things for Taylor. They're seeing visions of music videos and radio play and world tours, but Taylor's ambitions are more modest and, like her winning, funny personality, more down to earth.

"I'm not going to turn down any great opportunity, whether it's opening for a big act or playing for a big audience, but I'm not going to do anything that would be detrimental to my family and home life," said the married mother of three. "That's my sanity. That's my sanctuary. I don't want to get lost on the road somewhere, but playing regionally will be nice, and if the chance comes to play some national shows I'll do it. I'm

willing to stretch myself this time."

When she says her home life is her sanity, she's referring to the time she spends with husband, Jason Berry, and their three daughters: Josie, 3; Myra, 5; and Jayna, 6. The girls are all very different but get along well, and together they have their mother laughing constantly.

"Josie, she's my wild one. I was eight months pregnant with her when I performed at the Whammys after *Lock the Door and Leave* came out. My hands were so swollen I couldn't hold a guitar pick. And Myra, she's mischievous but also very genuine and scientific. She'd rather pulverize and study her dinner than eat it. Jayna is very artistic, very sensitive. She's like a little mommy. Her teacher told me that if someone gets hurt on the playground, Jayna's there, nursing them. She's super sweet and very emotional. I don't know where she gets it."


Taylor has come a long way since she lit up such local haunts as Toast and Jam and Higher Grounds as a teenager. Gradually she earned a loyal local fanbase through her live performances, charming onstage persona and proven talent as a guitarist, singer and writer. And, for the last half-decade, she's managed to balance life as a passionate musician with that of a devoted wife and mother. It's no wonder that she considers her new material to be her best yet, strengthened as it is by the wisdom of experience. Taylor said she's particularly happy with how one song on the EP, "Highview Drive" came out. Based on Taylor's childhood and her parents' divorce, the song eluded her for years. Then, when she sat down to write it last winter, it came out in a rush.

"All the memories came back piece by piece," she said. "It was a song I'd always wanted to write but didn't think I could, and then I sat down and it came to me in 10 minutes.

"I can barely perform the song without breaking down," she continued. "I can't think about what it's about. It hits me like no song ever has, and it seems to get the audience too. When I was singing it with Mark Hornsby I actually started crying. I felt like such an idiot. He probably couldn't use anything from that take, but later, when I heard what he'd done with the song, how it sounded on the final version, I was thrilled. It sounded exactly how I wanted it to, how it sounded in my head."

Taylor says many of her songs are therapeutic, that the act of writing down her feelings and setting them to music has helped her get over and beyond some of her life's most trying times. She's glad that she's provided that same experience for her fans who have a habit of taking her aside after her shows and telling her that a certain song made them cry or even just see things a little differently. She knows she's loved in this town, so even if this EP marks the beginning of the big time for Sunny Taylor, she's not about to forget where she came from.

"I'm ridiculously grateful for the amount of support I've gotten. I have the best family and friends anybody could have. They're amazing to me. And then there's my Come 2 Go church family and all the wonderful people who come to my shows. It's been so humbling. I've been spoiled."



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Sonata Arctica

Live in Finland

Could anything more Nordic exist than a live album by a band called Sonata Arctica that was recorded in Finland? The answer is a resounding probably not. The Finnish band, which has been plying its trade of epic sweep and bombast from those arctic shores since 1996, is proving that if it's worth doing,



it's worth overdoing on its latest live recording, aptly titled *Live in Finland*.

If there's one thing you can't accuse Sonata of, it's understatement. Everything about the recording is grandiose, from its running length (22 tracks and almost two hours), to its song titles ("As if the World Wasn't Ending," "Last Amazing Grays"), to the instrumentation (which includes keyboards and horns along with a traditional power metal attack). You also can't fault the band for its musicianship or obvious passion; the songs are all solidly constructed and delivered with skill and feeling.

Their style may not be for all metal fans (their romantic leanings will likely be scoffed at by fans of more dour genres) but fans of bands like Europe, the Scorpions, and Dragonforce will likely find much in which to delight on *Live in Finland*. The main problem with the band is that, while the songs are all well put together, they never quite reach the originality or iconic heights of the bands Sonata Arctica emulates. In fact, in "Replica" lead singer Tony Kokko wails "I'm a replica! I'm a replica," which may be an unintentional admission of the band's primary sin.

Still, *Live in Finland* works exceptionally well as a live document for fans of the band and can be an engaging listen for newcomers. The wealth of material offered here is appealing enough at first listen but also offers enough depth to reward repeat listenings. If you're in the market for some rousing tunes to inspire you to get out there and protect your village by fending off that orc horde or slay that dragon to save the king's daughter, Sonata Arctica's *Live in Finland* just might do the trick. Hurry Up, We're Dreaming

Ahh yes, the everlasting rock n' roll romance of the double album. Most bloated, few worthwhile, all ambitious. When I think back to high school, *Mellon Collie and the Infinite Sadness*, the 1995 double album by The Smashing Pumpkins, comes to mind. When I think of college, it's Godspeed You Black



Emperor's Lift Yr. Skinny Fists Like Antennas to Heaven! and my late finding of Wilco's Being There. And then there's Ryan Adams' sprawling breakup record, Cold Roses, and what are easily three of my all-time favorite records: The Beatles' White Album, The Rolling Stones' Exile on Main St. and The Clash's London Calling. Now those seven double records, all of 'em, deserved their format. Most other double albums through time (not counting, you know, Bitches Brew, Bob Dylan, The Who and stuff like that)? Not the case. Nearly all of them, I'd argue, could be whittled down to a single album or even an EP. So when M83 main man Anthony Gonzalez announced last year that he was working on an "epic double album," I started to worry. I'd only just become a big fan with the release of the last M83 album, 2008's great Saturdays = Youth, and now the guy was going to chase me off? Ugh.

Regardless, I skipped happily to the record store on release day, excited at the possibility of hearing a "new classic" for the first time. About halfway through the record's first proper song (and current single), "Midnight City," I nearly wet my cargo shorts. What a huge, epic, inventive and addictive track! And, gulp, sexy! What is that hook? An animal? Animals? A final plea? Didn't matter. I was suddenly filled with the kind of excitement that's hard to find once you turn 30. I thought for sure that I was in the middle of a new memory. One to keep forever and hold onto when the world is ugly, like the first time I heard White Blood Cells or OK Computer. Gonzalez had quickly made one thing clear: he had a whole lot of weird, ambitious ideas.

Then the record played on. Clearly, I realized, Gonzalez is still

BACKTRACKS

Journey *Infinity (1978)*

This was the fourth record from the San Francisco band Journey, the first with Steve Perry. Journey were basically scraps from an earlier version of Santana that parted company with the guitarist in the early 70s. Perry took the progressive rock band into a different



progressive rock band into a different direction and fronted the band for the next 10 years.

The album opens with "Lights," a beautiful homage to San Francisco (one of the greatest cities in the world). It's a staple at the San Francisco Giants baseball games.

Next up is the "Feeling That Way/Anytime" where keyboardist Gregg Rolie opens with the vocals until Perry takes over for "Anytime." Neal Schon played a nasty progressive-pop guitarthroughout the band's history, and this album may be one of his best. "La Do Da" keeps the Schon/Perry combination rocking along until side one almost grinds to a halt with the super-ballad, "Patiently".

Side two opens with the familiar "Wheel In The Sky" and chugs along with the whiney "Somethin' To Hide." The latter was one of those songs that can sort of deflate an album.

I always liked "Can Do." It's a little short, but you can tell that this band had some hard rock capabilities. On the other hand, had Journey committed to this sound, they probably wouldn't have been as successful. "Opened The Door" closes an album that has five great rock songs and five "high school make-out" songs.

Perry went on to record six more Journey records and has had moderate success as a solo artist. The band split up briefly in 1987. Journey went through several lead singers (and had about a dozen or so band members) before finding a pretty decent vocalist in Arnel Pineda back in 2007.

Fun Fact: Neal Schon has played on every Journey album since 1975. (*Dennis Donahue*)


deeply obsessed with the sound of 80s pop music. That, and youth: the two themes prevalent throughout *Saturdays*. Luckily, he approaches neither from the slant of an ironic nostalgic, but, rather, as a cinematic nostalgic attempting to soundtrack both the daydreams of hip adults and the nighttime adventures of those still young enough to regularly indulge in such things. And he does so with lush, expansive arrangements, each of which holds tight to the record's cohesive sound while still managing to offer new ideas left and right. No doubt, Gonzalez took the Double Album Challenge because he knew he was at the peak of his powers. We hear that peak, absolutely, on tracks like "Wait," "Midnight City" and "The Bright Flash" – and that's just the first disc. Big, fancy, extensively ornamented songs whose appeal just grows and grows with the familiarity of the listener.

And while this 80s space rock journey through dreams and childhood is most definitely a hell of an impressive piece of work, I'm not sure that the kind of music M83 make is conducive to the the double album format. I mean, yeah, Soft Machine made *Third*, and Miles Davis made *Bitches Brew*, and others have made double albums that aren't full of pop songs all through the history of recorded music. But if I'm being completely honest, I do kinda/sorta feel like *Hurry Up*, *We're Dreaming* might have been better off as a single album. Rather than two 11-song discs stuffed full of big ideas, how about the best 14 songs on one disc, followed by a really great seven-song EP? It'd be a "classic," right? All the songs here are worth releasing, and I guess that's the point. When you're in the kind of zone Gonzalez is in, you kind of just want to brag about it and document it. You want to step up, and step past, the others. I get it – the drive of the human. On record.

Next topic: greatest triple albums of all time. *Have One on Me*, *Sandinista* and *69 Love Songs* all come to mind. Hopefully Gonzalez doesn't take the challenge. In fact, despite the impressive accomplishment that is *Hurry Up*, he'd most definitely be better releasing single albums from here forward. (*Greg W. Locke*)

realize that it's totally tongue in cheek with us," commented bassist Chris Kael in a recent interview with the website the Great Southern Brainfart. "It's really crazy. I can see how some people would get upset about it, but we really don't at all ... we are completely laid back and we absolutely love it. It keeps me entertained out here on the road."

Evidence of the band's oft-overlooked sense of humor can be found in their dis track to their haters, their recent single "Over and Under," which features lead singer Ivan Moody sarcastically rehashing a laundry list of accusations the band has presumably heard before kissing them off in a scathing chorus. The video is just as humorous, with the band hamming it up and embodying every rock n' roll cliche they've presumably been accused of.

While some of the band's tough-guy style and image might include some elements of humor, their origins aren't necessarily a joke. For example, Bathory has been training in martial arts since childhood and is a "self-proclaimed ambassador" for the Gracie Jiu-Jitsu Academy. Last year he even suffered a rib injury from sparring while on tour with Godsmack, making his typically high-energy stage performances diffi-

Yet no amount of tough-guy cred or poking fun at said tough-guy cred is likely to silence their haters or please media critics. To understand why that is, it is essential to recognize that they're a populist band in the truest sense of the word: they genuinely reflect the values and desires of average Americans.

If you mention the working class or poor people in rock n' roll music, what generally comes to mind is the tradition of protest songs. Woody Guthrie is generally considered the founder of the tradition of protest songs, and Bob Dylan, Bruce Springsteen and Rage Against the Machine are three artists that fit into that in that mode. Bands with protest leanings tend to be critics' darlings and are often considered almost sacrosanct in terms of criticism.

Then there are the populist bands, bands that actually reflect the values and ideas of the working class without actually being about them. They can be a little bit more difficult to define and aren't necessarily overtly political, but they are generally blues-derived. Examples include early rockabilly, Creedence Clearwater Revival and Grand Funk Railroad. They can be recognized by their broad working class appeal and generalized disdain from critics.

Five Finger Death Punch are obviously a populist band, not a protest-style band. Fittingly, their album American Capitalist was released not long after the Occupy Wall Street protests got into full swing. The attitudes contained in the album and the protests couldn't be more opposite.

When asked about his take on the protests in relation to their album in a recent interview with examiner.com, guitarist Jason Hook commented, "I don't think that corporations or corporate America is a bad thing. I think that corporate America is a wonderful thing. Big business is exciting, big business is born out of passion and desire and people that are successful put themselves there."

Hook went on to say, "And they put themselves there by pushing themselves, and taking risks, learning, asking questions, education, desire, work ethic. To me, that's all good stuff. Somebody that just doesn't take risks and plays it safe and is lazy, unmotivated, those people who are going, 'Help me, help me, help me ...' And so for me, personally, I don't have a lot of compassion for that.'

Of course, their position as a populist band continues to result in the band making decisions that can become easy fodder for their critics. For example, just over a month after American Capitalist came out, the band announced that it was going to re-release the album with different artwork. The move prompted a harsh response from critics, one of whom took the opportunity to dismiss both the band and their fans by saying, "I actually applaud Five Finger Death Punch, for having the gall ... to sell their fans the same record twice ... but I guess they know their fans are dumb enough to fall for it."

Despite the cries of rip-off and insults to their fans, however, Bathory, who is known for actually being a really nice guy, explained the band's decision in a simple and straightforward manner. "We are the people's band, and a lot of fans really liked this alternative artwork we had on the tour posters," he said. "So many times we heard, 'that should be the album cover,' so we figured we'd make it happen. If you like the original cover, that's cool too. I guess the original will be somewhat of a limited item from now on, so there you go."

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





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'Tis the Season for Red

LA ROQUÈTE

Fall and winter are red wine season. I personally go through a lot more white wine in the spring and summer, but when the leaves start to change, I load up on the

Recently, my wine-pal Danny and I led a wine tasting. Since autumn was descending at the time, and many stores were already hanging their seasonal decorations, we thought we'd get a jump on the holiday season and do a full spread of red. We wanted to provide a few suggestions for the upcoming dinner party (and party in general) season.

Whether you're stocking the cellar or stuffing the stockings, snagging a case of most of the wines we poured wouldn't set you back too far. All of them fall squarely into the "flexible food wine" or "slurpable party wine" categories (with one deliciously notable exception). Have at 'em:

Vina Borgia 2008 Garnacha – I've long been a big fan of this wine. It's one of my go-to inexpensive bottles. It's 100

percent Garnacha (or Grenache, if you prefer) from the Aragon region of Spain. You won't find anything overly complicated here. You'll pay six or seven dollars for a bottle and be rewarded with a nice nose of blackberries and spice, a body that's medium weight with a good balance of dark fruit and pepper,

along with a nice firm finish. For the price, it's one of the best balanced reds out there. It's perfectly drinkable on its own or a good accompaniment with flavors from chicken to grilled meat. I think it's great wine choice for a holiday table when you're buying in bulk. The Vina Borgia is also available in a 1.5 liter bottle for around \$12 or a 3 liter box for \$18. Can't beat it.

Vinterra 2010 Pinot Noir - One of the things I love about pinot noir is that the grape has a real sense of "place." If you pour a California pinot, you'll usually get bigger fruit flavors and higher levels of alcohol. Burgundies will be lighter and earthier tasting. New Zealand pinots, like this Vinterra, tend to be light, delicate critters. It's a very pretty smelling wine; flowers, cherries and strawberries are prominent. The body is extremely light for a pinot. By way of comparison, I'd put it at the same weight as a Beaujolais. This is another wine with very nice balance, giving you flavors of strawberry and cherry cola. The finish is gentle, drifting away on a mist of cherries. Like most pinot noirs, this wine basically goes with any food, and it's a great wine to pull out if you have someone around who "doesn't like red wine." It's almost impossible to find pinot noir this good at \$15, but here you have it.

Ocaso 2008 Malbec – I wouldn't want to write a column that extended through football season and the requisite manly grilling without throwing a masculine malbec in there. As I always say about malbec, anything you can drag across fire -veggie burgers to grilled mushrooms to a big ol' ribeye will snuggle right up to a tasty malbec. Argentinean wines remain some of the best values out there. As Danny said, "Take most wine from Argentina and double the price.



That's what you'll pay for a comparable red from France or California." Blackberries and coffee were my first thought when I got a slug of this one. It's tannic, but not overly so, and it's nice and muscular if you're in the mood for something along those lines. I've read that it actually goes well with vegetables too, but that wouldn't be my first choice. You can find this for around \$10-12. Ocaso also makes a malbec rosé that I poured next to the aforementioned Vinterra. The rosé (\$8) is actually heavier, believe it

Elvio Cogno 2007 Dolcetto D'Alba -If you're looking to step outside the Chianti world for a relatively light Italian red, Dolcetto is a very nice alternative. Dolcetto trans-

lates as "little sweet one," although this is hardly a sweet wine. I thought this was a wine that was basically built to be passed around a dinner table, like most good Italian wines are. It's got a fair amount of acidity which allows the flavor to cut through almost anything with a red sauce, be it pasta, chicken

Parmesan or brasciole. I recently poured this next to a roasted eggplant-and-red-pepper soup and it was simply divine. If you don't like the "chalky" flavor that Chianti sometimes has, but you like the acidity and the full fruit flavors, this is a great choice. It's around \$15 and worth every penny if you're cobbling together a little feast for friends.

Chateau de Bel 2009 Bordeaux - Bordeaux is one of the more vintage-dependent wines out there. Bordeaux from an "off year" can be overpriced and uninteresting. The 2009 vintage, however, apparently has the potential to be one of the great vintages in Bordeaux (and in much of the rest of France as well). The quality even trickles down to the more inexpensive bottles, like this one from Chateau de Bel. This 90/10 merlot/ cabernet blend is an impressive bottle, especially for \$15 - intense fruits and a nice dose of the "old world funk" that I like so much in Bordeaux. A little tannic, a little oaky, it's just a very solid all-around wine. For the Francophiles out there, consider squirreling away a few bottles for five years or so. I'm very interested to see how this one develops over time. Or just lay out some rich cheeses. grilled pork chops or some good stew. You'll thank me later.

Domaine La Roquete 2007 Chateauneuf-de-Pape - Danny couldn't resist being a show-off. He pulled this little gem to put the rest of our selections to shame. He said that if he were forced to only drink one kind of wine for the rest of his life. he'd choose Chateauneuf-de-Pape, a predominantly Grenache/Syrah blend from the town of the same name in the Rhone valley. This is one damned delicious wine. You

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Super 8

Kids today (you know you're getting old when you start a sentence with the words "kids today") can't appreciate how difficult it once was to see any movie not currently playing at the theater. Before the age of affordable VCRs, before HBO, before cable TV, you could either see it at the cinema, or you could see it if it happened to be playing on one of the four TV channels you got. Otherwise, you were, as the saying goes, screwed.

Every movie lover of a certain age (you also know you're getting old when you use the phrase "a certain age" to describe your generation) can probably think of at least one movie they would literally have sold their most prized possession to see, just once. For me, that movie was 2001: A Space Odyssey. I don't think I'll ever completely forgive my mom for making me go clothes shopping with her at Sears on the one night it aired on television, in the late 70s. No, I didn't get to see 2001 until I was in high school, by which time there's no way it

could've lived up to my expectations of it. (And yet somehow it did, and still does, but that's another story.) This is the world explored

in writer/director J.J. Abram's nostalgia-infused labor of love, Super 8. I was, like the main characters Super 8, in middle school in 1979. This is my world: the world of the suburbs, of monster-movie geekdom, of Spielberg idolization. I loved ELO and got a thrill from the vaguely naughty lyrics of "My Sharona." I had to hear from those older than me how cool Alien was on the big-screen. I saw Star Wars half a dozen times, and nearly every frame of Close Encounters became hard-wired into my visual DNA. Like Super 8's Joe Lamb (Joel Courtney), I had a Dawn of the Dead poster hanging on my wall, though I was still too young to be allowed to see it. You just know poor Joe hasn't seen Dawn of the Dead yet, ei-

Unlike Joe Lamb and his pals, though, I didn't have access to a Super-8 film camera, and so I could only dream of making my own homemade horror movies. The first part of Super 8 is highly autobiographical for Abrams; home movie-making is exactly what he and his friends did, in lieu of being able to watch the real thing. There's something truly thrilling about seeing these geeky, resourceful, enthusiastic kids doing something that I could only have fantasized about doing. (And if you don't see the sweet poignancy of a kid in braces playing a brain-chomping zombie, I pity you.) All this makes me wonder, would an entire generation of J.J. Abramses (or even Spielbergs) have ever mastered the craft if they'd had the easy access to every movie that today's kids do? Time will tell how today's high-bandwidth Internet age will influence future filmmakers.

ther, and will likely not get a chance to see it

until he's in high school.

So, yeah, Super 8 sets all the nostalgia receptors in my brain alight, not unlike the prominent bluish lens flares we see in so many of the movie's nighttime scenes. (Even Abrams, in interviews, admits he may have overdone the flaring effect, a direct cinematographic nod to 70s-era Spielberg.) From the ultra-grainy film stock, to the naturalistic set design, to the realistic portrayal of young kids as self-consciously foul-mouthed, talking-over-each-other excited and tentatively rebellious, the movie gets all the details exactly right, and nobody between the



ages of, say, 35 to 50 will be able to resist smilingly widely almost nonstop during the movie's first hour or so.

But Joe and his friends encounter a monster in real life one night, while filming a scene for their zombie movie at an old train station. A pickup truck comes out of the darkness and rams right into a train, causing a massive derailment and a series of explosions. One damaged boxcar seems to contain something alive, trying to get out ...

The kids barely escape alive. And in the days that follow, it becomes clear their small, rusted-out Ohio steel town will never be the same again. I'll avoid mentioning in detail what exactly it is that this boxcar contains, both

> because I don't want to spoil it and because I don't think it's all that remarkable. Frankly, the creature that begins wreaking havoc on the town is disappointingly pedestrian in appearance, motive and action. The movie takes a decisive narrative misstep at this point. More than excitement, wonder or fear, I felt a nagging sense of disappointment. I never cared about where the creature came from, what he wanted or where he'd go afterward. I just wanted to hang out with these kids another hour or two, free of the stric-

tures of the monster movie genre.

One thing Super 8 gets exactly right is the painful puppy love Joe feels for the slightly older Alice, a girl who is miraculously talked into playing the leading role in their nerdish little movie production. It certainly doesn't hurt that Alice is played by the preternaturally talented actress Elle Fanning. Fanning knocked me out in her role as the ice-skating daughter in Sophia Coppola's Somewhere last year, and here she's every bit as good. But Abrams has also written some great scenes for Joe and Alice, and this more than makes the entire movie worth watching, nostalgia or not.

The sci-fi angle seems tacked-on, almost as an afterthought. In interviews, Abrams more or less confirms this, if you read between the lines: the project started as a 70s period piece, a poignant character study about grief, adolescence and the making of a cheesy no-budget zombie movie, but then gradually became a high-concept creature feature once the financiers (among them, Steven Spielberg himself) arrived.

There is a fine line between homage and outright imitation, and during too many of the scenes late in the movie I felt things slipping further and further into a semi-pandering, overplotted mire of cliché. (If you want an example of a movie that gets the homage element exactly right, and goes one step further by becoming something you've never quite seen before, you need look no further than Cloverfield, which was produced by none other than Abrams.)

As a result, Super 8 never really rises above being an exercise - a superlative exercise, but an exercise nonetheless – in nostalgia, a facile search-for-the-not-so-subtle-movie-references bit of gamesmanship, when with a bit more loving care in the second half it could have been the same kind of timeless classic it's tooslavishly trying to emulate.

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Treasures Among the Trash

American Pickers Guide to Picking, by Libby Callaway, Hyperion, 2011

From what I see on cable TV, there are two activities that Americans are really interested in right now: finding old things and selling them for a lot of money, and shooting guns.

I'm not sure how to explain the fascination with guns, except that Americans have always been fascinated with guns, but it seems pretty clear why the idea of finding hidden treasures and getting rich from them is appealing these days. After all, you can't necessarily count on having a job anymore, so an alternative source of income, particularly a source that produces money with little effort, is a good thing to think about. One of the most entertaining treasure-hunting

shows on cable these days is the History Channel's American Pickers, the adventures of antique buyers Mike Wolfe, Frank Fritz and Danielle Colby. and this book is an attempt to translate the show's formula to the printed page.

Wolfe and Fritz are pickers (Colby is their office manager), and pickers are buyers who scour the countryside in search of caches of junk that they can buy and resell at

a profit. American Pickers doc- u ments Fritz and Wolfe's road trips, during which they seek out great rusting piles of old stuff in front yards, basements, attics, barns and other dusty, overgrown locations. They pick out items that most people wouldn't look twice at - old signs, cans, rusty bicycles - and spot items that they can resell for a surprising amount of money. Wolfe and Fritz are charismatic and fun to watch, and Colby adds some quirky charm to the show.

The book version of American Pickers could be simply a print reproduction of the show, with entertaining stories about the duo's encounters with eccentric collectors and unexpected finds, and it is almost that. But the hook here is different. The book claims to be a guide to picking, an informative volume that will give you tips on how to become a picker like Wolfe and Fritz. Most of the tips will be familiar to regular viewers of the show, so those viewers shouldn't expect any fortune-making revelations.

Much of the advice is geared toward teaching you where to look for the best junk. Your goal here is to find people who have accumulated lots of old stuff but who either don't know or don't care



how much any of it is worth. If they know what their junk is worth and are intent on getting full value for it, you're not going to be able to buy it at a low enough price to be able to resell it at a profit. What you need to find is someone who collects things for reasons other than their monetary value - because they simply love collecting things. What you're looking for is a certain disorganization, a lack of collecting focus. You're looking for

untended piles of things, where it's likely that the collector doesn't remember what's at the bottom of the pile.

Wolfe and Fritz have some guidelines for finding these kinds of collections. Rusting cars in the front yard, piles of items visible through windows, an abundance of outbuildings - all of these things indicate a potential gold mine. Aboveground pools and kids' toys in the driveway

automatically rule out a property as a possible picking ground (the former indicates too much willingness to spend money on the property; the latter suggests that the inhabitants are too young to have accumulated any really good stuff).

The book also contains advice on how to determine the value of the things you find and how to resell it once you've bought it. All the advice is illustrated and augmented with stories from the pickers' personal exploits, and the stories are almost as fun to read as they are to watch on the show.

If you have dreams of making a living as a picker, though, you should carefully consider the odds of being able to do it. Wolfe and Fritz stress how much time and energy they put into their picking, and if you pay careful attention to the deals they make on their show, you'll see that the profit they make on most of the items they find is not huge, especially given all the driving and hunting they do. They're making money, but they're not getting rich. Watching them do their job is good TV, but following in their footsteps would not be easy. It's probably best that you keep your day job, if you

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may have heard wines described as "elegant." This one falls squarely into that category. It's a deeply layered wine. As you take successive sips, you'll find different flavors emerging: currants, cherry, nutmeg, blackberry and a backbone of nice earthiness. Chateauneuf-de-Pape is an expensive wine. You'll often see this

wine start at around \$50-60 and go up from there. This one was under \$40, and for my money - if you want to impress this is a nice selection to have in your arsenal. Or have this one the day after your dinner party as you're relaxing the next evening. Be selfish. You deserve it.

A Dose of Cowboy

Walking into ATuna Christmas I had no idea what I was in for. My only clue was that the program listed only two actors for the show with 11 parts each. What unveiled itself was the wittiest romp through Christmas I've ever seen.

The two incredibly talented actors that compose the 22 part show are Nick Tash and Michael Bartkiewicz, both of whom have ex-

perience in different Fort Wayne theaters but are new to Civic's Off Main stage at the main branch of the Allen Co. Public Library. Tash, who was seen as Romeo in Romeo and Juliet, takes a big step out of the realm of Shakespeare to don a wig, heels and sometimes a cowboy hat. Bartkiewicz was last seen on the Civic's main stage in Hairspray, another outlandish comedy. Both of these young actors portray a range of characters that span the gamut from sassy young waitresses, to jokester radio personalities, to crusty old women in this tour of Tuna, Texas.

As I tried to process my thoughts about what to say in the review of First Presbyterian Theater's An American Christmas Carol, I realized that I have never begun a whatzup review with a disclaimer. Doing so this time, however, is probably necessary. So I'll just say that the views expressed here are mine and mine alone, although I'm sure many seeing this production would agree with my interpretation.

The reason I think I need to include that statement is that An American Christmas Carol, by William A. Reilly with lyrics by Gary Lamb. can, without much of a stretch at all, be viewed (as I viewed it) as a fairly political retelling of the Christmas classic by Dickens. FPT has described it as a "musical retelling of a holiday classic ... set in the 1906 Chicago world that Upton Sinclair wrote about in his novel The Jungle." This is an accurate description. With Scrooge and the other Dickens characters switching to Americanized plots and a city as close to us as Chicago is, it seems to speak more directly to the audience. This play feels modern in ways that A Christmas Carol does not, even though its plot takes place a century ago. As I thought about news headlines I've been seeing lately, those about corporate greed, a supposed "war" on Christmas and inane statements about the poor from those who compete to represent us, I saw more and more from An American Christmas Carol that could just as easily have been set in 2011.

While both Dickens' A Christmas Carol and another of our most beloved Christmas stories, It's a Wonderful Life, show the importance

IPFW Dancers Show Maturity

Watching the six original dance pieces that comprise this year's eighth annual evening of dance, Pureby Dance 2011, it's clear that the IPFW Dance program is maturing. The dancers' strength, conditioning and ability to execute the moves with accuracy and fluidity continue to improve. This skill in turn allows their expressiveness - the heart of this most ephemeral of all the arts – to shine through.

Purely Dance 2011 is just what the name suggests: all dance. It gives the dance minors in the Department of Theatre and the choreographers, who include faculty and community dance professionals, their own opportunity to show us their best moves. According to Purely Dance 2011's artistic director, Brittney Tyler Coughlin, the program currently has about three dozen enrolled, so the 16-dancer ensemble represents a substantial portion of the students in the program.

The program's strong orientation to modern dance in its various versions is evident throughout the evening. To the earlier styles of Graham, Dunham, Horton, Ailey, Taylor, Jones and Battle this year's choreographers have added influences from street styles, color guard patterns, hip-hop moves, jazz hands and other eclectic elements. That puts it in tune with trends being pursued by the professional companies in New York, Los Angeles and regional companies that some of these students may soon hope to join.

The evening opens with a playful piece called "Arrive, Play, Depart," by choreographer Elizabeth Mikautadze using music by David Mikautadze. The dancers were Emily Craig, Gregg Lothamer, Allison Thomas, Cory Waite and Erlinda Wall. Craig's arm motions, and the men scrambling about on all fours, gave the piece some interesting imagery, al-

it sounds odd, but it was fun to watch and suggested some thoughts about conformity and relationship.

Alison Gerardot's piece, "Les vies d'autres gens: Nous sommes tous les gens (Other people's lives: We are all people)" concluded the first act with a dance that brought more of a narrative style than the two early pieces. Brennan Stillman's elegant and delicate ballet was in contrast to the modern, emotion-flavored moves of the people who pass by Brennan's park bench, beginning with Gregg Lothamer's frustrated beau, and a jazzy romantic duo of Marisol Sharpe and Abraham Gutierrez, and interludes by Hailey Bandt, Allison Thomas, Ashley Zumstein and Emily Keisler. Adam Fletcher was the piece's lighting designer and Craig Humphrey designed the street-clothes cos-

Brittney Coughlin's opener for the second half is titled "The Tie That B(l)inds" and features effective use of a long, dramatic red cloth, enhanced by lighting designer Mark Ridgeway. After some light frolics by the dancers - Amber Clark, Emily Kiesler, April Kuhn and Erlinda Wall – to the Phish tune "Birds of a Feather," the mood turns more somber. The red cloth provides the dancers with what could be described as almost a flowing landscape of emotion in the context of the songs "My Weakness" by Moby and "Self-fulfilling Prophecy" by Scala and Kolacny Brothers. This piece, to some viewers, suggests some religious

musings, especially connected to the use of the chair draped with the cloth that is deftly delivered to the stage by stage manager Brogan Stillman's team.

Choreographer Kelly Holt, lighting designer Corey Lee and costumer Amber Klinker set about to tell the story of a love in the piece "Seasons of Us" and succeed very well. Dancers Abe Gutierrez and Marisol Sharpe deftly move through the four seasons of a couple's life together. From the young lovers' ballroom dance and modern flirtations, through middle age with its struggles that at times almost reached some Apache intensities, to old age and its burdens on the body's ability to move, Abe and Sharpe are a delight to watch easy in a Fred & Ginger kind of Gutierrez.

The 90-minute show concludes with a bang – actually a bunch of carefully coordinated clacks by a group of five smiling women who definitely know their way around syncopation and fancy footwork. Choreographer Nicole Prichard's "Hanuman" is a complex celebration of rhythms. 

Money for Nothing: J.C. Chandor's Look Back at 2008

"Speak to me as if you might to a young child – or a golden retriever," says the chairman of the board to the young analyst who has discovered that the trading practices of the firm have left the company with significantly more debt than assets. *Margin Call* is a gripping and gloomy account of a day and a half, perhaps the last day and a half, in a fictional financial management company in 2008. Though not as informative or infuriating as Charles Ferguson's brilliant documentary *Inside Job*, *Margin Call* is by far the best feature film to dissect the sorry, arrogant, greedy and corrupt state of the financial sector. *Margin Call* unwinds like a thriller, a

whodunit and a heist caper all rolled into one. It has a share of black humor and natural but sharp dialogue (Mamet minus steroids); it also manages to convey the motivations and personalities of a healthy number of characters. This is the feature debut of writer/director J.C. Chandor who handles both duties fluidly and has worked making commercials and music videos for years. The stellar cast is all working in top form. The film is beautifully shot (Frank DeMarco) and wonderfully scored by (Jason Larson) as well.

None of this means *Margin Call* is easy to "enjoy" in the usual trip-to-the-movies way. We know how this ends: very badly for everyone but the few people we meet on screen. Amazingly, though sympathy might be too strong a word, we do share in the strange combination of emotions experienced by the players. I left the theater with the same mood of grim resignation that overcomes the few characters who don't seem to be completely without souls.

Margin Call begins with an Up in the Air

scenario. A team of folks arrive to terminate a large percentage of the workforce, including many members of the risk assessment team. Eric Dale (Stanley Tucci) handles his dismissal with a dignity that masks his natural anger and resentment.

Dale had been working on a new model to update the risk projections for the bundled mortgage "products" that had been earning the company so much money. On his way out the door he hands a small drive to a young trader, Peter Sullivan (Zachary Quinto) with the ominous warning to take a look at it but to "be careful."

Peter, who is genuinely sorry to see Eric go, stays late to continue Eric's work. After adding a few bits of data Eric hadn't gotten to, he becomes so alarmed at what he has discovered that he calls his friend and suggests that he and their boss get back to the office quickly.

What Peter has discovered is that the company is in serious trouble. Peter becomes our tour guide through the ranks of bosses inside the company. A running joke in the film is that each boss is perfectly content to be ignorant of how their business actually works.

"Speak to me in English," says Will Emerson when Peter speaks to him. "You know I don't understand this stuff," Sam Rogers (Kevin Spacey) says when learning of the looming disaster.

Jared Cohen (Simon Baker) and Sarah Robertson (Demi Moore) are silent as the projections are brought to them. They aren't saying anything they don't have to say, but it is clear they aren't completely surprised. They had been warned by Eric Dale, whom they now cannot find because they cut off his



phone service the minute they fired him.

Finally, they must call in the chairman and the board to decide what to do. John Tuld arrives by helicopter and, in a board room filled with very scared people, asks Peter to explain – as if to a child or a golden retriever. Tuld is played with oozing charm by Jeremy Irons who I don't believe has been this silky and sinister since playing Claus Von Bulow.

The exchange between Peter and John helped me understand the crisis. I'm somewhere between a child and a golden retriever when it comes to financial instruments, but every time I hear the cause of the crisis described, I do have the sense to know the "products" may have legal, but the supposed value of the "products" always had a very "emperor's new clothes" vibe.

Tuld tells the assembled folks what he has said since day one: to survive in this business you have to be first, be smarter or cheat. Of course, technically, they haven't been cheating, and he is adamant that he doesn't cheat. They can't smart their way out of this. So, they must be first. They must in one day liquidate the debt, even if it means, as it almost certainly will, the demise of many businesses, including their own.

They spend the night making the plan to make this happen and getting the personalities aligned to toe the line. This may not sound like the stuff of thrillers, and I'm sure there are some for whom the subject is too depressing to endure. I'm thinking of the

homeless, those without retirement accounts or the jobless people left that way by the actions of guys like this.

What I found foscinating is the way the

What I found fascinating is the way the different characters justify their actions and resign themselves to their fate. "We really have no choice" is a sentiment that is expressed in various ways to describe the actions taken at several steps of the crisis by most of the players. And in each case you can see how the individual came to the conclusion to take a specific action.

In all situations posed, though, the right answer is the answer that will get them money. They talk a lot about what is right, but for them right is determined by what will gain them money and power.

J. C. Chandor's father worked for Merrill Lynch for about the same amount of time as Kevin Spacey's character, nearly 40 years. I'm sure that experience informs *Margin Call*. At one point, Peter tells Sam. "I think I know your son. Not well, but he always seemed like a nice guy."

Sam responds with a cynical smirk, "Yahe is. I guess there are worse things to be called"

Sam is the most distraught by what is happening, but he goes along. He has no choice. My guess is that Chandor's father is relieved his son hasn't followed in his footsteps, that he's made a different choice. He must be beaming with pride at his son's feature debut

Sometimes thousands. And getting a job on a movie, even a bad movie, is not an easy thing to do. Getting an influential job on a movie is not unlike climbing a mountain. And so I watch just about any film I can get my hands on because, well, there's always something to appreciate about every film - even the biggest stinkers. Maybe it's a single performance or even just some locations. Often, especially these days, you can almost always appreciate the cinematography in any major film. Sure, I get annoyed, very often, by the bad movies - but it's true, they make the good ones seem that much better. And, well, it's fun to pick things apart now, isn't it? But mostly, it's fun to challenge myself to understand why this or that "bad" movie got made or has the appeal that it does.

That rant in mind, I figured we'd take this week's edition of ScreenTime to get the Year End fun started. Our "Favorite Films of 2011" won't run until January 5 (and we'll do a follow-up column a couple months later, after we've actually seen everything), but this we thought it might be fun this week to look at some of the worthwhile films from 2011 that weren't quiet good enough to crack our Top 20 or so but were far better than we expected. family, the fifth being a disappointment of a husband. We watch Bertha Bumiller as she struggles with her absentee husband and juvenile children, all while trying to provide them with a good Christmas.

There are spotlights also on the lives of a weak man and his shrewish wife, two old codgers who have never outgrown their troublemaking, an overly dramatic theatrical director, a lonely divorcee and the town princess and her dysfunctional family.

Guest director Jane Frazier clearly had a vision for the show she was directing. It is no easy task to give direction to a cast with more personalities than fingers. Beyond her actors, this show about small town Texas has the feel of a large-scale production, even on the smaller, Off Main stage. It clearly took great skill to coordinate the huge set changes along with the constant, fast-paced costume and makeup changes the show goes through. All of these changes were undoubtedly aided by stage manager Clarence Tennis and assistant stage manager Bill Wunderlin, who both have many years of theater experience.

A Tuna Christmas is a hilarious, fresh story to enjoy this Christmas and the perfect way to kick off the holiday season with a dose of cowbov.

of generosity and building community, they also make clear that greed represents a clear failure to follow the ways of Christ, who many argue is too removed from the holiday season.

The Scrooge we see here seemed a blend of the Dickensian Scrooge and Mr. Potter from *It's a Wonderful Life*. He has grown increasingly rich by raising rents and fees on his tenants, most of whom seem to work for him. One of the first scenes shows police officers, clearly pretty tightly under Scrooge's control, evicting tenants who are unable to pay their rents. We see prostitutes trying to steal the few remaining possessions of mother and daughter Maria and Christina Jessup.

Tim (formerly "Tiny Tim") Cratchit has become a grown-up rabblerouser who fights for the "little guys." He is trying to find help for Maria and Christina before they freeze on the street, which figures into the plot of Scrooge's visit by the spirits of past, present and future. This Scrooge, it seems, isn't just a miser; he's a pretty mean guy as well.

We see the choices he has made, just as we do in the original version by Dickens, but in this update there is a bit more violence. Tim is beaten severely in a vision of Christmas Present. There is freezing in the street. What we see of Isabella Fezziwig, the love of Scrooge's life, is also heartbreaking.

I liked this retelling of the original. It is fresh. It is entertaining. But until he experiences his revelation that he can keep the Christmas spirit in his heart throughout the year, it is also probably much darker than Dickens' tale. My only real complaint about the play is that a little more development of the changes in Scrooge was possible. This is not a short play, but the time devoted to cleaning up after his greed and mean ways seemed a bit too brief. There was a scene with him lowering tenant rents and increasing salaries of his workers dramatically. He also made heartfelt apologies to those he had hurt, including his nephew Freddy, the only person who had refused to give up on him.

The production, directed by FPT's Thom Hofrichter, is good. I went for a preview performance, and I'm sure a few minor rough spots were worked through by opening night. The cast, especially Scott Rumage as Scrooge, does well with the script.

Since the reminders that Christmas is upon us come earlier each year, and, to be frank, some of the traditions are just plain ol' silly, it's good to take an evening to be reminded that the real spirit of this holiday is generosity.

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
