Give a kid a shovel and he will dig - and dig, and dig, and dig.

Joseph Pelka, a local ceramicist, connected with the earth (mud specifically) at an early age when he asked his mom for per-

mission to dig a fishpond in his backyard. Assuming the summer vacation daze had begun to dim her son's creative brain, Pelka's mom sanctioned the project.

"It was huge," he recounts, emphasizing the word, huge with a tinge of fading Californian accent. "My mom had no idea I would actually do it. We filled it with koi fish when they were just starting to get popular."

While he didn't realize it at the time, the pond served as a research lab filling his mind with enough creative seeds to inspire a prolific career as an artist devoted to mud spinning on a pottery wheel.

Pelka's strong connection to nature is reflected in his creative endeavors. He remembers the stream patterns carved by the fish as they swam in his pond and references the flowing yet fleeting lines in his designs. Salamanders, frogs, and snakes - "everything that kinda crawled around, I started putting them on my artwork right away," Pelka explained, his eyes alive and gleaming with childhood nostalgia. His vessels are often set on stilted legs and dressed in textures resembling

stones, sea plants and assorted hairless creatures. He is currently building an army of turtles that can be purchased as single units or small platoons at the Barr Street Market where the artist can be found most Saturday mornings.

A California native, Pelka was drawn to the Midwest by the lucrative summer art shows that cycle through the area.

"Midwest art shows were crankin'," he explains.

As a successful potter in California, Pelka found himself traveling east every year to shows in Chicago and other surrounding cities. He and his wife, Kathy, who keeps the business side of selling art moving forward, surveyed the area and decided to pack up and move to centrally located Fort Wayne. The accessibility to larger art markets may have attracted them to the city, but even after living in the area for 10 years, Pelka shows vibrant enthusiasm toward his not-so-new home base.

"I love having space around me. I can see across the field from my studio. Deer run around here all the time. California is way built up - feels like you are caged in.' He also comments on the quirky tradition of travelers receiving a plastic wrapped cookie Airport.

"I love that!" he says, with sincere enthusiasm emphasized by bright eyes and a quick, upright jolt in posture.

Pelka's studio is located in Huntertown, in an aged but interesting strip mall that most

"I've been a potter since high school. I'm a product of community college," says Pelka. "I really like industrial arts and art, but I was turned off by school. I loved working





with my hands. I knew it in fourth grade."

After being disenchanted by working in a mass-production pottery factory, Pelka joined a potter's guild.

"I got a job glazing awful pottery," says Pelka. "Clay is such a noble substance. I couldn't understand why anyone would abuse it like that."

The decision to network with other artists changed the course of his career. He worked closely with some famous potters, including Beatrix Wood who, according to Pelka, "was about 105 years old at the time." Wood suggested a visit to some high-end art shows, and Pelka took her instruction.

He was inspired by the work he saw and noted the success of other potters working around him. After much experimentation and practice, Pelka found a personal style that connected with the public.

He started to get accepted by the highend shows and - with the diligence of his wife who sought out more opportunities and balanced the financial side of things - grew the business to the point where he could finally take the leap to live life as a full-time artist.

There have been few musical success stories as remarkable as Motown Records. The rise of Berry Gordy as a music executive and the enduring legacy

of groups like the Temptations, the Supremes and Smokey Robinson & the Miracles - not to mention solo acts like Marvin Gaye and Stevie Wonder - have left a catalog of music that will never be forgotten. But for the Spinners, a Detroit vocal group with its own distinct five-part harmony and sound, the Motown dream was elusive, leaving the group searching for a new home by 1970.

The Spinners first formed in 1954 - 60 years ago this year - and began their professional career in 1961 with Motown. Then managed by Harvey Fuqua, who was himself a recording artist and was married to Gwen Gordy, the Spinners had a couple of Motown hits, including one produced by Stevie Wonder, "It's a Shame." But in

spite of some success, the Spinners opted to leave Motown when their contract was up at the end of the decade.

"We got lost at Motown," says Henry Fambrough, the last surviving original member of the Spinners. "Think about the producers back then who were writing songs. They wanted to write for the Temptations, Marvin Gaye, the Supremes. With all of those top bands, we didn't get any attention. We didn't have a writer just writing songs for us. Holland-Dozier-Holland were writing songs for all of them back then, but we had no one giving us songs."

During their brief time without a label, the Spinners toured briefly with Aretha Franklin who had been very successful with Atlantic Records. She told the group Atlantic had been very good to her, and she felt very comfortable with the way they had managed her career. The Spinners signed with Atlantic, and the rest, as they say, is history.

It was through Atlantic that the Detroit group became known as part of the Philly sound, with Philadelphia music titan Thom Bell put in charge of providing them with material. Rather than just cranking out generic soul music for them to record, Bell took the time to find out what would best suit singers Fambrough, Bobbie Smith and Pervis Jackson.

For all the accolades and success, Fambrough says the group's greatest honor came in 1976 when the Spinners were given a star on the Hollywood Walk of Fame. Given their early struggle to gain recognition while sharing a label with the Temptations and Supremes, one additional detail seems especially sweet.

"We were only the second black group to be honored with a star," says Fambrough. "The only other at that time had been the Mills Brothers, so that was a big thrill for us."

Through their many

years of hits, Fambrough has dedicated his life to the Spinners and now is the last surviving member of the group.

"Bobbie just died last March, so it's been important for me to be able to carry on what we all started together in 1954. We lost Billy [Henderson], and we lost Pervis. We lost Philippé [Wynne] in 1984, and even though he wasn't with the group anymore, he was still a brother.

"And then we lost Bobbie last year. So I'm the last one, and I wanted to get the group back together, so it was important to replace him with the same kind of guy. We wanted people with good character, who didn't do drugs or any of those things. Once we found the right person, we hit the road again. We don't go like we did in the 70s, but we're on the road about 60 percent of the time."

Carrying on, particularly after the loss of Smith, whose distinctive voice was the lead on "I'll Be Around" and "Could It Be I'm Falling In Love," was as important to his departed friend as it is to Fambrough, and it was his last conversation with Smith that assured the continued presence of the Spinners on stages around the country.

"Bobbie and I had dinner together a couple of weeks before he passed, and the last thing he told me was, 'I don't know what's going to happen with me and everything that's going on, but I want you to promise to keep everything going.' And that's what I'm doing."

-----Feature • Carl Weathersby ------The Accidental Mentor MUSIC HALL

Carl Weathersby is already known as a soulful singer, songwriter and guitarist. But without really meaning to, the Chicagobased blues icon has begun to occupy an even more important position: mentor.

With many of the old guard passing on, Weathersby has found himself helping younger musicians make the leap from mere

players to real bluesmen. He has become the accidental men-

"I play with a lot of different people," Weathersby told me by phone from his East Chicago, Indiana home. "I guess I'm one of the older ones around. I guess I should be a mentor for them."

Weathersby and his band take a break from their regular gigs at the legendary Kingston Mines in Chicago to play the Eagles Theater at the Honeywell Center in Wabash. The show is slated for Thursday

Feb. 27. Doors open at 6:30 p.m., with the music beginning at 7:30 p.m. Wish Weathersby happy birthday if you go. He turns 61 on Feb 24.

It's natural that Weathersby should find himself helping younger musicians navigate the often difficult world of the blues. As a youngster teaching himself to play, Weathersby got a few tips himself from a friend of his father's one day while figuring out Albert King's "Crosscut Saw." Thinking he had the song down, young Carl played it for his father and his friend Albert, a diesel mechanic. It turned out that Albert was also a pretty good guitarist who's last name happened to be King. King then proceeded to show Carl how the song was supposed to be played.

That was the last direct lesson Weathersby ever got from Albert King, even though years later Weathersby spent time as a rhythm guitarist in King's band. "Albert King wouldn't show you nothing," Weathersby said. "He wouldn't show anybody anything. You'd have to stand there and watch him. You had to figure out how he played it because he played it the other way, left handed."

Not all of the previous generation of bluesmen were as stingy as King with their tips. Some of them were downright helpful, but more readily with Weathersby than with other musicians his age. Weathersby attributes their particular generosity to the fact that he was born in Mississippi and brought the manners he learned there to the blues clubs of Chicago.

"Some of the older guys tried to steer me," said Weathersby, who at age eight moved with his family from Jackson to Chicago. "They'd say 'It don't take all this to do that.' They were talking about playing and a lot of other stuff. Coming from Mississippi, I was one of the only young guys Louis Myers would talk to." Myers, a guitar player, led the Aces, the band that backed harmonica

he said. "They mostly want the band to play along. But somebody got to be doing something else to make it music. That's the challenge. I learned to do it. Bruce Igauler pointed that out to me. I was playing two parts. Something else had to be there. Only thing that could do it to make it music. Kind of like everything else, necessity is the mother of invention. It wasn't like I was so smart and came up with other stuff. It was

> just something I had to do."

Playing well with others hasn't always come easily for Weathersby, at least in the non-musical world. Following a stint in the Army from 1971 to 1977, during which time he served in Viet Nam, he worked as a state trooper in Louisiana and later as a prison guard and steel mill worker. And if you got pulled over for speeding in Louisiana, you'd better hope the guy behind the badge wasn't Carl Weathersby.

"I just got out of the military. This was in the 70s, and being a soldier in those days didn't have much uses. Just the way it was. When I stopped someone, there's no

negotiation going on. This is it right here, now. I had a problem dealing with civilians. It took me a while to get used to that." He still has, as he put it later in a video interview, "a low tolerance for knuckleheads."

You won't find any knuckleheads in his band. Joining longtime members Calvin Gaskin on bass and Leon Smith on drums is relative newcomer Garrett Jacobson on rhythm guitar. Jacobson, who is from Oklahoma, replaces guitarist Corey Dennison who left to start a solo career. Weathersby was glad to see Dennison go.

'I waited too long. That's what I was telling Corey. You need to do what you gotta do while you're young. Just like a little kid. Time to take off the training wheels. When you're young you got to get out on your own. I didn't want to see him when he's 50 competing against 20-year-olds."

Jacobson's favorite guitar player is Little Milton, whom Weathersby played with from time to time.

"If you was to go to Oklahoma you would never think you'd find a guy like him," Weathersby said of Jacobson. "He's a Mormon guy. Corey used to see him around a lot. He told me this guy can physically play. A friend of mine left Chicago and started

automatic credibility, however, Weathersby said. You had to treat the old-timers with deference.

"A lot of those guys were from Mississippi," he said. "I knew how they were raised. I talked to them like we were in Mississippi. You know, 'yes sir.' Kind of a knowing your place thing. I figured I'm a young man. I ain't going to give 'em a hard time. I'm not going to overshadow or upstage them."

After his last stint with King ended in 1982, Weathersby spent 15 years as lead guitarist with harp player Billy Branch's band, Sons of Blues. His time with the SOBs taught Weathersby about harmonica play-

"When you play with a harmonica player, they think they're supposed to be heard whatever else is going on," he said "And some guitar players think they should be heard all the time. That's why a lot of guitar players run into problems all the time. You have to give up a lot of the spotlight. A lot of guys aren't willing to do that. I just know how to do it.2

One thing he said he learned from the older guys was that if you're on stage people will see you. You don't have to act stupid to get attention. What you do have to do is learn to play what needs to be played.

"The harp players need that old stuff,"

There's a bit of mystique about the art of poetry, with some finding it slightly uncomfortable to attempt or difficult to define. Must it rhyme? Should it deal with deeply emotional issues? Is it something for only the most rarified of writers? Are poets born or are they developed?

As IPFW professor George Kalamaras, who has been with the university since 1990, begins his twoyear term as Indiana's Poet Laureate, he sees the appointment as a way of demystifying poetry, sharing

its beauty while making it accessible to those who may feel outside of its reach. Extensively published and honored both within his own institution and through international entities, Kalamaras has been forging the link between poetry and nature, humanity and the global community for years, but he sees this opportunity as a way to open the doors for others throughout Indiana.

"I have a fairly generous agenda of what I'd like to get done, and I want to start with the hallmark of my laureateship, a web magazine and blog called The Wabash Watershed: Where Rivers of Tradition Meet Rivers of Innovation. I want it to be a place where we can publish Indiana poets, featuring different poets on a regular basis so that several will be

featured every year. It will include biographical notes, photographs, a short interview and maybe a podcast of the poet reading his or her work. We have some wonderful poets in Indiana, but they aren't getting any exposure.'

And in bringing forth this website, Kalamaras hopes to not only provide that exposure but to redefine the way people see poetry in the first place.

"Poetry needs to be community-based," he says. "The cultural stereotype of poets is that we're loners, isolated somehow from our community. A film like Dead Poets Society makes my teeth ache because that only advances that stereotype. What we really need to do is come out of ourselves and write poetry of the community. They shouldn't worry about themselves.

'George Harrison wrote 'I, Me, Mine,' and that has been totemic for me in my life. We have to get out of ourselves and not worry about the 'I, Me, Mine' and see who we are in companionship with our community."

Born in Chicago, Kalamaras grew up in Lake County, Indiana which clearly drives his sense of Indiana geography, tradition and symbolism, all of which is helping to define his early plans for his laureateship. In keeping with his theme of community, he also looks to launch Project 411, so named for the 411 undammed miles of the Wabash River.

"I want for poets to work in collaboration to create 411 lines of poetry, to create a collage poem in the way that individual tributaries all flow together to form a river. The name of the website and magazine are significant to me because the river wouldn't be what it is

The categories will be rural poetry, urban poetry, historical poetry and 'outsider' poetry which don't really fit into any category but deal with issues like race. class and gender. Young people should have a forum for sharing their poetry, and, of course, they feel comfortable with technology, so rather than having a poem published in some obscure book or journal, they can tell their friends, 'Hey, I have a poem published on this website' and be able to share it with people.'

In providing a forum for young poets, Kalamaras can try to recreate the experience he found in his first effort at poetry, one which obviously still resonates and was instrumental in setting his life course.

"I wrote my first poem when I was 12 years old, and it was a really powerful moment for me. I usually slept soundly, but one night I couldn't sleep and had the idea to write a poem. I worked on it off and on all night, and when I shared that poem and saw the reaction of other people, that they could see and experience something I was feeling, it was very powerful.

"I didn't have a chance to write poetry in school. There were no language arts classes back then. We ba-

This summer Pelka plans to try a new strategy and skip the summer art tour. He wants to spend his time close to home where he will be a frequent seller at local markets, including the Barr Street Market.

He has developed a collaborative relationship with Hedgehog Press and hopes to continue to work with owner Julie Wall-Toles again this summer. He also leans on his wife who has set up an effective social media outlet where Pelka's work sells well via Etsy, the online market (search pelkaclayart.etsy). He also develops longstanding relationships with clients who like to keep in touch with his progress through Facebook.

As business partners, Mr. and Mrs. Pelka are con-

stantly strategizing and looking ahead for new and out-of-the box opportunities.

"You have to be willing to change in order to survive," he explains. "If I can set up my life to stay creative in this economy, it's awesome."

With plans to increase his studio hours, Pelka hopes he can generate more traffic from people who want to watch him throw on the wheel. It is, after all, a fascinating process, especially when executed by a vibrant artist.

teaching college in Oklahoma. Me and this guy grew up together. He saw Garrett playing and told him, if you like to play blues you got to go to Chicago."

In joining Weathersby's band Jacobson will learn from the best, from someone who is open and willing to share a lifetime of experience. That's a responsibility Weathersby doesn't take lightly.

"I wasn't afforded that luxury. And it was really a luxury. Back in the 80s there were only a handful of that old guard that would tell you anything. I was around people doing it. Probably wouldn't be the same for Garrett in Oklahoma. There are no reference points. Might be harder to figure this stuff out for him. Otis Clay used to help me out. Tyrone Davis, too. They are some serious players. It kind of weirded me out one time when Otis was talking to me like I was one of his peers. It made me feel weird. I haven't done anything, I was thinking, never been on a national TV show."

One lesson Jacobson will likely glean from his new boss is that you're never too old to be impressed. As we were winding up the interview, Weathersby mentioned that he was going to a meeting later with some heavy hitters.

"I've been in the studio. I got eight or nine songs I've been working on. John Mayall is supposed to do something with me. Sometime this afternoon I got to go meet with his drummer. I'm doing my new record with Mayall's bass player and drummer. That's worth the wait. A legendary guy like Mayall, I can wait till April. He would have come in November. He got sidetracked."

I see it as a way to understand poetry and what I'm doing in more palpable ways, to see the potential of poetry to be more than personal. Poetry is not personal in a 'hey, look at me' way. Showing poetry as a way to connect to students, neighbors and people throughout the state is very satisfying. Although it's a 'laureateship,' I don't want to rest on my laurels. I see this as a way to move forward, not a resting point."

Rough Francis Maximum Soul Power

For now, Rough Francis are far better known for their backstory than they are for their music. If you've seen the excellent rock documentary A Band Called Death, then you know that Rough Francis are a band with a legacy literally built into their DNA.

Here's the nickel tour:

Three Detroit brothers record heartfelt, proto-punk masterpieces in the early 70s, flirt with success, are criminally denied. Sons of one of the members get heavily into punk, cover Bad Brains and eventually find out about their dad's band. Sons form band to cover Death's songs and call themselves Rough Francis in honor of their late uncle who used the moniker to record shortly before his passing. Awardwinning documentary is released, energizing a new generation of fans and introducing Rough Francis in context. An EP of original music follows, and now we arrive in the present, listening to a supercharged full-length entitled Maximum Soul Power.

Tough drumbeats announce the album's opener, "Ruffians," and by the time Bobby Hackney Jr. sings, "Let's get our minds together / We've got to learn from each other / Right Now!" you can feel the spirit of their father's and uncles' art coursing through their own. It's a double treat: Maximum Soul Power compels on its own merits (it's tight, loud, well produced - and it flat-out rocks), but if you've heard even a bit of Death's brief catalog, you'll recognize the influence. This is a band unapologetically carrying the torch, and even turning up the flame.

As catchy as it is impassioned, "Black & Red" surges along on power chords and a sing/shouted chorus that would make classic Kiss jealous. The breathtaking "Staring Out The Window" is that perfect combination of gentle, melancholy and fuzzed up. It's the kind of power ballad you want to crank up. Completely in their element in the hard-hitting "Righteous," Rough Francis perfectly encapsulate what makes them tick: honesty, positivity, unabashed love of punk and classic rock and a deep appreciation for Death's trailblazing work.

The album closes with "Comm to Space," a chugging, vamping rocker that kicks off with the voice of their late uncle, David Hackney, making a very surreal prank call. Running his voice through effects, he gravely intones, "I am from the planet Mars, and I need your help. I need your vehicle." It's a sweet, weird little cameo, but the real tribute to Death is woven into the soul of Maximum Soul Power. If these guys stick around awhile, perhaps they'll get a documentary of their own someday. (D.M. Jones)

Warpaint

Warpaint

Warpaint is the kind of record that would have kept a young David Lynch up late into the night. It's a dark, expensive, moody, cinematic, Gothic, dreamlike listen that rewards familiarity more than most recordings. Pretty, creative, thoughtful, skilled girls sing and rock, embracing time changes and pro



rock bravery in a way very few have the courage to do these days. It's a long, balls-out set of songs that sees a band going all out, trying to make a major classic without ever blushing. In this era of abundant sarcasm and scarce sincerity, it's a rare record that is more concerned with being good than cool.

In order to expand their sound from the dreamy, proggy rock of their 2010 debut, The Fool, the gals of Warpaint (bassist Jenny Lee Lindberg, guitarists Emily Kokal and Theresa Wayman and drummer Stella Mozgawa) have changed things up quite a bit. In addition to getting a new drummer between recordings, they've also embraced new instruments into their mix, prominently featuring keyboards and drum machines throughout. Also added to the formula this time around are two of the great studio men on the planet, Flood (who produced) and Atoms for Peace's Nigel Godrich (who mixed the al-

Closing the gap between psychedelic and heavy metal, San Diego's Iron Butterfly flew high above the rest with this 1968 album. Known mostly for the title track (which clocks in at 17 minutes), side one of this album also has some great nuggets from a band that fatefully



established its identity from just one song.

The first track, "Most Anything You Want," has keyboards that are very reminiscent of The Doors. It's an upbeat track with some crisp harmonies and crunchy guitars.

"Flowers and Beads," which follows, sounds like a cross between Cream and The Monkees. It's a groovy, late 60s track and is easy on the ears, but it's hard to imagine that this band was going to have a monster hit with such a heavy vibe.

"My Mirage" leads with an organ arrangement and soft drumming and guitars. It's more of the same, but delves into the psychedelic sound that they sort of developed after this record.

"Termination" sounds a little like some of the more electric stuff Jefferson Airplane were doing up in Northern California at the same time, and is another very heavy percussion-based track from the band. As the song fades into silence with the help of wind chimes, you get the hardest track on side one in "Are You Happy?"

Side two is the title track, originally called "In A Garden of Eden." But during the recording session, the vocals were garbled so much by an inebriated Doug Ingle that it was misunderstood. The band loved it, and the rest is history. The song stayed on the charts for almost three years.

Fun Fact: Iron Butterfly were booked to play Woodstock in 1969, but the helicopter that was to take them to the location had mechanical issues and they never made it. (Dennis Donahue)

bum). To say that Warpaint is a great sounding recording is an understatement.

The plan this time around, song-wise, was to embrace minimalism while making songs that feel big. A good reference for such an approach that worked out well would be Mogwai's Come On Die Young, another dark, expansive, secretly complex record made for the cerebral indie rock type. Warpaint turns out to be the kind of album that the right kind of fan could really get lost in. Despite their minimalist aspirations, the gals have crafted a very epic-sounding set of songs that requires listeners to spend time learning the moves. taking the songs apart piece-by-piece - not at all unlike a great set of Radiohead songs.

Theresa Wayman (also known as the girl who slits her wrists in her dorm bathtub in the 2002 film Rules of Attraction) has, in my opinion, stepped up as the band's most interesting singer, softly howling her way through many of the album's best tracks, sounding very cool, apathetic and, yes, very sexy and even seductive. In her tracks the band's pseudo-stoner vibe still lingers, hanging around in the record's more loop-y, trance-like tracks. And that's part of the problem here: excess. Loops. Drawn-out trance-y moments that make the record carry on for what feels like forever.

Here we get 12 fully baked songs clocking in at over 50 minutes. about 12 minutes too long for a record that's so lacking in interesting lyrical content or stylistic diversity. The dream simply goes on too long, resulting in a flawed record that doesn't come near being the classic the girls were aiming for. Cut three or even four of the lesser tracks and Warpaint would be a very interesting modern addition to the DDPP (that's "Dark Dream Pseudo Prog") sub-genre artists like the Cocteau Twins, Mazzy Star, Low, Opal, Broadcast and even Beach House have all contributed so much to.

Instead of that big new sexy dark classic we end up with an overbaked, overly long album with really pretty cover art and a handful of great moments. (Greg W. Locke)

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A Fearless Forecast

Upon review of this year's nine Best Picture nominees, it'd be hard to argue that the 2014 Academy Awards ceremony isn't much more

cinephile-friendly than most years. Or perhaps any other year. Eight of the nine directors whose pictures were nominated could make up a who's who list of modern masters, including David O. Russell (American Hustle), Paul Greengrass (Captain Phillips), Alfonso Cuaron (Gravity), Spike Jonze (Her), Alexander Payne (Nebraska), Stephen Frears (Philomena), Steve McQueen (12 Years a Slave) and, of course, some guy named Marty (The Wolf of Wall Street). While several of my personal favorites (Blue is the Warmest Color, Only God Forgives and The Place Beyond the Pines) weren't nominated, I feel just fine about this year's nominees. Maybe Captain Phillips is a bit out of place, but the surprising Philomena nomination makes up for that just fine.

So who will win Best Picture this year - that's the question, right? Most bets so far are on *12 Years a Slave*, *Gravity* and *American Hustle* (all of which have already taken home plenty of hardware at other awards shows and festivals), with the hard-to-watch *12 Years a Slave* leading the way. And that's how I think it'll go down – with *Gravity* picking up most of the technical awards and likely also Best Director for Cuaron.

Cate Blanchett will win Best Actress for her masterful performance in Woody Allen's mostly snubbed *Blue Jasmine* and Matthew McConaughey (whose last name I finally had to learn how to spell) will almost certainly edge out Chiwetel Ejiofor (whose name I still have to look up every time I type it) and win the Best Actor Oscar for his marvelous *Dallas Buyers Club* performance. Jared Leto will likely win the Best Supporting Actor Oscar for *Dallas* while most think that Jennifer Lawrence will once again win a Best Supporting Actress Oscar for a role in a David O. Russell film (though I really don't think she deserves it this time around).

As stated above, I think Cuaron will win Best Director (which he should have won years ago for *Children of Men*) while his *Gravity* will almost certainly sweep the technical awards, including Best Cinematography. Best Animated Feature will probably go to *Frozen*, though I think Hayao Miyazaki's *The Wind Rises* is much more deserving. Best Foreign Language Film will hopefully go to *The Great Beauty*, but only because the remarkable *Blue is the Warmest Color* was disqualified from being nominated due to some small release-related detail that determines eligibility. So maybe next year, *Blue*.

Best Production Design (an award that I think should get much more attention) will almost certainly go to the lavishly designed *The Great Gatsby* while Best Adapted Screenplay should go to *12 Years a Slave* (though I think everyone is praying for a *Before Midnight* upset). And finally, the most important award of the night (according to me, that is), Best Original Screenplay. This one, I think, will go to ... oh who knows. I could certainly see Spike Jonze's *Her* taking the honor, but any of this year's nominees – aside from maybe Woody's *Blue Jasmine* – seem worthy of the little naked man.

So that's how I see things shaking out at this year's big celebrity party. I think Ellen will do a fine job as a host and Leonardo DiCaprio will once again have to act as if he's not deeply devastated and disappointed when he once again loses by a hair. The Oscars will air on the night of Sunday, March 2. Maybe take a nap that afternoon before the backpatting marathon begins. Oh, and please remember that the pretty faces who conduct the red carpet interviews are not to be taken seriously. gregwlocke@gmail.com



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
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
