Patriarch of the Piano

It is difficult to name one person in pop music in the 1960s and 70s who had a role more central than the role occupied by Leon Russell.

Russell, the often imitated, never equaled piano player, did his thing on more recordings than nearly any other musician you can name. As a part of the in-

famous Los Angeles-based cadre of studio musicians known as the "Wrecking Crew," Russell played piano on recordings for Gary Lewis & the Playboys, Jan & Dean and Frank Sinatra. When the members of The Byrds needed help playing the "Mr. Tambourine Man' parts, they called, among others, Leon Russell. When Brian Wilson needed a piano player for Pet Sounds, Leon Russell was there. When the Rolling Stones needed a horn arranger and piano player for Let It Bleed, they rang up Leon Russell. And when Elton John felt the urge to recognize his main influence, he called Leon Russell. As a composer, Russell brought the world "This Masquerade," "Delta Lady," Tight Rope" and "A Song For You." His influence is staggering.

A striking figure with long white hair, a long white beard and reflective sunglasses, Russell's appearance is as recognizable as his voice, which he once described affectionately as sounding like Moms Mab-

ley. Russell, his hair, glasses, voice and piano will all be present for his show at C2G in Fort Wayne on Friday, November 22.

Despite his ubiquity during the 60s and 70s, Russell drifted out of sight during much of the last 30 years. Constant touring and recording (Russell and his band performed in Angola a few years ago) failed to overcome his aversion to interviews, which kept him out of the press. Changing popular tastes took their

Then a 2009, out-of-the-blue call from Elton John thrust Russell back into the limelight. John told him how much he'd meant to him in his career and asked if Russell would like to make a record with him. Russell said sure. Their 2010 album The Union earned a Grammy nomination and helped propel Russell into the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame and the Songwriter's Hall of Fame in 2011.

Back in the late 60s John made his American debut at the Troubadour in Los Angeles. In an interview John recalled looking out at the crowd on the second night of his two-night stand and seeing, among the throng of LA musicians, his idol, Leon Russell sitting about 30 feet away. John gathered himself, finished his run, then took off. Russell took off as well, but to a

As a session musician, Russell was in high demand for his versatility. He could play anything - soul, R&B, blues, classical, boogie-woogie - and his taste in arranging gave him constant work.

In an interview he recalled coming up with new arrangements for songs between takes. He was brought by Herb Alpert to tighten up some songs. (In the end Alpert stuck with his own arrangements.) In addition to all the studio stuff he was doing for other artists, Russell started putting out his own records. His

eponymous debut came out in 1970 and the first song was "A Song For You." Though it isn't his biggest hit, it became his most recorded song. Everyone from Gram Parsons to Whitney Houston, Ray Charles to Cher, Neal Schon to Donny Hathaway recorded it. It was a standard from the beginning. That's because Russell wrote it that way intentionally. In about 10 minutes.

"Delta Lady" was already a big hit for Joe Cocker. Cocker and Russell had teamed up earlier for Cocker's Mad Dogs and Englishmen tours which featured the song "Superstar" as sung by Rita Coolidge during the tour. "Superstar" was written by Russell and Bonnie Bramlett (Bramlett called it "Groupie") and was made into a huge hit by the

In 1971 Russell was asked to join the Concert for Bangladesh. Russell (on bass) joined George Harrison in backing Bob Dylan during his set. Russell also scored a medley hit off that gig with

"Youngblood/Jumpin' Jack Flash."

Other solo records followed, including *Carney*, in 1972, which featured "Tight Rope" and "This Masquerade," Will O' the Wisp and three country discs under the name Hank Wilson. With live records, compilations, specials and greatest hits Russell has released nearly 50 albums.

Weaving together the stories and connections associated with Russell results in a sort of drift net indiscriminately ensnaring a host of musical species. Take his early life for instance. Russell was born near Tulsa, Oklahoma in 1942. He started taking piano lessons when he was 10, and by the time he was 14 he was playing in nightclubs around Tulsa. (Oklahoma was a dry state then and there were no liquor laws to prevent a 14-year-old from working in nightclubs.) At one point he played behind Ronnie Hawkins & the Hawks, which later became Levon (Helm) & the Hawks, which later became The Band. He also played in a band with J.J. Cale. Three years later he was in L.A. writing songs for Gary Lewis & the Playboys and playing piano with the Wrecking Crew.

Though he's now 71, Leon Russell has entered another new phase in his career. He opened for a string of Dylan shows a couple years ago, and he's got a new solo album on the back burner. In the meantime he's just going to keep getting out there, playing those songs for you.

That phrase, by the way, was spoken by George Harrison by way of introducing Russell at the Concert for Bangladesh. When you're the piano player that Elton John looks up to, well, that's the kind of company you keep. So, yeah, "stoked" is probably put-

As if that weren't enough, the very same night the Honeywell will be hosting a band playing numbers like "Proud Mary," "Fortunate Son," "Down on the Corner" and a bunch of other classics. Yeah, those guys – CCR, aka Creedence without Fogerty, but still Creedence.

That's almost too much music for one night, especially when you realize you can't be two places at once. Our suggestion? Read the features on pages 2 and 4, make your choice and buy your tickets before they're gone.

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Survivors of the Storm

-Feature • Creedence Clearwater Revisited ------

There's something immensely sad in the prospect of some of the most beloved rock music of the late 1960s and early 70s being locked in limbo, never again to be performed by the musicians who originally delivered it to the public. There's little danger of that happening to most popular music, but the future and legacy of Creedence Clearwater Revival's music is more precarious than most, making a revival of the Revival seem more like a necessity than an indulgence.

Creedence Clearwater Revival - CCR to all but the most uninformed music fans — was formed in San Francisco in the early 60s, a collaboration between John Fogerty, bassist Stu Cook, drummer Doug "Cosmo" Clifford and Fogerty's brother Tom. The band

signed with jazz label Fantasy Records in 1964 and was dubbed the Golliwogs by label owner Max Weiss. Three years later, after John Fogerty and Clifford did some time in the military, the band renamed itself Creedence Clearwater Revival at the urging of the label's new owner, Saul Zaentz. The band's self-titled first album was released in 1968 and established the band's distinctive Southern swamp rock sound, and it produced the hit single "Suzie Q."

The band's entire career spanned just four years and seven albums, but it spawned a jaw-dropping number of songs that would go on to have life spans much longer than the band itself: "Proud Mary," "Born on the Bayou," "Bad Moon Rising," "Green River," "Down on the Corner," "Fortunate Son," "Midnight Special," "Travelin' Band," "Who'll Stop the Rain," "Up Around the Bend," "Run Through the Jungle," "Lookin' Out My Back Door," "Have You Ever Seen the Rain?" The number of genuine classics that emerged from CCR's brief heyday is inarguably astounding.

But after the band broke up in 1972, things got ugly. To start with, John Fogerty didn't want to finish out his contract with Fantasy - which obligated him to make eight more records for the label - but Zaentz wouldn't let him go. David Geffen eventually bought out Fogerty's contract, but part of the deal was that Fogerty would sign his rights to all the CCR songs over to Zaentz. The legal wrangling took a bizarre twist in the middle of the 80s when Zaentz sued Fogerty, arguing that the song "Old Man Down the Road" on Fogerty's *Centerfield* album plagiarized CCR's "Run Through the Jungle"; Fogerty was being accused of

sounding too much like himself.

As a result of the mean-spirited lawsuits, a bitter Fogerty refused even to perform any CCR songs until the late 80s, and he didn't have many kind things to say about his former label, its owner or even his former bandmates. Fogerty, it seemed, would rather have the music disappear forever than to let someone else steal it from him.

That's the kind of environment Cook and Clifford stepped into when, in 1995, they decided to form a band to play the old music at a few private gatherings. There was no question that John Fogerty wasn't interested in a CCR reunion — he had explicitly said he wasn't - and Tom Fogerty had died in 1990. The question was whether or not the band's original rhythm section could find front men who could do justice to the

"In the beginning Cosmo and I decided that if we could find the musicians that could capture the sound and recreate what the music was about," says Cook, "we'd do it."

Cook and Clifford called in singer John Tristao, who had worked with the band People in the 60s, to sing John Fogerty's part without overtly imitating him. Tristao turned out to be the right man for the job, and the new band - Creedence Clearwater Revisited — debuted to an audience response that was much bigger and more positive than Cook and Clifford had anticipated.

"We never really had any intention of playing for the public," says Cook. "But a friend wanted to promote a couple of concerts. We got talked into it but didn't know how it would go over."

It went over in a big way. The band, which eventually included guitarist Kurt Griffey and multi-instrumentalist Steve Gunner, went on to tour Europe, Asia, Australia, New Zealand and all over the Americas, and its 2008 album, Recollection, was certified Platinum.

The whole thing hasn't been without drama, though. When CCR was inducted into the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame in 1993. John Fogerty refused to let Cook and Clifford perform during the induction ceremony, and when the pair formed Creedence Clearwater Revisited two years later, Fogerty filed a law suit to try to stop the band from using the name. A judge initially granted an injunction to do just that, but eventually Cook and Clifford were allowed to continue performing with their version of CCR.

Earlier this year Fogerty told CBS News that a CCR reunion was something he was "not totally against," but that whenever he says something like that, "I'll hear back stuff that doesn't sound like it's possible."

Cook and Clifford aren't convinced that Fogerty's hints at reconciliation are sincere. and in the meantime they'd rather just play the music. All the legal and personal conflicts are a threat to the future of the songs that CCR fans love, and the right thing to do. they think, is to avoid the long-held grudges and hurt feelings and just get up on stage.

"People don't want to be involved in an endless debate," Clifford says. "They want to hear the music."

Going His Own Way

When we last heard from Taylor Fredricks, just a few months ago actually, his band, also called Taylor Fredricks, had just released its second EP, The Structure of a Mechanical Heart, and was already in the planning stages for the third EP. Just as The Structure of a Mechanical Heart was starting to make some noise, gaining regional and

national attention, Taylor Fredricks the band - unexpectedly broke up.

"Some of the other guys in Taylor Fredricks didn't have the same goals and ambitions like they used to," Fredricks explained recently. "I wanted to get signed, go on tour and succeed with the band, but some of the other guys did not want that anymore. Plus, we had different musical directions we wanted to take. It got to the point where we weren't having fun anymore, and it became difficult to finish writing a new song.

"It tore me up because I really wanted the band to succeed, but things happen, and you've just got to learn to roll with the punches and move on."

Not one for staying idle, Fredricks had begun to write songs for a solo project even before Taylor Fredricks had disbanded. That allowed for a smooth transition.

"I had started this new solo project (The Victim, The Witness) before Taylor Fredricks broke up," he said. "I had songs I was writing that didn't fit the band's sound, and I wanted these songs to be heard."

Fans accustomed to Taylor Fredricks' often loud, aggressive and highenergy music will be in for a surprise when checking out The Victim, The Witness for the first time. The songs are played acoustically, but that doesn't mean the music is any less passionate, a trademark of Fredricks'

"The Victim, The Witness is different because it is just me, my voice, and an acoustic guitar," Fredricks said. "Lyrically it is some of the best stuff I have written. The songs are about loss and heartbreak, and they really hit home on a personal level. Stylistically, it is definitely different from Taylor Fredricks. I found a couple new bands, Misser and Citizen, that really influenced my writing. I combined those influences with bands like Brand New, Bayside, Incubus, Silverstein, and I the Mighty that already have inspired me. Combining all these bands really broadened my writing ability."

Fredricks has already played a few shows as The Victim, The Witness, and the crowd response has been overwhelmingly

"People like it," Fredricks said. "A lot of people ask why I just didn't keep my own name for my solo project, Well, because I didn't want people to confuse my solo project for my old band. Thankfully, I've kept

a lot of the same fans from T Freddy, but gained a lot of new fans that are more into acoustic type music than the heavier stuff my former band was doing."

If you haven't heard The Victim, The Witness music yet, you likely won't have to wait long, as Fredricks is already working on an album that should be out within the next couple of months.

"I have my very first legit solo album



coming out before 2014," he said. "The album is called Complacency, which I thought was a perfect title to convey the songs on the CD. It means living in the positive and the good but not knowing the danger or the bad that's about to happen."

Fredricks said he has an "all star cast" helping out with his new project.

"Ryan Hodges took photos for me, and Jesse Gordon designed the album cover," he said. "I had A.J. Becerra, who did all the production and recording on Taylor Fredricks' The Structure of a Mechanical Heart EP, do all of the recording and production on this solo CD as well. And I had Logan Keith of Axis Apparel, based out of Indianapolis, do my shirts and shirt designs."

Whether flying solo or in a band (Fredricks is also the bassist and one of the singers in a new project called Tracing Oceans), you can count on Taylor Fredricks to keep making quality music.

Already a veteran of the Fort Wayne music scene at age 22, it's likely he won't remain exclusively here for much longer. The world is anxiously waiting for a new music star, and Fredricks has demonstrated he has the ambition and talent to fill the role. Now it's up to the world to do its part and discover

Majic Miracle Music Volume 6

Always a star-studded affair, the Majic Miracle Music project has been a runaway success since its first release over half a decade ago. Now comes *Majic Miracle Music Volume* 6, the final offering of the series. Issued by WAJI Majic 95.1 and Sweetwater, this collection of acoustic songs benefits the Riley



Hospital for Children in Indianapolis. The effort has paid off; to date, the project has raised over \$45,000 for Riley. Majic Miracle Music is truly a labor of love for the artists who played on it, the engineers who recorded it and the organizations that paid for its pressing: every penny earned from the CD goes to the hospital. Several of the numbers were recorded locally at Sweetwater Studios, while some of the tracks were donated by the artists. That said, it's a cohesive listen all the way through and it offers the listener a chance to hear 17 songs stripped to their true essence and performed flawlessly.

Sure, Majic Miracle Music Volume 6 is worth picking up because the proceeds go to a great cause. It's great to know that 100 percent of the money is going to Riley. But you should buy this disc based on the sheer amount of talent gathered on one album - and for the chance to hear unique acoustic versions of a bunch of fantastic tunes. From David Cook's passionate take on "Fade Into Me" to Hanson's soulful "Give a Little" to "Beating My Heart," an uplifting, pianodriven number from Jon McLaughlin, this iteration of MMM is full to bursting with great stuff. Kimberly Caldwell pours her heart in to the propulsive "Desperate Boys & Stupid Girls," while Rachel Platten's "1,000 Ships" balances her crystalline voice with dancing piano keys. Sparse percussion and acoustic guitars dance around Jason Reeves' vocal on "Sticks and Stones," while Kris Allen's soaring live version of "The Truth" provides a fitting closer to this fine finale in the Majic Miracle Music series. I didn't even mention great tunes from the likes of Jason Reeves, Phillip Phillips, Safety Suit, Finger Eleven, Chris Medina and Rob Bolin.

Lousy with Sylvianbriar

If you're a longtime fan of Kevin Barnes and his band of merry pranksters known as Of Montreal, then you also know that the guy changes up his sound about every three months. It seems that, within just a month or two of releasing a record, he's giving an interview saying he's going in a completely



different direction with the next album. Barnes has done twee pop/folk, Beatlesque 60s pop, confessional lo-fi indie electronic, 70s funk and even modern avant garde classical. They're all hats that have oddly enough fit his head pretty well (some better than others.)

After last year's dense and difficult Paralytic Stalks. Barnes

After last year's dense and difficult *Paralytic Stalks*, Barnes decided to get back to basics with Of Montreal and go with some late 60s rock n' roll. The result is *Lousy with Sylvianbriar*, an album filled with touches of Rolling Stones, Bob Dylan, Neil Young and, of course, Of Montreal. Barnes is the indie rock Prince. He can play pretty much anything and has recorded all of the Of Montreal albums by himself since the mid-2000s.

Lousy with Sylvianbriar is different in that Barnes went into the studio and recorded live with a full band – and recorded straight to tape. The results are stunning. There's a crispness to the tracks that hasn't been there in the past. Opener "Fugitive Air" is a rowdy rock n' roll number that would've fit just right on Exile On Main Street. On last year's Paralytic Stalks, the highlight track was the sublime "Wintered Debts" which featured pedal steel guitar. The pedal steel must have made an impression on Barnes, as the instrument is scattered throughout Lousy with Sylvianbriar with great results.

There's an air of dirtied up rock n' roll, courtesy of Muscle Shoals, on this album. "Obsidian Currents" feels like an old school soul number with electric piano and some great walking bass parts

Black Sabbath

Masters of Reality (1971)

Black Sabbath, the original heavy metal band, have been blowing minds for over 40 years. This, their third release, featured some of the best stoner rock ever created.



It opens with the coughing of guitarist Tony Iommi, recorded in a

loop. "Sweet Leaf," which follows, is fundamental Sabbath, and the crisp vocals from Ozzy Osbourne capture just how great his voice was.

"After Forever" was written by bassist Geezer Butler and has some faith-based themes (even though they were perceived to be Satanic). Bill Ward pounds away on the drums in this track. "Children of The Grave," which closes the first side, is amazing, ethereal, heavy metal acid-rock.

Flip the record over, and the brilliance continues with "Orchid/Lord of This World." Some handsome guitars get it started (Iommi was a beast as a 23-year-old) before it opens back up with the trademark grunge and the creative changes that they conquered throughout their illustrious career.

"Solitude" turns the vibe way down and features Iommi on guitar, flute and piano; it's a softer vocal track (due to a delay) from Ozzy and one of the prettiest songs they ever did.

The album closes on a high note with the six minute thriller "Death Mask/Into The Void."

I'll get some arguments, but I still think this is the best Black Sabbath album, with *Paranoid* right behind it.

Black Sabbath had seven really tight records before Osbourne got booted out of the band and Ronnie James Dio took over in 1979. The original members (minus Ward) released *13* in June of this year. It's actually pretty good for a bunch of men in their 60s. (*Dennis Donahue*)

that allow for Barnes to get his soul man on. "Belle Glade Missionaries" has a great groove and some of Barnes great wordplay that usually makes no sense but it sounds wonderful.

Barnes is never short on vernacular eccentricities. Take the mud stomp of "Hegira Emigre," one of the grittiest tracks Of Montreal has committed to tape yet. Barnes sings, "If you're thinking I'm Caucasian well I'm actually gray / I was conceived on Ash Wednesday and stoned on Christmas Day," as the band gives him a rhythm to spit his attitude into the air.

Barnes has made his loosest album yet, all the while never hanging up any of Of Montreal's eccentricities that have made them so startlingly original. He seems to have just needed a breather from creating bizarre characters and new languages so he could let his inner Jagger gyrate and promenade across the stage for a bit. Another Georgian raconteur did the same thing earlier this year. Deerhunter's Bradford Cox, much like Barnes, decided to get back to basics and put out a howling, bloodied rock album after a couple years of putting out tightly wound, intricately created albums. The result, *Monomania*, is one of the best rock n' roll albums of the year. You can now add *Lousy With Sylvianbriar* to that list. (*John Hubner*)

Did you know that some serious music critics genuinely like the albums of new age legend Enya? I didn't know this until recently, and, frankly, the information sort of disturbed me. I learned of this surprising, bizarre Enya love while researching a Los Angeles duo called Boardwalk. The band's



singer, a handsome gal named Amber Quintero, has a vocal style that might bring the new age queen herself to mind for many music fans. Sure, her voice will also make you think of the Cocteau Twins, Portishead, My Bloody Valentine and Mazzy Star. But, mostly, it's that Enya babe who comes to mind while listening to Boardwalk. And

somehow, it pretty much works.

I was bored and broke on a chilly fall Sunday, wandering around Manhattan with enough money to maybe buy one record and take the subway back to Brooklyn. I dug through the racks at NoHo's Other Music, looking for something I could write about and hopefully enjoy for a few weeks while waiting to store up some more extra change to blow on a music. After about an hour I was about to give up, as everything was either out of my price range or unappealing. I was even walking towards the door when, suddenly, I heard something. The clerk, a skinny, chatty kid with a spike, had changed the record. A lush, dreamy, female-fronted track poured from the store's speakers. "I hope this is new," I said to myself, instantly excited. If it was new, I could review it, which would warrant me buying it and playing it on repeat for a few weeks. Rather than jump right in, I flipped through the used LPs while the record played loudly over the store's stereo. The opener, "I'm Not Myself," was sweet and easy a perfect fall spin. "What's Love" came on next, another dreamy, retro-tinged, shoegaze-flavored ballad featuring a beautiful, light vocal. One more solid song, this one titled "Crying," played before I located the record and put down a small stack of smelly dollar bills. I hopped onto the F train via the always musty Broadway-Lafayette station and felt the rumble of decades-old wheels below me as we rolled towards Brooklyn, past the park and into some hole in the wall call Kensington where Sufjan Stevens supposedly lives.

That record, of course, was the above-mentioned eponymous debut from LA's too-cute duo, Boardwalk. As the album was released by Stones Throw Records (home of producers Madlib and Peanut Butter Wolf, among others), I wasn't at all surprised by how great the quality of the record's production was. Keyboards, samplers, bass, loops, drum machines and some instruments made by the band's music-maker, multi-instrumentalist Mike Edge, amounted to a sound that can best be described as ethereal. Laid-back. Meditative. Reflec-

This is music to water the plants to. Music to make out with girls to. Music to fall asleep at noon on a Wednesday in October to (trust me, I tested it out). It's a juicy, sweet, engaging and warm sound that I suspect fans of any artist mentioned in this review would like very much. While I'm tempted to say that it's Quintero's Enya-like vocals that are the star of the show, it's really both band members who make this tight, approachable, modest debut record work as well as it does. Edge is an inventive producer with a beautiful sound and style. His productions are somehow lean and epic, all easily filling the air without ever overwhelming the listener. It's a simple but impressive sound that suits Quintero's light-as-air vocals perfectly.

The record lacks diversity, sure, but overall it's a promising debut that makes for a great late night soundtrack and rewards repeat listens. Or maybe just a great lazy day soundtrack, perfect for Wednesday naps. (*Greg W. Locke*)

Darkside

Psychic

The buzz echoing throughout the alleys of Musicville over the last few years has often been about this handsome 23-year-old New York City kid named Nicolas Jaar. Supposedly he's the new genius. Pianist, producer, singer, arranger, Guy Who Knows How to Make Weird Music Using Computers,



Jaar, at age 21, released a debut record called *Space Is Only Noise* that was so creative, cerebral and fully formed that NYC's own Matador Records offered to put out his next effort, the just released *Psychic*. For the album, Jaar collaborated with a budding guitar god named Dave Harrington under the band name Darkside, releasing an eightsong, 45-minute double LP that I'm certain will be remembered as one of 2013's most important debuts. It's a mellow, triply, electronic work that, if only because of the band name and Harrington's guitar sound, will remind many people of Pink Floyd.

The record is sexy, eclectic, avant garde and, more than anything else, deeply textured and composed. We hear Jaar's compositional genius at every turn, his arrangements working as sophisticated blueprints that breed the core elements of electronic music with krautrock, prog-rock and symphonic rock. Opener "Golden Arrow," at over 11 minutes, may be the year's most shockingly accomplished opening track, taking the listener on a journey that's equal parts Brian Eno, Peter Gabriel, Can and *Kid A*. The first time I heard the song, I played it again. Then again. Then a fourth time for posterity. It's

a druggy sound we hear here, backed by dense production, slappy breakbeats, spinning atmospherics and prog-friendly vocals. If Jaar can already wrap his head around music this complex at age 23, it's frightening to imagine what he'll be doing at 25, let alone 30. The song sets a high standard for the remainder of the record, which plays out like something of a space epic. This is the music that M83's Anthony Gonzalez and Caribou's Dan Snaith would probably listen to together on a road trip, if they were to ever take one together (and if there were no Jim O'Rourke records laying around).

"Sitra" works as something of a cool-down after "Golden Arrow," leading us nicely into another big winner titled "Heart." Led by a stomping rhythm section and some seriously Floydian guitar, "Heart" is one of *Psychic*'s most accessible works, playing like some lost prog-rock hit from the 70s but updated for today's technology-obsessed listenership. Jaar's vocals aren't always easy to make out, but similar to someone like Damo Suzuki, they work in an instrumental fashion, blending in nicely with the song's glitch-y arrangement. The track builds over its five-minute runtime into a sprawling, if comparatively short, epic, stomping its way towards a grand, memorable conclusion.

One of *Psychic*'s anchors, an eight-minute track called "The Only Shrine I've Seen," reminded me instantly of James Murphy. It's dance-y, hip and complex, shifting subtly throughout its extended playtime, stacking on production detail after production detail. It's one of the rare tracks you could play at a club or at home while you're reading. "Greek Light," perhaps the record's most avant garde offering, feels to me like a more successful version of what Thom Yorke and Radiohead were trying to do on the title track to their 2001 masterpiece, *Kid A*. It's not the prettiest or easiest song to listen to, but there' so much style and texture there that it works as the type of composition that rewards familiarity and patience.

Psychic closes with the five-minute "Metatron," a mellow, mostly instrumental work that unfolds as something of a prog-rock-infused DJ set, Jaar and Harrington ending their phenomenal debut record by throwing what feels like all their leftover ideas at us in the form of one cohesive composition. By the time the track ends, you feel as if you've been on a journey – a strange, triply, psychedelic, electronic, cerebral journey through the mind of tomorrow's compositional genius. (Greg W. Permanent Signal

You know, it's always kind of a bummer when someone releases a really promising debut only to follow it up with a not so promising sophomore release. It makes me sad, really. All that greatness you enjoyed about that first album just disappears into the ether as a second album filled with schmaltz and



The first noticeable difference in *Permanent Signal* compared to *Strange Weekend* is that Remiddi's voice is way up in the mix this time around – not processed at all, really; it's floating right there in your face, daring you to compare him to Erasure's Andy Bell, or Air Supply's Russell Hitchcock. I'm not saying Remiddi's voice is bad. He sings in key. But the problem is that those wobbly effects added to the mood of that debut album. Without them it makes these songs feel way too serious, way too high school talent show.


"Think of the Ocean" starts out with some weird noises and wobbly square waves before a lilting (processed) cello comes in and Remiddi brings on a melancholy vocal delivery. It's kind of a downer opening, reminiscent of a Depeche Mode B-side. "Cluster" is decent enough, almost sounding like Explosions in the Sky at the very beginning with the e-bowed guitar. The chorus brings to mind some of the more longing moments of *Strange Weekend*.

There's still that great production that Mauro Remiddi excelled at last time around; it's just that these songs aren't all that interesting. "Night Birds," for example, is really just, well, it's just not that good. This is schmaltzy soft rock with modern production squiggles





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

to make it sound relevant. There are even moments where Remiddi's voice wavers uncomfortably, like someone who's fighting the urge to get sick while singing at a karaoke bar. "I Lost Connection" takes the cake, though. It starts out sounding like Bob Seger's "We've Got Tonight" and then proceeds to plod through nearly six minutes of piano bar balladry. "The Way Out" is interesting enough. It dirties up the ears a bit with a overblown drum beat and guitars hanging in the background. Remiddi's voice is more an instrument instead of a focal point, which I think works in his favor.

I try to look for the good in everything. I really do. Unfortunately this album is just an overall letdown from the beginning. Some of that magic from 2012 is sprinkled here and there, but for the most part it can't save a drab listening experience. (*John Hubner*)

Dent MayWarm Blanket

Dent May isn't shy about his love for Brian Wilson. On 2012's *Do Things* he showed a knack for creating a musical gumbo that was equal parts Beach Boys and Animal



Collective. It was an interesting and at times quite pleasant listening experience. Having been signed to Paw Tracks, the Animal Collective beats and quirks were understandable. But for a guy who was known as Dent May and his Magnificent Ukulele before going with just his name, the *Pet Sounds* sounds were surprising.

Returning from wherever he was hanging out and writing more pop confections, May has now given us Warm Blanket. Like the title suggests, this is an album of warm, gooey pop tracks that are sure to warm you up from the inside out. The Animal Collective mannerisms pop up here and there, but for the most part this is a straight-up pop record that makes no qualms about its unabashed love of AM Gold, honey-sweet sentiment and even the occasional F-bomb. "Turn Up The Speakers" brings to mind a young-ish Harry Nilsson and his "Turn Up The Radio," albeit a truncated version at just over a minute long before "Let Them Talk" comes in and says throw caution to the wind.

May sings over booming drums and a funky guitar line. There's still those Panda Bear mannerisms in the whooshing synths, but for the most part, he seems pretty solid in his own footing. "Born Too Late" has a disco beat and hand claps, bringing to mind Andrea True Connection's "More, More, More." Don't let that scare you off, as it's a great song, filled with Brian Wilson lamentations about wishing you were older than you were. "I can't explain, but I'm at that age /I'm born too late," May sings as the beat goes on. "Yazoo" is a lilting ballad, while "Corner Piece" brings to mind late 80s/early 90s Adrian Belew. "Do I Cross Your Mind," the highlight of the album, is a beautiful, melancholy song that is reminiscent of Nilsson and Randy Newman's Lenny Waronker-produced albums. It also has some Dr. Dog qualities with it's guitar harmonies. "I was so ordinary till you came around / I had not learned to deal with thoughts that kept me down," May sings over a song crossed with Memphis soul, Brill Building pop sheen, and a sad sack quality even Elliot Smith would've approved of.

Warm Blanket is song after song of pop hooks, peppy beats and, at times, a maudlin feel that never brings you down as much as it makes you sigh as you stare off into the distance. "It Takes A Long Time," "I'm Ready To Be Old," "Found A Friend" and "Summer Is Over" all evoke a feeling of longing – a feeling of "what if?" These songs are about searching – searching for love, acceptance and an ear or two that'll

listen. May wears his heart on his sleeve once again, and it's a good look for him. (*John Hubner*)

Toxic Holocaust

Chemistry of Consciousness

There's just something about a band with a nearly indecipherable logo. It says to the world, "Hey world, we're a band that plays the music we like, whether you recognize who we are or not." Toxic Holocaust are that type of



band. They even take things one step farther by making their logo not just indecipherable but also angular and blade-like, as opposed to the more organic style that generally signifies bloody gore. No, Toxic Holocaust has a logo that is perpetually in imminent attack mode. Keeping with this theme, there is a cobral also poised to strike, on the cover of their new album, Chemistry of Consciousness,

Endearing logos and cover art aside, TH have been churning out a heady brew of punkish, thrashy burners for over a decade now. A band more or less in name only, the band is the brainchild of one Joel Grind who writes all of the music and plays every instrument save for the drums in the studio (he hires a backing band for tours).

Among the newer generation of bands that take their cues from early 80s thrash metal and punk, TH have separated themselves from the pack by earnestly breathing life into the genre while not necessarily expanding its confines. In other words, though the songs are decidedly retro, even formulaic at times, TH never sound stiff or mechanical. On the contrary, the songs here sound very much alive and vital, even if their inspiration comes from decades ago.

Sounding most typically like a punkish take on, say, early Venom or Exodus, and with a decided predilection for reverbed vocals, TH don't stray far from this invigorating neo-proto-thrash (if there is such a thing) on *Chemistry*. Lyrically, they mine the same politically belligerent horror/gore topics they share with their progenitors; song titles like "Deny the Truth," "Rat Eater," and "International Conspiracy" give a clear indication of where TH are coming from thematically. It's not exactly the walk through hell that a band like Slayer might take you on; it's more like a bunch of cool-sounding stuff to say while you're skateboarding in the half-pipe.

Still, the songs taken as a whole often suffer from a certain sameness, with one song often sounding very much like the next. In fact, one often gets the feeling that the lyrics from one song could be switched with those of another without anyone noticing. In that sense, they may be more in the vein of hardcore punk, spewing out lyrics over similar-sounding guitar chords for each song. When they do bother to throw something distinct into the mix, such as the all-too-brief guitar solo about halfway through "Acid Fuzz," it takes the band to another level, even if it invites howls of disapproval from the hardcore crowd.

Overall, *Chemistry* finds the band improving by degrees over Toxic Holocaust's prior recordings, and may have even found a certain level of mastery over their own metallic niche. If you're looking for a newfangled means of thrashing like it's 1985, it's unlikely that you'll fare much better than *Chemistry of Consciousness*.

12 Years a Slave Hard To Watch But Must Be Seen

As I watched the harrowing 12 Years a Slave, a phrase a friend taught me kept running through my mind. A recent graduate of journalism school, he left New York State where he had lived most of his life to take a job at a paper in Alabama to get some experience. For months he had a serious case of culture shock. Folks in his new surroundings who had a sense of humor about the South would say, "It's not the heat. It's the stupidity." (My friend used his best folksy Southern drawl while saying this.)

I think that a pretty funny line. There is nothing funny, not a drop of humor, in 12 Years a Slave, and to call what goes on in the South before the Civil War stupidity is a massive understatement. As we witness episode after episode of violence and humiliation, the sense of hopelessness and dread build ferociously.

By the end of the film I couldn't bear one more shot of moss hanging off a tree, a cane field, fog on the water, or a cotton field. The movie makes the outdoors feel claustrophobic. The outdoors is wilderness filled with danger that goes on in every direction for hundreds of miles.

You can feel the heat and humidity, the oppressiveness of it. You don't see the mosquitoes and other bugs, but you know they are there. I wanted to flee – and I'd been sitting comfortably in a movie theater. (Coming out of the theater to a cool light rain was delightful.) What happens closer to home is even more horrifying.

12 Years a Slave is based on the true story of Solomon Northrup, who wrote a memoir titled 12 Years a Slave, with the subtitle Narrative of Solomon Northrup, a Citizen of New York, Kidnapped in Washington City in 1841, and Rescued in 1853, From a Cotton Plantation Near the Red River, in Louisiana. Northrup was born free in Rhode Island and grew up in New York. He was living in Saratoga Springs with his wife and children when he was kidnaped. Two men offered him a job playing violin in a circus. Once they got him to Washington, they drugged and kidnapped him. He was sold and shipped to New Orleans.

The film, written by John Ridley and directed by Steve

McQueen, is unlike most movies about the South during the time of slavery. There is nothing pretty or charming about white life on the plantation, and there are no happy slaves. This is the story of the people who were considered property, and it is told from their perspective.

I am a big fan Chiwetel Ejiofor who plays Solomon. From *Dirty Pretty Things*, through *Love Actually, Melinda and Melinda* and *Kinky Boots*, I have been hoping he would get a big role that would get him more big roles. This role will get him plenty of work and Oscar buzz.

Solomon is a confident, trusting, happy family man before his ordeal begins. He is free. For a long time he clings to this identity, even as every experience he has is demeaning and brutalizing. But as he suffers and watches the suffering of others, he changes. Ejiofor's expressions and demeanor change and toughen. Two scenes in particular – singing at the funeral of a fellow slave and when he is forced to whip a woman he cares for – are particularly affecting. Ejiofor makes you care deeply about Solomon.

He gets in trouble in part because he can't hide that he has done many things most slaves have not done. This causes him to be sold and moved and treated badly. Various actors play the men who make his life a living hell. Paul Giamatti plays a slave dealer. Paul Dano is a particularly crazed overseer. Benedict Cumberbatch plays a kinder master, but he's not willing to buck the slave system. The vilest of his owners, Edwin Epps, is played by Michael Fassbender with characteristic Fassbender zeal. Sarah Paulson plays the nearly as cruel Mrs. Epps.

Alfre Woodard makes a short but memorable performance as a woman who has gamed the system as best she can. Newcomer Lupita Nyong'o is tremendous as Patsey, the

woman who has the misfortune to be very good at picking cotton and attracting the attention of Master Epps.

12 Years a Slave begins with Solomon, who has been given the name Platt, cutting sugar cane in the field. There

are skips in time, flashbacks to Solomon's life in Saratoga Springs. This structure is ideal for maximizing the profound differences between freedom and slavery and for giving the audience some relief early on from the soul deadening world of the plantation.

Still, by the time the 12 years is almost over, you desperately want out of this world. The filmmakers grind you down

still, by the time the 12 years is almost over, you desperately want out of this world. The filmmakers grind you down the way Epps destroys the slaves he owns. The title told me Solomon's hell would end, and I could barely sit any longer waiting for that relief.

Sticking closely to the real story of Solomon, a Canadian carpenter who holds abolitionist views gains Solomon's trust enough for Solomon to explain his background and ask him to write to his friends at home to help him get his freedom. Brad Pitt plays this decent white man. Pitt is also proud to be a producer of the film.

There is no lecturing about how evil slavery is. We see the evil, and there are speeches that remind us how the Bible was used to enforce and justify slavery.

Everyone should see 12 Years a Slave. This is extra true for every person who has ever claimed the Civil War was about states' rights and every person who defends displaying the Confederate flag. It wouldn't hurt Paula Deen and Richie Incognito to see it either. More importantly, students in high school and college should see this film and talk about it. The film is a rich and entertaining source for discussions of history, slavery, the lasting legacy of slavery, morality, decency, and human rights.

12 Years a Slave is powerful and moving, two words that are overused when talking about films (I'm guilty of this) and often cover up the fact that the film, while it might be powerful and moving, isn't really very good. 12 Years a Slave is very, very good.

Not That Long a Way

Despite the cigarette ad, women had not come a long way, baby, in 1979 and 1980. When the original movie of 9 to 5 came out, women were still doing most of the work for half the pay and regularly commiserating about getting chased around the desk. When they complained to the boss or husband, they would be told they "have no sense of humor." The very idea of a woman promoted to a leadership job was so rare it was newsworthy.

A funny movie – albeit a revenge fantasy and starring "Hanoi Jane" Fonda,

ring "Hanoi Jane" Fonda,
Dolly "Double D" Parton, and Lily "Ernestine" Tomlin – was first and
foremost a surprise to men and a relief to working women. I love Dolly,
and some of her tunes have become true classics, including "9 to 5,"
(although the idea of working only eight hours a day is quaint to many of
today's "cuberrati"). That it has become a Broadway show, still relevant
to the 99 percent who are not the man at the top of the food chain is, well,
kinda discouraging.

So, Fort Wayne Civic Theatre and guest director Dianne B. Shaw with music director Eunice Wadewitz have their work cut out for them to present 9 to 5: The Musical. It's a play with a flawed, unfocused book and some peppy Parton tunes. This version of the story sacrifices action for songs, and the center is not the hostage-held boss and three self-liberating women as much as it is their fantasy. Hardworking, strong-singing actors, a good set, solid pit orchestra and a willing audience are not enough to lift this production up to top-notch. It should be fun, but except for three or four moments, it's just not.

The three leads – Aimee Lackey, Meagan Solloway, and Lindsay Hoops – do a good job with their characters and manage the songs well particularly as a trio. Kent Bixler is piggish enough as the bad boss. Franklin Hart. But the scenes that made the movie so delicious, after Hart is kidnapped and tied up for a month are all but missing. Act One is too long, and Act Two is too much in the typing pool and not nearly enough in the conflict.

The show briefly comes alive in two scenes. The first is a number by Julie Donnell as Roz Keith, Office Gossip, who has a serious thing for the boss. With humorous backing of a red-robed gospel choir, she declares her love with a bare shoulder and a lot of hubba hubba. Gary Lanier's gentle choreography gets its first moment to shine in Roz's "Heart to Hart."

Shortly after that number woke the audience, the leads puff a little pot and let their imaginations run wild. Lindsay's Judy is a sexy shooter, and then Megan's Doralee builds on the mood with a Texas rodeo, but it is Aimee's Violet who soars as a demented Snow White, complete with cute Woodland Creatures and an awesome cackle worthy of any Disney witch to really take the prize! Aimee also puts some of Gary Lanier's choreography to good use at the beginning of Act Two with her song "One of the Boys." Later, the girls and ensemble nail the big number "Change It."

Generally, the men are wolves, although Jimmy Mitchell as Joe the CPA Who Loves Violet gets a chance to shine with the duet "Let Love Grow." Gregory Stieber plays a cad of an ex as Dick Bernley, and Brad Davis gets to be a sweet, lovin' cowboy as Doralee's devoted Dwayne. Newcomer Sean Arata is solid as Violet's son Josh. Matt Faley gets to be the resolver as Chairman Tinsley and Ennis Brown Jr. gets a couple of lines as Bob Enright.

Among the women in the typing pool, Jann Fisher as Margaret careens around well, Emily O'Rourke is sweet as Maria. Others include Susannah Chadwell and Stephanie Longbrake. The cast is rounded out with Eileen Ahlersmeyer, Emma Ashmawi, Tamarah Brownlee, Megan Browning, Bobbi Jo Carroll, Jenna Clark, Jeanne Hanford and Prentis D. Moore. The Cute Woodland Creatures are Claire Bobay, Mercé Burney, Amanda Chadwell, and Emma Weldon

On the production side, I don't know what is going on with Civic's lighting, but the lights on opening night in many scenes were dim, like a four on a scale up to 10. Lights are fun and dramatic; they are key to

A Classic Comes to Life

The University of Saint Francis School of Creative Arts chose a classic of American theater for its fall production. George S. Kaufman and Moss Hart's The Man Who Came to Dinner, which premiered in 1939, has been staged consistently across America for nearly 75 years, and most of its script, to which USF is faithful, I believe, still feels fresh today.

260-399-7700, ext. 8001 The title character of this play is Sheridan Whiteside, a famous radio personality based on the The New Yorker's famed critic Alexander Woollcott. Whiteside falls on the front steps on his way to visit for dinner, and proceeds to completely and hilariously takes over the house of a rich Ohio family, Mr. and Mrs. Stanley and their children, during the Christmas season of 1939. Sherry, as his friends call him, is, to say the least, very interesting. His friends are among the most famous people of the time, and they keep the house hopping in ways that delight the audience as they frustrate

the Stanley family. Overall, this may be the best production I've seen from USF in quite some time, and the production team and cast do excellent work on this one. The kinks caused by moving into such a cavernous space as the old Scottish Rite Theater have been worked through brilliantly. In last season's production of To Kill a Mockingbird, there were a few minor issues with technical systems (which I think USF was using for the first time). For The Man Who Came to Dinner, however, there were only a couple of tiny glitches with the sound system connected to a few actor microphones. Otherwise, use of the perhaps too large theater was flawless. The set, the elegant living room of the Stanley family, is absolutely beautiful and serves the production quite well, and the costumes are appropriate.

The cast included many actors I had not seen before. Many, of course, are USF students; however, most of the larger roles are assumed by experienced community actors who give excellent performances. Because so many of the roles in this and many other plays produced by area universities are for older actors and require at least some experience, it makes sense that the leads aren't students. The ratio of student to community performers, though, is often surprising and makes me wish plays giving experience to a greater number of

student actors were chosen instead of those requiring so many nonstudent actors.

As with any other decision, I'm sure there are reasons for the choice of plays at universities and the actors cast, but when any university's name is attached to a production, I really like seeing as many students from that school on stage as possible. Aside from the two leads, the performers receiving the most enthusiastic applause at curtain were students, which is generally the case in a collegelevel production. Perhaps Roald Dahl's Willy Wonka, the USF production in March, will use a larger percentage of student actors.

As Sheridan Whiteside, Christopher J. Murphy is nothing short of amazing as he demonstrates both the wit and arrogance of his character. Nathan Lane played the role in a recent Broadway revival, which makes sense as it is easy to picture him as Sherry. Murphy's wife, Emilie, brings grace and skill to the role of Maggie Cutler, Whiteside's secretary. I'm hoping to see both on Fort Wayne stages

Standout members of the supporting cast include Erin Harney-Siples as Harriet Stanley, who made me laugh perhaps more than any other character; Aaron Willoughby as Bert Jefferson, a reporter and love interest of Maggie; Quintin C. Jenkins as Beverly Carlton, an actor whose arrogance matches Sherry's; and Naomi Eddy as Lorraine Sheldon, a tart and actress willing to do what she must to rise to the top. Local favorites Jim Nelson and Harvey Cocks both appear as well. Nelson is especially funny in his over-thetop role of Banjo, a Harpo Marxish comedian, and Cocks brings his usual charm to the role of an elderly doctor caring for Sherry.

Overall, USF's production of this true classic is solid. With two intermissions, it runs around two hours and 40 minutes, nearly every one of which entertaining.



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Hiking to Happiness

Wild by Cheryl Strayed, Alfred A. Knopf, 2012

What a difference an author makes. As I read Cheryl Strayed's Wild Leouldn't below

Wild, I couldn't help thinking about Bill Bryson's A Walk in the Woods. Bryson's book, published in 1998, is about the author's attempt to hike the Appalachian Trail, a 2,000-mile-plus path that stretches from Georgia to Maine. It's funny and deeply informative, providing insights into the history of environmentalism in America and into the mind-set of long-distance hikers. Strayed's book is markedly different, despite its foundation on a nearly identical setting although a different trail - and premise. Strayed is funny but not comedic, smart but

not didactic. Her book is much more about introspection than it is about hiking, about looking inside even when you're surrounded by the great big world.

Strayed's book isn't a memoir of the summer of 1995 when she hiked the Pacific

Crest Trail through much of California and all of Oregon, as much as it is an explanation of the events that led her to the trail in the first place. She was in her 20s then; she'd grown up in the woods of northern Minnesota, living in an improvised cabin with her siblings, her stepfather and her hippie mother. Four years before Strayed ended up on the PCT, her mother had died from cancer and her siblings and stepfather had grown distant as the family dissolved in the absence of her mother's stabilizing presence. Strayed's marriage had also dissolved when her husband, whom she had married when she was 20, discovered her frequent infideli-

Strayed fell into a depression after the death of her mother and her divorce. She moved to Portland, Oregon, hooked up with a heroin addict and began to flirt with addiction herself. She was adrift, and when her ex-husband intervened, she was hit with a revelation: she needed to do something to get her life back on track, and she decided that what she needed to do was to hike the PCT.

She hits the trail uninformed and unprepared, and her memoir



traces her transformation from a hopelessly naïve novice to a seasoned, competent hiker. In that way, her book is just like Bryson's, but Strayed's real story is in the flashbacks to her history, scenes from her past (the quick decline of her mother, the death of a beloved horse) that are wrenching and that tell us who Strayed really is. Beyond those stories, the book is just another story of the trail, a meditation on how beautiful the wilderness is, how hiking hundreds of miles teaches you how big the world

is by emphasizing the length of a single mile.

But this is really a story about a woman's personal transformation (that's why it was chosen to be part of Oprah's Book Club) and in that area, it delivers. It's not always easy to see exactly what Strayed's transformation entails.

however. She tells us that before she went on the hike she used meaningless sex to escape her problems, and she congratulates herself for not sleeping with every man she meets on the trail; she does, however, think about sleeping with nearly every man she meets on the trail, and she does hook up with one random guy near the end of her trip. She tells us that she comes to terms with her mother's death and her relationships with her surviving loved ones, although it's not entirely clear how she does so, beyond simply deciding that she has. We largely have to take her word for it when she tells us that she's a different person at the end of the hike than she was at the beginning.

The beauty of the book, though, is in the words rather than the conclusions. Strayed is an excellent storyteller, and she has several stories to tell: a thriller about a messed-up young woman on the verge of self-destruction, a drama about the intense relationship between a mother and a daughter, an adventure story about a human meeting the challenges of the wilderness. She tells all the stories gracefully, with humor, poetic turns of phrase and disarming honesty.

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The Food's the Real Draw

------ Review • Dash-In------

Dash-In has graced the top of my downtown restaurants list for several years. However, when I moved to Fort Wayne over a decade ago, it was known mostly as a coffeehouse with limited hours, and it never hit my radar. I am happy to report that over the years it has changed owners a few times and expanded its menu and hours, making it one of the headliners of downtown nightlife.

For beer lovers, Dash-In is a popular spot. Al-

though I don't fall into this category, I have many friends who do, and the Dash rockets to the top of their list. It boasts 23 rotating taps of craft beer, enough to satisfy even the snobbiest of my beer loving friends. The bartenders are more than happy to provide samples of the beer to help you make a decision, and they know a ton about them. Recently, I stopped by with a friend after work and tried

two or three of their selections before choosing Founder's Rubaeus, a raspberry ale, which quickly became a must-have in my book. Because the taps rotate, you never know what you might find when you visit, and that's part of

the fun. Of course, they announce their beers on the website and Facebook for those who don't like to be surprised.

The main reason I visit Dash-In is for the food. My husband and I often pop in on Saturday morning for brunch when they serve a variety of breakfast sandwiches, eggs Benedict and omelets. My favorite menu item is the Smoked Salmon Benedict served with red onions, capers and poached eggs with a side of potatoes and fruit. It hits the spot, especially if enjoyed with some hot tea (Dash-In carries the Tazo line) or coffee from locally owned Old Crown Coffee Roasters. The Dash serves breakfast on weekdays too, but I find the menu to be boring and limited. Service is slow at this time of day, too, so if you are pressed for time, this is not the place for you.

Now that I work downtown, I find myself at The Dash often for lunch. It's a great place to catch up with friends or meet with someone for business. The lunch menu offers a nice selection of salads. My favorite is the Black 'n' Blue Salad (\$8.50) made with mixed greens and topped with blackened chicken breast, bleu cheese crumbles, tomato, sliced mushrooms, red onion and cucumber. The Cobb Salad (\$8.50) is also a winner; it's made with mixed greens and topped with charbroiled chicken, bacon, hard boiled egg, bleu cheese crumbles, roasted red peppers, red onion, tomato, cucumber and artichoke hearts. Sadly, the Crab Cake Salad (\$9.75) leaves something to be desired. While the crab cakes are tasty, the salad is skimpy and left me hungry on several occasions. For the price, go with one of the salads I mentioned; the portions are just right.

Perhaps the most popular items on the menu – or at least the ones everyone raves about – are the grilled cheeses. There are four from which to choose, all served on grilled sourdough: Gourmet Grilled Cheese (\$7) with cheddar, Swiss, provolone, pepper-jack, Par-



mesan, herb cream cheese and tomatoes; Euro Grilled Cheese (\$7) with smoked Gouda, Havarti and Muenster cheese with roasted red peppers; Pesto Grilled

Cheese (\$7.50) with cheddar. Swiss, provolone, Muenster cheeses. matoes, artichoke hearts. pesto and sauce; and Baja Grilled Cheese (\$7.50)with pepper-jack. cheddar, Swiss. and provolone. guacamole, and

black bean corn relish. While all of them are delightful, my favorite is the Pesto Grilled Cheese. The flavors and textures are superb, though they could ramp up the pesto.

Another item that gets rave reviews is the Vegetable Pesto Soup, and while I like it. I wouldn't rave about it. I find it to be a tad bland, but it pairs well with the grilled cheeses. Personally, I prefer the tomato bisque, a rich and creamy tomato base with a touch of white wine and onion. It's the perfect complement for the grilled cheeses – I mean, come on, who doesn't love a grilled cheese with tomato soup?

I tend to focus on the healthy choices when I visit, but for burger lovers Dash-In has several top-notch choices, all made from fresh 100 percent Angus beef including the Pub Burger (\$9) with bacon, cheddar cheese, lettuce, tomato, red onion, and 1,000 island dressing; and the Black 'n' Blue (\$9) with bacon, lettuce, tomato and bleu cheese dressing. Vegetarians can substitute garden burger or falafel for any of the burger choices for an additional 50 cents. The menu also includes paninis, sandwiches, wraps and quesadillas, and there is always a daily special or two, as well.

For dinner, Dash-In adds appetizers, gluten-free flatbreads, and desserts. My favorite appetizer is the Loaded Hummus Trio (\$9) with three types of house-made hummus: cilantro, red pepper and olive, accompanied by grilled zucchini, kalamata olives, roasted red peppers, cucumber, roma tomatoes, red onion goat cheese and warm pita wedges. It's a great dish for sharing. I haven't ventured into the flatbreads or desserts yet, but they all look amazing.

I love visiting The Dash on summer weekends and grabbing a table outside on the sidewalk. That block of Calhoun Street is one of my favorites, and inevitably someone you know will walk by or even join you. On most Friday and Saturday evenings throughout the year, it hosts live music. You can check the calendar on the website to find out what's coming up, and then make plans to take a group of friends downtown to spend some time at the Dash-In. It's a great place to hang out and the food is pretty darn good too.

The Box Gets Hammered

Tops at the Box: TVdirector-turned-film director Alan Taylor (Mad Men, Game of Thrones, The Sopranos, Deadwood, etc.), widely regarded as



one of the all-time great TV directors, saw his debut feature film, Thor: The Dark World, open big last weekend, selling \$86 million in the U.S. over its first three days. Add to that over \$240 million abroad and this super mediocre *Thor* series evidently has some legs. Starring the babe Chris Hemsworth, ScreenTime favorites Natalie Portman, Stellan Skarsgard, Idris Elba and Tom Hiddleston, Anthony Hopkins and that girl Kat Dennings, Taylor's comic book-based production epic certainly isn't lacking in big-name talent. Look for this one to keep on bringing in the big bucks for a few more weeks.

Also at the Box: Jeff Tremaine's Bad Grandpa took the No. 2 spot at the box office last weekend, selling another \$11.3 million in the U.S., bringing the film's 17-day total to just under \$80 million. Good job, Johnny Knoxville. Free Birds, an animated film that I'm told is based on an iTunes video game of all silly things, took the No. 3 spot at the box office last weekend, selling a decent enough \$11.1 million over its second weekend and upping the flick's 10-day total to just over \$30 million. Looks maybe sort of like a cute little flick for the kiddos and, with it's Thanksgiving theme, is certainly hitting screens at the right time. Jon Turteltaub's truly terrible Last Vegas continued to do fairly well, selling another \$11 million, bringing the flick's 10-day total to \$33 million. Rounding out last weekend's U.S. Top 5 was the heavily promoted Ender's Game.

Auteur Steve McQueen's third feature, the critically acclaimed 12 Years a Slave, finally saw a wide release, playing on 1,144 screens and selling \$6.6 million, bringing the movie's so-far total to about \$17 million in the U.S. Looks good. Maybe a bit overrated, but certainly good.

New this Week: Fourteen years after writer/director Malcolm D. Lee's The Best Man was released comes sequel The Best Man Holiday, starring most of the same actors, including Taye Diggs, Terrence Howard, Sanaa Lathan, Nia Long, Morris Chestnut, Monica Calhoun and many others. Looks like a sure-thing minor hit to me. Mostly, after watching the trailer, I found it shocking how much this crew of actors still look like they did in 1999. (Bad joke: Maybe the next one will be called The Best Man Fountain of Youth.) As far as new wide releases go, that's all we get this week. Promising indies Charlie Countryman (starring Shia LaBeouf, Mads Mikkelsen, Vincent D'Onofrio, Melissa Leo and Evan Rachel Wood) and Alexander Payne's Nebraska (starring Bruce Dern and Will Forte) both open in New York City and Los Angeles before presumably seeing a wider release. Both are probably worth watching, especially if your only other option is *The Best Man Holiday*. My guess is that Thor will continue to sell a lot of tickets while Best Man finds a niche audience. And yes, I think more and more people will go see 12 Years a Slave, as it's getting a whole lot of Oscar buzz, and that makes people feel

the mood of a show. Dim lighting sets a low-energy mood. Comedy requires high energy, engagement, connection. And for Pete's sake, when you have a finale, do not dim the lights on the whole cast. Add light to spotlight, sure, but the phrase "last one out, turn off the light" should not apply to the last number of a musical.

Also, in closing, recent construction has led to allowing parking in the plaza in front of the Arts United Center. It is tacky and was difficult for cars parked there to leave in an orderly fashion. If you go see 9 to 5: The Musical, head downtown a little earlier than usual and expect to walk a block or two after you park. I suggest using the County Building garage.

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
