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

The main question surrounding the life

and career of Bob Dylan is this: What is going on in that guy's head? As if the output of that varied and prolific life in art weren't enough, people continually seek some utterance from him, some hoary scroll sent down from the rarefied air of his black tour bus as it rolls down the highway, something, anything, to explain it all. Well, good luck with that.

If anything has been clear in Dylan's spotty answers to all the probing during his 50-year career, it's that if he actually does knows the reasons he did this or wrote that, and if you're looking for someone to provide details, it ain't him, babe. Better to howl at the moon and wait for it to howl back.

Bob Dylan and his Band return to Fort Wayne Friday, August 24 when they will play Parkview Field. Howling at the moon is recommended. The show comes just weeks before the September 11 release of Tempest, Dylan's 35th studio release and his first since 2009, when both Together Through Life and Christmas in the Heart came out.

Dylan just wrapped up a European tour in July and is at the beginning of a North American sweep that will take the 71-yearold troubadour and his Never Ending Tour through mid-November. Interest in his music and life continues to build. In May he was awarded Presidential Medal of Freedom, the country's highest civilian honor. As reported by Rolling Stone, "President Obama said of Dylan, 'There is not a bigger giant in the history of American music,' adding that the 'unique gravel-y power' of his voice helped redefine 'not just what music sounded like, but the message it carried and how it made people feel."

The journalist Jonah Lehrer, in his book Imagine: How Creativity Works used Dylan's song "Like a Rolling Stone" to explain how under the right circumstances the brain can lead a person with writer's block into uncharted territory. Dylan, Lehrer explains, was drained and thought he had nothing left to say. Then, as if guided by an unseen hand, Dylan "grabbed a pencil and started to scribble.'

"I found myself writing this song, this story, this long piece of vomit 20 pages long," Lehrer reports Dylan saying. "I'd never written anything like that before, and should do.'

It's an interesting peek into Dylan's

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at least, or to anyone else for that matter. Lehrer, it turns out, fabricated the Dylan quotes to make his point. Who better to dissect creatively than Bob Dylan? Who worse to make up stuff about?

Dylan rarely discusses his songwriting process. But he does write about the importance of letting a song transform and grow. Chronicles: Volume One, his 2004 stab at an autobiography, is a rambling and recondite account, but it's fascinating all the same and, for the most part, it's all we've got. Two more volumes are planned, as are four more books in a six-book deal signed recently with Simon & Schuster.

Songs are like living things to Dylan. "Folk songs are evasive - the truth about life, and life is more or less a lie, but then again that's exactly the way we want it to be. We wouldn't be comfortable with it any oth-

es, and you must meet them all if you want to play this stuff. A folk song might vary in

meaning and it might not appear the same from one moment to the next. It depends on who's playing and who's listening.'

And, where interviews are concerned, it depends on who's asking the questions.

"My family was my light and I was going to pro-tect that light at all costs," Dylan writes of his retreat from public life in Woodstock, New York, following the huge successes of the mid 60s and of the spotlight blasting its way into his personal life. "That was where my dedication was first, last, and in between. What did I owe the rest of the world? Nothing. Not a damn thing. The press? I figured you lied to it."

Dylan set the pattern from the moment of his first interview with a biographer in Chronicles.

It was 1962 and John Hammond had just signed Dylan to Columbia Records. Hammond, who had recently signed Pete Seeger, called in a promotions guy named Billy James to work up a short bio of their newest find. Dylan writes, "I strolled into his office, sat

down opposite his desk, and he tried to get me to cough up some facts, like I was supposed to give them to him straight and square." Poor Billy James didn't know what he was in for. Asked where he'd come from, Dylan told him Illinois via freight train. Asked where his parents were, Dylan said he didn't know, said they were "long gone."

"I hated these kinds of questions," Dylan writes. "Felt I could ignore them. Billy seemed unsure of me and that was just fine. I didn't feel like answering his questions anyway, didn't feel the need to explain anything

to anybody." Dylan, of course, isn't from Illinois but was born in Duluth and grew up in Hibbing, Minnesota. And his parents were still right where he left them. But his refusal to 'give it to 'em straight' fit nicely with the general facts of the early 1960s folk revival. In January of 1961 Dylan appeared on the Greenwich Village folk scene, having caught a ride in a "4-door sedan - '57 Impala." Most of the rising folk stars didn't come from especially folksy backgrounds. Many, like Dave

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Painting With a Graphics Touch

Though several years it appeared alongside delightfully snappy graphics in the Fort Wayne afternoon daily, the name Sam Minick might be familiar to many area residents.

A Fort Wayne native who loves his small city, Minick started with the newspaper soon after his 1991 graduation from IPFW. But in 2008, at the urging of fellow illustrator Bryon Thompson, he left the paper to grow a freelance business and currently is a successful independent illustrator working primarily with publications such as Outdoor Life, MotorTrend and Smithsonian Magazine. (For examples of his illustrative style, visit www.samillustrations.com.)

At IPFW Minick studied in the fine art's program with a major in graphic design.

"My graduating class was the last one to have classes down on Berry Street," he says with pride, referring to when the college's art department was still centered at the legendary downtown Fort Wayne Art School.

Minick received the best of both worlds in that program: a rigorous schooling in the principles of design and also classes in the traditional studio arts. He cites faculty members George McCullough and Norman Bradley, both noted painters, as having been

particularly enjoyable and influential instructors.

So it comes as no surprise that Minick has been steadily developing a body of fine art as a personal sideline to his daily output of graphics for hire.

In his current show at the Firefly Coffeehouse, Old, New and Ultramarine Blue, it is easy to see how so many years as a graphic artist have informed his painting style. Each composition is taut and executed with aplomb. But there is nothing slick about their polish. Using acrylics for the most part, Minick presses his professional skills into high gear to kick up some fun.

An amusing conversationalist, Minick employs the kind of wit you'd expect from a guy with an intelligent eye. According to his artist statement, "The only common themes between the pieces is the pure escapism in creating them and the frozen moments of bliss they illustrate. Sam often creates work that is a window into



promising comfort."

The result is a retrospective array of creative, humorous and/or thoughtful canvases, each perfect in their individual conception and treatment. And you will feel quite comfortable at the Firefly.





His works on canvas manage the difficult trick of being both painterly and linear at the same time. He builds his images with layer upon layer of thin color, often over a wash of ultramarine blue (hence the exhibit title). This technique yields a soft, velvety finish to which highlights are added using a deft flourish of thicker paint to further embellish the surface.

His signature use of line, however, is what makes his paintings sing. And, oh, what a line: sinuous and quivering with rhythm and ever-changing intensity. In the hands of many artists, the use of such a contrasty, heavy outline would bring the image to a frozen halt, like leaded glass. In Minick's hands, however, the undulating delineations seem to propel the image and suggest movement and energy.

Of course, in these works, the significant departure from his day job is in the selection and execution of the imagery itself.

"For my own work I'm sketching out of my own head," he says. And he literally means sketching with pencil on paper, as opposed to his commercial illustrations which are done in the computer.

Having free rein flips the process for him. He is not shackled to a theme pre-determined by someone else; he just lets loose and allows the piece to make a natural evolution and then evaluates the result for a title.

Exploration of this kind may lead into sci-fi fantasy (Minick is a big fan of the genre), magical landscapes or into pure experimentation with materials and paint.

In fact, the show at the Firefly contains some of the artist's recent ventures into heavy impasto, like the wonderful

textured surface of "Storm Giants."

"Those pieces were totally experimental. I tried an acrylic modeling paste that I will surely use again; I love it. So, in all truthfulness i was playing with the medium's potential on those paintings."

In Old, New and Ultramarine Blue, we clearly see Minick playing with his own unfettered potential. The exhibit stays up through the month of August. The Firefly is open daily until 8 p.m., and you can see Sam Minick's fine art any time at www. bluecanvas.com/minick.

Roots Goes Regae

Brian "Rocket" Rock didn't take long to acclimate to life in the United States. Shortly after moving here from Dominica, the experienced bass player and singer got a call from someone to play bass on a song. Rocket said sure. The session went fine.

"The song was already recorded, but they wanted a different bass line" Rocket recalled during a phone interview. "A while later I was watching television with some friends and I saw him. I said 'there's the guy.' Turned out it was Bruce Springsteen singing 'Born in the U.S.A.' I didn't know who he was."

Apparently the Boss knew who Rocket was. The second time a fa-

mous rock group asked Rocket to add some bass to a song, he knew who it were. After all, everyone knows the Rolling Stones. "I was standing there talking to Ron Wood," he said, still sounding amazed. "I did the bass on 'Too Much Blood.""

People in Fort Wayne know who Rocket is. He's

the frontman for the reggae band Gizzae and will once again lead that band on stage at the Botanical Roots Outdoor Concert Series on Friday August 24. Dan Dickerson opens.

"We played there a couple of time. We played the Botanical series a few years ago," he said. "It's always good to see everybody having a good time. We're bringing a big band with us. Two keyboard players, a trumpet, trombone and a saxophone player. She is very good."

Gizzae will be doing tunes from their new CD, Hang in There, as well as other originals and a few select covers. "We always do covers. People like to hear familiar songs."

Gizzae played Spikes and Noa Noa a few weeks ago, and Rocket said he's been getting messages from fans who were at that show asking for details about it. With a band this good, a following is inevitable. Based in Chicago, Grizzae have been all over the U.S. playing reggae festivals and all around Chicagoland. When we talked Rocket was getting ready to head to Mark Twain's hometown of Hannibal, then up the Mississippi to Rock Island for another reggae festival.

"We're going to turn Mark Twain on to some reggae," he said.

Gizzae formed out of the ashes of Dallol, an Ethiopia-influenced reggae band. Rocket was at the time playing with Moja Nya, a band that often shared the bill with Dallol. After Dallol fizzled, members of the newly formed Gizzae asked Rocket to play drums and maybe sing. It didn't take long for Rocket's bass talents and singing voice to rise up. Today, Gizzae consists of Asrat Selassie on drums, percussion and vocals; Ralph Mote on keys and vocals; Clem Julian on guitar and vocals; Ruphael W. Mariam on drums, keys and vocals; and Evans Atta-Fynn, also on drums, keys and vocals.

Selassie and Mariam came to the states from Ethiopia and formed the core of Dallol. They also played with Ziggy Marley during Marley's Grammywinning days. Ziggy Marley and the Melody Makers won Best Reggae in 1989 (*Conscious Party*) and 1990

Selassie soon followed after, leaving the popular band, The Sensations, to explore other music opportunities. Together, they started Dallol with several other mates from Ethiopia. Rita Marley noticed their progressive sound and conscious lyrics and signed them to a record deal. Soon

Dallol was on the road with Marley for several world tours from 1986-1990, opening for such acts as U2, Bruce Springsteen, Gun's N Roses, Phil Collins, Iggy Pop and Boy George.

Atta-Fynn hails from Ghana. After playing with his grandfather and father in bands in Ghana, in 1992 he joined the Western Diamonds, Ghana's best known hi-life band.

Evans moved to Chicago in 1997 with the Western Diamonds and has been a member of Dansika and Hydro reggae band.

Mote has been a regular on the Chicago music scene in a variety of capacities. He is a long time reggae veteran and has jammed with some of the biggest names in reggae. He also writes and produces for his company, Clear Vision Music, which produces ads for television and radio.

Julian, like Rock, is from Dominica. He started playing professionally at age 19 and toured the Caribbean for five years with the band Ignition. A trip to the States landed Julian the lead guitar spot with Bell Combo back in the late 70s and early 80s. From there he hooked up with the band Swinging Stars for a few years. Eventually he hooked up with Rocket and what was left of Dallol, and Gizzae were born.

Since then it's been non-stop positive vibes and a whole lot of fun. Anyone who has seen them can attest to that. With a fabulous horn section joining the Gizzae core, it's a show that should not be missed.

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Athens' Last Man Standing

Bill Mallonee's musical career spans two distinct eras, worlds apart in spirit but both exciting times for independent musicians.

Through it all, Mallonee has continued to do what he does: write songs and perform

them for the people who appreciate them. No matter what the music industry does around him, that much remains constant.

It all started in the 1980s in Athens, Georgia, where Mallonee found himself in the middle of a music scene that was about to hit the big time. The B52s and REM had already put the place on the musical map, and the little college town had become a modern rock mecca, a place where you could find soon-to-be-legendary bands like the dbs and Let's Active. More importantly, Athens and its scene were a symbol of the new force in rock music: college radio, an

exciting medium that promised to clue the mainstream into what the cool kids were listening to and, ultimately, bring exciting new music to the masses. REM would ride that force to superstardom. For other musicians, it was simply a way to be a part of something intoxicating.

"We were a scene of highly intelligent, smart-aleck college kids with too much time on our hands and a desire to just tinker with used instruments we got from pawn shops," Mallonee writes. "It was about ignoring radio altogether, much less the corporate aspects of an 'industry.' You formed a band, and it was do it for fun, drink cheap beer, break all the rules."

So that's what Mallonee did, first as a drummer in a band called The Matching Fibers (which he describes as "punk-jangle lounge-lizardy stuff") and eventually as a guitarist, songwriter and founding member of the successful Vigilantes of Love. Formed in 1990, the band put together two albums on its own—Jugular (1990) and Drivin' the Nails (1991)—followed by 1992's Killing Floor, produced by Mark Heard and REM's Peter Buck. It was a heady time, and the feeling of sheer musical possibility that permeated college rock in those days shows up as Mallonee lists his influences at the time.

"I guess it was equal parts Joy Division, Woody Guthrie, Dylan, the Clash, REM, the Replacements and Violent Femmes," he recalls.

Over the next decade, VOL would go on, in various incarnations, to release nearly a dozen and a half more albums. They developed a following in the South, then nationally, then internationally. The band broke up in 2001, and Mallonee headed off on his own.

That was more than a decade ago, and times are very different now. REM are gone. So are the Replacements. And the B52s. And the Violent Femmes. College radio doesn't even really exist anymore.

Where does the musical product of Athens belong in 2012? Mallonee's answer



seems to be that he belongs just where he's always been: writing songs, recording them and delivering them to the people who want to hear them. He's continued to be as prolific as a solo artist as he was when he was the frontman for VOL; he's released eight solo albums, beginning with 2002's *Fetal Position*, and he has never stopped touring.

Through it all, he has stayed resolutely focused on his influences, although he's revised his list of muses somewhat. Indeed, it's not easy to find a figure in rock history that Mallonee doesn't credit with giving him inspiration. He still gives a nod to Joy Division, REM and the Clash, but Echo and the Bunnymen and XTC have joined the club, along with a whole host of post-punk, New Wave names. In his solo work Mallonee draws upon the example of the great folk-rock singer/songwriters, the greatest of which are, of course, Dylan and Neil Young.

"Being a son of the South, it's hard not to be surrounded by the beauty of things fractured and incongruous. That's the stuff of real songs, and that's what I learned on the road doing 180 shows a year from 1995 till about 2002," Mallonee says. "What came out was my own version of what I deeply loved in the work of those two."

And it's not just the songwriters of the era that have captured Mallonee's imagination.

"The work of folks like Flannery O'Conner, Thomas Merton, Kerouac, and a fella named Frederick Buechner helped me make sense out of the road. We made 24 records over 16 years. It all played out, very unglamorously, on the asphalt and in the clubs. I gravitated to the old soul of folk and country artists because it seemed like what we were doing and how we were doing it lent a measure of authenticity to the art."

When he tries to pull it all together, all these diverse influences, Mallonee comes up with a common musical thread, one that would probably surprise most people: the British Invasion of the 1960s. He hears it in the music of the folk songwriters, and he hears it in the college rock of the 1980s.

"I think there were always huge connections between the Brits and their affinities for 60s West Coast psychedelia, the Byrds being an obvious example," he says.

So there's common ground between Dylan and REM via the Byrds,

and that commonality is still hanging around in the A mericana that Mallonee is more closely affiliated with these days; it's easy, after all, to hear the Byrds in a

band like Wilco, too. It all makes sense, and it links a guy like Mallonee, who has been playing for more than two decades now, with the freshest of today's music.

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Mallonee has also learned to take advantage of the DIY spirit of today's independent musicians. The internet has taken the place of college radio as the gateway to success for indie music, and Mallonee is taking creative advantage of it. He records EPs and releases them through Bandcamp as downloads only; he calls the project the Works (in) Progress Administration (WPA), and he's released over a dozen volumes of songs so far. His latest full album, Amber Waves, as well as its predecessor, The Power & The Glory, have also harnessed the power of the internet; both albums were available for pre-order, with proceeds helping with the production of the albums. It's a very modern way to do things, and it works.

At the heart of it, though, it's all about the songs.

"At the end of the day, it's about the story living under your own skin," Mallonee says. "In my work, I've just tried to chase that story down and put something of a frame around it for a spell."

Static Takes the Reins

Possibly the only band in history to have its logo a graphic representation of its lead singer's hairdo, Static-X have been churning out a grind of industrial-tinged thrash since 1994. Aside from the already-mentioned coiffure of frontman Wayne Static (born Wayne Richard Wells), they are perhaps known best for their 1999 hit "Push It," from their debut album Wisconsin Death Trip.

Static is, in fact, the sole remaining founding – or even long-term – member of the band. That isn't necessarily a bad thing for

fans, since, aside from being its most recognizable member, Static has written the majority, if not all, of the band's music. In 2009, Static-X announced that it

would be going on hiatus so that Static could focus on his solo project, Pighammer. In 2011 he released a solo album called *Pighammer*, but earlier this year he announced his decision to reform Static-X, albeit with none of the original members, each of whom had moved on to other projects.

"Static X [have] never been a band where the four guys get into a room together and jam and write songs and all that kind of stuff," the frontman said in a 2010 interview with Uncensored Net Noise regarding Pighammer. "Here's the way Static-X has always worked: I write all the songs by myself — totally and completely by myself — I give demos to the other guys, and then they add their parts to it, and then we argue about stuff and compromise and it turns out being Static-X."

Even though the band formed in California in 1994, it has earlier origins in the Midwest. Static grew up in a small town in Michigan and moved to Chicago after graduating high school. It was there that he met drummer Ken Jay who had grown up in Illinois and worked at the same record store as Static (the two were actually introduced by Billy Corgan of Smashing Pumpkins fame). The two played together in a band called Deep Blue Dream in Chicago; after that band disbanded they joined a Chicago metal band called Stygian and recorded a demo under the band name Drill, but they ultimately decided to move to Los Angeles to search for more band members.

Once in California, the two joined up with bassist Tony Campos (the band's only founding born-Californian) and Osaka, Japan-born guitarist Koichi Fukuda. They were originally going to call their band the name of their debut album – Wisconsin Death Trip – but apparently decided that was too long and opted for the Static-X moniker. It was just as well that they did, as the band name along with Static's over-the-top image

On the origin of the band's name, Static recently explained to Revolver magazine online, "It's kind of funny; I'm a Star Trek geek, so I thought Static Warp Field was cool. I shortened it to Static, then added the X to have it sound experimental. It's what we were doing in the '90s when creating a new sound we call "evil disco."

The name, the image, and the music on their *Wisconsin* debut album made a stir upon its release in 1999, with the album going Gold. Two singles, "Push It" and "Bled For Days," also charted, with the former actually reaching No. 5 on the Hot Dance Music chart. Since then the band has released six additional

albums, although none have had the commercial or critical impact that their debut did. Still, the band has maintained a steady following with a dedicated fanbase, and their

albums continue to sell respectably, with 2009's *Cult* of *Static* opening at No. 16 on the Billboard 200 chart and 2007's *Cannibal* debuting at No. 36.

While Static-X continue to play songs from as early as their first album live, Static recently told the website Noisecreep that he feels like a different person now than who he was when he wrote and recorded the earlier albums. "To listen to my first record, it doesn't sound like me," he said. "I feel like it was somebody else. I hear myself struggling to find who I was at that time and it is just totally different now."

And on that image, and his hair, Static commented to Revolver magazine recently that "It takes zero time [to get my hair like that]. It's only a weekly thing, and it ends up staying like that."

As for the other founding members, bassist Campos, who was in Static-X from 1994-2009, has moved on to working with Soulfly and Prong and has made it very clear via that he has no plans to rejoin Static-X.

"I keep getting asked about this Static-X/Prong tour coming up, so I want to clear up a few things. I have no interest in working with Wayne Static, now, or anytime in the foreseeable future, so I will not be part of this version of Static-X," Campos stated.

Still, in the past he's gone on record as being in support of Static's decision to reform the band without him. "I'm proud of my years with Static-X," he said, "and want to see the name of the band stay alive and well. I hope that all of our fans will continue to support both Wayne and [me] in our individual endeavors."

On the former bandmembers' working relationship, Static recently told Loudwire.com, "You know, we've never been that close. It was always more of a business relationship, that's how it has always been. We all kind of had our chemistry onstage and then had our own lives separate from the band." **Upcoming FREE** Event at Sweetwater



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Feature • Valhalla -----**Maximizing Opportunity**

Some might think placing second in a competition makes you just the first loser. Valhalla, the progressive metal band disagree. To the members of the progressive metal band who took second place in a 28-band, 15- week whatzup/Wooden Nickel Battle of the Bands, second place was just the next step in their growth as a band.

Formed just over a year ago, Valhalla - Patrick DiGangi on drums, Jeremy Harmeyer on bass, Paul

Kendall on keyboards, vocalist Detwiler Logan and guitarist Justin Zych - had already been raising eyebrows with their self-released EP, Deathless, when the band decided to enter Battle of the Bands 9.

"We recorded a few songs, people checked it out and we got a good response," said Zych in a recent interview. "And we want to record a full-length LP at some point (to capitalize on the momentum of the EP), so we were going to use the money we hoped to win in [the] battle to pay off our bills and get started on the new record."

The members of Valhalla are familiar to fans of the local scene, with Zych and Detwiler mostly known for playing with for-

mer power metal band Zephaniah. Kendall is from Color By Numbers and Joey & The IROC Experience, and Harmeyer played with Invisible Guests and Days of the Falcon. DiGangi is the veteran musician of the band, however. He's been in and around the local scene for over 18 years with punk band Skeeter, rockers The Ivory and, most recently, with The Sunny Taylor Band.

"We all come from very different backgrounds," said DiGangi in a separate interview. "We didn't really know where we wanted to go with this band when Paul and I got it started, but we knew we just wanted to play good music. We did know we wanted it to be some type of rock band, and eventually [with the addition of Zych and Detwiler] it turned into progressive metal, which has really pushed me [as a drummer] farther than anything I've done before, really expanding my playing way outside of what I thought were my abilities.'

"I wasn't doing a lot at the time Valhalla got started, except looking for a keyboard player for Argonaut," Zych recalled. (Zych is a member of Argonaut and Cougar Hunter, along with Valhalla.) "Paul called and we got together. After a while, we realized we worked well together and we could shred hardcore. Eventually we got Logan in the picture, got a bass player (later replaced by Harmeyer) and worked some things out. We recorded a few songs, people checked it out and we got a good response.'

One of the keys to Valhalla's quick success is the bands knack for relentlessly marketing themselves. There was a time when bands had to make their own flyers, whether by hand or computer, find some place to make copies cheaply (usually at somebody's job

without the boss's knowledge), buy a lot of tape and post news about their upcoming shows wherever they could, bulletin boards, venue windows, telephone poles and car windshields being some of the more popular destinations. In today's world, it's much easier to get the word out about your shows through social networking, though the response to those internet postings aren't always positive, according to Zych.

"I use Facebook a lot for promotion. Being in 8,000 bands at the same time, there's only so much you can do to promote yourself, so Facebook is a great way to tell people about what shows are coming up. Some people don't like all the invitations

to events I send out, and I understand that, but that's not going to stop me. I understand it, but I don't care. You wouldn't know we were playing if I didn't do it. If nobody knows about the shows, then nobody will come to them and we won't get any more bookings."

Getting more promotion and creating networking connections were main factors in why the band chose to compete in Battle of the Bands this year as well. Zych had played in the contest for the past four years so he knew the advantages of getting to know other musicians and playing in front of people whom they might not otherwise have had a chance to reach.

"First of all, when you're in Battle you get a lot of promotion in whatzup, for just \$40. That's worth entering in and of itself. But you also get a chance to have a new fanbase check you out. That's really the best reason to do Battle every year. The promotion you get and the chance to network with other bands [are beneficial].

"I've done this long enough to know it's good for everyone. Some people don't get that. If they don't

Van Ronk, Ramblin' Jack Elliot (born Elliot Charles Adnopoz) and Joan Baez, came from middle- or upper-middle class families. The modern template for many of the folk singers of the 50s and 60s was Woody Guthrie. Guthrie had led the hardscrabble life admired by so many of his followers, including Dylan who often visited Guthrie in the New Jersey hospital where he lay dying of Huntington's chorea.

Like Elliot before him, Dylan learned Guthrie's songs and to play and sing like him. Dylan also soaked up all the other folk tunes and art he could, taking drawing classes and listening to every record he could lay his hands on. His performances in places like Gerde's Folk City, the Gaslight and Cafe Wha? stood out from the other folkies. Dylan writes that he emphasized the song rather than himself, which must have been true because that's what grabbed the attention of Hammond.

"What really set me apart in these days was my repertoire. It was more formidable than the rest of the coffee-house players, my template being hardcore folk songs backed by incessantly loud strumming. I'd either drive people away or they'd come in closer to see what it was all about. There was no in-between. There were a lot of better singers and better musicians around these places but there wasn't anybody close in nature to what I was doing."

There still isn't. In 1998 Dylan's umpteenth "comeback" record, *Time Out of Mind*, won three Grammy Awards. His next two studio albums, *Modern Times* (2006) and *Together Through Life*, proved he could still venture into unexplored vistas. A collection of his drawings and paintings, *The Drawn Blank Series*, has won praise and brisk sales from fans and critics. And by all early reviews of *Tempest* Dylan the songwriter still has it. Writing for the London Telegraph, Neil McCormick says, "It is fantastic to be able to report that popular music's greatest troubadour is still as brilliant and bewildering as ever. Words spill out on his 35th album ... one liners, couplets, random observations, overheard expressions, inverted slogans and non sequiturs, verses and images often set up in baffling opposition to one another... I was blown away with the mad energy of the album ... Dylan is still striking out into strange new places rather than revisiting his past."

On *Tempest* Dylan is backed by his touring band – bassist Tony Garnier, drummer George G. Receli, steel guitarist Donnie Herron and guitarists Charlie Sexton and Stu Kimball – as well as David Hidalgo on guitar, violin and accordion. The title track is a 45-verse, 14-minute trip aboard the Titanic, complete with references to Leonardo DiCaprio. Dylan doesn't expect everyone to get it.

"People are going to say, 'Well, it's not very truthful,'" says Dylan in a recent issue of Rolling Stone, "but a songwriter doesn't care about what's truthful. What he cares about is what should've happened, what could've happened. That's its own kind of truth. It's like people who read Shakespeare plays, but they never see a Shakespeare play. I think they just use his name."

Fifty years and not much had changed. Dylan is still Dylan. And that's all that we can ask.



win, they get mad and leave."

Zych explained that even bands that don't win anything benefit from the promotion that goes into the competition. "I wish I could promote every show like (a Battle of the Bands show)," he said.

Another reason Valhalla entered Battle of the Bands was, of course, for the prizes. "We would have liked the van, of course, but we wanted to record a full-length LP after the battle, said Zych. "That's what the money we were hoping to win was going to be used for. First, we have to pay off our debts from the EP, then what's left was going to go toward getting into a good studio and getting a good amount of time to record." For finishing second, Valhalla received \$1,000 cash, along with \$300 in advertising credits, studio time at Digitracks Recording Studio and CD production and packing from Advanced Media Integration.

The songs on *Deathless* were collaborative, explained DiGangi. "Most of the songs started with a riff Paul wrote, then Justin would find a melody to build off of that, we'd add a drum and bass line and then Logan would write the lyrics. A lot of the songs are about things that have been going on in Logan's life, relationships songs, with the exception of [the title track] 'Deathless' which is a medieval fight song. Surprisingly, we are a progressive metal band who ended up writing songs about relationships." You don't hear that every day.

Currently still in the planning stage for that fulllength debut, the band is progressively (pun intended) writing songs to complete the task. "We have one new song which we only played once in the contest because it's nine minutes long and we are in the middle of writing another song," said DiGangi. "I don't know if any of the songs on the EP will make it to the new record, but we may reuse some or re-record a couple of them, I don't know. There is no real time frame for getting it done right now. This is just a really exciting time for us, having just finished second in Battle of the Bands. We think that's great, given that we are a new band and given the style of music we play. We got to meet a lot of new people and saw our fan count on Facebook increase dramatically. I don't know if our music is for all ages, but all ages seem to like our music."

Diiv Oshin

Diiv, like a few other purveyors of everything alternative 80s, are sipping from the cup that runneth over poured by great bands like the Cure, Echo and the Bunneymen, Modern English and Joy Division. If a band was signed to Sire or 4AD, then more than likely Diiv are echoing their sentiment.



But unlike a lot of bands that attempt to capture the spirit of the early days of 80s alternative and fail, Diiv not only capture it, but hone it and make it something they can call their very own. The brainchild of Beach Fossils guitarist Zachary Cole Smith, the band was at first a bedroom project but has now become much more than that. With clean, reverbed guitars, driving 16th note bass lines and danceable drum beats, this Brooklyn (of course) quartet run through 13 tracks in 40 minutes with nary a lagging moment. Smith's vocals have an ethereal quality to them. They float along in a haze of echo, indifference and ambiguity. Understanding lyrics isn't the point here; it's about opening up and letting the music take you somewhere.


Oshin opens with the two-minute instrumental "(Druun)," a great introduction to Diiv's head space. A reverb-drenched and very atmospheric track, "(Druun)" is the hole in the wall which allows you to take a peak at what's in store. "Past Lives" sounds a lot like one of Diiv's contemporaries, Real Estate. Both bands plow the same musical fields, albeit on different continents. Where Real Estate borrow heavily from *IRS*-era REM and the like, Diiv are backpacking it through Europe and having a hell of a time doing it.

"How Long Have You Known" is a great, pulsating track in the spirit of Joy Division. "Earthboy" has buried vocals, cleanly played guitars and drums that hover just above audible volume. You think the song is ending in a wash of guitar and muted distortion when the drums kick back in to help bring the track to it's end. "(Druun pt. II)" returns to the instrumental fold, this time with more of a new wave drive with a hint of Tangerine Dream.

Yes, Oshin is very derivative of the past, in particular Joy Division, the Cure, Echo and the Bunnymen and to some extent Cocteau Twins. But if you're going to bask in the past, why not make it the good stuff? If you're into Real Estate, Yuck or even Deerhunter, you'll want to take the dive ... and check out Diiv. (*John Hubner*)

Nas Life Is Good

The 10th proper studio record in just under two decades from the man responsible for the greatest hip-hop LP ever made (1994's *Illmatic*), arrives on a tall wave of universal praise. "Nas is back," the lanky crowd of critics have shouted in tired unison, few likely worthy of critiquing a genre master with the ability, his



tory and influence of one Nasir Bin Olu Dara Jones. Here's the thing: *Life Is Good* is absolutely a good record. Undeniably so. It's the best Nas record since 1996's *It Was Written*, the man's second disc. It's a return to form in that after 16 years of cloudy, misled mediocrity, the emcee has once again released an album with more than three worthwhile tracks on it. That said, *Life Is Good* isn't perfect.

For starters, three of the discs' best tracks – including last winter's hit single, "Nasty" – are only included on the pricey Special Edition of the album. (Poor form or foolishness?) Second, *Life Is Good* (speaking here of the Special Edition, as that's the only one worth owning), is, at 18 tracks, far too long for the modern attention span.

My other three big complaints are the same three things I've been griping about since Nas' third album, 1999's mediocre *I Am*: (1) Nas' beat selection is as inconsistent as they come, and while most of the beats on *Life* are damn good, there are six productions that can't even begin to hang with the rest of the disc; (2) Nas likes to build songs here and there around terrible R&B hooks, and he does here five times (simply put, Nas has ridiculously poor taste in R&B vocals); and (3) Nas can't help but try to put a few *industry hit*-type tracks on all his albums. Call 'em his "Jay-Z tracks." We get four of

Syd Barrett *The Madcap Laughs* (1970)

Syd Barrett got kicked out of Pink Floyd in 1968 for doing LSD every day, which led to his behavioral problems with the band and in his personal life.



This first solo release by him is either brilliant or really appalling. I mean, if you like Floyd or any other psychedelic music from the late 60s, it has to be good, right? I don't hate this record, but I don't worship it either.

It opens with "Terrapin," a pretty cool, bluesy folk song with some hippie guitars and the familiar vocals of Barrett. It reminds me of early Beck. "No Good Trying" is musically a pretty generous song, but the lyrics are clearly coming from the part of his brain that is full of bong resin. The rest of side one goes on with four more tracks, each clocking in at around 2:30, including the the romantic "Love You" and the trippy "Dark Globe," produced by David Gilmour and Roger Waters. Barrett's former bandmates produced a couple of the tracks on this record, and in some cases contributed with their guitars.

Side two opens with "Octopus," a song I feel is the best thing Barrett ever did. Trippy guitars and lyrics make this some serious acid-folk. "Golden Hair" brings it way down with the soft guitars and brooding lyrics, but the album goes a little Dylan-meets-Leonard Cohen in "Long Gone."

Madcap closes with "Late Night" which features a tricky electric guitar behind Barrett's straining vocals. It closes an album that I find exhausting to listen to, but really enjoy nonetheless.

Barrett released a couple more records and went into seclusion with his mother before passing away in 2006 at the age of 60. He left \$1.5 million in Pink Floyd royalties to his four siblings. (*Dennis Donahue*)

them here and, while they do all sound like possible radio hits, none of them fit in with the album's 11 or so best tracks, all of which fit the perfect boom-bap mold in spirit. They're corny and obvious and don't highlight the good in Nas' ability.

So, now that we've touched on the many issues and shortcomings of *Life Is Good*, I'd like to say some nice things about the disc. When Nas is in full-blown Queensborough emcee mode, he is, along with Q-Tip and maybe Andre 3000 (remember him?), the best hiphop album maker we've yet seen. The heaviest factor of *Life*'s success can be credited to the six new beats we get from the man who is, for my money, the best living hip-hop producer, No I.D. (see last year's *The Dreamer / The Believer* for further proof). The No I.D.produced songs alone make *Life Is Good* not just the second best Nas record ever, but probably the best hip-hop record so far of 2012. They're *that* good, both because they all sound like classics and because they bring out the hardest working version of the emcee.

Nas' now-long running producer pal, Salaam Remi (the man often credited, along with Mark Ronson, for Amy Winehouse's success) offers up eight beats, most of which are reasonably strong, if not as organic and Nas-worthy as No I.D.'s tracks. The tragedy, I suppose, is that if we took the 11 best cuts from this 18-song collection, we'd have a hands-down hip-hop classic rather than a bloatedbut-good disc that'll make you add wear to your skip button. We'd have one of the all-time great hip-hop discs. A record that shows one of the genre's biggest talents finally writing some songs with mature themes. Sure, Nas is still stuffing many of his songs with all the familiar old cliches (I'm rich; I'm good in bed; I'm the man in my neighborhood; I'll live forever because I'm special; I like to buy stuff because I can; etc.), but he's also writing about fatherhood and divorce along with some beautifully cinematic stories about New York City street life. Could Nas be the first hip-hop artist to release middle aged records for mainstream audiences?

As hip-hop grows up incredibly slowly, so does Nas. And, along with the stellar production and born-again writing/vocal fire, the increasingly mature mind behind *Life Is Good* is what makes the record this real deal. Is Nas back? I wouldn't put it that way. He never lost the ability to make a good song or write the year's greatest verse when he felt the drive to do so. He's been doing these things all along, if only here and there. With nine or so new classics spread throughout, it's safe to say that, with *Life Is Good*, Nas has finally reclaimed his throne. Conn Returns to Fort With Recoil

It was 1 p.m. last Sunday when I gave Jef Conn a call to see what was new and exciting in his life. I thought an afternoon call would be as good a time of day as any, but he was actually just waking up for the day in pure rock star fashion. It was probably his gig the night before in Greenwood, Indiana that had him starting his day so late.

Conn's name should be familiar to anyone who's followed our local music scene the last 10 to 15 years, as he's fronted a number of different acts including Downbreed, Cuttheredwire, KillNancy, Ashes of October and Shunned. A couple of years ago, Conn's heart had him packing up and heading south to Indianapolis to live with a girlfriend with whom he eventually tied the knot. While there, and itching to get back onstage, an established rock cover act named Recoil contacted him to see if he had any interest of taking the helm. He quickly agreed to join the band and has been tearing it up ever since.

"Every Friday and Saturday night we're out playing somewhere in the surrounding area, and in all we're doing 130-plus shows a year," a stoked Conn said. The band appears to be doing well for itself; they've been hailed by fans and local press as "Indy's Premiere Party Band."

Conn is joined by Christopher Saunders (bass), Scott Huff (drums), Dino Codalata (guitar) and Darrell Mitchell (guitar), and together they perfect cover tunes from such artists as Godsmack, Rage Against the Machine, Alice in Chains, Foo Fighters and Disturbed. "It's pretty much radio rock stuff, said Conn. "We try to stay current. Probably the oldest song we play is 'Sweet Child o' Mine.' Someday soon we plan on taking a stab at some original material."

The band is sponsored by the Jagermeister which could result in future tours and festivals. "Jagermeister has been great to us and hooks us up with all kinds of Jager gear to toss out during our shows. We're kind of like the Jager girls, but were not girls," Conn laughed. As busy as Recoil's schedule is, Conn still finds time to perform in Indy with his acoustic side project Copy-

If you're interested in catching up with Conn and soaking in the Recoil experience. save your gas money 'cause they'll be coming to town to perform as the house band at Piere's on Friday, August 31. Round up the troops that evening and be ready to rock out the only way Conn knows how. Good tunes on a good sound system - sounds like the place to be. Better yet, I'm certain Conn would love to catch up with ya.

You can be sure Fair Fjola have been adding to their fanbase after capturing the whatzup/Wooden Nickel Battle of the Bands title a couple weeks back. I for one consider myself a dedicated fan. If you haven't had the pleasure of scoping these cats out yet, then make your way to The Brass Rail on Saturday, August 25. That evening the sextet will cram themselves on the Rail stage to display why they're one of the scene's hottest acts.

Fjola will also be sharing the spotlight that night with the bands Chrash and The Daredevil Christopher Wright Band. Chrash are a rock trio out of Rock Island. Illinois and TDCWB are another trio that features brothers Jon and Jason Sunde. This swamp folk act, hailing from Eau Claire, Wisconsin, is currently out supporting the release The Nature of Things. Looks like a good mix. ***



Ferrell's Political Comedy a Tonic for the Silly Season

Based on the television ads, I imagined The Campaign would be the Dumb and Dumber of politics, which, I'm sorry to say, fits my description of too many of the candidates and campaigns we endure in election after election.

I hoped seeing a bracing comedy about our political process would give me some immunity from what I know is coming: candidates saying things so dishonest and absurd they create flu-like symptoms. I think I'm still vulnerable to the headaches, fever and nausea the current campaign is already generating, but I did laugh. À lot.

The Campaign isn't just laughs. There are some stabs at satire, but nothing truly biting. The movie doesn't dare to suggest anything radical. There is a very happy ending, based on acts of courage and honesty and the transformation of the character of a candidate. It is so out there you can't imagine this happening in the real world. The American people are protected by politicians from greedy, selfish power players hiding behind patriotic rhetoric! In other words, The Campaign is a fantasy.

Early in the campaign, unopposed incumbent Cam Brady is out giving stump speeches. At every stop he gives a rousing endorsement of "America, Jesus and freedom!" He loves the reaction these words get, though he doesn't know or care why. I laughed as a shudder went up and down my spine.

These days I see ads from a local candidate that say almost as little. One ad says he loves his family. One says he loves hard work. One says he believes our troops are heroes. Yes, and a circle is round!

I don't doubt he loves his family, but I'll bet his opponent does too. I'm sure working in Congress is hard, but the examples noted in the ad are of physical labor done long, long ago. Of course our troops are brave and courageous, but this is the guy who, some years ago, after touring an Iraqi market with armed American troops as his escort, claimed that the experience was just like shopping at a farmer's market in Indiana. I go to farmer's markets all the time without an armed escort. and I can't remember the last time market day was interrupted by an IED explosion or a suicide bomber, which was common in Iraq at the time.

Cam Brady, the chest-thumping selfsatisfied incumbent, is well played by Will Ferrell. His eyes have that scary blank expression. His characterization has a hint of Ferrell's dead-on impression of George W. Bush mixed with a soupcon of his portrayal of Ricky Bobby from Talladega Nights. Cam's scheming wife Rose (a wonderful Katherine La Nasa) also harks back to the hot, blond and ambitious "better half" of Talladega Nights.

When Cam's sense of privilege starts to become an embarrassment to his financial backers, they go looking for another candidate. Dan Akroyd and John Lithgow are white and whiter as the Motch brothers, stand-ins for the Koch brothers.

The candidate they find is Marty Hug-



gins. He leads tours and promotes tourism in his hometown in North Carolina. He also happens to be the less than favorite son of a local Republican bigwig. Marty is sweet, simple and a bit strange. He lives a happy, God-fearing life with his wife, two sons and two French bulldogs. (The bulldogs are replaced with American dogs as soon as his candidacy is in full swing.) He reminds me of Marcus Bachmann.

The Campaign parodies more rightwing types than left wing types, but party is not really the target here. Though Ferrell is associated with W., Cam Brady is more John Edwards. The words Republican and Democrat are rarely mentioned. The only specific politician ridiculed is Bill Clinton, and his sins are turned into a virtue. Cam uses Clinton for cover. They are both "real men."

The corrupting confluence of money and politics is the main target of the film. The Motch brothers invest in the best political operative money can buy. Tim Wattley, a very slick Dylan McDermott, will do anything for any candidate as long as the Motch brother checks keep coming.

The other group made fun of in the film is the pundit class, though I'm not sure they realized they were being made fun of when they signed on. But here are Chris Matthews, Wolf Blitzer, Joe Scarborough and Mika Brzezinski commenting on the strange race in North Carolina, reporting with seriousness stories without substance, just as they do in real life. They shake their heads at the wacky antics (Brzezinski gives her trademark cross-eyed scowl) and the system marches on.

The scheme the Motch brothers are trying to accomplish through the politicians they buy involves Chinese sweatshops being built in the United States and "insourcing" workers from China. They are confident that buying a few well-positioned, well-paid politicians they can overcome immigration issues and do away with pesky regulations about safety standards and child labor laws. They are bipartisan offenders.

The Campaign is filled with gags, gross outs and betrayals. Accidental baby punching, blackmail, seduction, a crossbow shot to the leg. Tim Wattley goads Marty into behaving in ways he never would have considered on his own. It is all very naughty, very funny and vaguely offensive.

The Campaign is directed by Jay Roach who has directed Meet the Fockers, Austin Powers and Game Change. The Campaign is more Meet the Fockers than Game Change which simply means it is more fun than political. If you don't care about politics, you will still be able to laugh. If you do care about politics, The Campaign may not be an immunization to what is to come, but it is laugh therapy, at least a tonic or a palate cleanser.

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The Problem With Paris

Paris, I Love You But You're Bringing Me Down by Rosecrans Baldwin, Farrar, Straus and Giroux, 2012

Everybody loves Paris. On the consensus list of the most awesome cities of all time, Paris is in the top two. (New York is the other half of the top two.) People gaze wistfully into the distance when they recount the amazing time they had on their vacation to Paris, how much they'd love to live in Paris, how they hope to be able to visit Paris just once before they die. But PARIS, does the reality of Paris justify its I YOU mythology? Rose-BUT YOU'RE crans Baldwin isn't sure. He had been in BRINGING love with Paris since he was a kid, and then he had a chance to live there for awhile; his ambivalent memoir of his time in the City of Light presents a disturbing contrast between the Paris of legend and the real city.

Baldwin's 2010 novel You Lost Me There got some critical praise, but before that happened he was a freelance writer in New York City, doing textual odd jobs such as writing "luxury humor" for a magazine targeted at wealthy travelers. Then he got offered a job with an advertising agency in Paris. The agency was looking for an English-speaker who was able to understand French and do copywriting in English, and out of the several million people in America with the right qualifications, Baldwin got the job because he knew a guy who worked at the agency. So, just like that, Baldwin and his wife were moving to Paris. He was giddy.

As it turns out, he should have had reservations. Learning to live in Paris was a tornado of culture shock, especially since Baldwin didn't speak French very well, and his wife spoke it even less well. The pair was forced to navigate confusing customs and bureaucracy without the benefit of adequate communication, and it wasn't easy. It was made much harder by the fact that Paris was impatient with them. Everyone they encountered expected that they should know what they didn't know, and there wasn't much of a helpful spirit on the streets of Paris. They felt very much on their own in a fast-moving, dynamic city.

Baldwin's time in the office wasn't any easier. He fumbled and made egregious social faux pas because he didn't understand the customs or the language. He didn't know who to kiss on the cheek, and when he tried to make jokes he

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often ended up insulting someone important. Worse, no one seemed to be precisely sure what he should be doing. He was hired because he could write in English, but the company didn't seem to have a

clear idea of how that skill should be put to the best use. He was valued because he was an English speaker. but at the same time he was seen as an outsider to be distrusted for that very reason.

Baldwin doesn't present any Parisians as particularly likeable, but his co-workers are especially unap-pealing. They're mostly fashion- and

etiquette-obsessed snobs who seem to be much more concerned with food and smoking than they are with doing any actual substantive work. They sneer at Baldwin's French even though their own attempts to speak English are delivered with the vocabulary of a toddler and the attitude of a hormonal 14-year-old boy. They are surly, sexist, coarse and condescending. You know, just like Parisians are supposed to be.

The company itself also has a Parisian personality. When Baldwin impresses the right people by unsuccessfully pitching a dumb idea to a client, he's tapped for a bigger responsibility. He's called into a meeting with a difficult client to masquerade as a mid-level exec during a campaign pitch. Why is he asked to pretend to be someone important when he's really just a clumsy novice copywriter? Because the client is from Texas and Baldwin is American. Surely that's enough to win the job; Americans are stupid, and all they want is someone who can guffaw with them in their own crude language. Unfortunately, the ideas that Baldwin is asked to pitch, while French, are stupid, and the Texan shoots them down. The whole experience is another example, for Baldwin, of how simultaneously cynical and naïve Paris can be.

Even after he decides to leave. Baldwin continues to love Paris. His stubborn love for the city is as I suspect it is for most people. based entirely on the daily opportunity to walk around and say to himself "I'm in Paris!" Even if the real city is not at all as lovable as its myth, it will always be Paris. evan.whatzup@gmail.com

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Bourne Topples Batman

Tops at the Box: Harrison Ford, Alec Baldwin and Ben Affleck have all played Jack Ryan. Look at all those Batmen and Bonds. And remember that time Christian

Bale, Richard Gere, Heath Ledger, Ben Whishaw, Marcus Carl Franklin and Cate Blanchett all played Bob Dylan? And now we have, essentially, two Jason Bournes. In Tony Gilroy's new action flick, The Bourne Legacy, Jeremy Renner stars as Aaron Cross, the new 5'10" ish blond with a knack for survival and a whole lot of pop in his punch. Yet another man on the run from some dark government character (this time played by Ed Norton,) who wants to clear the Treadstone name of any fault. There's am inspiring, hot smart girl (Rachel Weisz) and probably a lot of backstory.

Sure, it's odd that the studio had the chutzpah to keep the Bourne brand even though the Bourne character wasn't involved. But even more odd, I thought, was the casting of the lead. Renner beat out a number of better-suited (and often bigger named) actors for the role of Aaron Cross, including Jake Gyllenhaal, Tobey Maguire, Garrett Hedlund, Michael Fassbender, Taylor Kitsch, Josh Hartnett, Michael Pitt and quite a few others. Me? I would've liked to see either Hartnett or Fassbender in the role. And, of course, a different title. The Bourne Identity took the No. 1 spot at last weekend's box office, selling \$40 million over its first three days, knocking the Batman out of the top spot.

Also at the Box: The latest Jay Roach comedy, *The Campaign*, starring Will Ferrell and Zach Galifianakis as two bumbling, competing politicians, took the No. 2 spot over its first weekend, selling just over \$27 million in three days. Critics are saying that the movie is dumb, but isn't that the case with most hit comedies?

The Dark Knight Rises finally began to fizzle this past weekend, selling only \$19.5 million at the box, putting the movie's 24-day domestic total at \$390 million and its foreign total at \$445 (both numbers, while impressive, are far below studio expectations). Look for the studio punks to announce either an offshoot or even a reboot – probably starring Joseph Gordon Levitt – before the end of next year.

Rounding out last weekend's Top 5 were newbie *Hope Springs*, starring Meryl Streep, Tommy Lee Jones and Steve Carell, which sold \$20 million at No. 4, and *Diary of a Wimpy Kid: Dog Days*, which sold \$8.2 million, at No. 5.

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The previous weekend's big winner, *Total Recall*, saw its numbers drop off considerably, selling only \$8.1 million in the shadow of the Batman and the Bourne. Also, supposed movie of the year (so far) *Beasts of the Southern Wild* is finally making some decent scratch, taking the No. 14 spot at the box last weekend, upping the low budget film's pull thus far to over \$7 million in the U.S.

New This Week: Four new films for four very different types of viewers open this weekend, starting with a sure-thing stinker called The Expendables 2 which stars Sylvester Stallone, Jason Statham, Jet Li, Jean-Claude Van Damme, Chuck Norris, Bruce Willis, Arnold Schwarzenegger, Dolph Lundgren and quite a few other very strong men who know how to act like very strong men. The week's most promising film, Paranorman, also opens, as do a music drama starring the late Whitney Houston called Sparkle and a Peter Hedges-directed fantasy film called The Odd Life of Timothy Green, starring Joel Edgerton and Jennifer Garner. Expendables 2 is the only film projected to do decent buck, and that's only if the Batman and the Bourne don't continue to dominate. Spike Lee's Red Hook Summer, which opened in four New York theaters last weekend, will open in a few more cities
