So read on and plan yourself a little pre-holiday and holiday fun. All we ask is that you tell everyone you meet along the way that whatzup sent you.

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
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-----Cover Story • Fiddler on the Roof -----Made for Their Roles

It is true in theatre, as in film and television, that certain actors become indelibly connected to particular roles. Although playing to smaller audiences, stage actors can often perform the same show repeatedly for years, even decades. True, sometimes the connection is reinforced by films which leave an eternal legacy (who can think of

The King & I without thinking of Yul Brenner or My Fair Lady without Rex Harrison?), but even without that enduring link, Zero Mostel became a household name when he won a Tony Award for his Broadway performance as Tevye in 1964's Broadway production of Fiddler on the Roof and became forever associated with the part.

But in truth, few have embodied that role longer or more completely than stage veteran Jimmy Ferraro who was first tapped to perform in Fiddler by the legendary Jerome Robbins 36 years ago. Having "moved up the ranks" as he says now, and originally performing alongside Herschel Bernardi as Tevye, Ferraro has now logged over 2,000 Fiddlers, many in the lead role which made Mostel a star. It's a character he continues to em-

brace without any shred of fatigue in his enthusiastic account of his ca-

"Tevye celebrates life and always finds hope," he says. "No matter what tragedies he faces, he always respects his family

traditions. He talks to God like he talks to anyone else, and I always enjoy those moments in the show."

What he is also enjoying this time around is the opportunity to co-star with his wife, Dee Etta Rowe. Although they have shared the stage together several times, in between bouts of going their separate ways to pursue different jobs, this production of Fiddler on the Roof, which visits Fort Wayne's historic Embassy Theatre on November 13, marks their first time playing opposite each other as Tevye and Golde, the parents who must lament their daughters' choices in marital partners even as they celebrate their own devoted union. Happy to spend this time interacting on stage together in these two classic roles, the show provided the real-life couple with a remarkable bit of symmetry which was very emotional for them both.

"My wife and I recently celebrated our 25th wedding anniversary, and on our anniversary we performed two shows," recalls Ferraro. "In those shows, when we sang 'Do You Love Me' there's a line 'For 25 years I have lived with him' and we realized that Tevye and Golde had been married for 25 years, too. So when we sang that song that day, we got a little more choked up than usual. It's just been marvelously wonderful to work with her in this production."

Although Ferraro loves Tevye and calls the role "something I'm happy to come back to, even after playing him most of my life,' he does get ample opportunities to branch his own senior prom while performing in Hello Dolly at a community theatre. But his biggest break was to come when Robbins the "God of American musical theatre," Ferraro says - chose him for a touring company of Fiddler, and of the 42 cast members who were in that production he was one of only 12 tapped to head to Broadway.

From that first taste of success to his current nine-month run in this touring show,

> spray. ("Going from Papa Tevye to Mama Edna certainly provided me with a much different role," he laughed.) He has also enjoyed playing iconic supporting roles like Nicely-Nicely Johnson in Guys and Dolls as well as Sancho in Man of La Mancha.

"Sancho is another staple role of mine," he says. "And with that role as in all of the others, no matter how often you play the part, you learn something new all of the time. Different directors breathe new life into the shows, and the director we have now for Fiddler has a great vision which comes right across the footlights. Every cast, venue, audience brings something new each night so it's never the same thing over and over."

Ferraro considers himself fortunate to have been able to pursue - and succeed in the only career path he ever envisioned. He says his parents have 8mm footage of him singing and dancing in the backyard of his native Valley Stream, New York on Long Island where he discovered both school plays and local playhouses allowed him to fulfill his destiny. In fact, Ferraro says, he missed Ferraro has managed to keep busy, as has Rowe who has found long-term success in Menopause The Musical. But each time a show ends - and this one winds down in April - the couple, having put out feelers while they're still on the road, hope more jobs are around the corner. While he still has roles he'd love to tackle (Fagin in Oliver! is his top pick), Ferraro is always happy to revisit roles which have given him and his audiences pleasure for so many years. The story and songs of Fiddler on the Roof - including memorable tunes like "If I Were a Rich Man," "Sunrise, Sunset" and "Matchmaker, Matchmaker" - endure to this day as timeless now as when they first appeared almost five decades ago.

"The show and the story still hold up today. Tevye's third daughter wants to marry a Russian, and Tevye doesn't want her to do it but she does it anyway. That kind of thing happens everyday. The conflicts in the show are things that are happening in families even now, but even as Tevye disapproves, when his daughter leaves, he says, 'May God be with you.' His humanity is what makes him such a wonderful character to play for all these years."

Keeping the Vibe Alive

How many tribute bands receive the opportunity to warm up for – or even tour with some of their heroes?

The answer may be "not many," but Badfish, a Rhode Island-based tribute to the So-Cal ska-punk 90s heroes Sublime have done exactly that.

The band formed in 2001 at the University of Rhode Island where drummer Scott Begin and bass player Joel Hanks decided to form a band that would pay tribute to some of their heroes while differentiating themselves from other bands in the area at the time.

"[Sublime] was just one of those bands that we all really liked a lot, and people in college that we were with and we knew growing up even before then, everyone really liked them," says Begin. "It spanned different genres, and we really enjoyed their music, and there really were not any bands around [us] doing that type of thing. There were a few tribute bands here and there covering some classic rock stuff

and whatnot, but we figured it might be something that people would be interested in."

Mainstream music fans will likely recognize Sublime from their hit singles "What I Got," "Santeria," and "Wrong Way" from their eponymous third album, released in 1996, but the band had already developed a loy-

al fan base amongst punk and college radio listeners in the early 90s. Tragically, that album proved to be simultaneously the band's mainstream breakthrough and its swan song, as lead singer Bradley Howell died of a heroin overdose two months before it was released, leading to the band's dissolution and an end to its output.

Unlike other California punkers such as Green Day and Offspring who broke into the mainstream in the 90s, Sublime incorporated ska, reggae and surf elements into a cut-and-paste, dub-oriented collage aesthetic that could just as easily be likened to post-modern artists like Beck and the Beastie Boys. Case in point: their second album, 1994's *Robbin' the Hood*, featured not just guest vocals by a pre-fame Gwen Stefani, but also a field recording of the psychotic

ramblings of a mentally disturbed man named Raleigh Theodore Sakers.

Given the breadth of the materials, samples and drum loops the original Sublime utilized to create their unique sound, replicating it live can be a challenge for Badfish.

"On a lot of the samples we will play an actual sample live. On a lot of the drum loops, we'll actually use drum loops and I [won't] play the kit during that song. Some of the sound effects and spoken word



effects that they used on the record we try to replicate live," says Begin. "Sometimes it's a matter of replicating it ourselves. Sometimes it'll be someone on the mic replicating it. But sometimes

we'll actually trigger the sample itself. Dorian, our keyboard player, actually went back and found a lot of the old hip-hop records that had the source samples."


While Badfish don't attempt to recreate Sublime's look or personalities on stage, they do strive to replicate their sound as closely as possible to the original recordings. While they do introduce some of their own elements to the music – such as a quick and pumpedup, 30-second version of the song "Pool Shark" – they don't deviate too far from the originals.

"Musically, we try pretty hard to present the songs in a way that people are used to hearing them," says Begin. "We've definitely taken liberties with some of the songs that lend themselves to improvisation, but I think for the most part we stay true to the arrangements that people are used to hearing on the records."

Their loyalty to the source material has even won the band approbation from surviving members of the Sublime camp. The band has had the opportunity to meet, open for and even tour with some of the individuals who were involved with the original lineup of Sublime

"We've played a couple shows with the Sublime drummer's Bud. He had a band called Del Mar, and




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Across the Generational Divide

Once upon a time, in the early days of rock n' roll, music divided the generations. Parents, appalled by the long hair and sheer volume of this new genre, railed against artists like Elvis Presley and the Beatles. But

a new day has dawned, and what once provided fodder for family disharmony now unites the generations as much as it once divided. Oh, there are still squabbles, to be sure (not all parents have embraced hip-hop or are prepared to call themselves Beliebers), but when it comes to classic rock or oldies radio stations or concerts featuring bands from 30 or even 40 years ago, age becomes almost irrelevant.

I have seen this phenomenon with my own kids. Our rather large blended family has experienced the shared bliss of Springsteen concerts in recent years. I've attended an Alice Cooper concert with my oldest, and my daughter is currently requesting Otis Redding on the car stereo

because "it relaxes before she heads to work. Then there's my middle child, Jamie, who has taken this retro thing in a direction I had not anticipated: he collects vinyl records. While I

have spent the last quarter-century trying to replace my vinyl with CDs (don't even talk to me about iPods), Jamie has spent the last several years doing the exact opposite.

As that collection was first taking shape, Jamie's friend Briana gifted him with a variety of albums, including Chicago II. Of course, I had grown up listening to Chicago, and I played Chicago VII constantly for a time. But I guess I hadn't played it enough in later years to expose my kids to their music, so this album was a great revelation to Jamie, a musician himself. He was hooked, and soon he had me helping him to acquire the entire Roman numeric assortment of Chicago LPs.

This story is not unique in families today. Check out audiences at most concerts featuring artists from yesteryear, and you are going to find smiling faces of all ages mouthing along to lyrics several decades old. What is remarkable is how a band like Chicago, which runs the gamut from jazzy rock to adult contemporary, has managed to sustain not only the often changing whims of the music industry but changes in lineup that might have crippled other groups.

The band, originally dubbed Chicago Transit Authority, debuted with a bang in 1969, releasing an eponymous double album

which included now-classic hits like the aptly titled "Beginnings" and "Does Anybody Really Know What Time It Is?" Although double albums were quite the rage for awhile (George Harrison even had a triple album), new bands have seldom thrown down the gauntlet in such bold fashion. But the group

they veered from their Roman numeral album titles. With the song "Alive Again," the band indicated only months after Kath's passing that they were prepared to move forward, with Cetera now handling the lead vocals almost exclusively. It proved a commercial boon for the band which now began

found an audience immediately. Nearly everyone climbed aboard this Chicago Transit Authority (except, ironically, the actual CTA which apparently doesn't cotton to rock bands paying homage to their hometown mass transit system in such fashion). Fortunately, the Windy City proved more forgiving when the band shortened their moniker to the far simpler

name of Chicago. By this time Chicago included saxophonist Walter Parazaider, guitarist Terry Kath, drummer Danny Seraphine, trombonist James Pankow, trumpet player Lee Loughnane, keyboardist Robert Lamm and bassist Peter Cetera, with Kath handling most of the lead vocals. Eventually, Cetera's voice was also heard more regularly, with his ballads "If You Leave Me Now" and "Baby What a Big Surprise" providing a counterpoint to the band's other hits like "Saturday in the Park." Chicago covered a lot of musical territory, and the diverse talents of its members allowed them to tap into the varied tastes and radio expectations of the 1970s. But that perfect balance was shattered in 1978 when Kath was killed by an accidental, self-inflicted gunshot wound.

In the wake of Kath's death, Chicago seemed to shift direction, naming their subsequent release Hot Streets, the first time charting with softer, 80s-friendly ballads featuring Cetera's smooth voice. While the horn section remained, the band seemed to be moving to a more pop-oriented sound with a new voice at the forefront and producer David Foster at the helm.

The new era was short-lived when Cetera left the band in the mid-1980s. Tired of life on the road and already having launched a successful solo career, Cetera's voice remained a mainstay of pop radio while Chicago moved forward with a new bassist/ vocalist/songwriter to fill Cetera's hefty role (Jason Scheff) and continued to have success of its own. Change again altered the lineup through the years, with founding member Seraphine leaving in 1990. (His memoir. Street Player - My Chicago Story, was released in 2010.) Yet despite these significant upheavals, Chicago boast a remarkably sturdy lineup of musicians, with Parazaider. Pankow, Loughnane and Lamm still on board. Even some of the replacement players, most notably Scheff, have now been part of the band longer than their predecessors.

Most significantly, the music and popularity of Chicago has endured through success and tragedy, change and consistency. It's for that reason that their appearance at the Honeywell Center in Wabash proved a hot ticket upon availability. Those catchy grooves, those hot horns and an unspeakably recognizable catalog of music have taken Chicago into its fifth decade and will continue to bring together generations of music lovers who will happily share them for years

A Band That Gives Back

A Huntington-based folk rock/indie rock band that in its two years of existence has played at a prison, recorded more than two albums' worth of material and developed a loyal and devoted fan base, James and the Drifters have accomplished a lot in a short time. While the band's name may remind some of the well-known doo-wop/R&B band the Drifters, their sound recalls something more akin to the country-tinged folk-rock explosion of the late 60s and early 70s, albeit modernized for a contemporary audience. In other words, their sound can be likened as being something

like the Flying Burrito Brothers as interpreted by Coldplay vocalist Chris Martin – or maybe just a more country-ish, full band variation of Sufjan Stevens' music.

Its members are for the most part the residents of a community associated with the 509 Church in Hundrington, but the band's music isn't overtly religious, and they avoid being tagged with the "Christian" label.

"It's tempting for us to be [labelled] a 'Christian' band,"

says Brent Chamberlin, multi-instrumentalist and one of the band's two chief songwriters, "because we can do the church scene and we can get paid by churches. To be honest, you can really milk Christian folk rock. Because folk music is now becoming mainstream, Christian folk rock is like everything else. But from an artist's standpoint, it's just not something that I feel comfortable with."

What James and the Drifters seek to do is deliver music with a positive, hopeful message without necessarily labeling themselves or broadcasting the fact that it's made up of sincerely religious band members.

"To give a comparison, it would be more like when you listen to Mumford and Sons and you think these guys are really hopeful. They have some base things going on," says Chamberlin. "You don't walk away from music like that. You don't say 'those guys are believers.' You just walk away and say, 'That song's really cool in a way that I relate to this and it has a message of hope and something deeper.' I don't necessarily want people to listen to us and say, 'Oh, those guys are Christians' or 'That's a Christian band.' I hope that art touches people no matter what religion they come from. I hope my art can have that kind of effect, that kind of power."

As for how the band came by its name, it has both a prosaic and metaphoric meaning. The name itself, however, is from another source entirely.

"A drifter is someone who is wandering. And I think – to quote *The Lord of the Rings* – not all who wander are lost. I think it's an okay thing to drift around, not sure what's going on. I feel that way, being just out of college. I feel like I'm drifting from one job to the next, one passion to the next, one identity to the next – kind of like, what's my place? And so I think that's where James and the Drifters comes from. No one in the band is James. James is this other person, but we can relate to being drifters."

Additionally, as a part of a church community, its members have lent some of their time, space and resources to those in need, which is the literal source of the band's name. Specifically, the homeless shelter in Huntington has directed some individuals in short-term need to the 509's community house, where some of the band members have come to their aid.

"We had about three people within two years come into our lives at the community house, that were looking for a place to stay," says Chamberlin. "So we had these interesting people come to stay at our house, and, surprisingly, their names were always James. And we would always say, 'Come in,' and give them



food. One guy was walking from Florida to Seattle. When the oil spill happened, he lost his job and basically found a job in Seattle, and so he started walking. He came to us, and we let him stay for the night, bought him a bus ticket and sent him on his way the next day."

To date, James and the Drifters have recorded and released three albums' worth of material, a 2010 eponymous debut, 2011's *Train!* and this year's *Before the Dawn: The Otter Lake Sessions*, something of a precursor to the pending release of another album, *Morning Light*. All of the band's recordings to date are available for listening on their website.

Unlike some music acts that may come to mind with the term "folk rock," James and the Drifters's music is often upbeat and even danceable.

"We are very energetic when we play live. We are dancing around and sweating bullets. It's just a lot of fun. Our music is just really accessible and upbeat, and people have a good time," says Chamberlin.

"Usually when you say folk rock, people think they're gonna go to a show and just kind of watch you, but we're very crowd interactive. Absolutely."

The audience connection is something that has not only paid off for the band, but is something that they try to reciprocate. They generally play two to three shows per weekend and have kept the earnings from their live shows in a fund exclusively for the band, using it to finance their recordings which are then given back to their fans at no charge.

"People came [to shows] and paid money for us, and we were able to completely pay for our recording because of it," says Chamberlin. "We saved the money; we didn't take it and pocket it. We took all the money we made from the last two years of shows into an account, and we saved it and we paid for our entire recording and mastering and stuff from that and we gave it away for free."

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
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Yesterday Dreamers

Ten songs, 35 minutes. Fuzzy guitars, eight-track production and everyman vocals. John "J" Hubner, perhaps best known for both his writing as a music critic and the many records made by his other band, Goodbyewave, spends his days working, his evenings daddying and his nights making things



out in Warsaw, Indiana. Loads of things. He maybe sleeps, too, but I'm not convinced (peruse his blog, www.jhubner73.com, for proof). When recording under the Goodbyewave moniker, he makes big, immaculately detailed and produced pop tracks that fans of Kevin Hambrick, The Beatles, ELO, Wilco and Vandolah should love. Possibly dearly. When wearing his sunnydaymassacre Chucks, Hubner keeps it loose, recording lo-fi rock and pop tracks that are often driven by the primal, ageless drive that any lasting rock n' roll fan has somewhere in his system. There's piano and bass and drums and other things, but, mostly, there's J and his electric guitar. And probably some beers. And, ya know, obviously, a record button.

His latest sunnydaymassacre effort, Yesterday Dreamers, couldn't be a better follow up to his last lo-fi effort, the great Possible Pinch Points. The overall aesthetic here might be a bit more guttural and, well, rockin'; but, for the most part, all the elements are here, and they keep getting better. Hubner's writing becomes more interesting by the song, his own voice coming out of the cracks more and more with each release.

And while I'm no expert on the subject of composition or production, I feel safe saying that Yesterday Dreamers shows improvements in those areas, too. In a recent article written about Hubner, he explained how he had trouble finding like-minded musicians in Warsaw through the 90s. "I didn't know anyone that played bass, so I bought a bass and played it myself. I didn't know anyone who played drums, so I bought a drum set and played it myself. I didn't know any singers, so I begrudgingly sang my own songs."

What makes Hubner, and Yesterday Dreamers, most interesting is that J is a fan first. I've known more songwriters than I could ever keep track of, and one of the main common personality defects among the dopes is that very often they seem to have lost their interest in being a fan. They like making stuff and standing on stages. And they like listening to what they listened to before they started "taking their art seriously." But new stuff? Bands that don't sound familiar? No thanks. That's not Hubner, and his progress, and the diversity of his songwriting, is the better for it. Take this great new Dreamers track called "Sunday Lies," for example. Five years ago, when I first heard Goodbyewave, I never could've imagined Hubner making such a song. I don't know if he was listening to The Kinks back in those days, but he certainly is now, and I like that.

Head over to sunnydaymassacre.bandcamp.com now and download the album at no cost. Or give a little – totally up to you. You can also order a retro hard copy, handcrafted CD edition of the album if you choose to do so. Me? I think *Yesterday Dreamers* belongs on 12-inch vinyl. Or maybe a double 10-inch that, for the hell of it, plays at 45 RPM. Clear vinyl, gatefold. Maybe a little picture of me in the liner notes. Just in the background somewhere. (*Greg W. Locke*)

Ariel Pink

Mature Themes

There's something about Ariel Pink's quirky, eccentric sound that makes me feel very strange. Not every song puts me on the can, but overall, Pink's records – especially the "chillwave" tracks – prompt the corner of my brain that loves music to feel, I dunno, sorta molested.




Like many of his contemporaries, Pink is a Tarantino-spirited fanboy artist in that he has digested enough variations of pop and rock music to make his own offerings feel instantly familiar. And so he writes a lot of songs and releases a lot of records – nine in the past decade or so. Pink's most recent offering, 2010's *Before Today*, was by far his most celebrated effort yet and included on countless year-end lists, the track "Round and Round" even being called the best song of the year by the staff at Pitchfork.com. And yeah, I like that song; it's a trippy, atmospheric

ture of hard rock, punk, Goth and grunge, with most tracks clocking in at just around two minutes.

"Bruise Violet" opens the album with three frantic chords in front of shrill vocals and thunderous drumming. It's "riot girl" power, rock n' roll style. Maureen Herman pounds her bass in "Right Now" to go along with the scrappy, but valued guitars of lead singer Kat Bjelland (Courtney Love played bass for Babes in '87). "Bluebell" continues the angst with more aggressive language, as does "Handsome And Gretel." Just imagine a female version of Black Flag, if that's even possible.

The middle tracks of the record include more screaming and knotty arrangements that would have made 70s girl band The Runaways blush. The instrumental "Quiet Room" sort of clears the palate with a basic guitar track before the tone picks back up with the creepy, almost serene, "Spun." This was the sound that Love and her band Hole borrowed, as did many of the bands that followed, like L7, Bikini Kill and Slint. I do value the vocal range that Bjelland was able to lay down on this track and respect the fact that, as a band, they were able to hang in the era of grunge dominated by dudes.

The record closes with "Gone" which is punctuated by the sound of bottles crashing to the floor behind the harmonies of what I think is one of the more original bands of the past 2- years. They split up in 2001.

adventure that reminds me of Richard O'Brien's work on *The Rocky Horror Picture Show*'s soundtrack.

And I like quite a few of the tracks on Pink's brand new record, *Mature Themes*. The lead single, "Only In My Dreams," for example, is a great piece of 60s-inspired oddball pop. It's light and breezy with a big hook and the exact type of jangly-guitar that I love so much.

Half, maybe more, of *Mature Themes* is great. Fantastic, even. But that other half or so has me pulling the needle just as much as any of Pink's previous stomach turners. "Schnitzel Boogie," a Technicolor, drug-addled type of retro tune is an odd one, as is opener "Kinski Assassin," maybe the creepiest of the bunch, with Pink singing in an oddly sinister, pervy tone that's different from the many other voices we hear Pink take on throughout *Themes*' 13 tracks. I can't quite put my finger on how to describe what it is about the Pink songs that keep me from loving the guy, but – like certain David Bowie, Brian Eno, Roxy Music or Hall & Oates tracks – there's an unsettling sexuality in the words and vocals and accompaniments that distract from the otherwise good songwriting we hear on the album. I feel the same way when I watch early John Waters or Todd Solondz films.

Call it the chillwave effect. Like every single artist ever to dabble in the still-new, still-stupid sub-genre, Pink likes to lean on electronics and post-production, using more than his share of retro keyboards and effects processing throughout his tracks. A shame, I think, as he has proven himself to be, over the course of 10 studio albums, a songwriter who can work in several genres in very interesting ways. As far as artistic appeal goes, he reminds me, more than anyone else currently making music, of the late T. Rex frontman Marc Bolan, who also had an incredible knack for twisted glam rock and psychedelic pop. Also in common, both men sing, at all times, in a way that oozes with sexual innuendo.

So, if you enjoy 80s pop, 60s pop rock and psychedelic production, and you like the idea of someone trying to do all of these things at once, then you'll probably like *Mature Themes*. Or, to make it easier, if you can imagine mid-career Bowie (when he was making

albums with Eno) doing cheesy 80s pop music, then many of the tracks on *Themes* will be very much for your ears. But don't be surprised if you get halfway through the record and start having rape-y daydream nightmares involving Dylan Baker's Bill Maplewood character from the film *Happiness*, Solondz' uncomfortable 1998 classic. Because that's how I feel when I listen to too much Ariel Pink: molested, uncomfortable and indescribably sedated. Other than that, *Mature Themes* is a good listen. If nothing else, check out the tracks "Only In My Dreams" and "Mature Themes." Me? I'll stick with the 80s synth-pop sound of M83. (*GWL*)

Tame Impala

Lonerism

In a lot of ways, Kevin Parker reminds me of Elliot Smith. Musically? No. But aesthetically, yes. Like Elliot Smith, Parker writes songs that feel lonely. Isolated. Also



like Elliot Smith, Parker's songs come from a place deep down inside of himself. The outside world is of no concern; the world in his head is where he writes from. But unlike Elliot Smith, I don't believe Parker is sad about being alone. He isn't a tortured soul, just an old soul.

And that Technicolor landscape deep in Parker's head is where the excellent new album *Lonerism* comes from – a place where John Lennon joined Blue Cheer and committed himself to acid head trip jams and Sid and Marty Krofft-directed episodes of Little House on the Prairie. Tie-dyed tees and bean bag chairs. Schwinn Stingrays and key parties.

Parker isn't old enough to have experienced the 70s, so he's re-creating them one album at a time. This time out, he's perfected them.

"Be Above It" starts the album out with a looped voice repeating "gotta be above it" continuously, along with a looped drum part before Parker comes and turns this song into an anthem of sorts, a PSA straight from Perth, Australia. At first listen it's odd, but after you hear it two or three times it becomes this almost beautiful mantra. "Endors Toi" has that windswept stoicism that permeated Tame Impala's excellent *Inner Speaker*. "Apocalypse Dreams" sounds like a lost Lennon track, a mix of "A Day in the Life" and Plastic Ono Band idealism with a pinch of THC for good measure. "Mind Mischief' has a great, Marc Bolanesque rock n' roll groove.

Then, midway into this excellent album, you are hit with three amazing acid-tinged pop tracks. "Music To Walk Home By," "Why Won't They Talk to Me" and "Feels Like We Only Go Backwards" are some of the catchiest pop songs you will likely hear this year. Parker shows what a true pop music revivalist he is at heart. "Keep on Lying" is in a class of it's own. It's a long, strange meditation on Parker's own head space. Who's he lying to? Us? Himself? It doesn't matter, 'cause I dig his lies. Every single one of them.

The fact that Kevin Parker's voice reminds me of a younger, reincarnated John Lennon only adds to the love I'm feeling for Tame Impala right now. Parker breaks out the riff strut of "Elephant" to pull us out of our daze, if just for a moment. It's about as rocking as it gets in Tame Impala country. Much like the *Inner Speaker* track "Island Walking" (sadly not included on the vinyl version), "Elephant" grabs hold with a monster guitar riff that lives up to the song's namesake. Much like "Runways, Houses, City, Clouds" on *Inner Speaker*, "Nothing That Has Happened So Far Has Been Anything We Could Control" is the epic, existential moment on an already epic record. I'll spare you a long explanation of what it means because

I don't know. My one-word guess: transcendence.

Tame Impala have given us a gift in *Lonerism*. Perth, Australia has given us a gift in Kevin Parker. *Lonerism* seems to be a state of mind – a state of mind where it's okay to be alone. A place where you're comfortable with the ghosts of the past and the visions of a place that has never really existed come together to make a Technicolor dream you needn't wake from.

Kevin Parker may be alone, but never lonely. (John Hubner)

Metz Metz

Metz' debut is a blistering, punishing 29 minutes of what would be the equivalent of aural shock therapy. Equal parts crushing drums, screeching guitar noise and vocal



shredding, this is the kind of album that needs to come along every so often to wake us from our everyday coma and remind us that rock n' roll does still exist. And it can still be dangerous.

The Toronto power trio wastes no time in pummeling the listener. Opener "Headache" kicks off with big drums and massive guitars that are reminiscent of Nirvana's "Serve The Servants" off In Utero. There are many similarities between that Nirvana swan song and this debut. The loud, abrasive guitar spurts, the big, overblown drums and, of course, the primal scream vocals all bring that Seattle three-piece that changed everything in 1992 to mind. But besides the "sound" they bring to mind, Metz also have Nirvana's ability to assault your sense with music you'll remember. Underneath all the violence and anger, there's an underlying song craft. For the most part, though, Metz just beat the hell out of you.

"Sad Pricks" is pure violence and chaos put to tape. "Rats" is the musical equivalent of the bombing of Dresden during WWII. "Knife in the Water" could almost be called catchy. Then the screams begin. "Nausea" actually lives up to it's title. It's minute-long piece of music that sounds as if the tape machine's about to break, wobbling all the way through to the end. "Wet Blanket" is a scrapper, throwing punches all the way to the end. The spirit of Detroit lives in this excellent track. MC5 and The Stooges are alive and well in this bloody nose of a song.

Besides Nirvana, these Toronto punks, either intentionally or unintentionally, bring to mind Big Black, old school Dinosaur Jr., The Pixies and Wire on PCP. There's also a similarity to Cloud Nothing. Metz are Cloud Nothing's big brother just out of prison.

Metz are a force to be reckoned with. They play rock n' roll that's angry, brutal, violent and dangerous. It's also meticulous, precise, catchy and razor wire sharp. Their self-titled debut is one of the best rock albums you'll likely hear this year. (*JH*)

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

As suchs a concert with both headlining is a little like a Tootsie Roll Pop: two treats in one. Either act is worth seeing, but combined, it's a no-brainer.

You can tell a lot about artists just from the art they use on their CDs. When we checked out Huber, we were intrigued by the calming, natural feel he's chosen to illustrate his work. The music inside is no different. Huber describes his music as acoustic folk-rock with a Celtic twist. The lyrical themes are built around reclamation, resilience and restlessness and capture the sound of an artist fully hitting his stride. The songs acrobatically drift from coffee house intimate to arena-ready folk-rock. An evening spent listening to Huber will put you in a tranquil, uncluttered state of mind - just what we all need before the onslaught of the holiday season.

Gecko Club are a bit more driven. By their own admission they live in the land where big guitars and big melody are king. With two critically acclaimed independent albums under their belt, they have truly

Back in July we told you all about Unknown Hinson, the handgun-toting hilljack who brings new meaning to country western music.

Maybe you had your doubts about this singer with no name, this hell-raising North Carolinian who spent 30 years in the Illinois

State Penitentiary for a "wrong he never done" and who, in a few short years following his release, created and starred in his own cable access show that won Creative Loafing's poll for Best Public Access Television Show four years in a row.

Actually, he has a full name, but his act transcends the stage. He is a dark parody of the country music stars of the mid-60s and takes every opportunity to poke fun at performances from a bygone era. With huge sideburns, a slick rodeo coat and a ribbon-thin neckties Unknown Hinson acts out the hard-drinkin', hard-living', dog-dyin', wife-leavin' woes that somehow figured into every country music song.

If you did miss his Botanical Roots show this past summer, CS3 is giving you a second chance on Thursday, November 15.

Seriously, we wouldn't have him as a Pick of the Week if this wasn't the best way to spend a Thursday

There's something cool about telling people you saw a musician before they became a big star. If, like us, you like having those bragging rights, we know you'll be heading out to see Clayton Anderson on



November 17 at Neon Armadillo.

A fellow Hoosier, Anderson hails from Bedford, Indiana, where he cut his teeth playing country music at nearly every venue he could find. And it's his roots that give his music so much appeal. In his debut CD, Torn Jeans and Tailgates, Anderson sings of romances, relationships and family - all with a nod to Midwestern life. He sings of his grandma's fried chicken in "What You're Missin" and of the life

he's experienced sittin' on a tailgate. Plus, the man knows how to have a good time. He's got "Beer on a Boat on a Saturday" but also professes that "Beer Tastes Better on a Friday."

It's actually surprising that Anderson is not a household name to Hoosier country music fans, given the number of places he's performed and the names he's opened for - names like like Kenny Chesney and Luke Bryan. But it's a sure bet that'll change before long. Another great thing is about seeing Anderson early on in his career is the low dough \$5 cover. Take our advice and head out to see him for a rare Fort Wayne appearance.







we played a few shows with them, so we met him. He sat in with the band and did a few songs, and that was really great," says Begin. "[He was really down with how we interpret the music and how we perform it, so that's good. We've also played with some of the horn players that Sublime played with. Those guys have done little stints on the road with us, and they play with us when we're out west. So it's been pretty good vibes all around from people in the Sublime camp that we've come into contact with."

While the remaining members of Sublime have remained active in musical circles (and the band did briefly re-form and tour with new lead singer Rome Ramirez from 2009-2011 under the moniker Sublime with Rome), many lament the initial disbanding of the band just as it was beginning to reach its prime. While they had recorded three full albums of increasingly sophisticated music by the time of their dissolution, many feel the band's best days were ahead of them, cut short by Howell's pass-When asked what he thinks the band might have achieved had How-

ell not passed away, Begin says, "I'd like to think that they would have kept writing great music and just been able to ride the major success [that had begun to kick in] after Howell passed away. I would hope they would have continued to perform and put out more great albums. How long it would have gone on, it's hard to say, but I think that their music has proven that they're a pretty important band in rock music and reggae Fans contemplating a trip to the upcoming Badfish show can expect a

mix of both the band's hit singles and lesser-known album tracks, meaning that it's worthwhile for not just hardcore fans but casual fans and newbies as well.

"It's close to two hours of fun, high-energy rock and reggae. People have a blast, you know. We've heard many times from many people that it's one of the best shows that they've ever been to," says Begin, "so we just try to keep that vibe going, put our all into it while we're on stage and allow people to just kind of let everything out and have a great time.'

mitting it in mixed company. But have you heard the end-times rock opera on side two of 1977's Shotgun Angel by Daniel Amos? That's right. 1970s era end-times, as in The Late Great Planet Earth. Fortunately the Antichrist has held off his appearance in anticipation of the expanded collector's edition release of this unique album. Daniel Amos started out as what would be called alt-country, if such a

term existed in the mid 70s. This didn't last for long because, by Shotgun Angel, their second album, the band was less and less country (most of it to be found on side A) and more alt. Imagine Firefall or The Eagles morphing into 10cc and you'll have an idea of the sonic transformation captured on this album. As you might expect, the vocal harmonies are incredible, the melodies indelible. And despite the 10cc influence being contained mostly to the aforementioned side B, there's a strong sense of humor throughout many of the songs which would help the country medicine to go down smoother (for non-country fans) if the AM-friendly medicine wasn't so silky smooth to begin with. As good as the first half is, you know you're in for a treat when you

turn the record over, or whatever it is you kids do these days. "Finale: Beresith Overture" is a true overture, blending in musical themes of every song on side B and played by an orchestra. Yep, cellos, flutes, timpani, woodwinds - the whole shebang. There was a big budget for the album and it shows! All the digital scrubbing of the original master tapes doesn't hurt either, allowing everything to shine through clearly. 'Lady Goodbye," a mournful piano ballad, picks right up after the

overture, quickly fleshing out with full orchestral accompaniment to become a grand and gorgeous statement. Ominous sound effects lead the way to the creepy "The Whistler" while the brief, peppy, Beatlesque "He's Gonna Do a Number on You" gives a break from the heady topic at hand. "Better" picks up the rock theme with loads of sizzling guitar parts injected between the vocals of "Just take my groceries and put 'em in the sack / No checks, no cash, don't give me no flack / 'cause my little number hasn't failed me yet." "Sail Me Away" is pure AM radio candy oozing with strings and vibes and even a harp, a song which is presumably about the rapture. The alt-country element comes back in with the final song, "Posse in the Sky," bringing the album full circle just in time for the end of the world, er, the end of 2012, which is nigh at hand! animation and video games. Create whatever world or worlds you want, make up whatever rules you want, use time and space as you like and the audience will have no trouble joining in the fun. Wreck-It Ralph does all of that with cheerful enthusiasm.

The movie is tremendous fun, and you

get magnificently prepped for it by the animated short, Paperman, that precedes the feature film. Silent and black and white with a very old school style, it is a quick and quirky romance. Paperman is also a tribute to New York City and the mini wind storms that spring up between skyscrapers. Both films are sweet to the core. Beyond that they couldn't be more different.

I have to give Disney a big shout-out. Before Paperman and Wreck-It Ralph, they do a sporty logo update of Mickey Mouse's first widely distributed film, Steamboat Willie. For those who don't know, Steamboat Willie is the first animated film to have a fully produced soundtrack. It has a slightly creepy vibe (a la "The Itchy and Scratchy Show")and is a parody of the live action Buster Keaton film, Steamboat Bill. It is a quick reminder that Disney has been an innovator in animation since 1928. Not only does Disney have a big, profitable hit on its hands with Wreck-It Ralph, they bought the Star Wars universe recently. Sure, it cost

them just over \$4 billion, but I don't doubt it

In Wreck-It Ralph world, characters in video games have a life of their own once the arcade closes for the night. They can visit other games by traveling through the power lines into a Grand Central-like terminal. While they can bounce back to life in their own game no matter what punishment they take, if they are killed in a game not their own, they stay dead.

Ralph has been on the job for 30 years in Wreck-It Ralph. He's the villain. In every game he trashes the nice apartment building next to the dump where he lives. Then a handy but rather self-satisfied little guy named Fix-it Felix Jr. puts everything back together again.

Ralph is sick of always being the bad guy and says as much in a meeting of villains "Bad-Anon"). He wants to be appreciated. He wants to win a medal.

Ralph is voiced by John C. Reilly who is especially endearing when he is blue. Ralph is a big guy with a kind of mopey demeanor. He looks a little bit like Reilly. I mean that in the nicest possible way.

In search of a medal, Ralph runs away from his own game and into a game called Hero's Duty where a successful soldier can win a medal. He is befriended and schooled by a tough-talking warrior, Calhoun. She is a growling, hot-looking sergeant voiced with gusto and humor by Jane Lynch.



Through a series of mishaps Ralph and his medal land in a game named Sugar Rush Speedway which is as speedy and pink as it sounds. There he meets Vanellope von Schweetz, a very cute, candy-coated rascal. Like Ralph, she is an outcast in her game, not because she's a villain, but because she is a "glitch." Her code is a bit off and she fuzzes into pixilation in little fits.

Sarah Silverman uses her best little girl voice to be Vanellope. She's a rascal who needs Ralph's medal to get into a race on the speedway and prove even a glitch can be a

But there are forces ganging up on Vanellope. There are lots of mean girls who don't want Vanellope on the track. And King Candy, the mayor of Sugar Rush, has a very secretive and irrational dislike of little Vanellope. King Candy, voiced by Alan Tudyk, will remind you of the great and powerful Oz. You will also think of Oz when the mayor's henchmen, who look like a certain cookie, march into the castle singing "Oreo! Oreeeeo!" to the tune of the Wicked Witch's soldiers.

Back in Wreck-It land, the Nicelanders

(the folks who get their homes destroyed and rebuilt each game) and Felix are desperate. Without Ralph in the game, no one wants to play. If no one wants to drop quarters in the game, the arcade unplugs it. To fix things Felix, who is programmed for just such a mission, goes in search of Ralph. Jack McBrayer voices Felix, with more than a hint of the page he plays in 30 Rock.

With Ralph, Calhoun and Felix helping, Vanellope gets her chance to enter the race. Bad guys are defeated. There is a happy ending for all. But this is probably far from the end for Wreck-It Ralph. Director Rich Moore and story team Phil Johnston and Jennifer Lee have created a world that can easily produce sequels, games, merchandize and more. Watching Wreck-It Ralph, it is hard to figure out why somebody hasn't created an entertainment so - ugh, I hate this word synergistic.

I've never played a video game in my life, but it didn't get in the way of my enjoying the movie. I'm sure there were tons of game references that I didn't get. The humor in the film is geared mostly toward kid viewers. There are some movie references for the grown-ups, but the silliness is for kids.

For grown-ups, the movie might feel a little too much like what happens when you fill kids full of sugar, but there is a kind gooey heart at the center of this confection.

Cast Shines in afO's Christmas Play

Director Lauren Nichols will tell you that the all for One productions does not usually perform a specifically Christmas-centric play because most of them are tired, over-done or don't fit with afO's religious values as a theater company. An O. Henry Christmas is a special exception, and it's easy to see why.

Set in the late 1800s, a group of homeless have gathered on Christmas Eve to share warmth and words on an abandoned railroad in New York. The stage is littered with debris, scrap metal and forgotten odds and ends where the cold inhabitants have made their home.

Agnes, played by Bonnie Jean Talcott, is fussing and fretting over her sick friend and desperately seeking help. Marguerite, played by Tabitha Chen, is a dying young woman in the center of it all She has pinned her hopes on a vine that clings to life across the courtyard and decided that when the last leaf falls, so she shall pass with it. Marguerite's makeshift family is trying miserably to bring some cheer to her when a hungry stranger wanders into their camp and offer his stories in exchange for some hot broth. O.P., played by Michael Wilhelm, is the storyteller, the embodiment of O. Henry. While O.P. narrates, the "company of the railroad track" play out his stories, transforming into the characters he creates. Soon the varied crowd is drawn together by more than just hunger; they form a bond of caring in the Christmas spirit.

Hal, played by Nate Chen, is a drunken prodigal son who has left his Harvard education far behind him and accepts his fate in the cold night with a sense of finality. Hal plays along with the stories we have come to know now as O. Henry classics such as "The Gift Of The Magi." Beside him is Fran, played by Stacey Kuster, a pickpocket and lifelong survival artist who

finds comfort in Hal.

Dennis Nichols, as Grover is a reluctant father figure to the crew while Todd Staszak as Dinty plays a miserly critic of life who won't see the light through the darkness that O.P. is trying to give them all. Ron Stauss as Guido appears throughout the show as a police officer looking for a criminal.

Nichols usually makes imaginative use of the small space the library auditorium provides and equally impressive use of lighting. Though this show is no exception, the shining star of this production is the cast. It would be impossible for me to overstate how impressive the acting was in *An O. Henry Christmas*. You'll be drawn into the night, and drawn even farther into their stories as you watch from the sidelines of a cold railroad in New York on Christmas Eve.

Ah, home, sweet Hohman, for the holidays!

Fort Wayne's Civic Theatre tells A Christmas Story of heartwarming incidents from growing up in 1938 in northern Indiana. It's full of smiles and laughs as a gentle narrator takes us with him down memory lane to enjoy a lively cast of boys and girls, the Old Man and Mother, a Major Prize and, of course, that Red Ryder carbine-action, 200-shot BB Gun with the thing in the stock that tells you the time.

It takes courage to stage a story that many in your audience can practically recite along with you because they have seen it about 30 times since the movie made audiences laugh till they cried in 1983. It's a story that is so rich, so vivid that we love it each time.

(Okay, maybe not so much on the day cable TV does the "marathon," but most other days.) There are only four stories I can think of that fit that pantheon of watch-

ability: The Wizard of Oz, It's a Wonderful Life, The Princess Bride and A Christmas Story. And what's more, I've talked to more than a few Midwesterners (my mother included) who swear it was "just like that in those days" in Fort Wayne, South Bend, Muncie, Indianapolis, or wherever your parents or grandparents grew up. So it's a time capsule as well as a story of a boy's campaign for armament.

For the Scrooge in the seat behind me (who, I can only guess, had never attended a stage play before in his many decades of life), yes, this is a performance

by live, skilled, local actors following a clever, faithful script written by Philip Grecian with the original movie's team of Jean Shepherd, Leigh Brown and Bob Clark. Shepherd was the narrator and author of the original stories blended together to form the classic tale, which are also in this play. If your family loves the story, you won't want to miss this – and, word to the wise, the tickets are going fast.

One would never guess that guest director Rosy Ridenour is new to directing. She has done a very good job of bringing all the pieces together – including a pas-

sel of talented kids all new to the Civic boards, and a complex, ambitious set and sound design. Scenic designer Robert Shoquist's house on Cleveland Street, with young Ralphie's upstairs bedroom, is wonderful, as is the Santaland at Goldblatt's Department store.

Jonathan Maag's lighting, including a perfect Christmas snowfall, and Chris Olry's many essential sound effects make huge contributions to the performance. Louis Heckman's costumes are true to the

times and story, right down to the ankle socks and Miss Shields' nip-andtuck dress and Mother's housedresses. Del Proctor and Margaret Leslie's props are spot-on. (Look out for that Indiana python!) Stage manager Larry True and his crew have it all under control and moving along.

Justin Herber, as Adult Ralph Parker, is our endearing host. His narration was amazing, and the ovation at the end of opening night confirmed that he's the star of the show. Young Ralphie is played with appropriate restraint while his inner life is narrated for us by Jason Collier. He has the look and sound right, and by show time this week he may have gained a bit more confidence in the blocking, especially for his big fight scene.

Ralphie's buddies Flick and Schwartz are played with flair by Bo Geyer and Jordan Ross. Their dread enemies in the alleys of Cleveland Street, Scut Farkas and his gang of one, are played with pushy aplomb by Gavin Drew and Nathan Williams. And Austin Mann has little brother Randy down pat, from piggy snort to whining lines to the winter walk-toschool roll.

Mother and The Old Man are played for likability by Bethany Schmitt and Nol Beckley. Their reaction to the dangers of soap poisoning was hilarious. Bethany, who comes to Civic by way of movie acting, could amp her reactions up a couple notches for the stage, although she gives us a fine mom for her imaginative boy and turkey-loving hubby. Nol Beckley is at his best when admiring the glow of his Major Prize. As a Feared Furnace Fighter, he could use more pseudo-swearword lessons - more growly non-words (think Sgt. Snorkel from Beetle Bailey cartoons). Among the grownups, my favorite was Janet Piercy as Miss Shields, Ralphie's teacher. It's not a huge role, but Piercy puts some grande dame oomph into her time onstage.

The cute girls in Ralphie's class get a little more time in the spotlight in the play than in the movie. Anna Armstrong as Esther Jane Alberry is not only adorable but a good sport about that spider pin and comes to the rescue with Ralphie's missing glasses. Alana Haupert as super-smart Helen Weathers is nonchalant about her theme on economics and funny during the swamp adventure.

In a few more years, we can hope Civic will bring us the musical version of A Christmas Story which opens this week on Broadway. In the meantime, this one will do very well and could be a nice addition to open the holiday season. Good job, Rosy and the gang. This one will go on Santa's list as a big plus mark.





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Apocalypse Almost

12.21 by Dustin Thomason, Dial Press, 2012

There seems to be some confusion about what "the end of the world" means. In this potentially apocalyptic year we're hearing the phrase a lot, but there's ambiguity surrounding it. If you take the phrase literally - the end of the world - it seems to suggest an abrupt ending for the planet, say in a fiery asteroid impact that vaporizes the entire globe. The problem with that scenario is that it's hard to make an action movie out of an event that lasts a few seconds and ends with no survivors, not even Bruce Willis. If you stick to a smaller, more Hollywood-friendly scale, like, say, widespread disease or natural disaster, you're stuck with a cataclysm THE RULE OF FOUR that lacks final-

We've been seeing plenty of hurricanes, tsunamis, earthquakes and epidemics in recent years, and yet the world keeps chugging along. As we contemplate Mavan prophecy, what exactly are we supposed to be anticipating?

Dustin Thomason, in his novel 12.21, cleverly exploits the hype of 2012 apocalyptic angst at the same time that he pokes at its fuzzy logic. He invents a story that falls into line with the predictions of Maya-inspired doomsayers, but he suggests that all of the convergence might be nothing more than coincidence. He hedges his bets, giving us a thrilling end-of-the-world-ish scenario but underpinning it all with seemingly sound research and scientific plausibility. The novel's two central char-

acters are learned people. Gabe Stanton is a medical researcher who studies prion diseases. These diseases, of which Mad Cow Disease is one, are caused by strange, rogue proteins that, among other things, interfere with neural functioning; the diseases are incurable and fatal. Chel Manu is an art historian who works at the Getty Museum in Los Angeles; of Mayan descent herself, she is a specialist in ancient Mayan culture.

At the beginning of the novel, Stanton and Manu are presented with puzzles: Gabe encounters a patient who seems to be suffering from a new variety of prion disease; and Chel takes possession of an extremely rare (and illegally obtained) ancient Mayan text. The pair are brought together when Chel is called in to translate the



gibberish of Gabe's patient, who turns out to be Mayan too. They soon discover that their separate puzzles are part of one big puzzle. One big potentially world-ending

The new disease, of course, is highly infectious, and soon it is decimating L.A. Gabe assembles a team of medical researchers, and Chel assembles a team of cultural researchers. They work largely separately in an attempt to figure out how this old text can help

them to find a cure for this new disease.

Like all good thriller heroes, they have to work outside the bounds of authority: Chel is in illegal possession of the ancient manuscript; and Gabe is being watched by the bureaucratic eye of the CDC. There's also a doomsday cult that proves to

be something of a

nuisance. Thomason introduces a third branch to the narrative as the Mayan manuscript is translated. The ancient scribe who wrote it emerges as a character, and his story ultimately pulls all the threads of the plot together. These interludes in the middle of the book both slow down the pace of the story and introduce its most compelling character development. Those readers hoping for a pulse-pounding ride will probably find the trips back in time to be tedious, but they add a richness to the story that pulls it away from familiar thriller terri-

More than anything, though, the story depends upon coincidence. Everyone seems to be in the right place at the right time. and both Chel and Gabe happen to have ex-spouses who have skills that are improbably convenient to the plot. Overall, the plot depends on a web of connections that puts Chel squarely in the middle of all the events in a way that's difficult to believe is purely a result of chance. Is Thomason trying to tell us that there really are mystical, cosmic forces at work here?

What he's trying to do is to have it both ways. Clearly the book is carefully and intelligently researched, and its facts are convincing (I can't vouch for their

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Ralph Scores a Hit

pected, Disney's new animated flick, Wreck-It Ralph, took the No. 1 spot at last weekend's box office, selling just under \$50 million over its first three days of release. Years in the works and over \$165 million in production costs, the movie also sold another \$12 million overseas. Featuring a number of different animation styles, all influenced by videos games past and present, Ralph tells the story of a video game villain who dreams of becoming a hero. Directed by Rich Moore, best known for his work on The Simpsons, the movie is thus far getting passionately mixed reviews, including a perfect score from New York Times critic A.O. Scott who called the movie touching and silly, adding that "the secret to [Ralph's] success is a genuine enthusiasm for the creative potential of games, a willingness to take them seriously without descending into nerdy pomposity." Boston Globe critic Ty Burr, on the other hand, disliked the movie, saying "It made me want to go read a book." Well

Also at the Box: Flight, director Robert Zemeckis' first live action film since 2000's incredible Cast Away, took the No. 2 spot at the box office last weekend, selling \$25 million in the U.S. over its first three days of release. I've not yet see this flick, but I understand the plot to be simple and get the feeling that the beauty of the picture is in the craft of the people who made the movie, including actors Denzel Washington (who is getting quite a bit of Oscar buzz), John Goodman, Don Cheadle and Melissa Leo – as well as cinematographer Don Burgess (Source Code, Spider-Man, Forrest Gump).

Taking the No. 3 spot was the Ben Affleck-directed *Argo*, selling over \$10 million over the movie's fourth weekend, upping its grand total to \$76 million in the U.S. (\$89 million worldwide). The RZA-directed The Man with the Iron Fists took the No. 4 spot at the box office, selling \$8.2 million in its debut weekend. Not bad for a first-time director working with a modest \$15 million budget. We've heard some seriously mixed reviews ... but whatever, Iron Fists looks fun.

Rounding out the Top 5 was Taken 2, holding strong in its fifth week, selling another \$6 million, upping the movie's total to \$125 million in the U.S. and a whopping \$336 million worldwide. Big money.

New this Week: Sure, Steven Spielberg's Lincoln will start to screen here and there this weekend -mostly in New York City and L.A. - but the big deal headliner flick of the week is the latest James Bond offering, Skyfall, directed by Sam Mendes (Away We Go, Revolutionary Road, American Beauty) and starring, once again, Daniel Craig in the title role. Joining Craig in what looks like, not even kidding, the best-made Bond flick yet, are Judi Dench, Javier Bardem, Ralph Fiennes, Ben Whishaw and Albert Finney. One of the absolute best cinematographers to ever hit the REC button, Roger Deakins, shot the movie, making it a must-see for all serious cinephiles, be they a Bond lover or not.
