

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

In 20 years time, Blue Man Group has gone from an unlikely theatre sensation to

a must-see extravaganza to an indelible part of our culture. It's hard to remember a world without Blue Man Group, and its unique combination of sound, visuals and technological wonderment has brought a new spin on the typical theatre experience. While it remains popular worldwide and is now a mainstream part of the performance world, the

show, at its heart, continues to stay just outside the traditional parameters of drama, comedy, musical and spectacle.

With casts all over the world, there remains a remarkable unity of vision which makes it possible for cast members to come and go for years at a time. Kalen Allmandinger, who will be in the cast of Blue Man Group when it visits Fort Wayne's Embassy Theatre next week, has been one of those cast members who has visited and revisited the world of blue men. Having discovered the joys of entertaining as a small boy, he now gets to put all of his interests and experiences to use in Blue Man Group.

"I was always drawn to performing, was

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> always the class clown, but my grandfather was really my inspiration. He played drums - he wasn't a pro, but he played in Dixieland jazz bands. He formed the Joliet Legion Band when he came home from his service in World War II, and that band is still active to this day. I looked up to my grandfather and wanted to be like him, and he gave me my first set of drumsticks when I was two years old."


Growing up in Iowa and Wisconsin but with ties through his mother to the Chicago area, Allmandinger took those early years on the drums and parlayed that to a pursuit of music and theatre, eventually heading to Chicago College of Performing Arts. While

in the Windy City he got a chance to perform with the Chicago Shakespeare Theatre when that venue was still new, sharing Romeo and Juliet with area school children both in the theatre and at the schools. Shortly after that experience, the chance to join Blue Man Group came along, and he has performed with the production off and on for 12 years. Al-

though the show is known for its spectacular visuals, Allmandinger appreciates the dichotomy of the message contained within

"There's a lot of ingenious technology going on and the show is known for its spectacle, but at the heart of it there's also a lot of mystery to the character. Through the silence there's something intriguing and even a little scary about the character. I think people un-

# Gravitational Force

You might think you understand the law of gravity, but when Montreal's RUBBERBANDance Company come to Fort Wayne this weekend, they'll have you questioning whether what goes up really must come down.

The five-person company will be performing their award-winning original piece *Gravity of Center* at 8 p.m. Saturday, April 14 at the Arts United Center. The show, written by the company's artistic director/choreographer Victor Quijada, explores the tribal, animalistic side of human nature through the company's unique aesthetic of hip-hop and classical dance.

Quijada got the idea for *Gravity* when listening to coverage of the financial crisis, although he's quick to say that that was just the initial inspiration for the work.

"The crisis gave me the first flash of an idea – what happens when a person goes from having everything to having nothing?" he said in a recent phone conversation

from RUBBERBAND's headquarters in Montreal. "What is the result of that dire need, when someone is faced with survival or certain death? This isn't about losing your new Hummer or the new condo you bought that you couldn't afford.

It's much more primal than that."

In Quijada's mind, what happens when people lose everything is a 70-minute dance narrative featuring not only his trademark hip-hop/ballet blend but also the distinctive compositions of Jasper Gahunia.

Quijada and Gahunia have almost identical artistic backgrounds, only told in reverse. Quijada came to dance via the streets of Los Angeles. He started out as a break dancer, earning the nickname "Rubberband Man." Eventually, his moves caught the eye and interest of legendary choreographer Twyla Tharp, and Quijada moved to New York to study classical and contemporary ballet. Later, he joined the Les Grands Ballets Canadiens de Montreal, leaving it in 2002 to start his own company.

RUBBERBANDance was Quijada's brainchild; he wanted to create a new dance language, one in which hip-hop and street dance meld with ballet to form a fresh vocabulary. The result is a company whose members, over the last 10 years, have earned a reputation for their innovative artistic vision as well as their skills as dancers.

Unlike Quijada, Gahunia, started on the classical side of the equation. He worked for years as a classical pianist, making the choice halfway through his career to switch to the life of a hip-hop DJ. He and Quijada met on the set of a rap video, Gahunia acting as DJ and Quijada as choreographer. The two have now collaborated on three RUBBERBANDance shows, and Quijada said he's always astounded by Gahunia's powers of invention. For *Gravity of Center* the young

composer took classical works by such heavyweights as Bach, Wagner and Mozart and parsed single notes or lines of music from known masterpieces to give birth to

something new and inventive. The result, according to Quijada, is much like the company's mix of hiphop and ballet: a new vocabulary, a novel musical language sure to thrill audiences.

"I don't think fusion is the right word for what he's doing," Quijada said. "It's more like he's creating an entirely new sound. You have to hear it to believe it."

Quijada and his fellow RUBBERBAND dancers will speak to anyone interested in learning more about their work at the Fort Wayne Dance Collective at 4 p.m. and 7 p.m. Friday, April 13. In the afternoon the troupe will give a demonstration of their technique, and in the evening Quijada will conduct a master class. The piece de resistance will then undoubtedly be Saturday's performance which, in addition to altering your views on gravity and the physical limitations of the human body (Quijada is not called Rubberband Man for nothing) could have you rethinking what it means to be an individual trying to maintain a sense of identity in a society that sometimes demands you lose yourself to stay alive.

"The narrative of *Gravity of Center* deals with the idea that, on one hand, human beings need each other to survive, but on the other hand have a deep need for individualism," Quijada said. "The question is, 'What is your role in a small group, a gang?' Are you a leader? Are you the flunky? There's always a hierarchy, an alpha male, a matriarch, etc. We look at all sides of these questions through each individual dancer's journey."

# Invasion of the Metal Monsters

Clutch and Hellyeah. Two bands that aren't quite household names but nonetheless command a considerable and dedicated following throughout the country. Both bands could be considered veterans. One is a supergroup of sorts. And they both specialize in serving up raw helpings of lowpretense hard rock and heavy metal.

The band Hellyeah is something of a supergroup made up of a who's who in heavy metal: vocalist Chad Gray and gui-

tarist Greg Tibbett from Muddvayne, guitarist Tom Maxwell from Nothingface and drummer Vinnie Paul of Pantera and Damageplan fame. Bassist Bob Zilla (also from Damageplan) currently rounds out the lineup, although that slot was originally filled by Jerry Montano.

After forming in 2006 and writing and recording at Paul's Texas homestead, their eponymous debut was released in 2007 to no small amount of fanfare, meeting a great deal of anticipation with a marketing push relatively rare in heavy metal these days. Surprisingly, their album largely lived up to

or exceeded expectations, delivering a raw and blistering set of mosh pit anthems with a handful of ballads thrown in for good measure.

While it may not have been particularly innovative or clever, it was a potent blend of various hard rock and heavy metal elements, and the band members stuck to what they knew best and delivered a strong set of songs that fit just as well on the radio or at a backyard barbecue as they did in concert. Their sophomore effort, *Stampede*, released in 2010, delivered on more of the same style of unpretentious hard

Lyrically, part of the straightforward simplicity of the band may come from vocalist and primary songwriter Gray. The lead singer's other band, Mudvayne, is known for its complex and sophisticated lyrics, and Gray has stated that he approaches his work in Hellyeah differently from his work in Mudvayne. "I've always separated Mudvayne and Hellyeah as much as I could, even though it was my voice," he said in a press release. "Melodies, lyrics and just the overall style of writing were different [in both bands]."

Hellyeah also recently announced that they have completed work on their third album, *Band of Brothers*, and that

it will be released this June. The song titles that they've released so far indicate that the band is continuing in the same direction as they have since they formed in 2006. "War in Me," "Rage Burn" and "Drink, Drank, Drunk" all seem to fit the aggressive and volatile motif established on their first two recordings. But band members say the new album is going to be bigger and heavier.

"On our first two records, we were a new band. We really wanted to branch out and expand and experiment with all different styles," Paul told the website Loudwire in an

comprised of members well-known from other bands, but they are a band of veterans in a stable and long-running lineup which is the subject of no small amount of reverence from their dedicated fans. The band formed in Germantown, Maryland in 1991 and has maintained virtually the same lineup throughout its entire existence. The only lineup change since the early 90s came in 2005 when the band added a keyboardist (Clutch have featured on-record keyboards since the release of their self-titled Elektra debut in 1995).

While heavy metal may be their most obvious touch-

stone, as something of a post-modern genre-blending band from the 1990s, Clutch also mix in elements of funk. classic rock and blues along with literate, sometimes cryptic and often humorous lyrics. The band last released a new studio album in 2009. Strange Cousins from the West. In 2010 they released a live DVD, Clutch: Live at the 9:30, recorded at the 9:30 nightclub in Washington. DC. This year will also see the re-release of three of their past studio albums on limited edition vinyl: Blast Tyrant (2004), Robot Hive/Exodus (2005) and From Beale Street to Oblivion (2007).

Despite having a long established fan base (vocalist Neil Fallon has stated that "We've been around long enough now that we are beginning to see moms and dads bring their kids to Clutch shows. That's a great feeling."), Clutch aren't content to rest on their laurels. As recently as 2010, the band found themselves touring with Black Label Society and Children of Bodom, two bands who don't necessarily share the same fan base as Clutch. As Fallon told the website Metalsucks, "I think that when we were offered that tour we said ... 'that's kind of odd,' but we also said that about Marilyn Manson. Those tours, when you put yourself out in a little bit of uncharted waters, you get a greater reaction. I think maybe people had heard of the band's name but never actually heard us play. That was good. You can't always preach to the converted."

Clutch haven't released an album since 2009, but they keep busy with touring, running their own record label and working on side projects. Their most well known side project is the Bakerton Group, an instrumental jam band made up of four of the band's members.



interview published this February. "We all come from traditional metal bands and backgrounds, so it was a great breath

In the fall of that year guitarist Tom Maxwell said in an interview on examiner.com "I think the next record will get a little heavier. A little darker. Mean. A mean record, the

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# A Collaborative Effort

As it winds up its 77th season – a number which makes it the third oldest children's theatre in the country – Fort Wayne Youtheatre is pulling out one of the most popular of all children's tales, one which has transcended simple fairy tales to become a cultural touchstone for generations, *Rip Van Winkle*. The man who took the fabled 25-year nap is universally known and beloved, and the Washington Irving tale, with its strange creatures and woodland atmosphere, is ripe for reinterpretation since there are just so many nooks and crannies to the story and setting.

To bring the story to life, Youtheatre is pulling out

all the stops, collaborating with two local dance organizations - Fort Wayne Dance Collective and Fort Wayne Ballet – to bring depth to both the performances and the theatre experiences of the young students who are learning stagecraft and technique. It is that kind of education that Fort Wayne Youtheatre has brought to the community since it began in 1934. While always changing, growing and evolving with the times, Youtheatre has even thrived during some fairly significant transi-

tions. After helming the entire operation for more than three decades, Artistic Director Harvey Cocks, perhaps the most famed theatre icon in Fort Wayne history, was joined two years ago by Youtheatre alum Leslie Hormann who now fills the executive director role.

Already well

known to Fort Wayne radio fans as Leslie Stone, a talk show host and one-time partner to Doc West, Hormann was already used to working alongside Fort Wayne royalty when she took on her duties at Youtheatre in June 2010. In addition to her work with the Youtheatre kids and her writing efforts which result in many of the plays those students perform, Hormann's other significant contribution to the Youtheatre cause has been pulling the offices out of the basement of the Arts United Center. Long tucked into the dark bowels of the building, Hormann seized the opportunity to move 'em on up to the first floor, space emptied by the move of Arts United to the Auer Center for Arts and Culture, a move which not only provides a more pleasant working environment but provides the organization with a much higher profile, making them now visible to all who attend events at AUC.

But in the end what most matters for Fort Wayne Youtheatre are the classes and performances at the heart of its mission. Tackling the Irving tale – last staged by Youtheatre in 1976 under the direction of Larry Wardlaw – was an act of love for Hormann who was anxious to bring it to one of her first seasons as

"It's always been one of my very favorite classic

fairy tales. Youtheatre had done it when I was in seventh grade, and since I had just been in the previous production I didn't audition for it. But I worked in the light booth, and I just loved the story. When I sat down to write it, I could just picture it all so clearly in my head, all the eerie and weird stuff that's going on with these strange little creatures."

Part of what she envisioned included dance sequences, which provided a great opportunity to reach out to other arts organizations. As it happened, both were now neighbors of Youtheatre with the move of Fort Wayne Ballet to the Auer Center just across the street. Work with the Fort Wayne Dance Collective began first, however, with Kelly Holt working with

students this spring semester.

"Fifteen Forest Park Elementary kids met every Tuesday morning before school to work on this," said Hormann. "I covered theatre with them in the fall, and this semester they've been working with Kelly on

dance. I just knew from the time I was writing it that Dance Collective could do something really different with those strange gnomes and that whole atmosphere, and they're so great with their outreach and working with the community."

She had something completely different in mind for the time when Rip Van Winkle wakes up, coming back into the world after a quarter-century slumber in the woods. Hormann said her vision on what it would be like was clear: a man so deeply entrenched in the forest that he was now a part of it. To convey those surroundings, she knew who she needed to contact.

"I have always been the biggest fan of Karen Gibbons-Brown," she said of the executive/artistic director of Fort Wayne Ballet. "She's a personal, professional and artistic hero to me for all she's done in the community. I so clearly imagined how her dancers could bring so much to that scene. The students are really excited to work with her, and I'm so happy to be able to expand the theatre program here to include more dance by bringing both the Dance Collective and Fort Wayne Ballet in to work with them. It both exposes the kids to different dance experiences and introduces them to other ways they can perform on stage."

# Third Generation Blues Heroes

For The Kinsey Report the blues are as thick as blood. Brothers Donald, Kenneth and Ralph Kinsey, sons of the great, late Lester "Big Daddy" Kinsey, have taken that blood and pumped it into a powerhouse blues band. With 25 years together as a band and a lifetime as bothers, The Kinsey Report play with an unmatched level of intuition and unity. They give new meaning to the notion of being "in the

Natives of Gary, the Kinsey Report bring their brand of rockin' blues to The Philmore on Broadway Saturday, April 21.

With six recordings to date, including one with Big Daddy, The Kinsey Report have been one of the hottest acts on the Chicago blues scene since the late 1980s. Their sound has been described as street smart, modern and funky. Or perhaps it was funky and modern with street smarts. In any event, the band knows what it's doing and how to do it. Growing up around the masters of the genre certainly did not hurt.


The history of The Kinsey Report begins not with Big Daddy but with Big Daddy's daddy, Lester Kinsey Sr. The elder Lester displayed his musical skills as a firebrand preacher at Gary's Chase Street Church of God in Christ for nearly 50 years. It was there Big Daddy and the Kinsey kids got their first taste of music that stirred the soul.

"My grandfather's church had so much energy going on with the music, people would shout and jump," Kenneth Kinsey wrote in the liner notes of the band's 1998 release, Smoke and Steel. "That's where a lot of our musical influences – especially our rhythm – comes

The Mississippi Delta was home to Big Daddy until after World War II when he moved north to Gary. Like so many of his contemporaries, Big Daddy started playing music in the church, where he learned harmonica and gospel-style slide guitar. While working in

the steel mills he began emulating Muddy Waters' style and after the birth of Ralph and Donald, in 1952 and '53, quickly

made the blues a family affair. He gave Ralph a snare drum and Donald a guitar, and by the time Donald



was in his early teens he'd acquired the nickname "B. B. King Jr." Kenneth, who came along in 1963, began playing bass as soon as he could hold one.

Performing with their father as The Constellations, they acted as backing band on Eddie Silvers' 1969 single "Funky Fun in the Ghetto." In the early 70s the family band toured the South as Big Daddy Kinsey & His Fabulous Sons. But in 1972 Ralph enlisted in the Air Force and Donald wound up as the backing guitarist for Albert King, a pretty good gig for 20 year old. During his three years with King Donald picked up more than a few tips, including a suggestion to play fewer notes, but to make them count.

By 1975 Donald had left King and Ralph had left the Air Force. So they formed a new band, a bluesy metal trio called White Lightning. They signed with Island Records for one self-titled release. While with Island, Donald caught the eye of label-mates Peter Tosh and Bob Marley. Donald played on Tosh's Legalize It and toured with him for a

while before joining the Wailers and touring with Marley. Donald Kinsey has been credited with infusing reggae with blues/rock guitar leads. Donald played on the Rastaman Vibration sessions and on the subsequent tour, which resulted in the concert flick Babylon by Bus.

In what he called "the ultimate freakiness" of his life, Donald was sitting next to Marley when a would-be assassin shot and wounded Marley.

Back with Tosh for the record Bush Doctor and for the 1978 Rolling Stones tour, which featured Tosh as opener, Donald finished his life-changing reggae career with the Wailers on Marley's final tour.

The Kinsey brothers reunited in 1984 as The Kinsey Report and played on Big Daddy's first solo record. Bad Situation. In 1987, without Big Daddy, The Kinsey Report signed with Alligator Records and released their first record, Edge of the City. The much-lauded follow-up, 1989's Midnight Drive, more than lived up to the promise of their debut. Guitar Player called Midnight Drive "one of the most exciting albums ever issued by Alligator ... immaculate and soul-

But following Midnight Drive The Kinsey Report switched labels. Their next two records on the Pointblank label, 1991's Powerhouse and 1994's Cross-

ing Bridges, veered away from the blues toward a heavy, rock edge. But by 1998 The Kinsey Report were back in the Alligator fold with the acclaimed release *Smoke and Steel*.

The Kinsey brothers remain a tight-knit group, even after the 2001 death of Big Daddy. The stuff they learned early on from their father and grandfather still drives the band today. For any fan of the blues, The Kinsey Report live is a must-see show.

derstand what it is to be an outsider and to not quite feel like you fit in, and I think they see that in the character. It's just a unique and magical experience, sometimes very funny too.'

Audiences keep coming back to Blue Man Group, proof of its enduring appeal. But actors keep returning to the roles, as well for a variety of reasons.

"It's a great company with a lot of great people," says Allmandinger. "When you're on the tour it's full-time, and the group really comes a family. You live together in the hotel, work together at the theatre and travel together. You're with each other all the time which can sometimes be a bit much, but it's

great spending time with them too." Another appeal to the show is the opportunity to travel internationally, and Allmandinger has enjoyed long stints in world capitals like London and Tokyo. It was after a year spent in Tokyo that Allmandinger took a sabbatical from the production, going with his wife to New York City to try to get some new jobs.

"I spent the time going to auditions, and I didn't end up getting anything, but I did get to do some work with New York University, working with their drama department to provide workshops. It's good to get away from time to time and do something different and know you have the flexibility of returning to Blue Man

With plans to head to Los Angeles to audition for

television and film projects after the current tour, Allmandinger says he looks forward to using one aspect of his talent that lies essentially dormant when putting on the blue

"I'm looking forward to rediscovering



my voice. I don't use it during Blue Man Group, so I'm anxious to use that part of me again, to find some work in TV or film or even some commercials and voice-over work."

For better or worse, taking the stage night after night, year after year, as a member of Blue Man Group provides little in the way of recognizability, a fact which has both

es for Allmandinger.

"It's fun sometimes to walk past groups of people who have just seen the show and hear what they have to say about it. I can just vanish into the crowd because they have no idea that I was just one of the people on the stage. I'm essentially anonymous which I

actually like. But then again it can also lead to interesting conversations with casting directors who may have seen me perform but aren't sure how that will translate into whatever it is that they're looking to cast right

Anonymity works for Allmandinger though since he doesn't aspire to stardom. Rather, he just wants to be a working actor. He credits a supportive family who put up with the noisy years of drumming and who also encouraged him to pursue his passion for performing. His grandfather, the first person to inspire his chosen career, has since passed away, but Allmandinger says he was able to share his success with him before he

"He saw me perform in a number of productions, and he saw me in Blue Man Group in Chicago. He was very proud of me. I've been very lucky to have a family who have always been behind me in whatever

# A Winning Combination

Scratch the surface of the band Shunned and you'll find more that you expected. They're angry, they're heavy and they're looking out for kids in need. They're here, then gone, then back. They're an original metal band with an infectious sound and experience-driven lyrics who twist within their genre, branching into new styles of metal. Most of all, contrary to their name, Shunned are a hard band to turn your back on.

Formed in 2001 by John Herrera and Scott Earley, the Shunned project was long in the works. Earley, who had been drumming for the band Downbreed, was ejected from the group. He called Herrera the same day to discuss starting their long talked about

project. "We had been trying to do it since '98, and every time we caught each other it was like, 'Well, I'm in between projects, but you're working.' But in 2001 we actually named the band and went forward." Herrera said. So, along with Brandon Thrasher and Michael Granger, they set their sights on metal heaven.

In 2003, Shunned independently released and hand-distributed their debut album, Victims of Circumstances. The album was filled with a certain gloom and anger lurking behind the growling, screaming

and melodic vocals weaved throughout. Tuned-down guitars helped to get that low, heavy, crunchy sound that makes them so recognizably original. "When we started off we were a cross between Sevendust, Dope and Switched. We kind of had the edgy, almost alternative sound," said Herrera. But bands, much like anything in life, change with the passage of time, and soon Shunned stumbled into a sticky situation that put a halt to the group as they knew it.

In 2006, shortly after bass player Michael Granger left, Herrera also stepped away from the band and Earley brought in a replacement. Confusion and misunderstanding ensued, leaving the group disjointed. Years passed before Granger was replaced by James Gates, and Herrera reclaimed his position in the group, cleaning up the mess and the image of Shunned.

Though bass player James Gates was not an original member of the Shunned lineup in 2001, he was an early fan and had some outside perspective on the progression of Shunned. "I remember the first show I saw with these guys after the new album. I walked straight up to John, and I said, 'I need a CD and a shirt right now,'" Gates said. Now he is a part of the sound of that progression. "I've been friends with these guys for many, many years, and I've seen the evolution; and to hear the differences in the sound between the stuff that they were doing before and [what they are doing] now, while it's a natural progression, it's a world apart." Gates said.

Herrera agrees that the change in tone for Shunned was natural and inevitable. Time, experience and age

will affect your creative output. "As we grew and as we played out more, we got heavier and heavier, and we eventually decided we were just going to do what we do best," said Herrera.

Shunned have promoted themselves in unexpected and original ways since their beginnings. "We're sponsoring an MMA fighter, Relentless Heather Bess. Her entrance music is "Twist," the last song of our album. And then we have a pro wrestler that has been using our song "Face It" for years," Herrera said.

Aside from attaching themselves to professional wrestlers (a sport Gates says is a natural marriage to the kind of music they play), Shunned market themselves as a package group with what they call The Local Neck Wrecker Union 66. "It's Scott's band Ko-



heleth and James's band Born Under Burden; we all tour as a package," Herrera said. Forming the Union lit the spark of inspiration that would lead to more out-of-the-box ideas the group could participate in, like holding charity benefit shows.

In 2010, Shunned began holding annual charity benefit shows "not so much like the corny 'I'm giving back' thing, according to Herrera, but "more like 'let's do something different and let's not talk about it; let's just make it happen." This year, SCAN will be the object of their largesse as they plan for a full day's worth of shows in July and gather even more bands to play and raise money. It's not just about the marketing and the publicity; sometimes it's about being different and keeping the focus of a group in the right place. "I don't want this to be a selfish endeavor," said Herrera.

Shunned will release an EP this summer, the first new material they have produced in years. To go along with the release, they'll be making a music video for the song "Just Like You." Half of that video will be shot at C2G on May 25 with what Herrera is hoping is a large crowd of fans.

Herrera, Gates, Thrasher and Earley all aspire to turn Shunned into something more than a regional bar band; they're pushing for national recognition. Though kick-started by creative marketing techniques, the benefit shows and publicity, the success of Shunned will come when they are heard. Good musicianship, a talent for creativity and the ability to play the heavy-hitting metal of their dreams is a winning combination.

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
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#### D Ferren

For Glare & Gun

D Ferren founded the band Hipnoses and Sockmonkey in the 90s and in 2001 released his first solo album, *Saint of Life and the Morning After Cavalier*. Drawing comparisons to Dinosaur Jr and Jack White, the record was co-produced by Jason Davis of Streetlamps For Spotlights



"Merilee" starts the album off with a gently strummed acoustic, then accompanied by organ and drums. As the song progresses, more instrumentation is introduced. At the 3:30 mark a brass section comes in, and we're suddenly transported to a cantina south of the border and wondering about a girl named Merilee while drinking warm Tecates. "Two Dollar Bill," with its fiddle and rolling snare, sounds like something off of Wilco's A.M. Ferren has one of those voices that sounds so familiar, yet you just can't quite place it. At times he's reminiscent of *Mutations*-era Beck, at other times a less constipated Jay Farrar, although Farrar could never write anything this fun. Backing vocals from Wooden Satellite's Andrea Harvey take songs such as "The Ballad of Gram Parsons," "Going to Phoenix" and "Elephant Tears" to another level. "Elephant Tears" is the album's most experimental track, starting out with drones and noise that evolves into a 70s-era, organ-fueled, long jam, complete with a great sax solo not unlike Wayne Shorter's celebrated solo on Steely Dan's Aja. Put your headphones on for this.

D Ferren gets by with a little help from his friends, and *For Glare & Gun* is an album of wonderfully written songs, ornamented by excellent musicians. The album was recorded once again with co-producer Davis directly to tape. Davis pulled multiple duties on drums, organ, piano, bass and probably the kitchen sink. In addition to Harvey's vocals, Bob Craven's pedal steel brings the songs he's on to a whole other level. This record feels like a lost gem, newly found; we get to enjoy it once again and wonder how we ever got along without it. You get beautiful ballads, desert strummers, experimental jams and ramshackle alternative country that at times feels like it's falling apart at its drunken seams. But like the best of the best, D Ferren and company bring it all back together in the end.

Get a hold of D Ferren's *For Glare & Gun*, put on some headphones and reap the rewards. (*John Hubner*)

#### Joey 0

Joey's Blues

Joey O follows in the tradition of guitar gurus such as Jeff Beck, Jimi Hendrix, Buddy Guy and Stevie Ray Vaughn. He takes the traditional blues formula and puts his own spin on it. The blues are a tricky style to make a name with. Sure, any guitar student could tell vou what the 12-



Album opener 'Love To Spare' has a shuffle to it that makes you want to move. It has a *Double Trouble* vibe and a pool hall machismo that gives it some grease and grit. Joey O's playing is old school blues, but with just a hint of guitar slinger lean that gives you the feeling he's holding back a barrage of 32nd notes that would tear the flesh off your face. "The Devil I Know" is straight up juke joint blues, hot, sweaty and woozy. Otis Rush would be proud. "For Donna" is a bit of a departure. It's more reminiscent of the mid-80s Mike Varney and Shrapnel Records heyday, something Greg Howe might've put out before his brother started singing for him. It's very minor key, a nice showcase for Joey O's chops.

"Auburn Sunrise," which brings to mind Joe Satriani's The Ex-

#### Nirvana

**Nevermind** ((1991)

Living in California in the late 80s and early 90s was a blessing because I was able to hear and see bands that were either unsigned, or on smaller labels. Not all of it was good, but some of it changed music forever.



Bands like Primus, Rage Against The Machine, Jane's Addiction and Nirvana each captured a little bit of what I wanted to hear: alternative rock and roll with a social/political (mostly cynical) look at life, behind daft lyrics and sick guitars.

This album came out just after my 26th birthday (a week after Guns N' Roses' *Use Your Illusion* and a week before Soundgarden's *Badmotorfinger*). Clearly, rock n' roll was back, and I couldn't have been happier.

Kurt Cobain, drummer Dave Grohl and bassist Krist Novoselic (along with producer Butch Vig) rolled out a dozen of the best songs I had heard on one record in a long time.

It opens with "Smells Like Teen Spirit," which was in heavy rotation on MTV. "In Bloom" followed with heavy parts in the chorus and simple grungy guitars as a backdrop to the gritty vocals and the surreal drumming from Grohl. You just have to see the video to enjoy this track. "Come As You Are" was another popular single and, ironically, another track with the word "gun" in it. "Lithium" starts off as a mellow ballad before exploding into modified hard rock, while "Polly" takes it down a notch. "Territorial Pissings" comes at you with hardcore riffs and an almost punk sound as Cobain takes the vocals up a couple of notches. The balance of side two is outstanding in every way.

I was lucky enough to see Nirvana in San Francisco back in 1990 and 1991. And you know the rest of the story, as it's been 18 years. (*Dennis Donahue*)

tremist album, is a great guitar melody. I do hear a lot of Satriani in Joey O's tasty playing. Making a great instrumental album is a tricky feat. It's not just laying down a generic rhythm section and shredding for 45 minutes. You have to create nuance and melody before you can lay down the real fret work. Jeff Beck did it with Blow By Blow and Satriani did it, well, he's still doing it. Joey O, too, has found that great balance.

"Born To Love You" throws us a curve ball. This barely twominute track that leaves the listener wanting more of its almost mystical, southwestern mood leads us into the last two songs, "Suburban Blues" and "For Donna Pt. II." The latter is a wonderful track to end this great album on – triumphant and melancholy at the same time. It sounds like Derek and the Dominos covering Santo and Johnny's "Sleepwalk'."

Joey O has done it again. It's the blues, Joey O style. (J.H.)

### Ty Segall and White Fence

With last year's great *Goodbye Bread* Ty Segall arguably became rock n' Roll's best vocalist, howling, humming and crooning at – or even above – the level of today's elite rock gods. Jack White, Cole Alexander, the guy from The Black Keys, etc. Away from the mic Segall also proved his worth as a creative song arranger, putting together an album that mixed garage classicism with



minor, often mellow experiments that reminded of the DIY outsider spirit of an artist like Robert Pollard. Some seriously detailed stuff. The result was one of 2011's most exciting and memorable rock records, full of spirited blasts and memorable personality twists. An intimate record that at times sounded like a drunken army that just woke from a nap. A star-maker set of songs, certainly.

For his next release, easily the most anticipated of his still-young career, Segall has teamed with kindred spirit White Fence, aka Tim Presley, for a short, loud, retro-spirited record called *Hair*.







The immediate problem with Hair is that Ty Segall's name is credited before Presley's namesake. Presley plays the solos and sings most of the songs while Segall plays drums and adds vocals here and there. The lyrical contributions are split up the middle, sure, but it's Presley's guitar that steals the show. That Segall isn't the frontman here doesn't mean the record isn't a good one. It is. Very good. It's messy and loud and trippy, full of wild moments, big guitars and that undefinable appeal that great garage rock recordings have. It's the kind of collection fans of The Stooges' Fun House love to death: a nonstop blast of energy and spirit as told by howling guitars and lo-fi vocals. Pounding drums and charming mistakes. Rock n' roll for people who actually like rock n' roll. But damn, what could have been. I suppose the question at hand is obvious: if you're in the studio with Ty Segall, why have anyone but Ty Segall sing?

"Easy Ryder," the only track where Segall clearly sings lead, is, aside from maybe a track called "Tongues," the instant standout - the single, if albums like this still had singles. We hear Segall's effortless drawl over a mid-tempo track that chugs through with the same stoner spirit we heard on last year's Goodbye Bread. While nearly every other track on Hair is messy and full of musical shifts and guitar squeals, "Easy Ryder" is a straightforward pop track. A damn good one, too. Next up after the "Ryder" is the record's second most accessible track, titled "The Black Glove/Rag." Presley's hook is quick and clear and memorable, and his guitar feels so perfectly retro, especially in the "Black Glove" section of the track. It's a killer tune that could make any proper rocker dope want to quit his job, move into Mom's garage, slow down and play loud music. Stay up all night rocking. Kick the pricks.

These two slower, more instantly accessible tracks are a nice detour on what is otherwise a balls-out garage rock record with big solos, aching howls and some amazing pseudopsychedelic moments. All together, *Hair* amounts to a short, memorable collection of songs that feel authentically retro. That said just about everyone who explores this particular.

disc will hear "Easy Ryder" and wish that the guy who sang that song sang lead on all the songs. But Tim Presley is a great rock n' roll vocalist too, and he does a nice job of offering this duo collaboration a cohesiveness it might have otherwise lacked. Mostly, we hear two very cool, very talented young rockers having a blast together, enjoying nd supporting each other's huge talents – a stopgap release before both Segall and White Fence release proper solo records later this year. Can't hardly wait. For now, retro freak outs, pounding drums and howling solos it is. (*Greg W. Locke*)

#### Django Django Django Django

Django Django are a British quartet that met in Edinburgh, Scotland while attending art school. And from the sound of their self-titled debut they don't pull their influences from the usual bag of musical



inspiration. The Beatles? Nah. Nirvana? No way. Try putting a genre on these guys. I dare you. There's no shoegaze, grunge, garage rock, 90s alternative, chillwave or math rock. These lads defy a label. Throw some names around like Syd Barrett, Animal Collective, The Beta Band and even Devo and possibly, just possibly, you might be on the right track.

The album opener, a short little instrumental that comes in like *Tangram*-era Tangerine Dream, leads us into "Hail Bop," a nice slice of 60s psychedelic that would've fit nicely somewhere on *Piper at the Gates of Dawn*. If Pink Floyd doesn't butter your toast, relax, we're just getting started. Continuing on with the 60s psych flavor, "Default" comes in like a storm, and nice retro guitar is added to the mix. With robot bleeps and blips, this track has a real spacey, futuristic vibe. And thanks to the Devo-esque kinetic drums, you'll want to hop out of your comfy spot on the couch and dance

like it's 1981.

At one point on the track "Skies Over Cairo" you'd swear someone was playing the desert level on Super Mario Bros. "Zumm Zumm" is like a B-side off of *Merriweather Post Pavillion*, like "Lion In A Coma" through a funhouse mirror.

On several occasions throughout this kinetic, futuristic and funky-in-a-Devo-way album, Django Django seem to be carrying the torch that Animal Collective began running with on *Merriweather*. These are pop sensibilities run through a confectioners oven, sprinkled with sugar and hallucinogenics – anxious rhythms, pulsating synths and pop harmonies somwhere between Barrett-era Floyd, Ride and a barbershop quartet on ether.

The sound of this record has a real "sat in the attic for years" kind of vibe. There's a real analog warmth to the synths, as if Kraftwerk lent out their *Trans Europe Express*-era moogs to these blokes for the weekend. I know there are plug-ins for that kind of aged, buzzy analog tape vibe, but I like to think Django Django recorded this robot love-making soundtrack in a dank, dark, mildewed studio with a 30-year-old 8-track reel-to-reel running and a drunk, 63-year-old sound engineer named Simon running the board and splicing takes together like Macero and Miles did with *Bitches Brew* nearly 40 years ago in a studio much like Muscle Shoals, except located on the Isle Of Wight, instead of the Crimson Tide.

Django Django have given us an album of dance music for the living room booty shakers. This is psychedelic music for the non-medicated. This is inspirational music for the car poolers, full-timers and those just hanging out. We have been initiated. Now prepare to be blown away. No magic mush-rooms required. (J.H.)

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# As It Turns Out, Death Isn't Much Fun

Stay Awake by Dan Chaon, Ballantine Books, 2012

Dan Chaon's world is brutal, and it doesn't make any sense. Death stalks the characters of the stories in *Stay Awake*, either in memory or in the future, and there's no escaping the cold nothingness of the end. That doesn't sound very cheery, does it? Well, it's not, and Chaon's stories are bleak; they consider what it's like to be alive and to die, and they refuse to be very happy or hopeful about any of it. What they refuse to do most of all, though, is to give us any firm answers to hold on to. We're on our own when it comes to drawing conclusions about all this, just like Chaon's characters are.

The 12 stories in *Stay Awake* are intimately related to one another, not just because similar events keep popping up again and again in story after story, but because there's a tight cluster of themes running through all the stories, questions asked by those events and personalities that many of the stories share. They are clearly questions that nag at Chaon, and he seems determined to revisit them, picking at them like one would pick at a hangnail, until he figures it all out. He never does figure it out, and eventually that becomes the point.

Death, violent and catastrophic, plods through every one of the stories, and if someone doesn't die, someone comes awfully close. Multiple characters are involved in horrific car crashes, usually emerging "lucky to be alive," sometimes coming out of the ordeal broken and shattered. Necks and backs are broken, rehabilitation is contemplated, paralysis is narrowly escaped. Other charac-



ters fall – out of trees, off of ladders, sometimes losing a digit in the process (it happens to two different characters). It's not just accidental death, either; there's plenty of murder in these stories, too – multiple murders, attempted murders, contemplated

murders. And suicides several suicides. The book's body count is impressive.

Wrapped in all the death is the theme of parenthood, and it doesn't get handled with any sentimentality either. Parents abandon children, either literally by trying to flee (only to be brought up short by being nearly paralyzed in a car accident), or by committing suicide, or by committing infanticide. Sometimes

we get to see the abandonment f r o m the point of view of the parent; more often we see it through the eyes of the children.

If the parents can't be counted on in these stories, we at least have siblings to turn to. Brothers and sisters try to carry on, supporting each other as they struggle separately with the traumas inflicted upon them by their parents and the world at large. Even in a world as perilous and unforgiving as

this, family is important.

But what does it all mean, this bloody grappling of death and life? Where is it leading? Why do we have to be involved in it, and will we ever be able to understand? The characters try mightily to piece the puzzle together, looking for signs and symbols and clues. Messages weave through the stories, scrawled on bathroom walls, tacked to front doors, written on a Post-It and stuck

to computer monitors, inked on an arm with permanent marker. It's tempting to think that if you could just figure out how every note, every symbol, every fragment of meaning was meant to be chained together with the next one, you might be able to understand, to comprehend what it all means and what's coming next.

Maybe, though, just maybe all the clues don't mean anything. Maybe the real answer is as simple as staying awake or going to sleep, holding on or letting go. That's the conclusion that Chaon ultimately

seems to reach, that behind us and in front of us is only nothingness, and everything in between is an hallucination.

It's not a comforting answer, and it's not much fun getting there, wading through these grim stories and their numbing sameness. Like all stories that aim to deconstruct themselves, disassemble themselves as we read them until we have nothing left to hold on to, these stories are not satisfying.

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#### The Lie

In the opening scene of *The Lie* Lonnie (Joshua Leonard) goes to see a therapist (Jane Adams) about his, ahem, "anxiety" issues. His goal here is to get a prescription for medical marijuana, and after some blatant manipulation on his part (he says he wants a more "organic" and less "western" treatment than drugs) he eventually gets it.

But here's the thing: Lonnie, it turns out, really does have a lot of anxiety, his outward neo-hippie mellowness notwithstanding. Also, he really does disapprove of western medicine, so much so that he's horrified when his wife Clover (Jess Weixler, Teeth) announces she's seriously considering accepting a job offer from a pharmaceutical corporation.

About that anxiety: Lonnie hates his job. Hates it. When asked at social gatherings what his job is, he always says "musician," but he actually makes his living editing local TV commercials. His boss (Gerry Bednob) is verbally abusive, and the work steals time that he could spend pursuing his dreams of being a rock star with his best bud Tank (Mark Webber). Every day that he goes into work is a struggle.

And then one day, he just can't do it. He walks up to the front door of the company ... and then walks away. He calls in and tells a small lie and gets an earful from the boss. The next day is the same story, but this time his boss is screaming and swearing at him, and in the heat of the moment Lonnie tells a lie that is so egregious that as soon as it leaves his lips he knows nothing in his life can ever be the same again.

Based on a short story by T.C. Boyle and directed by Leonard himself (this is his feature length directorial debut, but as an actor he's been an indie mainstay since *The Blair Witch Project*), *The Lie* tells a very simple but very human – and quite funny and unexpectedly moving – story about what happens when you tell a lie so hor-

rible that (a) everyone automatically believes you because nobody could conceive that someone would say it if it weren't true and (b) it could jeopardize Lonnie's marriage in addition to his job once it comes out, which it's bound to do.

Everyone who has ever had a job they were convinced was sapping their very soul, or who is still struggling to retain their youthful idealism even after the responsibilities of adulthood begin to make it very difficult, will find much to relate to and admire here. Some really good indie movies gain traction and become surprise hits. (Some really bad ones do, too.) This is a really good indie movie that it seems almost no one has heard of. Don't let that dissuade you from watching one of the sharpest and most compelling domestic dramas of the year

Like Crazy

Like Crazy, directed by Drake Doremus, begins with Jacob (Anton Yelchin) and Anna (Felicity Jones) quickly and easily falling in love. Unlike the characters in most American romances, the leads in this movie act and talk like real people. That is to say, they don't say overly scripted and clever things, and they're sometimes a little awkward around each other. But they've fallen in love, and that's all that matters.

asking that now about Will Ferrell. What would possess him to make a film, entirely in Spanish, in which he plays a dim-witted big hearted Mexican rancher? Ferrell is the driving force behind Casa di mi Padre, the very funny comedy that mocks and offends at every turn.

The ratio of laughs to offense will depend on what sensibilities you bring this unique exercise of parody or homage. Again, parody or homage? I saw it as two taste treats in one.

I will first invoke a "Saturday Night Live" standard. Plenty of former SNL cast members have put out movies much less funny and more offensive than Casa. And if you were laughing this weekend as Sophia Vergara mocked her accent and Penelope Cruz, then you maybe should not be too hard

Ferrell brings his signature play-itstraight-never-break-character schtick to the role of Armando Alvarez, the brother who stayed at home on his father's ranch while his more ambitious and handsome brother has gone out into the world to seek his for-

Armando herds cattle and trades dumb jokes and overly long laughs with his buddies Esteban (Efren Ramirez, Vote for Pedro!) and Manuel (Adrian Martinez.) In early scenes they roam the range on horseback. One of the clever bits in *Casa* is how fluidly the scenes move from a fake old-style sensibility to a guns- and Escalade-furnished

Papa Alvarez (played by Pedro Armandariz Jr. who died last year after a long and popular career and to whom the film is dedicated) genially, openly mocks his son, yet Armando loves him and loves the family. "La familia" is one of the most invoked phrases of the film.

Brother Raul (Diego Luna) returns home with his beautiful fiancé Sonia (Genesis Rodriguez) for a wedding and a quieter life. Armando and Sonia share a love of the land. Each gives an impassioned hilariously clichéd speech about their connections to the natural elements, and we can see the repressed sparks fly.

Casa di mi Padre is most hilarious when it is mocking the conventions of television and movies. After a ride around the ranch, Sonia and Armando stop for a heart-to-heart in what Armando describes as the most beautiful place on earth. It is a fabulously tacky studio set complete with pond, fake plants and a backdrop that suggests nothing more vividly than a setting taken from "Bonanza," with cinematography to match.

The plot of Casa di mi Padre is similarly plastic. The beloved brother Raul is, of course, a drug lord. He is in competition



and at war with "Onza," Gael Garcia Bernal. And the DEA is lukewarm on their trail. Nick Offerman of "Parks and Recreation," brings the same "who cares what happens to them?" attitude he has on that show to this movie. In the movie, he has that suspiciously not exaggerated DEA philosophy that if he just waits long enough, these guys will all kill each other and save us all a lot of trouble. All sides of the equation are dripping with disdain for each other. There are no funnier bits in the film than when Armando waxes philosophical about how whiny, lazy, selfish and drug-addled Americans are.

There is no need to mention much more about plot. Lots of people get shot - very theatrically - before a tidy resolution that would fit any television soap opera or Bmovie south or north of the border. What is fun is how it gets to the end. In addition to a "Bonanza"-like landscape for key scenes, there are stuffed animals used to scare and inspire. There is a "love-making" scene that involves lots of shots attractive and not so attractive bare butts and a few shots of plastic butts thrown in for good measure.

All actors and actresses are bedazzled in amusingly cartoonish bling, hair styles and wardrobe. The music is surprisingly good. Casa di mi Padre is played straight as it makes fun, so music and language come off surprisingly authentic, at least to my very gringa eyes. Ferrell's Spanish may not be perfect, but it is still impressive.

The seemingly straight respect for music and language is endearing. If you go to Casa di mi Padre expecting a slapstick, in-yourface-comedy, you will be disappointed. I laughed a lot but, as I've noted, very often at the media send ups. The murderous wedding sequence, for example, is more Godfather than anything else, and I kept laughing the more the bullets flew.

Written by Andrew Steele and directed by Matt Piedmont, two longtime Ferrell collaborators, Casa di mi Padre has the feel of a lot of Ferrell vehicles, so I also laughed at Ferrell. Here he is doing the same job on a stereotype of Mexican cinema that he did for the homophobic redneck Nascar crowd in Talledega Nights: The Ballad of Ricky Bobby; vain, narcissistic media weasels in Anchorman: The Legend of Ron Burgundy; tacky, gold chain-wearing bridge and tunnel guys in A Night at the Roxbury; immature ex-frat boys in Old School; and on and on. Honestly, I think he might be running out of white guy types to ridicule.

The filmmaking team may not have reached the Napoleon Dynamite vision of cult admiration they aspire to, though again, I would vote for Pedro, and I was glad to see him. Still, I can imagine Casa di mi Padre having a longer life on video and television than it is enjoying in theaters.



# Rising to the Challenge of Bertold Brecht

As an actress I have always found the most satisfaction in portraying roles I find challenging. Shen Te certainly did not disappoint on this front, and I began the rehearsal process eager to face the host of unique challenges this character presented.

A kind and self-sacrificing person at heart, Shen Te is forced by circumstances to create a male alias (Shui Ta) in order to protect herself and her shop. While Shui Ta and Shen Te are obviously the same person, I had to approach them as two interrelated yet separate individuals. Aside from the gender difference between the two characters, their personalities are opposite in many ways. Thus, in order to avoid making

either Shen Te or Shui Ta seem too caricatured, I tried to consistently remind myself that this character has a specific purpose in mind for every action she takes. In doing so, I incorporated many analytical preparation techniques I have learned in my first-year theatre classes.

While envisioning and embodying Shen Te has taught me much, approaching a Brecht play is a learning experience in itself. There are many preconceived notions about Brecht's work and Epic Theatre itself. Our director, Jeffrey Casazza, was thus charged with the task of balancing the classic with the contemporary, a task which he passed onto us as actors. Early in the rehearsal process we addressed the concept of Gestus (embodying a story, idea or attitude with physical gesture and a specific point of view), direct address and



other theatrical conventions Brecht employs. While there is no doubt that The Good Person of Szechuan is highly emotional, there is also an educational element which Brecht - and consequently we as actors - tries

The decision to use music in the show greatly excited me as well. I love music in all forms and enjoy

> expressing my thoughts through song (both on and off the stage, as my family can certainly attest). While musical theatre holds a special place in my heart, Jeff Casazza stressed the fact that Good Person is not a musical but a play with songs. Rather than the characters using the


songs to propel the plot, the songs serve almost as commentary on the action taking place.

The Good Person of Szechuan is a play that manages to say so much in so little time, and I feel blessed to have been a part of such a wonderful production. I hope that this play will move you as much as it has moved me. After all, "It is for you to find a way my friends, to help good men arrive at happy ends.'
