------ Cover Story • C.J. Chenier

As the old saying goes, "Some are born great, some achieve greatness and some have greatness thrust upon them." In C.J. Chenier's case, the second and third part of that saying are definitely true. The first part? Well, the pedigree was certainly there from the start; it was just a matter of finding out who he was - and who he would become. Son of the legendary Clifton Chenier, "King of Zydeco," C.J. Chenier has become a torchbearer for the

Chenier tours the country and overseas incessantly, bringing instant authenticity and passion to a genre that's not your run-of-the-mill fare in most communities. His mission is to show the folks how it's done right, and to witness him and the Red Hot Louisiana Band onstage is to experience an instant energy infusion.

The younger Chenier honors his late father's legacy while he manages to add new wrinkles to zydeco music. From lauded performances at festivals around the world to appearances on top-tier albums to a 2012 Grammy nomination, Chenier has turned his commitment to music into a successful, long-legged career. You can see

Chenier and his band in action when they appear at the Botanical Conservatory on August 23.

"I'm looking forward to coming back up there, Chenier says.

His voice is a deep baritone, and his laid-back demeanor is lightyears away from the frenetic shows

he and the Red Hot Louisiana Band whip up at every stop. Zydeco music is energetic, soulful and generally fun music. But, believe it or not, Chenier wasn't initially taken with it as a youngster. In fact, he was unaware of zydeco for a good portion of his youth. Growing up in Port Arthur, Texas, Chenier had very little opportunity (or inclination) to pursue his father's musical muse. Instead, his first great love was jazz.

"The first music I really sat down and listened to was jazz," he says. "Since then, I've been hooked.

Given his father's profile as the universally acknowledged main man of a whole genre, C.J.'s takeaway upon first listening to zydeco was underwhelming: he thought everything sounded the same. In addition to jazz, the budding musician fell in love with funk music and eventually took up saxo-

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phone. He played in Top 40 bands around the Port Arthur area and went to college to study music.

In time C.J. came to appreciate zydeco and Clifton's role in it. And though he played sax, not accordion, the young

man started on his path to mastering the art form. By the time he was out of his teens, he got the opportunity to play with his father's

"It was one week before I turned 21 in 1978," he says. "I started on a Sunday, I remember." He chuckles, "I was thrown right into the deep end, with the sharks and the

Though he felt that he was following his true calling, the young sax player experienced growing pains on the tour.

"At first, I didn't know what I was playing," he recalls. "I guess it took me a year or

By the mid-80s, the elder Chenier was in failing health. By now, C.J. had mastered the accordion and was opening shows and playing squeezebox with the band. Following Clifton's passing in 1987, C.J. took over leadership of the Red Hot Louisiana Band. Over the years, he's managed to stay true to the spirit of the band while blending in elements of the music that initially influenced him. It's something his father not only supported, but actively encouraged.

"My daddy always told me, if I heard something I really liked, to use it. If I hear something, if I can feel it. I can make it work for me in my mu-

When Paul Simon heard Chenier's work in 1990, he made the inspired choice to feature him on the followup to Graceland, a wildly successful album that was also a critical success. Simon continued to pursue music from different regional and global locales. and Chenier's style and approach appealed to the veteran artist.

The Rhythm of the Saints showcases Chenier's distinctive accordion style alongside the playing of a virtual UN of musicians; the "world music" boom, initiated in part by Graceland, was further bolstered by The Rhythm of the Saints. The experience marked a high point in Chenier's career.

"Recording with Paul Simon, that was a real highlight," he says.

The recording process was quite an eye opener, however.

"When I go into the studio with my band, it's pretty much a live performance," Chenier explains. "When I

went into the studio with Paul Simon, I was all by myself and I was doing something like 30 takes! But I was just proud to be on that album."

When asked if he recalled any particular highlights among his live performances. Chenier's answer is a telling clue to his level of commitment.

"As far as performing, I don't really have 'highlights' because whenever we put on a show, it's a party. Sure, some crowds are wilder than others; some are more subdued than others."

He admits that zydeco's popularity has waned somewhat over the past two decades. but that fact only makes him more steadfast in his mission to expose more people to the

"From where [zydeco] was in the 90s, I think it's lacking a little bit right now. But I want to get it out there to the people. I want people to get it. A lot of times when we're playing, the little bitty kids are the first ones to get it, the first ones to cut loose. But then the adults get it, the older people in the crowd get it. Zydeco music is family oriented," he explains. "People from age 5 to 85 like it. When we finish with you, you're going to understand a little more about zydeco! Oh, yeah."

He illustrates in terms any festival pro-

Fort Wayne's biggest annual celebration of local arts, entertainment and food is about to descend on downtown. Taste of the Arts is back for another course on Saturday, August 24, and this year's installment is a whopper!

"The biggest challenge festival goers will have is picking which performances, artists and vendors to visit in a sea of so many excellent choices," Taste of the Arts coordinator Tena Woenker playfully warned. "We wanted to make the event two days long, but the logistics didn't pan out. Instead, we

Programs are available at the information booth for plotting out your day. Rest assured that there's plenty to see, do and taste at this

year's event.

For your palate, Taste of the Arts features over 30 local restaurants dishing up samples of their best and most unique items. The list runs the gamut from American to Italian to Irish to Vietnamese. A complete listing is available on the Taste of the Arts website. Whatever your culinary preference, you'll definitely want to come hungry. Food and beverage tickets are \$1 each and can be redeemed at any of the food vendors.

For your eyes and ears, Taste of the Arts has coordinated more than seven performance stages and areas featuring around 60 entertainment acts. Buskers will perform all

around Freimann Square, affectionately renamed Busker Square, where there will also be hands-on activities.

"It's the largest array of musicians, dancers and performing artists to be found in one place anywhere in northeast Indiana," said Woenker. "And this year's event has more range and diversity than ever before. There will be some classic acts mixed with new. And that's what Taste of the Arts is all about - enjoying our old favorites while also finding a new favor-

The arts marketplace returns, with two market areas for artists, one at Barr and Berry Streets and another at Main and Lafayette. The fine art fair (at Main and Lafayette) is now a juried event, elevating the quality of the art both displayed and offered for sale. Juried artists include several regional favorites along with some new discoveries.

And if that's not enough excitement for you, here's what's new at this year's Taste of

Young Leaders of Northeast Indiana (YLNI)'s Barr Street Market has extended its hours for that Saturday, with most vendors staying open until at least 4 p.m. Shop-

pers can also browse the official Festival Fan Fare Warehouse inside the Arts United Center for festival-related merchandise. Music from festival performers will be available for purchase. You can even request to hear a sample to try before you buy.

Head over to the Russ Oettel classroom in Artlink for a special presentation of Mi-

stages, with several artists performing inside the Auer Center. Some of the Taste of the Arts food and beverage vendors will also stay open late to help keep the party going.

If Dessert isn't your speed, consider the Arts United wine tasting event from 7-9 p.m. For a special admission fee, guests can enjoy wine tastings and education coordinated by WineTime and then choose from learning salsa dancing with Salsa Loca or creating their own painting with Artlink's Bring Your Own Brush class (or enjoy both for an hour each). Tickets are \$50 a piece or \$90 for a pair and can be purchased in advance at the ArtsTix box office, 422-4226. The funds raised benefit Arts United and the myriad of organizations they support.

But the party doesn't stop here, folks. Top off the evening with an exclusive, free outdoor screening of 1933's King Kong at the Arts United Center plaza. Made possible by the Cinema Center, Woenker says this event was three years in the making.

"The holdup was due to architectural requirements on the building. The screen had to be temporary, and we couldn't figure out a good way to pull it off," she explained. "Now that the issue has been resolved, Taste of the Arts can present the audience with a unique theatrical experience."

The family-friendly screening of this classic movie begins at 10 p.m. Chairs will be available, but people are welcome to bring

chael Rhoades' Horizontal Blue exhibit "The Sights and Sounds of Numbers." This artistic representation uses computer-generated music and images to portray a study of several different views of the same subject.

But perhaps the biggest expansion for Taste of the Arts is what happens after the festival is over.

Dessert has been the traditional afterparty since the event was created. Last year 89.1 WBOI radio host Julia Meek added to the flavor of the show, combining it with Meet the Music, a program showcasing local talent, recorded live for later broadcast.

The pairing was a success, and Meek's company was invited back for a repeat performance. However, instead of a single stage as in past years, Dessert has grown to three their own along with blankets. Coolers are discouraged, as there will be plenty of food and drink from food vendors staying open late to cater to the movie crowd.

All proceeds from Taste of the Arts food and beverage sales help reinforce Arts United's mission to develop, coordinate and support the arts and cultural efforts in northeast Indiana. Each year Arts United gives aid to more than 70 organizations in our area.

"The original intent for Taste of the Arts was to showcase the artists. Fundraising was an added bonus," Woenker said. "Really, the mission boils down to our community - and even beyond. We want Fort Wayne to be a leader in the entire tri-state region for arts. Taste of the Arts helps fill gaps in funding to make that mission possible. It allows us to take on projects like expanding the downtown arts campus or supporting more groups. Our priority is making arts accessible to the entire community."

Blues School Grad

The story of any bluesman is a story of his education in the blues. It's about whom he learned from, whose style he built upon and what part of the country influenced him the most. The blues is a traditional music form like no other, and that's just the way it is: who you are as a bluesman today has

everything to do with where you came from. For Nick Moss, that's even more true than it is with most blues players.

It started in the hospital when Moss was 18 and recovering from kidney surgery. He'd played bass in some bands, but that's not who he really was. He was a wrestler and a football player, things he didn't think he could be any more.

His brother tried to cheer him up by bringing his bass to the hospital and then by suggesting that they slip out and go across the street to a blues club, the Wise Fools Pub in Chicago's Lincoln Park. Little Willie and the Nightcats were playing. That's where it all began for Moss. He could see himself becoming that guy, the bluesman up on stage.

Moss' decision to become a professional musician paid off

quickly. Soon he was playing bass in Jimmy Dawkins' band and later moved on to The Legendary Blues Band where he played with drummer Willie "Big Eyes" Smith. That's where Moss's education began in earnest.

"I loved Willie," he says of Smith.

"He was like my second father."

While he was with Smith, Moss made a major change: he switched from playing bass to playing guitar. The instrument change was part of his exploration of the possibilities and options he had on stage, and Smith was helping him figure out what it took to play the blues the way it was supposed to be played in Chicago.

"With Willie, I learned how to play the Chicago feel," Moss told *Chicago Blues Guide*. "You know that lag-time-behind-the-beat feel that Muddy Waters made so famous? That was one of the most important lessons – to learn the feel and timing of how this music is supposed to be played."

Moss hadn't learned everything yet, though. After leaving Smith's band, he went on to play with Jimmy Rogers. The switch from bass to guitar had moved Moss toward the front of the stage, and in Rogers' band he learned how not to lose sight of the fact that there were still other musicians on stage

with him.

"From Jimmy, I learned to really listen to what was going on and to play off of the next guy," he says. "I was no longer just playing a single part."

Moss had learned a lesson that was perhaps surprising, yet also essential to understanding Chicago blues. Chicago blues, it turns out, depends a lot on musicians with

"Listen to early

All this talk of old styles, traditions and the great old-timers makes it sound as if Moss plays the kind of Chicago blues that has been the same for the last 50 or 60 years, and his playing has at times been described as nostalgic. But Moss knows that an acknowledgment of tradition and influence doesn't mean you're not an innovator. It just means that you came from someplace real.

"I don't consider myself a 50s or retro or vintage Chicago blues torchbearer. I grew up in Chicago," he says. "Everything I do know, I learned from the old-timer Chicago musicians. So anything I play is going to sound like Chicago."

You should understand, however, that despite the debt he owes to his teachers and the traditions of his city, Moss has always been himself. He went out on his own in

A New Jam Flavor

I'm going to leave the world of radio rock on pause while I venture forth into the local music scene this week and experience the real thing. From the PA of every Walgreens and Kroger, I'm perpetually bombarded with pop ditties and auto-tuned voices singing catchy hooks. It makes me long for something a little less clean and over-produced.

Maybe the salve for my wounded ears is just a little dirt. Dirty Comp'ny, a band that keeps their licks like their company, is one of the newest additions to Fort Wayne's nightlife. With their first gig back in January, opening for 80s cover band Brother, they gave crowds a taste of the gritty music yet to come.

Dirty Comp'ny describe their style as rocking blues jam with a hint of metal, and they have a mix of personalities to match their two-tone style. Patrick Ryan on lead guitar, Chris Patallita on bass, Mike Rogers on drums and brothers Ben Gabet on rhythm guitar and Sam Meyer on vocals make up the mix of musical tastes that create this fresh new sound.

"The Harley people say we're too hippie and the hippie people say we're too Harley," Patallita said. "We're somewhere in the middle, but there's a lot of people who like to cross that line, too."

Their raw, animated songs do indeed blur the lines between blues and metal, going places neither genre usually goes. Meyer's gritty vocals play a large role in their unpolished sound. Though he has the face of a young musician, he carries the voice of someone who has seen his fair share of troubles and wants to sing to you all about them

The soulful artists that influence their music are what you might expect from a jam band. Blended in with their own hard-edged sound, you can hear bits and pieces of influential idols like The Allman Brothers Band, The Meters and the String Cheese Incident in their music.

"What we're trying to do is be creative – create new music for people to hear, hopefully create a new sound," Rogers said. "Every time we get together we put something out there that we've never heard ourselves. Whether it's bad or it's good, it's something we've never heard."

Dirty Comp'ny can even expect to hear new things at their own live shows. Their goal is not just to create music behind closed doors and take it to the people, but to be a jam band that simultaneously inspires and gains inspiration from their audience.

"The more we know each other over time, the better we can take the jam," Meyers said. "We turn songs back into one another. We can really get down and wail and really go outside of the box."

Outside of the box is pretty solidly where the whole band's thinking is. Though the group has recorded a couple of demo tracks you can hear on their Facebook page. Meyers said they're more concerned with getting their music to the man on the street and less about recording an entire album.

"It's important to get your music out in front of people. You write it and you take it out and see what peoples' reaction is," he said. "We thrive off of people having a good time, and if that just means bringing people to a bar and playing late into the night, then we're down to do that."

Playing to the crowd and putting their musical creations out into the world – these are the things Dirty Comp'ny are working towards. It's why they research, write, rewrite, practice and push for more shows. Theirs is the real, raw music I wouldn't mind hearing as the backdrop to my day in place of whatever song has been churned out by the latest hit machine.

"We all have soundtracks being played in the back of our lives," Rogers said. "Whether you're playing it on your phone or in your car when you're coming home, there are things we choose to listen to, and they make us feel a certain way about life. And we're just trying to be the background to somebody's life."

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Run the Jewels

Run the Jewels

Unlike a certain Jay-Z album I could mention, the latest collaborative effort from El-P and Killer Mike has no intention of favoring fans who own a product the artist endorses. Quite the contrary: the Brooklyn-Atlanta duo, under the moniker of Run the Jewels, have released their eponymous debut



for anybody to download for free on the Fool's Gold website. Even with some artists' inclinations to embrace the digital landscape as a distribution medium, it's still easy, and almost natural, to think that anything given away for free these days usually reflects the quality of the work. What's important is that in terms of artistic sincerity, Jay-Z's good intentions exclusively towards Samsung users have nothing on Run the Jewels.

To provide some contextual background to the formation of Run the Jewels, El-P and Killer Mike both released critically successful solo albums last year which proved underground hip-hop is alive and thumping. While Mike's *R.A.P. Music* is the first official collaboration where El-P provided a complimentary production to Mike's politically incendiary lyrics, this Run the Jewels project consolidates and solidifies their strengths. Over the course of a mere 33 minutes, El-P and Mike celebrate what they accomplished last year by working even harder.


Given how this album carries a certain victory-lap attitude, the substance within *Run the Jewels* isn't supposed to be of the same caliber as something like *R.A.P. Music* or *Cancer 4 Cure*. However, anyone with a sense of humor can deduce that this is a sincere, yet comical effort. You won't find political discourse on the same level as Mike's "Reagan" track, but rather, you'll hear challenges against Jay-Z and Kanye West's *Watch the Throne* collaboration on "Sea Legs." Nor will you find a spastic club banger with the same intensity as *R.A.P.*'s "Big Beast," but you will likely agree that *RTJ*'s 10 tracks maintain a consistent level of high energy.

There are comparisons that can be drawn between *Run the Jewels* and *Watch the Throne*, but the fact of the matter is, both duos cater to audiences of differing tastes while they coexist in the same genre. The latter duo celebrates wealth and hedonism while satirically gloating about their spoils. The former would rather have you enjoy over-the-top violence with ironic sexual themes, as exemplified by Prince Paul's seductively goofy appearance in "Twin Hype Back": "I got your glass of Beefeater / I got a brand new deck of Uno cards /... How about I pick you up on my brand new Segway?" In terms of artistic integrity, which would you rather hear: *Watch the Throne* or *Run the Jewels*? (*Colin McCallister*)

Force Fields at Home

Here we have a side project from Robert Pollard, another solo effort under a pseudonym that distinguishes this album from his standard Todd Tobias-accompanied solo albums. The one man band "uses old instruments," as the liner notes indicate, while also making use of "Zube Tube Jr. (The



Even for Pollard, known to stretch the limits of songwriting with wordplay, lyrically-driven changes and structures that pack a nonlinear progression into two- or three-minute bursts, this is a wacky album. It's an album for fans who know Pollard's work well and love what he does – that, or for hipsters who assume the stranger a record is, the better it is. Pollard records on an old 90s-era multitrack recorder for *Force Fields*. The results are as raw, interesting and unusual as you might imagine an artist who's written nearly 2,000 published songs is capable of.

Highlights of side one include "Current Pressings, Colors and Styles," which follows the atmospheric "Come See the Supermoon" with a spacey riff punctuated by an even snare beat, bursting into guitar crescendo and ending abruptly. It's as close as Pollard gets to pop on side one. "Strangers for a Better Society" is one of the most interesting tracks lyrically, as it seems to call out politicians "Dodg-

Joni Mitchell

Court and Spark (1974)

Canadian folk singer Joni Mitchell (born Roberta Joan Anderson) took some time off after her fifth album to compose what may be the greatest compilation of music she ever produced. Although a tad melodramatic, Mitchell enlisted a pool of talent



(Robbie Robertson, Graham Nash, David Crosby) to begin her transition from straight folk to a smoother jazz-folk-rock.

The title track opens the record with fundamental jazz piano and light guitars. Mitchell's voice, it should be noted, is an instrument itself. "Help Me" may be her most recognizable song and has a power flute and saxophone. The flute also shows up in "Free Man in Paris," a track that picks up the pace of the record. "People's Parties" has a great acoustic guitar arrangement, and Mitchell showcases her vocal range from high to low in this one. It flows right into "Same Situation," an introspective track that quietly disappears behind a modest string arrangement.

Side two has a different vibe with more woodwind and brass, and her songwriting feels more descriptive. It's a breezier side with the exquisite "Just Like This Train" and the harmony-infused "Raised on Robbery" which is one of my favorite tracks on the album. The final song is "Twisted," a track that takes elements from each of the previous 10 tracks and blends a little humor, jazz, folk, blues and the clever (almost cynical) lyrics of Mitchell. It also features a little Cheech & Chong if you really pay attention.

Mitchell has released 13 more albums since *Court And Spark*, the latest one being *Shine* from 2007. Although semi-retired from the industry she stays relevant yet sometimes misunderstood with her political thoughts as well as the controversial Morgellons syndrome that she suffers from. Mitchell will be 70 in November.

ing pointed questions / Just to always please us ... With the soft fist of intelligence / Delivered to the spot."

"Peter Pan Can" is sloppy sort-of-jangle-pop early on side two and includes the lines "I don't like robot music" and "I don't dig your national anthems." What follows continues the weirdness, a dialogue between "Non Factual Alice" and "Prime Time Eddie" in the piano piece "Alice and Eddie (Fabulous Child Actors)." In the song, Pollard does for the piano what Daniel Johnston does for the guitar.

"Gymnasium Politics" has an interesting vocal refrain/outro with Pollard accompanying himself on multiple vocal tracks, as he's done before on *Alien Lanes*. As one moves through side two, it's hard not to get in the spirit of the album. This is clearly an artist who enjoys the act of creation, and isn't releasing the work with any sort of concern for what people will say about it.

Essentially, Force Fields at Home is a wonderfully strange album that will appeal to Bob Pollard die-hards. If you're a Guided By Voices fan who likes it when Pollard gets weird, this is the record for you. (Steve Henn)



Rocker Lita Ford Returns to the Fort

If you've browsed through Neon Armadillo's upcoming concert calendar, one show in particular probably caught your eye. On Friday, September 13 the stunning Lita Ford will be stopping in town to perform at the Armadillo for what is sure to be a show to remember – especially when you combine the intimate surroundings of the venue with one of the more important female representatives of the rock genre.

Ford is indeed a rock pioneer who got her start back in 1975 at the age of 16 with the all-female rock group The Runaways, one of the first girl groups to break through the male-dominated world of rock music. After the band broke up in 1979, she launched a solo career that eventually gained the commercial success she'd hoped for, with the 1988 release of *Lita*. That album spawned such hits as "Kiss Me Deadly," "Close My Eyes Forever" and "Back to the Cave." An avid MTV viewer back in the day, I can still remember being well-focused on the "Kiss Me Deadly" video. Wow, what guy didn't love that video? Lita strumming on her BC Rich guitar, heavily teased hair and crawling on the floor in sexy leather. It could very well passed as a Boudoir Noir ad.

It was around that time Ford came to town and performed at the Foellinger Theater while on tour with Yngwie Malmsteen. I still occasionally hear stories of how good that show was and what I missed. If I remember right, I didn't have my license and tickets were around \$14.50, a lot of dough considering I had to save lunch money, mow yards and buy cigarettes to maintain my tough guy image.

Her next release, *Stiletto*, didn't quite measure up commercially, and she eventually put her music career on the shelf for nearly 15 years to focus on raising her children. At that time, I'm not sure anyone knew how long that break would be, and folks had to wait

until 2009 to see her next release, *Wicked Wonderland*, which gained rave reviews and even had a track featured on the Xbox 360 and Playstation 3 video game Brutal Legend. She did stroll through town for that release, performing at Piere's alongside Queensryche. That was probably one of the weirdest show setups I've seen, with Ford only performing 3 songs all backed by Queensryche. It was a tease, but it was definitely cool seeing her.

With a music career that has spawned almost 40 years, a brief engagement to Black Sabbath's Tony Iommi and marriages to both W.A.S.P. guitarist Chris Holmes and former Nitro vocalist Jim Gillette, Ford is without a doubt a rocker. Plus, she shows no sign of letting up, as she's out supporting her latest release, Living like a Runaway, which was co-written and produced by Gary Hoey. In October comes a live album, The Bitch is Back ... Live. And with that come tour dates in Australia, Europe and the U.S. as well as the Monsters of Rock cruise in the Bahamas. Her current touring band features guitarist Mitch Perry (MSG, Asia, Edgar Winter), bassist Marty O'Brien (We Are Fallen, Tommy Lee, Static-X, Disturbed) and drummer Bobby Rock (Vinnie Vincent Invasion, Nelson).

Come out early that evening, as our very own Brother and Actual Size open the show. Tickets are \$18 in advance and \$20 day of, available now at Neon Armadillo. Act fast; they're gonna go quick!

moter will understand: "In Denver, we've played an event every year for five years straight. See, they go by beer sales ... and we outsell everybody in beer."

Chenier hasn't just been a tireless emissary of zydeco on the stage. He's also recorded several well-received albums over 20-plus years. These records give him a chance to share the same energy he and the band bring to their live shows – and also stretch and expand the genre with jazz, rock and funk touches.

In 2012, Chenier's dedication and craft were recognized in a big way when he received a Grammy nomination in the Best Regional Roots Music Album category. Unfortunately, 2012 marked the first year in which several different (and disparate)

forms of music – including Hawaiian music, polka, Native American music, zydeco and others – had lost their own individual categories and were lumped together. Chenier didn't win, but he's philosophical about the experience.

"There are so many different styles in that category. It would have been nice if they still had the zydeco category, but I was still happy to be nominated."

What's next for C.J. Chenier and his

What's next for C.J. Chenier and his crowd-pleasing band? More high-energy shows, for sure. And more time in the recording studio.

"I plan to get another CD out early next year," he says. "Maybe we'll see if we can make it back to the Grammys again. I want to open some more eyes to what we do."

the late 90s, forming his own band, the Flip Tops, and creating his own record label, Blue Bella Records. The company was named for Moss's beloved 1970 Lincoln Mark III, and there couldn't be a more fitting symbol – a big car made for the freedom of the open road – to represent Moss's need for musical independence.

Also symbolic was his popular 2006 live album *Live at Chan's*, a recording of a performance at a favorite venue, Chan's Fine Oriental Dining in Woonsocket, Rhode Island. It's a document of everything that Moss has learned over the past couple of decades, an energetic extravaganza of freewheeling blues by a collection of musicians who know how to stay out of each other's way and give the audience more of their money's worth.

"I wanted to make sure that the CD reflected the spontaneity of our live performances," Moss says. "I've been blessed with an extremely talented band; each one

of us is a multi-instrumentalist and has no problem switching it up during our shows."

problem switching it up during our shows."

Moss captured the band's live vibe on two more albums, *Play It 'Til Tomorrow* in 2007 and *Live at Chan's*, *Combo Platter No.* 2 in 2009, and then delivered a new studio album, his fifth, called *Privileged* in 2010. His recordings have gathered an armload of Blues Foundation Blues Award nominations, a tradition that continued with his latest, 2011's *Here I Am*, which was nominated for Rock Blues Album of the Year.

That's where Moss is now, starting with the lessons he learned in the blues and combining them with everything from rock to funk to gospel in order to produce something new. It's a direction that began with *Privileged* but gains serious momentum on *Here I Am*, and there's little reason to expect that Moss's innovation isn't going to keep gaining speed as he heads toward the future with, of course, a solid respect for where he's been.

collective. No, these were headier fare that elicited the breezy scope of simple acoustic songs, yet underneath there was something happening you couldn't quite put your finger on.

Time Off is breezy, smooth and at times strikingly complex, like a fine scotch. Gunn played with Kurt Vile's Violators, and there's certainly that "lazy smile" vibe in these songs, especially in album opener "Water Wheel." Gunn's voice is a cross between Nick Drake and Ben Ottwell of Gomez – hefty and full, yet still calming and easy going. Tim Rutilli of Red Red Meat can also be heard in Gunn's wobbly vocal delivery.

"Water Wheel" is a good place to start with this record as it's one you can fall right into and want nothing more than to stop what you're doing and take the trip with Gunn and his fluid guitar. Like Vile, Steve Gunn likes to take his time getting to wherever he's going. They say the trip is more important than the destination, and Gunn definitely likes to take his time getting to any sort of conclusion. This is to our benefit. "Lurker" is another light and easy acoustic-driven track, opening up with some great 12-string guitar before the song gets its walking shoes on and takes us on another hike through some groovy acoustical brush. Think Jimmy

Page's excellent acoustic work on *Houses of the Holy* and it would give you a good idea of the territory we're dealing with here.

Steve Gunn is more than proficient on the 6- and 12-string guitar, both electric and acoustic. He has a bluesy feel to his solos. yet you can tell he's been influenced by more than the usual suspects. "Street Keeper" and "New Decline" bring Richard Thompson's more esoteric style of playing to mind with a hint of slide guitar thrown in to break up the maudlin. "Old Strange" brings to mind Nels Cline's work; specifically his beautifully dense and challenging work on his mostly acoustical Coward album. "Trailways Ramble" is the eight-minute closer that acts as an acoustical mantra, repeating itself over and over again until you feel you've transcended space and time.

Time Off was an album that just sort of snuck up on me. It starts out as a wonderfully breezy acoustic record that sounds well-made by a guy that seems to know his way around a fret board.

But spend a little more time with Steve Gunn's excellent new release and deeper emotions reveal themselves. Hidden truths and worldlier intentions arise song after song. Scotch and soda optional. (*John Hubner*)

Why Air Travel Sucks

Full Upright and Locked Position by Mark Gerchick, W.W. Norton & Company, 2013 When I fly, I often fly

low-cost airlines (freelance writing isn't the best-paying career in the world), and I'm very used to listening to fellow travelers grumble about how terrible the airline we're flying is.

On recent trips I've heard complaints about the airline because of a delayed flight (on a day when weather had delayed virtually every flight, on every airline, leaving O'Hare) and an aborted landing (despite the fact that it was another airline's plane that failed to get out of our way so we could land). There's no doubt that flying can be a difficult and unpleasant experience, but it's also clear that most people have no idea why it's often so frustrating. Full Upright and Locked Position attempts to

fix that problem. Aviation lawyer Mark Gerchick identifies three factors that have fundamentally changed the experience of air travel in recent years, mostly for the worse. First and most obvious is the security crackdown that came in the wake of 9/11; flying is a trying experience like no other post-9/11, and it's nothing

like it was 20 years ago. Then, Gerchick says, came the spike in fuel prices in 2008 that threatened airlines' profitability and scared them into going on a cost-cutting binge. Finally, there was the rise of low-cost airlines, nimble companies that attempted to reshape the industry and end the dominance of the big airlines. These three things, Gerchick argues, are largely to blame for most of our air-travel troubles in 2013.

The author tries to explain why this is so by walking us through the details of just about every aspect of the industry, from the design of planes to safety issues to employee relations to baggage handling to the intricacies of air traffic control. He perhaps goes a little bit heavy in the chapters on FAA and Department of Transportation regulations and compliance, but he is a lawyer after all. His explanations are, for the most part, illuminating and interesting.

Perhaps most illuminating is the part of the book in which Gerchick clarifies the arcane and inscrutable practice of airline ticket pricing. The practice inspires a raft of questions. Why does the price



of a particular seat on a particular flight vary so widely depending on when I buy it? Why did the guy sitting next to me pay half as much for his ticket as I paid for mine? Why is the guy up front in business class willing to pay an extra \$1,500 for a no-extra-charge bev-

The explanation is complex and Gerchick gives us all of it – but it comes down to this: airlines have figured out how to get every one of us to pay as much as we're willing to pay for our seats, and no less. I pay a low fare because that's all I'm able and willing to pay, and the guy up front pays many times what I pay, for essentially the same service, because he can. And the

airline manages to fill an airplane with passengers, each of whom has paid his own personal maximum price for his ticket.

People often joke about an airplane's economy class as a version of the steerage class in an oldtime ocean liner, as if the comparison is clever yet not literally true - when the comparison

is, in fact, precisely true. Airlines pack the backs of their planes full of passengers who can't afford to fly any other way, and they fill the bigger seats in the front with passengers who are able to pay 10 times as much as the folks in the back for a bit more legroom and the preservation of their corporate-class image.

The class division on the airplane breaks down along the lines of the country's economic division: the dollars are concentrated in the few seats up front, but the masses in the back keep the plane flying by contributing all their pennies to

Gerchick's breakdown of airlines' pricing strategy and structure makes air travel seem like a clear refutation of the idea of America as a classless society, and anyone who sees a substantial difference between steerage on the Titanic and economy class on a 737 is kidding himself. And when you think of it that way, it makes sense: riding in the bottom of an ocean liner was no fun, so why should we expect flying to be any more enjoy-

Whedon and Pals Pull Off Something with Nothing assistance of a talented cast and a lean and

"Oh! What men dare do! What men may do! What men daily do, not knowing what they do!" wails a suffering character in Shakespeare's Much Ado About Nothing. It is said in a grim scene filled with deceit, betrayal and tragedy. I love this line because it can have many meanings. That could also be said about Joss Whedon who has adapted and directed this brilliant play into a clever, funny and completely delightful movie that celebrates this much beloved comedy.

There aren't many directors who, after finishing shooting an expensive and complicated major studio film but before going into the grueling process of editing the film, would relax by spending a few weeks with friends making another movie. Not just any other movie, but a contemporary modern dress and decor screen adaptation of Shakespeare, using the real language of the play, with almost no budget, using mostly friends. This is the task Whedon set himself.

He had finished shooting The Avengers which went on to become a huge commercial and critical success. He was scheduled to vacation in Tuscany with his wife and production partner Kai Cole. For fun, this couple had been having occasional readings of plays by Shakespeare in their home over the years.

Whedon wanted to do this project, and his wife was willing to cancel their vacation to make the film. They agreed that the vacation would be filled with worry about how to bring The Avengers from footage to fruition and decided to skip it. (At the end of the play Benedick urges Don Pedro "to get a wife." I would add, especially if you can get one as supportive and simpatico as Kai Cole.)

The movie they have made with the

innovative production team calls for a celebratory reading of the "what men do" line. My favorite reading of this line is in Ouiz Show, as Paul Scofield and Ralph Fiennes play screen versions of a real father and son, Mark and Charles Van Doren, professors of literature. They quote this line in a friendly game of recitation of Shakespeare. At that moment in the film, the son knows he is doing something that could deeply embarrass the family. The father is unaware. It is a heartbreaking, foreshadowing reading of the Much Ado About Nothing is the funni-

est and darkest of Shakespeare's comedies. Beatrice and Benedick are the wittiest, sharpest-tongued pair of lovers Shakespeare gave us. It is the source from which the best screwball comedies of the 30s and 40s flow. (Some of these have been named "comedies of remarriage" by Stanley Cavell in *Pursuits* of Happiness: The Hollywood Comedy of Remarriage.) The film is shot in black and white. The costumes and music give a nod to that era. It is not a stretch to compare the tone, wit and pace of this film with The Philadelphia Story.

Benedick and Beatrice both disdain marriage at the beginning of the play and film. He scorns marriage because it weighs men down, obligates them and spoils their fun. She has more ambivalent reasons for her dislike of the institution. She does not like the idea of submerging and submitting to a man, but she also knows that not being married severely limits her options and sets her apart from most of society. Imagine how easily that translates into today's time.

Amy Acker and Alexis Denisof play Be-



atrice and Benedick, and both give wonderful performances. The two have chemistry together; they're quick with dialogue and believable in anger, humor and in kisses. When the plot turns dark and Beatrice demands Benedick kill Claudio to avenge her cousin and prove his love for her, these actors manage this dramatic transition convincingly.

The physical comedy of each is accomplished. When Benedick struts in front of Beatrice, in full vanity, he stretches like the usual gym rat, rolls into push-ups, then yoga poses and ends with a pilates move or two. When Beatrice eavesdrops on her cousin and maids talking (deceptively) of Benedick's love for her, she falls down stairs and rolls around the kitchen. I, and everyone in my audience, was laughing out loud.

There are many other fine performances in Much Ado About Nothing. Clark Gregg and Reed Diamond are especially good as the film's "older" gentlemen, Leonato and Don Pedro. Ashley Johnson is lovely as Margaret, the compromised maid. Sean Maher makes an excellent villain. Every performance is good, but the milder characters just have less to do.

The comic relief is hilarious. Nathan Fillion (Castle) plays the gloriously ridiculous Dogberry. He pulls off the verbal gaffs, the dim wit and the oblivious conviction to deliver the "I am an ass" joke. In his over-sized, ill-fitting suit, he is joined by the members of his team, the original Keystone Cops.

Modern norms are used well in the film. The bumbling cops have great fun with their sunglasses. When Don Pedro "receives a letter," he holds up his smart phone. When the gents have succeeded in fooling Benedick into believing Beatrice loves him, they fist bump. Slipping a phone into a base with speakers and hitting play is just as effective as asking musicians to commence playing.

The film's nice home in a gated community with security guards in place stands in easily for a castle and a retinue of soldiers. Whedon doesn't drop the theme of returning from war, the European references to place and rank or the tough language and penalties for a lack of virtue.

But the contrasts don't produce an annoying dissonance. They demonstrate how portable the human condition is and affirm how well Shakespeare understood human nature. Dressing people up in costume and putting them in a castle to demonstrate the timelessness of Shakespeare dates Shakespeare. Whedon's approach doesn't. It suggests that things, especially for women. haven't changed that much.

Do we lie? Yes. Do silly proud men lacking a sense of worth and purpose still kill each other over petty slights? Yes. Do they sometimes use the affections of a woman as the excuse? Yes. When our better natures triumph, isn't life grand? Yes.

I'll do what Whedon didn't have to do and paraphrase Shakespeare. Wow! When we have the passion and conviction to do something, we find a way to do it. Though we may be stumbling blindly, sometimes it works out beautifully. Much Ado About *Nothing* is proof.

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------ Review • Taj Mahal **Vibrant Colors and Flavors**

Before I met Jon I was a sheltered eater. I grew up in a small town in northern Illinois, and family meals consisted of stew made in the Crockpot, roast beef, pork chops and mashed potatoes. When she was feeling adventurous, my mom occasionally prepared Polish sausage or lasagna. The only restaurant in my hometown was an Italian Dari-ette that also served pizza. Jon, on the other hand, grew up in the Chicago suburbs surrounded by a wide variety of ethnic restau-

I will never forget the first time he introduced me to Indian food. He had come to visit me at college for the weekend, and we were on our way to the train so he could make the trek back to Indiana. We stopped at

his favorite Indian restaurant in Oak Park, Illinois. My love affair with Indian food began that evening. The rich smells, vibrant colors and the intense flavors - the entire experience filled me up. I had never had anything like it, and I couldn't wait to have more. I wanted to try everything on the menu.

Two years later, when I finally joined Jon as an

Indiana resident, we were pleasantly surprised to discover amazing Indian cuisine at Taj Mahal, located on West Jefferson in Coventry Plaza. Our favorite thing about Taj is the buffet, offered every day at lunchtime. We love it because we can never choose which dish to eat, and this allows us to sample a wide variety. It's also a good option for those who have never had Indian food. You can try a little bit of everything to determine whether or not it's for you.

After years of sampling, I've landed on a favorite dish, paneer masala, a rich dish made with Indian cheese and a creamy tomato-based sauce. Jon is a fan of saag, a spinach- and mustard leaf-based curry

and naan, leavened, oven-baked flat bread. You can order your dish mild, medium or spicy. My tastes are more delicate, so I always order mild, which still has a slight kick. Jon orders his medium and spices it up with Indian pickles or onion chutney. Other favorites include tandoori chicken, smoky marinated chicken legs and thighs; samosas, a fried savory pastry filled with spiced potatoes, onions, peas and lentils; and

> chana masala, a chickpea and curry dish.

If you opt for the buffet, I encourage you to sample every dish. Indian food is well known for its rich and flavorful sauces. and you may elect to eat them over rice or with naan. Not every dish has curry in it (a common misconception among folks who have never tried Indian food), and they all dif-

fer greatly in texture, flavor and ingredients. And be sure to save room for dessert. Jon and I love the gulab jamun, a cheese-based dessert similar to a dumpling often soaked in light syrup. We eat ours in the rice pudding. After a spicy meal, the cool of the rice pudding coupled with the sweet, soft galub jamun is nothing short of perfect.

I'd be remiss if I didn't tell you about lassi, a soothing yogurt drink similar to a smoothie, available in strawberry or mango. Taj Mahal also has a mango milkshake on the menu that is worth a try.

Tops at the Box: District 9 writer/director Neill Blomkamp sure has come a long was since the D9 buzz first hit in the late summer of 2009. His first major market release, a sci-fi thriller called Elysium, opened strong last weekend, selling over \$30 million in the U.S. over its first three days. Add to that another \$11 million overseas and Blomkamp's Matt Damonled romp is fast on its way to earning back its \$115 million dollar production budget. Reviewers are saying mixed things about the film thus far, but ya know what? Reviewers stink. Especially when it comes to films that arrive with great expectations. I would bet every single one of the \$11 that currently are in my bank account that Elysium is very much worthy of an afternoon at the theater. Or, at the very least, a rental.

Also at the Box: Ensemble comedy We're the Millers, another film that has been seeing very mixed reviews thus far, took the weekend's No. 2 spot at the box, selling \$38 million over its first five days and about \$26 million over the weekend. Produced for about \$37 million, We're the Millers is already into the black despite being, very likely, a painfully pedestrian modern comedy. Looks like a rental to me, if mostly

because the production style and general quality of the film seems to be very un-filmic. Taking the No. 3 spot at last week's box office was DisneyToon Studios' Planes, selling \$22 million over its first weekend. The film is the first of a planned trilogy and was initially slated as a home video release. Supposedly Disney liked the end product so much that they gave the film - voiced by Dane Cook, Val Kilmer, Elaine Bennes, Anthony Edwards and some other B-Listers an almost-full theatrical push. Rounding out last weekend's Top 5 were, at No. 4, Percy Jackson: Sea of Monsters (\$14.6 million) and, at No. 5, 2 Guns (\$11 million). Also of note, Woody Allen's Blue Jasmine, featuring a said-to-be-Oscar-worthy performance from leading lady Cate Blanchett, again led the way in

per-theater average, selling another \$2.5 million, upping the film's threeweek limited run to just over \$6 million in the U.S. Time to seriously up that distro, Sony; people who live outside the 15 biggest cities in the country like movies too.

New This Week: Last week we suggested that you hold onto your movie-going dollars in preparation for this coming weekend's promising batch of releases. Of the four major releases, three are must-sees. On top of that, there are two very promising indies – Ain't Them Bodies Saints and Austenland – that will begin to see some test releases in major markets. The first wide release you should consider is Lee Daniels' The Butler, an ensemble period piece from the Weinstein Mafia that critics are forecasting to be a major player in the coming Oscar season. About a black White House butler (the always great Forest Whitaker) who witnesses several notable events during his decades-long tenure, The Butler boasts one of the year's most interesting casts, including Whitaker, Liev Schreiber, Robin Williams, Oprah Winfrey, John Cusack, Jane Fonda, Cuba Gooding, Jr., Terrence Howard, Vanessa Redgrave, Alan Rickman and several others. Reviews and advance screening reactions have both been very intriguing thus far. Next up is Joshua Michael Stern's Jobs, starring Ashton Kutcher as Apple dude Steve Jobs. The film, like The Butler, spans decades and, I think, looks promising. Remember when everyone was ragging on "The Facebook Movie" (aka David Fincher's The Social Network) and it ended up being maybe that year's best film? Well, I don't think that's going to happen here, but I do think *Jobs* will be a lot better than people are expecting. Ashton Kutcher is - wait for it - underrated. There, I said it. Last in our trilogy of worthwhile major releases this week is action-comedy Kick-Ass 2, featuring all the kick-ass kiddos from the original film and adding Jim Carrey and John Leguizamo. No telling how good this will be, but I assume many will see it simply because the first film falls somewhere between modern classic and cult classic. It was, and remains, a stellar entry into the action canon. Kick-Ass 2, for all we know, could be really, truly, bad. The fourth major release this weekend, despite having a great cast, seems very boring. It has something to do with offices and money and guys in suits and is directed by Robert Luketic, also known as the guy who brought us stinkers The Ugly Truth, 21, Monster-in-Law and Killers. One of the great living actors, Gary Oldman, is involved, so who knows? Could be worthwhile. Doubt it.
