



Having settled into their downtown locale for the last two years and collaborating with multiple arts organizations throughout the city (last fall's performance was Carmina Burana, presented with the Fort Wayne Children's Choir and the Heartland Chamber Chorale), the ballet now looks to establish their talents in all forms of dance, something which can be discovered when you learn more about

"Our fall show is really a repertory program, and it reflects so many styles of dance," says Gibbons-Brown. "As of right now we will do a sort of ballroom work," says Ingram when asked about his choreography last month. "Hope is composing new music for my work. and I hope to leave people laughing and smiling."

Ingram's arrival as a full-time member of Fort Wayne Ballet has brought a new dimension to these shows, given his eclectic approach to dance. But he

also knows that many of the dancers being trained at the ballet have a lot to offer audiences looking for many forms of dance.

'Come see the versatility, the range and the technical virtuosity of the dancers at the Fort Wayne Ballet. This is not your typical night at the ballet."

Tritz also brings a full range of dance expertise to her work as both faculty and choreogra-

pher at Fort Wayne Ballet. Teaching everything from ballet to jazz to musical theater, she not only sees the full range of what the company dancers can do but also spotlights the talents of the FWB students in her work, which she says will pay homage to a couple of

"Fosse is one of my idols, and this gives me a chance to pay tribute to him," she says. "Plus I'm from Chicago and he's from Chicago, so I can also pay tribute to a place that's been really important in my life. I'll mostly focus on pieces from Chicago, but there will also be some stuff from Sweet Charity and the show Fosse, and there will be both singing and dancing."

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------Feature • Phillip Stewart -------From the Aftermath, Art

Over one year ago, on June 29, 2012, a powerful storm littered city streets with huge branches and fully mature trees as it blasted its way across Fort Wayne. Many who remember the storm have stories to tell about where they were and what they saw as the 91-mph straight-line winds swept through our neighborhoods. Phillip Stewart was out of town when the storm hit, but his life will be forever connected to the event.

Unaware of the storm, Stewart and his family dismantled their campsite in northern Michigan, loaded the truck and headed home. Memories of a fabulous vacation lingered in their minds - camping, fishing, swimming and a visit to a surprisingly impressive art show where Stewart met some men who carved wooden decoy ducks. He was instantly drawn to their work and felt the call of inspiration.

Back home in Indiana, Stewart found his neighborhood littered with branches and trees. With memories of decoy ducks still fresh in his mind, his wheels started turning. Stewart harvested a log from a pine tree that had fallen at the end of his cul-de-sac. He cut off a section about three feet tall, rolled it down the street and parked it in his driveway.

"That's when all the craziness started," said Stewart.

That craziness includes an impressive collection of sculptures, which sprout up from Stewart's yard. That first harvested log is now a bear, a vision clearly imagined by Stewart and carefully carved with his chainsaw. Another log was transformed into a wise, bearded man named Phil Robertson who welcomes guests at the front door with textural detail that commands not just a second look but a respectful investigation with an open palm.

With the pass of a hand, one can quickly understand why Stewart is attracted to the medium. Wood is a material that can be brutally rugged (enough to leave you with a nasty gash) yet worked to a curvaceous, smooth shine. Wood is inviting but at the same time unforgiving. Mistakes can't be corrected easily, and once a carver decides to head in one direction, there is no turning back.

Many will agree that there is a spirit held within a piece of wood. The life of the tree lingers within the layers that grew slowly over time. When an artist can harmonize with the grain, the patterns of light and dark, the swooping and curing lines seem to unfold magically, adding a rich layer of beauty to the finished piece.

Stewart is keenly connected to his medium. He studies each piece of wood carefully before picking up his power tools.

"I used to look at trees and just see a tree," explained Stewart. Now he visualizes images in the organic shapes of trees. He looks for interesting features such as burls or branch formations that he can incorporate into his designs. When referring to his first bear sculpture, Stewart said, "I immediately saw what I wanted to carve based on the shape and size." Thirty hours of labor later and the bear carving was finished.

When Stewart first took a chainsaw to a chunk of wood, he unleashed a hidden talent. It is incredibly hard to comprehend the level of quality he has been able to achieve



in just one year. When asked about his training, Stewart replied simply, "I took art all through elementary and high school. I like to draw and I play around with watercolor."

His casual response leaves one wondering, what else is this guy capable of? With no formal training, his research done online, Stewart has been able to establish himself as a skilled craftsman, one who has already stacked up a line of requests for commissions. "I've had people straight up call me a liar," said Stewart as he recalls conversations with curious observers of his work. "They act like they are joking, but I think they really have doubts.'

The truth is, Stewart hasn't had time to investigate his passion and talent until now. He is a father, husband and full-time firefighter for the city of Fort Wayne. Prior to that he served in the military, which instilled a craving for excitement. The fire service offers Stewart the rush of adrenaline that he needs, but he also enjoys helping people. He is proud to serve as a firefighter and goes to work excited to give his best effort.

Someone is depending on you to be your best on the worst day of their life," said Stewart as he explained what has motivated him for the past 11 years.

High standards and commitment to quality are traits that have undoubtedly helped lift his carving skills to a high level in a remarkably short period of time, and Stewart is pushing himself to a new level with his current project. A cigar store Indian stands proudly in Stewart's front yard. It is an enormous work, over six feet tall, carved from a beautiful piece of locus harvested from a tree that a neighbor recently cut down.

"Someone came over and told me about it," said Stewart. "Luckily the guy who commissioned the piece happened to have equipment large enough to move the trunk into my yard. It's a beautiful piece

of wood."

The wood's grain complements the form that is taking shape. Small lines encircle the cheekbones while larger grain patterns highlight the muscle tone in the figure's abdomen. By contrast, the back of the figure is consistent in color, allowing the bone structure to flow smoothly.

As Stewart works, neighbors and friends keep close tabs on his progress. The carving is taking shape out in his studio which is on the lawn outside of his front door. As the Indian takes on more detail and definition, Stewart has noticed an increase in foot traffic. People from other neighborhoods are walking past to watch him work. They often stop to ask questions or comment on the transformation of the giant log. As details such as braids, a feather and a pipe emerge, observers seem more fascinated by his work. While he enjoys visits, Stewart knows he must stay focused while he works.

"There are many angles, and they all have to be in alignment and anatomically correct." He is constantly problem solving and thinking ahead of the wood. "I

battle with a sense of hesitation and fear. I have a lot of time invested in this piece. One mistake and the whole thing is ruined, but you have to be willing to go for it. You have to be willing to try."

Because he works outdoors, Stewart must also battle the weather. He can only carve on dry days, and even then he constantly applies varnishes and urethanes to the wood to protect it from drying and cracking. As the summer season winds down, carving season ticks away. A sense of urgency pushes Stewart forward as he knows he must finish the largest piece of his short career as soon as possible.

Stewart has dreams of buying a place in the country where he can set up a shop to allow him to continue working all year long. His mind is a whirlwind of ideas for making furniture, birdbaths and abstract pieces.

"My brain is crammed full like a closet full of junk," says Stewart who plans to continue developing his skills and possibly turn his hobby in to a second career. His passion for creating is strong, and if he can keep up this pace he will no doubt find success.

"I sometimes look at other people's art and it blows my mind," says Stewart. "That's what I want other people to get out of the work that I do."

After making the visit to witness his work, one can safely say, mission accomplished.

The Battle's Other Winner

"You gotta win to get love. I mean, that's just life. Look at ... look at Don Shula. Legendary coach. Look at that Asian guy who holds the world record for eatin' all those hot dogs in a row. Look at Rue McClanahan. From The Golden Girls. Three people, all great champions, all loved."

When Ricky Bobby, in the movie Tall-

edega Nights, said this about winning, he clearly hadn't been in a close contest. Not one as close as this year's whatzup/Wooden Nickel Battle of the Bands, anyway. Miles High, in their third year participating in the contest, missed winning the final night's show by just three one-thousandths of a point. If they had received just one more judge's point or one more person's vote, we would be talking about Miles High, not Trackless, as Battle of the Bands champions in 2013. But just because they didn't win, it doesn't mean they aren't loved. Nearly a hundred fans came out to watch the band play and voted for them to win. That's love.

As Miles High guitarist John McKnight said, "Anyone could've taken first that night. It was a good night of music and we want to thank our fans for helping us rock the house."

Formed in 2010, Miles High began as a group of friends sharing a love of music that morphed and grew as the band searched for its sound. Anyone who had seen the band perform in its early days would be amazed by what has grown into a mature, professional band ready to become prominent players in our area's music scene.

"This band has been quite a work in progress that has seen many looks and lineup changes over the years," McKnight said in a recent interview. The core group has been Miles Boyd on vocals and guitar, Nolan Opper on bass, Andy Murfield on saxophone, McKnight on lead guitar, and Ryan Moreno on drums. The most recent additions have been the horn section of Dominic Gaietto on trombone and Chris Adamisin on trumpet.

With the exception of Adamisin and McKnight, the members of Miles High went to school together, so they had been familiar with each other and shared a love of music well beyond the band formed.

"Everyone has been playing music for quite some time," McKnight explained. "Everyone had different reasons for getting into music, and everyone had different styles" going into the band, but their differences are what make them great. "[Mixing the different styles] really adds a nice dimension to the music.

McKnight explains that with influ-

ences ranging from "Red Hot Chili Peppers, Prince, Incubus, Rage Against the Machine, Umphrey's McGee, Phish, Jack White, Pearl Jam and everything in between," it's difficult to plug Miles High into one specific type of music. And though those influences sound pretty diverse, Miles High have found a way to incorporate them into their music each and every night.

"Pinning us to any one genre is nearly

The band's biggest asset may be having a lot of members with different ideas, but that size and diversity also presents some of the band's biggest challenges.

"Having so many talented members makes it hard to focus our energy on one particular project to really propel it forward," McKnight said. "Everyone needs their freedom to play, so it must be respected. Beyond that, simply finding time to get



impossible because we tend to infuse funk, blues, country, reggae, pop, jazz and rock into our music," McKnight said. "We try to do it in ways that people can really grab on to, regardless of which particular style is calling them. Each musician has [his] own tastes, and we all let that reflect in the music. However, each musician is proficient enough to cover many styles so we can hit from all angles.

When we talk about progressing," McKnight continued, "it's attributed more to our abilities to play and really clean up the sound. In having such a large band, it's a huge priority of ours to not only play well, but to sound as well and clear as we can."

Writing music for a band with such a wide range of styles sounds like it would be huge challenge. That's why, McKnight says, the band spreads the workload around to all its members.

"No one individual is responsible for all the music we write," Mcknight said. "Someone will either bring an idea up at practice and everyone will add some color, or we'll simply start jamming and see what comes of it. Some of our best work has been really spontaneous.

Boyd is responsible for the bulk of the lyrics, according to McKnight.

"Stresses, anger, love gained, love lost, life changes, good times and bad times all creep their way into the lyrics. Some songs are purely fun, and some have deeper feelings put into them. It helps keep listeners on their toes and gives them something to listen to regardless of their current situations."

so many people together for practice is one of our toughest challenges. We can go over a month without practicing, which is kind of crazy we are even able to play at the level we believe we can play at."

Though they've begun to finally see the fruits of their success, Miles High have a very realistic approach to the future. Having already two CDs - 2010's Freaks 'n' Losers and Pleasure Playground, released last April - the band continues to write new music to present to fans. The band has found a way to combine their individual talents and influences into some great music, forging their own path, taking on challenges as they come and adapting and changing when needed.

"I think we tend to try and take it a week at a time and try not to get too far ahead of ourselves," said McKnight. "Life has a way of throwing wrenches into plans, so we might as well enjoy it while we can. It's hard to imagine where we'd be if life wasn't in the way of the music."

"Second place is just the first-place loser." With all due respect to the late, great Dale Earnhardt, creator of this oft-used quote, that's not always the case. Through three years of fighting through tough competition to finally get to the finals of this year's Battle of the Bands, the band has made its mark on the music scene and gained a ton of new fans in the process by putting on some highly energetic, highly entertaining shows that left everyone highly impressed. It's safe to say that in the case of Miles High, second place wasn't the first loser; it was really the second winner.

Syracuse, Indiana author Jim Cox, a natural-born storyteller, writes enchanting tales in the style of Louis L'amour.

If you are an avid reader of Westerns, you will appreciate the easy cadence and plain speak of Cox's style. His books read like one would expect actual dialog on the 1800s frontier to sound like.

So far, thanks to local recording powerhouse

Sweetwater Sound, there are two ebooks and audiobooks of his in-print novels available: A Man Called Scar and Rusty Crooked Nails. Two more books are in development - Scar and the Double D Ranch, the longawaited sequel to A Man Called Scar, and The Long High Trail.

Cox writes with a steady moral compass and says, "I like to write books that anyone can read and provide wholesome entertainment for all ages to enjoy."

A 13-year-old boy can read and enjoy Cox's Westerns every bit as much as a grownup, which is refreshing in today's culture.

Cox is a member of what's sometimes called the Greatest Generation, and his worldliness and compassion comes through in everything he writes. He has had three careers, authoring Western novels being his


Born the youngest of five siblings in the 1930s in Missouri, his family moved

around extensively when he was a small child before settling back in the town of his birth – Essex, a town of 500 in the flat river bottoms of southeastern Missouri. After his father's death when he was 12, Jim and his mother and youngest sister moved in with his grandparents. His grandfather, it would seem, is his muse who propelled him into his career as an author.

"Back then money was scarce, but the memories were priceless," Cox told me. He states that his grandfather told hour-long stories of his growing-up years with obvious embellishments to make them larger than life. Those precious memories of his grandfather's long-winded varns left an indelible impression in Cox. One might say that storytelling is in his genes.

His foray into the enchantment of storytelling began when he lived with his brother in West Lafayette while attending Purdue University. The car rides to visit family back in Missouri over the holidays were an eight-hour trip, and that's when Cox started carrying on his grandfather's tradition. He'd entertain his nephew Jay as his own stories came to life in the back seat during those special times years

Fast forward to current times: after college Cox worked for many years for a major agricultural company, not unusual for a Purdue grad. However, due to his great business sense and determination, Cox went on to found his own successful agricultural business which allowed him to retire comfortably. Not one to sit idle, Cox did what a man of his caliber would do: he started another full-time job. Cox became a full time author, and along with his stellar Western novels he has also penned a series of children's stories titled Granddad's Children's Stories. In keeping with a tradition of instilling values, hope and a positive attitude. all of Cox's children's stories have a positive message and communicate wonderful lessons about maintain-



coming challenges and adversity through personal integrity.

Early on, Cox's publisher recognized his commercial potential and literary skills and determined that it made good sense to surround Cox with high-caliber talent. All of his books have been edited by Bill Thompson, the same editor who discovered and edited for both John Grisham and Stephen King. Next

came national distribution. Starting September 1. Cox's Western books are included in a national release which will provide the exposure and marketing efforts that an author like Cox merits. His Granddad's Children's Stories and additional Westerns will follow in the coming months in print, ebook and audiobook.

A lot can be learned from a prolific author like Cox whose life lessons are so pure that you may enjoy his fast-paced, fun-to-read-books and not even realize he is also sharing valuable advice. He not only wants to entertain you, but wants to instill in you the sound principals that will enrich your life. He is not just an author; he is a humanitarian. Best of all, he genuinely cares

Rendering the Maumee River

After a long day at work, running errands in and out of air-conditioned buildings and being stuck in traffic, it is easy to forget the beauty that is outside our back door. Sometimes all you need is the sound of the wind in the trees or a moment to take in the way the light plays on a field of grass to feel grounded and grateful for all that surrounds you.

Seeing the new exhibit at Artlink reminds you of all those little things that can so easily be taken for granted. *Great Outdoors* has over 40 artists participating in a multimedia art exhibition featuring scenes of nature with a focus on the Maumee River. Encouraged in partnership with the Maumee Valley Heritage Corridor, the exhibit takes visitors back to those country roads and down paths often forgotten in the day to day

The Maumee, 137 miles in length, is the largest

river in the Great Lakes system and one of the most biologically productive in the region. This show reflects diversity in arrays of pho-

tography, etching, mixed media, fiber art, charcoal, oil and watercolor. Each artist distinctively displays the beauty found within the area.

The Maumee Valley Heritage Corridor's mission is to advocate and protect the historical, natural and cultur-

al resources of the Maumee Valley watershed while promoting their use and appreciation by current and future residents and visitors. Artlink's *Great Outdoors* exhibition displays works by artists who share the desire to capture tones and colors; pieces harmonize together to create an integration of landscapes that pulse with energy applied in stippled paint and shutter speeds which reflect the corridor's objective to cherish the landscape.

The *Great Outdoors* collection expresses the notion that diversity found in nature is often echoed artistically. Approaching the same subject matter, these artists use different mediums and methods to express what they perceive.

Within "Roosting Egrets Eagle Marsh," Bill Christie's digital photo, a certain magic is brought forth with bright white birds and their reflections glowing on the water below blurring into a dreamlike scene. Elizabeth Balzer presents the landscape in a more confrontational way in her digital print "Untitled" with





a ghostly white tree that stands against a black background; highlighted in a simple organic

> rectangle, branches glow purple against vibrant pinks and greens that radiate from behind. Through use of the same medium these artists provoke such different feelings in their approach, yet both capture a mood that is powerful enough to transform the viewer into another

time and space.

In conjunction with photos that capture hummingbirds in flight and foxes at play and paintings that display the delicate foliage that surrounds, the show also provides a modernistic interpretation of nature. Charlotte Wehr uses pieces of broken blue- and amber-colored glass intertwined in wire to create the abstract landscape of "Waterbirds." More open to interpretation than other images of the river and swampland, this piece offers another way to perceive this landscape. Using varying hues of blue and teal, the sharp bottle bottom becomes soft water, forcing the viewer to imagine the scene in terms of transparent color blocks, offering a powerful reminder of the mark carelessness can make on habitats.

Great Outdoors runs through Wednesday, October 9 in Artlink's main galleries. During the same period, Robin Dluzen: Where the Road Begins is exhibited in the Feature Gallery, and Paintings by David Buenrostro is in the Betty Fishman Gallery.

The Nutcracker begins on December 6 and continues through December 15. The spring performance will be Romeo & Juliet, a show which has been long on the wish list at Fort Wayne Ballet, but until recently it wasn't possible to perform.

"There are many male roles in *Romeo & Juliet*," explains Gibbons-Brown, "and we never had enough dancers or the funding to bring in the guest dancers for the cast. But we received a gift to secure those dancers so we'll finally be able to stage this ballet."

Another popular addition to the season's schedule has been the Family Series, which in recent years expanded from two annual performances to three. A more casual production, performed in the FWB Main Street studios, the shows are aimed at smaller children who might not have the attention span or understanding to appreciate the more complex shows. The stories also lend themselves to the talents of the Fort Wayne Ballet Youth Company, which itself has grown to include some very talented ballet students. This season's

Family Series productions include *Rodeo* (September 28), *Ferdinand the Bull* (February 22) and *The Little Mermaid* (April 26).

"I like to try to pick children's books and stories that have good characters and fun, educational themes," says Alexis Ingram, director of Fort Wayne Ballet's Youth Company. "I like to challenge the young dancers by pushing them to create characters and keep the audience engaged all while remembering choreography and staying true to the story. It's a lot to ask of a young person, but they continue to become greater artists with every show!"

The season will again be capped with *Fort Wayne Ballet*, *Too* in June 2014, but as is always the case for that performance, fans will have to wait awhile to find out what outside-the-box plan will take shape. 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Jonathan Rado

Law and Order

On this solo debut from Jonathan Rado, guitarist for newish indie stars Foxygen, we take a tour through the 23-year-old songwriter's influences, most of which are late 60s and early 70s rock bands – garage-, folk-, classic- and psych-rock, mostly. In its pleasant derivativeness, the album



reminds me very much of the records Ryan Adams was putting out after he first left Whiskeytown in 2000. Both Adams and Rado have a keen knack for making others' work their own in a way that manages to feel both exciting and interesting.

The difference between my early Adams listening experiences and my impressions of the very good *Law and Order* is that I was 19 when I was first listening to Adams' solo work and now I'm 33 and, well, I suppose I'm finally at that point in my life as a listener where I don't much care to hear young guys play their version of The Hits as much as I used to. I can enjoy it when I hear it, and I can certainly respect it when it's done as well as Rado is doing it, but this sort of record doesn't give me the spark that a Daughn Gibson or Dirty Projectors album can. But I digress, *Law and Order* is a very stellar debut, one that I think I would've loved dearly as a younger man.

The production here is almost always interesting, Rado employing Beck-like techniques to his poppy rock compositions. Opener "Seven Horses" is a melodious, hook-driven tune featuring simple basic tracks ornamented by various electronic loops and effects. It's meant to be the track – the sound – that hooks you, and it does just that. It's a short and sweet sampling of the many things Rado does well, and it sets the stage for the modernly retro *Law and Order* perfectly.


Up next is "Hand in Mine," a bouncy boy-girl duet that reminds me very much of the record Adam Green and Binki Shapiro released earlier this year. The composition is again poppy and dusty, with some very modern-sounding production techniques. It's a big winner, helping the record get off on a serious – and diverse – roll.

The epic, poorly titled "Looking 4a Girl Like U" is up next. This lengthy offering boasts heavily distorted vocals and an organ-heavy composition that uses mellotrons, guitar pedals and other various synths in its subtle, yet complex composition. I'm not sure how much appeal the song has as a destination track (mostly due to its over-the-top vocal effects), but it effectively adds an avant garde element to Rado's still young creative voice. I imagine fans of The Flaming Lips' *Embryonic* liking this track a whole lot, if not too many others.

And so it goes on, a collection of labored-over tracks that will likely remind you of some of your all-time favorite songs. The question becomes, I think, a two-parter: (1) Is Law and Order the kind of record that can start a solo career? And (2) if it is, does Rado leave Foxygen immediately or does he stick around to see how his sophomore solo record goes over? My guess is that Rado's solo effort will find fans and, if nothing else, help thicken up the momentum Foxygen have been building all year long. Law and Order isn't Heartbreaker, but it is most definitely a very good, very diverse rock record that works hard to show off its maker's many abilities. (Greg W. Locke)

No Age An Object

What is it that No Age are so angry about? I keep listening to *An Object*, and I'm wondering who rained on their parade? I mean, they've always had this angst-y vibe about them. *Everything in Between* seemed to be the point where they found the perfect balance of angst and rebellion mixed with pop appeal, all



the while never losing artistic face. It seemed as if their next album would be a shining achievement. Instead, we get *An Object*, an album that at times hints at what could've been something monumental, but instead it seems to be a line drawn in the sand. If you cross, do so at your own risk. If you don't, well then you just don't understand, man.

ZZ Top

Spins

Rio Grande Mud (1972)

ZZ Top's second album was Texas-style electric blues, and 40 years later they've continued to play sold out arenas all over the world. What exactly is the reason behind ZZ Top's success? Maybe because they have been together all these years? Or because the music,



although not brilliant, is consistently above average? It doesn't matter, but you need to get into their early stuff to appreciate their tenure at the table of rock n' roll.

Opener "Francine" is pretty good blues rock without being pretentious or overtly simple. "Just Got Paid" is one of my favorite songs the Top ever did. A little harder than Lynyrd Skynyrd, it's more Texas blues than Southern rock. Lyrically, however, the two bands are somewhat similar.

"Ko Ko Blue" is another song that also flew under the radar. Riddled with harmonica and a grungy rhythm guitar, it sounds like something they could have released in the mid 90s. "Apologies to Pearly" kicks off side two and is more of a traditional blues instrumental number. Billy Gibbons and Dusty Hill were decent guitar players, and I think the simplicity of their arrangements made them more accessible.

"Bar-B-Q" cranks it up a little more before the record comes to a screeching halt in the groggy blues number "Sure Got Cold After the Rains Fell" (think "Tuesday's Gone").

The album closes with "Down Brownie" which, after about 30 minutes of listening, sounds like every other song they ever wrote. But this formula works for them, so who am I to judge? After all, ZZ Top have released 15 albums, toured extensively and sold over 25 million units. If it isn't broke, don't fix it.

The band will play the Lima Civic Center in Ohio on Friday, October 25.

"No Ground" opens the album interestingly enough with a delayed guitar, then a driving bass line. That wall of guitar follows with drums hidden in the background behind muddied sonics. Dean Spunt yells about something. He's angry at "you." Who "you" is is anybody's guess. It's a noisy opener that seems to stay in one mode: disenchanted. "I Won't Be Your Generator" is a nice surprise. It hints at the greatness of *Everything in Between* and shows Spunt and Randall less aggravated and more inspired. "C'mon Stimmung" is the sort of dream punk anthem No Age are known best for, but it sounds somehow worn out, as if these two are exhausted.

There's a back and forth on this album – a back and forth from ear-catching to stunted and grating. It's sonically in a grey area. No bright spots or dark corners. Just sort of muted. There are some really great songs, like "An Impression," which sounds oddly enough like a lofi Merriweather Post Pavillion B-side. The aforementioned "I Won't Be Your Generator" and "Running From A-Go-Go" both are truly great tunes. The latter half of *An Object* seems to be where No Age decided to loosen up a bit and allow the songs to breathe and grow naturally as opposed to keeping with some rigid artistic manifesto.

It's all well and good that No Age want to spit in the face of convention on *An Object*, but when you start alienating the ears that have followed you and supported you for so long, well, you end up playing to an empty room. Sure, there are folks who will adore this record's droning noise and artistic vision. The fellas even went so far as to make the packaging for the record and ship the "objects" themselves, bringing them that much closer to the fans that bought the album. I think that's admirable, I really do. But I'd rather the artist concentrate more on the balance between the art's validity and intent and less on printing UPS labels. I want to be challenged as a listener and lover of art. I don't want easy entertainment. I want it to grow on me, and there are some songs on this record that I'm sure will grow on me as time goes by. But when you make an album so hard to break into and get to know, there are lots of folks who will just drop it and move on. *An Object* is an admirable try at an artistic statement.

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

Earl Sweatshirt

Doris

"Free Earl," the kids said. But more on that later. First, let's talk expectations.

Angeles Los emcee Earl Sweatshirt has been widely regarded as the most talented rapper from the Odd Future camp



since the tribe first went public, and *Doris*, his long awaited (and first proper) solo record could easily be considered the most hyped of all the Odd Future-related projects to date (not counting the Frank Ocean album, which I don't consider a proper O.F. release). And now I can say, for certain, that *Doris* is the best Odd Future product yet. It features, easily, the best production and vocal performances of any O.F. release. No contest. And yes, I think the record will get great reviews and start a career or two.

All that said, I think the record is a disappointment. Underground hip-hop fans wanted – maybe even expected – the best debut rap album since Ready to Die or Illmatic. Earl's very early verses displayed one of the freshest, most developed, enjoyable and natural vocal styles we've heard in many moons. Add to that his pedigree (his dad is a poet and intellectual and his mom is a UCLA law professor) and you have the hype. And how about the story of Earl? After recording some early classic verses at age 15, Earl began to get quite a bit of exposure. His mother eventually heard some of his songs, which could easily be described as "horror core, and wisely sent her son to a private reformatory school in Africa, far away from his often demented Odd Future family. Thus the "Free Earl" movement. Once back in the U.S., Earl seemed smarter, more mature. He regretted many of his darker lyrics and immediately went to work on what would become Doris.

Quite a story, right? Earl wanted it. He waited for it. For *Doris* he recorded countless songs, selecting the best of the bunch for this 15-track debut (you can expect a second album of leftovers to hit store shelves quickly). The kid wanted to make the classic record we all expected from him. But he didn't, unfortunately. Sure, Doris is good, but it's a deeply flawed record. For starters, Earl deserves better production. The sound of the bulk of the record could be described as dark, maybe even still horror core or Goth-tinged. Much of the production is very creative, but to what end if the sound doesn't suit Earl's vocal style? Rather than hunting down beats that service his flow, Earl is here servicing his producers. And he's great at it, surely, but I think the opposite approach would've resulted in a much better record. A classic. One of a handful of expectations is a track called "Centurion," produced by Christian Rich. Rich's work here - and elsewhere on the record - works incredibly well with Earl's style, allowing him to really shine as an emcee.

But outside of my production-related gripes, I have other complaints. Doris is a collection of unfortunate, if small rookie mistakes that add up to make a flawed record that could've easily been much better. For starters, Earl doesn't perform the album's first verse. Also, the opening track feels very slight and underwhelming, hardly the grand entrance one hopes for on a much-anticipated solo debut. There are too many guest verses and too many hands in the production pot. Lastly, the record is too long, an almost mandatory rookie misstep in hip-hop. Had Earl released the 11 best tracks from his uneven 15-song collection, his record would most definitely be held in a higher regard. Quality over quantity.

But enough with the negative talk; Doris will likely be a contender for the year's best hip-hop record honors, and deservingly so. Unlike Kanye West's Yeezus. Doris is an album that street kids from both coasts could fall in love with. That matters. Tracks like "Molassas," produced by and featuring none other than the RZA, is a new classic of the genre. The same could be said for "Hive" (which sees Earl doing his Tyler impersonation), "Chum," "Centurion" and "Whoa." So yes, if you were wondering because I complained so much, I do like *Doris*. I like it a whole hell of a lot, even. I wish it were more in line with what my idea of a great first record is, but for a first proper offering from an 18-year-old kid, Doris is a phenomenal effort, one of the year's most character-driven works of mainstream art and, I think, 2013's best hip-hop release. The future of hip-hop is here, hidden in Earl's lazy, rich delivery. (Greg W. Locke)

GWAR

Battle Maxiumus

GWAR are sort of a package deal, one that's best experienced live. For those who aren't already familiar with them, GWAR are the costumed band to end all costumed bands.



Their characters are intergalactic warriors who are out to kill, rape, pillage and blaspheme everything in their path. Led by the scatologically battle-hungry Oderus Urungus, they are, as the title of their debut LP proclaimed, the Scumdogs of the Universe. Their shows are messy, offensive affairs with sacred cows being bludgeoned and gallons of fake blood being spewed upon the crowd nightly. While their albums are necessary to keep the plotline going (and to satiate fans as they await the next show), they can be hit or miss and are generally considered secondary to their stage

On Battle Maximus, GWAR seem to be in extrapummel mode, with some genuinely meaty riffs driving the whole show. The plotline goes something like this: GWAR are roused from their Antarctic home to defend the planet against a sinister invader or, more precisely, to defend their claim to be the ones to destroy the human race if they so choose. Natch. This time around their foe is the mighty Mr. Perfect who has traveled through time to steal GWAR's power and turn the human race into his own vision of perfection, thus making them his slaves and not GWAR's.

As the title indicates, much of the album is devoted to battle-themed crunchers like "I, Bonesnapper," "Nothing Left Alive" and the succinct "Bloodbath." Like a blue comedian telling the Aristocrats joke, however, GWAR are at their best when they are cleverly offensive, such as on the nasty little ditty "Raped at Birth" in which Oderus tells the tale of how he was violated shortly after being born and how it continues to happen to this day.

Fans will wonder if any mention is made of Flattus Maximus, the character that was retired after the untimely death of guitarist Cory Smoot who played him. Not exactly, but the album is dedicated to him, and the rare somber track "Falling" sure seems like a tribute to him.

All in all, Battle Maximus is another helping of GWAR. It's not up to the level of their early Scumdog days, or even their recent high point, 2009's Lust in Space, but if you like GWAR, you will like Battle Maximus. If not, then you'd best keep your distance from it, lest you get covered in fake blood. (Ryan





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



Jay-Z is set to follow up his successful summer mega-tour with Justin Timberlake with some headlining dates of his own in support of his newest opus Magna Carta Holy Grail. But if you want some real laughs (at the usual inappropriate topics) and some attempts at heartwarming sentiment (circling the usual topics), then I recommend We're the Millers (but don't see it with anyone who you would be embarrassed to be sitting in the theater with when inappropriate humor is focused on teenage boy body parts).

The premise is pure screwball. A not very accomplished, pot-selling, middle-aged adolescent male gets robbed. His mildly more effective and brutal boss will hurt him badly unless he brings a "smidge" of product from Mexico to Denver. To get the job done without getting busted, he hires a wife and kids and rents an RV so they can cross the border back into the United States without drawing any unwanted attention.

Things don't quite go according to plan.
Well, they go perfectly well if you're sitting in the audience waiting for things to "be more funny," as Homer Simpson would say.

The hapless drug dealer, David Clark, is played by Jason Sudekis. I'm so used to seeing him with short hair that, as the movie began, I wasn't sure what to make of the

stubble-chinned, shaggy slacker he portrays. Then he started talking, and the rude, jerky guy he so often plays clicked in.

David has been wandering through his life being a jerk, but he's not even very accomplished at being a jerk. He half-heartedly hits on his stripper neighbor Rose, a ridiculously still adorable Jennifer Anniston.

At work, Rose faces much more aggressive jerks, so David is just a minor annoyance. At home, she faces not only David's rude come-ons but mounting bills and the cruel reality that her boyfriend has left her after spending every penny on every credit card they shared.

Also hanging around the building is Will, a sweet, moon-faced Kenny Rossmore. He has been abandoned by the only parent he knows. He follows David around like a puppy.

Will looks after Casey, a homeless hottie who hangs around their building. Emma Roberts, as the convention goes, isn't nearly as tough as Casey pretends to be.

Will comes to the rescue of Casey. David comes to the rescue of Will. Yep, this is the purest definition of family. These poor suckers don't figure that out until the last act, which is cool. We get to watch. Without Rose, these dimwits would never figure it out

The Millers are unwittingly aided and



abetted by the Fitzgeralds (a nice, humorous reference to the philandering, drug-addled 35th president), another couple on the road in their RV. The Fitzgeralds are clueless and have issues, like their namesakes, but without the trust funds or the family muscle.

Nick Offerman and Kathryn Hahn play the parental Fitzergalds. They're cute and all, but the Fitzgerald rose is Molly Quinn, their red-haired daughter. She is a cutie, and Will knows it.

Things get mushy when Rose and Casey figure out that Will has never kissed a girl and want to help a boy out.

Oh, yeah, there are drugs in this movie. They are a tiresome maguffin. Pot. Really? A raccoon in the house could be funnier and cause more damage.

The funniest thing in We're the Millers is Will singing a certain TLC song. When not burning down their NFL-playing boyfriend's house, making up sad rap names for themselves, doing anything necessary to make major dollars, wearing ugly clothes, going in and out of rehab or tragically dying in an accident in Honduras, the chicks of this

Hubbub and Ha-Ha's

Civic Theatre guest director Ranae Butler and a cast clearly best described as "ridiculously talented" wring a lot of ridiculousness from The 39 Steps, a spy thriller/whodunit packed with hoopla, hubbub and occasional brouhahas. If you are in the audience, no need to

look around – the "ha-ha's" will be coming from you, beginning immediately after the lights go down and the action begins under a streetlight somewhere in London.

The comedy is a raucous, rambling affair, and its origins are almost as convoluted as the show itself. The tale is loosely based on a 1915 melodramatic novel by John Buchan which then was freely adapted by Alfred Hitchcock in 1935. Many years later Simon Corble and Nobby Dimon conceived of making it a stage comedy to be acted out by just four actors.

Patrick Barlow rewrote the script in 2005, and the show ran for two years on Broadway.

By the numbers, four actors (with a few assists from willing audience members and backstage crew) portray more than 150 characters (including a few inanimate objects). They race through 33 scenes in some 21 locations, ranging from a Cockney music hall to the Scottish Moors and back to the London Palladium. It even includes the first-ever live airplane

A Tour de Farce at FPT

First Presbyterian Theater tees up some non-stop silliness with The Fox on the Fairway, scoring plenty of guffaws in this tale of golf rivals run amok and love taking a mulligan. If you are under the impression that golf is a slow, polite game and the country club is a bastion of decorum, this show is going to pop your eyes open, baby. It is a witty, door-slamming

romp to the max, and dimpled balls have never been more fun.

Guest director Christopher Murphy and the very talented cast of six keep the action rolling like a well-serviced golf cart. The premise is that two unpleasant men place a \$200,000 bet on the outcome of their two clubs' annual tournament. Shenanigans quickly begin. Who will win? Quail Valley or Crouching Squirrel? Love, psyches and jobs are all at stake.

The script, by Ken Ludwig of Lend Me a Tenor and Moon over Buffalo fame, is a tour de farce if ever there was one. Ludwig tosses in almost every trick in the book, going way, way past mere door

slamming. He opens with that gambit, having the young lovers race around in the Tap Room of the Quail Valley Clubhouse Then the plot thickens. There are valuables in danger, drunken confessions overheard, a battle ax on the prowl, silly clothes, buffoonish bosses, underhanded tricks and revealed true identities. When kisses are kissed, feet kick up coyly, and when bottles are opened, drunkenness is sure to follow. And should a "19th century English Ming vase" get delivered, the game of pass would make the Manning family nod in admiration.

These Kids Are Pros

The founder of Ecstatic Theatrics, Jeannette Jaquish. is not one to take the easy road. She writes, directs and plays a major acting role in her latest musical comedy, Slipperzzzz! Cobb and the Twelve Dancing Princesses. Featuring the talents of both children and adults, Slipperzzzz! has it all: singing, dancing, slapstick,

tricky stage combat and even some truly heartfelt moments.

Based on a 17th century German folktale, Jaquish's version gives personality to the princesses and ties up loose ends the traditional oral folktale left dangling. In this version a Young Cobbler (Sam Smiley) spurns the advances of his hometown's less-than-attractive female admirers (all, I believe, played by boys) and dreams of marrying a beautiful princess. He leaves the town of Hobnobbit to seek out a bride. Along the way meets an Old Lady (Jaquish) who tells him the sad story of her life through an interpretive dance. She was once a happy wife and mother but was lured away by a magic spell and forced into slavery. The Old Lady also tells Cobb about a king who has 12 princess daughters and encourages him to search for his bride among them.

The princesses wake up every morning exhausted, with their shoes worn out. Their father, King Leo (Scott Wiley), and his vizier (Kael Bronson) devise a contest in which a succession of princes will attempt to find out where the princesses go at night. The prince who succeeds will marry the princess of his choosing. If he fails, he will go to the dungeon (actually just a mop closet with the word "dungeon' written on the door).

Meanwhile, the Old Cobbler quits his job out of frustration at all the worn-out shoes. Cobb is hired and catches the eye of young Princess Jonquil (played in alternating performances by Chloe Cameron and Paige Trammel). The secrets of the Princesses (as well as that of their missing mother) are revealed

at the end of the play.

The script is witty and there were several laugh-out-loud lines ("You saved me just in time! I was running out of British slang!") and Jaquish's writing has a very distinct voice. For a kids' show, one might think the dialogue would be simplistic, but she does not dumb anything down. The cast did an amazing job with a word-heavy script and one-liners that come fast

> and furious from a lot of different actors, one after the other.

> There were more musical numbers than I had been expecting, and the choreography was more complex. For such a large number of dancers in such a small space, the cast pulled off a lot of choreography without tripping over anyone. The songs were funny and catchy, with lyrics by Jaquish and sung to tunes by Kevin MacLeod. The one that is stuck in my head is from "Merry Go," and includes the lyric, "Where do we go? We don't know. Borneo? Tokyo? Favorite dance scenario: Dancing with our Daddy-o."

> Most of the performers adopt British accents for their roles and do an admirable job. Kael Bronson has a particularly good command of his roles (Town Crier, Vizier, and King Mudrid) and has excellent comedic timing. He also interacted well with Ary Sakri (as Mudrid's bumbling son Lurk), who also has a distinctively funny way of a delivering a line and sardonic facial expressions.

> Smiley is a sweet-faced Cobb who captures a range of emotions, from annoyance to kindness to love-struck angst. He also does an effective bit of sleight-of-hand in his first scene with the Old Lady.

> As King Leo, Wiley is one of the few adults in the cast and manages to be pompous and despotic without losing his fatherly vulnerability and charm. Scott Sarrazin (Prince Duncan) steals his scene as the goofy, mugging prince who was tricked out of his duties by the promise of a cinnamon Danish.

> The script allows each of the 12 princesses to shine, but I was particularly impressed with Katheryne Schauer (as the oldest princess, Violet) who, during a lively musical number, dispatched with a dropped prop by grabbing it with her bare foot and flinging it to the back of the stage in the middle of a


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

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This Time *Riddick* May Be a Hit

Tops at the Box: David Twohy and Vin Diesel's third *Chronicles of Riddick* collaboration, *Riddick*, took the No. 1 spot at last weekend's box office, selling just under \$19 million over its first three days. The first film in the series, 2000's *Pitch Black*, sold \$39 million total while the second, *The Chronicles of Riddick*, sold \$57 million. *Riddick* should easily push the \$70 million mark during this weak release season. While I don't think anyone would call the *Chronicles* trilogy a classic, it's definitely bound for cult classic status and features a classic central character.

Also at the Box: Lee Daniels' The Butler continued to softly entice the nation, taking the No. 2 spot at the U.S. box office last weekend with another \$8.9 million in sales, bringing the ensemble drama's 24-day total to \$91 million in the U.S. That's almost double the combined total of Daniels' three other films. Call it this year's The Help. Daniels' 2012 film, The Paperboy, a movie I liked very much, sold just under \$700,000. Ouch. Looks like Daniels is on his way. Taking the No. 3 spot at last weekend's U.S. box office was breakout foreign language indie Instructions Not

Included which sold another \$8 million, bringing the film's 10-day total to just over \$20 million. We're the Millers (\$7.9 million) and Planes (\$4.2 million) round out last weekend's notably weak Top 5 while Morgan Spurlock's silly One Direction: This Is Us doc sizzled at the No. 6 spot, selling a meager \$4 million over its second weekend. Woody Allen's Blue Jasmine also started to flutter a bit, selling just \$2.7 million, bringing the movie's U.S. total to just over \$25 million.

New this Week: Two new films open wide this season, starting with *The Family*, Luc Besson's first directorial effort since his underrated 2011 drama *The Lady* and his first Besson-looking film since 1997's *The Fifth Element*. The film, starring Robert De Niro

Who Knew Digestion Could Be Fun?

Gulp by Mary Roach, W.W. Norton & Company, 2013

Whether or not she originally intended, science writer Mary Roach has made a career of writing about taboo subjects. Her first book, *Stiff*, methodically examined the biological, historical and cultural contexts of death, and her third book, *Bonk*, did the same thing for sex. Even in books like *Spook*, which addressed the idea of the after life, and *Packing for Mars*, which explored the problems of extended space travel, she showed a tendency to now and then veer off into territory not fit for the squeamish. So it's no surprise that her latest book, *Gulp*, dives with gusto into the realms of the gross.

An exposé of the human digestive tract, from beginning to end, *Gulp* leaves no intestinal stone unturned. Roach claims, however, that her intent is not to gross us out, but rather to intrigue us, to make us fascinated with this subject that we spend most of our time trying to avoid.

Remarkably, she succeeds.

Roach envisions the digestive system as the core of our biological mechanism. We evolved, she explains, from a basic digestive machine, eventually growing limbs in order to move that machine around in search of food and then developing a sophisticated nervous system to control the increasingly complicated workings of the whole deal. At the center of everything, though, is a simple tube; food goes in one end, is processed as it moves through and exits the other end once it's been mined of all its available nutrients.

That much is simple, but Roach looks carefully at the intricacies of the process. She starts at the input end, of course – our mouths – and she tells us things we never knew about how we taste and chew and begin the process of digestion. She talks with scientists who are studying things we didn't know needed to be studied – taste, food texture, saliva, etc. – and she follows the same method as she goes in search of the secrets of the rest of the tract.

She also has quite a bit of fun as she unearths the history of digestive science. She tells us about scientists of old who did some shiver-inducing things – like

the guy who made his life's work out of sticking things (including his tongue) into a hole in another man's side to find out exactly how the stomach worked. There's the guy who insisted that we'd be much better off if we spent the better part of our lives chewing our food and the guy who was convinced that the entire large intestine was a foul and unnecessary organ and that we'd all do well to have ours removed. Here, Roach's

goal is clearly, at least in part, to make us giggle and squirm, but there's good information to be found even during these digressions.

In her introduction Roach admits that much of the book is about topics that we'd generally like not to think about, but that's not the point. She doesn't want to make us queasy; she wants to use the little thrill that we get from tip-toeing through the taboo to help us find our way into some truly intriguing territory. She hopes that by the end of the book, we'll think about our own inner (and semi-inner) workings in an entirely different, less squeamish way. As I began the

book, I was skeptical that I'd be able to get past the ick-factor of topics like saliva and flatulence and reach an objective, science-minded point of view about the subjects.

The amazing thing is that it happened within only a few pages. Roach approaches the subject matter in such an engaging manner – factual, yet fully acknowledging the edginess of her subject with humor – that it's easy to get caught up in her enthusiasm and forget that you're supposed to think this stuff is disgusting. By the time, near the end of the book, she writes at length about a researcher whose project is performing fecal transplants, I was entirely on her side. Not only was I able to read it without cringing, I was ready to go out and start campaigning for increased funding for fecal research.

chase to be carried out inside the Arts United Center. Look sharp and you'll find tips of the bowler to several Hitchcock classic films, including Strangers on a Train, Rear Window, Psycho, Vertigo and North by Northwest. Hitch himself even pops up.

The action is not merely the rapid-fire patter of the comedy. It is one surprise after another with very little letup and often in a variety of accents. (Note to sound techs: the accents and action make it hard sometimes to make out what is being said on stage. Could the volume be dialed

Every performance is a nonstop physical workout. No wonder the credits include movement coach Josh Zacher. Robert Shoquist's set design includes a veritable jungle gym of rungs, ramps, swivel set sections and detachable frames. And with some timely assists from the energetic, colorful lighting by Jonathan Maag, moving trains and bridges and bloodhound searches become a bit more plausible. The sound design by Jonathan Hicks is another key part of setting the scenes, particularly during the many chase scenes. The train and plane were impressive.

Ted Rice as Richard Hannay, the formerly bored man suddenly on the lam, is an excellent straight man to the insanity erupting around him. He brings a bit of James Stewart here, some James Bond there, especially with the ladies, several of whom are played with femme fatale wiles by Joyce Lazier Lloyd. She ranges from Madeline Kahn and Dietrich as Annabelle Schmidt to a more Bergmanesque Pamela. Both Ted and Joyce are making their Civic debuts in this show. Cortney White and Kevin Torwelle, Clown No. 1 and 2, respectively, supply about 145 of the 150plus characters, sometimes playing three at once through deft hat changes and voices. Thanks to some creative costumes by Louise Heckaman and crew, Cortney and Kevin are always very funny, whether in drag as a cleaning lady or innkeeper's wife, a ventriloquist's dummy or a floppyeared bloodhound.

With lightning-quick prop changes performed both by the actors and stage manager Nan Durant's team, the story moves along at the cinematic pace. It's the fastest two hours in town!

Jacob Starr and Morgan Spencer are luminous as young lovers Justin and Louise. He is heroic and as dim as Dudley Doright, and she is as perky, energetic and sexy as can be. Morgan can rattle a teacup and wail in despair with the best of farceurs, and Jacob is adorably bright-eyed and innocent – until he goes bonkers.

Todd Frymier, Mr. Bingham, the chief executive of Quail Valley, is the conductor of the madness, fending off his harridan wife while fearing for his prosperity and position. He plays it as part Martin Short, part Peewee Herman, with a lot of Mr. Dithers leading us laughing along. Leslie Beauchamp plays Pamela, the oft-divorced club secretary and verbal sparring partner. She starts out bitter and sweetens steadily as the long day goes along. Jim Matusik plays bad guy Dickie Bell with relish. He scrambles clichés like eggs, bends rules to shorten the odds to his favor and wears golf sweaters that could blind a foursome. Suzan Moriarty rounds out the ensemble with a formidable posture and air of command.

Director Murphy also designed the club cozy and sunny set. Costumes designed by Emily Arnold and managed by Jeanette Walsh are just right. The costumers may merit some bonus points for all the quick changes during the encore. Lighting by Corey Lee and sound design by Frank Sims also merit a nod of approval. The "Public Address system" sound effects are particularly good. Bob Sutton is the technical director and Tom Scribner is stage manager, with assistant stage managers Alexandra Gaff and Brooke O'Mara. The sound board operator is Reid

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
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
