

There was a time that the songs of Broadway were the hit songs on the lips of most Americans who were familiar with the work of Rodgers & Hammerstein or Lerner & Lowe regardless of their access to a New York stage. Those songs constituted popular music until Elvis and the Beatles took the Top 40 in a whole new direction. Now many of the showstoppers which might have been well-known are somewhat more marginalized by the wider availability of so many musical

The one glaring exception to that is the work of Andrew Lloyd Webber. Even those who haven't visited New York and don't frequent community theater productions of musicals have a pretty good knowledge of the songs which have filled shows like Jesus Christ Superstar, Evita, Phantom of the Opera and Sunset Boulevard. When the Fort Wayne Philharmonic presents its Pops concert Behind the Mask, it will prominently feature Webber's songs, probably the best known theater works of the last half of the 20th

It's a songbook well known to vocalist Sal Vivi-

ano, a performer who has been active in musical theater for three decades and who now often tours the country singing with symphony orchestras. His path to the stage was circuitous. Born in the Detroit area, his family moved to Illinois as he began high school, and he eventually at-


tended Eastern Illinois University on a full scholarship – to play quarterback for their football team.

'We won a national championship while I was there," says Viviano. "A lot of big football names came out of that program - Tony Romo, Sean Payton, Mike Shanahan. I'm not on the level of those guys, but Mike Shanahan was our offensive coach while I was

So how does a guy who plays quarterback for a successful football program end up singing for his supper? That story begins a couple years earlier when Viviano was attending Shaumburg High School and wanted to support a teammate who was auditioning for the school choir. When he and his friends realized they had missed class, their only option was to also audition, thus gaining a pass, avoiding detention and remaining eligible for an upcoming track meet.

"I think the director did wonder why all of these athletes were coming in for auditions, but I actually did make the choir. I kind of laughed it off and declined it because I liked to sing, but I had just done it to avoid detention. During my sophomore year I went to the performances because I did have friends in them, and I found myself thinking, 'I can sing better than that.' So at the end of the year I decided to really audition for the choir. The director asked me why I had auditioned the year before, and I told the story about needing a pass to class, and he said, 'If you had told me that, I would have given you a pass. You really made a mockery of the auditions.' I apologized and auditioned, and I made the choir. He turned out to be a great mentor for me."

Despite that turn of events, Viviano continued to pursue sports and was happily focused on football



until Eastern Illinois moved up from Division II to Division I.

"When we moved up

a division, we started

having our heads handed to us every week. and I didn't enjoy it anymore. I had no de-

lusions that I had a future in football, so I gave up my scholarship. But I knew I couldn't afford to continue without a scholarship so I asked if I could audition for the music school as a non-major."

With a new scholarship secured, Viviano eventually earned his degree in music education and opera performance. His student teaching in the Chicago area provided him time to audition for acting jobs, and he continued teaching after graduation while earning jobs and three union cards.

"I got to work with great faculty and had a great principal, a great department, and I loved teaching. But I knew I wanted to be an actor."

While learning his craft in college, Viviano spent some time honing his talents in Indiana and fondly re-

members a summer spent at Warsaw's Wagon Wheel "Tom Roland had been the director at Wagon

Wheel and left for awhile and was on the faculty at Northwestern. When he went back to Wagon Wheel, he had auditions at Northwestern, which is how I happened to get involved. I was involved in all six shows that summer after my junior year in college, and I had a great time. Everyone had a chance to have a lead role, and then for the other shows you'd have a supporting part or be part of the ensemble. I did everything there - passed out programs, cleaned the bathrooms, worked on sets. It was a great experience."

Since those early days Viviano has worked with some of the greatest names in music, even introducing a new Irving Berlin song shortly before that legendary songwriter's death. He has worked on Broadway and



# A Passion for the Piano

Cover Story • Hamilton Tescarollo -----

It may not always occur to students, busy managing their own academic demands along with family and job pressures, that those who teach them are often themselves juggling a variety of professional endeavors which reach far beyond their classrooms. In the case of Hamilton Tescarollo, a member of the IPFW faculty since 2007, his efforts as a teacher to students of piano and keyboards represent just a part of his duties and creative energies. His upcoming recital, in which he performs the works of Bach, Liszt and Mozart, is an annual opportunity to share his own extraordinary talents with his students as well as the IPFW and Fort Wayne community.

When Tescarollo first began playing in his native Brazil (the country in South America, not the city in Indiana), he likely had no idea what or where IPFW was. He was young enough when he began to play that he mostly relies on his parents for anecdotal evidence of his interest.

"I have two older sisters, and one of them was taking piano lessons. My parents told me that I asked to take them too, so I began when I was about seven years old. I don't really remember those first few years,

but I do know we didn't have a piano at the time, so I had to go to my neighbor's house to practice. I remember thinking that I so much wanted a piano in our house, and when we got

it, it was really an important thing. I always knew my desire to play was something very strong for me. I really loved it."

There was no question in his mind that he would study music in college, and he says his parents were always supportive of his plan. He studied in Brazil, earning honors in competitions before leaving for Arizona State University to work on his graduate degree. While there he taught and, upon earning his Ph.D., served as both associate and visiting faculty for the next few years. In 2007, he came to interview for a full-time position at IPFW.

"My predecessor, Masson Robertson, had been at IPFW for 38 years, and I met him when I came in to interview. It was a great opportunity, and there was tremendous growth in the department and the piano program. At the time I came to interview there was also this new building under construction, so they gave me a hard hat and showed it to me. It was a very exciting time to be coming to the university, to see that progress and know I could be part of a collegial, supportive environment.


He was also happy to become part of a community which he quickly realized val-

When I first visited the area, I saw so many exciting things. Fort Wayne's not a

huge city, but it has so much culture to offer. There's a wonderful Philharmonic, ballet, theatre, museums. It's great to be in a city that values the arts."

Tescarollo enjoys sharing his passion for music with his students at IPFW and relishes the progress they make. He also finds his own skills are sharpened from the effort he makes in communicating with them.

"The most gratifying part of teaching is



seeing students grow from one point to another. No matter what their starting

point is, there is always progress. The process is really what it's all about, being able to improve their own playing from a rough style to something that really communicates on a deep level to whoever is listening. That process is a beautiful thing, and you discover things about yourself when you explain a concept or a way of doing something; you may think of things in a new way because you've had to explain it in a way maybe you hadn't even thought of it before. The teaching and performance really do complement each other. I wouldn't be happy doing just one or the other."

Even during his nine-month teaching schedule, Tescarollo finds time to perform not only at his faculty recital but also at a recent visit to his alma mater, Arizona State, where he performed, taught a master class and served as adjudicator for a competition. During the summer, he often performs all over the world, in solo concerts and as part of a duo with cellist Carlos Audi.

'Carlos and I played together many times when we were young in Brazil. He's now in Florida with a family, and I'm here in Fort Wayne, but we always wanted to put together a recital of Brazilian music. We put together the music of three Brazilian composers for cello and piano, and we've also premiered a composition, 'Confluences,' written by one of my colleagues at IPFW. Chris Rutkowski.

"I also perform my solo concerts, and I feel like both the solo work and collaborations really complement each other, often in the same ways that teaching enhances my playing. The same communication takes place, and that exchange of ideas provides a learning process because you have to work together and learn to listen. When you work with a group or ensemble, it's not just you working on your piece. You have to know if you're following or leading and find that give and take with the ensemble."

Among his many honors over the years, Tescarollo claimed the top prizes at soloist and piano competitions and was one of three finalists at the 1991 National Mozart Competition in Brazil. In addition to his acclaim as a performer, he was also awarded "Teacher of the Year" honors at the 2001 Schimmel-AZ Piano Young Artist Piano Competition. His growing credits and honors are matched by those of his students. underscoring the dedication he has shown to both aspects of his career over the years. Having performed on several continents in the past few years, Tescarollo is beginning to make plans to continue with the Audi-Tescarollo Duo and with his solo work as summer 2014 approaches. His growing list of accomplishments as a teacher, academic, performer and recording artist does not mean he plans to rest on his laurels, always finding new ways to explore the piano and the sounds and music it can create.

has toured the country in numerous shows while his wife, actress Liz Larsen, pursued her own theater career. The game changer came when Viviano and Larsen became parents to two sons whom they wanted to see grow. They decided that managing a family with two theater performers knocking out eight shows a week was not the way to accomplish it.

'So now I perform with orchestras around the country, and I've worked with over 150 now. It's a great medium of expression to hear these songs with an orchestra. No Broadway show can afford to use a full orchestra any more, so to sing these songs with a full set of strings and a 70-piece orchestra is such a privilege."

In addition to his performance of Webber's songs, he also promises selections from other popular shows including Jersey Boys, Wicked, Little Shop of Horrors and Spamalot. But he has high praise for Andrew Lloyd Webber's ability to so perfectly win audiences with his moving melodies.

"I've had the opportunity to meet him a few times, and even with his great success and longevity on Broadway he is a tremendously humble guy. It's just extraordinary what he has accomplished in his time, and it's always an honor to be able to sing those

# Singer of Silly Songs

When Tim Cavanagh came on the scene in the early 80s, the time was ripe for being a musical comic. The Dr. Demento radio show, having long been a champion of funny songsters from the first half of

the century such as Spike Jones and Stan Freberg, was now in national syndication, and Demento and his producers were busy searching out a new generation of singing comedians. Fortunately for Cavanagh, Demento found him in 1981.

"The first song of mine that Demento played," Cavanagh says, "was 'I Wanna Kiss Her.' The national airplay that Dr. D gave me was a huge boost to my career."

The song's hook – a few bawdy puns and some impeccably timed pauses ("I wanna kiss her, but ... she won't let me") – was the perfect kind of silliness for Demento's audience, and Cavanagh's

songs began to appear frequently on the show.

By 1982, another Demento regular, "Weird Al" Yankovic, a long-time protégé of Dr. D, had hit the big time with his punny song parodies and videos. Hits "Another One Rides the Bus,"

"I Love Rocky Road" and "Eat It" were nearly as popular as the songs they skewered, and they proved that comedy songs could sell. Cavanagh made his own contribution to the genre in 1984 with "99 Dead Baboons," a parody of Nena's "99 Luftballons" that was one of the year's most requested songs on Demento's show. So by the mid 80s, Cavanagh had made a name for himself, setting the stage for a career that's now well into its fourth decade.


It's been a long trip for a guy who began playing in comedy clubs in his native Chicago while he was still a high school teacher.

"Not surprisingly, I found the biggest difference between the classroom and the nightclub was the drunks – which I generally let the principal handle," he says, the implied rim shot finishing the sentence.

It's only a joke, though, because Cavanagh's classroom was far from a den of iniquity. He taught religion
at a Catholic girls' school, and he had to be careful to
keep his two jobs separate. His songs and on-stage act
were clean compared to the foul-mouthed comedians
of the day (Eddie Murphy was big in 1982), but Cavanagh had enough of an edge that it wouldn't have
been a good idea if any of his school's administrators
happened to be in the audience. In fact, he remembers,
he used to open his show with a song called "Thank
God I'm an Atheist," something a Catholic-school
teacher can't do and still keep his job.

But despite his clean act and his history of pious educational jobs, Cavanagh owes much of the longevity of his career to his associations with bad boys. Around 1995, he appeared on the raunchy Bob & Tom

radio show and performed "I Wanna Kiss Her" (the show's producer knew the song but not Cavanagh and thought that he was ripping off someone else). Tom Griswold and Bob Kevoian were strong supporters of musical comedians like Heywood Banks and Pinkard & Bowden, and the exposure they offered was criti-

cal to Cavanagh's career. Cavanagh became a regular guest on the nationally syndicated show, and a few years after that first appearance Griswold asked Cavanagh to contribute a weekly bit to the show, a new

song each week that they called "The One Minute Song." The bit became one of the most beloved long-running staples of the show.

During the same period, Cavanagh worked with Danny Bonaduce, a once-cute kid on *The Partridge Family* and, at the time, a controversial radio shock jock on WLUP in Chicago. Cavanagh was a regular songwriter for and guest on that show and one that Bonaduce did later on WKQI in Detroit.

In the middle of all this, Cavanagh also released several CDs, the first in 1997, and he was named "Best Artist" on the Hits & Giggles label three out of the past four years (a joke that only works if you know that Hits & Giggles is Cavanagh's own label, and he's its only artist).

"It's still a big thrill," he deadpans.

It's not easy to get Cavanagh to be serious, but he works seriously hard. He still hits the radio shows – his "Cavalcade of Celebrity Birthdays" on Bob & Tom started in 2007 and is yet another favorite (a sample: "Actor John Ratzenberger celebrates birthday number 66. After his role as Cliff Clavin on *Cheers*, he opened up a restaurant called 'Ratzenberger's,' which, for some reason, never caught on") – and he plays a staggering number of shows at an amazingly diverse variety of venues, from sports bars to casinos to corporate gigs to theaters.

For a lot of comedy fans, Cavanagh is the creator of classics. Lines like "I wanna hold her behind ... closed doors and more" are cherished memories from their childhoods, and they can sing along with every song. But more than 30 years after he wrote those words, Cavanagh is going as strong as ever.

#### **Stephen Malkmus & The Jicks**

Wig Out at Jagbags

Now 11 very good studio records into his 23-year career as rock n' roll's antihero, it's safe to say that Stephen Malkmus will go down as one of the most consistent – if not the most consistent – American rock musicians of his time. With the hilariously titled Wig Out at Jagbags Malkmus has again given us a collection of cleverly detailed pop songs disguised as college rock



classics. It's a record you can file among his most accessible works, including *Crooked Rain*, *Crooked Rain*, *Brighten the Corners*, *Stephen Malkmus* and 2010's *Mirror Traffic*. It's a collection of left turns, howling guitar and nerd-next-door poetry.

First known as an experimental minimalist guitarist who had the vocals of a slacker god, Malkmus has grown into a Mascis-level guitar master whose vocal and writing style haven't aged a day. His writing, which has perhaps become less abstract, is still very funny and very melody-serving on *Jagbags*, Malkmus never shying away from a good do-do-do-do-do hook, a silly yelp or that always endearing girly voice thing he sometimes slips into for laughs. Topically speaking, the only thing close to a theme the record employs is middle-aged observations, none of which Malky ever takes too seriously. Mostly, and as usual, his topics are all over the place and hard to pin down or even translate. Here he seems about as nostalgic and happy as he's ever been, but other than that, *Jagbags* is as hard to analyze as any of his 10 other records.


"Planetary Motion" opens the album. It's an understated rocker with more going on, compositionally speaking, than meets the eye. While the track doesn't exactly sound like Malkmus' eponymous solo record, it's maybe the closest he's come to that sound since *Pig Lib* was released 10 years ago. Lead single "Lariat" is classic Malkmus, featuring cutesy lyrics, endless melody, killer riffs and SM's signature warm, breezy vocals. It's a youthful anthem for music lovers, Malkmus singing "We grew up listening to the music from the best decade ever" in a battle cry-like tone. Like "Baby C'mon," "Phantasies," "Cut Your Hair" or "Senator," it's a song that you can bet will long outlive Malkmus or any of the other Pavement boys. Same goes for other standouts like "Cinnamon and Lesbians," "Chartjunk" and "Houston Hades."

I could go on, breaking down every Jagbag track, explaining how poppy and accessible and friendly they all are. How great the solo on "Shibboleth" is. How funny and riff-filled every track on the album is. I could tell you about how Malkmus' vocals sound just as young and silly and smug today as they did in 1992, because all of these things are most definitely true. Instead, I'll just tell you that yes, Stephen Malkmus has done it again. Does Jagbags' 12-song tracklist make for a better set of Malkmusian indie rock than Mirror Traffic? Probably. Jagbags might not have as much variety as Mirror, but it's more consistent and has higher peaks. Without a skip-worthy track in the bunch, I'd even suggest that Jagbags is the most approachable, instantly likable thing Malky has released yet. His all about best? No, of course not, but Wig Out at Jagbags is most certainly a great new addition to the Stephen Malkmus catalog. (Greg W. Locke)

### **Hooded Fang**

Gravez

Listening to Hooded Fang's third full length, *Gravez*, makes me feel my age. Hearing the energy and edge-of-abandon performances that propel this album only serves to remind me how old I've become. Quickly enough, though, I find myself pulled in and, once acclimated, ageless. That's a helluva natural drug



From the jacked-up tempos and garage-y "Graves" to the more stately, plaintive "Bye Bye Land," *Gravez* engages throughout. Indie pedigree is proved out: Toronto post-college guys/gal personnel? Naturally. Fuzzy/clanging guitars? Check. Reverb-drenched, slightly distorted vocals? Yep. Elliptical lyrics delivered with just the right combination of cool distance and "I mean it, man" immediacy? You bet

## BACKTRACKS

#### Savoy Brown

**Raw Sienna** (1970)

Thanks to founding member Kim Simmonds' perpetual need to tour, Savoy Brown have been around for a very long time.

The band formed in 1965, and although the lineup was ever-changing, it was Simmonds' dream to enlist the



best musicians for one of the greatest blues-rock acts of all time. With the frenzied drumming from Roger Earl, the filthy guitars of Dave Preverett and bass from Tony Stevens, Savoy Brown played rock n' roll that was brash yet unpretentious.

This release opens with the funky "A Hard Way to Go" which is just the appetizer before the brilliant "That Same Feelin'." Bright horns and bluesy vocals make this one of my favorites from Savoy Brown. It features a nice piano behind some really groovy guitars and jazzy rock drumming.

"Master Hare" is next, and again is energized by a nice piano and some horns. "I'm Crying" brings the tempo down but fits perfectly on the album as a nice palate cleanser. It's bluesy but has elements of jazz and funk that reminds me of Zappa or early Chicago. "Stay While the Night Is Young" follows and also brings it down to a jazzy crawl, but it isn't lost in the earlier tracks. "Is That So" fills up most of side two with a bossa nova jam that fits perfectly on one of my favorite records of all time.

As an album, *Raw Sienna* is really is a good collection of songs, unlike the later years of rock when it was more important to release singles for the radio.

With over 20 records in almost 50 years, Simmonds has the name and still tours. They will be at C2G Music Hall on March 1st.

Fun Fact: Earl, Preverett and Stevens left Savoy Brown soon after this release and went on to form Foghat. (*Dennis Donahue*)

But what makes Gravez so invigorating is the unstudied, crackling enthusiasm that lies behind every note. "Wasteland" is awash in echoing guitar shards, recalling an earlier era that bridged new wave and what would eventually be called college rock (then alternative, and now indie. Broad brushes, to be sure). Then there's "Never Minding," which gives us maybe a taste of what the Strokes might have sounded like had early Guided By Voices been more of an influence. Guitarist/vocalist Daniel Lee stays cool throughout, grounding repetitive riff-based tunes like "Genes" nicely. Plus, the "doo-doo-doo" count on this album is high. That's a good thing.

While a hint of darkness lurks at the heart of *Gravez*, the record is buoyed by the charged atmosphere and pop goodness Hooded Fang generate. Much more DIY sounding than their even poppier previous effort, 2010's *Album*, *Gravez* is also perhaps more three-dimensional. Somehow in embracing their inner garage band, stripping off a layer of smooth veneer from their sound and not sweating the small stuff, Hooded Fang have made their most compelling album yet. Where sprightly horns juiced up some of the numbers on *Album*, grainy reverb, lower-fi guitars, and at least a bit of a sense of abandon jumpstart *Gravez*. These (perhaps) self-consciously applied imperfections only serve to shine a light on Hooded Fang's pop smarts and melodic gifts. (*D.M. Jones*)

### Beyonce

Beyonce

Even if you hate most pop music, it's still a challenge to hate Beyoncé. I will even go so far as to say that since the punk aesthetic has many of its ideologies rooted in feminism, Beyoncé is the most punk pop star working to change how artists release their work. When Mrs. Beyoncé Giselle Knowles-Carter



released *Beyoncé* on iTunes without any promotional campaign, or even a hint that it had been completed, it wasn't a widely celebrated

event so much as it was a sucker punch to the music industry, proving that if an artist is big enough, the work will sell itself with no hype necessary. The risky strategy probably would have backfired if Beyoncé didn't take risks of its own.

Beyoncé's fifth solo effort is uncharacteristically introspective and confessional (hence the appropriate decision to leave it selftitled). Beyoncé has never been shy about expressing sexuality as a form of female empowerment, but on Beyoncé she makes no apology for her aspirations, desires ("Drunk in Love"), or insecurities ("Partition"). The first thing you see upon removing the stark black slip cover bearing her name in raised pink lettering is her voluptuous booty graced with an S&M-type g-string, with her hands caressing one of her more valuable feminine assets (no pun intended). This liberal display of sexuality foreshadows what can be expected, along with blush-inducing lines like, "I can't wait 'til I get home so you can turn that cherry out." The repetition of those last four words can sound awkward to those who still remember her relatively innocent "Say My Name" days with Destiny's Child.

For all of the potentially risqué and embarrassing sexual frankness Beyoncé brings to this album, she rarely loses sight of her own sense of humanity and the charisma that helped make her a household name. The first thing we hear is a pageant judge (Harvey Keitel) asking, "What is your aspiration in life?" After Beyoncé repeats the question to herself, she replies, "To be happy." This leads into "Pretty Hurts," by far her most endearing feminist statement and one that makes "Single Ladies" look like an ill-advised parody.

But the music is only half the story. The reason why physical copies retail for at least \$17 is the visual counterpart that is the complete experience of *Beyoncé*. The songs that have the most emotional density can obviously stand on their own, but the visual accompaniments give those songs a wider emotional palate and are impressive enough to serve as a template for artists who wish to attempt a similar feat in the future.

Five weeks have passed between its unorthodox release and the time I'm writing this, and besides being her most critically successful album, it has already sold in excess of 3 million copies worldwide. Coming from someone who has been regularly enjoying Slayer, Miles Davis and the Flaming Lips as of late, it was hard for me to ignore Beyoncé solely on the principle that an artist can only achieve that level of success by being punk enough to defy what most people expect from the average pop album. So while Beyoncé is still pretty far from being considered the riot grrrl of pop, we can leave complacence and subservience to Katy Perry and Rihanna. (Colin McCal-

#### Damien Jurado

#### Brothers and Sisters of the Eternal Son

Maybe I'm wrong, but I think Damien Jurado is having his midlife crisis. Not the kind of crisis where you get a red car, lose 25 pounds, shave your mustache and get a new girlfriend but, rather, the good kind. The kind of crisis where you look back at your life and realsinger/songwriter albums, Jurado



has seemingly emerged anew over his last three records, all of which he's made with Richard Swift.

From a sonic standpoint, the albums have been increasingly adventurous and creatively risky, Jurado now making music that could almost even be described as progressive. Maybe it's not a personal crisis that's pushed Jurado into new creative territory; maybe it's simply the partnership with Swift. Whatever it is that prompted Jurado to do such radically new things is his business All I know is that, as a fan, I'm very happy about it. Rather than being the guy with great lyrics and maybe four very good songs per record, Jurado has become a full-blown recording artist over the course of 2012's Maraqopa and the just-released Brothers and Sisters of the Eternal

"Swirling," I believe, is how a lot of critics like to describe the sound of a song like Brothers' opener "Magic Number." Jazz fusionstyled drums and a hefty mellotron arrangement bloat Swift's psychleaning production, the two musicians ornamenting their song with layers of subtle detail. It's a bold, memorable opener that very much reminds of Maragopa's "swirling" opener, "Nothing Is the News."

Simply put, gone - for now at least - are the days of "Omaha" and "Letters and Drawings," even if Jurado's vocals and writing still feel endlessly familiar and classic in a Nick Drake sort of way.


Much is being made of the "otherworldly" vibe and dub reggaeinspired production on Brothers. What we have is a set of mid-tempo folk-rock songs drenched in production ideas. The album, because of both the arrangements and Jurado's very theme-oriented songwriting, feels like something of a rock opera, Jurado leading us through some mythical unknown. Along the way we soul search, question life and meet a whole lot of strangers. Because of the sound, the themes, the cover art, the album title and just about everything else, *Brothers* and Sisters of the Eternal Son feels like something of a sci-fi album, Jurado taking storytelling risks he's never before approached. While it all sounds very impersonal and cold on paper, the reality couldn't be more different, Jurado speaking for himself through his characters in surprising, intriguing ways.

Oftentimes I feel a sense of embarrassment for a certain type of singer/songwriter. If the writing is overly emotional, confessional, self-involved or obvious, I cringe, even if the story is good. I've felt this way regularly for Jurado over the years. Maraqopa was different in that regard and so for the most part is Brothers and Sisters, "Silver Joy" bring the only time I laughed a nervous laugh. Jurado and Swift's latest collaborative effort is their greatest sonic work yet, an ambitious record that's bit and bold and, at times, beautiful. And complete. Whether or not I'll end up liking the disc more than my sofar favorite Jurado work, Maragopa, remains to be seen. That said, the two discs most definitely work well together as a one-two punch of textured songwriter psychedelia. (Greg W. Locke)

### Wooden Ships

Back to Land

Ripley Johnson and his bearded friends in Wooden Shjips have made a name for themselves as master purveyors of psychedelic stoner rock. With their mix of heavy drone, motorik beats and a healthy dose of 60s garage rock blues, these Bay Area fuzz gods have been putting out stellar albums for years now. Back to



The formula on this new album remains the same. Find a groove and lock into it. Allow Johnson to lay down some tasty riffage and float along as if carried by some psychedelic cloud. These guys aren't changing much in the sound, but they've honed in on their strengths and have created a dense, bluesy, druggy sound that you can't penetrate.

The title track starts out all fun and good times but quickly gives in to that hazy darkness on "Ruins," which is like a cross between The Doors and NEU! "Ghouls" has a hard-driving beat and trippy echoed vocals with a Farfisa organ in the background. It's hard to pinpoint or explain a band like Wooden Shjips. Anything I say will not do this band justice. It's like explaining a rainbow to someone who's never had sight; it needs to be experienced. But explain I must, as that is my job here.

For every crazy, fuzzed-out rocker there's always a lighter poppier song just lingering around the corner. "These Shadows" is one of those songs. Sounding like something Neil Young might have written with Buffalo Springfield, it's got that underlying organ with strummed acoustic accompanied by some low end fuzz for good measure. It's a great song that would sound good plugged or unplugged. "In The Roses" is a motorik/boogie hybrid that will make you put the pedal to the metal (if you're driving, that is). The album closes on another lighter song, albeit one that's melancholy in comparison to the Shjips tried and true sound. "Everybody Knows" is a minor key song with a feel of tragedy to it - and a longing in Johnson's voice not heard on any previously released albums. It's a decidedly different note to end the album on, but not a disappointing one in any shape or form.

As kraut rockin', boogie-woogie, psych rock goes, Back To Land is top-tier. Johnson and company don't disappoint. And like most great albums, this is a grower. Put on the headphones, drop the needle, spin, repeat. (John Hubner)





This week's big concert news comes from the **Mötley Crüe** camp. It has been long rumored that the band was going to call it quits within the next few years, now it's official. After over 30 years of rocking together, Mötley Crüe's "Final Tour" will take place



this summer and kicks off in Grand Rapids July 2. Other shows in the region take place in Noblesville July 5, Cincinnati July 6, Columbus, Ohio July 8, Chicago August 8, Detroit August 9 and Cleveland August 12. **Alice Cooper** will open the shows. Are you kidding me? Alice Cooper? That just goes to show you what kind of guy Alice Cooper is. Cooper is big enough that he doesn't need to open for anyone, but he is humble enough to do so and, in turn, help create a mega-touring package people will be hungry to see.

There are a few things here worth discussing. First, we have seen many "Farewell Tours" and "Final Tours" announced by iconic rock acts over the past decades, only to see these bands continue to make music and continue to tour long after saying "goodbye." Heck, **Kiss** announced their farewell tour in 2000. I bought into it and went to see them a couple of times on that tour so I would have something to remember long after they were gone. Fifteen years later the band is still making music and playing live on a pretty regular basis. So why should we believe The Crüe will be gone after this tour? First and foremost, guitarist **Mick Mars** has been in poor health for years with a degenerative condition that affects his spine and pelvis. No one can foresee Mötley Crüe performing without Mars on stage, so the decision to quit seems likely to come to fruition for this fact alone. Also, the band signed a formal Cessation of Touring Agreement, legally forbidding the members from touring as Mötley Crüe after 2015. Lastly, the band have a lot of other things going on these days, including the screen adaptation of bassist **Nikki Sixx**'s book *The Dirt*, set to be in theaters in 2015. I've never read a better autobiography about this era of music, and believe me, I've read a few.

Why do I believe this won't be the end of Mötley Crüe? There are two reasons. First, the same lawyers hired by the band to write the Cessation of Touring Agreement most likely included "out clauses" such as, " if all members of the band are in agreement that touring as Mötley Crüe is in the best interest of the band and the bands brand, this contract shall be considered null and void." Now I'm not a lawyer, but it probably goes something like that. Secondly, there's the reunion tour money. You know some promoter will offer the band millions and millions of dollars to tour again in five years as part of another summer blockbuster package. The band will take the offer because, well, money talks and there will be a new generation of rockers hungry to see the band live. Am I pessimistic about the "Final Tour." Yes. Will I go to see the show anyway? Probably. I'm not going to miss a chance to see one of the best live acts going today and the man who taught them everything they know about shock rock. The only thing that could keep me at home is the poor parking situation at Klipsch Music Center. I hate that place. I think I will go to Detroit instead.

# You Won't Be Able To Stop Thinking About Her

Another Best Picture Oscar nominee, another great reason to go to the movies.

I wasn't sure the premise of Her could be sustained for the length of a feature film, but Her is wonderful and strange and doesn't run out of ideas. Director Spike Jonze is no stranger to quirky storytelling in films like Being John Malkovich, Adaptation, and Where the Wild Things Are and music videos like The Beastie Boys' "Sabotage." Her is the first film he has directed from his own screenplay. This debut screenwriting effort is Oscar-nominated for Best Original

The film is set in a future that seems distant yet familiar. In Her, a man falls in love with his computer operating system. As creepy and impersonal as that sounds, Her is lovely and alarmingly personal.

Joaquin Phoenix plays Theodore Twombley, a man whom we meet as he is speaking to the camera in very tender terms. He is talking to a person but dictating to his computer. Theodore works for BeautifulHandwrittenLetters.com and composes letters for clients who need help expressing themselves. Just about the first thing we hear him say is "I've been thinking of telling you how much you mean to me.

He has dozens of co-workers who do the same thing. Some of them have had clients for years. The letter Theodore is writing is for a client he's had for eight years. He does very personal work in a world where the personal touch seems just beyond reach for many. He's a gentle, sensitive guy who is good at what he does. The receptionist, a genial Chris Pratt, compliments him often, calling him a poet.

Documenting and commemorating the important moments in the lives of others is one source of the boredom and melancholy that hang over Theodore. He's recently divorced and more than a little lonely. He works. He goes home and plays video games. He hangs out with an old college buddy and her husband who don't seem that happy with each other. Amy Adams plays his friend Amy, a character a million miles away from the spitfire of American Hustle.

Theodore lives in Los Angeles of the future. The city has huge, tall buildings everywhere. The skyline seems end**CATHERINE LEE** 

less. The air is a sickly yellow. People take trains and travel on walkways that connect buildings. The world is glass and concrete. The sameness of what we see is oppressive. Her has Oscar nominations for Best Production Design and Best

Theodore sees an ad for a new product, the first operating system with artificial intelligence as its new and improved feature. He buys it immediately and so begins his relationship with Samantha, his new operating companion. They hit it off right from the start. Samantha has a sense of humor, tons of "skills" and a caressing, sexy voice.

Samantha is voiced by Scarlett Johansson. Going into the film, I thought casting a beautiful actress we will never see was a bit of a trick to make the story more convincing. Watching the film, you realize that an operating system would employ a lovely voice to help sell the product. A buyer of the product would imagine a face and a body to attach to the voice, and don't most men put Johansson close to the top of the list of hot actresses?

She is very seductive as "Her." She never scolds Theodore, even when she is acting as an alarm clock. In only a manner of days she has organized and read everything on his computer. She suggests new things to him. They joke. They develop an affection for each other. They begin "seeing" each other, such as it is.

One day Theodore suggests they do something special. Theodore takes Samantha to the beach. At this point in the film I was aching to see something green. I thought at the beach there might be a palm tree. There is one leaf and every inch of a wide beach is packed with people. The scene is nearly as grim as the city.

Samantha, after reading through his letters and emails, encourages him to go out more and see people. He meets

his ex-wife Catherine (a brief but touching performance by Rooney Mara) for lunch. Finally, a few trees and shrubs are visible at the outdoor setting for their meal. He tells her he is seeing someone, sparking a ripple of jealousy.

With some trepidation, Theodore tells Amy he is seeing his operating system. He asks if she thinks that is strange. Like so much of Her it is strange, and it isn't. As the film goes on, the questions of what technology can do for us or should do for us get more complicated and interesting.

Phoenix's performance deepens with the complications that arise. In any other year, this performance would have gotten him a nomination. He's touching and sympathetic. When Theodore goes away for a weekend in the mountains. we finally see some real nature. A forest, a cabin and snow make for a very romantic weekend, but the fault lines of a relationship between human experience and artificial intelligence start to show. The scene is such a relief I could almost taste the fresh air, and seeing snow fall on Theodore gave me pleasurable shivers, but I'm a sucker for a good snowfall. (It is the icy aftermath that gets tiresome.)

There is no "I'm sorry, Dave" moment between Theodore and Samantha. Her is not Kubrick or Arthur C. Clarke science fiction. Her is much more delicate. The questions it asks, the ideas it explores aren't far away in space; they are right around the corner.

I am usually quite the Luddite, although I love my iPad. and I'm especially grateful during this snowy, freezing winter that I get to deliver this column to whatzup through the "internets" or "a series of tubes." At least I'm not that out of it, technologically. Her doesn't devolve into a Luddite rant.

I wouldn't want to spoil Her by revealing what happens. but what happens is achingly logical and yet still surprising. I'm still thinking about the movie and what will happen in the world of the film after the screen goes black.

Her made me think about the world differently, which I love. And it made me want to use every sense we're given and enjoy them and not think too much.



seasons ago, we have looked forward each year to one play which is truly for all ages. As any veteran of children's theater knows, striking the right balance between kid-appeal and elements which adults will appreciate is challenging. Fortunately, there is a great body of children's literature in the world, much of it substantive enough for grownups and whimsical enough for the young.

The Princess and the Goblin, one of 19th century Scottish writer George MacDonald's most enduring novels, is a fantasy with humor, mystery, excitement

and even some spiritual undertones. But with its varied settings and fantastical characters, we also knew it would be one of our most challenging productions to stage.

Design work began this past summer

when I met with Jeff Salisbury and Kimberly Bronson. Together they had recently mounted an effective retelling of part of C.S. Lewis' Narnia saga, using both dance and drama. Kimberly (executive director of Kinetic Revelation Academy of Dance and the Arts) was the logical person to turn to, since I had been hoping to add choreography to this show. As we looked at the script together, we identified some specific pieces of the action which could be told with dance - notably, the moments when Irene is exploring the huge old house with its "door, doors and more doors," leading up and up to the attic. Kimberly was able to suggest a simple and unusual effect: three dancers become the doors with the help of a one-piece costume which turns them into living set pieces. Happily, the same costuming allows the dancers to portray parts of the rock walls of the caverns where Curdie is trapped by the goblins later in the play. Now slabs of stone can be hefted and toppled, and no stage crew or set changes

But how, I wondered, would we depict the fact that some scenes are high up in the house or on the mountainside, and others are far under the earth? Salisbury (afO's technical director/lighting designer) turned set designer for this show and has, with a great crew of assistants, built us a pair of towering structures, one rep-

resenting the inside of the house, one the mountainside, with a bridge to connect them. afO audiences have never seen the likes of this on our little stage before.

Meanwhile, the cast of 20 has been rehearsing (de-

spite bad-weather cancellations, we've stayed right on schedule), and five seamstresses have been sewing. Christine Newman-Aumiller is crafting goblin jewelry and crowns, while puppet-maker Byron Thompson is creating a flying dove. Scott Kump, who also plays the Goblin King, has arranged, performed and recorded a percussion soundtrack for the goblin dance and the battle sequence (whose hilarious components will range across the stage and through the audience as well). Theater is always a team sport, but this show has required more players than usual and stretched us more than most. We hope you'll join us for the finished product which I can promise will delight young

Annika Kroeker stars as Princess Irene, and Jeremiah Paden plays Curdie the brave young miner. Lorraine Knox is Irene's great-great grandmother. Also featured are Erin Bean, Laura Fischer, Eli Ramsour, Dennis Nichols and Ruth Keller. The show runs just under 90 minutes and will have no intermission.

# Space for Creatives

Head down Fairfield Avenue and you will eventually come across a brick building marked by an assortment of wheatpaste graffiti. Some of the images hang loose, flapping in the wind, while most

ping in the wind, while most hold with a tight grip and refuse to let the winds of this wild winter get the best of them.

The exterior of the building may seem a bit gritty for art enthusiasts who are used to a more refined scene, but those who choose to drive by are missing out. The gallery offers a constant rotation of experimental, sometimes shocking, yet thoughtful work.

Wunderkammer Company recently celebrated the completion of its first year of programming and has quickly become known for its willingness to try anything. Openings are filled with a menagerie of people representing the full span of our city's social spectrum. There aren't many places in town where a corporate CEO can be seen standing next to a 20-something with a half-shaved head, but Wunderkammer has managed to make this sort of mingling seem ordinary. Operated by Dan Swartz, the gallery welcomes creatives from all walks of life and allows them to experiment within its space. Swartz's jovial enthusiasm makes entering the gallery feel like stepping into a surprise party as he greets guests with an open-armed, celebratory cheer often topped

Could Swartz get even more excited about life and art? The answer is yes. Ask him about the next show opening and his eyes warm and words flow out of his mouth with amped-up speed.

"Oh my God," he says, "It's going to be huge." The excitement comes from his discovery of a new artist, Theoplis Smith, who is about to slam his first footprint in the art world as he displays the results of a marathon painting experiment. About a year ago Smith passed a homeless man who held a cardboard sign posting a simple phrase, "Can you spare change?" The words triggered a cycle of thinking, and Smith asked himself the same question, this time defining the word "change" as a call to action. "Can you spare change?" read in a new context posed a deep and challenging question.

Smith, also known in the street-art world as Phresh Laundry, rescued a pile of cardboard panels from a trash pile and set to work. Throughout February 2013 he devoted one hour of each day to painting. 28 days he painted large-scale portraits on cardboard depicting icons of African Ameri-

can social change.

Some of his personal favorites include Nelson Mandela, Dr. Martin Luther King and Coretta Scott King as well as classic pop icons Muhammad Ali and Spike Lee.

Smith's work explodes with energy. During a recent event at Wunderkammer, he performed a live painting demonstration to an audience waiting to bid on the finished pieces. With a slab of cardboard resting on the easel, Smith turned up the speaker volume and filled the room with jazz layered with techno-funk. A small brush waited in a cup of black paint. Smith paused for just a moment to absorb the energy, then unleashed his hand, laying down a storm of lines across the picture plane, bringing movement and tension to the background. A switch to white paint and highlights of forms came forward from the tan foundation of humble cardboard. As Smith worked, the crowd grew. He turned the canvas 90 degrees and slowed his hand down, adding thoughtful, thick lines. After a few more dabs of white, Smith stepped back for a second to look at the piece with a refocused gaze. One more 90 degree turn and the viewers in the room suddenly interpreted the painting as a portrait: a young woman in profile, with visible swirls of breath. Smith captured the essence of a human with a few strategically placed lines - a sketch, yet an honest expression of his work.

Smith's larger works are more powerful. His portrait's eyes pull the viewer in with an attractive force. In the gallery, these faces look across the walls at one another. Some are stoic, others scream. All have a message to share. Sit in the middle of the room and you might find yourself caught up in the middle of a dialogue storm, wrapped up in bits of conversation as the portraits call out their stories, spilling them out in the open space of the gallery that holds them. Smith's integrity, passion and strength flow from his brush onto the canvas and out through the eyes of his portraits. He wants to do justice to the work these figures accomplished. He wants to keep the social change they fought for in the front of people's minds.

"I just want people to be around my work," said Smith.

Swartz summed up the artist's

# Bundle Up and Get On Out There

It's always hard to know how much winter we can expect here in Indiana, since the past couple years have provided both extremes. But this year has already provided a couple of blasts, and while temperatures have been bitterly cold a couple of times, generally those who love cold weather have had opportunity to enjoy the ample white stuff and cool but tolerable temperatures.

Of course, kids are generally disposed to play in the snow, and judging from some of the creative (and more traditional) lawn art I've seen, some adults may enjoy rolling up some snowballs and snowmen too. Many of the local parks and area trails have plenty to provide in winter hiking and activities for those who start feeling stir crazy (or just need to let the kids burn off some of their winter restlessness). In addition to the popular and well-known ice skating facilities in town, there are some fun places for families and winter enthusiasts of all ages to visit in northeast Indiana before spring invades the area.

Pokagon State Park in Steuben County, always a good bet for hiking, is only 45 minutes away. During the winter months Pokagon has been home to the Toboggan Run for almost 80 years. While a lovely dose of winter weather makes the tobogganing more fun, it isn't actually necessary thanks to the refrigerated track, which means the run is able to stay open through February (this year closing on March 2) even during freakishly warm spells. The cost for a four-person toboggan is \$12.84 an hour, which means if you visit during less busy times and are willing to move quickly back up the hill, you can get quite a few trips down the run for a pretty reasonable prices. The Toboggan Run is open Fridays through Sundays, but there are special hours during

# A Bright Light Dimmed

Like many people, I considered every movie featuring Philip Seymour Hoffman to be mandatory viewing. Even when the film itself wasn't the greatest (Mission:

Impossible III, Along Came Polly, etc.), PSH was always worth seeing. In most cases he either blew his co-stars off the screen or inspired them to be better than ever.

When I heard news of Hoffman's passing this past Super Bowl Sunday, I stopped what I was doing and sat quietly for a while, thinking, surprised at the news. Heroin? Who'd have thunk it. Not me. Sure, the guy often looked disheveled when he wasn't working, but the rate - not to mention the quality – of his production over the last decade would alone suggest a level of sobriety. Needless to say, I was a bit torn up over the news, as were, I'm sure, just about all the other cinephiles around the world. PSH was, almost undeniably, one of the top three or four screen actors of his time.

As something of a tribute, I figured I would take this week to talk about my five favorite Philip Seymour Hoffman performances. Looking over the very lengthy list of films I considered for my Top 5, I was shocked by how cool, how tasteful, how good Hoffman's filmography was. It was hard to pick just five, but here they are ...

- 5. Happiness (directed by Todd Solondz, 1998): Solondz's very eerie, unsettling family sex drama is the only movie to ever make me physically ill. It's one of the most uncomfortable, odd, divisive films I've seen, and much of that drama is driven by Hoffman's very powerful performance as the sexually frustrated Allen. Chances are good that, if you read this column regularly, you've seen this film and already have an opinion on it; if not, definitely rent or stream or steal it ASAP.
- 4. The Savages (directed by Tamara Jenkins, 2007): This familial drama saw Hoffman paired up with a very powerful Laura Linney as a very true-to-life brother and sister who, through tragedy, both become closer and help each other solve some personal issues. It's a very authentic feeling film for which Hoffman gave the year's second best performance (after Daniel Day-Lewis' Daniel Plain-

- 3. Capote (dir. Bennett Miller, 2005): The movie for which Hoffman will likely be best remembered is also the film he won his Oscar for, playing the brilliant Truman Capote during the years when he was writing his masterpiece, In Cold Blood. Hoffman falls so deep into his character in Capote that he emerged almost unrecognizable, ultimately beating out Heath Ledger's Brokeback Mountain performance, considered by many to be one of the best of the decade.
- 2. Synecdoche, New York (directed by Charlie Kaufman, 2008): A movie seen by very few and understood by only its biggest fans, Charlie Kaufman's Synecdoche, New York is considered by several notable film critics to be the best film of the last decade. Leading that film is Hoffman in a decadesspanning performance that sees the actor holding together a very complicated script and production. It's a film and performance that I think will earn a legacy over time, maybe even someday standing as an all-time classic.
- 1. The Master (directed by Paul Thomas Anderson, 2012): Ahh yes, finally, Hoffman's masterwork. Everyone involved's masterwork. Alongside Joaquin Phoenix and Amy Adams, Hoffman leads the way in what is, for my money, one of the best-acted films ever made. It's a strange puzzle of an art house epic, and Hoffman's performance is one for the ages. A beautiful, complex, poetic and powerful performance from one of the hardest working and most soulful actors of all-time.

Also Great: Jack Goes Boating, Doubt, Charlie Wilson's War, Love Liza, Owning Mahoney, Before the Devil Knows You're Dead, Cold Mountain, 25th Hour, Punch-Drunk Love, Almost Famous, State and Main, Magnolia, Flawless, The Big Lebowski, Boogie Nights, Scent of a Woman and, a major personal favorite, The Talented Mr. Ripley.

Wow. What a career. If only it were longer. R.I.P. Scotty J.

# Foodies: Believe the Buzz

I have a general rule of thumb when it comes to new restaurants: wait a few months to give it a chance to work out all the new-restaurant kinks. That is what I intended with the new Brazilian restaurant at Jefferson Pointe - Tucanos, which opened late last year – but I couldn't ignore the hubbub. Friends and acquaintances were reporting back with rave reviews, and it piqued my interest. I mean, seriously, how could I not be intrigued by exclamations of "meat fiesta" and "meat extravaganza?"

Before venturing to Tucanos, my only encounter with Brazilian food was through my friend and fellow food blogger Cynthia Presser, a Brazilian native living in Fort Wayne who helps organize the annual Taste of Brazil event. She taught Jon and me about typical Brazilian seasonings and introduced us to its delicious national drink, Caipirinha, made with sugar cane hard liquor and lime. Beyond that, we didn't know what to expect.

We visited Tucanos one afternoon in early January, and the place was hopping. Tables were full of families while servers bustled around with skewers of meat and vegetables, creating a lively buzz throughout the brightly decorated former food court space. We chose to sit at the bar which

gave us a great view of the dining room and the Salad Festival. Yes, you read that right: Salad Festival. The bartender greeted us, asked us if it was our first visit and explained how the Churras-

co (aka meat fiesta) works, which was a bit intimidating only because it was new to us. Churrasco is a term for barbeque that uses a variety of meat cooked over a flame on a spit or skewer. A small tri-colored column at each table is used to let servers know you are ready for more meat. Green means go and red means stop. There is also a sampling of sauces at each seat used for dipping.

The menu is pretty basic. Guests can order the Churrasco (\$14.95 at lunchtime, \$21.95 during dinner) which includes the Salad Festival, or they may order from a small sampling of appetizers. There are also specialty skewers available that may be added to the Churrasco. Guests may also opt for just the Salad Festival (\$10.95 at lunchtime, \$14.95 during dinner). We chose the Churrasco in order to get the full experience. Tucanos also has a small selection of specialty cocktails and a full bar. We opted for Brazilian Lemonade with a few shots of tequila added to it, making it the best mixed drink price on the menu.

We began with the Salad Festival, a multi-sided salad bar loaded with fresh veggies and fruit, cured meats, cheeses, soups, breadsticks, deli salads and

even sushi, all prepared fresh daily. I wanted to try everything but was mindful of the amount of food ahead. If you aren't careful, it is easy to fill up quickly. I was thoroughly impressed with every-

thing I sampled, with the exception of the sushi, which I found mediocre (I am pretty snobby when it comes to sushi). The cured meats were especially delicious, and I paired mine with fresh melon for a salty sweet treat. The most interesting item on the salad bar was hard-boiled quail eggs, which, aside from being smaller than chicken eggs, taste just like them, but made me feel adventurous nonetheless.

Once we finished our Salad Festival, we flipped our tri-colored column to green, and the Churrasco began. Waiters came by every few minutes with skewers of meat, grilled veggies and even grilled pineapple. They were knowledgeable about the food, answering our questions and explaining each item. First up

was Picalho, garlic Parmesan beef, which was tender and delicious and cooked to a perfect medium rare. Peru, turkey wrapped in bacon, was next out of the kitchen, and it too was tender and

flavorful. We also sampled Contra Coxa, a sweet and sour chicken wing; Corazon de Frango, smoky chicken hearts; Faldinha, beef tenderloin; Picanha, top sirloin; Assado, marinated beef brisket; Presunto, brown sugar glazed ham; and grilled veggies and grilled pineapple.

Absolutely everything wowed us. All of the meats were cooked to perfection and seasoned appropriately. We never even ventured into the dipping sauces in front of us because the meats, veggies and fruit were just right on their own. Once we had tried everything, the servers came around with the items we liked best: grilled pineapple and Garlic Parmesan Beef. We may have had three or four helpings of the pineapple, but who is counting? I thought we would need to be wheeled out of there because of the amount of food we ate! Sadly, we didn't leave room for dessert, but we were pleasantly surprised to learn that all desserts are made fresh daily.

Overall, we were extremely impressed with the experience and the food, and we will certainly visit again.

ney's book that lets readers know that they're in for a shocking re-focusing if they expect the book to be like Delaney's popular Twitter

quips. Delaney is a comedian, actor writer whose biggest claim to fame, so far, is his Twitter feed, on which he posts funny comments.

They aren't jokes as much as they are ironic bits of absurdism. Here are a few examples: "Imagine a shark. Terrified yet? Well you will be when I tell you that THE SHARK IS MADE OF GLUTEN!!"; "My dog got hit by a train today & we found out my brother didn't make parole. Talk about a case of the Mondays!!"; "Cats probably wouldn't need 9

lives if they wore tiny little hel-

mets and didn't smoke cigarettes." Delaney's tweets have been enough to get him nearly a million followers and earn him the title of "Funniest Person on Twitter" at the 2012 Comedy Central Comedy Awards. Frankly, that news makes it seem like there must not be very many funny people on Twitter, but the bigger problem is that it sets up readers of Delaney's first book for disappointment if they expect

that the book is going to be a longform version of the 140-character tweets. Some of the tweets are jammed onto the title pages at the

head of book's sections, but the chapters in between are essay-ish pieces that are pretty grim.

Most of the book is concerned with Delaney's struggle with alcoholism and depression. He sprinkles jokes around it, and we're supposed to find the wry, self-deprecating tone amusing, but

the situations that he describes are

harrowing and far removed from funny.

He tells us about a drunken boat joyride that nearly kills him, a friend, and a couple of strangers. He explains the car crash that nearly killed him - and, fortunately, no one else - and triggered his decision to finally get sober. He talks about a drunken decision to illegally bungee-jump off a bridge in New York and a nearly fatal drunken fall from the top of a telephone pole. He writes about rehab and bad decision

after bad decision, and the smile he tries to put on all of it is painfully strained.

The really odd thing is that Delaney's life seems to be a lot better now. It looks as if he has a job. After all the drunken and unsuccessful sex and failed

romance that he writes about, he's now married, but his wife doesn't come on the scene until late in the book, and then she just pops up unannounced. The same thing happens with his kids; between the lines, it looks like becoming a parent was a significant factor in his salvation, but there isn't much explanation of how he got there.

As a memoir, the book is patchy; it dwells in the bad stuff, and it suggests that the author has grown once the bad stuff was over, but other than the obvious rockbottom epiphanies, it doesn't tell us much about how the growth happened.

That's probably a lot to ask, though, of a writer who has established himself by writing two sentences at a time. Delaney is to be commended for stretching and trying to tell a story that's much bigger than Twitter allows. Some of the pieces - such as the account of a foray into an abandoned mental hospital with his mother and his uncle - are riveting and enjoyable to read, and the documentation of the horrors of substance abuse is convincingly bleak. Anyone who's looking for easily digestible bits of silliness, though, should be reminded that beneath most comedy lies a foundation of despair, and Delaney doesn't hesitate to dig down to his foundation here.
