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-----Feature • ZZ Top -------Southern Fried Wonders

Part comedy team, part sideshow, all hard blues-rock, ZZ Top have held a prominent place in the American music scene for the past 43 years. With their signature chestlength beards, their double-take lyrics, their ironic dance moves and their instantly recognizable sound, that Little Ol' Band from Texas is as fun to watch as it is to listen to.

The trend-setting trio brings their show to the Veterans Memorial Civic Center in Lima, Ohio on Friday, October 25 at 8

You'd be hard-pressed to conceive a more unlikely group of musicians to become the silly darlings of the MTV generation in the 1980s and earn praise from such luminaries as Eric Clapton and the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame in the 2000s. Then again, the individuals in ZZ Top - guitarist and vocalist Billy Gibbons, bassist and vocalist Dusty Hill and drummer Frank Beard - are consummate musicians whose bona fides spring from a deep knowledge and love of the blues and the blues legends they worshiped.

With their 15th recording, 2012's La Futura, and a busy tour schedule stretching out before them, ZZ Top have retained their relevance amid the turmoil of the ever-changing music scene. Their headlining appearance at Bonnaroo this year confirmed ZZ Top's status and their refusal to take themselves too se-

riously. Dressed in black, colorfully embroidered suit jackets, matching cowboy hats and cheap sunglasses and playing matching purple guitars, Gibbons and Hill did their Texas-style dance moves and generally had a good time while Beard hovered behind his skull-covered kit with its dual-kick drums and an elongated tom. What more could you ask for?

The current incarnation of ZZ Top formed in late 1969 or early 1970 (depending on what you read) in Houston when Hill and Beard joined Gibbons, who had already been playing under the name with other musicians. Hill and Beard had played in American Blues since 1966 with Hill's brother Rocky, considered by many to be among the top blues guitarist of his generation. Both American Blues and Gibbons's earlier band, Moving Sidewalks, tended to play a more psychedelic style of blues/rock than straight-up blues. But they learned the blues from the best. When he was a teenager, Hill did a stint with the great Freddie King who was a major influence for Gibbons as well. King later became a friend and mentor to ZZ Top and even introduced the band to Muddy Waters, Howlin' Wolf and Jimmy Reed dur-

ing a poker game at a blues festival.

In 1971 ZZ Top released their first album, called ZZ Top's First Album, giving a hint of the band's ever-present humor. A second record, Rio Grande Mud, came out a year later and was greeted with deafening silence.

But the silence disappeared with their next record. It was replaced by grunts and howls of adulation that have continued unhave fun. With a new label behind them they topped off the 1970s with Degüello, a record that found them sticking to their sound but giving it smoother, if harder, edges. Degüello went Platinum on the strength of the singles 'I Thank You," a Sam & Dave cover, and "Cheap Sunglasses" which single-handedly turned dime-store eyewear into a fad with

Speaking of legs, the video for the single



abated ever since. Tres Hombres hit the shelves in 1973, and the single "La Grange" raced up the charts and remains a classic rock staple. Based on a John Lee Hooker riff, "La Grange" features Gibbon's low-register vocals and his high-energy guitar solos, along with the driving, solid rhythm that Beard and Hill perfected. Instead of playing to empty theaters, as they did during the tour supporting Rio Grande Mud, the boys found themselves headlining sold-out arenas.

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In 1975 they released Fandango, a halflive, half-studio record that included the hit "Tush." Another sold-out tour followed, as did another record in 1976, Tejas, and a tour to support that record. But after seven years on the road, ZZ Top decided to take a threemonth break. Three months turned into 24 months, with the trio going their separate ways. Beard headed for Jamaica, Hill dipped into Mexico and Gibbons took off for Europe. When they reconnected, both Gibbons and Hill had grown their beards out and the band seemed to have found a new way to nator found the beards playing white furcovered guitars that spun like windmills and offering up keys to Gibbons's 1933 chopped Ford Coupe to a besieged, mousy woman as a form of salvation mixed with revenge. That video and the two others that came out of Eliminator ("Sharp Dressed Man" and "Gimme All Your Lovin") vaulted ZZ Top to the top of whatever gauge you could find. The MTV audience loved them. So did radio

While ZZ Top retained their blues/rock edge, they nodded toward a more pop sound with the addition in the 80s of synthesizers which, as you could expect, fomented ire among some fans and delight among others. The band just played on, but by the early 90s they dropped the synthesizers and returned to their proven formula.

ZZ Top had a good year in 2004; they were inducted into the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame and got to close-out the inaugural Crossroads Guitar Festival in Dallas. Clapton said the choice of ZZ Top to wrap up the two-day axe fest was a no-brainer. They may do funny things, Clapton said, but they're great musicians.

The Love Ain't Left Yet

Formed in Chicago in 1969 by brothers Maurice and Verdine White, Earth, Wind & Fire were quickly destined to rule the radio airwaves within a few short years. With the early additions of fellow founding members Philip Bailey Jr. and Ralph Johnson, the quartet was the early building block of a band which would include horns, percussion and vocals, making them one of the most spectacular live shows of the era. Their rich R&B sound infused funk and jazz to create

a distinctive niche in popular music through the 70s and 80s. Their classic hits – "After the Love Is Gone," "Shining Star," "That's the Way of the World" and many others – are still heard often, and the sound they perfected can be found in many of the R&B acts which have followed on their heels.

While the backing players have changed over the years, the key members of Earth, Wind & Fire remain, minus the touring presence of Maurice White whose Parkinson's diagnosis led to his retirement from touring in 1994. But when Earth, Wind

& Fire take the stage in South Bend on November 2, Verdine White, Bailey and Johnson will be there, not only playing the well known hits which span four decades, but also performing songs from their latest release, Now, Then & Forever, their first new

album since their Grammy-nominated Illuminations in 2005. Some bands are content to ride on the coattails of their former glory, but Earth, Wind & Fire like to keep generating new music as often as possible.

"We're in the enviable position of not having to do new music at all," says Johnson, percussionist and vocalist for the group. "People come to our shows wanting to hear our old hits and not necessarily any new music. But we're creative people, and it had been eight years since our last album, so we were anxious to jump in and do something new."

Although audiences can be somewhat restless when artists are performing newer, less familiar songs, Johnson says their fans have embraced the new material on this year's tour.

"They love the new tunes. Part of it is where we have the new tunes. Placement is important because you don't want to break the flow of what you're doing. So we have a new song early in the show and another near the close and a couple of others in there too. But people are definitely into our live shows and their favorite songs are their favorite songs, and they want to

Maurice White is no longer active with their recordings either, with Bailey taking the helm on pro-

duction duties now. Johnson says the elder White is "watching us do what we're doing. He's doing just great. Parkinson's is a progressive disease so he's slowed down a bit, but he's doing fine.'

Even as the band is moving forward with new music, the 21st century saw their first three decades rewarded with numerous honors and accolades. In 2000 the group was inducted into the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame, and since then several other artists like Prince and Alicia Keys have credited them with influencing

how the stuff that you've done has influenced them."

Their influence has also been felt among heads of state. Earth, Wind & Fire have played the White House twice in the last several years, their first visit coming in early 2000 when President Bill Clinton asked them to come to perform at a state dinner. More recently, President Obama invited them early in his first term and took some time to talk to them before they performed.

"He came in to see us while we were setting up and doing our sound check, and he was very down to earth, wearing khakis and a cardigan sweater, and we thanked him for having us. It was the first social event of his administration, and he was a very warm gentleman."

Rubbing elbows with musical and political icons aside, Earth, Wind & Fire continue to tour the world with a large entourage, one Johnson says stems from the era when the band was born, when that big sound (complete with horn section) was all the rage.

"It was just part of that time. It was us and Chicago, and before that there was Blood, Sweat & Tears. Tower of Power [were] also around then. It was just



What do zombies, classical music and Metallica have in common? That's the question String Shift's *Symphony in Z* performance on Friday, October 25 will answer with a dynamic audio/visual experience. These nine mega-talented string players (group cofounder Ed Stevens on lead cello; Yana Bourkova-Morunov, Colleen Tan, Tim Tan and Caleb Mossburg on violin; Lori Morgan on cello; Derek Reeves playing lead viola; Rachel Mossburg on viola; and Kevin

Piekarski supplying lead bass) are introducing themselves to northeast Indiana in a zombie-themed performance sure to send chills down your spine.

String Shift started out as an idea kicked around between two old friends earlier this year. Stevens says the idea had been percolating in his brain for

a while, but his pal Charlie Witkowski provided the encouragement and momentum to really get things started. The two formed a partnership from this idea of a fresh take on the classical concert experience.

"The idea is really anything-goes-style concerts that draw in a variety of audiences," described Stevens. "Everyone loves great music, but not everyone is necessarily comfortable with going to see great music in a big, fancy concert hall or something similar. It's about opening up those doors to bring in more people by not only playing some great classical stuff that is very accessible, but also incorporating some pop culture elements in there."

At the heart of it all, Stevens and wife Lori Morgan say the shows are simply about good music that blur the lines between genres. Some shows may have themes (like *Symphony in Z*); others may focus more on the art of collaborating with local bands in interesting, modern ways. String Shift is fortunate to have several members who are well connected to the northeast Indiana music community. They've already begun talks regarding collaborations and mash-up shows.

"We have a lot of eclectic personalities in the group. Beyond being talented musicians who are

open-minded, the similarities go out the window," Stevens laughed. "That's one of the things that excites me most about this project: when you get a bunch of minds like this together, what other kinds of things can we come up with? While I love classical music, I also enjoy so many other styles. I'm excited to tackle those with String Shift."

"When you're part of a large orchestra, you lose your individuality a bit. This allows us to have a real say in things – that's one of the most exciting things about this group," Morgan chimed in. "We're all from

orchestral backgrounds where we're used to being one of many, and so to now become one of few and to have creative control and input into programming, presentation and marketing, it's given us a real sense of ownership that I'm not sure any of us has really experienced before."

She confessed that String Shift's approach to programming blurs the lines between genres in ways she's not sure many other groups do. Rather than presenting music as simply popular, classical or any other label, they focus only on presenting great music. And great music defies genre-typing.

"There are plenty of groups that combine styles, but I think String Shift [present] a fresh concept in terms of taking classical music and sort of shoving it together with something different," added Stevens. "There's such intensity that string instruments can achieve."

"That's the thing about a lot of metal or classical—it's full of that drive and intensity that's not individual to those genres," Morgan continued, as Stevens nod-ded in agreement. "There are many parallels between pieces of music that have been written hundreds of years apart. It's been really fun for us to discover these things and figure out interesting ways to put them together."

While the members of the ensemble have been playing together in various forms over the years, *Sym*-

Honoring the Greats

You've probably heard the old saying "You are the company you keep."

In that case, Rhode Island native turned world-touring crooner John Pagano is a pretty amazing guy. Not only has he sung at Burt Bacharach's side for

the last 15 years, sharing both the studio and stage with the legendary man behind such hits as "Rain Drops Keep Fallin' on My Head" and "What the World Needs Now is Love," but he's also worked closely with Whitney Houston, Elvis Costello, Garth Brooks, Wynonna Judd, Faith Hill and Jerry Seinfeld.

His newest musical collaborator? The Fort Wayne Philharmonic. On Saturday, October 26 at 8 p.m. at the Embassy Theatre, Pagano and his band will join the Phil in presenting the world premier of A Soulful Musical Journey: Songs of Love and Inspiration.

Speaking of inspiration, Pagano credits his family with inspiring him to pursue music at a young age. His father used to wake him up for school with Sinatra tunes, and his older siblings fed him a steady diet of Marvin Gaye, Stevie Won-

der and Chet Baker.

"I grew up listening to jazz and R&B and Motown,' Pagano told me in a recent phone interview. "There

was always music playing in my house, and it was good music, quality artists. That really helped shape me as a musi-


Pagano took up the guitar and began playing in clubs around his hometown of Providence. Eventually his hard work paid off, and he was signed to Capitol Records. Under that label he put out his debut, Let's Get to It, as well as A Brand New Christmas and his latest effort, Pure Imagination, an album of Sinatra covers. One of the most gratifying aspects of the Pure Imagination recording experience was, believe it or not, getting feedback from close friends of Frank.

"When I cover an artist, I don't try to sound just like him," Pagano said. "I don't try to sound just like Frank Sinatra or Stevie Wonder. Instead, I try to pay homage to what that artist did to give people that special feeling when they hear a certain song. When I did the Sinatra album a lot of the musicians I worked with had also worked with Frank, and they told me they were happy I wasn't trying to be him. 'We

already have a Frank,' they said."

And now we have a John who takes his own approach to hits from the Great American Songbook and the golden years of Motown and R&B and gives fans a chance to relive the joy they felt when they heard such songs for the first time.

CAGE THE ELEPHANT Melophobia

The latest album by Cage the Elephant, *Melophobia*, breaks away from the band's traditional style. Worrying less about being likable and popular, the songwriting and style of this album reveal the true reflective, thought-provoking ideas of the writers with naked honesty. 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Elements of Cosmos 2013

There's a lot to digest when listening to the seven songs on Elements of Cosmos' eponymous EP. Recorded at Ball State University in 2012 and released earlier this year, the EP covers a breadth of stylistic ground revealing an eclectic variety of influences.



The album kicks off with the rootsy rock "Welcome Home," a twisted mix of Hootie & the Blowfish-meet-Red Hot Chili Peppers or, better yet, a Rusted Root for the new generation. The guitar playing of Adam Lentine and Mike Needler brings to mind the playing of John Frusciante, not just on this song but throughout the disc, adding a bit of funk/rock to James Valdez's very Darius Rucker-sounding vocals.

"I Swear" turns up the amps for a good old, straightforward rock song. This is one of the better tracks on the EP, with guitar soloing adding to the mix of this Sister Hazel-type jam.

The reggae-ish "Who Are You Trying To Be" and the introspective "Give Me More" occupy the middle of the disc and happen to be the standout tracks as well. Great songwriting is the key to these two songs, and they'll stick in your head for days. Rounding out the disc are the darker "End of Me," the stripped down sound of "Lady Comet" and the breezy "Down by the Riverside."

Though a variety of musical styles can sometimes turn a listener off, the range of offerings on this album allow the songs to sound fresh even after repeated listens. The band doesn't appear to be necessarily aware of that sense of musical variety because, no matter what style the songs may lean toward, they still sound like they came from the same band.

Highly consumable and ready for the radio, this is an EP that should appeal to just about anyone who gives it a listen. (*Chris Hupe*)

The Dodos

Carrier

I've loved The Dodos ever since I first heard their second album, *Visitor*, back in 2008. What I heard in their brand of jumpy, manic, acoustic pop made me think of watching a little kid with boundless energy and conviction to the task at hand use his imagination to entertain himself.



That task? Well, for that little kid it might be making the Hulk defeat Abomination, or Optimus Prime taking Megatron out in a desert battle in the middle of my living room.

In the case of Meric Long and Logan Kroeber – aka The Dodos – that task was to beat an acoustic guitar and some toms and a kick drum into submission. They made music that had endless energy and bounce, yet underneath that sugar-high exterior there was this underlying melancholy in Long's vocals and the melodies he weaved out of his much-abused acoustic guitar. *Time To Die* (2009) and *No Color* (2011) continued their progression, finding the two Californians honing their sound to a precise point, never truly leaving behind that manic propulsion they began with, but integrating more instrumentation (vibes, electric guitar) and guest musicians (Neko Case and the Magik*Magik Orchestra on *No Color*) and turning up the pop aspect of their songwriting.

Now, with 2013 well into fall and that little kid donning a Hulk costume for trick-and/or-treating, The Dodos give us *Carrier*, one of this year's finest records. *Carrier* hasn't lost all the manic energy of its predecessors, but this is more of an introspective record – more introspective and heartfelt than anything Long and Kroeber have done before. The theme of change, transformation and loss weigh heavy on songs like "Transformer," "Substance" and "Confidence." The death of their close friend and touring band member Christopher Reimer directed where these songs would lead.

A word that best describes this album is contemplative. Contemplation of the big picture. Why things happen the way they do. There isn't anger in these questions. Songs like "Relief" and "Holiday" aren't mournful or dire. They still hold that childlike wonder that The Dodos always bring to the proceedings. It's just wonderment from a child who's lived a life beyond his years.

BACKTRACKS

Eagles

One of These Nights (1975)

My wife hates the Eagles. Most of my friends do too. It's hard to write a review knowing that the people who love you won't even read it. But I do like some of the early alt-country-rock that the Eagles produced in the mid 70s, and I'm not ashamed to share my opinions.



This was the fifth record from the Eagles and featured three Top 5 hits, including the opener, "One of These Nights." With Don Henley on the vocals and the distinct guitars of Don Felder, it was one of the harder tracks on the release. "Too Many Hands" follows and comes at you with Randy Meisner on the vocals. Its Southern vibe reminds me of Gram Parsons and is one of the few Eagles songs that probably would have charted higher had it been released as a single.

Side two opens with the venerable "Lyin' Eyes," a song that enabled the band to cross over into the rock mainstream yet cling to their Southern California roots of soft, harmonious, progressive country. "Take It to the Limit" is next and aside from "Hotel California" may be one of their most well-known songs. "After the Thrill Is Gone" is the lone track on this release on which Glenn Frey steps up to the mic. It's another one of those Eagles songs that has some really decent guitars buried behind the vocals. Obviously the band was trying to reach the lyricist crowd, but these were actually some extremely talented musicians at the time.

This was the album that preceded *Hotel California* and was unfortunately the last with Bernie Leadon, one of the founders (and formerly of the Flying Burrito Brothers).

Fun Fact: The Eagles have sold more than 125 million records since 1972. (*Dennis Donahue*)

"Destroyer" abuses the toms nicely with Long's new love of the electric guitar giving the song a jangly perfection. "Death" is a mournful and quiet meditation on loss. "The Ocean" ends this chapter, expansive and awe-inspiring like its namesake.

The Dodos made a record about loss. They did it with grace and love. They dedicate it to you. And that little kid in my living room. (*John Hubner*)

Perpetual Surrender

Diana are a Canadian synth pop band comprised of members of other Canadian bands, not all of them synth pop. That is inconsequential for you to truly enjoy their debut, *Perpetual Surrender*. What is consequential is that you love synth pop, or at the very least occasionally get the itch to listen



to Thompson Twins, Missing Persons, Cocteau Twins or This Mortal Coil. If you grumbled reading any of those band names, you may want to just keep moving along. The rest of us are in for a real treat.

It starts out simply enough – *Perpetual Surrender*, that is. "Foreign Installation" opens with icy synths coming over the horizon before they disappear with the push of an electronic kick drum, and Carmen Elle's calming voice croons into your ear before the chorus comes in big and strong like a wave of angst and emotion. This track oozes 80s, complete with some great guitar wankery in the mid section that you'd swear was played on a white Steinberger electric guitar.

Here's the thing: like Bear In Heaven (another wonderful band that dabbles in 80s synth fun, albeit in darker corners), Diana make these songs something unique. They don't just put on the eyeliner and vinyl pants and rock their DX-7s. No, they create something that sounds vintage, but vital at the same time.

"That Feeling" has a dance floor groove to it, but the track has enough going on in the background that it keeps your ears and legs busy. Title track sounds like Sade getting it on with Oingo Boingo.

Or Was (Not Was). Elle also brings Annie Clark (aka St. Vincent) to mind with her voice, giving the illusion you're hearing a St. Vincent/Animotion mash up at times. "Strange Attraction" should be playing on radios everywhere, instead of Drake or whatever the kids listen to these days.


Like I said before, Diana are no stranger to the Synsonics drum sound and icy synths. But unlike how a lot of purveyors of the 80s synth pop sound these days, Diana are giving us really good songs to enjoy with our morning DX-7 fix. No other song on this excellent debut proves this more than the stunning "New House." It delves deeper into less bouncy territory and into more of a melancholy direction with sparse electronic percussion, faint synth waves and Elle's voice singing as if pleading for a lover to stay - "What do I gotta say to make you wanna stick around?" You know, the good stuff. It's a hazy, quiet, emotive track that could hint at what direction their next album could go in.

There isn't a spot on this album I would change. No note I'd move. No mood I'd lighten or darken. Perpetual Surrender is an album for soundtrack-summer fun, fall walks and winter doldrums. Maybe spring cleaning too. (John Hubner)

Bill Callahan

Dream River

Bill "Smog" Callahan has done a lot of things right over the years. Beginning as a DIY artist whose talents initially felt like those of an artsy dilettante, Callahan's records have sounded increasingly better as the years have worn on, hitting a peak



with 1999's Knock Knock, a singer/songwriter record I'd put up against almost any from the last 20 years. Callahan's next major work came in 2007 with the release of Woke on a Whaleheart, the first collection of music he released under his birth name. The man who was Smog has been on a role ever since, now releasing his fourth "solo" record, the justreleased Dream River, his most musically complex, ambitious and varied work to date.

Forty minutes spread over an eight-song playlist is what we get this time around – Callahan mixing elements of jazz, bluegrass, folk, funk, Americana and pop into his singersongwriter backbone. Where his last record, 2011's Apoca*lypse*, stuck mostly to slow-burning Americana compositions, River takes countless left-hand turns, going to places that at first feel a little off, a little odd. What holds the slight genre fusion experiments together are Callahan's strong and steady vocals and always great lyricism. In fact, *Dream* represents perhaps the strongest set of Callahan lyrics in many years, maybe even since Whaleheart.

All that good stuff said, the biggest downfall of the record is the diversity itself, Dream lacking anything resembling an immediate coherence. The gut of the record's sound works well enough as a single piece, but each song has its own strong identity which makes full-record spins feel a bit disjointed, especially when compared to Callahan's other three solo records, all of which very much focused on cohe-

siveness and playability.

The most challenging thing to do in the case of Callahan's less straightforward records (i.e. Rain on Lens, Julius Caesar, The Doctor Came at Dawn and now River) is to find other artists and albums to reference; such is the case more than ever with this surprisingly unique record. I suppose I'd start by mentioning mid-era Leonard Cohen, after his voice started to sound like dirt and while he was in his most experimental studio mode. Next I'd maybe mention Fairport Convention and David Berman. Or maybe Michael Hurley. Callahan's writing is more classical than Berman's, yet not nearly as perfect as Cohen's; it's more exciting than Richard Thompson's and more effective than Hurley's. It's weird, folksy stuff that often featured very detailed, fragile compositions. In Callahan's case we hear flutes, strings, lap steel and peddle effects all somehow melting into country song structures.

Mostly, what I learn every time I sit down to review a


Callahan record is that the guy and his music are unusually difficult to describe. Like Will Oldham, Callahan embraces a variety of sounds and keeps the personal details of his life mostly out of his music and interviews. He has a deep, gruff voice and writes always poetic, visual lyrics that never feel pretentious. His compositions are loose but complex, with an overall rustic tone that at times feel sprawling and even cinematic. All these things remain true on *Dream River*, but this time around Callahan is going on little folksy studio adventures. While I certainly enjoy each track as a standalone trip throughout the brushy, confusing mind of a true artist, I find the record as a whole a lot to digest. (Greg W. Locke)

Guided by Voices

English Little League

Here we are, all of the sudden, four albums into the reunited, reinvigorated "classic" Guided By Voices lineup from the mid 90s. What the heck?

Think about it: this matches the 1993-'96 crew's total output (of albums, anyway). Call me a cynic, but I initially re-



Compared to the combo's initial post-reboot, Let's Go Eat the Factory, English Little League is cleaner, more coherent, less willfully obstinate and just plain more enjoyable as an album of songs. Anyone who's even passingly familiar with GBV knows that this band is still Pollard's ship to pilot (with yeoman's service from the always-dependable Sprout), so it's no shock to hear his pop/prog/psych touchstones appear throughout the album.

What is mildly surprising, arguably, is how much some of these songs and their production might remind you more of an early Pollard solo album (think Not in My Airforce or Waved Out) than any of those Big Four albums released by the GBV lineup. "Know Me as Heavy," for example, has those Who guitars and a a slow-burn start that would sit comfortably on one of Pollard's early solo platters. The galloping "Crybaby 4-Star Hotel" recalls a GBV era that predated even the "classic lineup," calling to mind Self-Inflicted Aerial Nostalgia's "Navigating Flood Regions." English Little League even serves up some lo-fi comfort food for GBV diehards; "Sir Garlic Breath" (keep those titles coming, Bob, even if you quit making albums) could easily be mistaken for a Bee

Nostalgia-triggering detours aside, this album is loaded with standalone pop gems. Sprout offers two in particular: the chiming, Byrds-meets-Big Star "She Talks in Rainbows" and the more solemn, piano-driven "The Sudden Death of Einstein's Ways." Aside from a couple of what fans - and Pollard himself – are fond of referring to as "brown nuggets" ("A Burning Glass," we're looking at you), this disc is remarkably filler free. Now, considering that Pollard probably recorded two solo albums and another GBV release in the time it's taken me to write this review, that's saying something. The exuberant "Flunky Minnows" reaffirms Pollard's pop chops, as does the cheeky "Xeno Pariah." And chunky rockers like "Taciturn Caves" and the closing "With Glass in Foot" remind us, if we needed reminding, that the past and future iteration of GBV still has plenty of life in it yet. (D.M.

phony in Z is String Shift's first organized performance. It was a happy coincidence that the show ended up so close to Halloween. They had this idea for a zombie-inspired program up their sleeves, and it was the first date that worked with everyone's schedule.

Stevens says Symphony in Z will be a great introduction to the kind of eclectic artistry String Shift create. Listen to nearly any horror movie and you'll hear a variety of string effects coaxing the mood in the background. Symphony in Z employs those same kinds of effects.

"If you watch a show like The Walking Dead or a movie with a modern score like 28 Days Later, there's a certain eerie beauty there," said Stevens. "I always think of strings as incredibly vocal instruments, except you don't have the limit of breathing. You can sustain these notes and bring out these harmonies that otherwise might be limited. With that element involved, there's this other side of it – it's beyond the scary. intense stuff to bring out the somber, moving side of these

To program Symphony in Z, Stevens contemplated what makes the zombie genre so popular in today's culture. He dissected "awesome moments in zombie culture" to create a library of study and inspiration. Ultimately, he says, it all came down to this varied scope of emotions that often contradict one another. In one moment, a scene from a zombie flick could be bleak and hopeless; in the next, it might offer

"The music that accompanies those movies builds that atmosphere, and that's what we're trying to do with Symphony in Z. We're enabling people to enjoy the zombie medium in a concert format," Stevens said. "C2G is really wellequipped to do some dramatic lighting and video images. We've worked out a lot of those elements to recreate what's become so popular about the zombie genre while allowing people to be immersed in a new experience."

Programming the show has also helped the members of String Shift get out of their own comfort zones a bit. Morgan admitted that not all of the members are as into zombie culture quite the way Stevens is, but they've all taken on the challenge with excitement and fervor. She added that the interesting mix in personalities will make for equally interesting shows in the future.

"Everyone's got their own thing that they are into, and one of the really great things about String Shift is that we're all very embracing of each other's ideas. Our group has become a bit of an idea incubator," she said.

Stevens nodded, adding that Fort Wayne itself is also a great place to try out ideas.

"There's a lot of great music happening in Fort Wayne but I think there's also a thirst for something a little bit different – a little bit out there. When those things come along they seem to be supported pretty well by the community String Shift [are] a bit of a curiosity, so hopefully people will embrace the concept."





The Misfits were formed in the late 70s by singer and songwriter Glenn Danzig, but the group has seen a fluctuating lineup over the years, especially early on. The group split in 1983 and, after legal battles and other ruckus, reformed with the original bassist, Jerry Only. Today's lineup is fronted by Only (bass/ vocals), Dez Cadena (guitar) and Eric "Chupacabra" Arce (drums).

The Misfits remain iconic figures in the history and progression of the hardcore punk movement of the early 80s, though today they're more aggressive, topical and sought-after than ever before. This show is going to fill up fast, so show up early. Openers include The Attack, Atom Age Vampire and Grave Robber, just in case you needed another reason to be prompt that evening.

Those unfamiliar with Taproot's music may be wondering when we're going to get to that part. Well. they've got hard rock roots and have been classified as nu-metal, alternative rock, and hard rock. The group's unique for its aggressive rap-to-screaming combination, groovy basslines, varying tempo and time signatures and the primal, aggressive, emotional tone in their music.

They have a unique blend of influences, and their sound is like Alice in Chains one moment, Korn the next. If you like groups like Breaking Benjamin, Crossfade, 10 Years, A Perfect Circle or Thousand Foot Crutch, this is a show for you.

The Pixies have been making music off and on for over 25 years and just released a new EP, cleverly titled *EP-1*. Founding member and bassist **Kim Deal** left the band earlier this year, but that hasn't stopped the band from forging on. Now we get news that **Nirvana**'s **Kurt Cobain** was often cited as a



heavy influence, and they'll tour in 2014 to introduce themselves to a new generation. The tour begins in mid-January in Toronto and makes its way to Columbus, Ohio February 7, Detroit February 8 and Chicago February 9. **Cults** will open the shows.

I know this will crush many of you, but **The Jonas Brothers** have cancelled their upcoming tour due to "creative differences." That's right; the one-time biggest pop band in the world now can't get along. Apparently an argument took place recently where **Nick and Joe Jonas** called his brother **Kevin**'s reality show "lame" and said they didn't think his wife Danielle could cook a proper Thanksgiving dinner even if she hired Gordon Ramsey. To explain, Carlos was put on temporary hiatus from the band in 2010, but is still considered a member of the band and still gets paid. The band just doesn't like him, I guess, as he has never been asked to return from that hiatus. Now, Nielsen, Zander and Peterson have countersued Carlos asking for his removal from the board of Cheap Trick Unlimited. Wait, Cheap Trick has a "board?" That's so not rock n' roll.



sci-fi film Gravity once again took the No. 1 spot at the box office. Can we call this the Bullock Effect? Maybe. Either way, I'm shocked. Gravity sold another \$44 million in the U.S. last weekend, bringing the movie's 10-day total to \$123 million in the U.S. and \$191 million worldwide. Gandolfini's Last Role Is Something of a Letdown Buying a ticket for Enough Said is a

lousy experience. You know you are paying to see a great actor, James Gandolfini, in his last performance. Before playing you-knowwho in a very big role on the small screen, Gandolfini made memorable impressions in small roles on the big screen. In Enough Said Gandolfini takes up where he left off in film. But now, that modest size doesn't fit. And Enough Said is far from a fitting send-off for The major acting feat for Gandolfini in

Enough Said is trimming his talent for the role. He's great, as good as anyone could be, but that just makes you scream for what could have been and never will be. And Enough Said has problems beyond the fact that this is a last glimpse of a great actor playing a nice guy in the tepid world of contemporary southern California.

Gandolfini isn't the only actor playing down to suit the role. Julia Louis-Dreyfus is also playing the part of someone much less interesting than we're used to seeing her play on the small screen. The characters they play, Albert and Eva, are pleasantly average folks, one much more appealing than the other. But throughout the film, because the two main characters are played by above average talent, I kept waiting for the film to bust out. It never does.

Dreyfus plays Eva, an average lady, the divorced mother of a daughter about to go off to college. She works as a masseuse, and while she would like to be romantically involved, the pickings are slim. Is she funny or just cynical and lacking the usual filters?

One night, at the urging of her friend Sarah (the talented and regularly undervalued Toni Collette), Eva attends a party. She goes in the hope of meeting an interesting and available single man and soon concludes there are none worthy of her attention. She says as much in the presence of Albert who agrees that he has seen no women of interest

This is the anti-"meet cute." Albert and Eva aren't attracted to each other, so they end up dating. I would like to be all warm and fuzzy about two 50-somethings getting all romantic with each other, except that Eva is such a superficial, spineless wimp that it is hard to imagine she will ever have the chops to think about anyone other than herself.

And that is pretty much how it works out. Albert is also divorced and has a daughter the same age as Eva's kid. They bond over that. But Albert is fat and sloppy and has little desire to change. Maybe we are supposed to see a woman's obsession with someone else's weight as an interesting twist? I just found it depressing.

Albert may be a big, fat slob, but he's also kind and smart. He works as an archivist and curator at a museum for television, an interesting job, not the couch potato bore fest Eva assumes it is. He enjoys his work. She mostly dislikes her work, which is filled with clients who are smelly, lazy or endless-

Eva has one new client that she admires. Marianne (played by Catherine Keener who should stop somnambulating through this kind of dippy role) is a lovely woman with impeccable taste in decorating and all things lifestyle. She is friends with Joni Mitchell (an insult to Mitchell, by the by).

In one silly example, Marianne has a



surfeit of chervil and offers some to Eva who later confesses she has no idea what chervil is. As if any half-alive masseuse in Southern California doesn't know what chervil is!

Without mentioning names, Eva sounds Marianne out about her doubts about Albert. Marianne commiserates. She was married to a loser just like him. Then Eva figures out that Albert is Marianne's ex. And Eva is so short on figuring things out on her own that she sort of just adopts some of Marianne's attitudes toward Albert.

Writer and director Nicole Holofcener has made a career out of nitpicking her way through the tiny distinctions of life among the wealthy and not so wealthy in Southern California and Manhattan in her films. I've enjoyed her movies, and despite my complaining, Enough Said is entertaining. It just isn't entertaining enough to pay full ticket

Holofcener has directed episodes of Sex and the City and other good television shows. Maybe it has influenced her work. Whatever. Television keeps getting better, and some indie flicks just can't keep up. Small screen beats big screen, as long as the writing is strong.

I couldn't help thinking (and later hoping and then silently begging) that Albert, a la Tony Soprano, would grab some of the saps he is surrounded by in the dull domesticity of SoCal stupidity and punch some reality into their very small, very self-absorbed

Gandolfini blew up the small screen up in The Sopranos. Nearly any episode of The Sopranos fitted for the big screen would kick this flick thoroughly. In a couple of minutes of many episodes of The Sopranos, Tony would take a minute or two to eat ice cream. and watch a movie or the History channel, demonstrating the regular guy likability of a character like Albert.

Tony would do this in between spasms of murder, extortion and debauchery of all flavors. Occasionally, for better and worse, Tony also put in time, convincingly, as a husband and father. Gandolfini could switch gears as quickly as the writers of The Sopranos demanded.

In Enough Said, Gandolfini just ambles through the landscape like a big bear (but not a bear as nuanced as Bear, Gandolfini in Get Shorty.). Since The Sopranos, Gandolfini spent much of his time helping veterans of the Iraq war. He made several documentaries to bring attention to the trauma, physical and mental, soldiers returning home suffer. This is by far the most important role he played post-Tony. Gandolfini, by his own admission, suffered his own mild actor version of PTSD after playing such a brute for so long.

I'll take the abrupt but appropriate ending of The Sopranos over Enough Said as an exit any day. Enough Said is a tad disappointing. As Tony would say, it is a shame to see a guy go out this way.

Then he would shrug and say, "'Nuf

"I know I'm biased," she says, "but I love working with Thom as a director because he makes good actors better and coaches inexperienced actors from zero to 60 in six weeks or less."

She also respects his knowledge. "He is a walking encyclopedia of the theater," she says. "He sees the big picture as well as the minutiae and really knows how to analyze a script and help actors understand structure, pace, action, context and whatever else we need to know to serve the play. I trust him completely. So I keep coming back to First Pres."

Working with a spouse has other advantages, she says: "It's nice to see him in the evenings," she says.

Their latest collaboration at First Presbyterian Theater is the Emily Mann drama *Mrs. Packard*, the true story of a 19th century woman who is put into a mental asylum by her husband for disagreeing with his religious beliefs. The shocking part of the story is that this wasn't unheard of in the late 1800s. In certain states, including Illinois and Massachusetts, a man could legally incarcerate his wife in a mental asylum and have her declared legally insane, without benefit of a trial, for absolutely any reason.

Mrs. Packard fought for her freedom and wrote a tell-all account of her experiences in the asylum and the inhumane treatment of the inmates (including waterboarding). As a result, legislation was passed giving women the right to a trial before being declared insane.

Kartholl was attracted to the script, she says, because she was "simultaneously appalled and fascinated by Mrs. Packard's story. We 21st century American women owe her a debt of gratitude for her sacrifice and perseverance, for her role in the arc of our journey.

"But aside from that," she adds, "it's just a compelling and eye-opening story from beginning to end."

Kartholl says the story is "important, well-written and thoroughly engaging," and the subject matter has created what she says is the biggest challenge she has ever faced as an actor.

"I am really having trouble putting blinders on my 21st century eyes and viewing the action and dialogue in the play from the perspective of a 19th century woman," she says. "My natural instincts in developing this character are generally not the right ones. Usually my instincts for character development are pretty good, so re-thinking my choices is difficult for me.

"But it's good for me to stretch."





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

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Dash into a Fort Favorite

There are some places that seem just too obvious to write about, local haunts that I feel certain everyone has been to a billion times. Then I'll casually set a meeting with someone and say, "How about Dash?" and they say, "Where?" After I fall over and pick myself up, I realize some people don't even know it exists.

So, the Dash-In.

I've been going to the Dash on and off for over a decade, probably closer to two. In its most recent incarnation 23 taps of craft beer have been added, and my proclivity to stop in after 5 p.m. has gone up a few notches.

So what is Dash doing right? Variety!

You have 23 taps to chose from, so if one or two are blown and they haven't received their new shipment yet, there are plenty more from which to choose. Keep in mind that a lot of micro producers are distributing in five-gallon kegs, so you might see your absolute favorite craft beer come on tap somewhere one week and be off

the next. This happened to me this week when I stopped in to try the New Belgium Coconut Curry Hefeweizen. This is one of the special selections off the Lips of Faith series, which I adore. A lot of bars are turning taps frequently because the stuff is popular, so I can't fault the Dash one bit for being out of a good beer. In addition to the taps,

they also keep a stocked fridge full of special beers, so don't hesitate to go take a look at what is new.

I really love that they will freely give you a small sample if you don't want to commit to a whole beer. For the purpose of this article, I was ordering multiple beers, possibly over my lunch hour, so I wanted half glasses. I offered to pay full price, but they charged me half price. To me this is just excellent customer service. As far as they knew, I was just another lunch customer who prefers beer to water.

So on to the beers. When I couldn't get my Curry Coconut Hefeweizen, I decided to try the Hinterland Luna Nitro Stout, a beer from Green Bay, Wisconsin. I found this Stout to be a little on the watery side for my taste. I like really dense Stouts, and this just left me wanting something with some heft. It poured a very pretty, deep dark brown with just a small beige head on top. But sip after sip I was just left with, well, not much of anything.

My next beer was the Founders Rubeaus. I'm not a huge fan of fruit beers, but Founders is one of the most consistent brewers we get in this area and I'm

never disappointed in their offerings. The Rubeaus was no exception. It pours a beautiful ruby red and smells exactly like what it's made of: fresh raspberries. My biggest pet peeve with fruit beers is when the brewer doesn't use fresh fruit. You can tell the difference. If sweet, smooth raspberry is your thing, this

beer is superbly done.

Since they were out of a few key beers I wanted to try and they were slated for beer delivery the next day, I decided to be a good girl, go back to my job and try again the next day.

Day two: New beers on tap . Yes!

I was really excited to see a new beer from New Belgium. Seriously, put down your Fat Tire and pick up anything from the Lips of Faith series. It's like the Epicurean delight of beers.

They had the Yuzu, something I had never had before. Listed as a Berliner Weiss, a style I wasn't familiar with, I wasn't sure what to expect. My companion's initial response was that it was similar to a white wine. I could see his point – a little dry, a little sour and a little fruity. Overall, I really liked it and I think it would be a good "gateway" beer (for those still transitioning from macros to micros or craft). A Berliner Weiss is a sour wheat beer, but balanced with the Yuzu fruit and the magic stylings of the yeasts the brewers use, it comes out crisp. I loved it.

Next up was the Tyranena Painted Ladies, a pumpkin spice ale from Lake Mills, Wisconsin. Again, not a huge fan of fruit beers (but 'tis the season) and I've had enough already this year to feel like I had some to compare it to. What I liked best about this beer was that it wasn't overdone. Some of the brewers throw in so many different spices it gets cloying. This is the one beer style where I feel like less is more. This beer carries a hint of pumpkin and a hint of spice but is in general a smooth, well-balanced and palatable ale. I really don't want any more than that from this style.

Overall, there are many reasons to recommend Dash-In. There are issues regarding service that I've witnessed and experienced, primarily in the evenings that bother me. If they approached service with the same enthusiasm as they do their menu and their beer selection, I'd never hesitate to recommend them to anyone. Regardless, their variety, pricing and willingness to accommodate my decision-making is what stands out to me and what keeps me going back with an embarrassing frequency.

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Zombies by the Book

The Walking Dead: What Comes After by Robert Kirkman, **Image Comics**, 2013 The Walking Dead is

one of the most popular series on television at the moment, and its fans are abuzz with speculation over what direction the show's plot will take when the new season begins. That's a little odd, considering that the TV series is based on a comic book series whose plotline is years ahead of that of the TV series. The story's creators, though, have suggested that the TV show won't necessarily follow the plot of the comic book, so the sense of mystery is appropriate. Fans of the TV series who love the show's gory zombie-ness might be relieved to know that the TV show isn't beholden to the comic's plot, since, for at least

some stretches of the comicbook narrative, zombies play almost no role in the story.

The story arc in the latest Walking Dead graphicnovel compilation, What Comes After, concerns Negan, a lunatic gangster who effectively terrorizes the good-guy survivors. He and his group of follow-

ers ("The Saviors") run a protection racket that demands tribute from the various communities of survivors scattered around the DC area. Negan rules his domain with an iron fist; he is insane and sadistic, and although he claims to rationally follow a set of internal rules, he's obviously unstable, and his instability makes everyone around him do whatever he tells them to do. He also wields a barbed wire-wrapped baseball bat that he calls "Lucille." He's cray-zee, I tell ya.

Negan is a kind of villain common in thrillers. With ostentatious delusions of grandeur, he maintains dominance by being so openly off-balance that he inspires constant fear; one never knows what he's going to do, and he's capable of doing the most horrible things. He's Dennis Hopper in Blue Velvet, Joe Pesci in Goodfellas. You don't see this kind of villain in the real world; real-life despots keep their power by hiding their cruelty and misdeeds from the world at large, and once they're revealed, the world at large generally removes them from power. The sociopathic self-



styled king makes a great bad guy in pulp fiction, though.

In this story, the group of survivors led by Rick Grimes is the target of Negan's nastiness. Negan demands half of the group's supplies in exchange for protection from zombies, and Rick submits to his demands. The survivors are angry at Rick for giving in, but Rick confides in his girlfriend, Andrea, that his submission is a ruse; he plans to fight back eventually, although he's not sure how. Meanwhile, Rick's son, Carl, takes matters into his own hands (he's a boy of action)

and tries to take Negan down himself. He fails, but he forces Rick's hand and sets into motion a series of events, including the discovery of a new community of survivors led by a benevolent king named Ezekiel (the anti-Negan?!) that could mean the end of Negan's tyranny. The Walk-

ing Dead (the TV show) has always been primarily a soap opera with horror-movie window dressing. It started out as a nearly note-fornote cover of 28 Days Later, but it quickly became a characterdriven melodrama that pandered, almost as an afterthought, to our culture's taste for violence. What's surprising is how completely the story's initial, although highly derivative, conceit has been left behind at this point.

This story arc is an adaptation of a generic story about a mob thug who goes around breaking legs in Brooklyn, and zombies are only necessary as an explanation for why there are no police around to stop him. In fact, zombies barely appear, except for a scene or two where characters off-handedly decapitate a few on their way to doing something

I suppose I should applaud The Walking Dead for being versatile and ever-changing. But I can't do that. Instead, I see it as consistently unoriginal and distasteful in its cynical violence, and those shortcomings are only becoming more pronounced as time goes on.

The man has more than enough material to write about. And certainly reason to be passionate in how he performs said material.

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
