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Beauty and the Beast has taken its place among the most beloved of Disney classics alongside much earlier films like Snow White and the Seven Dwarfs, Cinderella and Sleeping Beauty. Part of its enduring charm is its new-generation heroine, one who is willing to look past physical appearance to more meaningful things – like the size of his library. Belle's status as outsider, a maverick who loves books and dreams of a life of adventure over one of domesticity, struck a chord with not only young girls, but their mothers, making the film one for audiences of all ages.

That multi-generational appeal is only one element of what made the film popular and later made its leap to the Broadway stage so logical. An additional plus was the already splashy show stopper "Be Our Guest," a song, as performed by the late Jerry Orbach in his animated candelabra form, which captured the energy and excitement of a stage performance even in 2D. That, along with some fairly remarkable characters in their enchanted alter egos, obviously screamed for theatrical interpretation.

Now one of the most popular shows touring the country, *Beauty and the Beast* will visit Fort Wayne's historic Embassy Theatre, a perfect setting for such a big production. With a cast of more than 30, it's a big show, one that will fill the stage and charm audiences of all ages. The show has been enchanted for one of its cast members as well. Roxy York, who just graduated from the Boston Conservatory a mere 10 months ago, found herself landing her first big role, that of Madame de la Grande Bouche, before she even left school.

"It was a whirlwind," says York. "I attended an open call last April, and there were close to 1,000 women there. It was insane. I had kind of taken a hooky day from school and taken the bus to New York for the day. Then I got a callback every single day that week. I ended up missing a whole week of classes my senior year, but I kept calling my professors and saying 'This is a really

big opportunity, and I'm applying all of the things I've learned!' At the end of that week I got a call that I had the job. It was very exciting, and I'm sure my parents were very relieved that I had a job before I graduated."

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Her parents may have been relieved, but they never dissuaded her from her dream of performing. York says she was on her way to the stage "basically from the womb. I've been addicted to it for an incredibly long time. There may have been a short time when I was young that I was talking about being president, but I've really wanted to be an actor forever."

While always drawn to musical theatre, York studied classical voice with the thought of performing opera while also studying straight acting and taking film classes. She says she will happily audition for anything, from film to Shakespeare to opera, but her true passion is with musical theatre, making the last several months particularly memorable.

"We started rehearsals the last week of August and started the tour in September. I have a nine-month contract, so I'll be doing this show through June."

Her attachment to the show goes back much further than the last 10 months, however, and further connects her to her love of the stage and her closeness to her parents.

"This show is so special to me because I saw it on Broadway with my father, and it was a real father/daughter moment, so it's always been in my soul to love it. And of course, I grew up with the movie and the music. One of my favorite moments in the show is that opening scene when they're singing 'Belle.' I'm not even in that scene, but when I hear those opening notes, it's just so thrilling. The show is laced with magic, and I love being part of it."

For those who have not yet seen

the stage version, York notes that there are additional songs and longer scenes which give the audience even more opportunity to love the characters and invest in their stories.

"The show deeply affects everyone of any age. Parents will bring their kids and then be even more moved by it because the story speaks to so many deeply emotional things."

Her character, voiced by *Laugh-In* star Jo Anne Worley in the film, is an opera singer-turned-wardrobe, which gives York a chance to use her opera training for comedic purpose.

"Madame de la Grande Bouche translates to Lady of the Big Mouth, which really works for me," York laughs. "But my favorite scene with my character is when she serenades Belle with her opera skills. And it's funny because you really can't decide if she's a great opera singer or not, so I get to play the humor of the situation as her voice is cracking. She may not actually be good, but she also may just be working through a bad situation. So that's fun for me and for the audience."

Aside from the stage experience, York is also getting a crash course in other dynamics of a touring show, much of which stems from her very large costume.

"I didn't know very much about touring life, and typically the on-stage part of it is pretty much the same, even though the audience changes. But the backstage part changes every night because it's a different theatre, so we don't know what it's going to be like

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


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Arts Advocate, Visionary

----- Feature • Deb Washler -----

When Deb Washler became the executive director of Artlink nine years ago, she was stepping into some pretty big shoes. Her predecessor, Betty Fishman, was not only the face of the gallery but a legend in the area's arts community. But Fishman spent three months working with Washler, helping to ease the transition and allowing the new director time to benefit from Fishman's knowledge.

Almost a decade later, Washler has clearly made the job her own. With remarkable growth, a new location and a wide range of new opportunities for local artists, Artlink has become a force in the Fort Wayne arts scene, and several new programs promise to make it a leader in the community, thanks in no small part to Washler's vision.

When she was earning her degree in fine and commercial art at the University of Saint Francis, Washler had her eye on both pursuing art and possibly teaching. Four years in commercial photography led her to think more about teaching and whether or not she wanted to pursue a graduate degree to make that happen.

"I was considering it, and then someone at Saint Francis took a sabbatical, and I filled in for a year and was able to get some experience. I realized I wasn't as excited about it as I should be, not excited enough to go into debt for grad school. At that point I kind of fell into a job at Arts United and was introduced to the world of arts administration. Then I worked at Fort Wayne Ballet before taking this job at Ar-

She credits Fishman with her handling of the transitional time after her hiring.

"Betty has a classy way of handling everything," says Washler. "She spent those three months working with me. I was the executive director, and she was executive director emeritus. I had been a member of Artlink, so I knew her, and she helped me get to know the members and the board.'

Even in those early days, Washler was already formulating some of the ideas which are just now really coming to fruition with the Arts Incubator, a set of programs which recently launched in Fort Wayne through the supervision of Artlink and aimed at helping local artists establish themselves.

"I had run across a book on incubators when they were really just getting started. I

wanted to try to do something like that, but the reality was that where we were in our old space, it just wasn't going to happen anytime soon. So I focused instead on our exhibits. That space had only one gallery, so I could only do one at a time."

The opportunity to leave their smaller



gallery came in 2011 when Arts United purchased the building now called the Auer Center for Arts & Culture, located on Main Street. The new home not only provided additional gallery space for multiple exhibits, but it featured classrooms for workshops and other educational opportunities as well.

"We were so limited in what we could offer and how much we could offer before, and now we can bring in more art, feature more artists and more mediums. It took awhile to get used to that much space and how to program it. We also have two classrooms now so that we can teach classes and workshops. And that opened the door to establishing the Arts Incubator."

The incubator provides three resources: a Co.Starters program, Arts Dialogues and a website which provides resources for artists. The first Co.Starters program, a nine-week workshop which helps entrepreneurs formulate and realize their business ideas, begins in March, and Washler says she first learned of the program through former Arts United president Jim Sparrow.

"Jim had gone to Cincinnati where they have the program which is a licensed program through Chattanooga, Tennessee, where it originated. After he had discovered it, he came to talk to me about it. The purpose is creating an environment where a creative individual - and it's not limited to visual artists - can find help in molding their businesses. They can learn from business leaders how to take their idea, look at what might be missing or what things they need, and then put that plan into action. When they come out after nine weeks, they have a better understanding of what they have to do and how to find the seed money to make it happen.

"But we also have our Arts Dialogues for those who might not be ready for something like that yet. We'll have a series of topics, like how to set up an Etsy shop. which can help artists utilize things like that. The dialogues are just a drop-in thing. and there will be different topics along the way.'

Washler began the process of implementing the Arts Incubator last summer. and in the months and years ahead the possibilities are exciting. She says the chance to bring together various resources in one place and provide it to the community will benefit not only artists and art lovers but the community as a whole.

"As we continue growing the Arts Incubator and the community begins to utilize it. we'll be able to see what it can do and what other needs are. We want to give it as much structure as we can so that we see how we can grow this program. Hopefully two or three years from now we'll see five storefronts that have come of this program."

While her career may have taken a different path than she had initially envisioned. Washler - and Artlink - have flourished in the last nine years, making Artlink a unique presence in Fort Wayne. She ultimately decided against teaching, but she has contributed as many artists to the community as many who do pursue education. And that has been her greatest reward.

"The best part of my job is watching artists grow. I look back on some of the artists who had just begun showing with us when I first started this job, and I look at what they're doing now and see how much they've improved over the years. That's really exciting, and it's why I do what I do."

to have me walking around in a 30-pound costume. The big question every night is 'Where are we going to put Roxy?' because there are different situations in each theatre. It's always new and exciting. Of course, I don't get to see my costume because I'm in it, but it's so much fun and brings so much joy to people when they see it."

Having secured her first job weeks be-

fore graduation, York spent the summer with her parents in her native Long Island before joining the show in August. She credits their constant support for her ability to pursue her dream and says they have already seen several of her performances, including recent ones in Florida. Once her contract is up in June, York goes on to face the life of a working - and sometimes not working - actor, a

lifestyle she's prepared to embrace.

"My plan after June is what every actor faces: it's back to step one, back to auditions. Sometimes I envy my friends who have 'real people jobs' and can move up in the company and see some security. I'm basically looking at a life of working freelance where I'm my own CEO. It's both confusing and exciting, but I wouldn't trade it."

Lydia Loveless

Somewhere Else

Look up a list of notable people from Ohio and you'll find dozens of astronauts, a whole bunch of presidents, tons of sports superstars, Devo and, um, Charles Manson. Among others. One Columbus-born artist who hasn't made this illustrious list (yet) is Lydia Loveless. But give her time.



Barely pushing her mid 20s, this alt-country spitfire is already well on her way to pushing past the boundaries of the genre. Her third and latest full-length, *Somewhere Else*, is fine proof of that.


Her strong vocals carry even the most boisterous rockers on the album, giving a plaintive edge to the soaring arrangements. Dripping with feeling and even desperation, "To Love Somebody" offers straight-ahead rock with just-right touches of 80s riffage and pedal steel.

"I don't think too much these days / I don't even try too hard to stay awake," Loveless sings in "Head." The song builds from pleasingly jangly to driving, adding an edge to its initially resigned tone. If you're at all familiar with Loveless already, then you're no doubt aware of the "new Neko Case" tag she's been saddled with (though to be compared to Case isn't too shabby). You may even mistake the opening bars of "Verlaine Shot Rimbaud" for Case. It's a beautiful tune, and at least part of it would suil Case perfectly. True, Loveless' powerful pipes do imply a similarity, but only on the surface. Loveless usually opts for a grittier direction, as is evidenced as soon as the chorus in "Verlaine" kicks in. Her natural twang and down-to-earth subject matter always lets Loveless keep at least one foot in bar-band/country rock territory, but you don't have to be a country or alt-country fan to enjoy any and all of the tunes on this consistently rewarding album.

"They Don't Know" is a catchy, honest song reminiscent of Lucinda Williams, while the opener, "Really Wanna See You," is a rocking barn burner that's sure to tear up stages on tour. Whether she's talking to a lover, pushing one away, or musing over the loss of one, Loveless doesn't hold back. Somewhere Else is sure to end up on several lists this year, and it's definitely worth adding to yours. (D.M. Jones)

Martin Courtney has a voice that is simple and plainspoken. He delivers lyrics about longing, lamenting yesterday and being content



Tommy James & The Shondells

Crimson & Clover (1969)

Tommy James was a Midwestern boy who was born in Dayton, Ohio and raised in Niles, Michigan. A baby boomer, he grew up listening to the rock n' roll sound of the Detroit area and had his own band when he was just 12.

He and his band had already established themselves with charted



This album opens with the title track, a psychedelic number with groovy guitars that I consider to be one of the last bridges between the bubblegum 1950s and the mind-expanding 1960s.

"Kathleen McArthur" oozes folk, and the trippy Beatlesesque "I'm A Tangerine" follows. This release also featured the familiar "Crystal Blue Persuasion," a great song that reached No. 2 on the Billboard Pop Singles chart.

"Sugar On Sunday" has a Bee Gees vibe, heavy with organs and harmonies, and "Breakaway" has a definite Motown vibe. "Smokey Roads" is another under-appreciated track from this release, as is the grungy "I'm Alive" – magnificent guitars in this one, and a pleasing organ arrangement behind some great shattering vocals, pure garage rock from Tommy James and his band.

The band produced a couple of records through 1970 before James went on as a solo artist.

His only other notable chartable hit was in 1971, with "Draggin' the Line."

James has a seat at the rock n' roll table and is credited with having been associated with sales in excess of 100 million (singles, LPs and downloads). He will perform in Cleveland on Saturday, March 29 with Steppenwolf and Herman's Hermits. (*Dennis Donalma*)

with today as if he's in conversation with an old friend. There's no melodramatic delivery, just a slightly stoned sleepiness that comes with long drives back home for holiday or staying up till 2 a.m. drinking coffee with a long lost friend in a 24-hour diner down by the piers. Matt Mondanile has turned his crystalline jangly guitar work into a true art form. There's nothing flashy about what he does, yet there's something almost transcendent in the lines he plays on "Crime" and the country-ish sway of "Primitive." Alex Bleeker adds an almost orchestral touch to rolling bass lines reminiscent of both Nashville swing and Philly soul. Jackson Pollis lays a steady beat throughout *Atlas*, and newest member Matt Kallman fills the already lush sound with keys.

With this lineup Real Estate have become this very tight band that shows some road worn muscle on this album. There aren't any major changes in sound and style from 2011's excellent *Days*, just a honed-in concentration with the songs. The tunes are as long as they need to be. Nothing more or nothing less. And the songs are the best these New Jersey guys have penned.

It helps that both Mondanile and Bleeker have their own musical projects outside the Real Estate fold. I think this allows the band to concentrate solely on Real Estate and not a "who gets what credit" sort of ego trip. Thus, songs like "The Bend," "Horizon," "How I Might Live" and "Navigator" can be as simple yet perfect as they can

With bands like Real Estate, where members have other things going on outside the band, I get worried that those other projects will take precedent over the main gig. And especially with Real Estate I worry an album like *Atlas* could be their last. I wonder to myself how they can do better than this jangly little wonder of an album? I mean, if you were gonna call it quits, this would be the album you'd want people to remember you for.

It's perfect. In every way. (John Hubner)

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

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



Dave & Phil Alvin and the Guilty Men (\$25)

Unless you were paying no attention at all during the past week, you already know the biggest rock tour news of the last week was the announcement of the Kiss/Def Leppard tour hitting all of the summer sheds beginning in late June. The pair of music giants



will first visit this area July 15 in Cincinnati then return August 16 in Chicago, August 22 in Noblesville, August 23 in Detroit and August 26 in Cleveland. Night Ranger were rumored to be the opening act on the tour, but Kiss frontman Paul Stanley shot that down in a recent Twitter post, so that slot still remains a mystery. Tickets are already on sale.

A month-long co-headlining venture for Soundgarden and Nine Inch Nails takes place in the sheds this summer. Though the bands wouldn't seem to have a lot in common, they were both popular during the 90s, so they have that going for them at least. The bands have scheduled Chicago July 24 and Detroit July 26 as their only regional appearances.

Tesla's May 30 show at Piere's has been postponed to September 12 due to scheduling conflicts, so if you were really anxious to see them you may want to travel to Firekeeper's Casino near Battle Creek on May 31 to check them out. The Sacramento-based band will be at the casino's 2,000-seat theater that night previewing their new CD, Simplicity, due out this summer and, of course, playing all the fan favorites as well. There were just a few tickets left at press time, so get them while you can.

If you went to the Crosby, Stills and Nash show last week but still wanted to get your "Young" fix too, we have the medicine for you. Neil Young has two scheduled shows at The Chicago Theatre April 21-22. The shows are expected to be low-key, without his band Crazy Horse and focusing mostly on his 60s and 70s catalog of songs. So far, these are the only dates scheduled for the iconic musician in this area.

The Eagles will bring their History of the Eagles show to Van Andel Arena in Grand Rapids September 8. With nothing new on the shelves since 2007's Long Road Out of Eden, I'd expect most shows would be a history of The Eagles, even if they weren't calling it that. But, I digress. Tickets go on sale March 28 and are reasonably priced, for an Eagles show anyway, ranging from \$50-\$163.

Singer/songwriters Matt Nathanson and Gavin DeGraw will co-headlining a couple of months worth of dates this summer, bringing Mary Lambert and Andrew McMahon along for the ride. I've long touted Nathanson as a must-see live act, bringing great songs together with a lot of stage banter to create an intimate experience no matter where he plays. The tour visits the Zoo Amphitheatre in Toledo July 1, White River in Indianapolis July 20, the Ravinia Festival in Chicago July 21 and the LC Pavilion in Columbus, Ohio July 22.

The new Fort Wayne Youtheatre collaboration, this time with the University of St. Francis School of Creative Arts, is a fun night for kids and those who get a kick out of watching youngsters be amazed by things that can happen onstage. Giant flying TV set? "Oooo!" Boy dropping into a tube and getting whisked away? "Gasp!" and "Will he be okay?!" And how about that big stage-filling mass of green-haired Oompa Loompas that draws happy little hand claps and singing along. To top it all off, don't forget the DeBrands chocolate bar for every child with a ticket!

Directors Brad Beauchamp and Leslie Hormann have assembled a massive team to produce a light, lively, colorful, fun version of author Roald Dahl's

tale of an impoverished but good lad and a quirky confectioner. The show sticks more closely to the Gene Wilder 1971 movie than Dahl's beloved book. With 74 Oompa Loompas (37 per performance), a crew of a couple dozen to handle the requirements of sets, costumes, makeup, wigs, special effects— not

to mention a sizeable cast who all sing and dance – it's amazing to see how well it all comes together.

USF Dean Rick Cartwright has had some fun with the scenic design, especially the Bucket shack, the floating Giant TV, and the factory's Chocolate Room. Leslie Beauchamp's choreography makes frequent use of the runway out beyond the orchestra pit, bringing the fun closer to the audience.

On opening night, there were a few glitches with sound and one special effect, and a long intermission carried the show past many bedtimes, but that's live theater for you. Packing the magic into the second act

worked to keep the attention of even the youngest, squirmiest audience members

There are several strong performances from this cast. Parker Irwin as Charlie Bucket is terrific. His strong clear singing, energetic dancing and confident performance are masterful, and I liked Todd Frymier's weird Willy Wonka even better than Wilder's movie version. Another standout was Jan Venderly as Mrs.

Bucket for the "Cheer Up, Charlie" number.

The six-person pit orchestra with music leadership by Ben Wedler and Jeannette Walsh flawlessly handled the sunny Anthony Newly/Leslie Bricusse tunes, including the classics "The Candy Man," "Pure Imagination" and the Oompa Loompa song

as well as new ones by Bricusse and Tim McDonald, including "Think Positive," a highlight moment between Parker and Tom Scribner as Mr. Bucket.

Eileen Ahlersmeyer as Phineous Trout and Bob Ahlersmeyer as The Candy Man provide a lot of the information that packs Act One. And life at the Bucket home includes fun with the grandparents, played by Paul Stephens, Michael Alspaugh, Cathy Christoff, and Audum North.





Not So Sweet Home Chicago

Divergent by Veronica Roth, HarperCollins, 2011

Veronica Roth's *Divergent*, a movie version of which opens in theaters this month, seems specifically created to try to take the helm as the next big film franchise aimed at tweens, teens and young adults. Its echoes of *The Hunger Games* are clear and hard to ignore, but *Divergent* is confident enough in its premise and, well, divergent enough in its details to stake its own legitimate claim to a little bit of the spotlight.

The dystopian story (not many stories in our current pessimistic age aren't set in a dystopia) takes place in Chicago in the possibly-not-too-distant future. The city is a wonderful set piece, with crumbling skyscrapers and a shoreline that overlooks a brown expanse of marsh that used to be Lake Michigan. Despite the sorry state of the city, its people stay inside the fenced city limits, safely locked away from the mysteriously dangerous world outside.

The signature characteristic of the novel's society is that its population is divided into five "factions," divisions based on a particular personality trait aspired to by its members. The Abnegation faction values selflessness. Candor is all about honesty. Erudite places intelligence and logic above all else.

Amity strives for peace and friendship in all things. And the members of Dauntless are fearless. At the age of 16, each citizen takes an aptitude test to determine which faction she is best suited for, and then she must choose to either stay in the faction into which she was born or switch to another faction.



The book's plot is, eventually, a political thriller in which power struggles between factions threaten the fragile fabric of the society. The members of Abne-

gation, because of their dedication to service, have traditionally been the governors, but their position is being challenged. Erudite's quest for knowledge has led to a hunger for power, and Dauntless, once mostly concerned with bravery and honor, has become lately more focused on bullying and recklessness.

Caught in the middle of the conflict is Beatrice Prior, a young Abnegation who faces an identity crisis. Her aptitude test showed that she was suited to more than one faction – a rare occurrence called divergence – and she's been warned that it would be dangerous for her to publicly reveal her uniqueness. When she re-

belliously chooses to leave Abnegation and join Dauntless, she alienates her family and sets herself up for persecution by the Dauntless-born among whom she must live.

The book's parallels with *The Hunger Games* are obvious. In both books a defiant young woman must use her talents to resist the oppression of an authori-

Badass Chick Crushes Muppets

Tops at the Box: Two films, Buena Vista's Muppets Most Wanted and Lionsgate's Divergent, were both considered risky releases a week ago. Some industry analysts thought Muppets would score big while Divergent flopped, and some predicted the opposite. Both films cost quite a bit to make and received healthy promotional campaigns, but it was director Neil Burger's Divergent, starring Shailene Woodley, Miles Teller, Kate Winslet, Ashley Judd and Theo James, that took the No. 1 spot at last weekend's box office, selling \$56 million in the U.S. over its first three days of release. It's a long, epic film that will likely make both Woodley and James household names - and will almost certainly spawn a couple of sequels. Looks entertaining, especially if you're a Hunger Games fan. Or just incredibly bored.

Also at the Box: Fittingly, Muppets Most Wanted, directed by James Bobin and starring a bunch of puppets and Ricky Gervais, took the No. 2 spot at the box, selling just \$16.5 million in the U.S. over its first three days of release. Yikes that's bad. Apparently, kids don't like puppets as much as they used to. Or as much as they do animated stories. How fantastic is The Muppets Take Manhattan? Or how about Emmitt Otter's Jug Band Christmas? Or that dude Cookie Monster! Me, I love puppets.

Fox Searchlight's latest animated effort, Rob Minkoff's *Mr. Peabody & Sherman*, took the No. 3 spot at last weekend's box office, selling another \$11.7 million and bringing the film's 17-day total to over \$81 million in the U.S. and over \$183 million worldwide. Looks no good to me.

The flick has thus far made \$13 million in the U.S. and \$33 million abroad without even seeing a wide release. Good for Wes and the gang! Oh, and I suppose it's also worth mentioning that Disney's *Frozen* is now not just a billion dollar movie, but one of the Top 12 films of all time.

Looks like an amazingly well produced piece of cheese. I can't wait to someday watch it. But not at the theater. And only if I'm really bored and can't find anything else to do. tarian society, and in both books young people are at the forefront of a violent cultural conflict. Divergent is also not unlike Ender's Game, a much older novel which was also recently made into a big-budget movie; in all three books, the brutality of children is exploited by authorities as kids go at one another with Lord of the Flies viciousness. We've even got some reflections of *Harry Potter*, with Erudite standing in for Slytherin (albeit with no house as appealing as Gryffindor in sight).

But Divergent has some things going for it. First, there's the complexity of the metaphor of the factions. It's not surprising that Dauntless would be the bad guys, but it's a bit of a shocker that Erudite, the faction of knowledge and logic, would be a villain too. However, it makes more sense when you consider that the values of Amity, Abnegation and Candor all have to do with interpersonal relationships, while the priorities of Dauntless and Erudite are almost entirely egocentric. The good guys care about each other; the bad guys only care about themselves.

Then there's the appealing atmosphere of the novel. Sure, there are some downright silly things in this dilapidated Chicago (like the fact that the trains that the Dauntless ride never actually stop, leaving passengers to leap on and off as the trains rush past), but there's also something extremely fun about Roth's dark vision of the city. After all, what could be cooler than zooming down on a zip line from the caved-in roof of the Hancock building to the pavement of Lakeshore Drive?

Whether or not Divergent can capture some of the box office fire that's currently in the sole possession of *The Hunger Games* remains to be seen, but as a novel, *Divergent* definitely has what it needs to hold its
