


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# Traditions of Her Own

Earlier this month Rebecca Stockert succeeded in placing first runner-up visual artist category in the annual whatzup Readers Poll (Whammy Awards). That's quite a feat in a town with so many active artists. Many

folks might remember Becky from The Firefly (another perennial Whammy winner for best coffeehouse) where, in addition to the usual barista duties, she orchestrated the crafts display. Or, if you have managed a visit to Artlink recently, you might have noticed her behind the counter working as scheduler of the gallery's educational programming.

These are positions this young artist has held while advancing her own art education at the University of Saint Francis. As an undergraduate she majored in ceramics; presently she is working on her master's degree, only this time concentrating on painting and printmaking.

Stockert is working in the vein of art known as pop surrealism, a movement that began back in the late 70s, partly in reaction to the steady elevation of mainstream fine art to high-end galleries and drawing rooms after WWII. Pop surrealism, also known as low-brow art, deliberately aims low, drawing inspiration from cartoons and other

graphics already extant in popular culture but not normally given a "fine art" assignation. Inspiration is taken from automotive art, music posters, graffiti, tattoos and animé, for example. Figures and objects are freely manipulated and juxtaposed for provocative content. However, execution is usually handled in a very traditional style, which further distances this movement from the expressionistic and abstract paths of earlier rebels.

A popular trend in underground art for a few decades, pop realism is now ironically in danger of occupying the same mainstream perch it eschewed at its inception. In fact, it's flagship publication, Juxtapoz magazine, recently outsold every other art periodical, including Art News.

While the work of many pop surrealists is intentionally garish, Stockert's small oil paintings and prints stand out in their simplicity and subtler nuance. They call to mind the quiet poetry of the earlier surrealist René Magritte, whose work differed in the same way from his more sensational contemporary, Salvador Dali. Like Magritte, Stockert manages to imbue simple, ordinary objects



with a hint of playfulness and deeper meaning.

For subject Stockert, matter, who has a young son, found herself surrounded by the trappings of childhood and began to use these new props in her art, employing little stuffed animals as models for etchings and oil portraits. Some creatures are

her own creations, like her series of little characters drawn with wide TV-screen-shape faces and footed union suits. These childlike figures are referred to as "Monsters," because, if parenthood has taught Stockert one thing it's that "children are cute, but they're also little monsters.

Anyone having 24/7 experience with small fry gets what she means; our children not only wreak havoc with our lives, but,

owing to the intensity of our attachment to them, are potentially a parent's worst nightmare should anything bad happen to them. That motherhood has a double-edge is not lost on Stockert, and her willingness to accept the bad along with the good also makes her a sharper artist.

So far, mostly toys and stuffed dolls (at least one made by artist Clare Tarr) have born the brunt of her newly informed perspective. She brings to them a quiet intensity, confronting the viewer with a full-frontal presentation of the stuffed dolls resting on a flat. patterned background. They look almost as if they are pinned there like specimens we should contemplate and learn from. These little paintings are somehow too mysterious for a child's room; they belong in the study.

Oils are a medium that she is currently embracing under the tutelage of Justin Miller at USF.

"I've discovered that I really love oil painting and printmaking," she says, citing Tom Keesee as her printmaking instructor.

"I love painting fabrics. I want to show the texture of them, whether they are shiny or soft, the sharp edges of the folds ... the values of lights and darks."

Recently the fabric animals have given way to real live fur, as Stockert has been painting her own pets or those of friends. And she has shown a flair for portraiture, having painted her own portrait as well that of her son Ezra. He brings the "Monster" series full circle by donning a monster hat in his portrait, and Stockert lets the jagged

shadows from the sawtooth trim on the cap fall across her child's face. This shadow is a very unusual device to use in child portraiture, a wee bit dark. But it's inclusion is what sets Rebecca Stockert apart from the pack.

What lies ahead for this artist?

"My current projects are an exploration in where I fit in the Midwest. I am trying to find my Midwestern voice, or the Midwestern voice, in general," she states.

And how does pop surrealism figure into this exploration?

"A trend with my contemporaries is that we are all trying to find our place in the world, just like every generation before us. We are heavily influenced by postmodernism; however, tradition is not as important as it once was. We are making our own traditions. I feel like we are reaching back to pre-20th Century traditions in art more than our predecessors, who cast it off," she says. referring to the abstractionists and expressionists and Dadists who have gone before.

"We are creating a new world that combines what you [might] refer to as the techno and tradition."

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# Keeping the Party Going ... Forever

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Anyone without a sense of humor, an appreciation of innuendo, or a sense of the funk, get out of the way. Because once again, Here Come the Mummies.

The Nashville, Tennnessee-based band will be bringing its tight R&B-influenced funk, crazy costumes and outlandish sense of humor and swagger back to Piere's on

The Mummies are a collective of unnamed R&B and funk musicians who hide their identities behind their mummy personas. Currently consisting of no less than 13 members, a Mummies show is a veritable onslaught of sight, volume and zany humor.

Forming around the year 2000, the band released its first album, Terrifying Funk from Beyond the Grave, in 2002 and has subsequently produced three more increasingly polished studio albums and one live DVD. As a touring band, the Mummies have circulated around the country, although mainly in the South and the Midwest.

While the band's image and lyrics may be tongue-in-cheek, their music is no joke. One listen to their recordings will reveal a tight and versatile phalanx of funk. Their instrumental prowess is, apparently, something the members take pride in. When asked how mummy musicians compare to their undead competitors (e.g., zombie and vampire musicians), percussionist Java Mummy states bluntly, "Less trendy. Suck a lot less."

Aside from their instrumental play, their

wordplay apparently knows no bounds either (note that the preceding comment 'suck a lot less' is likely referring both to instrumental ability and the fact that vampires suck blood). Take, for example, the mummy names the members have dubbed for themselves. There's Eddie Mummy, whose name is presumably a goof on the musician Eddie Money, and then there's Mummy Cass, apparently the mummy version of "Mama" Cass Elliot from the Mamas and the Papas.

Then take a look at a sampling of their song lyrics: rather than great minds think-

ing alike, "Dirty Minds" think alike. Their last album was called Bed, Bath, and Behind. And then there's the song ... um ... "Libido Knievel."

whose faces are behind the gauze-wrapped madness, the Mummies keep their mouths shut tight. While it's rumored that they consist of musicians contracted with various record companies who wear the costumes to hide their identities, and that their ranks include several Grammy winners, anyone who knows their identities has their lips sealed.

And despite the fact that they are based in Nashville, their sound bears no resemblance to the country music that city is known for.

New Orleans, as the Mummies' R&B-inflected funk sounds closer to the down-home grooves of the Meters than the hillbilly yawl of Hank Williams and George Jones.

Though Nashville is known for country music, Java doesn't acknowledge any difficulties for a funk band in that locale. When asked if the Mummies feel out of place in the city, he debunks the question with a nonsequitur: "All the time," he says. "Except at Joan Rivers' house."

And speaking of exceptionalism, Java

also debunks the idea that band members ever face prejudice for being a member of the undead subculture. "Usually folks just clear on outta the way, y'know? This has certain advantages," he says.

Even though the Mummies have remained more of a regional touring act than a household name, their music has made its imprint in mass media. The aforementioned song "Dirty Minds" has made its way onto the television shows "Scrubs" and "Big Shots" as well as the movie Fired Up! And the band has become a favored guest on Indiana's own Bob and

Tom Show after appearing on that show in

show, aside from the tight funk emanating from the stage, can be summed up in one word: party. Their second album, after all, was titled The Everlasting Party (which is something that, apparently, undead mummies can indulge in). Java expands on the party-like atmosphere of their live shows by stating they are "like Mardi Gras, Arbor Day. and 'Christmas in July' all rolled into one.' And just about everything they produce exudes a mirthful, party vibe. When asked what the craziest thing ever to happen at a show, Java goes off on a wild tangent of dubious veracity.

"Once, Spaz dislocated his hip in a failed attempt at a bizarre stunt involving a vat of hot liquid magma," he says. "Fortunately, the magma worked wonders on that hip, and he came out of the whole thing no worse off than when he went in. But, if I were to say the craziest thing, just reading it would cause your eyeballs to fry themselves over-easy in their very sockets."

And if you've ever wondered what exactly a mummy might think of Fort Wayne Java will lay it down for you loud and clear. "Y'all look sexy in a Wonderbra and gstring," he says.

As for the future of Here Come the Mummies, Java has some extravagant (and smart-aleck) ideas on that as well. "Well, lemme see ... expect action figures, hulahoops, jet packs, recording with a symphony orchestra... recording with action figures. hula hoops and jet packs," he says. "You get the idea."

# Steeped in Percussion

A drummer since the age of 11, Bernie Stone lives and breathes percussion. He caught the music bug when he took lessons as a child, and he hasn't stopped to look back since.

The UPS man by day and drum superhero by night likes to stay busy, which works out well because he truly is just that. Stone plays drums for local favorites and ninetime Whammy Award winners Spike and the Bulldogs, who typically play over one hundred shows a year. He also owns and operates Stone Custom Drum, a business built upon his extensive reputation for high quality custom percussion equipment.

The custom drum part of his story began in Ohio where he was working for Columbus Pro Percussion at the age of 21. "In my spare time I would fix up old drums. I became known for it," Stone said. "They asked me to be their repair guy." Once he got his foot in the custom drum community, he never left.

Stone began buying vintage equipment that needed serious rehabilitation work. He would take the repaired drums to the Percussion Center in Fort Wayne to exchange for store credit. "I'd bring in old stuff and leave with new. It worked out really well," said Stone.

Over time, a relationship cemented itself between Stone and Neal Graham, the shop's owner. Graham eventually invited Stone to move to Fort Wayne in order to work at the Percussion Center on a regular basis.

Stone's career with the Percussion Center exposed him to many high-profile projects and musicians. He worked on some of the most famous drum kits in the world – for which he is still known today, over 20 years later. His clientele at the Percussion Center included heavy-weight names like Rush, KISS, 38 Special, Dokken, Bill Cobham and John Mellencamp. Stone says that one of the most memorable moments of his tenure with The Percussion Center was when

he received a Platinum album celebrating 1 million copies sold of the Dokken's album *Back for the Attack*. He received this award for his custom work on Wild Mick Brown's Monsters of Rock drum kit – a five-piece Tama he painted in a custom finish that Stone dubbed "Brilliant Ruby Metallic."

Once his time with the Percussion Center was over, something happened that could almost be called kismet.

"In December of 2003, I got a call from a friend to go check out this auction on eBay. He said someone was selling factory drum shell equipment. As soon as I saw it, I knew what it was," Stone said.

The equipment belonged to a now-defunct, well-known drum manufacturer based out of Niles, Illinois. The opening bid was \$30,000. Stone says he watched the auction expire without a single bid. It was relisted for \$10,000. Again, no takers.

"A week before Christmas, they finally listed the equipment with no reserve. I put a \$100 bid on it. It held steady at around \$500-600. Then at the last hour, I got into a bidding war with another guy. Luckily, I won," he said with a smile.

Stone's winning bid was only \$3,800. "I basically paid a penny on the dollar," he said. He then spent his Christmas driving to Gretsch drum factory in Ridgeland, South Carolina to pick up the equipment.

He got such a steal because the folks at Gretsch couldn't figure out how to operate it. Even an engineer from Raytheon was stumped. It came with no owner's manual or schematics; any helpful instructions had been burned in a fire, according to his research.

It took Stone eight years to work a little reverse engineering magic on the equipment's sub-systems, testing every single component to make sure it was in working order. "Four years after going through all sub-system parts, I hooked it up to electricity to see if it even turned on. To my sur-

# Riding the Bulleit Train

Tradition is a tricky thing, especially when you try to become part of it. That's what Darren "Dag" Hunt has discovered as he and his new band, Dag and the Bulleit Boys, have found themselves swept up in a century-old music tradition that has some new and vocal advocates.

No matter what you call it – neo-trad country, outlaw country, XXX, underground country – the music that Dag and the Bulleit Boys play is part of a trend that's taking traditional country music and filtering it

through the musical rebellion of the late 20th century - most specifically punk - resulting in something like Jimmie Rodgers with lots of tattoos or Johnny Cash with even more of an attitude. Hunt is content to be considered part of that trend, but he's quick to point out that he isn't the typical underground country player.

"One distinct voice that's coming

to the forefront is one that says you shouldn't be co-opting this music if you weren't born into it, if you aren't from the South," he explains. "You don't have authenticity or legitimacy if you aren't a former punker, your dad raised you on country, then you went off and played punk for 10 years before coming back to traditional country."

Hunt may not have the right hometown address – he was raised in Idaho and didn't listen to much country music while he was growing up – but he can claim a genealogical link to a long line of Missouri farmers, which should give him sufficient rural cred to be allowed to play neo-trad country. What's more important, though, is that he loves the music, and he's a good enough storyteller to write songs that do the tradition proud

He's been doing it for awhile, but the current band is a project that's just getting off the ground. Hunt met brothers Logan and Levi Blauvelt through their dad, Les, who was a fan of Hunt's previous band, The Rewinders. Some jamming with the Blauvelt boys in early 2011, with Logan on upright bass and Levi on guitar, led to the formation of the Bulleit Boys. Josh Schall added mandolin to the mix a short while later, and Hank Whitman came aboard with his trombone around the same time.

From there, things happened fast. Less than a year later, the band has an album and the attention of fans of the genre across the country. They're getting exposure as far afield as Texas, and the underground country scene in Chicago is taking notice of them. Internet radio venues like Outlaw Ra-

dio Chicago make it possible for a band that might otherwise spend all its time playing for modest bar crowds in Fort Wayne to find itself in the middle of a nationwide music movement. That's a good thing, Hunt acknowledges, but it requires a player to have a solid sense of his own identity.

"It's a wave that almost everyone wants to ride," Hunt says. "All the punkers have suddenly become bluegrass players. But that's not who I am. I've always been more straight-ahead country, nothing punky."

Not that you can't be straight-ahead country and still have plenty of punk's anti-



establishment attitude. Given that mainstream country, as controlled by the Nashville industry, has always been about aligning traditional country music with more lucrative pop music, it's not surprising that traditionalists have periodically chafed against the mainstream over the past 100 years or so. Underground country is just the latest in a cyclical history that sees country outlaws emerging from the crowd over and over again. Hank Williams did it. Johnny Cash did it. Merle Haggard did it. Willie Nelson and Waylon Jennings did it. Steve Earle did it. As much as the young XXX practitioners want to think they're on to something new, Hunt knows there's nothing new under the country sun.

"People may hear one of our songs and say, 'Isn't that "Folsom Prison"?' And, yeah it is. It's the same chugging train rhythm, but Johnny Cash got it from Jimmie Rodgers. Merle Haggard got it from Jimmie Rodgers. And Jimmie Rodgers probably got it from some black guy who had been playing it for a long time before Rodgers played it. I hope that I bring something original to my songs – a bit of melody, a lyric, an original story – but I don't have an expectation that the songs are going to be original in terms of that tradition."

With that in mind, Hunt is ready to look ahead. The band's first album, *Bulleit Train*, was recorded before the current line up came together, and Hunt is eager to record with the new crew. More significantly, he's looking forward to recording a new kind of song.

### Dan Mangan

Oh Fortune

Small victories are the ones that make listening to unfamiliar music worthwhile. Such is the case with Canadian Dan Mangan and his latest long player, *Oh Fortune*. When this disc showed up in my mailbox, courtesy of a good friend with unimpeachably good taste in music, I



knew I would at least give this a listen. Sure enough, Mangan turns out to be one of those "best kept secret" artists you have to tell your friends about. So, friends, here we are. Though commonly categorized in RIYL referrals (yecch) under "folk," Mangan doesn't lend himself to such easy shoehorning — and *Oh Fortune* is a baroque/pastoral/dingy/sad/ecstatic gleaming carousel ride that doesn't just reward repeated listens. It practically demands them.

Ascending woodwinds and percussion propel the opening track. "About as Helpful As You Can Be Without Being Any Help at All." The track more than lives up to its mouthful of a title, with a glint of Andrew Bird's indie orchestral jones buffering Mangan's sometimes Morrissey-like delivery. However, Mangan soon leaves Morrissey's own Morrissey-like vocal range in the dust and takes "About's" second half to thrilling heights. You could probably base a pretty decent musical career on the stylistic tent posts Mangan stakes throughout this single song — a promising start. However, "How Darwinian" makes it clear that Mangan is in no hurry to show off all his moves at once. This slow burner drifts along on its own languid cloud (punctuated by occasional Flaming Lips-esque bursts of distorted drum hits). Not that the opening song was a red herring by any means, but "How Darwinian" sets the true tone for the album. "See I don't know what I want/ I just know I really want it," pines Mangan. His need to search is our gain.

A brief digression: what is it with Canadian indie music? Is Canada's music education really that good? Listening to Oh Fortune's title track, a deceptively spare and acoustic-based number loaded with effortless ebb-and-flow beauty and nonchalant profundity, I'm reminded that the list of sometimes-jaw-dropping bands and artists from up north (from Emily Haines/Metric to Broken Social Scene to Feist to [A Certain Band That Cannot Be Named, Holy \*\*\*\*] to the New Pornographers to Arcade Fire) is a mile long. Beauty, eh? Mangan certainly belongs on this list. His canny combination of direct-injection emotion and room-creating atmospherics keep you engaged, but you'll also appreciate the fact that he doesn't go for the easy out. While his melodies inspire, they're not instantly memorable. He makes the listener work alongside and thus grants rewards that unfold over time. The rollicking, raw "Rows of Houses" could sit alongside any Arcade Fire tune in its intensity, and it's directly followed by the twinkling, droning "Regarding Death and Dying," which is in turn followed by the bittersweet closer, "Jeopardy." The net effect of such sequences over the course of Oh Fortune is mesmerizing. This is a true album that's good enough to require your full attention as you drop the needle. Thank you, Canada. (D.M. Jones)

#### fun. *Some Nights*

Two years ago fun. put out their debut album, *Aim & Ignite*, and it quickly shot to the top of my personal playlist where it has remained since, helping me make it through the infamous Music Drought of 2011. Now the boys are back, fighting hard to beat the sophomore jinx. The problem is that their first



album was a glorious once-in-a-lifetime catharsis, a kind of modern *Pet Sounds* built around quasi-spiritual themes of personal regeneration wherein they invited the listener along on the journey. On *Some Nights* they revisit these themes, expanding their already broad array of sounds to make an even bigger rock orchestra. If these three gentlemen were not as impressive talented songwriters as they are, such overblown production could easily explode and overshadow the meat of the music.

As on their previous album, there is a kind of introductory song (in this case the song is actually titled "Some Nights Intro") opening in a whisper of self-confession before venturing into a slew of sonic effects and ending with a dramatic symphonic sweep. The title

#### **Pixies**

Surfer Rosa (1988)

I'm a pretty big Pixies fan. I believe Frank Black is one of the better vocalists/songwriters from the last 25 years. I also think he may have created (or at least helped formulate) the American-born indie rock culture, and for this we should be thankful.



When this, the Pixies' first full-length album came out, the comparisons were all over the place. Called everything from grunge to alt-metal to surf rock, it was just good rock n' roll with an elternative twict.

The album opens with the trippy "Bone Machine," a song that sounds like anguished screaming in front of reverberating guitars and the countryesque harmony of bassist Kim Deal. Next up is "Break My Bones," in which Black and Deal again share the vocals while Frank bangs away a frenzied two-note rhythm/lead guitar. Like nine of the 13 tracks, this one clocks in at less than two and a half minutes.

"Broken Face" is more punk than alternative and clears the palette for the wonderful "Gigantic." One of my favorite Pixies songs, Deal takes the vocals for this one, and I have to mention the fantastic drumming from Dave Lovering and the lead guitars from Joey Santiago. "Where Is My Mind" is another Pixies song that the loyal fans go back to when they talk about "the old stuff."

Most of side two takes you down a road of the same fuzzy guitars and the off-key choruses that worked so well with this Boston-based band.

The Pixies went on to release just four more records until they split up in 1993. Black has about 20 solo records, and the Pixies reunited in 2004, playing cities all over the world through 2011.



song hits you with a wall of vocals that would please Queen before jumping into an energetic African revival beat. This mirrors the first album in song layout, a curious choice but not in itself a bad thing. "Some Nights" is the first of too many songs that seem to be a kind of crowd sing-along, like they anticipate fans singing along at live shows and recorded the future. "We Are Young" is a peppy song about bar hopping that quickly switches to a plodding synthy singalong song where it spends the majority of its duration. The band picks up the ball in "Carry On," telling about a night in a bar with old friends along with wisdom such as "If you're lost and alone / Or you're sinking like a stone / Carry on." A sizzling guitar solo leads into the group-sing portion as violins and an accordion give the song a Celtic bar song feel. However, in "It Gets Better" the band pulls out the stops, starting with a stuttering drum and vocoder vocals before slamming into a thick bass-drum beat that whips you around the frantic melody.

While some bands like to build a song from a slow simmer to a big crescendo fun. tend to cram as many different parts into a four-minute song as possible (see "Uncle Albert/Admiral Halsey" by Wings as an influence.) In the amazing "Why Am I the One" there is a verse melody, played in three starkly different variations, a big chorus (with the revelatory lyrics of "For once I get the feeling that I'm right where I belong") and two completely different bridges. Classify this music as "pop" if you want, but it's sophisticated pop that goes down easy but is full of complex nuances. "All Alone" is about falling in love with a wind-up souvenir, a breezy, quirky song full of toy pianos, some very tasty guitar tones, a dad-blurned catchy chorus and half of a marching band. "All Alright" is another sing-along while "One Foot" beats the same horn-driven measure ad nauseum, which is extremely inexplicable for a band that normally keeps things varied. At best, these two songs are boring and are easily skipped over to get to "Stars," the final non-bonus song. Nearly seven minutes in length, "Stars" is a summation of the album, looking back on his past and reveling in his present, zooming along with horns and crazy guitars for two minutes before settling into a loungy riff set to strings. Here the vocals are processed through a vocoder, auto-tune and a few other effects, growing more and more bizarre as the song nears its end.

It's no coincidence that fun. teamed up to record a song with Panic at the Disco last year. They are from the same planet musically, though they speak slightly different dialects. However Panic's sophomore album was a huge creative leap forward while fun.'s takes a small step back and to the side. *Some Nights* is a very good album and some of the songs even approach greatness, but it's missing the magic pixie dust of their debut. ### Bruce Springsteen

**Wrecking Ball** 

The lead single and opening track on Bruce Springsteen's new studio album, *Wrecking Ball*, immediately sets the same tortured pop tone "Born In the U.S.A." set almost three decades ago. Titled "We Take Care of Our Own" and sung with an anthem-like charge, the track at first appears to be



wholly patriotic, led by the repeated lyric "We take care of our own / Wherever this flag is flown." Pay attention to the verses and the song reveals itself as Springsteen's best trickster tune in years. Clearly, this is a patriotic man, but not a man made blindly out of touch by his good fortune. "We Take Care of Our Own" is a rich-get-richer call-out aimed to make members of the middle and lower classes feel comfort, a song about a struggling country led by businessmen, lawyers and, ahem, crooks with no worldview, seemingly with no regard for future generations or working classes. And so the stage is set: Bruce is back and he has a message. When he sings "The road of good intentions has gone dry as a bone" in verse one, I can't help but feel that the gauntlet has been thrown. Here Bruce appears to be talking directly to President Obama, adding "Where's the promise from sea to shining sea?" Bruce publicly supported the Change Campaign, yet here is a record aimed at the shortsighted bailout era of American politics.

Eleven heavy tracks deep, *Wrecking* plays through as an observational critique of modern American culture that I can't much argue with. Springsteen writes and sings from the perspective of a hopeful humanitarian struggling to understand how our human instincts and general intentions got so cloudy. "Jack of All Trades," a beautiful song featuring guitar hero Tom Morello, is sung from the perspective of the working man, out hoping for a better day while working through the pain. The song questions why the fortunate care so little about the less fortunate, building to the cheesy but effective line "Now sometimes tomorrow comes soaked in treasure and blood / We stood the drought now we'll stand the flood." What matters more, luck or resilience? History or the future? *Wrecking Ball* is clear in voice and sweet at heart, a sad but sanguine album that aims for the ear of both the comfortable and the crying.

The biggest issue with the disc as an album is that Bruce seems to be pandering below his ability for ears and attention. The music was probably really quite great in demo form and rehearsal sessions; but once the tunes hit the studio, the sheen came on strong, and with it some cheese (see "Rocky Ground"). This because, we have to assume, Bruce and the boys wanted to get their message out to as many ears as possible, not unlike how they did with Born In the U.S.A. (Let's face it, most listeners don't much care for gritty, authentic rock n' roll these days.) Also like Born, Wrecking Ball's lyrics seem more straightforward, more obvious, than what we've come to expect from the guy who wrote Darkness On the Edge of Town. And while I do think the message would cut deeper had Bruce written more for himself, rather than for the supposed radio masses, I've already seen a lot of people reacting strongly to the record. Not the blind chanting that Born saw, but people actually digging in on the message of the record. Quality ears. The biggest difference between the Born and Wrecking eras is that people today are influenced by television and celebrity culture, not music or written words. It doesn't matter how insightful and accessible Springsteen makes his message; people just aren't going to hear it. Not enough people, that is – not unless Bruce grows breasts or wears a meat dress. Regardless, the songs are above average and the message is one I can easily commend for its positive intentions. If nothing else, here Bruce epitomizes the guts and focus

As an overall work, *Wrecking Ball* doesn't offer solutions as much as it does commentary, documentation and insights. It's the kind of hopeful, politically-focused record that can cause debate and actual anger. Springsteen's thesis, I believe, is simply that the people in power are not the kind of people who should be in power,


that the majority is being led by the overly fortunate when it should be led by the fighting. Pretty obvious, right? History tells us that the people who run this country, no matter their political party, have long tended to be greedy and power-hungry types who've led, or desired, lifestyles that come nowhere near resembling the population they represent. But here Springsteen implies that the current breed of greed is as nasty and oppressive as ever before, and so the times are getting darker than most of us yet realize. And, thankfully, he sends his hopeful message through often great rock n' roll tracks that a generous number of ears will hear.

By now Bruce Springsteen is as rich as any citizen would ever need to be. That he still has the ability to feel the pain of the lower classes so deeply is what makes him a good man. That he spends his days and energy using his art to speak for the underrepresented is what makes him Bruce Springsteen, the most ethical, soulful American songwriter since Woody Guthrie. (*Greg W. #### **Howlin Rain**

The Russian Wilds

Do names like Leslie West, Rod Argent, Ken Hensley and Carlos Santana mean anything to you? what about Deep Purple, Mountain, Uriah Heep and Steely Dan? If after reading those names you felt an involuntary surge of stomach acid come up your throat, then do as Bob Seger once said, and turn the page.



Okay, now that those whippersnappers have moved on to their current issue of Under The Radar, let's talk about Howlin Rain's new long player *The Russian Wilds*. This drunken, stoned and southern California-drenched record will appeal to those of us who enjoy their songs long, light on filler and heavy on the jam. This is 70s soul rock in the tradition of Grand Funk Railroad and Rare Earth, 70s hard rock in the loving likeness of albums like *Machine Head*, *The Magician's Birthday* and *Abraxas*.

Howlin Rain are fronted by Ethan Miller who fronted the fuzzedout psych rock band Comets on Fire. Fans of Comets on Fire will more than likely scratch their heads in bewilderment as soon as "Self Made Man," *The Russian Wilds*" opening track, starts up. With it's Hammond B3-inflected opening which turns into something resembling Wolfmother fronted by Leslie West, this is light years away from Comets' 2004 debut *Cathedral*. Midway through we get into something resembling Carlos Santana jamming with Steely Dan, complete with guitar solo, organ and Latin percussion. Welcome to throwback territory.

"Phantom In The Valley" is very reminiscent of the Eagles staple "Hotel California," if Graham Bonnet took vocal duties and Joe Walsh's 12-string was replaced with a Hammond B3 and a Leslie speaker. "Can't Satisfy Me Now" is a hard rock soul hybrid that brings to mind Head East, Argent and a pre-"Red Rocker" Sammy Hagar wailing away at the mic. "Dark Side" has a Can't Buy a Thrill vibe, with prominent electric piano and organ. Once again the Sammy Hagar-ish vocals take over the track with screams not committed to tape since the late 80s. I'm not sure if the Hagar vocal inflections are intended or not, but the similarities are uncanny. No 70s nugget is left unturned, as there's even a nod of the oversized hat to Looking Glass' one-hit wonder, "Brandy" in the track "Beneath Wild Wings'." Far out, man.

The most surprising aspect of this record is that production duties were handled by none other than studio guru Rick Rubin who brings a very natural, organic sound to the record. You feel like you're listening to a lost gem found in the bargain bin at the local record store rather than a bunch of hipsters wearing Mom and Dad's musty 70s duds that have been packed away in the attic for 30 years. Rubin gives *The Russian Wilds* a hazy basement sound and a munchie-driven hunger to pick up a Les Paul and a bag of chips at the same time.

If you are a child of the 70s, grew up on a steady diet of AOR radio and like your music one part rockin' and one-part soulful with a bit of machismo thrown in, then give *The Russian Wilds* a spin. Now pass those chips, man. (*John Hubner*)

prise, it did. Then I was faced with figuring out how it was even used," he

Stone spent the better part of four years figuring out how his newly acquired equipment worked, honing his knowledge of optimal glues. woods, and parameters. Each size drum is unique and requires fine-tuning of variables in the assembly method.

As luck would have it, Stone got a break in the form of a phone call from Jim Moritz, whose father Jack operated Stone's drum shell equipment for 11 years. Jack Moritz had retired and lived in Chicago. After chatting with the younger Mortiz, Stone asked to arrange a meeting. This meeting was the invaluable breakthrough he needed to unlock the equipment's magic.

"I showed Mr. Moritz pictures of the equipment on my laptop, equipment he had not seen in decades, and he just had tears in his eyes, said Stone. "I learned more about that equipment in two and a half hours of talking to him than I had over the nearly eight years I owned it! He cleared up a lot of missing variables. Every problem I had encountered

After a cosmic whirlwind of the meeting the right people and figuring the drum shell equipment system out, Stone was finally able to get it up and running. He has fine-tuned his process to make drum shells from some of the most beautiful exotic woods that accommodate even the pickiest of custom specifications from clients.

And that client base is local, regional, and national. Stone has built a legendary following on drum enthusiast message boards, word of mouth and reputation alone. He said, "I've got the mystique of the legendary drum shell equipment and a product that speaks for itself."

What's next for Stone Custom Drum?

"I was contacted by two musical instrument companies out of Asia wanting to place orders in excess of 10,000 units a year. I can't handle that capacity yet, but the demand is definitely there," Stone said. He is exploring ways of expanding his business to accommodate large orders like those and hitting the road to get the word out.

In the meantime, Stone still isn't sitting still. He's got his day job. Spike and the Bulldogs and his family to keep him busy. He's working on research and development for major drum manufacturer Ludwig. Stone says, "I've grown up playing drums, and I plan to spend the rest of my life playing and manufacturing them. Drums are my life!"







After reading his autobiography, *The Beast*, lent to me by a friend, I have a renewed interest in the man and his music.

Summerfest in Milwaukee is starting to rival Rock on the Range as one of the nation's biggest and best rock festivals. Taking place over a ten day period, Summerfest features a more varied lineup with **Neil Diamond**, **The Beach Boys**, Iron Maiden and **Lady Antebellum** joining **Steve Miller Band**, **The Avett Brothers**, **Common**, **Joss Stone** and **Gavin DeGraw** as some of the bigger names already lined up. June 27-July 8 are the dates you are looking at if you are interested in being immersed in music for an entire vacation. Not a bad way to spend your time away from work, if I do say so myself.

#### The Thing

A massive spaceship has been found buried under ice in Antarctica where it has been waiting to be discovered for 100,000 years. What appears to be some alien creature has also been found near the ship, frozen solid and presumed dead. Renowned American archeologist Kate Lloyd (Mary Elizabeth Winstead) has been sent to a Norwegian scientific outpost to oversee the proper extraction and sampling of the alien.

If I told you the creature turned out not to be dead after all, would that spoil things for you? How about if I added that not only is the creature very much alive, it also has the ability to mimic the shape and behavior of any other life form it wants, until it's ready to pounce? Oopsies.

The ideal audience for the 2011 remake-prequel of *The Thing* has never seen or even heard of the John Carpenter-directed classic from 1982 (which was itself a remake of a 1951 B movie). It's hard to imagine anyone being blown away by this latest version to start with, but it really suffers by direct comparison. (And, no, this isn't just nostalgia talking; I recently re-watched the Carpenter version just a few months ago and found it to be a wonderfully enjoyable melding of 70s-era gritty realism with 50s-era sci-fi kitsch.)

You might expect that at least the special effects would be better, but even on this count you would be wrong. The sloppily rendered computer-generated effects in the 2011 version don't hold a candle to Rob Bottin's inspired practical animatronic effects from the 1982 version.

I do really like Winstead in the leading role here; she looks a little timid and reluctant, like she's in way over her head, which is perfect for the part she's playing. I sincerely hope this is only the beginning of a long and interesting career for this talented young actress. But, c'mon, Kurt Russell was such an unforgettable bad ass as R.J. MacReady in the 1982 version, can there really be any comparison?

There are, admittedly, a few nice moments here, moderately well-handled by director Matthijs van Heijningen Jr. For example, the scene in which Kate comes up with a quick test to see who among them might really be an alien imposter is clever and disarmingly simple. I also liked the friendship between Sam (Joel Edgerton) and Jameson (Adewale Akinnuoye-Agbaje).

But the remake/prequel fails to generate even half the toxic paranoia found in Carpenter's version. The alien is so powerful on its own, you kinda wonder why it even bothers to hide as a human in the first place. It doesn't help that 75 percent of the Norwegian crew lacks any differentiation or characterization whatsoever. Most of the time, when the alien kills someone, I had a hard time even determining who the victim was, let alone whether or not I should care.

After the creature "outs" itself for what it is, the final 45 minutes or so devolve into a prolonged flame-throwin' shoot-em-up, making this version something the Carpenter version never came close to being: a bore.



#### **Beautiful Boy**

College freshman Sammy (Kyle Gallner) calls his parents late one night. He sounds lonely and perhaps a bit depressed, though most of the conversation concerns an upcoming family vacation. His father Bill (Michael Sheen) is tired after a long day at work and signs off after just a few faux-cheerful pleasantries. Sammy's mother, Kate (Maria Bello), is visibly concerned, but she is unable to find the words to draw her distant son out of his shell. She goes to bed telling herself her boy is experiencing the normal difficulties many children go through when they first head off to college.

The next day it's all over the news: there's been a mass shooting at Sammy's college. Many are dead, including the still-unidentified gunman. A few hours later, police come to the door. Kate, who has been unable to reach Sammy on his cell all day, immediately assumes the worst. But it's even worse than she can conceive of: Sammy, it turns out, was the shooter.

As you might expect from such grim subject matter, there's really no way to pull away from the parents' suffering here, and as a result it's nearly unbearable to watch. Caught between witnessing the abject pain of others or switching the movie off, I honestly wavered.

Ultimately, I stayed with it, and now that I've finished watching it I am glad I did. Though we never see the actual shooting (thank goodness for small mercies), we are spared none of the emotional violence of the aftermath. Writer/director Shawn Ku wisely realizes that it is only by unflinchingly plunging directly into the heart of this couple's suffering that he can be honest about what has happened to them, and what choices still lie before them.

Whether their marriage can (or even should) survive such a blow becomes the central question in *Beautiful Boy*. (The marriage was virtually over even before the shooting.) That, and the parsing out of blame: was what Sammy did their fault in some way, or was Sammy just sick and/or evil? Could they have prevented it from happening? In one unforgettable motel room scene (Sheen and Bello are both so bracingly good here!) harsh words are irrevocably exchanged that few parents would ever dare to think, let alone utter.

It's beyond sad. It's excruciating. And like I said, it's unclear whether these two really should stay together, or whether they might be better off divorcing. This is something we have to figure out right along with Kate and Bill.

It's hard to take, yes, but *Beautiful Boy* is worth the journey. It's a strong and urgently told fable about grief, guilt, blame and the perils of parenthood and marriage, a worst-case scenario that most of us are perfectly content to never, ever entertain the possibility of.

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## Going Home? Don't Bother

Wayward Saints by Suzzy Roche, Voice, 2012

Someday I'd like to read a novel about someone from a small town who becomes a superstar – either a rock star or a movie star – and continues to live in the same small town as his career develops. He'd live where he's always lived, and there'd be no need for him to return to the town at the peak of his stardom (or after his career is in decline), worried about how his family and old friends will receive him. There'd be no need to wonder what they'd think of him because he would have been among them all along, and if he'd done something questionable like, say, exposing the town's skeletons

exposing the town's skeletons in his art, he would have been faced with the consequences immediately, not long after the fact when he finally returns to town. It would be an interesting story, maybe, but it's not the story in Wayward Saints.

The story in Wayward Saints is much closer to the novel that I've already read in many different versions. It's not quite the standard you-can't-go-home-again story, but it's not so far off from the formula. Mary Saint is a rock star who grew up in the small town of Swallow, New York (the town is named for the birds that live there). She became a star after she left home and moved to Britain. Her band, Sliced Ham, hit the big time in the UK and then made a smaller, but still substantial, splash in America

That was in the 1990s, and now Saint is much less of a star; after the death of her band's bass player, Garbagio, who also happened to be Saint's lover, she was hit with a profound lack of motivation. Her career suffered, but she did manage to clean up her bad-girl act, kicking drugs and generally calming down. Now she's living in San Francisco, working in a coffee shop and perfectly willing to play a gig at the high school in Swallow when a big fan, who happens to teach at the school, asks her to come home.

Everyone in the novel is dealing with skeletons, closeted and otherwise. Mary Saint is doing the best job of it; she's already spewed out the baggage given to her by her abusive father in her angry, profane songs. She's overcome the guilt she once felt about Garbagio's



death, and now she's at peace, thanks in large part to a spiritual experience she had as a child an experience that has buoyed her through life's trials.

Garbagio's father is also at peace. He has gracefully accepted both his son's death and his wife's dementia, and he is content to live

with the pride he feels for his son's accomplishments and the overwhelming love he still feels for his wife. He is doing fine.

Mary's mother is not so fine. Always having lived in denial of the effect her husband's abuse had on Mary and herself, she's not dealing with it much more easily even now that the angry old man is disabled by a stroke and living in a nursing home. She's ashamed of Mary's career and embarrassed by her daughter's willingness to talk openly about both her turbulent past and her spiri-

tual beliefs. Jean Saint is detached from the world around her (as illustrated by the fact that she's never heard of Twitter), and she's deeply uncomfortable with her life.

I'm always puzzled by the apparent difficulty that writers have when they try to write about fictional popular music. You'd think that someone like Suzzy Roche (who has had a long musical career of her own) would be able to write about music in a way that wasn't so painfully awkward. The name's surrounding Mary's music - Sliced Ham, Garbagio. Four Broke Blokes, Jed Syringe and the Shoot Ups – don't sound much like anything that was happening in the mid 90s, and Mary's songs ("Sewer Flower," "You're a Pig," "I Pee Like a Girl," "Over Daddy's Dead Body," "I Can't Stop Eating," "Lay Down Upon My Swarmy Liver") seem like a lame person's idea of what punk rock sounds like, 20 years too late.

The odd mixture of off-the-mark rock n' roll debauchery and mystical Catholicism never quite clicks, either, and Roche's attempt at a you-should-go-home-again story is unable to find a recipe for coherence.

The band's current oeuvre covers the principle themes of trad country music (the band is named after a brand of bourbon, after all, and the album has a train on the cover), but Hunt is ready to move beyond songs about drinking, the songs he wrote during a particularly dark, single-minded time in his life.

"When I look back on it now, it all makes sense," he says. "But at this point, I'm pretty sure I've written all the drinking songs I'll ever need."

Instead, he'd rather write deeper, more human songs.

"I'm not good at love songs," he admits.
"I'm mainly a cynic. I'm a skeptic at heart, about the state of the world, but I don't want

to put all that crap into songs. I don't want to bring people down. I'm not going to be writing songs about Syrian protestors, even though those are the kinds of things I care deeply about. I'm wanting to write songs about the human condition, and I want to write them with humor, with sadness. I want to look for the nuances, the subtlety as I write about what it means to be human."

No matter what he writes about, though, Hunt and his Bulleit Boys will be sure to stay true to a history for which they have great re-

"We're stepping into a river of tradition that's been flowing for a hundred years, and we're just trying to make a ripple."

## MPAA Would Keep Film From Those Who Need It Most

*Bully*, a new documentary about bullying may or may not be coming to a multiplex near us in a few weeks. *Bully* is the victim of some bullying on all sides.

The Motion Picture Association of

America is the organization that determines ratings for films. Due to some bad language in *Bully*, supposedly repeated use of F bombs, the MPAA insisted on giving the film an R rating, though I've read reports that count the F bombs at six. An R rating would mean that no one under 17 would be admitted to the film without an accompanying adult. They offered to give the film a PG-13 rating only if the language was removed.

But director Lee Hirsch has refused to edit the movie. As he notes, the language is a form of the bullying. Words can hurt you. The full negative impact of bullying would be softened by removing the language is his argument. He also notes that kids are not unfamiliar with obscene language at school.

Luckily for Hirsch, his film is being released by the Weinstein Company. The president of that company, Harvey Weinstein, is up to a fight. Many in Hollywood have used the word bully to describe him.

The Weinstein Company, Hirsch and the MPAA have been arguing back and forth for some weeks. Hirsch and Weinstein have argued that an R rating will prevent many teens from seeing the movie, just the audience the film is designed to educate and encourage. The MPAA wouldn't budge, and neither would the director and his distribution.

tion company.

The Weinstein Company has decided to

release the film unrated, a choice any studio can make about any film. This decision also has ramifications. In most cases, a film that does not have an MPAA rating is not picked up by the major theater chains. Generally, the only films that are released without ratings are films that would receive an NC-17 rating. (Some foreign language or smaller independent titles do not go through the MPAA rating process.)

Most movie theater chains will not show films rated NC-17. Locally, none of the major theater chains will show an NC-17 rated film, and they rarely present an unrated film. If *Bully* is not picked up by any of the local theater chains, it will be shown at Cinema Center. No rating is as bad as an R rating for the possibility of screening *Bully* in schools.

Bully is set to be released in New York and Los Angeles this Friday and will expand into the top 25 markets across the country in two weeks. So far, theaters in New York and Los Angeles are comfortable with an unrated film, but no major theater chain has announced whether or not they will release the film across the country.

Many celebrities and groups are weighing in the debate. Celebrities like Meryl Streep, Justin Bieber and Ellen DeGeneres are supportive. Anderson Cooper and Kelly Ripa have hosted a screening for teachers and educators.

But regular people are taking up the cause as well. Katy Butler is a Michigan teen who has been bullied. She has started an online campaign to support the film getting a PG-13 rating and has gathered nearly half a



million signatures. You can sign the petition by going to change.org.

Organizations are weighing in as well. The American Federation of Teachers president Randi Weingarten is encouraged by the change to an unrated film. "Our job is to keep kids safe and films like this help to do that, even if it is tough to watch," he says.

On the other side, the Parent Teachers Council president Tim Winter has issued a statement saying, "This movie, regardless of intentions, sets a precedent that threatens to derail the entire ratings system." This statement seems particularly narrow and uninformed.

The stated purpose of the film is to prevent bullying, to help kids understand how to help themselves and stand up for kids. I doubt that the MPAA will come crashing down if a film about teens and for teens is available to teens. I haven't seen *Bully*, so I can't offer a full opinion yet. I can say that watching the trailer is a bit scary. It is hard to watch kids getting pushed and shoved and called names. It is even harder to hear adults deny that kids are being victimized.

If the MPAA had said the content is simply too brutal for a PG-13 rating, that might have had more credibility. The behavior looks ugly, and I'm sure when you add in the language, the effect is chilling. The filmmak-

ers pretended to be following lots of kids in each location, so the kids didn't understand that the subject was bullying and specific kids were being watched.

I wonder what Tim Winter thinks of the PG-13 rating for *The Hunger Games*? It may be based on a popular book, but it is still about teenagers fighting each other to death. I know kids are smart, and they know a film like *The Hunger Games* is fiction. And it may be tougher to watch real people getting bullied. But, kids are smart, and they know bullying is happening.

Chris Dodd, the former senator from Connecticut, is now the head of the MPAA. He has been quoted, "If we change the ruling in this case, I'll have 10 other filmmakers lined up saying they shouldn't be given the R. And who are we to say why this film should be different from others?"

Well, first of all, it is your job! Presumably, making a judgment based on the content of a film is what the MPAA is designed to do. What if 10 filmmakers show up and want further consideration? I would like to believe the ratings board could handle the situation.

the life, values and history of this great city of Fort Wayne, *The Farnsworth Invention* recaptures the drama, heroism, intrigue and emotion behind the patent wars over the invention of the television in the first quarter of the 20th century. Philo T. Farnsworth, childhood genius and inventor of the cathode ray tube, which provided the foundation for the first electronically transmitted moving visual image, spent most of his productive career right here in Fort Wayne in the early days of International Telephone and Telegraph and the Farnsworth Television Company. His professional battles with David Sarnoff, the powerful president of RCA, and his personal battles with addiction and grief, are the building blocks of this powerful story that celebrates our human quest for discovery and our strength in relationships.



her spirit over the months.

Regan Kreigh stands out in every role she plays, and her M'Lynn is no exception. From the way she lovingly touches her daughter's face to the sharpness in her voice when sharing her disapproval over Shelby's choices, M'Lynn's loving maternal relationship with her daughter is completely believable. Her controlled strength and eventual emotional breakdown in the final scene leave the audience breathless and several actresses on stage wiping away genuine tears throughout the remainder

Under the direction of Brad Beauchamp, who has helped grow the USF theatre department over the past few years, the rest of the cast is every bit as convincing at creating their individual characters who each go through their own transformations.

Clairee (T.J. McCombs) is brash but warm and is searching for meaning in her life after her husband, the town's mayor, dies. She has a lovingly caustic relationship with fellow widow Ouiser (Molly McCray), a crank with a soft side she doesn't show very often. Annelle (USF student Amber Hughes), the wallflower-turned-party-girl-turned-born-again-Christian, has perhaps the greatest transformation. Hughes seamlessly portrays all sides of her character's growing confidence as she "realizes [she] has something to offer." Truvy (Suzan Moriarty), the salon owner, semi-adopts new stylist Annelle when she falls on hard times. Truvy is funny, wise and diplomatic, always keeping the peace among her friends. She is the glue that holds everyone together.

The University of St. Francis production is the first in their new home at the former Scottish Rite Auditorium in downtown Fort Wayne. Patrons with difficulty walking up and down steps might want to arrive early to find seating in the lower rows, as the center aisles do not have handrails. The large stage space allows for a particularly beautiful and detailed set designed by Rick Cartwright, USF's dean of the School of Creative Arts. Unfortunately, on opening night the backdrop behind the set showed distracting shadows of people walking backstage.

The costumes were just '80s enough without seeming like parody, although the hairstyles, overall, could have used a bit more height. However, short of giving all the actresses perms, they looked fine.

I've seen a number of productions of Steel Magnolias over the years, but I don't remember ever laughing as hard or being so moved to tears. After leaving the theatre, all I wanted to do was go home, kiss my daughter and set up a good old-fashioned gossip session with my best friends. jen@greenroomonline.org

ing goals for place and character identity, technical directors Robert Shoquist and Jonathan Maag and costume designer Louise Heckaman weave visual magic as altogether these artists create picture after picture that moves us from New York to Utah, San Francisco to New Jersey in seamless time and intriguing image. It has been an honor to work with each and every one of them.

As both a scholar and theatre artist, protecting the intent and integrity of a playwright's language is always paramount to me; hence some of the profanity you will hear. The hard words help define the character's spirit. However, I do take some issue with the playwright's characterization of Farnsworth's life and contributions following his loss of the television patent. Farnsworth continued to have a creative and influential



life, much of which unfolded here in Fort Wayne from the 1950s to the 1970s. While financing scientific research was and always has been a daunting, fiscal reality, at the time he died Farnsworth held 300 U.S. and foreign patents. His inventions contributed to the development of radar, infrared night vision devices, the electron microscope, the baby incubator, the gastroscope and the astronomical telescope. Farnsworth truthfully embodies the declaration of Pete Conrad, the third astronaut on the moon, whose words are spoken by David Sarnoff's character: "My God, we were meant to be explor-

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
