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Saint Francis Dresses Up

The University of Saint Francis will be putting on the Ritz at their annual Presidential Gala this year. *Fashionable Art: Apparel from the 1920s and 1930s* is the featured art exhibition, opening to the public on Saturday, September 8 in the Weatherhead Gallery. This collection features several one-ofa-kind, genuine dresses from the 1920s and 1930s, pieces that have never been publicly displayed before now.

And it all started with a mannequin.

Donald Orban, historic preservation planner with the City of Fort Wayne, is the man behind the impressive collection. Growing up, Orban studied art, architecture and history, which kindled his love of the 20s and 30s. When he secured his first apartment, he hit the flea market/antique scene in the hopes of finding interesting décor.

"I'd see stacks of vintage clothes. There always seemed to be more ladies' clothing than men's. I think the men generally wore their stuff till it fell apart," Orban reminisced. "But I had no use for the ladies' clothes until a friend gave me a mannequin. I had to dress her in something, and since I liked the 1920s, I started looking for clothing from that era. That started the snowball rolling downhill."

Orban has been collecting vintage clothing for the past 15-20 years, he estimated. His collection spans more than 130 dresses, only a fraction of which will be on display during the University of Saint Francis Presidential Gala.

"Don's collection is incredible. I wish we had room to display all of his gowns. This is just the tip of the iceberg of what he has," said Elizabeth Kuebler-Wolf, assistant professor and program director of Art History at USF.

Both Orban and Kuebler-Wolf agree that there is something for everyone at the Presidential Gala.

"If you are not familiar with the fashion/ art of the time period, this is an opportunity to see great examples of the real thing and see what continues to influence current de-

----- Feature • The Guess Who ------A Half-Century of Song

Garry Peterson has spent half a century providing the backbeat for the Canadian rock band The Guess Who. From his perch behind the drums Peterson has witnessed a stream of changes in the band, the music industry, audiences and the business in general. Given everything that's happened, a less enthusiastic person might have chucked it all and retired. But at 67, Peterson couldn't be happier or more upbeat about things.

The Guess Who play Foellinger Theater Saturday September 8.

Peterson's claim as the longest-serving member of

The Guess Who holds no water for two reasons. One, he never claimed to be the longest-serving member of The Guess Who, and, two, bassist Jim Kale is the longest-serving member of The Guess Who. Or at least the longest-serving member of the band that became The Guess Who.

The Silvertones came into being in 1958, and by 1962 The Silvertones had become Allan & The Silvertones. Chad Allan, whose real name was Allan Kowbel, was the vocalist and songwriter. It was Allan & The Silvertones that fea-

tured the first pairing of what has to be one of the longestlived rhythm sections in rock n' roll. Allan & The Silvertones also featured the guitarist Randy Bachman.

When I talked with Peterson, he rattled through the name changes like he's done it for 50 years, which, more or less, he has.

Peterson seemed to have long ago done away with the formal question-and-answer format upon which most interviews turn. Instead, he launched into what was on his mind right off the bat.

"We started off as Allan & The Silvertones," he said, "but Al thought sounding English would be helpful because it was at the time of the British Invasion. We thought Chad Allan & The Reflections would give us a more English-sounding name. But then we found out there was another band called the Reflections, and we didn't want to deal with lawsuits and things, so we changed it to Chad Allan & The Expressions.

Chad Allan & The Reflections released their debut single, "Tribute To Buddy Holly," on Canadian-American Records in 1962. After the release of the single the band signed with the Canadian label Quality Records and released a couple more singles that failed to find traction. But the U.S. group called The Reflections had recently released the song "Just Like Romeo & Juliet," and Chad Allan & The Reflections went back to the band-name dart board.

The dart was thrown, and soon Chad Allan & The Expressions had their first No. 1 single with a cover of the song "Shakin' All Over," which had been a hit for the British group Johnny Kidd & The Pirates. By this time Burton Cummings had joined as a second vocalist and keyboard player. Quality Records was getting ready to release "Shakin' All Over" in the United States when someone at the label got a bright idea.

"The label thought deejays in America wouldn't play Canadian hit songs in the states," Peterson said,

"so they put 'Guess Who?' on the cover and shipped it out. Pretty soon it was "Shakin' All Over" by The Guess Who?'

Peterson and the boys were less than pleased. "We hated the name because of The Who," he said. "People said we were just copying them."

But the joke, if there is one, ended up being on The Who, in a way. Or maybe on The Guess Who. "It's a funny side story," Peterson said. "The Who came over here, and people kept saying to them play your hit, 'Shakin' All Over.' I think they got so tired of it they recorded it on their 'Live at Leeds' album. Even today the odd person will come up and say you guys

never played your best one, 'Squeezebox.' People still confuse the two groups. I'm the drummer from The Guess Who, not The Who." The Guess Who ended

up achieving something The Who never did, namely having double-sided singles both going to No.1. Only five artists ever managed it: Elvis, The Beatles, The Rolling Stones, Creedence Clearwater Revival and The Guess Who.

The list of records The Guess Who released in the late 1960s and early 70s (after Allan had left the band) reads like a who's who of hits: "These Eyes," "Laugh-ing," "No Time," "Undone," "American Woman," "No Sugar Tonight/New Mother Nature," "Hand Me Down World," "Bus Rider," "Clap for the Wolfman," "Rain Dance" and "Star Baby," to name most of them.

By the mid 70s the distinctive voice of Cummings was gone, and so was the brilliant guitar work of Bachman ,who left in 1970, but the band carried on. Cummings and Bachman came back a few times for reunion shows and tours in the 80s and 90s and into the 2000s, but since 2008 the lineup has been Peterson and Kale along with Derek Sharp on lead vocals and guitar, Laurie MacKenzie on guitar and Leonard Shaw on keyboards, flute and sax.

For Peterson, as well as the fans, it doesn't seem to matter who is playing the songs as long as the songs get played. "Songs are even bigger than the band," he said. "What is it? It's the music that the groups created - not only the person that sang the song or wrote the song, but the song the group put on the record that's indelibly etched in their (fans') memories. That's why a band like ours is able to play for 50 years after the fact."



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-Feature • Hamilton Loomis ------**Funked Up Blues**

There's been a lot of talk in the blues world about the possible death of the genre. What happens when all the legends bow out and join the big blues choir in the sky?

Never fear. The blues are in very good hands. Young and passionate performers such as Galveston, Texas native Hamilton Loomis are working hard to fill the big shoes vacated by the likes of Bo Diddley, David "Honeyboy" Edwards and Freddie King. And who knows? Maybe a Loomis-style shot in the arm is exactly what the blues needs.

Loomis, who will be taking the CS3 stage Tuesday, September 4 at 9 p.m., actually got his start in the blues thanks to

Diddley, who had this to say about the 30-something guitarist: "You got to put some seasonin' in what you're doin', and this boy's got the whole salt shaker."

Some of that

seasoning is courtesy of Loomis' parents, whose large and eclectic record collection and family doo-wop group inspired Loomis to become a multi-instrumentalist at the tender age of 14. When most of us were trying to master the skateboard or geometry, Loomis was teaching himself to play the drums, bass, harmonica, piano and guitar and touring regularly as part of the doo-wop act. And he wasn't shy about his talents. Two years later he went backstage at a Bo Diddley concert to talk to his hero and ended the night playing alongside him.

That fateful meeting inspired a friendship that would last the rest of Diddley's life. It also helped solidify Loomis' determination to make a life for himself as a bluesman. Diddley gave him perhaps the best advice an aspiring blues guitarist can receive: "innovate, don't imitate."

"He was a great mentor and example of his own creed, because nobody sounded like Bo Diddley," Loomis told Belgium's RootsTime magazine.

In addition to the boost he got from Diddley, Loomis also learned much at the knees of local Houston bluesmen like Joe "Guitar" Hughes, Gatemouth Brown and Johnny Copeland, who helped Loomis, then only 18, land a gig playing the Delta Blues Festival. Then, in the mid and late 90s he put out a series of self-produced albums, including Hamilton, for which he played every instrument and got some Grammy buzz, Just Gimme One Night and All Fired Up.

In 2003 he signed with Blind Pig Records who put out Kickin' It, an album that, according to Blueswax, demonstrates the fact that, as a 20-something, Loomis grasped the deep-down power of the blues as well as its potential for versatility. The Milwaukee Journal went so far as to compare Loomis'

and vocal guitar stylings to Robert Crav and Buddy Guy, predicting that he would soon experience a simi-

lar crossover appeal.

Loomis followed up Kickin' It with Ain't Just Temporary, which features his duet with Diddley, "You Got to Wait," not only a barn-burner, but also the last recorded song of Diddley's career.

Loomis' latest release, Live in London packs quite a punch, at least so says Full-MoonBlues.com: "Hamilton's got da funk of the Queen of the Gulf Coast New Orleans, the sweat of good ol' boy Texas boogie, the soul of up the river Memphis, and the smooth sophistication of big city New York. There's something to live shows that drive, and Loomis's got that along with plenty of funk, soul, blues and groove."

And this good ol' Texas boy rarely leaves for tour without his vacuum cleaner. and not because he's particularly concerned about cleanliness. Loomis has devised a unique harmonica holder that he says gives him the exact sound he wants, hands-free. A nozzle rather than a rack frees Loomis to switch quickly between instruments, and because he was searching for the distorted Chicago sound created when players cup the microphone, he settled on this solution. It might look a little odd, but it's the music that matters.

Loomis' mix of blues, funk, soul, rock and groove might strike some purists as slightly odd, but Loomis is fine with that. His loyalty is to the blues, but he's also here to put his own spin on the genre, to create new art that no one's heard before.

"I grew up with the blues, and even though my music is not traditional, I appreciate blues and respect it, and you can gather from my music that I'm influenced by it. I give it a modern twist, so that people who normally would not listen to blues might do so now," he said.

----- Feature • Slow Pokes ------**Taking Their Sweet Time**

A lot of people thought Slow Pokes couldn't make the transition from cult band to local favorite. Even the band members themselves had their doubts. As it turns out, they're music is pretty good. And people like 'em.

The beginnings of Slow Pokes are not uncommon. The members were friends first; they jammed together and played in bands together before finally deciding to get serious, creating some great music in the process.

"Charlie (Simmonds), Pierce (Bucher) and I have been in bands together for years," said singer/guitarist Zach Kerschner in a recent interview. "We've played together for a long time. This band we're in now was originally named Tangle Factory, which is one of those band names that is so bad you know you will never leave Fort Wayne with it.

"Like six or seven years ago, we wrote a few

songs and recorded them with Kevin Hambrick [of The Orange Opera, Blueberry Hurricane and about a thousand other bands]," Kerschner said. "Kevin and Pierce use to work next to each other at Sweetwater and became the best of friends, so we asked him to help us out."

Though the band had the material, they only had a couple days to record and were able to complete just one song with a vocal track, so they had very little to show for their efforts. A few gigs followed, but the results weren't exactly what the band was hoping for.

"As soon as we started playing shows, we realized we weren't getting as good of a response as we wanted. It was pretty rough," said Kerschner.

Given the poor response, the band felt a little reevaluation was necessary.

"We agreed to go to the basement to work it out," he continued, "and we decided we didn't want to come out until we were ready. We basically took a threeyear hiatus to find the right sound. People thought we quit playing, but we didn't. We were playing the whole time in the basement." The trio learned as many covers as they could and just kept playing until they liked what they heard.

About two years ago, the final piece of the puzzle was added to the mix when Kerschner got in touch with high school friend Ryan Lee and asked him to come over to jam. The band quickly realized that "adding Ryan to the equation made us a whole new band with a whole new outlook. He really was the missing piece we were looking for."

After the addition of Lee, Slow Pokes immediately inserted themselves back into the Fort Wayne scene, opening for national acts and playing local shows, mostly at The Brass Rail, although you might have seen them at a CS3 show or two as well.

"We don't mind being labeled a 'Brass Rail band," said Kerschner. "The Brass Rail has treated us well. We've gotten to play with a lot of national bands there. It's one of the few places where you can always hear original music, and they are also one of the only places in town that can have a show on a weekday and get a crowd out for it.'

The crowds Slow Pokes have played for have been very appreciative and loyal, but Kerschner says the band wanted to make even more people aware of the type of infectious blues/indie rock they play.

With that in mind, they entered this year's whatzup/ Wooden Nickel Battle of the Bands and played several incredible shows, eventually finishing in the top four. To get the word out about the shows, the band used Facebook quite a bit, but they also took it to a more personal level by taking the time to call friends and family to ask them to come out to the shows and lend their support.

"We are so lucky to have so many good friends to help us out. When I would talk to them, I would tell them that even if they couldn't stay for the show because of work or family or whatever, all they had to do was come in

and give up their five dollars, vote, give me a hug and get on their way." It worked out well, as the band had the highest total vote count in the semi-final round, helping to secure a spot in the finals.

Though stepping outside their comfort zone and expanding their fan base were two of the main motivations for entering the contest, the third reason likely was the grand prize van donated by SweetCars. "Being an up-and-coming band, we have no means of transportation, so we can't go on tour," said Kerschner. "The van [would have provided] us an opportunity to tour. Even though we we didn't get it, I think we will feel like we accomplished a lot more when we finally do go on tour. We will know we worked for everything we have and didn't get anything handed to us.'

Though understandably disappointed about not winning the van, Slow Pokes are sure they didn't lose anything by playing in the contest. In fact, it's likely they gained hundreds of new fans in the process.

We were all pleasantly surprised" by the crowds at Columbia Street West, said Kerschner. "We were apprehensive going in because we didn't think the type of people who go to C-Street would be into us, but playing there [in the Battle of the Bands] has been the best promotion we have ever had. The response was really astounding."

Van or no van, the future looks bright for Slow Pokes.

"It took us so long to get to where we are, but we are finally at a point where we don't have to work hard to book shows anymore. We are actually turning down shows. We finally have some money in a band fund, and we are hoping this (contest) will give us a kick start to get something going. Our primary goal now is to get a CD done, promote it and get on the road to get the word out.'

Given the band's passion, drive, determination, and knack for writing great songs, there's no doubt we'll be hearing from Slow Pokes for a long time to come.



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PASSION PIT Gossamer

Passion Pit's highly anticipated sophomore album deliver more of the lush electro-pop that made their debut, *Manners*, one of 2009's best records. Michael Angelakos is in top form here, and the result is an elegant collection of songs that, once again, has critics raving. Pick up *Gossamer* for just \$11.99 at any Wooden Nickel Music Store.

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Hellyeah Band of Brothers

The rare supergroup that actually delivered on some of its hype, Hellyeah stomped onto the scene five years ago with an eponymous LP filled with a strong set of belligerent rockers with a couple of solid and earnest ballads thrown in for good measure. The band, comprised of current and for-



mer members of Mudvayne, Nothingface and Pantera/Damageplan, continued on and delivered a second LP, *Stampede*, to diminishing returns in 2010. Not quite a sophomore slump, the album had a few solid songs but the smart/dumb cleverness from their debut ("Alcohaulin' Ass," "Goddamn") was absent, and gave way to an excess of filler like the throwaway ode to strippers, "Pole Rider."

On their third LP, Band of *Brothers*, however, Hellyeah appear to be back in it to win it, refreshed, refocused and with another set of scorchers that rival those on their debut. This time, however, the band, or at least lead vocalist and lyricist Chad Grey (Mudvayne), seems to be in more of an embattled mind set, raging against those who are apparently in opposition to them/him ("War in Me," "Rage/ Burn"). Their weapon in this battle seems to be their solidarity ("Band of Brothers") combined with a healthy dose of individualistic independence ("Call It Like I See It," "I'm Free). The good times of previous songs like "Hellyeah" and "Hell of a Time" make another appearance here in "Drink Drank Drunk," although here again, even the good times display a more violent underbelly, as the song closes with the repeated refrain of "There's only two reasons, that we showed up here / To party and kick some ass, and we're almost outta beer."

Gone too are the earnest sentiment of prior ballads like "Star" and "Better Man," replaced by the desolate and forlorn "Between You and Nowhere" and the copulatory ode "Why Does It Always." Altogether, the set of songs found on Band of Brothers end up delivering a more eviscerating listen than found on previous Hellyeah efforts. Their signature sound of pulsing and rolling guitars combined with a tight and pummeling rhythm section is still intact, and fans will instantly recognize their style of play. What's different this time around is that the band's music is stripped of nearly all emotion other than raw anger and rage. The lyrics are almost beside the point, as the band rages against the demons which seem to haunt them, although the set of songs here are strong as well.

Either an expression of Hellyeah's embattled mind set, a bid to win over the hardcore metal fans for good, or a little of both, *Band of Brothers* makes for a compelling listen that isn't necessarily for the feint of heart. (*Ryan Smith*)

Willis Earl Beal Acousmatic Sorcery

Chicago-based singer / songwriter

Willis Earl Beal said in a recent interview with GQ writer Jayson Greene that he "doesn't really know how to do anything. I don't know how to play guitar, I don't know how to do anything at all. I look at things as tools."

If you're new to the charms of

Beal, his story is one that any struggling artist, especially self-taught ones, will find inspiring. At times sick, homeless, jobless and, we can only assume, lost, Beal spent years doing low-key outsider art in Chicago and Albuquerque – drawings, writings, songs. Hundreds of songs. Eventually Found Magazine came across a self-illustrated flyer Beal had made in order to help him secure a girlfriend and, well, the rest is history. The mag released a limited edition box set of Beal's various artworks, including music – and then, something like clockwork, indie giant XL Recordings came knocking. Not much later we have *Acousmatic Sorcery*, a brilliant, 11-song debut record that I'd call not only the year's most interesting and promising debut, but also the most beautiful outsider album I've heard in a very long time.

I believe the most important trait an artist can have is self confidence. Whether that's an all-around confidence or one that exists alone in the basement doesn't always matter. Beal has this trait, basement and beyond. He's unpolished and imperfect, sure, but he knows that he has a notably great imagination and, maybe most importantly, he has good taste in the many diverse arts he has ingested over the

These guys met at Miami University in Oxford, Ohio, but the band featured members from England and New Zealand and carried a sound that was heavily influenced by the San Francisco music scene.



The opener, "Rice Is Nice," has a piano and string arrangement and is pure bubblegum, sort of a carryover from the midsixties. "Shoeshine Boy" has a violin-based psychedelic vibe, but in a Monkees-meets-The Beatles kind of way. "Ask Me If I Care" has a Byrds vibe, complete with the harmonies, 30-second guitar changes and, of course, a tambourine. "Green Tambourine," which closes side one, is still one of my favorite songs. I usually murder it when I do karaoke (like everything else), but it's only two and a half minutes long. It's been covered by Lawrence Welk, Status Quo and Tripping Daisy.

Side two wanders around in the realm of psych-pop with a blend of folk in a couple of two-minute tracks. Again, it's not original for the time, but it's a pleasant Sunday afternoon record. Additional strings (harp included) are all over this side.

"Fifty Year Void," the hardest song on the release, busts out a pretty good rhythm guitar as well as some funky organ work. It resembles more of the New York City sound from 1968. The closing song is the nine-minute jam "Through With You," which has a sort of "Eight Miles High" thing going on, but it closes out a pretty decent album.

The band released just one more record, *Jungle Marmalade*, and then disappeared from the music scene forever after being dropped by their record label, which thought that they were too psychedelic for the clubs and bars of Ohio.

Fun Fact: Guitarist Bill Bartlett was later in Ram Jam, the group that did "Black Betty" in 1977. (Dennis Donahue)

years. His influences (Dylan, Waits, Jandek) and inspirations (Bukowski, Jarmusch, beautiful women) are everywhere – in his songs, writing and art – filtered through his soulful slant. Some would compare Beal to *Hi, How Are You?*-era Daniel Johnston, if only because both men made great, unlikely songs without using any conventional methods. Beal didn't spend years developing his craft or writing the perfect songs or laboring over perfection in the studio. He simply willed his ideas into songs. As a result, we have an 11-track record that plays through like a stylistically diverse spilling of a man full of fire, an artist who can't help but create under his own odd, interesting, brilliant terms. (Note: Physical copies of the record also include a large book full of creative writings and drawings.)

I could tell you about early Sebadoh albums and what they mean to me many other 30-something lovers of song. I could make a case for Jandek being the smartest man in music or even sell the argument that Pavement's mega-lo-fi *Westing (By Musket and Sextant)* is the band's best record. And I could explain to you why Willis Earl Beal is maybe one of the great American artists. I can do these things because I know how to write about the arts and I do so with a passion. But, in this case, I just can't go there. I can't do a song-by-song breakdown, explaining the influences and carefully articulating my feelings on Beal's brilliant minimalist accompaniments or oddly poetic writing. His brilliant, powerful vocals. I can't go there. I can't polish up the presentation, call it the spirit of *Acousmatic Sorcery*, an album that almost feels like an accident. Like a collection of tracks that never should have been, yet will never be forgotten by the best of ears.

The question for me, the new fan, is simple: What will Willis Earl Beal do next? Will he learn to play guitar, get a band and spend weeks in a studio? And, if he does, will the wholly unique character throughout *Acousmatic Sorcery* still feel so special? So romantic? Or will Beal return to the well and give us more of the same? Something tells me this genuinely unique and brilliant young artist will figure something out, that he'll keep things interesting and real. I'll be the guy outside the record store at 10 a.m. on the morning that second album is released, fingers crossed. (*Greg W. Locke*)

signers," Orban said. "Those who have more of a fashion background will recognize the basic designs but most likely see things they have never been able to see in person. Those with more experience will also be able to recognize the exceptional skills of those who actually made the dresses. I do my own restoration work, and when you are able to see how these pieces are put together, you realize that some of these seamstresses were masters of construction."

"People are going to love it and be amazed, not only by the different types of gowns by also by how beautiful they are. Some are very sculptural, and some are like paintings with their beadwork. They are just fantastic," Kuebler-Wolf added. "Don's a curator's dream with this lifelong collection of what's beautiful and historically important."

The Fashionable Art: Apparel from the 1920s and 1930s exhibition is only a slice of that history, Orban pointed out.

The 20s and 30s were a whirlwind of social change for women. A prosperous economy, women's liberation movement and technological advances combined for a different sense of luxury and style. The shape and materials used in designing these gowns represents these transitions. More diversity and cre-

ativity was incorporated as fashion moved away from the Edwardian era and into the age of the flapper. And, of course, these years were marked by major cultural influences like World War I, the Great Depression, the discovery of King Tut's tomb, the Jazz Age and the Machine Age, all of which were reflected in the clothing styles in some incarnation or another.


This was a period of experimentation in fashion design. Different silhouettes, fabrics and seaming techniques afforded a boost in creative vision. Beads and feathers were frequently used to accent pieces, sometimes in laboriously great detail.

"You don't see detail like this today unless it's on a couture gown," Kuebler-Wolf explained. "We have a gown with an entire hem made of feathers. In the 30s, women worked thousands of hours sitting around beading those dresses in factories. They went on strike because they weren't getting paid a fair wage for all of those hours. The amount of woman-hours that goes into one of these dresses is enormous."

One such incredibly detailed gown happens to be one of Orban's favorites. "It's a 1920s dress of sheer white crepe decorated with an Asian inspired design of flowering cherry branches done in white, silver, clear and black glass beads," he said. T"he stylized design has an abstract simplicity that is wonderful."

Juxtaposed to the opulent gowns are ones favoring cleaner lines and a bit of alluring feminine simplicity. We've come to know this style as Old Hollywood Glamour. Think scenes from an F. Scott Fitzgerald book playing out to a jazz band in Fort Wayne's Embassy Theatre. "The 30s seem so much more plain without the

"The 30s seem so much more plain without the beading, but it's more about the shape of the gown with the bias cut," said Kuebler-Wolf. "That bias

These gowns are really meant to be dresses that move with the body, and that's my one regret: that we can't show them in movement. Their construction is what makes them so beautiful."

To complete the feel of the 20s and 30s, the University of Saint Francis Presi-

dential Gala will feature music from the time period and display fashion accessories in the Goldfish Gallery. The Spotlight Gallery will have poster designs on display from John Souder, the local artist famed for designing the Auburn Cord Duesenberg Festival posters for decades. His posters depict the sleek lines, glistening chrome and glossy paint of the classic cars built by the Auburn Automobile Co., a style that mimics the women's fashion design at that time.

Gallery attendees can follow a timeline of events corresponding to the gowns on display to give the exhibition historical perspective. USF has added an interactive component with QR codes for smartphones linking to a Tumblr blog site (fashionableartexhibit. tumblr.com) with more information, pictures, videos and posters from the era.

Calling Orban's gowns "a jewel of a collection" right here in Fort Wayne, Kuebler-Wolf sees the *Fashionable Art: Apparel from the 1920s and 1930s* exhibition as a way to appreciate our culture visually.

"The fashion of the 20s and 30s tells us a lot about the time, aside from being beautifully stunning pieces. As an art historian, I see art as a way to peer into the past" she said. "It's a way to see and appreciate larger cultural and socio-economic issues. This museumquality collection of gowns really does give us a bigger window into things that were happening in the 20s and 30s. What goes into fashion evolution? Come to the show to find out."



In what will likely be the signing of their death certificate, American Idol producers have reportedly signed **Nicki Minaj** as a judge for this year's shows to go along with the recent addition of **Mariah Carey**. The show reached out to a lot of superstars, including country star **Keith Urban**, but Minaj is the best they could come up with, which is a sad statement about the show, given **Steven Tyler** and **Jennifer Lopez**' awful performance as judges the last two seasons. As for Urban, he confirms he was asked about his interest in judging, but he says he is "busy making an album." The last original judge, **Randy Jackson**, looks to be taking on a lesser role on the show as well.

Smashing Pumpkins, trying to stay relevant, plan to head out on tour this fall to support their new album, *Oceana*. The Pumpkins are now essentially singer **Billy Corgan** and a bunch of hired guns, but there does still seem to be an audience for their (his) music. No dates have been released, but the tour will stop in Detroit and the bands hometown of Chicago, probably in October or November. More info is coming soon.

A Dream Come True Doesn't Necessarily Mean a Happy Ending

"Stranger things have happened, right?" Calvin asks his brother Harry in the midst of what is a dream or a very powerful hallucination.

"Not really" is the answer he gets, and deserves. I was thinking "only in the movies." *Ruby Sparks* is just the kind fun and funny fantasy that makes going to the movies such a great escape from reality.

Calvin Weir-Field is a writer who wrote a wildly successful novel when he was just 19. It made him rich, famous and adored. He's written stories since, but for a decade all have eagerly anticipated his second novel.

Calvin has issues. His girlfriend left him just weeks after his father died. He's reclusive, seeing almost no one but his brother and the brother's family. He has a dog that he bought to help him meet people, but the dog is kind of afraid of people. Worst of all, he has writer's block, big time.

He discusses these issues with his psychiatrist (a gentle and kindly Elliot Gould) who asks him, as an exercise to write – just a page – of what it would be like if he and Scotty met someone Scotty liked and who liked Scotty.

Calvin has also been seeing glimpses of a girl in his dreams. After getting the assignment from his shrink, he wakes up from a dream that stars the girl and fulfills the assignment. He rushes to his typewriter full of inspiration. He sits there for days, pouring out the story of Ruby. She is the girl of his dreams. But strange things start happening. Women's things are appearing in his apartment. His brother finds a bra in his couch. His sister-inlaw finds panties in a drawer. Calvin doesn't know how they got there, but he says he found them and brought them home.

Then one day he wakes up and there in his apartment is Ruby. Of course, he thinks he is hallucinating. He calls his shrink who advises him to go out into the world and talk to real people. But Ruby is real. She is the exact character Calvin has written, and she is Calvin's girlfriend. Anything he writes about her comes true.

The only person Calvin tells is his brother Harry. "She's like Harvey," he says, "but she's not a six-foot white rabbit and other people can see her." Harry thinks Calvin should give Ruby bigger boobs.

That line startled me because it was such a funny, predictable, man reply and because *Ruby Sparks* was written by a woman – Zoe Kazan, the actress who plays Ruby. There is something delightfully symmetrical about an actress playing a part created by a writer when she is the real author of the character.

The screenplay is so clever and funny I can't imagine Kazan had any trouble attracting the formidable team that brings the story to life. *Ruby Sparks* is directed by Valerie Faris and Jonathan Dayton who directed *Little Miss Sunshine*. *Ruby Sparks*



isn't as bouncy as that film, but it does have a lightness and kindness towards its imperfect characters like the earlier film.

Paul Dano, who was in *Little Miss Sunshine*, plays Calvin. In *Sunshine* he was an angry young man. In *Ruby* he is a confused, melancholy fellow who wants to do the right thing. He wants to get on with his life, but he isn't sure how to do that.

He tells Harry that he doesn't want to change a thing about her, that he won't write another word. But what he finds is that though he created her, he doesn't control her. Harry is played by Chris Messina who gives a great performance as a guy who turns out to be smarter and more sensitive than the boob comment might suggest.

In the beginning, Ruby is perfect to Calvin, and you can tell she is madly in love with him. Without forcing, *Ruby Sparks* takes us along the trajectory of so many aspects of relationships. Aren't we all horribly smitten at the beginning? And then things start to change, and it is how we weather those changes that matters.

When things get more complicated between Calvin and Ruby, he can't resist sitting down at the typewriter and making a few adjustments. He's not proud of this, but he can't really cope with the needs of another person. Ruby makes him happy and not alone, but he really hasn't learned how to get out in the world. He clings to Ruby which starts to drive her crazy.

There is still so much about his past that he can't accept he retreats when anything troublesome threatens. A particularly amusing example of this is the trip to Big Sur because Ruby doesn't understand why she hasn't met Calvin's mother.

Annette Bening plays Mom. While Calvin was growing up, she wore polo shirts and played golf. Now she lives the hippie life in a gorgeous but idiosyncratic home with her furniture-making lover, a smoldering hunk played by Antonio Banderas.

Ruby Sparks could get very dark but instead just gets a little scary. Controlling another person can get ugly, and it turns out to be exhausting as well. Ruby's existence challenges Calvin and shakes up his world. He is forced to confront the darker elements in his nature. He gets less sympathetic. You root for Ruby to be able to be her own true self, even though she's a manufacture. But Kazan keeps things from getting too dark. Ruby Sparks gives you plenty to think about in terms of identity, relationships, artists and their creations, but the story comes around to a satisfying and suggestive ending, a basically happy ending. What else would happen to a writer creating an ideal role for herself?

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To Know or Not To Know

And God Said: Let There Be Evolution! by Steve Henn, NYO Books, 2012

If someone asked me what the poems in Steve Henn's And God Said: Let There Be Evolution! are about, I'd have to say they're about not knowing. Well, first I'd try to avoid answering the question at all, because answering such a broad question in such a definitive way is counter to the spirit of Henn's poems. But if I were pressed, I'd say the poems were about not knowing. They're about not knowing the answers to big questions or small ques-

tions, and they're even more about being impatient with those who think they do know the answers to questions big or small.

Henn is in the NU GOU SAID: LET THERE BE EVOLUTION! perfect place to AND GOD SAID: make his observations about the qualities of knowing. He teaches high school English in northern Indiana. He's surrounded by populations - teenagers and rural Hoosiers who often take pride in not knowing things but who are also often pretty sure that they know more than you do. The poems in And God Said were written when Henn was re-examining his connection to Catholicism, so there's also the element of conflict between religious mystery and dogma. The intersection of all these circumstances is inhabited by absurdity, and Henn notices all of it.

Many of the book's poems, as the title suggests, focus on the contradictions in popular expressions of faith. As much as he wants to plumb the depths of spirituality, Henn is also awed by physics, so he's likely to pull string theory into his consideration of Heaven. In the title poem, he argues that evolution can be rationally fit into an understanding of God's plan, especially since no one understands God's plan, not even Pat Robertson. It's all a big mystery, and you can even say something like "The Voice of God Told Me Agnosticism Is the One True Faith," and no one can really prove you wrong.

Elsewhere, Henn points out the silliness of pious musings by irreverently bringing spiritual figures down to earth. In "What would Jesus really do?," he wonders whether, if Christ were here with us right now, would he be as ego-centric and superficial as the rest of us.

Conversely, in "Note to my



Atheist Friends (who will be coming over for a party)," he proclaims, "The fact that we don't know if God is is not proof of His/ Her/Its/Their inexistence, but I do know this," followed by a list of social trivia; in these things that he and his friends will do tonight, "I have everlasting faith." And that's all he knows for sure.

It's not all about religion, though. Sometimes it's about the things that some of us believe that are demonstrably wrong. In "Political Will," he pokes at people who hold strong opinions about things they don't understand. and in "Margaret Hires a Personal he Thinker," Steve Henn envisions the ultimate outcome of our journey toward proud ignorance.

Sometimes it's just about ridiculousness. The poem "I can't wait until J.D. Salinger dies" is followed two pages later by "I Killed J.D. Salinger"; apparently Henn wrote the first poem less than a week before Salinger died, and the experience leaves Henn feeling "pretty good" about himself because "I didn't know I had that kind of pull in the universe."

But even if he holds a higherthan-expected position in the universe, he still has to endure grocery shopping, hair cuts at Great Clips and the infuriating customer service at Verizon, all of which are examined in other poems.

When your world view revolves around uncertainty, you're not going to be serving up many answers, and these are not the sort of poem that offers anything approaching an ultimate truth. Overall, Henn seems to be fine with the realization that there are some things we can know and many things that we can't. It seems, though, that he wishes that most of us would try harder to sort out which is which.

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All-Time Best & Worst

The Greatest Movie of All Time If one considers the many eras, genres, styles, production levels and emotional agendas spread throughout the film industry, it is, I surmise, impossible to select a single film as the greatest of all time. Disrespectful, even, to the art form's greatest asset: its creative storytelling range. You could say that Citizen Kane is paramount because of its influence. You could call The Dark Knight *Rises* the most impressive due to its masterful - and previously unimaginable - production scope. Or how about, say, The Wizard of Oz, a time-tested piece of cinema art that has not only had a lasting influence on pop culture (as well as childhood development), but takes us to another world in a way that only cinema can. And that's just three of the endless Stateside films one could make a convincing argument for.

For a number of reasons, when asked to name my favorite movie during first dates and small talk, I've most often listed Martin Scorsese's 1976 classic, Taxi Driver. There's Robert De Niro's performance which resonates with most American men at some point in their lifetime. More so, it's the overall vision and multi-departmental mastery of the film that keeps me coming back. A perfect storm of skills and timing; the nuanced craft that is Taxi Driver. That tense, urban score. The timeless and gritty cinematography. The calm-but-dangerous poetry of the script. Is this a street story of salvation or a document of cultural fear and humanistic fracturing?

I believe I return to the story of Travis Bickle because, maybe more than any other on-screen story, it personifies and influences my own personal creative development. The visual bite and the poetry. New York City and the underdog. The never-ending confusion of right and wrong, all here, on screen - a resonating masterpiece of human storytelling and cinema art.

The Worst Movie of All Time

Of the myriad of faults a motion picture can have - poor writing, uninspired acting, inappropriate casting, tasteless production choices - the biggest shortcoming, I believe, is a leader whose vision has been compromised by artless foci. Most of the films made over the last 50 years, I like to think, employ a fair amount of passion behind their many moving parts most of which, ideally, comes from the helmsman. Passion is key. This because, aside from skyscrapers, films are the most elaborate - in terms of both creative aim and necessary production assets - of

the modern art forms. You simply can't toss off a proper film.

History tells me that the reason for the stench in failed films, most often, is misplaced passion, a lack of heart at the top. The goal, for a proper art project, is to create something that expresses something, inspires someone, documents whatever. But film, in the U.S. at least, is big business. An industry, even, not unlike the automotive industry. And so, from time to time we have films that are driven not by passion, but by greed. Studios with strategies, statistics, loud mouths and agendas. CEOs and their calculator dreams. Movies written up on paper as budgets, targets and campaigns, not stories. Maybe the greatest modern example of a hopelessly studio-driven project is Joel Schumacher's 1997 action film, Batman & Robin.

At the time of the film's production, Batman was big business, one of the great American symbols of the time. Tim Burton's first two Batman films were hugely successful, both as artworks and investments. Then Burton left and, well, the studio took over. The story of Batman & Robin has since been spoofed, mocked and referenced endlessly as something of a career parable for filmmakers. Sure, Schumacher survived the royal mess that was his second Batman picture, but few pieces written about the director since have failed to jest about his failed Big League maneuvering.

So is Batman & Robin the worst film ever released? A lot of very talented people worked very hard on this disaster. Set designers, grips, PAs, editors and more, all at the top of their game, probably doing very good - if very misguided - work. The problem was not their efforts but, rather, the flawed agenda of the too-powerful Warner Bros. studio who handled the production. With sights set in the wrong direction, the men sitting at the desks talked and planned so much, and so artlessly, that the film never stood a creative chance. And so, for almost a decade, one of the great American characters was little more than a punchline. A symbol of simpleminded greed and creative corruption in an industry that exists only because of the passion of the creative minds that fuel it. For that reason, I find it easy to select Batman & Robin as the worst movie of all.

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
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
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
