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# -----Cover Story • Into the Woods -----Into the Deep, Dark Woods

I've been obsessed with the Stephen Sondheim musical Into the Woods since the 1988 Tony Awards.

The musical weaves several folk tale characters' stories into one. Act One ends with "happy ever after," and Act Two explores the ramifications of what the characters had to do in order to achieve their happiness.

I bought the original cast recording, and every note, breath and nuance has become permanently etched into my brain. In 1991 PBS aired a performance of the Broadway production starring Bernadette Peters, and the show was more relevant to me than anything I had seen since The Breakfast Club.

It was all about young people being pushed around by domineering parents. Cinderella's parents raised her to be "nice," but where did it get her? Picking lentils out of the ashes to earn the privilege of attending a ball - and then not being allowed to go anyway. Who among us hasn't been there?

Jack just wants to hang out with his best friend (a sickly milk cow), but his mother says he needs to find better friends. He steals from a Giant to earn her respect. Rapunzel, raised by the quintessential overprotective mother, just wants to leave her tower and go out with a cute prince, but her curfew is

pretty restrictive. Little Red Riding Hood meets a sexy Wolf in the woods and lets herself stray from the path because he "seems so nice." And we all know what happened to her.

Aside from robbing giants, I could relate to every one of these kids.

In 1998, Craig A. Humphrey directed the show at IPFW, and I was thrilled to be cast as Cinderella's Stepmother. With a little more life experience under my

belt, I was surprised to realize the story was actually about a Baker and his Wife who so desperately wanted a child they would do just about anything to get one - even lie, cheat and steal. It was about being tempted by wicked charmers and about people not being who you thought they were.

Now, 16 years and a family of my own later, I have been cast in the current IPFW production of Into the Woods, also directed by Craig Humphrey, running April 18-27. And I have come to realize the show is actually about a mother who just wants to protect her daughter from the evils of the world and to keep her a child for as long as she can.

I am quite certain that in a few years, I will conclude that the show is about disappointing your children and realizing you have taught them all the wrong lessons and basically ruined their lives.

This is what theatre is all about - holding a mirror up to the audience and giving

them a new perspective to ponder. Sondheim is a master at that. Perhaps inspired by his own strained relationship with both is parents (his father abandoned the family and his mother took her bitterness out on her young son), the show is about "the complicated and delicate nature of parent/child relationships," says Humphrey. "[It's about] the

> concept that 'no one is alone,' and the idea of sacrifice in the goal of getting what we want."

> Despite the familiar fairy tale characters, Humphrey hopes the audience recognizes the seriousness of the show's themes. His production

may be slightly "darker," than some other community theatre productions. "I'm trying very hard to stay away from a 'Disneyfied' production," he says.

Visually, the costumes are distinctly un-Disney. "We're taking an eclectic approach to the design of the show," he says, "because to me it helps make the idea of 'once upon a time' timeless. These fairy tales live over a vast expanse of time."

The costume and lighting design are by IPFW theatre alumni Jes Sokolowski and Corey Lee respectively. The costumes are based on Humphrey's original designs from the 1998 show. In that production, Cinderella's family dressed in 1950s fashion, the Wolf in a leather jacket and other characters in more traditional "fairy tale" garb.

One big difference in this production from the one 16 years ago is that almost all the cast members are IPFW theatre students. The 1998 cast consisted of a mixture of theatre students, one music student and several

well-respected community theatre actors (Todd Frymier, Leslie Beauchamp, Anna Wood and Hannalies Hepler, to name a few). This time around, Humphrey realized the school "had the right group of students at the right time," and all but two cast members are IPFW students or staff.

Possibly due to the growth of IPFW's music program over the past nine years (the John and Ruth Rhinehart Music Center was built in 2007 under the tenure of Dr. Michael Wartell). the theatre department has drawn more musical theatre students then it did in 1998, says Humphrey.

Despite the musical experience of the young actors, he says, "The music is very difficult.'

Maggie Hunter, an IPFW staffer who plays Jack's Mother, agrees. "You have to focus [on the music] and never stop focusing," she says. "The timing, the rhythms and the music are difficult. and you must become totally involved in what is going on. It's fast-paced and it doesn't stop. It is exhilarating but ex-

hausting - and I mean that in a good way."

Once the actors got the music learned, they could start to explore the themes in the show. "It's amazing how well-crafted the material is," says Humphrey, "and how truly multi-layered."

Even the minor characters multiple dimensions that are rare in musical theatre. Dotty

Miller, who plays Cinderella's Stepmother, describes her character as "a social climber who wants the good life at all costs, including living vicariously through her daughters and, eventually, her stepdaughter."

Paige Matteson as Little

Schrock as the Wolf;

Red Riding Hood and Brady

Brady Schrock plays the dual role of the Wolf and Prince Charming, characters who are two sides of the same coin. "The Wolf is essentially what the Prince covers up under his dashing exterior," he explains. "Elements of both characters can be seen in the other."

Schrock especially enjoys playing the comedy of his princely role. "The Prince is

# Taking Laughs Nationwide

There are all sorts of things you probably can't learn from a book.

Among them, intuition, street smarts, altruism, and the maternal

A lot of people might put standup comedy on that list.

But Drew Carey famously learned standup from a book he checked out of the Cleveland Public Library, and now Wabash native Michael Palascak tells a similar tale.

Palascak will perform at Wabash's Eagles Theatre (part of the Honeywell Center) on April 17.

It's the first time he has returned to Wabash since achieving major success as a comic.

Palascak's fateful interaction with the aforementioned tome happened in the summer of 2002.

He had recently moved from Wabash to Joliet, Illinois with his family.

"I was in a new city during the summer, and I was just kind of bored at a bookstore and I found a book on standup comedy," he says.

But the seed was planted considerably earlier than that and by an unlikely gardener: Palascak's father, an economist.

"He would pose it as a riddle at the dinner table," Palascak recalls. "Like 'what's the most difficult job in the world?

And we'd be like, 'scientist' or something. "And he would say it was a standup co-

median ... until he gets the crowd." This may sound like an unlikely conclusion for an economist to come to, but Palascak says his father just loves to be en-

"He likes guys who can be clean," he says. "But really anything that makes him laugh."

Palascak's father told his son that standup comedy is the hardest career to get going,

but the best once it gets going. "I think he's somewhat to blame for my career choice now that I think about it," he

But back to the book. In the back of the book was a list of venerable open mic nights

across the country. "One of them was literally five miles from my house in the suburbs," Palascak Leno was the more generous and so-

But performing on a giant sound stage in Los Angeles (where the Tonight Show was located before Jimmy Fallon moved it back east) was far more nerve-wracking, Palascak says, than performing in a theater in

There was a time when an appearance on The Tonight Show was an E ticket to great things in the career of a standup comic.

But Leno didn't have the influence of Johnny Carson, and commercial television doesn't have the influence it had in Carson's day.

Palascak says he likes how his career has progressed thus far.

He'd like to get to the point where he just performs in theaters instead of a mix of theaters and clubs.

And he would like to make a move

"I think a concrete goal that is sort of timeless is to be able to go to a city and have people want to come out and see you and to be able to sort

of live off that," he says.

Palascak's comic voice is droll and quintessentially Midwestern, but he says he is still refining it.

His goal, ultimately, is to make his stage persona as close to his real self as possible.

It's harder than it sounds.

In the book that launched Palascak's career, the reader is entreated to make a pact with his future self by writing down a date when he will quit standup if things aren't working out or if things have worked out as much as they ever will.

"I couldn't even imagine that that day was coming," Palascak says, "I was just like, 'I am going to do this forever and ever and

But Palascak can now imagine such a day, even though he hasn't yet committed a date to paper.

"If the day comes when I don't want it to be part of my life, I hope I have the courage to step away," he says.

Palascak says he now sees possible modes of creative expression open to him above and beyond stand-up comedy.



says, "so I read the book and went up there two weeks

later.' Palascak was as bad at first as most new comics are.

The fact that he had no friends in Illinois made his bombing hurt more, he says, but it may have also made him improve faster.

"It seems like when a lot of comics start out, a lot of their friends come out and just laugh to support them," he says. "I was kind of grateful that I didn't have that.

"I just wanted to realize, 'Oh, this isn't funny. I need to get better at it," Palascak

Five years after he graduated from college and started doing standup full-time, Palascak was invited onto The Tonight Show with Jay Leno.

A year after that, he did The Late Show with David Letterman.

Palascak says that, of the two hosts,

completely sure-footed in absolutely everything," he says. "He is completely unaware of the fact that he is an extremely arrogant, superficial and self-entitled person.

Humphrey says that even though the show is funny and at times even silly, it is important to play the realism of the story which includes infidelity, greed and murder. "I don't think the humor works without the darkness," he says.

This darkly realistic approach to the show is what allows the story to take on different meanings to different people at different stages in their lives. Humphrey says that the show always makes him think about his relationships with his own parents.

"Maybe it's my age," he says, "but I think [the show is teaching me] more about forgiving and being forgiven."

That is the brilliance of this musical. At first glance, it's a fairy tale romp. But its "morals" speak to anyone who has ever had a parent, a child, a lover or a friend - or a desire to have a parent, a child, a lover or a friend. No matter what stage in life you happen to be in at any given moment, Into the Woods is your story.

When the IPFW Jazz Ensemble and the Singing Dons vocal group take the stage at the Auer Performance Hall, it will be for what the school's Department of Music bills as a "mega-ensemble tour-de-force." In slightly more precise terms, though, the performance will offer a diverse musical menu, with a main course of cool mid-century jazz spiced up with sides of late-century interpretations of older themes and some 21stcentury vocal acrobatics.

The concert's entrée, if you will, is built around a pair of pieces from the eternally ruling nobility of jazz: Duke Ellington's "Do Nothin' Till You Hear from Me" and Count

Basie's "Cute." Between those venerable two pieces is sandwiched "Feeling Good," a moody show tune by Anthony Newley and Leslie Bricusse. It's a surprising juxtaposition, but

one that makes sense when you consider it as an encapsulation of the rise of popular jazz between the 1940s and 1960s.

The choice of the Ellington tune is a no-brainer. Originally written as an instrumental show piece for trumpeter Cootie Williams in 1940, it soon picked up lyrics by Bob Russell. Since its release in 1943, it has become the epitome of a jazz standard, and it's been recorded by virtually everyone who's ever sung jazz, from Nina Simone to Mary J. Blige.

Not as easy a choice, but a good one nonetheless, is Basie's "Cute." It was written by Neal Hefti, the trumpeter who made a name for himself as a composer and arranger for Basie's orchestra, but who is, perhaps unfortunately, best known as the composer of the themes for The Odd Couple and the 1960s Batman TV show. Before he went Hollywood, Hefti was instrumental in shaping Basie's sound, and as Miles Davis noted, neither man sounded quite the same without

"If it wasn't for Neal Hefti, the Basie band wouldn't sound as good as it does," Davis said at the height of Hefti's Basie years. "But Neal's band can't play those

same arrangements nearly as well. The Newley-Bricusse tune comes from

the 1965 musical The Roar of the Greasepaint-The Smell of the Crowd, but it took its position as a standard after it was recorded by Nina Simone later that year. It's stuck around since then, and recent covers of the song have included a much-loved version by Muse and a much-reviled interpretation by the Pussycat Dolls.

"Feeling Good," with its air of swaggering sophistication, provides a link to two other vocal classics, "Sway" and "Come Fly with Me." Both songs are dripping with the 1950s Rat Pack vibe (the former was first recorded by Dean Martin, and the latter was written by Sammy Cahn and Jimmy Van Heusen for Frank Sinatra) and both keep the theme of suave and smoky jazz running

through the show. Although mambo-flavored "Sway" is closely linked to male vocalists (Michael Bublé more recently did a wellregarded cover it)Rosemary Clooney and Julie

London claimed it as prime territory for a sultry female torch singer, too, and that's no doubt the mark that vocalist Stephanie Johnson will hit in this performance.

The entirety of the action in this show doesn't take place between 1940 and 1965, though. The evening kicks off with "Hey Mama, Your Samba's on Fire," a 1987 composition by saxophonist Dan Gailey, and David Baker's "Padospe" shows up near the end. The former foreshadows the Latin influence of 60s-era pieces to come later, and Baker's piece echoes the big-band swing of the Basie and Ellington tunes.

The show's apparent outlier, however, is "Words," an a cappella piece by Swedish composer Anders Edenroth. The poppy, layered meditation on the expressive power of, well, words is undeniably a product of the 2000s, and yet it has a smooth swing that would make it seem not at all out of place in 1963 - and, thus, not at all out of place in this program.

The Jazz Ensemble performs under the direction of Dr. Farrell Vernon, and the Singing Dons are led by Dr. Patricia Kennedy. Featured performers for the night include trumpeter Conner Freimuth, tenor saxophonist Sam Lock, trombonist Luis Sanchez and pianist Madison Cole.

If you like your Pink Floyd to be accurately reproduced and not haphazardly interpreted, then Pink Droyd are the band for you. Through its faithful adherence to the loopy precision of Pink Floyd's music, the Fort Wayne-based band has earned a reputation that reaches far beyond the Summit

And when you throw in a laser light show and topnotch string section, the Pink Droyd experience only gets better.

Strings, lasers and that unique Floyd sound will fill the University of Saint Francis Performing Arts Center on Saturday, April 19 when Pink Droyd and the Pink Droyd Philharmonic Orchestra present All Strings At-

tached. Doors open at 6 p.m. with the show starting at 7

It's excusable to think that it's crazy for a band to take on Pink Floyd. But anyone who has spent a week or two locked in room listening to Dark Side of the Moon

or Meddle through headphones will tell you that it's not crazy. It's passion. Every time the needle drops on a Floyd record some new sound emerges from the depths, some previously unheard aural doodle grabs the ears and demands to be investigated. Same with the lyrics, which burrow into the brain like some delicious puzzle. Pink Floyd's music simply refuses to get old.

The members of Pink Droyd are driven by that same passion. For lead singer and guitarist Kevin Quandt, Pink Floyd's music has always stirred him. Imagine his delight at finding a bunch of other musicians equally moved by Floyd.

"It's a sordid story," Quandt said. "When you have people who are so passionate about putting on a large scale Pink Floyd tribute, things just sort of happen."

The first incarnation of what would become Pink Droyd grew out of a one-off show at Piere's. Quandt had assembled a band of like-minded players called Earthbound Misfits. The show turned out to be more fun than Quandt had expected, so a second gig was scheduled, this time paired with the Rush tribute band Grace Under Pressure. But because of scheduling conflicts with the initial Earthbound Misfits lineup, Quandt had to scramble to piece a new band together.

"We decided to do it again," Quandt said. "Six months later we hooked up with Daniel Fisher."

Fisher had recently relocated to Fort Wayne from Boston where he had played keyboards in a Floyd tribute band called Pink Voyd. After the second Earthbound Misfits show, Quandt and Fisher kept jamming together. Eventually they expanded

Quandt and Fisher found the right guys. Mike Lennon, who played guitar with the Lennon Brothers and worked with Fisher at Sweetwater Sound, had been talking with

Fisher about a Floyd tribute. His participation was inevitable. Now with drummer Nick Talevski and bassist Trevor Krall. Pink Droyd, while not a touring band. play shows across

the Midwest and beyond.

Pink Floyd, like a lot of British bands in the late 1960s, were steeped in the blues. Their earliest records reflect this, to a point. After founding member Syd Barrett got lost in the haze of mental illness and David Gilmour took his place, the band began to change direction behind Roger Waters' leadership, offering up music that was at once simple and complex, hard and spacey, sweet and cynical. Navigating the breadth and depth of Pink Floyd's oeuvre is more than just difficult. Combined with the expectations of their fans, it enough to test any musician's mettle.

Some fans are obsessed. They want perfection. They want it to sound like the records, like they've got their headphones on. They're animals. Fans of Rush, for instance. have turned the Canadian trio into a band that is a tribute of itself. People in the audience at a Rush show will know if Neil Peart so much as misses a drum fill. Pink Floyd fans are the same way. And the members of Pink Droyd are nothing if not huge Pink Floyd fans.

"We pride ourselves on knowing all of Floyd," Quandt said. "Somebody will start a song that may be a little deeper than others, and we have to know it cold. Daniel will go into some Syd Barrett song and we're all right there with him."

Quandt knows Floyd fans want to hear

# Right Where She Belongs

Already a natural performer as a kid growing up, Fort Wayne Youtheatre Executive Director Leslie Hormann had energy to spare and the creativity to write and direct plays which demonstrated her budding talents. By the time she reached third grade, it was clear she needed an outlet beyond her neighborhood.

"My teacher told my mother 'Get her in theater because she never shuts up. And she's always coming up with little plays and skits for everyone to do.' So that's when I started taking classes at Youtheatre. Then the directors were Janice McNellis and Larry Wardlaw, and I learned so much and had a great time."

Those classes lasted her through Harris Elementary School and Lane Middle School, but by the time she reached Snider she was ready to replace her Youtheatre classes with her own high school's plays. After high school and college, Hormann spent more than a decade teaching before her son was born

"When my boy came along, I decided not to teach full-time so I could spend time with him, but I kept my hand in it by teaching drama enrichment for Southwest Allen County Schools."

She also stayed active in the theater, and in a surprising turn of events one of those stage appearances at the Civic Theatre led to an offer to join the on-air staff of WXKE Rock 104 where, as Leslie Stone, she became a radio fixture.

"I was put on the morning show. At that time Buzz Maxwell had been put on the morning show and Doc West had been moved to middays, so for nine months I was the crazy sidekick, read the news and did funny little stories. But they brought Doc back to the mornings."

Thus a new favorite morning team was born. The pair worked together for 13 years, during which time Hormann says they forged a close relationship. When she received a call from Linda Ruffalo, director of development at IPFW and a board member of Fort Wayne Youtheatre, she decided it was time to move on to other things, however.

"My son was getting ready to leave for college, and he's my only child, so I was facing the whole empty nest thing. Then Linda Ruffalo called and said they were reorganizing at Youtheatre and would I be interested in coming in as the new executive director?

I was ready for a new challenge. With my son leaving, I had extra time on my hands, and obviously I had a passion and love for Youtheatre."

She accepted the position in June 2010 and quickly began revitalizing Youtheatre through a series of new projects which helped expand its reach into the community, chiefly providing youngsters in the area a taste of theater they might not otherwise not



have gotten.

"My first big project was to start Storybook Theatre, which is a traveling troupe that visits preschools, schools and libraries. It gives kids who haven't experienced theatre a chance to have it come to them, and it provides three benefits to Youtheatre. One, it's a great recruiting tool because kids see other kids up there singing and dancing and acting, and they think, 'Hey, I could do that.' Secondly, it provides free theater to the masses, and thirdly, we focus on literature-based shows and have 18 different tours we can offer that tie into their curriculum. We do anywhere between 55 and 85 of those shows in the region every year."

One of the perks of the job has been sharing a work relationship with Youtheatre's Artistic Director Harvey Cocks, who Hormann calls "the Lee Strasberg of Fort Wayne" and a personal mentor.

"He teaches the senior and junior high school students, and I learn so much from his example. He's so respectful of those students, and he has the best stories of anyone I know. He's 89 years old, and you would never know it because he stays so young and spry from working with these kids. He's taught me that if I want to stay young, keep working with kids because it's keeping me young."

Having already spent a good deal of time with young people as a teacher, Hormann has brought that academic mind set to Youtheatre's mission, looking for ways to expand upon its methods of teaching.

"My background has definitely helped in our governance because I have been able to set academic standards and an educational rationale so that when you talk to schools and organizations about our programs, they know we're legit. Theater is an academic area; it's not fluff."

In four years as executive director, Hormann has taken on a number of exciting projects, including the staging of *Anansi the Spider* which included the use of large puppets to augment the performances of her students. But she counts one experience as an early favorite.

"I think the highlight so far has been the collaboration with IPFW on *Oliver!* and the opportunity to have our kids learning from the 'big kids' who were such great mentors and taught the littler kids so much. And that experience provided a template for doing those kinds of collaborations so that we were able to collaborate with [University of] Saint Francis this year [on *Willy Wonka and the Chocolate Factory*].

"We've also grown our outreach so much and have worked with the Boys & Girls Clubs of Fort Wayne, the Fort Wayne Urban League, Parks & Rec. Those are the things I'm most proud of – having that kind of community input and watching our reach in the community grow. And now that we have this great new black box theatre across the street, it gives us a whole new venue and so many new possibilities."

Hormann still keeps active in radio, continuing to host her Sunday morning community affairs show, *Closer Look*, but most of her heart and energy is devoted to Fort Wayne Youtheatre. Although she doesn't anticipate she, like Cocks, will still be working at Youtheatre when she's 89s, she does plan to keep working with young students who are anxious to share her love of the theatre.

"I'll always be working with kids, always be working in the theater or going to schools and reading in the classrooms. I'm already planning two years out for Youtheatre and have no plans to stop."

the hits as well as the more obscure tunes. So "Money," "Another Brick in the Wall," "Have a Cigar" and "Time," among others, are almost certainties. But it's all fair game. This time around the fun for Quandt has been adding the strings to the mix.

"Roger Waters, of course, wrote his own orchestration," Quandt said. "We have a five-piece string section – two cellos, two violins

and a viola – that has been very involved, very intense. They've rewritten songs that lend themselves to a string section. But it will still be Pink Floyd."

Fans may have their demands and obsessive ears, but it's the band that makes the music. And in the end it's always up to the

"One of the things about Pink Floyd is

they always delivered music they thought was good," Quandt said. "They tried to deliver music they liked. And they invented songs live. *Animals*, the whole album, was created and sculpted live. I love hearing people tell me what Pink Floyd means to them. How emotional and cerebral the music is. It just transcends so many genres. From the beginning to the end of the catalog."

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#### **Dum Dum Girls**

Too True

No, the Dum Dum Girls didn't take their name from the sucker, but their sweet indie pop nature becomes more apparent with each successive release. For six years, Dee Dee has remained solely responsible for the group's output, and while her three full-lengths and EPs consistently hinted at great-



ness, she only flirts with the notion of finally releasing an all-killer, no-filler album. To those who argue that the EPs capture the Dum Dum Girls' appeal more effectively, the brevity of *Too True* would suggest distilled greatness, but instead resembles hesitation to go in for the kill.

It's difficult to determine if *Too True* lives up to its full potential when the straightforward style of composition never jumps out at you in a desperate attempt to impress. It's compelling music to follow, with highlights that stand as some of the best music indie pop has to offer right now. There are times when the cooperation of song and production succeeds with awesome results like "Lost Boys and Girls Club" and "Rimbauld Eyes." Better yet, these particular songs are spaced nicely so that the surrounding tracks work to support them. "Evil Blooms" is an enticing primer for "Rimbauld Eyes," and "In the Wake of You" is the pre-game for the sonic high of "Lost Boys and Girls Club."

When you think of all the artists who are currently or have ever been affiliated with the Sub Pop label (Soundgarden, the Shins, Fleet Foxes and, yes, Nirvana) you realize that the Dum Dum Girls fit right in with their respectable peers and alumni. This also means that in order to distinguish themselves from not only their Sub Pop competition, but the rest of the indie pop clique, the Dum Dum Girls need to be greater than the sum of their influences. This formula of the Jesus & Mary Chain meets the Smiths meets Slowdive does work for DDG, but more often than not it saddles their progress with predictability. For example, try listening to the opening riff of "Little Minx" without thinking of Sabbath's "Paranoid." (I know I can't be the only one.)

Weirdly enough, consistency ends up being the main drawback to *Too True* and DDG's previous works, even though it's also what creates their appeal and maintains the band's fanbase. Most people don't want every artist to constantly challenge their tastes and capacity for experimentation. There's nothing wrong with wanting to chill out to pop music; that's why it exists. A good percentage of bands, pop or not, don't even last six years, so what's the harm in suggesting that the Dum Dum Girls are due for challenging their audience? *Too True* really is too good to not want to see them succeed with a surprising new direction. #### The War on Drugs

Lost in the Dream

The War On Drugs' Lost In The Dream is a reminder of a time when artists like Tom Petty, Bruce Springsteen, U2 and Dire Straits dominated the Top 40. It's a reminder that pop songs were actually written by the performers of said songs. Adam Granduciel and The War On Drugs have written an album filled with



massive songs that could've been huge hits 30 years ago. The 80s may be dead, but Granduciel didn't get the memo.

"Red Eyes" is just ridiculously great. It's got the feeling of Bruce Springsteen on a good day – all driving beats and pop bombast not seen since Bono used to dance with fans in front of the stage. I know the Springsteen connection has been mentioned ad nauseam, but I'd be remiss if I didn't say listening to "Red Eyes" doesn't take me back to 1984 and watching Bruce dance on stage with a then unknown Courtney Cox. Actually, this whole album takes me back to being a kid and taking trips into town with my mom and on a 20-minute drive hearing a handful of songs now deemed as "classics" on pop radio by artists now considered "legendary." Turn on the radio on your ride home from work today. Tell me if any one of those singers you hear will be deemed as classics or legends 30 years from now. Hell, how many of them actually wrote the song they're singing? Those numbers will be small.

#### BACKTRACKS

#### **Wilson Pickett**

The Exciting Wilson Pickett (1966)

If James Brown was the Godfather of Soul, Wilson Pickett was a very close uncle. This record has everything you need to absorb the sweet soul, and rhythm & blues of the mid 60s. With classics like "Land of 1,000 Dances," "Barefootin" and



"Mercy, Mercy" on side one, it's hard to imagine that this isn't even the "good" stuff. With a band of fantastic Memphis musicians behind him (mostly from the Stax studio), Pickett could make you dance and cry on the same album, and his rich voice was basically another instrument.

"In The Midnight Hour" may be his most recognizable song over his nearly four-decade run, but this record also had bright moments in the brassy "Danger Zone" and the soulful strut of "Ninety-Nine And A Half." "It's All Over" has a gospel vibe and fantastic backing vocals, and the release closes with a cover of Bobby Womack's "She's So Good To Me."

If you settle for a greatest hits-type package of Pickett's career, you are missing out on one of the best records from the 60s. Start with this one, and work your way up through 1978's *Funky Situation*. Listening to this almost 50-year-old record is just another reminder that today's artists have no clue what soul music really is.

Born in Alabama but raised in Detroit, Pickett had the blues and soul in his blood, but his lifestyle (and probably his success) only got him into trouble. Nonetheless, his legacy as a singer/songwriter should always be recognized as one of the greatest. Pickett died in 2006 at the age of 64.

Fun Fact: "In The Midnight Hour" was written by Pickett and Steve Cropper in Memphis at the Lorraine Motel, the place Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. took his last breath three years later. (Dennis Donahue)

The War On Drugs have tapped into that classic vein. There's no pretension, no irony, no sly little grin. Here we have Granduciel creating sonic journeys that aren't "of the time." They're timeless. It only took one listen to "Suffering" and that Leslie speaker guitar solo for me to realize that Granduciel is the real deal. Someone who writes a song as sublime and beautiful as that song isn't trying to cop a feel and run. He's in this for the long haul.

There's so much to love about this album. I can't get into the lyrics, as I haven't quite broke the code, as they say. The words are hazy and somewhat muddled by Granduciel's delivery, but I know they're important. Even on the album's liner notes, they're nearly illegible, so I just go with how he says them more than what they really are. The music here is more than enough to win you over.

"An Ocean In Between The Waves" sounds like Petty's "Running Down A Dream" with Mark Knopfler on lead guitar. It's an epic jame When the drums kick in over the drum machine, you feel like you're shifting into sixth gear and hyper speed. "Disappearing" sounds like a lost collaboration between Bob Dylan and Dire Straits, or some artist who never existed except in my mind. A song like "Disappearing" seems to have existed in my subconscious for 30 years, heard on so many bus rides and car rides in dreams. "Eyes To The Wind," the eerie instrumental "The Haunting Idle" and "Burning" all float along like some psychedelic radio station from my childhood. These songs feel old and worn-in, comfortable and reassuring to me. "Suffering" is one of those songs that I'd keep turning my lousy little bedroom radio up to until the speaker would give. "Lost In The Dream" and "In Reverse" bring back some of that ambient noise and lilting melancholy that made Slave Ambient one 2011's best albums.

This album hits me on a much deeper level than most. It brings up memories of childhood, some things that happened and some that didn't. A childhood that exists in a random car ride with a random radio station. Songs that weren't ever hits but should've been hits, if this were a fair and just world. Granduciel and The War On Drugs have given us their version of "Morning in America," regardless of how dark it may be outside the window. (John Hubner)

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# Nickel, MABC Celebrating in April

A man faces many choices in life: draft or bottle, blonde or brunette and how he wants his music. Deciding between country and rock or Roth and Hagar is one thing, but how you choose to listen to it is another. The easiest thing to do these days is download your favorite tunes onto your mp3 player and play it through the crappy speakers of your iPod docking station. Have our lives become so fast-paced that we can't sit down and listen to an entire album or CD anymore? Are the days gone of enjoying the smell of a fresh new cassette or listening to an album or CD while enjoying the creative artwork and liner notes that come with it?

No matter what you think, there's always going to be a market for a physical piece of music. Just like any piece of art, it becomes a collector's item that conntects artists and fans. While stores like Best Buy may not have gotten that memo (Have you looked for the CD aisle there lately?), Fort Wayne is blessed to still have record stores to take care of our needs.

Who doesn't enjoy a record store experience: opium incense filtering through the air, blacklight posters on the wall, a hippie-type dude behind the counter and the sounds of some obscure music blaring throughout the store? Okay, maybe they're not all like that, but a good number of them are. When I was growing up, the man behind the counter at those stores was my source for all things music. This was before the internet and the rock mags on the shelves were filled with monthold news, but the dude at the store always had the lowdown with all the cool new music and what acts were coming to town.

Here in the Fort, one of those guys was none other than Bob Roets, owner of Wooden Nickel for the past 32 years. Roets can tell you all about the importance of record stores and the ups and downs that they've all encountered.

"I had six stores here in town in 1998, the same year the whole downloading and Napster ordeal began. Soon after, I had to make the decision to close half of the stores, as did many others across the country," Roets told me. With people getting free music while sitting on their couch, you can imagine what it did to these stores. Roets feels a big part of the reason that many record stores still survive today is the resurgence of vinyl, that and the fact that many large retailers no longer stock CDs.

"With the sales of vinyl up, we're on our way back," Roets said. One secret to his success is Wooden Nickel's \$5 CD bin featuring many great rock and classic rock titles. Another boost has come from the annual Record Store Day held the third Saturday in

April. Record Store Day celebrates the culture of independently owned record stores across the world. On Saturday, April 19, all three Wooden Nickel stores will be taking part in the seventh annual event that will feature many exclusive releases, 600 goodie bags, giveaways (including a Joe Bonamassa-autographed guitar) and, of course, live music. Roets will be staggering the opening times for his locations so that music lovers will have more opportunities to snag what they want. 





Get your tickets before April 30 and the band will send you a limited edition poster for being an "early bird."

*Nashville* is a TV show that started out fairly strong in the storyline department but since the end of the first year has become pretty nondescript. The music has remained strong, however, and now some of the cast is going out on a grueling three-city tour to present that music to the masses in a live setting. Main stars Connie Britton and Hayden Panettiere won't be on the tour, but some of the other actors will be when they hit the stage at Joe's Bar in Chicago April 25. By no mere coincidence, a fourth *Nashville* soundtrack is due out May 6.

# Bateman Plays Not So Bad in NSFW Bad Words

In a promo clip for Captain America: The Winter Soldier one do-gooding comic book hero asks another, "How do you tell the good guys from the bad guys?" The answer: "If they are shooting at you, they're bad guys." That's a fine formula for the simple, exaggerated world of action movies. In the very funny and politically incorrect new film Bad Words, the bad guy comes to the party with insults, vulgarity and profanity which he sprays like machine gun fire at all who get in his way. And though the world is changing – sticks and stones still break bones, but words can be terribly hurtful as well - who are the real bad guys?

Bad Words is Jason Bateman's directorial debut, and he has cast himself as Guy Trilby, a 40-year-old misanthrope who is taking his revenge on the world in an absurd campaign to win the Golden Quill National Spelling Bee. We meet Guy in a qualifying bee in Columbus, Ohio. He insults and berates fellow spellers, parents and bee officials, but he has done his research. The rules of the contest make no mention of age. They stipulate that you cannot participate if you have completed the eighth grade. Guy dropped out of school before finishing the eighth grade, so he's in on a technical-

Guy has also carefully prepared by finding a national media sponsor, something every participant must have to be part of the competition. For Guy, the sponsor is an internet news service which has picked up the expense of Guy's participation. Kathryn Hahn plays Jenny, the reporter from the service assigned to be his babysitter for the duration. What they want, in exchange for their support, is the story of why Guy wants to win the championship.

A grown man who has studied and who is taking leave from his job as a proofreader (of warranties, no less!) has little trouble winning qualifying rounds for the championship in beautiful Pasadena. On his flight west, he is accosted by Chaitanya Chopra, the almost criminally cute Rohan Chand. Chaitanya knows who Guy is and keeps chatting him up despite a string of insults and rebuffs. When Guy tells him to



shut his "curry hole," Chaitanya relents, at least for the duration of the flight.

Once at the championship, the stakes and the conflicts escalate. The parents and the participants get a little crazier. So does Guy. For fun, Allison Janney is on hand to play the director of the bee, Dr. Bernice Deagan. She's devoted her adult life to the bee after being a young spelling champion transformed her life, so she hates Guy and his disrespectful attitude. Playing a tough old bat in a bad wig, she's still fun

Dr. Deagan is especially worried about the situation because this is the first year that the championship rounds are going to be broadcast on national television. The founder of the bee, Dr. Bowman (Phlip Baker Hall), is also quite disgusted by Guy's efforts to make a mockery of his life's work and threatens Guy.

Beyond this setup, I hate to say too much more about what happens. Bad Words talks tough - and dirty, really dirty, all the way through - but the soft heart and happy ending are inevitable once Rohan Chand's insanely adorable, nerdy persona enters the picture. I can't claim to know much about the tastes of 10-year-old boy braniacs, but I imagine that Bad Words is a download any precocious kid will enjoy. Parents, don't take the kids. The R rating isn't borderline. In addition to bad language, there are odd sexual encounters.

But working from a sharp, juicy script by Andrew Dodge, Bateman's choices as actor and director here are a delight. Bad Words has a unique tone and rhythm, and while you can see the happy ending coming, the experience is bumpy and pleasurable.

Though Bateman is known for roles as a nice or at least

harmless guy, Guy isn't the baddest guy he's played. In Juno he plays a guy so stuck in adolescence that he runs away fast from responsibility after making a big mess. Finding the bad guy in Bad Words got me thinking about

the best movie description of the devil in movies. It comes from Broadcast News. The complaint describes a reporter, but it works in broader context very well: "What do you think the Devil is going to look like if he's around? ... Nobody is going to be taken in by a guy with a long, red, pointy tail! ... He will be attractive! He'll be nice and helpful. He'll get a job where he influences a great God-fearing nation. He'll never do an evil thing! He'll never deliberately hurt a living thing ... he will just bit by bit lower our standards where they are important. Just a tiny little bit. Just coax along flash over substance. Just a tiny little bit. And he'll talk about all of us really being salesmen. And he'll get all the great women."

As relentless and mean as Guy is, he just doesn't fit the bill of a dastardly dude. Throughout Bad Words he narrates all of his shortcomings, but in his quest for what turns out to be revenge, he runs out of anger. Real bad guys are much sadder characters than Guy.

Throughout Bad Words Guy is trying to get Chaitanya to use bad words, but Chaitanya loves words so much he just doesn't want to cheapen the use of them. When he finally does swear, it is a giggle, but not a defeat. Chaitanya is the conqueror between him and Guy. In their "meet cute" on the plane, Chaitanya has rhapsodized about his favorite word, subjugate. With a favorite word like subjugate, Guy is a goner from the get-go, and I happily fell in line as well.

P.S. Just wanted to give a big thank you to the cute young couple who cheerfully gave me a jump start in the rain after I left the doors locked and the car lights on during the movie. They were on their way in to see *Noah* and laughed off my offer to buy them tickets or popcorn. Grateful thanks for the

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# Capt. America Trumps *Noah*

Tops at the Box: The Russo Brothers new flick, Captain America: The Winter Soldier, took the No. 1 spot at the U.S. box office last weekend, selling a stellar \$96 million over its first three days of release. Add to that another \$207 million abroad and Marvel Comics has yet another major superhero hit on its hands. The film, starring limp noodle Chris Evans, Scarlett Johansson, Samuel L. Jackson, Robert Redford, Anthony Mackie and several other notable talents, has been getting solid reviews. 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# Post-Shining Stress Disorder

Doctor Sleep by Stephen King, Scribner, 2013

Stephen King has said that he decided to revisit Danny Torrance, a character from The Shining, nearly four decades after the publication of the original novel because he was curious how Danny would have coped with life after the horrific experiences of The Shining. The resulting sequel novel, Doctor Sleep, is very clearly an exploration of Danny's post-traumatic coping rather than an attempt to recapture the atmospheric creepiness of the original novel. The Shining is widely considered to be one of King's best books, and although Doctor Sleep has moments of effective scariness, it's unlikely to make the short list of the author's most successful projects.

Doctor Sleep opens with a prologue that begins not long after the events of The Shining. Danny is living with his mother in Florida, and he's dealing with lingering ghosts that haunted him - and drove his father insane - when the Torrance family spent their disastrous winter at the Overlook Hotel in Colorado. The boy is still seeing dead people, and they're getting more threatening all the time. Danny gets a visit from Dick Hallorann, the hotel cook who had recognized Danny's psychic gifts and helped him to survive at the Overlook, and Hallorann gives Danny some advice about how to get on with his

In the prologue we also get a glimpse of the True Knot, a group of energy vampires who are traveling around the country in RVs, disguised as old people and looking for psychic children to eat.

As Danny grows older, he finds it more and more difficult to deal with his past and his powers, and he descends into an abyss of alcoholism, poverty and violence. He eventually hits bottom, and soon after he finds himself in a little town in New Hampshire where he begins to turn his life around. He takes a job in a hospice and learns how to use his psychic powers to help others (the book's title comes from Danny's ability to

comfort terminally ill patients as they're dying).

Eventually, too, Danny comes into contact with Abra, a young girl whose psychic powers are even greater than his own. As the triangle is set up – Abra, the powerful kid; Danny, Abra's mentor and protector; and the True Knot, the malevolent force out to destroy Abra – the structure of the novel's ultimate large-scale conflict, the stuff of the typical King novel, becomes obvious.

King is quick to head off criticisms about the story's similarity to other pop-culture tropes. He has his characters mention *The Sixth Sense* and *Twilight* so we know that he recognizes the parallels as much as we do, but the disclaimers are only partially convincing. Even if King says that the True Knot are not like the *Twilight* vampires, they really are, and the ghost-seeing kids are very much *Sixth Sense*-

ish. But in King's defense, he helped to create the modern pop vampire a long, long time ago in *Salem's Lot*, and Danny Torrance saw dead people decades before M. Night Shyamalan came up with the idea. What's harder to dismiss is the story's similarity to King's own previous work. The psychic kids and the people who are out to get them have appeared before, in *Carrie* and *Firestarter*, and Abra is not at all a fresh character.

The book that *Doctor Sleep* doesn't resemble, though, is *The Shining*. That book's success lay in its amazingly creepy setting, the empty old hotel buried in snow high up in the mountain wilderness. The book's feeling of isolation was overwhelming, and it set the stage perfectly for its characters' descent into madness. King has always

been at his best when he confines his horror stories to a small scale - the eerie small town of It, the car and barnyard of Cujo, the lonely farmhouse of Pet Semetary. He's less consistently successful when he lets his stories ramble, and that's what he does here. We're given no ominous set pieces in which to immerse ourselves. Danny and Abra languish in unremarkable small towns - not even the same small town - and the True Knot wander all over the place, never once visiting anywhere compelling. By the time the action shifts to Colorado, it's too late.

In Doctor Sleep, King tries to address some very serious issues - addiction, child abuse, moral responsibility, survivor guilt - and that's a noble thing to do. In spots, the novel flirts with the kind of exploration of everyday humanity that King, on his best days, can do very well. The book is never, however, very scary, and because of that, it's not a very satisfying successor to The Shining.

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
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
