omehow it always seems to work out that the whatzup/Wooden Nickel Battle of the Bands winds up with a bang, and this past Thursday was no exception. More than 300 music fans crammed into Columbia Street West to see four very talented bands compete in what turned out to be one of the most exciting, and certainly the closest, conclusion to the 15-round competition. We're hoping they're all back for an even more exciting competition next year.


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Rising to the Challenge

X. The 24th letter of the alphabet was a significant part of the 2013 whatzup/Wooden Nickel Battle of the Bands.

It is the Roman numeral for 10. This was the tenth year of Battle of the Bands at Columbia Street West. New emcee Kyle Stamos of 98.9 The Bear made the X into a bat-

tle cry before, during and after shows, and it was quickly adopted by bands fans. and judges as the letter of the summer.

As it is the most frequently used letter in the alphabet to indicate a variable in an algebraic equation, X also symbolized the many unknown variables in this year's contest. Battle of the Bands X featured one of the

most diverse lineups in its history, with new bands, veterans of the local music scene, hiphop acts, rock bands, blues bands, folk/indie artists, an R&B/funk act and two very different one-man bands heading to the stage on 15 separate nights throughout the summer. From night to night, you literally were never quite sure what you were going to hear. And that's a good thing.

Then there was the X factor. Winning band Trackless not only had the X factor, but were the X factor in this year's contest. Based out of Muncie, with three members originally from Fort Wayne, one member from Anderson and one member from Wisconsin, they were the band nobody saw coming and became the band that everybody quickly fell in love with, virtually creating their own coming out party at the battle and inserting themselves smack dab in the center of the Fort Wayne music scene.

Trackless captured the attention of both the crowds and judges at Columbia Street West by consistently putting on entertaining half-hour sets that left the crowds wanting more. More songs, more drum solos, more bass solos, more keyboards and more guitar. And, of course, more of singer Jeremy Jones' silky smooth, soulful voice.

Though Trackless stood out among their peers every time they played, they didn't win the contest as easily as one might expect. The band fought through some heavy competition in the preliminary rounds and won the final contest by the slimmest margin ever in a whatzup/Wooden Nickel Battle of the Bands, just three 1,000ths of a point over runners-up Miles High. It came as no surprise to the band that the going would be tough.

"We entered the battle of the bands because we love being challenged," said drummer/vocalist Jordan West in a recent interview. "For us, a competitive setting brings out the best in our playing and arranging the acoustic version on the piano and have everyone take their own interpretation of it. I didn't have a specific sound in mind for the songs. I just wanted to write as much material as possible, as we had a few three-hour sets booked, but only about an hour of music [in our repertoire]. This led to us playing a really eclectic mix of genres.'

As the collaborative

process has evolved, however, that mix has coalesced into a unique. easily identifiable sound.

"Now, I think ... we are working towards a more consistent group sound. I'd describe our sound as combining aspects from pop. R&B and soul into really energetic and relatable music. Our lyrics are relatable too, as they come from experiences in our lives. When



while providing the chance to share our music with people who may not have been exposed to it before. Plus, it's fun to compete with and listen to other local bands.

"Though we had been getting good judges scores all along and we were happy with our performances, we certainly didn't assume we would win," West continued. "We knew the other bands would be gearing up for the show, so we weren't sure exactly how it would turn out. We just wanted to try our best and put on the best show we could" and let the chips fall where they may.

Trackless - West, Jones, guitarist Will Smith, bassist Jesse Gaze and keyboardist Jon Nelson - formed about two years ago at Ball State University. It was a pure love of music that brought them together. As it turns out, it may have also been a destiny finally fulfilled as well.

According to West, music was always present in each of the band members' lives. Private music lessons and participation in elementary and middle school choirs led to further study in high school which, in turn, "led all of us to Ball State as music majors which is where our stories intersect. We found each other and realized that our chemistry was something rare and valuable, and that we should take it as far as we can."

The Trackless sound, a sound many new fans have now come to love was born of hard work, experimentation and sheer necessity.

"When we started out, we weren't really sure what direction we wanted to go in," West explained. "I would write a song, play I write, I am always looking to connect and convey some emotion to the audience. We try to bring a lot of energy and musicality into every song too, whether we're playing it live or in the studio.'

Trackless began performing in and around the area in February 2012, securing a regular monthly gig at Club Soda in Fort Wayne in the process. The band released their first CD, For Your Soul, earlier this year to all the usual digital media outlets, including iTunes and Spotify, and is currently writing and rehearsing new music for a second album they hope to release before the end of 2013.

"One of the reasons we are so excited to have won Battle of the Bands is because now we will be able to give out more music to people as a result of the prizes we received [a full album recorded, mixed and mastered by Digitracks Recording Studio and 1,000 CDs in jewel cases provided by Advanced Media Integration].

The future, no doubt, looks bright for Trackless. With a Battle of the Bands win in their pocket and plenty of exposure to a new audience, the group will be in high demand for shows. In addition to that and the recording of the new CD, pre-planning for a 2014 summer tour has already started. World domination may be next.

"In the long term, we plan to move to a musical center such as Nashville, New York, or Los Angeles," said West. "When we get

4 Decades of Carrying On

Having kids opens one up to a lot of unusual experiences. In the end that's part of the charm, as it provides a lifetime of peculiar anecdotes and conversation material. But at the time, even as these stories provide amusement, they can be baffling and inexplicable, leaving a parent to wonder what ex-

actly is going on in those crazy

little minds.

My go-to story about my youngest and only female child, Andrea, is just such an example. At the age of four, amidst the usual requests for anything starring those darling Olsen twins and programs on Nickelodeon, she developed an attachment to a concert video, Kansas Live at the Whisky. Their songs became required nighttime lullabies, and the now aged VHS was inserted into the player the minute her older brothers left for school. Perhaps that alone isn't so strange, but the fascination led to an obsession with Kansas's bass player, Billy Greer, who suddenly became Andie's constant companion. At least in her little preschool world of imagi-

It all sounds kind of cute now, but, frankly, Billy could be a pain at times. When denied Oreos before dinner, she would huff "Billy Greer lets me have Oreos!" When loading into the family van, Billy was apparently unable to buckle himself into his own car seat and needed parental assistance. And by wearing a pair of faded jeans with tattered knees in the Whisky performance, he made Andie's pair of faded pink jeans with similar holes in the knees the daily uniform. He was a definite

fixture of our family life. Nearly 20 years later, she still harbors affection for her rock n' roll friend whose bandmates once called daily on her Fisher-Price phone. What makes his prominence in her Kansas world so ironic is that many who were devoted fans during Kansas's early days of fame, when their hits "Carry On Wayward Son" and "Dust in the Wind" were ubiquitous on radio, might not even know who Billy Greer is, since he was not among the original lineup. But his tenure with the band is now almost three decades long, making him a longer-term member than Kerry Livgren, the guitarist/songwriter who was at the core of the band in the 70s.

The distinctive Kansas sound was due to not only to their melodic songs (written mostly by Livgren and singer Steve Walsh), but the violin, originally played by Robby Steinhardt, at the center of the almost orchestral sound prominent among the progressive rock bands of the era. Walsh left the band early in the 1980s and formed a band called Streets which would also feature Greer on bass. Led by John Elefante, Kansas carried on before Livgren and Dave Hope, the original bass player, left to pursue Christian music. That left the door open for Walsh's return and the addition of Greer, as well.

"I joined in July 1985, and it was about a year and a half that we worked on new music, which led to the Power album in 1987," says Greer. "That was my first album and

sas stronghold from their early days. While touring with Kansas, Greer continues to pursue outside projects including his own band, Seventh Key, which will release a new CD, I Will Survive, in November of this year. Greer has been signed to an Italian recording deal since 2000 and says it provides a great outlet for bands popular in the 70s and 80s.

"Since I signed with them, I've had a

couple of live studio albums, a live album, a DVD and the new studio album this year. The band has done pretty well because in Europe they still love the old melodic of the 70s and 80s. The label doesn't have the machinery to promote and sell in America, but there really isn't any interest from labels or radio for new music from the bands of that era anyway. You

can't buy airtime on radio these days.

Greer's musical partner is former Streets bandmate Mike Slamer, and that kind of cordiality among former bands also exists with members of Kansas. Replaced for much of the 90s by David Ragsdale, Steinhardt returned for a time, only to leave again for good. The lineup now - Walsh, Greer, Ragsdale, drummer Phil Ehart and guitarist Richard Williams - is nearly identical to that which graced the Whisky performance almost 20 years ago. But the former members have not been forgotten, and a special commemoration of the 40th anniversary will feature a reunion of that original lineup.

"It'll be the first time I'll have seen the original lineup perform together, so I'll be there in my seat to enjoy it, too," says

But the show will continue to go on with the current lineup and about 75 performances each year. There's nothing to stop Kansas from celebrating their golden anniversary in another 10 years.

"There was a time when we were going out there and we had a bus and would tour for five or six weeks at a time, and we just didn't get home much," says Greer. "A couple of the guys have had a couple of marriages along the way, as have I, and some have young kids now, so we just didn't want to do that anymore. So now we plan weekend shows, and we fly commercial in and out of Atlanta. It's made for a much more livable and tolerable situation. So now we have dates throughout the year and are touring constantly."

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tour with Kansas. They had known my work before, since when we were with Streets we had gone to see Kansas when John Elefante was the singer, and they had come to see Streets a few times, too. So they knew my capabilities."

Having played in bands all through high school and college to help support himself, Greer, a Tennessee native, connected to Walsh and Kansas after moving to Atlanta, a city that Kansas has called home for many years now. In fact, Kansas is about to be inducted into the Georgia Music Hall of Fame, a fact which might surprise those who connect the band to another state.

"Topeka is still home for the band, but have you ever been to Kansas?" asks Greer. "It's cold and windy, and Atlanta is just a great city to have as a home base. It's easy to get in and out since the airport is a major hub. The band has been based down here for 38 years now."

That represents a significant chunk of time since Kansas is now celebrating its 40th anniversary. A fan appreciation event took place in Pittsburgh this August, a fitting place since Greer says Pittsburgh and the entire state of Pennsylvania were a Kan-

Fort Wayne native Kevin Hayden has spent much of his musical career under the tutelage of one mentor after another, but at this stage of his young life, he feels it's time to forge his own musical path. Raised in a family that had already produced a number of drummers, he spent his early years playing in church choirs and the Fort Wayne

Youth Ensemble. His musical horizons really began to broaden, though, when his uncle introduced him to the work of fusion drummer Dave Weckl, and, surprisingly enough, they continued to broaden when he joined the Marines in 1998.

The Marine Corps

may not seem like the kind of place where a musician could hone his craft, but keep in mind that the corps has its Marine Corps Band, the oldest professional music organization in the country. In other words, they know their stuff. Lamont Sydnor, a drummer who had been playing professionally in touring gospel groups since was 15 years old, was part of that band, and Hayden met Sydnor when both were stationed at Camp Lejeune in North Carolina. At the time they met, Sydnor was playing with the Mike Corrado Band, and Hayden quickly saw the talented and experienced drummer as both a friend and a mentor who could help him develop his skills.

After the Marines, Sydnor moved to Los Angeles where he has gone on to play with and open for an astoundingly diverse list of performers – Macy Gray, Busta Rhymes, The Temptations, the Derek Trucks Band, The Platters, The Coasters, John Mayer, Tina Turner, Susan Tedeschi, Little Feat, and on and on – but before he did, he left Hayden with a skill set that would serve him well in the years to come.

When he left the marines in 2002, Hayden moved to Milwaukee, his mother's home town, and there he settled into the local music scene, attending jam sessions and auditions and attracting the attention of Mil-

waukee musicians. He also enrolled in the music program at Milwaukee Area Technical College where he studied under Ben Hans, a drummer with his own impressive list of colleagues as well as a bookshelf full of instructional books that he's authored.

Hayden had more mentor relationships in his future, but by 2008 he was ready to claim a little bit of the spotlight for himself, and he took his first solo steps via that great 21st-century producer of music sensations: YouTube. He made a series of performance videos and posted them online, and before he knew it, he'd attracted the attention of yet another mentor: Gerald Forrest, founder of Gospel Chops.

Forrest's company was aimed at promoting awareness of the history and performance of gospel music, and to that end he produced a series of hybrid performance instructional videos. He called Hayden on board for *Bass Sessionz Vol. 1*, a project that brought together top gospel musicians and legendary jazz players, including drummer Peter Erskine and pianist John Beasley.

Cultural Immersion

Another perfect evening of Indian culture is on the horizon. This time, a pair of former child prodigy flautists – one from northern India, the other from southern India – have put together a concert showcasing the different styles each plays while blending them into a seamless confluence of traditions. Shashank Subramanyam, born in the south of India, and Rakesh Chaurasia, born in the north, have grown to be leading artists in those traditions. Hearing them together on stage in Fort Wayne may be a once-ina-lifetime event.

Their September 14 performance at the Auer Performance Hall in the Rhinehart Music Center on the campus of IPFW in Fort Wayne is sponsored by a collaboration between IPFW Col-

lege of Visual and Performing Arts and Shruti, the Fort Wayne Indian Cultural Society.

Shruti was formed a little more than a year ago with the express purpose of bringing Indian cultures and traditions to Fort Wayne to the benefit of the 300 or so Indian

families living in the city as well as the Summit City's general population. But with the first two performances in the series (the first brought an Indian classical dance troupe and the second, the world renowned musicians Pandit Shivkumar Sharma, on the santoor and Zakir Hussain, on the tabla) it became clear that the concept of bringing Indian culture to Fort Wayne was reaching a much wider audience than anticipated.

Dr. Vijay Chilakimarri, a local physician and a member of the Shruti Concert Committee, said people came from out of state to watch the first two performances.

"We had people coming from Chicago, Dayton and Indianapolis," he said. "We were just hoping to introduce this diversity to the campus."

"This is an exciting opportunity for IPFW," said John O'Connell, Dean of the College of Visual and Performing Arts. "We are fortunate to bring artists of this caliber to Fort Wayne."

And the people of Fort Wayne are fortunate to have this series. Classical Indian dance is a treat for the eyes, an intellectual and spiritual art form transmitted through the body with centuries old traditions of movement serving meaning. Indian music serves much the same purpose but with much more room for improvisation and collaboration with other musical traditions. It was into this world that Rakesh Chaurasia and Shashank

Chaurasia has stretched the boundaries of his instrument, playing with musicians such as Spanish guitarist Marco Salaun. Indian jazz pianist Louis Banks and percussionist Taufiq Qureshi, amongst others. The great success of *Vira*, one of his many album releases, earned him and tabla player Talvin Singh an invitation to play the concluding set of BBC Radio's 24-hour celebration of Queen Elizabeth's Diamond Jubilee. A few years ago he played a concert in Bangalore with banjo player Bela Fleck, bassist Edgar Meyer and tabla player Zakir Hussein.

Subramanyam first performed publicly when he was six years old. Trained by his father, he spent his youth traveling the world, and in 1991, when he was 12, earned top billing at the annual show at The Music Academy in Chennai, India. Like Chaurasia. Subramanyam has explored many genres outside traditional Indian flute music. In 2009 Subramanyam and guitarist John McLaughlin earned a Grammy nomination for their album *Floating Point*.

Music in India began with the Vedic scriptures, the oldest Hindu texts. There are

A Passion for the Stage

Jim Matusik, one of Fort Wayne's most respected and accomplished actors, got his start onstage as so many have: in drag.

He was a junior in high school in Hillsdale, Michigan, and on a whim he auditioned for his high school production of *The Pink Panther Strikes Again*. He was

cast as a butler who is also a female imperson-

Did the teenage Matusik know he was auditioning for a role that would put him in a dress, makeup and high heels?

"Negative," he says.
"I only auditioned because I thought it would be a good way to be around girls but not actually have to talk to them. I found them a bit intimidating."

After a pause, he adds, "I still do."

He admits to having been embarrassed at first, "but then I realized, 'The girls are laughing. They think it's hilarious.' So I just went for it."

His courage paid off. His friends came to

see the show, and rather than making fun of him they told him how funny his performance had been and that he seemed to be having a lot of fun

"I thought, 'Yeah, I guess I was having fun!" he recalls.

Later that year he auditioned for a production of *Arsenic and Old Lace* at the tiny Sauk Theatre down the road from him. "After having to wear a pink dress and heels while lip-syncing to a Streisand song," he says, "I figured everything else was a breeze after

He won the role of Officer Brophy and has since done the show two more times, each time in a different role. "This is the show I keep coming back to," he says. "My goal is to do all the male characters at some

After high school, he studied biology at the Michigan Technological University in Houghton. "It was in the Upper Peninsula," he says. "There was nothing but spow and spow"

Although MTU didn't have a theatre program while he was there, it did have one theatre teacher who put on shows and formed an improv group that Matusik was a part of. He says that college is the perfect time to learn theatre.

"You have no reservations," he explains. "When you're still in high school, you have reservations because you're trying to fit in. Then when you graduate college and enter the real world, you get reservations again. 'What, I have to be mature? But when you're a college kid, it's easy to throw it all out there."

The improvalso helped him build characters. Five years ago, he and Jim Nelson played a combination of 40 characters in Arena Dinner Theatre's A Tuna

Christmas.

"That was a blast," Matusik says. "Christopher J. Murphy directed that show, and he had a lot of input into the characters. Some were [written] as pretty stereotypical, but we tried to move beyond the stereotype. One of the characters I played was inspired by Marge Simpson's sisters."

Although he didn't come from a theatre background, his family still

supported him.

"I came from a long line of hunters," he says. "They didn't understand my love of theatre."

Nevertheless, his family attended as many of his productions as they could until his father passed away two years ago.

Meanwhile, he has developed a theatre family of his own. "My wife Anna has been in several shows," he says. "Brad and Leslie Beauchamp are my in-laws. And my daughter wants to join Fort Wayne Youtheatre."

Matusik met Anna Wood at an Arena Dinner Theatre audition for You're a Good Man, Charlie Brown. He was cast as Charlie Brown, and she was cast as Lucy. But his shyness with wom-

en overtook him. "I guess it was love at first sight," he says, "but she asked me out first."

They now have a seven-year-old daughter, Katie, who is also interested in theatre.

"She comes to rehearsals with me," he says, "and she loves to play around backstage. Everyone loves having her around. She's still a bit shy when it comes to actually speaking onstage, but she wants to get over that. I think that's pretty cool for a seven-year-old to want to face her fears."

Although he earned his degree in biology and has vast theatrical experience, he earns his pay as an annuity case manager for Ash Brokerage, processing applications and working with agents to ensure the best service for his customers. However, he still manages once a year to put his theatrical background to use at the office.

"Every Halloween we have a costume contest," he says. "For the last three years I've taken it to a new level. Last year we sang a parody of an Eagles song. One guy played the guitar and we sang. Costumes? That's grade school! We perform!"

He also earns spare cash appearing in local commercials and industrial videos. "I did a commercial for Bart's Cars about seven years ago," he says. "They play it every year during football season. I am recognized for that all the time on the street."

But his real passion is the stage. He has worked with every major theatre group in town and says he lost count at 50 productions. Two of his favorites are *Death of a Salesman* (which starred the late Wayne

Live Vol. 1

After quite a few years off from recording – 2007's Hard Pill to Swallow was his last album of originals – Bill Lupkin is back with this collection of tunes recorded live at the White Lake Blues Festival in Whitehall, Michigan, and at the Key Palace Theater in Redkey, Indiana. In a



sense, Live $Vol.\ I$ is a reiteration of classic Lupkin rather than something new, but it's a reminder that the harpist holds a significant spot in the history of Chicago blues, and he can still play it like it's supposed to be played.

The tunes on *Live Vol. 1* are almost entirely Lupkin originals, and most of them were originally released on *Hard Pill to Swallow*. One original, "What's with That?," from 2006's *Where I Come From*, and two covers – Jimmy Rogers' "Walking by Myself' and Little Walter's "Juke" – fill out the set and keep this from being *Hard Pill Live*.


That's not to say that this live set is not a treat in itself. From the fiery kickoff of "Think It Over Baby," it's a whirlwind, with drummer Tino Cortez and bassist Steve Lupkin (Bill's brother) setting a breakneck pace into which Lupkin's harp and vocals fit perfectly. Even when things settle into a slower groove, as in the dreamy "Bad Luck," there's energy bubbling under the surface.

In general, the songs recorded at the Key Palace Theater feel looser and more intimate, while the tracks from the Whitehall gig trip along with polish. Regardless of ambience, though, every track is a fine platform for Lupkin's warm, smoky delivery. (Evan Gillespie)

Grant Hart

The Argument

It begins "Out of Chaos." Disembodied voices chant in reverse. Timpanis support funhouse organ parts. Grant Hart's voice then rises to the surface to recite the first 10 lines of John Milton's *Paradise Lost*, the classic epic poem serving as the overall plotline for *The Argument* (which, not coincidentally,



is also the title of the preamble to "Book I" of *Paradise Lost*). To paraphrase, "The Argument" states how man's tendency for disobedience caused the loss of paradise and hints at Lucifer's impending fall from grace.

Hart, the former drummer for Hüsker Dü, has made an album that bands like Iron Maiden and Judas Priest secretly wished they could make: an album about Satan. Unsurprisingly, the chaos of the overture is followed by "Morningstar," which is the Latin translation for Lucifer, and thus *The Argument* unfolds.

College students who are looking for a more accessible Cliff Notes version of *Paradise Lost* may be disappointed ,since the plot arc occasionally diverges with Hart's insights on his friendship with renowned beat author William S. Burroughs. The grandeur of *The Argument*, and how Hart attempts to adapt the epic poem in rock album form, may suggest that he is trying to match the legacy of his old band's 1984 punk opera, *Zen Arcade*. What should be noted is how The Argument is a conscious effort from Hart to prove that Dü's classics like *Zen* didn't get by on Bob Mould's songwriting prowess alone. In a way, it would make more sense for Mould himself to craft an album like this, since his post-Hüsker Dü career was far more prolific than Hart's. In contrast to the 11 solo albums Mould produced (not counting his work with Sugar), *The Argument* is just Hart's fourth solo effort since 1988.

Upon first listen, Hart's conscious desire to distance *The Argument* not just from Hüsker Dü's discography, but from his own previous solo efforts is apparent in its meticulous construction. For instance, I don't recall the sound of barking dogs being employed as a sonic building block the way "I Am Death" does. The same goes for what sounds like Satan's rubber duckies on "Awake, Arise." Wikipedia's page on *The Argument* will tell you ostensibly that this is an alternative album, but the level of sonic creativity employed, as well as the attention to detail in the subtleties, makes the "alternative" moniker understate the album's true experimental nature.

Behind the funky vocals of Peter Wolf, the J. Geils Band, one of the original boogie/R&B rock acts to make it best, were best known for their live shows in the early 70s. Hailing from the Boston area, the band took the elements of blues and rock and blended a new wave sound that was both original and entertaining.



This sixth album featured the familiar smash hit "Must Have got Lost." The rest of the release contained eight tracks from the apex of their discography. It kicks off with "Detroit Breakdown," a rockin' piano-based number with funky horns behind Geils' scratchy guitars. "Givin' It All Up" has a Rolling Stones/Motown vibe with sharp harmonies and heavy percussion. "Look Me In The Eye" has a bluesy/jazz feel and a cool Little Feat sound – it's a 'garage rock' song with a touch of funk and soul sprinkled throughout.

If you like harmonica (which is almost a trademark for this band), then you'll appreciate the guttural jam that is "Stoop Down #39." They next do a brilliant cover of Bull & The Matadors' 1968 single "Funky Judge" and close the record with "Gettin' Out," their most underrated song. If this song doesn't make you tap your toe and rock your head, you probably shouldn't even leave the house.

This is a great album for anybody who likes the mid-70s classic rock.

The band had success all the way into the 1980s with hits like "Love Stinks," "Centerfold" and the overplayed "Freeze Frame." They broke up in 1985 but occasionally get back together for special shows or festival appearances. Wolf has had a respectable solo career, and released *Midnight Souvenirs* in 2010.

Fun Fact: Wolf was married to actress Faye Dunaway from 1974 to 1979. (*Dennis Donahue*)

If you're only half-interested in Hart's adaptation of *Paradise Lost*, the good news is how *The Argument*'s 20 tracks carry each other to give the music a compelling edge the way *Zen* did with its approach to telling a lengthy coming-of-age story. But for all of Hart's ability to compose worthwhile songs, there isn't much of a dynamic to them as they contribute to the whole. I suppose it could be worse in the sense that Hart could have made *The Argument* into a sprawling three-hour epic that adapted every single nuance of *Paradise Lost*, or scattered slower, ballad-type songs that could severely drag the pacing of an already lengthy album.

Since *The Argument* insists on being listened to all the way through, the 74 minutes still feels like an endurance trial of sorts where you know you like what you hear, but it can't really help but overstay its welcome. Maybe because of that, *The Argument* is bound to slip past the radar of the Billboard charts, but those who overlook it would be missing out an opportunity to remind themselves why the album as a medium is an art form and not a commodity. The Winery Dogs The Winery Dogs

"Elevate," the first song from the self-titled debut album of "supergroup" The Winery Dogs transported me instantly back to Sammy Hagar-era Van Halen. Singer/guitarist Richie Kotzen's smoky voice is strong and commanding, leading to a powerful, bright radio-friendly chorus that



has background vocals that, well, if they aren't intentionally trying to emulate Van Halen, they must have been in the band's subconscious. The mid-song bass solo, how-

ever, is a dead giveaway that this isn't some cheap knock-off band. No sir, that's the genuine Billy Sheehan making the kind of ruckus that only he can. And who is that keeping up with this proficient duo without breaking a sweat? It can only be ex-Dream Theater member Mike Portnoy, probably only using his left hand. Fortunately this killer song isn't the only winner in a sea of dogs. (Sorry. Couldn't resist)

"Desire" showcases an intense groove, a guitar and bass passage that would be at home on any Steve Vai album, and impassioned soulful vocals. Listen to this song and you'll be reminded of the power trio helmed by Hendrix – the Hendrix, not his cousin Melvin. Another strong offering is "Not Hopeless" which mixes Grand Funk Railroad with high-octane Mr. Big, throwing in a bit of technical wizardry to keep your interest but not to the point of distraction. In fact, like classic Van Halen, this album is about the music first and foremost, though the occasional head-turning shows of testosterone are not frowned upon. Neither are power ballads ("I'm No Angel" and "You Saved Me"), and apparently neither are songs populated primarily by Hammond organs and piano ("Regret").

What could have been just another throw-away side project album is instead a pleasing find sporting songs that appeal to technical musicians and casual listeners alike. While Sheehan's involvement is obvious (dizzying bass parts take a bow in nearly every song), the album is primarily the work of Kotzen, both in the bluesy classic rock songwriting, the vintage yet energetic guitar rhythms and the expressive vocals.

These fellows squeeze the power trio format for all it's worth, truly combining to form something greater than the sum of its parts. I'd ask when the next Winery Dogs album comes out, but that would be whining. (Jason Hoffman)

Explosions in the Sky

Prince Avalanche

Film scores are often the most nondescript type of records a pop music critic can review. In the case of traditional film scores, we're presented with a collection of pieces of music that were specifically made



to aid – and often even manipulate – the viewer of a film as they watch the on-screen action. Feel happy ... now! Feel sad ... NOW!

Scores are used for other things, too. Sometimes a score is simply an extension of the filmmaker's creative aesthetic and has nothing to do with mood. Either way - tool of manipulation or not - film scores are hard to write about without talking quite a bit about the film they were created for. And, if I'm being honest, I don't think most of my readers (i.e. people who have listened to Bakesale every few weeks since the mid-90s) sit around listening to film scores. Maybe some of Mark Mothersbaugh or Yann Tiersen's film-related work, but not likely much else. Enter Explosions in the Sky, a perfectly popular post-rock band who, with the just released Prince Avalanche, now have two remarkable scores to their credit.

That first score, for Peter Berg's underrated Friday Night Lights film, featured, I think, some of the best music the band had created up until that point in their career. Working in film allowed them to approach their process in a different way. As a result, they crafted a less formulaic record than ever before, effectively getting out of the funk they were arguably in. The band has gotten even better since (see 2011's wonderful Take Care, Take Care, Take Care for proof), and so their score for David Gordon Green's new film,

the great *Prince Avalanche*, arrives with high expectations. For the record – and once again shaking up their process - the Explosions gang teamed with composer David Wingo who lives down the street from the band in Austin, Texas (as does Green himself). The difference in the Explosions' sound is immediately detectable. The songs are somehow even more nuanced than before - more cinematic. More precious. The little details shine through at every turn - sweet, cozy, ambient noise laced behind beautiful, pulsing compositions that usually end too quickly. Where electric guitars and pedal effects have led the Explosions' sound in the past, here we have almost no electric guitar within earshot, the band instead working its way through an impressive bevy of new sounds.

Instead of those ringing, rising, dropping, epic, swirling guitar compositions, Prince Avalanche sees the Explosions using a whole lot of Wingo's piano, acoustic plucks, bowed guitars, strings and even some trombone. The result is a very mellow set of score pieces that hardly resemble the post-rock sound Explosions in the Sky are so well known for. The real key to the sound of the record, I think (aside from the piano), is the production, which is handled by the artists themselves. It's perfect, making me wonder who did what (there's little information on the LP sleeve) and why they aren't producing for detail-obsessed artists like Radiohead, Animal Collective and Sigur Ros. Maybe Sufjan, too.

As with just about any score, there's something of a core sound fluid throughout several tracks on the record that effectively offers the film itself an audible cohesion. Rather than do what so many other film composers do and record a handful of slightly different versions of essentially the same composition, the band and Wingo plucked out certain sounds and used them to form a "theme set" that we hear on many of the record's shorter tracks. And while many of those short tracks are certainly good, it's the seven compositions that cross the two-minute mark that I think make up the heart of the record. It's weird, I have to admit, to hear a band known for their 10-minute epics recording 90-second tracks that force them to streamline

Four of these longer tracks in particular - "Alone Time," "Hello, Is this Your House," "Send Off" and "Theme from Prince Avalanche" - make the record worth investing in. I think fans of strongly crafted, very cool, mostly mellow instrumental rock will find a whole lot to like about this new Explosions in the Sky, even if they weren't fans prior to this release. There are none of the rise and drop, crash and wail guitar epics the band is known for, yet somehow the sound still makes sense as a part of their catalog. If nothing else, I think this exercise in careful detail and piano-based composition will see the Explosions crew once again inspired anew. I can't wait to see what comes next from both Explosions in the Sky and director David Green. Hopefully, this is just the beginning of a long Austin, Texas relationship. In short, Prince is a very pretty, very comforting, very winter-friendly record of mellow, thoughtful compositions. (Greg W. Locke)

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

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It was so nice to see how all the media outlets – including both liberal and conservative TV stations, radio stations and newspapers – could finally come together to tackle a topic so important to our nation. And because of this, you have probably had your fill of **Mi**-



ley Cyrus and her abnormally long tongue. But you've got to hand it to her. She wanted to draw attention to herself so she could let us all know how she is no longer the innocent Disney star we were used to seeing all those years. She is now an "adult." Obviously, adults dress in flesh colored body suits, make sexual gestures with foam fingers and dance with people who wear oversized stuffed bears on their backs. I mean, who hasn't gone through this rite of passage? And don't even get me started on twerking. Proving your adulthood by bending over and gyrating your butt in the air in front of millions of people? Been there, done that. I don't know anybody who hasn't. What struck me most about all the Miley talk was not how "shocking" this all was, but how sad it really is. Cyrus wants to be taken seriously as an artist, yet all I could do is laugh at the ridiculousness of her attempt to prove how mature she is. If this is maturity, I've done seriously something wrong over the years. No, Cyrus isn't the mature artist she wants us to think she is, and she didn't prove anything to us about how adult she is. All Miley Cyrus proved, like many of her peers, is that she is desperate for attention.

Now, back to your regularly scheduled program.

Stone Temple Pilots will release their first album without former singer Scott Weiland – and with new singer, Chester Bennington of Linkin Park – on October 18. *High Rise*, an EP, will contain five new tracks that will also be featured during the band's fall tour. That tour kicks off September 4 but heads to Australia before the new year and before any dates in our vicinity. Though no announcement has been made yet, I'd look for the new version of STP to continue to tour in 2014, with shows throughout our area soon after the ball drops in Times Square. Meanwhile, you can watch the legal battle between the band and Weiland, as both are suing each other over the future use of the band's name.

Jonny Lang will release his first album in seven years on September 17. Lang says he has been working on *Fight for My Soul* for three years, but family commitments and touring have made the completion of the project difficult. Look for Lang to spend a lot of time reintroducing himself to audiences. Area dates already booked include St. Charles, Illinois, near Chicago, September 7, the House of Blues in Cleveland September 24, the House of Blues in Chicago November 8, Kalamazoo State Theatre November 9 and The Palladium in Carmel November 10.

The Misfits visit Pieres October 18 in a highly anticipated show I won't miss, even though Jerry Only is the only member of the band's classic lineup still with the band. If you are interested in seeing the other two-thirds of the classic lineup, Glenn Danzig and Doyle Wolfgang von Frankenstein, you'll have to head up to The Intersection in Grand Rapids on October 26 where Danzig will be celebrating the 25th anniversary of his own band, Danzig. Doyle will join Danzig at some point during the show to perform a short set of Misfits classics. A stellar opening lineup of Butcher Babies, Texas Hippie Coalition and A Pale Horse Named Death, featuring former Type O Negative and Life of Agony drummer Sal Abruscato makes this show well worth the two-hour trip north.

Lee Daniels Gets Most Things Right in *The Butler*

Why Lee Daniels' The Butler includes the director's name in the title mystifies me slightly. Yes, he directed the film. He didn't write the screenplay. That was done by Danny Strong. He didn't write the article "A Butler Well Served by This Election" about the real White House butler, Eugene Allen, that inspired the film. That was done by Wil Haygood.

But I'm happy to give Daniels immense credit for taking a story that covers decades of tremendous change in this country and presenting these changes in intimate, personal terms in a way that doesn't play like a PBS doc or too much like a made-for-Lifetime movie. There are a few creaky plot twists and odd omissions, but *Lee Daniels' The Butler* is fascinating and enjoyable.

The movie gives us a perspective of African-American experience in this country that begins at a time when a white man could shoot and kill a black man and suffer no consequences and ends with the election of Barack Obama.

Cecil Gaines is a little boy picking cotton when his father is shot dead by a privileged white jerk. Afterwards he is brought into the house by a white lady, Vanessa Redgrave, who isn't much nicer. She does teach him how to take care of white folks. When he gets to be a little older, he leaves, not so much to find a better life but to avoid being killed by the same man who murdered his father.

Life beyond the cotton fields isn't much better at first, but with the help of a kind man Cecil gets work in a hotel. Then he gets recommended for a job in a hotel in Washington, D.C. At that job he is noticed by a white man who works in the White House.

He is interviewed by the chief black butler, Freddie Fallows, who resents being told whom to interview but realizes Cecil will fit in nicely. Coleman Domingo is only on screen briefly, but his performance as Fallows is memorable.

Cecil spends 30 years as a butler in the White House. We see him with presidents, the other black staff and at home. He loves his family. He enjoys his work for the most part. At first he is a nervous country boy, but he soon becomes as popular, polished and professional as anyone on the staff. He advocates better treatment for the black staff, timidly at first, but persistently.

I've never been much of a fan of Forest Whitaker who plays Cecil Gaines. He tends to play heavies and scowl a lot. He's very good here, especially as a young man. He actually smiles, and his entire demeanor changes as the situation warrants. As he gets older, he relies perhaps too much on his hangdog expression, but the man has seen a lot

One thing *The Butler* makes painfully obvious is that there are a lot of really good black actors and not enough quality parts for them. I think almost any of the supporting men could have played Cecil. This includes performances by Cuba Gooding Jr. as Carter Wilson and Lenny Kravitz as James Holloway, both fellow butlers, or Terence Howard as a neighbor of the Gaineses.

The celebrity cameos are all excellent



and not distracting. They run the gamut from Robin Williams as Dwight D. Eisenhower to Jane Fonda as Nancy Reagan and include James Marsden as John F. Kennedy, an especially good Liev Schreiber as LBJ, John Cusack as Richard Nixon and Alan Rickman as Ronald Reagan. Even Mariah Carey, perhaps because she barely has to speak, is good as Hattie Pearl, Cecil's much violated mother who loses her mind after many other losses. The celebrity appearance that transcends cameo is Oprah Winfrey as Gloria Gaines, Cecil's wife. She has stayed away from screen roles since Beloved, but I hope this experience encourages her to make more movies. She's very good playing a long suffering wife, a role she cannot draw on her own personal experience to portray, though I'm sure she has seen plenty of examples of Gloria in her life.

The long hours at the White House put a strain on the marriage and on Cecil's relationship with his two sons. (The sons are played at different ages by more truly talented actors.) One son grows up to be an activist. One grows up to be a soldier and dies in service to his country in Vietnam.

Father and son don't speak for years after this event, which is the plot twist I thought particularly lame. The strains between the men in the family throughout give Oprah a

lot of material to prove what a good actress she is. As good as she is, there does come a time in the movie when an older Gloria is barely holding her family together at a time when Oprah was conquering the world.

Of course, I shouldn't expect uniformity

Of course, I shouldn't expect uniformity of experience, and I can only hope Eugene Allen didn't witness his father's murder as a formative experience. And as Gloria points out, Cecil did everything to make a good life possible for all of them. Cecil is particularly proud that his sons never even saw a cotton field and were safely away from the South.

In real life, Eugene Allen and his wife had only one son. He says life at home was never as contentious as it is portrayed on screen, but he is a fan of the film.

I saw *The Butler* 50 years and a day after the march on Washington, which made me perhaps a little extra conscious of what is in and not in the movie. Martin Luther King (Nelsan Ellis) gives Cecil's son Louis a talking-to on the importance of the contributions of domestics to furthering the cause. It is just one instance of the determination of *The Butler* to present multiple sides of the story. The oddest omission is there is no moment between Cecil and Jimmy Carter. I really wanted to see how the two Southerners would behave towards each other.

Lee Daniels' The Butler is true enough to the times and the characters that real vocabulary is used, so those fearful of the "n" word beware. Like so much of the movie, the language is used to serve a story that deserves to be told and feels honest and real.

How hard could it possibly be for a faith-based company to come up with one overtly sacred piece each year to open our Home Stage season? Sure, it might be challenging to find secular material which has high entertainment value while being consistent with a Christian worldview; it could be tricky to find plays that are both thought-provoking and family-friendly. And if you're also seeking pieces that have

some name recognition, but which no one else in the area is producing – whew, that's tough. But surely, finding one religious piece in the midst of that would be a piece of cake, right?

Wrong, wrong, wrong. all for One wants to appeal to the broadest possible

audience while maintaining its mission and vision. We want each piece we do to be theatrical and engaging, not divisive or pedantic. It can actually be trickier to find the right sacred piece to complement the season

The 39 Steps is a play about connecting the dots. Richard Hannay is literally connecting the dots on a map, connecting clues to solve an international threat to the country, and eventually finding what has been missing in his life – real connection with another human being.

The concept we use to tell this story is that of a group of hempen homespuns putting on a play, much like the rude mechanicals in Shakespeare's *A Midsummer's Night Dream*. The troupe is lead by the actor playing Hannay, and all of the other characters are

played by three extremely busy actors doing the very best they can to tell a story involving a hundred characters. They play inanimate objects, animals and people, all while simultaneously making set changes. So what we have here is a local Fort Wayne actor portraying an actor in a traveling theatre group,

playing a wide variety of characters.

Because this play has an intimate feel to it, one might argue that it is best suited to a smaller theater.



Doors Are for Slamming

the Royale Theatre as the curtain rose on an art deco hotel room containing no less than six doors. This was the set on playwright which Ken Ludwig's brilliantly funny Broadway debut, Lend Me a Tenor, played out. For two hours, I convulsed with laughter as Victor Garber and Philip Bosco ran in and out, slamming

those doors in a tale of misunderstandings, high stakes, mistaken identities and romantic complications- the ingredients of any good farce. For me, it was comedy heaven.

While an audience isn't allowed time to think about it as they roll along at breakneck speed, great farces are minutely plotted; and part of the joy we take from a great farce comes from the beauty of the play's architecture. When a complex story ticks along without missing a beat, then fits together perfectly at the end like a Chinese puzzle box, we leave the theatre feeling exhilarated.

The particular form of farce that Ludwig (for whom reviving this high art of low comedy is something of a mission) has tried to honor with *The Fox on the Fairway* reached its heyday in 1920s England. What these plays have in common is not only their wildly funny stories and characters, but a firm sense of their own innocence. Many had sporting themes, probably because sports have a jaunty yet competitive edge that can bring out the best and worst in us all. And what sport is better suited to comedy than golf? The clothes alone are hilarious!

Set on the day of the inter-club tournament between Quail Valley and its rival country club Crouching Squirrel, Fox is stuffed with all the deliciously funny ingredients we expect to find in a farce: stuffy country club members, a high stakes wager, outrageous lies, young love on the brink ... and five doors ripe for slamming.

The play is more than an homage to an earlier tradition. It's also a reminder of the values that the tradition embodies – things like innocence, humor, good sportsmanship and honor. It is the playwrights hope (as well as this director's) that we can still come together in a darkened theater and embrace these values with a sense of understanding and laughter – especially laughter, because it's funny. Seriously funny. If so, there may be hope for us yet.

I'm proud to have worked with a tremendous cast – Todd Frymier, Jim Matusik, Leslie Beauchamp, Suzan Moriarty, Jacob Starr and Morgan Spencer.

The play previews on Thursday, September 5 at 7:30 p.m. (all seats \$10) and runs Fridays and Saturdays, September 7-22 at 7:30 p.m., with one 2 p.m. matinee on Sunday, September 15. Advance tickets are \$20 general admission, \$18 for ages 65-plus and free for full-time students. They are \$24, \$22 and \$10 at the door. Box office hours are noon-5 p.m. Wednesday-Friday and one hour prior to every performance. They are also available at www.firstpresbyteriantheater.com.







From there, Hayden embarked on his career in earnest. Forrest helped him to record his first album, *Delegations and Assignments*, with a group of musicians that included bassist Damian Erskine (Peter's nephew), keyboardist Terry Harris Jr. and bassist/producer Lance Tolbert (another Fort Wayne native who has played with Mariah Carey).

After that, things happened fast. Hayden formed his first band, the Kevin Hayden Band, with keyboardist Theo Merriweather, bassist Dwayne Williams and saxophonist Tobias Cainion. True to the influences of the people he'd been playing with and the kind of music he'd been playing, the Kevin Hayden Band was a jazz fusion group that played its first gig at the Jazz Estate, a club that enjoys legendary status in Milwaukee, and the group went on to play local jazz clubs and festivals, including the gigantic Summerfest, which bills itself as the world's largest music festival

Throughout 2011 and 2012, Hayden played and recorded with various iterations of his group, which became the Kevin Hayden Trio in 2011. In 2012, the trio, consisting at that point of Hayden, Terry Harris Jr. on keyboards and his brother Alan on bass, released *Paris*, an album of jazz fusion, and the fusion leanings of the group were augmented with the addition of keytarist Quintin Gulledge later in 2012.

Throughout this whole period, however, something was missing for Hayden. He felt stifled by jazz—not so much by the music, but by the insular nature of jazz culture, the unwillingness of old timers to allow new people with new ideas into the club. Hayden longed to be allowed to do something different, to be musically inclusive and branch out in new directions. The answer was *Illegal Playlist*, his third album, released earlier this year. The album starts off with straight-ahead jazz tunes before veering off toward fusion and R&B, and finally ending up with hip-hop.

"We structured the album that way because our sound is changing," Hayden told Express Milwaukee. "This is the direction the group is going. We're going to be more hip-hop, so we ended the album on that note so people know what to expect from us going forward."

If gospel is at the roots of Hayden's music, then jazz and fusion seems like his musical adolescence—and hip-hop begins to look like his musical maturity. He likes it, and he expects to keep playing it.

"Hip-hop just feels so good to play, so we're going to keep doing it," Hayden says. "There will probably still be hints of jazz in what we do, but I don't know that we'll cover any more jazz standards."



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How About Them Boy Bands?

Tops at the Box: I'm still not quite sure what One Direction is or why they're so big or who the people are that love them. At first I thought it was a Twitter joke – some funny dude making a joke boy band. Maybe an SNL or Funny or Die skit. Then the joke didn't end, and now we have this movie called One Direction: This is Us, directed for some reason by Morgan Spurlock. I'm not certain of what the film is about, but one has to assume that, in the movie, they show us who they are. The film, produced by Simon Cow Bell and featuring a handsome group of young men who know how to sing, took the No. 1 spot at last weekend's weak late summer box office, selling \$17 million in the U.S. over its first three days. Add to that \$14.5 million in abroad sales and I guess this One Direction thing must actually be a big deal. But I will listen to them never. Ever. Never ever.

Also at the Box: Lee Daniels' The Butler took the No. 2 spot at the U.S. box office over its third weekend, selling a stellar \$14.7 million, upping the flick's 17-day total to just over \$74 million on native soil. I wonder how this one will do abroad? Rawson Thurber's mediocre We're the Millers took the No. 3 spot last weekend, selling another \$12.6 million and bringing the hit comedy's total to just under \$110 million. Not bad for a film featuring only somewhat talented people and an incredibly derivative, obvious script. Disney's Planes took the No. 4 spot, selling \$7.7 million over the weekend while newbie Instructions Not Included rounded out the Top 5 with \$7.5 million in sales over its inaugural weekend.

Neill Blomkamp's very good sci-fi flick, titled *Elysium* and starring Matt Damon, continued its unfortunate flop, selling just \$6.3 million last weekend, bringing the big budget shoulda been's four-week total to just \$78 million in sales. Bummer. Also of note is Woody Allen's *Blue Jasmine* which sold another \$4

million, bringing the movie's total to \$20.5 million in the U.S. We call that "Woody Numbers," as very few of his films have broken the \$40 million mark in U.S. sales

New This Week: David Twohy and Vin Diesel's Riddick, the third installment in their The Chronicles of Riddick trilogy, finally opens this coming weekend. I've not seen any reviews yet, but the film was shot by David Eggby, who worked as DP on the original Riddick film, Pitch Black, so I have a feeling it's at the very least a very good-looking movie. A friend recently urged me to watch these Riddick films, and I have to say that I thought they were pretty darn good. especially Pitch Black - so good that I ended up reading up on the Diesel and realized that I've maybe underestimated the guy a bit. So am I looking forward to Riddick? Meh. Not quite, but I'm sure I'll watch it eventually. Twohy, who has directed all three of the films in the trilogy, seems to be at his best when he's with the big man.

The only other film seeing a decent bit of distribution this week is an indie drama called *The Ultimate Life*, starring Peter Fonda. I can't find a whole lot of information about the film, but I think it's a sequel to *The Ultimate Gift* (which basically no one saw) and might be one of those Christian genre movies. A handful of smaller films will also start to test in major markets, including *Touchy Feely*, *Salinger*, *Populaire* and *Money for Nothing*.

two basic forms on Indian music, the Carnatic, which Subramanyam plays, and the Hindustan, which Chaurasia plays. Both adhere to the basic structure of Indian music. According to a Shruti press release:

"The uniqueness of Indian classical music lies in its elaborate and complex Raga and Tala system. The Raga is like a scale with enormous scope for improvisation and allows powerful and subtle expression of moods. The Tala is the rhythm built into compositions. There are a variety of talas constructed through many permutations and combinations of beat, speed, time

and silence.'

The improvisational aspects of Indian music, and its basic do-re-mi format (Sa Re Ga in India) make it familiar enough to enjoy quickly, even for Western ears unaccustomed to the sounds of the instruments. The music generally starts off slowly then builds to a frenetic pace. It pulls you in.

Anyone interested in music would be loathe to miss this concert. So grab a meal at one of the fine Indian restaurants in town and head to IPFW. Immerse yourself in Indian culture.

1522). Luther talks directly to the audience about his life. He also steps periodically into flashbacks in which he interacts with other (invisible) characters on the stage, providing us with an enjoyable challenge to the imagination. Sound effects and lighting help to create the various locations.

I wrote this play for my husband who toured with it for many years. As he's too old now to play Luther at that time in his life (next year he'll be technically too old to play Luther at all), we've been waiting for the right actor to take on this very demanding role. We found our new Luther in Jeff Salisbury who has been working with all for One for several seasons. I'm also excited to present A Mighty Fortress for the first time with full stage set and lighting, and a brand new sound design, including several pieces of music composed by Martin Luther himself.

Luther's life reflects an era of radical social change: printed material was suddenly plentiful and

cheap, and much of it was available in ordinary language rather than the Greek and Latin of scholars; the Holy Roman Empire was splintering and losing its authority as secular government became more powerful. All these changes affected the Church. I think that understanding these events is important for Protestant and Catholic, historian and non-historian alike.

A Mighty Fortress is an hour-long drama. Appearing with it will be a shorter one-act drama entitled Prisoner of Joy which will look at a much older, yet equally revolutionary time in history, the first century A.D. A large cast, original music and lively staging will portray the story of the church at Philippi using only the words of the Bible found in Paul's letter to the Philippians and stories from the book of the Acts of the Apostles. We hope that the audience will find our somewhat contemporized depiction of these events to be consistent with the stories of persecuted churches throughout the world today.

King's Enjoyable Ride

Joyland by Stephen King, Titan Books, 2013

I cut my teeth as a reader on Stephen King's books in the late 1970s and early 80s, and I'm always going

to have a fondness for those early novels. I haven't had much trouble. however, resisting most of what he's written in the past 25 years or so; all those big, bloated novels were just too much trouble to get through without offering much in return for the effort. I couldn't resist picking up Joyland, though. How could I? It looked like it played to all of King's strengths, and it was only about 300 pages long. It seemed worth the trouble, and it is.

Published under the Hard Case

Crime imprint of Titan Books, the

book is an artfully pulpy paperback with a wonderful cover painting by Glen Orbik of a sexy redhead in a skimpy dress. It's a murder mystery and a coming-of-age story set in the early 70s at a thirdtier amusement park on the beach in North Carolina. Do pleasures get any guiltier than a book like this?

Devin Jones, the

novel's protagonist, is a 21-year-old college student who takes a summer job at the park. He's in the midst of a breakup, the end of his first real relationship, and he's wallowing in his misery. He stays at a boarding house run by a maternal landlady, and makes lots of friends at the park – his fellow summer workers, the nurturing fortune teller, the amiable guy who runs the Ferris wheel, the wise old owner of the park. He discovers that he has a gift for entertaining and comforting children, and he sincerely enjoys all the hard, dirty jobs he's given to do. Despite his heartbreak, and his nagging wish to lose his virginity, his summer is shaping up to be a pretty good one.

There's a dark side, however. Legend has it that the park's haunted-house ride is actually haunted, and Devin is intrigued by the stories. It's not just folklore, either; the ride was the site of the welldocumented murder of a young woman just four years earlier, and her murderer is still on the loose. Now, the stories say, the girl's ghost sometimes appears to select park employees in the dark confines of Horror House.

The book weighs in at only about a third the size of King's grander novels because its plot is relatively sketchy by the author's



standards. In fact, nothing much of consequence happens in the first half of the novel, and both the supernatural elements and the crime story don't really get going until the second half. The story's key figure, a psychic boy with a terminal illness, doesn't make his first real appearance until we've already spent a lot of time with

But that's not a problem. The book's uneventful first half is its best part, as Devin settles into his unfamiliar new world and learns to cope with his adolescent sad-

ness. He throws himself into his work, and he mopes on the beach and in his room, listening to his Doors records and reading The Lord of the Rings. It's quiet and comfortable in a melancholy way, and the world that King creates around Devin is a delightful set piece.

As the scarytouching part of the plot gets going, things get a little more predictable

and a lot less original. The psychic boy is pulled pretty much whole from King's own The Shining, with a little of John Irving's A Prayer for Owen Meany thrown in. The murder mystery is only moderately clever, and King's efforts to turn the whole story into a tear-jerker are heavy-handed.

None of that is enough to spoil the book. King's typical reliance on folksy slang, a trait that I've never liked nearly as much as his admirers do, is restrained here, although his inclusion of an entire vocabulary of carny-speak is pushed selfconsciously to the forefront. Even though he admits that he made up a lot of the carny terms, they feel real and natural, a nice contrast to the quaint gibberish that his colorful characters often speak.

It seems an odd thing to say about a Stephen King book, but Joyland is soothing. For the first half of the book, there isn't even any conflict aside from Devin's loss of his flighty girlfriend. There are no bad guys, no monsters, no malevolent cosmic forces, no impending doom. There is only a young man making his way through a summer that is at once difficult and exhilarating - and that, for Devin and for us readers, is a wonderful ride.

Schaltenbrand) and The Producers.

But he is particularly proud of his recent role as Atticus Finch in the University of St. Francis production of To Kill a Mockingbird. Directed by his brotherin-law Brad Beauchamp, it's a show that "everyone needs to see every now and again or at least re-familiarize themselves with," he says.

"The greatest reward [of a role like that]," he says, "is the palpable feeling you get when you know that an audience is connected with you while you're performing. He was especially proud of a letter he received from the legendary Harvey Cocks following the production. "I know Harvey writes a lot of letters to a lot of people," he says modestly. "But his letter meant so much to me. He said my Atticus was 'idealistic but not bombastic,' and that was so great because Brad and I worked hard to keep him simple and truthful, not to hit the audience over the head with the message. And then the letter said - I remember the exact words - 'Your courtroom performance made this old man cry.

His current role, however, is a complete 180-degree departure from such a heavy-hitting, emotionally
