'Thank God and R.L.'

It would be a misconception to lump the Cedric Burnside Project in with the other guitar and drum duos out there, or with other blues bands for that matter. Not that bands such as Left Lane Cruiser and The Black Keys are poor company. Far from it. But to

dismiss CBP with a careless wave would be to dismiss North Mississippi hill country blues as just another take on the 12-bar template.

The Cedric Burnside Project – Cedric Burnside on drums and Trenton Ayers on guitar – not only work to keep hill country blues alive, they push it in new directions, adding elements of funk and R&B while honoring the roots and soul of the

The Cedric Burnside Project will play at the Phoenix Saturday Jan. 18 at 9pm.

Anyone who caught CBP on their last swing through Fort Wayne in September, when they shared the bill with Left Lane Cruiser and White Trash Blues Revival, will no doubt be lining up for tickets this time around. Cedric Burnside comes from hill country blues royalty. He grew up with the music he describes as "almost like"

horses running through a pasture." His grandfather, the late, great R.L. Burnside, raised him from an early age. The house was filled with the propulsive sound of hill country blues.

"I loved every minute of it," Burnside told me. "He used to have house parties every weekend when I was seven or eight years old. They'd play for a while, then take a break. It was pretty wild. They'd drink moonshine, then go back to playing. I just loved the music and everything about it."

Burnside's life was a bit different that the lives his friends led. Most of his schoolmates were into hip-hop and didn't quite understand the attraction of hill country blues.

"I was a blues baby and a blues kid," Burnside said. "My friends used to ask me 'how can you listen to it?" I told them I've been around it all my life. I got some of them to come to the juke joints, and they got to see it and they enjoyed it. I turned a lot of my friends on to the blues. I just try to keep it going."

Burnside started playing drums before he was 10. He said he was always drawn to them and one day just hopped up behind a kit and starting playing. By the time he was 13 he was traveling the world as the touring drummer for R. L. "Big Daddy" Burnside.

Big Daddy had been a sharecropper most of his life. He started playing guitar in juke joints and in the 1940s moved to Chicago to try to make a better living for himself. He spent 15 years there but returned to Holly Springs and his old life following the murder in Chicago of his father, two brothers and an uncle all in the same year. Big Daddy finally began to get

recognition for his playing in the 1990s. Big Daddy, along with Junior Kimbrough, kept the hill country blues sound alive through their recordings and tours.

By the time Cedric came to live with him, Big Daddy's influential guitar playing had brought other relatives into the fold, including his son Duwayne who has played guitar with the North Mississippi Allstars.

Following Big Daddy's death in 2005, Cedric and Garry released a record. It was during the recording of that Burnside really began to perfect his drum-

ming. It's also when he started handling vocal duties as well.

"The way I started learning how to play drums and sing at the same time was playing with my uncle Garry Burnside in a band called 'Burnside Exploration.' He's a great guitar player, but he doesn't sing. I had to learn the songs he wrote as well as sing my own. And I had to play the drums. It took a lot of practice. It was very hard. We locked ourselves in the front room and for three or four months practiced every day. Over the years I just got better and better at it. Thank God and R.L. Burnside."

Around the same time Burnside started another guitar-drum duo with Lightnin' Malcolm. The pair released *Two Man Wrecking Crew*, an album that Allmusic reviewer Jim Allen called "unimpeachably raw and undoubtedly 'authentic."

In 2010 Burnside teamed up with his brother Cody and their uncle Garry to form the Cedric Burnside Project. That lineup pushed the envelope of hill country blues by adding hip-hop (Cody's influence) funk and R&B to the basic driving sound.

"People loved it," Burnside said. "Cody loved hip-hop, and we found a way to come up with a rap that fit. I thought we were doing something new and different."

But when Cody died unexpectedly in 2012, Burnside found himself at a crossroads. He wasn't sure he would be able to carry on.

"When he passed there was a lot of heartbreak,"

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The Human's Progression

It would be understandably tempting for wildly successful and beloved bands to rest on their laurels. After all, don't most rabid fans just want to hear their favorite songs played over and over again? Why stretch one's creative powers, why devote oneself to growing as an artist, when you can sell out venues playing a set stuffed with greatest hits?

Clearly, Stone Sour have not gotten the memo. The post-grunge alt-metal foursome from Des Moines, Iowa has worked tirelessly to learn something new with each album. From the group's self-titled debut in 2002, to 2006's Come What(ever) May and 2010's Audio Secrecy, Corey Taylor and company have shown that they are not even close to one-trick ponies. Each CD has its own unique sound, each song its own obsessions. This is particularly true of

their latest release, a two-part concept album entitled House of Gold and Bones.

According to Stone Sour's website, the hero of the album's story, referred to simply as The Human, is to a certain extent based on the real-life experiences of Taylor who, like The Human, recently found himself at a jumping off point. Prior to writing the material that would eventually become House of Gold and Bones, Taylor found himself at a creative and emotional crossroads. Like The Human, Taylor was doing a lot of soulsearching, a lot of growing up. The results of such searching include the first several tracks on the album, namely "Absolute Zero" and "Gone Sovereign."

"There's a good chunk of the album

that's autobiographical," Taylor said. "It's been a long road for me trying to get from being this youthful crazy person to this more mature crazy person ... At the same time, I never use a name in the story. I wanted to reinforce the mirror effect where you read it and can see yourself in it."

Fans have been seeing themselves in Stone Sour's oeuvre for decades now. And why not? Some of the band's biggest hits

The original members – Taylor (vocals). Joel Ekman (drums) and Shawn Economaki (guitar) - came together in Des Moines in 1992, playing their style of hard rock mixed with metal in and around the Midwest. In the late 90s Jim Root joined on, and in the early aughts Josh Rand came on board. Stone Sour's demo tapes turned into their first major studio debut, which in turn led to their

first two Grammy nominations, for the singles "Get Inside" and "Inhale." In 2006. Ekman was replaced with current drummer Roy Mayorka, and five years later Economaki bowed out. Since then, Stone Sour have had a rock solid lineup and a steady output of new work, despite the fact that Taylor and Root divide their time between Stone Sour and heavy metal heavy hitters Slipknot.

Stone Sour will take the stage at Piere's Saturday, January 25 at 8 p.m. Pop Evil and Stolen Babies

will open the show. It's obviously not the first time the band has screamed through the Fort, but, given Stone Sour's determination to grow and change with every CD. every song and chord and shredding guitar solo, one thing is for sure: the show will be unpredictable, spontaneous, rocking and, of course, loud.

Fans can also count on hearing chunks of House of Gold and Bones, Parts 1 and 2.

According to Josh Rand, the concept album is proof that Stone Sour will continue to surprise with each passing year: "We just wanted to offer something more; in a world where it's all about singles, we just wanted to do something different. We've always evolved from record to record."



to date – not only "Inside Me" and "Inhale" but "30/30-150," "Made of Scars," "Sillyworld," "Through Glass" and "Zzyzx Rd." are irresistibly catchy and universally relatable. Most of Stone Sour's singles have either climbed to top chart positions or been nominated for Grammys or both, and you don't get there by being too obscure or self-

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The Victim, The Witness

Complacency

Those familiar with Taylor Fredricks' prior work in his former eponymous band may be surprised when they hear The Victim, The Witness, Fredricks' new solo project. But a lot of the qualities that made



his prior band a local and regional success are present here, so they shouldn't be disappointed.

While Taylor Fredricks was mostly an in-your-face, loud rock band, Fredricks tones things down a bit in his solo project, favoring lyrics and melody over big guitar riffs and loud vocals. If you're looking for comparisons, the most obvious ones would be Chris Carrabba's turn from rock band Further Seems Forever to his solo act Dashboard Confessional back in 2000 or Jonah Matranga's departure from his band Far to record as onelinedrawing. In the same way Carrabba and Matranga initially did with their solo bands, Fredricks abandons everything but his acoustic guitar on *Complacency*, delivering six songs of pure listening bliss.

While The Victim, The Witness may initially sound less aggressive than his earlier work, Complacency has the same biting and edgy lyrics we have become accustomed to hearing from Fredricks, and that is the album's strength. On the album opener, "No Reason For Your Madness," Fredricks predicts "your condescending and ambiguous ways will drown your morals in shame / like you ever had them," while on "Another Day in Paradise" Fredricks goes a step further when he asks, "Can you tell me what it feels like to have no one care about you? / I'm sure you felt it before because no one ever really liked you.' And lastly, on "Oh, How Things Change," Fredricks pleads for his antagonist to loosen the grip around his neck. Whomever these songs are about, suffice it to say, Fredricks is exposing them to the world for who they really are and creating some really great songs in

"Beyond the IV Line" and "I'm Just Your Pin Cushion" are the best and most accessible songs on *Complacency*, with the latter bringing to mind the eerie vibe of The Cure's "Lullaby," while "The Details in Fine Print," *Complacency*'s closing track, brings the listener full circle as Fredricks seems to make peace with his situation when he says he is "finally over you, so leave me alone."

The Victim, The Witness is a daring project for Fredricks. What takes more guts than exposing your innermost feelings to an audience via a simple guitar and song? Fredricks' honest and genuine lyrics are refreshing and unexpectedly startling at times. With this extremely cohesive album, Fredricks scores big with The Victim, The Witness. (*Chris Hupe*)

Andrew Bird

I Want To See Pulaski at Night

I've seen Andrew Bird live twice in my life. The first time was at the Chicago Opera House back in early 2009. The second time was at the Murat Theater in Indianapolis in the fall of 2009. Both shows were stunning, Bird displaying a mastery of musical art like



no other. But both shows were different versions of Andrew Bird. The Chicago show was the meticulous,

almost dandy-like version of the musician with the first 20 minutes nothing but Bird with several mics and standing in the middle of a circle of looper pedals. Moving from pedal to pedal, he created a veritable orchestra with nothing more than looped violin lines and whistles. It was breathtaking and awe-inspiring, and I'm sure it's also maddening to keep everything in time and on cue as well. The fall show was something altogether different. It was loose, loud and jangly. Bird played a beat-up Fender Mustang as much as he played his cherished violin. He seemed to want to prove to the world that he could rock with the best of 'em. For the most part he succeeded in that.

I Want To See Pulaski at Night is an EP, though not an EP in the classic sense. For most artists this would be considered a full-blown album, not an EP. Clocking in at over 32 minutes, this is more of a minialbum. It seems Bird wrote a great song called "Pulaski at Night," and instead of holding onto it until he had an album's worth of music to share along with it, he wrote several incidental musical pieces that followed the same musical twists and turns of "Pulaski at Night." The result is the mostly instrumental I Want To See Pulaski at Night, a wonderful addition to Bird's musical canon.

If you're familiar with *Useless Creatures*, his companion record to 2009's *Noble Beast*, or his 2003 album, *Weather Systems*, then you already know what to expect here. The center of this EP is "Pulaski at Night" for sure, but instrumental numbers like "Ethio Invention No.1," "Lit from Underneath" and "Hover 1" and "Il" create a sort of suite that helps make this a cohesive musical journey that could've scored some independent film or quirky documentary you'd see on IFC late some Sunday evening. Bird has delved into be rather adept at it. His music is already very visual, creating scenes in the mind with the mere pluck of a violin string or a looped whistle creating counter melodies within counter melodies.

I Want to See Pulaski at Night is a further step towards becoming the next Cliff Martinez or, to a lesser extent, Jonny Greenwood.

Which Andrew Bird wrote this mini-album? Was it the meticulous plucker and whistler from the Chicago Opera House or the loose, jangly Murat version? More the former than the latter this time around, but both are present and accounted for. (*John Hubner*)

The Flaming Lips

Peace Sword

Welcome back, heartfelt Wayne Coyne. That's what first came to mind as I listened to The Flaming Lips' *Peace Sword*. Sure, it's songs from and inspired by a lousy movie based on a cultish 80s sci-fi



a lousy movie based on a cultish 80s sci-fi book called *Enders Game*, but that's not the point. It's those ideas put through the Lips' bloody, psychedelic filter and then regurgitated on a musical canvas, much like some hallucinogenic-fueled Jackson Pollock painting. This is also the most open and earnest The Flaming Lips have sounded in over 10 years.

"Peace Sword (Open Your Heart)" opens the album as if we were back in 2002, full of *Yoshimi* optimism and that album's pomp and circumstance. "If They Move, Shoot 'Em" follows with a more sinister vibe, thanks to the ominous synths and the snare roll throughout. This song certainly has a film score-like vibe to it. Then "Is The Black At The End Good?" comes in, and suddenly it's 1999 all over again. Coyne has that innocent lilt in his voice that we haven't heard since "A Spoonful Weighs a Ton." This song is a cross

between mid 70s John Lennon and Midlake, if that makes sense (even if it doesn't, go with it). This song give me hope that The Flaming Lips I fell in love with back in January of 1999 haven't completely disappeared into the ether of freak-out jams and gummy vaginas. It's a truly beautiful and stunning song.

Side two gets things going with "Think Like a Machine, Not a Boy," and the late 90s sound continues with the added bonus of mammoth synths and effect-laden acoustics. This record has the feel of a classic 70s prog rock album but without all the pretentious storyline and drum solos. "Wolf Child" is a wonky little number carried by an up-front drum beat and some Juno synths that move the song rather nicely. Midway through the song takes a decidedly 80s turn as it morphs momentarily into a Talk Talk B-side. This is a great mix of all the things The Flaming Lips do so well, which is make interesting pop music while never bending to convention. The album ends on "Assassin Beetle/The Dream Is Ending" which starts out as dreamy, incidental music racing along with distant percussion, background vocals and moody keys before settling in on the more traditional and orchestral song structure Coyne and company perfected on The Soft Bulletin. It's an epic piece of music, one that far exceeds the source material from which this record was inspired.

I'm a Flaming Lips lifer. I won't pretend to be objective in my view of these Oklahoma fearless freaks of nature. I've enjoyed every trip I've taken with them. They've done what they've wanted to do from the beginning. From starving on the road and playing dive bars in the 80s and early 90s, to becoming the godfathers of alternative music, they've never strayed from the vision of their crumpled, gray-haired ringleader. They've "kept it real," as it were. But this time around it seems that a so-so book turned into a so-so movie has woken something in these Oklahoma acid casualties. They've found more than just visceral, raw emotion; they've found a beating heart once again. Peace Sword could be the beginning of a new phase for The Flaming Lips, one lit by sunlight, not black light. (John Hubner)

Circus Devils

When Machines Attack

Many men better than me have lost their faith in Robert Pollard, an artist who has been releasing five or more LPs per year for well over a decade now. Best known for his legendary Guided by Voices outfit, Pollard has along the way collected an uncountable number of side projects, the most consistent of which, The Boston Spaceships, is already defunct. Pollard's most currently alive side project, Circus Devils, have just released two new albums, including a



released two new albums, including an oddity called When Machines Attack.

It's clear that, through his career, Pollard has taken his Guided by Voices, Boston Spaceships and solo work seriously while using outlets like Circus Devils (as well as this year's earlier Teenage Guitar) as arenas in which to experiment. Now that Pollard has a nice home studio available to him 24/7, we can only assume that the more experimental records will become increasingly common. And, really, "experimental" is the word when discussing an album like When Machines Attack. Some critics call Pollard's Circus Devils albums "progressive," but I can't agree. Circus Devils records tend to be, compositionally speaking, mostly bare-bones affairs with odd song structures and sparse arrangements. When Machines Attack is no exception. It's a challenging album that features, as is usually the case for Pollard, a handful of gems and a plethora of, um, "growers."

The 40-minute, 19-song record opens with some gritty guitar riffs that remind of early Spoon records like *Series of Sneaks*. Over said riffs Pollard performs some sort of spoken word piece in a half-convincing, old man voice that hardly resembles his smoky, Whoobsessed Anglophile howl. Proper opener "You're Not a Police Car" is up next, coming off sounding like a demo for your hometown's next great art-rock band. It's the kind of track that, like many of Pollard's efforts, will grow on you with time (though you have to be in the right mood to sit through the whole thing). Finally we get to "Idiot Tree," a gritty rock song that offers us up our first dose of proper Pollard pop. The song starts to go off the tracks in the final seconds, but is, I think, one of *Machines*' most accessible offerings.


The next great moment comes in the record's title track, a twominute song that plays through in the spirit of punk-y art-rock bands

Ween

Chocolate and Cheese (1994)

Ween, a band that I discovered back in 1990 after listening to their record, *The Pod*, are sort of an artsy, lo-fi group and one of the best American underground bands that has ever produced music. Find a devoted fan and you can talk for hours about an



album or concert - and you will have made a new friend.

This release, their fourth, was the first one they actually recorded in a professional studio, and while not as organic as their early stuff, is still a really, really good album.

It opens with "Take Me Away," a snarky romantic number that, like most of their tracks, clocks in at around three minutes. "Spinal Meningitis" follows with a voice modulation overdub, and although lyrically difficult, it still has a great arrangement. Most of the songs they produced have subject matter that would offend the mainstream, but I think they got it right (in the strangest way) on this song. "A Tear for Eddie" is an homage to the great Parliament guitarist Eddie Hazel. A beautiful track with funk-jazz guitars, it showcased the talent that Mickey Melchiondo (aka Dean Ween) brought to this innovative band.

"Joppa Road" is another one of those great tracks buried in the Ween catalogue. With great harmonies and an almost bossa nova sound, it sounds like some of the 'yacht-rock' staples from the late 70s. "Voodoo Lady" explores Polynesian funk, and the smart vocals of Aaron Freeman (aka Gene Ween) and twisted effects make this one of my favorite tracks from the album. "Buenos Tardes Amigo" is a pretty cool ballad with a non-offensive fake Spanish accent. Freeman claims it was derived from a Spanish lesson he saw on *Sesame Street*. Clocking in at seven minutes, it may be one of the longer songs they ever did.

If you want to explore the amazing Ween, start with this record. (Dennis Donahue)

like Wire and Pere Ubu. That this is one of his most focused efforts on the album speaks volumes, as it's not exactly "Doughnut for a Snowman"-styled pop. Another favorite is "We're Going Inside the Head (of a Winner)," a slow, melodic, simple track that reminds, surprisingly, of the Eels' last great record, *Tomorrow Morning*, until it curiously kicks into full-on hard rock mode. Clocking in at over three minutes, "We're Going Inside" is the album's most substantial work. Sadly so.

As much as it pains me to bash a Robert Pollard record, When Machines Attack is, for my money, the worst thing Uncle Bob has done in a good long while. It's an interesting listen because Pollard is in such creative spirits, but the results of these sessions are largely unenjoyable and meandering. They feel personal, like sketches towards some next great idea. Here we have Robert Pollard, a man capable of writing some of the best pop rock songs of all time, so within that context I'm fine letting the guy wander and explore a bit from time to time – as long as he comes back with some Class Clown Spots a UFO-, Honey Locust Honky Tonk- and The Bears for Lunchlevel efforts every once and a while. As it stands, When Machines Attack is one of those not so rare Pollard records that is probably best avoided unless you're either (a) a super fan or (b) rolling in dough. Everyone else, save your money for his next solo record, which, if my theory about Pollard's approach to his serious work holds any weight, should be some degree of fantastic. (Greg W. Locke)

he said. "It was tough to get playing music again. The thing we were doing got cut off real quick. But I decided I had to keep it going for him and for Big Daddy as well."

Now with guitarist Trenton Ayers, a lifelong friend, Burnside is definitely keeping the Cedric Burnside Project alive while helping spread the legacy of his brother and grandfather and the hill country of north Mississippi in general. The new CBP album, *Here Me When I Say*, is getting lots of play on Sirius XM and the duo is spending lots of time on the road, including a recent tour of Europe.

"I just love to make that music. And people love to hear it."





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Filling in the Blanks

Before I Die by Candy Chang, St. Martin's Grifin, 2013

Candy Chang calls the project she undertook in New Orleans art, but it could just

as easily be seen as a particularly unscientific poll. Chang painted a boarded-up, abandoned house in her neighborhood with chalkboard paint, then she stenciled over and over again on the walls, "Before I

die I want to _____."
After that, she left some chalk nearby and stepped away. As she'd hoped, passersby immediately and enthusiastically began filling in the blanks. They wrote some entertaining things, but the specifics of their words are not nearly as interesting as is the broader response to the

project. BEFORE I DIE In this book of text and photo essays, Chang explain how her initial project in New Orleans inspired hundreds of imitators all over the world. "Before I Die" walls went up in New Zealand and Kazakhstan, Minneapolis and Jerusalem, and pretty much every place else in between.

Sometimes they were big installations like Chang's; sometimes they were panels hung on the wall of a restaurant. Sometimes they were organized by community or arts groups; sometimes they were more spontaneous and individual.

The way people filled in the blanks was not surprising. They gave answers that anyone would when asked to fill out a bucket list. They expressed the common desires to explore ("live in another country," "hike the Appalachian Trail"), to tote up experiences ("write a book," "live in Paris and eat croissants in the Tuilleries with a café au lait and a good book," "hold a public office"), to be good and loving ("make the world a better place," "change the world with love and compassion,' the exception to the rule," "help my neighbor"), to appear deep and quirky ("find out who I am," "evaporate into the light," "find my mythical creature," "build a magnetic car").

As a way to get a true glimpse into the minds of the writers, the project is of questionable value. The responses are full of faux humility, unrealistic pipe dreams, platitudes, psychobabble and cute irrony, and they don't show much evidence of people sincerely contemplating the real fleetingness of life. They say lots of pretty things,



but they're self-consciously pretty things. Chang is interested, more than in the words themselves, in the community involvement that comes out of the projects, the interactions between people as they write on the walls, the awareness of the world around the writers that the projects encourage.

The projects become most intriguing when they're viewed as a whole, rather than as statements by individuals. Compare walls from different locations and

you begin to get a sense that people, although full of similar wishful thinking, are subtly unique from place to place. It seems like people are more practical in China, more serious in Brooklyn, more goofy in Berlin.

You don't have to draw conclusions anecdotally, though; there

is some data in the back of the book that helps to bring the big picture into clearer focus. First of all, everyone's wishes are across-the-board altruistic; when you combine responses that express concern for family, loved ones and other people in general, you account for a full 41 percent of all the things that respondents intend to do before they die. More selfcentered pursuits such as wealth (4 percent), sex (3 percent) and fame (2percent) are apparently not on many people's minds. It's not clear how all the people who intend to travel (12 percent) are planning to do so while ignoring wealth. And although religion (4 percent) is not on many people's minds, people in Minneapolis are apparently more religious than people in the Netherlands, who think more about sex than anyone else.

What can we conclude from all this? Maybe that people who write pithy sayings on walls are not very practical, and that they write about things they wish they did ("change the world") more than things they actually do. It doesn't inspire confidence that a "Before I Die" wall is going to do much to change a world, or probably even the behavior of the individuals who write on it. It might, however, bring a few strangers together for a minute or two - get them to talk, to laugh with one another - and that's never a bad thing.

Paying to park your car always seems like a slap in the face. Well, in some cities it feels more like a punch to the gut. Owning a car is ridiculously expensive, and the idea of having to pay money just to let it stand still is absurd. But fear not my fellow gratis automobile placement advocates, this weekend you can save those few dollars for the finer things in life. That's right, the Fort Wayne Philharmonic is performing their next Masterworks performance at the IPFW Rhinehart Music Center Auer Performance Hall where you can park for free on Saturday, January 25 at 8 p.m.

If the free parking isn't quite enough to convince you, then the great lineup of music from Prokofiev,

Arnold, and Schubert should be more than worth the price of admission. The evening kicks off with Sergei Prokofiev's vibrant Classical Symphony. Written early in the composer's career, his Classical Symphony serves as the perfect example of what would later define Prokofiev. It

is mischievously difficult to play, yet carefree and light-hearted in its approach. Prokofiev wrote it as both an homage and parody to the traditional classical forms. It is likely you will never hear another piece that demands so much from the orchestra yet ends up sounding so incredibly cute.

Next, the Phil features two of its own with Olga Yurkova and Johanna Bourkova-Morunov performing Malcolm Arnold's *Concerto for Two Violins*. Arnold, a modern English composer, offers all the usual perks of contemporary British music. The soloists are accompanied by a string orchestra with music featuring lush and beautiful harmonies along with what I can only describe as "fresh" sounding sonorities. Only at the Phil can you hear two Russian violinists

living in Fort Wayne performing English music. If only there was some German music to round out the evening.

But wait, you are in luck! Also featured are the vocal stylings of tenor Keith Brautigam, another local talent, as he tackles two of Schubert's most beloved songs "Nacht und Traeume" and "Erlkoenig." I have always been a fan of "Erlkoenig," as it is one

of the most chilling pieces of classical music written in the 1800s. Something about hearing messed-up German poetry about elven kings trying to lure sick children into their kingdom of death really keeps you up at night. The evening concludes with Schubert's Symphony No. 4 in C minor which Schu-

bert himself called his "Tragic Symphony." No one really knows exactly why besides the obvious minor key, but the really tragic part is the fact that the work did not premiere until two years after Schubert's death.

This concludes another memorable night of music at the Phil that should not be missed. If you have yet to hear a concert at the state-of-the-art IPFW Auer Performance Hall then this is the perfect opportunity as well. Tickets start at \$17 for Adults or \$10 for students with ID. Daisy Ages Gracefully

The film Driving Miss Daisy, starring Jessica Tandy, who won the Oscar as Miss Daisy, and Morgan Freeman, won the Best Picture Oscar in 1990. Before that it won a Pulitzer Prize for Drama. When I reserved a ticket to see First Presbyterian Theater's production of it this past weekend, I realized I had never seen the filmed version of the story about a wealthy Southern Jewish woman who, having crashed her car, is driven for 25 years by a chauffeur, Hoke Coleburn, hired

by her son. Generally, I am glad when I don't have much familiarity with the performances of film stars playing the roles local actors assume on our stages, since I too often seem less able to enjoy what I'm seeing.

There are many themes one could pull from this play, written by Alfred Uhry, as director Thom Hofrichter discusses in his program notes. As the relationship between Daisy and Hoke grows during the period between 1947 and 1972, the play shows both Daisy and her driver as outsiders of sorts – she due to her religion

and he because of his race. Growing past their preconceived notions of "other," they forge a sweet connection through the years they are together. The play includes a visit by Daisy to a dinner honoring Dr. Martin Luther King Jr., centering one of the play's messages firmly around equality and race relations and her strange handling of inviting Hoke to accompany her.

What struck me more than that, though, was the role of aging and physical decline in the story. When we meet Daisy at age 72.

director in Laughing Stock, has selected three shows to perform within a hectic repertory schedule. He plans to have his cast of players perform Charley's Aunt one night, Dracula the next and Hamlet in between for the weekend matinee.

hired to direct *Charley's Aunt*. Susannah reveals her modern vision of *Charley's Aunt* to a perplexed cast of performers when she announces that she wants to explore the deeper, symbolic "anguish of gender" of *Charley's Aunt*. Gordon's attempt to steer her back toward a more traditional interpretation – "but funny inner torment and rage, right?" – can't even dent her misguided concept. Soon her reluctant cast are exploring the "primitive" aspects of their *Charley's Aunt* characterizations as they improvise being crocodiles, wildebeests and lions in search of the true meaning of

gender identity at an African waterhole.

Dracula, Prince of the Undead starts off on a more familiar footing but is quickly derailed when Tyler (Joel Grillo) insists on incorporating his method acting skills into his interpretation of the famed vam-

pire. However, even Tyler's outlandish "Dracula meets Brando" interpretation of his role is upstaged by an independent-minded fog machine, exploding crosses that refuse to explode and a mechanical bat that just can't seem to stay airhorne

The Playhouse's production of *Hamlet* gets a sur-

prisingly good start until Yorick's skull gets misplaced somewhere backstage and a cantaloupe is considered as its understudy – "Alas, poor Yorick."

Laughing Stock is an affectionate, hilarious peek behind the curtain of the lives of summer stock actors, actresses, stagehands and directors as they navigate friendships, romance, alcohol, humidity and missed cues. We'll even throw in the sound of crickets and a few annoying mosquitoes to remind you that summertime is just around the corner (or at least it is at Arena Dinner Theatre).





category (though Julie Delpy was truly fantastic in Richard Linklater's Before Midnight). Like Daniel Day-Lewis, Blanchett is simply operating on a different level than her colleagues and contemporaries. That said, in my book, Adele Exarchopoulos' star-making performance in Blue is the Warmest Color was the best performance I saw all year by an actor.

Thus far, Best Supporting Actress honors have mostly been going to the most likable woman on the planet, American Hustle actress Jennifer Lawrence. And while I do think she was great in that role, I think Lea Seydoux's performance opposite Exarchopoulos in Blue is the Warmest Color was easily the year's best supporting performance. She won't get nominated, though. Lawrence is probably a lock, though it'd be great to see Blue Jasmine's Sally Hawkins sneak in and steal the show, as she was truly great in Woody's latest

BEST SCREENPLAY

Spike Jonze won the Best Screenplay statue at the Golden Globes Sunday night, surprising a whole lot of people. His *Her* script beat out more celebrated scripts by John Ridley, Jeff Pop and Steve Coogan, Bob Nelson and Eric Singer and David O. Russell. Something tells me Jonze might repeat at the Oscars. In fact, I could see his *Her* surprising a whole lot of people on Oscar night in a handful of categories. My three favorite screenplays, however, belonged to Abdellatif Kechiche (Blue is the Warmest Color), the Coen Brothers (Inside Llewyn Davis) and Derek Cianfrance (The Place Beyond the Pines), with Kechiche most worthy of the honors.

BEST DIRECTOR

As for Best Director honors, we have a whole lot of heavy hitters going after the statue this year, including Martin Scorsese, Alfonso Cuaron, Woody Allen, Steve McQueen, Alexander Payne, David O. Russell, the Coen Brothers, Jonze and perhaps a surprise nomination like Abdellatif Kechiche. And while I think Cuaron or McQueen will win come Oscar night, my pick would be Kechiche, who directed the year's most hu-

BEST PICTURE

Now, finally, we have Best Picture honors. Oscar night can go any which way these days. A movie like Her or Gravity or even the great Inside Llewyn Davis could end up being a big surprise that sweeps several of the big categories. My guess, though, is that either 12 Years a Slave or American Hustle end up taking the top honors. Both are great films, but, for my money Nicolas Winding Refn's Only God Forgives and Kechiche's Blue is the Warmest Color were by far the year's two most interesting - and best - films. Blue could maybe steal a Best Picture nomination, but I doubt it; here's hoping it at least wins Best Foreign Film honors.

Check back next week if you're at all curious about how the Oscar nominations played out. We'll definitely have some more opinions to share.

she's just proven, at least to her son Boolie, that she should no longer be driving herself, which is what leads to his interviewing and hiring of Hoke who impresses Boolie during the interview, since he had been the driver of a prominent local judge and friend of Daisy's deceased husband. Much like On Golden Pond, another acclaimed play and well-loved film about aging, this story shows two strong-willed human beings facing old age with grace and humor, leaning on each other in ways neither would have expected or would acknowledge until they had spent many years together forging a strange but beautiful friendship. Near the end of the play many in

the audience were sniffling. Hofrichter acknowledges that foremost among his reasons for choosing to include this play in this year's lineup was that he wanted local actress Kate Black to play the role of Daisy. She does so - as those of us who have seen her act would expect - brilliantly, aging as Daisy does to near 100.

Everett Collier, making his first appearance on a Fort Wayne stage, is a perfect fit for the role of Hoke. He brings a fine mix of humor and humility to the role, and I hope to see him in other roles lo-

Rounding out the small cast is Scott Rumage as Boolie. He gets to have a great deal of fun playing the goofy Boolie but is also fine when he has to show genuine concern for his challenging mother.

The majority of scenes in this play – which has a run time of 90 minutes without intermission - are very brief, without any lengthy monologues. This, though, felt right, as the relationship forming the heart of the play took many brief exchanges to develop and add up to create a lovely picture of friendship between two people doing their best.

I have lots of friends who frequent this establishment, and obviously quite a few who don't. I often go there for lunch. I work downtown, and it's very close. I know I'll run into a myriad of downtown business people, so it's great for socializing and networking.

I have also gone there for lots of shows. They get

a variety of bands that play back in the Tiger Room. I've also stopped in after work for an after-5 brew or cocktail on many occasions.

On this particular night I was going for a coworker's birthday party and took a mutual friend who is recently back in the Fort after a bit of a hiatus. I got to see the place with brand new eyes.

We arrived and asked for a beer menu. I love that more and more places have a real beer menu. Sixteen taps and a variety of bottles. Not bad. We ordered up. I got a Bells Double Cream Stout (6.1 abv), and she got a Sierra Nevada Pale Ale (5.6 abv). Both were served in pint glasses. We perused the food

menu. Chatted a bit. Then she says, "I never would have guessed, driving by, that this place would be so charming. Its not only charming, it's cozy, yet spacious - and they have

amazing beers!" I was so caught off-guard by her enthusiasm. I have been there so many times, witnessing it through new eyes made me fall in love with the place all over again.

I ordered simply as I always do. A BLT and fries. She opted out of eating. The food is good. As always. I'm not a foodie and not overly picky. They have a



good service especially appreciated: I'm not a regular, but I get great service. I can't stress this enough. Service will make up for any transgression, any time.

Back to the beer. The Bells Double Cream is one of my favorite Stouts. Some Stouts are heavy with coffee, chocolate or a burnt note in some way. Bells Double Cream is simply creamy and delicious without too much of any overpowering flavor. There is no actual dairy in this



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
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
