

Keeping the Groovy Going

At its best, American musical theatre is uniquely able to capture a particular time in history while remaining timeless enough to endure. Whether it's The Music Man with its

charming and nostalgic glimpse into early 20th century life in Indiana or Grease! which pays loving homage to the 1950s, the stories take us back in time without seeming removed from our current lives. Universal themes and memorable songs help keep us grounded even as we escape.

The award-winning musical Hair, which won Tony Awards for Best Musical in 1968 and for Best Revival in 2009, is decidedly a product of its times, portraying the turbulent and controversial era of the 1960s when Vietnam protests and anti-establishment ideals were de rigueur. While the attitudes and politics of Hair decidedly represented a segment of the population in the late 1960s, the musical proved as controversial and divisive as the movement itself. In fact, Indiana found itself in the midst of the controversy or at least the response to the controversy – when three of its towns (South Bend, Evansville and Indianapolis) either denied booking

for the show or found picket lines protesting themes that were deemed by some to be un-

Almost 50 years later, Hair can still spark strong responses, though now through the guise of a different perspective. The current touring production which comes to the Embassy Theatre next week is now playing to audiences of all ages. It's that very different life experience and point of view which Erik Kopacsi, who plays tribe leader Claude, thinks makes the show a hit.

"Older audience members remember the 60s. They remember all of that stuff and experienced all of those things and have very strong feelings about it. The younger audience, people my age, are facing a lot of those same things that are going on with the characters. They have their own feelings of anti-hate, anti-prejudice, pro-peace that are happening on the stage. Now there are hipsters who are really looking for their own place, trying to find their own sense of style. They're trying to find where they fit in, and they see that going on in the show.'

The music, which includes songs like "Good Morning Starshine," "The Age of Aquarius" and "I Believe in Love," remains incredibly catchy, even as it deals with serious themes like drugs, war and sexuality. The nudity still shocks even some jaded audience members, and some people still leave the show as much from the emotional impact as disapproval of content which Kopacsi thinks speaks to the power of the show.

As Kopacsi found his way to this show's

cast, he took a sometimes circuitous route to a career in musical theatre. A native of the Canadian province of Ontario and now living in Toronto, he began as many do, by playing the piano. Although he admits he fell away from it for a time ("I was the typical

Labour's Lost) along with musicals (Rent and Sweeney Todd) but found great satisfaction in something remarkably traditional.

"We did a production of Oklahoma which is as classic as you get, and I didn't think I was going to love it. But I did. That



boy wanting to play video games"), by high school he was interested enough to resume playing and took a drama class which introduced him to a new world. He played piano and guitar but had no experience singing, so he joined the choir to work on his voice.

"I got to work on my voice, and it was fun. Then I heard there was going to be a Gilbert and Sullivan kind of show and they were looking for tenors, so I thought I would just try out for it and got the part. The music was so catchy and so fun that I thought I wanted to do opera at that point."

The move from no vocal experience to possible opera training is a huge step, which Kopacsi readily admits.

"Making that shift in a short time is rather miraculous, but I think it goes to show that the musical training I had already gotten by then was so good that I was able to make that kind of progress so quickly."

Even now Kopacsi considers himself more of a singer than an actor, but his college career at Sheridan College prepared him to do anything. He says he did both straight plays (Amadeus) and Shakespeare (Love's was a great experience, one of my favor-

After finishing school, Kopacsi worked with an amateur theater group he started and began auditioning for roles, and that's how he came to the Hair cast last fall. Auditions were held in October, rehearsals in December, and the show hit the road in January where it will remain through May 15. He says the opportunity allows him to travel and do what he loves, an irresistible combination. He also gets to stretch his stage skills since his duties go beyond the norm.

"There are 16 of us in the cast that are also playing the music. I'm playing the guitar, and it's surprisingly challenging. Of course, we're up there acting, but we're also playing and while we're playing we're doing our choreography. So your fingers and feet are all working at the same time, and it's definitely challenging but totally reward-

The experience has led Kopacsi to suggest to young actors that they expand their

Dancing Outside the Lines

Prepare to be mesmerized, Fort Wayne, for you are in for a visual treat like no other on March 15.

The Fort Wayne Dance Collective is bringing the prestigious and edgy Gallim Dance from Brooklyn, New York as their guest artist residency at Arts United Center. As part of their 2014 worldwide tour, this is the first time Gallim (rhymes with "dream") Dance has appeared in northeast Indiana. They are an award-winning, highly sought after company whose work has been acclaimed by The New York Times as "voluptuously polyglot choreography.'

group was The founded in 2007 by dance visionary and Juilliard graduate Andrea Miller. Miller has been hailed as a risingstar choreographer responsible for challenging and shaping this new generation of dancers. A relatively young artist herself, she seeks to nurture the careers of other young dancers while stimulating the audience's imagination with her work. This formula is part of what

makes Gallim Dance so unique and allows the troupe the freedom to dance outside the box, so to speak.

"I think what draws me to modern dance is the surprise when you see something new," said Liz Monnier, co-founder and artistic director at Fort Wayne Dance Collective. "And that's exactly what the audience will experience with this stunning performance on March 15. Andrea Miller's choreography challenges the dancers to explore different ways to move and allows audiences to expand their vision of what dance can be. It is important for our community to bring in dance companies from outside Fort Wayne to expand our artistic aesthetic."

Gallim Dance isn't just about moving their own bodies; they want to move their

"They [the audience] should move around in their seats. They should get uncomfortable. They should laugh out loud. They should feel alive," Miller said in a 2013 newspaper interview. For Miller, dancing is about soul – the expression and sharing of it

among others. Dancing is a community art form, a conversation between the choreographer, dancers, and audience members.

For those unfamiliar with Gallim Dance, Monnier says that these visually engaging, almost mind-bending performances are contemporary dance at its finest. Blink and you

run the risk of missing something.
"Well, it's not *Swan Lake*," she proclaimed with a chuckle. "The two dances that they will be presenting are quite different from traditional dance styles.

The two performance pieces are "Sit, Kneel, Stand" and "Pupil Suite."

"Sit, Kneel, Stand" is inspired by Albert Camus' myth of Sisyphus (the king of Ephyra who was doomed to roll a large boulder up a hill only to watch it roll back down - forever). The dramatic, eveninglength performance is set to an original music composition by Jerome Begin and Christopher Lancaster. It explores the mix of absurdity and joy in the restless efforts of our shared human experience through characters that demand empathy as they depict Sisyphus's (and humanity's) struggle.


"Pupil Suite" is a performance but packs an equally moving visual punch. It contains quirky experts from Miller's beloved and crowd-pleasing "I Can See Myself In Your Pupil" piece. Set to an interesting mix of Israeli band Balkan Beat Box, the dance is a playful romp that plays with the madness of imagination and the ecstasy of movement.

Both "Sit, Kneel, Stand" and Suite" feature six to seven dancers and probe a wide range of emotions through enchanting movement. You will be hard-pressed to find this level of dynamic, original choreography from such high caliber dancers in northeast Indiana. "The second piece, 'Pu-

pil Suite,' I think is just funny and playful. Sometimes they look like their bones are made of gelatin, going in and out of the floor," said Monnier. "The first piece 'Sit, Kneel, Stand,' makes me think about how we as human beings organize ourselves to move. The title suggests basic functions of movement but how we get there can be accomplished in many interesting

In conjunction with these performances, the Gallim dancers will be delivering a discussion session in the Ian Rolland Gallery after the show. Light refreshments will be served, and the audience is encouraged to meet the talented dancers and ask questions.

Monnier added that, while the company is in Fort Wayne, they will be teaching master classes at South Side and North Side high schools to help dance students broaden their knowledge of dance. They will also be teaching a public master class at Fort Wayne Dance Collective on the Friday before the performance (March 14) at 6 p.m. To register, call Fort Wayne Dance Collective at 260-424-6574.





A Pocket Full of Wry

When it comes to writing songs of heartbreak, James Ellsworth is a master. He's pretty good with songs of wry observation, too. As leader of the band Clusterfolk, Ellsworth has put out two CDs of exquisite devastation and oddball fun. Drawing on back-toback breakups and life in rural Lagrange County, Ellsworth has opened his big jar of woe and incredulity and spread it all around for our benefit.

The records, 2006's Heart on Sleeve, released under the name James Ellsworth and the Dynasorrows, and 2011's Circle the Wagons, by Clusterfolk, offer

brilliant breakup songs interspersed with tender instrumentals and catchy ditties about cowboys and drug-addled canines, dubious road trips, crazed yokels and, on Heart On Sleeve, a beaucrazy-girlfriend who comes to a different kind of end.

A new album is in the works. Ellsworth's challenge is to maintain the balance between clinging heartbreak and soaring joy that worked so well on the first two CDs. On the first two discs, lyrics snickered and fumed through sarcastic jokes, thickets of subtext and largely un-

knowable private references - like Steely Dan lyrics if Becker and Fagan had at some point had their hearts broken somehow while driving through the wilds of northern Indiana looking to score.

Ellsworth says he has plenty of material stored up and is currently writing and arranging new material for the third disc, tentatively called Woo. In addition to the challenge of mining old wounds for fresh insights, there is the task of bending the music to fit the current lineup of the band.

In the right hands the pain of a failed relationship can bring an immense amount of joy. Ellsworth understands that the wounds of love don't necessarily arise from a single blow but from a compounding series of skirmishes, both real and imagined, that over time build and then dismantle trust. You remember good times and bad. It's not a bad place to be marooned.

Sometimes it's beneficial to think that your ex is listening to a song and finally realizing the extent of the damage done," Ellsworth said. "All relationships are different. The writing of a song that directly or even indirectly addresses the situation is going to affect me in different ways. I guess a full-spectrum of feelings can come from a group of songs about a number of different people/relationships."

The exposing of that spectrum is what makes lingering heartbreak so much more enjoyable than the pain of toothache. And who writes poems or songs about toothaches anyway? Well, Ellsworth might, if the mood were to strike. And if such a bizarre mood should happen by, you can bet the result would be catchy and clever.

So how do you go from bewilderment to creation? In Ellsworth's case you write some great songs, then assemble some great musicians to breath life into them. The aptly titled Heart on Sleeve featured hand drummer Dan Halferty, acoustic guitarist Duane Eby, violist Felix Moxter, bass and mandolin player Dave Kartholl and Ellsworth's daughter, Sarah, who contributed harmony vocals. (Sarah also brought the bounce and beauty of youth to a band of rickety old men.) By the time Circle the Wagons rolled around. Halferty had left and Sean Hoffman's lilting fiddle had taken the place of Moxter's husky viola. And Sarah Ellsworth's role had expanded to include lead vocal work and various implements of percussion.

Health problems forced Eby to end his involvement with the band after Circle the Wagons came



out. The departure of Eby, who is equally adept with haunting restraint ("Breathe," off the first disc) and psychotic abandonment ("Meth Lab Dog," off the second) presents a big change to the sound of the band.

The addition of Sean and the eventual loss of Duane had a significant affect on our sound and style," Ellsworth said. "Sean brought a more old-timey, bluegrassy feel to our songs, which I like very much."

The current lineup of Ellsworth, Kartholl, Sarah Ellsworth-Hoffman and Sean Ellsworth-Hoffman. (Sarah and Sean got married in 2012. They had met some years earlier at a festival on Beaver Island in Michigan where Clusterfolk and Hoffman's old-timey band Goldmine Pickers both played.)

The band has always thrived on its members' disparate styles. Ellsworth was a drummer in high school and after college starting writing songs on guitar for Foxfire, a country/alt rock outfit. And over the years he's listened to a lot of Neil Young, Joni Mitchell, Jethro Tull, Ryan Adams, Cat Stevens, Kings of Leon. Wilco, Son Volt and Sarah Jarosz. But his compositions aren't like any of his influences. He'll use sixsyllable words and Irish slang as the need arises.

Kartholl plays in three other bands in addition to his duties with Clusterfolk. With the Americana/blues band Possum Trot Orchestra, he plays bass. In the Grateful Dead cover band Grateful Groove, he plays electric guitar. And in the bluegrass band Chere and Her Bluegrass Bobs, he plays mandolin. While his other bands cleave more to a particular style, Clusterfolk's broad range appeals to Kartholl's sense of musical adventure.

"This band is really versatile," Kartholl said. "We

Sonata Arctica

Pariah's Child

The justification for Sonata Arctica's existence has been waning in recent years. Founded nearly 20 years ago in the mid 90s, the Finnish band has always played a distinctively European version of progressive metal, but their musical chops distinguished them from many of their peers and won



them audiences worldwide. On Pariah's Child, however, SA edge ever closer to the schmaltzy, sentimental, almost 80s glam metal style that the band has gradually been turning towards.

The album starts out amicably enough, with "The Wolves Die Young' and the revved-up "Running Lights" getting things going. By the album's mid-point, however, the band begins to fall victim to its own sentimentality. The most egregious example has to be "Dad, What Did You Do in the War?" which features no shortage of cringeinducing lyrics ("What did you do in the war, Dad? / Why don't you smile when the children sing?"). Maybe it comes across better to Finns, but it's hard to imagine the sentiment coming across as anything but cheesy, regardless of one's cultural sensibilities.

Sometimes the band's lyrics simply come across as a little bit off. Take, for example, "Half a Marathon Man" which finds the band exclaiming that "I'm doing everything I can / to be a half of a marathon

Elsewhere, the band is just perplexing. "X Marks the Spot" has some over-the-top spoken word sections that are intentionally humorous (unlike the unintentionally humorous parts of the album). But those sections are overshadowed by the majority of the song, which is more straightforward and sincere. Each section taken independently makes sense, but when they're juxtaposed against each other, they don't quite gel, and it becomes unclear what the band's intent for the song is.

Sonata Arctica's main redeeming value, of course, is their impeccable musicianship and songcraft. Despite the saccharine sentiment and schmaltz, the songs are exquisitely composed and musically executed. That alone can make Pariah's Child a worthwhile listen, but it can also be a source of frustration; SA clearly have excellent musical ability, so why can't they come up with something better to write about? Perhaps they've run out of fresh lyrical ideas, or perhaps the lyrical themes simply play better to their home crowd. The music certainly contains an excess of European-style keyboard overkill, so it would make sense that the lyrics would follow suit.

The end result is ultimately mixed. It plays like something akin to a mix of Dream Theater and White Lion, if you can imagine such a thing. Musically speaking, there's much to enjoy on Pariah's Child. The trick is wading past the thick sentimentality to get to it. (Ryan

Rave Tapes

Rave Tapes is the newest album from Mogwai, the Scottish five-piece known for their extreme volumes, intense guitar workouts and post-rock sound-

It seems that a good portion of their original fans have been disappointed with their last few years of musical output. "It's




not like Rock Action." "Why can't they go back to Come On Die Young?" Well, to them I say grow up. If you don't like the new stuff, then listen to the old stuff and let Mogwai grow. Let them spread their post-rock wings and find new sounds, new trips, new sonic ex-

Ever since 2008s The Hawk Is Howling, Mogwai have been refining their sound, expanding the musical palette, if you will. Even before that, even back with Rock Action and Come On Die Young, the band wasn't always about the guitar bombast and intense noise assaults. They've always toyed with analog synths, wavering square waves and 80s soundtrack vibes. With 2011's Hardcore Will Never Die, But You Will and then last year's Les Revenants (a soundtrack to the French TV series of the same name), they took the moody, dire

? and the Mysterians 96 Tears (1966)

Rudy Martinez (also known as the question mark symbol) and the rest of this band were from the Saginaw area and were one of the first Mexican-American garage bands to chart a single.

This debut featured the groovy,



The album opens with Animals-type song in "I Need Somebody" and follows with the T-Bone Walker gem, "Stormy Mon-"You're Telling Me Lies" is a dirty versions of any Beatles song from the same era, and "Ten O'Clock" follows with a poppy Kinks sound. It's really good stuff with some pretty hip guitars and a snappy drum beat.

"Don't Tease Me" has an undercurrent of sexual tension but is tame enough for radio. "Midnight Hour" is also a little dirty and has a great organ arrangement reminiscent of the Doors. These guys were pretty original, even though most of the songs clocked in at just under two minutes, which at that time was great for ra-

The record closes with the whimsical "96 Tears," a song that is probably in the Top 100 of any publication to this day.

Understandably, this band was ethnic, popular and chart-making during their mid 60s heyday of the mid-sixties, and it still has one of the most familiar songs from its generation. To have such a huge hit and be able to survive the psychedelic and hard rock era that followed gives them well-deserved credibility. The band has gone through numerous personnel changes, but Martinez has insisted on carrying the name through the last 50 years.

I was able to chat with Q and have to say that he knows his place in rock n' roll and isn't afraid to admit the luck that brought him there. (Dennis Donahue)


sound they'd toyed with all along even further. With Rave Tapes I feel they've now gone "all in," as it were. They've embraced those warm analog synths, moody Gothic moods and 80s soundtrack vibe and have created one of their warmest and complete records to date. Sure, I may be in the minority with this opinion, and that's okay. I'm more comfortable that way.

"Heard About You Last Night" opens the album and pretty much sets the stage for the rest of the record. It's really quite a lovely song, carried by a simple synth part, bass, clean guitar and quiet drums. These guys should continue down the path of film scoring, and Danny Boyle should call them immediately. "Simon Ferocious' is up next and keeps the sunshine firmly planted on the proceedings. Warm, bubbly synths percolate along, as the rhythm section of Dominic Aitchison and Martin Bulloch create a steady rumble which the rest of the band can move freely and create moody sonic movements. "Remurdered" gets darker quickly, with a sound reminiscent of both John Carpenter's Christine soundtrack and Cliff Martinez' work with Nicolas Winding Refn. You can almost see those neon lights flickering and reflecting off of a car hood as it drives down Wilshire Boulevard. "Hexon Bogon" brings back some of the louder moments of The Hawk Is Howling while "Repelish" adds a spokenword piece about devil worship and Led Zeppelin's "Stairway To Heaven" as the band plays eerie, rolling music behind it. "Deesh" is a Gothic-sounding, beautiful track that brings side two up a notch or two, while "No Medicine For Regret" is very reminiscent of some of those classic 70s Italian horror movie soundtracks by Walter Rizzati. "The Lord Is Out Of Control" ends this pretty amazing album like a cross between Vangelis, Giorgio Moroder and the band's own masterpiece "Scotland's Shame."

I've said my piece. I think Rave Tapes is a shining spot on Mogwai's already stellar musical discography. You'd be doing yourself a disservice writing this one off. Give it another spin. Or five. (John







play lots of different kinds of songs, and we can do them in a variety of configurations."

Scheduling conflicts result in Clusterfolk appearing as a duo, a trio or the complete foursome, depending on who's available. Ellsworth is the common denominator in all lineups. He'll play as a duo with Kartholl, Sarah or Sean, and as a trio in every combination.

"He is a big chunk of the backbone of the band," Ellsworth said of Kartholl. "His bass and mandolin playing, insight and experience play a major role. He and I have been playing a lot of duo gigs, honing the songs, learning how to interact musically with one another."

Sarah Ellsworth-Hoffman remembers her father playing guitar around the house. "He would play (Gordon Lightfoot's) 'The Pony Man' song a lot because I begged him," she said. "He had me sing with him as I entered high school and college age at little places like Toast & Jam or the Grass Roots Music Festival. I was so shy on stage. It really frustrated him. It wasn't until a couple years into Clusterfolk that I started to feel comfortable on stage."

Sarah's stage presence these days is anything but shy. She whoops and hollers and kicks her feet, sings with confidence and adds percussive flair using everything within her grasp, from a washboard to a frame drum. "She doesn't know it yet, but I'm expecting her to add a fair amount of dulcimer to the mix on the next album," Ellsworth said.

Sean Ellsworth-Hoffman started play-

ing fiddle at age six. After high school he attended the Merchant Marine Academy and started taking fiddle lessons with the All-Ireland champion fiddle player Brian Conway. After college he moved to San Francisco where he began playing with the Frank O'Connor band. When he moved back to Indiana, Ellsworth-Hoffman played with a number of bands in South Bend before joining Goldmine Pickers. Playing with Clusterfolk agrees with Ellsworth-Hoffman for a couple of reasons.

"Since it's more folk rock, I get to explore some different areas stylistically," Ellsworth-Hoffman said. "Also, I get to share a really excellent musical experience with my wife and father-in-law. We play some great classic covers as well as Jim's very excellent original compositions. And Dave and I share a couple of musical connections since I also play with the Possum Trot Orchestra.

"As far as the new material goes, I think we are leaning in a more folk/alt country direction and there is a lot of really fun stuff that is coming up."

"Sean is one of the best fiddle players in northern Indiana, and I'm hoping to incorporate some of his Celtic leanings on the new album," Ellsworth said.

The transition from psychedelic folk rock to folk country has been seamless, which is a testament to the quality of the songs as much as the quality of the musicians. The live band is fun to see. The recordings are headphone worthy. With Clusterfolk there's a lot to like and a lot to look forward to.





guide season selections at FPT. I had a strong belief that to do important theater, theater that affects the way people live their lives (for why else would a church spend its resources on a theater?), we must choose plays for their ability to examine the human condition. Well, Kate kept demanding that if that was the goal, then we should be doing Shake-

After two seasons of parrying her requests, I finally relented, but with a twist: it would be an all-female cast, and she would play Othello. If I was going to suffer through what I thought was deadly dull, then she was going to be with me every step of the way.

Turns out she was right and I was wrong. That Shakespeare is not a half bad playwright. And that experience kindled in me a 14-year love affair with the works of William Shakespeare, a love affair that is still burning strong. We have produced one of his shows every season since that 2000 production of Othello. Moreover, for the last 11 summers I have taken a bus load of folks to the Stratford Shakespeare Festival in Canada. (There are still a couple of seats left for this year's trip, June 20-22.) And I've now read or seen every one of his plays except Timon of Athens. (It got rained out the night I was supposed to see it at an open-air theater in the middle of Wisconsin.) I love Shakespeare. Thank you, Kate Black.

So, why are we doing Othello again at FPT? I mean, if you count the 14 I've directed and the three others I've acted in, I'm only halfway through the canon. Why not do one of the other 20 I haven't explored? For one, about 11 of those are history plays which no one comes to in Fort Wayne, so that drops the legitimate number to about nine or 10. And for those, the answer is simpler than one might think. This all started when I saw the work of Cortney White on stage at the Civic Theatre. He was in their production of A Few Good Men, and though it was a small role, I immediately knew this young man had the presence and the voice to inhabit one of dramatic literature's greatest characters. Over a year ago I inquired; he said yes, and so it was on our season.

But what also drew me back to this work was my desire to reexamine the other great character in this play, Iago. I am still amazed during every rehearsal by how effortlessly he is able to steer a group of people to their doom by whispering lies in their ears. In most instances the lies contain enough truth to make them seem plausible. I see the same things happening in our national life as a country, and I wonder when our better angels are going to be aroused. But until then, I wanted to use this play to remind myself what to be on guard against.

The plays stars Cortney White as Othello, Scott Hess as Iago, Rachel Banks as Desdemona, Kevin Torwelle as Cassio, Steve Penhollow as Brabantio, Jacob Slone as Roderigo, Meg Brouwer as Emilia, Christi Campbell as Bianca, Billy Hofman as Gratiano, Chad Butterbaugh as Lodovico and Duke Roth as Montano. Also in the the cast are Junie McGraw and Jesse Paden. Costumes are designed by Jes Sokolowski, technical direction by Bob Sutton and the crew consists of June Torwelle-Rambo and James DelPriore.

The play previews on Thursday, March 6 at 7:30 p.m. (all seats \$10) and runs Fridays and Saturdays, March 7, 8, 14, 15, 21 and 22 at 7:30 p.m. There is one Sunday matinee, March 16 at 2 p.m. Advanced tickets are \$20 general admission, \$18 for patrons age 65-plus and free for full-time students. Music, Ellen Make for a Nicer Oscar Night

How does Hollywood celebrate a year of many, many wonderful films? By throwing the best Oscar show in a long time. Yes, it was a long night and there were some missteps. Just like you can't predict a year of great films or guarantee a hit movie, you can't guarantee a good Oscar ceremony. This year some predictable and unpredictable ingredients came together to make for a celebration worthy of the year in

To have a shot at a great Oscar ceremony, it helps to have great material to feed the celebration. The films this year provided abundant material and audience interest.

Next, you need a good host. After last year and Seth Mc-Farland's widely panned performance, the Academy needed a turnaround. Ellen DeGeneres fit the bill perfectly. She is the self-professed queen of nice, and for the most part she hit the right note. The selfie event was great fun, the perfect interjection of something new into an event 86 years old. The pizza delivery connected the black tie event to us bums

But not every joke played well. Maybe there is an unwritten rule book in which it is okay for a gay event host to make fun of a gay icon, but it didn't translate to the general audience. When Ellen joked about "the best Liza Minnelli impersonator" to the real Liza, it was funny for a second. Then she just kept going, "really a great job, sir." The aftertaste lasts and is sour.

Liza looked unhappy. She's sitting there with her siblings, on hand for the tribute to her mom and The Wizard of Oz. Liza has had enough struggles being her mother's daughter - with drugs, surgeries (cosmetic and other) and gay husbands - and doesn't deserve that kind of treatment. If Ellen had targeted the other gay icon on the show, Bette Midler, I'm guessing the Divine Miss M would have given her a sharp smackdown reply. Liza isn't that kind of tough broad. Had Ellen directed barbs at the sad Kim Novak, would that have been hilarious? (Matthew McConaughey deserves another award for his gallant performance as Novak's co-

Ellen more than made up for her Liza moment by mocking the superficiality of Hollywood. Her best barb pointed out why the supposed "tight race" for Best Picture was all hype. Ellen called it when she joked that there are so many possibilities on Oscar night: "Possibility No. 1: 12 Years a



Slave wins. Possibility #2: You're all racists."

In Hollywood, political correctness trumps all. Of course, 12 Years a Slave was going to win. The campaign for 12 Years was headlined by the phrase "It's time..." Meaning that it is about time a film directed by a black man won the Best Picture Oscar. And since 12 Years was produced by Brad Pitt, a Best Picture Oscar means that Hollywood can reward one of its favorites, and see him on stage at the end of the night. (For the record, another first happened on Sunday night. Alfonso Cuaron is the first Latino to win an Oscar for

12 Years a Slave is a great movie, a powerful and groundbreaking film. (It is somewhat pathetic that it took until 2014 for a film to be made that shows the cruelty of slavery from the perspective of the slaves, but the depiction of slavery is groundbreaking.) I think everyone should see 12 Years.

But I'll probably never watch it again. More and more, durability is a quality I want in a Best Picture. I'll watch The Wolf of Wall Street, American Hustle, Gravity, Dallas Buyers Club and Philomena many times in the future. Maybe slavery is so awful it can't be treated with subtlety, but Philomena and Dallas Buyers Club are about tragic circumstances, and they manage to temper the suffering.

It isn't the violence of 12 Years that will keep me away; it is the relentlessly dour tone. Seeing the screenwriter unable to smile or thank his director as he accepted the Oscar explained a lot about the personality of the screenplay.

The best and happiest surprise of the evening was the music. Often, the Best Song nominees are uninteresting, and that is being polite. All songs nominated this year are wonderful, and the performances were excellent, fast and wonderfully staged. An Oscar miracle!

I feel bad that Idina Menzel had to begin her performance after John Travolta butchered her name, but Travolta's screw-up was a high point of the evening. He didn't just mispronounce her name. He created an entirely new name - and while sporting another truly hilarious hair piece. Every

Oscar show needs a comedic screw-up.

The song performances weren't the only good music. Darlene Love rocked the house with her acceptance song for 20 Feet From Stardom, and the acceptance duet by Best Song winners Robert Lopez and Kristen Anderson-Lopez was another high point of the evening.

Pink did a good job with "Somewhere Over the Rainbow," except for the weird phrasing. (Does she really need to breath in the middle of the word over, the second word of the phrase?) I confess I hoped Bette Midler was going to sing the Oz tribute - even more so when Bette finally sang. She looked and sounded great, but why was she there? Because the word "hero" is in "The Wind Beneath My Wings?"

What didn't work and wasn't needed was the "hero" theme of the evening. The montages were sloppy and confused, and the idea of "hero" is so tired and overused. This extra element was particularly superfluous because the show did such a good job of celebrating this year's films. The clips for each nominated actor and film were so much more artfully chosen and edited than in recent years. They showed why the film or performance deserved recognition. (The writing was also much better than usual, especially the descriptions of the Best Picture nominees.)

Another wonderful change this year is that Oscar winners weren't played off the stage by music. That makes the show longer, but for real movie lovers, winners deserve to speak! Luckily, the acceptance speeches, mostly, were poised and polished. Some were even eloquent, and only a few were rambling or goofy.

There were other little moments that lifted the evening. Bill Murray adding Harold Ramis to the nominees for Best Cinematography was perfectly delivered. "Oh, we forgot one, Harold Ramis for Caddyshack, Ghostbusters and Groundhog Day.'

I liked Pharrell's ruby slippers better than Whoopi's. She included the striped stockings. Doesn't she realize that means a house from Kansas may fall on her?

The evening left me wondering a few things. When will Leo get some Oscar love? When will David O. Russell get some Oscar love? And how will this year's films and next year's Oscar ceremony match this year's?

East, West Duke It Out

Gallery visitors who witness both exhibits are encouraged to vote for their favorite show. The group of winning artists will be showered by glory and fame. Local artists will be addressed as Champion, Master and Supreme Creatives. Yes, winning is the focus of this show, and those winners will be honored with a celebratory bash: a block party (to be scheduled once the grips of cold misery release the city).

The competition between galleries and artists is all in fun. But with over 35 hand-selected artists represented by each venue, the shows are sure to include some serious art. Artlink, 300 East Main St., will open its portion of *Fort Side Story* on March 7, from 6-9 p.m. Wunderkammer Company, 3402 Fairfield Ave., opens at 6



A Heavyweight in His Own Mind

The Twenty-Seventh City by Jonathan Franzen, Picador Modern Classics, 2013

I recently read author Jay Parini's reaction to Amazon's list of "100 Books to Read in a Lifetime," and I was struck by how easily he dismissed *The Corrections*, Jonathan Franzen's 2001 National Book Awardwinning novel. The novel "made a splash," Parini admits, but "any one of a dozen or more books could have been substituted" for it. *The Corrections*, he implies, is decent but largely unremarkable. That's why I was so interested when I saw the 25th-anniversary edition of *The Twenty-Seventh City*, Franzen's 1988 debut novel. It seemed like a good opportu-

nity to re-evaluate Franzen's stature. Did Parini's assessment mean that Franzen's destiny as one of the greatest American writers in history is already in doubt, just a quarter century after his debut?

The Twenty-Seventh City is a long, dystopian novel about St. Louis – or, as Franzen so cleverly puts it at the beginning of the book, "a place very much like St. Louis" – in 1984 (or rather, "in a year somewhat like 1984"). It's basically about an Indian woman (from India, not a Native American) who becomes the city's police chief and then sets about taking control of the place via a program of government surveillance and covert terrorism. It's not as exciting as it sounds, though; Franzen spends hundreds of pages following a lengthy cast of characters through the bureaucracy of city politics. It's a slog to get through.

Although *The Twenty-Seventh City* made a bit of a splash in 1988 (it got good reviews from the crit-

ics at the big newspapers but didn't sell well), it's not aging gracefully. In retrospect, some critics now are quick to point out Franzen's problematic portrayal of Indians (some of them go as far as to accuse him of the kind of racism he says he was criticizing), and

no one seems to want to claim that the book looks like the early work of a great writer. Franzen himself, perhaps in a bit of damage control, has dismissed the book as flawed. At best, it looks like the work of an undisciplined, immature, clumsy writer, someone who thinks that he can cast himself as a literary heavyweight if he writes lots of pages, name checks Pynchon and cribs from Orwell.

Supporters of the book – well, at least the jacket copy – praise its prescience, its prophecy of our current fears of surveillance and terrorism.

But, really, it doesn't predict any of that. Its themes of surveillance come directly from 1984, and they're there because of Reagan-era Cold War paranoia (and, of course, because the year 1984 had just passed), not because of any special insight. We were all thinking those thoughts back then.

What this book – along with *The Corrections* and its follow-up, *Freedom* – does predict is the rise of

Another Ho-Hum Awards Night

If this year's Academy Awards ceremony accomplished but one real achievement, it gave a Best Director Oscar to one of the more deserving talents of recent memory: Alfonso Cuaron, director of the new sci-fi classic *Gravity*. Cuaron probably should've won the award for *Children of Men* at the 2007 ceremony, but that was the year of Scorsese and The Departed. Cuaron's 2004 Harry Potter film, which turned out to be one of the great modern epic fantasy films, also should've earned him some attention. Add to that list of incredible directorial performances 2001's Y Tu Mama Tambien, which has become known as his pre-Gravity signature film, and you have the rap sheet of one of today's great film talents. So congratulations to Cuaron and his *Gravity*, a film that not only won seven Oscars at this year's Academy Awards ceremony, but was also a huge financial success, selling over \$700 million worldwide while playing in theaters. It's rare that a film sells huge, is loved by critics and goes on to win awards. Gravity is, simply put, a new all-time

The other big winner of the night was Steve McQueen's gritty period piece, 12 Years a Slave, which won Best Adapted Screenplay (John Ridley), Best Performance by an Actress in a Supporting Role (Lupita Nyong'o) and, of course, Best Picture (producers McQueen, Brad Pitt and several others). Observant viewers got to witness a bit of sassy behavior among some of the 12 Years gang as writer Ridley snubbed McQueen during his victory walk and speech. In return McQueen air-clapped for Ridley and, when he won himself for Best Picture, snubbed Ridley, instead

focusing on the book which the script was based on. Those divas.

Scorsese's The Wolf of Wall Street was shut out despite being one of the year's most talked-about and seemingly most loved films (I believe it has the year's highest IMDB rating so far), leaving Leonardo Di-Caprio once again Oscarless despite his best efforts. Paul Greengrass' Captain Phillips also went home empty handed despite receiving six nominations and doing fairly well at the box office. David O. Russell's American Hustle, which received 10 nominations and was one of the year's biggest crowd pleasers, was easily the night's biggest loser, taking home no hardware despite doing well at the Golden Globes. No one saw that coming. In fact, a whole lot of film writers thought there was an outside chance that Hustle - because it's such a fun, cool, star-studded picture - would get on a roll and end up winning several awards, including Best Picture. Alexander Payne's Nebraska, which was nominated for six Oscars, also went home empty handed. To be honest, I don't think the film is that great. It's a good idea for a script, and I like it as a minor work for Payne, but several of the nominations (especially Best Cinematography and Best Picture)

our culture of instant legends. When Franzen came on the scene, young literary writers who wrote massive books were in demand, and Franzen fit the profile (the original manuscript for The Twenty-Seventh City was reportedly over 1,300 pages long). And he hit the scene with confidence; he was convinced that he was smarter and more important than lesser writers, and he told us so. The script for his induction into the pantheon of Great American Writers was pre-written, and critics dutifully followed

But Freedom was a disappointment to most everyone. And in hindsight, The Corrections seems like it's just okay. And The Twenty-Seventh City seems to fall somewhere barely on the positive side of terrible. Is this the résumé of a Great American Writer? Unfortunately for Franzen, those questions are being asked very early in the game of his canoniza-

When I teach art history classes, my students often ask why they're supposed to think that Leonardo da Vinci is the greatest artist of all time, and the best answer that I can come up with is that that's what people have been saying for 500 years. That's not a good reason, but that's how it works. People have to keep saying you're a legend for a long time in order for you to become one. In that light, it might have been a bad idea to dredge up *The Twenty-Seventh City* so early in Franzen's career.


