The Fort Wayne culture scene is about to get out there – way out there. Not just different, like the guy in the car next to you with the forehead beard. No no no. I'm talking the edge, the periphery of art and performance, the kind of stuff no one in this town has experienced – not, at least, while in this town. Fort Wayne is about to venture into the fringe.

The Fort Wayne Fringe Festival happens January 31-February 3 at the newly minted head-quarters of the Wunderkammer Company. Housed in the former Casa D'Angelo at 3402 Fairfield, Wunderkammer Company provides the ideal space for the first Fort Wayne Fringe. With 10 performance groups lined up, Fort Wayne Fringe promises

to take audiences on a tour of dance, theater, music and more. It's an event Fort Wayne deserves.

"There is great talent in this city," said Fort Wayne

Fringe co-founder Jason Markzon. Markzon is the principle percussionist with the Fort Wayne Philharmonic. A transplant from Philadelphia where he attended several of that city's fringe festivals, Markzon and Fort Wayne singer/songwriter Fernando Tarango hatched the concept for Fort Wayne Fringe a year ago.

"We were coming up with what we


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Weddings, Wheels Get Hitched

There comes a point in every wedding, usually after all the church/park/beach photographs have been taken, when the glowing bride and proud groom climb into a

getaway car decked out to take them into their future. Whether the car is festooned in old shoes, empty cans or soapy slogans ("Just Married," "Vegas or Bust," "Honk if You Believe in Love") and regardless of its destination (rocking reception, romantic honeymoon, the sunset) it cannot be argued that automobiles play an important role in the American wedding.

It is only fitting then, that one of the area's most popular bridal extravaganzas, the Classic City Bridal Show, would take place inside the Auburn Cord Duesenberg Museum.

On Sunday, January 25 from noon to 4 p.m. prospective brides and grooms will have the chance not only to nail down every aspect of their special day, from the rehearsal dinner to the honeymoon, but also browse the museum's estimable collection of classic cars.

The show, now in its 15th year, proves that such events aren't simply designed for brides, mothers of the bride or even mothersin-law of the bride. Men are very much welcome and, according to Kendra Klink, operations director for the ACD Museum, are all too happy to attend this unique gathering of vendors and lovers and dreamers.

"It's a nice setting," Klink said. "It's different. It's not a regular reception hall, and it's not an impersonal convention center either. The museum and the cars are available for the whole event. We even encourage brides and grooms to pose inside the cars for a unique souvenir photo opportunity."

The other advantage the Classic City

Bridal Show has over others of its ilk is its intimate nature. Many bridal shows are so packed with vendors - photographers, dressmakers, cake makers, DJs, planners, caterers, jewelers, florists - that what can already seem an overwhelming task (planning a

wedding that is both fun and reflective of the couple's aesthetic tastes and dearest hopes) can become more so. The Classic City Bridal Show takes the stress out of the situation and replaces it with one-on-one consultations with the vendors and a lot of quality question and answer time.

That means, Klink said, brides won't spend the day after the event wondering whose business card they're holding, as often happens post-show. They'll be able to put a face with that card and even a first impression.

"We hear from a lot of vendors and attendees that this is one of their favorite shows because it isn't overwhelmingly large,"

to spend with brides and grooms, and that way they get all their questions answered. Ours is a nice setting. It's relaxed. We don't have too many vendors of any certain type; you won't find 45 different photographers.

for instance. We limit our vendors so couples can, in effect, plan every aspect of their wedding.

Many couples leave the Classic City Bridal Show heaving a collective sigh of relief. They might even walk away with their wedding/reception facility booked. The Auburn Cord Duesenberg Museum plays host to a number of ceremonies and post-wedding parties each year, and Klink said everyone at the museum looks forward to such events. After all. what's not to like about a wedding?

Food. Dancing. Optimism. Love in the air.

You'd have to be a bitter party of one to scoff at such delights.

"Weddings are such happy times," Klink said. "Everyone's in a good mood. We love to host the bridal show, and later, when couples come back for the big day. we couldn't be more thrilled."

That goes for traditional and less conventional couples alike. Many prospective brides and grooms who attend the Classic City show resemble miniature cake-top couples - i.e. young, beautiful, wide-eyed - but just as many others might be on the older, more mature side. Regardless of your age or number of trips down the aisle, Klink promises that the Classic City Bridal Show will have something to offer you.

"We do see brides at every stage of life. whether it's a young bride or someone planning a second wedding. The show is geared toward everyone. Our hope is that couples of every stripe and stage attend and have a good time," she said.

Murder, They Wrote

Local author Margarite St. John is actually local authors and sisters Johnine Brown and Margaret Yoder. The pen name is a combination of the two first names with the added panache of the strong mass market sounding moniker. For over three years, they have collaborated to write a steady stream of murder mystery novels, a how-to book for aspiring authors of popular genre novels and, in the last quarter of 2012, a holiday-themed book, *Postcards from a Tuscan Christmas*. Although the latest release doesn't include a murder plot, it has its own charm and intrigue and includes a cast of characters from previous titles as they work on a mystery abroad in Italy.

Born in Iowa, the sisters eventually landed in Fort Wayne, which is good fortune for their reading public. Even if you are not from Fort Wayne, you will notice the hometown feeling you get from the varied references to Fort Wayne and businesses that give you a feel for a medium-sized Midwestern city. If you are reading a Margarite St. John title and you also happen to be from Fort Wayne, it's a bonus, as you will recognize locations and enterprises that either are called by name or mirror places you know by another name.

There is slightly more than a 15year age difference between the two, but they write as one in their fastpaced, edgy thrillers. The older sibling, Brown, is a retired attorney with

advanced law degrees. She also has another career path which is handy if you plan on writing novels, as she was an assistant professor in Chicago State University's English Department with a masters in English lit and a doctorate in English language and lit. Combine that with a bachelor's degree in psychology, and you have your bases covered for all aspects of human nature plus the added benefit of being proficient in grammar, spelling, punctuation and style. Yoder is also well-educated and has degrees in education and a medical background. Between her work experience and her surgeon husband, she rounds out the team with medical expertise.

Although the recurring characters interspersed in the novels create a series feel, all of the books stand alone as individual titles, so you won't feel let down if you happen to read any of their seven books out of sequence.

From information gathered during conversations with the authors, Yoder is the chief dreamer, concept molder and shaper. The pair take the plot Yoder has conceived and have brainstorming sessions to build the story around the mutually agreed upon premise. Once all aspects are hammered out, Brown goes to work with her literary background and brings the story to life. As the story progresses, they have status meetings on a regular basis to ensure that both contributors have equal parts in the finished product.

Margarite St. John books are a kind of a combination of Agatha Christie meets Danielle Steel. They generally stick to the ever-popular murder mystery plotlines and make them endearing by including humor, innuendos and unexpected twists. There have been times when I have been reading and actually ex-

perienced belly laughs from some of the racy humor.

Most new authors write their first book and then

set about perfecting it and seeking a publisher or a market for that hard-earned accomplishment. Not Margarite St. John. Once they got started, they realized they enjoyed it and also realized they were good at it. Their first book, *Face Off*, soon had an addition to the brand, *Monuments to Murder*. Four books later they are still going strong with additional titles planned for 2013 and beyond. Of course, seeing your books in print and marketed to the general public is exciting, but most people write books with ambitions of achieving bestseller status. Margarite St. John started out at a humble pace, self-publishing through Amazon and having New Release parties and book signings which generated substantial sales in the local market. Their success caught the attention of the press, and as



a result of print and television coverage, they subsequently caught the attention of local publisher Bauer Communications. In November the sisters signed a contract with their new publisher and are anticipating sales on a national level which will hopefully make Margarite St. John an up and coming mass market brand with fans who can't wait to curl up with a nice cup of coffee and the latest MSJ release.

Their work ethic, something these ladies do very well, has gotten them to the point they are today with their literary ambitions. They work very hard at the craft and don't let any grass grow under their feet while pining for success from a single book. Any successful author will agree that more is definitely better, and you can be sure not everyone is going to love every book you write. If you have several to choose from, the odds are much greater that one of your books will spark interest from readers who will have a favorite but will still be interested in other offerings. This also helps grow exposure and sales.

All Margarite St. John titles are currently available on Amazon, and the publisher has indicated that there is a concentrated effort coming to bring their books to the masses as printed books, e-books and audio books and will include many additional markets and an extensive social networking platform.

The full Margarite St. John catalog to date includes Face Off, Monuments to Murder, Murder for Old Time's Sake, Finding Mrs. Hyde (How-To Guide for Writing that Mystery Novel You've Been Meaning to Write), The Girl With a Curl, Hot as a Firecracker and Postcards From a Tuscan Christmas. You might find a favorite or love them all. If you enjoy a good murder mystery or suspense thriller, you will appreciate the time and talent these two Fort Wayne authors have devoted to the Margarite St. John brand.

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Cold Pumas

Persistent Malaise

Cold Pumas like to dabble. They like to dabble in the world of Ian Curtis, Colin Newman and anything else that might be lurking in the shadows of late 70s post punk and early 80s alternative. The sound made on their new album, *Persistent Malaise*, is one we've heard before. In fact, there are



a few bands that have given us their version of Joy Division's *Unknown Pleasures*, Wire's *154* and The Cure's *Three Imaginary Boys* this year. Some have succeeded rather well in taking that jagged disco beat, angular guitar and steady bass line and giving us something familiar yet new; others were derivative for the sake of being derivative. Cold Pumas definitely take their influences and wear them on their torn sleeves, but they do it so well you don't really care.

Persistent Malaise on first listen sounds more like The Strokes, had they been more into Joy Division and Bauhaus rather than The Stooges and The Cars. It's a sonic landscape that isn't really lo fidelity, but there is a layer of grime that covers the sound and gives it a dark and dangerous vibe. It's as if they recorded in the basement of a mortuary or a 500-year-old catacomb under the streets of Brighton. It's a dulled sound. Everything is in focus, yet it's hard to tell where the treble-y guitar ends and the hi-hat begins. This really isn't a complaint; it's just how my ears hear it. There's a wooziness to the sound that makes me want to return for repeat listens.

This UK band has done their homework in regards to their postpunk forefathers. Songs like "A Versatile Gift," "Fog Cutter" and especially instrumental "Variety Lights" bring back the spirit of Joy Division and Wire's *Pink Flag* while still showing a modern take on a classic sound is a good thing. "The Modernist Crown" will bring comparisons to America's favorite Joy Division cover band, Interpol, but there is no slick production to hide behind on Persistent Malaise. It's bare bones territory here. What you hear is what you get. Raw, dark, untethered punk for the art school crowd. If I had heard "Puce Moment" randomly, not knowing anything about this band, I would've sworn it was Ian Curtis and company without Martin Hannett's boxy production. "Rayon Girls" is a beautiful pop track and a pleasant surprise. It's like that great pop song that was placed somewhere in the middle of the tracklisting on the first three great Wire albums. "Outdoor Miner" comes to mind. The nearly seven minute "Vanishing Point" ends this rather great debut with reverbed guitar, a flurry of beaten toms and, well, malaise.

I've made it no secret that I'm a fan of 70s post-punk and early 80s alternative. It lights the nostalgia fire in me that I quite enjoy warming myself next to. *Chairs Missing*, *Unknown Pleasures*, *Marquee Moon*, 154 and *Power*, *Corruption*, and *Lies* are just some of the albums I've grown with. Albums that defined an era for me. Cold Puma's *Persistent Malaise* is a hell of a start in creating a post-punk musical legacy. Ian Curtis abides. (*John Hubner*)

Toro y Moi

Anything in Return

An advance digital copy of the third proper Toro y Moi album hit my in-box at an unlikely time. It was just after midnight on the evening of this year's Golden Globe Awards. Lena Dunham and Anne Hathaway had just finished reminding me how unimpressed I am with the current crop



of young people; I was up late writing about the scatterbrained eloquence of Jodie Foster's coming out speech and the overrated-ness of Director Ben Affleck when I first pumped Toro's 13 new tracks through my speakers. As a kinda/sorta fan of Chaz "Toro y Moi" Bundick's previous studio album, 2011's *Underneath the Pines*, *Anything In Return* was a record I was at least sort of anticipating. This is because there were some great things about the first two Toro records, specifically the thick, heavily detailed production sound.

But *Pines* was a young person's album in that it proudly tinkered with novelty. The record too often winked at the dated pop sounds of the 80s, even shaking out some disco vibes from time to time. Upon its release, the album was considered to be something of a chillwave upgrade: a hazy, production-heavy dream of an album focused on hooks and dance floor accessibility. To me, *Pines* sounds like the work of a tremendously gifted song arranger who wanted so badly

Los Lobos

Los Lobos are often defined as an East L.A. Chicano band, though their sound that has its roots in all sorts of genres. While I eventually tired of their Ritchie Valens cover, "La Bamba" (from the 1987 movie), their eighth album. The Neighborhood, mode me an in



bum, The Neighborhood, made me an immediate fan.

The record opens with "Down on the Riverbend," a rhythm and blues rocker that has some elements of Eric Clapton and early Robert Cray. "Emily" strums away with a slight country-rock vibe, and the pace picks up with the great guitar-driven "I Walk Alone." The band then brings it way down with a nice, soulful ballad, "Little John of God," accompanied by the vocals of the late Levon Helm.

Side two opens with "I Can't Understand" with the bluesy vocals of David Hidalgo covering a classic Willie Dixon track. Again, this band can really play the blues, and with the creative brass arrangements sprinkled throughout, it's one of the better blues records you probably never even knew about.

"The Giving Tree" melds the Latino-based sound with an almost zydeco purr, and "Take My Hand," which features John Hiatt on vocals, once again brings the tempo down. It's one of those songs that flirts with alt-country but really stands out here.

This collection of songs has a little swagger to it, as Los Lobos really discovered their sound on this and the eight or so albums that have followed. By the way, they are fantastic live, with pretty much the same lineup they have had for over 30 years.

In 2010, they released *Tin Can Trust*, their first album of original music since 2006. They will be in Grand Rapids on February 8. (*Dennis Donahue*)

to be unique in his inspirations that he was taking from some of the worst pop music ever made, if only because few others were doing so at the time. Regardless, I liked the record fine, but mostly for Bundick's remarkable production ability and indie pop sensibilities. If I had to listen to a hip, 80s-obsessed record in 2011, it was the second Toro y Moi album.

But now comes Anything In Return, an album meant to push Bundick to the forefront of indie rock's current generation of aimless, history-ignoring, contrarian types. Bundick still treats 80s pop with too much respect but also works really hard on his production. The tracks are almost all dance-y, thickly-produced and juiced with hooks and easily digestible arrangements. We hear not just the indie pop and 80s pop influence throughout, but also influences of heavy R&B, house and, where bass and drums tracks are concerned, even little flashes of hip-hop. My instant favorite, a mid-tracklist tune called "Studies," floats through the room with Bundick's voice light and his accompaniment both thick and smooth. It's one of the first great songs I've heard in 2012 and probably, I think, a track that will get a lot of play through the year.

Just as I was starting to really dig into Anything In Return, Justin Timberlake's surprise new single, "Suit and Tie," hit the internet. First the Globes, then Toro and now the first proper new JT solo track in over six years. And here's the thing: the Timberlake song was so good that I turned the Toro record off. JT's track was also R&B-tinged, hip and beautifully produced. The difference is that JT isn't shamelessly trying to re-energize or re-invent a generation of pop music that is best forgotten.

As impressed by Anything In Return as I was, I went to sleep that night wondering about the merits of pop music and pop music makers, sad that Bundick came along when the only era left to steal from in a unique way just happens to be the worst era for pop music. Sad that the young people who love Toro so much seem to be so often tasteless in the works they hold highest. That said, I think the guy has made another worthwhile production, an album that fans of Dunham's Girls will love and listen to through the rest of the year a record that I'll even probably revisit from time to time, if only to wish Bundick were using his ability and creative energy in a better way. The concept for fringe festivals grew out of a series of impromptu performances by theater groups in Edinburgh, Scotland during the 1947 International Festival. Today the Edinburgh Festival Fringe is the largest arts festival in the world. The idea has spread to cities around the world. In keeping with the spirit of fringe, the Fort Wayne version used a lottery system to select performers who in turn will present works that have never been seen in the city.

"I think the most exciting part is that the audience can experience a whole range of performances in one afternoon," Markzon said. "They can watch something that pushes their limits a little bit. That's the whole idea - to experience something different and edgy all in one day.

The Fort Wayne Fringe lineup includes local artists dAnce.Kontemporary, Pyroscope Entertainment, The Hope Arthur Orchestra and Kurt Roembke in addition to out-of-towners Joshua Kent (Chicago), Identity Cubed (Ann Arbor), All's Fair in Jewels and Dresses (Atlanta), Melinda Jean Myers (Chicago) and O.G. Productions (Columbus, Ohio).

'The format is rapid-fire succession," Markzon said. "Each show is about an hour long, and we have it scheduled so a local performer will be followed by an out-of-town group.'

dAnce.Kontemporary kicks off the festival Friday January 31 at 7:30 p.m. Local dancers Alison Gerardot and Kara Wilson formed the 14-member dance company in 2012 with the goal of providing local dancers a venue for exploring a wide scope of dance forms, from jazz to hip-hop. dAnce.Kontem-

porary will be performing pieces from "Cupcakes and Heartache," a show from their inaugural season. This show represents the arc of a romantic relationship from the sweet and sugary cupcake phase through, well, heartache and everything in-between.

Pyroscope Entertainment and Twin Flames Productions will present "The Elements," a visually and musically enticing exploration of the four classical elements.

A collaboration between local fire performers and musicians, "The Elements" encompasses the essence of air, water, earth and fire through a combination of fluid movement, fire manipulation, ambiance and ar-

Singer/songwriter and pianist and accordion player Hope Arthur, whose influences range from Björk to Brahms, will debut music from her upcoming album. Arthur blends classical keyboard chops with experimental sensibilities into original music with a twist.

Unspoken word artist Kurt Roembke will present his piece "Hunting for Mushrooms." Roembke found inspiration from John Cage who assembled a score from cut-up pieces of recording tape.


Identity Cubed are a three-piece percussion group from Ann Arbor that specializes in transcending traditional concepts of rhythm.

All's Fair in Jewels and Dresses is a comedy written by Atlanta playwright Amina S. McIntyre. The play is a spy-versus-spy comedy about two women,

Tangie and Esmeralda, both working to get a precious ring, which belongs to Dennis, to take back to their agency. The ring, however, can't just be stolen. 

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Not So Simple Stories

The Best American Short Stories, edited by Tom Perrotta, Houghton Mifflin Harcourt. 2012

Tom Perrotta, the guest editor of this edition of The Best American Short Stories collection, is jeopardizing his critical cred by being as honest as he is in his introduction to the volume. Perrotta admits that his formative years as a writer were colored by an admiration for the populist simplicity of Raymond Carver and a dislike of the elitist obfuscation of writers like Thomas Pynchon. The young Perrotta wanted stories – all stories - to be accessible to the typical reader, and remnants of that preference show up

THE BEST as the older Perrotta collects what he believes are the best short stories published in the U.S. and Canada in 2011.

S.H.O.R.T STORIES The populistelitist divide is an interesting dilemma for serious fiction, and it's a question not often addressed in venues like this, where stepping outside the bounds of critical consensus can make a writer seem far less than serious, at least to those writers and critics who take themselves very seriously. Perrotta lays the problem out nicely, though, and his assertions are brave. He compares the accessible, unadorned work of a writer like Carver to indie rock, while he draws a parallel between overblown serious fiction - which Perrotta once thought was exemplified by the work of David Foster Wallace - to "a rock-god guitar solo that goes on for so long, you can't even remember what song you're listening to; all you can do is shake your head in weary, worshipful amazement." It's a simple explanation from a writer you prefers simplicity.

Perrotta backpedals a bit, though. He says that he changed his mind about Wallace after reading the collection of essays A Supposedly Fun Thing I'll Never Do Again. Here, Perrotta says, he found an understanding of Wallace's work: he "wasn't really a fiction writer in the traditional sense ... he was more of a freefloating intelligence, a cultural observer whose methods and obsessions enabled him to notice things that were invisible to the rest of us and to diagnose the peculiar sickness of the age." True to the typical urge to deify Wallace, Perrotta attributes to him a sort of omniscience that defies comprehension

by the common man; he was better than us, and he saw things we didn't see.

This is where Perrotta's focus wavers, and he potentially loses his grip on his vision for the collection. He seemed to have been arguing that a writer like Carver also saw things that were invisible to the rest of us but then explained them to us in a way that we could

understand; his writing was a revelation. Wallace, on the other hand, took things that were invisible to the rest of us and then made them invisible in a different way. I've yet to hear anyone explain how Wallace's writ-

ing is revelatory. The obscurity is the point; he must be a genius, because he writes things that none of us can understand. This was, I thought. the point Perrotta want-

ed to make, but then he opened the door to a blatant contradiction to his argument. Could it be that he was influ-

enced by critical pressure? Was he concerned when he sat down with series editor Heidi Pitlor and found that she didn't always share his affection for "directness of voice and simplicity of language?" In the end, he claims that it wasn't that big a deal, that the divide between populism and elitism is diminishing, that writers are finding a way to bring humor and directness even to serious fiction without resorting to stylistic tricks.

I tend to believe him since the stories in the collection are clever and fresh but mostly lacking in silly gimmicks. There's only one story here that was originally published in McSweeney's, Jess Walter's "Anything Helps," and although it has the kind of obsession with grittiness and stylistic flourish that screams Serious Fiction, it's also deeply sentimental. something that was anathema to serious fiction writers only a few years ago. Elsewhere, the collection is a dense thicket of work that, for the most part, stays close to Perrotta's proclaimed vision. Only George Saunders' "Tenth of December," with its self-conscious and unconvincing childish voice. harkens back to Wallace-inspired navel gazing. Otherwise, the volume is well worth sorting through. evan.whatzup@gmail.com

Early Picks for Oscar Last week, following the

tossing around of Golden Globe statues to middle weights like Ben Affleck and Lena Dunham, I wrote a ScreenTime column that was kinda/sorta about the Golden Globes. A beautiful poem it was not. Mostly I said that I liked co-host Amy Poehler's goofy performance a whole lot and was bummed that P.T. Anderson's *The* Master wasn't better represented or awarded. At the end of said column I promised that, in my next column, I would give my thoughts on the recent Oscar nominations. So here we go, easy peasy:

Best Picture: My two favorite films of 2012, P.T.'s The Master and Leos Carax's Holy Motors, weren't nominated for Best Picture. Of the nine films that were nominated, I've seen seven thus far. I'll most likely never watch Les Misérables and look forward to seeing Michael Haneke's Amour. So, of the flicks I've seen, I'd probably call David O. Russell's Silver Linings Playbook my favorite, if only because I've only seen Quentin Tarantino's Django Unchained and Steven Spielberg's Lincoln once each. What movie do I think will take the statue? Probably Lincoln. And if not Lincoln, maybe Zero Dark Thirty. That said, I'd loved to see Benh Zeitlin's Beasts of the Southern Wild steal the show.

Best Actors: I'm almost certain that **Lincoln** star Daniel Day-Lewis will win his third Oscar trophy. He won the Golden Globe a couple of weeks ago and is, I think, the hands-down best actor of his generation (R.I.P,. River Phoenix and Heath Ledger). While I found Joaquin Phoenix's performance in The Master to be more memorable and Denis Lavant's (Holy Motors) to be more interesting, it's hard to argue with the mastery of DDL's turn in Spielberg's new epic. Also, Bradley Cooper's performance in Silver Linings Playbook was ridiculously impressive and, most years, probably award worthy. As far as the Best Supporting Actor category goes, I think Lincoln's Tommy Lee Jones will probably win. Me? I live in a reality where Philip Seymour Hoffman is the nobrainer pick for his probably legendary performance as Lancaster Dodd in *The Master*.

Best Actresses: There are three maaaaajor contenders for this year's Best Actress in a Leading Role statue, starting with Silver Linings Playbook star Jennifer Lawrence, a gal I think will win a few of these shiny things before its all said and done. She'll have to beat out much loved performances from Zero Dark Thirty star Jessica Chastain and Beasts of the South-



ern Wild hero Quvenzhane Wallis. And she will. The Best Supporting Actress category seems to be a lock this year for Les Misérables star Anne Hathaway. I've not seen the film, but I do believe in the on-screen power of the Hathaway. That said, there's an outside chance Lincoln's Sally Field will slip in and win her third statue.

Best Director: The biggest, most pleasant surprise at this year's nomination show was the announcement of indie dudes Michael Haneke (Amour) and Benh Zeitlin (Beasts) as a Best Director nominees. Neither will win, not unless *Beasts* ends up somehow taking the show by storm, which is very unlikely. Spielberg will almost certainly win yet another Best Director award. Or maybe Silver Linings will somehow win Best Screenplay, Best Picture, Best Actress and Best Director, but probably not. My guess is that Sunday, February 24 will be all about *Lincoln*.

Best Screenplays: Best Adapted Screenplay will probably go to Lincoln writer Tony Kushner or Silver Linings Playbook writer David O. Russell. Both are deserving of the highest praise, if in much different ways. Best Original Screenplay, I think, will probably go to Mark Boal's epic Zero Dark Thirty script. Wouldn't it be sweet, though, if Tarantino's Django Unchained or Wes Anderson's Moonrise Kingdom somehow won? Yes, that would be sweet, but all signs point to ZD30.

Best Other Stuff: Some of the best living cinematographers (Robert Richardson, Roger Deakins and Janusz Kaminski) are nominated this year. All did beautiful work, surely, but I think Life of Pi DP Claudio Miranda will probably win. Oh well. Best Editing should go to Lincoln editor Michael Kahn, but won't. It'll most likely go to Argo editor William Goldenberg. Brave will almost certainly win Best Animated Feature Film over two far superior films, Tim Burton's Frankenweenie and Chris Butler and Sam Fell's ParaNorman. Last and certainly not least, we have the Best Foreign Language Film category. Since the year's two best foreign language films, Holy Motors and Rust and Bone (both from France), aren't nominated, I'm pretty sure Austria's Amour will win. Actually, I'm certain it will.

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
