There's more on the Whammys inside, and, of course, there's other stuff to see and do too. So get reading, and be sure to tell 'em who sent you.

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


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A 'Golden' Collaboration

------ Feature • Willy Wonka and the Chocolate Factory

The writing of Roald Dahl covers a wide range of audiences and styles, and his short stories have been turned into films and teleplays, with the Alfred Hitchcock Presents dramatization of "Lambs to the Slaugh-

ter," starring Barbara Bel Geddes being one of the most notable. But Dahl is primarily known for his amazing catalog of children's books which include Matilda, James and the Giant Peach, Fantastic Mr. Fox and, of course, Charlie and the Chocolate Factory. Films based on those novels have been hugely successful, and the 1971 version of Charlie, called Willy Wonka and the Chocolate Factory, has been an enduring classic for generations.

Released when I was just nine years old, that version of Willy Wonka was my basis for any opinion of Dahl's work, though I hardly knew Dahl's

name at the time. (I was better acquainted with his then-wife Patricia Neal through various film and television appearances.) But the film had enchanted me, and when in fifth-grade my teacher decided to read Charlie, and later James and the Giant Peach, to us after lunch, my love affair with his works was firmly established.

This year, though she is but four-months old, I have opted to start reading Dahl to my granddaughter Lucie, mostly to honor the 50th anniversary of Charlie's release. Much of Dahl's somewhat subversive, playful, snarky and whimsical prose is lost on the very young (no doubt why he captured me at the end of elementary school), but his use of language can be amazingly engaging for listeners of any age.

That deeply entrenched appreciation, not to mention instant recognition, of the Willy Wonka name is the chief reason Leslie Hormann, executive director of Fort Wayne Youtheatre, has opted to make that her spring production. She knew as soon as she heard about it that it was a perfect fit.

"I was working with Brad Beauchamp on Althea's Well at the Civic, and he oversees the productions at [the University of] Saint Francis," she recalls. "His wife Leslie had seen Willy Wonka in London, and as soon as she told me about it, I knew we had to do it."

The show will likely come to the states in the future, but for now Hormann was able to secure rights to the show, something which will be more difficult when it comes to American theaters. In addition to the op-

portunity to present Willy to the community, which Hormann knew would be a coup, she and Beauchamp had decided this would provide their two programs a way to collabo-

"We had such a great experience collaborating with IPFW for Oliver! last year, and

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it's so great for our kids to be able to work with those students. They provide natural mentors for our kids, and they learn so much watching the whole process unfold, like seeing the sets being put together. I had learned so much from Oliver!, and it provided a template for how to collaborate with a university."

It also provided another venue for her Youtheatre students to perform, with Willy Wonka presented at the USF Performing Arts Center, formerly the Scottish Rite auditorium. She says the space is "very old school" and offers a decided contrast to their usual home at the Arts United Center. She also loves how elaborate the sets and costumes can be with the benefit of such collaborative efforts.

"The sets are just amazing because it's such a visual production. The colors and the design are really in keeping with what you saw in the older film, though there are elements of both that and the later Johnny Depp version, the book and the play. The Bucket household is another great set because the grandparents' bedroom looks like something out of a Salvador Dali painting. It's really wild.

"And I'm in charge of the Oompa-Loompas, which are definitely taken from the old movie," she adds. "They'll have the bright green hair and the colorful outfits. The music will include some of the famil-

iar songs, but there are a lot of new songs that people don't know yet. so that's really exciting.'

As the official Oompa-Loompa wrangler, Hormann is overseeing 74 kids, which means 37 for each set of weekend shows. But the leads will remain steady throughout all performances, including veteran actor Todd Frymier as Willy Wonka, Bob Ahlersmeyer as the Candy Man and Paul Stephens (of Fawn Liebowitz fame) as Grandpa Joe. Remarkably, although last year's production featured two young actors sharing the lead in Oliver!, one fifth-grader from Weisser Park El-

ementary School, Parker Irwin, will handle every performance as little Charlie Bucket.

"He's a phenomenal kid, just a pro," says Hormann. "The minute we heard him sing 'I've Got a Golden Ticket' for his audition, we all just looked at each other and said 'Well hello, Charlie!' He's just a natural."

With Brad Beauchamp directing the adults and Charlie and Hormann looking after Oompa-Loompas, Leslie Beauchamp, herself a familiar face to local theatergoers, is serving as choreographer. The diverse blend of talents both onstage and off is a key part of Youtheatre's current strategy, providing classes to young actors while giving them important opportunities to demonstrate their talents. By learning from a large array of local theatre pros, Hormann knows her kids have a great chance to expand their knowledge and their comfort level.

More collaboration is in the offing as well, with a massive effort in May titled Fairy Tale Fest. Tied into the IPFW 50th anniversary celebration for Sculptures with a Purpose, Fairy Tale Fest is planned as an annual celebration of Fort Wayne arts and the downtown arts campus. Featuring performances in multiple downtown venues like Arts United Center, the new ArtsLab and the Museum of Art, Fort Wayne Youtheatre will work with other area organizations like Fort Wayne Ballet and Fort Wayne Dance Collective to put on a day's worth of arts performances.

If you think that the art of percussion involves simply pounding on things, or that the spectrum of percussion instruments falls solely into the drum family, then you owe it to yourself (and to percussionists everywhere) to visit the IPFW Percussion Ensemble during their upcoming recital. The recital's program is a wide-ranging combination of the old and the new, and almost none of it is what you'd expect if you're

new to the world of percussion. Technically, the art of percussion does involve pounding on things, but the range of things that a percussionist can pound on (and the myriad ways that he or she can pound on them) opens a world of possibilities beyond merely drumming. Each of the pieces that the ensemble will be performing comes at percussion from a different direction and

with a different goal in mind. Consider, first of all, Evan

Chapman's "Second Thoughts." Chapman, a graduate student in the Jacobs School of Music at Indiana University, composed the piece on commission from Marriotts Ridge High School in his native Maryland for the school's Jukebox Time Machine musical production. The piece uses floor toms, but that's as conventional as its instrumentation gets. It's a quartet arranged for four percussionists, each armed with a floor tom, a wooden sawhorse and a selection of Boomwhackers, plastic tubes of varying lengths that, as you might guess, emit a tuned "boom" when they're whacked against something (such as wooden sawhorse). Despite the wacky (an irresistible pun) instrumentation, though, the piece turns toward the traditional once it gets rolling, as the contrast between the wood-on-wood of drumsticks on sawhorses and the resonant low tones of the drums

But if you think "Second Thoughts" is unusual, you might be at a loss to describe "Ziggurat," a resolutely unclassifiable piece by John Hollenbeck. A native of Binghamton, New York, Hollenbeck is an avant garde jazz drummer (although some appreciators of the kind of music he plays are calling it "post-jazz") who immersed himself in the NYC scene after graduating from the Eastman School of Music in the early 90s; he currently teaches at the Jazz Institute Berlin in

"Ziggurat" begins with the insect-like buzz of snares before building layers of rhythms on top of the

weird, snarling, metallic interjections. As with "Second Thoughts," "Ziggurat" pulls together the new (expect to enjoy an appearance by Boomwhackers in this one, too) with the old; along with the drums, a xylophone isn't out of the question either.

The recital will not, however, be purely an exercise in new-music experimentation. The two more intellectually challenging pieces are bracketed by a pair of works that are both more traditionally minded and emotionally charged. The first of these is "Power

Struggle," a piece built for an eight-piece ensemble evenly divided between tonal keyboard instruments and battery percussion; for the percussively uninitiated, that means xylophones, marimbas and vibraphones balanced with timpani, toms, snares and cymbals.

In contrast to the wooden whacking of "Second Thoughts" or the vibrating rattle of "Ziggurat," "Power Struggle," not content to waste a single measure

on prologue, blasts off with an explosion of sound. The power struggle in question is between the previously mentioned keyboards and drum battery. The two halves of the group trade volleys, the melodic lightning of the keys competing bravely with the artillery of the toms and timpani.

And, finally, there's "Valse Brillante," a piece written and originally published by xylophonist George Hamilton Green in 1936. Given that Green, who made his mark in vaudeville early in the 20th century, is widely considered to be one of the best xylophonists in American history, it's not surprising that this piece is built around a showcase of solo xylophone virtuosity. It can be played with a single xylophone taking the reins, with only a piano as accompaniment, but this version, arranged by Bob Becker of the NEXUS percussion ensemble, surrounds the xylophone with a quartet of marimba players whose four voices add a rich bed over which the xylophone can frolic.

The IPFW ensemble takes the stage under the direction of Eric Schweikert. Scheweikert has been a part of the Fort Wayne Philharmonic since 1989 and is currently the principal timpanist; he's been on the faculty at IPFW since 2008. He's also served previously as the principal timpanist with the Victoria Symphony in British Columbia and has performed with the symphony orchestras of Cleveland, Milwaukee, Pittsburgh, St. Louis, Indianapolis, Chicago, Detroit, San Francisco, Columbus, Alabama and Virginia.

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

Imagine how poetically symmetrical it would be if Paganini's uncle had invented the violin. Or if Jimmy Page's distant cousin had brought the first guitar to the UK. How great it would be if a virtuoso performer could claim in his lineage the inventor of the very instrument that he has mastered.

It would seem to be too good to be true, but that's exactly what Amjad Ali Khan can claim about the sarrod

It's indisputable that Khan is a master of the sarod, a lute-esque instrument that's a fundamental part of Indian classical music. Khan is such a prominent player of the instrument that if you type www.sarod. com into your web browser, you'll be delivered to his personal web site. He's part of the sixth generation of sarod players in his family (his father was the legendary sarod player Haafiz Ali Khan), and via his

two sons, he's created the seventh generation. But his family's connection to the sarod goes much deeper than simply a long tradition of playing the instrument.

"You could say it's my family instrument," he says. "Whoever is

playing the sarod today learned directly or indirectly from my forefathers."

The forefather most instrumental, if you will, in the development of the sarod's identity in India is Mohammad Hashmi Khan Bangash, Amjad Ali Khan's great-great-great grandfather. Bangash was a horse trader who settled in India in the middle of the 1700s. According to one theory of the sarod's origin, Bangash brought with him an Afghan instrument called a rubab, and he was so good at playing it that he became the court musician to the Maharajah in the city of Rewa. His grandson, Ghulam Ali Khan Bangash, was also a court musician, in the city of Gwalior, and he modified his rubab, turning it into an instrument that we can recognize as the predecessor of today's sarod.

That is, we could recognize it if we knew anything about the sarod – something that's not too likely in the Western world. The sarod is a stringed instrument with a fret-less fingerboard and a sound board made of stretched goat skin. It usually has between 17 and 25 strings. Four or five of those strings are plucked to play the melody, three or four of them are drone strings that provide a base under the melody and nine to 11 of them are sympathetic strings which are not

plucked, but are allowed to resonate naturally with the vibration of the other strings. The sound that comes from all those strings is complex, layered and fluid.

By the middle of the 19th century, the sarod had established itself as a principal instrument in the classical music of northern India, but it would be more than another century before the instrument was heard widely on our shores. By the 1960s, most Americans had heard of another traditional Indian instrument, the sitar, thanks to the international fame of sitarist Ravi Shankar and the fact that the sitar kept showing up in the music of rock bands like the Beatles, the Rolling Stones and Led Zeppelin. But while Shankar and other sitarists were willing to Westernize their music most sarod players, including Amjad Ali Khan, stuck to playing classical music.

That doesn't mean, however, that Khan is a musical elitist.

"There is no essential difference between classi-

cal and popular music," he says. "Music is music. I want to communicate with the listener who finds Indian classical music remote."

Khan's virtuosity couldn't be ignored by Westerners once they'd heard him play. He's been

invited to participate in festivals in Australia, New Zealand, Hong Kong, the UK, Vienna, Rome, Seattle and elsewhere. He's played with the Hong Kong Philharmonic Orchestra and the Taipei Chinese Orchestra as well as a long list of renowned instrumentalists, and he's performed in some of the most famous venues in the world, including Carnegie Hall, the Royal Albert Hall, the Kennedy Center and the Sydney Opera House. He's served as a visiting professor at numerous schools in the UK and the US. He's been the subject of books and documentaries.

In short, the world knows who Amjad Ali Khan is, and through him the world knows about the sarod and Indian classical music. He has more than done his part to make the music less remote to Western listeners.

And he's not finished yet. His performance in Fort Wayne comes just over a week after performances at the Getty Center in Los Angeles and five days before he's scheduled to play the Kamani Auditorium in New Delhi. For many performances on the current tour, including the Fort Wayne concert, he'll be joined by his sons, Amaan Ali Khan and Ayaan Ali Khan, a sure sign that the sarod is still his family's instrument – and that it will continue to be his family's instrument well into the future.

The music of the 1980s is remarkably distinctive and memorable. For those who loved it and those who derided it, it can never be forgotten. Its stature largely comes from the advent of music videos and the appearance in 1981 of MTV, which made the visual aspect of the music as important, perhaps even more important, than the music itself. Radio was still an important part of the equation, but now there had to be a look that could not be resisted.

The explosion of hard rock bands in that era made use of both mediums, providing just enough pop edge to the songs to stay radio friendly, but providing even more glitz and glam than even many of their 1970s predecessors had. The clothes, the makeup, the preening and strutting ... and, God almighty, the hair. The advent of mousse and styling sprays, not to mention good old-fashioned Aqua Net, played no small role in the era of music known fondly as "the hair bands."

Given the popularity of that music and those good old days of glam rock, it's no small surprise that a band could really catch hold of public attention and affection by paying homage to that era. And in one universe, a Fort Wayne cover band has done just that. Cougar Hunter, a band that plays the music of that bygone era quite well and captures the look perfectly, has become hugely popular in just a few short years by combining

their talents and paying tribute while humorously satirizing the form. Having won multiple Whammy Awards at the last couple of presentations, Cougar Hunter have claimed the evening's top prize, Performer of the Year, two years running now and show no sign of slowing down.

But, as already noted, that reality exists in one universe. In another parallel and slightly warped universe, Cougar Hunter isn't a cover band at all but the originators and sole practitioners of 1980s music, setting the stage for the musical wannabes (slackers like Def Leppard and Bon Jovi) to rip off for the last 30-plus years. In that universe, band

It gives artists a chance to hear their peers perform and to support each other. It provides a reason to hang out with old friends, meet new ones and to have some fun.

The great sound and relaxed atmosphere at C2G made for a fine evening

The list of Whammy show performers alone make the whole thing worth it. Where else can you go to see on the same night, on the same stage Dan Dickerson's Harp Condition, Duane Eby, Hubie Ashcraft & The Drive, , Farmland Jazz Band, Totally Orange Time Machine, Djenetic Drift, Phil's Family Lizard & Friends, Blood From a Stone, Miles High and Trackless? Or see Jack Hammer and Billy Elvis goofing together again?

While perennial Whammy winners like Taylor (singer-songwriter, folk/Americana and live solo performer), Terry Ratliff (visual artist), Spike & the Bulldogs (oldies) and Left Lane Cruiser (live duo, blues) collected their awards to no one's real surprise, other winners like David Todoran (non-rock CD for True), Valhalla (EP single for Deathmas), Elephants in Mud (rock CD for Machinery + Scenery + Sound) and Miles High (new performer) were, by the very nature of the categories, far from done deals.

Julia Meek deservedly won the H. Stanley Liddell Award for her contribution to the local arts and culture scene through her Meet The Music program on WBOI. That award was presented by Wooden Nickel Music's Bob Roets and Rock 104's Doc West, who then turned around and surprised Roets with the same award.

Other Whammy winners include Cougar Hunter (performer of the year, live band and cover band), Barbie Brown (karaoke host), Kill the Rabbit (metal/hard rock performer), Freak Brothers (R&B performer), Unlikely Alibi (original rock performer and funk/world performer), Curtis Smith (television personality), Hubie Ashcraft & the Drive (country performer), Flamingo Nosebleed (punk performer), Doc West (radio personality) and Jamie Simon Trio (jazz performer).

The list of nominees is as impressive as the list of winners and no doubt many will be back on the list for next year. And given the competition, that's nothing to grumble about. (Mark Hunter)

Julia Meek seems to be a ubiquitous presence in Fort Wayne. Who hasn't had the experience of hearing her on the radio one day, seeing her at Hyde Brothers the next, sharing a house with someone who has her art on a T-shirt and looking at pictures of her romantic but unconventional wedding on Facebook – all within a week? Well, maybe not everyone has had that experience, but some of us have – and it doesn't take much special effort to achieve it.

A talented graphic artist, she has beautifully captured some of Fort Wayne's most treasured landmarks and scenic stops with art that has graced everything from notecards to the aforementioned T-shirts. Her understanding of what makes our city tick, even if it's a building which no longer stands but remains seared into the hearts and memories of the locals, is impeccable. No doubt that understanding comes from her deep understanding of roots, the kind of folk music and lore which she shares with the city through her radio show as well as in her interactions with all of the people lucky enough to spend a few minutes with her.

She has also used her radio forum to help Fort Wayne meet its talented musicians, practitioners of all kinds who radiate in the warmth she projects on-air. Not everyone in the city hangs out at the local bars and clubs where many of the bands and performers ply their trade, but Meek extends a hand and continually coordinates shows which catch lightning in a bottle, week after week. Her melodious and recognizable voice has become a central feature at NIPR where she hosts Folktales and Meet the Music, two shows which allow her to share two of her great passions.

Although a local legend in her own right, Meek seems determined to shine the light on others, which makes her honor as a Liddell Award winner at the 2014 Whammys particularly sweet for anyone who appreciates her selfless promotion of what this city has to offer. An active community volunteer, she has poured her heart and soul into Fort Wayne. And on Whammy night, Fort Wayne was able to show some love in return.

"I was asked to come to present some awards, so I wasn't expecting this at all; it was a complete surprise," said Meek moments after the presentation.

Presented the award by Doc West, a previous winner of this award, and Bob Roets, who was to be honored with one just moments later, Meek wasn't expecting the tribute on stage to be for her. As Roets listed her many accomplishments, which included an early Whammy as Best Visual Artist, and noted her 30 years with WBOI, Meek moved to the stage, clearly stunned. Shortly after, she talked about what makes her so happy to

help put this city on the map. "I was born and raised in Fort Wayne

- I'm a 'Forthead,'" she said. "I love Fort
Wayne and love all the music that makes Fort Wayne so special."

Meek is also no stranger to C2G, the Whammy venue for the second consecutive year. She regularly visits the site with a live version of *Meet the Music*, providing her talented co-stars an opportunity to really share their music in more open spaces. While she loves to laud the talents and accomplishments of others, she admits that part of her disbelief when she was presented with the Liddell Award was that she isn't used to being lauded herself.

"I'm usually on the other end of these things, and that's where I like to be. I just



love what I do and don't think anything about it. I spend an inordinate amount of time with music and the arts, so being at something like this where so many are honored is a special treat."

In the excitement backstage, with Meek, West and Roets gathering for photos, there was a definite mutual admiration society at work. Meek shared a story about she and her husband stumbling into Roets and his wife Cindy while both couples, unbeknownst to each other, were hiking in Zion National Park in Utah. Roets says he has a great friendship with Meek and talks of their pleasure in helping each other promote music in Fort Wavne.

'She has me on her show, helps me to promote National Record Store Day or some of the music that's appearing at Wooden Nickel. And I help her out too, giving her a hand with the Meet the Music shows at C2G. So winning this award with her is a real honor.'

West, himself honored with another Whammy for Favorite Radio Personality this year, probably summed it up best as he was congratulating her moments after her presentation.

Beyond the availability at many department stores and general merchandise chains, stores specializing in selling record albums (those big round vinyl disks which eventually fell out of favor only to be revived a generation later) were plentiful. National brands like Musicland and Camelot were at Glenbrook while Karma held down the distinction of being a local hot spot for all things music.

Then Wooden Nickel came along. At

who usually provides coffee and his wife's cookies as an added lure, dashes about like a kid at Disneyland, making sure everything runs smoothly. Wooden Nickel has also become a popular stop on National Record Store Day each April, with a non-stop itinerary of bands performing while special releases and other industry attractions bring in scores of people each year. In short, Wooden Nickel has been the center of the music business for Fort Wayne since it opened its doors more than 30 years ago.

And through it all, there stands Bob Roets, businessman and court jester, happy to be there for the ride. His motivation was his love of music, not the possibility of winning an award. But at this year's Whammys he did just that, picking up a Liddell Award for his contributions to the local music scene. It's a fitting honor, one which clearly took Roets by surprise.

"Doug Driscoll had asked me if I could present the Liddell Award to Julia Meek, which I was happy to do because Julia is a good friend. So I prepared a speech to introduce Julia, and I was really happy for her. Then as I was getting ready to leave the stage, Doc stopped me and said there was another Liddell Award winner. There had never been two, so I didn't expect that turnaround. I'm still in shock!"

Receiving an award for his contributions to Fort Wayne is clearly meaningful to Roets though not his motivation in doing what he does. But receiving an award connected to whatzup obviously makes the award special

"Doug and I have been buddies since he called me to ask if I wanted to advertise in whatzup, and at that point I didn't even know what it was. I like to help out and volunteer to help with things that whatzup is doing, so I came here tonight to take pictures and do whatever I could to help. And I co-sponsor the Battle of the Bands with whatzup and have been at the competition and served as judge for the last six years."

His benevolence doesn't stop with Wooden Nickel and whatzup. He and his wife volunteer throughout the community. and he has served as president of the board of directors for Fort Wayne Children's Choir.

"Fort Wayne has been good to Wooden Nickel for the last 32 years, and I want to give back to the community in some way. I help with administrative things because of my background in management, and it lets me contribute to Fort Wayne and the music community."

Roets was pleased to be presented with the Liddell Award alongside friend Julia Meek, but saved special praise for the meaning of the award named for another friend,

"I especially appreciate this because I knew Stan. I sold tickets for him for 20 years, and he was a great guy to be around. It means so much that this award is given in his name because he meant so much to the music scene in Fort Wayne. I'm still in shock a little, but this is pretty cool!"

Phantogram **Voices**

Phantogram could easily have gotten lost in the massive wave of boy/girl electronic duos that have made their way into our ears since 2009. They've ridden the wave with bands like The Bird and the Bee, Matt and

into that hip hop-inflected in-



catchy or grating. Fortunately for Phantogram, they are blessed with the amazing voice of Sarah Barthel and the studio prowess of Josh Carter. They're unique in a sea of many interesting but not necessarily long lasting bands.

Their 2009 full-length debut, Eyelid Movies, was a rather breathtaking album filled with rough-around-the-edges pop tracks hidden under electronic beats and occasional industrial roughness that made you think you were hearing something more than just electronic pop. Barthel's voice is what made that album so unique, while Carter's programming and studio expertise made the beats more than just cookie cutter loops run through some Pro Tools plug-in. Eyelid Movies felt organic, not processed. Four years and one EP later, Barthel and Carter have returned with a polished piece of electro/industrial pop gold called Voices. While not as sublime and dark as its predecessor, Voices builds on Phantogram's strengths: Sarah Barthel and

Right out of the gate "Nothing But Trouble" comes roaring out of the speakers, all studio shine and spit-polish. There's no mistaking Barthel's voice, for sure. But there's something a little stale about the beat; it's distinguishable from any other electronic band playing on internet radio. Mid-song Carter comes in with some guitar work that is reminiscent of classic 80s Cure and brings the song up a few notches. We then go right into the club banger "Black Out Days" that seems to want to be some sort of radio hit. Nothing wrong with that, I suppose. It just sorta goes through the motions. Decent enough, but as one 80's commercial pondered, "Where's the beef?" The answer is "Fall In Love," a soul-inflected track that reminds the listener why Phantogram are so great. All the elements are there, popping and clicking. Barthel's ethereal voice floats above the excellent programming. This is 21st century pop music at it's finest – catchy as hell, yet still interesting and new to the ears. Hello, Phantogram.

Okay, so pretty much after the first two songs this album kicks into gear and becomes this massive record filled with ear candy and interesting production. "The Day You Died" is big and emotional with a chorus that soars. "Howling At The Moon" brings back some of that weirdness Eyelid Movies delivered in spades. You'll be cranking this and blowing the speakers in your Camry for sure. "Bill Murray" is sublime - a beautiful ballad that should be playing at the coolest proms on the planet this spring. "My Only Friend" closes this record out on a melancholy note. Much like Eyelid Movies' excellent closer "10,000 Claps," "My Only Friend" is proof of the power in Barthel's sweet, beautiful, and longing voice. The production is 80scentric reverbed beats and hand claps. It's perfect.

Voices continues what Eyelid Movies started, with better production and bigger choruses. While there have been some really great and interesting guy/gal duos over the last few years, Phantogram have proven they've got staying power. They've got the beats. They've got the voice. They've got the songs. (John Hubner

Papir

Not too long ago I found this little slice of musical heaven located in Denmark. It's a little record label by the name of El Paraiso Records started by some guys in a band called Causa Sui in order to release their records to the listening public. Besides releasing Causa Sui records, El Paraiso releases



records by Jonas Munk and Jakob Skott (both members of Causa Sui), California's Psicomagia, Sun River and a little band called Papir. Papir, along with most of what comes out of El Paraiso Records, dabble in long, dreamy, sometimes jammy soundscapes much like

Crosby, Stills & Nash Crosby, Stills & Nash (1969)

David Crosby, Stephen Stills and Graham Nash (and occasionally Neil Young) may be one of the longest tenured "supergroups." As former members of The Byrds, Buffalo Springfield and The Hollies, CSN found that the harmony and vocal pitch they shared was



unique and original enough to record an album together.

This is one of my favorite records and to this day is as refreshing and unique as it was 40 years ago.

It opens with the familiar "Suite: Judy Blue Eyes," a track that featured four different parts or "suites." It is such a powerful song, and although written about Judy Collins (Nash's ex-girlfriend), it is one of the most relatable breakup songs ever written. "Marrakesh Express" follows with a Middle Eastern vibe behind a nice organ and folksy guitars. "Guinnevere," a soothing track that Crosby shines on, sounds like something Joni Mitchell could have written and performed. Side one closes with the jazzy tune "Pre-Road Downs" which reminds me a lot of early Steely Dan. It's actually one of the grooviest songs on the release.

Side two opens with "Wooden Ships," a track co-written by Paul Kantner; it was also featured on a Jefferson Airplane album later that year. "Helplessly Hoping" is gorgeous harmony with a nice acoustic guitar to guide it through before the band gets electric again in the splendid "Long Time Gone." It captures the elements of the period, and borrows from the sounds of each members previous bands. The record closes with the delightful "49 Bye-Byes."

The band plays a sold-out Embassy Theatre on March 19. Their first show together was in Chicago. The next day they played Woodstock. (Dennis Donahue)

Causa Sui. But for the past three years or so, Papir have been refining their sound – whittling, reshaping, tearing it down and building it back up again. They have mastered the art of extended jams and have transcended it into something much deeper and bigger than their collective universe. They released IIII, a year to the day they gave the world III, and it only goes to prove that Papir get better each time

From the El Paraiso website: "As a unit the three members achieve what the great power trios of the 1960s did at their most fertile: the ability to combine each aspect of the band into a whole that surpasses the sum of its parts." This is a great way to sum up Papir. They create these part improv/part structured, long-form pieces of music and take the listener on a journey. Like past records, these pieces are segregated into a handful of soundscapes. On IIII they are divided into four songs, "IIII.I," "IIII.II," "IIII.III" and "IIII. IIII." Each of these tracks are distinct in mood and where they take you. They are instrumental, yes, and they are created using the same guitar-bass-and-drums formula each time. But within the confines of a rock trio, they make a sound that rivals even the great Explosions in The Sky. Where EiTS have a certain melodrama and pomposity in their songs, Papir seem much looser. This looseness carries the nearly 22 minutes of "IIII.III" along freely, and you never once feel like checking the clock.

"IIII.I" is light-hearted and breezy, like a pleasant wind coming off the Danish Straits. Nicklas Sørensen does some amazing guitar playing that brings to mind Michael Rother and even John McLaughlin. Christian Becher Clausen's bass is ever present throughout the proceedings, always moving and always pushing the song forward. "IIII.II" starts out slow and builds, like some of the best Mogwai bits over the last 10 years. Pretty soon the song explodes into a ball of cymbal fire and blistering guitar lines that ascend to the Heavens. It's bombast at its finest. "IIII.IIII" is the shortest track and a hazy beauty. Delayed guitar flutters overhead as tribal drums and a steady bass line anchor the song to earth. We're left to float above like a kite looking down on the hand holding our string.

Papir have created yet another masterpiece from somewhere in Denmark. If bands like NEU!, Can, Explosions in The Sky and Mogwai make you smile from the inside out, do yourself a favor and find IIII. Once you're in love, find III and Stundum. You'll thank me. And you'll most certainly thank Papir. (John Hubner)

The 80s called, so, of course, I picked up the phone. They explained to me that former teen heartthrob **Rick Springfield** will tour this summer with **Pat Benatar** and **Neil Giraldo**, intending to play to every person who had ever worn acid washed jeans or at-



tempted to solve Rubik's Cube. So far, the only regional date that has been announced is July 8 in Cincinnati, but I'd expect the pair of icons to schedule dates in most of the summer sheds soon.

As alluded to here a few weeks ago, the surviving members of **Queen** are joining forces with former *American Idol* star **Adam Lambert** for a U.S. tour this summer. There are only 19 dates on the docket, but a couple of them – June 19 in Chicago and July 12 in Detroit – are within driving distance. The pairing is a good one, as Lambert is a pure showman and can hit the notes the late singer **Freddie Mercury** use to sing – not an easy feat. Tickets are already on sale and will likely go fast.

All the Juggalos out there will be relieved to find out that **Insane Clown Posse**'s annual Gathering of the Juggalos will be held once again this year, albeit in a new location. The band planned to move their festival from Illinois to a campground in Kansas this year, but the campground hierarchy backed out of the commitment due to backlash from the locals who apparently didn't want to have to clean up Faygo from their streets for the next six months. Thornville, Ohio, just a little East of Columbus, is the new location for the four-day festival held July 23-26. The usual suspects – **Twiztid**, **ABK**, **Blaze**, **Boondox** and many others – will join ICP on the bill.

Sean Lennon has a new project with **Charlotte Kemp** called **GHOASTT** (**The Ghost of a Saber Tooth Tiger**). The duo will release an album April 29 and tour to support it, including a June 1 show at Lincoln Hall in Chicago.

Country superstar **Toby Keith** is still touring on 2013's *Drinks After Work* album and will venture into the area a few times again this summer. The Shut Up and Hold On tour heads to Cleveland June 29, Chicago July 13, Cincinnati August 8, the Allen County Fair in Lima August 23 and Indianapolis September 13, with more dates sure to be announced to fill in the gaps in the itinerary.

The summer tours are being announced rapidly now. The latest is a package tour of **Linkin Park** and **Thirty Seconds to Mars**. Linkin Park are celebrating the fact that they are the last nu-metal band standing while **Jared Leto** of Thirty Seconds to Mars is hoping his Oscar win will help translate into newfound publicity and success for his band. The Carnivores Tour will stop in Chicago August 29 and Detroit the following night. **AFI** will open the shows.

Ringo Starr and his All-Starr Band will hit the road again this summer to give audiences another chance to see a former Beatle play some *Beatles* songs and some songs he wrote later that no one really knows but will pretend they like anyway. Joining Starr this year will be legend Todd Rundgren, guitarist Steve Lukather of Toto, drummer Greg Bissonette of several bands, including David Lee Roth's solo band, and keyboardist Greg Rolie, a founding member of both Santana and Journey. The All-Starrs visit Detroit June 27, Chicago June 28, Cleveland June 29 and the Zoo Amphitheatre in Toledo July 1.

Mr. Peabody and Sherman Time Travel Well

Animation is one of the movie industry's consistent bright spots. Animated films continue to find winning combinations of style and substance that delight audiences of all ages. I thought about this while enjoying Peabody and Sherman, the latest and most successful attempt to bring a Jay Ward cartoon to the big screen. Though not black and white or crudely drawn, Peabody and Sherman mostly captures the spirit of the original pair and sends them on a lively adven-

Every other big screen adaptation of the beloved cartoons that made up the show Rocky and His Friends has been live action, and all – Rocky and Bullwinkle, Dudley Do-Right and George of the Jungle - have been disappointing, wan interpretations of the very funny, very original characters. Peabody and Sherman does make some adjustments for our times. In the original cartoon it was always "Mr. Peabody and his boy Sherman." Calling someone your boy just isn't done these days.

Back in the days of the show, characters this quirky and knowing were unique. Today, it is unusual when characters aren't winking at themselves and the audience. Mr. Peabody is a much hipper guy than he used to be. He's the brilliant beagle he always was, but now we know more details. He graduated Harvard as the "valedogtorian." He's a master chef and mixologist (specialty drink: Einstein on the Beach), Nobel Prize winner, Olympic medalist, master musician and doting father of his adopted son.

Peabody and Sherman is set in a present-day, but still cartoon world. They live in a Jetsons-like penthouse. The place is New York City, and it is Sherman's first day of school. Like all fathers, Peabody is nervous for his son to do well. Sherman is eager to get started. After all, though he may be a pretty average kid, how many boys have a father like Mr. Peabody or a WABAC machine at home? Sherman has been time traveling with his father and is ready for school.

We get a nice narrative of their life together through a montage set to John Lennon's "Beautiful Boy." (Put that



song in any movie, and I'll enjoy whatever flashes on the screen.) Father and son are close, but Mr. Peabody maintains a certain distance. The typical good-night exchange is Sherman saying, "I love you Mr. Peabody." Peabody responds, "I have a fond regard for you too."

Things get off to a rocky (not Rocky) start at school when a mean girl, Penny, makes fun of Sherman for being adopted and having a dog for a father. Sherman can't handle it, and he bites her. This gets Sherman into big trouble, including the intervention of a social worker who isn't sure Mr. Peabody is a suitable father.

In an effort to smooth the situation, Mr. Peabody invites Penny and her folks over for dinner. He gives Sherman one rule for the evening: no mentioning of the WABAC machine. But while Mr. Peabody is wining and dining Penny's folks, an evening that includes music and a chiropractic adjustment, Penny starts pushing Sherman's buttons. In the time it takes to say WABAC machine, the pair are hurtling through

Animation makes it easier and probably less expensive to jump from era to era and meet up with great characters from the past. Another advantage of animation is that wonderful actors can put in just a few days of voice work and make characters pop. As Peabody and Sherman zoom around history, the talent behind the voices is impressive, but all the voices are excellent.

Mr. Peabody is voiced by Ty Burrell (a more affected tone than he uses as Phil Dunphy on Modern Family). Max Charles is a bubbly aw-shucks Sherman. Ariel Winter as Penny is a know-it-all, but slightly showier than her Alex on Modern Family. Penny's parents are voiced by Stephen

Colbert and Leslie Mann. That annoying social worker? Allison Janney. (Will she ever get material as smart as she is?) As we wander through time, Leonardo DaVinci is Stanley Tucci. The lumbering Agamemnon is Patrick Warburton. Mel Brooks makes a good Albert Einstein. The visits to the past are each enjoyable set pieces, full of

geeky humor. Parents and precocious kids will laugh ahead of time, since these episodes do follow the fortunes of the famous people involved. Like the original cartoon, there is no shortage of puns. Penny almost marries King Tut. Marie Antoinette tells

them to eat cake. Sherman takes a spin in DaVinci's flying machine. They stop by the Trojan War. In the course of these travels, Sherman messes with the past, which will mess with the future, so our dynamic duo has more work to do so history is not disrupted.

They have a mission to fix history, and they also have some repairs and adjustments to their relationship. Mr. Peabody needs to learn that boys aren't science experiments. Sherman needs to learn to do more for himself. This kind of adjustment didn't happen in the short cartoons of the original, but a little relationship improvement is part of the formula for a feature-length film. By the end, it is Mr. Peabody who says "I love you very much, Sherman." Sherman responds with a more grown-up wit, "I have a very fond regard

Mr. Peabody and Sherman is directed by Rob Minkoff, a co-director The Lion King and director of Stuart Little. Working from a script by Craig Wright (his first after some very good television credits, including episodes of Six Feet *Under*), this team has taken an old favorite – a classic – and made an enjoyable update. Old timey fans like myself will probably always prefer the original, but Mr. Peabody and Sherman have time traveled forward and arrived in remarkably good shape.

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Home Again, Home Again

Mennonite in a Little Black Dress by Rhoda Janzen, Henry Holt and Company, 2009

The lesson that Rhoda Janzen tries to teach in her memoir Mennonite in a Little Black Dress is not that you can't go home again, but that sometimes you have to go home again. The book documents a time in Janzen's life when, rocked by physical and emotional traumas, she retreats to her childhood home and discovers that a return to the people and the places that shaped her values was

just what she needed.

At the beginning of the book, Janzen is in her early 40a, a poet and English professor at a small Christian college in southwest Michigan. Her husband has a new job, and they've just bought an expensive house on the lake. But then things start to fall apart. She has a health crisis and is faced with recuperating from major surgery and its complications. Then her husband leaves her. Then she's in a serious car accident that breaks several of her bones and sets back her recovery. She needs help.

So she goes home. Her home is California where her parents live. Her father is an imposing man, very tall and handsome, and the leader of the Mennonite church in America. Her mother is sharp and talkative, a former nurse who doesn't hesitate to talk about bodily functions at the dinner table. Rhoda's parents welcome her home without question or judgment, and they take care of her as

And she does settle in. The book is mostly a flow of reminiscences of her childhood - of home cooking, of wacky relatives, of awkward moments at school, of terrible camping trips, of excruciating car journeys with her outrageously frugal father. All of it is colored by the distinctly Mennonite culture of the household, in which deeply conservative German and Eastern European traditions help the family get through the day but make life a not-alwayspleasant adventure for a little girl.

Janzen's book has been criticized by some Mennonites (I came late to the party; the book was a bestseller a few years ago) for being flippant and dismissive toward the religion – and Janzen certainly works hard to be funny - but there's no question that she takes a great deal of comfort from her family's traditions, and she uses the book to suggest that those traditions saved



her at a dangerous time in her life.

To an outsider, in fact, it can look as if she's being overly generous to those traditions. She wonders why she and her sister grew up so timid and fearful and why her brothers turned out to be so conservative and intolerant. If she's dismissive of anything, it's of the idea that her upbringing where dancing was forbidden. where only the most mod-

est of clothing was allowed. where access to popular culture was cut off, where her father said little except to point out sheep along the roadside and to tell his wife what to order at McDonald's - had much to do with it. In her tradition, women cook, and education is viewed with suspicion; tradition-

ally, apparently, Mennonite women left school after the third grade, and when Janzen encounters an old Mennonite woman at one point in the book, the woman decides that Janzen is a good person, despite her having a PhD.

Much of the book is devoted to Janzen's grappling with the breakup of her marriage. Her husband suffered from bipolar disorder, and he was unpredictable, controlling and emotionally abusive. When he leaves Janzen, it's for a guy named Bob that he met on Gay.com (a fact that Janzen cannot leave alone). Janzen tries to explain why she never seriously considered leaving Nick, but again, she doesn't seem to suspect that it has anything to do with the gender roles she grew up with; it simply never occurred to her to leave, she says.

It's no surprise that the book closes with Janzen meeting new men, and it's also no surprise that, even though Janzen has insisted all along that her worldliness sets her apart from her family, the men she focuses on are not at all worldly. One is a funny Mennonite 15 years younger than her. The other is a guy who looks like a "rocker" but wears a replica of a nail from Jesus' cross around his neck and approaches Janzen at the grocery store, saying she should email him if she's "a single woman of God."

Janzen might suggest that you can, after all, go home again, but it looks like, although she moved a couple thousand miles away, she never strayed very far from home in the first place.



Rise of a 300 Movie

Tops at the Box: 300: Rise of an Empire, the Noam Murro-directed sequel to Zack Snyder's 300, took the No. 1 spot at last weekend's domestic



box office, as expected, selling \$45 million in the U.S. over its first three days of release. Add to that almost \$90 million abroad, and Murro, Snyder and Warner Bros. already have a big hit on their hands. Much of the buzz about the film thus far has been focused on an Eva Green sex scene. Anyone who has seen Bernardo Bertoculli's *The Dreamers* knows that an Eva Green sex scene is, well, go see for yourself, ya big perv.

Also at the Box: Fox's latest animated effort, a dog-centric comedy called Mr. Peabody & Sherman, took the No. 2 spot at the U.S. box office, selling \$32.5 million in tickets over its first three days. Like 300, Peabody is already doing well abroad, selling nearly \$70 million in foreign markets. The film is voiced by Ty Burrell, Stephen Colbert, Ariel Winter, Stanley Tucci, Lake Bell, Leslie Mann, Mel Brooks and Allison Janney. Looks mediocre to me.

Taking the No. 3 spot at last weekend's domestic box was Liam Neeson's latest action romp, *Non-Stop*, which sold another \$15.4 million, bringing the film's 10-day total to \$52 million in the U.S. *The LEGO* Movie took the No. 4 spot, selling another \$11 million, while Son of God

The Best Mexican Around?

There is no shortage of Mexican restaurants in town, and lately it seems a new one pops up every few weeks. If you add all the tacquerias that have hit the scene in the past few years, I bet the ratio of Mexican restaurants to people living in Fort Wayne is about 1 to 3. That's good news for people who like Mexican food, but it's potentially bad news for the indecisive. Let me make it easier for you.

Our first choice for Mexican cuisine is Don Chava's, part of the Cebolla's family of restaurants. It is hands-down our favorite in Fort Wayne.

Other popular Mexican restaurants are located near major shopping areas, but Don Chava's stands alone along the Well Street Corridor, which means it doesn't get as bogged down with mall dwellers and families. Though it might be considered a little out of the way for some, don't let that deter you. The food is outstanding, and the establishment is clean and comfortable inside, and we especially enjoy sitting in the bar area which boasts plenty of booths and tables. It even has a private area in the

back for larger parties. In the sum-

mer months, those looking for outside dining options will love the patio which provides a great space to enjoy ice cold margaritas and beers.

Now that I work downtown, Don Chava's is one of my favorite

lunch spots. On weekdays from 11 a.m. to 4 p.m. it features a rather robust and affordable lunch menu. One of my favorite items is the Grilled Shrimp Salad (\$7.75), a crispy flour tortilla stuffed with a heaping portion of sautéed shrimp,

onions, bell peppers, and tomatoes, covered with lettuce, cheese and sour cream. I can't say enough about this salad. I typically order it sans cheese and sour cream and drench it in Don Chava's delicious fresh made salsa. The shrimp is cooked to perfection and seasoned just right, and the fresh veggies add a desirable crunch.

Another favorite from the lunch menu is the Burrito Verde (\$6.95), a large burrito filled with grilled steak or chicken, onions, green peppers and beans, smothered with cheese and green tomatillo sauce and served with Spanish rice, lettuce and pico de gallo. My husband and I get serious cravings for this dish. The tomatillo sauce is the best we've ever had - extremely tangy and zesty, with less heat than a typical tomato salsa.

I always have a tough time deciding what to eat when we go to Don Chava's for dinner. Just reading the menu can be overwhelming, so here are a few suggestions. The Mixteca Salad (\$9.50 with steak or chicken, \$12.24 with shrimp) is a gigantic salad made with romaine lettuce, pico de gallo, black

beans, corn, red pepper, avocado and tortilla crumbs mixed with homemade chipotle dressing. I continue to be impressed with the quality of the food at Don Chava's and I think this salad showcases that best. The lettuce is crisp, and the veggies taste so fresh.

And I love the homemade chipotle dressing – the right blend of tangy and spicy, and it complements the fresh elements well.

I'd be remiss if I didn't mention Tacos de Carne Asada (\$8.99). This dish feathree tures tacos with grilled steak or chicken

chunks served with onions, cilantro, spicy tomatillo sauce and refried beans and is perfect for Mexican food purists. It is complex in its simplicity; there's really nothing to it but the flavor combinations are explosive. Sprinkle them with a bit of fresh lime, and you'd be hard pressed to find better tacos in town.

My favorite dish is extra special because it's available only on Sunday. Caldo de Res (\$8.50) is a generous serving of soup made with tender beef and vegetables and seasoned with Mexican herbs. It's one of the most unique dishes I've had in Fort Wayne, and I can't get enough of it. It is extremely

hearty and satisfying, with a flavorful broth and colorful garnish (typically raw onion, lime juice, jalapeno and cilantro).

Of course, no Mexican dinner would be complete without a margarita, and Don Chava's does margaritas right. Whether you like them on the rocks or frozen, you won't be disappointed. My husband's favorite is the regular Texas margarita on the rocks, but I prefer something fruitier and usually opt for the peach- or mango-blended margarita. They come in a variety of sizes and are available in pitchers as well, if you are sharing with a group of

Perhaps what I like most about Don Chava's is the friendly service. We have eaten there hundreds of times and have always been impressed with the wait staff. They are attentive, efficient and knowledgeable. Oh yeah, I can't forget about the housemade tortilla chips and fresh salsa. It's hard to stop eating them, they are so delicious, but be sure to leave room for your meal.

liam Shakespeare on an area stage. We're supposed to like Shakespeare, or at least that's what his place on reading lists would have us believe. Having a good many friends with strong backgrounds in literature and working with the students I teach at Ivy Tech and IPFW, I see (and demonstrate, I suppose) the mix of attitudes about works from the literary canon, including Shakespeare, fairly well, I think. They show, in part, what fills or leaves empty the seats of theaters here and everywhere. A couple of weeks ago, I went to see IPFW's staging of Gint and saw a couple of my former students, one required to attend by a class he was taking and the other there by choice. I was wondering what they were thinking when the play turned a little weird. Quick chats showed the expected: the one there by obligation rolled his eyes; the one who had come by choice attempted to find meaning and connections willingly. They, of course, both represent theatergoers as much as I do.

Director's notes by Thom Hofrichter, FPT managing artistic director and director of Othello, give a good explanation for the annual inclusion of one or another play by a guy who's been dead for almost 400 years. To sum up and paraphrase Hofrichter's sentiments, Shakespeare still has much to offer in helping us examine and understand the human condition, a general purpose of all theater, whether our first impulse is to run to or from his words that sound both like and unlike our own. It's not inconsequential that my impulse in writing this is to use an uppercase "H" for "his," since Shakespeare is given such reverence.

For anyone unfamiliar with the plot, here is an exceptionally quick synopsis of Othello: Othello, recently married to Desdemona, is driven to violence due to a plot by the evil Iago to make him think Desdemona has been cheating on him.

Hofrichter says one of the reasons he chose Othello for this year's Shakespeare offering is that he saw Cortney White, who plays Othello, perform recently in Civic productions. White is, indeed, very good as Othello. The other leads, Rachel Banks as Desdemona and Scott Hess as Iago both turn in strong performances as well. The latter is obviously having a very good time with his role.

Lighting (designed by Corey Lee) was used in the production brilliantly. The costume selections by Jes Sokolowski were an unusual mix of modern day and Elizabethan, but they work. The simple set worked

Everything about the movie (which stars Aaron Paul, Imogen Poots, Dominic Cooper and Michael Keaton) screams Fast and Furious rip-off. Skip it, I say. Also out everywhere is Tyler Perry's The Single Moms Club, another film I think you'd do right to skip. Last and probably least is R-rated comedy Art of the Steal, starring Jay Baruchel and Kurt Russell. Looks very forgettable. In case you didn't already know this, production companies don't like releasing films right after the Oscars, as it's the biggest time of the year for at-home viewing.

New to Home Video: I love Wes Anderson. There, I said it. I know it's "uncool" to like Wes these days (or at least to admit that you do), but if you have a studied appreciation for film craft, it's hard not to be impressed by the guy. He will go down as the most design-obsessed American director of all-time, and, I think, his legacy will grow long after he's gone. The amount of detail in his films amount to, for me at least, a long term cinematic love affair. And so it of course goes without saying that I can't wait to go see Anderson's excellent-looking eighth feature, The Grand Budapest Hotel, this weekend. The film stars what will likely be the year's most stacked cast, including Ralph Fiennes, Adrien Brody, Willem Dafoe, Jude Law, Jeff Goldblum, Bill Murray, Ed Norton, Saoirse Ronan, Jason Schwartzman, Tilda Swinton, Tom Wilkinson,

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
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
