

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

Experience the Groove

The CD was supposed to be the end of it. The vinyl record, that is. The CD has better sound and is more mobile, they said. It's the next generation, they said. The vinyl LP is done for. And for the most part, they were right. The CD took over as the preferred musical medium of choice shortly after its introduction to the masses in the early 80s. Vinyl and cassette sales dropped dramatically and eventually were all but abandoned by record companies.

But, even as the CD was being replaced by online music sales just 25 years later, something happened that spurred the growth of the forgotten vinyl. In 2008 vinyl sales nearly doubled the previous year's sales, going from 1 million units sold nationally to 1.9 million units. Since then, vinyl sales have risen each year, to about 4.6 million units sold in 2012, according to Nielsen

What happened in 2008? The debate is a good one, but one argument gives the credit to a group that had formed to try to save independent record stores. That group, otherwise known as the founders of the website RecordStoreDay.com, held its first celebration of music, called Record Store Day, on April 19, 2008. Not surprisingly, the event focused heavily on vinyl sales and was "conceived as a way to celebrate and spread the word about the unique culture surrounding over 700 independently owned record stores in the U.S. and thousands of similar stores internationally," according to the Record Store Day press release.

The event, officially kicked off in 2008 by Metallica Day at Rasputin Music in San Francisco, brought together independent music stores across the country with artists who supported the importance of keeping those independent music retailers alive. With special appearances, autograph signings, performances and exclusive product available only to independent retailers on that day, the event became a hit and has grown in popularity and increased in visibility every year since, with more and more artists joining the cause and releasing exclusive music, on the

third Saturday in April each year.

Bob Roets, owner of Wooden Nickel Music in Fort Wayne, remembers that very first Record Store Day. "There weren't a lot of releases available for that first Record Store Day, but I'm convinced, if that day had not been a hit, you wouldn't see the increases in vinyl sales you're seeing today," Roets said. "Record Store Day's success is single-

They will have over 300 exclusive Record Store Day releases available for collectors to purchase, each store with different selections and varying amounts of product. based on what they ordered and what is available from distributors to them. Not all releases will be available in all stores, so shop with that in mind.

New Republic Skate Park

Donny Manco is best known as both a fine artist and tattoo artist. Over the last few years, however, he's become increasingly known for the community leadership he's shown with his The Framework organization and his involvement with the New Republic Skate Park. That said, I think Manco has a future as a storyteller. Over the course of an hour or so phone conversation, Manco talked to me not just about skateboard

community and the upcoming Good For You fundraiser show for New Republic Skate, but about art, community and, mostly, the power young people can have when they really want something.

Manco first became known in the community in the late 90s after he began working at the first legal tattoo shop in the city. He's been riding that wave ever since, as tattoo culture has grown into the beast that it is today. Along the way he's done several other things, specifically quite a bit of community work, including some not-for-profit ventures.

"We formed this organization in 2010 called The Framework. What we do is we look at a problem and ask if it can be fixed and, if so, how you go about doing that practically. Most of the work I'd done was with people living together in a common area – a nursing home, a Section 8 housing community. I thought to myself that the skate community,

though they don't live together, all gather together. They identify with each other and have their own rules and regulations. So that community was bound together by their identity."

Manco started getting involved with the city's skate community because he was, in his own words, "trying to be a good parent to my kid who is a skate-boarder." Manco's son wanted to go to Lawton

Park, a place Manco calls "an imperfect miracle."

"The park had a lot of tough kids. Kids who basically lived at the park. I felt like I was in someone else's house. That's not so bad though. I'm a tattoo artist; I've been in crazy situations for years. So people there were constantly in contact with each other without having the fabric of community to really bind them together. Now that's just the long way to say that these guys weren't organized. It was like Lord of the Flies in there. There were kids with tough, broken backgrounds, and they were all sort of gathering at this place where they could have something. Now what's come from that is the local Fort Wayne skate culture. A sub-culture with its own rules that I needed to learn. So like some safari guide in the jungle observing the rituals of the whatever, I began to study what was going on in that park."

Manco quickly fell in love with not just the skate culture, but the art of skating itself.

"I just thought, man, there's beauty in this skate

r just thought, man, there's beauty in this skate culture. And my son wants to be part of it. And, you know, the only thing I've seen as close to the beauty of skateboarding in my 41 years of experience on earth is the martial arts. These kids [that] people assume lack discipline, have discipline. The kids that people think

lack respect, have respect. They just don't respect you. So I just thought that if my kid wanted to get involved with this, I wanted to help change things for the better for the local skate culture."

Using his experience as a community activist and leader, Manco set his sights on the local skate community, turning his gears in their directions in a very altruistic and patient manner.

"It really just stared with me observing. This guy gets a lot of respect and these guys don't. And that guy



gets the most respect. What I observed was a sort of order. Their sport is so disciplined that it just contains that kind of thing – order. They might not respect the law or you, but they respect someone who skates better than them. So I learned that they have respect and start-

ed asking myself, how can I tap into that? How do I help them get the tools that they need to do more than skate and piss off cops? "

After a couple of years of hanging around Lawton Park with his son a few times a week, Manco started to meet skaters and get to know the community. He eventually started hosting cookouts every Sunday at the park, planning all along to get involved with the goal of helping the skate community become increasingly healthy and positive. What he learned over time was the value of trust within the community.

"Tupac said something like 'The most expensive thing in the world is trust. It can take years to earn and just a matter of seconds to lose.' I just thought, Tupac, you're so right; I have a new respect for you. It took me two solid years to earn these skaters' trust. I don't skateboard – that's the big secret. Everyone assumes I do, but I don't. So how the hell did this guy get into this position? These guys respect me like I'm one of them. Sometimes I feel like Kevin Costner in *Dances With Wolves*. I just spent so much time working with this community, so they took me in.

"I learned that the one thing they wanted more than

Preserving a Life Left Behind

His drawings are grand. His tools are simple. Htoo Doh reveals the strength and subtleties of the human spirit in drawings that are executed with such high accuracy they are often mistaken for photographs. With a tuft of cotton, an eraser, a soft brush and a bit of charcoal, Doh captures a life from which he was forced to flee. Portraits depicting Burmese elders with creped, wrinkled faces framed by strands of tribal beads

conjure stories of survival and struggle. A contrasting piece shows a young child with a porcelain complexion and a tear falling down her cheek, speaking in a silent yet powerful voice that calls for help, as if she witnessed her own, frightening future in a looking glass.

The life Doh left behind in Burma was quite different from the daily grind that many of us in northeast Indiana have grown to consider blasé. Doh was born in Burma, now Myanmar. As a child he witnessed war crimes in the streets.

"Everyday life was under gunfire. We lived in a war zone," said Doh. "I once caught malaria and almost died.

We went out for medicine one night, and the Burmese army arrested me. They wanted me to become a porter and carry a machine gun." The Burmese soldiers kept his father but released Doh. "If I went with them I would have died," says Doh. "My malaria got so bad. My stomach hurt so bad. I know if I would have when gone with them I would have died. I needed medicine."

Doh is Karenni. He belongs to an ethnic group that has been engaged in a war of resistance against Burmese forces since 1948. During our interview, Doh seemed reluctant to divulge the details of what he had seen, as if he were embarrassed to have witnessed such ugly brutality. He quickly brushed over the topic with a matter-of-fact description, using the same tone many of us use to speak about our list of daily errands. "In Burma,

[the] military shoot or arrest you or rape women. At any age. It didn't matter. People were treated like they were meaningless. Like they were animals," said Doh. "The Karenni call it ethnic cleansing or secret genocide."

Doh left his family and fled to Thailand, a bordering country, when he was 14. He was homeless and alone from 1999 to 2002. He tried to enter a refugee camp in Thailand but was soon cast away because he didn't have official refugee papers. During those years,

Doh did his best to survive. He helped other people in need and asked for a place to sleep in return. Because he didn't speak Thai, it was impossible for him to find a proper job. He relied on his own resources and managed to keep himself alive until he reached the magic age of 18. At that age, one no longer has to rely on an adult to apply for refugee papers. With proper documentation, Doh entered a refugee camp that offered free education to those who wanted to participate. He lived in the camp in one of about 6,000 huts that consisted of nothing more than grass roofs pitched over dirt floors.

In 2004 Doh started drawing. He was 20 years old when he met an artist named Saw Kennedy. Kennedy also lived in a bamboo house with no walls. "There were no windows or doors, only posts that held

up a roof. The kitchen was very basic and it was outside." Doh and Kennedy met at a New Year's celebration where Kennedy was showing his artwork. "He was the best artist I ever met," said Doh.

Doh was fascinated by Kennedy's work and technique. He watched him closely, and they soon developed a close bond. Doh studied and drew alongside his mentor. He eventually moved in with Kennedy, his wife and their son, Junior. Doh connected with drawing very quickly. He drew with incredible

detail right away. His skill level was so high that Kennedy signed his established name to Doh's work so the pieces could bring in a higher price at the market. Doh was proud to represent Kennedy and also dedicated to refining his craft. He learned to pay close attention to minute detail. After studying for four years with Kennedy, Doh finally earned the right to sign and sell his own work. "I never signed my own drawings until 2008," he said.

Kennedy and Doh parted ways when Kennedy was forced to move to the United States after he was listed as a threat to the Burmese government for drawing

portraits of Aung San Suu Kyi, the Myanmar resistance leader and Nobel Peace Prize winner. Drawings such as these are illegal in Myanmar. Kennedy was quickly accepted by his new home near Seattle, Washington where he was invited to show four pieces of his work at the Seattle Center just two weeks after he arrived in the United States.

Doh eventually made his way to the United States as well. His wife was chosen from a list of refugees to settle in Fort Wayne. One month later, Doh was offered a place to live in Pennsylvania where he attended Montgomery County Community College and studied to earn his criminal justice degree. He recently moved to Fort Wayne to reunite with his wife and hopes to

The Music's in His DNA

Taylor Fredricks has been playing music for more than half his life and has been a part of the local music scene for almost a decade already. Big deal? He's only 21 years

You might say Fredricks had no choice but to become a musician. You might even say it's in his blood. He got his first guitar on his ninth birthday and the rest, as they say, is history.

"My father said he started playing when he was about eight, so I wanted to do the same thing," Fredricks said in a recent interview. "I immediately fell in love with it. I taught myself [to play] and

started writing songs almost immediately."

By the time he was 13, Fredricks began booking his own shows at coffee shops in and around Fort Wayne. "I'd do three to four shows a month at every different coffee shop" that hosted live music, gaining valuable experience and a number of fans in the pro-

But solo shows weren't getting Fredricks where he wanted to be musically. To be able to play shows on bigger stages and in larger venues, he knew he had to find a band to back him. Through friends, networking and Craigslist, Fredricks put together that very band.

"This month is the third anniversary of this band,"

They started big.

"Our first show together was a sold out show at Planet Rock in Battle Creek, opening for Pop Evil and Parabelle. It was amazing. Parabelle's bassist [Chris Giovenco] liked us so much he rode back to Fort Wayne with us after the show. My high school graduation was the next day, and he came to that. Then we drove to Detroit and played a show that night with Parabelle at The Ritz.'

More shows followed, as the band perfected tracks that would eventually become their debut album, ... And Then the Hearts Suffered EP. The EP was released in 2011 and was well received, earning them opening slots for national bands like Hawthorne Heights, Red Jumpsuit Apparatus, Shallow Side and Otto's Daughter, to name a few.

Taylor Fredricks, the band, took part in last year's whatzup/Wooden Nickel Battle of the Bands. Because a lot of their fanbase are under the legal drinking age of 21, the band ended up playing in front of a lot of people who had never heard of them or their music. Armed with a passionate and energetic stage show complete with great songs, Taylor Fredricks won over many new fans while advancing to the quarterfinals before finally being ousted from the contest.

"Battle of the Bands was something new for us. It was definitely a fun experience," Fredricks said. "We loved playing with the other bands and rooting for our friends in Soma, Valhalla and Maria Hill. It's definitely something we want to do again in a few years, when we can get a few more fans over 21 in to vote for us.

After Battle of the Bands, the band added one musician and changed another. "We added my buddy Travis [Kreager] on keys to make the sound fuller, and we have a new bass player in Marcus Fulk," Fredricks



said. "Travis was coming to all of our shows anyway. Then we found out he could play keys a little. He's really stepped up and added a lot to the band."

With the new lineup came a new attitude, new ideas and new music.

"We feel our last EP doesn't do us justice anymore because we've grown and matured as a band," said Fredricks. "We've improved so much and have a different sound now.


To show off that new sound, Taylor Fredricks began recording new music last year. "This time, we got AJ [Becerra] from Sweetwater to help us record it. He has his own studio, called 9:00 Studios, and it is a great place to record."

While the last album was a nice way to introduce themselves to the music scene, Fredricks hopes this album will go a bit further and not only impress current fans, but also capture the attention of new fans and people who can make a bigger difference in their

"We're hoping that because this album sounds so much better than the last one [that], once we send this album out [to labels], we will have a lot better chance of some of them becoming interested in us and signing

On April 12, Taylor Fredricks released that EP, the six-song The Structure of a Mechanical Heart. "We're really happy with the way it came out," Fredricks said. "This album is the next part of our story, which we hope to continue with every album. On the first EP, we broke down the heart; now, with this album, it's being rebuilt. Whereas the first album was a bit negative and relationship-based, this album is more positive. It's about following your dreams and never giving up. There is only one relationship song on this album, a song I wrote years ago that was re-worked to make it sound current. The rest of the songs just inspire you to keep fighting, no matter what the odds or what adversity you face. It's based around the concept of hope, love and life and getting yourself in the mind-set of doing what you need to do to get you where you want to be.'

Catch Taylor Fredricks and his band (Fulk, Harrison Sade, Dylan Jones and Kreager), when they play at Broadripple April 19 and at Wooden Nickel's North Anthony store on Record Store Day the next day at 7:30 p.m. Pick up a CD while you're there, and one day you may be able to say, "I knew them before they got big."

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
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John Hubner

Midwest Son

By now, we've heard several iterations of Warsaw, Indiana's reigning basement indie king: the yearning Rundgrenesque pop from Goodbyewave; the spiky low-and mid-fi energy of Sunnydaymassacre; the more considered and self-contained songwriter presence of the first J. Hubner title, 2010's *Life in Distortion*. The guy is a



veritable pop factory, and his primary source of fuel appears to be vinyl (of the 33-1/3 variety). So, to call the second J. Hubner release, *Midwest Son*, a definitive album may be somewhat premature. I mean, he'll probably have another full-length in the can before I finish this review.

Two things stick out immediately upon dropping the virtual needle onto the figurative wax. First, Hubner has never sounded better. His blend of vintage and modern-indie sonics is adventurous and interesting, but the cool sounds never supersede the songs themselves. No wankery here. The second eye opener is the sheer range he exhibits on *Midwest Son*. From the brash rocker "I Am the Kaiser" to the subdued, Eels-by-way-of-Beatles-evoking "Lost at Sea," the stylistic shifts are impressive - but never forced. Right on the heels of "Lost at Sea" comes another left turn, the 80s-evoking "The Touch," with its groovy bass and echo-laden vocals.

Though part of Hubner's musical charm has always been his ability to conjure different eras and recognizable vibes, the guy has always sounded himself and nothing less. Play "spot the influence" all you want, but you won't hear an artist aping other artists here. Want to mainline prime power pop (complete with priceless "aah" background vocals)? Listen to "The Book Wrote You." Or, check out "Beard of Bees," with its outward calm disrupted by a dizzy funhouse middle eight. Elsewhere, chiming guitars and a vintage piano highlight the stately "The New Americans."

I won't dig too deep into Hubner's motivations and lyrical themes, but suffice it to say that the album's title is reflected, prismlike, throughout its songs. It's a portrait of an artist who is from but not necessarily of his environment. Hubner refuses to become detached, and the result is a batch of songs with warmth and humanity flowing through them. Definitely a Midwestern trait, and one to be proud of. (D.M. Jones)

Chris Good

Beautiful

Ann Arbor-based Chris Good, perhaps better known to soul-pop diehards as the guy from Mutual Kumquat, has assembled something of a Michigan indie all-star band for his solo debut. *Beautiful* won't disappoint MK fans (some MK members appear on the album, in fact); it's still chock-full of



Good's concern for the environment and humanity in general, his innate positivity and his folk-inflected delivery. Whether he's singing about tolerance for everyone in "Beautiful (the Pink Fingernail Song)," self-grown food in "For the Veggies," or, well, ancestry in "For the Ancestors," he's always straight up.

The beauty in Good's art is his directness; you won't find oblique here. No irony. No detachment whatsoever. It's refreshing, and it re-

here. No irony. No detachment whatsoever. It's refreshing, and it reminds us what lies at the core of true folk music: direct communication. "... Ancestors" is also musically gorgeous. Its loping rhythms support a gentle melody, vaguely recalling Paul Simon's *Graceland* work.

The bluegrass-y "For the Veggies," a paean to the joys of homegrown garden food, features impressive mandolin gymnastics and a suitably breakneck tempo. It never once feels rushed or harried, however. Be sure to stick around for the soulful slow-jam turnaround late in the song ("Don't forget that squash/ And the rutabaga"). "... Veggies" shows that even the speediest songs here sound relaxed and fun.

On the other hand, "Humble Down" might at first come off as a generic societal complaint. "Seems like everyone's got a corner on

Talking Heads

More Songs About Buildings and Food (1978)

The second album from the Talking Heads was a little more adventurous than their first release, as producer Brian Eno incorporated more of a poppy beat sound into the band's previously organic, alternative vibe. It opens with the upbeat "Thank You for Sending Me an Angel" and the rapid arrangements and vocals of the genius that is David Byrne.



"With Our Love" follows, and you are served up a delightful scratchy guitar from guitarist Jerry Harrison. "The Good Thing" completes the first third of the record, complete with the dependable, blue-collar backing vocals from the rest of this incredible band. "Warning Sign" has more of the traditional Heads sound to it. Byrne creates a melody with his voice, and the rest of the band keeps up the almost psychedelic/jazz/funk beat.

"Found a Job" is one of my favorite songs from the Heads. Again, groovy guitars steer the song about reality television 25 years before it ever happened. "Artists Only" is a snapshot of the future Talking Heads sound. It's preppy art-rock, and the strong bass work from Tina Weymouth makes it one of the craftiest songs on the release. The lyrics aren't noteworthy, however; it could have been an instrumental.

"I'm not in Love" and "Stay Hungry" keep up the frenzied pace of the album before it shifts downward into "Take Me to the River." Written by Al Green in 1974, it is probably their most recognizable song (along with "Burning Down the House") to the casual fan. The record closes with "The Big Country," a track that blends a country & western sound with the angst of modern rock.

Like all Talking Heads releases, there are no fillers on *More Songs About Buildings and Food*. I still think they are one of the greatest bands of all time. (*Dennis Donahue*)

the truth/ So quick to judge, so quick to choose," sings Good over a laid-back reggae groove. But, he's looking for a solution. Hammond organ and horn embellishments add musical heft to a tune that appeals to our better angels, but is never didactic or preachy. Ultimately, Good turns the mirror onto himself and vows, "I'm gonna live this life with humility."

The wide-eyed "Come with Me" is an unabashedly open-armed love song. Sings Good: "Tumbling through this life with you is so beautiful." I mean, really, if you're going to use the word "soulshine" in a song (as he does here), you'd better be completely committed. And he is. It's a beautiful way to be. (D.M. Jones)

"Remember What Brought Us Here" comes bolting out of the speakers with buzzes, hisses and the sound of synths bubbling underneath. Pretty soon a loping drum beat comes in along with Cole Furlow's vocals swathed in some of that lofing goodness that so many kids love these days. *Dead Gaze* sounds like Grandaddy turned



up to 11, Sonics busting at the seams, churning in a pool of static and melancholy. It's a catchy noise, as if Dinosaur Jr. and Dent May decided to collaborate on some drunken Friday night.

Dead Gaze is Furlow's pet project that he recently turned into a real band, with real people that play with him. But for the studio, only Furlow's imagination and penchant for frayed-at-the-end pop hooks are needed.

"You'll Carry On Real Nice" is a pop rock stomper that Teenage Fanclub might've recorded way back when, with Ty Segall covering it inside a giant coffee can. "This Big World" sounds like ELO, The Pixies and a dirty tape head that had a head-on collision inside Lou

Barlow's skull. Bleach-era Nirvana might've liked this song, too. "Future Loves and Sing Abouts" once again has that recorded-in-a-can vocal thing happening, with the music being a cross between Panda Bear and Yuck.

"Glory Days for Sure" is damn near jarring. After so much analog-y fuzz and slight disorientation comes this cleaned-up, Cure-ish track that sounds like it was transported from another time and mixtape. Its light synth textures and slapback-echoed drums give the track a dreamy quality. It's a very cool track and a sound Furlow should revisit more often. I was reminded of the great Icelandic band Tilbury as I sat listening to it intently. But soon enough, "Back and Forth" return us to the gritty pop goodness that permeates this album.

Furlow, like other fractured pop purveyors of the past (Jason Lytle and Mark Linkous come to mind), is a pop songwriter when push comes to shove. He would've fit right in with the Elephant Six Collective back in the early 90s. But seeing as it's 2013, he's taking those great pop songs that are falling out of his head and lathering them up with a bit of lo-fi, gritty garage rock goodness. "Take Me Home or I Die Alone" sounds like The Polyphonic Spree without the caffeine and slick production. It's pop music's reflection in a dirty mirror. "Fishing With Robert" is the kind of song that once you hear it you wish you had written it. Who's Robert? Pollard? Smith? Redford? Who knows, but I want to be on that boat.

Dead Gaze is a great and scuzzy little band from Mississippi. *Dead Gaze* is a great and scuzzy little album, filled with enough pop nuggets and lo-fi goodness to make fans of Guided By Voices, Sebadoh and Dr. Dog alike giddy with delight. Add Grandaddy, Yuck and Dent May to the mix, and you have something reminiscent of something else. Familiar, yet new. Broken? No, just broken in. (*John Hubner*)

Specter At The Feast

"Fire Walker" opens quietly. It's like opening a long forgotten book and beginning what would be many incredible chapters. "Fire Walker" is the opening sentence to a band's reawakening. Robert Levon



Been doesn't come out swinging, but swaying ever so lightly. Tension and sadness permeate his voice as he sings lines like "Your soul was only yours to keep / It's

buried in me now / A bullet from the shell it leaves / It strips it to the ground." The song never gets above a masterful solemnity, and that's how *Specter At The Feast* begins a new chapter for Black Rebel Motorcycle Club, one of their best albums in years.

Then comes the rock. That familiar fuzzy bass, the straining guitar squalls and the tribal drums return in full bombastic form on "Let The Day Begin," an instant BRMC classic. It encapsulates all the things BRMC have used to build their sound since forming in 1998: tension, gutter grime and a fist-pumping bravado. At the heart of this leather-clad group, there is a straight-up rock n' roll band that wants nothing more than to fill an arena with fans screaming at the top of their lungs and singing along. They're the U2 of the black leather jacket union. They're the saviors of the freaks and geeks.

A song like "Returning" is a scratched and bleeding open hug for the disenfranchised. "Lullaby" has the feel of a lost classic. Been has never sounded this earnest and, well, lovely. The death of Been's dad in 2010 supplied *Specter At The Feast* an ample amount of heartache and reflection that, for good or bad, has never been so present on any previous BRMC album. "Returning," "Lullaby," "Some Kind of Ghost" and "Sometimes the Light" bring an air of remorse, introspection and ultimately redemption to this record.

There's also still plenty of fire and grime in tracks like "Hate the Taste," "Rival" and the excellently Jesus and Mary Chain-like "Teenage Disease," one of the best rock n' roll screeches you're likely to hear this year. I hear a song like "Teenage Disease" and I can't help but be reminded of New York by way of Detroit punk metal rockers Warrior Soul. Though only prominent for maybe a five-year span, Warrior Soul's Korey Clarke had a voice that sounded battered, bruised and bloody, yet still retained soul and power that kept you enthralled. Been has that same ability. Check out 1991's *Drugs, God and the New Republic* for proof of Warrior Soul's short-but-sweet moment of rock n' roll glory. *Specter At The Feast*'s closer "Lose Yourself" is a long and bittersweet goodbye, with a melancholy sound that hints at early British band Straitjacket Fits.

After a mid-2000s lull with albums like *Howl*, *Baby 81* and the straight up bizarre *The Effects of 333*, Black Rebel Motorcycle Club seemed to be on the road to healing with 2010's *Beat the Devil's Tattoo*. With *Specter At The Feast*, BRMC have proven to us once again they are one of the best rock n' roll bands working today. Been has also proven the best way to healing is through songs. This is a raucous rock n' roll comeback and a bittersweet goodbye. The best kind of album. (*John Hubner*)



In addition, said Agen, "Fresh Ben will be DJ-ing all day, and we will make a valiant attempt to play all of Zaireeka," the Flaming Lips album that requires four discs to be played simultaneously in order to be enjoyed as intended. Neat Neat Neat will also be giving away Music Hall USB1 turntable which normally retails for \$249.99.

Wooden Nickel Music, with three locations, tries to top their previous Record Store Day celebrations by adding a few surprises each year. First, owner Roets says he is buying as many Record Store Day titles as he can, and the product will be spread out among his three stores, primarily at the North Anthony location, Wooden Nickel's main outlet for vinyl (see cover photo).

Second, says Roets, the three locations will stagger their openings this year, with the North Anthony location opening at 8 a.m., the Clinton Street store opening at 9 a.m. and the Times Corners location opening at their regularly scheduled 10 a.m.

"This will give everyone a better opportunity to get the Record Store Day titles they are looking to buy," said Roets. "If we run out of a title at one store, they can go to the next location and try to find it there.

Third, in honor of Wooden Nickel's 31st anniversary, the first 31 people who purchase three or more Record Store Day titles will receive an envelope containing a \$10, \$20 or \$100 gift certificate good for future purchases.

Last year, without an incentive to get in line early, over 140 people were in line when the North Anthony store opened, according to Roets.

In addition, Wooden Nickel will host 20 local band performances at the North Anthony location, including performances from a reunited Casket Sharp, perennial city favorites John Minton and Sunny Taylor, all four 2012 Battle of the Bands finalists and 13 others. Wooden Nickel will have at least 600 free goodie bags available to patrons, will give away a signed All That Remains Gibson guitar and skateboard, an additional \$200 Wooden Nickel gift certificate, a complete Beatles Recordings box set worth \$379, a USB turntable, a Led Zeppelin CD box set and a Jimi Hendrix Experience four-CD box wet. If that's not enough, \$5 from the sale of all Wooden Nickel T-Shirts, including a new tie-dye design, and the limited edition Rush Record Store Day T-Shirt will go to Community Harvest Food Bank.

Whether you're a collector, audiophile, music junkie or casual listener, there should be something about Record Store Day that appeals to you. With a number of local performances and giveaways and hundreds of opportunities to talk music with people of the music community, this is the day we all look forward to with great anticipation each year. The celebration of music. Can it get any better than that?



Janiva Magness is a singer of raw power, emotional complexity and seemingly unimaginable technical ability. She can sing just about anything. While Magness soulfully knocks it out of the park when she performs her originals, she has also made quite the name for herself with her blues and soul covers. Perhaps one of

This won't be just any show; it will be an experience. This performance at C2G is one you'd assuredly regret passing up.

anything was a place to skate in the winter. I also learned that it cost the city a ton of money because they were having to police all these skateboarders in parking garages. Why skate in parking garages? Because the skate park doesn't have a roof and there was no where else to skate in the winter."

Manco learned that there were, in fact, a few Lawton Park regulars who had petitioned the city to put an awning - like the one at Headwater's Park - over Lawton Park. The city, currently sitting on a financial excess, clearly has the money but, as Manco suggests, skaters probably don't rank very high on the city's priority list.

"I don't think the city has anything against skaters but I also don't think [skaters] are as lovable as all these other causes. So I said, 'Do you guys really think we're going to get this awning from the city?' I wanted them to be hopeful, but I also wanted them to be realistic, and part of being realistic is asking, 'What if this doesn't happen?' I told them that I thought they had everything they needed to make it happen on their own.

And so Manco and the Lawton skate community started to organize. Different people took on different roles and, most importantly, there was an energy there. A positive one with a very obtainable goal.

"First, we needed a location. A big location. So we start looking at what it would cost – maybe \$30,000 a year for rent to do this on our own. So I told them to write the city and also try on their own. So we did both. We organized fundraisers and, in the course of just a year, we made about \$20,000, enough to get us going and get them out of the parking ga-

So, through Manco's The Framework, they secured their locations and went to work. Within just two weeks the skaters had built a DIY skatepark in their new building

"It was just like Field of Dreams, and you can quote me on that. 'If you build it, they will come.' It felt like it was overnight. All of the sudden there are these 100 kids showing up. They trusted what we did. And we've transformed this joint into this nice, amazing, DIY place. And we've not

had any behavioral problems. We've never had to call the cops. We never had to kick a kid out for violence or drugs. It's proof to me that this community, that people kind of disregard, has all the ingredients necessary to give themselves what they want, what they need to thrive."

Manco believes that all the positive changes aren't because of The Framework or himself. He believes that when a community becomes healthy, as the local skate community has, it thrives. But what was next?

"Well, we realized that, hey, look what we can do. We just opened an indoor skate park. And we've gained so much credibility from everyone that people are coming regularly from all over because we're the real deal. People come here because we're DIY - by skaters, for skaters. People from all over. So this fundraiser is these guys saying, 'What else can we do?' They wanted to get some

pros to come, so I said 'You should! Why wouldn't you do that?' They had these dreams that they were no longer afraid to pursue, so they started contacting Mike V about it, telling him what they did with the park."

Mike V, aka Mike Vallely, who has been considered one of the best skaters in the world for almost 20 years, is one of the most interesting figures in the skate world. He's worked as a stuntman, an actor, a musician, a professional wrestler, a hockey player and an actor. He even has a video game out. In a phrase, he's a living legend.

"You'll probably find more Mike V fight videos on You-Tube than you will Mike V charity events, but this is the guy they wanted. They picked someone, and they went to work on trying to get him. These kids are constantly learning



the power that is obtained when they work together, keep their noses clean and self-actualize. They take care of their own. This park, it's run by skaters. I run the not-for-profit that runs the park, but the actual park is run by skaters who volunteer. There's a guy named Jake Curtis who puts 40 or 50 hours in a week to keep this thing going, all unpaid."

After months of trying, the New Republic skaters finally get somewhere with Mike V, who promises to come to town with his band, Good For You (a duo project featuring legendary Black Flag founder Greg Ginn), who are currently touring in support of their debut record, Life is Too Short Not to Hold a Grudge.

"They've agreed to play a show and help us raise funds that will help us make it through the lean times in the summer. When the weather is

nice out, the skaters aren't going to pay the three bucks to get in to skate when they can go outside. So this event is all about getting us through the summer."

The journey leading up to the Good For You show has been a long, exciting one for all those involved. While to most, the highlight of such a story is the skating, to Manco. it's the community growth that shines brightest.

"Community is all about solutions. So though it took a big investment of time and energy to build the trust, it's what we needed. To work with that culture, you have to work within that culture, and these kids are learning that to get to where you want to be there are certain hoops you have to jump through – not because the man tells you to but because you decide to do that on your own in order to get to where you're going. All they needed was some direction.'

More Than Just a Cup of Coffee

If you've lived in Fort Wayne for even a short period of time, you've undoubtedly heard of Old Crown Coffee Roasters. Founded in 1999 by husband and wife team Mike and Jennifer Woodruff, it offers arguably the best locally roasted coffee you can find. The Woodruffs took a leap of faith before coffeehouses were even a thing and before people began to cultivate a more sophisticated palate for coffee. They started small, experimenting and roasting their own beans. Soon they started to understand the nuances of different beans and roasting techniques and expanded beyond sharing with their family and friends. They opened up shop and made their dream a reality.

Now located in the quaint North Anthony business corridor, Old Crown has become more than just a coffeehouse, serving baked goods and a café-style menu during the week. It also has an extensive beer and wine list and full bar service. The inside is adorned in warm colors and eclectic art, making it a great place to meet with friends for a cup of coffee or a quick lunch, and with free Wi-

Fi, it's a great place for business meetings, as well.

In 2011 Old Crown began offering a special dinner menu on Friday evenings from 6 to 9 p.m. The menu changes each week and always features one or two appetizers, four main dishes and a dessert, as well as suggested wine and beer pairings. Chef Johnny Bojinoff designs the week's menu and posts it to the company's Facebook page a few days ahead of time. Part of the fun is not knowing what will be served visit after visit. We've been there several times and have never been disappointed. There are a few things you can count on. The menu always includes a vegetarian option, a fish dish, a cast iron chicken and a beef entrée, and items are always prepared with the freshest available ingredients and sourced locally as often as

My favorite menu was featured last summer and included Grilled Celery Soup and Chopped Butter Lettuce with Bleu Cheese, served with avocado, rad-

ish, tomato, croutons and buttermilk dressing. Main courses included Raspberry Ginger Root Glace Halibut, Cuban Beef Pot Roast, Double Teriyaki Grilled Cast Iron Chicken and Vegetarian Black Bean Loaf, and for dessert, a Raspberry/Banana/Orange Sorbet

Every meal is served with warm rustic potato

rosemary bread with Indiana maple syrup and whipped butter. It takes every ounce of willpower not to devour the entire basket of this deliciously fresh bread.

Perhaps even better than the culinary experience is the neighborhood experience. Almost ev-

eryone in the place lives in the 46805 neighborhood, and there's an under-

current of pride that ema-

nates from each table as neighbors greet neighbors and rave about the wonderful food being served. That's not to say you can't enjoy the food and the company if you live in another part of town. In fact, those of us who live in this neighborhood want as many people to know about this community gem as possible. It's doing wonders for the North Anthony business corridor, and we want it to stick around for a long time.

earn a position as a police officer.

Doh's work as an artist is just as impressive as his mentor's but, unfortunately, not as appreciated. His talent is still undiscovered. Doh represented himself with one portrait in a recent Wunderkammer show, but he was shyly discreet at the event. Doh explained to me, "I thought no one liked my work. I was embarrassed." I, on the other hand, witnessed people at the show stepping close to the frame and remarking in surprise, "That's a drawing!" after first assuming the piece was a photograph.

Perhaps his work was too good. Perhaps most viewers casually walked past thinking the piece was captured with the tap of a finger on a camera rather than with hours of work with a brush and a small pile of powdered charcoal.

Part of this confusion may stem from the fact that Doh draws from photographs. He uses photos of Bur-

mese dressed in traditional costumes as reference to capture his culture. He wants to preserve his heritage and share his traditions with the rest of the world.

Doh's skill level places him on the same shelf as highly successful artists. His humble personality doesn't allow him to agree with praise. Doh considers himself a hobbiest. "I see myself as someone who loves art. I do not see myself as an artist. I believe every artist has his own style. It doesn't matter what type of art. I respect everyone. I can feel the art."

Doh doesn't see the creation of art as part of his future. He loves to draw, but can't see how the practice can help him earn a living. Doh is anxious to work as a police officer, but with no immediate prospects of a new academy class being hired, Doh funnels his skills into working as an interpreter. Like most refugees, he is focused on earning enough money to support a meager lifestyle. He works hard and finds little time to draw, but is open to doing portrait work on commission. Doh doesn't realize the potential that is held in his brush. "Most of my art I just give away to people. Once I threw a lot of my portraits away and a lady picked them out of the garbage," he said.

Doh is a man of great talent who carries with him the story of a full life. As a young man who has already overcome great obstacles, one can't help but wonder how the future chapters in his life will read. Perhaps the pages will be wordless, with his story captured by detailed smudges and highlights rendered in charcoal directed by years of practice, patience and passion.









While we're on the topic of smart devices at shows, since you're not taking pictures or video anymore, don't think that gives you license to dial up the person at home who is too lazy, too broke or too lame to actually come to the show and broadcast the entire show to them. Not even one song. Don't do it. Don't hold the phone up in the air so they can hear their favorite song better. The concert is 115 decibels. You won't get a better sound by holding the phone over your head right in my view. The better idea is to call your friend and tell them to turn off American Idol, get off the couch and get their butt to the show. Once again, the best way to enjoy music is to experience it. Don't try to live vicariously through your friend's cellphone. That's a life lesson all of us can use.



Lots to Cheer About for Baseball Fans and Non-Fans Alike

Great screenwriters layer in bits of dialogue that fit the stories they are telling that are accurate in the moment and suggestive of the bigger picture of the story. Brian Helgeland, a great screenwriter who won an Oscar for his screenplay for the dazzling L.A. Confidential (and a Razzie the same year for The *Postman*), does this in his new film, 42.

Sometimes I'm sure cherished bits of dialogue end up not making it into the final cut of the film. In 42 Helgeland has the advantage that he is also the director of his own screenplay in this inspiring portrait of Jackie

Early in the movie a young fan is watching a baseball game with his mom. Jackie Robinson, who has been signed by Branch Rickey to join the Brooklyn Dodgers franchise, is playing for the team's minor league franchise based in Montreal. Jackie is driving the pitcher crazy. He's stolen two bases. Then the pitcher commits a balk, and Jackie gets to walk home. Mom doesn't understand what has happened. "He discombobulated the man!" the little boy shouts.

Yes he did. Jackie Robinson discombobulated baseball, the country and the man. 42 tells just a tiny slice of his life, but it is a crucial slice. Helgeland gives us a brief look at Jackie playing shortstop for the Kansas City Monarchs in the Negro league, and he compresses a lot of detail about Jackie's life up to that moment when Branch Rickey, the president and general manager of the Brooklyn Dodgers, is reviewing the files on many African-American players.

Rickey is looking for just the right player to bring in to white baseball, and Jackie Robinson has the perfect stats. He's young and talented. He was a commissioned Army officer. He attended UCLA where he lettered in four sports: basketball, football, track and baseball. He also played tennis. Rickey also likes him because they are both Methodists. Though he quotes Scripture a few times, it is hard to imagine Rickey actually went to church.

Most of 42 takes place during Jackie's rookie year, 1947. To baseball fans, the story is familiar. But even if you are a devoted baseball aficionado, I can't imagine you wouldn't find 42 well worth your time. I go to baseball games, but I'm not a fan with a head filled with stats. 42 will probably be most enjoyed by folks like me. And it is and ever will be a "must see" for young people learning about racism in our country. And that should be all young people. This story didn't happen that long ago.

Chadwick Boseman gives a breakthrough performance as Jackie Robinson. He looks more than a little like Robinson, and he knocks it out of the park. (I couldn't resist.) Perhaps I've seen him in a small role somewhere, but he'll be playing larger roles from now on. It can't be easy to play such an iconic figure. He hits just the right notes, expressing anger, restraint, passion and joy as needed, and the ride Robinson is on calls

Harrison Ford plays Branch Rickey. He's chewing the scenery a bit, but it seems appropriate for the kind of character Rickey was. He's actually acting, not just yelling or playing some variation of a cowboy.

Ford says he didn't know anything about



Rickey before taking on the role. He just loved the way the part was written. I took to the internet after seeing 42, and reading about many of the characters in the film just made me appreciate the movie more.

I was especially pleased to learn that the exchange between Robinson and Rickey in which Robinson asks, "Are you looking for a Negro who is afraid to fight back?" to which Rickey responds that he's looking for a Negro player "with guts enough not to fight back," is an exchange that actually took place.

What 42 does very well is chronicle the racist attitudes up and down the spectrum and across the country. I'm sure 42 could have been an angrier and more explicit portrait of racism, but the film doesn't duck the

The list of people who didn't want a black man in white baseball includes just about everyone. We see Jackie harassed by the police, by fans, by hotel managers, by park managers, by other players on other teams and by his own team.

Robinson gets spiked running bases. Pitchers fire balls at his head. He is taunted nearly constantly from the stands and the rival bench.

Yes, the "n" word is said fairly often. Alan Tudyk is especially good in an awful, authentic way as Ben Chapman, the manager of the Philadelphia Phillies.

Yes, the South is harsher than the North. When Rachel Robinson (Nicole Beharie) sees her first "Whites Only" sign on a bathroom, it stops her in her tracks. Life wasn't exactly equal in California, but the racism wasn't as overt. And though there are many black fans in the stands in Brooklyn, there is also plenty of name calling.

When Robinson walks into the locker room for the first time, they don't even have a locker for him. Only pitcher Ralph Branca (Hamish Linklater) will shake his hand. Many players are signing a letter that they won't play if he's on the team. But gradually. as they see that Robinson can play and he won't go away, they start to change. You can see them grow increasingly embarrassed, if nothing more, about what he has to endure.

We see Pee Wee Reese (Lucas Black) put his arm around Robinson on the field before a game in Cincinnati, a particularly racist environment. The white folks, except for Rickey, aren't presented as too important, but they are everywhere. Christopher Meloni gets to have some fun as Leo Durocher. John C. McGinley has even more fun playing sportscaster Red Barber.

Robinson helps the Dodgers win. He starts bringing in tons of fans. 42 reminds viewers often that money is an important part of the calculation.

42 looks great, a kind of saturated color suggesting a tad of nostalgia, a bit like L.A. Confidential. The score gets in the way a few times. But 42 stays focused on Jackie Robinson and gives audiences plenty to cheer.

magically transforms into a woman. Ruhl was only 22 when she tackled Woolf's classic which has been called "literature's longest love letter." Woolf wrote Orlando in 1928 for her lover, Vita Sackville-West. Both were feminists and bisexual, facts which Ruhl's amusing script toys with by having most of the actors shift at one time or another from male to female and back again. Often it is clothes that make the man or maid, although in a few instances posture and vocal pitch signal the gender. The script even refers to these shifts.







will admit to a bit of partisanship in this column. During my administrative tenure at IPFW, I worked for three years on an event called Tapestry. While the annual day of fun began fairly modestly in 2002, hosting a few hundred women in IPFW's Walb Ballroom, it quickly began to outgrow its home on campus. 
Malick's Abstract, Epic Movie/Poem

Starring Bond girl Olga Kurylenko, Oscar-winning psycho killer Javier Bardem, The Notebook babe Rachel McAdams and Hollywood prom king Ben Affleck, To the Wonder - directed by quiet guy Terrence Malick (Badlands, Days of Heaven, The Tree of Life, etc.) – is a movie unlike any I've seen in my 33 years. It features some of the biggest names in Hollywood as on-screen talent yet gives those actors very little to say or do. The movie plays through like an abstract puzzle or a poem, Malick's reflections, memories and ideas about the place of love and romance spilling onto the screen via some of the year's most elegant cinematography and editing.

Increasingly known for his startlingly original and uncompromisingly artistic voice, Malick has become a new breed of director over the last decade. Once a filmmaker who would write perfect scripts and laboriously chip away at his notably poetic edits, he has as of late been taking his voice and his art to a different place. And in that place he shoots with no script, no lights and, we assume, no hard plans. His actors are his pawns and his camera his king. The queen? Well, I suppose you could convincingly suggest that it's Malick's world view that has become the centerpiece of his recent work, his films feeling like abstract life theories drenched in months of golden hour shooting and all-night editing sessions.

While on set for To the Wonder, Malick's many great actors never quite knew what they were mak-

(who supposedly whispers his direction into his actor's ears) cast not just the above-mentioned heavy hitters, but also Jessica Chastain, Rachel Weisz, Amanda Peet, Barry Pepper, Michael Sheen and many others, all of whom were cut from the final edit. Affleck, who was cast as the runaway lead around whom Malick intended to build his film, saw his role nearly diminished in the editing room, his performance cut down to a practically mute secondary slot behind Kurylenko, an equally powerful and intelligent Ukranian beauty who here acts as Malick's first-ever muse. She plays a once-happy Pariasan lover to Affleck's always-distant American stud. As the movie's 113 minutes float past, we see Marina's life and happiness defined – as whimsically portrayed by Kurylenko – by the wide ranging degrees of passion she shares with Affleck. Along the way, Affleck also briefly falls for McAdams' Jane, a character whose role feels too big to ignore yet too small to digest. One point of showing these fragments of relationships is to, I think, put on screen the most

and each one held a glass of wine in her right hand. They weren't exactly alike; one woman held a cell phone in her left hand, the other a garden hose. Clearly, the former was supposed to look sophisticated, the latter whimsical. Also clear was the assumption that we were supposed to care what these memoir-writing women had to say, and from the similarities in the cover photos, it looked as though that was probably pretty much the same thing. I was intrigued, and I decided I had to sort

it out. The cell-phone woman is Brandi Glanville, and her memoir is called Drinking & Tweeting. Brandi, in case you're like me and didn't know, is famous because she was on the reality TV show The Real Housewives of Beverly Hills because she was married to a soap opera actor. She has since split from the actor because he had an affair with LeAnn Rimes. Brandi really, really hates LeAnn Rimes; she makes that very clear via the nasty things she writes about Rimes, including vicious commentary on the singer's career, allegedly enhanced teeth and

McDonald writes for and appears on Chelsea Lately, the TV talk show hosted by Chelsea Handler. McDonald claims to

want to be a celebrity like Glanville, but what she really does is write jokes about being an irreverent wife and mother who's trying to negotiate the craziness of living in Hollywood. There are big differences between her book and Glanville's, and the

superficial similarities

are unfortunate.

Some of the most important differences are: Glanville's book was actually written by someone named Leslie Bruce, and although it has wide line spacing, it doesn't have any pictures. McDonald's book appears to have been written by McDonald herself, and there are many more words in it than there are in Glanville's book. There are also - bonus! - pictures in McDonald's book, but they are small, black-and-white and infre-

The two books do offer some common lessons, however. First of all, Hollywood is a cray-zay place! Second, it's fun to be trashy. Third. it's not easy to achieve celebrity status, it's not easy to hold on to it once you have it and, just when you think you're a celebrity, you might find out you're not that big of a deal after all. When that happens, you have a couple of choices: you can work even harder to keep yourself on top, or you can relax and have fun with it. You're going to have to read the books to find out which approach these women decide to take.

My favorite is when teenaged Orlando sees and falls for the beautiful skater Sasha, played with elegant reserve by Kearstyn Keller, and then he must struggle to figure out if that is a man or woman.

Heather Moser plays Orlando well. Off stage and in previous roles, her look is not androgynous, so it is all the greater tribute to Moser's acting chops that, as the lad Orlando who is swept up into aged Queen Elizabeth I's court, Heather gets into the boisterous swagger quickly and is easily believable as a "son" for the queen's old age. Later, when Orlando awakens as a woman, there is a minute or two where one can wonder why that boy is parading around in that big dress. Oh, yeah. He's Heather!

The men get to have most of the fun in this script. Colin English as Queen Elizabeth I is at once hilarious and sensitive in his portrayal of the powerful queen who is smitten by Orlando's shapely legs. Jacob Slone's Archduchess/Archduke nearly steals the show with his giggle and ogling in either gender, and Brady Schrock's dashing horseman is beautifully handsome. Chase Francis is gently charming as the ship captain for Orlando's first trip as a woman. Darby Mullen LeClear's talent for dialects and beautiful singing voice are put to good use, and Hannah Vandell and Carly Thompson are quite capable in smaller roles.

Jeanne Pendleton's costume designs have been meticulously executed by the costume team. Sasha's sumptuous fitted-and-flared red cape and white pants, the starched collar of the Queen's dress and the brown hunting gown of the Archduchess are all exquisite. Eric Smead's court and carnival dance choreography is light and pleasant.

The minimalist set and lighting design of Mark Ridgeway succeed at easy versatility as the story sweeps from the 16th century to the present day, from the court to the frozen to Constatinople to a country house. Wafting cloth plays a role in some scenes to set the scene or mood. Casazza also has provided the sound design (listen for the skating sounds) and Corey Lee is credited with some witty projection design. Stage Manager Halee Bandt and assistants Amanda Simpkins and Nathan Garner take turns at roles behind the scenes, and at least 16 others have labored for weeks not only behind, but also in front and around the scenes, having built the sets.

true and subtextual look at heartbreak and loneliness you'll find at the big-box cinemas. The real goal, I believe, was simply to make something unique, memorable and beautiful – which Malick pulls off with an artistic grace we rarely see on film these days.

As tempted as I am to suggest that To the Wonder is Terrence Malick's first non-classic work as a director (it is, in fact, a universally defiant work), I get the feeling that the movie hasn't had its way with me just yet. Yes, it's a beautiful looking picture. Yes, it has an abundance of style and is deeply buried in subtext. Yes, I greatly appreciate Malick's freewheeling approach to the production of his film. And yes, it's an absolute one-of-a-kind work. But what do these things mean? How much do they count for? Does the calm-yet-striking originality of the picture work in a manner beyond symbolism?

I still can't say. What I do know is that Malick has long been a challenging, original voice in the cinema world, and with To the Wonder he has become a true blue art house poet, the very rare breed of moviemaker with ability to go places no one has gone before, even when it feels risky. To the Wonder proves, if it were ever up for debate, that Malick has the ability to make movies that challenge, enlighten, teach, influence, push and pull.

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
