As the Embassy Theater's Down the Line franchise gets set to begin its eight year, it is beginning to resemble TV's *Law and Order* both in popularity and scope. With the second annual Down the Line: Hard Chord

ready to head-bang 2013 into memory, the original Down the Line, dubbed "Classic" slated for February and Down the Country Line boot-scootin' into view later in 2014, it's clear the Embassy has found a winner.

The appeal is easy to spot: great local bands playing well-known songs in a visually and aurally beautiful setting, an all-ages, melting-pot crowd and extremely reasonable ticket prices. Local bands get the chance to play in front of an audience far larger

audience far larger than possible with a normal bar gig. That same large audience gets a sample of some of the great music happening in the city. And the Embassy gets a boost for its foundation. What's not to like? Spread the joy as widely as possible.

Bring the kids! Watch the old folks boogie! Have fun!

Down the Line: Hard Chord, 2013 edition, brings to the Embassy a talented, strange and fun collection of bands playing tunes from the 1970s through the 90s. In chronological order there's Lurking Corpses playing Judas Priest, Cougar Hunter covering Mötley Crüe, Masochist doing Metallica, Big Money and the Spare Change channeling Nirvana and RP Wigs feeling some Rage Against the Machine.

The head-banging, hair-spraying, thrashing, grunging and rapping will rattle the Embassy walls on Saturday De-

cember 28. Doors open at 6:30 p.m., with

the music starting at 7.

Down the Line in all its iterations usually sells out. Down the Line: Hard Chord will get started at 6 p.m. in the Indiana Hotel lobby with a beer tasting and a sound equip-

ment showcase. The Sweetwater Sound

Open Jam give musicians the chance to try

out the latest equipment while sampling beer from Five Star Distributing.

"We chose this date because a lot of college students are home and looking for something to do," said Embassy Marketing Director Barb Richards. "A lot of local bands have a big following, and there are a

lot of people who want to bring their families and see their favorite local band on the big Embassy stage."

Embassy Technical Director Rick Kinney, who pulled the bands together for the event, said he wanted to cast a wide net across the heavy end of the broader rock genre.

"We tried to get a diverse group of people on stage and in turn bring in a diverse







audience," Kinney said. "It's a great way to spotlight local talent."

"I'm so ready to shake my hair," said

Richards.

Part of Kinney's job was to match local bands with famous rock acts. No small task, in some towns. But here, when looking

for a band to cover Judas Priest, Kinney's obvious choice had to be Lurking Corpses. Lurking Corpses founder and main zombie, Lord Vladimir von Ghoul, does a great Rob Halford impression. Halford, lead singer for Judas Priest, can do an operatic scream – if there is such a thing – like no other. Backed

by Saint Legions the Six, Cousin Eerie, (noticing a trend?) Richter Mortis – The Skeleton King and Friar Frightengale, von Ghoul's falsetto will make your hair tingle.

"We wanted to pick a band that was wellknown enough that people knew the songs and that other bands (in the Down the Line series) have not already covered," von Ghoul said. "Plus I can handle the vocals pretty well."

Von Ghoul said the Corpses will be sticking pretty close to the Judas Priest recordings. "We're really excited to be a part of this show. We've been working really hard since we found out we were going to do this. We're trying to sound like the original studio tracks. We're getting close. I'm trying to mimic the vocals as much as possible."

According to Cougar Hunter guitarist and vocalist Ripp, Mötley Crüe have some explaining to

"We actually wrote all of the songs Mötley Crüe plays," Ripp said. "Mötley Crüe stole them and got famous."

While the credit for the oeuvre of the 80s glam rock pioneers remains in doubt, Cougar Hunter have forged ahead in staking their claim. Cougar Hunter – Diamond Drake, lead vocals; Le Tigre, guitar can vocals; Ripp, guitar keyboards and vocals; Big Bone Malone, bass and vocals; and Denim Dan, drums and vocals – notoriously spend all of their earnings on hairspray and spandex.

Famous for their elaborate stage antics and ability to be in close proximity to open flame without exploding, Cougar Hunter are noth-

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There was a time when artist Nathan Taves worked in an office surrounded by blueprints, land surveys and aerial photographs. He studied the details of our city and combined drawing, drafting and tedious accuracy to create books of maps that planners, firefighters and other city officials use to navigate and analyze the chunk of land that we call Fort Wayne. Taves spent years immersed in charts of neighborhoods and networks of roads that tie our community together. During that time his mind played with concepts connected to space and gravity, quantum physics and string theory.

Upon viewing his paintings, the influence of this background is obvious. One can almost see the gears turning inside of his head as the rules of space and perspective are questioned and experimented

"I am interested in manipulating space having taken my cues from physics and what it says about gravity, relativity and quantum world weirdness," says Taves when asked about his influences. This man is a thinker who is fascinated by the laws and theories of our physical world. The rigorous, almost painful thinking required for a human brain to comprehend the abstract laws of space and gravity energizes

"I am not a scientist and I do not understand the math behind scientific formulas. I do struggle to understand the books written by scientists about these topics for laymen like me," he says. This humble explanation is brought with an enthusiastic tone, his voice energetic, like a scientist on the verge of discovery.

Taves approaches his work with childlike inquiry and thinks of himself as playing with ideas to see what churns out. He has given himself permission to let go of the horizon line so he can look at space in a different way. This artist spends a great deal of time thinking and sketching to establish a framework for each new design. When he finally sets his brush to paint, he doesn't follow the road map laid out by his sketch; rather, he looks for insight

and inspiration as he moves through the painting process, or, as he puts it, "I'm looking for a way to configure space that can surprise and challenge me."

Taves works with oil paint on hardboard. The materials are both durable and responsive and allow for repeated manipulation. He uses brushes along with napkins, paper towels and Q-tips to apply, wipe away and layer the paint.

The process is tedious, yet he says, "I don't want the viewer to see the labor involved in getting the painting from the beginning to the point of letting it go. I want the image to seem like a fresh spring plant that just grew that way.

Taves is quick to say he is not an illus-

scientific theory.

"These are poetic interpretations," he says. "I am using concepts. I am asking questions. What if? I'm not making a state-





Top: Extreme Gravity Bottom: Venus and Highway


ment. I'm asking, what if space can be bent? What would it be like to be in a world where we could

see the bends of space?'

While all these thoughts may be as difficult to follow as a movie about time travel, Taves manages to create work that viewers connect with. His palate is consistently cool and calming, dominated by pale blues and greens. At first glance, his pieces appear completely abstract, but given a few seconds of focus, trees become clearly visible, and soon after that clouds and possibly a road. sunset or tiny house can be identified.

"Entering a tree is inserting an anchor

# Rekindling a Music Scene

What happens when you leave home to take a journey that introduces you to the art that will define you ... and then you come

For local jazz performer Mark Meussling, it's all about creating your world and making the most out of your talents - wherever you happen to be. You can hear Meussling perform with his Mark Mason Trio and Mark Mason Quartet combos regularly

at the newly opened All That Jazz club (he also serves as musical director there). Meussling has also recorded and released several CDs, ranging from standards to spirituals to original compositions. From his farmland youth to his education at the prestigious Berklee College of Music to his return to his roots, Meussling has always carried a flame for music – and a particular passion for jazz.

Meussling's early memories include hearing his father's Dave Brubeck and orchestral albums, taking piano lessons early on and, finally, discovering what made music tick for

"What really grabbed me was when I heard an Elton John album, 17-11-

70," he remembers. "I kept picking up the needle and playing the parts over and over. I went to the piano and thought, 'Wow, I can figure this out.' So, this was my first attempt at trying to hear music and decipher it instead of just using the sheet music in front of

He continued to play piano through his adolescence but didn't consider studying music seriously until he actually arrived at

"I actually went off to college planning to become a veterinarian," he says. Shortly after his arrival, however, Meussling quickly realized that music might be his true calling. During orientation week he entered a talent

"I came offstage, and they said, 'So, you're a music major?' and I said, 'No, I'm studying to be a veterinarian." The seed was planted.

"Long story short, after a few classes with the chemistry teacher scaring the daylights out of me, I sat up all night talking with a guitar major and went the next day to the chairperson of the music department and became a music major," he recalls. He put together a performing trio and soon set out for Berklee, though he ended up going

"We were all going to go, and I said,

'I'll see you in the fall,' and when fall came, I was the only one who went. I never saw those guys again."

Once in Boston, the budding jazz student received "the full immersion into the music and the culture. I was very fortunate to see some of the greats live and in person: Oscar Peterson, Ella Fitzgerald, Joe Pass, Bill Evans – the great idols of jazz who are no longer with us. As a young person, it was just surreal. I just devoured it.

Circumstances, however, drew Meus-



sling back home. "When I was 21, my father passed away. Plus, something pulled me back to the area." He eventually put down roots, starting a family.

"To my chagrin, the jazz just wasn't what I had left. I ended up playing in the basement of Columbia Street West, which was called Mother's back then. There was also the Retreat Lounge. Buddy Nolan and I got to know each other; I'd fill in for him when he was unavailable to play. I even booked him for a few gigs ... I was kind of 'the kid' back then. At the same time, I started a professional career in real estate to make ends meet, but my first love was always jazz mu-

Meussling continued to plug away, often adding pop, R&B and other genres to his repertoire to suit the audiences he was playing to. But his love for jazz never flagged. He'd mostly limited his performances in recent years to private parties and functions, avoiding the rat race and diminishing returns of a club and bar environment that has moved further and further away from the music he loves to make.

Fortunately, the new All That Jazz club has made him enthusiastic about performing in the club setting again and has created a music director role for Meussling that taps into his experience and expertise.

"This club gives me a reason to 'reemerge,' if you will," he says.

Meussling is understandably enthusiastic about what All That Jazz brings to the area. He foresees "a huge impact. [Club owners] Annrita and Gary Chappell and I began collaborating on this project a year ago, and I knew it was the right time and the right place to rekindle awareness for fine jazz music in Fort Wayne. There has been such a void, and such a need," he says. "The time is now. So many patrons tell us how much they love the

place and how it reminds them of a Chicago jazz club.'

Built from the ground up to spotlight jazz performances, All That Jazz features a stage that accommodates single performers, small ensembles and even larger groups. Meussling points to the centerpiece of the stage.

"We have a grand piano onstage that's definitely conducive to the jazz format. It also provides an attractive visual element. It allows us the flexibility to have a solo pianist in there, but the stage is big enough to allow for groups."

The "stage as showcase" element is not lost on this local jazz veteran.

"Having a dedicated stage is a bit of a rarity these days; a lot of places

just move a table out of the way and have the bands set up on the floor. All That Jazz revolves around the band as the featured attraction," he says. He credits the club for breathing new life into a scene that might otherwise get bypassed nearly completely.

"As jazz artists, we're trying to make the best of what we have here. With All That Jazz, we have a venue that's a perfect fit for both the players and the kind of clientele that don't just want to go to a bar. It's for folks who want to go out for an evening of more sophisticated music and dining.'

As music director at All That Jazz, Meussling is responsible for booking musicians and scheduling the performances, among other duties. "The goal is to do my part to provide a great place for jazz musicians to make great music happen. We've spent years and years honing our craft; we're working hard to provide a great venue to showcase it." He also performs regularly at the venue.

But Meussling hasn't limited himself to live performances. He has also recorded several albums. "I have my own private studio, so I'm able to produce CD-quality work from home," he says. "Right now, I've got a jazz standards CD in progress. I also have a CD of original music which is a blend of

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# **Gregory Alan Isakov**

The Weatherman

"Expansive" usually isn't the first word that you think of when you're explaining a new folk-based album, especially one populated by acoustic guitars, banjos, light drums and cameos from other traditional instruments. But "expansive" absolutely pegs the vibe on criminally overlooked (so far) singer/songwriter Grego-



ry Alan Isakov's new album. *The Weatherman* is an accomplished work that's equal parts songcraft, sterling production and incredible performance.

Everything on this album spokes out from Isakov's honeyed vocals. Paul Simon springs immediately to mind, but the comparison is mostly only incidental. Isakov uses his voice as an instrument, making the most of the way the words roll out and never laboring to deliver a lyric. This facility extends to the instrumentation; nary a part is out of place on this spare-but-somehow-cinematic release.


The languid "Amsterdam" makes one wish for a time machine, if only to deliver the song to the Everly Brothers and hear what they could do with it. It's a beautifully mesmerizing tune, gentle and rolling. Same goes for "O' City Lights" which glistens like a nighttime cityscape viewed from above. It's only when you dig into what Isakov is actually saying that you realize his subject is high in another sense of the word: "Maria's stoned like a porcelain saint / sweet morphine / sweet morphine," Isakov sings. The lyrical darkness, offset by the gossamer musical bed (or enhanced by it, in the case of the character in the song) adds depth and balance to a tune that's easy on the ears by itself.

If there's any criticism of Isakov's work on this album, it's that he's possibly too consistent; some tunes blur into one another, making stretches of *The Weatherman* feel more like movements than individual songs. That's not to say, however, that any one song on this record is subpar or repetitive. *The Weatherman* is an accomplished effort that reveals its layers through repeated listens. Isakov hides his barbs well enough that listeners aren't required to stay rooted to the listening chair to be rewarded. Is it damning with faint praise to point out that you can do the dishes to this CD? Nope. But you can also find yourself drawn completely into Isakov's lyrical world when you decide to pay this album the full attention it definitely deserves (*D.M. Jones*)

# **Washed Out**

**Paracosm** 

Ernest "Washed Out" Greene proves with his second LP, *Paracosm*, that he's a hugely ambitious music maker. He wants to make a big sound, and he seems to have an increasing interest in creating music with an outsider pop appeal. For this record, his follow-up to 2011's spotty but



decent Within and Without, Greene moved out to the middle of nowhere, bought some new toys (most significantly a Mellotron, which we hear all over the record) and began working on a toasty warm pop record. What we get is a big sound spread out over eight full-blown compositions and an unnecessary intro track. If Within was a record for early winter snuggling, Paracosm is a collection of songs that feel perfect for late summer nights. Happy ones, with drinks and thoughtful friends.

What struck me most about Greene's new sound is that he's somehow managed to become an even more detail-oriented producer. His compositional style still feels very much influenced by hip-hop production, but we also hear a Dave Fridmann sound entering the mix – a sound that feels like a nightclub version of *Yoshimi Battles the Pink Robots*. Greene goes back and forth between sexy club numbers and cinematic pop, inserting many of his new tracks with, for better or worse, a very 1980s radio pop aesthetic. (I'd like to say, for the record, that I'm not a fan of the 80s nostalgia trend currently dominating indie music.) His actual songwriter is still nothing to write home about, but *Paracosm* does show an increased structural ability, Greene having come up with at least a couple of tracks that feel like light pop hits.

# The Youngbloods

The Youngbloods (1967)

This is one of those records that doesn't have a bad song on it. The late 60s gave us a little bit of everything musically, and The Youngbloods injected their sound into this generation of rock n' roll.

The album opens with guitarist Jerry Corbitt's "Grizzly Bear." The



track is about a foot-stompin' dance technique from the 1800s and has a groovy sound; think the Animals meet Buddy Holly. "All Over the World" comes at you with a softer folk sound but still has that harmonizing that bands like Jefferson Airplane and the Mamas and The Papas mastered. They do a great version of "Statesboro Blues" from Blind Willie McTell, followed by their most familiar song, "Get Together," one of the best hippie songs ever written. It has been featured in several movies and has a sweet-tempered guitar solo in it.

Side two is mostly covers, and opens with Fred Neil's "The Other Side of This Life." Neil wrote "Everybody's Talkin" which became a hit for Harry Nilsson after it appeared in the movie *Midnight Cowboy*. The record closes with John Hurt's "C.C. Rider." Though covered by almost everybody, The Youngbloods really give it the blues-folk treatment, and it sounds very inventive with its fat bass line and snappish guitars.

The Youngbloods recorded through 1972, and had modest success beyond "Get Together." They reunited in 1984 for a few dates and played smaller venues with three of the original members, but ticket sales were light.

Fun Fact: "Get Together" appeared on Clear Channel's list of "questionable songs to be played" memo to their 1,200 radio stations after the attacks on September 11, 2001. Google it; it's a very interesting list. (*Dennis Donahue*)

We also hear little bits of pseudo-shoegaze in the mix, not unlike some of Greene's chillwave contemporaries, including Toro y Moi. With its poppier, fuller and more detailed, varied sound, Paracosm feels like Greene's stab at making the sort of crossover record M83's Anthony Gonzalez made in late 2011 with Hurry Up, We're Dreaming. That record, unlike Within (which was, again, released in the same year), went on to be a hit with both audiences and critics alike. even spawning a hit single in "Midnight City" and landing Gonzalez several film score gigs. The difference, I think, is that Gonzalez is a truly unique interpreter of 1980s pop and production while Greene strikes me as something of a still-lost artist who isn't quite sure what to throw into his pot. Both producers make electronic-based pop records that clearly want to cross over into the mainstream without losing their cerebral authenticity, but only Gonzalez consistently succeeds. While Paracosm is inarguably an impressive effort with a few great moments, I think Greene's vision is limited. To these ears. Paracosm is a mostly forgettable dream-pop record made only for chillwave obsessives and fans of homemade electronic production techniques. (Greg W. Locke)

# **Low Roar**

Low Roar

Ah, Low Roar take me away. "Expansive," "shimmering," "reverberating" are the kinds of words that pop into your head when you treat yourself to this Icelandic delicacy (pun intended). In absolutely no hurry at any point during this assured debut, Low Roar (actually a musical ve-



hicle for Ryan Joseph Karazija) projects both a sense of "big"-ness and calm, kind of a sonic Aurora Borealis from whatever you play it on.

"Give Up" sets the gossamer tone with a slowly strummed guitar, gentle vocal melodies and enough reverb to make My Morning Jacket say, "Dude, that's a lot of reverb." Karazija doesn't limit himself

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to folk or pop structures; the album's title track lays on the ambience even thicker, with a repetitive melody and buried vocals bringing to mind a particularly chilled-out (pun not intended) Sigur Ros. It's functionally an interlude to the more down-to-earth "Friends Make Garbage (Good Friends Take It Out)." At first blush, you might be mistaken if you think Thom Yorke stopped by for a cameo, but the similarity to Karazija's higher-register voice is mostly confined to the surface.

"Friends..." is a fine, understated song with minimal instrumentation. I'd love to hear New Pornographers' A.C. Newman try something so sparse and unguarded, with or without Neko Case in tow. Acoustic guitar again comes to the forefront on the more pensive "Rolling Over." Before it opens up to the heavens, this slow beauty showcases Karazija's ability to set a mood with a bare minimum of instruments – and as few notes as necessary. The similarly bittersweet "Because We Have To" glides delicately along, with a minimum of friction, like an \_\_\_\_\_ skater effortlessly gliding along on \_\_\_\_ (go ahead, fill in the blanks).

Loaded with snowy metaphors this review might be; the point is that Low Roar is nothing if not superbly evocative of its place of origin. But inside the album's chilly, smooth sonic shell beats a warm, human heart. (D.M. Jones)

# Cate Le Bon

Mug Museum

The first time I heard Cate Le Bon's third proper solo record, the just-released *Mug Museum*, I was reminded, if only for a brief moment, of the fall of 2001. That's when I first started to really fall for Iggy Pop, David Bowie and Lou Reed, when I first started trying to memorize their solo cata-



logs. Television, too. That fall was when I was first really getting into The Strokes, and reading about their debut record, *Is This It*, inspired me to check out all of the above mentioned artists – each of whom I fell in love with much more than The Strokes and still listen to to this day. Enter *Mug Museum*, an album that takes from the 70s era records these artists released in a very convincing manner.

Opener "I Can't Help You" sounds so much like Television's Marquee Moon that I found myself going online to see if Le Bon had somehow reunited Tom Verlaine and Richard Lloyd for tangly guitar duty. No such luck, but it's a convincing effort. Elsewhere Le Bon takes from Iggy's Bowie-produced records Lust for Life and The Idiot without blushing. Then it's Lou Reed's Transformer. We hear what almost sounds like a cover of Reed's "Andy's Chest" followed by a track that sounds like an outtake from Bowie's Aladdin Sane. Le Bon, vocally speaking, doesn't sound like any of said artists. She sound more like a mix between Charlotte Gainsbourg and early PJ Harvey, if with less bite. Or perhaps a more conventional version of Nico who actually took some singing lessons at some point during her journey. She has a good, strong, memorable voice and decent enough lyrics that tend to be dark and poetic leaning.

The problem is that, by the third time I put *Mug Museum* on the player, I was sort of over it. Sure, the record's 10 tight tracks reminded me of some of my favorite music ever and even inspired me to dig some of those albums out and hit play for the first time in years (not counting the Reed records, which I've listened to regularly all along). When I was in my 20s, I always swore that I'd never become the kind of listener who would someday claim to have heard it all. You know the type: they have every Beatles and Stones and Zeppelin and Kinks and Dylan song memorized, yet never had any interest in Olivia Tremor Control, Ryan Adams, The White Stripes or White Fence. Why listen to those things when they're just taking ideas from "better" artists who came before them? I never ever wanted to be that kind of a listener; I wanted to be young forever.

But here I am, balding, jaded and getting ready to go sell off my copy of Cate Le Bon's perfectly good third album. It's not that I didn't like the album or didn't find Le Bon intriguing, because I did. It's more so that I don't feel the need to spin this disc ever again. If some venue plays one of Mug Museum's tracks before a show while I'm waiting to see a band someday, then sure, I think I'll dig it and maybe wish I hadn't sold the record. But at this moment, the only purpose I see an album like Mug Museum serving is as a conduit to its influences, a gateway spin for young listeners who haven't yet explored the depths of rock n' roll history. So, if you're reading this and dig Le Bon and are young and don't yet know a lot of older music yet, I recommend checking out the following fairly standard classics: Iggy Pop's Lust for Life, Television's Marquee Moon and Adventure, The Velvet Underground's The Velvet Underground, David Bowie's Aladdin Sane, T. Rex's Electric Warrior and maybe even John Cale's Vintage Violence. From there you'll find a whole spiderweb of great records and songs and artists. And, of course, also be sure to enjoy your copy of Mug Museum, as it is most definitely a very solid, inspired rock n' roll effort. I still shamelessly very much love my copy of Is This It. (Greg W. Locke)

within the piece. It gives the viewer something to reference," said Taves. It seems the familiarity helps people connect with his work. Many collectors who have lived with his paintings say they still get a lot from looking at them, even after years of ownership.

Tave's paintings easily capture the inquisitive viewer, then reel the mind in as the eye travels around the canvas, connecting with these familiar anchors. The interaction with one of his paintings is similar to a typical approach to thinking about the scientific concepts that his paintings address. Concepts like string theory take a great deal of time to think about, to wrap one's mind around; often a lifetime of contemplation. Tave's work is the same. Give it time and thought, let your eyes dive into the paint and you will start to understand. The mind begins to branch out, riding along with Tave's thought process, up and over hills and between fragmented trees. His work transforms a swirling storm of confusion into a manageable, peaceful world that invites us to wonder and dream.

Taves paints parts of our world that are unseen.

"I am interested in the world we don't see, but it is still very much a part of our world." His inspirations include germs, internal organs, gravity, time, string theory and nanoparticles.

His current work is the result of an evolution of his own experiences and artistic experiments. During his sculpture period Taves created representations of internal organs. While the ugliness of innards failed to connect with a broad audience, the study led him to a series of white clay pieces. Void of color, the shapes he created allowed Taves to focus on space and volume.

"So much sculpture is still framed by planes," he explains. "The 'Love' sculpture is simply an extended font. I really wanted to think about space and the white sculptures did that." One particular sculp-

ture, "Curved World," was the bridge that changed the course of his work. Taves painted an abstracted landscape upon the white sculpture, and that turned out to be the breakthrough that led him back to the 2D world of canvas and hardboard. Ironically, Taves feels he can most effectively capture ideas of space and perpetual movement on a flat, stationary surface.

While the scientific realm fascinates Taves, he has little interest in responding artistically to society and culture. He is bored by the inflated vocabulary that so many artists use to validate and describe their work, and he feels art is a visual language that shouldn't have to be explained with lengthy statements. Taves paints for his own fulfillment and doesn't use self-promotion to push his way into the art world. His life is private, and he keeps images of himself out of the public eye. He chooses to look within and pushes away the constant, superficial distractions that surround us.

"I am not out to reinvent the definition of art or painting," he explains. "I'm not interested in investigating political or social issues, using imagery from pop culture or the internet age. In the last hundred years scientists have revolutionized our perception of space, time, matter and the size of our universe ... In the last hundred years artists have spent a great deal of time thinking philosophically about art, and now we can't seem to get past all the self-reflection and mind-numbing art-speak. It is like staying in therapy too long.

"My prejudice is simple," he continues. "I would be very interested if more artists, using what we know from science and physics, would create images and objects that speak to all that fascinating information and all of the rich and inspiring theories. It would be a new type of poetic and theoretical realism that goes far beyond human retinal images."

Mississippi-born singer-songwriter Steve Forbert has been compared to Bob Dylan his entire career, but he doesn't let it bother him. "You can't pay any attention to that," he told NPR last December. "It was just a cliché back then, and it's nothing I take seriously. I'm off the hook - I don't have to be smarter than everybody else and know all the answers like Bob Dylan.'

Don't think for a moment that Forbert has let himself off the hook.

however. He released his first studio album, Alive on Arrival, in 1978 (which features his biggest hit to date, "Romeo's Tune") and has written and put out music steadily ever since. And not cheap, Dylan knock-off type stuff, but award-winning, chart-topping, critically acclaimed folk and Americana that has earned him not only the respect of his fellow musicians but



legions of loyal fans who follow his career closely and eagerly anticipate his next offering.

One of those loyal fans is Fort Wayne and One Lucky Guitar's own Matt Kelley who is bringing Forbert to OLG's performance space, The B-Side, Friday, December 27 at 8 p.m. Kelley learned to love Forbert's unique take on acoustic folk when he joined 2001's compilation tour. Young, Guitar Days. The owner of the lucky guitar that gave Kelley's business its name was performing with Forbert, and Kelley was a

roadie for a few weeks. selling merchandise and loading amps.

On OLG's website, Kelley says that Forbert's appearance at the B-Side "brings one of the oldest One Lucky Guitar stories full circle." It will also give fans a chance to hear songs from Forbert's latest, Over With You, which, according to American Songwriter is "all lovely, melancholy, lyrically moving and beautifully performed."

# It's All in the Wagyu Raise 'Em

America's Wagyu Trail by J. Robert Britton and Steve Penhollow, Britton Marketing and Design Group, 2013

I was in a casually fashionable bar in suburban Chicago not long ago, and I encountered a menu tem called "Akaushi London Broil Fajitas." I was intrigued; I didn't know what an Akaushi was, but I envisioned some kind of yak or shaggy Asian antelope raised by nomads on windy steppes. The server spoiled the image when he tried to explain the dish, saying vague things about Japanese cows, and in the end, it sounded like Akaushi was merely beef - and it wasn't entirely clear why the fajitas were worth \$21, when the chicken schnitzel was only \$13.95.

Perhaps if the server had had this book to back up his explanation, he'd have made the sale.

As it turns out, Akaushi is a breed of Wagyu, a distinctly Japanese variety of cattle that has been raised in the United States only for the past several decades by a handful of boutique ranchers scattered across the country. The breeds of Wagyu cattle produce meat that is prized for its flavor and texture, thanks to both their carefully maintained genetic advantages and traditional husbandry techniques. Unlike mass-market American cattle, which are bred and raised to grow fast and grow big, Wagyu cattle grow slowly, and they don't yield a lot of meat.

This perfect convergence of factors - slow maturation, costly farming requirements, relatively low yield, noticeably tastier meat - makes Wagyu beef a marketer's dream, and it's been successfully promoted both in Japan and abroad as a luxury food item that demands premium prices.

America's Wagyu Trail is a primer for those who wish to understand the princely stature of the meat. A crucial piece of the story provided by the book is an explanation of the vastly different histories of American cattle (many of which are descended from feral mutts that roamed the prairies when early European settlers arrived) and Japanese cattle which were lovingly developed by artisan farmers. The contrast became clear when Wagyu arrived in America in the 1970s and it could be compared directly to inferior

What makes Wagyu special? The book gives us lots and lots of information about technical specifics: breed specifications, genetic definitions, FDA catego-



rizations. It's all, frankly, pretty confusing. What it comes down to, seemingly, is the structure of the meat, and the advantage of Wagyu shows up more clearly in photographs than in the text. Instead of the clear demarcation between muscle and fat (red muscle bordered by white bands of fat) that we're used to seeing

in mass-market beef, Wagyu meat is consistently infused with fat; it is a homogeneous net of intermingled fat and muscle tissue. Since we tend to really like the flavor of fat, a fat-infused mouthful of Wagyu meat is going to be tastier to most of us than a mostly-muscle bite of mainstream beef.

The book isn't entirely about the history and science of Wagyu, however. It also includes profiles of the few American ranchers who produce Wagyu beef, and a section near the back includes a number of Wagyu recipes for do-it-yourself gourmets. The best part of the book, in fact, is the gorgeous photography of Kyle Miron, both in the rancher profiles and in the culinary sections.

America's Wagyu Trail is of local interest not just because it was written and produced here in Fort Wayne, but because one of the Wagyu ranchers featured in the book, Pete Eshelman, raises his cattle in Roanoke. Eshelman transitioned from a lucrative career in professional sports insurance to the proprietorship of Joseph Decuis, an upscale restaurant in Roanoke, and he added boutique ranching to his resume after he gave his wife some Wagyu cattle for her 50th birthday. The culinary sections of the book spotlight the Wagyu dishes that are on offer at Eshelman's res-

A Wagyu steak at Joseph Decuis will set you back as much as \$85, so it's important to Eshelman and other Wagyu producers that you understand why this stuff is better than the sirloin at Ponderosa. This book is designed to help you do that (a customer review on iTunes says that the book is "an invaluable tool for cattlemen, chefs, and bon-vivants alike"), and at only \$16.99 for an ebook copy, it's a lot cheaper than the meat itself.

contemporary jazz but also moves into pop-ballad/ love song-type arrangements." He's also working on an album featuring gospel and spiritual songs, drawing from the experience he gained during 12 years as a church music director and a stint as choir director for the Embassy Theatre.

When asked how he feels about musical education and opportunities for young, potential musicians, Meussling's passion truly comes to the fore. Shrinking music programs in public schools aside, he points to efforts made in the community.

'Obviously, Chuck Surack and Sweetwater have had a huge impact on the musical presence in Fort Wayne, with their Academy of Music. It's wonderful to see the arts and music more accessible to the public. We'd like to see more of the younger up-and-comers get interested in jazz; we don't see as much 'new blood' coming into the scene as we'd like, but part of that is a byproduct of the sheer amount of different types of music that people are exposed to."

He points out that "a lot of people grow up with simple chord structures and melodies. Jazz commands more depth of listening. Some people hear that and they're intrigued by it, as I was. They hunger for more of it. There's color and richness to the sound.

'I really believe that people want to understand it and appreciate it, and the more you listen to it, the more you want to hear," he adds. "The on-the-spot activity that's happening when people play jazz, when people improvise with an instrument (without sheet music, in many cases), listeners find that amazing because they're seeing art being produced at the moment. People are seeing ideas springing forth right now. To me, that's the coolest thing. It creates a particular energy and excitement when an ensemble is playing dynamically and in sync and doing everything as one unit. That's something jazz brings with it that no other form can."

We're going to be crazy," Ripp said. "But we've had to make concessions. The Embassy has limited us to only 25 pelvic thrusts, and we won't be able to use our roller coaster drum riser. So we decided to invest more in hairspray and spandex. Spandex takes a lot of time to prepare and put on. A late addition to the lineup, Masochist will be doing their finest Metallica. But in that time Masochist have made a big impression on the scene.

'We came together slowly," Gladieux said. "Our bass player has been with us about a year, but I've played with him for about 10 years, so it wasn't like bringing a total stranger into the band.

Though he's a bigger fan of Megadeth, Gladieux is more than comfortable doing the songs of Metallica, the more mainstream of the two metal bands.

'That's the style we write and the style we play," Gladieux said. "We played all of the songs we're going to do at Down the Line at our last show. We play it exactly how it's supposed to be played. There may be a little difference in some of the vocal harmonies but most people won't

Gladieux said playing at the Embassy will be a big step in increasing the band's name recognition. It also gives them a chance to network with the other bands in the lineup.

"We always like to find other bands that we would like to play with," he said. "It's a great way to get more publicity. It's hard to get your name out there, but this will be a big help. There are so many people I've talked to who would never come to one of our shows but who are going to come to this. Even my grandmother is coming."

Brian Spears doesn't know how his band, Big Money and the Spare Change, got called on to perform Nirvana at Down the Line: Hard Chord but he's not going to waste any time worrying about it.

"It's an extreme honor," Spears said. "It's really exciting to get to play at the Embassy. Not many local musicians get to play there. I don't know how we got involved, but we always wanted to since we started."

As a three-piece - with Dan Obergfell on guitar and vocals, Cale Gerst on drums and Spears on bass – Big Money and the Spare Change cut their musical teeth on Nirvana. Despite playing their own compositions about 80 percent of the time these days, Big Money started off covering a lot of Nirvana.

"As a three-piece, it was only natural for us to cover Nirvana when

we first started," Spears said. "A lot of our friends liked to say Nirvana songs are easy songs, but they're tough to do well."

And while they'll put their own twist on a few of the songs, Spears said they'll try to cover the material just as it was recorded and appear as close to Nirvana as possible - with perhaps one exception.

"Our singer looks exactly like Kurt Cobain," he said. "He's really excited. We're trying to get him to wear a dress. We tell him it's probably his only chance to wear a dress in public and get away with it. He'd better

RP Wigs take on the challenge covering the explosive rap-rock band Rage Against the Machine. In order to do the best job they can in getting the sound right, a few extra pieces of equipment had to be purchased.

"We definitely try to keep it as true as possible, to keep it as close to the recording, as we can," said the RP Wigs drummer who goes by the single name Landon. "We went out and bought new equipment to mimic the tones (Rage guitarist) Tom Morello gets when he plays. We don't have all the resources to come up with the sound exactly, but we've definitely tried to get it so when people hear it at the Embassy they can say we did a pretty good job."

Landon said that his job as drummer is easy compared to the chore his bandmates face.

'When compared to Rage Against the Machine as a three-piece. we're able to add more depth and tone. Their drummer basically plays straightforward hip-hop. I don't nearly have the challenge our guitarists have. Or our vocalist. They have guitar solos and vocal cues. There are a lot of words. I just get to sit back and watch."

Formed in 2007, RP Wigs - Korey Z on vocals, DJ on bass, Cory J and Chris on guitars and Landon on drums - are currently in the studio working on their third album. They've played all over the area, played in the whatzup Battle of the Bands and once opened for an Alien Ant Farm show in Las Vegas, but getting invited to play Down the Line: Hard Chord is a big deal for them. They've increased their practice schedule and are ready to "get this show on the road."

"It's great exposure for the bands and the Embassy as well," he said. "The money gets put back into the community, and everybody has a good time. I think it's cool they're making it a regular event. It's great to be a

# **An Oprah Snub and Other Foreign Press Oddities**

This year the holidays are tumbling over themselves making the season seem shortened and in a hurry. Thanksgiving was about as deep into November as it could be. Hanukkah started that same weekend. Christmas is nearly upon us. The Hollywood Foreign Press Association is in a similar hurry. The Golden Globe nominations are out, and the awards will be announced January 12. The Globes are in such a hurry they will be given out before the Academy Award nominations are announced on January 16.

The schedule is tight, and even more than usual, a large number of pictures considered contenders for the big awards are all hitting theaters at the same time. The good news is that more of them are making it to our market soon. Of the ten Best Picture nominees, five each in the Drama and Musical or Comedy categories, eight of the films will have been or be available for local audiences. The other two might make it to town as well, depending on how well or poorly the big holiday films perform.

The Golden Globes is always a fun show, combining big movie stars and big television stars. Tina Fey and Amy Poehler, who proved to be charming and funny hosts last year, are back. The Cecil B. DeMille Award for lifetime achievement will be given to Woody Allen, so hopefully we will be treated to some funny clips from his films. Allen himself is living up to his reputation as a recluse and L.A. hater and will not be there. He's sending Diane Keaton to accept on his behalf, and she'll be as funny and more relaxed than he

As much as I look forward to the Globes every year, this year their influence feels diminished. Completely separating their timeline from the Oscars doesn't enhance their profile. Sure, they will have the spotlight as the first awards show, but they'll be over and done while the Oscar race rages. Whatever momentum Globe winners get as they campaign for Oscars will be diminished by the time lag.

This year has been a very good year for movies. No set of awards will be able to honor all the great and good movies released, but the Golden Globe nominees are particularly odd this year. The nominees betray the quirky relationship



between American movies and the tastes of foreign journalists who report on them.

Here are some highs and lows in the Globe nominations. One of my favorite things about the Globes is that there are two Best Picture categories, but what good is a comedy and musical category if you don't use it? Technically, all of this year's nominees have elements of comedy or music, but American Hustle, Her, Inside Llewyn Davis, Nebraska and The Wolf of Wall Street make for an awfully serious group of nominees. They would all fit comfortably into a generalized Best Picture category.

In the Best Drama category, Rush is a film only the foreign press would consider one of the top 10 best movies. Formula One racing isn't big here. Philomena is a lovely film, but the Globes fascination with Judi Dench is driving that

The Hollywood Foreign Press seems to have room for only one African-American story this year. 12 Years a Slave and American Hustle each have seven nominations, all in the big categories. I can't argue with those choices, but why does 12 Years a Slave squeeze out any nominations for The Butler? Beyond those two films, Fruitvale Station and 42 are excellent movies that should be seen as some of this year's

I am particularly surprised that Oprah Winfrey received no nomination for The Butler. She's wonderful, but more importantly the Foreign Press Association loves to have big stars on their red carpet. So Taylor Swift gets a best song nomination for a tune in One Chance, a movie that won't be released in the United States until February, but Oprah gets

Kate Winslet is another Golden Globe favorite. I'm sure Labor Day is a fine picture, and I'm sure she is fabulous in

it, but it hasn't been released anywhere. At least One Chance has opened in a few overseas English-speaking countries.

While titles and actors with an international flavor are favored in some categories,

Hayao Miyazaki's The Wind Rises did not win a nomination for Best Animated Feature. Somehow, I doubt that The Croods is a more deserving nominee. The Wind Rises does get a Best Foreign Language nomination, but with so little space for foreign language films, this seems like a poor allocation of resources.

If you are trying to get caught up on nominees before the Golden Globe broadcast, here is a quick summary of where to look. Now playing in town are many pictures with nominees in top categories: 12 Years a Slave, Captain Phillips, Frozen and Philomena. (The Butler is also still here and worth seeing. This is my pick for Golden Globe snub of the

Titles you may have missed that are in the limbo between theatrical and residential release include Gravity, All Is Lost, Rush, Blue Jasmine and Dallas Buyers Club. Frances Ha and Before Midnight are available on DVD.

According to the current studio release charts, the following nominees will make it to town in time to see before you cast your ballot at home: American Hustle, Saving Mr. Banks, The Wolf of Wall Street, Inside Llewyn Davis and

Titles that don't have a dated nationwide expansion but may make it to town include Nebraska, August: Osage County and Mandela: Long Walk to Freedom. Labor Day is scheduled to open on January 31.

Too often at this time of year I am trying to remember what movies I've seen and how I will be able to fill a top 10 list and when films that might make that list will arrive locally. This year, if I didn't see another film, I could pick 10 easily. By the time of the Golden Globes, I'll be struggling to get the list down to 10 plus five or six films that could have

# Atkinson Teams Up with Star Trek Alums

Former Fort Wayne actor/director Tad Atkinson gives new meaning to the term "living out your dreams."

In 2005 he moved to Los Angeles to pursue film and has racked up a steady stream of acting and producing credits. In 2008 the lifelong Trekker worked for Renegade Studios which produces films starring Star Trek alums Walter Koenig (the original Chekhov), Nichelle Nichols (Uhura), and Tim Russ (Tuvok from Star Trek: Voyager).

Atkinson volunteered to act as a gopher for a mini-convention held in honor of Koenig receiving his star on the Hollywood Walk of Fame and insinuated himself at the registration table. There he ran into Sky Conway, the producer of Koenig's film InAlienable, and he asked to be involved with Renegade's latest project, Star Trek: Renegades, a network TV series pilot starring Koenig, Russ and a host of other actors, including Sean Young, Edward Furlong and Robert Picardo.

Atkinson was named production coordinator but proved himself so valuable he was upgraded to associate producer. He was also given a cameo role as a Starfleet admiral.

During the course of production, Atkinson learned that Sky Conway is also from Fort Wayne.

The Star Trek: Renegades pilot will be presented to CBS in June 2014. "If they like what they see," says Atkinson, "then they'll put it on the CBS Interactive website to see what kind of traffic it generates. If that is sufficient, then they'll talk to us about a network deal."

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
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
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# So Many Flavors To Savor

----- Review • Crown Brewing-

One of the many nice things about so many new breweries popping up, is if you decide to head out of town to check one out, you can usually find one or two more not too far away to make your trip that much more advantageous. Since I tend to plan my out-oftown adventures just that way, on my recent trip to visit Three Floyds, I decided to check out Crown Brewing on the way back.

I was familiar with them through their one beer, Crown Brown, which had been on tap locally for a short time and was pretty well done. I wanted to check

My first impression of the bar at Crown was it was very cozy. There is a nice display of their swag as soon as you walk in the door and a large chalkboard which tells you which standards and specialty beers are currently on tap. The bar isn't overly large, but it's very comfortable. A light made out of dozens of beer

originally brewed as a summer ale, with a much lower ABV than current styles (more likely in the low 3 percent range). Typically referred to as Farm House ales, these were often brewed in the fall and winter as a way to keep farmhands employed through the slower

winter months, and in the summer months the beer was used in the field to keep those same farmhands hydrated – a safer alternative, due to lack of potable water.

The Americanized version tends to have a higher ABV (typically 7-10 percent) and is brewed with a more fruit and spice influence. One of the best out there is Tank 7 by Boulevard Brewing.

Crown's version of the Saison was not bad. It wasn't terrific either – drinkable but without any kind of wow factor.

As I went through the rest of the beers, I kind of had the same feeling. They were all pretty good, but none of them made me say. "Oh wow, now that is amazing." The Java Porter was probably my favorite and to me, the beer that was the most true to style and well crafted.

That said, one of the most interesting things to me is the sheer variety of beers Crown is brewing. If you follow them on Facebook you know they are really good about posting when a new beer is being released, and a lot of them

sound really intriguing. Currently, according to their Facebook page, they have a Pecan Pie Java Porter, a Milk Chocolate Stout (which I'm assuming is different than a Milk Stout) and a Marshmallow Cream Java Porter. I have to give some props to breweries that are willing to extensively experiment and offer beers that you simply aren't going to find in a package store. The counter to that is whether or not they are giving themselves the time to refine their beers. This is a line of thinking that gets talked about a lot: brewing quantity of beers over a handful of beers really, really well. Some breweries do it well (think Drangonsmead in Detroit that brews close to 50 all pretty amazing beers on site) and some are still refining the process.

Either way, I would definitely go to Crown again. I'd really like to go now after reading the new beers they have on tap.

To me, one of the most important things to keep in mind, is that supporting your local brewer is important. Some are going to have outstanding beers. Some are going to have good beers. Some are going to occasionally put out something less than perfect. But they are all better than a majority of what the macro producers are producing – and you are supporting local business. So get out there and explore what's available.

bottles provides most of the illumination, casting a nice warm glow that adds to the intimate ambiance. In addition to the small bar, there is

a very large family room that appears to be a local favorite hangout. There is also a good-sized outdoor patio that was beautiful – and quite busy – when I was there this fall

The bartender immediately greeted us with a friendly hello, which is always the first step in winning me over. Despite serving the bar and the patio, she was very attentive and helpful in choosing beers. Staff is so key; I simply cannot stress that enough. I was extremely pleased with the service.

I decided to start off with a flight. I always find it interesting how different bars and breweries present their flights. Some are very creative, some resourceful, some with very little attention or presentation. Crown uses a simple tray with a laminate wipe-off sheet on which to write down the different beers. I really liked this; it made it easier for me to keep track, and I liked that there wasn't added waste of paper that would eventually get thrown away. Crown's flight was six 3-oz. pours. I went with the IPA, Imperial Red, Saison, De Railer, Java Porter and Cream Ale. I went with both styles I have a high bar for (Saison, Java Porter) and styles I'm more ambivalent about (Imperial Red, Cream Ale).

I'll start with the Saison. I've had some really top notch Saisons, and they are one of my favorite styles. My favorite is Saison Dupont, the flagship beer for Dupont Brewery in Tourpes, Belgium. Saisons were
