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# A Meeting of Cars and Stars

There is so much going on at Auctions America's flagship Auburn Fall Collector Car Weekend, August 28-September 1 at the historic Auburn Auction Park that it's tough to know where to begin. For starters, NBC

Sports Network will broadcast the event live August 29-31. Then there are television stars, monster truck and helicopter rides, freestyle motocross action, memorabilia, car corral, swap meet - the list goes on and on. And, oh yeah, there will be cars. Collector cars. Lots and lots of cars. Eleven hundred of them, on-site and on the block. You can see everything from a 1962 Goggomobil TS250 Coupe to a 1933 Ford Hot Rod Highboy Roadster "Mexican Blackbird" to a 1976 AMC Hornet Station Wagon.

As always, the Auburn Fall auction coincides with the Auburn Cord Duesenberg Festival, now in its 57th year. If you like cars, Auburn is the place to be this Labor Day weekend.

Keith Koscak of Auctions America in Auburn said the 2013 Auburn Fall will have something for everybody.

"We've got a lot of great things for the whole family going on this

year," Koscak said. "We've got cars in every price category, from \$5,000 up to as high as \$1.5 million. Cars from a 1907 Ford Runabout to modern sports cars. We even have three Duesenbergs this year, which is pretty special."

Koscak added that one of the main things not to miss are the television stars who will be on hand. And a television network as well.

"Also new this year is the coverage by NBC Sports," Koscak said. "They're going to do nine hours of coverage that will bring the auction to 80 million homes."

Jessi Combs, star of Discovery's Overhaulin' and All Girls Garage, will be on hand Saturday, August 31 and Sunday, September 1 to sign autographs and meet with fans. And Jessi Combs has a lot of fans. After taking a shot at being a professional snowboarder, Combs decided what she really wanted to do was pursue her love of cars and driving. She enrolled in a specialty school in Wyoming where she learned to build cars from the ground up. Her skill, enthusiasm and personality turned out to be a perfect combination for television. Following a guest co-host stint on Overhaulin', she co-hosted Xtreme 4X4 until an accident on the show sidelined her. She was bent in half by some huge contraption and broke her spine. Amazingly she recovered fully and went on to appear on 2

Guys Garage, TruckU, a SEMA Show special, Dupli-ColorTV, Full Throttle TV, Pirate4x4 TV Live, Behind the Scenes with Bosch 125 and Mythbusters.

Richard Rawlings and Aaron Kauffman, stars of Discovery's Fast N' Loud will also be on hand Saturday and Sunday doing

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> pretty much the same thing as Jessi Combs signing autographs and meeting fans. These guys are a bit, um, scruffier than Combs but have a large fan base nonetheless.

> Rawlings and Kauffman run a shop called Gas Monkey Garage which is featured on Fast N' Loud. Both natives of Texas, the two grew up tearing down cars and putting them back together in ways that made them happy. That usually means the cars, once reassembled, are fast. And loud. Makes sense.

> Rounding out the TV celebrity appearances is Wayne Carini, the host of Velocity's Chasing Classic Cars. Carini is the Grand Marshall of the ACD parade which is slated for 1 p.m. Saturday. He is a master of car restoration; he's restored cars belonging to David Letterman, Ivan Lendl and the Du-Pont family.

> Of course, the real reason for all the celebrity appearances, festivities, parades and hoopla is to buy and sell really cool cars,

and there's going to be a lot of that going on. One of the more anticipated groups of automobiles coming to Auburn is the collection of Ed Ewing. Ewing, a semi-retired business tycoon from Jasper, Indiana, will be auctioning some 100 cars from his personal collection, a collection he houses at Big Tree

Farm, his 600-acre estate in Santa

NBC Sports Network will air a half-hour special featuring Ewing and his collection. Called Epic Collections by Auctions America. the special will run at 5:30 p.m. EST Saturday and will be rebroadcast numerous times throughout the weekend. NBC will also cover the auction live.

Ewing owns an eclectic collection of cars, including a 1962 Goggomobil TS250 Coupe. The Goggomobil is of German make and is touted as the perfect picnic car. It comes complete with a wicker picnic basket strapped to a rack on the trunk.

Ewing also has a 1921 Ford Model T Paddy Wagon. Model Ts came in only one size, but they could be fitted with a number of body styles. Ralph Zajiczek built this Model T as a replica of an East Kittery, Maine police department paddy wagon. Designed as a longhaul workhorse, Zajiczek has driven it from Dallas to the Arctic Circle and back, Dallas to New York and in a cross-country race from New Jersey to Seattle. It comes with a bell, a hand-crank siren and a billy club.

Another gem in his collection is a 1935 Auburn 851 Phaeton Sedan, a four-door convertible which is recognized by the Classic Car Club of America as a Full Classic.

Another outstanding collection featured this year is that of Kirk F. White. White, according to his website, has been offering "Remarkable Treasures" since 1968.

"We're starting a day early this year as well. The first day will be Wednesday and we're going to have a preview of the Kirk F. White memorabilia collection. He's got some really great stuff."

Not only does White's collection include incredible cars like his 1933 Ford Hot Rod Highboy Roadster Mexican Blackbird, he's bringing along a Venus Fashion point-of-sale model, circa 1940 (15" X 28"), a Rubberlite period advertising model made in Chicago. He's also got vintage toys, prints, model trains, planes, automobiles, motorcycles and boats as well as a rare pair of German aeronautical 3-D valentines (4 inches by 7 inches by 10 inches). His collection certainly lives

So if you're looking to spend Labor Day weekend with the family and thinking about starting a car or memorabilia collection of your own, Auburn is the place to be.

## No End to the Numbers

By 1985 Chicago had been a constant presence on radio for well over a decade. From their debut album, Chicago Transit Authority, through a succession of numerically named releases, Chicago's streak of hit

songs seamlessly made the transition from the late 60s to the early 80s without missing a beat. Through those years, despite the strong presence of a powerful horn section, it was bass player Peter Cetera who emerged as the leading vocalist and writer of their very popular ballads. His departure could easily have signaled doom for the band.

But in his place arrived Jason Scheff, an equally talented bassist with a voice well-suited to inherit Cetera's spot. Only 23 at the time, Scheff had been active in

a variety of cover bands in his native state of California, but he knew he wanted more and then a remarkable twist of fate changed his life forever.

"I knew I wanted to get to the next level, so I started writing more songs," recalls Scheff. "I was working with a publisher who, ironically, went to Warner Brothers to see if my songs could be placed on the Peter Cetera solo album. Warner Brothers heard my demos and said 'Wait a minute, we need somebody to take Peter's spot in Chicago.' And that's when it happened."

Isn't it a little heady and overwhelming to replace someone like Peter Cetera? Or is 23 just young enough to not know any bet-

"Well, you nailed it," says Scheff. "People ask me all the time about that, if it wasn't a bit heady and how I was able to handle it all. But I was young and stupid enough to think 'Why not?' If that all happened to me now at 51, and I had been a career Top 40 musician playing in nightclubs and an opportunity like this came to me, I would probably overthink it. But then I just thought 'Well, okay!'

"I have really adopted the philosophy that you spend the first half of your life trying to be a success and the second half trying to be significant. So now I'm really focused on giving back to the next generation in the hopes that I can help them the way I was

Scheff credits his bandmates in Chicago with more than just establishing his musical career. He says they helped him set his life

on track, as well. "I was your typical kid growing up in the 60s and 70s and got involved in drugs and alcohol. By the time I joined Chicago, those guys had already gone through all of that craziness and had gotten past it. So they really helped me see that I needed to put all of that behind me."

Growing up when he did means he was aware of Chicago's music from early in his childhood, and it did influence him as he began his journey as a musician.

"I listened to everything, and I heard Chicago, of course, but I wasn't really a big fan until Chicago VI. Actually, my older brother Todd won Chicago VI on the radio, and when I heard it I just fell in love. Then when they made their comeback in the 80s, I was a huge fan of that era and Chicago XVI and Chicago XVII. They really put their stamp on music during that time with those power ballads."

Little did he realize then that one day he'd be responsible for carrying on the legacy of those very songs. Scheff says people often comment that he's a clone of Cetera and ask if he's trying to copy him. But Scheff maintains that his experience of covering hits early in his career and his determination to pay homage to the music is behind his ability to so closely replicate Cetera's vocals.

"Peter and I actually had a conversation about this, and I told him that people thought I was copying him when I was really just trying to honor the music. A lot of people think there must be some competitiveness or weirdness between us, but my visit with him was unbelievable. We were able to talk peer-to-peer, and he was grateful to me for carrying the torch."

As it turns out, Scheff's connection to Chicago was not his first brush with musical royalty. His father, Jerry Scheff, was himself a bass player and a member of Elvis Presley's band for a number of years. Young Scheff got to experience some of that excitement firsthand.

"My parents split up when I was young, and my dad ended up moving to Palm Springs and later to Los Angeles," says the San Diego native. "I was born in '62, and

> my dad moved away by the mid-60s, so I would go to school and see all those families, kids with both of their parents, and the one thing I could always hang my hat on was 'My dad plays for Elvis Presley!'

> "He took my brother Darin and me to Las Vegas for Elvis' show once. This was only about three months before he passed away, so it was kind of sad seeing him sick, but it was also really exciting because he had us in the percussion stand. So I can say I've been on stage with Elvis."

Scheff credits his parents and all of his family for making his musical success possible, and he credits the remarkable Chicago songbook for making the job such a pleasure for almost three de-

"I do get asked a lot 'How do you keep it fresh?' and I always say, 'Listen to the material.' It's an amazing songbook. It's fun to play those songs night after night. I remember when my publisher first hooked me up with Chicago, and I was joining the band, he said, 'This is incredible. You can probably get a good five years out of it!' And now this September it will be 28 years. All of us in the band are so grateful, but every night on stage Walter Parazaider, the sax player who founded the band, and I make eye contact and just feel this great sense of gratitude."

Scheff reports that in addition to their regular schedule of touring, the band also recently shot a scene for the Al Pacino film Imagine and Larry David's Clear History. They also keep recording, planning to put new music on their website with no immediate plans to compile the songs into a new CD. While they did release Chicago XXX in 2005 and have also released a holiday album, for now they're content to share their music without any involvement from a label. Having worked with legendary producer Phil Ramone, who passed away in March, Scheff says it becomes more important as they get older to move forward.

"It used to be that if you wanted to record, you had to have a label to release it so you needed permission to record. There's no longer a gatekeeper. We just lost Phil which reminds us that there's a sense of urgency to every day. When you're kids you don't think of things having an expiration date, but we all do. So don't wait for someone to give you a green light. Just get it done."

# KT Goes Surfing

Anyone familiar with Kenny Taylor knows that he always has plenty to do and something new to offer to Fort Wayne music fans. A veteran of the local music scene and known for his involvement with everything from Blue Moon Boys to Deuce, Taylor continues to have a lot of projects which allow him to share his love of guitar music and his eclectic taste for and encyclopedic knowledge of musical genres not always tackled by other musicians

One of his more inventive endeavors is the Tikiongas, an instrumental surf music combo which is turning some iconic songs into tiki classics. Much as Todd Rundgren did more than a decade ago with his CD With a Twist, a remarkable reworking of his own catalog to make it tiki bar suitable, Taylor is finding a unique way to express some very familiar songs in unfamiliar ways.

"I wish we had a Polynesian tiki bar here," says Taylor. "I really love the records of Martin Denny who was an American jazz musician. He had a record called *Quiet Village* and about

seven other albums that had these exotica covers, and he'd have these jungle noises in the background. His drummer did bird calls, and it was all of this great surf music. I grew up hearing surf music on television, and some of the Elvis movies had a surf sound, and I really thought it was cool."

Finding old records at places like the Salvation Army, Taylor found yet another way to make his guitar talk. With the Tikiongas he's merged everything from alternative rock to pop classics to put a surf spin on well-known songs. A video for "Surfs Like Teen Spirit" can be found on YouTube, a conceptual video Taylor speaks of with

"I really think that's a fun video. It usually takes a gestation period of six or seven weeks to get it all right, but after playing it for awhile we finally got that song to sound right. We also do 'Surfin' with the Devil,' which is from 'Runnin' with the Devil,' and 'Sultans of Layla,' which is 'Layla,' but the middle guitar section becomes 'Sultans of

Helping him accomplish this surf revival are drummer Jamie Simon and bass player Andy Pauquette, and Taylor says they're always looking for more songs to remake in

their surf glory.

"We just worked out an arrangement for Madonna's 'Material Girl,' and we have people come up to us a lot and suggest other songs that would be really great as a surf

Another inspiration for Taylor's love of surf music is Dick Dale, a guitarist that Taylor is especially quick to praise.

"I hear songs all the time and think, 'This would be a great song for Dick Dale.' I



would love to do a whole night of Dick Dale songs."

The Tikiongas had their origins several years ago when Taylor first started formulating his plan to pay homage to surf music, but it took him awhile to get the project off the ground.

"I first started the Tikiongas six or seven years ago, but it just fizzled out after three months or so. But I never completely let go of it and just decided a year or so ago that I just needed to do this."

One of the obstacles Taylor faces is time, the enemy to anyone who has too many great ideas and not enough hours to accomplish them all. His full-time job since May has been as guitarist for Fort Wayne legends Spike & the Bulldogs, which Taylor says has allowed him to further expand his abilities.

"It's a real honor to play with those guys and to play music from the 50s and 60s. I've played 50s music before but not much doowop, which requires forceful singing while playing the guitar. It's a real learning opportunity for me. I'm just a cog in the machine, and I have to learn my parts, which requires me to be more disciplined."

He also plays a couple times a year with El's Angels, an Elvis tribute band, along with various solo shows and the Farmland Jazz Band.

"The jazz band isn't my band; it's the band of Ed and John Renz. I'm the old guy in the band, which is cool, and I get to play the banjo in a Dixieland style. I've had this banjo around for years just waiting for a chance to play that kind of music."

# One Big Bashment

DEAL'S GONE BAD

w/UNLIKELY ALIBI

Deal's Gone Bad have learned how to make things go right. With their eighth studio recording set for an early fall release, an incredibly tight and energetic lineup and a growing fan base, the ska/reggae/rocksteady revival pioneers from Chicago are gearing up for a major tour next spring. Since 2007's *The Ramblers*, Deal's Gone Bad have honed their sound and style, adding country and rock flavors to their solid Jamaican-inspired chops.

Deal's Gone Bad return to the Botanical Roots Outdoor Concert Series Friday, August 30. Unlikely Alibi open.

Topping a record as nearly perfect as *The Ramblers* is no small or easy task, but, according to drummer Mike Corcoran, the challenge has been good. Corcoran, one of two original members (guitarist Dave Simon is the other) has lived and played through the lineup

changes and thinks the new record finds Deal's Gone Bad in even better form.

"After *The Ramblers* we became a tighter band," Corcoran said. "We did a world tour to support that record, and all the playing – we did like 180, 200 shows that year – really got us together as a band. We became a live band. The new record shows it. It's going to be really fun to listen to."

That's a no-brainer. Deal's Gone Bad are always fun to listen to. The rhythms are tight, the tunes yank you out of your seat and, with Todd Hembrook on the vocals, the sound transforms you. Hembrook, who for years fronted Fort Wayne ska favorites Skavossas and Heavy Step, started singing with Deal's Gone Bad after moving to Chicago in the early 2000s. Hembrook's voice is reminiscent of the singers who defined the Stax Records sound. And he's got just enough Motown in him to make you think he's some

sort of time traveler. Yet he's got a style all his own. So does the band.

Corcoran had been listening to Fishbone and other bands from the California skate-boarding scene, and when he started digging into the music those bands played, he discovered the music coming out of Jamaica in the 50s and 60s. "At that point I just fell in love with that music," he said.

Deal's Gone Bad first formed in 1994 when the so-called third wave ska revival was nearing its peak in the United States. The band played so infrequently, however, that Corcoran pegs the beginnings of DGB around 1997, when they began playing more around Chicago. Their first major release

Large and in Charge came out that year.

Constant changes to the lineup, however, prevented the band from refining and defining its sound. More than just a band that simply mimicked the sounds of Jamaican musicians like Prince Buster, The Skatalites and The

Wailers, Deal's Gone Bad were always striving for their own style. When Hembrook joined, they were one heavy step closer to finding it

"Over the years our biggest changes came from lead singer to lead singer," Corcoran said. "What we really wanted to do from the start was Jamaican soul. The Jamaican musicians we admired were all listening to American music. Obviously they had their own culture of music, and that was influenced by R&B. What we wanted to do was add our influences of Chicago blues and funk. The last record we really got the closest to that."

Along with Corcoran, Simon and Hembrook, the band includes Mike "Spider" Hobson on bass, Aaron Hammes on sax and vocals, Pedro Hernandez on trombone and

 Exploring the Spirit Through Music

Matthew "Matisyahu" Miller has been having quite the career. He broke out into the public eye in 2005 when the release of his second album, a live record called *Live at Stubb's*, became a surprise hit, going Gold in the U.S. and ushering in a new, unique talent in pop music. Here he was, maybe the most unlikely pop star of his time – a fully garbed

Hasidic Jew rapper who made poppy reggae tracks that, for some reason, fans of both underground hip-hop and jam band culture seemed to embrace. And, of course, Jewish kids everywhere finally had a Rock God of their own.

On paper, it sounded silly. Perhaps I'm being too honest, but to me it sounded like a stew of gimmickry. I live in a neighborhood known for its Hasidic population, so seeing someone in the full garb (the gartel, the rekel, the beard, the curls, the yamaka, etc.) isn't so odd. But to see a rapper dressed as such in Rolling Stone, on the biggest stages in the U.S., well, that was surprising. Fast

forward eight years, and Matisyahu not only has one of music's most diverse and devoted followings, but a feature film, four studio records and three live albums. His most recent release, last year's *Spark Seeker*, is arguably his most accomplished work yet, debuting at No. 19 on the U.S. Billboard charts and featuring his most di-

verse collection of songs to date. The record satisfied fans while also bringing in new ears.

When I finally caught up with Matisyahu via a recent phone interview, he didn't much care to talk about *Spark Seeker*, despite the fact that the record is still going strong and he's still out on the road supporting the record.

"To be honest, I've been recording new music over the last six months, so that's where my head has been," Matis explained as we talked about his upcoming Fort Wayne show. "On the tour we're playing a combination of the old records and *Spark Seeker* tracks. We started off playing a bunch of songs from the new record, and a few really stuck, so we

play maybe four of the new songs."

When I asked about the tour, Matis called it a "reggae summer thing," also featuring Rebelution and Collie Buddz. And while Matis is probably best known as just that – a reggae artist – he's been covering a whole lot of ground, genrewise, over the last few years.

"I'm doing a lot of different things. Each song [on Spark Seeker] has a different flavor and appeal to it. Genre-wise, I like a lot of new things, so I work with a lot of different people and do a lot of diverse sounds."

This prompted me next to ask about his artistic motivations. Is the goal to appeal to as many listeners as possible like, say, Katy Perry might be doing with her records? Or is the goal to simply make the music you want to make? Working in so many genres, I have to assume, can feel like a risky approach. You can easily alienate or even deceive fans. That said, Matis has seen friends like Ben Harper do it success-

fully over the years.

"I've never really created music for a particular audience. It just comes from whatever I'm into at the moment. I mean, I listen to a lot of different stuff. Lately I've been listening to less hip-hop. I've mostly been into electro-soul type stuff like Twin Shadow and the Holy Others. The last record I really, really loved was Frank Ocean's record."

While the diverse sounds of *Spark Seeker* seemed to sell just fine, further establishing Matis' cult following, another notable recent change in his artistic image has had an effect on his day-to-day life as a musician and celebrity. As a skateboarding, rapping, singing, guitar-playing, heavily bearded, fully garbed Hasidic Jew, the 6'4" Matisyahu was hard to miss in a crowd, especially when he was outside of Brooklyn. The guy simply stood out. Then, one day, he shaved.

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All of it. He cut his hair and changed his clothes. Gone was the whole look. Matis now looked like a taller, thinner Adrien Brody, but with salt and pepper stubble, a T-shirt, khakis and a pair of Adidas. He could go out in public and, for the first time since becoming a famous musician, be totally anonymous.

Of course, I had to ask about his fans' reaction to the sudden change. Specifically, I was curious about the reaction he saw from his Jewish fans.

"You know, my Jewish fans are split on it. As an artist you feel misunderstood, but I don't always feel it's my place to explain myself. The music does the talking. I feel like all the songs I've made are authentic representations of where I'm at, and the next record will be the same. And I'll talk about all these things on the next record and how they made me feel and where I'm at with my fans. But to speak on it a little bit, there are those fans who are fans of the music first and foremost. Those fans have been around and stick around, and they totally get it. But there are also the other fans who see it as a betrayal. They think I lost something that I had.

"Everyone has [his] own opinion. It still freaks me out to see people saying 'where's the beard?' or whatever. But that's what we sign up for as public artists. Scrutiny is part of the package."

And while the change in look has certainly been a subject in interviews over the past year or so, very few people have asked Matis about the current state of what seemingly informs his life as an artist the most: his spirituality. Have philosophical ideas changed or were the razors just on sale?

"Well, I'm sort of exploring spirituality right now. I lived with a large set of rules for a lot of years. Sometimes my intuition or feelings line up spiritually, and when they didn't, I tried to force it. So I got to a place where I decided that I wasn't going to force myself to do things that didn't feel right. So it's more about exploring things on my own rather than with a community. I still look to Judaism for spirituality and for symbology or signs. It enriches my life. I still

pray, which is what I was interested in to begin with. A lot of my spirituality beyond Judaism is all about psychology and therapy. Self knowledge and self awareness. Expansion within."

Sounds like an artist, right? Part of the process of finding new creative inspiration involves keeping your mind open to new things – to change and discomfort. To allow yourself to go through things in the most honest, natural way

you can, assessing yourself along the way. Is part of the result Matis' new poppy sound? Who could really say. Certainly, I'm sure, the wandering has informed his creative output at some level.

Eventually our conversation circled back around to just that: the work. The music. Specifically the next record, which Matis seemed to be very excited about, mentioning off and on as we spoke.

"We just pretty much finished recording the new record. We're in the process of mixing it while we're on the road. I'm really excited about it. It's a different direction from the last record. It was produced mainly by my bass player from the Dub Trio, Stu Brooks. And Joel Hamilton. It's gonna be cool. It's gonna be interesting to see people's reaction to that. So we're hoping to have that out early next year."

And, to close, I asked Matis to tell me a little bit about his summer. His tour, specifically.

"Well, you know, there's lots of love on this tour. A really cool group of guys. Really relaxed. I've been on tours where a lot of

people are pretentious, but everyone on this one is just sort of happy. And we're playing a real mix of songs this time. It's you know, a real cool show. Laid back."

Mellow, poppy, positive hip-hop-infused reggae music? Sounds like a great way to wind down the summer to me.

Taylor says he has many more irons in the fire, including a possible gig with rockabilly goddess Wanda Jackson at a December performance.

"It's an event in honor of Pearl Harbor Day, and I've been hired to be in Wanda Jackson's backup band. It's a big deal, and I have my fingers crossed that it all happens. They could have picked any guitar player in the U.S. and picked me. I about fell over when I got the call."

Also this year is his annual October celebration of Chuck Berry's birthday, a performance he shares with Mitch Frazier as the Kenny Taylor Rockestra in which they play all of Berry's hits in their original key. It's those kinds of things which have defined Taylor's career, one dedicated to not traveling the obvious roads.

"I like to do things that are a little different. If someone else is already doing it, I'm probably not interested in it."

While he keeps busy doing his own thing, it's a distinctive path which allows him to remake and revisit the music he's loved over the years, the material which has drawn him to a career playing guitar. He says he has a wealth of "grand, glorious things" he'd like to do if money were no object (like turning El's Angels into an 18-piece band), but he's happy enough if he's always working, never standing still and sounding like Kenny Taylor.

"I always try to sound like someone else, but no matter what I do it always sounds like me. I just try to pay homage to the guys who were heroes of mine and play a big bag of crazy guitar music."

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#### **Daniel Amos**

Dig Here Said the Angel

It's been over 10 years since the last Daniel Amos album. Not that lead songwriter Terry Taylor has been sitting on his duff - what with his alt-Americana band (Lost Dogs), his quirky rock band (Swirling Eddies), various solo albums and composing music for TV and video



to name a few) - he just hasn't had the time. But when a Kickstarter campaign tripled the goal amount, his schedule magically cleared

The result of "getting the band back together" is Dig Here Said the Angel, a brilliant and joyous exploration of the theme of his own death. Oh, he's a wily one, that Uncle Terry! "Forward in Reverse" opens with Mellotron flutes that are soon joined by military snare drums and shimmering guitars; from there, it morphs into a plucky parade of horns that become ensnared in a flanged swirl of orchestral strings. Keyboardist Rob Watson pulls out all the stops, adding realistic strings, timpani, harps, pianos, horns and all manner of tasty touches to make each song a wonder of surprises, no extra charge.

The upbeat rocker "Jesus Wept" has one of my favorite lines on the album, "I found my masterpiece in a discount bin," and also features an oddly disconcerting wobbly guitar sound - or is it an organic keyboard? Not bad for a song about how many of your friends have passed on. The title track is an epic with crusty low bass that bubbles up like a tar pit, reflecting upon its oily surface the light guitar figures that glitter like stars in the heavens. Bassist Tim Chandler cuts loose on this album, and his imaginative, unorthodox style, which can turn a simple folk song into a tension-filled bar brawl, revels in fuzz and a dominant place in the mix.


Offsetting the lush orchestral rock of the first "side" is the stripped-down punk rocker "Now That I've Died," with lyrics from the perfected afterlife like "I'm never cynical (but still a little sarcastic)." A personal favorite is the Jerry Chamberlain-penned powerpop gem "Waking Up Under Water," a dark song full of gigantic guitar hooks that give way to timpani, strings and horns for a modern "Kashmir" feel before adding in a bizarre Middle Easter guitar sound, compliments of Greg Flesch, whose wildly inventive, yet melodic guitar figures will give me months of enjoyment unwinding and understanding. Of course, I have to mention drummer Ed McTaggart who manages to bring freshness and vigor to the aging art form known as rock n' roll drumming, nowhere more so than on the Lennonesque closer "The Sun Shines on Everywhere" where Taylor unveils yet another lush anthem graced with a stunningly gorgeous and melodic guitar solo. One last extra touch to mention is the brief appearance of "Penny Lane" horns in the final seconds of the album, a sly wink and a final ray of hope against a normally dark theme that permeates the album.

In a recent interview Taylor said that this band is basically "accessible 60s pop ... but eccentric." But it's so much more. It has humor, lyrical paradox and intelligence and is very human. Plus it's just danged good. Dig Here Said the Angel is an album that has quick appeal but a depth both lyrically and musically that will certainly be calling me back well into 2014. (Jason Hoffman)

### Daughn Gibson

Me Moan

My love for crooner/songwriter Daughn Gibson didn't come easy. I have a friend (let's just call him Shawn Smiff) who from time to time puts me onto my new favorite thing. He introduced me to Whit Stillman and even hipped me to both Bon Iver and Phosphorescent long before either artist made his first real



waves on the local Urban Outfitters playlist. Mr. Smiff bugged me about Gibson's first solo record, last year's All Hell, several times. Didn't take. The record was a mix of avant garde experimentation and – I dunno – dark, sexy, Nick Cave-influenced weirdo pop with loops and an odd baritone vocal. It just wasn't for me. Then, recently, came Gibson's sophomore record, Me Moan, released by those yuppies at the Sub Pop estate. Smiff, once again, was more persistent than usual. His instant album of the year.

### **Neil Young**

Ragged Glory (1990)

Neil Young's 19th album came out back in the early 90s. There was a lot of hard rock/grunge on the airwaves at the time, so Young joined the party and created his own genre: alt-country/grunge. Ragged Glory rightfully sits on the podium with Zuma and Harvest as one of the best things he ever recorded.



Opening with the stunning "Country Home," the Canadian never sounded better with crisp vocals and a cheery layer of guitars. "White Line" follows and has garage-band simplicity before the angry anthem in "F\*!#in Up." The tracks "Over and Over" and "Love To Burn," two tracks that make up about a third of the entire album, are vintage Young. His supporting band, Crazy Horse, complements the sound with jamming capabilities without rival.

Side two kicks off with "Farmer John," a Don & Dewey original that was a pretty big hit in 1964 for The Premieres. "Mansion on the Hill" is one of the more radio-friendly tracks and has a nod to the Hank Williams era of roadhouse country. "Love and Only Love," another song that clocks in at just over 10 minutes, may be one of my favorite Neil Young songs of all time. It has a supportive arrangement behind some of the best lyrics Young ever put down on paper.

The album closes with the wonderful "Mother Earth," an environmentally conscious song that pleads with the human race to take better care of this place we all call home. A stunning record on so many levels, Ragged Glory is a must have for even the casual fan of Neil Young. Psychedelic Pill, his 35th solo record, was released last October.

Fun Fact: Young was once a part owner of Lionel toy trains and still sits on their board of directors. (Dennis Donahue)

"Have you listened to Me Moan yet?" Sort of. I think I'm gonna buy it and really commit to getting to know it. "Did you buy Me Moan yet?" Not yet.

Finally, I bought a copy of Me Moan. It came on clear vinyl with a free bonus 7" single, some stickers and handsome cover art. I was ready to commit. I wanted to like this beautiful thing. There was something there, surely. Something weird and unique and, possibly, something great. Surely. And so the record spun and spun. I just kept playing the thing, sometimes, admittedly, with my teeth grinding. 'Are those bagpipes?" "Does this guy not kind of sound exactly like the Swedish Chef?" Bort, bort, bort, bort! Things still felt weird and sexy and dark, but I was connecting a little more than I had to All Hell. For starters, the compositions seemed deeper – more interesting, less loopy, more composed. More all-out.

I responded, almost immediately, to a few of the tracks ("Phantom Rider" and "The Pisgee Nest," for sure). To try to describe the sound of those songs would be to take the fun and mystery out of the whole weirdo experience. There's a weird country crooner thing going on, but there's also this anything-goes, ADD-friendly production style - noises and atmosphere and rhythms, all mashed together in the strangest way. Just trust that the collection of composition on Me Moan is perhaps the most unique you'll hear in 2013. I could labor over descriptions but, really, you just have to hear this thing.

As far as the spirit of Me Moan goes, there's maybe a touch of TV on the Radio's self-assured art nerd thing going on, but more than anything the freedom we hear in Gibson's artistic choices is what stands out. That freedom, which is the dominant element on the record, reminds me most of, say, early Tori Amos or even classic era Tom Waits. No, none of Gibson's music sounds a bit like either of those artists, but the creative bravery and playfulness feels very in tune with signature Amos and Waits works like Under the Pink and

The real obstacle for me all along has been Gibson's undeniably odd vocals. Same as his compositions, Gibson's singing is unlike anything you've ever heard. He croons a bit like Ian Curtis, had Ian been born in the American South and at some point listened to a lot

of 60s country and created his own accent. But that's not saying enough about what Gibson does in the vocal booth. Like a great film auteur, Gibson peppers his vocals with an almost constant flow of unexpected detail. Every syllable counts – every second of every track is an opportunity to infuse some odd idea.

After, say, maybe 20 spins of *Me Moan*, it really finally hit. I *loved* this record – well, the bulk of it. Mostly, I loved this artist and his record, partially because it really did sound that great, but mostly because it is so winningly unique and creatively brave. Such records, for me at least, take some real bonding time. Shawn Smiff was right again: *Me Moan* is the real deal and Daughn Gibson, who is now making more approachable music, just might be the most interesting recording artist in America right now. Is *Me Moan* the record of the year? In a way, I think so, if only because it really is that creatively bold, that creatively successful and even inventive. Hopefully others are having an easier time falling for Daughn than I did. Me? I'm just happy I committed, that I trusted a friend who felt strongly about a one-of-a-kind artist. (*Greg W. Locke*)

### Speedy Ortiz

#### Major Arcana

You know, I try to be "with it" and "in the know." I want to be "up to date" on all the relevant music of today. Even as a kid in short pants growing up in rural Hoosierville I was always buying cassettes at my lo-



cal record store. If there were some new band everyone was talking about, you could be sure I had that in my cassette deck. Granted, due to the age I was and my geographical location, most of these cassettes were of the hair metal variety. It was 1984, kids. And it was northeast Indiana. I wasn't listening to R.E.M., Husker Du, The Cure or Echo and the Bunnymen – not yet, anyway.

As a grown-up I'm still trying to keep up on all the relevant indie rock coming down the pike. The early 90s indie rock scene has been rather dramatically raped and pillaged over the last couple years. Some of these revivals have been rather impressive (Yuck, The Pains of Being Pure at Heart, Parquet Courts) while others have not. (Tribes, anyone?) Speedy Ortiz are here to show us their own brand of Pavement dance moves and Nada Surf mope. They seem to have all the right moves. All the off-kilter rhythms and interesting guitar lines are there and, with lead singer/guitarist Sadie Dupuis' smart lyrics and biting storytelling, they seem to have everything they need to win the jaded indie rock oldsters' (old hipsters') approval and love.

I'll just say this right off the bat: there's more Polvo love than Pavement going on here. First off, they're too good of musicians to be Pavement disciples. Pavement were sloppy, stoned and completely oblivious, which is what made them so good. Speedy Ortiz are much more meticulous in their songwriting and structure. Tracks like "Pioneer Spine," "Tiger Tank" and "Casper (1995)" owe a greater debt to albums like Cor-Crane Secret and Without A Sound than they do to Slanted & Enchanted and Bakesale. Dupuis writes lyrics that are more pointed and direct than Malkmus and Barlow as well. She sounds like a less stoned and more world-weary Liz Phair.

Midway through the album the band hits a three-in-arow winning streak with "No Below," "Gary" and "Fun"
where the band puts down the intricacies and noodling guitar lines for earnestness, melody and even some emoting in
Sadie Dupuis' vocals. Great songwriting and storytelling.
"Gary" sounds like Pavement once the THC clouds settled
and Malkmus decided he was serious about this songwriting
thing. Midway through, the song explodes into a fuzzed-out
wall and things get beautifully noisy.

"Fun" is short and sweet. "Criminally twisted, puny little villian," Dupuis sings over a quick pace and a jangly guitar that blows up into a Polvo-like crush before the song ends as it started. "MKVI" ends the album with seven minutes of foreboding guitar noise and a rhythm that plods along. It's

more of a statement than a final song.

If you're like me, you tend to just listen to those indie rock staples of the 90s – Pavement, Dinosaur Jr., Polvo, Sebadoh – as opposed to looking for that fix in current bands with folks in their mid 20s. Maybe because it makes me feel a hell of a lot older when I'm hearing "kids" playing the music of my early 20s. But if you must listen to current bands reviving the golden years of slacker rock, then Speedy Ortiz will treat you right. Major Arcana is a solid listen. (John Hubner)

#### **Selena Gomez**

#### Stars Dance

I woke up bored. This doesn't happen too often as you get older. Mostly, you wake up stressed or busy or depressed. Bored, though, is special. I looked out the window a while, played a few records and scanned



the fridge four or five times with no luck. Finally, I checked my e-mail. As is the case with most weekdays, there were a few digital copies of albums sitting there, accompanied, of course, by review requests. Usually, I get indie rock stuff, mostly from new artists based out of New York but occasionally from someone I love. On this day I received two dance-pop albums from artists I'd never listened to. The first was the debut record from a buzzing new English duo called AlunaGeoge; the second was the first proper solo record from Mexican American actress Selena Gomez, titled Stars Dance. The former is the hot new hipster dance joint; the later is the not-at-all-hip new dance joint. If you covered my eyes and played both records, I wouldn't know which artist was which. If Aluna has an English accent, I don't hear it. Same goes for Selena and a Mexican accent. They both just sound, to me, like modern radio pop.

I decided to review one of these two pop albums, so I played both loudly while catching up on some chores again, not knowing which was which. I liked the record with the baby vocals much less than the record without the baby vocals. It was too soft, too clever, too precious. All that, and the baby-voiced singer wasn't nearly as good a singer as whoever it was singing with a more sultry voice on the other record. I checked and, much to my surprise, it was the Selena Gomez record I preferred. Not the record Pitchfork loves, but the record made by the girl who had a show on the Disney Channel. So I started the thing over again; 11 songs over 39 minutes, a different producer and sound on every song. All huge productions, all mega pop, all featuring strong vocals that border on over-produced. Each track seemed to have a different modern influence - Rihanna, Icona Pop, even Britney Spears - all sung by this youthful-but-sultry girl. None exactly blew my mind, but still, there were some radio gems here. For starters, there's "Come and Get It," a song I'd somehow heard 100 times already without realizing it. A big American radio hit, and a damn fine pop song, for sure. Even if the rest of Stars Dance didn't take for me, I'd keep this song in my iTunes forever, right there with the Carly Rae Jepsen, Charli XCX, Icona Pop and Avril Lavigne

Opener "Birthday" is another big winner. The track opens the record, possibly symbolically, with a more childfriendly slant than the rest of the album. I'm not sure how old Gomez was when she recorded the song, but I know for sure that, until recently, most people just assumed she was still an innocent, virginal princess. Then came that Harmony Korine flick, Spring Breakers, in which Selena played a very adult role. The rest of Stars Dance has a much more adult vibe to it than "Birthday," which is perhaps a bone tossed to Gomez's still young Disney-loving fanbase. Still, the song is stylistically fitting for what Gomez is doing know. It's a poppy dance track with deep, labored production and charming, slightly sexy vocals. That's Stars Dance in a nutshell: Gomez's coming out as a pseudo-adult. The whole thing reminds me quite a bit of Britney Spears' In the Zone record, which saw that artist go from sexy singer to sex symbol.

I feel it necessary to say that, no, aside from "Come and

Get It" and maybe "Birthday," *Stars Dance* is not an album I would ever chose to listen to again. I understand, though, why others are enjoying these 11 tracks. After checking out her pre-solo output on iTunes, I don't get why people liked *that* stuff, but *Stars*, I get. This is a big, catchy electro-pop record full of hooks and cute, borderline sexy vocals. Interesting productions. Sure, Selena Gomez is mostly just interpreting the music of other various current pop stars, but she's doing a good enough job of it.

So will the record make a big (and sexy) enough impression to launch her career as an adult pop artist? As someone who has to compete for airwaves with Rihanna, Katy Perry, Charli XCX, Ke\$ha, Britney, Taylor Swift, Beyonce and whoever else is waiting in line? Hard to say, but I doubt it. Good thing she has that acting career to fall back on. And, okay ... I'm bored again. Time to check the fridge and listen to some real music. (*Greg W. Locke*)

#### Whirr Around

Whirr are lumped into that genre we Generation X oldsters affectionately call "shoegaze." And while some of my favorite music is lumped into this category, I have to say it's getting used way too much. It's become this generic term used



to describe anyone that looks at the floor more than 10 seconds in order to engage some swishing, whirly guitar effect or sings with a hefty amount of reverb on their vocals. This is wrong. This is lazy. This will not be tolerated anymore.

These are the same folks that call Mumford and Sons "indie." Sure, so were Dexy's Midnight Runners considered college rock? Come on, people. It's time to put your music label maker away and actually listen to the music coming out of the speakers (or earbuds, or whatever). Whirr are a band that has been known to stomp on a swishy, whirly pedal or two. And there is ample amount of reverb layered on top of those boy/girl vocal swirls. But they are so much more than a "shoegazer" band. *Around*, in its mere four songs and just under 28 minutes, proves that.

If I had to sum up *Around* in one word I'd have to say mournful. "Drain" is like an eight-minute funeral procession, a mixture of slowcore grind and 4AD Gothic beauty; it's as if Low discovered Bauhaus' *In the Flat Field* and had some sort of tortured spiritual awakening. The song's momentum never gets above a downtrodden march through muddy fields, yet the vocals somehow bring a certain distant sunlight to the proceedings. This is not your momma's shoegaze. This is Gothic rock at its finest. Robert Smith weeps somewhere for his integrity.

"Swoon" continues this new path of shaded enlightenment that Whirr have begun. This song is heavy without being, well, heavy. It's heavy in its overall depth of sound. Guitars are cranky and noisy without shoving it in your face. It's an all-encompassing sound. It envelopes you. On previous albums such as the Distressor EP and their first fulllength, Pipe Dreams, Whirr hinted at this sound, all the while showing some punk roots in the occasional blast of grizzled energy. This time with Around, Whirr sound like a band with six members. They sound huge, and it's a strangely beautiful thing, like a funeral by candlelight. This is the first time I can hear Nick Bassett's former band Deafheaven in the sound of Whirr. Like Deafheaven (especially this year's excellent Sunbather), Whirr create this chaotically beautiful world on their records, one where the starstruck lovers end up together but die in a fiery car crash. But they die together. "Keep" and "Around" finish this four-song mini-epic as if transmitting from a cavern miles into the earth. The bombast reigned in for a more dreamy finale. If you're looking for something jumpy, peppy, some-

If you're looking for something jumpy, peppy, something to get you going in the morning, then check the Warped Tour roster. This is for serious music listening only. It's dark, mournful, dreamy and quite often a beautiful little masterpiece. Gaze at your shoes if you must. Whirr are looking you straight in the eyes this time. (*John Hubner*)



The bluesbased indie rockers Black Cadillacs return to the Fort the last Saturday of the month. They're easily one of the most





lot of bloated baggage overripe with expectation from all genres comes out in the fall), there are films I am eagerly anticipating.

In no particular order, I am looking forward to the following fall titles:

Nebraska - Every film Alexander Payne makes falls somewhere between fascinating and fabulous. This is the first film he has directed without also writing the screenplay. Still, I'm guessing he had an influence; Payne is the perverse poet of the Midwest.

Enough Said - Which can never be true about James Gandolfini. Though it will break my heart to see the guy (whom I prefer to think of as the loveable "Bear" in Get Shorty as much as I adored him as Tony Soprano), I will go and weep seeing him with Julia Louis-Dreyfus in a romantic comedy directed by a real girl, Nicole Holofcener.

David O. Russell grossed me out with Spanking the Monkey and won my heart forever with Flirting with Disaster. After Silver Linings Playbook, can I do anything but buy a ticket to American Hustle?

Leo and Marty joining forces for The Wolf of Wall Street is the top of the season. And I can't stop myself from wanting to see Meryl Streep, Julia Roberts and Julianne Nicholson in August: Osage County. (Why do so many films have colons in their titles this season?)

I would like to think I want to see Her. I like Spike Jonze, and Joachin Phoenix was amazing in The Master. Still, I am ambivalent. Scarlett Johansson as just a voice? She is dull enough as lip-smacking, flesh-flashing meat. Disembody her? Wow. What a

Perennial Oscar favorites the Coen brothers are in the mix with Inside Llewyn Davis. They do well tapping musical roots. The tagline for this outing could be "this time it's folksy." I'm sure Tom Hanks will be on the obvious Oscar bait list for his role in the "based on a true story" Captain Phillips. Pirates. And not from the Caribbean.

I am daydreaming that The Secret Life of Walter Mitty lives up to its James Thurber inspiration. If the reviews are bad, I will just get all Walter Mitty on it - and imagine it good, and not go.

Gravity rests on a premise so scary I'm not sure I can go see it, but it is clearly a must-see for those who can. Bullock. Clooney. Space. Oscar?

Breathe easily and deeply, movie fans. The drought of films with ambition beyond box office returns is over. The good stuff is coming to a theater near you soon.

## Love Conquers All, Even on a Train

Trains and Lovers by Alexander McCall Smith, Pantheon Books, 2013

As cynical as I am, I was cheered by the recent news of the birth of England's royal baby, if only because it was the one story in the news that wasn't about disaster or death or political battles or people doing horrific things to one another. It was simply a story about two parents welcoming a new child, nothing more, and it was an unabashedly positive story. It was the kind of thing I needed to read about. And with that in mind, I'm not going to find fault with Alexander McCall Smith's Trains and Lovers, a book so sentimental and easy that it practically begs to be eviscerated by cynical critics.

The book is not so much a novel as it is a collection of very loosely connected stories. Four TRAINS travelers, three men and a woman, sit LOVERS together on a train from Edinburgh to London, and, over the course of the several-hour trip, they share (or rather, most of them share) stories of their loves and lovers.

Kay is an Australian in her 50s; she's been in Scotland visiting her father's homeland. David is a slightly younger American; he's been in Edinburgh for a conference. Andrew is in his 20s, a young Scottish art historian who is on his way to start a new job in London. Hugh is young too, and English, but he lives in Edinburgh.

The quartet instantly bonds, and Andrew begins the tale-telling, explaining his recent love affair with Hermione, a beautiful, wealthy young woman he'd met during a summer internship at a London auction house. Kay follows suit, adding her story about the love of her parents, two hardy souls who had made a life together in the Australian outback. Hugh contributes his own story of a love affair with Jenny, a mysterious woman who may or may not have been whom he thought she was. Only David is silent, but his love story passes through his mind; the story is one that he's spent most of his life not telling, about a summer-time crush on another young man.

The situation is completely improbable, of course, even on a cross-country train where romantic notions tell us that intimate friendships are formed with ease.



Andrew launches into a story about his most intimate relationships with barely any encouragement from his fellow passengers, and they listen, rapt, without any judgment, disinterest or impatience. In other words, it's not much like a real train.

But that's really not the point. The point, as Smith lays it out in a very plain-spoken prologue, is that

love is a wonderful, powerful thing. The love in each of the travelers' stories is not without obstacles - Andrew and Hermione must contend with class conflict, Kay's parents had a harsh environment working against them, Hugh had doubts and suspicions nagging at him and David had deep emotional confusion but in the end, there is little question of whether or not love will conquer all. It

ALEXANDER McCALL SMITH to figure it out. Even his use of the train motif is not at all metaphorical. We think that trains are romantic, what with all their journeys and farewells and suggestions of new beginnings, and so what better place to set tales of love and romance than

on and around trains? Cynical critics are not going to be enthusiastic about a book with romantic love as its un-ironic centerpiece. The worst cynics might even argue that romantic love is just an illusion, a made-up feeling that doesn't really exist. If, like me, you feel the need for a break from cynicism, however, Trains and Lovers is that. It refuses to believe that there's no such thing as a strong, positive connection between two people, and it makes its argument in the most basic, unpretentious way. It is, ultimately, a buoying assertion that sometimes the things that romantics say really are true.





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## **The Butler Did It**

Tops at the Box: Whoa. How did this happen? Can we only assume that this is the Oprah Effect? Somehow Lee Daniels' The Butler took the



No. 1 spot at last weekend's U.S. box office, selling a stellar \$25 million in tickets over a very competitive weekend. I'm not saying the film shouldn't sell big - I hear it's great and the cast is certainly solid - but how did it slaughter both Kick-Ass 2 and Jobs, not to mention We're the Millers, Elysium and Planes? Incredible. Check out this cast: Forest Whitaker, Oprah Winfrey, John Cusack, Jane Fonda, Cuba Gooding Jr., Terrence Howard, Lenny Kravitz, Alan Rickman, Liv Schreiber, Vanessa Redgrave and James Marsden. Cast of the year? Yes, cast of the year. And Daniels (*Precious* and *The Paperboy*) is a really solid director. Can't wait to check it out.

Also at the Box: Over its second weekend ensemble comedy We're the Millers, starring Jason Sudeikis, Jennifer Aniston and Emma Roberts, sold just under \$18 million in the U.S., upping the film's 10-day domestic total to just under \$70 million. And here I thought we had a big stinky turd on our hands. Reviews and crowd reactions remain, however, quite mixed. Taking the No. 3 spot at last week's box office was Neil Blomkamp's surely great District 9 follow-up, Elysium, starring Matt Damon as, once again, The World's Hero. The film sold just under \$14 million in the U.S. over its second weekend, upping its 10-day total to \$56 million in the U.S. and \$94 million worldwide. Not exactly the Star Wars-like mega-hit Tri-Star was hoping for, but Elysium should turn out to be at least a tiny bit profitable once it's all said and done. Next up, at No. 4, was Kick-Ass 2, which sold a very disappointing \$13.5 million over its first three days. Bummer. And, finally, rounding out the Top 5 was Disney's animated flick Planes, which sold another \$13 million over its second weekend, bringing the movie's 10-day total to \$45 million in the U.S. and \$54 million worldwide.

Also of note, Woody Allen's Blue Jasmine, which for some reason is still only playing in 229 theaters, sold another \$2.4 million (good enough, once again, for the weekend's best per-screen average), bringing the flick's four-week total to just under \$10 million in the U.S. Woody's movies always do well overseas, so even if Blue Jasmine doesn't get a larger release in the U.S., he'll make back all his money in foreign markets and eventually turn a profit with Blu-ray and DVD sales. Woody wins again.

New this Week: Three films will see wide release this weekend, starting with Harald Zwart's The Mortal Instruments: City of Bones. Looks far too awful to waste any more ink on. Then we have Adam Wingard's low-budget horror film You're Next, starring nobody anyone has ever heard of. The film was produced almost three years ago now and is slated to be "The Next Saw," or something. It's yet another home invasion film, probably not too much unlike Funny Games or the 10 similar movies that came after *Funny Games*. The trend in Hollywood seems to be to produce a schtick-y horror film for cheap, then put a whole lot of money into advertising it as the "Scariest Movie Since Whatever." We've already seen this strategy several times this year, and I doubt You're Next is all that different.

Now, finally, we have this weekend's most worthwhile release, Edgar Wright's already massively acclaimed The World's End, starring, of course, Simon Pegg and Nick Frost. Joining Wright's regular duo will be Paddy Cosidine, Martin Freeman and David Fincher's new It Girl, Rosamund Pike. The film, an action comedy about five friends who reunite to attempt an epic pub crawl and become humankind's only hope for survival, looks fantastic and is already doing well overseas. Anytime Wright (Shaun of the Dead, Scott Pilgrim and Hot Fuzz), Pegg and Frost team up you can count on a winner. Color me stoked.

ScreenRant: Four exciting indie flicks will see limited distribution this weekend, starting with Wong Kar-Wai's long awaited production epic, The Grandmaster, a period piece kung-fu flick about Ip Man, the martial arts master best known for training Bruce Lee. Looks visually brilliant, if a bit overly stage-y. Next up is Drinking Buddies, a hilarious and charming comedy from mumblecore master Joe Swanberg that features breakout film performances from TV actors Olivia Wilde and Jake Johnson. Anna Kendrick and the always great Ron Livingston support. I've seen this one. Twice. It's a whole lot of fun. Next is Scenic Route, a two-man drama starring Josh Duhamel and Dan Fogler, and, finally, Short Term 12, one of my most anticipated films of the year, starring Brie Larson and John Gallagher Jr. as a 20-something couple who work at a foster care facility.

# A Fort Wayne Favorite

----- Feature • Acme Bar & Grill ------

The Acme Bar is one of those Fort Wayne landmarks that still embodies the charm of the local watering hole while being a family-friendly restaurant. After its brief closing in 2009, it underwent some updating; without losing any of its appeal, it quickly reclaimed its "local favorite" status.

I was thrilled to see them introduce craft beer to their establishment. I don't get over that way as often as I'd like, but I knew they carried a pretty extensive bottle list. Recently I headed over to see how it rated for a beer snob like myself.

The bottle menu contained roughly 85 craft bottled beers to choose from and a handful of macro imports and ciders. That's a pretty impressive selection! After selecting a few they were out of, I decided to start with the Boulevard Unfiltered Wheat. Wheats are a good beer to start off with, as they aren't over-powering and won't kill tastebuds like an IPA might.

After the first sip I knew something was very wrong. I've had this beer before, and it's excellent. The bottle was dated and past its serveby date. I love brewers who date their bottles, and for this very reason. My drinking companion pointed this out to the bartender and she very

apologetically took away the beer. Mistakes happen and don't particularly bother me when they're handled

The next beer I tried was the Four Barrel Brown by Triton Brewing Company. When I see barrel, I automatically think bourbon barrel, so my first sip was a bit of confusion; my brain was thinking, "Man, if there is supposed to be a bourbon taste, it is really subtle!" Well it's a four barrel, not a bourbon barrel, so I had to get my brain on another track. Once I readjusted, I was able to take in the subtlety of the beer. It's a nice well-balanced brown. Hints of malt, caramel. It's not very dense and a little on the watery side for my taste, but I tend to gravitate towards really densely flavored beers. This is a 2013 Gold Medal winner of the Indiana Beer Cup, and I would definitely recommend giving it a try if you like browns. I enjoyed it, but it didn't blow my doors off. The server brought me a small 8-oz. glass to pour it in, a huge pet peeve of mine. It's not necessarily the worst way to serve a beer, but I do prefer a proper pint glass.

Next up was the Sin-Bin Belgian Pale Ale, also by Triton. This beer is the official craft beer of Indiana Ice, with Sin-Bin being a nod to the penalty box. (I



had no idea about any of that, but found their website very helpful.)

I really want to love Belgian pale ales. Belgianstyle beers are my favorite, but pale ales are my least

favorite. Combine the two and my heart and taste buds are confused. The smell is all pale ale, and I love the smell of pale ales and can at least appreciate one well done. This one seemed wellbalanced and not too overthe-top, as some hoppy beers taste to me. I did request a room temperature pint glass for this beer, and the bartender was accommodating and friendly, which I appre-

The last beer of the night was my standby "I know it's going to be so delicious, so how can I pass it up" beer: The Kentucky Bourbon Barrel Ale. We specifically requested the snifter glasses and split the bottle between two of us, since

this beer carries a higher ABV of 8.1. The first time I had this beer I was in Kentucky for work, and my client recommended it. There isn't anything this beer is lacking. The nose is all soft bourbon with vanilla and oak. The taste is smooth and silky with a hint of bourbon flavor and a caramel back. This beer is better as it warms, and I strongly recommend letting it sit for five to 10 minutes if it's pulled from a very cold cooler, as this one was. It was the perfect beer to end our evening.

Overall, the Acme is a great place to go for people who want to try different craft beers. The selection is indeed impressive. As someone who is really obnoxious about beer, however, I would like to see all beers served in the proper glass all of the time. I'd like them to never be out of a beer I would like to try, and I would like to never have a bad beer sit in a beer cooler. But we don't live in a perfect world, and the friendly staff more than makes up for any shortcomings. I would not hesitate to recommend the Acme to someone looking to expand his or her beer knowledge, though I might go with them to make sure they are putting the beer in the proper glass. Man, that really bugs me.

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
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
