

# One Man's Trash

In early October 2013 two adult whales and one juvenile were carefully loaded onto a moving truck and carried south to the Port Canaveral, Florida. The whales were hung from the ceiling in the vast atrium of the Port Canaveral Welcome Center by artist Sayaka Ganz and her small team of supporters. Each adult whale measures 12 feet long, with the baby coming in at a smaller five. Together they form an installation that makes a powerful visual statement to visitors. Careful observers are quick to notice the vast, mysterious animals are

constructed from mundanely familiar materials. Hundreds of castaway items such as plastic spoons, a few coat hangers and even a snow sled make up the outer covering of the sculptures created by the skillful hands of a humble and me-

ticulous Fort Wayne artist.

Ganz is a sculptor who explores discarded materials. She turns waste into graceful works of art that cut through space with racing energy. The majority of her pieces honor animals known for heart-thumping speed. Horses with wild, flowing manes, a dashing, aerodynamic cheetah and a rookery of penguins darting under foaming waves are a few of her subjects. Her forms are composed of plastic spatulas and other gadgets collected from area thrift stores. She searches discarded piles for curvilinear forms that lend themselves to the organic slopes found in her subjects. Long, flowing lines are used to create the electric sense of movement.

Ganz's connection to castoffs is seated in her childhood. Growing up in several different countries, she was forced to adapt to a variety of situations. At an early age she was a flexible thinker ready to survey new situations to figure out how she could fit in. Over and over, childhood challenged Ganz to discover how to connect with others. The experiences left her longing for a sense of purpose. A kindergarten teacher taught Ganz a lesson of Shintoism that made a great impact on her personal philosophy. The lesson said that all objects, alive and non-living, have spirits. When objects are discarded they have feelings of sadness. The thought of this touched Ganz





who, as an artist, reclaims these items and gives them new life, hoping to bring them a sense of place and purpose.

Thousands of objects sorted by color into thirty, clear plastic bins, wait in her basement for the opportunity to find purpose as part of Ganz's work. When she begins a new piece, photographs taken from several angles serve as reference points for Ganz as she builds an armature, or skeleton, from thick aluminum wire, which serves as the foundation for the plastic pieces. To accentuate movement, Ganz carefully chooses long, curved pieces and attaches them to the armature in parallel, overlapping only when she is sure the flow of motion will not be interrupted. She takes time to look closely then steps away, going back and forth, over and over, to ensure the piece takes on a lifelike quality. Ganz is intrigued by the form and shape of animals, but she is even more interested in the shapes an animal makes as it darts, runs, or glides.

"Movement summarizes the fundamental existence of living beings," she explains.

Bringing new life to the objects she collects gives Ganz a sense of purpose and peace, but within her bins of supplies there are some forms that tend to get passed over. Finding the right home for all of the plastic parts she amasses is a chal-

"In the animals I look for very specific shapes. There are pieces that get left behind, especially round pieces like cups and bowls. I'd like to come up with an abstract relief using

those pieces," says Ganz who seems to keep her thoughts one step ahead of herself. Many of her misfit parts found a home within the Port Canaveral installation as strands of bubbles and kelp.

"The bubbles and kelp became simplified - very abstract. I made them into mobiles, and a colleague. Jim Mertz, helped me shape the wire so they could move. This idea allowed me to use the objects that I hadn't been using in the past," said Ganz. Large installations give her the opportu-

nity to explore new ideas and uses for materials.

A recent stay at an artist residency, The Art Farm, located in Marquette, Nebraska, allowed Ganz to explore a new material: inner tubes from discarded tires. Her interest in the material stems from a pile of rubble pulled from the Maumee River in Fort Wayne. She was asked to develop a sculpture using metal objects pulled from the river during an annual cleaning effort. Not many metal pieces were salvaged, but an alarming load of discarded tires piled up alongside the river.

"There were so many tires - enough to fill a small garage," said Ganz. "Volunteers pull tires out of the river each year, cleaning up after people who throw them in, thinking that because they are covered and unseen they somehow disappear." Frustrated by the discovery, Ganz was determined to find a use for the material.

She spent three days of her residency washing and preparing a modest collection of inner tubes. She cut the material with scissors and used a hole-punch to develop a delicate. lacy appearance and was able to transform a heavy, dirty material into something to reflect life and renewal: a tree.

During her time at The Art Farm, Ganz was faced with the burden that waste imposes. With no garbage service, the residency campus is forced to handle every detail of processing its own refuse. Composting, sorting, reusing and recycling all take effort. Ganz explains that when people realize

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# ----- Feature • The Addams Family-----Gracefully Aging Ghouls

At one time films and even television took their lead from Broadway. Film versions of classic and beloved stage shows were common, and TV networks would try to parlay that success into a weekly cash cow (Here Come the Brides from Seven Brides for Seven Brothers, for example). But these days the opposite often happens; even films are often remakes of classic and beloved television programs. Everything from Bewitched to Charlie's Angels has hit the big

screen in recent years, and in some instances those television to film transformations have found their way to the Broadway stage.

Case in point, The Addams Family. The theme song alone has endured for nearly half a century (currently being used in a television commercial), but the ghoulish and sexy story of Gomez and Morticia and their wacky family has remained a favorite since its fairly short two-season run (1964-66). Based on the New Yorker cartoons by Charles Addams, TV's The Addams Family was ABC's answer to the equally spookdriven The Munsters on CBS, and it injected a bit of saucy humor from the lustful inter-

actions between the parental characters, played on television by John Astin and Carolyn Jones.


Although two seasons isn't a particularly stellar record for a television series, constant reruns and syndication helped it build a loyal audience, making a film version in 1991 and a subsequent sequel, Addams Family Values, in 1993 a fairly safe bet. While some television shows lose something in their move to the big screen, The Addams Family's larger than life characters and campy gags made it a more natural fit than most. And so successful were the films, which starred Raul Julia and Angelica Huston in the leads, that Broadway took the idea and ran with it.

While the side characters – from young daughter Wednesday to crazy Uncle Fester to the spooky butler Lurch - certainly added to the fun, it was the strong lead characters played by equally strong actors which made the story work in so many formats. So it isn't surprising that when the show made its way to musical theatre, two of Broadways biggest stars, Nathan Lane and Bebe Neuwirth, were cast to lead the way. The show lasted on Broadway from early 2010 until the end

of 2011, and at that point the show hit the road throughout the U.S. and internation-

When the show visits the Niswonger Performing Arts Center in Van Wert on January 31, it does so with an accomplished cast as well. Playing the suave Gomez is Jesse Sharp, a stage veteran who has toured nationally with Grease while honing his comedy chops with the famed Groundlings and at renowned clubs like The Comedy Store. Keleen Snowgren takes on the role of Morticia after having toured in shows like Monty the original series ran, critics were less than enthused by it initially, with the typically harsher New York Times critic generally dismissing it. But reviews for the performances from the current touring cast have been enthusiastic. The show's visit to Portland, Oregon last June won over local critic Claire Gordon who commented on the cast's vocal talents and the show's timely references to everything from health care to Charlie

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The stage version of The Addams Family picks up a few years later than the series and films, with a now grown daughter Wednesday set to marry a "normal" boy from a traditional family, setting up the inevitable family showdown with comic results.

Of course what sells any musical are the songs, and The Addams Family is no exception. Brought to musical life by Marshall Brickman and Rick Elice, the pair responsible for the hugely successful Jersey Boys, along with Andrew Lippa who provided the score, The Addams Family kicks off with the show's best known number, "When You're an Addams," a song which introduces not only the characters to the audience, but sets the comedic tone for the entire show. Naturally, the well-known Addams Family theme is cleverly showcased before the overture.

Although the Broadway production was enjoyed by audiences for almost as long as

Captured brightly on the stage, it's now possible to find out what the creepy bunch would be like in the 21st century and judging from the response of thousands of happy theater-goers, they've aged grace-

#### Mercury

Miracle's Mercury is a loving homage to early 80s synth pop, much like Quentin Tarantino's loving film homages to 70s exploitation films. Like Tarantino, Steve Moore and singer Daniel O'Sullivan have created a debut album that is steeped in inspiration but never blatantly apes



that inspiration. Unlike most of the 80s synth revivals as of late, Miracle take this sound very seriously, and the tone here is dark and heady. There are no fun dance tracks here, kids.

"Good Love," with its arpeggiated synth line, electronic drums and O'Sullivan's best prepubescent Dave Gahan vocal, is as brooding as it gets. "Something Is Wrong" sounds like a lost Saga dance track.

Moore's synth playing, whether in pop mode or his more proggy stuff with Zombi, is instantly recognizable. His playing lends a hefty low end and a chunk of credibility to a genre that has otherwise been mined and stripped bare over the last few years by a bunch of kids that think The Strokes invented rock n' roll. They didn't. And you know what? Moore didn't invent synth pop either; nor is he saying he did. He's taking a crack at it, and he and O'Sullivan have done a pretty good job here.

"Automatic and Invisible" takes a stab at a sensual sound and pulls it off nicely. There's still a progressive undertone to Mercury, but it's done in a more laid back manner - something like New Order on a Yes kick, minus the 30-minute keyboard solos. Moore and O'Sullivan's earnest, never tongue-in-cheek approach lends an authenticity to their sound. "Neverending Arc" is as dark as the album gets, with an ominous sound that brings to mind John Carpenter soundtracks and Vince Clarke's darker moments.

If you're not into proggy synth textures, darker moments of early 80s alternative or balladry made for the Beyond Thunderdome crowd, you'll probably not get much out of this record. But if you've been a fan of Moore's work (particularly Zombi's Escape Velocity) and A. E. Paterra's Majeure album Timespan, you'd be hard pressed to find a more satisfying listen on a cold, winter's eve. (John Hubner)

#### **Death Grips**

#### **Government Plates**

Like with their previous effort, No Love Deep Web, Death Grips have released their new album for free on the internet, proving that if they are to remain inaccessible to the most forgiving masses, at least they're one of the most generous groups to emerge in recent years. Their gener-



osity, however, may be their way of compensating for their failure to show up at last year's Lollapalooza festival, leading some fans to misconstrue Death Grips as a switch-and-bait act. It's also hard not to interpret their music as a switch-and-bait of sorts; while generally regarded as hip-hop, they take an avant garde approach that barely resembles the genre at all.

Between their sexually explicit album covers and their inclinations to employ scatological ramblings in their approach to hip-hop music, polarization has been a part of their repertoire since they emerged from the Sacramento rap scene in 2010. Death Grips are a hard band to understand and appreciate, but they're not altogether unwelcoming, as evidenced by the closing track, "Whatever I Want." Your ability to understand their appeal will rely on how experienced you are in the realm of experimental and electronic-based music, and it has never been so apparent than with Government Plates, their third (technically fourth) album in just two years.

It's hard to say Government Plates is an improvement over their previous work because the album acts more like a continuation of their trademark industrial/experimental hip-hop approach. "You Might Think He Loves You for Your Money, But I Know What He Really Loves You For, It's Your Brand New Leopard Skin Pillbox Hat" is a blunt opener that instantly makes us flinch with the shattering of glass and then proceeds to pound us into submission with a dubstep-like wobble beat. From there, the Death Grips occasionally make conscious, yet seemingly accidental attempts to become more appealing with the rhythmic "Anne Bonny" and the vaguely melodic "Birds," but it's still not the sort of music that would be

#### **Jefferson Airplane**

Jefferson Airplane Takes Off (1966)

Jefferson Airplane's debut album did not include Grace Slick or Spencer Dryden, but it was still very influential in the launch of psychedelic-folk in the mid to late 60s.

"Blues From An Airplane" opens the record with a haunting riff

from guitarist Paul Kantner and soft backing vocals from Signe Anderson (who left the band after this record). Although Marty Balin was the lead vocalist, it was the harmony from the rest of the band that made their sound so stunning. Kantner takes over on the mic in the earthy folk number "Let Me In," and Balin takes over again on the lovesick "Bringing Me Down." Side one closes with a nice cover of John Loudermilk's "Tobacco Road," a hit for The Nashville Teens just a couple of years earlier.

Side two brings the tempo down with the melancholy "Come Up The Years," but it picks up a little in the soulful "Run Around." "Don't Slip Away" continues the electric folk with nice guitars before Anderson takes over the vocals in "Chauffeur Blues," a blues song originally recorded in 1941 by Memphis Minnie. Jefferson Airplane cover it with a folksier tempo that fits perfectly on Takes Off. The record closes with "And I Like It," a great bluesy number that Balin really pours his heart into.

After this release and a brief tour, Anderson and drummer Skip Spence left the band. They were replaced by Dryden and Slick, and the rest is rock n' roll history. Anderson had health problems in the 1970s and is believed to be back in her home state of Oregon. Spence went on to play with Moby Grape but tragically wound up addicted to heroin and homeless. He died in 1999, just days before his 53rd birthday. (Dennis Donahue)

well-received, or even appropriate, on a mainstream platform like, say, Letterman or Leno.

It would be easy to say that Kanye West has a kindred spirit in Death Grips, considering how Yeezus was a clean break from traditional hip-hop in favor of electro grinds and abhorrent aggression. Even if Yeezus wasn't directly inspired by Death Grips, the style employed by both artists foreshadows what may become the blueprint for how the sonic templates of rap are forged in the 2010s. If indeed the rest of hip-hop decides to follow their examples, Death Grips are among the pioneers. (Colin McCallister)

#### **Nearest Suns**

Seconds into "Be Gone," the lead off track from Brad Laner's solo album Nearest Suns, you know this isn't going to be your average listening experience. Part psych-pop, part Eastern-influenced, and all aural sunlit grandeur, Laner takes his Medicine magic, spreads it over 60s-influenced



like Reznor, Godrich and Allen when it comes to audio geek prowess. He does things that seem otherworldly to music. In an interview Laner told me that he would much rather be in the studio creating than playing live. He feels playing live hinders his ability to create. If this is the case, you wouldn't know it from listening to this excellent long player. And the fact that he put out the first Medicine album in 18 years (that one he put out with Bruce Lee's lovely daughter doesn't really count) back in the summer, then released Nearest Suns in October, makes me think the guy is brimming with creativity

The songs here run the gamut from Beatles-inflected pop, CS-NY-inspired vocal arrangements and even jazzy rhythms, all melded together with Laner's studio trickery that leaves the listener guffawed and breathless. "Be Gone," "Time Balm" and "Catapult" are sublimely constructed pop gems filled with aural spells that lull and sway. At times the songs come across complicated but never convo-

# **Expect the Expected**

The Highway by C.J. Box, Minotaur Books, 2013

I'm exactly the opposite of a summertime beach reader. I get the urge

to read pulpy best-selling novels when I'm snowed in during the most frigid part of winter, and that's precisely where I was recently – so I made my selection and settled down for a long winter's read. My first novel of 2014, thus selected, is *The Highway* by C.J. Box, the award-winning author of the Joe Pickett series of mysteries. Or so the book's jacket tells me.

The novel's premise is fairly

simple, even if its cast of characters is large: there's a killer on the road. And I'm not just making the Doors reference to be cute; Box quotes "Riders on the Storm" right at the beginning of the book, and the book's killer calls himself the Lizard King. He's a longhaul truck driver who kidnaps prostitutes from truck stop parking lots and murders them in his truck. He has a hunger for less seedy prey, though, and he sets his sights on Gracie and Danielle, teen-age sis-

ters who are on a road trip

from Colorado and stray

into the Lizard King's path i

Montana. Danielle's boyfriend, Justin, lives in Montana, and Justin's dad is Cody Hoyt, a renegade cop who only wants to get the bad guys and can't seem to work within the system. Hoyt's partner is Cassie Dewell, an earnest rookie who is struggling with sexism and corruption within the department. When Gracie and Danielle fall into the Lizard King's trap, it's up to Cody and Cassie, despite their vastly different police-work styles, to find the girls before it's too late.

The Highway is an excellent illustration of the difference between mystery series and standalone mystery novels. Box's previous novel, Back of Beyond, was a stand-alone, but it starred Cody Hoyt, along with Justin, Danielle, Gracie and their spineless father; thus, The Highway couldn't rightly be called a stand-alone, and it comes up against a couple of obstacles that mystery series have to navigate.

First, there's the problem of credibility; the plausibility of the series' fictional world gets more



tenuous as the series' characters encounter extraordinary circumstances over and over again. In the real world, fortunately, teenagers don't often encounter serial killers, but Gracie and Danielle have run into two of them within the space of two years.

Then there's the problem of suspense. If we know that the series depends on certain characters, we know they're likely to remain safe despite the dangers that surround them. This problem, at least, Box handles with an unexpected touch.

But there's not much else that's unexpected in The Highway, mostly because the story is assembled from a collection of story fragments with which we're all familiar. The Lizard King is part Norman Bates, part Leatherface, and the secret world he's part of seems a lot like the plot of that movie from the 90s where Kurt Russell is menaced by a sin-

ister truck driver.

Cody Hoyt is every renegade cop you've ever seen, from Clint Eastwood to Bruce Willis, and Gracie and Danielle are polar opposite sisters, like the Dunphy girls on Modern Family.

I'd be more willing to forgive all this if Box weren't also prone to making lots of petty mistakes, like writing "expansion bridge" when he means suspension bridge, or "seasonable ranger" when he means seasonal ranger. Or using a phrase as ridiculous as "the clatter of a clattering diesel engine." Then there's the way that Box shows off his research into trucker lingo when he has the Lizard King's internal monologue include parenthetical clarifications like "commercial driver's license (CDL)" and "less than a load (LTL)"; I don't know about you, but I don't usually have to explain myself to myself when I'm thinking to myself.

I don't need my mystery novels to be fine art, but I do need them to be reasonably well crafted. *The Highway* got me through my cabin fever this time, but I have to say that I hope Gillian Flynn has a new novel before the next snowstorm hits.

luted. Laner knows when just to pull back and give us a sweet harmony in place of musical abstraction. Like Medicine's *To the Happy Few* earlier in 2013, this record perfectly weaves the harsh with the delicate. You're never sure which way a song may diverge, but you're always pleasantly surprised by where you end up.

"Dream Drug" wavers in your ears like psychedelic hummingbirds swimming in LSD-laced square waves. "Nearly Hospital High" harkens back to Laner's early Medicine days: San Francisco's Haight-Ashbury tie-dyed positivity mixed with a good portion of Creation Records' dark horses. "Holiday King" melts over you with breathy harmonies and trance-like percussion. "None of the Above" and "Eight Question"

Marks" end the album on more pointed, jagged notes. Filled with dissonance and obtuse vocal structures, these songs serve to prove that Laner takes musical cues from more than just 60s pop and 80s alternative.

Nearest Suns confirms Laner as an amazing songwriter and producer. His production prowess is second to none. He's an indie rock Jon Brion. And while at times *Nearest Suns* can sound a little strange, it never gets boring. In my book, strange is good. (*John Hub*ner)

# Russell's 'Bumpy Rides' Are Increasingly Fun

David O. Russell makes films that teeter-totter between comedy and drama. Sometimes, in films like Spanking the Monkey or I Heart Huckabees, the ride is as bumpy as a ride on an aging piece of that playground equipment. Behind the screen things can get bumpy too; George Clooney and Russell came to blows on the set of *Three Kings*, and Clooney vowed never to work with him again. But with 2010's The Fighter, Silver Linings Playbook last year and now American *Hustle*, he keeps making a bumpy ride more and more fun. American Hustle is so much fun it has 10 Oscar nominations and Golden Globe wins and nominations and is very much in the fabric of this year's awards whirlwind.

Based loosely on the Abscam scandal, the film opens with the phrase, "Some of this actually happened." American Hustle is a mix of so many delectable elements it is nearly impossible to characterize, but that opening warning is so much more fun than a straightforward "based on a true story" or the more pompous "based upon a true story" that we are set up to laugh.

The Hollywood Foreign Press Association awarded American Hustle the Golden Globe for Best Comedy. I laughed often, and microwave ovens will now and forever more be known as "science ovens." But American Hustle is about much more than a few laughs.

In the late 70s a con man selling fake masterpieces to the rich and foolish makes the mistake of selling a painting to an undercover FBI agent. But the agent has nearly blind ambition to make a name for himself. He also has a soft spot for the bravado and cleverness of the con man, a passion for the con man's partner/mistress and a taste for illegal substances.

Rather than send this pair of scam artists off to prison, he enlists them to help him catch bigger fish. There isn't too much in the film that sticks to the facts of the actual Abscam scandal, so all future information refers to the film, not the

Just after the warning that "some of this actually hapbened," we see a man constructing an elaborate comb over. These hairdos actually happen, but I had never seen how it's done. The hair belongs to Irving Rosenfeld and is a perfect symbol of Irving's ability to construct something that is not



what it seems.

The opening scenes are the set-up for a pay-off involving Irving, Carmine Polito (the mayor of a New Jersey town), a partner of Irving's calling herself Lady Greensley, a congressman and a suitcase full of money. The meeting is being recorded by the FBI, and things don't go as well as planned. To explain how everyone arrived at this situation, we get voice-over background from Irving and his partner. But even more interesting and entertaining than what is happening are the characters involved.

Barely recognizable as Irving is Christian Bale. His mistress and partner of multiple identities is Amy Adams. Both worked with Russell in *The Fighter*. Irving's loose cannon of a wife Rosalyn is Jennifer Lawrence. The overly ambitious FBI agent, Richie DiMaso, is Bradley Cooper. Both worked with Russell in Silver Linings Playbook. All four of these actors have well-deserved Oscar nominations for their performances here.

The terrific performances don't stop with these four. Robert DeNiro, another veteran of Silver Linings Playbook, makes a brief but sublime appearance as a crime boss. Jeremy Renner, in a role unlike those we're used to seeing him in, is compelling as the mayor trying unsuccessfully to be a good guy. Elizabeth Rohm is wonderful as Carmine's wife Dolly, a role far away from the blonde prosecutor she played on Law and Order. Perhaps most amusing performance is Louis C.K. as Stoddard Thorsen, DiMaso's by-the-book FBI boss. (Towards the end of the film Cooper does an imitation of his boss' huffing and puffing that is hilarious mimicry.)

What gets in the way of DiMaso's plan to make a name for himself by getting politicians to take bribes is a complicated web of human frailties including friendship, love, loyalty, greed, pride, jealousy and passion. And, as is so often true, many of the complications involve women.

Despite his wife, large belly and comb-over, Sydney loves Irving. They have fallen in love over a shared passion for Duke Ellington, and they are perfect for each other, two lost souls trying to make the world work for them. As Sydney says her "dream was to become anyone other than who I was." Irving has been trying to transform himself since he was a teenager throwing rocks through store windows so his father's window replacement business would have custom-

Early in their relationship they enjoy a passionate encounter in one of his dry cleaners. American Hustle delights in 70s trappings, and what could be more '70's than making out while a dry-cleaning rack swirls around you?

Irving's wife, Rosalyn, isn't crazy about her husband but she wants him to take care of her and their son. She certainly doesn't want anyone else to have him. She knows about Sydney and doesn't like it. She's brash and beautiful, and men flock to her, and she doesn't mind the attention at

Richie lusts after Sydney, and key to Irving and Sydney getting out from under their troubles with the law is Sydney's ability to convince Richie that he is who she really wants when the sting has been accomplished.

All this intrigue and passion is orchestrated with style. Russell, a devoted admirer of Scorsese, has made a film that uses every play in Scorsese's book. Swirling camera work, the perfect score with hits of the era, wonderful period detail in all aspects of the production design (especially hair and costume), a great screenplay and an obvious joy in the pro-

These two directors are both nominated for their work. and their movies are nominated for Best Picture. In this particular match-up, Russell has an advantage. The women in American Hustle are irresistible. With women so brazen. beautiful, flawed and fascinating, no film overloaded with testosterone can be as seductive. I have a couple more Best Picture nominees to see, but so far, American Hustle has my vote. If only I had a vote.

# **Expect the Expected**

The Highway by C.J. Box, Minotaur Books, 2013

I'm exactly the opposite of a summertime beach reader. I get the urge

to read pulpy best-selling novels when I'm snowed in during the most frigid part of winter, and that's precisely where I was recently – so I made my selection and settled down for a long winter's read. My first novel of 2014, thus selected, is *The Highway* by C.J. Box, the award-winning author of the Joe Pickett series of mysteries. Or so the book's jacket tells me.

The novel's premise is fairly

simple, even if its cast of characters is large: there's a killer on the road. And I'm not just making the Doors reference to be cute; Box quotes "Riders on the Storm" right at the beginning of the book, and the book's killer calls himself the Lizard King. He's a longhaul truck driver who kidnaps prostitutes from truck stop parking lots and murders them in his truck. He has a hunger for less seedy prey, though, and he sets his sights on Gracie and Danielle, teen-age sis-

ters who are on a road trip

from Colorado and stray

into the Lizard King's path i

Montana. Danielle's boyfriend, Justin, lives in Montana, and Justin's dad is Cody Hoyt, a renegade cop who only wants to get the bad guys and can't seem to work within the system. Hoyt's partner is Cassie Dewell, an earnest rookie who is struggling with sexism and corruption within the department. When Gracie and Danielle fall into the Lizard King's trap, it's up to Cody and Cassie, despite their vastly different police-work styles, to find the girls before it's too late.

The Highway is an excellent illustration of the difference between mystery series and standalone mystery novels. Box's previous novel, Back of Beyond, was a stand-alone, but it starred Cody Hoyt, along with Justin, Danielle, Gracie and their spineless father; thus, The Highway couldn't rightly be called a stand-alone, and it comes up against a couple of obstacles that mystery series have to navigate.

First, there's the problem of credibility; the plausibility of the series' fictional world gets more



tenuous as the series' characters encounter extraordinary circumstances over and over again. In the real world, fortunately, teenagers don't often encounter serial killers, but Gracie and Danielle have run into two of them within the space of two years.

Then there's the problem of suspense. If we know that the series depends on certain characters, we know they're likely to remain safe despite the dangers that surround them. This problem, at least, Box handles with an unexpected touch.

But there's not much else that's unexpected in The Highway, mostly because the story is assembled from a collection of story fragments with which we're all familiar. The Lizard King is part Norman Bates, part Leatherface, and the secret world he's part of seems a lot like the plot of that movie from the 90s where Kurt Russell is menaced by a sin-

ister truck driver.

Cody Hoyt is every renegade cop you've ever seen, from Clint Eastwood to Bruce Willis, and Gracie and Danielle are polar opposite sisters, like the Dunphy girls on Modern Family.

I'd be more willing to forgive all this if Box weren't also prone to making lots of petty mistakes, like writing "expansion bridge" when he means suspension bridge, or "seasonable ranger" when he means seasonal ranger. Or using a phrase as ridiculous as "the clatter of a clattering diesel engine." Then there's the way that Box shows off his research into trucker lingo when he has the Lizard King's internal monologue include parenthetical clarifications like "commercial driver's license (CDL)" and "less than a load (LTL)"; I don't know about you, but I don't usually have to explain myself to myself when I'm thinking to myself.

I don't need my mystery novels to be fine art, but I do need them to be reasonably well crafted. *The Highway* got me through my cabin fever this time, but I have to say that I hope Gillian Flynn has a new novel before the next snowstorm hits.

luted. Laner knows when just to pull back and give us a sweet harmony in place of musical abstraction. Like Medicine's *To the Happy Few* earlier in 2013, this record perfectly weaves the harsh with the delicate. You're never sure which way a song may diverge, but you're always pleasantly surprised by where you end up

"Dream Drug" wavers in your ears like psychedelic hummingbirds swimming in LSD-laced square waves. "Nearly Hospital High" harkens back to Laner's early Medicine days: San Francisco's Haight-Ashbury tie-dyed positivity mixed with a good portion of Creation Records' dark horses. "Holiday King" melts over you with breathy harmonies and trance-like percussion. "None of the Above" and "Eight Question"

Marks" end the album on more pointed, jagged notes. Filled with dissonance and obtuse vocal structures these songs serve to prove that Laner takes musical cues from more than just 60s pop and 80s alternative.

Nearest Suns confirms Laner as an amazing songwriter and producer. His production prowess is second to none. He's an indie rock Jon Brion. And while at times *Nearest Suns* can sound a little strange, it never gets boring. In my book, strange is good. (*John Hub*ner)



that using a material will create more work and require significant use of personal energy, they tend to consume less. If one obtains an object that can never truly be discarded, the realization forces a person to think deeply before bringing the object into his or her life.

"What I am doing is such a small thing compared to all the waste

"What I am doing is such a small thing compared to all the waste that exists in the world. I try to remind myself that my job isn't to change the whole situation but to change a small part of it. I want to help people value materials more," Ganz explains.

She wants people to realize that living sustainably is more than recycling. It is making a paradigm shift to consider whether or not to bring a new object into one's life and considering what will happen to that object once it leaves a person's control.


"If I can make plastic really beautiful, it can change the value of the material," she says. She isn't referring to monetary value but rather the value that people place on something as being useful and at a higher level, something to be cherished.

Ganz will soon have a new opportunity to share her passion for sustainability and pass along some of her strategies as she serves as the keynote speaker at the Youth Energy Summit. She will travel to California and speak to young leaders about her work with sustainable art.

During a workshop at the conference Ganz plans to share her Japanese heritage by introducing participants to an old world object, furoshiki. Furoshiki are traditional Japanese wrapping cloths that can be used to transport items as a backpack or service other tasks such as wrapping a gift or storing a collection of objects. Ganz hopes to help young minds think beyond what is familiar to them and to consider deeply how they consume and use materials in both art and throughout daily life.

Ganz's trip to California follows a whirlwind year that not only took her to Florida to install three whales, but to Italy for a large solo show. She currently has work traveling with an exhibit that will land in Kalamazoo, Michigan in February before continuing to travel through the Midwest on a multi-year tour.

While Ganz does commission her work, it is more important to her to show work than it is to sell. Her challenge for the world to treat objects with value so that less waste is produced is most effectively delivered without words, but through her beautiful work in sculpture.

Tops at the Box: Director Tim Story's Ride Along took the No. 1 spot at the box office last weekend, selling a very respectable \$41 million

over its first three days. The film stars Ice Cube as a tough, streetwise police officer and Kevin Hart as his funny, helpless, soon-to-be brother-in-law. Should be funny, right? I guess so. But are you sure? Yeah, I'm fairly sure. Okay man, I'll take your word for it. The real story here is Story who will now have five very profitable films to his name, including Think Like a Man, Barbershop and the two Fantastic Four films.

Also at the Box: Peter Berg's Lone Survivor continues to bring in gigantic stacks of dollar bills despite receiving a whole lot of negative reviews. The film took the No. 2 spot at last weekend's box office, selling another \$23 million in the U.S. while upping the its total take to over \$74 million. Taking the No. 3 spot at the box was a silly animated flick called The Nut Job, voiced by Will Arnett, Brendan Fraser, Liam Neeson and Katherine Heigl. The movie sold \$20 million over its first three days, notably low for a new release children's film. Rounding out last weekend's Top 5 were Jack Ryan: Shadow Recruit which sold a lousy \$17 million over its first three days (once and for all proving that Chris Pine is not someone you can build a film around) and runaway blockbuster Frozen which sold another \$12 million, bringing the film's international total to about \$760 million.

Also of note, David O. Russell's American Hustle is still selling really well, including another \$10 million in sales last weekend, bringing the film's Stateside total to \$116 million.

New this Week: Well friends. it's that time of year again when the studios start dumping their terrible films into theaters in an attempt to make any money they can from the productions that didn't turn out as well as planned. This week we

Gimme Shelter tells the story of a girl named Apple (Hudgens) whose mother (Dawson) is a drug addict and a prostitute and is teaching her daughter how to get into the same lifestyle. Apple sets out on a journey to find her estranged Wall Street Broker father (Fraser), hoping that he'll take her in. And so on. Gimme Shelter looks decent enough, for a film full of cliches, that is.

ScreenRant: HBO's latest and greatest, a crime drama series, True Detective, is the best television I've seen since Breaking Bad ended. The show, which plays through with the cinematic quality of a great crime film, follows two detectives (Matthew McConaughey and Woody Harrelson) as their lives become entangled during a 17-year hunt for a serial killer. The story jumps around through the years, showing the detectives when they're youngish and oldish. It's a very smart, tasteful, well-made show that I think only further establishes both McConaughey and Harrelson as two of the best American actors currently working. Look for other networks to follow this trend of short-run, extremely high-quality and high-profile series. Or, that is, I hope they follow suit; I can only watch so much Girls.
