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

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# Habit-Formed Hilarity

------ Feature • *Late Nite Catechism* ------

Many of us who grew up in Catholic families have spent a lifetime hearing from our parents and grandparents about their experiences in Catholic schools and the church. Most of those stories contain some vague reference to "the nuns," and some contain fairly specific examples of conversations or conflicts with "the nuns." The term routinely came to suggest a somewhat mysterious, occasionally menacing and surprisingly powerful force in these children's lives, something that has clearly stayed with them for their entire lives.

Nowadays nuns are somewhat less prevalent, particularly within the schools they used to rule with an iron fist. Sightings on television and in film suggest they wear very large habits and would be fairly easy to spot, but for the most part those outfits have been replaced by considerably less formal wear, lending them a much less austere

look. The visions and collective memory of "the nuns" from decades ago, however, remain deeply entrenched in the minds of those who were raised Catholic - and even of those who weren't.

Tapping into that mind set and exploiting it for laughs is Late Nite Catechism, the hit comedy which mines laughter from the shared experiences of not only Catholics, but anyone who has ever had a teacher who made them a little nervous. Written 20 years ago by Vicki Quade and Maripat Donovan, the unusual, interactive show became a favorite for its innovative way of making the audience part of the action, its witty script and the early performances of Donovan as the somewhat testy but affectionately portrayed "Sister" who rules her classroom with very stern boundaries.

On and off since 1996, the role of Sister has been played by Mary Zentmyer, herself raised Catholic as she was growing up in Chicago. She acknowledges that the humor is directed at those who attended Catholic school, but she says there are plenty of laughs for anyone who comes to see the show

"It's a real flashback show, especially if you're over 40 or over 50 and you went to Catholic school and recognize the nuns of those days. Young people now don't even know what a nun is, and if they were to see one, they might not even realize who they're seeing because they're wearing comfortable shoes and regular clothes. You don't see the full habits like you did years ago, and those are the memories that older audiences have. But even if you've ever had a strict teacher in public school, the show is a riot."

Even as Zentmyer talks about Late Nite Catechism, she maintains the concept of the show perfectly - which is to say she seldom calls it a show at all. It's "class" and

bad behavior. One recent bad behavior that vexes Zentmyer is one found all too often at performances of every kind, only the show provides a remedy that can't always be found in other venues.

"Technology has definitely put a new wrinkle into things," she says. "I don't understand people paying that money to go to a show and then spending the time on their phone texting. I was just at a White Sox game, and I couldn't believe how many people must have paid \$35 or more to get into the game, and then they spent the whole time on their phone. So when I see one of the students on the phone, I'll often have to confiscate it from them - and they really don't

If you think that's a joke, you'd be very mistaken. Although Late Nite Catechism is about 80 percent scripted, that still leaves a lot of the show to the actress' imagination, which means that no two shows are exactly the same. She recounted a recent example of a woman who attended several shows in one short run.

'You could come to any of the shows and see a different show every night," says Zentmyer. "I just did a seven-show run in Easton, Pennsylvania, and a woman loved the show so much that she brought her book club to it a couple nights later. I always visit with the class as they leave each night, and after that second night she said, 'You didn't measure anyone's skirt,' because she had found that part especially funny. I told her I didn't see anyone in a short skirt that night, and that part wasn't in the script - it's just one of those things that happens. She ended up coming a third night with her husband, and she said to me af-

ter the show, 'The audience was really great tonight.' She was becoming a groupie and was really seeing how different it was from night to night."


It's that variability that has kept the part so exciting for Zentmyer, who is ready for any audience misstep. Chewing gum? Arriving late? Talking during class? Expect to be taken to task. One odd thing has worked its way into the plot in recent years, and it's made for an amusing exception to her rules.

"A lot of places have caved now and are letting people bring food and cocktails into their theatres, and I get it. You pay a lot of money for those things, and you don't like to have to drink them down immediately. But it leaves me in the very odd position of calling out students who are chewing gum but ignoring those who are drinking alcohol. I did recently have someone escorted out of class for being drunk, though, so you have to be able to go with the flow and see what happens.

Those who attend the class will often begin the evening trying to avoid making eye contact with Sister, but as prizes are being awarded along the way, they start warming up considerably. Winning over her students has been the ultimate reward for Zentmyer. and she knows that the show has been rewarding for her students, as well.

"It really strikes a deep chord with people, and I think it takes us all back to a simpler, happier time, a time when we all wrote with a No. 2 pencil and chalk.'

**VICTOR WOOTEN**

Victor Wooten's first language was not English; it was music. Instead of words, phrases and sentences Wooten learned to communicate through notes, chords and measures. And instead of vocal chords he used a bass to make himself heard. He learned quickly. It turned out he had a lot to say.

Now, nearly five decades later, Wooten is still using his bass to talk. With the simultaneous release in 2012 of Sword and Stone and Words and Tones, the five-time Grammy winning artist has doubled down on his conviction that a person can say a lot with 12

notes and four strings.

Best known for his work with Bela Fleck and the Flecktones, Wooten has been playing the bass since he could walk. By the time he was two years old, Wooten was hanging out with his four older brothers and their band. By the time he was six, he was playing bass in that band. Over the last 43 years, Wooten has refined and redefined what

it means to be a bass player. In any list of the world's best bassists, Wooten is at or near the top. But such rankings are not particularly important to him. What he finds compelling is the role music plays in communion with his fellow musicians, with nature and with

When I spoke with Wooten via phone, he was at Wooten Woods, his home outside Nashville where he has hosted bass and nature camps since 2000. Wooten has a thoughtful, deliberate speaking style that comports with his modesty. I asked him at what point in his career did he begin to think he was more than a regular bass player.

"I would say I'm still a regular bass player," he said. "I've just learned more ways to express myself more clearly. It's like when you talk, even though you know so many words, you're still just a regular speaker, which means you can communicate with everyone. The same is true in music. So if I need to play a Top 40 gig, I can do that because I know those words. I just have the ability to do a little more than the norm. I don't look at it as special. Maybe I have a little larger

How he uses that large vocabulary is what it important. Using B.B. King as an example, Wooten said the guitar great may not have the technique of Eddie Van Halen or the flash of Steve Vai, but he can still manage to say what he wants, just with fewer notes. And understanding how to deploy that musical subtext, Wooten said, is an even greater talent.

"Being fluent in music helps me express myself in more ways, with larger dexterity," he said. "But what you don't say can have a larger impact emotionally. It's like if someone has a newborn son and I say tell me about it. If they're really emotional, they can't find the words. When they say nothing, it says more than

if they used a lot of words and flair. Sometimes saying less you can say more.'

Of course, saying more can be a lot of fun. And when it comes to the bass, Wooten can say whatever he wants, however he wants, as fast as he wants. Take his recent CD projects. Released on his own Vix Records, Sword and Stone and Words and Tones are showcases

for Wooten's various modes of expression. Each disc has 14 songs, with the majority showing up on both. The difference that is Sword and Stone is largely instrumental while Words and Tones has, well, words. On both, Wooten plays fretted and fretless bass, upright bass, mando piccolo bass, cello, bassimer, tenor bass, slide bass, keyboards and sings. He even plays something called iPhone strings on one track.

His touring band - there's not a guitar player among them - includes Krystal Peterson on vocals, keyboards and drums; J. D. Blair on vocals and drums; Derico Watson on vocals and drums; Anthony Wellington on bass, keyboards and vocals; Steve Bailey on bass, keyboards, trombone and vocals; and Dave Welsch on bass, trumpet, keyboards and vocals. I caught their show last July and was blown away. Wooten has always put on a good act with the Flecktones, with whom he's played since 1987, occasionally flipping his bass around his neck between plucks or slaps on the strings. This new band doesn't disappoint. The sheer musicianship is astonishing. Each member plays

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# Improvisation & Elasticity

The last few years have been busy for Fort Wayne guitarist and composer Phil Schurger. And the way things are going, the next few are unlikely to offer any respite.

One reason for the flurry of activity is the change in Schurger's attitude toward playing live. In short, he's become a yes man. That's a good thing, especially for the growing number of people who have encountered Schurger's fluid guitar work. It's also a good thing for Schurger. His willingness to play with a wide variety of musicians in an equally wide variety of styles has earned him some positive karma. And now he's spreading it around.

On Saturday, April 20 the Dash-In will host Phil Schurger's Mayim Quartet for an evening of original jazz. The group - which includes Schurger on guitar, saxophonist Greg Ward, bassist Jeff Greene and drummer Clif Wallace - will play a section of an ambitious project Schurger has been working on. The group will play

the following day as well at Manchester College where Schurger teaches.

The musicians playing with Schurger are all internationally known and have toured extensively. Schurger met them through his frequent forays to Chicago where he lived off and on for several years. He now commutes to Chicago every chance he gets to rehearse his music and play in the jazz clubs with the guys in his group. The shows at the Dash-In and Manchester College give him a chance to play his compositions with musicians who know what he wants to accomplish.

What this group represents for me is a mixture of my classical music interests, early 20th century music like Debussy and Ravel and Impressionism and my jazz influences - Wayne Shorter, Kurt Rosenwinkel. In the end, all of my music is rooted in groove and dance. It's funky."

Schurger was born in Delphos, Ohio and moved with his family to Fort Wayne where he finished high school. Following graduation he took off for the West Coast for a few years. When he was 24 he enrolled at Northern Illinois University to study music. That's where he met Ward.

Ward, who lives in New York City, has a diverse performance and composition background. He has played with musicians such as Von Freeman, Frank Wess, Al Jarreau, Carl Allen, Rufus Reid, Jeff Parker, Brian McKnight and Hamid Drake and has performed around the world.

Wallace is a Fort Wayne native. He graduated from North Carolina Central University where he studied music and jazz performance. His work with the African-American Jazz Caucus's Historically Black College and University All-Star Big Band earned him gigs with the likes of Jimmy Heath,

Joe Chambers, Gerald Wilson and Jimmy Cobb. In 2009 he played with Betty Carter's Jazz Ahead program at the Kennedy Center in Washington D.C. He currently lives and plays in Chicago.

Greene went to Indiana University where

he studied jazz. Like Wallace, he attended Betty Carter's Jazz Ahead program at the Kennedy Center in Washington D.C. where he studied

with Curtis Fuller, George Cables, Winard Harper and Billy Taylor.

Ward, Wallace and Greene are all accomplished composers, a fact that fits well with Schurger's background and his intentions with the Mayim Quartet.

"I went to school for classical composition," he said. "String quartets, things like that. It's pretty strange, ambient stuff. What I liked about it was I didn't have to put a drummer in it. When you add a drummer it puts time on a grid. There are a lot of drummers whose sense of time is one dimensional. With classical music the music breathes more, it's more elastic. So what I've been looking for in the past 10 years is a rhythm section that's more elastic. That's what I like about this band. They can let time be elastic. There's more freedom to how the groove develops.'

For a little more than a year Schurger has been going to Chicago to practice with these guys. And in June, he plans to record four albums' worth of content with them. Much of what they've been working on lately are the improvisational sections each piece of music contains. The challenge for Schurger is to erase the line between free flowing music and note-for-note playing.

"What I don't like about improvisation is when every improvisation sounds the same," he said. "What I've been trying to do is treat them a little more like chamber ensembles, so each improvisation is sculpted to the

visation. That's what I'm going to try to do with these improvisations. I work with the people I work with because of the way they do what

they do. The lines between composed music and improvised music is blurred. They bring a great blend of freedom and constriction. To me that's the future of improvisation."

A few years ago Schurger played with the Grateful Groove, the Fort Wayne-based Grateful Dead cover band. Lately he's been playing the music of the Allman Brothers Band as well as the Dead in gigs around town. While the improvisation inherent in the music of these two bands appeals to Schurger's sensibility, the sense of creating a communal experience tugs at him as well. And that's what he hopes to achieve with his compositions and the Mayim Quartet. He found it during a recent performance of his music at Ketu Oladuwa's Acoustic Spoken Word Cafe. And he's convinced he'll find it again at the Dash-In.

"I did a performance of this music at Ketu's space. Primarily, what I've been doing with Grateful Groove and some of the Allman Brothers stuff is because the music is what was going on. There's a collective experience in that music. I got that in Ketu's space. That's the reason I really love the Dash-In. The first time I played at the Dash we did the opening of John Coltrane's "A Love Supreme," and we did a 15 minute version of it. We finished and people clapped. I didn't know what to do. That was a great moment. The Dash-In has been a great resource for this kind of music. I think a lot of other musicians would echo that sentiment."

# Fort Wayne on His Mind

Fort Wayne was seventh on Hitler's hit list, according to Fort Wayne native, college professor and author Michael Martone. As it happens, that is the title of one of Martone's many Fort Wayne-themed books.

"Back then, there was so much industry in Fort Wayne that was related to the war effort that it made our little city an integral part of the U.S. war machine,' he explains. "I'm glad it was Hitler who perished instead of Allen County," quipped Martone during a recent phone interview from his current home base in Tuscaloosa, Alabama.

Some people have Georgia on their mind; Martone has Fort Wayne on his. Over a 30-year writing career, he has exclusively used Fort Wayne subject matter in his more than a dozen titles spanning from 1984 to 2013. The amazing part is that he hasn't lived

here for any length of time in over three decades. Born at St. Joe Hospital and having attended Northside High School, Martone has deep roots in the community. His father still lives in town, as does his brother, a Northrop High School football


I think he left Fort Wayne and the state because he ran out of colleges. His educational and professorial career reads like a Rhodes Scholar's resumé and then some. Currently, he is a professor in the creative writing program at the University of Alabama where he

has been teaching since 1996. While gethis degrees, he attended Butler University and graduated from Indiana University. He holds an MA from The Writing Seminars of Johns Hopkins University. He is a past faculty member of the MFA Program for Writers at Warren Wilson College, has taught at Iowa State, Harvard and Syracuse universities and is currently a professor at the University of Alabama.

While teaching at Harvard, where he was the Briggs-Copeland Lecturer on Fiction, Martone couldn't help noticing all the shops selling used tuxedos in Cambridge. He thought "how Gentile," until he was clued in to the real purpose for the abundance of upscale attire. The students at Harvard referred to them as Battle Tuxes, and they were an essential wardrobe item for functions, events and parties. Who doesn't need a cool tux on to roll around the frat house floor and look sharp while drinking keg beer straight from the tap? Martone eventually got himself a tux of his own but claims he hasn't ever gotten it back out after departing the Harvard academia scene.

Martone writes in an eclectic format he refers to as "false biographies." He sometimes augments facts with fiction and fiction with facts, leaving it to the reader to ascertain where one stops and the other begins. His works have been well received, as he has been published by three different publishers including IU Press, FC2 and University of Georgia Press. He is also a frequent contributor to anthologies of fiction, nonfiction and essays, including 2009's Not Normal, Illinois: Peculiar Fictions from the Flyover which showcases 33 tales and points of view on Midwestern values and experiences from acclaimed writers of this region. His most recent work is Four for a Quarter, a quirky compilation of love, life and pop culture that is, of course, written in four parts.

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#### Jimi Hendrix

People, Hell and Angels

Jimi Hendrix died in 1970, leaving us with three studio albums that changed the face of guitar and rock n' roll forever. Hendrix showed a major progression in his playing and songwriting in just three short years, and only a handful of musicians and bands have been able to accomplish that since.



Basically, we didn't need posthumous releases. There's a reason they sat in a vault; for the most part they weren't all that great. I don't think Hendrix would have put the majority of the albums out which his family has deemed "Hendrix Family-Approved." So you can imagine my pessimism when late last year it was announced that yet another posthumous release was coming out. What now? Hendrix: Polka? Hendrix Live From Heaven? Hendrix Unleashed in the

After hearing the first single, "Somewhere," my pessimism turned to optimism. It was a slow burner. That classic Hendrix voodoo that permeated albums like *Electric Ladyland* and *Axis: Bold As* Love was all over this track. With Buddy Miles on drums, Stephen Stills on bass and Eddie Kramer at the helm, this was a classic Hendrix track that was finally seeing the light of day in a new, much better light.

After hearing the album, I can say without a doubt that this is by far the best posthumous Hendrix release to take money from our wallets. Does it stand up to the three classic and timeless Jimi Hendrix Experience releases? Not by a mile. But there are some gems well worth owning on 2013's great money grab.

The key to the success of People, Hell and Angels is Eddie Kramer. He was the seminal producer and engineer of the 60s and 70s and had a hand in all three albums by The Jimi Hendrix Experience. Kramer oversaw the most recent posthumous release, and you can tell. It doesn't have the sound of a quickly thrown together jumble of demos and raw tracks; it sounds like the album that should've come out after The Jimi Hendrix Experience broke up.

"Earth Blues" opens with a sound of what was to come. It has a soul vibe but still very much showcases Hendrix's cosmic blues playing. One of the best renditions of "Hear My Train a Comin" is on this album. There's an urgency to this version that hadn't been captured on a recording since the acoustic version performed by Hendrix in the documentary Hendrix. "Bleeding Heart" has some amazing "Little Wing"-like guitar and a great Chicago blues vibe to it. "Easy Blues" is a nearly six minute instrumental which provides a glimpse of what Hendrix may have had in store for us had he kept recording through the 70s with Band of Gypsys. "Inside Out" is a funky number accentuated by some great Leslie speaker-infused gui-

The album falters on the pseudo-soul yawner and longest track "Let Me Move You." Versions of "Izabella" and "Crash Landing" don't add much to the collection either, besides being the best versions of the otherwise uninspired Hendrix leftovers.

All in all, if you've already dropped a fortune on 40 years of Hendrix rehashes, do yourself a favor and drop a few more on this surprisingly solid collection. Or, if you're like me, you can just pull out Are You Experienced, Axis: Bold As Love and Electric Ladyland and spin them in succession and at high volume. Your choice. (John Hubner)

#### **Phosphorescent**

Muchacho

If it were up to me, I wouldn't have called this album Muchacho, put an orgy on the cover or stuck a big ol' nipple (and two tiny ones) on the back of the LP. But, aside from those unimportant gripes, I can't find much not to like about Matthew "Phosphorescent" Houck's sixth studio album, a 10-song masterstroke




that sees the guy responsible for my favorite record of 2007 (a little slice of brilliance called *Pride*) finally doing something interesting

In the years since Pride helped me shiver through the cold winter, Houck has kept semi-busy, releasing a spotty studio record called

cept album of the last 25 years and really does wrap up the decade of decadence.

The tracks are arranged skillfully as you are introduced to each personality and concept. The main character is Billy, a disabled Welsh person who contacts a local DJ at a fictitious radio station in Los Angeles.

'Radio Waves' describes Billy's gift, while "Who Needs Information" argues how information has misguided society into becoming too comfortable with technology. We meet Billy's brother Benny at this point. It is hard to explain the message; this is a very "modern rock" album for a guy who used to play the bass in Pink Floyd.

As it progresses into the darkness (sort of like *The Wall*), you are treated to some great horns, soulful back-up singers and a host of musicians who are still considered the best in the business.

Side two of the record sounds quite a bit like Pink Floyd, but with Waters on lead vocals. It begins with a track titled "Sunset Strip" about Benny's wife, Molly. "Home" is one of the best songs Waters ever wrote, including anything he did with his first

"Four Minutes" is about the supposed end of the world. Was Billy actually smart enough to launch missiles? Was this really the end? The DJ pleads with Billy to call the station if he is out there listening. You'd be surprised how it ends. (Dennis Donahue)

Here's to Taking It Easy and a forgettable covers disc called To Wil lie. Neither, clearly, did much for me, at least not when compared to the hypnotic and surprisingly epic folk record that was Pride. Muchacho sees Houck once again kicking his shoes off, mixing the ambitious spirit of Pride with the more straightforward songwriter fare we heard on Here's to Taking it Easy. The result is a very diverse and pleasantly accessible record that I think stands a very good chance of going down as the man's signature, if not best, work.

The threat with this little smash is that Houck gets too big – that he's the next My Morning Jacket sort of crossover artist. I call this a "threat" because I'm a big picture guy and I'd rather Phossy's work have a different sort of legacy. I'd rather his songs, sound and spirit have a Townes Van Zandt sort of slow-burn, hidden-in-the-weeds vibe - not because I don't want Houck to have more orgies, see more nipples and enjoy a bigger success, but because I think the type of fan who likes cult-level songwriters is the type of fan who tends to dig in more than the average listener, and Muchacho, like Pride, is a disc best enjoyed by the obsessives.

It's a densely layered and beautifully arranged collection that never runs out of moves, sounds or ideas. I could break down the songs, what they sound like and where I think they came from (Dylan, Young, Palace, Cohen, etc.) one by one, but to me that style of review only takes the punch out of the possible listening experience you – my dear, lovable reader – could have in your precious future.

What you need to know is that Houck is a Jeff Tweedy-type in that his backbone is built on twangy structure, gritty and honest lyrics, indie rock ethos and DIY production. Also like Tweedy, Houck has evolved very much over the years, leaving behind the Grandaddy, Bright Eyes and Will Oldham comparisons in favor of a diverse yet cohesive sound that's all his own.

Helping Houck with his opus, in addition to a serious gang of players, is legendary engineer John Agnello and some guy called Greg Calbi. Not bad company. It's Phossy, though, who is the star at every turn, not just writing the songs and playing several instruments, but also producing and engineering the record. And while I can't quite compare Muchacho to some of the complex, progressive folk Tweedy has released, I do think Houck has found some interesting ways to make his music feel increasingly big and new. By carefully arranging and layering his compositions (not to mention writing some almost always killer lyrics), the Phos has recorded the

kind of record that feels a little more essential with each spin, an album that could very well inspire a passionate following.

The closest modern reference for a record that sounds like *Muchacho* remains the music of Will Oldham, even if Houck has become more accessible and versatile than that other bearded, weirdo folkie. The question, I think, is whether or not Houck is the true one-of-a-kind sort of talent and personality Oldham has time and time again proven himself to be. Maybe it's the nipples or the Willie Nelson cover record, but I'm still not quite sold on Houck as genius, even if the combination of *Pride* and *Muchacho* warrant such consideration. His lyrics, at times, just feel too obvious, his compositions too digestible.

Maybe in a few months, after I've heard these 10 great new songs a few dozen more times, I'll be singing a different tune. Maybe *Muchacho*'s mix of new and old will reveal itself to be some new step forward for the folkies. Here's hoping. (*Greg W. Locke*)

#### **LOW** The Invisible Way

Twenty years on, Low have pretty much stuck with a simple formula: gorgeous vocal harmonies and spare, often melancholy lyrics attached to restrained instrumentation and



often achingly slow tempos. On the stunning *The Invisible Way*, Alan Sparhawk, Mimi Parker and Steve Garrington give Low fans what they crave with no unnecessary bells and whistles to obscure the unvarnished songwriting.

Much has been made of Low setting up shop in Wilco's loft to record *The Invisible Way* with Jeff Tweedy himself in the producer's chair. Given the yeoman's work Tweedy did producing a recent Ma-

vis Staples album, the thought of the same treatment applied to Low certainly set hipster heads nodding. And you know what? The album sounds fantastic. Tweedy's production talent so far appears to lie in making artists sound very much themselves, however. The Sparhawk/Parker vocal dynamic, arguably the signature piece of the band's sound, comes to the fore here. The vocals are front and center, just as they should be. Parker actually takes the lead on nearly half of the album's songs, adding variety to *The Invisible Way* without disrupting the light instrumentation. It's not that the louder songs and distorted guitars that populated *The Great Destroyer* were negative additions, mind you; that album felt like a refreshing midstream changeup rather than the signal of a change in direction.

On the new album, piano appears to be the weapon of choice, along with a bit more acoustic guitar than on recent Low discs. "Amethyst," for example, relies on simple piano chords, lightly brushed drums and a bit of tasteful guitar as an unhurried backdrop for the vocals. You can sense the space here, and you're able to savor every note. That's Low at their best.

The sprightly in contrast "So Blue" features the same arrangement, but with Parker's lead vocals augmented with her own harmonies. It's a stirring tune that's sure to be a live favorite.

Sparhawk, as always, delivers. On "Plastic Cup" he imagines an ironic future for a lowly drug test cup: "The cup will probably be here long after we're gone," he sings. "They'll probably wonder what the hell we used it for / this must be the cup the king held every night." It's bitter, sad and sardonically funny at the same time. "Plastic Cup" provides a perfect intro to an album full of smart, sparse numbers. Definitely a high point for Low. (D.M. Jones)

a variety of instruments, sometimes several, during any given song.

Fifteen years ago Wooten released A Show of Hands, a record that was just Victor Wooten on the four-string bass and voice – no overdubs, no drum tracks. The disc, lauded for its inventiveness and audacity, introduced the world to Wooten apart from the Flecktones.

He has since released eight solo records. Wooten has made 14 albums with Bela Fleck, some with the Flecktones, some without (Wooten's older brother, Roy "Future Man" Wooten is also a member of the Flecktones). He has recorded with Stanley Clarke and Marcus Miller and has made records with everyone from Dave Matthews to Mike Stern, Keb 'Mo to India. Arie, Stuart Duncan to Mark O'Conner.

Wooten keeps his musical heroes close to home. His four brothers – Regi, Roy, Rudy and Joseph – remain his first and most important influences. After all, it was his brothers who got him into music in the first place. The "eight-year-old bass ace" Wooten was almost a novelty in the Wooten Brothers Band, which toured with Curtis Mayfield and opened for Stephanie Mills, War, Ramsey Lewis, Frankie Beverly and Maze, Dexter Wansel and The Temptations.

Later, Wooten's brother Roy recommended him as a bluegrass fiddler for a job with a band performing at Busch Gardens in Williamsburg, Virginia. Wooten, who had never played the fiddle, gave himself a crash course and within a few weeks was on stage playing fiddle and bass in the *Good Time Country Show*.

"That was in 1981," he said. "I was 15. The toughest part was learning how to hold it and get a tone

that is not so scratchy." He'd been playing cello, so the concept of bowing was not foreign, but learning to play such a small instrument while holding it with his neck was. "I literally had no time to learn it, so it forced me to learn it quickly."

Around the same time, the Wooten Brothers were doing shows for the USO. During one of those gigs, Wooten began messing around with a friend's banjo. Naturally, he played it like it had a bass tuning. The resulting sound was strange. The friend told Wooten about this bluegrass banjo player named "Baylor Fleck" and suggested he check out some of his stuff. Wooten did. A few years later Wooten took a trip to Nashville and tracked down Fleck. In 1988, a year after that first meeting Fleck, Wooten, Futureman and harmonica/keyboard wizard Howard Levy formed Bela Fleck and the Flecktones.

The Flecktones recently ended an extended break, welcomed the return of Levy and have plans for a new album and tour. And with his own tour just getting underway, Wooten has had to schedule time away from his other passion – his music and nature camps. "I used to schedule the camps around the tours. Now I schedule the tours around the camps."

Begun in 2000 on 150 acres of wooded land just west of Nashville, Vix Camps offers several music and nature camp retreats each year. Wooten's love of nature rivals his love of music. In fact, for Wooten, the two are inseparable. "People who come to the camp are helped in ways they don't even recognize," he said. "Music is a language and it's difficult to learn a language well in a room. You have to get out in na-

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


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

### Roger Ebert's Lasting Influence on Movies, Moviegoers ing small films easy - helped keep indepen-

A week ago Tuesday when I read that Roger Ebert was taking a "leave of presence" because his cancer had returned, I knew it wouldn't be long before we would hear the sad news that Roger had seen his last movie. Still, I was shocked that less than a week had passed between his announcement and the sad news of his death. Yes, he had been writing fewer reviews

recently, but cancer or no cancer, it would only be human for even the greatest movie fan – which he was – to slow down a bit. He was tough, a fighter, and he had an incredible passion for life. That passion showed in all his endeavors: reviews, tweets, blog posts, his television show and a film festival that changed names several times but kept growing and prospering.

A normal person would have done years ago what he said he was going to do last week: scale back a bit and review only the movies he wanted to actually see. But for Ebert to say that, well, I felt certain he would only make a statement like that if he were very, very ill. The man was no quitter.

Ebert's reviews could be right on the money or off in left field, positive or negative, but you never doubted that he was the hardest working man in the world of movie chatter. He loved movies, truly, deeply, passionately, irrationally, obsessively, compulsively and more.

One thing he loved about movies is that they are an escape from whatever is happening in the real world. It isn't surprising that he kept working so hard during his battle with cancer. He said he felt like himself as long as he was seeing movies and talking and writing about them.

There are so many things to respect and admire about Roger Ebert.

He was a Midwesterner, body and soul. After growing up in Urbana, Illinois and attending college at University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign, he traveled a bit. But he came home to Chicago. And then he never left, and he could have.

Staying put in a territory that is derided as flyover territory by movie moguls and other tastemakers had a tremendously positive effect in so many ways. Because he was a Midwesterner, he championed regional stories in movies that coastal critics sometimes dismissed and sometimes admired, though rarely with Ebert's insight. And can there be any doubt that his influence encouraged young filmmakers to make their films in Chicago and all over our region?

I also love that he always identified as a newspaperman. He was involved in print journalism all his life, beginning with a neighborhood newsletter he published as a kid, through high school and college, before choosing to become a reporter over attending graduate school.

His background in journalism kept his reviews grounded in a more practical voice than that of many other critics. He could wax philosophical, but often he gave viewers and readers practical reasons to go to the theater or stay at home. Journalism is supposed to inform, and that was his mission.

He never left Sun-Times, though he could have. But staying a true champion of an old media didn't mean he didn't embrace

His down to earth excitement about talking about movies infected a generation. I



loved going to the movies, but would I have gone as often had I not heard Gene Siskel and Roger Ebert arguing back and forth about movies that were otherwise under my radar? No. Would my teenage buddies and I have gone out for pizza and ice cream after the movies to argue about them in the same way? No. I am happy to claim Ebert as an enabler to the movie habit I cannot and do not ever want to shake.

Ebert wasn't a snob. After growing up and watching Siskel and Ebert at the movies and watching movies in college, I moved to New York, which is filled with movies and moviemakers. But jumping in to movie culture in New York City was a bizarre experience. Going to the New York Film Festival, to name just one NYC film tradition, was as absurd as any parody of movie snobs. Everyone would be dressed in black, in every layer from turtlenecks out to leather jackets. They would look bored and not happy to be seeing something new. They stood around and smoked a lot of cigarettes (it was the 80s).

The tedious seriousness didn't stop with the fans. I loved movies, but I could barely pick up publications like Film Comment without wanting to throw them across the room - they were insanely pretentious and full of nonsense.

Ebert embraced all kinds of films. His support of independent films - especially in the 1990s, before the internet made discoverof films like Do the Right Thing, Ruby in Paradise, Bound, The Straight Story, Hoop Dreams, The Big Lebowski, Crumb, The Last Seduction and Boys Don't Cry helped get those films in front of audiences when multiplexes wouldn't book them. He loved foreign language films. He

dent movie houses alive. Glowing reviews

loved documentaries. He loved the classics. He loved genre films. He wrote screenplays for a few of those, including Beyond the Val-

He didn't always get it right. Who does? He gave The Usual Suspects only one and a half stars and criticized the screenplay which went on to win an Oscar for best original screenplay. He gave only two stars for Die Hard but three stars for Speed 2: Cruise Control. At least he admits in that review he was strolling down Michigan Avenue on a nice summer evening in a great mood before he saw this mess of a movie.

He could be brutal. My favorite Ebert slam is often quoted, "I will one day be thin. Vincent Gallo will always be the director of The Brown Bunny."

"People don't change" is an expression I hate. They change all the time, some more quickly than others. Ebert changed a lot, but one constant with him was his passion for films. He was brave and bold in the face of his struggle with cancer. He was a champion for the little guy, on screen and off.

The last review he filed was for To the Wonder, Terrence Malick's new film. I've read it online. It is the perfect last song for a voice I miss already.

# **Worth Revisiting**

To Kill a Mockingbird is one of the books that caused me to be an English major, but I hadn't revisited it in a good many years, partially because I have been a little fearful that it might not be as good on a second read. I have also avoided watching the Gregory Peck filmed version. So, seeing the University of Saint Francis production this past weekend was the first time I had spent with young Scout and her father, Atticus Finch, in Maycomb, Alabama.

Written in 1960, Harper Lee's book is, of course, still one of the American novels most widely read by high school students.

Despite the impact this book had on me when I read it as a high school student, I have to confess to asking the friend who went with



### Navigating Obamacare's Waters

versial and divisive topics in our country has been health care - more specifically, the health care reform bill signed into law a couple of years ago. A hot topic during the 2012 campaign, the reality of the changes in law are now finally beginning to settle in, and regardless of your own position on those changes, there are two undeniable facts. First, at some point each of us and those that we love will require health care of some kind. And secondly, whatever laws are in place to oversee the providing of health care and the coverage provided by insurance, there will have to be an understanding of what those laws are and how they will ultimately affect our own health care decisions.

Navigating those murky waters will be important, and knowledge is your best bet in doing so. To provide some necessary insight, an open discussion is being held at the Allen County Public Library conference room on Sunday, April 28 at 1 p.m., and it's sure to help clear up at least some of the confusion. Much of the concern stems from the uncertainty of what the reform actually tries to accomplish and the means of making that happen - and for most of us, slogging through the full narrative of those laws is beyond daunting. Sleep-inducing might even be a better description. Fortunately, there will be more than discussion; there will be some people there to help clear through the information and misinforma-

and Professor Abraham Schwab, a medical ethicist and assistant professor of philosophy at IPFW, the discussion - "Obamacare and You: What's Ahead?" examines the reform and provides a personal glimpse into the pros and cons.

There is a lot of misinformation concerning the health care law, and it doesn't help that the law itself is complex and confusing," says Walker. "However, the law has some really important innovations that people need to be aware of, and at the same time, there are aspects of the law that are worrisome. We are going to review the history of the law and the forces that helped create it, as well as discuss the problems with our health care system that make reform necessary. We then hope to discuss what people can expect and how their lives will be affected over the upcoming years.'

Representatives of Senators Joe Donnelly and Dan Coats, along with those of Rep. Marlin Stutzman, have been invited to attend the discussion, but Walker emphasizes that the conversation goes beyond the politics of the issue and addresses the important applications and how those will ultimately affect our health care in the years to come. ## It's Springtime for Stalin

Ah, the loveliness of spring. The sun is shining, the weather is getting warmer, birds are chirping and trees are starting to bloom. The harsh days of winter are now just a bitter memory. So what better time to attend a concert featuring a bunch of dark and heavy Russian music!

There is no better way to greet the change of seasons by taking in a healthy dose of communistic oppression and Russian drama at Do Svidaniya, Stalin, the next concert in The Phil's Masterworks series this Saturday, April 13. People often imagine classical music as relaxing and soothing. They might buy a ticket to a concert expecting they will have a great napping opportunity with light and pleasant music in the background. Sorry, nap enthusiasts, but this is not one of

The evening starts off with the famous Piano Concerto No. 1 by Tchaikovsky. Most people will instantly recognize the four-note intro by the horns with the piano crashing in a few bars later. The opening is familiar enough that it has been parodied by both Saturday Night Live and Monty Python (look up "Monty Python: Sviatoslav Richter and Rita" on YouTube for

Regardless, the piece is full of drama, virtuosity and plenty of bombastic goodness one expects from Tchaikovsky. The piece is considered so difficult that the gifted Russian pianist Nicolai Rubinstein deemed it vulgar and unplayable when Tchaikovsky presented it to him. Luckily, The Phil has brought in Alexander Korsantia who is up to the task of tackling this beast.

While Tchaikovsky might represent a more regal and grand Russia, Shostakovich, having composed around the mid 20th century, had a much different backdrop for his creative endeavors. Imagine having a job where turning in work that didn't meet the boss' expectations didn't just result in the usual lecture



about "mission statements" and "team environments' but instead resulted in being thrown in jail and branded a traitor. This was Shostakovich's reality for much of his compositional career.

He composed his 10th Symphony after an eightyear hiatus during which he was afraid to showcase any works that might be considered innovative lest they be labeled as "modernist" or "un-nationalistic" (he was under extra scrutiny from Stalin's regime during that period). However, with the death of Stalin in 1953, he felt inspired to resume work on this symphony, a return to form for the composer.

If you haven't experienced the music of Shostakovich, all I can say is prepare yourself. This symphony is filled with incredibly dark and ominous themes, contrasted by fast and heart-pounding intensity. It was reported that Shostakovich would listen to his own music, barely able to contain himself. He would lean forward at the edge of his chair while biting his fingernails and even breaking into sweats. I would not recommend showing up and expecting easy listening.

So gather your comrades, bundle up in your ushankas and shubas and celebrate the fall of the Soviet Union by attending this next concert in The Phil's Masterworks series at 8 p.m. on Saturday, April 13 at the downtown Fort Wayne's historic Embassy Theatre. Tickets start at \$16 for adults, \$10 for students with a valid ID, and kids attend free with a paid adult. For tickets, call The Phil Box Office at 260-481-0777 or visit www.fwphil.org.

### **Evil Dead Remake Tops Box Office**

**Tops at the Box:** Fede Alvarez's Evil Dead remake, starring Jane Levy, Shiloh Fernandez, Lou Taylor Pucci, Jessica Lucas and Elizabeth Blackmore, sold well enough over its first three days, bringing in \$26 million in the U.S. and \$4.5 million abroad. Sam Raimi's original Evil Dead film, one of the most beloved cult films of all-time, made \$2.4 million when it was released in 1981. I'm sure the new flick is fun and cool and whatever, but dang, the original is such a little gem. ### The Dude-to-Dad Trip

Dan Gets a Minivan by Dan Zevin, Scribner, 2012

It seems like only yesterday that Brooklyn was the place to be. What was once a fairly dowdy part of New York City was alive with hipsters who spent their time knitting in Prospect Park and looking for pseudo-dumpy ethnic places to eat. It was a place for hip, young families who wore corduroy and dressed their toddlers in ironic T-shirts with the names of indie bands on them. It was hipster heaven. But apparently that was yester-

Now, if Dan Zevin's new book is any DAN GETS indication, it's time for the hipsters to begin fleeing Brooklyn and heading to get this - the suburbs. Zevin's ode to the minivan and trips to the town swimming pool are a little disconcerting. Is he selling out, or has he found the big cosmic circle of irony that can lead us to think subur-

ban life is as cool now as it was supposed to be in 1950? Dan Gets a Minivan is a

memoir that lays it all out on the table via its title. It's a collection of essays that documents Zevin's transition from postadolescent free spirit to parental everyman — a trip from "Dude" to "Dad" - with all the introspective angst that growing into adulthood entails. Zevin is in his 40s, but that's when these things happen to Americans these days.

Zevin is a freelance writer, and his wife is a professional of some sort. They've moved to Brooklyn from Boston, presumably following the great hipster migration, and they've settled in. They used to have just a dog, but now they have two young children, and now they realize that having a dog isn't basically like having children. Having children, it turns out, is harder. Zevin struggles to work but can't get much done, so he gives up on having an amazing career - no Pulitzer in his future - and focuses on becoming a stay-at-home dad.

That doesn't mean he doesn't need a nanny. One of the longer essays in the book details his and his wife's search for a suitable nanny to replace the charmingly indie girl with the multi-colored hair who had been doing such a nice (and

nicely edgy) job taking care of their kids. The search is difficult. Nannies are hard to find in Brooklyn, probably because everyone there is in pretty much the same situation that Zevin is in: needing to hire someone to take care of their kids while they stay at home to take care of the

> There are other difficulties in Zevin's life. He has a hard time reserving a tennis court at the fitness center. He has to go to the courthouse to fight a ticket he got for allowing his dog off his leash in the park. He has to deal with hipster dads - real hipsters, who are totally unlike him - on the playground.

He has to try to

find new friends (as explained in a creepy essay in which he conflates dating and finding couples to hang out with, a process he calls "co-mance"). He has to deal with his mother, a hypochondriac from Jersey who spends too much time trying to make his life easier.

There's professional stuff, too. He writes a blog for an oldguy website in which he has to try to make aging sound fun. And when he's invited to give a commencement address at a Catholic college, he writes an off-putting essay that implies bigotry on the part of the college's administration to explain why he, a Jew, is uncomfortable speaking at a Catholic institution. But he has bills to pay - nanny, fitness center, new minivan, etc. - so he's gotta do what he's gotta do.

Zevin's biggest problem, though, is the way he's changing. He loves his minivan, and he doesn't like living in the city much any more. He resists the model of grown-up fatherhood presented by his own father, an OB/GYN from Jersey whose favorite place in the entire world is Costco. But can he really resist it? Is it possible to be a real father, a real man who provides for his family and understands what's important, while living in Brooklyn? Zevin isn't so sure, and as much as the idea unsettles him, he's finding the suburbs really attractive lately.

my memory was how well Lee captures the feelings of a child. The thing I have carried with me from the book is the loss of innocence experienced by Scout, her brother Jem, and their young friend Dill as they come to understand not only the power of racism but also the quiet strength of their father, a man they initially consider to be completely unimpressive, but who shows a greater ability to understand others and walk in their shoes than perhaps any other character in modern literature.

Under Brad Beauchamp's direction, this production (just USF's second in the old Scottish Rite theater downtown, now the USF Performing Arts Center) comes together nicely. The sets, consisting of the street where the Finches live and the county courthouse, are terrific. The actors use the spaces well. At the beginning of the opening night performance, the microphones seemed a little off, but whatever this issue was, it was quickly corrected. There will doubtless be a few growing pains as USF makes this huge new space its own, but it's a fantastic improvement.

As Scout, Zoe Moore is quite good. So, too, is tiny Ray Wolf as Dill, a character based on Lee's childhood neighbor, Truman Capote. Older brother Jem, with his fiery disposition, is well played by Bo Geyer.

Jim Matusik brings the right amount at gentle restraint to the role of Atticus Finch. Gregory Stieber brings aggression to his role of Mr. Gilmer, prosecution attorney. Jeff Moore clearly has a good time as Bob Ewell, town drunk. His daughter Mayella, who accuses Tom Robinson of having raped her, is played effectively by Chrissy Fleenor. As Tom Robinson, Ennis Brown Jr. is believable.

The messages in this story are plentiful. Members of mobs, as Atticus explains to the children, are different people than those human beings are outside the group. Racism, though less prevalent and with less often fatal consequences, still exists. The controversy of the recent Trayvon Martin case shows this. "Negroes only" signs, such as the one that shocks us from the stage, may be a thing of the past, but they remind us that it's not a terribly distant past.

Overall, this production of around two hours is a solid representation of the beloved book and reminds us all of some of the loss innocence when we see the world's uglier sides.
