

----- Feature • Fort Wayne Philharmonic Pops------Rolling Symphonically

In the early days of rock n' roll, performers from Elvis to the Beatles were viewed with suspicion by the older generation while lauded by youngsters who were looking for something less staid than they saw in their parents' music. For many years, classical music and rock music were seen as polar opposites, invoking devotion in their own camps and derision from the other. But as the years have gone by, such generational gaps have become much less prevalent, and in fact, many classical musicians came of age during the heyday of rock music while baby boomers have come to appreciate the classics along with the music of their generation.

It isn't surprising then that the Fort Wayne Philharmonic Pops performances, which help to merge those different musical approaches for the benefit of an increasingly eclectic audience, have become incredibly popular. In fact, rock music as performed by symphony orchestras has become a regular feature of many philharmonic schedules in recent years, and this season the Fort Wayne Phil has proven that point by scheduling Satisfaction, a band which pays homage to the music of the Rolling Stones.

The timing of this event is particularly apropos, given the current 50th anniversary celebration the Stones themselves are touting with a book and summer tour. While many bands have found themselves connected to symphony orchestras over the years, it does seem a little ironic that the Stones would now be part of that movement.

"The Stones were always the bad boys of rock n' roll, always so rebellious, so coupling that with a symphony does seem con-tradictory," says Chris LeGrand, executive producer of Satisfaction. "But so many of their songs lend themselves so well to an orchestra. 'Gimme Shelter' is a great example of a song that is so epic already, and it has this apocalyptic sound which is phenomenal when set against an orchestra.'

LeGrand, who also performs with Satisfaction as Mick Jagger, first conceived of these orchestral performances two years ago, 10 years after Satisfaction first began playing around the world in tribute to the Rolling Stones.

"It really started because I began listening to symphonic versions of the Rolling Stones music, picking up various CDs in search of some music to play during our introduction that would create a dramatic effect. We started using some mash-up versions of these orchestral tracks, and I started to realize that the music really translates so well to orchestral arrangements. It was such a fluke thing that I came upon this idea from listening to those CDs."

In some ways LeGrand's original conception of Satisfaction is also a bit of a fluke. The Texas native says he first had to come to terms with some obvious realities before he felt comfortable stepping into the famed persona of Jagger.

"I always tell people I have been both blessed and cursed with these looks," he says about his obvious likeness to Jagger. "I would hear about it all the time, but as a 15-year-old I brushed off comparisons because I wanted to be my own guy and do my own thing. I was playing music and wanted to establish myself but was struggling when I was in my 20s. Eventually I decided to retire from music, and I got married, had a family. When I decided I wanted to come back to music, I started seeing all of these tribute shows going on. There were a lot of tributes to the Beatles. but I wasn't seeing any tribute bands

for the Rolling Stones. This was in the late 90s, and it's hard to believe now. but the internet was just becoming part of our lives, and I researched to find any Stones tributes out there. Short of a few bar bands, there were no groups that actually toured the country playing the music of the Rolling Stones. So I figured I have these looks, I could sing these songs and I could really pull this off. So in my middle-age I stumbled upon the most


successful thing I've ever done. I really wish I had thought of this 10 to 15 years earlier."

Although he has learned to invoke the Jagger accent, LeGrand himself speaks with a soft Texan drawl, but he notes how appropriate it is for an American from the South to be tackling the music of the Rolling Stones.

"I grew up not far from Austin and the Mississippi Delta area, and if you listen to early Stones records, that was the music that was really inspiring what the Stones were doing themselves. They were really trying to sound Southern and black, so I guess it's sort of funny that now I'm trying to make myself sound British to capture that sound. It does come in handy though when we play some of their country songs."

LeGrand isn't content to rest on his laurels and continues to look for ways to expand

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----- Feature • Rock of Ages -----**Broadway for Rock n' Rollers**

Through its long and storied history, musical theatre has provided a form of entertainment unlike anything else. For many years Broadway musicals informed the popular music charts and Hollywood blockbusters, making names like Rodgers & Hammerstein, Lerner & Lowe and Kander & Ebb household names and songs from "Shall We

Dance" to "New York, New York" ubiquitous classics. But times change; the musical form became somewhat less mainstream, falling into a stereotype of improbable song and dance numbers that struck new generations as decidedly uncool.

In the last decade or two, however, the musical has made a definite comeback as a Hollywood genre, bringing films like Chicago and Mamma Mia to folks who may not be able to catch the shows on the New York

stage. One reason musicals have made a comeback is that they have started reflecting trends instead of necessarily trying to start them. Popular films like Footloose and even cult favorites

like Once have been turned into Broadway hits, reversing the old system of Broadway to Hollywood. Perhaps even more remarkably, pop music has been turned into musical theatre monsters, with the aforementioned Mamma Mia only one example of how popular music has been adapted to fit a laterpenned narrative.

One of the most successful examples of this new trend is Rock of Ages, the homage to the music of the 1980s, which found huge audiences on Broadway before becoming a 2012 film starring Tom Cruise and Julianne Hough. The show - using the music of iconic rock bands like Journey, Starship, Styx, For-eigner, REO Speedwagon and Whitesnake, as well as solo artists of the day like Pat Benatar - has lured new, oftentimes reluctant audiences into theatres. Danny McHugh, who visits Fort Wayne's Embassy Theatre in a production of Rock of Ages, says he often hears that very story from people.

"When we talk to people after the show, we hear all the time that this is the first mu-

----- Feature • Willie Nelson -----**Country's Main Man**

At age 80, Willie Nelson has had a long and storied career with its share of trials along with triumphs. He has amassed a staggering catalog of over 100 albums and sold more than 50 million copies of them. He has written songs for classic artists like Patsy Cline ("Crazy") that have gone on to become standards and recorded duets with luminaries ranging from Merle Haggard and Waylon Jennings to Elvis Costello and Neil Young. Along with the success have come some very public struggles, the most significant of which came in 1990 when the IRS informed him that he owed \$32 million in back taxes as a result of his use of tax shelters.

For someone who eventually became an icon of country music and popular culture in general, Nelson struggled for many years before he achieved his solo success. A songwriter from an early age (he reportedly penned his first song at the age of seven), Nelson spent most of the 1960s writing hits for other artists and struggling to launch his career as a solo artist. It wasn't until he aligned himself with the burgeoning outlaw country music wave in the 70s that he began

to emerge as a solo artist.

Nelson's true breakthrough moment didn't come until 1975 with the release of The Red Headed Stranger, a remarkably spare concept album about a preacher on the run after committing murder. That album is one of the most unlikely success stories in the history of country

music, being an unusual and demanding listen, which nonetheless went on to blockbuster status perhaps in part because it was so distinctive.

Simultaneously to the success of The Red Headed Stranger, like-minded outlaw country singer Waylon Jennings achieved success, and the movement became a pop culture sensation that helped to fuel a fascination with all things Southern and redneck (Jennings later lamented the trend with the song "Don't You Think This Outlaw Bit's Done Got Out of Hand").

"The term 'outlaw' was a marketing thing that someone came up with in Nashville," Nelson says. "But the cowboy side was something me and Waylon and others could relate to, sure. It made a good story and felt fresh again."


With momentum built, Nelson went on to further burnish himself into the public's consciousness by branching out into Hollywood films, with appearances in the Robert Redford film The Electric Horseman (1979) and Honeysuckle Rose (1980). The soundtrack of the latter spawned the hit "On the Road Again," which went on to become one of Nelson's signature

Through the 1980s Nelson continued to successfully write and record music, but by the end of the decade he was about to hit a personal low point. His problems with the IRS resulted in Nelson having to auction off most of his assets. The problems came from bad accounting advice, and many of his friends bought and held his possessions for him until he could afford to buy them back. In another attempt to pay the IRS, Nelson released the double album The IRS Tapes - Who'll Buy My Memories? The album was marketed

on television, with all the profits going to his IRS debt, and by 1993 all those debts had been paid.

"Everything else just fell into insignificance," Nelson said in a recent newspaper interview.

Nelson bounced back recordings-wise in 1993 with the release of Across the Borderline, an ambitious duets album that featured artists ranging from Bob Dylan and Kris Kristofferson to Sinead O'Connor. In the intervening two decades, Nelson has released an astonishing 40 additional albums - averaging two per year - which stands as a testament to how prolific he is as a writing and recording artist.

While he continues to find success through recording and a relentless touring schedule, these days Nelson is in the news as much for his political stances as he is for his music. A longtime advocate of marijuana legalization, he's become something of a poster child for the pro-legalization crowd. His endorsement of gay marriage and embrace of environmental issues have also brought his persona into the political sphere and solidified his image as an outlaw country artist. His tour bus even runs on bio-fuel, and in Texas he's known as Bio Willie for setting up filling stations there to supply truckers with the fuel.

'[I'm] trying to get others to use it more," Nelson said, "because the more of that we use and the more solar energy and hydro and wind we use, the less we will have to go around the world looking for oil."

Nelson still shows no signs of slowing down, and retirement is not a concept that appeals to him.

"I think that [retiring] would be the hardest thing to do. To quit the road. To quit playing music. Being on the road in my tour bus, it's what I enjoy," Nelson said. "I would get tired in a day or two if I stopped doing this. I'd get fidgety. Restless. I want to see what's happening over there. I want to play with this singer over here."



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----- Feature • Appleseed Comics and Art Convention------**Capitalizing on Our Comics Connection**

Superheroes. Crime fighters. Cuddly creatures. Pulp and sci-fi stories. You can find all of this and more at Appleseed Comic Convention at the Grand Wayne Center on Saturday, May 11.

This will be the event's inaugural year, but make no mistake, founder Zack Kruse really knows what he's doing. He lives and breathes comics, penning his own Mystery Solved! webcomic in addition to guest spots on various panels and podcasts. And this isn't the first convention he's organized. Comic enthusiasts may remember the somewhat short-lived Summit City Comic Con. That was also Kruse's brainchild, and Appleseed is a continuation of the same mission, just under a different name.

"It started in a lot of different ways," recalled Kruse. "The main philosophy behind Appleseed Comic Convention is a love for the comic book community. Comics are like no other form of entertainment. If you bump into someone you know at a comic shop, you end up talking for 15-20 minutes, maybe even an hour. You just get lost in it. There's this weird connection that fans have, and I wanted to share that with Fort Wayne. If someone walks about with even a tenth of the excitement I have for comics, the event's a success in my mind.'

Kruse says the best shows are smaller ones that celebrate the tightly knit community of creators with a curious public. That's why you won't find any barelycelebrities, dealers or marketing gimmicks at Appleseed Comic Con. Kruse keeps the event true to the roots of the comic art by crafting a creator-focused show

"That's what sets it apart from other shows in the region and even bigger shows further out. I strive to bring the best talent in the Midwest - from Ohio, Michigan, Chicago, wherever - to Fort Wayne where fans can access them, shake their hands, and really talk to them about comics," Kruse said.

A large part of the Appleseed Comic Con lineup is talent right from our own backyard: Jeremy McFarren (Red Rocket Comics); Tim Baron (The Life and Times of Julius Destructus); Ben Tiede (The Quad: Comics, Art, Literature and Film podcast); and Aaron Minier, Brandon Peat and Arndt (Black Rose). And that's just to name a handful.

"Fort Wayne is fortunate to have a lot of really talented people here. Appleseed Comic Con is a chance for those artists to show off and introduce themselves to the community,' said Kruse. "I don't think people understand that this isn't something new. It's a continuation of a long-term trend."

He's right. Northeast Indiana and the surrounding counies have been home to some real illustration legends. Jim Davis, creator of Garfield, grew up within an hour and a half

drive from Fort Wayne. Denys Cowan, a prolific artist best known for his work on Milestone Comics, spent some years in Wabash, Indiana. Dwight Graydon "Gray" Morrow was born and raised in Fort Wayne, graduating from North Side. Morrow was a heavy hitter in the Marvel world. He worked on several projects and co-created Marvel's muck-monster Man-Thing and DC Comics' Old West vigilante El Diablo.

"Morrow was just a hometown guy who did all of this incredible work. We have an important history here, and I like building on it and being part of it,


Kruse said.

"We have such a robust community of artists and supporters in northeast Indiana. There's truly something for everyone. I've been working in comics for nine years, and I'm always amazed by all of the things we have in Fort Wayne that other places don't have."

Kruse's passion for comics has turned him into a walking history book. It's a geek badge he has proudly earned over the years. And it all started with Batman.

"My parents bought me a comic book when I was five years old. I had other comics and stuff, but that was the one that sparked it all. It was a Batman No. 402," he said with a grin. "The image from the cover is seared into my brain. It had two Batmen fighting each other, strangling one other. I remember being a little kid and thinking, 'Oh my God, how could this happen?' I read it over and over and saved it for the longest time until someone finally threw it out.

"Another pivotal moment was when I discovered the work of Steve Ditko. He created everything about Spider-



Man except for the name. When I found his stuff in fifth grade, it changed me forever - and he's still with me to this day. I've presented academic papers at conferences about him. I have a very healthy obsession with his work. I get chills thinking about it."

After he graduated from college in 2004, Kruse cashed in on that passion with a job at Discount Comic Book Service. It was at DCBS that he really honed a deep knowledge of all things comics, climbing the ranks to achieve marketing director status.

In 2009, he helped put on DCBS's tenth anniversary event. That's when the convention bug sank its teeth into Kruse. On a shoestring budget, he brought in a few great artists, placed one small ad and relied on word of mouth for the rest. The event was a hit, and he loved every minute of it.

All the while, Kruse was building an impressive network of comic creators, scholars and fans. It's this network that helped springboard his own comic convention efforts and make Summit

City Comic Con (and now Appleseed Comic Con) a success right from the start.

When you walk into the Grand Wayne Convention Center on May 11, you'll be struck by row after row of comic book artists and writers spanning the genre gamut. It is a show where the creators are the exclusive, and they will be eager to shake your hand and geek out with you.

Kruse said one focus of Appleseed Comic Con was to provide something for everyone. With that in mind, other activities include shopping the several attending vendors (more than previous years), a few discussion panels, a writing workshop, living statue workshop put on in partnership with the Downtown Improvement District, a children's cosplay (costume play) contest and Star Wars characters for photo opportunities.

There's also an exclusive, limited-edition event poster print by Dave Wachter that you'll want to get your hands on. All pre-order tickets receive the print automatically. If you're registering day-of-show, they'll be available for sale at the registration booth. Wachter will be at the convention, available to sign and talk about his artwork.



A Well-Traveled Sax

A homegrown saxophonist who is also a veteran of the Los Angeles music scene, having lived there for more than three decades, Mark Maxwell currently plays with the Mark Maxwell Sax Experience along with writing and recording his own music. The band consists of, in his words, "pillars of the Fort Wayne jazz community" Cliff Webb on guitar, Michael Patterson on upright bass and Steve Smeltzer on drums.

Maxwell comes from a musical family. His mother, sister and brother all played saxophone, and their household had a piano, organ, and other musical accouterment (In fact, his brother is now a professional saxophonist.) Maxwell took organ lessons at an early age and began to pick up various instruments fairly quickly, eventually picking up the saxophone.

"I had music in my blood," he says. "My mother played keyboards and organs and there was always a piano in the house. I grew up playing music and learning instruments. I had a talent for picking up instruments because I ended up playing keyboards, a little guitar, flutes you know, all sorts of just pick up instruments and learn how to play them."

After graduating from high school and spending three years in the U.S. Army Band, Maxwell and a musi-

cian friend packed up and left for Los Angeles after the blizzard of 1978 prompted them to search for greener pastures. Once he landed in L.A. and became established in the music scene there, Maxwell began to accumulate no shortage of highlights and interesting experiences. One highlight was having the opportunity to play at an event in the 1984 Los Angeles Olympics.

"I played in a big band. It was a band that I played with regularly. We played all over town and we ended up playing at the [Olympic] rowing event at a lake up in the mountains above L.A.," he recalls. "We had to go out there in the morning, and it would be foggy and cold, and we played for the fans as they watched these rowers go by. It was kind of weird actually."

Another sports-related highlight came when he had the opportunity to play the national anthem at L.A. Lakers games in two successive years.

"I had a friend whose ex-wife worked for the Lakers," he says. "She arranged an audition for me, and they liked the way I played. They ended up inviting me to play the anthem in two successive years during the Magic Johnson era. [It] was a huge thrill for me because I was a huge Laker fan at the time."

Sporting events aside, what has become perhaps the hallmark of his musical career are his recordings of original compositions. Over the years, he has written and recorded 18 complete albums consisting primarily of smooth jazz and blues, and he's currently working on his 19th. With all-time sales in the 500,000

range, Maxwell has had the opportunity to develop a personal rapport with his fan base, selling many of his recordings at street fairs and festivals.

It was a street fair in Tucson, Arizona, in fact, that originally prompted him to start selling his compositions directly to fairgoers.

"I had stuff composed and recorded, enough to make a couple albums. I had a good friend who was living in Tucson at the time," Maxwell recalls. "There's a big street fair in Tucson called the 4th Age-

nue Street Fair, and he kept seeing these musicians, and he said, 'Mark, these guys sell tons of albums.' So I made up some cassettes, and we rented a space in a street fair. For three days we sold them to people and made like \$2,000. We couldn't believe it. So I started making more music and selling it at street fairs. That's how I really got going ... and I've sold about half a million CDs over the years at fairs and online."

While Maxwell's musical proclivities are fairly well established at this point, he still continues to expand, explore and try new things. The recording he's currently working on is a bit of a departure from most of his catalogue in that it's primarily a studio construction, a "groove-oriented ambient electronica sort of thing" consisting of loops and studio effects, as he describes it

"It's exciting and fun,"

he says of the current recording process. "You know, composing is one thing that I can do endlessly. Time stands still when I'm doing it, I guess you'd say. If I could do one thing all the time, that's what I would do – sit in my studio and just compose. It's just a blast."

While studio constructions may be his current focus, one of his favorite memories from his career came from playing in a very live and off-the-cuff mode. While in the L.A. area, rock and blues music legend Joe Cocker would sit in with one of his bands for impromptu song sessions.

"There was a place in Santa Barbara I used to play with the Rhythm and Blues Bombers," Maxwell says. "And Joe Cocker used to come in and sit in with that band. That was always a wild experience. The band was like a really gritty kind of down home, bluesy band, and he would come in and just tear the place up singing these old blues tunes. I remember just being in awe of the guy."

In the end, though, it's the opportunity he's had to interact with his fans and touch people's lives that has meant the most to him in his musical career.

"The thing I'm proudest of overall is my ability to touch people with music," he says. "I sold at street fairs for many many years, and I got to talk to tens of thousands of people. And to see how they would react to the music I was making was really gratifying over the years. It's a gift from the universe; I can't take too much responsibility for it, but it's been the highlight of my music career."

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U.R.B. Sound it Out

U.R.B. (or herb?) play a style of funky rock n' roll that will sound very familiar to your ears. They like to mix it up with some reggae beats, 12-bar blues, funky shuffles and milelong innuendos. These aren't a bunch of young Turks putting on Daddy's

black leathers, strapping on his road worn Tele and pretending to be rock stars. These are more the middle-aged dudes that have seen and experienced a few things. There are more than a few ghosts of local bands past under their collective belt. They've learned from the greats: Stevie Ray Vaughan and Double Trouble, Charlie Sexton, Arc Angels, Duke Tumatoe and even a little Sublime. U.R.B. have no interest in making you ponder life or sway you on political or social issues. The only sway is going to be on the dance floor or on the stage. Sound It Out has one goal: to make you shake your groove thang

"I Just Wanna Take You" has an island jam sound to it, with a Sublime flow in the vocals and a Wailers vibe in the music. "Hay Bay Bay" is a groovy little funk number that's like a cross between Infectious Grooves, Parliament and more "Hay Bay Bays" than you can shake a stick at. In comes the Arc Angels-approved "Keep On Missin' My Baby." If you're looking for vernacular-heavy word puzzles, you might want to listen to some Elvis Costello. U.R.B. tell you pretty much what the song is about in the song titles themselves. With songs like "Song For Dawn," "Git It On," and "When The Lights Go Down," what you see is what you get. This is a band of fellas that like to play music you can feel. You get blues, funk and Rastafarian-heavy beach jams played by guys who have been playing their instruments a long, long time. "She Told Me" has some great guitar squall from lead singer/guitarist Catfish Dave P. He's a mix of metal, blues and guitar slinger all rolled into one party king ringleader. The last track, "Ee-Oh (San Seishin Chant)," ends the album the way it started: on a tropical breeze with a hint of blues, funk and soul coming out of the south.

Sound It Out will keep you movin' and jammin' till the cops tell you to turn it down. (John Hubner)

Controller Undefined

The first thing you hear when putting on Controller's debut, Undefined, is a wavering bass line and ambient noise, followed by spoken word passages pertaining to spirituality and the lack of control over one's own

destiny. Another voice speaks of titles being "divisions of the mind" before

this short piece leads into "Shadows Left Behind," a dirge-fueled metal explosion that brings to mind both modern and classic metal. Lead singer Bob Pearson seems to channel Tool's Maynard James Keenan, as does the band too in its double bass blasts and start/stop guitar riff fury.

UNDEFINED

Don't plan on any balladry or whiny indiscretions happening on this 12-song debut. Undefined just wants to punch you in the neck and send you on your merry way. Controller are made up of members of now-defunct local bands Image, Mob 9, Six Lives Out and Torrential Downfall, and they make no qualms about leaving the past behind and getting busy with their new metal conglomerate.

Recorded by Austin Putt at 1521 Studios in February of this year in just four days' time, the album has a feeling of spontaneity and looseness in the exacting and precise metal displayed here. Tracks like "Cold," "The New Beginning" and "Turmoil" show the range these musicians have in their brand of riffage. Controller love to pummel, yet there is a delicate nature to the aural violence as well. It's not progressive in a Dream Theater sort of way – more of a Tool sort of way. There's a mechanical, deliberate drive behind these tracks

"Marbles" is a soft and quiet piano piece that starts out as if its being played on an old transistor radio before coming into bright, aural focus and then proceeding to tear into your ears like a chainsaw into wet wood. "Lucky" continues with a haunting piano line being backed by buzz saw riffage and a sneering tone in Pearson's vocals. "Visions" ends the album on a ambient note, full of synths, spoken

BACKTRACK

Lynyrd Skynyrd (Pronounced 'lehinerd' 'skininerd) (1973)

This debut album from Lynyrd Skynyrd is still, 40 years later, the best thing they ever released. Skynyrd sort of took the approach that if the Allman Brothers were going to be Southern blues, then they would be more South-



ern rock. The Jacksonville, Florida band occasionally looked at guitars as backing instruments to the bass and piano but could still bring a soulful rhythm to the tracks with the crisp vocals of Ronnie Van Zandt. Obviously, they were still able to lay down some cozy guitars.

The record kicks off with "I Ain't the One," a racket that showcases the band's ability to write, arrange and play Southernstyle rock n' roll before it was even a genre. You can probably name 20 bands that were influenced by this record alone.

"Tuesday's Gone" slows things way down, but the pace picks right back up with their classic, guitar-riddled "Gimme Three Steps." "Simple Man" slowly brings things along again but is another lyrical gem. It features great keyboards and has some large guitar riffs throughout. "Things Goin' On" fills the honky-tonk gap and may be one of the most lighthearted things they ever did (along with "Mississippi Kid," which follows). "Poison Whiskey" makes the record funky again with honest lyrics and a garage band vibe. Closing it all is "Freebird," one of the most requested songs ever on FM radio, even more than "Stairway to Heaven."

While I credit the Allman Brothers for bridging the gap between rock, blues and country, I credit Lynyrd Skynyrd on expanding that Southern-style, blues-based music and rocking it out. Lynyrd Skynyrd, with just two original members, will be in Noblesville at Klipsch Music Center July 20. (Dennis Donahue)

word passages, and busy drums. It ends as it began.

Controller are out to take over the world, creating "control freaks" wherever they scorch the land (and stage). They pummel you with huge riffs and machine gun double bass, but they do so thoughtfully and with precision. British Sea Power Machineries of Joy

If you're already familiar with celebrated indie limeys British Sea Power, then I'll cut to the chase: it's a solid addition to an embarrassment of riches of a catalog. If you're not acquainted, then this album makes a perfect entry point.



Opening with ambience and what sounds like a nod to the old Star Trek riff, British Sea Power's predictably unpredictable Machineries of Joy quickly moves into a comfortable cinematic chime on the title track. Scott Wilkinson's vocals contain hints of a less mannered Bono, perhaps with a dash of Chris Martin and a pinch of Bowie suffice it to say, a certain intangible that make this absolutely British rock as opposed to a more generic "indie" variety. "K Hole" ups the tempo and the energy level with a satisfyingly fuzzed-out bass and foot-on-the-monitor vocals from Wilkinson. It's old Blur meets Spiritualized but not quite either. It's definitely higher-octane BSP that's for sure. Another highlight, "Hail Holy Queen," follows on "K Hole's" heels. Its swirling calm is a bit of a cool-rain shock following the relative rave-up that came before it. This is BSP at their best, showing off their formidable range while making each song a world unto itself. "Hail Holy Queen" is poignant and stirring; if BSP had assembled their own mellower version of the Flaming Lips' Soft Bulletin, this tune would certainly make the cut.

The fact that BSP is a band of songwriters makes Machineries of Joy a fresh listen throughout. The gorgeous "What You Need the Most" blooms into being atop an acoustic guitar. Think older, more conventional Radiohead in their quieter moments with vocals around an octave lower. It's engrossing, enveloping music - adventurous

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enough to please indie snobs but accessible enough for the beardless to enjoy.

BSP being BSP, they don't stay in one place very long. Witness "Monsters of Sunderland" with its horns, chunky/over-the-top guitars and a crowd-ready chorus. The punters will love this one. "Radio Goddard" is simultaneously anthemic and tender while the closing cut, "When the Warm Wind Blows Through the Grass," does a fair approximation of old-school Peter Gabriel. Bottom line: at both their most unhinged and most reserved states, the band shows an uncanny command of concise songcraft and atmosphere. Underneath even the most layered tune on *Machineries* of Joy is a solidly written song that, given a few spins, will plant its roots firmly in your skull. (*D.M. Jones*)

Adam Green & Binki Shapiro Adam Green & Binki Shapiro

People are going to compare songwriter Adam Green's new project, a collaboration with former Little Joy vocalist Binki Shapiro, to some of Serge Gainsbourg's records (specifically the ones he did with Anna Karina and Jane Birkin). This isn't because



Green's new record sounds like any of Gainsbourg's LPs (it doesn't) but because Green is an averagelooking guy who seemingly went out of his way to highlight the vocals of a very good looking woman who had never before done such great work. Mostly, I think, that comparison will exist because, for his record with Shapiro, Green seems to have really stepped his game up - inspired by, we can only assume, the chemistry (i.e. attraction) between himself and his muse. While Serge skipped around France for years, killing time with endless beauties, Green has actually shacked up with his collaborator - equal partners in life and art. I like that. I like that because I always thought Green was a good guy and because I love the record he made with this girl he loves. His arrangements, as a collection, are far better than anything else he's offered up as a solo artist, and, well, Shapiro really is a great vocalist. More so than those Gainsbourg records, Adam Green & Binki Shapiro reminds me of Zooey Deschanel and M. Ward's She & Him records, if a bit less precious.

As a solo artist and member of The Moldy Peaches, Green has often turned to humor, subtle absurdity and mostly obvious abstraction for his writing. Here, writing with Shapiro, Green has finally put up a collection of songs that feel very real, very novelty-free and, surprisingly, very soulful. The sound is 60s haze, with a heavy folk-rock and vocal pop influence throughout. Shapiro, at times, almost sounds like a stoner Nancy Sinatra, seducing the microphone with the kind of cool, sexy apathy Nico aimed for over the course of several half-baked LPs. And while the record does feel like Shapiro's, at least from a vocal standpoint, we hear a whole lot of Green throughout, their odd couple voices mixing quite organically despite having very different appeals. The arrangements are thick and smoky, bulked up by strings, synth, omnichord and kalimba and made perfect by ace producer Noah Georgeson (Joanna Newsom, Devendra Banhart, Bert Jansch, etc.), whom I suspect may have introduced Shapiro and Green.

The record plays through quickly, clocking in at 10 songs over 27ish minutes — not a frog in the bunch. Just chewy, sweet, juicy songwriter fare — the sound of two too-cute people falling in love while writing songs together in a New York City café. If you like those two pretty great She & Him records, I highly suggest picking up *Adam Green & Binki Shapiro* soon. Shapiro's a better singer that Deschanel, and Green is a talented dude working with the power that comes with loving a super cute, super cool girl. It's a sweet, satisfying listen that I think has some serious crossover elements, appealing to listeners young and old, hip and tired, happy and sad – a thick, smoky, stylefilled LP for lovers, babes, dudes and stoners alike. I can't wait to see what this newly married couple does next; *Adam Green & Binki Shapiro* is so enjoyable that I wouldn't mind it a bit if they returned with something very similar. Jenny and Johnny, you other two killer babes, look out! (*Greg W. Locke*)

Anthrax Anthems

Cover songs and cover albums by established bands can be a hit or miss affair, and artists can take any one of many approaches. Take for example Seether's cover of



Wham!'s "Careless Whisper," a slightly more pumped up but faithful version of the original. Or think back to Faith No More's early 90s cover of the Commodore's "Easy" which made for supreme irony by covering the original as faithfully as possible (wrap your head around that one).

In Anthrax's history, they've trended towards either the faithful or the kick-butt novel approach. For examples of the former, listen to their covers of Joe Jackson's "Got the Time" and Public Enemy's "Bring the Noise," both of which refashioned the originals to a striking effect and became two of their trademark songs. For the latter, look to their more faithful 1999 cover of Radiohead's "The Bends," a passable but unremarkable cover and was quickly forgotten.

The real question about Anthrax's *Anthems* EP is, "why?" Sure, these are 1970s AOR-style hard rock nuggets that influenced the band, and in a sense Anthrax is continuing on the theme of 2011's *Worship Music* (paying homage to their genre and influences). But unlike some of their past covers, none of the tracks here are particularly innovative or remarkable, although some of the songs work better than others.

Unfortunately, the answer to the "why" question is most likely that it is filler to maintain momentum garnered from *Worship Music* until they can muster another proper release. After all, at the time of its release, *Worship Music* was their first new album in nearly a decade; the band endured no shortage of drama en route to its creation (largely around lineup shifts) and most recently longtime lead guitarist Rob Caggiano recently announced his departure (initially to focus on producing, only to later join Volbeat). As a result, *Anthems* arrives under suspicion of being a stopgap release that the band could record and release relatively quickly in order to please fans. To that end, Anthrax have also included a track ("Crawl") and a remix of the same track from *Worship Music*.

On Anthems, Anthrax sound best when adding crunch to the original's they cover (Rush's "Anthem," Journey's "Keep on Runnin") and worst when not (Boston's "Smokin"). It can be a kick to hear vocalist Joey Belladonna wrapping his voice around the source material. In the end, the recordings offer little over their source material, however. Anthems may be worthwhile for fans of the band and the source material, especially since it represents the final recording of Caggiano with the band, but for others, it may ultimately be an enjoyable but easily forgettable release. Return Trip to the Biltmore

I've written about wines from Biltmore Estate Winery once before. Back in July I went to a conference in Asheville, North Carolina, home of the aforementioned Biltmore Estate. When I returned from the trip, I found samples of their Century Red and Century White waiting on my doorstep. While I didn't have a similar crossing of paths this time around, I recently snagged some samples of their "sweet sipping" collection.

One of these samples was my second go-round with the Century White. The others were a Riesling and a sparkling wine. I've not had much of a winerelated sweet tooth these days, but I was bound and determined to give them a fair shake. So, let's take a little trip to Carolina in our minds. (Perhaps we can swing by the Dean E. Smith Center, where the wailings of demoralized UNC-CH fans still echo through the rafters a week after their basketball teams' twin demolitions by the Devils from Durham.)

Biltmore Estates (NV) American Riesling — My favorite Rieslings are typically those from the French region of Alsace. Alsace Riesling typically has lots of minerality, light body, lean fruit and a slight alkaline flavor in its dry finish. American and German Rieslings tend not to have those particular qualities, as they're generally made in a "heavier" style. This offering from Biltmore is a pleasant exception. I found that this wine had plenty of those Alsatian characterics, except they've left a little residual sugar to make it more interesting to the American palate.

The result is a very quaffable, yet still complex white. It's got some nice floral aromas and a little sweetness on the palate that gets calmed down by an interesting minerality. Melon and peach flavors abound and are followed by a semi-sweet finish. It's okay on its own, but I tried it with both a spicy Thai chicken soup and a flavorful turkey chili. Both pairings were quite nice. I'd think it would be a nice choice to go with almost anything spicy. (\$11)

Biltmore Estates (NV) Century White Wine — My reaction to this one was a bit different the second time around. The last time I tried this blend, I thought The Naked Vine MIKE ROSENBERG

it made a pretty decent glass. This time, it wasn't nearly as friendly with the ol' palate. I discovered that they'd changed the grape blend. Gewurztraminer was the primary grape, but now it's Muscat Canelli, which often creates a heavier, sweeter still wine. I thought it was cloyingly sweet and very heavy on my tongue. There's fruit, fruit, fruit and sugar, sugar, sugar. As our neighbor Minnesota Marlene put it, smacking her lips, "This has got lots of apricot," and that's it. (If Marlene ain't talkin', it ain't workin'.) It's a substantial wine that works with spicy cuisine well enough, but is too heavy to be enjoyed on its own. If you like really sweet wines, perhaps give it a try. Otherwise, give it a pass. (\$16)

Biltmore Estates (NV) Pas de Deux Sparkling Wine — The packaging is predominantly pink with a pair of ballet slippers on the label. The back label promised a wine that's "slightly sweet," and I saw that it was made from 100 percent Muscat Canelli. I mentally braced myself for "toothache inducing levels of sugar" as I prepared to pop the cork. Sweeter sparkling wine usually says "brunch" to me. As a result, I decided on "breakfast for dinner" with a scrumptious "trout benedict" concoction as My Sweet Partner in Crime to go alongside. We plated it up, poured and let the bubbles settle; the Pas de Deux caught me completely off guard. It's downright tasty. Yes, it's a little bit sweet, but not overly so. I thought it exhibited some really nice tropical fruit flavors with a surprisingly crisp finish. It reminded me of a more highly carbonated Moscato, and this is not a bad thing in the slightest. I thought it was a fun wine and would consider giving it another run for brunch sometime. Nice work. (\$19)

the Satisfaction offerings. Currently he's working on a new project which would add a narrative to their musical tribute, making Satisfaction a Broadway-ready theatrical production. He says they have "a lot of irons in the fire. We're always looking for new ways to present this music to people."

Among those who are well aware of their efforts are the Rolling Stones themselves. Although there has never been any direct communications between the Stones and Satisfaction, LeGrand says they did have to earn approval before booking a major gig a few years back.

"We were approached by Disney to perform at their parks, and in order to do that, Disney required that we get the approval of the Rolling Stones. It took a couple years to work all of that out, and we had to get approval from everyone from their management to Mick himself. But eventually they looked over all of our materials and said they had no problem with it. We aren't endorsed by the Rolling Stones, but for them to give us their approval to play for one of the biggest corporations in America in Disney, that meant a lot to us."

With plans for new ways to continue their own contribution to the Rolling Stones legacy, there are no plans for Satisfaction to quit any time soon. LeGrand is now comfortably committed to a path which his own Jagger resemblance seems to have predestined him to take.

"There's a great hunger for this music, and the Stones can't go everywhere, so we try to hit as many cities as we can. We're affordable, accessible, and we plan to keep carrying the torch for as long as we can."

McHugh has certainly been exposed to older, classic shows, having studied many of them in college, and he says he looks forward to trying his chops in some of those, having already proven himself in rock musicals.

"I'm hoping I can stretch myself more, do something that's a complete 180 from what I've been doing so far. I'd love to do *Guys & Dolls* or even *South Pacific* so I can stretch myself more as a performer and







Upstate New York is the setting for two of my favorite films adapted from novels: A Place in the Sun from Theodore Dreiser's An American Tragedy and Nobody's Fool from Richard Russo's novel of the same name. While watching The Place Beyond the Pines, the ambitious new film from director Derek Cianfrance, I thought of both those films. Though Cianfrance and his co-writers have created an original work, watching the film is like seeing a novel on screen. All three films address class distinctions in this beautiful region of the country that has seen economic prosperity and decline.

The Place Beyond the Pines is set in and around Schenectady, New York in contemporary times, though devices like cell phones and televisions are rarely to be found. The filmmakers are interested in creating an outof-time experience to keep us focused on the characters.

This is a story about greed, corruption, ambition and class, told through relationships between men, most wrenchingly between fathers and sons. It is a serious and rewarding film. Stars Ryan Gosling and Bradley Cooper and supporting players Eva Mendes and Ben Mendelsohn give outstanding performances. (Ray Liotta is also good, but he is playing a corrupt bully. Will the poor man ever get another kind of role?)

I say these things up front because I cannot resist writing about this film in a way that reveals some key plot points. If you are a fan of smart, serious drama featuring excellent performances by movie stars, go see The Place Beyond the Pines; it is rewarding and entertaining. I don't think what I'm going to reveal will ruin the experience of seeing the film, but it will eliminate a fresh experience of some surprising twists, so stop reading now if you want to avoid spoilers.

Cianfrance designed the film as a triptych, and there are three stories that happen in chronological order. In Blue Valentine, Cianfrance's first film, chronology is messed with again and again, which wrings maximum misery out of the story of a disintegrating relationship. This new film is a huge advance in storytelling and skill.

The Place Beyond the Pines begins with the camera following the head and shoulders of a man making his way through a carnival at night. In this long tracking shot, a nice homage to Orson Welles' Touch of Evil

Luke is a daredevil motorcycle rider, covered in tattoos with a cigarette hanging from his lips almost constantly. After the show, while signing autographs, a woman walks up and asks, "Do you remember my name?" Of course he does. Romina, or Ro, is played by Mendes, a woman who would be hard to forget. When Luke figures out that their affair the last time he was in town produced a son, he quits the carnival and hangs

Romina has moved on. She's living with Kofi (Mahershala Ali), a man who will not back down. After Luke meets up with the oddball Robin (Mendelsohn), he turns to robbing banks to earn the kind of cash that might win back his family.

Luke puts himself into a very risky situation that goes wrong. He is shot and killed in a showdown with a police officer played by Cooper. There is something audacious and



crazy about having two such talented actors in a film where they barely exchange a word. Luke is a criminal, full good intentions, charisma and bad judgment. He's missed every moment afterwards, but though the picture keeps slowly deflating, his death reminds us how temporary things are.

The second story belongs to Cooper. His character, Avery, is wounded in the leg in the showdown with Luke. He's a "hero," but he barely feels like one. Post-shooting, he is haunted and plagued by his actions.

His life was a bit of mess before the shooting, and the experience has weakened him. He falls into some episodes of corruption and struggles in his relationships with his father and his wife.

In one brilliant scene with his therapist, he pauses tells us a lot about what he's think-

The third story begins with a device Luke and Avery. For me, this is the weakest themselves as about the sins of the father.

Jason (a sensitive, appealing Dane De-

sion of his father Luke. AJ is an unfortunate distillation of the privilege and arrogance of his father Avery. Though their story is the most predictable, I was a sucker for the ending of the film.

While watching The Place Beyond the Pines, I was worried, irritated and entertained. After the movie, I kept turning the story and the atmospherics over and over and liking the film more. In particular, I kept thinking about the fathers and sons: a young man who grows up with no father and ends up shot by a cop; a young man who grows up with a father with high expectations applying pressure to his son who has trouble being his own man; a young man who grows up with divorced parents, a father so distracted by his career that most of his time is spent living with his mother; a young man who grows up with a father who loves him and, though he isn't the biological father, has been there for him since before his birth.

This dissection of the structure doesn't give even a hint of the depth and flavor of the characters, but that would take a term paper or more length discourse. Or just enjoying the film itself.

The movie's title is a partial English translation of the Mohawk meaning for Schenectady, "the place beyond the pine plains." Crucial moments of the film take place in the still-thick forests of the region. And while the specifics of the place, from forests to decaying neighborhoods, inform the story, the title surely is also a reference to the place inside us that is nurtured and tempered by places and people that surround us.

"The course of true love never did run smooth," Shakespeare said (through Lysander) in *A Midsummer Night's Dream*. As it does for *Romeo and Juliet*, that statement most certainly applies to *Antony and Cleopatra*, which just opened at First Presbyterian Theater and runs through May 11. Every season

Every season, FPT includes a Shakespeare play. I have to

admit, I much prefer the comedies and wasn't all that excited to see this one, a mix of history and tragedy, listed when the season was announced. Under the direction of Thom Hofrichter, though, the script was shortened significantly from Shakespeare's very long play (around four full hours). With an intermission, this adaptation ran two and a half hours.

When the play begins, we find Roman Marc Antony and Egyptian queen Cleopatra very much in love, or at least highly in lust. When Antony is called back to Rome by various circumstances, their love is, to say the least, tested, and the results of those tests are tragic.

Director Thom Hofrichter's adaptation of Shakespeare's *Antony and Cleopatra* is fine. Standouts in the cast include Scott Hess as Antony. He brings restraint to a role that could easily have been over the top, but he reels it in quite well. Due to the last-minute illness of a cast member, Hofrichter himself had to step into the role of Agrippa, but, as usual, he excelled.

We who teach stress the importance of knowing the relationship between speaker and audience in effectively conveying a message to a target group. The task of writing reviews, I think, makes me more mindful than many theatergoers of the choices made by production teams and actors as well as the potential variety of results in receivers of the messages they offer. This play, more than any other recently, has made me look at my role of reviewer for a couple of reasons.

I was reminded of this when I took a fairly large group of students to see FPT's production of Shakespeare's *Henry IV* a couple of seasons back. They showed me anew that I was, indeed, a much different member of the audience than any of them were. Most were enthralled by what they were being shown and even moved to front row seats after intermission. There was another reminder recently when I discussed IPFW's recent staging of Virginia Woolf's *Orlando* with a few former students of mine who had been required to see it for a theater appreciation class they are taking. More conservative than many, they were shocked by some of what the play included (actresses kissing actresses, gender reversals, etc.), yet they were thinking through reactions, and doing so outside their comfort zones, which is generally a very good and valuable thing.

Furthermore, for me, it is sometimes hard to let go of connections between historical figures the and actors and actresses who have played them definitively, whether in the same actual work or not. Theater audiences still seem to skew high in terms of age, but more diverse audiences mean that more of those who see local theater bring little or no knowledge of the tales they are being told nor awareness of earlier adaptations of the storylines or actors associated with specific roles. In the case of *Cleopatra and Antony* we have, of course, Elizabeth Taylor and Richard Burton who played them in the 1963 film. Younger audience members would, of course, likely not make this connection. And FPT's valuable Tomorrow's Audiences Today program, which offers free tickets to fulltime students, brings to the theater a new generation of audience members to whom everything is fresh and new, or at least has the potential to be. For them, a play such as *Antony and Cleopatra* would likely be a little more exciting than it is for me or those with even graver hair than mine.

Although I sometimes think that plays depicting historical events, however loosely, and introducing local audiences to the characters who shaped one era or another are at least as educational as they are entertaining, if not more so, they still provide nights of value in theaters. Here, again, is another way I think what is offered by an individual production varies, depending on who is watching history come alive. In the specific case of *Antony and Cleopatra*, the values provided to individual members of the audience are not an issue of higher or lower, but rather of differ-







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The Festival Gets Its Raft Race Back

Once upon a time, one of the highlights of the year in Fort Wayne was the annual Three Rivers Festival Raft Race, an excuse to grab a lawn chair, find your favorite spot along the river and situate yourself for a couple hours of fun. Touted as the second biggest event of the year in Indiana (behind only the Indy 500), the Raft Race was a classic local event, one which both highlighted our rivers but also our annual gem, Three Rivers Festival.

It was such a great thing that it was almost inevitable that it would all go wrong eventually. With alcohol(not to mention the bravado and tomfoolery that often accompanies the consumption of same) becoming more and more of a factor, the race itself seemed secondary to the sometime frat party atmosphere which ultimately made it less family-friendly. But now, after a break of more than a decade, the long-lamented Three Rivers Festival Raft Race is back - and it promises to be better than ever thanks to a well thought out plan to help avoid some of its pitfalls while revisiting all of its former glory.

This year's triumphant return will take place on Saturday, July 20, the final day of TRF. With rafts launching at 11 a.m. near Swinney East, there are a lot of reasons to start planning your raft design and giving thought to winning the race across the river. A full list of rules is available at threeriversfestival. org under the Events tab, but TRF Executive Director Jack Hammer emphasizes two key elements of the new guidelines: a big "yes" to life jackets and a big "no" to booze. Safety is a huge factor, and there will be lifeguards, police, firemen and divers on standby in case of any mishaps.



Another added bonus is prize money, which totals over \$14,000 in cold hard cash. With awards for both speed (those who finish in the top three) and original design of the raft, there's definite incentive to do this right, thanks to the generosity of local businessmen Bill Bean and Bruce Dye. It'll be good to have the raft race back. Hopefully it's here to stav.

Another classic (or as Hammer calls it "heritage event") is the Bed Race, one of the other TRF traditions reborn in the last decade. This year's will be held on Wednesday, July 17 and will once again see some cleverly designed beds dashing through the streets of downtown. Last year the event moved to the Freimann Square which provided more shade during what you may recall was Fort Wayne's decent into fire and brimstone. With any luck at all, this year's TRF will suffer less of Mother Nature's wrath, but it's good to know that the folks who plan these things take pity on participants and make it all a little more comfortable when they can. Over the years, DeBrand's Chocolates has more or less owned this event, but it's never too late to provide a little challenge. Well, it will at some point be too late. Check out all the rules and entry details at threeriversfestival.org.

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million over its first three days in the U.S. The movie - a true story about three bodybuilders who get caught up in a wild kidnapping scheme - stars Mark Wahlberg, Dwayne "The Rock" Johnson, Anthony Mackie, Ed Harris, Monk and Rebel Wilson. Bay, who usually spends \$200 million or more making blockbusters, worked with a budget of only \$26 million this time around. Something tells me he managed to squeeze in some car chases and explosions despite his "modest" budget. Sure, the movie isn't high art, but Bay knows how to put nice productions up on the screen and Wahlberg has been increasingly picky while selection projects to get involved with. Something tells me Pain & Gain is a good time at the movies. Will it make big dollars? Well, this week's \$20 million haul suggests that it'll be a financial success, though likely not the huge one most of his other films have been.

Also at the Box: Tom Cruise's latest big budget sci-fi adventure, the Joe Kosinski-directed Oblivion, took the No. 2 spot at the box office over its second weekend, selling another \$17.5 million. The film has thus far sold \$64 million in the U.S. over its first 10 days; add to that another \$134 million abroad and you can go ahead and chalk Oblivion up as yet another Tom Cruise winner.

Brian Helgeland's Jackie Robinson drama, 42, held strong at the box office last weekend, selling another \$11 million, upping the movie's 17-day total to just under \$70 million in the U.S., good enough to take the No. 3 spot at the box office.

Rounding out last weekend's Top 5 were ensemble comedy The Big Wedding (\$7.5 million) and surprise mega-hit The Croods (\$6.6 million). Get this:

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The Croods has now made almost \$500 million at the box office around the world. Dang.

Also of note, Jeff Nichols' third feature, Mud, opened on 363 screens and sold \$2.2 million worth of tickets over its first weekend of release. Not bad, considering Nichols' first film, Shotgun Stories, sold only \$51,000 in tickets and his second film, Take Shelter, sold only \$1.7 million. Great films, all three.

New this Week: This coming weekend's major release, action/adventure flick Iron Man 3, will open in every American town that has at least 10,000 people living in it. It'll sell big, it'll kick ass, it'll warrant yet another sequel. The film, directed this time by Shane Black (Kiss Kiss, Bang Bang), has already made about \$200 million abroad. Look for this movie - said to be darker than the other two very fun Iron Man flicks to be far more divisive than the other two clang clang clangers. Joining Robert Downey, Jr. for the ride this time around (in addition to staples Gwyneth Paltrow, Jon Favreau and Don Cheadle, that is) are the man Guy Pearce, the babe Rebecca Hall, the gent Ben Kingsley and the husband Paul Bettany. Looks good. Not great - good. Nothing else will see major distribution this week, though The Iceman, another very good Michael Shannon film (he's also in the above-mentioned Mud), will be released in New York City and Los Angeles.

ScreenRant: In 2004 a new American auteur named Shane Carruth released his first film, Primer,

The Prince of Gen X

I Would Die 4 U: Why Prince Became an Icon by Touré, Atria Books, 2013

I might be in danger of overreaching as I try to describe the near universal appeal of Prince as a musician. I'm sure there's someone out there who doesn't like him, but I'd argue that Prince haters are few and far between. I'd also argue that his fans transcend categories, and fans of a diverse range of musical genres have at least a measure of respect for the

man's music. But why? What is it about Prince that makes him, it seems, more widely admired than most pop musicians? I have no ideaa, but this new book by Touré looks as if it not only shares my perception that Prince is unusually well-liked, but also has a reason for why that's true. That's enough to make me extremely curious.

There has to be some secret to Prince's success. If you had to name the lasting pop music icons that emerged from the 1980s, you'd probably name four: Michael Jackson, Madonna, Bruce Springsteen and Prince. That quartet has reached a level of commercial success and name recognition that is virtually unmatched by anyone else who made music in that decade (and which rivals the fame of anyone who made music in any decade). You might cite Jackson's eccentricity, Madonna's courting of controversy and Springsteen's every-man image as keys to their success, but where does Prince fit in? Nothing seems clear-cut with Prince.

Touré thinks he knows the secret, and he lays it out for us in I Would Die 4 U. Prince, the author argues, spoke for a generation. That's a little bit of a cliché, or rather a huge cliché, but Touré puts a spin on it. He argues that Prince spoke for Generation X, those Americans born between roughly 1965 and 1982, which is slightly surprising given that Prince was born in 1958. Touré says that Prince was older than Gen X, but he spoke for the generation like a wise big brother. It seems like a stretch, but I'll stick with him on this point.

How did Prince speak for Gen X? Well, Touré says, Prince spoke for Gen X because his parents were divorced, and divorce was the defining situation of Gen X's young people. It's true that the divorce epidemic hit its high point in America while Gen X was young, but since almost none of Prince's music has anything to do with the divorce of his parents, it's hard to



follow Touré's connection between Prince's fame and the prevalence of divorce in America. Prince spoke for Generation X, despite being a Baby Boomer, by embodying the culture of divorce without

ever actually mentioning divorce? I'm not sure I'm willing to stick with Touré any longer.

He seems to get a little closer to the truth the few times that he, nearly in passing, puts Prince alongside other icons like Jackson and Madonna. Prince shares some traits with those musicians - he is extremely shy and eccentric like

Jackson, and he approaches his career with calculated ambition like Madonna-but he also differs from them. His eccentricity is not self-destructive like Jackson's, and his ambition has always been primarily focused on his music, not on publicity-seeking shenanigans like Madonna's. He avoids the flaws of those other icons while capitalizing on their strengths; he has Jackson's talent and Madonna's drive, not vice versa.

Even if Touré's arguments feel off-target and, frankly, a bit simplistic, that's not to say there aren't some aspects of the book that are enjoyable and enlightening. There's some good analysis of Prince's music, and there's enough detailed explanation of Prince's history to allow the reader to draw his own conclusions apart from Touré's. There are also some really delightful vignettes; the story of the author's spontaneous basketball game with Prince at the artist's Paisley Park studio in Minneapolis is priceless.

The independent conclusion I drew about Prince's success is satisfying if not revelatory. Prince has become an icon, I think, because he's talented. His music is good, and a big segment of the music-loving public recognizes it. It doesn't really have to be any more complicated than that, and it says something about the world we live in that we feel compelled to look for a less obvious answer. In an era when no one seems particularly good at understanding why one person should be famous and another person shouldn't, it's refreshing and hopeful - if somewhat perplexing - to a see case of justified fame.

into the festival circuit. The movie featured amateur acting, DIY filmmaking techniques and a script that was almost too smart for its own good. The film ended up alienating most who saw it and earning deep fandom from those who "got" it. I was part of the latter group, and have been keeping my eye on Carruth ever since. For years he worked on producing his would-be second film, *A Topiary*, in Hollywood. The script was heavily discussed by other filmmakers such as Rian Johnson (*Looper*, *Brick*) and Steven Soderbergh (*Contagion*, *Traffic*, etc.), both of whom are champions of Carruth (Sode-y even called the director "The offspring of David Lynch and James Cameron) and loved his script. Though Carruth eventually put that project on the shelf, he spent several years trying to get it made without ever being able to secure the needed funding the very ambitious project required.

Eventually the filmmakers started to work on the just released *Up-stream Color*, a movie I recently watched and was, to put it gently, absolutely blown away by. Carruth not only wrote, directed and produced the film, but he also starred in, edited, shot and scored the movie. And he did all these things very well while shooting on a modest \$600 DSLR camera. Skills, he's got 'em. Carruth is currently only weeks away from beginning principle photography on his third feature, titled *The Modern Ocean*. A new legend in the works, I think it certain. I highly recommend checking out *Upstream Color* ASAP.
