So read on, enjoy the season and tell 'em whatzup sent you.

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

The first annual sign that the Christmas season is upon us is when I begin work on the Embassy Theatre's Festival of Trees article. I couldn't tell you how many of these articles I've written now, but it's been several - and I look forward to it each year.

While there is always a certain amount of delightful repetition - because part of what we love about traditions is the comfortable predictability of what to expect - the Embassy staff works hard to provide new angles to a classic, fresh interest to an event. Chief among those who have shaped the Festival of Trees, and the person who has helped me get the needed info for these yearly updates, has been the theatre's marketing director, Dana Poffenberger. But this year the first of the holiday surprises came in an email from Dana which was signed Dana Berkes. It seems our intrepid tree-meister has tied the knot and has, as she put it, "moved up the alphabet." But with the ink still drying on her new marriage license, Berkes has remained diligent in her efforts to keep the Festival of Trees exciting and fun while still providing all of the details that have drawn area families for years.

Kicking off as always on the Night of Lights on Thanksgiving Eve, November 21, Festival of Trees has a remarkable twist on that opening night: a chance to stand on the stage which has hosted some of the finest musicians, actors and performers of the last century. Although tour groups have been given that same chance over the years, many of those who revere that very stage have yet to set foot on it, and from 6-9 p.m. that Wednesday night a Winter Carnival will host rides and treats on the stage, welcoming those who wish to spend a buck or two for the pleasure. (Many of the events at Festival of Trees are "pay to play," but the nominal charge makes it affordable to families visiting.)

"We're very happy to make it possible for people to be on that stage," says Berkes. "Every year, what we hear over and over again from the dance groups who perform, is what a thrill it is to be on the Embassy stage. And we love finding ways for visitors to get that experience."

Of course, those dancers are back this year as always the weekend after Thanksgiving, providing entertainment to those who might wish to take a break from the trees in the lobby area. With comfortable seating, it's possible to stay for long periods of time - or come and go as is pleasing - as the dancers take their respective turns. One of the regular visitors to the stage is Fort Wayne Ballet's Youth Company, and even as the holiday season gets busy in preparation for The Nutcracker, the young performers enjoy the chance to do something a little different at Thanksgiving time.

"The Youth Company loves performing on the Embassy stage during Festival of Trees," says Alexis Ingram, Youth Company director. "They love to be a part of the city's holiday celebration. It is also a wonderful opportunity to refine their performances skills and get ready for the upcoming Nutcracker run.'

The most coveted visitors for the weekend are Santa and Mrs. Claus, and rest assured that they will be back once again to take requests and hear wishes. Santa will provide candy canes to those who share their Christmas list, and the pair will be hosting Breakfast with Santa on Friday and Saturday that week, also on the Embassy stage.

Decorated windows will feature the impish elf Oscar, and beyond the pleasure of the décor the windows tell a story which makes them fondly reminiscent for those who still long for the bygone days of downtown Fort Wayne. In fact, the Embassy Theatre was on the cutting edge of bringing people back downtown, and Berkes backs that up with numbers.

"Last year we brought 16,000 people into the downtown area. Festival of Trees is a huge driver for downtown traffic, and in the last 28 years we've brought as many as 20,000 people to this event. It's become a huge part of the holiday celebration in this community, and it has come to mean so many things to so many people."

With windows, Santa, dancing and carnival rides, what else might you find that week at Festival of Trees? How about trees?

Berkes calls the increasingly elaborate designs "art meets engineering. The artists really step it up each and every year." And this year you can expect to find more eclectic variations on a theme, with both live and artificial trees on display. The Pedal Power tree will return, and with it more ways to encourage sustainability while celebrating the holidays.

"This is our third year of bring live trees to the event, and our Green Trees are really a win-win-win situation," says Berkes. "Indiana Michigan Power is sponsoring the trees, and we bring in non-profit groups, preschool classrooms, various people who need to get their name out there, and they have a chance to get that exposure while adding to the beauty of these trees. Then the trees will go to Fort Wayne Parks and Recreation so they can be planted. It's really the perfect program."

As usual there will be special days for groups wishing to visit during less heavily trafficked times. Kingston Seniors' Day is Monday, November 26 (9 a.m.-1 p.m.) while Kids' Day is Wednesday, November 28 (also 9 a.m.-1 p.m.). Daily events include more of the pay to play options like a photo booth, a Vera Bradley raffle and the Money Tree. In the hotel lobby you can find roasted nuts to munch on, and kids can settle in to write a letter to Santa as well.

The theme for this year's Festival of Trees is Imagine, and if you're wondering (like I was) whether John Lennon was an inspiration, Berkes does share that one of the trees will incorporate that song into its design. But the word does perfectly conjure what Festival of Trees is all about: the imagination of kids, adults and artists of all kinds sharing the joy of the holidays in the perfect setting. In the end, it's that venue which is the real star of the week.

"People who come to Festival of Trees want to be dazzled," says Berkes. "They love to be entertained but they also feel engaged in history when they're at the Embassy. The setting is beautiful, it's elegant, and they love to experience all of the beautiful trees and activities in this lovely theatre."

Right Place, Right Time

There are many ways to go about getting your big break. Luck usually plays a huge role. Sometimes it comes down to who you know or striking when the proverbial iron is hot. For Fort Wayne native Lyndy Bazile, it was a matter of e-mailing exactly the right person at exactly the right time.

Two years ago, the now 24-year-old graphic art-

ist and animator was trying to figure out her next step. A graduate of South Side High School, she'd just finished up a year of classes at IPFW and was dissatisfied with what she saw as the directionless state of her life. So, at 3 a.m. one morning she e-mailed Jonathan Katz, a comedian and voice actor whose animated show Dr. Katz Professional Therapist ran from 1995-1999 on Comedy

Central. Bazile was a fan of the show and of Katz's work and told him so. She even wrote that she'd be interested in doing a project with him.

So far so typical, right? Young fan sends an adoring email to her idol. Most are lucky to get a form letter or at the most an autographed picture in the mail, signed by the assistant. But Bazile got much more than that. She got a personal reply to her message and a correspondence that grew into a close friendship, not only with Katz but with Katz's friend Tom Snyder, the animator and brains behind Squigglevision, the computer-based animation technique in which characters wiggle and undulate once in awhile over still backgrounds. (Dr. Katz Professional Therapist was one of the first mainstream shows to use Squigglevision.)

"I think I was very lucky," Bazile told me in a recent phone interview. "Jonathan must have been in the right mood to receive an e-mail like mine, and maybe the fact that I sent it at 3 a.m. caught his eye. He hadn't done much since Dr. Katz, and I guess the fact that I referenced something from so long ago, that it'd been

a while since he got fan mail about that particular show, made him pay attention."

Bazile's e-mail relationship with Katz and Snyder progressed from the personal to the professional, partially because she mentioned, in that first 3 a.m. message, that she liked to draw. Katz and Snyder misunderstood and took her for an animator. Instead of correcting them, she let them persist in their belief while she taught herself how to turn her two dimensional

drawings into moving pictures.

"Tom sent me a drawing tablet in the mail and I started from there," she said. "I knew Tom and Jonathan were very openminded about different ways to do simple animation and that they weren't necessarily looking for studio production level kind of work but for something good and simple. I was pretty confident I could figure something out."

Bazile is proof that necessity is indeed the mother of invention. Roughly a year after that first e-mail to Katz, she'd mastered the techniques of simple animation and was even working with Katz on Hey, We're Back, a podcast animated comedy series about a man who works in a radio station and his adventures both on and off the air.


While working on Hey, We're Back, Bazile became good friends with Katz's assistant, Katie Covett, who at the time was acting as producer for another Katz/Snyder web series, Explosion Bus. Explosion Bus is a weekly web comedy series in which two men, Jon and Leo (voiced by Katz and Tom Leopold, respectively), travel around the United States trying to discover new talent. The catch and the comedy result from the fact that Jon and Leo are often as clueless as their auditioners, and each show ends with real fake auditions from fans of the show. "Real fake" because they know they're auditioning for a fake talent

What do gingerbread and innovation have in common? You can celebrate both at The History Center this holiday season as the 27th annual Festival of Gingerbread returns this November.

Opening to the public the day after Thanksgiving, this is the History Center's biggest and most mouthwatering fundraiser. The event brings in around an eighth of the non-profit's revenue and a little more than one-fourth of its annual attendance. Executive Director Todd Maxwell Pelfrey says the festival consistently exceeds expectations, setting new attendance records each year.

"The festival is a well-established, longtime Fort Wayne tradition," he said. "Our numbers hovered around 8-9,000 for about a decade, but thanks to some creative marketing, attendance has grown dramatically over the past three years."

The Festival of Gingerbread has seen 10 percent increases annually, and Pelfrey says they are expecting "well over 13,000" visi-tors for this season's edition. If that number holds, a new attendance record will be set.

This may also be the year for breaking the record number of gingerbread house entries. In 2011, 134 delicious creations were submitted for judging (the second highest number of entries since the record was set in

2009 with 143). I asked Pelfrey if he thought the record would be broken this year, but he was hesitant to jinx it.

Last year's entries ran the gamut from a realistically textured "wooden" rocking chair to a three-foot tall smiling clock (see photo) to anniversary themes like the Fort Wayne Komets (2011 was their 60th anniversary) and Dr. Suess' The Lorax (celebrat-

ing 40 years last year).

If Pelfey has heard any rumblings on potential entries for this year, he is playing it pretty close to the chest. He did divulge a bit of insider knowledge, though.

"Some of the professionals begin their preparation a year or two in advance," he said with a smile. "A lot of times they'll peruse the current year's submissions and start jotting down ideas for next year. It's always interesting to see the way that each year's festival provides a springboard for creativity for following years.

"For example, when LED lights first came out, it was a really novel concept. Next thing we knew, a dozen houses had LED accents. What's also interesting is those folks who have made the houses for quite a few years will come in and really grab on to some of the less evident creative components and run with them."

The festival has taken on a very artistic component, with different spins on how to use a particular candy, icing and other accents. Each submission brings its own interpretation of the gingerbread house art form, perhaps incorporating a novel twist or theme.

The festival is also colored with a hint of competition.

"At the professional level and the adult individual and group levels, there are certain names that tend to pop up in the top spots each year. But just about every year, I've also seen a first-time entry blowing away the competition unexpectedly." Pelfrev said. "That keeps it exciting because it's anyone's game until all the votes are counted."

This year's festival comes complete with all the favorite events. Lighting Night will be on Wednesday, November 21. Part of downtown's Night of Lights kick-off event, the History Center's turret will be lit like a beacon signaling the arrival of the holiday season. On Saturday, November 24, Holly Trolly Tour participants will have the opportunity to create their own orna-

ments.

And for the fourth year, AEP Indiana-Michigan Power is sponsoring a night of free admission on Tuesday, November 27.

Plenty of family-friendly activities are lined up throughout the festival's run: storytelling of beloved holiday classics; a "Science of Sugary Structures" event; cookie decorating party; and even a visit from Santa himself.

Pelfrey says that the schedule has been fine-tuned over the past several years to include the programs the public really enjoys while also affording the museum the opportunity to try some new things.

"Our weekend programming is the same as last year with a couple of twists. Last year we tried a four-mile run called the Gingerbread Pursuit. Due to the initial success we're bringing that back on December 8. Participants are given free admission to the History Center that day if they show their racing bib," said Pelfrey.

"We like to try out new ways of engaging the public, and that race stuck in a big way. We're delighted to repeat it this year.'

Another treat is a completely restored fleet of animatronic elves. Volunteers have lovingly worked to repair and re-clothe



the characters that many may remember from the Wolf and Dessauer holiday storefront display. This will be the first year to feature all animatronics fully functioning for the public's enjoyment.

But the novelty doesn't stop there. Remember the mention of gingerbread and innovation at the beginning of this article? Festival patrons will get a hands-on look at the kind of work they are supporting.

"We experience very large crowds throughout the festival. During some of our busiest times, the lines wind through the building," Pelfrey explained. "This year. guests will be able to enjoy a new gallery as part of festival admission while they wait."

This new gallery is the Allen County Innovation exhibit, showcasing more than 500 square feet of regional pride. It is the first new permanent exhibition gallery for the History Center in 32 years.

"Since we have so many people coming through in that three-week span - perhaps folks who haven't been to the History Center in a while - we want to show them something new and important to the museum," said Pelfrey

"It highlights a number of our 20th century innovators and entrepreneurs. Fort Wayne has long been called a center for creativity and ingenuity. Those stories are best highlighted by focusing on the 20th and ear-

The Fort's Jazz Soldier

He's a piano teacher and an accomplished jazz impresario. He has his own internet radio station that he uses to connect with like-minded jazz aficionados worldwide. In the 80s, he played in a Scottish hair metal band that recorded for the BBC and rubbed shoulders with the likes of the Rolling Stones and Sharon Osbourne, the latter of whom suggested he might be happier packing his bags and returning home to Indiana.

He's recorded six solo albums in styles ranging from worldbeat to avant garde. He plays around town

regularly with his own jazz trio. This last summer he participated in a jazz festival in Fort Wayne's sister city in Poland and is planning a possible trip to another jazz festival near Bangalore, India, just to hang out and meet people. Now at the age of 50 and suffering from Crohn's disease, Dave Latchaw is still going strong and is still excited about the same music he got into as a teenager.

"[I'm] just lucky that I'm still doing music full time. I like teaching and I still feel like a full-time student myself," says Latchaw. "I'm still as curious about music today at 50 as I was as a teenager. Music rules."

A native of Kendallville and graduate of East Noble High School, an elder schoolmate of Latchaw first introduced him to the jazz fusion and progressive rock music that was prevalent in the 70s and fueled his interest in music. He cites diverse artists such as Chick Corea, the Weather Report, Mahavishnu Orchestra, King Crimson and Yes that sustained his interest during the otherwise discodrenched era.

After graduating high school, Latchaw pursued a degree in music education from Indiana University and eventually found himself moving overseas to join his then-wife who was stationed abroad in the U.S. Navy. While there, he auditioned for and landed a keyboardist spot in the Heat, a Scottish hair metal band which was gaining a fair amount of attention from the British press at the time.

"I just happened to be in the right place in the right time," Latchaw says of landing the gig with the Heat. "We were in some of the big European magazines like Kerrang!, Metal Hammer, and Raw."

The Heat may have seemed like the next big thing at the time, but their breakthrough never happened. Latchaw returned home after his manager failed to renew his British work visa, and the band broke up a few months afterwards. While Latchaw's departure may not have been entirely of his own choosing, by the time it happened, he says, he had begun to grow tired of the band, and a chance run-in with none other than Sharon Osbourne had already made him reconsider his career path.

"We were one of the few unsigned bands to ever record for the BBC ... and the two other unsigned bands to do that before us were Led Zeppelin and Def Leppard," he says. "You know, you have your foot in the door, but how long do you bang your head against the wall? And after hanging out with Sharon, she said that [her husband] Ozzy Osbourne would be like Ozzy regardless of if he was famous or not. And I was a piano player from Indiana hanging out in the British rock scene, but I really wanted to play jazz the whole time. I can play all styles of music, but my first love and passion is really jazz."

And jazz is what he's primarily pursued since his

return to the U.S. in 1990. Latchaw's most recent experience that he cites as a career highlight was another international journey. Last summer, he spent a week in Fort Wayne's sister city of Plock, Poland, participating in a jazz festival there.

"They put me up in a fancy hotel there, and I taught during the day for about four hours," he says. "And one of the leaders of the festival and the workshops had a jazz fusion group called Three Jazz Soldiers, and I played in that group, so I was an honorary jazz soldier for the week. It was about nine hours a day doing music over there."

In between the Heat and the Polish jazz festival,



Latchaw has launched an internet radio station that keeps him in touch with jazz heads nationally and worldwide. And his Polish experience has motivated him to seek more opportunities playing with his jazz trio and possibly touring.

"I'm starting to pursue more band stuff. This past summer, playing with the Three Jazz Soldiers [inspired me] to write some original stuff and to play with my current working trio and start trying to get out of Dodge," he says. "I've had some opportunities to play out of the country and do some bigger things. And I just feel like after all these years of practicing and studying and whatnot I just want to go compete with people doing what I do, but at that level."

Currently, Latchaw continues to teach and gig frequently with his jazz trio at places such as Club Soda and Skully's Boneyard. He's also recorded a series of six full-length albums of often-improvisational jazz. Fans of fusion musicians such as *Bitches Brew* era Miles Davis and postmodern composers such as John Zorn and Bill Laswell (the latter of whom Latchaw cites as an influence) may find interest in his experimental and free-ranging recordings, which are available on his website.

When asked what it is about jazz music that continues to excite him after all these years, Latchaw says simply that it's the creative freedom allowed by the genre.

"It's the improvisation aspect to it. I feel like I can play in any context, and if I know what the harmonic structure is, I can play a part that will fit just about any situation," says Latchaw. "So for being an improvising musician, I think jazz is the thing that really gets me excited about playing music. It's the freedom that excites me about playing jazz."

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Melody's Echo Chamber Melody's Echo Chamber

Every once in a while an album comes along that floors me. Appearing out of left field, this nugget of music beauty has taken over my ears for weeks – painting pictures of hazy days and melancholy nights, walking that fine line between psychedelic and sober, existential and down to earth.

A mix of Blonde Redhead's mel-

ancholy breeze, Tame Impala's psychedelic haze and late 80s shoegaze courtesy of Lush, *Melody's Echo Chamber* is dreamy, sleepy, drugged-out and at times quite melancholy and beautiful.

Melody's Echo Chamber's namesake, singer and musician, Melody Prochet, is definitely living in the past, and we're the better for it. A mix of 60s French pop, 70s psychedelic and 80s alternative, her debut album is an aural fix like you've never heard – or at least haven't heard in some time. On "Follow You," the opening track, she swoons like a lovelorn Kazu Makino over a melancholy guitar line before the chorus – filled out with wavering, strummed electric guitar – comes in. Imagine Tame Impala and Blonde Redhead collaborating together; that should give you a pretty good idea of where Prochet is at on this excellent debut.

"Crystallized" continues the acid-battered sound of Tame Impala even more, so much so that you aren't surprised at all when you check the liner notes and see that Tame Impala's main guy Kevin Parker produced and played on the album. Prochet's quiet, sleepy vocals are a perfect match for Parker's water-stained, Technicolormeets-bong production values. Any other combination of musician and producer and this wouldn't be Melody's Echo Chamber.

I'm all about nostalgia and wading in the waters of the past. This record is a head-first dive into analog synths, lovelorn melodies and slightly danceable beats firmly planted in Serge Gainsbourg's subconscious and the expatriot-strewn streets of early 60s Paris. "Bisou Magique," a beautiful track sung in French, brings to mind Parker's quieter moments with Tame Impala. Prochet's voice carries this song to a whispered, lilting finish. "Endless Shore" once again borrowing from Parker's main gig for inspiration, sounding as if Lush's Miki Berenyi stopped in for the *Inner Speaker* sessions. "Mount Hope-less" floats along on a synth line and slowed-down, lo fi-sounding break beat as Prochet sings to no one in particular. The beautiful, Portishead-sounding "Snowcapped Andes Crash" floats along till the final track, "Be Proud Of Your Kids," complete with cute little French kid talking over the track, ends the album on a strange note.

Melody's Echo Chamber has caught my attention more than any other album that has come out this year. It's a strange, psychedelic, beautiful head trip. Prochet has a great voice without making her voice the main attraction. Like any good musician, she uses her voice as just another instrument. She serves the song. In Parker, she's found the perfect studio partner. Together they've created one of this year's best albums, and the best debut by a mile. Step into *Melody's Echo Chamber* and get lost. Taylor Swift Red

Working full-time gigs at record stores for nine years meant hearing a lot of music I wouldn't have otherwise spent any time with. I've kept up with indie music (or college rock, or whatever you want to call it) pretty well since the late mid- to late-90s, so I never needed much help there. Typically, it was pop, soul and



pop rock music that my always diverse co-workers often exposed me to – everything from U2's *All That You Can't Leave Behind*, which I heard about 14,000 times in late months of 2000, to Avril Lavigne's *Under My Skin*, a record I even ended up *buying* at some point.

Nowadays, it's the lonely late hours of the night that usually prompt me to look into artists I wouldn't otherwise check out. I screen the new releases on iTunes, listening to as many samples as I can. Most of what I hear, of course, is very much not for me. But, from time to time, I'll be really surprised by how good a Miley Cyrus or P!nk or Katy Perry song is. My most recent surprise find just happens to be, as I type this sentence, the by-far most popular record

Ten Years After *A Space in Time* (1971)

Personally, I think *Crickle-wood Green* is the best Ten Years After album. However, Alvin Lee and his band spoke to the masses in this, their seventh release which included one of the best songs from 1971 in, "I'd Love To Change The World." But the balance of the re-



cord is a great mixture of eclectic rock n' roll.

The assertive and somewhat funky/psychedelic opener, "One Of These Days," delivers a great dose of the bluesy sound that this band evolved into. Heavy organs and harmonicas make this track really stand out from the rest. "Here They Come" follows with a spacey vibe until it settles down with some crazy-good guitars and creamy vocals that were a staple of Ten Years After.

"Over The Hill" reminds me of early Kinks and includes a sweet string arrangement. It's almost too pretty after following the dark lyrics of "Change."

Side two comes at you from a different direction with "Once There Was A Time," a track with a honkey-tonk style and altcounty drumming reminiscent of Levon Helm. "Let The Sky Fall" keeps the release cruising along before the wonderful "Hard Monkeys" picks up the pace a little. Great guitars and piano in this one as well, with lyrics clearly based on addiction. "I've Been There Too" is also a very compelling track and has some positive messaging in it. The record closes with a two-minute blues/jazzbased jam, a nice dessert after listening to a delicious album.

The band released eight albums in eight years and are more than a footnote during the period (1964-1974) when some of the best music was ever produced. Alvin Lee's latest release, *Still On The Road To Freedom*, just came out in September. (*Dennis Donahue*)

on the planet, *Red*, Taylor Swift's fourth proper studio album. I'd heard the record's lead single, "We Are Never Ever Getting Back Together," a number of times here and there while floating around in popular society's common spaces. A good pop song, I thought, not realizing that it was the work of that goofy, skinny, super young country singer who serial dates celebrities and acts super phony every time a camera is pointed at her. It never occurred to me that it could be Swift, an artist I knew to be a bland product of the modern pop-country machine. This was a pop song. A cheesy one, but a good one, with great production, an incredible hook and brilliant production.

The samples I eventually heard on iTunes were at times interesting, but it took hearing the album's most recent single, "I Knew You Were Trouble," to convince me to really look into Swift and her new record. What I found was a pretty solid pop disc that had few traces of any sounds I relate to the country genre (through further investigation I learned that *Red* is a departure from Swift's past records which are full of generic mod-pop-country). So yes, finally, I bought a copy of *Red*.

Of the album's 16 tracks, I genuinely enjoy six – quite a bit. By far the best offering remains, I think, the above mentioned "Trouble," a synth-heavy production that feels, to me at least, oddly hip. It's an indie synth pop track that could be played alongside Fun. or even Gorillaz, the difference being that Swift songs, I hate to admit, really do have notably stellar vocals. Other great cuts include opener "State of Grace" (which, oddly enough, sounds like Swift singing over an early naughts U2 composition), "Stay Stay Stay" (a cutesy indie pop song that will absolutely be in a television commercial soon enough), the aforementioned "We Are Never" (another big snyth-pop production with a massive hook), "The Last Time" (a singer/ songwriter collaboration with Snow Patrol's Gary Lightbody that, no jokin', could've easily been on the *Once* soundtrack) and "The Lucky One," an epic swell of a production that borders on being too cheesy.

But here's the thing about this review: I'm unusually picky about pop music. Chances are, if you like Taylor Swift, or commercial pop music, or pretty much any of the songs I've discussed in this review, there's a very good chance you'll like most of *Red*. I recog-

nize that the title track is a big winner, as are second single "Begin Again," pop-fest "22" and Ed Sheeran collaboration "Everything Has Changed." I just don't personally happen to like these songs a whole lot yet. What I'm saying is this: Taylor Swift, against all odds, has made a pretty damn impressive pop record. Working with producers like Butch Walker (Avril Lavigne, Weezer, Katy Perry, Pete Yorn), Dan Wilson (Mike Doughty, Adele), Jackknife Lee (U2, R.E.M., Weezer, Bloc Party) and Kanye West's secret weapon, Jeff Bhasker (Bruno Mars, Alicia Keys, Fun., Drake, Beyonce, Jay-Z, Lana Del Rey, etc.) doesn't hurt. Nor does being able to sing as well as Swift surely can. Yeah, the record's themes - a 20-something girl growing up, trying new things, falling in and out of relationships - isn't relatable to me, but that's what all the massive hooks and interesting production are for. I never thought I'd say this, but, sure, I like some Taylor Swift songs. A whole lot, even. That said, when I listen through the Swift back catalog I dislike just about everything I hear; Red, though, well, for what it is, it's pretty damn impressive. (Greg W. Locke)

Neal Morse Momentum

In two weeks world class drummer Mike Portnoy (ex-Dream Theatre) is scheduled to stop by and record on your next album. There's just one little prob-



lem: you have only one song written and it's short. Time to panic? Not if you're Neal Morse (ex-Spock's Beard), master musician, composer, song crafter and all-around nice guy. Instead you double down and churn out an hour of music. And not just filler, but solid, melodic songs that stand among the best of your long career. I'm doing my best not to be jealous.

While the album first fell flat on my ears, it didn't take long for the hooks to take hold. Both "Momentum" and "Weathering Sky" are high-octane, positive rockers. Though Morse is known for his progressive rock roots, both of these songs are free from any "weirdness" and should find a tidy home with fans of classic rock. "Smoke and Mirrors" reflects acoustic guitars, electronic piano and strings, building from a gentle verse section to an impassioned, dramatic crescendo before backing off again. Fans of Morse's more adventurous side will take heart with yet another installment in his "Thoughts" series, this one being part five. Layered a cappella sections via Gentle Giant battle with disjointed rhythms, creative sounds, scorching Hammond organs and invigorating, extended instrumental sections. I'll take this over a cuppa coffee any day! Stretching himself a bit, Morse presents "Freak," an upbeat song built around a staccato string part, building big into a full orchestra before dropping off to accentuate the punch line.

And of course no Neal Morse album would be complete without at least one gigantic song. This time out its "World Without End" which runs a modest (by Morse standards) 33 minutes. While I enjoy this song as it's pumping through my brain, the sheer scope of it has prevented the melodies from sinking in. I have little doubt that this is only temporary. I will say that this song gives Portnoy and bassist Randy George many chances to stretch out and dig deep into their immense talents, and I'm hearing lots of sections that make me perk up my ears like a schnauzer hearing a can opener.

Morse titled the album *Momentum*, and a more appropriate title cannot be found. While his solo career had a rusty start as he found his footing, every album since then has consistently knocked it out of the park. I keep waiting for the man to slack off and release a dud, but to my immense pleasure he's on a roll and I

for one am happy to come along for the ride. (Jason Hoffman)

Devin Townsend Project

Epicloud

Devin Townsend is one of those guys about whom you could waste an entire review trying to describe, which means that for most people the adjective "weird" suits just fine. "Oddball" might also be



allowable (the man has sold puppets on his web site. PUPPETS!) During the last few years Townsend did a massive personality probe, fracking it into four distinct parts and recording an album for each facet. Admitting that this was self-indulgent, Townsend decided to clear the air by unleashing his "inner Def Leppard" which, in his hands, turns out to be something quite different, but oddly similar to the arena rock we all know and (go on, admit it) love.

Epicloud is that carnival view of arena rock, and it lives up to its name. It's big (epic) and it's loud. Except the first track, where Townsend apparently thought it would be humorous to have a churchy choir singing a harmonious theme that makes appearances elsewhere in the album. (It's hard to kick that self-indulgent thing.) "True North" follows, and it's fairly characteristic of the rest of the album. Heavy yet catchy guitar rhythms float on a spacey bed of reverb while Anneke van Giersbergen adds angelic vocals and Ryan Van Poederooyen (I'm not making that up, to steal a line) goes completely Donkey Kong on the drums. Now and then the band may change things around, but mostly the songs are intentionally much simpler than much of Townsend's past work. This is never more evident than on the single "Lucky Animals (The New Beige)" which is so refined and streamlined that it will make a beeline for your brain and stay there for weeks. Do not, I repeat, do not watch the YouTube video Townsend made of himself for this song ... in his back yard in one take. Okay, go ahead. I'll wait.

"Liberation" is another killer song, a kind of trip to the moon with Cheap Trick at the wheel and the cast of *The Rocky Horror Picture Show* in the cargo bay. I'm perfectly serious here. The entire album is a kind of raucous tent meeting, as a full choir makes an appearance on many songs. But instead of, say, "You Can't Always Get What You Want" by The Rolling Stones, where a choir signifies that you've jumped the shark, Townsend pushes past irony with his use of the choir, having them sing such glorious lines as "Rock! Let's rock! The time has come to forget all the bull***t and rock!" It's impossible to listen to this album and not smile.

To keep things balanced there are a few slower songs such as the touching "Divine" which features lyrics of "Loving you is the best thing in the worst thing in my life." I think it's a love song. In fact, maybe the entire album is a love song. Maybe it's to himself. Or maybe it's an anti-love song/album. One never can be too sure about such things.

While at times a bit lean in the ideas department, at least compared to his past albums where layers exist to enhance the layers that augment the layers of layers, *Epicloud* is a joyous, happy album that has more than its share of highly accessible songs. Sure, it's a little off the beaten path, but it's a journey well worth taking. (*Jason Hoffman*)



Falling for Skyfall's Bond May Be the Real Conspiracy

Skyfall marks the 50th anniversary of the James Bond franchise. This year is both the diamond anniversary of Elizabeth II and the golden anniversary of a popular entertainment franchise that relies on British intelligence credibility for its popularity. You might think the Brits, who inspired the original tea party rebellion, are speculating the entire Bond franchise is a slow-simmering diabolical Socialist conspiracy. Luckily for the British Empire, their citizenry doesn't include as robust a collection of conspiracy theory prone citizens as does their most successful colony.

Diamond and gold anniversaries in the same year? Are we sure this conspiratorial commercial market madness wasn't planned for decades by diabolical subversive monetary forces at work in the UK trying to transform society? You saw the Olympic opening ceremony! Clearly that parachute landing of the movie star and the queen is the fruition of a plan as long in the making as President Obama's forebearers' plan to turn our nation to the dark side! Skyfall did have the biggest Bond opening ever in the United States and is on pace to surpass records overseas as well, so I must be right.

In reality, in movie reality, the only weakness in Skyfall is the villain. Javier Bardem, sporting a blond bombshell version of his No Country for Old Men a la Prince Valiant haircut, is a deviant with a mommy complex and computer skills that are not all that scary. Bardem is perfectly creepy in the role, but I'm more scared of how he is perfecting creepiness more than I am frightened

by that creepiness.

It doesn't matter. Skyfall assumes, like any good shell game, that your eyes will follow the action. That sight line has trended towards the villain for many Bond movies. We've always known what Bond would do - no matter who plays Bond. He will look good. He will drink, smoke (until a certain era), brandish fancy gadgets and mess with women. He will get in fights and blow up locations here and there. He will escape alive and emerge sadder and wiser (often with a hot chick at his side). So, the bad guys were always the ones to watch.

While bad guys wreak havoc in Skyfall, there is plenty of fancy business that keeps our eyes on Bond and off the bad guy. And this time it is personal. Bond personal. We get a heaping helping of the backstory and the current story of Bond and M (In Skyfall, M is for "mommy" or just Mum), and that sleight of hand keeps our eyes off the fact that there is almost no prize. So, Bond is the one to watch in Skyfall.

Revenge is just about the only pea under any shell being shuffled before our eyes. Not that there is anything wrong with that. I can join in the chorus of critics and fans endorsing the notion that Skyfall is the best Bond ever.

There is much to love about Skyfall. The backstory of Bond and the ties between Bond and M make for fresh entertainment. Inner demons can be just as fascinating as villains. Give credit to screenwriters Neal Purvis, Robert Wade and John Logan for great dialogue between M and Bond and a screenplay



laced with humor and nuance that still makes room for great action sequences.

This is the 23rd Bond film. And at 50 (though the hero looks every day of 50), the franchise is fresher than ever. Daniel Craig won't hit the big five-0 for a few more years, but Skyfall plays on his weariness. You never doubt that he is up to the challenge. He may be craggy, but he makes it to the gym on a regular basis. He's just a little more exhausted and ambivalent than ever before. Age and experience weigh on him. Craig's piercing blue eyes shine through his world weariness. His Jason Bourne-inflected "what am I fighting for" hesitations give him a more rounded humanity without detracting from his consummate professionalism.

Skyfall is a highly polished gem in every production detail. Every scene is beautifully staged and shot. The opening action sequence is a stunner. It is funny, clever and magnificently executed. Director Sam Mendes brings his trademark intelligence for depicting human relationships to his work here, and he shows us he can handle the biggest scale production the movie business has to offer. No dodgy shaky cam, just a delightfully well-choreographed spectacle.

Adele's Skyfall-title tune may be the best Bond song ever. (I wish radio actually existed these days, so you could come upon it randomly in the car. Bond has lasted longer than real radio. Who could have imagined?) She is old-fashioned British blue-eyed soul.

Taking a note from the Die Hard playbook, Skyfall infuses the old school with some young, fresh-faced folks. Two "yutes," a slightly pompous and prissy Q and a hot young chick colleague agent (played by Ben Whishaw and Naomie Harris) keep Bond on his toes. O scoffs at Bond's expectation of an exploding pen, giving him instead some new takes on reliable gadgets. Eve takes a shot at Bond literally, but she treats him like a mentor with only a hint of a crush. Bond returns the respect (and the hint of attraction).

Other notable performances include Ralph Fiennes as the new head of MI6 and Albert Finney as Kincaid, an old friend of James', before he was Bond. Fiennes is understated and effective. Finney wonderfully plays a Gothic type.

There are great film and literary references in Skyfall, but they aren't coddled. For instance, in the opening credit sequence there are some sly suggestions, my favorite of which is a little homage to Gilda.

And when they head off the Moors. I could think of little but film, pop music and literary suggestions to Heathcliff. I was humming Michael Penn: "He's just Romeo in black jeans / He's just Heathcliff, it's no myth." (Okay, it is). Chick fans are just looking for someone to dance with. Skyfall Bond is that man. Of course, I'm just a zombie for the blue eyes that hypnotize me into the global British/Hollywood/socialist conspiracy.

Follies Fit Well New USF Stage

If ever a show befitted the stage of the St. Francis Creative Arts Performing Arts Center stage, it is the musical extravaganza Will Rogers Follies. The musical revue, co-directed by Leslie Beauchamp and Todd Frymier, blends folksy stand-up comedy, pageantry, song-and-dance numbers, cute kids, romance, heartfelt political and social commentary and, yes, rope tricks.

The show is a pastiche of the Ziegfeld Follies of the early 20th century, which made Rogers the star he became. After the opening number introduces him, Rogers takes the stage. Reminiscent of Johnny

Carson, the gently plainspoken Midwesterner tells the modern-day audience that Mr. Ziegfeld is watching "from above" as the revue gets underway. He explains that they will be seeing a version of his life story that might be a little more interesting than what actually happened. The Voice of

Ziegfeld interrupts the action at times, giving cranky direction to the stage manager "Peter" (who is actually the female stage manager, Lauren Bachle).

Rogers, the youngest of seven children, had six older sisters. His father Clem feels that his son is wasting his life performing rope tricks; he dies before seeing his son's success.

Rogers meets the love of his life, Betty Blake, at a train station - well, as more imaginatively conceived by Ziegfeld, on the moon – and it's love at first sight. They marry and have four kids, but Rogers' life on the road is tough on his wife. Just when he decides



to move them back to Oklahoma to settle down, he is hired by the Ziegfeld Follies in New York, working alongside the biggest stars of the day. "Blake," as he calls his wife, realizes he can't pass up the opportunity, so the family moves to New York.

Rogers' rope trick act grows to something more.

Berry St., Fort Wayne Tix.: \$12-\$15, 260-399-8064 His laconic sense of humor creeps in, and he becomes more and more beloved, even being asked to run for President of the United States. When the Great Depression hits, the Follies closes and he gives a radio address about the distribution of wealth that hits close to home so soon af-

ter the 2012 presidential election.

The star's untimely death in a plane crash is hinted at early in the show and becomes a theme throughout. The scene leading up to and following the story of his death and the national mourning that followed are heartfelt, although they do slow the pace of the show a bit. The closing number "Never Met a Man I Didn't Like," Rogers' most famous epigram, is poignant and inspiring.

Brad Beauchamp stars as Rogers, and he portrays

Lockerbie Fitting for the Season

Knowing the basic plot of The Women of Lockerbie, after having read advertising materials, it was odd to step into IPFW's Studio Theatre and hear Christmas music playing. There is a quiet calm as the cast walks onto the stage.

As the play begins, we are reminded of the plane that crashed over Lockerbie, Scotland, a few days before Christmas in 1988. It is seven years later as we meet the parents of one of the crash victims as well as a group of Lockerbie women who have petitioned to be allowed to wash and return to the families of the 259 victims some 11,000 articles of clothing held in a warehouse since the crash. The women's request is blocked by the U.S. state department which plans

to incinerate the clothing as well as other items found at the crash site.

Madeline and Bill, the parents of an American college student who had been returning from a semester in London when Flight 103 crashed, are in Lockerbie for a memorial service and have clearly refused, in dif-

ferent ways, to fully deal with their grief over losing their son. Madeline has obsessed and, we are told by her husband, spends her days sobbing and wondering what could have prevented her son's death. Bill, having to care for the despondent Madeline, has never shed a tear. By the end of the play, both are better able to go on with their lives at last.

The women of Lockerbie, having witnessed the actual horrors of the crash, have become every bit as



obsessed with the act of terror from a few days before Christmas seven years earlier as Madeline and Bill have. Eleven residents of Lockerbie, including the family members of one of the women, were killed during the actual crash of the plane and the quiet town of Lockerbie has forever become associated with an act of hate.

As in a Greek tragedy, the four women of Locker-

bie speak in unison which. at first, is a little jarring, but it brings even more power to their messages. Two hundred other local women share their goal of finding closure through the washing of the clothing having belonged to the dead. Olive, the group's spokesperson. makes the case beautifully

that the Americans should break with policy and allow them to prepare the clothing so that hate will not have the final work in the act of terrorism, and that love be allowed to prevail in the end.

The actors playing the difficult roles of Madeline and Bill are exceptional. Marcia Smith, in the difficult role of Madeline, doesn't overplay the emotion and

the self-effacing confidence of a man who knows where his talents lie but has the humility to remain the everyman. Beauchamp is at his most charming in this production and effortlessly channels Rogers' aw-shucks spirit.

Susan Moriarty's beautiful singing voice brings emotional punch to the show as she expresses her love for her husband, despite the difficulties being married to him bring. Gary Lanier plays Rogers' gruff but (eventually) lovable Clem and several other roles. (As he explains, Ziegfeld is too cheap to hire additional actors to play those parts.)

Bridget Pearson struts and poses with cutesy sexiness as she carries the title cards that progress the story. She also shows off her vocal chops in the opening "Will-a-Mania" number. The Rogers children (Ava Beauchamp, Christopher Svitek, Miles Fedders and Raymond Wolf) are suitably adorable (and each can spin a mean rope).

Aaron Willoughby put together some nice slides and videos that are projected onto the backdrop, lending to the old-timey feel of the show. The choreography by Abigail Ehinger includes a little bit of everything, from cowboy swagger to tap to a really impressively fast hand-jive during "Our Favorite Son."

But what's a follies show without scantily clad dancing girls? Although a little less skin is showing in this production than one might expect (this is a Catholic university, after all), the costumes (from Broadway Costumes) are colorful and sexy enough to make the point. One particularly lavish second act number brings out all the Follies girls in spectacular gowns and headpieces.

If the opening night crowd is any indication, plan to arrive early to ensure a parking space across from the theatre. The 2,500-seat auditorium wasn't sold out, but the lower level was nearly full. The cast earned a standing ovation, and by closing night I'm sure they'll have never met an audience they didn't like.

A Counterweight to All That Turkey

There are many things to love about Thanksgiving Day: spending the holiday with family and friends; watching football; checking out the ads for all the Black Friday specials the next day; and certainly for many it marks the first day of a cherished four-day weekend. But let's face it, Thanksgiving is all about the food, copious amounts of food. The menu is often set weeks in advance, turkeys are ordered and shopping for one meal usually costs what some of us might spend in an average week on food. Gluttony, thy name is Turkey Day.

Whether it is a healthy consciousness of how indulgent the day has become or whether it's just plain guilt that now motivates, a surprising number of people participate in a walk or run event early Thanksgiving Day to help set the proper healthful tone for the day (or maybe just burn some of the calories later ingested in pie). Indiana is no exception to this trend, and with one event here in Fort Wayne and several others around the state, there are plenty of opportunities to burn off some steam and some mashed potatoes in advance of the food and football extravaganza. Even if you're visiting relatives somewhere else in Indiana, chances are you can get to one of these activities.

University of Saint Francis is the location for the Galloping Gobbler, a four-mile run/walk which begins at 8:30 am. The race typically attracts about 3,800 hearty souls who enjoy a loop through campus and Lindenwood Cemetery before turning around and heading back to campus. New this year is the eight-mile run which covers the Towpath Trail near Jefferson Road. The eight-milers will begin at 8:15 and will ultimately merge with the four-milers near Lindenwood Cemetary, with all entrants bringing it



home well in advance of the dinner bell.

There are numerous other similar events throughout Indiana, including the Turkey Stampede (one mile, 5K and 10K) in Elkhart, the Turkey Trot in Attica, the Gobble Gallop 5K in Avon and the Drumstick Dash (with distances of 2.6 miles for fun, 4.5 for competitors) in Indianapolis. LaPorte hosts the Turkey Recovery 5K on Saturday, November 24 while Indy hosts the Leftover Turkey Trail Run the same day. For a full list of such events by state, check out www.active.com or www.runnersworld.com

There are a few other great walk/run events coming up in the next few weeks in the Fort Wayne area, and for those and a list of 2013 events, check out www.veepraces.com. Among upcoming events is the Gingerbread Pursuit on December 8, a run which takes entrants through downtown Fort Wayne and provides admission to the Gingerbread House exhibit at the History Center. And if you're really feeling ambitious, the Huff 50K event is set for December 29 and leads runners through Albion's beautiful Chain of Lakes. I find it hard to even imagine 50K being a real distance, but I suppose it would cancel out a whole lot of holiday revelry. If 50K is a bit much for you, relays are also an option. May as well share the load with a friend who likely helped you celebrate the holidays.

Here's how luck was on Bazile's side this time. Covett needed another producer to help her with the Explosion Bus workload, and Bazile, still living in Fort Wayne, was a natural choice. After all, she was already good friends with Katz and Snyder, and she was totally willing to make the move to Cambridge, Massachusetts, i.e. Explosion Bus headquarters.

"I remember driving in my car with my mom thinking, 'I don't know why Katie can't just e-mail me and ask me to come to Boston to work on Explosion Bus," Bazile said. "Then, a few months later, that's exactly what happened."

And, a few months after that, when it was clear the show's original animator wasn't

working out, Snyder and Katz asked Bazile to step in and do the job.

"It was like, 'Why don't we just have Lyndy do it?" said Bazile. "I really couldn't believe it."

Since stepping into the animator shoes, Bazile has put her own unique stamp on the show, and that stamp has included completely revamping the look of the main characters and making specific landmarks from the cities Jon and Leo visit a key part of each episode. She's even managed to get a little hometown love into the mix. In episode 27, for instance, Jon and Leo drop in on Power's Hamburgers and the Broadway Zesto stand. The joke is that the guys are in town scouting for talent for a Coke commercial, but Power's only serves Pepsi. Hence the trip to Zesto's.

"When I heard that in that episode the guys would be in the Midwest, I had to set some of it in Fort Wayne," said Bazile. "I love Fort Wayne, and evervone I know who's from Fort Wayne loves it, too. I thought it was a cool chance to pay tribute to my city."

Bazile is now focusing all of her energy on Explosion Bus,"which she hopes will soon receive the rec-

> ognition she believes it deserves for being a "small, home-grown web series that is both consistently original and consistently funny." And home-grown is literal. She and Covett live in a duplex adjoining Snyder and his wife. All of the work, with the exception of the recording, is done in that duplex, and even the recording

studio is just down the street.

The result, Bazile said, is a show that continues to improve each week it hits the web. Snyder, Bazile and Covett work together to write a script and then give the script to the actors to record. After that, the audio goes to Snyder who edits it and gives the final version to Bazile to begin the animation process. When a show airs, the cast members watch how Bazile draws them and their surroundings, and, in doing so, they in turn get a better feel for whom their characters are.

"It's a very organic, circular process. With every recording session, the show gets exponentially better," she said.

"It drives home this spirit of entrepreneurship and creates a palpable sense of pride in our community. This tradition provides a foundation for our future success.'

has a terrific voice for the theater. Scott Maughmer, as Bill, shows reserve until reserve is impossible.

As the Lockerbie women, Halee Bandt, Kearstyn Keller, Heather Moser and Piper Kirkpatrick are also very good. As Hattie, a cleaning woman, Keller brings pretty much the only humor to the play.

The simple set serves the cast well.

Seeing the desperation of Madeline's attempt to find any trace of her son was heartbreaking. My sister and grandfather died in an accident when I was a child and each memory, photograph, and object surrounding them has taken on huge significance. We who survived have spun these things through our hearts, minds, and fingers more times than I can count. When a friend recently sent me a few pictures of my sister that I'd never seen before, it was like finding treasure. This is what Madeline and Bill are seeking in Scotland and what the women of Lockerbie are hoping to offer to the families of all the victims of the crash of flight 103.

The attempts of the women of Lockerbie to heal and bring healing are, despite the heaviness of this play, transcendent in a way and show the power of love over hate. It's an unusual holiday offering, but it's one with much to offer.



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A Lost Generation

Office Girl by Joe Meno, Dial Akashic Books, 2012

In 1999, our country was at the pinnacle of an era in which Americans thought they could be successful by doing nothing. The tech sector was booming, the stock market was on fire, failure was celebrated as just another step on the pathway to ultimate success and we thought we could stay on top of the world by just sitting back and watching young people work their young-person magic on the internet, even if we didn't understand what it was, exactly, that they were doing on the internet.

The only potential obstacle on the horizon was the Y2K threat, and no one really believed it was going to amount to much. The future looked blindingly bright.

charac-The a novel by Joe Meno ters in Joe Meno's Office Girl manage to be gloomy even in this context, but despite their pessimism, they buy into end-of-the-milennium American exceptionalism enough to think that, somehow, they'll get by despite their pronounced lack of motivation or ambition.

Odile and Jack live in Chicago. Odile is an art school dropout who is working – or, actually, not working - her way through a series of uninspiring telemarketing jobs. She's also in the process of creating a history of unwise relationship decisions; her current crush is a married co-worker who is very obviously taking advantage of her.

She's not really into any of this. In her spare time she cruises through the wintry streets on her bicycle, pausing now and then to make obscene doodles on posters and ads.

Jack also rides around town on his bicycle - his street-art hobby is using a handheld tape recorder to record miscellaneous street sounds, such as the sound of a lost glove lying in the snow – and he's also not very good at the whole job thing. He's an art school grad, and he has a job at an advertising firm. He doesn't really do the job, though; instead, he spends his time making unauthorized copies on the office copier. When he walks away from that job, he ends up working at the same place as Odile, and the pair immediately recognize that they are kindred spirits.

Odile is convinced that she possesses artistic genius that has, so far, gone unrecognized. She hates art school because no one there has any imagination (one



professor she detests goes so far as to call one of her projects, a dress made out of chewing gum, "whimsical") and she longs to be able to make art that matters (such as drawing gentalia on bus ads). She is entirely sure of the superior originality of her ideas; she never considers that her professor, in his teaching career, has probably had a student make something out of chewing gum every other semester.

Odile talks Jack into joining her in the creation of an "art movement." The movement is nebulously defined - Odile will only say that it can't involve anything "popular" - but its projects consist mainly of doing little public stunts such as acting out (inaccurately) a scene from Jaws on the 'L' or riding a bus while dressed as ghosts. Jack goes along with it because he's falling in love with Odile.

Odile is an insecure girl who, despite her attempts to distance herself from the mainstream, wants only to gain the approval of everyone around her, even the people for whom she claims to have no respect. These conflicting urges push her into making poor life decisions, and the resulting damage gives her a wounded-bird appeal. Jack, who seems to be a sensitive person with plenty of his own selfinflicted damage, responds enthusiastically to Odile's siren song. It's a situation that's unlikely to end well.

Meno draws these characters skillfully, and he succeeds in making them moderately interesting despite their largely empty heads. Both Odile and Jack are inflicted with the kind of narcissism that paralyzes (as opposed to the kind of narcissism that makes one an especially successful businessperson), and in the real world they'd be insufferable. In the pages of Office Girl, though, their self-sabotaging behavior and off-putting superiority is illuminating; it concisely captures the worst aspects of their generation: the certainty of their feelings of entitlement and their failure to recognize that they can't expect the world to give them much if they don't give much back.

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Skyfall Opens Huge

Tops at the Box: The latest entry into the James Bond franchise, the Daniel Craig-fronted Skyfall, had a huge weekend, opening with just under \$90 million in ticket sales in the U.S., making for one of the year's most successful openings to date. In addition to the big stateside dollars, Skyfall, directed by underrated Englishman Sam Mendes (Revolutionary Road, American Beauty), has already sold \$428 million overseas. Add to the big bucks a slew of glowing reviews - including high marks from studs like Andrew O'Hehir, Roger Ebert, Manohla Dargis, Claudia Puig and Joe Morgenstern - and we have the most talked about movie of the fall release season. The Oscar forecasters over at Vulture.com have already begun speculating that the movie might even stand a chance as being a heavily nominated picture. Maybe. I could see Skyfall going up against The Hobbit and The Dark Knight Rises in a lot of

technical categories (sound mixing, editing, etc.), but that might be the extent of it. Hopefully, cinematographer Roger Deakins (aka the man behind camera for almost every great Coen Brothers film) at least gets a nomination, right? Right right.

Also at the Box: Disney's video game movie, Wreck-It-Ralph, continued to sell well in its second weekend of release, adding another \$33 million to its sales, upping the film's 10-day total to just under the \$94 million mark in the U.S. (about \$120 million worldwide).

Robert Zemeckis' Flight held strong at No. 3 during its second weekend, selling \$15 million at the U.S. box, upping the movies 10day total to \$48 million. Not bad for a kinda/sorta depressing drama that's up against some seriously fun movies like *Skyfall* and *Ralph*. Somehow maintaining a spot in the Top 5 was Ben Affleck's Argo which held the No. 4 slot, selling another \$6.7 million during its fifth weekend and upping the period ensemble drama's mark to just under \$86 million in the U.S. (\$112 million worldwide).

Rounding out the Top 5 was Taken 2, selling a measly \$4 million in its sixth weekend, good enough for the five spot.

Possibly for the first time in the three-plus year history of this column, all five of the movies in the Top 5 are worth seeing. Four of 'em are even pretty damn great. Add to that Steven Spielberg's Lincoln, which sold well on the 11 screens it began testing on (a whopping \$81,000 per screen!), and we have one of the most handsome box offices in recent memory.
