

The main event will feature Shigs in Pit barbecue as well as several other purveyors of food, live entertainment at the park by The Bent Spoon Boys and an appearance by Fort Wavne's own Old Crown Coffee Roasters. 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SANCTUS REAL

Sanctus Real might not be the biggest thing to come out of Toledo, but they might be the biggest thing to come out of Toledo Christian School. That's where Matt Hammit met Chris Rohman in 1996, and that's where one of the hardest-working Christian bands in the business was born. It happened when the pair were in the 10th grade, in ninth-period science class, to be even more precise.

"I'm thinking of starting a band," Hammit recalls whispering to Rohman, according to a Toledo Blade interview. "I play drums a little bit."

Hammit soon decided to play guitar instead, though, and so did Rohman. The pair jammed together in Hammit's basement, and they were

eventually joined by Mark Graalman, who played drums for real, and Matt Kollar on bass. By the end of 1996, they were confident enough in the way they sounded to put together their first show, a free concert for 50 of their friends.

"My dad owns a photography studio that's in a warehouse, and we did our first concert out of the back of the warehouse," Rohman recalled in an interview with CCM Magazine. "We practiced and practiced, maybe had six songs and played for a handful of our friends from school.

From there, the band's story follows the typical plotline for a 90s band bio: they put those six songs on a demo tape, then followed it up with a five-song EP, playing together as much as they could manage in the meantime. After the EP came a full-length album recorded in a garage, 1999's *Message for the Masses*, and then came plans for a professionally recorded album financed by some less than enjoyable part-time inbs

"We did telemarketing for a few months, and it had to be the most dreadful job ever," says Hammitt. "You have to call people at the most inconvenient times. We got death threats over the phone. One guy said he was going to come through the phone and strangle me."

The result was 2000's *Nothing to Lose*, a project the band recorded with Grammy- and Dove-nominated producer Skidd Mills. The album achieved a high enough profile to draw the attention of several labels and cause more than one contract offer to be placed at the band's feet. They chose to sign with Sparrow Records. Faced with writing and recording their first label-supported recorded, the band had to decide if it

wanted to be a Christian band or not.

"Ultimately, we knew we could relate to kids in the church," says Hammitt. "We are passionate about our faith, and we knew we could encourage Christian kids to keep their faith growing and, likewise, reach kids who never before heard the message. From our personal experience, we felt this was the place we were supposed to be."

The band's first Sparrow record, Say it Loud, was released at the end of 2002, and after the album

went public the band, which included Steve Goodrum on bass after Kollar left in 1999, went on the road. They'd already spent the summer on the Festival Con Dios tour with Toby Mac, Audio Adrenaline and Out of Eden, and 2003 saw them on the See Spot Rock Tour with Relient K, the O.C. Supertones,

Pillar and John Reuben. Things were heating up.

Sanctus Real began to edge into the spotlight the next year when a single they recorded for a fundraising album, a cover of U2's "Beautiful Day," reached the top of R&R magazine's Christian Rock chart and pulled in a Dove Award nomination for song of the year. The band's next album, *Fight the Tide*, was even more successful, delivering two more R&R number ones and winning a Dove for Modern Rock Album of the Year in 2005.

The next couple of years were equally eventful. *The Face of Love*, released in 2006, spawned two more chart-topping singles and two more Dove nominations. There were also lineup changes, with Goodrum being replaced by Dan Gartley in 2005 and Pete Provost coming on board as a third guitarist in 2007.

The band's fourth album, We Need Each Other, kept the momentum going, producing another hit single and more accolades, this time a Grammy nomination for Best Rock Gospel Album. Touring was a priority in 2008, too, including a stint as an opener for Third Day and a 30-city headlining tour. As if that wasn't enough, Sanctus Real found time to play a benefit concert in Toledo in support of a project being undertaken by the reality TV show Extreme Makeover: Home Edition. The event raised \$50,000 for a needy family, and it emphasized the point being made in the title of the band's current album.

"The beautiful thing about being a part of the Extreme Makeover: Home Edition benefit concert was that we saw our community, our town, our home

Honeywell's Gift Brightens Up Wabash

When you think "thermostats," you probably don't think "Broadway musicals." But the two have more in common than you probably ever realized.

The world's leading manufacturer of thermostats, Honeywell International, had its humble beginnings in none other than Wabash, Indiana. Founded in 1906 by electronics industrialist Mark C. Honeywell, the company has become a multinational Fortune 500 company employing over 100,000 men and women.

But Mr. Honeywell had more than business on his mind. A student of the arts, Mr. Honeywell dabbled in photography, filmmaking and violin, among other things. In 1941 he established the Honeywell Foundation to oversee the building of the Honeywell Center in his Wabash hometown. The 45,000 square foot facility was expanded by an additional 75,000 square feet in 1994, including the addition of the Ford Theatre.

The Wabash Valley Music Association (WVMA) was established in 1956 by Honeywell's first wife Eugenia, and brings an eclectic mix of entertainment to the Honeywell Center every year.

"We choose a variety of performances to expose audiences to different genres," says WVMA chairman Doug Lehman. "A typical season includes Broadway musicals, dance, classical and choral performances."

This season is no exception.

"Mr. Honeywell built the center "to provide a place for cultural, recreational and artistic opportunities for the entire community," says Lehman. In that spirit, WVMA kicks off its 2012-13 season with the Wabash Area Community Theater production of *Annie* (September 28, 2012).

"The Honeywell Center works closely with the community theatre to offer their members a professional theater, stage and crew to assist them with producing a quality show," Lehman says. "The Honeywell Center is proud to support our local talent, and WVMA audiences thoroughly enjoy these annual performances."

ual performances. Following that is *Savion Glover's SoLe*

(October 26. 2012). Tap legend Gregory Hines once said that Glover was "possibly the best tap dancer that ever lived." The former child prodigy has choreographed The Dance Kid, Bring in da' Noise Bring in da Funk and the film Нарру

"Glover and Marshall Davis Jr. will pay tribute to Sammy Davis Jr., Gregory Hines, and others," says Lehman. "It will be an energetic and entertainperforing mance featuring amazing talent."

The winter season will bring

two national tours of hit Broadway musicals. Just before the holidays audiences can take in a live production of *Shrek: The Musical* (December 21, 2012). The stage show, based on the movie, premiered on Broadway in 2008 and starred Brian d'Arcy James (TV's Smash) as Shrek and Sutton Foster (TV's Bunheads) as Fiona.

"Shrek has wide appeal for families with young children, teens, and young adults," says Lehman. "The story has humor, a great storyline and colorful sets and costumes. The musical also includes new songs that weren't



in the film."

After the holidays WVMA brings *Disney's Beauty and the Beast* (January 17, 2013) to its stage.

"This is a beautiful Broadway musical version of the classic Disney tale," says Lehman. "Like *Shrek*, *Beauty and the Beast* appeals to everyone. It features amazing sets, beautiful costumes, and a classic score."

Fans of Glee will appreciate the talents of the Singing Hoosiers (February 16, 2013). The 115-member group from the I.U. Jacobs School of Music performs well-known American popular music, jazz and Broad-

way favorites.

"The Singing Hoosiers offer a modern take on classic choral performances," says Lehman. "The songs are catchy songs and the choreography is impressive."

In the spring, WVMA returns to Broadway with the tour of *Catch Me If You Can* (April 29, 2013). Based on a true story (also made into a hit film starring Tom Hanks and Leonardo DiCaprio), the musical tells of a talented young con artist and his many adventures.

"The award-winning show tells an interesting story in a fun and humorous setting," says Lehman.

The WVMA's summer show is a performance by the Indianapolis Symphony Orchestra (June 2, 2013). The ISO will perform popular pieces by George Gershwin and Leonard Bernstein, accompanied by Time for Three, a trio of young musicians.

"The ISO presents classical music in an elegant but entertaining fashion," says Lehman. "Time for Three refer to themselves as a 'classically trained garage band,' and they add a young, hip element to the classical performance."

In fact, admits Lehman, "WVMA selected all this season's shows with a younger audience in mind."

Young audiences and old alike with appreciate the Ford Theatre's space which boasts "comfortable seating, extra leg room and amazing sound and lighting," says Lehman. "There are 1,500 seats which is big enough to attract touring Broadway shows, yet small enough to ensure everyone has a fantastic unobstructed view."

Other features of the Honeywell Center include a restaurant, free parking and an absence of ticketing fees. The Center also features monthly art exhibits and an extensive Educational Outreach Program.

"The program provides interactive classroom residencies with professional performers and artists at no charge to the schools," says Lehman.

The seven-show series cost \$75-\$165 for adults (\$37.50-\$82.50 for students through high school) and can be ordered by calling

Start of Something Big

Sometimes it's not easy to tell the difference between having good luck and benefiting from good planning and hard work. Consider the case of a songwriter who has one of his early efforts turned into a hit

single by a major recording artist and whose first single as a solo performer gets the attention of one of the most powerful people in TV. Is it luck, or is it a hard-working guy putting his talent in front of the right people at the right time? In Randy Houser's case, it's probably a lot more of the

latter.
"I don't know how it happened, but everything in my life has started lining up," Houser says. "I must have done somebody right in the

Whether Houser built up his karma account balance in the distant past, or whether he's just seeing the payoff from his current professional dedication, there's no doubt that things are lining up for him. He's got a new wife, a new son, a new record deal and a new record that's nearly

finished; it seems that he's at the beginning of something big.

A native of Lake, Mississippi (population 408, according to the 2000 census), Houser grew up with an understanding of what it meant to be a professional musician. His dad played locally, and Houser himself had formed his first band before he was even in

high school. While attending classes at East Central Community College, he founded another band, this one called 10 Lb. Biscuit (Houser's way with words made itself apparent early on).

But, as often happens, Houser decided that rural Mississippi was not the best place to get a professional music career rolling, and in 2002 he made the move to Nashville where he hoped to make a living writing

Turns out that he made precisely the right move at precisely the right time. One night at a honky tonk, he and friends Jamey Johnson and Dallas Davidson were watching the crowd on the dance floor. One particularly shapely woman (or, more accurately, one particularly shapely part of one particular woman) caught the trio's eye, and before he knew it, Houser had come up with the title of a new song. He, Johnson and Davidson co-wrote "Honky Tonk Badonkadonk" within an

It wouldn't have been a big deal, probably, if Trace Adkins hadn't recorded the song and put it on his Songs About Me album in 2005. But he did, and the song hit No. 2 on Billboard's Hot Country Songs chart; more significantly, it was a crossover hit, making it onto the Billboard Hot 100 and Pop 100 charts.

He continued with his songwriting efforts – his posterior-themed oeuvre grew broader when he wrote "Back That Thing Up" for Justin Moore – but he also started to focus on performing. He played around Nashville, and he signed a contract with MCA, a deal

> that didn't produce a record. He kept at it, though, and he eventually got another record deal, this time with Universal South in 2008. That deal did produce a record, Houser's debut, titled Anything Goes.

Before the record was even released, the title track was getting played on satellite radio, and that's where David Letterman heard it. Once again, Houser was the beneficiary of what looked like luck. but which was actually the result of several years of trying to be heard. Letterman loved the song, and he

invited Houser to come on his Late Show to perform it. The exposure was great for Houser, and it helped to get "Anything Goes" onto the charts.

The record's second single, "Boots On," was an even bigger hit, making it to No. 2 on the Hot Country Songs chart. Just like that, Houser proved that Adkins wasn't

the only one who could put a Randy Houser song into the Top 10. The industry took notice, and Houser was nominated for New Artist of the Year and Music Video of the Year at the 2009 CMA Awards.

After releasing another record with Universal one that didn't produce any Top 10 singles - and touring relentlessly for two years, Houser began to realize that this music career thing wasn't going to be as easy as it looked at first. He was tired.

"It seemed like professionally things weren't as great as they could be, and that was part of it," says Houser. "But the biggest thing was not having a home base. I needed an anchor."

In 2011, he took steps to get things in order, to give himself a base. He got married, and in the spring of this year his son, West, was born. Houser also left Universal South and signed with a smaller label, Stoney Creek Records. Now he had a family to give him a base, and he had a professional base that seemed to suit him better, too.

"Everybody there feels like part of my family," he says of Stoney Creek. "You walk in the door and everybody seems really happy with their job; there's

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Season of Change

As steady, constant and reliable as the Fort Wayne Philharmonic has been for all these years, the organization which brings you everything from the classics to contemporary pop with a twist is constantly renewing itself and evolving to meet a changing audience and cultural landscape. In less than a decade, a new executive director (J.L. Nave), music director (Andrew Constantine) and assistant conductor (Sameer Patel) have all arrived at the Phil and have

re-energized an already vital orchestra. But the changes will not be stopping there, as Nave has learned in his almost seven years that things are never entirely settled at the Fort Wayne Philharmonic.

"Right now we're searching for a new concertmaster as well as a new choral director," he says. "Our concertmaster, Hiromi Ito, decided to retire, and our choral director, Robert Nance, has chosen to focus more on his other endeavors, chiefly his work at Heartland Chamber Chorale. These are both important leadership positions, obviously, so we'll take our time to make sure we make the right choice."

Philharmonic audiences will be happy to know that they'll be part of the process, just as they were when Constantine was hired a few years ago. Once the applicants have been narrowed to a special few, each will get an opportunity to work with the talented orchestra and chorus, a chance for fans to see each in action. The process clearly worked with the hiring of music director, as Constantine has already made his mark on not only the orchestra but the Fort Wayne community.

"It is nice when everyone has essentially the same vision, from the board to the staff to the artists," says Nave. "Andrew is not just good on the podium, but he's more than willing to talk with groups in the area and donors. He's there to help support the Philharmonic in any way he can, and it isn't unusual to see him out in the lobby at the Embassy greeting the audience and talking to them about the performance."

It becomes clear very quickly in talking to Constantine – or even to see him on the Philharmonics well-produced television ads – that he remains very approachable and charismatic, someone who doesn't try to

elude the public.

"Andrew doesn't like being called 'Maestro," says Nave. "He's very skilled and talented, but he is also a very real person and enjoys talking about interests outside of the orchestra. He's a big fan of soccer – or football, as he would say – and will talk about a variety of things besides music."

Constantine's friendly demeanor has made the collaborative effort easy for all concerned, and while his first season in Fort Wayne was pretty much set in stone by the time he settled in, he has now had enough time to make a firm fingerprint on the per-



formances, bringing both eagerly anticipated works along with some surprises which he delights in sharing with the audience. Last year's performance with footage from the Hubble telescope, which featured narration from Science Central's Martin Fisher, is just one example of the outside-the-box thinking which has breathed new life into the Philharmonic.

The options this season are diverse as always and can be found in the beautifully assembled 2012-13 schedule, available at Philharmonic offices and at upcoming performances. Opening night – Saturday, September 22 at the Embassy Theatre – features guest pianist Fabio Bidini and works by Rachmaninoff and Dvorak, but the exciting twist herein is the work by Jonathan Leshnoff, "Starburst," which portends something even more exciting down the road.

"We've commissioned a piece by Leshnoff for the 2013-14 season, a world debut which is being written specifically for the Philharmonic," says Nave. "So we've decided to introduce the composer to our audiences this year with a piece which will allow them to become familiar with him before his new work premieres next season."

Another Masterworks highlight comes in the season's second performance, on October 27, when the Phil pays tribute to visiting dignitaries from Fort Wayne's Japanese and German Sister Cities who will be in attendance and will have the opportunity to hear music from their native countries featured in an evening which will include compositions of Toru Takemitsu along with Strauss, Floyd and Beethoven. The performance will also feature soprano Janice Chandler Eteme.

January 12 will feature not only the talents of the full orchestra but also the burgeoning talents of the Philharmonic Youth Symphony, a remarkable performance opportunity for the young musicians which Nave says demonstrates Constantine's passion for education and his strong belief in the abilities of the Youth Symphony. The May 18 finale will cap off a total Masterworks season of 10 performances and will do so with a bang, featuring Bach's Suite No. 3 in D major and Mahler's Symphony No. 6 in A minor.

Fans of the Chamber Series will note a

It can be easy to look around your hometown and think you're living in a vacuum, where culture, arts and common sense can't find it's way in. A different opinion from the norm may and can be frowned upon.

Where do I fit in? Where are the films I want to see? Where are the bands that I want to hear? These are sentiments that I'm sure are echoed throughout your hometown. I know they're echoed in mine. Sometimes you have to just look a little harder, or just look a little further, but if you stand still and concentrate you just might hear an answer.

An answer to the question "Where are the bands I want to hear?" is sometimes, "Right in front of you, pal."

Fort Wayne is not lacking in extremely talented, original music. I've heard so many great original bands over the last year alone. Years prior have been the same. Some stick around for the long haul and become those crusty blokes playing every weekend to adoring fans, putting out music despite the fact that they know in their hearts this is as good as it gets. No national tours. No contract signing. They do it for the love of music

Other bands are gone before we have a chance to get to know them. Some do their thing and then move on to other projects.

One such band is Fort Wayne's House of Bread. This is a band that started out in 2005 as nothing more than a living room chill session for All Nite Skate's Omar Afzaal. House of Bread have since become a full-on band, four dudes laying it down like a well-oiled machine. I got a chance to talk to Omar about the band, music and their excellent forthcoming record, *Hypnic Jerk*, that is soon to blow minds in the Fort.

"I wanted a creative outlet that didn't require me to take what I was doing so seriously. I had no quality control over my output at the time and ended up recording 30 songs in 30 days," recalled Afzaal.

This bountiful burst of creative energy became House of Bread's first full-length album, *House That Bread Built*, a record Afzaal now describes as "super sloppy and incredibly embarrassing to listen to.

"However," he added, "I do think I recorded some accidental gems that have aged pretty well. I essentially used a digital

8-track recorder, and the only effects I used to produce it was whatever was on my guitar pedal board." If that's not DIY, what is?

What Afzaal had established was a creative outlet for himself, something he could keep to himself, hide from the outside world and his other band, All Nite Skate. If he wanted to record a song in the morning with a cup of coffee and the cat staring at him from across the living room, he could. How did this one-man session become the full-on dream pop, indie rock juggernaut that it is

"Eventually, Bob (Haddad, Afzaal's bandmate in both All Nite Skate and Castles) convinced me to let him join the project. This immediately forced me to take the project more seriously. I didn't want to waste his time, and I wanted to get the most of the creative connection that we have when we write and play music together."

With Haddad on board, the duo finished House of Bread's first collaborative album, 2010's *Superhuman Tomb*, and with that stellar album under their belt, they decided they needed to get right back to work.

"We immediately started working on *Hypnic Jerk* together," said Afzaal. "This is the first HOB album that we have collaborated on from beginning to end. We knew that our live shows were lacking without a live drummer and bass player, so we convinced Phil Arbogast and Zach Smith to join the band. Suddenly, House of Bread was a 'real' band."

Arbogast was the drummer in both All Nite Skate and Castles. Smith has played in a who's who of the area's premier original bands, including Definitely Gary, Happy Birthday (a Ween tribute band), Wooden Satellites, Orange Opera, unofficially in Superchunk, Good Time Fun Club and Casa Del Pan. I think I even caught Smith practicing with my band once before he vanished in a cloud of dry ice smoke. The dude is an established player, let's leave it at that.

With a full band in place, House Of Bread are ready to start hitting stages across town and sharing *Hypnic Jerk*'s original blend of dream pop.

"I think dream pop might be the best way to categorize our sound", say Afzaal. "As much as I hate genre names, this is the

brought together like never before," Hammit said of the concert. "There's power when people are unified, and there's a righteousness that's unbridled when that force is molded to serve, love and sacrifice for the greater good.'

Since the release of Pieces of a Real Heart in 2010 (and another Grammy nomination), the band has been touring, and they're serious about it. Nothing slows them down, not even a scary fire that destroyed their tour bus in Pennsylvania earlier this year.

"As soon as I rushed off the bus, in the dead of night, the engine wasn't on and all you could hear was this whooshing of fire," Rohman said. "It was a big,

The fire destroyed the bus and some of the band's personal items, but their equipment was spared. More importantly, everyone on the bus - including Hammit's and Graalman's children - escaped unharmed.

"We're very thankful for God's protection because it could have been much worse," said the bus driver, whose quick action probably averted further disaster.

If nothing else, there's a clear message here: Sanctus Real have some important things to do, and it's not time to stop yet.

no strife in the air. That's really important for me to have right now. It's comforting.

So now he's finishing up his first Stoney Creek record, an album that is being produced by Derek George. In March we'll have 'Forbidden Broadway,' with music from generations of Broadway musicals, and we'll wrap up the Pops season with the music of the Rolling Stones in May. So we really will have something for everyone."

The Phil's Family Series kicks off with a "Spooktacular" on the Sunday before Halloween and includes additional performances in January and April. The latter two will feature special collaborations with other Fort Wayne arts organizations: January's "Home on the Range" featuring episodes of "Rodeo" with Fort Wayne Ballet and April's collaboration with Fort Wayne Youtheatre on "Witches, Wizards & Fairytales." quickest way to give people some sort of idea of what we sound like." I was able to get a super secret listening session with the new album. I won't say much about the album, other than this is truly one of the best local releases to come out of the scene.

With an album this special, Afzaal and Haddad wanted this record to sound as good as it possibly could, so they decided to put it out on vinyl. Since few people have a vinyl press in their basement, they decided on doing a Kickstarter campaign to help pay for the pressing.

"Once we finished Hypnic Jerk we knew we couldn't sell it short by only having a CD release. We were really proud of the songs that ended up on the album and wanted to do them justice by doing a fullfledged vinyl release. However, money is definitely a serious issue when it comes to this format. We wanted our Kickstarter campaign to really be treated as a 'pre-order campaign' with a ton of added benefits. The cover requests quickly spiraled out of control because of it. However, we'd do it again."

Cover requests, you say? Why yes. One of the perks once you hit a certain "pre-order" donation level was that you got to request a song for the guys to cover. All of the song requests will be compiled onto a covers album called Keeper of the Earth.

I asked Afzaal if the covers album is fun or torture? "It's a little of both. There have been some selections that will go unnamed that we have dreaded doing. However, it has really helped all four of us get to know each other musically. I really cannot believe we are consistently pumping out a cover a week. I think the cover of Rob Zombie's 'Dragula' was the most surprising cover we did. I still don't know how we pulled that one off. But yeah, overall the covers album has been a total blast.'

House Of Bread - some guys who work day jobs, have girlfriends and wives and domesticated pets and enjoy a good maki roll every now and then - have pulled a musical miracle out of thin air. Sleight of hand, or ear, if you will.

What started out as one guy trying to not be so serious and record for the sake of fun - no expectations, no pre-conceived delusions of grandeur, just record some songs and enjoy it like he did before all that 'serious artist' stuff - has turned into something so much more. If anything, Afzaal and House Of Bread have proven that you don't have to be a serious "artist" in order to make serious art. You can laugh, goof off and record an entire album of covers and still create something epic and beautiful as well. Hypnic Jerk is a testament to that.

Opossom are a musical wonder. They're treading similar musical waters that bands like Unknown Mortal Orchestra, Ariel Pink and Tame Impala are treading, but in more of a popcentric way. At first listen the album has the aged, crackling sound that Dave Fridmann likes to pile on top of



completely to Opossom's infectious and syrupy sweet psych-pop. It must be said that the similarity in sound to Unknown Mortal Orchestra isn't completely happenstance. In fact, there's a darn good reason: Opossom main man Kody Nielsen was in Unknown Mortal Orchestra. He's also the little brother of UMO's psych-rock mastermind Ruben Nielsen. There's obviously something in the water down there in New Zealand, or at least the neighborhood where the Nielsen brothers grew up. But the love of tattered psych rock is the only real similarity between the two bands. Kody takes Opossom in a much

more accessible direction than UMO. You would not find a great track like Electric Hawaii's "Blue Meanies" on an Unknown Mortal Orchestra album. "Blue Meanies" is pure pop fun. If "Pumped Up Kicks" can be a hit, then so can "Blue Meanies."

"Getaway Tonight" is another pop confection that should be blasting on every college radio station in the states. Nielsen has a way with pop hooks and using just the right amount of aural rust on the mix to make you think you're hearing some long lost pop nugget. Opossom have much more in common with Kevin Parker and Tame Impala than with his former band and big brother's main gig. Like Kevin Parker, Cody Nielsen has as much love for a great sugary pop hook as he does for a psychedelic acid freakout.

Not that there aren't plenty of those moments. On the second half of Electric Hawaii we're treated to plenty of LSD-laced aural trips. "Why Why" has a striking similarity to George Harrison's "Wah Wah" during the chorus, with just the right amount of reverb to make you think you're listening to the album being played inside a grain silo. "Cola Elixir" sounds like The Black Angels scoring Surf Nazis Must Die. "Electric Hawaii" is a trippy instrumental that leads into "Outer Space," a slowed-down jam that would've sounded just fine on the Zombies' Odyssey and Oracle. "Inhaler Song" ends this great album on a somber note. Like a funeral dirge played through a vacuum, this is Opossom at their Tame Impala-best.

This is a half hour of freaked-out, acid bubblegum pop bliss that you won't mind flashbacks from. (John Hubner)

Sigur Ros

Valtari

When I think back to the fall and winter months of 2002, one of the more memorable times of my life, I automatically hear Sigur Rós' () record. In those days we were still living in the confused wake of 9/11, and



many of us, myself included, felt like we were waiting for something to start. Or maybe end. I had decided to put off my final semester of college (for the rest of my life) in favor of artistic struggle, failure and ridiculous honesty. All those young man things. That record, (), was the needed emotional score for 2002's particularly chilly winter, the one in which I hit the reset button. I'd sprawl out in my car, not wanting to go into the house, freezing while all those epic untitled tracks played through slowly, making me feel as if I were living in some coming-of-age movie where the protagonist was constantly finding new meaning in the mundane - the Art Bechstein of my town, wandering lost and lonely but ready for whatever. Listening to Jonsi's made-up Hopelandic language as if it meant anything at all, just waiting around in a beautifully cloudy state I've never found

Ever since, I've romanticized the music of these Icelandic postrock soundscapers, hoping that each new release would somehow trigger another romantic, hopeful time in my life. I've sat through all the lame ducks, listening closely, hoping for something half as good as () or Ágætis byrjun with no such luck. Sure, Takk was decent (if forgettable) and With a Buzz in Our Ears We Play Endlessly had those two great tracks – but nothing since has moved me so deeply,

Nine Inch Nails

Pretty Hate Machine (1989)

Nine Inch Nails have always been called "industrial" music. It would be unwarranted to say that they invented the genre, but NIN did take it up a notch with this, their debut album. They blended a darker sound with



funkier beats to reach both the Goth and dance crowd, and it appears to have worked.

Opening with "Head Like a Hole," the record explodes into a mixture of drumming, synthesized beats and the frosty vocals of Trent Reznor. It's techno, metal, punk and a little poppy all at the

Terrible Life" continues the angst and is a little heavier, while "Down In It" sounds a lot like the club version of New Order. "Sanctified" sounds like it could be a great song with a heavy bass lead-in, but just never quite develops. "Kinda I Want To" continues the sampling and trippy synthesizer along with the creepy vocals from Reznor, but this one isn't as angry.

'Sin" sounds like early 80s new wave and is basically industrial house music with a techno twist. It really captures their sound before they went a little darker in the mid-90s. "The Only Time" is probably funkiest track, with an abstract bass that crawls around in the background for about five minutes. I love the keyboards too, and it's probably my favorite song on the record.

The release closes with "Ringfinger," another "angry at my girlfriend" track (which does get a little old), but it still has some pretty crunchy guitars.

I sort of worship Reznor for his talent as a producer, engineer and musician. The man has enormous talent and has been a major contributor to music over the last 25 years.

like the band's second and third records did a decade ago. And so I gave up, shifting my hope towards old Mogwai records, Lotus Plaza discs, Thelonious Monk, leftover Brian Eno and, you know, the Bon Iver guy. Decent stuff, but none so special as ().


But then, finally, some new Sigur Rós videos started popping up on the internet - ridiculously beautiful videos by great directors like Ramin Bahrani that featured amazing music I'd never heard. And now, finally, we have Valtari, an truly incredible eight-song record that is every bit as cinematic and moving and intimate as (), if in a more controlled, streamlined way. Eight new gorgeous, deeply detailed compositions made perfect for those alone moments that make you start reflecting on whatever your big pedestrian picture may be - the swells, the sways, the strings and the cold, icy soul.

So yes, I've been living through my own movie moods again. this time to the mostly calm, more detailed than ever sounds of the again-great Sigur Rós. I play the record as background music when I sleep, or when I read, or when I write, or when I'm on the train. I play it daily, and with fall and winter around the corner I suspect that I'll only spin the record more and more through the frosty months. Floating through a new, different dream, a different person, forever stalled and confused but backed by one of life's greatest rewards: perfect sound. Valtari is so good, so satisfying, that I'm right back to where I was months ago in that I'm already in dire need of a great new record from the band. My dramatic soul begging for the score. (Greg W. 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

Compliments of the Vanderbilts

"I never thought this would happen to me. I am an administrator at a small Midwestern college, and I was on my way to a conference in Asheville, North Carolina ..."

No, you're not reading the start of my letter to Penthouse Forum. There are no scantily-clad medical students with heaving bosoms whose car overheated, stranded on the side of I-75. There were no offers for me to "accompany them on their Grand Rounds" once I got them into the college van and escorted them to safety.

The trip to and from was uneventful. When I returned home, however, there was a mysterious package waiting for me. I was expecting one set of wine samples (the ones from Pepperwood Grove, which I've posted about already), but a second set of samples showed up unannounced.

I've long ago learned not to look a gift horse in the (bottle) mouth.

These wine samples turned out to be from the Biltmore Estate's Winery. For those of you unfamiliar, the Biltmore Estate is an enormous chateau-style house built in the late 1800s by George Washington Vanderbilt II and still owned by the Vanderbilt family. The Biltmore Estate Winery was a dairy farm until the early 1970s. It is currently the most-visited winery in the U.S., with over a million visitors annually.

So, why is this of note? The Biltmore Estate and its associated winery are in ... Asheville, North Caroline. I could have saved them some shipping charges, although I don't think the Vanderbilts are hurting for cash these days.

Anyway, the Biltmore winery itself grows about 250 tons of grapes a year. On site they grow Chardonnay, Riesling, Viognier, Cabernet Franc, Cabernet Sauvignon and Merlot. They sell about 140,000 cases of wine per year. One ton of grapes yields about 60 cases of wine

Since the estate's grapes can only provide a little over 10 percent of that yield, grapes get sourced from other growing regions, largely in northern California.

In the mysterious Biltmore box was one each of the red and white from the Biltmore's "Century Collection." These wines, which retail for \$13-16, were first bottled in 1999 as tasting-room-only offerings. The Biltmore's winemaker, Bernard DeLille, said that he was trying to create a wine that would allow a wine drinker to "re-live their Biltmore experience at home by simply opening a bottle and pouring a glass. As the wines grew in popularity, they expanded production and began making them available through retail outlets

Biltmore (NV) Century Red Wine: This red,



sourced from three locations in California, is a blend of Sangiovese, Merlot and Zinfandel. The Sweet Partner in Crime swirled this and exclaimed, "Vanilla!" For sure. The first whiff is powerful vanilla, followed by a bunch of dark fruit. Blackberries and cherries, predominantly. This is a wine that really improves with decanting, as straight from the bottle the finish is clipped and the flavors don't last long. With some air the flavors brighten a bit. It's a "firm" wine, but the finish stayed quick, even after decanting. The fruit flavors are quite nice while they're there, and the tannins are mellow.

We had this alongside a grilled flank steak, some sautéed mushrooms and a salad. The vinaigrette wasn't the best match, but the crystallized ginger we'd thrown in the salad was wonderful with it. The steak and mushrooms were tasty enough matches. A decent enough bottle for an everyday quaffer.

Biltmore (NV) Century White Wine: Ninetyeight percent of the juice in this wine comes from Mendocino and Monterey. Two percent is actually from North Carolina. It's a blend of some very aromatic grapes - Gewurztraminer, Muscat Canelli, Riesling, and Symphony (which is a cross between Muscat and White Grenache). The nose is peppery and peachy. I thought it smelled very much like a Gewürztraminer from the Pacific Northwest. The major flavors are ripe pineapple with some cloves and cinnamon underneath. It turned out lighter than I expected. I thought it would be a bit more palate-coating, considering the residual sugar level. The finish is peppery with a good deal of sweetness, as the residual sugar finally shows up. Again, a very solid wine – flavors like a Gewurz, but milder and not quite as heavy. If you were trying to introduce the notion that "not all sweet wine is bad" to a friend, this wouldn't be a bad start. Conversely, if you wanted to start moving an "I only like sweet wine" person towards the light, this would also be a good starting point. Food-wise, we had this alongside a Thai-style chicken, shrimp and rice soup since gewürztraminer goes so well with those flavors. This one was no exception.

This was my first time with Biltmore wines. I can only hope I have the same good fortune after my upcoming trip to Oregon (aforementioned medical students optional).

steady stream of these youngsters raiding their mom and dad's record collection and finding that Mom and Dad were a hell of a lot cooler than they thought.

Wild Nothing were actually in the forefront of this alternative 80s nostalgia trip. In 2010 they released the excellent *Gemini*, followed by the equally retrolicious *Golden Haze* EP later that year. Wild Nothing's main guy, Jack Tatum, took some time to come up with the followup LP, and it shows. *Nocturne* is more concise, clear-eyed and focused than any of the previous releases. He seems to have found the perfect balance between his influences and his own voice.

"Shadow" opens the album with an airiness of a long forgotten summer dream. It brings to mind a car ride to town, sitting in the backseat of your parents' car with the radio playing something that nearly lulls you to sleep. These are 80s dreams re-invented in the age of iPads and social networks. "Nocturne" reminds me of what Ariel Pink could do if he upgraded his record-

ing technique a bit and stopped having the nightmares. "Through The Glass" has a big sound with reverbed drums and vocals and a tight acoustic guitar. "Only Heather' has a Real Estate vibe and a "beating the steering wheel" drive to it. This is a song you crank driving on the toll road cruising into Chicago for the night. "Rheya" closes the album as the dream pop cherry on the melancholy sundae called *Nocturne*.

I admit it. I'm a sucker for 80s alternative. I love it. It's mix of melancholy moods – reminiscences about a day long gone and people you were once close to but are now merely ghosts of your present – but it puts me in a happy place. This music is human nature done up with a dance beat, clean guitar lines, synth melodies and a voice lost in the analog wilderness. Merchandis, Diiv, Real Estate, Frankie Rose and Craft Spells are doing it right. Wild Nothing was at the forefront of this musical renaissance, and continues to stay there with Nocturne. Dax Shepard and Pals Have Some Fun with Hit and Run

When I heard that Smokey and the Bandit was Dax Shepard's inspiration for Hit and Run, it didn't inspire confidence. I wasn't a fan of Burt Reynolds until Boogie Nights, or of Sally Field until Norma Rae. But I did see Smokey and the Bandit back in the day, because I was and ever will be a huge fan of "The Great One," Jackie Gleason. When I realized that Tom Arnold had inherited Gleason's role in a skewed way, as an accident-prone, insecure federal marshal, I had to laugh. I did a lot of laughing during Hit and Run, one of the funniest mash ups of genre films I've ever seen.

Hit and Run is a raunchy, politically incorrect (or at least politically ambiguous) romance/on the run/shoot 'em up/car chase romp. No dogs were harmed in the making of this film. Some very cool vehicles were damaged. Some less than cool vehicles were abused, some repeatedly. There are some very candid and explicit conversations about relationships and sex, handled with a big sense of humor. There is nudity, but all of it is older folks and rounder folks. (Think Side-

ways, only worse.) I mention first the things that might offend - if you're sensibilities are slightly proper – because all of the crazy stuff is still handled with a goofy sweetness. (Plenty of grumpy critics, mostly old guys, have panned the film.) For all the folks who love all the elements I've mentioned so far, let me now mention what might turn you off.

The gorgeous girl who provokes all

the mayhem is a sweet thing who happens to have numerous degrees in non-violent conflict resolution. Her political correctness and her need to work through every conflict, no matter how small could drive you crazy. Luckily, there is so much good chemistry between all on screen the overall tone of Hit and Run is buoyant, fast, fun and very sweet

This really is an example of "hey kids, let's put on a show." The film is the product of a group of friends getting together. Shepard and David Palmer co-wrote and codirected the film. They are friends who have worked together before, and they are having a good time here.

Shepard stars in the film as Charlie Bronson, a guy living in a small town somewhere in California. He's leading a low key life because he is in the witness protection program. He's watched over ever so ineffectively by Randy (Arnold.)

He's very much in love with his girlfriend Annie, the lovely Kristen Bell who is Shepard's fiancé off screen. Their off-screen affection for each other translates well to the screen. Annie thinks Charlie witnessed a bank robbery gone very wrong and that he's in witness protection for having testified against the bad guys. As the film rolls along, the real truth about his past comes out.

When Annie is forced by her slightly demented boss (a very funny Kristen Chenoweth) to go to Los Angeles for a job interview that will secure her dream job, there

is trouble in paradise. Annie says she won't go because Charlie can't go back to Los Angeles, the scene of the crime. But Charlie's love for Annie triumphs. He decides to drive her to Los Angeles and quit the program.

The problems begin when Annie's exboyfriend Gil (Michael Rosenbaum), who is still crazy about her and convinced Charlie is some sort of truly criminal type, interferes. Gil gets his brother the cop to do a little improper research on Charlie.

For the drive to Los Angeles, Charlie has decided to drive his 1967 Lincoln. He wasn't supposed to take anything when he went into the program, but he couldn't leave behind a car he spent so much time and money restoring and enhancing. The car is really Shepard's, and he does his own driving. His passion for cars and driving shows in the screenplay.

From his brother's search of the license plate of this gorgeous machine, Gil learns Charlie's real name. He looks up Charlie's past and befriends one of the guys Charlie testified against. Big mistake, but Gil isn't the sharpest tool in the drawer.

Within miles of leaving their sweet, happy home Annie and Charlie are being followed by Gil, Randy and a gang of bank robbers. Later, Gil's brother and his partner ioin in the chase. The bank robbing gang includes Alex Demitri, played by an almost unrecognizable Bradley Cooper. Alex has weird blond dreadlocks that hang over his face, and he wears yellow reflective glasses that seem like a disguise.

Alex is a hot head and a sensitive guy, and he has revenge on his mind. He is joined by Allen (Ryan Hanson) and Neve (Joy Bryant who plays Shepard's wife on the TV show Parenthood). They want revenge, and they want Charlie's share of the money from the robberies they committed. Oops. That's a little bit of a spoiler.

I don't want to spoil the sidetracks Hit and Run makes. Some you see coming. Others you don't. The ones you do see coming are there because the filmmakers want you to anticipate. This is a spoiler example. Hit and Run is not the kind of film that shows you a room full of naked people only once, but you can see the joke coming.

The asides are a mixed bag, but watch for Beau Bridges and Sean Hayes in wonderful cameo roles. What is consistently entertaining are the conversations on the road between Annie and Charlie. It takes all of her conflict resolution skills to work through the strange circumstances presented to her. Conflict-resolution chick meets bank robbing ethic. It is a ripe comedic situation.

Annie's reality is shattered by what she learns on the road, but she also gets charged up by the adrenaline rush. And so do we.

A Vacation Right Here at Home

It continues to amaze me how often we take our own hometown for granted. I have an example I think pretty well sums up the problem. For more than eight years I lived in Rochester, New York, a city I still consider "home" because I have family and friends who remain there. One of the big attractions in Rochester is the Lilac Festival, an event timed to correspond to the peak of lilac season in the gardens of Highland Park. One day many years ago, I got into a conversation with an older coworker whose husband had recently passed away, and when she learned I was from Rochester, she immediately began telling me of her fond memories of trips there to see the lilacs in May. She clearly loved the experience and envied me having grown up in the city which they so enjoyed visiting after many hours of driving.

I agreed that the lilacs were a splendid thing, too embarrassed to admit that in my years in Rochester – and even in my visits home from college (which were often in May) and with my family years later – I had never once been to the Lilac Festival. All these years later I still have never visited, and at this point I'm pretty sure I never will. In fact, I've never seen those lilacs, period – festival or no!

This is a cautionary tale to those of you who may spend many days intending to visit attractions here in Fort Wayne but never get around to it – or only do it when family visits from out of town. While we often plan vacations to other cities to see their sights, it's easy to overlook just how much is going on right here in our backyard.

Be a Tourist in Your Own Hometown is designed for exactly those reasons. On Sunday, September 9 from noon to 5 p.m., a simple passport (available online on the Visit Fort Wayne website or at area Scott's, Kroger and Tower Bank locations) gains you free entry into 12 local museums, places you may keep promising to take the kids but just never got around to.

Among the gems you may have overlooked is the African/African-American Museum which provides enlightening tours with docents who really know their stuff. A city like Fort Wayne, which really loves


its history, should embrace this great house-turnedmuseum on East Douglas. Artlink is also included and this year sports a new facility which gives the gallery far more space and educational options than before (more on Artlink's new digs in the next Fare Warning).

The Embassy Theatre, the Fort Wayne Museum of Art and the History Center are generally familiar to most in the city, but when was the last time you visited one of them? Here's your chance to check them out for free, and the Embassy is allowing self-guided tours to those who want to explore a bit.

Parkview Field is well known for its TinCaps games, but on an off day it's fun to check out the park more closely - and enjoy some concessions while you're at it. The Allen County Courthouse and Historic Fort Wayne provide further examples of the city's love of history and architecture, as is the Lincoln Tower which continues to shine even as Lincoln's presence has diminished over the years. Science Central is a great place for family fun and hands-on learning, providing one of our hometown's truly unique tourist attractions. And the Botanical Conservatory has become a great place for everything from meetings to weddings to musical performances, but don't wait for a special occasion to go. The staff there has some very creative ways to make their collection of foliage and plant-life fun and very special.

Last but not least, check out the Visit Fort Wayne location at the corner of Washington and Harrison. Not only can you find out more about Be a Tourist in Your Own Hometown and lots of upcoming events in Fort Wayne, but it sports one of the area's best gift shops. And what day of tourism is complete without a souvenir of the day's activities?



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Coming to a Bad End

When a television show is done well, that is, when it develops an interesting story arc that lasts at least a handful of seasons, I tend to form a relationship with that show. Not just the characters, but the lo-

cations and writers and style of the show. And the message, be there one. Most recently I fell hard for HBO's The Newsroom, a series that I think will be better remembered for how passionately it articulated its complex message - that we can't trust the media - than its soapy tendencies, Juno-fast banter and slanted ideals. The first show I loved as much as the movies was The Sopranos and my favorite show of all time - surprise, surprise – is David Simon's The Wire, a series I've now watched six times in three years. While I don't think I'll ever connect to The Newsroom as much as I did The Wire or The Sopranos, there are four current shows that I love very much: Mad Men, Louie, Treme and, of course, AMC's Breaking Bad, the show one of my heroes, Chuck Klosterman, called the "best show of the last 10 years, edging out Mad Men, The Sopranos and The Wire." Of those four, I think Breaking Bad has recently secured it's place as the most realized of its time. From the beginning, my re-

lationship with Breaking Bad has been a conflicted one. It's clearly a creative show with strong writing and an often beautiful visual style. The production has guts and passion, and, most importantly, each season has been more entertaining, and artsy, than the last. That said, I don't understand what the show is about. Our hero, Walter White, is a high school chemistry teacher who gets cancer and thus suddenly needs to make a whole lot of money. To make the money, he starts cooking and selling the best meth on the market. Later in the series Walter appears to be both healthy and wealthy. He's gotten away with it. His cancer is in remission, he has a somewhat happy family life and he's financially secure. But Walter keeps on making a drug that ruins lives, kills people, even, when he no longer needs to. Along the way, as a direct result of Walter's work in the meth game, many people die. Too many to count. In the series' most recent episode, for example, Walter pays to have nine men killed in prison. In the prior week's episode Walter shoots one of his partners in cold blood, and in an episode before that one of Walter's associates kills a little boy for no good reason.

Is this a show with a hero? Or is it a show about a good man who is overtaken by greed and, in a way, a sense of purpose? (Walter is quite

proud of the fact that he cooks the best known meth around.) Or is it just a series about how a man turns into a mass murdering drug kingpin - the failed War On Drugs and how people do, and always will, find a way to get high?

The setup for the series has been lost along the way. In season one we're made to root for a good man who has to do a really bad thing in order to give his family the life he feels they deserve. We're absolutely convinced that he's doing the only thing he can to protect his wife, son and new daughter. But then he gets better. He no longer has a reason to be involved with such a destructive business, but he keeps at it. He works harder than ever and becomes more destructive than ever. During the montage where nine men are killed in prisons at Walter's command, the Frank Sinatra recording "Pick Yourself Up" plays, reminding very much of both The Godfather and The Sopranos. An homage? Or is series creator Vince Gilligan finally telling us that, yes, this is a show about the making of a drug lord. A show about the reasons crime happens. A modern day mafia figure unlike any we've seen before. A man who had to go against the grain to fully realize his potential. Soon after the "Pick Yourself

Up" assassination sequence fades the episode ends, and we're informed that the show is taking a break. In the final seconds of the episode we see a tease that hints at the inevitable climax we've been waiting for all along. We learn that the second half of the 16-episode final season of Breaking Bad will conclude next June. The assassination scene, and the news of the break, finally defines Breaking Bad once and for all. This is a dark, ugly, scary show with an anti-hero who can never redeem himself. Walter White, a deeply written, flawed character who has been, at times, heroic, cannot possibly justify his post-season two actions. We see his mountain of money rising beyond the pile of bodies. We see his wife at home, dying inside, knowing what her husband does. We see Walter's brother-in-law, a DEA agent, fighting to track down the hot new meth on the streets. We learn that, no matter what happens in the final eight episodes of Breaking Bad, everyone around Walter White will be different for-

Unlikely Conversations

You & Me by Padgett Powell, Ecco, 2012

The primary reason that Samuel Beckett's Waiting for Godot has become one of the most important plays of the 20th century is that it is a blank screen onto which interpreters can cast their interpretations. It is specifically a play about nothing - Beckett himself said so - but because it is nothing in itself, it's available as a container that interpreters can use to hold anything they want it to hold. It's been seen as a metaphor for the Cold War, a Freudian exploration, a Christian parable. Beckett insisted it was just what it was: a dialogue between two guys waiting for a third guy who never

In this case, though, they aren't even really waiting for anyone, a hint that this novel about nothing is really more nothing than even the play

about nothing that inspired it.

shows up.

The framework of the novel is as simple as it could be. Two men sit on a porch somewhere in the South, and they talk. They talk about nothing and everything, their conversation touching on mundane topics but most often veering off on absurd tangents. They bounce non sequiturs off each other like tennis balls, volleying them back and forth until they eventually land squarely in the net, at which point one of the pair serves up a new nonsensical lob.

Waiting for Godot is a gem of modern absurdism, and it's the intoxicating spirit of absurdity that Powell hopes to invoke here. And invoke absurdity he does, although the result is far less than intoxicating. It is, in fact, numbing and exasperating. It is so far divorced from realism as to be almost impossible to endure.

The book's jacket claims that Powell is a writer with "a pitchperfect ear for the way Americans



talk," a claim that is in itself the height of absurdity. If Powell has an ear for natural American speech, he's without the chops or the will (one or the other, or both) to play it back to us in a way that we can recognize. Consider this exchange between the two characters in You

"Do you ever feel you've left your heart in San Francisco?"

"Yes, all the time."

"Of course not there, but yes, this is what we have done, left it somewhere." "Or did we perhaps not really have a heart, and come to know it?'

"Not there of course but

"This is perfectly tenable."

"Do you think hand-wringing now will effect a recov-

Pitch-perfect ear. For the way Americans talk. I think not. The novel is this and only this. No, it is less than this. It is this, too:

"Do you see this hazard of steel appearing -"

"What is a hazard of steel?"

"I don't know. But it appears to recede into infinity ...'

And then, the next chapter:

"Have you had further occasion to view the hazard of steel?"

"No. It has been replaced by a vision of flowers."

"Giant flowers issuing from the giant pistol action?"

'No. A field of gladiolas.

Tended by a blind man.'

Powell is able to put together some clever turns of phrase and some evocative imagery, but they are bobbing in a sea of nothingness. If you have the patience to tread water as you wait for them to float by, by all means give this novel a try. Otherwise, I have no doubt that you have much better things to do with your time, and you should do them.

ever. He got a taste of the dream and became a monster. Needless to say, Walter White is a complicated character.

Me? I can't wait to see what happens. It'll be ugly and sad and, if nothing else, Breaking Bad will likely go down as both a cautionary tale and a sign of the times, one of the most unlikely and, sadly, believable American mafia stories ever told. The greatest show of its time? Probably. Better than The Wire and The Sopranos, as Klosterman claimed? Absolutely not, but certainly the best byproduct of those shows to date.

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
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
