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


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# A Tradition in Transition

*The Nutcracker* is a timeless holiday tale: a young girl in a fantastical dream world, complete with a nutcracker prince, an evil mouse king and sweet treats from a fairy. Each year, Fort Wayne Ballet turns a story that so many know and love into a full sensory experience.

Set to the classical Tchaikovsky score, *The Nutcracker* will once again thrill audiences beginning Friday, November 30. Opening night (and two additional nights) will feature

live music from longtime ballet collaborator the Fort Wayne Philharmonic, creating a delight for both eyes and ears.

For those unfamiliar with the art of ballet – or, specifically, the talent of Fort Wayne Ballet – these holiday performances serve as an excellent introduction.

"It's a story people are already familiar with," Fort Wayne Ballet Executive/Artistic Director Karen Gibbons-Brown said. "Look at the holiday decorations

with nutcrackers everywhere. You can't get through a season without hearing parts of *The Nutcracker* on commercials or while shopping. It's very accessible to people of all ages.

"The ballet's notoriety on the whole has really grown in the last 50 years. And because people are so familiar with the

story, it's a great opportunity to show people what we do. You see young people getting their feet wet, so to speak, on the stage for the first time, all the way up to high-level professionals who are athletes in their own right."

Fort Wayne Ballet's performances of *The Nutcracker* have been recognized nationally as being one of the top performances in the United States.

All dancers featured in this year's nine performances are either Fort Wayne Ballet company dancers or dancers from the local community – save for one. Guest artist Preston Swovelin will lend his talents to the production. Swovelin has worked with the Pasadena Dance Theatre, Miami City Ballet and, most recently, the Nevada Ballet Theatre. He has also performed and choreographed in collaboration with Cirque Du Soliel, which seems fitting, given the dreamy

#### nature of The Nutcracker.

Gibbons-Brown suggested that the ballet has successfully survived for well over 100 years because of the accessibility factor, saying that it "meets people where they are in their journey." And perhaps that's why she never tires of it. Her love for the classic production became apparent as she spoke of Clara's dream.

"It's for the young and the young at heart. In our production children are dancing children's parts, making it more realistic. Every little girl can relate to Clara at the

Christmas party with her new dress and wonderful toys. Every little boy can relate to being in trouble like Fritz, whether it's in a party situation or not. It's a story full of dreams that become bigger

than life. Or does Clara just get smaller?" she asked with a smile.

"In addition to all of the wonderful storytelling, *The Nutcracker* has strong dancing and visuals that simply take you away into its world. For an hour and a half or two hours, you can turn your electronic devices off and be swept away in the moment – just like Clara."

To better sweep patrons away in the magic in 2013, *The Nutcracker* Fort Wayne Ballet style is in the process of receiving what Gibbons-Brown calls "a total makeover." Those attending this year's performances will see glimpses of those changes while they say farewell to the iconic sets that have been used for years. Elements being added to the 2012 sets include a different throne, a larger-than-life cannon for the battle scene and a genuine sleigh for Clara.

"It's time for us to rebuild and refurbish.

While I love the sets and backdrops that we currently have, they only last so long," Gibbons-Brown said. "This past January, we began preparing for a 2013 rebuilding of *The Nutcracker*. The elements we're adding are ones that we can build on for next year when we'll unveil all new backdrops."

Another new feature is Act III, taking place on opening night immediately after the performance. This one-night-only ticketed event celebrates the opening of *The Nutcracker* with heavy hors d'oeuvres, a cash bar and dancing to the music of the Paradise

Band. A three-fold celebration of Fort Wayne Ballet, their newish space on the Arts United campus and the holiday season, the halls of the Auer Center for the Arts and Culture will be decked in a nutcracker theme. Party goers will have the opportunity to bid on unique. handmade nutcracker ornaments commemorate to the occasion.

But for all the new being added, Fort Wayne Ballet made sure to keep tradition in mind when slating this

season's schedule.

As in years past, Sugar Plum Parties will follow all matinee performances, giving children the chance to meet Clara, get autographs and take pictures with select members of the cast.

And making its return for the third year is "The Muttcracker," a program to help homeless dogs. Through a partnership with Fort Wayne Animal Care and Control, "The Muttcracker" has found homes for 28 dogs since 2010. Canine stars eligible for adoption will be featured in the Act I Party Scene of *The Nutcracker*, and they will be available for visits in the lobby during intermission. If you're unable to adopt a dog but would like to make a contribution to the program, a barrel will be available for pet care donations to help the homeless animals.

The brainchild of Gibbons-Brown, "The Muttcracker" gained momentum last year when she began getting other ballet companies across the country on board. She said six other ballet groups joined "The Muttcracker" effort, and she hopes for even more growth in the future.

"This is such a great facet to our holiday season, for both the community and the animals. We always receive a very positive response to 'The Muttcracker' program, so we wanted to make sure to bring it back this year," said Gibbons-Brown. "It embodies the spirit of family and giving, making it the perfect addition to our holiday season."

Having fun is not as fun as it looks. Real fun, legitimate fun, is the kind of fun that appears effortless, joyous and, well, really really fun. Real fun is infectious. Oh sure, you can get all giddy tossing a Frisbee or bowling and actually look like you're having the time of your life, even if you're not Earl Anthony. Hurl the ball down the lane, laugh as it wobbles into the gutter, spin back to the scoring console and drink another beer. You laugh. The people in the next

lane laugh. Everybody laughs. Fun.

Creating infectious fun with music, however, requires years of practice. While the guy with the guitar plunking through an open mic night may appear to be enjoying himself, chances are no one else is. Not really. But why take my word for it? To see real musical fun in action live and in person, boogie on down to Dupont Bar & Grill on Friday, November 30 and plug your head into the sounds of Space Capone. Your body will follow.

Space Capone is the name lead singer and songwriter Aaron Winters has taken for himself and his band. Though the

name sounds like some

sort of intergalactic bootlegger, it's really just Winters' interpretation of the music his band plays.

"I came up with it after sleeping," Winters told me in a phone interview. "There was a reason for the name change. Aaron Winters is just kind of generic. I wanted the name to have a visual quality to it. I wanted it to match with what you're hearing. There's no huge, great story behind it."

But the music Space Capone play is huge. And great. It's the sound of 1970s and 80s R&B, funk and soul. Think Michael Jackson, Kool & the Gang and Rick James dipped in a vat of Barry White and the Bee Gees. Have a Kung-Fu Christmas.

Space Capone released their first record a year ago with the help of some heavy hitters in the music biz. The self-titled CD was produced in a time warp. The feel is straight out of the bygone era of the 80s. It's the sound Winters was seeking.

"The production team that made the music, we don't listen to modern music. We listen to music from a certain period of about 10 years, from the mid 70 to the mid 80s. And we hired a lot of the guys who played on those classic tracks. We figured if we were gonna have a classic album, we should hire the guys who played on some classic albums. We weren't just doing this as hobbyists."

They weren't fooling around. For help on the horns, Winters hired trumpeter Jerry Hey who played

on Michael Jackson's Thriller. Hey has won five Grammy awards as an arranger and has worked with Quincy Jones, George Benson and Dan Fogelberg, to name a few. Winters also tapped guitarist Jay Graydon who - while he has worked with everyone from Gino Vannelli to the Jackson 5 to Ray Charles - is perhaps best known for his guitar solo on the Steely Dan song "Peg."

"Jerry Hey was a big deal for us," Winters said. "He's the best ever at what he does. And he was not intimidating. We were prepared. He treated us like

peers, even though he's pushing 70 and we're pushing 30."

Winters grew up in Carthage, Indiana, a farming community east of Indianapolis. His parents introduced him to a wide range of music including Jim Croce, Eric Clapton, the Bee Gees and more. While his friends were two-stepping to country, Winters was sliding off toward something else. When he decided Carthage didn't hold the key to the music career he wanted, he moved two states south to Nashville where he quickly immersed himself in the scene.

"Moving here from Carthage was a big change," he said. "I had no idea I would ever be in Nashville doing music."

A decade ago the music Winters was doing was a lot more

mainstream, along the lines of John Mayer and Jack Johnson. But the more people he met, the broader his tastes became.

"My musical knowledge has changed," he said.

One of the things that changed for Winters, apart from his name, was his singing style. Winters is largely self-taught and has fooled around with his voice from the time he started singing and playing guitar. His normal, easy tenor had always been a staple for him, but his range included a falsetto that didn't quite fit with the laid-back singer-songwriter motif.

Winters spent the better part of a decade honing his singing and songwriting chops while searching for the right players to help his vision come to life. That player search ground through about 50 different people over the years. But the changes were necessary to find the musician who knew how to play in a large band, players good enough to play their parts without stepping on each other's toes. He succeeded.

Space Capone play about 100 gigs a year and made it onto the stage of big festivals like Bonnaroo, SXSW, Hangout Fest and Summerfest. They are essentially a live band. Winters has no illusions about getting his songs in any Top 40 list.

There is no radio market," he said. "We don't care. The radio market doesn't make sense. We didn't want to be on radio. We don't want overnight success. We want to get better at what we do."



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# Glenn Berggoetz: A Man With a Plan

The idea of the midnight movie dates back to the 1930s when independent roadshows would screen exploitation films at midnight for the sauced, the horny and the lonely. The word-of-mouth phenomenon really began to hit its stride in the 50s when local television stations would screen low-budget genre films long after all the "normal" people were tucked neatly into bed. By the 1970s theaters around New York City were playing B movies at midnight to sellout crowds on a weekly basis. Jim Sharman's 1975 classic, *The Rocky Horror Picture Show*, was made by the dorks and freaks and dweebs and punks and losers and weirdos who so loved the counterculture movement, and, ever since, theater owners have been looking for *The Next Rocky*.

In the almost 40 years since *Rocky* made its mark, we've seen the concept expand, with midnight screenings embracing not just B movies, but a variety of films with cult followings (or cult potential). Films with camp and style. Movies like *Eraserhead*, *Pink Flamingos*, *The Harder They Come*, *Night of the Living Dead* and even one of this writer's all-time favorite movies, Alejandro Jodorowsky's *El Topo*. Good movies. Bad movies. Cult films, all.

Two of the more recent films to achieve cult classic status thanks to the midnight movie phenomenon are Tommy Wiseau's *The Room* and James Nguyen's *Birdemic: Shock and Terror*. Both of these films were made by serious men who believed that they were creating masterpieces. Both of these movies

are loved – adored, even – because they're so unbelievably bad that the viewer can only assume that the filmmaker is either: (a) a really funny guy who pulled a great gag; or (b) oblivious and delusional, maybe a little bit insane. And thus the appeal.

the appeal. Enter filmmaker Glenn Berggoetz, a writer turned college professor turned filmmaker turned public speaker who spent nearly 30 years growing up in Fort Wayne before moving to Denver, Colorado. Berggoetz is an anomaly. He's made so many films in the last four or so years that I've given up on keeping track. Some have been released, some are "coming soon" and others are in the works. And, of course, there are a dozen or so more scripts on the shelf. There's 2010's Therapissed which I believe had a screening in Fort Wayne, and there's 2010's To Die Is Hard which I know had a screening in Fort Wayne. There's 2010's Evil Intent which maybe played in theaters, and then there's the hot topic movie of the moment, 2011's The Worst Movie Ever! The film played in one theater and sold one ticket. Couple that little story with the fact that the movie is called The Worst Movie Ever! and you have an easy headline. Websites like Movieline.com picked up on the story, and soon enough Berggoetz was getting some action.

"I did decide on the title *The Worst Movie Ever!* as a way to market the film," Berggoetz told me in a recent interview. "My hope was that there would be a certain group of people who, upon seeing the title, would say to themselves, 'Oh, I gotta see that film.' It seems to have worked. And I've received press inquiries from all around the world.

"For the release of the film a theater owner in L.A. said he had a slot available that weekend for a midnight movie. I enthusiastically replied that I would love for him to show the film that weekend. While I realized that I would have basically no time to promote the screenings, I figured that, with the film showing in L.A., with the name of the film up on a marquee, at least a few dozen people would stop in each night to see the film. As it turned out, the theater never put the title of the film up on the marquee, so passers-by were not made aware of the film screening there. As it turned out, only one man happened to wander into the theater looking to see a movie at midnight who decided that a film titled *The Worst Movie Ever!* was worth his \$11.

"When I received the box office number on Monday, I was devastated. I was hop-

ing that we would somehow have a couple hundred tickets sold, and I'd walk away with \$1,000 or more as my part of the

box office take. For a moment I considered not telling a single person about the box office numbers, but I had promised Ray Subers at Boxofficemojo.com that I would get him the info once I had it. He e-mailed me back a few minutes later and asked if it was a typo. I informed him that, no, the \$11 total was correct, and I thought the matter was dead. Imagine my surprise when, barely 24 hours later, I was receiving e-mails from all over the world with people asking me about the film. Before long there were a quarter million viewings of the trailer."

Before I ever communicated with Berggoetz on the subject of his films, I had to know: is he serious? Does he really know what he's doing? Does he realize why he's getting attention and why people are watching his movies? I tell him that I think naming his movie *The Worst Movie Ever!* is kinda/sorta brilliant. I tell him that I get the feeling that he understands that people like to watch bad movies because they're funny and that he's made a solid effort to simply make the "best bad movie ever." I type all these words in his direction, knowing that, well, maybe I just hurt a stranger's feelings. Maybe he's serious about his art. Maybe his humor really is that different than mine and yours.

"Thank you!" Glenn replied. "The film did turn out pretty much just as I saw it in my head. And you hit the nail right on the head. I love watching bad movies, and I really wanted to make a film that was an absolute treat to watch for those people who like bad films. The goal was to make a film that was so bad it was good, which was liberating in some ways and very worrisome in other ways. There's a fine

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line between being so bad that something's humorous and so bad it's just stupid. [We shot] *The Worst Movie Ever!* over the course of two days – a weekend. I love trying to do completely bizarre, inane things in my films but have the characters act as if those things are the most natural, normal things in the world."

ed that a film titled *The* 1. Outside of describing the weird world of Glenn Berggoetz, the movie in question is hard to give an impression of with mere words. Here's the synopsis, as posted on IMDB. com: "A robot alien. Angst-ridden teens. Cleavage-wielding soul takers. A dark overlord. A cross-dressing retard. A pregnant 14-year-old cougar. Macho scientists. Santa Claus. Yeah, this movie has it all." Make sense? Didn't think so. The style of the production is as low-budget as

Make sense? Didn't think so. The style of the production is as low-budget as they come, with no noticeable attention given to things like color grading, foley work, sound mixing or even properly choreographed camera movements and scene construction. There's a story of sorts there, and there's a lot of ideas going on. But the charm of the movie has nothing to do with the story or the ideas. It has everything to do with how absurd, awkward and unthinkable the film is. So what's funnier, the things Berggoetz intended to be bizarre (i.e. the robot alien and the cross-dressing "retard") or the rushed, tossed-off, unseasoned vibe of the actual filmmaking? Which element will help the movie better achieve the cult status we can only assume the filmmaker was aiming for? Hard to say. A combination of both elements, I'd guess.

Before I let Berggoetz – who cites "Leslie Nielsen and *The Naked Gun* films" as his primary influences – get back to work on his next project, I had to get a little more info on the man. After all, he just might be a Tommy Wiseau- or Mark Borchardt-like cult figure in the making. I asked him, simply, what he was doing before he started making films just a few years ago.

"I had a handful of short stories published back in the 90s in some small literary magazines, the most prestigious of which netted me a payment of \$25," he said. "Starting in the late 90s I became a golf pro and got really immersed in the golf world. Over the next few years I had a couple short articles published in Golf Magazine, and I had two golf instructional books published.

"Besides the two golf instructional books, I just had a book released last month titled *The Independent Filmmaker's Guide: Make Your Feature Film for \$2,000.* This book details how I go about making my films on shoestring budgets. For example, I made *The Worst Movie Ever!* for \$1,100 and my previous film, *To Die is Hard*, for \$1,500."

So, golf. And books, apparently, as well. Speaking engagements, the true sign of cult figure status, too, are big with Berggoetz.

"At this point the speaking engagements are sporadic, but with the publication of my filmmaking book there has been some extra interest in me recently. My appearances typically consist of a short talk about my film background and how I got into filmmaking, then a lengthy Q&A session as attendees often have a lot of questions."

I bet they do. With all the speaking engagements and books and scripts and film productions in mind, I next ask Berggoetz how he keeps up the quantity of work.

"It doesn't feel like I'm a hard-working guy because, besides the producing aspect of making films, I pretty much really enjoy all the other aspects of filmmaking," he tells me.

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# The Chips Will Be Flying

A cynic might think that a chainsaw solo could get old. After all, how many times can one man chop up a stool on stage and throw the pieces into a crowd before fans tire of the lumberjack act?

That's a rhetorical question, of course, because Jackyl fans continue to clamor for Jesse James Dupree's signature bit, and, considering the fact that he's been rocking the saw solo since the 90s, chances are good they'll never stop.

Which is great news for Dupree and his mates - Jeff Worley on guitar, Roman Glick on bass and Chris Worley on drums - who are now looking at their 21st year in the business and their seventh studio album, Best in Show, released just this past July. And the great news for local fans is Jackyl will be at Piere's Friday, November 30. Wood chips will almost certainly fly. Jackyl came

backyl canne together in 1990 in Kinnesaw, Georgia. Back then the band was a quintet, with Dupree and the Worley

boys joined by Tom Bettini on bass and Jimmy Stiff on guitar. Word got around to Geffen Records that

Jackyl's live shows were, for lack of a better phrase, buzz-worthy, and the guys signed a deal for their first album, a self-titled 12-tracker that became a quick hit with fans but a thorn in the side of the establishment. The Man, which at the time included Kmart, rushed to ban the album on account of a few very adult-themed songs.

Jackyl responded in typical Jesse James style, meaning they played a concert in a Kmart parking lot in protest. It wasn't an empty gesture. The band used the concert footage for their video for their wildly popular song "I Stand Alone."

A few years after the release of *Jackyl*, Dupree and company put out *Push Comes to Shove*, and the album quickly went Gold on the shoulders of hits like "Headed for Destruction," "My Life" and "Rock-A-Ho." Soon, Jackyl had gigs all around the country and the globe, touring with road buddies Aerosmith, Kiss, ZZ Top, Damn Yankees and meat-eater and aspiring secessionist, Ted Nugent.

All good bands have a great year. For Jackyl that year was 1994. In addition to their first Gold album, 1994 marked Jackyl's unforgettable performance at Woodstock and the inclusion of one of their songs (title unprintable) on *The Beavis and Butthead Experience* soundtrack. The world was their wooden stool, if you will.

Speaking of, the band's third album, *Cut the Crap*, came out three years later and featured the high and mighty vocal stylings of AC/DC's Brian Johnson.

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Johnson was infamous at the time for not lending his cords to other projects, but he made an exception for Jackyl, and the resulting track, "Locked and Loaded" is a triumph of southern-fried, sleazy fun, according to AllMusic.

Next up for Jackyl was a greatest hits release – *Choice Cuts* – and another studio album, the aptly titled *Stayin'Alive*. Then, in 2000, Dupree put out a solo record, *Foot Fetish*. It was a relatively quiet period for Jackyl, if a band that regularly destroys furniture in their live shows can ever be described as "quiet."

It wasn't until the terrorist attacks of September 11, 2001 that Jackyl garnered a great deal of national attention again, this time for

their song "Open Invitation," which invited Osama bin Laden to kiss the band's collective nether region. Dupree has been quoted as saying the song "is written in the key of 'ANGER' that such a thing can happen in this country. It's not directed toward any religious group or race of people," but instead is targeting only those responsible for making that day so memorable and tragic.

Since then, the guys haven't stopped rocking. They released *Relentless* in 2002, another greatest hits album in 2003 (because you can't have too many) and *When Moonshine and Dynamite Collide* in 2010. The band's most recent effort, *Best in Show*, dropped this past Father's Day, the same day Jesse James Dupree's son, Nigel Thomas, and his group put out *Up to No Good*.


Twenty years of Jackyl. Twenty years of chainsaws. Jackyl fans clearly have something to be grateful for, but it's the members of the band who are truly thankful. In an interview with L.A. Music Blog, Dupree said he considers Jackyl fans a sizzling sample of the "real" America.

"We've never been a band that's thrived on whether or not we're the flavor of the day on the charts or whatever," he said. "We're a band that has sustained our existence based on the fact that we connect with real America, people that bust their knuckles every day working for a living. They want to come out and they want to jam. They want to do it loud, proud, hard, and honest."

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


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


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




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# Both Hands on the Wheel

Tucked away southwest of Warsaw, just a few miles off of U.S. 30, sits a potter's sanctuary. Not just any potter's sanctuary, but one owned, worked, dirtied and loved by John Bauman.

Bauman, who owns, operates and is the sole potter of Bauman Stoneware, has been honing his craft for years, creating beautiful, functional art for the public. The passion he has for pottery is evident in the pieces he makes. Like any great artist, nothing comes easy. If art came easy, then it wouldn't be art. It'd simply be product.

Apparently Bauman had had different plans for his life.

"I chose the college I attended for one reason: Sports. It wasn't a particularly good motivation - and not just for the obvious reasons. I not only picked a college that held little probability of preparing me for life, educationally speaking, but despite my passion for sports, I was a mediocre athlete. And that's putting it generously.

"But despite my questionable motivations, I ended up at Grace College at the exact point in time

that offered me exposure to a very deep tradition of functional pottery. One year earlier, or one year later, and I likely would never have been introduced to pottery."

As a college junior, Bauman was immediately captivated when he first saw a potter work at a wheel.

"It was something akin to magic to see something of value come into existence from nothing but skilled hands and a lump of clay," he says. "It's nice to reminisce about these things."

Bauman rather eloquently describes the senses intermingling when one works with the earth's very essence.

"After more than 30 years of being tangled in the midst of it, I remember that the choice of a craftsman's life comes down to what attracted me to the arts and to the biz of making stuff and the biz of selling that stuff in the first place," he says. "And it might have something to do with how hopelessly romantic I can be about the incredibly cool processes that many of us craftsmen go through in the production of our work – the smells of linseed oil and turpentine, just cut wood, OM4 ball clay (it smells like chocolate) – the visuals of incandescent lit, late-night workshops, floors littered with sawdust or clay shavings, kilns belching two-foot flames out of 10-foot chimneys, pouring molten metals, or glass pulled from glory holes, blistered or cracked and dry but skilled hands that can take materials of next to no value and turn them into something that could, generations from now, still be treasured.

"There's a real brotherhood among craftsmen," he continues, "and I'm proud that it's a big part of my life."

Finding one's passion in life can be quite elusive. But for those who find it, it's a beautiful thing. The true challenge is to take what you love and make a career out of it, or at the very least do it and manage to keep a roof over your head and food on the table.

"I was once asked how many hours of the day I spend in my pottery studio. I answered, 'All of them,' and I was only half kidding," he says.

"I usually start the day finishing the pots I started the day before. I like this kind of start to the day because first thing in the morning I'm not thrilled about sticking my hands in throwing water and wet clay."

After working a few hours, Bauman likes to take a break and run four or five miles on Winona Lake's bike trails with his wife, Dar, and two Alaskan malamutes.

"The break is an important part of my life as well as my physical and mental health," he says. "When I get back from the trails I get started on new pots. I try to make between 10 [large] and 30 [medium] pots a day. Some of the pottery I make is more involved in the finishing than in the throwing, so quite often what I throw in one day requires a day or two to finish."

For Bauman, business is personal.

"I have no employees," he ottery is made by

says. "Every piece of pottery is made by hand by me and signed with my name. This kind of business life has taught me much – influenced how I view economics. It has illustrated for me, in a concrete way, the notion of a value-added, production-based economy. What enters my shop with very little value exits my shop exponentially more valuable by virtue of the use of my hands, mind and time.

"I spend very long hours in the shop, but working for myself has its perks. I keep a guitar and a mandolin in the shop, and I take frequent breaks to play them."

Music is a passion for Bauman as well. He was influenced by his parents' jazz and big band records when he was younger. In the 70s it was singer-songwriters, and then musicians such as John Hartford, Norman Blake and Tony Rice. He even gets together with some musicians for a little break from throwing on the wheel.

"And whenever it's possible, I go up to Goshen and play old-timey music with a group of folks who get together a few times a month," he adds.

"I also really enjoy writing books and film scripts, and directing is a blast. I love doing speaking engagements because they are always such energizing events. And I love doing interviews. I guess that makes me a narcissist.'

Finally, I ask Berggoetz, the possible narcissist, what's next. What in the world could possibly be next? Transsexuals? Hitler? Zombies? Midgets?! A movie shot on an iPhone? A trilogy knocked out over lunch hour?

"I'm really excited about the release of Midget Zombie Takeover on February 8. From the little bit I've seen so far of the footage, and from what the editor has told me, it should turn out to be a really funny film that also has a few scary moments in it. Later next year we should have a finished edit of our film The Ghosts of Johnson Woods. I'm thinking that this might be one of those films that does really well on the film festival circuit. And I'm hoping my meeting in January in L.A. with an agent might open up a few doors for future projects.'

In closing, and with the new concept of Berggoetz landing a Hollywood agent in mind. I ask the filmmaker what he would do if given, say, a \$300,000

budget to make one of his films. "I would use the money to make one or two films," he said. "I have 14 completed scripts for films that would require much bigger budgets than I typically work with. I have written a dramatic script, titled Waiting for Evening to Come, about the friendship that develops between an elderly African-American man and a young white boy in rural 1950s America. I've bounced the script off quite a few people, and I have a number of experienced film people who love the script and want to be part of the shoot should I be able to get the film off the ground. I've also spoken with Samuel L. Jackson's agent about him playing the lead role in the film, and the agent told me that when I have money in place to get back to them about Jackson playing the lead in the film.

"If I had \$300,000 to work with, I would probably check with Jackson's agent to see if we could get him for \$150,000 or so, and try to make that film. If I couldn't get Jackson, I'd probably look to shoot two of my scripts."

So there you have it, a man with plans. The new Ed Wood? Well, maybe. But he totally knows it, which makes his work even more confounding.

was much more technically advanced than his own abilities, he decided to take matters into his own hands

"Much of that music was beyond my abilities, but when I turned 40 I decided to take upon myself the discipline to actually learn how to play that way - to flatpick. I'll never be as comfortable as a flatpicker as I am a fingerpicker, but learning to play with others in an ensemble has been worth any effort, and the additional musical skills allowed me to go full circle and teach myself to play many of those jazz/American songbook standards I first filled my musical consciousness from my parent's record collection."

What's the future hold for John Bauman and Bauman Stoneware? "I used to joke that I retired when I turned 20 [when I started my pottery]. To some extent, that's always been true," he says.

"I already live the dream most men have for when they finally shed themselves of the business, worka-day world. Now that I'm facing the reality of that meant-as-humorous statement, I admit it's daunting. There's a security in my self-employment - I won't ever fire me - but the economy has made selling unnecessary art to the middle class a much harder endeavor than it was 10-20 years ago. After 35 years of this, I have to face the reality that I may not survive financially. That was an eventuality I never foresaw.

"But should I find more new tricks to surviving this business world in a weak and getting-weaker economy, I have no plans of giving it up. Why would I? I love making pottery and I see nothing about aging that would diminish that enjoyment."

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## Green Day

What a mixed bag 2012 has been for Green Day. After working steadily from February through June on this ambitious triple album project, the seemingly frantic pace of the recording process has apparently taken its toll on frontman Billie Joe Armstrong who was hospitalized with supposed CREEN DAY

gastric problems in early September and is now in rehab indefinitely for substance abuse treatment since his infamous meltdown at the iHeartRadio Music Festival in Las Vegas just prior to the release of *¡Uno!*. The question now is: does the body of work justify all of the suffering on Armstrong's part?

However one chooses to answer, the aptly named iDos! still acts as a consolation prize for all the disappointment surrounding the number of cancelled and postponed shows. Those of you, like myself, who were worried that iDos! might be a power pop continuation of iUno! can be relieved that this second part is a harder, more aggressive, but still lyrically daft work that sheds some of the pop overtones in favor of distortion and brief instances of feedback on tracks like "Wow! That's Loud," and "Nightlife." Overall, the garage rock atmosphere of iDos! is a comparable relief to when we first heard that iUno! did not carry any overt political messages.

I suppose I am more biased towards this rougher album because I do not believe an overly poppy sound peppered with obscenities suited Green Day's style very well. Sure, Green Day have always been a relatively anti-establishment punk band with aesthetic inclinations towards more alternative and pop-oriented material, but when it wants to, the band does an effective job of reminding fans of what its angst-ridden energy can accomplish. There are plenty of epic songs on *¡Dos!* that were designed to work best in a live rock stadium setting, but even on a mere compact disc it still sounds like an ideal soundtrack to a bombastic party.

Now to the issue of how much filler is on *¡Dos!*: thankfully, not nearly as much as what was on *¡Uno!*. The first third and last quarter of *¡Dos!* hold up well and contain islands of interesting tracks like "Stray Heart" (even if it doesn't have the most original rhythm) and "Lady Cobra" floating between lesser efforts.

From what I've read in interviews, *¡Tre!* is not only shaping up to be the culmination of sounds explored in the first two parts of this trilogy, but a culmination of the varying explorative sounds that Green Day have achieved in their 20-plus year career. How much closure will we find in *¡Tre!*? Stay tuned. (*Colin McCallister*)

#### **Boston Spaceships** *Out of the Universe by Sundown*

In college Robert Pollard, a three-sport high school star, threw a no-hitter. Division I, if you were wondering. Years later he and his friends, indie rockers Guided by Voices, played a pickup game of basketball against Billy Corgan and members of the Beasties Boys. During the game,

which GbV easily won, the Sisters Deal (aka The Breeders) cheered for Pollard and Flaming Lips genius Steven Drozd rode around on a bicycle. That actually happened. One time, while on tour, Pollard and his then-current GbV lineup were contestants on the show Family Feud, playing against some band called The Strokes. Before the first "big" Guided by Voices album was released nationally, Pollard – then married with two kids – worked as a fourth grade school teacher for a number of years. He's released at least 81 proper studio albums that I know of, an uncountable number of EPs, been in over 25 bands, released at least five boxed sets and six DVDs and put out well over 100 7-inch singles. Also, he's an accomplished collage artist who has done almost all of the artwork for his few hundred releases, not to mention exhibited in galleries and released art books. Did I mention that he owns his own record label and is responsible for at least 50 of my all-time favorite songs?

Could there even be a biopic, or even a proper biography, about a guy like Robert Pollard? And if so, wouldn't it have to be a series of epic, beer-soaked films? Chances are, you either love Pollard, hate Pollard or don't know Pollard. There's not a lot of wiggle room between those extremes. If you love the man, then all you need to know is that *Out of the Universe by Sundown* is something you should buy.

## BACKTRACKS

#### Out of the Cellar (1984)

Ratt

Spins

During the mid-80s there were literally hundreds of hair bands touring the country as openers for established acts like Judas Priest, Ozzy and The Scorpions. One of these bands was Ratt, an above-average band with Robbin Crosby and War-



ran DeMartini on the guitars and Stephan Pearcy on the mic.

I can only describe this band as "Aerosmith light," but they could play loud and had all of the catchy hooks to make them one of the better (yet still cheesy) pop-metal bands from the 1980s.

This was their first full-length record and featured the hit single and MTV video darling, "Round And Round." The album opens with "Wanted Man," the obligatory "bad boys of rock" song. That is followed by the frenzied "You're In Trouble." The first side ends with "She Wants Money," and you don't really get a chance to catch your breath.

Side two sort of lives up to the same standards, with thunderous bass and drums that are accompanying dueling guitars and Pearcy's shattering vocals. Some of the better tracks are the Mötley Crüe-sounding "Lack Of Communication" and "I'm Insane."

Ratt released a couple more decent records, but none really matched the hype of this release. The single from their 1985 album *Lay It Down* did manage to chart well, but the genre fizzled, and the band called it quits in 1991.

Ratt reformed several times and released *Infestation* in 2010 without Crosby, who died in 2002 from a heroin overdose.

Ratt may not have been the greatest band from the 80s, but they weren't the worst either..

**Fun Fact**: Tawny Kitaen appeared on the first two Ratt album covers; she was dating Crosby during the peak of the band's success. (*Dennis Donahue*)

If you dislike him but like, say, The Beatles, I hope you'll someday give the man's songs another chance. If you're one of the many who still don't quite know who Robert Pollard is, I hope you'll keep reading because this one's a doozy.

The main thing you need to know when approaching Pollard's deep catalog is that many of his releases are incredibly spotty. Some of them are downright bad. On average, his best albums are the Guided by Voices records. Some of his solo albums (*Kid Marine*, *From a Compound Eye, Normal Happiness* and *Space City Kicks* especially) are very good, and a few of his stray side projects such as *Go Back Snowball* are worth checking out. But, mostly, check out the GbV discs and his more recently dissolved project, Boston Spaceships, a band that also featured John Moen (The Decemberists, The Jicks) and Chris Slusarenko (Takeovers, GbV).

After putting the Guided by Voices name on standby in 2005. Pollard started focusing on solo records (he's released 15 since '05) and Boston Spaceships songs. The best stuff he released before reforming his GbV namesake for this year's three-album onslaught were, easily, the five Boston Spaceships albums, all of which are worth checking out. The problem is, very few people heard those albums. Blame it on the Pollard fatigue that even his most devout fans have suffered through. Also, Uncle Bob was learning about selfreleasing music and never took any time to work on getting press or even really publicizing his new records. Oh, and he never released the albums outside the U.S., either. Enter Out of the Universe by Sundown, a collection of the 15 best tracks from those five Boston Spaceships records, neatly arranged on one short, brilliant album. Produced for overseas markets (but available in the U.S. at slightly inflated import prices) the record is made to blow minds. There's no holding back here, no artsy posturing, no nonsense. The 15 tracks on Sundown are all big and brilliant and accessible. Massive hooks and riffs; sweet details and a great amount of variety.

If you like The Beatles, The Kinks or Pavement, you'll find much to enjoy on *Sundown*. You *should* hear all the proper Boston Spaceships records – they're pretty damn good. But if you buy just one Boston Spaceships record, it should be *Out of the Universe by Sundown*. I'll go even further: if you buy just one album in 2012, and you want it to be an album you might listen to for the rest of your life, well, here it is, the most essential Robert Pollard purchase since *Universal Truths and Cycles*. True, Psychostick use goofy prop comedy with objects like rubber chickens and stuffed animals. According to reports, vocalist Rob "Rawrb" Kersey has been known to use a Guitar Hero guitar and a tennis racket during performances.

Psychostick are known to stop mid-song and break into comedy routines that consume only seconds or obliterate blocks of time. During one song a vocalist will quit the song altogether and walk off the stage - and his exit is complete with the sound effects of a door slamming.



Occasionally, the band will hold conversations during songs. On one track in their CD, a band member sarcastically says to the others, "This song ain't getting on the radio any time soon."

What that means is that Psychostick won't be on the Top 40, they won't have regular radio play and only if you pick up their CD will you get to hear their music. The problem with

that, however, is that the stage performance is where it all happens for this group. Sight gags and improv comedy sketches are what pumps the audiences at a Psychostick concert.

They are known to cover songs unlike any other artist. You might hear a rendition of Gloria Estefan's "Conga," in which band members each drag out a drum head and do some percussion themselves during the song, or Rick Astley's "Never Gonna Give You Up" in a live attempt at Rickrolling.

It won't be the kind of metal concert you're used to, but it will be one you won't ever want to forget. They'll be making one Fort Wayne appearance at 8 p.m. Thursday, November 29 at the Yellow Bird. Trust us, you'll be highly entertained.

Before announcing they would appear at the Embassy Theatre in Fort Wayne February 12, **Matchbox Twenty** played a show with **INXS** in Perth, Australia. Big deal, right? The significance of that particular show was that INXS announced they were retiring



from touring, effective immediately. In a statement following the show, the band said, "We understand that this must come as a blow to everybody, but all things must eventually come to an end. We have been performing as a band for 35 years. It's time to step away from the touring arena." Without singer Michael Hutchence, who died 15 years ago, the band never quite regained its popularity. Yes, it probably is time for them to move on. In fact, a farewell was probably long overdue.

Bonnaroo 2013 is set for June 13-16 in Manchester, Tennessee. The show's lineup is yet to be announced, but, as you know, the biggest names in the music business are sure to be there. General admission passes for the four-day event will go on sale November 26 and are priced at \$224.50, before the usual surcharges, convenience charges, handling charges, local taxes and handling fees. Still, it's a good deal for the year's biggest music event.

Country Thunder takes place July 18-21 in Twin Lakes, Wisconsin, a northern suburb of Chicago. Unlike Bonnaroo, the organizers of this festival have announced a lineup and it will include headliners **Dierks Bentley**, **Little Big Town**, **Keith Urban**, **Brad Paisley** and **Lady Antebellum**. Tickets are available now for \$99 but will reportedly go up in price substantially on January 1.

**Blackberry Smoke** have been tapped to headline the Ones To Watch tour in early 2013. Blackberry Smoke meld a lot of styles to make their songs but have been most often compared to **The Wallflowers** and **The Black Crowes**, with a little **Lynyrd Skynyrd** thrown in for good measure. If you like your music a little bit southern-fried, this might be a tour to check out when it comes to Deluxe, inside the Old National Center (formerly The Murat) in Indianapolis on January 5.

Speaking of Deluxe, they will host indie fave **Sufjan Stevens** December 14 for a Christmas show called "Surfjohn Stevens Christmas Sing-A-Long: Seasonal Affective Disorder Yuletide Disaster Pageant on Ice." Stevens just released a new box set of Christmas tunes, his second, titled *Silver & Gold: Songs for Christmas, Volumes 6-10.* It includes five EPs with 18 original tracks and many covers. It also includes stickers, temporary tattoos, a holiday ornament, an "apocalyptic" poster, lyric sheets and chord charts, music for playing along to and hallucinogenic photographs and psychedelic graphic design by Stevens himself. Nothing says "Christmas" like apocalyptic posters and hallucinogenic photographs.

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

#### Quick. "Austria." What just popped to mind? The Hapsburg Dynasty? Any one of a list of composers longer than my arm? A certain ex-

than my arm? À certain exgovernor of Gully-fornee-uh? Probably. How about wine?

"Aha!" a couple of you might say, "I

thought about wine! That groovy sounding

grape Grüner Veltliner." Well, bonus noo-

gies for you. You're absolutely right. Aus-

tria wasn't exactly a major player in the world of wine until the last decade or so, as

more and more folks discovered that um-

laut-speckled, mineral-slathered bottle of

deliciousness. About half of the wine made

in Austria is white, with Grüner making

up two-thirds of that. Austria is on a similar latitude as Alsace, and the mountainous

terroir yields lean, minerally, acidic wine.

wine making. There's archeological evi-

dence of wine production as far back as

700 B.C. in Austria. Through the Middle

Ages wine production waxed and waned

depending on various invasions, religious

incursions and occurrences of pestilence.

In the 19th century, Austrian wine really

hit its stride, only to be laid low by that

back quickly, though, and after World War

I Austria was the third-largest wine pro-

ducer in the world, selling largely to other

class of pinot noir and Beaujolais, so if you're looking for a red that's a little different (perhaps for Thanksgiving dinner), these would be distinct possibilities.

Neckenmarkt 2009 Blaufränkisch and Neckenmarkt 2010 Zweigelt: I include these together because I found them to be very helpful wines, vocabulary-wise. Both have helpful phonetic spellings of the varietals on their labels. The Blaufränkisch a very light, pleasant red. I thought it had a surprising depth of flavor for a wine this light in body. Lots of cherry and blackberry flavors without a full mouth feeling, although thankfully not fading into watery. As the wine opens, I got a little more mineral and a little more spice. It would have been an excellent summer red alternative had I found it a couple of months ago. We poured this wine with some roasted grouper and vegetables and it went splendidly. About \$10.

As for the Zweigelt, I was hit initially with a whiff of cranberries and graphite. Its taste is light, almost a bitter cranberry flavor. The flavor feels like it should be a lighter bodied, but there's almost a glycerine-y thickness. (Um, what was that about antifreeze again?) The finish is graphite and light tannin. Not my favorite. Around \$13.

Sattler 2010 Burgenland Sankt Laurent: A very light, fruit-forward, flexible red that I found exceptionally easy to drink. I found it full of smooth berry flavors with a firm, pleasantly smoky backbone. I found it quite pinot noir-ish in character, although not quite as complex. I recently rigged up my little kettle grill to double as a smoker. I sugar-and-salt cured some trout filets and put them over the applewood. We had a little smoked trout with the Sattler. My tasting note reads "Holy crap!" An unexpectedly wonderful pairing. You could con-ceivably have this for a brunch time red, as it's clearly a wine that's not scared of a little oil and a little salt. Solid for around \$15-16.

Heinrich 2008 "Red": So, what happens when you start blending these autochthonal grapes? Oftentimes, these grapes take on entirely different characteristics when blended than when poured alone. (Case in point: just about any non-Burgundian French wine will be a blend.) This Austrian table wine is a blend of 60 percent Zweigelt, 30 percent Blaufränkisch and 10 percent Sankt Laurent. The result? A much darker, deeper wine than any of those varietals singly. This one has a very fragrant nose of cherries and herbs. The mouthfeel is considerably heavier, and the flavors are fuller. Those flavors resemble pinot noir: cherry and smoke, with some pepper thrown in for good measure. The finish is long, firmly tannic, and peppery. For a fairly unique experience, give it a run for about \$18.

# Spielberg's Labor of Love Is a Movie for the Ages

*Lincoln* is a movie that will be loved, admired, researched, questioned and debated for as long as anyone pays attention to movies. In years to come, students of all ages and many disciplines will attend classes write papers about this movie. *Lincoln* is a film that deserves lasting attention, as does its subject. But at this moment, as *Lincoln* hits theaters, I can only breathe a sigh of relief that a film this complex, moving and entertaining has made it to the screen. Grab the family and see "*Lincoln*.

Lincoln said in his Gettysburg Address, "The world will little note nor long remember what we say here ..." Steven Spielberg knows that movies are noted, remembered and seen all over the world. *Lincoln* is a film he has long wanted to make. He has given meticulous attention to every detail of the film, and so has everyone connected to this project.

As I write this, it is the 149th anniversary of Lincoln delivering the Gettysburg Address. (Last Friday's nationwide opening proves that even the marketing department seems to know how to handle this film.) After a murderous and muddy battle scene, *Lincoln* begins with Lincoln taking shelter from a driving rain as troops file by heading off to battle. A few stop to speak to the president and, piece by piece, quote back to him the words of that speech.

This scene takes place a year and more after he gave the address on November 19, 1863. Learned folk, including Doris Kearns Goodwin whose book *Team of Rivals* was used as source material, say that though the speech has become probably the most famous speech by any American president, it is unlikely that anyone had agreed yet on the text of the speech. And they agree that no one would have memorized it yet – as students for generations afterward have. None of the scholars seem to mind. *Lincoln* and the scene are just that good.

This scene pushes us into the fray. The words are marvelous, and the speech is a somber and inspiring reminder of just what a difficult and threatening event the Civil War was and is in the history of our country.

Two of the soldiers repeating the speech to the president are white; two are black. Among them, they represent a nice range of perspective on the war and reactions to the president. In this first scene of Lincoln on screen, Daniel Day Lewis makes you believe he is Lincoln. I knew he would be good, but this performance is perhaps his most remarkable – and he's had a career full of remarkable performances.

Lincoln is an iconic and enigmatic historical figure. I know many will come to see the movie with only the most superficial acquaintance with him. Compared to many in our community (and compared to most of my family) I know very little about Lincoln. I can say that my interest and affection for Lincoln helped me love *Lincoln*.

Back in the day, like thousands of schoolchildren in Fort Wayne, I was taken on field trips to the Lincoln Museum. I miss the Lincoln Museum, and as much as I loved the newer fancier museum and the marvelous programs and exhibits featured there, it is the old Lincoln Museum I miss as well. Leaving the old museum, kids were often handed a copy of the Gettysburg Address written in script on faux, old parchment. Getting to go someplace with my class and being given something unusual to take home, how could Lincoln fail to be my favorite president? I digress.



If a trip to a museum doesn't sound exciting, don't worry. *Lincoln* isn't a typical period piece or bio-pic. The movie plays like a political thriller. Spielberg and Kushner have taken their very large topic and distilled it to a few months of Lincoln's life and the life of the country.

Lincoln tells the breathtaking tale of the passage of the 13th Amendment through the House of Representatives during the lame duck session after the 1864 election. This may not sound like a thriller, and, of course, there aren't some of the trappings of contemporary thrillers. But there is drama, chicanery, manipulation, persuasion, blackmail, passion and dire consequences should the mission fail. There are also welcome doses of humor. Some of those come from the president's stories and some come from the rascals rounding up votes.

Lincoln boasts a vibrant cast of characters. Sally Field is wonderful as Mary Todd Lincoln. David Strathairn is masterful politician Secretary of State Seward. Tommy Lee Jones is passionate abolitionist Thaddeus Stevens. Joseph Gordon Levitt plays Robert Lincoln who would prefer to enlist than return to college. Hal Holbrook plays Preston Blair who has little interest in fighting for the amendment. James Spader is W.N. Bilbo, a "gentleman" enlisted to "secure" the necessary opposition votes.

Who wouldn't want to be in a movie Spielberg is passionate to make? John Hawkes, Jackie Earle Haley, Jared Smith, Michael Stuhlbarg, Gloria Reuben, Lukas Haas, S. Epatha Merkerson and Tim Blake Nelson are all great actors who make delightful impressions in roles that give them plenty of room to show how good they are. Some have only a line or two, but there isn't a misplayed note in any performance.

Lincoln has many virtues, but I must single out Kushner's screenplay. He uses words and phrases of the time but doesn't overuse them. He makes people from another time familiar and accessible without making them too contemporary. He makes his political points and parallels without pushing too hard. The film doesn't dwell too long on any one thing. The horror of war? A wheelbarrow full of severed limbs outside a hospital is all we need. Slavery? Gloria Reuben in one short remark makes you feel the injustice.

Lincoln's debate with his advisers about the legal niceties of the Emancipation Proclamation versus the 13th Amendment are lucidly presented. All of the reasoning behind Lincoln's political calculations is fascinating. We see not only what a great politician he was but also how he could put aside petty grievances for a greater good. He is a caring father and husband and still a rascal, a very wise, learned man and a country boy.

Lincoln made the first presidential proclamation formalizing Thanksgiving as a holiday. He did this in 1863, a year in which there was little to celebrate. Lots of people today seem to think we have more to complain about than celebrate. I don't agree, but if you want something to be thankful for, go see *Lincoln*. We are a nation of problem solvers and optimists. Our imperfect union made it through the Civil War followed by an assassination. We should all be thankful.





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# A Perfect Film for Winter

If you don't know me personally and you don't read my writing regularly, then you likely don't know that I tend to be something of a gloomy guy. Quiet, introspective, lonely, sad - all the fun things you love in a friend. And so, fittingly, my favorite season tends to be winter. It suits me, the same way summer maybe suits the shiny happies. I like the clean, crisp air. The deathly look of frozen breath. I prefer the way the city looks under a fresh layer of frosting snow. I prefer the cold. I like that it's dark for 17 hours a day, and when you're out in the calm it's quiet and peaceful as opposed to hot and sweaty. And loud. And so each year, when my lovely winter finally comes around, I get excited. And that excitement spills into my always heavy movieviewing schedule.

As the seasons change I tend to watch some films that match the weather. Each summer I have annual screenings of Do the Right Thing, Major League, Dazed and Confused, Kids and, of course, Die Hard with a Vengeance. In the fall, another season I love, I usually queue up Dutch, Good Will Hunting, The Ice Storm, Friday Night Lights, When Harry Met Sally, Dead Poet's Society and the underrated Home for the Holidays.

My winter season films are usually split into two categories: holiday movies and chilly movies like Let Me In. While I'm clearly not the most cheery guy around, I do appreciate the holiday season quite a bit and thus watch a lot of holiday films, obvious titles like Home Alone, obscure picks like Un Conte de Noel and oddities like Rare Exports. This year, however, as it was getting cold, I found myself focused on one film in particular: David Fincher's U.S. adaptation of Stieg Larsson's The Girl with the Dragon Tattoo, released around this time just last year.

I saw this very dark, haunting flick when it originally played in theaters, enjoying it very much. Unlike most out there who write at least semi-professionally about the movies, I didn't make a ruling at the time whether or not the Fincher take was superior to the 2009 Danish-language version directed by the stellar Niels Arden Oplev. Felt like too much to digest. So just this week I revisited Fincher's *Dragon* for the first time since that initial big screen viewing. It was the movie I most wanted to see as the weather turned to cold. While I did like Oplev's movie very much, I now feel confident saying that I prefer the Fincher film. For starters, I think the adaptation, on paper, is much better. The dialogue is smarter. The story elements writer Steven Zaillian chose to include -



and not include - make more sense. And, maybe most importantly, of these two very long films, Zaillian's script passes easier.

But these are two different films, for sure. The key, I think, is Fincher's production value which is, as expected, far superior. And it should be, as Fincher may be the most technically sound filmmaker of his era, even better than that Steven guy. The performances by the leads in both movies is acrossthe-board phenomenal. And while Noomi Rapace did a great job playing one of the great modern characters, so did Mara Rooney, who went into the role with a much bigger, more critical spotlight. I think Rooney, who had the bigger mountain to climb (big budget, big expectations, biggest competition). gave the deeper, more memorable performance, making the character her own against all odds. Her Lisbeth stands, in this writer's opinion, as one of the great young female leads in American cinema history. And I'm not alone in this sentiment, as Rooney has since been cast to star in films with some of today's great filmmakers, including Terrence Malick, Spike Jonze, Steven Soderbergh and whoever ends up winning the race to helm Nick Hornby's adaptation of Colm Toibin's Brooklyn.

Like Fincher's other very slow-burning, incredibly detailed thriller, Zodiac, will be a late bloomer. A movie that picks up a legacy - if only for the performances and Fincher's champion craftsmanship - as the years pass. The movie just had too much baggage when it was released to stand a chance. Everyone had just read the book or recently seen the great Oplev film, or both. All people wanted to do was compare and complain, because they loved the original film, as well as the book, so much. But the Fincher movie is the better picture. Very much so, even. The script smarter, the cinematography better, the style more fully formed and, dare I say it, the performances better.

Sony has already signed on to produce the second film in the Girl series, titled The Girl Who Played with Fire. Zaillian is said to already be working on the script and the leads have signed on to reprise their roles. This is a good thing, I think, as quality of the Danish language versions of the films dropped dramatically with each installment. The problem is,

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# A Life on Easy Street

#### Lots of Candles, Plenty of Cake by Anna Quindlen, Random House, 2012

If I hadn't loved Every Last One, Anna Quindlen's shockingly effective 2010 novel about familial tragedy, I never would have picked up Lots of Candles, Plenty of Cake. I am outside the demographic that Quindlen made a career of writing about: I'm the wrong gender, I'm too young and I don't have nearly enough money. I mostly avoided her during all the years she was a columnist for The New York Times and Newsweek, thinking that her homey musings about middle-class motherhood would

seem alien to me, and I wouldn't be able ANNA to appreciate them.

QUINDLEN But Every Last One made me think that maybe Quindlen had an insight into something sharper and more universal, and maybe I'd find something revelatory in Lots of Candles, a memoir about contemplating the transition from middle age into old age. Alas, all I found

was that I had been right about that alien-seeming thing all along.

What makes Quindlen seem alien to me - and what makes her alien to almost everyone in America - is not that she writes about being a woman or that she's more than a decade older than I am. It's that she's lived a life that, until recently, most Americans thought that they should have - that they deserved to have, that they probably someday would have - but that very, very few actually do have. She is, and always has been, the kind of American that just 10 or 15 years ago every American expected to be when they were her age. She is not, however, the kind of American that most Americans are, and that makes her an uneasy fit in the role of spokesperson for a broad swath of the population.

The uneasiness is most apparent in the section of the book about materialism. The section's point is supposed to be that as she's grown older, Quindlen has come to realize that stuff isn't important. But the point that we actually get is that stuff seems to be very important to Quindlen. She owns two homes - one in the "city" and one in the "country," a lifestyle dichotomy that only the affluent truly understand - and both the homes are positively full of stuff. She insists that none of it matters, and she does so by giving us lists and loving descriptions of the inventory. None of it matters, she says, but she doesn't say that she's planning to have a massive garage sale any time soon. The bottom line is

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that it's easy to not care about stuff when you have a lot of it.

What's truly lacking Quindlen's narrative is the grittiness of real life that brings real wisdom to real people. The reason I liked Every Last One so much is that it was a convincing examination of grief, but, at least as laid out in this memoir, there is no grief in Quindlen's actual life. Her mother died when Quindlen was 19,

and I don't discount that tragedy, but since then it seems to have been smooth sailing. She married a man she met her freshman year in college, and they're still married. Her children are all happy, healthy and successful. She is wealthy. Her adult life has been unscarred by divorce, death or poverty. When

she searches for personal struggle to tell us about, all she can come up with is a long-ago-conquered drinking problem that seems to have been not so much alcoholism as a tendency to sometimes drink a whole bottle of wine.

Lots of Candles will satisfy Quindlen's fans, no doubt. They want affirmations - life only gets better as you get older, you'll always have everything you need, friends are wonderful, you needn't be concerned about your body as you age (as long as you have access to Botox) - and Quindlen is happy to supply them. She deftly conflates the abundance of an easy life with wisdom, and her fans willingly buy into the substitution. Quindlen has lots of cake to eat; some of her readers probably have plenty of their own cake, and many of those who don't will satisfy themselves by watching Quindlen celebrate her good fortune, pretending to empathize with her because she has the life they wish they had.
