The Fort Lights Up

Each November, thousands of people gather in the chilly downtown streets for what has become a yearly tradition for many of them. They walk from site to site, giddy with anticipation as each attraction lights up its corner of downtown. This is when holiday magic is more alive than ever. This is the Night of Lights, which on Wednesday, November 27 kicks off HolidayFest – a season-long celebration of the Christmas spirit, family and downtown Fort Wayne.

"Many families have made it a tradition to come down for Night of Lights," said Anita Homco, who coordinates all things HolidayFest for the Downtown Improvement District. "A woman recently told me that even though she has only lived in Fort Wayne for six years, she feels like she was raised here because of this sense of tradition and the family-friendly atmosphere we provide with events like this. It makes Fort Wayne feel like home."

But it's more than that. One of the great things about HolidayFest is that you're not just an observer – you're a participant. Whether it's walking the streets of downtown during the Night of Lights, skating at Headwaters Park or caroling at the courthouse, HolidayFest invites you to become part of it.

"This event promotes community involvement and gives people a sense of pride in Fort Wayne. Plus, nearly everyone I talk to tells me they are prepared to freeze their tooshes off while they stand in line for a dog from Coney Island," Homco laughed. "That's kind of become a tradition in and of itself!"

The Downtown Improvement District works hard every year to coordinate a diverse, exciting lineup to warm the heart of even the Scroogiest. This year's schedule runs from the last week of November into January of 2014, offering flexibility around holiday parties and options for entertaining out-of-town guests.

Homco admitted that it can be difficult to choose which events to add to your list, so she offered some suggestions. "The Night of Lights is a can't miss! It hits all of the mustsee lightings and caps off with fireworks at Parkview Field, plus the HollyPop boutique shop kicks off that night as well at 127 West Wayne Street. The Festival of Trees at the Embassy and the Festival of Gingerbread at the History Center make for really great family favorites that run though the season too."

For those looking for what's new this year, the University of Saint Francis has joined HolidayFest with a lighting attraction on Berry Street, bringing the total to eight displays. They will also have a Christ Child Festival at the Performing Arts Center (formerly the Scottish Rite).

In addition to all of the HolidayFest sights, Homco emphasized the importance of buying local as part of the programming. The goal of the season-long event (as with most Downtown Improvement District events) is to get people visiting, dining and shopping in downtown Fort Wayne. The answer to that last component is the Holly Trolley Shopping Day on Saturday, November 30, from 11 a.m. to 5 p.m.

"We are so excited to bring Holly Trolley Shopping Day back again this year. This event is an excellent way to remind people that there are many great restaurants and retail locations right here in downtown," Homco said. "With more than 50 participating vendors downtown and in Wells Street Corridor, Holly Trolley Shopping Day provides not only a fun and exciting shopping experience, but it keeps those locations in mind for everyday visits after the holidays are over."

The complete list of Holly Trolley Shopping Day participants can be found on the HolidayFest website. Trolley rides are free during this day, and many businesses will offer one-day-only discounts or limited edition items. The first 250 Holly Trolley riders will receive a keepsake holiday tote bag for carrying purchases along the shopping tour. For younger yule tiders, stop by Science

There's a reason gyms are packed to capacity every January. Sure, the New Year offers an opportunity for resolutions and new beginnings, a time to start a lifestyle often postponed until the next Monday. But the biggest reason that people often feel moved to move in January is as a remedy for the ex-

cessive indulgences (and likely extra pounds) through the holiday season.

But some people don't wait until January 1 to get in shape. Some do it all year round, or at least find ways to balance the treats that offer such temptation at family gatherings and special meals. For the last eight years, many in the northeast Indiana area – more than 3,000 actually - have found a way to work off that turkey and pumpkin pie before the meal has even begun. The Galloping Gobbler run/ walk is one of the largest 4-mile runs in the country and one of a growing number organized through VEEP Races, helmed by Fort Wayne City Councilman Mitch Harper.

Harper first began organizing local races almost 20 years

ago when he rediscovered his own love of running.

"I got back into running in the mid 90s and made a pledge to myself that I would do it differently than I did in the 80s," says Harper. "Different distances, different surfaces, different people around me."

As he began to look into organizing races, the

internet was just on the verge of exploding into a cultural phenomenon, but it was there that he began to get ideas for how to proceed.

"It was on the internet that I learned about ultra-marathoning, and I started applying the same marketing principles to organizing and promoting races here that I had learned in running for political office. I saw that in North America, there were 12,500 people who had run at least one ultra-marathon in the United States and Canada, and I saw that we could tap into that market to start a local race. I learned a lot from an ultra-marathoning magazine, but most of what I learned I found online. These races wouldn't have happened without the internet."

That ultra-marathon, The Huff 50K trail run, takes place each year on the weekend

between Christmas and New Year's (and this year on December 28). With that race established, VEEP Racing was off and, well, running. This year there are nine events at various northeast Indiana trails and paths, and the Galloping Gobbler has become one of the most popular, for a variety of reasons that go beyond guilt over upcoming consumption.



"We have a lot of people who like the chance to get a run out of the way early on before they enjoy their Thanksgiving meal, and for them it's become part of their holiday tradition. Some people travel some dis-

tance to get here for the holiday, and while some people are sleeping in that day or while the food is being prepared and others feel at loose ends, they can get out of the house and get in a run."

Since Harper learned about such races on the internet, it's not surprising he's made the internet work for him ever since. He was the first in the area to institute online registration (though mail-in forms are also available for download) and finds that the website helps draw new runners to the event each year.

"A lot of people who are traveling here for the holidays will look online for an event like this and find ours and register."

Harper says the event has taken place in all kinds of weather, from rain to snow to

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
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----- Feature • Festival of Trees **Decking the Embassy Halls**

Since 1984 the Historic Embassy Theatre has been bringing the holidays to life in downtown Fort Wayne through its Festival of Trees, one of the venue's highlights and annual fundraising events. In those three decades, Opening Night has been a big part of Fort Wayne's annual Night of Lights celebration, allowing families to gather the night before Thanksgiving (this year November 27) to watch the streets at the heart of Fort Wayne, not to mention Santa and his reindeer, come to life in lights to kick off the holiday season.

After the lights come up (and people have gotten their dinner at Coney Island), there's no better place to go than the Embassy for the first night of tree gawking. Of course, for those who can't make it that night, the fun lasts through December 4, providing ample opportunity to enjoy a visit (or maybe two) to the Festival of Trees.

While there are always new treats to behold - and cherished traditions revisited at the Festival of Trees, this year's event is

being overseen through fresh eyes. Longtime Embassy marketing director Dana Berkes has moved on to new opportunities, and longtime radio personality Barb Richards, for years the program director at WAJI, has stepped to the plate to fill her shoes. With this, her first Festival of Trees, Richards has inherited a big project.

"I started here in June, and I knew this was a massive undertaking," says Richards. "It's the Embassy's largest fundraiser of the year, so my first big event was the biggest event of all. But I've planned events for years, and every one is the same - it's just the details that are different. My predecessor, Dana, left me with wonderful files, and there have only been one or two times I've had to ask about something."

But, as Richards admits, there have been "bumps in the road."

"The other day one of the maintenance crews asked about the tree stands, and I said, 'All artificial trees come with stands.' He said 'No, we use special tree stands.' Well, that would have been nice to know six weeks ago! Apparently, they use ones that provide more stability for the trees, and, fortunately, we have some people that are handy with their hands and put some together for me.

"The hardest part is that you don't know what you don't know. Buying media is even new to me. People are surprised and say, 'You've been in the media for years,' but I remind them that I was the media, so I didn't have to buy media. But this is a very kind and helpful market, and people have helped me learn as I go along, and by next year I'll



know all of this." Some of the new trees will include a 12 foot Sweetwater Sound tree, a first at the Festival at that height. "Apparently 12-foot

trees have become very popular lately. Of course, I would have to buy a new house to fit a

12-foot tree into it, but it looks beautiful in the Embassy lobby.'

Carson's department store, new to our area, will have a "Champagne Wishes" tree while another tree will provide a nod to the popular Allstate Mayhem guy. The pipe organ tree, a tribute to the Embassy's own Grande Page organ, largely responsible for helping to save the theatre from demolition, also returns, providing one of many interactive trees at the Festival.

Richards' own fascination with pirates brings a new dimension to the Storybook Tree which will tell the story of "A Pirate's Night Before Christmas," and once again all three of Fort Wayne's minor league teams the Komets, the TinCaps and the Mad Ants will have trees in the lobby. But the first tree most will see as they enter is another of Richards' favorite, The Great Gatsby tree.

One of the most popular aspects of the Festival, after the excitement of the Night of Lights premiere, is Santa Land, the annual opportunity to visit Santa Claus on the Embassy stage and make your requests for this year's haul. The Breakfast with Santa (on Friday, November 29 and Saturday, November 30) will once again feature breakfast from McDonald's (after several years' absence) and coloring books and crayons courtesy of Macy's. There's even one more perk to enjoy this year.

"For the first time, each person to visit Santa will also receive a scoop of peppermint ice cream from Edy's," says Richards. "Santa Land is just such a magical thing, with the kids meeting Santa and being surrounded by all of these beautiful trees in this incredible theatre. But people need to get their tickets soon!"

Entertainment will once again fill the Embassy stage on that Friday through Sunday (November 29-December 1), with area dance groups performing at the legendary venue, often for the first time on such a large stage. That's a draw for families in itself, but just as popular is December 3's Kids' Day (this year called Tots & Trees) where bouncy inflatables will provide an outlet for all of that holiday energy. Kingston Senior Day (December 2) will also return. As always, the public is welcome anytime during special programming.

The theme for this year's Festival of Trees is "Merry & Bright," and you can bet the animated windows and "Winter Carnival" stage decorations will reflect that cheerful focus. Also "merry and bright" will be Barb Richards as she strolls through her new wonderland and enjoys her new surroundings

"I am just so blessed to be working at a magical place like the Embassy. It's such a local treasure, and I'm really looking forward to the Festival. Everyone warns me they're long days, and I know they'll be long days, but I really look forward to it. It's a great way to show off the facility, and I'm really excited about it."

Attention to Detail

Christopher J. Murphy is one of the area's most prolific and reliable actors, directors and producers. With well over 200 productions to his credit (he lost track several years ago when his computer crashed and he lost his database) he is, perhaps, the hardest working man in Fort Wayne show business.

"I spend more hours of my week than I even want to count up working in the theatre," he says.

During the day he is the director of theater at Blackhawk Middle School, where he has been for

where he has been for 10 years, directing two Broadway-style musicals and one play every season. By night he can be found onstage or behind the scenes in one production or another almost nonstop. He is usually working on multiple projects simultaneously.

He recently finished producing ARCH's haunted tours, selecting, rehearsing and organizing the tour guides and serving as a tour guide himself. He also freelances as a direc-

tor at various community theaters, most recently First Presbyterian Theater where he directed *The Fox on the Fairway*. Just for fun, he is starring (for the third time) in *The Man Who Came to Dinner* for the University of Saint Francis while he rehearses his students in *It's a Wonderful Life* which opens a week after the USF show closes.

Then comes his next major gig, the Fort Wayne Philharmonic's Holiday Pops, which he has produced/directed for the past three years.

"I help program and stage the chorus, children's choir, four super talented Cincinnati Conservatory performers, even Santa," he says. "I have a hand in structuring, writing and staging the entire show."

One of the CCM cast members, Christine Cornish-Smith, will be choreographing the dance numbers based on general concepts from Murphy. The cast rehearses in Cincinnati with frequent communication from Murphy in Fort Wayne. "The rest of the cast definitely plays a role in it too," he says, "as we want them to show off their best skills. They work very hard to get as much of their choreography down as possible before arriving in Fort Wayne so that we can spend their time here staging the rest of the show as quickly as possible."

Following that he will produce (and narrate) two family series concerts for The Phil, bringing him to Blackhawk's

spring musical and directing *Company* at Arena Dinner Theatre. In the summer he will direct another musical at Blackhawk and will travel the country teaching at fine arts camps from Kendallville to Texas.

"I'm tired just reading this schedule!" he says.

His career would seem to leave little time for a personal life. Fortunately, he has an understanding wife. He met Emilie Henry during a production of *Peter Pan* at the Fort Wayne Civic Theatre. He was Captain Hook; she was Wendy. They stayed in contact through theater connections (he taught her younger siblings,

who were involved in theater at Blackhawk). She left Fort Wayne to attend Columbia College in Chicago, then worked professionally in regional theaters in Florida. They lost touch until she moved back to Fort Wayne in 2010.

"I sent her a random e-mail inviting her to audition for my Christmas production of *The Mystery of Edwin Drood* at Arena Dinner Theatre," he recalls. "At the very last minute, she walked through the door, gave a great

audition and was cast."

During the rehearsal process, he says, "we somehow and unexpectedly found ourselves mutually smitten."

They began dating, became engaged a year later and married the following year (a year ago December, in fact).

They had a mildly theater-inspired wedding, which included playbill-themed programs. "Our theatrical backgrounds and creativity definitely came in handy in the organization and planning of the whole thing," he says. "I very much approached it the same way I would producing a show."

They have continued to work together, both as fellow actors (she plays his long-suffering secretary in *The Man Who Came to Dinner*) and he has directed her in numerous productions (*The 39 Steps* and *Boeing-Boeing* at Arena).

"I'm lucky to have an 'in' to get such a wonderful actress to audition for me pretty regularly," he says.

His wife isn't the only actor who regularly works with him. His professionalism, organization, creativity and experience draws Fort Wayne's most talented to auditions, and he routinely wins directing and acting awards at Arena Dinner Theatre.

But for all his experience and influence, he doesn't have a theatre degree.

His interest in theater began when he

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Feature • The Wickersham Brothers At Home in the Fort

Fernando Tarango has tasted the limelight, lived around the country and even traveled around the world, but he calls Fort Wayne home. He lives in a city crowded with musicians, either rooted here and playing for fun or striving towards bigger things in their careers. Tarango wants both. He's confident Fort Wayne is just the place to live and work while building a solid career for himself and a following for his band, Fernando Tarango and the Wickersham Brothers.

Tarango's musical career began early. At age 10 he was sent to sing at the American Boychoir School in Princeton, New Jersey. Over the course of the four years he attended, Tarango traveled and sang all over the United Stated and overseas, traveling for weeks at a time in some cases.

His leap from choral performer to recording artist was not immediate, and several years passed before he discovered his talent and love for writing and performing his own music.

"In high school I wanted to do musical theater. I didn't get accepted to the musical theater program at Michigan, so I went on vocal performance and really enjoyed that," Tarango said. "It wasn't till my senior year of college that I started songwriting, and then it started creeping in and I thought that this is something that I really enjoy doing. I think I can do this."

Tarango lived in San Francisco, Ann Arbor and briefly on a cruise ship, making his living quite successfully as a musician. But in the end, Fort Wayne was his destination – not to settle down, but to branch out.

"You can really get stuff done in a community like Fort Wayne. There's enough room for opportunity and a strong network of people that support each other here, especially on the artistic level," he said. "It's been an excellent place to get rooted and try to gain some momentum."

As a full-time musician, Tarango has his hands in a plethora of musical ventures that keep him busy around the clock. He teaches voice lessons, helped develop a family band and works for The Jesters, a music and theater troupe for the developmentally disabled. He has also signed on to work in a new healing arts program at Parkview Hospital where musicians and artists will be performing and working with patients.

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"In order to do what you like, you have to do a lot of those things that you don't like – a lot of administrative work, writing up invoices, signing contracts, e-mailing people," he said. "I'm growing, which is excellent, but it's also difficult to make sure I'm leaving room to do what I want to do – song writing and practicing – each day."

Tarango got a dose of instant notoriety on a country-wide level recently when he and his band were featured in a national commercial for Old Spice. The commercial, which was shot at a gig downtown in Fort Wayne, lit up news outlets with a sense of pride for their native son.

His band is one more undertaking Tarango squeezes into his repertoire of musical ventures. The group, born out of the mutual musical interests of Tarango and bassist Cale Reese, played their first gig as a three-piece at Taste of the Arts 2012.


"I think I'm just realizing that one thing I enjoy in music is that collaborative process," he said, "making music together with people and filling a space with energy of multiple people working together to achieve something greater."

In the space of the last year, they have grown as a group by leaps and bounds, adding Brad Crossland on drums, Jason Markzon on congas and Logan Weber on sax to the mix for a more full and collaborative lineup. They were also able to lay down a full-length, self-titled album.


The band shirks genre labels and aims for variety on their debut album, which was released earlier this month. Songs slip seamlessly from smooth, crooning jazz to peppy, folk-rock inspired tunes. While Tarango calls the East L.A. sounds of the 60s his biggest inspiration, the group collaborates to explore the character of each individual song. The end result is a studied, eclectic record.

"We call it Americana jazz rock. It's not Americana, it's not jazz and it's not rock. It's got elements that are reminiscent of all three, but we drift between styles. I love music, but I don't like any one genre of music for an hour straight," Tarango said. "I'm looking for audience members that are like me, that wouldn't mind hearing a great, jazzy kind of ballad and then a fun hip-hop groove right after."



On October 19, photography enthusiasts worldwide sat in front of computers streaming live feed from the premier international award for black and white photography, the Black and White Spider Awards. Broadcast from London, the prestigious awards were selected from over 9,500 entries representing more than 75 countries. Jurors included leaders in the field from institutions such as the Tate, London, Galerie Baudoin Lebon, Paris, and Art Stage, Singapore.

As the names of accomplished artists were recognized, one artist in Fort Wayne was surprised to learn that his entry was among the most notable works. Rob Borel, a prolific Fort Wayne photographer, was recognized as a nominee for his piece titled, "Pas De Deux." The piece illustrates a "duet of gracefulness" as a ballerina dressed in a cloud of white tulle drapes her body lovingly over the back of an elephant that appears to be rolling gracefully through a setting of urban decay. The photograph doesn't make a clear statement, but rather ignites a stream of questions from the viewer. One might ask, how did they end up there? What has happened to these two? Where are they going now?

Through his journey of creating the piece, Borel learned of the abhorrent treatment elephants are subjected to, not only in circus environments but also in countries where elephants are revered. These magnificent, gentle giants are dominated by abuse in order to serve man. Borel began to question how human behavior could turn so dark. His questions led him to uncover a disturbing truth about the treatment of these animals. "Pas De Deux" offers a sense of peace and nurturing to a situation that is in reality dark and horrifying.

The balance of a delicate dancer upon a massive animal can at first be interpreted as contrast, but if one is inquisitive enough to investigate, he will quickly learn that the elephant, too, is light on its feet. Thus, the viewer is prompted to search for more similarities that might be represented in the work.

Borel's artistic pieces generate more questions than answers. He himself is an artist who shoots out questions more than explanations during a conversation. When Borel hears a comment describing his work as being original, his brain reacts by posing a question in return.

"How do you know when a work is original? Everyone is influenced by what they have seen and the work of others. But your eyes aren't going to see the work in the same way as the next person.'

Influenced by artists such as Man Ray, Edward Weston and Irving Penn, Borel's work follows the same vein of curiosity as early surrealist work. Borel often shoots ordinary objects from unusual perspectives or sets objects in curious combinations. One can only assume that his creative process

is filled with a continuous internal dialogue of inquiry streaming with an endless line of questions.

"Why is that isolated wall standing in a field?" Borel asked of a concrete structure that stood alongside I69 behind the old Seyfert's potato chip factory. (The orphaned wall happened to be a remnant from an abandoned hotel construction project.) "What if I put a couch in front of that wall and take a photograph?" His work asks viewers to consider the ordinary with fascination and to also consider

"what if" even a small part of ordinary life were to change.

While many people continue to condemn Fort Wayne for being a cultural wasteland void of artistic expression, Borel looks for inspiration in places that many of us pass dozens, even hundreds, of times. He finds tiny compositions that, when put to print, are intriguing and certainly worth a few moments of sustained staring and even pondering. He has photographed countless shots of urban decay throughout our city - not with the intent to throw up his arms in disgust, but rather to say simply, this exists; take a moment to stop and admire the crumbling concrete and brick.

Borel has created works that grip the viewer and wrap him in tension. He uses the nooks and corners of the main floor of his apartment building for background settings and has even ventured down to the basement where the boilers and furnaces live to shoot some unusual scenes. He has taken bits of the vacated Byron Health Center and created pieces heavy with anxiety that echo a hollow chill, even after leaving the viewer's eye.

His artistic work tends to lean toward the dark side.

"I'm not consumed by the dark image, but I'm not afraid of it," he says. Somehow, he is able to create pieces to which a viewer may instinctively comment, "This should scare the crap out of me," but for some reason the images allow one to jump in and explore without running away screaming in terror. He presents images as if they were cut from a dream and veiled by a thin shield of mystery that tempts the viewer to look

fear straight in the face.

Not all of Borel's work is quite so mysterious or tense. Most of his camera career revolves around editorial, commercial or industrial work. He takes photographs of workers in action as well as functioning industrial equipment. Many area industries pepper their annual reports and advertising media with Borel's work. He currently serves as the exclusive photographer for Northern Indiana Lakes Magazine where he shoots interiors and exteriors of multi-million dollar homes. Even on these assignments where the end goal may seem mundane for an artist, Borel's brain still rolls out questions.

"How are these things made?" he asked of some locally produced tools. "Where did that come from?" he wondered about a piece of massive machinery. Questions of the ordinary world lead him back to his own world where art gives him the freedom to express whatever he so chooses.

Borel chose to pick up a camera when he was still in high school. As a student

Cambodia Highball **Odd Geometry**

In some alternate universe singer/songwriter/writer J. Hubner is a mid-level improvisational jazz musician who lives in outer Queens and makes ends meet by running a used book stand in the Lower East Side. He's a loner and a grump who has a gigantic beard and a cult following and keeps a flask nearby. He



stays up all night self-recording album after album, practically giving them away to fans before quickly moving on to his next sound. His nemesis is John Lurie, and his rent is past due. The actual J. Hubner lives in some small Indiana town, has a handful of kids and a wife, works a day job and plays rock music on the weekends. If he has a beard, it's not very bushy, and if he's a grump, you wouldn't know it. He drinks craft beer out of bottles, obsessively collects records and writes about music for several publications, including this one. Similar to Bizarro J. Hubner, Real J. Hubner is constantly recording new music, and he also practically gives that music away before moving onto his next project.

By now, if you at least sort of keep up with indie rock outsiders, you've probably heard at least one of Hubner's records. Some of them are released under the moniker sunnydaymassacre, and some of them are released under the moniker goodbyewave. Earlier this year Hubner released a solo album under the name J. Hubner. Now we finally have Cambodia Highball, Hubner's latest project, started as a way to explore his more experimental side. Cambodia Highball's debut record, the epic Odd Geometry, is out now, released by J. Hubner himself, DIY style. When asked about the project, Hubner had much to say: "I wanted to makes lots of noise and pretend I was Can, electric Miles, Explosions in the Sky or Klaus Dinger. Over the last several years I had begun to explore experimental and instrumental music as a fan and wanted to explore it as a musician.

After recording a few Cambodia Highball tracks alone in his basement a few years ago, Hubner lost track of the project. Then, earlier this year, he was approached by one of his oldest friends, Shane Darin Page, about recording some experimental music. The idea was to loosely record some shoegaze-, noise-rock- and art-rockinspired improvisational jams. The duo decided to get together for three hours at a time on Saturday afternoons and more or less hit a record button and see what happens – one man on the drums and the other on guitar, then switch, adding details later. Start with a simple idea and see where it leads. Hubner would maybe scratch down a few lyrics as Page worked on a baseline. The inspiration, as we can definitely hear around the 10-minute mark of "On Brighter Days (She Sings)," was to tap into the duo's love for electric Miles Davis albums like In a Silent Way and Bitches Brew.

The result is a four-cut double album that clocks in at about 73-minutes. It's a mostly instrumental post-rock album that features a very heavy 70s jazz influence. The four tracks are all cut up into movements that transition nicely, adding up to the equivalent of nine or 10 lengthy songs altogether. At times the music is sparse and quietly detailed, and at other times it's groove-and riff-driven, almost reminding of one of Trey Anastasio's jazzy side projects. We hear

Guitarist Randy Rhoads started this band when he was just 17. When he enlisted lead singer Kevin Du-Brow, Quiet Riot became one of the best bands on Sunset Strip.

In the late 70s they released this, their second record to decent sales

overseas and played with Van Halen during their ascent as an L.A band. Although the 1983 album Metal Health made them a household name, these early releases were formidable metal albums that were overlooked in the United States due to their Japan-only release.

"Slick Black Cadillac" (which also appeared on Metal Health) starts side one with the confident guitars layered behind DuBrow's great vocals. "You Drive Me Crazy" slows it down a bit before the band takes on the Small Faces classic "Afterglow." "Eye For An Eye" has some great hooks, and, oddly enough, reminds me of Big Star, one of my favorite bands. "Trouble" also has that late 70s hard-rock vibe (i.e. Sweet, UFO) and features Rhoads and his amazing talents on the electric guitar. "Inside You" sounds more like REO Speedwagon from the same era, or even a harder version of Cheap Trick with the harmony and backing vocals. The record closes with "We've Got The Magic," a very poppy track that I believe was a template for some of the bands like Loverboy and Bon Jovi that broke out during the next decade.

It's a pretty good record, largely due to Rhoads, who would leave Quiet Riot after this release and join up with Ozzy Osbourne's new band. He died at the age of 25 in a plane crash in 1982. DuBrow died of a cocaine overdose in 2007, just months after their 11th album, Rehab, was released.

Fun Fact: Metal Health has sold over 6 million copies; their other 10 albums sold less than 3 million combined. (Dennis Donahue)

bit's of Can's Tago Mago, Loose Fur's Loose Fur, Sonic Youth's Murray Street, Miles' 70s stuff and much more. The record is, as Hubner himself says, "spontaneity incarnate ... the total opposite of what I've done musically up to this point ... recording a 15-minute song based on a half hour field recording of a rain storm and kids playing doesn't jive well [when making pop songs], but with Cambodia Highball, that sort of thing is encouraged."

To say that *Odd Geometry* is my favorite thing Hubner has done to date would be a massive understatement. While I do like his Beatles- and Wilco-inspired pop records just fine, I found myself obsessing over Odd Geometry. Sure, a lot of rock n' roll guys have tapped into Miles and Can and Faust and Neu!, but not like this. Odd Geometry, to me, sounds like the kind of record Loose Fur would make if they got drunk for a week and finally decided that they didn't care if they disappointed their fans. It also sounds like a record that a fan of 70s era experimental music would love dearly. That's quite an accomplishment. (Greg W. Locke)

When I was only nine months old and my musical life consisted of nursery rhymes and shaking my rattle as if I were in a street-corner mariachi band, far more talented performers were getting ready for one of their final shows. Thanksgiving Day, November 25, 1976, at the Winterland Ballroom in San Francisco, the rock group The Band hit the stage for their "farewell concert appearance."

The idea for this last show came about earlier that year when pianist Richard Manuel was seriously injured in a boating accident. After canceling tour dates, guitarist/vocalist Robbie Robertson urged the other members to retire from the road and perhaps become a studio-only band. *The Last Waltz* was the title given for this special night which also featured many special guests The Band, including Bob Dylan, Neil Young, Paul Butterfield, Ringo Starr, Emmylou Harris, Ronnie Hawkins, Dr. John, Joni Mitchell, Van Morrison, Muddy Waters, Ronnie Wood, Neil Diamond, Bobby Charles, The Staple Singers and Eric Clapton.

With that kind of musical talent on stage, one would hope that someone was filming. Fortunately, filmmaker Martin Scorsese was thinking the same thing, and he captured this remarkable event and released the film of the same name in 1978. For those of you keeping track, I was only two years old at the time. The film is still hailed by many as one of the greatest concert films ever made.

On Saturday, November 30 at 8 p.m., C2G Music Hall will take us back to that special evening in 1976 with Such a Night: Recreating the Music of The Last Waltz. This idea came about after The Band's drummer, Levon Helm, passed away in 2012 and a small



group of Indianapolis musicians got together to honor his legacy. As word continued to spread, the group became larger, and it was decided to recreate The Band's final show, The Last Waltz. Such a Night, which got its name from the Dr. John tune that appeared in the film, is comprised of Indy musicians Bill Mallers, Tad Armstrong, David England and Wade Parish along with Johnny Socko alums Eric Evans, Matt Wilson, Josh Silbert and Charlie Krone. Though these guys have only performed a handful of gigs so far, they are gaining some rave reviews.

Here's the kicker, the C2G performance will also feature some of our locals lending a hand, including Dave Todoran as Bob Dylan & Paul Butterfield, Mitch Frazier as Ronnie Hawkins, Lee Miles as Neil Young, Marnée as Joni Mitchell, G Money as Muddy Waters, Hollie Shelton as Emmylou Harris, Johnny Mendez as Neil Diamond and Jake Bunnell as Eric Clapton.

Tickets are \$15 in advance and \$20 day of and are available at C2G, all three Wooden Nickels, Neat Neat Neat and www.brownpapertickets.com. A portion of the proceeds that evening will go to a local food bank, so everyone is encouraged to bring a canned good. This indeed is going to be a night to remember. See you there!



Central for the 15th annual Festival of Trains to watch the model trains zip around the tracks, head over to the Allen County Public Library to make a no-sew fleece scarf or visit Santa's Workshop at the Fort Wayne Parks and Recreation Community Center to make crafts.

And we would be remiss if we didn't mention Erin's House Lights of Love Memorial at Parkview Field. Many people look forward to this special event as a way to publicly honor those they've lost. Attendees can purchase personalized, lighted candles that will be on display near the center field amphitheater in addition to personal messages and photos of loved ones on the TinCaps video board, if they so wish. The Lights of Love Memorial runs 5-8 p.m. each nightfrom November 21-30 with the exception of Thanksgiving. All funds raised from this event go back to Erin's House for Grieving Children which provides grief support services for children, teens and families coping with the death of a loved one.

fog, but in 16 years of planning races he has yet to have one canceled for weather. One event did prove challenging for the Thanksgiving race, which runs through the St. Francis campus and nearby Lindenwood cemetery, but ultimately provided one of Harper's fondest memories. The death of Kevin Pape, a local staff sergeant in the Army's 1st Ranger Battalion, was killed in Afghanistan in November 2010, and his funeral was set to take place the day of the Thanksgiving Galloping Gobbler, which meant runners would be moving through the area only hours before the burial.

"I talked to the runners and explained to them what was happening, and I told them that I had always been impressed with the respect runners had shown when they ran through Lindenwood. And that day, all you could hear was the sound of footfalls as they silently ran through the cemetery. I will never forget that."

Since then the family of Pape has continued to be involved in the race, and his memory is honored with a T-shirt available for order through Facebook.

This year's Galloping Gobbler includes two events: the four-mile walk/run and a 15K (9.2 miles) course which will run along the Towpath Trail to Rockhill Park before finishing at St. Francis as the four-miler does. The 15K begins at 8 a.m. while the shorter race begins at 8:30. Shuttle trolleys will begin transporting the runners to the 15K around 7 a.m.

Adding to the fun of the occasion is the holiday spirit which sometimes manifests itself in turkey hats and other costumes which bring some levity to the effort of running. And while now there are a variety of running events in the Fort Wayne and Allen County area (like Fort4Fitness each September), Harper continues to bring new fitness challenges to his VEEP Races each year.

"We have nine different events this year. We're bringing the triathlon back this year in May. We have three events during a time when very few are planning such things right at the end of the year: the Galloping Gobbler on Thanksgiving, the Gingerbread Pursuit in December and the 50K at the end of the year. Those three events collectively attract over 5,000 runners."

The Galloping Gobbler also helps raise funds for various programs, including St. Francis's Girls on the Run athletic initiative. For more information about the races, visit VEEP at www.veepraces.com. Journey tour the U.S. again next summer, this time joining forces with another legendary group, the **Steve Miller Band**. The tour starts in mid May and winds around for a month until it heads to Cincinnati June 25, Noblesville June 28, Cleveland July 8, De-



troit July 9 and Chicago July 12. Tower of Power will open the shows so get there early.

Melodic Rock Fest 4 will be held at the H.O.M.E. Bar in Chicago October 3-5. The concept of bringing some of the biggest names in melodic rock together in one location in the United States was on life support after the first two inceptions garnered less than enthusiastic response. The third festival was held at H.O.M.E. Bar and was a full success. I know you weren't there, so I'll have to tell you that you missed an incredible couple of nights of rock music from bands that hardly ever play in North America. And H.O.M.E. Bar is, quite honestly, the best small music venue I have ever been in, and I have been in more than my share over the years. With ample parking, a full bar, an awesome menu and the stage in a separate room in the back, this place is amazing. It's clean, has great acoustics and – holy smoke, here's a new concept – they actually have places available to sit if you need to take a break from the mosh pit for a while. I can't wait to go back. Tickets for MRF 4 will go on sale early next year.

As I reported a few weeks ago, **Boston** have a new album, *Life, Love & Hope*, coming out later this year. There should be no reason to think the band will update their sound to fit into current music trends because bandleader **Tom Scholz** admitted recently that he has no idea what those current trends would be. In speaking with MusicRadar, Scholz was asked his opinion on other guitarists like **U2's The Edge** and **Andy Summers** of **The Police**. Scholz revealed he had no idea who they were. "I don't mean to be disrespectful," he told the online magazine, "but I don't listen to any other music — not since about 1974. The only times when I'll hear other music will be at the ice-skating rink or the gym — you know, if I go out and somebody's playing something. I don't listen to the radio in the car, and I do that because I don't want to be influenced." Hear it for yourself when *Life Love & Hope* is released December 3.

Booking independently, the Vogue in Indianapolis has attracted some great acts over the years. I've seen many, many shows there and I can testify that it's a great place to watch a concert. The venue has now joined the House of Blues family and will enjoy the booking power of a huge conglomerate in the future. Expect a change from more independent DIY bands to highly marketable mainstream bands that will pack the place on a nightly basis. Is that a bad thing? No, not necessarily, but as the number of venues who are allowed to act independently in booking continues to dwindle, the opportunities for "discovering" new and exciting bands continue to become fewer as well.

How I Learned That Lou Reed Was a True Gentleman

I miss Lou Reed. I was shocked when I heard the news that he had died, even though he was no spring chicken, and it's actually kind of a miracle that he lived as long as he did. For the first few days, I just went around singing "bum, bum, bum, satellite of love" over and over hoping the sadness would pass.

The New York Times did what it does best and published a long and lovely obituary that did not sugar coat his orneriness. Michiko Kakutani wrote a splendid piece about Lou being part of the fabric of New York City. And if you jump online, there are many people reminiscing. Many remembering what a cranky guy or indifferent – and sometimes way out of tune – performer he could be. When I saw him perform, he was great.

And the Lou Reed I worked for, ever so briefly, was a total gentleman. For a few years I worked for an artist who sometimes directed music videos. One of my tasks was finding us work. What I mostly did was play the bad cop and say "no" to the less interesting offers that came our way. I spent more time watching the release charts and trying to get us gigs with artists I liked.

Lou Reed was on that list. He's not the kind of guy you think of being in a music video, so I doubted I'd ever get the chance. But when he released *Magic and Loss*, he needed a video to go with the single. The whole record is about death. He had lost two friends and wrote this record to help him get through the grief.

The song "What's Good" was to be the first single, and it did go to No. 1. It is a bouncy tune, partly playful and partly mournful. The artist I worked for, Matt Mahurin, works with a dark palate. I think that appealed to Lou. Also, we had done the video for The Cowboy Junkies' version of "Sweet Jane,"



and Lou liked it.

I was thrilled when we got the gig. My job for this video was shopping for the props we would use. The song juxtaposes lots of odd items (a mayonnaise sundae, rain that falls up) so there was a lot of shopping to do. And the budget wasn't very big.

The oddest lyric that Matt really wanted to put into pictures is "Life's like Sanskrit read to a pony." Renting a pony isn't cheap, but you can get just about anything in New York.

Matt wanted the man reading to the pony to be wearing something that looked lush, like a king might wear. What I couldn't find in any prop shop was the kind of garment Matt wanted. I brought him Polaroid after Polaroid of possible rentals, and he rejected them all. Only one even came close, and it was going to cost nearly a thousand bucks to rent.

I should mention at this point that, though I am a big Lou Reed fan, my brother Rich is an even bigger fan. Matt said I could hire him for a few days as a production assistant so he could come to the set. Rich skipped a little school and got on a train to come to New York.

Not only was it great to know my brother would be on the set, his coming solved my wardrobe dilemma. I called our church and our kind and helpful drama director let Rich bring one of the costumes worn by the Wise Men at Christmas. It worked perfectly. In the video, Rich is the guy read-

ing Sanskrit to a pony.

Making a music video is kind of a big bore for the artist. You are lip-synching to take after take of your song, and then there is a lot of sitting around. Some artists get rude (Lyle Lovett) or need lots of babysitting (Danny Elfman). But Lou was cool. He was the only artist I worked with who came to the shoot on a motorcycle. He was the only star who wanted cue cards with all the lyrics written on them large. He didn't have a posse with him. No record executives. He was quiet and professional and interested in what we were going to shoot to accompany his performance.

I don't get star-struck often, but it was exciting just to be in the same room with him. He was so Lou – jeans, leather jacket, dark glasses. Standing right in front of me was the leader of the Velvet Underground. The guy that could write something as sweet as "I'll Be Your Mirror" and as raunchy as "Walk on the Wild Side" and as crazed as "Heroin."

The joke that Brian Eno makes is that, though hardly anyone bought the Velvet's records, everyone who did started a band. I didn't start a band, but you only have to see the yellow banana on the album cover to want to hear what's inside.

There just isn't anyone like him, and now he's gone. There are lots of great clips out there. Blond Lou live in Paris in the 70s is pretty great. My favorite tribute to the Velvet Underground is Jonathan Richman's song "Velvet Underground." You can find various versions online. "They were wild like the USA / A mystery band in a New York way / Rock and roll but not like the rest / And to me, America at its best / How in the world were they making that sound? / Velvet Underground!" And that's just the first verse. *ckdexterhaven@earthlink.net*

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
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Arnold & Conan's Comeback Unlikely

The Savage Sword of Conan, Volume 14,. Dark Horse Books, 2013

Arnold Schwarzenegger is putting a lot of effort into restarting his film career, but so far he's not having much luck. His recent solo vehicle, The Last Stand, failed to make an impression at the box office, and his recent team-up with Sylvester Stallone in The Escape Plan demonstrated that neither he nor Stallone is still able to trade solely on his 1980s superstardom. Schwarzenegger's last hope is to cash in on the iconic characters he portrayed in his most successful films, and he's planning to do just that in a big way in the near future. Sequels are in the works that try to resurrect Arnold's sci-fi fame (The Terminator), his comedic success (Twins), and his muscle-bound, smash-everything-in-hispath adventure flicks (Conan the Barbarian). It's this last project that perhaps faces the biggest challenge in the marketplace.

As Marvel superheroes go, Conan was never one of the biggest names. He was an anti-hero, which made him difficult to like; he was self-centered and anti-intellectual. He was only looking out for himself, and if he helped anyone else out, it was grudgingly and only because smashing the bad guys was in his own self-interest. But unlike Marvel's other small-brained bad-guy smasher, the Hulk, Conan existed in his own universe and didn't cross paths with more charismatic characters that would give him mainstream appeal.

The Savage Sword of Conan was not your typical Marvel title. It was a "magazine" rather than a comic book, with a hefty \$2 price tag and a glossy cover featuring



painted art of a higher quality than that of a run-of-the-mill comic. Its intricately penciled interior art was dense, its stories fleshed out with a surprising amount of text considering that its protagonist was a warrior who preferred action to words. The character of the book is very much in line with Conan's origin in the stories of Robert E. Howard, stories that fit well into the wordy and lurid pages of Weird Tales magazine and SAVAGE SWORD pulp paperbacks.

There was always something vaguely unsavory about the Conan books; their unapologetic pulpiness was made visually undeniable in their lavishly painted cover art which, along with the bulging muscles of the barbarian, also usually featured nearly naked, voluptuous women. The magazine seemed as if it would be more at home on the top shelf of the rack at the newsstand alongside Playboy and Penthouse instead of on the bottom shelf beside Spider-Man and Superman comic books.

This collection of Savage Sword titles dates from the late 80s, long after the initial issues published by Curtis Magazine. By this time Schwarzenegger had already brought Conan to the big screen, in 1982's Conan the Barbarian and 1984's Conan the Destroyer, and those films had simplified the Conan lore so that it fit more easily into the Reagan-era American philosophy of carrying a big sword and being willing to use it. Consequently, Conan was a well-known character at this point, but there was a disconnect between the way he was portrayed in print and the way the mainstream audience encountered him on film.

The stories in the collection feel surprisingly contemporary in some ways, with their unrestrained reliance on graphic violence. but in their irony-free, mostly humorless plots and characterization, they feel

dated. And although the over-sexed cover art of each issue is included in the collection, it's reproduced in black-and-white, robbing it of most of its appeal.

Of the two characters with which Schwarzenegger is most readily identified, Conan is by far the less popular, and it's by no means a given that moviegoers have been holding their breaths for the last 30 years. waiting for the character to

come back to the screen. If anything, a collection like this makes it clear how unlikely it was that Conan ever became a successful mainstream film character in the first place. If the resurrection of Conan doesn't work out for Arnold, however, he still has the Terminator to fall back on. If that doesn't work, Schwarzenegger may have to finally admit that his film career won't be back.

was a toddler. "When my parents divorced and my mother went back to work," he explains, "I spent my days with my grandparents. With no other kids around with whom to play, role-playing - running my own little store or restaurant out of grandma's kitchen - was my escape, my entertainment, and my fun."

He parlayed that interest into theater when he was a middle schooler at Blackhawk where he now teaches. "[Our theater program is] very advanced for a middle school," he says. "Elaine Nickell-Fabyanic ran the program when I was a student, and she first inspired and taught me my craft. I am honored to carry on that tradition and continue teaching these young artists the art of theater."

But he was the first in his family to perform onstage. However, he says, "I come from a very funny family, and I learned at their feet. My maternal grandfather, in par-

ticular, was what I call a great 'living room entertainer.'

Directing happened by accident for Murphy. As a high school student at Snider, he was in an acting class that led a children's theater troupe. They voted on one student to be the director, but that person lacked the necessary leadership skills. "I just kind of naturally filled the void," he says. "I didn't try to take over - I didn't even want to take over. It just seemed that my skill set suited me to do so."

He says it not only allowed him to use the best parts of his left and right brains, but it appealed to his "control freak nature." But most of all, he says, "there is nothing I find more satisfying than collaborating and giving a really great actor the tools and the environment in which to do their thing and shine."

Not content to simply direct, Murphy found himself asked to produce as well. This allows him control and final say of all aspects of the production, including staff, sets, costumes, casting and so on.

Murphy credits his attention to detail for his success both as an actor and as a producer/director. "I really believe that the devil is in the details and that those little elements of creating a character - a tiny flick of the hand, or selecting a costume, just the right cufflinks, or designing a set (putting that knickknack at just the right angle) - are what make an audience believe in what they are seeing.

He says the audience may only be subconsciously aware of these details, but they add to the realism of the production.

On the flip side, his attention to every detail and his meticulous perfectionism can lead to frustration, both for him and those working with him.

But that's a small price to pay to achieve consistently great art.

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Tarango's excitement and pride in the work his band has put into their album is overshadowed only by excitement at the possibilities his future holds in the city he cares so much about.

"I think we have something like 14 percent of the U.S. population living within 250 miles of Fort Wayne," he said, "so it's very possible to make a living on an independent level, writing music and performing here."

Working towards his master's degree and as a full-time musician while running a band is a tall order for Tarango to fill, but his work is an inspiration to those around him. As this city endeavors to expand in enterprise, culture and allure, it takes people like

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Tarango and the Wickersham Brothers who are willing to tie their talents to their home to make it happen.

"I don't want to be just a songwriter and just a band. I want to play and produce with all the talent here in Fort Wayne. I really want to reach the Midwest with my music and performance."

Tops at the Box: Marvel's *Thor: The Dark Whatever* once again took the No. 1 spot at the U.S. box office last weekend, beating out a bunch of



nonthreatening competition. The movie sold another \$38 million over a stormy weekend, upping its 10-day total to \$147 million in the U.S. and \$479 million worldwide. This means, of course, that there will be a third *Thor* flick. Which means that Natalie Portman will now be the female lead in two very profitable, very mediocre trilogies. Something to be proud of? Also at the Box: Malcolm D. Lee's The Best Man Holiday opened last weekend at No. 2, selling just over \$30 million over its first weekend. Some are calling 2013 the Year of the Black Feature Film. Between potential Best Picture nominees 12 Years a Slave and the The Butler, the excellent though little seen Blue Caprice (one of my favorites so far this year), Spike Lee's Kickstarter campaign (and his upcoming Oldboy remake), Gimme the Loot, Welcome to Pine Hill, Fruitvale Station, Mandela: Long Walk to Freedom, Blackfish (just kiddin'), the upcoming Black Nativity (not just kiddin') and now the box office success of The Best Man Holiday, it's a theory that's hard to argue against.
