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Pops Goes the Season

Each holiday season brings the warmth and comfort of tradition. Begin with the feasts and family of Thanksgiving, then onto the madness of Black Friday crowds. Sprinkle in a dash of holiday festivals and the increasing likelihood that the weather prediction will include snowflakes, and the recipe for holiday cheer is almost complete.

But, stop for a moment and think about the one constant that pops up in each and every piece of the holiday season. It's the holiday music and impromptu singalongs that are arguably the best part of every holiday task and treat.

Once the tree and hearth have been decorated and the gifts of the season wrapped, it's time to plan for a little family holiday entertainment. Enter the Fort Wayne Philharmonic's beloved Holiday Pops shows, which have been bringing holiday cheer for decades to nearly 8.000 northeast Indiana residents each year. What keeps those families and friends coming back year after year to The Phil holiday shows?

"We have crowd favorites and Fort Wayne traditions balanced by new additions to the show," said J.L. Nave, president and CEO of The Fort Wayne Philharmonic. "I can't imagine the concert not having 'Sleigh Ride' or the Christmas sing-along." That balance of fresh and new with traditional favorites must be the secret recipe to the Holiday Pops success.

Joining the show for 2013 will be the Philharmonic's associate conductor, Sameer Patel, in his third season with Fort Wayne's orchestra. The Phil Chorus and Fort Wayne Children's Choir also will squeeze onto the Embassy's Broadway-scaled stage to help make holiday memories for every audience member, young and old alike.

Returning for 2013, Kelsey Crimson, Nathaniel Irvin, Blaine Krauss and Christine Cornish Smith, all vocalists and performers from the Cincinnati Collect-Conservatory of Music will again join the Fort Wayne Philharmonic's holiday show.

When asked why bring the same performers back for a second year in a row, Nave said, "The Cincinnati College-Conservatory of Music has the top musical theater program in the country. Many of the "kids" we include in our show can be found on the Broadway stage just a few years later. They

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bring such energy and talent to the singing/dancing/acting part of our show."

Of course, it isn't a holiday concert without a full range of beloved holiday music, and this year's show is no different. Musical selections for Holiday Pops include favorites like "Let It Snow," "Baby It's Cold Outside" and "O, Come All Ye Faithful." The concert also will feature "The Prayer" from the major motion picture *The Polar Express* and the "Hallelujah Chorus" from Handel's *Messiah*.

"Each year we add in something we've never done before or haven't included in several years. Because we have built up a trust with our audience over the last several years, people know they will see an incredible, quality and fun holiday program every time they come," said Nave.

The Phil will feature six concerts in the 2013 holiday performance schedule at the Embassy Theatre.

"Several years ago, we added a fifth per-

formance and saw our overall attendance increase for Holiday Pops," said Nave. "We are adding a sixth show (a Saturday matinee) to give even more opportunities for people to experience Holiday Pops this year."

Most of the cost for Holiday Pops is in the production and rehearsal, so adding the sixth performance is only a little bit more expensive, but it gives several ousand additional people the opportunity

thousand additional people the opportunity to experience the magic of Holiday Pops.

Although there will be six opportunities to attend Holiday Pops, the Fort Wayne Ballet will only be seen at performances on the weekend of Dec. 20 and 21. Fort Wayne's pointy-toed dancers will bring the beauty of artistic dance to selections of Tchaikovsky's *The Nutcracker*. The Phil also performs concerts in seven communities throughout the region in a tireless effort to meet its continuing mission to inspire and foster a lifelong love of classical music through performance and education.

Thinking about going to the show? Be sure to get tickets early for great seats. So, press your Christmas best, shine those shoes and practice caroling with the neighbors before attending one of the six Fort Wayne Philharmonic Holiday Pops performances. Regardless of whether you're an alto or soprano, this year's show is sure to be a holiday treat come true.

s anyone who has lost anyone knows, the holidays can be bittersweet. We have much to be thankful for, most of us, and much to celebrate during a season that promises good tidings and joy. At the same time, this is a time of year when we most feel – most of us – those holes in our hearts that were once occupied by loved ones.

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

Missed Like a Heart Attack

As the sun was setting on downtown Fort Wayne on December 31, 2012, J. Robert Shimer II – known to most as simply J.R. – was murdered while working at Antiques on Broadway. It's theorized that Shimer was the victim of a robbery gone bad. What's certain is that the local artist's life was snuffed out prematurely.

Shimer had made a name for himself over the decades as an artist whose talent spanned multiple mediums from mirrors to paintings to his famed envelopes. More than 100 of these envelopes will be part of Artlink's exhibition Expressions of Love and Loss, opening December 13. The exhibit features artwork by 17 artists using various media including mixed media, jewelry, watercolor, photography and oil painting. The theme, of course, is commemorating a lost loved

The Love and Loss exhibition will be displayed in one part of the Artlink gallery. Another part of the gallery will show the Winners from the 9th Regional exhibit which features the photography work of Steven Anselm, printmaking work by Art Cislo and ceramic works by Kimberly Rorick. The Betty Fishman Gallery hosts the third exhibit which features abstract works by Linda Binek who will give demonstrations at the opening reception.

The Love and Loss exhibition is the first time Shimer's work will be on display in an organized gallery setting, thanks in large part to Vicky Hamilton, Shimer's long-time friend. Hamilton grew up in the Fort Wayne area, working for Apple Records and Three Rivers Review, writing concert and album reviews. She met Shimer in art school and formed a bond that transcended the decades and geography. This exhibit will be the first time she has visited Fort Wayne in 15 years.

"I met J.R. when I was 17 or 18, so I knew him almost all my life. He had a way with words that was incredible. In my party days, there was no one I'd rather party with than J.R. He influenced me art-wise and in my young music life," recalled Hamilton. "I didn't even know who Andy Warhol was until I met J.R. Andy Warhol is who I kind of aspire to be now, as a rock manager and artist."

Hamilton now lives in Los Angeles where she manages several bands and artists and continues to write. She notably managed

pened to him anyway in Fort Wayne," lamented Hamilton.

Rob Pargeon, another lifelong friend of Shimer's, was also shocked to learn of the murder.

"It was like getting hit in the stomach. It was New Year's Eve, and I was thinking about what I was going to do for the night when I turned on the news and found out what happened," Pargeon remembered. "We met as juniors in high school, and we were always on the same wavelength - even from the beginning. He was the best man in my wedding. I could read every expression on his face; I knew him that well. We had our own unique culture. So to lose a friend of 42 years with whom you've shared most of your life experiences, that leaves a significant hole in your life."

He told me about how they would go to a Hall's restaurant and drink coffee into the wee hours of the morning. As they sat and chatted, Par-

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
the early careers of Guns N' Roses, Poison and Faster Pussycat, in addition to serving as a management consultant for Mötley Crüe and Stryper.

"J.R. opened my eyes to a culture that I didn't even know existed outside of Fort Wayne, which inspired me to reach for more. He was a one-of-a-kind type guy, and he didn't get the attention he deserved while he was alive. I tried to get him to move to L.A., but he said he'd either get addicted to drugs or get murdered. I'm shocked that that hap-

geon said Shimer would draw on napkins. This was around the time Shimer was enrolled in art school with Hamilton.

"J.R. kind of got into envelopes from drawing on those napkins — and those envelopes were his thing for the past 35 years or so. He could sit down and work on an envelope for a couple of days. Some of them are really good. Some of them aren't so good," Pargeon laughed. He described Shimer's

The Axeman of the Season

Gary Hoey knows a few things about being persistent. No one handed him a twodecade-plus-long music career as a gift, and

in fact, there were plenty of obstacles standing in the way of his success as a guitarist. But now, more than 25 years after he got the professional music ball rolling, Hoey is still here, still playing and working hard.

In the beginning, though, it was all about being stubborn. As a teenager in Boston, Hoey was stubbornly dedicated to music, even if it meant diverting his attention from everything else. He'd spend his time practicing instead of going to class, giving guitar lessons and playing in clubs instead of getting a nonmusical job.

But although he wasn't academically focused, he understood the value of an education - at least when it came to music. One of the most respected music schools in the country, the Berklee College of Music, was right in his backyard, and if he wasn't destined to be a student there, he could at least try to benefit from the local talent in some other way - so he hung around the school, making connections and trying to get lessons from Berklee-caliber guitarists.

His persistence paid off in 1987, although the break he

got probably didn't seem like all that much of a break at first glance. Ozzy Osbourne was in town, looking for a new guitarist, and Hoey managed to get his demo tape into Ozzy's hands. Ozzy was impressed enough to fly Hoey to L.A. for an audition. Unfortunately for Hoey, Zakk Wylde also sent Ozzy a demo, and Wylde got the gig. It was a break that started Wylde on a big-time career track, and it could have been a dispiriting brick wall for Hoey.

But Ozzy liked Hoey's style a lot, and he encouraged Hoey to move to L.A. and pursue a career there. Hoey packed up all his stuff, scraped together all the money he'd saved from his teaching gigs and headed to California. At the time it seemed like being a virtuoso rock guitarist in California was a great position to be in; Steve Vai was getting headlines and radio hits for his work with David Lee Roth, and Joe Satriani was getting on the charts with his album Surfing with the Alien. Hoey came into this musical environment in the late 80s, and the future

looked potentially rosy. And then Nirvana happened. Suddenly grunge was the name of the game, and grun-

ge fans weren't particularly interested in technically proficient guitarists. Hoey's first album, 1992's *Heavy Bones*, was released by Warner Bros., and it left Hoey and the label a million dollars in debt. Not to be deterred, of

course, Hoey talked the label into letting him do a second album on a shoestring budget, and 1993's Animal Instinct produced a Top 5 hit, a cover of Focus' "Hocus Pocus."

From there Hoey has surged onward. Nineteen albums later he's still rocking, but he's also branching out a little. His latest album, Deja Blues, is, as the title suggests, a departure from the styles - rock and surf, primarily – that he has been pursuing to this

"This is an album of original blues songs I've wanted to record for a long time," he says. "The blues has always been near and dear to my heart. I have so much respect for it. When I'm recording a blues song, it's a five-minute journey, and you can't take a breath; you can't keep punching in the recording button to fix stuff or it loses the vibe.

> He's also been giving back some of what his perseverance has earned him. He's been involved with the Rock

> and Roll Fantasy Camp, a project designed to encourage aspiring guitarists; at this year's camp, Hoey played alongside Johnny Winter, Leslie West, Robben Ford and Yngwie Malmsteen, among

> And when he can, he uses his music to help others persevere. When a tornado struck Washington, Illinois, early in November, Hoey decided to take advantage of an upcoming concert in St. Charles to bring some Boston Strong-style resilience to Illi-

> "That night we're going to be collecting donations,' he says. "I'm also going to be putting up some of my equipment that I can get rid of, and we're gonna sell some stuff and give some of that money. And also, a portion of our merchandise that night we're also gonna donate. You never know who could be devastated in this world. It could be you, it could be me, so we gotta help these people out."

> Don't get the impression, however, that Hoey is

always somber; at times, he can be downright festive. When you've got a name like Hoey, you're almost required to have a Christmas tour, and in this respect Hoey doesn't disappoint. For years he's been making annual tours of radio stations, bringing holiday cheer, and so far he's produced three Ho! Ho! Hoey! Christmas albums along with two best-of compilations. His latest holiday single, "Still Got the Blues for Christmas" combines his current appreciation for the blues with his yuletide tradition, and his holiday shows bring all the festivities to the

After the holidays, Hoey will no doubt get straight back to work because that's what he does. A recent interview with Guitar World magazine in reference to his work producing an album for Lita Ford goes a long way toward summing up Hoey's approach to his entire career.

"It was definitely an emotional ride working on this album," he says, "but we always kept our noses to the grindstone and didn't get caught up in the emotion. We just focused on the work. But there was some blood, sweat and tears for sure."

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Jazzing Up the Holidays

Dave Koz didn't become one of the biggest names in smooth jazz on purpose, but now that he's there he is extremely purposeful in the way that he uses his position. Sure, he plays his music, and he does it well, but more than that, he's focused on things outside the music - and outside himself - in a way that probably never even occurs as a possibility in the heads of most successful musicians.

Koz underplays the sequence of events that made him into one of the most commercially successful jazz saxophonists alive today. He first picked up the saxophone when he was a kid in Encino, California, he says, as a way to squeeze his way into his big brother's band;

it was a social move more than a musical one. He played in the jazz band in high school, but when he went off to college at UCLA, he majored in mass communications, not music. The way he tells the story, his

decision to become a professional musician after he graduated from college was a whim that paid off in a big way.

Almost immediately after he jumped into the industry, Koz was an in-demand touring player and session musician. Throughout the late 80s he toured with singer Bobby Caldwell, keyboardist Jeff Lorber, and pop star Richard Marx. At the beginning of the 90s, Koz, always looking for the next move, decided it was time for a solo career, and he signed with Capitol Records; he got his first Grammy nomination for his third solo album.

But it was perhaps his training in mass communications that really sent his career into the stratosphere. Early on, he learned how to get himself and his music in front of a large audience. He played in the house band on Pat Sajak's talk show on CBS, and later he led the house band on Emeril Lagasse's show. He started hosting his own radio show in 1994, a move that eventually led to a syndicated show that is currently in its 18th year on the air.

Koz has always been a relentless entrepreneur - he came up with his Dave Koz & Friends at Sea series of musical cruises, for example, as a way to create unique, memorable and marketable experiences for his fans - but he has also been devoted to turning his entrepreneurial spirit toward good causes. Most visibly, he's worked hard for the Starlight Children's Foundation, an organization that provides support for seriously ill

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tal, on the ground, with kids, I immediately was hooked. I just saw the smiles on these kids' faces, even if it's just for five minutes forgetting where they are and whatever affliction they're hav-

Koz has acted as a spokesperson for the organization, but he's also come up with innovative business projects that benefit the foundation, such as Koz brand wine, proceeds from the sale of which go to Starlight. The reason he does it is, to him, simple: he does it because he can.

"I'm deeply humbled by the fact that what I do on the concert stage or in records has allowed me to do things that in my wildest dreams I never thought would be possible," he says. "Having a wine with my name on it is one of those things - and the fact that it has a social and philanthropic component that can really help kids in the real world."

He never forgets, however, that it's the music that got him in the position to help, and he still plays and records, making music that makes people happy. His most recent album, Summer Horns, was released last summer, and it was all about setting a seasonal mood. He was joined on the album by fellow saxophonists Gerald Allbright, Richard Elliot and Mindi Abair, and the quartet set about trying to recreate the sound of the big pop and R&B horn sections of the 60s and

The first album I ever bought was Back to Oakland, the 1974 recording by Tower of Power," says Koz. "I've always been fascinated with that sound. There are few things in music that are as exciting as the energy that comes from a really tight horn section. Over the years, that sound has graced some of the greatest records of all time by bands like Sly & the Family Stone, Earth Wind & Fire, and so many others."

The result was brass infused covers of songs such as Sly's "Hot Fun in the Summertime," the Beatles' "Got to Get You into My Life" as filtered through Earth Wind & Fire, and Chicago's "25 or 6 to 4."

"These are songs of a certain era, and if you are of a certain age, you're going to listen to them and immediately recognize them," Koz says. "It's meant to remind you of a time when that sound was everywhere. This was our chance to honor that era of great horn sections with a big tip of our hat and say 'thank you' to those who were responsible for it. I hope people feel the reverence that we all have for this music and the great bands that made it."

But that was two seasons ago, and Koz is currently off in a different direction. The day after Thanksgiving, he began his 16th Christmas tour, a holiday tradition in which he brings together a stage full of guest artists for an evening of jazzy arrangements of traditional holiday tunes, augmented by a list of non-holiday (but seasonally appropriate) songs. This year, Koz's guests include singer Oleta Adams, pianist Keiko Matsui and South African guitarist Jonathan Butler.

Through it all, Koz never stops moving, never stops looking for the next big thing he can do. As he rehearsed for the Christmas tour, he tweeted to his fans a synopsis of his philosophy, a 140-character summary of his promise to always innovate and always deliver everything he has to give.

"Every day we show up and give our best," he wrote, "and, in each and every moment, our best changes.

Sebadoh

Defend Yourself

Between his work over the last 30 years in Dinosaur Jr., Sebadoh, Sentridoh and Folk Implosion (not to mention a handful of solid solo records), singer/songwriter Lou Barlow has little left to prove. He's an indie rock legend, a lo-fi godfather and one of the sweetest singers in all of rock n' roll. In



this writer's opinion, at this point in his career Barlow shouldn't feel the need to put out anything other than solo records. That said, life is expensive these days, and Barlow's last two namesake releases haven't exactly been blockbusters (I'm also not so sure he's getting a whole lot of the Dinosaur Jr. reunion cash). And so we now have *Defend Yourself*, the first Sebadoh record since 1999's underrated — though also uncharacteristic — *The Sebadoh*.

Where the band's most signature work was purposefully rough, ragged, spontaneous and often unfinished, *Defend Yourself* feels more complete. Rather than embracing a DIY garage sound, the 13 tracks on this record feel largely off-the-cuff, as if they were recorded in a take or two, live in a proper studio. So while the classic DIY sound of a record like *The Freed Weed* or even *III* isn't exactly present here, that old Sebadoh spirit (i.e. guys in a room having fun, playing imperfect beauty) still lingers. Along for Barlow's latest ride is Jason Loewenstein, who has gone from the role of Screaming Drummer to multi-instrumentalist and sometimes songwriter. Gone are co-founder Eric Gaffney (who toured with the band on their 2007 reunion tour), Bob Fay and Russell Pollard and in is drummer Bob D'Amico. Mostly, this is Barlow doing Sebadoh – or, that is, Barlow doing something that resembles Sebadoh.

Several of the tracks employ that sludge-y 90s grunge sound too much for my taste, the best tracks being the ones where Barlow is writing melodic pop or soulful ballads. "Oxygen," an almost-bouncy rock tune, is a standout that will certainly remind longtime fans of what the band once did best, while "Love You Here" sounds like a leftover from either of Barlow's last two solo records. Opener "I Will" is one of *Defend Yourself*'s best offerings, sounding like a lost 90s college radio track. Barlow's voice sounds as sweet and familiar as ever on this song, almost single-handedly warranting the price of Defend Yourself, if only for the sake of nostalgia. "State of Mind," a deceptively simple rocker, sees Barlow doing what he does most naturally, playing simple riffs while weaving his hummy rasp through a series of one liners. The surprisingly twangy "Can't Depend," another major standout (and perhaps the record's best offering), reminds of Wilco and Ryan Adams, two artists Barlow has become a fan of over the last few years.

The biggest issue here is, as expected, Loewenstein's offerings, which haven't been too worthwhile since 1996's spectacular *Harmacy*. It's a shame to hear his tracks intertwined with what is an otherwise strong set of Barlow tunes. All that said, Barlow's tunes aren't always worthy of the Sebadoh name either. *Defend Yourself* isn't a bad album, but it's also nowhere near the heroic Dinosaur Jr.-like return Sebadoh fans were hoping for. Now let's all hold our collective college rock breath until The Folk Implosion make up and record a new record. (*Greg W. Locke*)

Ben Goldwasser and Andrew VanWyngarden, the two skinny Brooklyn nerds behind MGMT, had it all. With their debut record, 2008's breakout hit, *Oracular Spectacular*, they were suddenly the most promising new indie rock band on the planet. Their album was cool and popular, and they were



somehow on a major label yet were embraced by just about every pretentious rock critic in the industry. Admirably, they had a disco hit, a prog-rock hit, an indie rock hit and a pop-rock hit. They be-friended other bands and, eventually, went to work on their sophomore record with legendary producer Sonic Boom, best known for his work with Spacemen 3.

BACKTRACKS

John Lennon

Imagine (1971)

John Lennon's second solo album was released a week after my sixth birthday. The former Beatle's masterpiece, recorded at his home in England and at The Record Plant in Hell's Kitchen in New York City, took a different direction than his



solo debut and solidified Lennon's status as both a songwriter and a producer.

It opens with the title track, Lennon's plea for world peace. Words can't describe this wonderful ballad, but you know it; and it could be one of the greatest songs he ever wrote. "Crippled Inside" features former bandmate George Harrison (who plays on four other tracks), and "Jealous Guy" was covered successfully by Roxy Music six months after Lennon died. "It's So Hard" is driven by a nice saxophone from King Curtis who was killed just weeks after this recording. Curtis also played on the song "I Don't Want to Be a Soldier."

Side two, though not as good as side one, features "How Do You Sleep," a song that was said to have been written about Paul McCartney. Lennon was upset with some of the lyrics that he perceived were written about him on McCartney's *Ram* album. This is said to be the point where a Beatles reunion would never happen – and, sadly, it was true.

"How" is another hidden gem in Lennon's songbook, and it fits perfectly on the release. "Oh Yoko!" is a love song for his wife, Yoko Ono, one of many he wrote during his recording career

Lennon was shot and killed December 8, 1980, outside of his residence in New York. My wife and I visited this spot last month, as well as Strawberry Fields in Central Park. If you are ever in New York, this – as heartbreaking as it is – is a must see. (*Dennis Donahue*)

That second record, 2010's ambitious *Congratulations*, felt like the work of a band who'd been given the keys to the castle. The productions were all big and trippy, and the songs were mostly not accessible to the general population. It was a spit-shined psychedelic record that I think will, with time, reveal itself to be something of a beloved record, or at least one worthy of a cult following. While *Congratulations* didn't exactly fail, it also wasn't the hit record that *Oracular* was. And so now we have the band's quietly released third release, a supposed comeback record called *MGMT*.

The nerds have again tapped a legendary producer, this time giving the nod to Flaming Lips and Mercury Rev producer Dave Fridmann (who produced the big-sounding *Oracular*). We hear Fridmann's thick, juicy production style instantly: his epic, distorted drum sound; his swirling, gooey mix; his fuzzy bass sound; his exaggerated psychedelia. It's not a bad sound, but the Fridmann schtick feels more over-the-top here than it has elsewhere. "Alien Days" opens up the record pleasantly, feeling like something of a pop/prog mash-up, Goldwasser and VanWyngarden returning more to their *Oracular* sound, incorporating a clear hook and a wholly pleasant arrangement. It's the most accessible track we've heard from the nerds in some time. Too bad that approach doesn't hold up.

The problem with MGMT reveals itself before the end of track two, titled "Cool Song No. 2." The issue is this: MGMT want to make big, weird, inventive records that are also widely accessible. And they want to do it on a major label and tour the country and sell enough albums that they can put out more and more records. While they pulled off that trick to some degree with their debut, the plan fell flat on Congratulations and, if I had to guess, will fall flat with MGMT. It's a tall task to be simultaneously inventive and accessible - one that few bands have been able to pull off over the course of the last decade or so. MGMT, a record that sounds pretty much how you'd expect (somewhere between their first two album, but run through the Fridmann filter and with almost no real regard for accessibility), probably isn't going to take Goldwasser and Van-Wyngarden into the future. I wouldn't be a bit surprised if Columbia Records drops them and they put out a couple of albums on an indie label – never returning to their former glory – before breaking up and

going on to other projects. I could see VanWyngarden doing something really weird, interesting, artsy and even successful in the future, but not under the now-spoiled MGMT moniker. All that said, the nerds have done a notable thing with their first three records: they've released challenging, artsy records into the mainstream with some success. That just doesn't happen these days. Sadly, though, as impressive as the big sound of MGMT is, I don't expect it will have a legacy like the band's first two albums are destined to have. (Greg W. Okkervil River

The Silver Gymnasium

the indie rock world begin to really pay attention to singer/songwriter/band leader Will Sheff and his band of very dramatic, erudite men back in 2002. And while they've certainly had some good records since "Westfall" was released, the band – aside from maybe 2005's *Black Sheep Boy* – has never quite delivered on the great promise of that chilling, all-time great track. Sheff's a strong writer with a good voice who I think has been short on ideas for quite a while now. That, and his band sounds increasingly more and more like The Arcade Fire, who just happen to be maybe the biggest indie rock band out there.

For their eighth proper studio record (and first for ATO Records), the seemingly instantly forgotten *The Silver Gymnasium*, Sheff and his crew have decided to really go for it. Rather than toying around with slightly avant garde song structures or album-spanning themes, Okkervil River seem to be attempting to take after none other than The Arcade Fire themselves. *Silver* is an instantly more accessible record than anything else the Okks have ever put out, even opening with a bouncy piano-driven tune with a hummable, familiar hook. Sheff sings his heart out, trading his trademark big bleeding heart for a fun, radio-ready vocal that could make a young Michael Stipe blush. It's a wobbly, confident howl that I'd guess is aimed at new fans more than the band's loyal flock.

We hear horns all throughout the record, big and loud and seemingly leading a charge. It reminds me a bit of Spoon's Ga Ga Ga Ga Ga in that the band has managed to incorporate some big new elements without redefining its sound. We also hear some 80s-inspired keys, especially on the poppy, beautiful "Down Down the Deep River," a song that makes me think of Molly Ringwald, Friday nights and cheap-beer-fueled happiness with friends. That's sort of this record's vibe, really: friendship - happy, youthful friendship. Sheff isn't really singing too much about misery or struggle anymore; here he seems focused on good times, friends, memories and, eventually, change. Moving away from friends, getting on with your life, becoming an adult. He sings about cities and old apartments and good times from yesteryear. It's a fun, oddly intimate listen if you really pay attention. Sure, maybe the sound is a bit too clean and too accessible for a band that's mostly known for dark, intellectual, slightly avant garde records, but I suppose that's what happens when you go from an indie label to a major

My biggest initial issue with *Silver* was how fullblown all the tracks are. As the 11-song record wore on, it began to feel tedious, as just about every cut felt like a hit radio single version of past Okkervil River tracks. Finally, though, after a week or so of listening, I started to connect with the album as a single work. Yes, it's very upbeat, bouncy and full (and, also like Arcade Fire records, perhaps longer than it should be), but we still get enough of Sheff's expressive, oftbeautiful vocals and writing to stay tuned in with what the record is doing. "Pink-Slips" stands out as one of the record's better moments, Sheff talking about his drive to "go all the way" with his art.

Between the keyboards, bouncy pianos, horn arrangements and poppy song structures, *The Silver Gymnasium* stands as the most interesting thing Okkervil River has released since *Black Sheep Boy*, if only because it's so different than their last three efforts. It takes a little figuring out, but this record, or at least most of this record, is very much worth the time you put into it. (*Greg W. Locke*)

White Denim

Corsicana Lemonade

The 70s have come home to roost at Casa White Denim. Rather than the dizzying, kaleidoscopic pop fractals they've come to be known for on past releases, White Denim settle into something resembling



a cohesive identity throughout their latest, *Corsicana Lemonade*. The musical gauntlet is thrown down right off the bat, when doubled guitars and a galloping rhythm section announce "At Night in Dreams," maybe the best tune Thin Lizzy never wrote.

Make no mistake, however. This is still absolutely White Denim. Witness the breathtaking dual-guitar solo breakdown in the middle of the title track. The beauty of this particular passage is that it absolutely serves the song rather than being a left turn just for the sake of it. Bottom line: if you're looking for a return to jagged indie outbursts and lo-fi production, you'll probably want to look elsewhere. *Corsicana Lemonade* pulls you in on the merits of its tune craft, its blanket of comfortable sound and its downright satisfying "album-ness" – more and more a rarity in this age of the ADHD "single of the minute."

The album is varied enough, though, to let random needle drops yield compelling results. Mellotron meets mellow fuzz guitar on the nearly Big Star-esque opening of "New Blue Feeling." It's a mature work that shows off White Denim's ability to shift gears midstream, but this time they're shifting one gear at a time inside a linear pop tune structure rather than jumping between first, fifth, and second gear. It's a satisfying development from a hypertalented lineup that has at times appeared to sacrifice musical coherency in the name of staving off stagnation. The high-octane "Come Back" jumps up the classic rock quotient, bringing to mind everything from Joe Walsh to boogie-inflected country to straight-up pop confection.

You certainly can't accuse any tune on *Corsicana Lemonade* of falling into anything resembling a rut, but many of these songs are downright hummable. Producer Jeff Tweedy, an avowed fan of classic rock sonics, recorded the band at Wilco's Chicago head-quarters. The unfussy sound has "gatefold" written all over it, and it fits the material like a glove. "Let It Feel Good (My Eagles)" has just enough cheek and period reverence to let you know that they know you know. That said, it's got a helluva payoff that makes you nod along unself-consciously. The same could be said for the majority of *Corsicana Lemonade*. (D.M. Jones)

Let the Kids Be Your Excuse To Go See Frozen

Frozen is very much a fairy tale, though it bears little resemblance to the Hans Christian Andersen fable The Snow Queen on which, according to the film's credits, it is oh so very loosely based. Loosely based is fine when the liberties taken mean adding lovable characters, a funny screenplay, some cool visuals and highly melodic tunes. Frozen is a holiday movie the whole family can

Before seeing Saving Mr. Banks, a movie about the making of the Disney classic Mary Poppins, I thought I should see a Disney film. Previews at movies for young audiences are a depressing experience. Before Frozen started, the previews I saw seemed to be entirely about selling product, not about telling stories.

Then the real show started and all was well. Playing before Frozen is Get a Horse, a delightful new Mickey Mouse cartoon that uses archival recordings of Walt Disney voicing Mickey. The cartoon begins in the black and white style of the early Mickey cartoons, favorites of director Lauren Mac-Mullan. But when Minnie is threatened by Peg-Leg Pete, Mickey is thrown outside the screen where the world is in color, a la The Purple Rose of Cairo. Characters flop in and out of the cartoon world and the real world. Hilarity ensues. Kids at my screening were

giggling loudly. Get a Horse is a nice bridge connecting old school Disney with the new. Frozen is the kind of boisterous musical that I imagine will be turned into a Broadway show and become a presence in Disney theme parks. The songs are by Kristen Anderson-Lopez and Robert Lopez who have won Tony's for Avenue Q and The Book of Mormon. Yes, it is a princess story, but the princesses are not shrinking violets, and they have a powerful sisterhood bond. For the boys, there are fun sidekicks, plenty of humor and a brave mountain man. And one of the princesses has a cool super power while the other is a bit of a tomboy.

Frozen begins with two girls, princesses, of course, happily playing together. Elsa, the older sister and heir to the throne, has a special power: she can freeze things. This is a power she has trouble controlling, and she accidently hits her little sister, Anna, in the heart with a bolt of cold that knocks her out and turns a strip of her hair white.

The king and queen seek the healing and advice of a tribe of trolls. They warn the nervous parents that such a blow to the heart would be deadly and that Elsa's powers will grow more powerful as she ages. Fear, love and other powerful emotions will make her unable to disguise her powers.

So Elsa and Anna are separated, and the trolls have removed Anna's memory of what happened. Anna doesn't understand why Elsa never wants to play anymore. Elsa is afraid of hurting her sister and others. The king and queen are killed in a terrible storm at sea, so the girls are very much alone.

Time passes, and it is coronation day for Elsa. For the first time in years, the castle will be open, and guests from many kingdoms and the sisters will be together. At this point, Kristen Bell and Idina Menzel take over voicing responsibilities for Anna and

Menzel has a Tony for her performance in Wicked and was nominated for Rent. She



was delightful in the film Enchanted. You expect her to be wonderful, and she is. Bell is known more for film and television work (Hit and Run and Veronica Mars) than for her singing, but her singing in Frozen is fabulous. Bell has said she would like to do more singing and stage work. She has the pipes for it.

Anna is so excited on coronation day that she falls for the first handsome prince she meets, Hans (Santino Fontana). After knowing him just a few hours, she asks Elsa's permission to marry him and becomes very angry when Elsa says "no." Elsa unleashes a deadly bout of winter in the middle of summer and flees up the mountain to be

Anna pursues her to ask her to come home and thaw the kingdom. She is helped along the way by Olaf, a lovable snowman who keeps falling apart and back together. She also meets Kristoff (Jonathan Groff) who helps her and keeps telling her how dumb it is to get engaged to a guy she just

Olaf is an especially delightful character. Elsa created him when she and Anna were kids, and he jolts Anna's memories of the past. Olaf is voiced by Josh Gad with a lilting innocence. Olaf is a snowman who dreams of enjoying summer. Gad, who sang on Broadway in The Book of Mormon, makes Olaf's song of longing for summer one of Frozen's high points.

Some mild danger and treachery lie ahead, but so do more songs, more jokes, another visit to the adorable trolls, pure hearts and a happy ending. Beyond good characters, a healthy dose of humor and lively songs, Frozen looks great.

There is a funny contrast between the characters and the landscapes. I'm not crazy about the shapes of the princesses, though they have great personalities. Their shapes are very exaggerated, booming on the top and bottom and teeny-tiny in the middle. But all the humans are exaggerated. The guys have huge chins. The citizens of Arendelle and the visiting dignitaries are similarly old style cartoon-y.

Against the goofy drawing of the people. the landscapes are much more fairy tale-like and gorgeous. When Elsa freezes things, the transformations are dazzling. The storm that shipwrecks the king and queen is the perfect storm. Somewhere in between these different styles are the trolls. In all of Frozen, attention to little visual details is a pleasure. I may not be crazy about the shapes of our heroines, but look at those dresses move and

Take the kids to see Frozen. They can be your excuse. But be warned: little kids will start asking for a stuffed Olaf for Christmas. Maybe older kids will want one too. He's

'Tis the Movie Season

November, December and January are my favorite months of the year. It's during this chilly span that many of the year's best films are finally released



to the public. They're often presented over a five-week period right before the Oscar eligibility season concludes, but they scatter around the country all through the winter, keeping our artsy hearts warm and toasty. This past weekend I saw three of the year's most notable releases, including the film that will likely win the Best Picture Oscar (12 Years a Slave), the film that will likely make the most money in 2013 (The Hunger Games: Catching Fire), and the film that will perhaps go down as the year's most impressive artistic screen work (Blue is the Warmest Color). Though I'm still working to wrap my head around each of these flicks, I figure now – while all three movies are still in the theater – is the best time to share some thoughts (I will, naturally, share more in my year-end "best of" write-up).

Blue Is the Warmest Color: I'm a guy with rules. For example, I can only walk up the last set of stairs when exiting the platform at the Church Avenue subway station in Brooklyn. No other set of stairs makes my cut in that particular station. To explain this I would require about an hour of your time and likely more patience than you've got for such matters. Also, certain lights in my house don't get turned on; I cook Ramen in a very specific, labored manner; no one is allowed to touch my face, ever; and I check my pants zipper approximately 347 times each day (or at least every time I walk into a room). As you can see, I have an endless amount of rules that govern my days. A man needs a code, right?

One of my 4 billion other personal rules states that I see whatever film wins the Palme d'Or prize (an honor that, to the world of cinema, means more than the Best Picture Oscar) at the Cannes Film Festival every year at the theater, then again at home. It doesn't matter what said film is about, what language it's in or who made the film. This year's winner was a French movie from *The Secret of the Grain* director Abdellatif Kechiche, and it's called *Blue is the Warmest Color*. Kechiche's film is over three hours long and tells the sprawling, if not always eventful, love story of two young lesbians (played by Adele Exarchopoulos and Lea Seydoux). It features several unthinkably extended, very authentic sex scenes that are bound to make any audience member feel very awkward as they sit in a room full of strangers, so *Warmest* isn't exactly *Die Hard* 5. To my surprise, I was glued to the screen from the first shot, in which we see Adele, our protagonist, catching a bus for school.

We see Adele's sexual awakening. She tries out boys but can't stop thinking about Emma, this blue-haired gal (Seydoux) she happened to notice in the square. Eventually Adele and Emma hook up and have a beautiful love. I'll tell you no more, but that it all feels very authentic and even profound. The style of storytelling is masterful and the lead performances – especially by Exarchopoulos – are two of the year's best. I left the theater buzzing, wanting to see this three-hour love story again as soon as possible. It is, I think, a new major classic. [A+]

The Hunger Games: Catching Fire: I won some contest that allowed me a ticket to see the second Hunger Games flick for free before it was released. I enjoyed the first film well enough and had read that the second was supposed to be even better. At the moment it's no rare news that this flick, starring Jennifer Lawrence, is the year's biggest movie. Chances are you know what it's about and probably already saw it. Either that, or you hope to never see it, which is understandable.

For me, a film like this is pure escapism. Pure entertainment. And, on those two levels, Catching Fire delivered just fine. Director Francis Lawrence (I Am Legend) did a stellar job handling the epic production, and Lawrence once again holds the whole thing together with her Katniss. The addition of actors like Jeffrey Wright and Philip Seymour Hoffman to what was already an interesting cast (especially notable are Lawrence, Woody Harrelson and Stanley Tucci) is a nice touch, though I would've liked to have seen a lot more Hoffman. Clocking in at a substantial 146 minutes, I found that the film passed quickly and maybe even ended too abruptly. Considering how poorly the books are written and how handson the studio has been with the production of these films, I think they're turning out surprisingly good. Great? I really won't be able to say until a few years have passed and I've seen them all multiple times. What matters for a film like Catching Fire, I suppose, is that people love it. And, in this case, they most certainly do. [B]

cept called "willing suspension of disbelief." It gives the audience permission to accept the impossible in order to enjoy and appreciate the story.

Same Time, Next Year, now running at Arena Dinner Theatre, doesn't really require much willing suspension of disbelief. But for a handful of audience members it may require something one could call "willing suspension of moral judgment.

The two-person play fol-

lows George and Doris – both happily married to other people – who meet at the same hotel room every year for an affair. Over the course of 24 years their relationship grows as they themselves change, reflecting the changing times in American history from 1951 to 1975 (the year the play was written).

The affair becomes more about emotional intimacy than physical attraction (although they have that too), and they both struggle with feelings of guilt about their affair. As much as they grow to love one another, they also grow to care about one another's families through the stories they tell each other. The stories are hilarious and heartbreaking and the couple share a closeness they could never experience with their own spouses.

The show doesn't ask the audience to condone infidelity. My über-Catholic mother actually saw and enjoyed the 1978 film starring Alan Alda and Ellen Burstyn. She understood that the story reflects on what it means to be in a faithful relationship and what it means to experience satisfying human connection. You root for the pair to find lasting happiness together but question whether their getting together permanently is what they really want or need.

Director Brian H. Wagner cast Kevin Knuth and Gloria Minnich who are close friends offstage and have worked together a number of times in the past. Their natural chemistry shines through onstage as well. In the first scene, Doris is a naïve young housewife and George is a neurotic accountant. As the years go by, both characters evolve as the country does.

Twice, Knuth's performance moved me to tears - once at the climax of an argument and once during a surprising telephone conversation.





earned. The four-mile track begins on East Wayne near Clay at 8:30 that morning and includes the Rivergreenway and the still-new Martin Luther King Jr. bridge on Clinton. (Harper admits that the logistics for this event were challenged during the bridge's construction, so this year's inclusion of the beautiful landmark has made things easier for everyone.) Distractions along the way are always the key to a fun run or walk, and the four miles is only slightly longer than the very popular 5K events which take place regularly these days. And to make the pot even sweeter, proceeds will help benefit the programs at The History Center.

Since this particular race takes place only days after my own (gasp!) 52nd birthday, I think I'll join the hundreds of other holiday revelers that morning to bask in the glow of holiday spirit – not to mention gingerbread cupcake glory. And feel free to don a Santa cap or reindeer antlers for the occasion. You likely won't be alone.

Twice- and Thrice-Told Tales

Nine Inches: Stories by Tom Perrotta St. Martin's Press, 2013

There have always been consistent themes in Tom Perrotta's work, but you've had to dig a little to find them. Books like *Election* and *Little Children* seem on the surface to be darkly comedic send-ups of the perceived comforts of suburbia, and they are that. But the ways in which Perrotta undermines our ideas of suburban serenity are not always obvious. He often presents us with adult characters who act in childish ways, giving in to their immature impulses and desires and endangering the status quo in the process. Meanwhile, the actual children either suffer as a consequence of the childish grown-ups, or they offer a counter example, behaving in ways that are morally mature.

In the stories of *Nine Inches*, Perrotta keeps hammering these themes, sometimes to wonderful effect, sometimes monotonously.

In several of the stories, boys on the cusp of manhood grapple with the prospect of the long lives that lie before them, and they experiment with actions that will define their morality. In one story, a smart high-schooler blows off his college applications and allows his apathy and egocentric outlook to lead him down a dark path. In another, a high-school football player, forced to sit out his senior season because of an injury, rages at the sudden loss of his specialness, a loss that

he's sure he'll be feeling for decades to come. In yet another, a bright student makes some money on the side by taking college entrance exams for other students; already walking on the dark side, he continues to tinker with good and evil when he gets the opportunity to get some self-centered revenge on another student.

In other stories the protagonists are middle-aged men who realize that they haven't been paying attention to the world around them, and, as a result, their lives are chugging down unhappy paths. A Little League umpire tries to use his position to atone for his past bad behavior. An aging husband discovers secrets in his neighborhood that make him question



nearly everything in his past. A pediatrician pursues his adolescent urges, despite that fact that the pursuit will inevitably tear his life apart.

When the stories work, they work wonderfully. The best of the bunch is "The Smile on Happy Chang's Face," the tale of the morally ambiguous umpire. The story's voice and pacing are flawless, and the setting of the baseball game, which Perrotta takes us

of the baseball game, which Perrotta takes us through play by play, is a beautiful backdrop and metaphor for the narrator's struggle.

But the collection suffers from overwhelming homogeneity. Three of the stories feature adults engaging in introspection when they see themselves reflected in the students they encounter, and two of those stories involve adults who are chaperoning school events. Some of the stories rely on clichés: the underachieving smart kid; the angry, entitled jock; the mid-life crisis involving boyish hobbies. Some of the stories are uncomfortably similar to Perrotta's own past work; the guitar-playing pediatrician, for example, clearly

echoes the would-be lawyer in *Little Children* who neglects the bar exam in order to hang out with the skateboarders in front of the library.

There are few writers today who have Perrotta's balanced, nuanced view of the suburbs. Perrotta's little towns are not the outposts of perfection that they aspire to be, but neither are they happy facades that cover hearts of darkness and depravity. They are ordinary, good and bad at the same time; they are more complex than either suburban lovers or suburban haters want them to be. These stories tell complex suburban tales masterfully, but if the book has a weakness as a collection, it's that the same tales are told too well, too often, too easily.

work as semi-autobiographical, with a female figure resembling a former flame making repeat appearances. Shimer also analyzed pop culture and tried to work in a bit of humor. Pargeon added that there was no certain theme or anything that was off limits.

"It's pretty amazing the detail he could do on the very small space of an envelope," marveled Hamilton. "J.R.'s artwork reflected his real love for 'sex, drugs and rock n' roll.' I hope everyone has a sense of humor about it because that's how he drew it.

"I am doing this for my love of J.R. I want to build an audience for his artwork. I hope this show will bring awareness to his artwork and what a tragic loss it is — for me, personally, as his friend and the art world, in general — that his career never saw the light of day. This exhi-

bition is a testament to his talent and a life taken too

Pargeon agreed, calling Artlink's *Expressions* of *Love and Loss* exhibition a highlight of not only Shimer's work, but also his life.

"The theme of this show is so fitting because J.R. would always ask, 'Did you miss me?' knowing that



I'd always reply with a biting 'Like a heart attack, boy!' I think maybe this exhibit is what he wanted: that someone would pull everything together and have a show for him like this. In fact, I'm sure that's what he wanted in the back of his mind. J.R. would never say that, and he didn't go after publicity in life, but in the hereafter, he would enjoy it.

ably a new classic. That said, it's a tough movie to get through and one that I think very few people will ever revisit. The film tells the story of a free black man (Chiwetel Ejiofor) who is kidnapped and enslaved. We see his long journey back to freedom in painstaking detail. What's most amazing is how McQueen leaves all sentimentality aside and attempts to make the story feel as real and unrelenting as possible. He puts you in the room with the slaves and the masters, the pain and the torture, the human injustice and pain. Call it the anti-Amistad. We know that at the end Ejiofor's Solomon Northrup will find his freedom and seek out justice, but watching his impossible journey is the point here. We're reminded of just how awful certain parts of American history really are.

12 Years a Slave is a powerful, beautifully crafted art house film that I think everyone should see. Sure, it's long and slow and the structure is at times experimental, but there's not a thing I would change about it. McQueen has crafted one of the year's brightest, most substantial and socially conscious artistic works. [A+]

Minnich does a beautiful job depicting the gradually maturing Doris as she attains education (first through the Book of the Month Club, then through correspondence courses, and finally a college degree from Berkeley). She grows more self-assured as she discovers who she is. Meanwhile, Knuth's George is endearingly neurotic, over-analyzing every moment of their encounters, fighting with himself over whether the relationship is acceptable or not. Their transformations surprise and at times unnerve and infuriate one another. But as time marches on, their bond becomes stronger until a surprising twist at the end reveals where the relationship is headed.

The scene changes are long but entertainingly marked by era-appropriate pop music and a slide show depicting images of the times. The changes take time due to the elaborate costume changes, mainly by Minnich, who goes from 1950s crinolines to 1960s hippie fringe to a 1970s caftan, with wigs and accessories to match. The changes were expertly assisted backstage by dresser Donna Frey, and not a hair or pleat was out of place each time Minnich returned to the stage. The costumes and wigs, by the way, were some of the most beautiful I've seen in a community theatre production. Wigs are often obvious and distracting onstage, especially in such an intimate setting as the Arena stage, but these looked particularly natural and appropriate.

Opening night fell on Black Friday, and the house was nearly full, a testament to the quality of productions Arena puts on and the loyalty of its subscriber base. Opening night also ushered in a new caterer for the dinner theatre. Goeglein's Catering provided a mixed greens salad, chicken Chelsea (served with dill havarti cheese and ripe black olives on a bed of julienne zucchini), parsley potatoes, green beans with dill, rolls and peach crisp. During the pre-show curtain speech, which took place after dinner had been finished, the welcoming of the new catering service earned two rounds of applause by the appreciative audience.

One of the charms of Arena is the intimacy of the space. The stage is small and close to the audience. The space also lends itself to bringing audiences closer to one another, particularly during the dinner. I attended this performance alone but was seated at a round table with seven other patrons who were friendly and eager to introduce themselves and share a little bit of personal history. We discussed Fort Wayne theatre, Obamacare, tips on job hunting, our families and how we spent the holidays. When the show was over, we shook hands and wished each other safe travels home. This is a rare and unique experience for Fort Wayne and it exemplifies what theatre means: bringing people together through a shared experience.

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
