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
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
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## North and Other Directions

Believe it or not, 17 years have passed since Matchbox Twenty's crooning vocals first reached ears through stereo speakers. What started out as a 90s love affair for the American listening public has turned into

a long-term relationship with the smooth pop kings that redefined radio rock for a generation. In the midst of an era filled with decidedly eccentric musicians, Matchbox Twenty were a straightforward rock band. For the last decade, though,

Matchbox Twenty have been in and out of the music scene. They've enjoyed long breaks, with members focusing on side projects and taking their sweet time in making their latest album. Luckily for us, Fort Wayne of all places - will be one of the early stops on their first tour in so

very long. Like their music, Matchbox Twenty's history is fairly free of drama and eccentricity. Frontman Rob

Thomas was raised by his mother in Florida,

though he was born in Germany while his parents served in the military. It was in Florida that Thomas' former band, Tabitha's Secret, dissolved to make way for Matchbox Twenty. Thomas took with him bass player Brian Yale and drummer Paul Doucette. The trio recruited two more friends already in the music business: guitarists Adam Gaynor and Kyle Cook to finish out their lineup in 1995.

In 1996, when Matchbox Twenty sauntered onto the music scene, they were filling the airwaves with music that would come to be iconic to the late 90s generation. Their debut album, Yourself or Someone Like You, surpassed Gold and even Platinum status when it was certified Diamond after sales of 12 million records in the United States. Their debut album garmered mixed reviews from critics who thought it had a tendency to be bland, but it was also a refreshing alternative to the malevolent, angst-ridden, poppunk out at the time. "3 A.M." and "Real World" were just two of the five hit singles that charted from that album.

In 1999 Thomas' work co-writing and singing the Carlos Santana song "Smooth" also helped to thrust the group into the public eye even further.

Their next two albums, Mad Season and More Than You Think You Are were 4x Plati-

distortion, Matchbox Twenty are solidly a pop band and so good at it. Sometimes impassioned, often soulful, they churned out song after catchy song onto the radio. "Unwell," "Bright Lights" and "If You're Gone" are ringing in my ears even as I write their

North, the album Matchbox Twenty are currently touring to support, was released in September of last year and is the first fulllength album of new material the band has put out in more than a decade. Between releases Thomas filled his time working on Something To Be, a solo record that came out in '95. While his solo work was commercially successful, it lacked the style and soul of the music Matchbox Twenty made, even though Thomas is also the primary songwriter for the group.

In getting back together to make North, members said they wanted to take a different approach and have more collaborative songwriting, which explains in part why it took so long to make. Coming from a history where nearly all the songs on any Matchbox too many people were fighting for a different direction on the album, and several songs stray far from what Matchbox Twenty fans are used to hearing from the group. There are still songs that capture the classic style of Matchbox Twenty and their earlier days. "Overjoyed," which has hit the radio already, and "Sleeping At

There's nothing wrong with a band being a one-trick-pony. In fact, it's probably better for a group to know what they're good at and do it well than go exploring in all the wrong directions. Matchbox Twenty gained their popularity playing guitar-driven, 90s alternative songs and they still do it so well on their current album that I'll forgive the tracks that sound like they could have been written for One Direction.

Matchbox Twenty will be in town on February 12, sliding in right before Valentines Day. The Embassy Theatre is a perfect venue for their moody, mature rock sound. With any luck, this show, like most of their concerts, will mine their back catalog of songs to please the old, die-hard fans. And for those of us still buying Matchbox Twenty albums, this tour might be the last chance we have to see them in their prime, on the right side of 40.

# Jubilation on the Stage

If there's one thing you can say about The Avett Brothers it's that finding just one thing to say about The Avett Brothers is next to impossible. Stylistically, The Avett Brothers play an amalgam of bluegrass, country and rock n' roll. They sing love songs, songs of loneliness and despair, songs of angst and songs that will make you stomp around the room. Relying on a formula of being anti-formula, The Avett Broth-

ers have spread their back-porch jam sessions around the globe to adoring fans and rave reviews.

The Avett Brothers bring their act to a sold-out Embassy Theater in Fort Wayne on Thursday, February 14. Singer/songwriter Jill Andrews will open.

The three years between the release of 2009's I and Love and You and 2012's The Carpenter saw The Avett Brothers - Scott Avett, banjo and vocals; Seth Avett, guitar and vocals; and Bob Crawford, upright bass – grow from a band with somewhat limited popularity to a band playing soldout gigs here and abroad. They played the 2011 Grammys with Bob Dylan and their British counterparts, Mumford & Sons. They reached the top of the Bill-

board Charts in the folk category. It all seemed to happen quickly. But the trio is far from being an overnight success.

Seth and Scott Avett began playing together informally as kids in Concord,

North Carolina. Their father, Jim, is a musician and the brothers grew up listening to live acoustic music. By high school they had chosen a plugged-in path for themselves, playing in separate rock bands. But the pull of the music heard as kids got them back on the porch playing acoustic music, busking for a lark and gradually working their way to formal shows featuring their own material. They put out an eponymous EP in 2000 and in 2002, with the addition of Crawford (and the subtraction of former rock-band mates) released a full-length disc called *Country Was*.

With a self-booked tour to promote *Country Was*, The Avett Brothers began building their loyal fan base. A live record, *Live at the Double Door Inn*, which featured cover and originals, caught the energy of the young band and helped spread the word.

A sense of urgency drove The Avett Brothers on the road and in the studio. During a break from touring

and with a new label, Ramseur Records, to call home, The Avett Brothers recorded their second full-length studio effort, *A Carolina Jubilee*, in a mere 70 hours.

By the time *A Carolina Jubilee* came out in 2003, it was clear that The Avett Brothers had tapped into something beyond the ordinary. They played with an infectious enthusiasm. And even if their singing was at times off-key and their playing a little sloppy, as has been pointed out by some critics, fans who flocked to their shows in ever-increasing numbers were un-

deterred by such imperfections. In fact the flaws made the band more real, more attractive, more appealing. You really can't complain about a group of musicians giving it their all, night after night, especially if the songs are good. And The Avett Brothers songs are good.

Lyrically their songs are straightforward. If the title says a song is about a pretty girl from someplace the words of the song reflect that. That's been a consistent aspect of The Avett Brothers music through the years. The records after A Carolina Jubilee, Mignonette (2004), Four Thieves Gone: Robbinsville Sessions (2006) and Emotionalism (2007) continue in that vein lyrically.

What has changed is the music itself, especially with their first major label record, *I* and *Love* and *You*. Mega-

and Love and You. Megaproducer Rick Rubin reportedly caught some Youtube videos of The Avett Brothers

and approached them about moving to his American Recordings label. With Rubin behind the controls and his studio toys at their disposal, the Avetts polished and

filled out their sound.

And why not? The energy they put into their playing is still there. It's just being bolstered by the addition of things like piano and cello and harmonium. The beefed-up sound may not be what longtime fans would want, but it's what they're going to get with Rubin at the controls.

The Carpenter follows suit, but with a bit less of "gee-whiz look at all these toys" feel. Screaming electric guitar and pounding drums can be found along side gentle banjo picking. Such variety has allowed The Carpenter to chart on the 2013 Billboard Rock Albums list (No. 3) while not straying from their county-folk-bluegrass milieu. It's a dance not a lot of bands can do, but The Avett Brothers continue to do it and do it well.

# Keeping It Positive A Changing Grace

Floridian melodic hard rockers Shinedown emerged in the popular wake of postgrunge hard rockers such as Creed and Nickelback in the early 2000s. Fitting into roughly the same category as those bands while not necessarily sounding like either, the Jacksonville, Florida natives have embedded themselves in the public consciousness through the release of several solid albums, numerous radio-friendly singles, constant touring and a heroic and dynamic live show.

Their most recent album, 2012's Amaryllis, found the band moving in an even more uplifting and anthemic direction than they had previously, while still retaining the hard-edged metallic sound that gained the band attention in the first place. Singles like "Bully" and "Unity" showcase both sides of their sound, and have proven the band to still be a viable commodity more than a decade into their career in the ever-shifting musical landscape.

Shinedown originally formed in 2001. Founders were vocalist Brent Smith, guitarist Jasin Todd, bassist Brad Stewart and drummer Barry Kerch. The band has undergone several lineup shifts over the years,

with Todd and Stewart having left the band and Zach Myers and Eric Bass replacing them, respectively. Their brand of no-nonsense alternative metal won over audiences quickly first in their native Florida and later nationally and internationally, starting with their debut, 2003's Leave a Whisper, which featured the popular yet oblique single "Fly from the Inside." Since that auspicious debut, the band has released a total of four full-length albums, scored numerous hit singles and toured all over the

While their hard rock and metal influences may be the most obvious element of their sound, it's their anthemic

qualities in a complicated mix of influences that make them stand out the most. In fact, it may just be their mix of influences that makes Shinedown's sound unique. For example, while former guitarist/bassist Todd was reportedly heavily into death metal, current guitarist Myers has cited U2 as his all-time favorite band, and vocalist Smith has stated he's a fan of soul music.

As Smith described to L.A. radio station KNAC in 2004, "We're just really eclectic ... My biggest inspiration is Otis Redding. I'm a big soul guy. I like Sam Cooke and Al Green; I like Etta James and Billie Holiday, but you know, I also like [Guns 'N Roses'] Appetite For Destruction which I think is one of the most brilliant vocal albums ever created. We all love, of course, Led Zeppelin and going all the way to Soundgarden ... and then like [drummer] Barry [Kerch] is all into funk and is real jazz influenced, so there's a lot of diversity.'

Also characteristic of Shinedown is the band's tendency to cover darker topics but with the sense of uplift and the notion that one can pull oneself through the hard times with strength and perseverance. The sense of purpose, certitude and persistence may also come from vocalist Smith who, thought untrained as a vocalist, says that's always exactly what he's wanted to be.

"I probably knew I wanted to be a singer around the age of 2, and that's no lie," he said in the KNAC interview. "I've wanted to

be a singer since around 2 or 3 years old, and I've never changed."

Even the name of the band makes them stand out from their peers, being at once catchy and familiar, yet enigmatic. The name's origin derives from a relatively innocuous conversation Smith had with drummer Kerch about a painting in Kerch's house.

"The name actually came from a painting at

original lead singer? The recent departure of co-founding frontman Adam Gontier from Canadian band Three Days Grace has left many fans wondering just that. The vocalist recently announced that he would be leaving the band permanently due to undisclosed health problems. While his vacant slot will be filled for their current tour with Shinedown by Matt Walst, frontman of My Darkest Days and brother of Three Days Grace bassist Brad Walst, questions remain as to whether or not the band will continue on without Gontier, and if so who will fill his shoes. Speculation has already begun that Matt Walst could stay in the spot permanently, creating questions not just about Three Days Grace but also My Darkest Days, At this point, however, no official pronouncements have been made other than that the band intends to continue on in some form.

> The origins of Three Days Grace trace back to the local music scene around the small town of Norwood. Ontario (population 1,254) and a five-piece punk band known as Groundswell that formed circa 1992. Five years later, in 1997, Groundswell trimmed down to three members, rechristened themselves Three Days Grace and shifted their musical style towards the dark and melodic alt-metal that would surface on their eponymous debut album in 2003. To get to that point, however, the band relocated to the nearby city of Toronto which offered a more sub-

> > stantial music scene for the young band to gain experience and atten-

The original trio that formed the group in Norwood consisted of guitarist and vocalist Gontier, bassist Walst and drummer Neil Sanderson while they were still in high school. Prior to their move to Toronto, they played nearly any gig that was available to them, including opening for a movie. Once relocated, it was the

song that would eventually become the band's calling card, "(I Hate) Everything About You," that landed them a publishing deal and the recording contract that would lead to their debut album. Lead guitarist Barry Stock joined the band around that same time to fill out the

Their debut album focused on the band's background of growing up in a small town. especially its down side.

'In our small town there were murders. suicide and drugs - everything that happens in a big city, except we had to deal with it up close," Gontier said in an early interview. "There were 1,500 people in our town, so

Brad's house," said Smith. "A mutual friend of ours painted him a picture for his new house. We were trying to get the name for the band, and one day I was looking at the painting set in the corner of the wall and I was like, 'You know what, man? If you would hang a light on this painting where it would shine down, it would look awesome!' And then the next day Brad came in and said, 'What about Shining Down?' Later we shortened it to Shinedown. It really supports what this band is: sometimes you shine and sometimes you're down."

While the band may have been able to deliver music consistently over the years, as the meaning of their name indicates they've also had some ups and downs in terms of shifting lineups and battles with drug and al-

There comes a time when struggling actors must make a choice – to continue to toil through audition after audition, hoping the next might be *the one* that lands them the perfect gig, or to take control and orchestrate their own big break.

For husband and wife pair Andy Comeau and Dawn Lewis, the choice was clear.

"We were both actors, looking for something to

do ourselves, for something we would have creative control over."

This was five years ago when Comeau and Lewis were rather obsessed with Bruce Springsteen's We Shall Overcome: The Seeger Sessions, an album in which the Boss covers 13 Pete Seeger folk tunes.

"We were transfixed by the album," Comeau said. "We listened to it incessantly. I think what really appealed to us was the fact that Springsteen was doing these parlor songs, these classic tunes, not in a small bluegrass group the way you normally hear them, but with a giant, 17-piece band. It has a wonderful New Orleans feel to it, and Dawn and I thought, wouldn't it be wonderful if we could do something similar, only with a performance aspect to it?"

Comeau is a horn player. Lewis is a dancer. The two put their heads together and decided that the best way to realize their dreams of strutting and fretting upon the stage was to revive the old-fashioned traveling medicine show. So they put out a call to their actor/musician friends, and soon Vaud and the Villains – a 19-piece 1930s New Orleans-style orchestra and cabaret show – were born.

Couples who might not have had a chance to celebrate Valentine's Day (as well as singles grateful the chocolate- and roses-festooned day is behind them) will have a chance to see and hear what Vaud and the Villains are all about when they take the stage at the Philmore Friday, February 15.

According to Lewis, Vaud and the Villains are pretty much all about fun. Fun for the audience and fun for the players themselves, all of whom go by a stage name – Vaud Overstreet, Peaches Mahoney,

Silkie Shadie, Two Boots and Blind Dog, just to name a few.

"Every show is different," Lewis said. "Since we're doing this live, anything can and does happen. We like to keep it new for us, and keeping it fresh makes a difference with the audience too, I think. We wouldn't keep doing this if it weren't so fun."

By day, Vaud (Comeau) and his company of villains hold down jobs as office workers and teachers and lawyers. At night, they shed their "respectable"

buttoned-up selves and don fedoras, feather boas and skyhigh shoes in order to treat fans not only to an evening of classic tunes but witty skits and, of course, fabulous costumes. Being a part of the villains is, according to Comeau, a labor of love, and one that has paid

off. In their five years together, the members of the Los Angeles-based traveling troupe have performed all over the United States, including clubs in Chicago, New York and New Orleans.

Comeau said that wherever they go, audiences and critics say the same thing: "They tell us that our presentation really exceeds anything they've seen before. Our musical chops might not be up to the Boss's level, but because we're actors, we bring our storytelling strengths to the table and work hard to create an experience for our audience, to transport them to a different place and time through both music and performance."

Many of the tunes Vaud and the Villains perform come straight out of the American songbook. Classics like "This Little Light of Mine" form the backbone of their repertoire, but they also take modern-day hits and give them the 1930s treatment. And, like many cover acts, they're working on adding more of their original material to the setlist. The stories themselves are likewise eclectic. There's no over-arching plot per se, but the skits do tend to deal in some way with the group's motto: every saint has a past; every sinner has a future

"Ultimately what we're going for is a really fun night," Comeau said. "We want to lift people up and inspire them, but we're pretty good at masking the serious side in really fun music."

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#### **Jethro Easyfields**

The Outland

It's plenty impressive to conjure a compelling album of indie Americana from an island (metaphorically speaking; it's Indianapolis). It's quite another feat to plant a concept within said album and keep it alive and thriving throughout. But, that's exactly what perennial songmeister



cum provocateur Jethro Easyfields manages to pull off with his latest, *The Outland*.

It's an engrossing trip inside swampy rural/small-town intrigue, populated with victims, hucksters and outliers. And the banjo/acoustic guitar/brushed drum/harmonica instrumentation implies a period with sepia-toned vibe and just the right mix of propulsion and melancholy. As Jethro and company have proven before, they're startlingly adept at blending mirth and malice; charlatans bilk with impunity, and folks often gravitate to their baser instincts. It's just another stop on the long, long path to redemption. Ruby Roads is "ragged but right," and stands up as a 3D character instead of a flat character study. Same with land pirate Travelin' Sam who "boasts about his motorbike" and may or may not bring to mind Billy Gibbons. Long story short, Easyfields ain't too shabby in the storytelling department. You won't want to turn your back on Travelin' Sam, but you'd probably enjoy an entertaining evening around the fire with the guy. "There's an ugly stench of doom," he warns on the Ninth Ward/Katrina-recalling "Shame on the Levee." No shortage of blame to go around, to be sure, but Easyfields smartly sticks to the ground-zero, ground-level view here.

Much of *The Outland*'s settings and characters are unvarnished, unsentimental and, for the most part, resigned to their geography—and to their fates. "Have Mercy Ramona" recalls nothing if not Springsteen's *Nebraska*, were Nebraska set further south and east. "Singing the last song with your pants down / ... telling you, it's not a good look," sings Easyfields in a scratchy bray that's at once matter of fact, tender, worn out and introspective. A wafting accordion adds the perfect atmospheric touch to a song that's both lyrically brutal and wistful. In other words, typical Easyfields.

The entirety of *The Outland* is well produced (by Easyfields and Scott Kern), and the quality of the album never dips. You may not pull this one off the shelf when you need some aural comfort food, but if you're after substance, *The Outland* makes for a fine meal. (D.M. Jones)

#### **Language of Shapes**

Apocalyptic folk. I can't think of a better term to describe Language of Shape's self-titled debut album. Here's another description straight from the band: "With music as arresting as it is difficult to define, Language of Shapes [are] a psych-folk eruption of rainbow fire." Rainbow fire is another apt description.



But assigning specific sounds, hints, influences and the like to Language of Shapes would be futile. This Korea-based band of expats whose reach goes from Kent, England to the United States has created a genre all its own, and we're very fortunate for that.

Language of Shapes aren't a bunch of kids playing indie music

Language of Shapes aren't a bunch of kids playing indie music and throwing in an occasional djembe, mandolin and bouzouki to impress their worldly pals. Not the case at all. LoS create beautiful and mysterious pop and folk within the vast expanse of world music. Songwriter, lead singer and multi-instrumentalist Tristram Burden's heavy and world-weary voice delivers spiritual tomes and existential tales like someone wanting – no, needing – to share his words. Within each of the eight songs on this fantastic debut there is an urgency. Language of Shapes take the power of music very seriously and wield that power with vigor and an obvious love for what they do.

What do they sound like? Well, take African beats, eastern Indian philosophies, western popular cultures, European history and a large dose of existential pondering and you might have a little bit of an idea. "Now We've Seen The Dead" starts out like something that might've been on Stewart Copeland's African-influenced *The Rhythmatist*, with African djembe, the steel strains of the mandolin and a

#### **Foghat**

Fool for the City (1975)

The fifth album from English rockers Foghat is the one that includes the eight-minute rock and roll anthem, "Slow Ride." But the other six tracks on this release are worth reviewing as well.



The album opens with the title track, a great rock n' roll song with a pop undercurrent that features the amazing Rod Price on the guitar.

"My Babe" is a blues-based, rock n' roll, boogie-woogie track that resembles something that is rooted in old Buddy Holly. Again, with Price on the guitar, Roger Earl on drums and the great vocals from Lonesome Dave Peverett, it just doesn't get any better than this. In fact, I don't think a band exists today that worked harder to entertain an audience with straight-up rock n' roll. They may have been the best garage band to have ever made it big without changing their style.

After "Slow Ride" wraps up the first side, side two opens with "Terraplane Blues," a 1936 Robert Johnson tune. This is one of the better Foghat songs that grabbed the old blues sound and converted it to sound like a 70s song without forgetting where it came from.

"Save Your Loving (For Me)" is another great Foghat song about women; it doesn't get lost in the romantic fluff that today's bands try to address.

"Drive Me Home" turns it back on as a party song. It's sort of a pro drunk-driving song, depending how you look at it, but there are great guitars in this one as well and a groovy piano layer.

The record closes with the soft rocker "Take It Or Leave It." Foghat peaked in 1976 but still tours (only Roger Earl is an original member).

Lonesome Dave passed away in 2000, and Price passed in 2005. By the end of 1977, I had seen them live 15 times. I sure do miss them. (*Dennis Donahue*)

bass line that keeps everything from spinning out of orbit. Burden and J.E. Seuk sing together in desperation as if what they have to say must be heard. "Cage" is a beautiful song; its mandolin gives it an almost Celtic feel. "Copper Spiral Gate" sounds as if Guy Garvey took a stab at Led Zeppelin's "The Battle of Evermore," with excellent results. The eight minute closer "Queen of Space" is a tome on space and time, a beautiful beast of a track.

The theme throughout LoS debut seems to be constraints – physical, emotional and metaphorical. Ultimately, our release from these constraints is Language of Shapes' sound. It's a bittersweet sound filled with sadness and peace, but never regret. You can hear in the music and the Burden's lyrics a sense of movement from one life to another. It's pretty heady stuff, but an existential awakening isn't a walk in the park, folks.

If you need some guidelines, here's a few: Arcade Fire, Midlake, lute music, renaissance fairs, Andrew Bird, early Fairport Convention. But like I said, trying to label Language of Shapes is futile. You have to hear them to truly appreciate what they create. Language of Shapes are the real deal: world music, psychedelic folk and pop all wrapped up in a post-apocalyptic rain dance amongst the muddy grounds of despair and enlightenment. The world may be ending, but at least we have Language of Shapes to lull us into that good night. (John Hubner)

cohol addictions. In particular, vocalist Smith has openly admitted to his own addictive struggles. With Smith and drummer Kerch being the only original members left in the band, the latter has ultimately proved to be the anchor for the band that has kept them going day in and day out.

"I'm a pretty solid, stable person. I'm basically the rock of this band and I've been able to deal with all the craziness that's gone on over the years," drummer Kerch said in a 2012 interview.

Broken City is billed as a big, boisterous tale of power and corruption on the mean streets of New York City. Seeing it seemed like a proper tip of the hat to Mayor "How Am I Doin'?" I don't know if Mayor Koch would have liked Broken City, but like the former mayor, it is loud, aggressive, over the top, sometimes sharp, sometimes stupid and very entertaining.

Broken City begins with a smoking gun. It is in the hands of Officer Billy Taggart, played by Mark Wahlberg. Like so many recent performances by Wahlberg, it is solid and convincing. Wahlberg is consistently believable in roles where he plays regular guys who end up, for better or worse, not being

At the other end of the smoking gun, on the ground a short distance away from Taggart, is a dead bad guy. Just as Officer Taggart is about to be cleared of any wrongdoing in the death of this bad guy, new evidence surfaces that suggests he did do something

What to do with this new information

lin Fairbanks and Mayor Nicolas Hostetler. Playing out a scene of good mayor, bad commissioner, they let Taggart know that they will bury the evidence, but that his career as a police officer is over. After seeing Russell Crowe's mediocre

performance in the mediocre Les Misérables, an added bonus in seeing Broken City was that it helped me forget that dismal experience. In Broken City Crowe is the tough guy mayor of New York, menacing and scheming. He growls and projects a ruthlessness barely masked by a bit of charm and a lot of not terribly believable chatter about how dedicated he is to what is good for the city.

Crowe may not be a great fit for the role, but he sure is fun to watch. He almost gets the accent. He is sporting a haircut so awful I could hardly take my eyes off it. The man has nice hair, and no mayor of New York would wear such an unstylish cut. The character is flashy in every way. His hair should be flashy too.

What is the best accessory for a flashy mayor? A very flashy wife, of course. Catherine Zeta-Jones fits the bill perfectly. As Cathleen, she is as cold and calculating as her husband. She has her own agenda, and it has little to do with her husband. Her performance is as over the top as Crowe's. They snarl at each other and at the world the way the stars of classic noir films did.

When the mayor becomes suspicious Cathleen is having an affair, he calls Taggart, now a private investigator. He's made a nice new life for himself. At home, he has

later, as you might expect. At work, Billy has a very dedicated, smart and hot assistant, Katy. Alona Tal (yep, that's her name) is adorable and memorable. Bigger roles are coming for her and soon. Early in the film she and Billy try to squeeze money from clients who haven't paid, and the scene crackles with fun.

aspiring actress, and that does get in the way

Technically, this scene exists to establish just how badly Billy needs cash, so when the mayor offers him a lot of money to follow his wife, Billy doesn't ask too many questions. The election is coming, and the mayor is in a tight race and doesn't want his wife's activities wrecking his chances.

His opponent is Jack Valliant (yikes!), a wealthy, privileged, squeaky clean guy whose campaign claims that the mayor is only helping the rich and powerful. As Valliant, Barry Pepper is excellent, even overcoming his character's goofy name. His campaign manager, played by a wonderful Kyle Chandler, turns out to be the man Cathleen is meeting on the sly.

Still a major player cruising under the radar is Police Commissioner Fairbanks. Jeffrey Wright is almost in a different movie, his performance is so low-key, but he is sly

Plot and dialogue are not why you see Broken City. The secret agendas of the characters are only secret to the other characters. Screenwriter Brian Tucker gives us a barely B movie story with nary a surprise or twist that you can't see coming. But it hardly mat-

Broken City is directed by Allen Hughes in his first turn as director without his brother Albert. The Hughes brothers made a name for themselves directing the very streetwise Menace II Society and other films that examine the darker sides of human nature and behavior. He gives Broken City a palpable noir-ish mood.

Ed Koch was mayor of New York City before Times Square was a franchise-ridden. Disneyesque zone, before Greenwich Village was a playground for college students with surveillance cameras scrutinizing every inch of Washington Square, before every network morning show had outdoor concerts every week, when subway cars were covered with graffiti and before Central Park and much of the city had been cleaned and fixed up.

Now that the city is clean and shiny on the outside, accomplishing a mean streets feel is tough. Hughes and director of photography Ben Seresin favor overhead, swirling long shots. They make New York City look beautiful and dark from scene to scene. It is a cliché to say it (but Broken City is full of clichés): the city is the true star of Broken City. That adoration for the city itself - Ed Koch would have loved that.

if something happened it basically happened to somebody that you knew. Most of the record is written about the pressures and having your privacy invaded in a small

Once their first album was out and "(I Hate) Everything About You" had brought the band attention through airplay in their native Canada as well as here in the U.S. and abroad, they began several years of touring. The touring and being away from their home led to a feeling of disconnection for the band, a theme that would inform their sophomore album One-X which came out in 2006.

While disconnection and alienation may have been the overriding themes for the album, it's not necessarily a downer of a listen. For example, the standout single of the album, "Riot," incites listeners to take feelings of pain and isolation to incite the titular riot, making the song and the album almost a form of therapy.

As Gontier has explained, "I've always used music as a release or an outlet. For me it's like talking to a shrink. Some people go to a shrink and pay 'em a load of money to solve their problems. Instead I tend to pick up a guitar and try and write it down in a song."

Between 2006 and the 2009 release of their third LP, Life Starts Now, Three Days Grace had shifted their tone from angry and cynical to one that was slightly more optimistic. While Gontier and presumably the other band members may have found themselves in a slightly sunnier mode, the reaction to the album was more mixed than it had been for their first two records. The album sold respectably nonetheless, and the band continued to tour as a major act.

In October of last year, the band released the LP Transit of Venus which was another step for-

ward. Perhaps unexpectedly from a band known for its bluntness and relative simplicity, the album found Three Days Grace expanding their sound into something more complex and intricate. As the record's lead single, "Chalk Outline," demonstrates, the band has shifted its sound for the record into something slightly more atmospheric without abandoning their trademarked heaviness or fist-pumping style. Lyrically as well, Transit of Venus finds the band retaining its darkness but trading in their bluntness and cathartic tendencies for something more akin to cautionary


While fans may lament the departure of Gontier and the first change in the band's lineup since Stock joined the band in 2003, the band has indicated that it plans to continue. As for Gontier, he has yet to disclose what his health problems are – publicly or, apparently, to his former bandmates. But his decision to leave the band just last month due to a purported inability

to tour will not necessarily mean a permanent retirement from music, as he has announced via social networking that he has already begun work on solo music.

While Gontier has maintained that he has health issues, he has also begun to reveal more about his decision to leave the band, citing his creative differences and feeling that Transit of Venus was written more for commercial interests and that the songs on the album were not from the heart.

For those interested in hearing what the band sounds like with Matt Walst in the front spot, Three Days Grace have posted audio online. And while the departure of My Darkest Days guitarist Sal Costa has increased questions about that band's future, they have nonetheless stated that they have begun work on their next studio

As for what the future holds for Three Days Grace, Gontier, and My Darkest Days, as with all things, time will tell.

## **Always Something Worth Seeing**

A few weeks ago during a trip to Detroit, we decided to visit the Detroit Institute of Arts. We had been to the museum a couple years earlier, but my lingering memory was that after three hours I was beginning to lapse into some kind of cultural coma. I recall being very enthused to see the Diego Rivera mural, but by the time I stood in front of it I was too far gone to even appreciate it. A return trip seemed a great opportunity to visit the place in reverse and fully enjoy the parts that were more than I could absorb in one visit.

That plan was immediately thwarted upon our arrival, though it took awhile to realize it. When purchasing our tickets, we were asked if we wanted to also purchase tickets for the special Fabergé exhibit currently at the museum. I stood momentarily stunned which Mike mistook for disinterest, so he said no. The nice young man (who likely had seen this kind of thing before) informed me that tickets for that exhibit could be purchased later if we changed our minds. After a leisurely tour of an exhibit of Picasso/Matisse drawings, I had fully recovered and announced we would now immediately get tickets to Fabergé.

As it turned out, it was one of the best exhibits we had

until February 21. Beginning February 10 and running through April 7 is the *Scholastic Art & Writing* which features the work of young artists in our region, an ongoing program which nurtures the talent of local scholars while exposing them on a national level. *Seeds of Symbiosis* features the work of Fort Wayne artist Jerrod Tobias and runs February 25-April 21. *El Caballo: The Horse in Mexican Folk Art* runs March 26-April 28.

If you and yours are of a more scientific frame of mind, Science Central always provides hands-on fun and terrific visiting exhibits for the entire family. From now until April 14, *Genomics eXplorer* provides a fascinating look at how genetic research in plants is affecting agriculture, human health and the environment. For you Boilermaker fans out there, the exhibit was developed at Purdue University.

And while you're busy learning about plants, the current exhibit at the Botanical Conservatory – always a good place to study plants at any time of year – plays host to the *Mighty Jungle Adventure* from now through April 7. The Conservatory is always creative with its exhibits and finds clever and delightful ways to wrap a concept around the lush greenery and plant-life they nurture, and the fun and educational activities that emerge from the exhibits makes it a great afternoon for kids and adults of all ages.

## The Phil Spins Tales of Two Rivers

It's Monday and you are gathered around the coffee machine. Susan from HR comes in and asks in a disarmingly positive way, "So, do anything fun this weekend?"

Your answers may usually start out with a dismissal such as: "Meh, just went to a movie," or "Hmm, not much. Just hung out."

Then the conversation turns really awkward as Susan tries to put a positive twist on your lame weekend.

Now, replace that response with, "Actually, we went to see The Phil on Saturday," and huzzah, you have a small talk gold mine for just about any occasion. In addition to water cooler bragging rights, this article will tell a bit about why you should check out The Phil's next Masterworks concert, From the Moskva to the Thames, on February 9 at 8 p.m. Through vivid storytelling and fantastic music, this concert offers the perfect Saturday evening alternative to sitting at home and waiting to be disappointed yet again by Saturday Night Live.

Even though words and lyrics are missing from most of the music The Phil performs, almost every piece has a story behind it. The evening starts off in Russia, as Modest Mussorsgsky tells the story of *Khovantschina* through a short introduction, entitled "Dawn of the Moscow River," to Act I of his unfinished opera. Mussorsgsky is considered one of the "mighty five" composers of Russian heritage, and if the term "mighty five" makes you imagine a burly Russian man who drinks lots of vodka, you would be picturing Mussorgsky. He struggled with alcoholism



throughout much of his later life and left many of his works unfinished, to be completed later by colleagues and admirers. The story of *Khovantschina* is a brooding and bloody one, featuring all sorts of lighthearted topics such as rebellion, war and mass-suicide. However, this introduction offers a much more optimistic representation of dawn with pleasant Russian folk melodies.

The next story is one of friendship and forgiveness. It also reminds us that "time heals all wounds," and "dedicating a symphonic masterpiece to the person doesn't hurt, either." The German composer Johannes Brahms' final symphonic work started out as a "what-if" experiment, as he decided to write a concerto for the unusual combination of violin and cello. Brahms had a falling out with virtuoso violinist Joseph Joachim after the latter accused Brahms of having something to do with his divorce. After some years, Brahms was approached by a cellist colleague of Joachim's to write a concerto, and he took the opportunity to try to mend the fence with his old friend. A concerto is typically a piece that features a soloist in front of an orchestra. However, in this instance it creates a much more complete symphonic experience



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## Bitch, Bitch, Bitch

Cursing Mommy's Book of Days, by Ian Frazier, Farrar, Straus and Giroux 2012

It probably shouldn't be surprising that it's difficult to like a character who calls herself "Cursing Mommy." Ian Frazier's harried suburban mom is vicious in her attacks on anything that annoys her, and just about everything annoys her. She is probably most annoyed by herself, and I have to say that I understand her plight because she is, I'm afraid, an immensely annoying character. She is so annoying that the satire in Frazier's novel - and this novel is really nothing more than broad satire - becomes muddled; it's hard to know what, exactly, is being criticized here, since everything is so very deserving

of criticism.

URSING MOMMY'S Cursing Mommy is a stereotypi-BOOK OF cal American suburban mother. She has DAYS a job writing a mommy-tip column, but she IAN FRAZIER spends most of her time at home doing suburban mom things. Her husband Larry finances the family with a job in which he "bills" things, and he spends most of his at-home time in the basement working on a hobby that involves "capacitors." The couple's two sons are variously dysfunctional: eight-year-old Kyle is a timid, fragile kid who is always on the verge of a breakdown; and 11-year-old Trevor is a sociopathin-training whose anti-social tendencies are being medicated into oblivion.

Cursing Mommy's household is further complicated by a host of First World problems. The house itself is self-destructing; between plumbing disasters and trees falling on the garage, the building is in danger of collapsing around Mommy's ears. The kids' school demands an extremely large amount of parental involvement. Mommy's unbeloved father, who is suffering from Alzheimer's, is living in a nursing community which also insists on intruding on Mommy's time. Worst of all, Larry's work performance review revealed that he hasn't been billing enough, and his hourly rate has been reduced, making the family's financial situation unstable.

On top of all these typical problems, Mommy has more unusual things to deal with, and these unusual problems provide the closest thing that the novel has to a plot. First of all, there's a rich guy who is, confusingly enough, both Larry's biggest client and his boss. This client/boss is also attracted

to Mommy, and his pursuit of her is understandably problematic. There's also a platitude-spewing self-help author whom Mommy has an intellectual crush on, and his entry into her life is also, like everything in her world, problem-

Cursing Mommy handles all these problems with an astonishing lack of grace. To begin with, she curses a lot. For whole paragraphs.

and in all capital letters. Heavy-duty cursing. She also drinks a lot. Late in the day, early in the day, it doesn't matter; Cursing Mommy copes via cursing and alcohol. And between the booze and Mommy's incredible bad luck. she seems to be always falling down or otherwise ending up on the floor, where she'll lie for awhile mostly because it's

easier than standing up. This is all, of course, over-thetop satire. Cursing Mommy has every problem you've ever read about in a magazine, browsed on a news-ish website or seen in a fluffy piece of TV journalism - and she has all these problems to a degree of severity that you're unlikely to find in the real world. She doesn't just have problems; her daily life is one catastrophe after another.

There are so many levels to the American foibles that Frazier is satirizing here, though, that it's not entirely clear what he's poking fun at. For example, when Cursing Mommy and the other parents are called upon to do ridiculous chores at their kids' school (repave the parking lot, re-point the bricks on the building's exterior. etc.) is our attention being called to the fact that our schools are trying to abdicate their responsibilities and heap them all on parents? Or are we supposed to notice the irony when middle-class families complain about having to support their schools at the same time that they demand the tax cuts that made the schools unable to take care of themselves? Maybe it's both; it gets complicated.

What Frazier is probably trying to criticize is a culture in which people have become much better at complaining than they are at doing anything productive. It's the reason that we're in the state we're in, after all, but it's not very much fun to read about.

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
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
