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

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- Cover Story • American Idiot------A Green Day on Broadway

In addition to the usual list of musical classics which fill Broadway theatres each season - from the traditional charm of Rodgers & Hammerstein to edgier fare like Chicago and Cabaret - there has been a steady

stream of productions to win the hearts of baby boomers, shows with familiar, well-established songs known long before they took the Broadway stage. Everyone from Pete Townshend to Abba have found new audiences and stretched the boundaries of their solid fan base by reinterpreting their music for a new medium.

A less likely entrant to that club has been 1990s juggernaut Green Day. Although their concept album American Idiot may have reminded some of

The Who's similar excursions into musical narrative with Tommy and Quadrophenia, it may not have occurred to

the band's fans that a trip to Broadway was part of Green Day leader Billie Joe Armstrong's career path. Six years after American Idiot was first released as

an album, the show hit Broadway in 2010, bringing it with it other Green Day songs to round out the program.

Now touring the country, American Idiot comes to the Embassy's Broadway series next week, bringing with it a young and talented cast which includes newcomer Michael Pilato in the role of Favorite Son. Less than one year removed from college graduation, Pilato has been steadily employed since he finished school in May, a boon for anyone in the entertainment industry. His road to the stage began during a visit with family in Long Island, where the Florida resident had his first taste of the arts.

"I was 11 years old, and I was visiting family and there was an arts day camp where they did arts and crafts and music. They also had an improv class which I took and generally thought I was pretty funny in it. So when I got home, I asked my parents to find something like that for me, and they found a summer theater camp.'

Pilato was also active in sports and enjoyed both hobbies through middle school, but he knew he eventually had to make a choice. By his freshman year of high school, he heard of a program that would chart the course for his further education and career.

"One of the directors at the arts camp was the head of a performing arts program at a magnet school where I could focus on theatre, and he encouraged me to audition. So at the end of my freshman year, I auditioned

and got a full ride to finish high school there. I knew then it was time to take it more seriously."

As he began to look for college programs where he could continue the work already started in Fort Lauderdale, he knew he wanted a change from his life in Florida. He researched various schools and their teaching philosophies while watching videos which showed their programs in action. He found himself drawn to Penn State University where he also knew a friend already in the program.

"I saw that the kids that went there were doing very well professionally, and it was a great program and a great community.'

Shortly after graduating last spring, Pilato found work in Joseph and the Amazing Technicolor Dreamcoat at the Fulton Opera House in Lancaster, Pennsylvania before securing his role in American Idiot which began just days after he finished at Fulton. Having been with the show since September, and signed for the tour through May, Pilato has been able to work steadily his first full year out of school. He has also been able to take advantage of what his Penn State professors called his "contemporary rock" voice for the part. While he says he's well familiar with more traditional musicals through his college experiences, he feels an affinity for the newer shows like Joseph and American Idiot.

"I like being in shows that are accessible

to today's audiences. I love traditional pieces and in school became very familiar with shows like Carousel and South Pacific, and those shows were very bold in their own way when they came out. But I like being able to perform in shows that resonate with contemporary audiences."

Pilato is one of three Penn State grads in the current American Idiot cast, and the friend who helped inspire him to attend the college toured with the show last year, providing him with great familiarity with

the show and the songs.


"I think I saw the show about 13 times when she was in it, and so I was intimately familiar with all of it. I always liked Green Day and knew all the songs from American Idiot, but being in the show has definitely given me a new appreciation for Billie Joe's music.

Having spent his first year on the road, Pilato says he loves the travel aspect of his current gig, taking advantage of the opportunity to see the world.


"I really hadn't seen anything other than Pennsylvania since I left home, so this has been great for me. We've been to Midland, Texas and Portland, Oregon, Washington state and the Midwest. We all like to sample the local foods and beers wherever we go, and my understanding of the world has been expanding a lot through this experience. It's a great time in my life to be able to do this. and I wouldn't mind doing more of it in the future."

Of course, what he does in the future has yet to be determined. Pilato finishes the show's run on May 25, and from there he plans to move from Florida to New York City to allow for more auditioning. It's an uncertain life, but he's ready to take the chance.

"It's the life of an actor, you just have to hope that your next job will come soon. I know I've been very lucky so far. It doesn't always go with way for all of us, and it won't always go this way for me in the future. But I'll just keep auditioning for new projects and hold on to the excitement that I've always had for it."

If you lay out the two stages of Chris Lashua's career in straight-forward terms, without explanation, the connection between them probably doesn't seem very obvious. He started out as a freestyle BMX competitor with corporate sponsorship from a bicycle manufacturer and his face on BMX

magazine covers. These days he's a stage performer and acrobat who puts on shows with symphony orchestras. The transition from extreme sports to concert halls

makes more sense when you look at Lashua's career as an evolution; that's when it all works together as logically as the machines that are a part of his shows.

In the 1980s, Lashua was living in Boston and working as part of the Mountain Dew GT Trick Team, a touring freestyle BMX group that put on shows around the Northeast. Eventually, Nashua bought the team from its founder, Rick Stebenne, and changed its name. The new name, the Mountain Dew Freestyle Performance Team, was indicative of the new emphasis that Lashua wanted to bring to his BMX work: he wanted to be a performer more than a competitor.

Lashua's team toured broadly, not just in the Northeast and not just in the United States, but eventually, in the early 90s, it became much harder to make a living in freestyle BMX. Lashua was finishing college and looking for new gigs, so when Stebenne put him in touch with Tim Holst of the Ringling Bros. circus, Lashua had an open mind. Holst liked the idea of adding a bike act to his circus, and he sent Lashua and his team to a two-week festival in China. That's where the shift in Lashua's career began.

In China, Lashua met one of the founders of Cirque du Soleil. The now-famous performing group was new and relatively unknown back then, but Lashua loved the idea of their performance-oriented acrobat-

as part of a bike act, and when that gig was done, he wanted more. He spent a year working as a stage technician for the group in Las Vegas, and at the same time he started to spend less time on his bike and more time on a new acrobatic apparatus: the German Wheel, a big steel wheel in which an acrobat twirls and spins on stage.

"It was familiar territory and has a feeling similar to biking or skating," Lashua told ESPN. "It is a German gym-nastic discipline, but I blended my bike/street style

with the technical wheel training and found my way back onto the stage as the opening act of Cirque du Soleil's touring show Quidam?

Lashua's part in Quidam continued for five years, until 2000, and during that time he honed his traditional skills in the German Wheel, but he also began to innovate. He built a new contraption, a cradle that held the wheel so he could spin in place. Then he started adding things to the machine - gears, levers, cranks, a winch - that allowed him to interact with other performers while he was in the wheel.

As Lashua developed a new kind of performance aesthetic, he began to see differences between what he wanted to do and what Cirque du Soleil was doing. He appreciated what Soleil had accomplished, and he was glad to be a part of it, but he started to understand that he needed to form his own group.

'Touring with Cirque was pretty cushy," he says. "They really know how to take care of their people. They created a whole new art form and made it possible for us at Cirque Mechanics to do what we do. They raised people's expectations of what circus can be, and it was great to be part of that."

The biggest difference he saw between

If you were asked to write up a short bio on a man who calls himself a storyteller, you would not expect that storyteller to have racked up a list of injuries that would make a pro football player blush. Multiple concus-

sions, broken teeth, shattered bones, lacerations, a loppedoff ear. Physical damage of this sort is not the usual bullet list of accomplishments you associate with your typical storyteller. Then again, Mick Foley is not your typical storyteller.

Foley is a three-time World Wrestling Federation champion who performed under the names Mankind and Cactus Jack, among others. He is also a New York Times bestselling author, actor, voice actor and activist. The first two volumes of his memoirs each sat atop the bestsellers list in the early oughts. He writes novels and children's books. Over the past few years he has taken his love of storytelling on the road. That road brings Foley on Wednesday, April 23 to Snickerz Comedy Club in Fort Wayne. His show, Tales

from Wrestling Past, has won rave reviews for it's humor, wildness and warmth.

Foley will tell you he's always been a storyteller. He sees little difference in his work in professional wrestling and his

spoken word performances.

"It's just another way of telling stories," he said in a phone interview from hotel room in Baltimore. "Connecting to an audience in any way is fun."

The elaborate storylines in professional wrestling are acted out physically and with psychology facial expressions, Foley said. Professional wrestling has drama, intrigue, betrayal, comedy, mystery and triumph. Oh. There's action, too. Lots of action.


Foley was born in Bloomington, Indinana in 1965 and moved with his family to Long Island, New York when he was very young. He wrestled in high school, and after a trip to Madison Square Garden to watch a pro wrestling show he decided to make a career in the sport.

After a few years of training during college, Foley started touring on the independent circuit. His intelligence, affability, good looks (he looks like a cross between a hefty Jim Morrison, Jerry Garcia with the glasses and a young Santa Claus) and dedication to providing entertainment soon caught the eye of bigger promoters. In 1996 he joined the

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WWF and created the character Mankind, a character inspired by Mary Shelly's Frankenstein and the music of Tori Amos. His three WWF championships came in the late 1990s.

Around that time, Foley began writing the first volume of his memoirs. Without a

ghostwriter or the benefit of a computer, Foley scratched out some 800 pages of longhand in a matter of weeks. Called

Have a Nice Day, his story of life in the ring went on to top the Times bestseller list for non-fiction. The second volume, called Foley is Good: And the Real World is Faker than Wrestling, soared to the top of the list as well. A third and fourth volume followed. Foley has also written four children's books, the most recent being 2012's A Most Mizerable Christmas, which features characters based on friends from his professional wrestling days, and two novels.

Foley does not like to be called a "standup comedian." In a video on his Youtube channel, he said he tried telling jokes for a while but realized he had a trove of material from his personal and professional life that allowed him to be more natural - and funnier - in his show. The transition from pro wrestler to author to live storytelling came easily. For a time he toured colleges across the country giving talks at places like MIT, Syracuse University, Notre Dame and University of Miami.

"I've had a lot of practice with a micro-

"I think I came out of the womb singing but can't swear to it," says Maggie Kole Hunter. "Actually I knew I wanted to be an actor from a very early age.'

She was a natural actor.

"I was very curious and always making up stories and playing and becoming different characters," she says. "I loved books and invented worlds and creatures in my mind. I always knew I would be an actor and creator of characters."

Hunter drew inspiration from screen legends such as Carole Lombard, Greta Garbo, Bette Davis and Ingrid Bergman. But one actor made a lasting, and more personal, impression on her.

She saw James Earl Jones on Broadway in The Great White Hope and was not only moved by his performance but by his generosity with her high school group who had the opportunity to meet him after the show.

"I was expecting a larger than life person," she says. "Actually, he was very soft spoken and kind. I will always remember, no matter what I achieve in this business, to always take the time with others. It was magical!'

She also admires Meryl Streep for her ability to balance a film career with family and Olympia Dukakis who was "discovered" later in her life.

Hunter performed in her first major production - an Irish play called The Far Off Hills - while a sophomore in high school. "It was my first big production and I loved every minute of it," she says. "It was a great experience and one that set me on the path to the theatre.'

She went on to earn her BFA at Kent State University and then moved to New York to work as a professional actor. "I did quite well," she says, "but now I'm a little older and a little wiser and much more daring than when I was younger."

In 1996, she and her husband Michael moved to Fort Wayne where they raised their sons Brett and Colin.

Brett has followed in her theatrical footsteps. "He's in New York City living the actor's life," she says. "He is doing well and is loving every minute. He is gradually getting roles and is working at a restaurant that is called the West End Café, which is a favorite hang-out for producers, directors, agents and actors.'

Her other son, Colin, is a project engineer for a construction company in Indianapolis. "Truth be told," she says, "Colin was in show choir during high school and is an amazing dancer. He is very artistic and creative."

Hunter currently works as the interim director of personal and professional development in the IPFW Division of Continuing Studies. "Our department handles all of the non-credit courses for the university," she says.

She is also the head speech coach at

South Side High School and was the drama director and speech coach for the nowclosed Elmhurst High School. She does drama ministry for a local church and coaches and mentors high school students for college theater auditions.

She's Only Acting Naturally

Hunter has performed with most of the theaters in Fort Wayne but has a special place in her heart for the IPFW Department of Theatre. "I love working with the



students," she says. "I love their energy and exuberance. I also love the fact that I can be a mentor to the next generation of actors."

She is currently in her seventh IPFW production, Into the Woods. Previous shows include Hot l Baltimore, The Music Man, Talking With and last year's collaboration with the Fort Wayne Youtheatre, Oliver!

Hunter's love of education as well as her childhood love of books and creating characters carries over into her theater work. She conducts extensive research into the era in which a play takes place and creates a back story for every character she plays.

Her ability to create characters can only go so far, however, something she learned as a very young actor. She was appearing in a Moliere play and inadvertently skipped a page and a half of dialogue. "You can't make up Moliere on the spot," she says. "I blanked and couldn't think of anything else but to leave. So I said adieu to [my scene mate] and left the stage.'

Fortunately for everyone involved, the next actor to enter was already waiting in the wing, so the play went on with a minimum of awkwardness. "We had a good laugh over it [later]," she says, "but at the time it seemed hours passed on stage."

Her easy sense of humor makes her a fan of comedy, particular physical comedy. "I was never the ingénue," she says. "I was always the ingénue's best friend or the sidekick. Character roles. That has always been my niche."

She also acknowledges the serious side of her nature and her love of playing drama. "It's been a while since I have done drama, but it's the other side of the coin for me," she says. "Drama helps me grow and provides the opportunity to show a character's vulnerability to an audience."

To Hunter, vulnerability is an important tool in communicating with the audience. "It's about giving back," she says. "Self-doubt can be my enemy but it's not about me - it's about the audience who came to be entertained, or to forget for a while what is going on in their world or the world around them."

She is thankful for her God-given talent but is also grateful for having worked with some outstanding direc-

"The best director I worked with was Dennis Deal in Ohio," she says. "He cast me in a role [in a campy musical comedy he wrote] that would redefine me as an actor. His belief in my [comedic] talent was so strong that I believed and came out of my comfort zone. I will always be thankful to Denny."

Actors who "like to play and come prepared to play" help bring out her best on stage as well.

"I believe strongly in the creative collaborative process. It is the best moment in rehearsal when you and another actor hit that 'aha jolt.' It brings you to another level, and the commitment is so strong within that moment with the other person it's like heaven."

On the other hand, actors who lack commitment frustrate her.

"They act because it is an egotistical high," she says. "I have worked with several professionals [who feel that] is all about them and not the other professionals on the stage. That type of behavior is disrespectful.

As for herself, she makes every attempt to have fun, to graciously give back to her fellow actors and to share her experience in creating an entertaining, thought-provoking show for the audience.

Right now she is putting her musical experience to the test with Into the Woods at IPFW. "You either love Sondheim or you hate him," she says. "There is no in between. I happen to love him. All of his songs tell incredible stories of love, loss, loneliness, hope, salvation, life and relationships. And that can all be in one musical."

Of all the roles she has already performed, she would love the opportunity to reprise the role of Mama Rose in Gypsy (which features lyrics by Sondheim).

"I'd also love to do August: Osage County," she says, "or a Tennessee Williams play. More Shakespeare. And really anything, be it musical, comedy, or drama that this old soul can do until she can't do it no more."

Streetlamps for Spotlights Sound and Color

The first thing you notice as you listen to Streetlamps for Spotlights full-length debut, *Sound and Color*, is how much these guys love texture. Sometimes it's subtle, but these textural layers are always present in the songs. Whether it's in Jason Davis' guitar work with jagged punches of riffs and noise, or in Jay Hackbush's solid bass lines keeping things afloat, or Ryan

Holquist's pounding drums going from solid rhythms to full on post-punk explosions (sometimes in the same song), the textures are there.

As well as being the six-string guru of SfS, Davis sings over these aural explosions, sometimes like a man on a mission and sometimes like a man looking hopelessly for answers – always, though, with a purpose. *Sound and Color* is part post-punk manifesto and part grizzled, razor wire pop record. Several singles over the last few years have built up to this statement of musical authority, and Streetlamps for Spotlights are ready for their close-up.

This debut makes it perfectly clear that Davis, Hackbush and Holquist are a force to be reckoned with. "Ready Already" opens the album like an explosion of conviction. You can almost see the spittle flying in the air as Davis sings, "Are you ready already?!" Musically, this is a barbed-wire slash of a song, with noise that would make Sonic Youth jealous. But then gears shift in the great "Right Back," which turns the previous angst in the album opener into an alternative pop gem. The previously mentioned textures? Yeah, they're all over this one. "Someday" sounds like Green Mind-era Dino Jr., especially in Davis' guitar work. Hackbush and Holquist give SfS that very unique, almost metal-like backbone, allowing Davis to keep things loose and spacey in the mid-section. "Call it Off" is just a scorcher, with some speaker-melting guitar and Holquist completely abusing the drums.

The truly unique thing about these guys is that they keep the mood just slightly off kilter. Just when you think a song is going to do one thing, it does something else. There's always this underlying dissonance in the music that keeps it from becoming, well, "average," I guess. There's some amazing interplay between these three players, and the songs benefit greatly from Davis' eschewed view of the universe. Take a track like "Walking," an at times eerie-sounding track that shows off a great balance between artistic reach and melodic presence. It satisfies all the senses. You don't get fluff from these guys. Then they follow "Walking" up with a bombastic track like "Don't Worry" which just straight up rocks. And "Damaged"? It wouldn't have sounded out of place on an early Cheap Trick record.

These three guys take their expansive set of influences and mesh them quite well, but they do so subtly enough that you can never quite put your finger on who a particular song sounds like. It just sounds like Streetlamps for Spotlights. "Lies" and the wonderful "New Year's Ball" won't be mistaken for anything but SfS songs. Title track and album closer "Sound and Color" leave us with these words, "Will we still be doing this when we are 60 / Same thing we've been doing since we were 16." It's a sentiment that could be taken more than one way.

At its core *Sound and Color* is about loss, the hurt of losing someone. But around that core is a noisy, jangly, jagged rock n' roll album that is one of the best to ever come out of Fort Wayne. The trio of Davis, Hackbush and Holquist swirl noise like Pollock dripped paint. It can be messy and sometimes abstract, but it's always quite wonderful. (*John Hubner*)

Black Label Society The Catacombs of the Black Vatican

When it comes to Black Label Society, the undisputed star of the show is main man Zakk Wylde's fretwork. Thunderous and commanding, and with dextrous leads, it's what's made them (and him) almost legendary in heavy metal circles.

There is another side of their music, however, that gets scant at-

Greedence Clearwater Revival *Green River* (1969)

Creedence Clearwater Revival released three albums in 1969, this being the second. I wasn't really a CCR fan until I moved to San Francisco in the late 80s and I discovered they actually hailed from the Bay Area (and not the south). *Green River* was Southern swamp roots rock and featured one of their biggest hits in "Bad Moon Rising." It was also the



in "Bad Moon Rising," It was also the band's first album to reach the top of the Billboard 200 chart.

Opening with the title track, you get unassuming guitars and gritty vocals from John Fogerty. "Commotion," which follows, describes the "noises" of world during the late 60s (religion, traffic, politics); "Tombstone Shadow" tells the tale of one man's destiny with bad luck. It is one of the better songs they ever recorded. Side one closes with the ballad "Wrote A Song For Everyone." It reminds me of something The Band could have produced. Yes, it's that good.

"Bad Moon Rising" kicks of side two, and goes right into the wonderful "Lodi." Both of these tracks still get played on classic rock/oldies stations because they epitomize the gritty CCR sound. "Cross-Tie Walker" sounds too much like "Lookin" Out My Back Door," and "Sinister Purpose" has a little Beatles vibe to it. It's not as if the record weakens, but 20 minutes in it just gets a little predictable. The album closes with Nappy Brown's "The Night Time Is The Right Time." You've heard Ray Charles and, probably, James Brown do this, but CCR nail it, and I remember again why I really dig this band.

Unfortunately, the band didn't get along. They had a problem with their record label and eventually broke up. Their last album, 1972's *Mardi Gras*, gave them one final hit with "Sweet Hitch-Hiker." (*Dennis Donahue*)

tention – namely, their rhythm section. BLS aren't exactly Funkadelic, but Wylde's heavy guitar is inevitably laid on top of a firmly swinging foundation, and that sets the band apart from many of their contemporaries. They're something of a throwback to 70s heavy metal when bands like Zeppelin or Deep Purple were expected to have a rocking rhythm section instead of the hit hard and fast approach more common today.

And while BLS' sound never changes radically over time, each album they release has different areas of emphasis. Their last true studio album, 2010's *Order of the Black*, was perhaps the hardest and heaviest of their career. Almost every track went over the top (even for BLS standards) with riff after hammering riff. With *Order* being the most recent studio release, it may not be a surprise that The *Catacombs of the Black Vatican* is comparatively more restrained.

Of course, "restraint" is a relative word when it comes to BLS. Restrained for them would be, well, nearly reckless abandon for most other band. But on *Catacombs* it's apparent from the get-go that Wylde wants to emphasize the band's mid-tempo grooving rock abilities. It's not until the fifth track (out of 11), "Heart of Darkness," that the band really opens up and cuts loose with a barn burner. The first four songs consist of three of the aforementioned mid-tempo heavy groovers and one ballad. The ballads on *Catacombs*, too, seem more soulful than those on *Order*, perhaps because they don't stand out in such stark contrast to the other tunes.

What emerges out of this is an album that seems back-loaded with its own heavy-hitters. It's something of a return to *Mafia*-era BLS, when their recordings were more varied affairs. Back in 2005, when *Mafia* was released, BLS were releasing about an album a year, meaning that fans didn't have to wait long for more of Wylde and Co.'s guitar heroics. The last two albums, however, have been released after four-year droughts. The long waiting period results in a heightened sense of expectation, one that *Order* mostly delivered on, being the sonic exclamation point that it was. And while it would be unfair to say that *Catacombs* is a disappointment, it doesn't quite hold up to the expectation that builds up after such a long lapse.

As an album, though, *Catacombs* can stand on its own two feet. It's more akin to the remainder of BLS's catalog than *Order* was, and it features no shortage of bona fide guitar heroics, something that is in short supply 30 some years after the 70s ended. (*Ryan Smith*)

his performance goals and those of Cirque du Soleil was the surreal vibe of Soleil's shows. Lashua wanted something that was more down to earth, in contrast to the fantasy of Soleil.

"We don't want to do that," he told HK magazine. "The fantasy style is very popular, but we wanted to find a way to do something that was in a real time and a real place - the 30s, in a factory, as opposed to a lyrical dream space."

Lashua's first machines were cobbled together from old bike parts that he found in his garage or in the trash, and everything had a gritty, vintage industrial feel. That aesthetic set the tone for the first show that he put together for his new group, Cirque Mechanics.

"This interaction between acrobat and machine is a kind of extension of all those years with bikes, and became the central theme of Cirque Mechanics' first show," he says.

That first show, "Birdhouse Factory," had a very specific setting-a 1930s factory filled with workers, shadows and rumbling machines-and the entire show, with its acrobats, jugglers, mimes and contortionists, was built around the central theme.

"We used [the machines] to inform the decisions we

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made about everything, from colors to lighting and design," he says. "We had this 1930s look. So it developed backwards. We started with a machine, then setting, context, time period, aesthetic, and then the story. As Cirque Mechanics developed new shows, Lashua

worked on new ways for his performers to interact not just with each other and with the show's contraptions, but also with musicians-and that involved building new machines. The latest addition is a gantry crane, a huge construction that provides both a platform for the acrobats to perform on and around and a frame for the symphony orchestras that Cirque Mechanics performs with. It's a solution that melds the performances, musical and circus, into one immersive experience for the audience.

These new shows are a long way from flatland freestyle BMX-they're more about artistic atmosphere than they are about caffeine-fueled extreme sportsbut there's no denying the common thread between the two, the synergy between human and machine in the service of thrilling performance. In that light, the idea of an orchestra-backed circus led by a former bike-riding superstar.

phone and in telling stories with my books," he said. "And I had a sort of training period speaking at universities. I got to try out different things and I discovered the humorous stories worked best. But nobody knows what to expect from me."

Indeed. Foley is currently co-writing WW Comic *Book* and has made a documentary about Santa Claus. (Foley is fascinated with Christmas. He even has a permanent Christmas room in the home on Long Island he shares with his wife of 21 years and their four children.) He's also made more than two dozen appearances on television as himself or characters from his wrestling career, including an episode of *Celebrity* Wife Swap. He considers himself a feminist and is active with the Make-a-Wish Foundation and ChildFund International.

Despite having spent many years performing on television and in front of large arenas packed with tens of thousands of people, Foley relishes his current gig playing to mere hundreds.

"I'm really flattered that people trust me enough to come and see my show," he said. "And I really enjoy being able to see the faces of the people in the audience, to see and hear their reactions. I love the intimacy. But I'm not claiming I would pass up the opportunity to perform in front of 20,000 people. If that happens, great. In the meantime I'm perfectly content to play the small clubs."

mences in early August and rolls through this area with an August 27 performance in Detroit and an August 28 show in Chicago. Both artists will perform full sets and then get together for a collaborative performance at the end of each evening.

The dates for the long-rumored Aerosmith and Slash tour have been announced. There is no Noblesville show scheduled for the Let Rock Rule Tour as of press time, but fans can still check the groups out July 22 in Cincinnati and July 25 in Chicago. A third act may join the tour as well, but that announcement has not been made official yet.

Jack White has a new album, Lazaretto, coming out June 10, so he is going out on tour to let people know about it. White will be at The Chicago Theatre July 23, then move over to The Chicago Auditorium for a show the next night. He will repeat the unorthodox two-night stay, this time in his hometown of Detroit, by playing The Fox Theatre July 28 before heading up the street, literally, to The Masonic Temple Theatre for a show on July

Another Detroiter, Uncle Ted a.k.a Ted Nugent, will continue doing what he does best in 2014 when he launches the Shutup and Jam! Tour in July. Nugent will celebrate playing his 6,500th show this summer and will be playing songs from a catalog that runs 39 albums deep. Don't worry about not knowing the songs because he will, of course, play "Cat Scratch Fever," "Great White Buffalo" and all of the usual hits alongside a few new songs when he visits The Star Plaza in Merrillville July 18, DTE Energy Music Theatre in Detroit July 19 and the Northwest Ohio Rib Cook Off in Toledo August 8. A new album, also called Shutup and Jam!, will be released sometime this fall.

While we are exploring that state up north, Alice in Chains will be in Battle Creek May 20, at Kellogg Arena, after they play two shows in the great state of Ohio, a Cincinnati show on May 17 and a Cleveland show on May 19.

Rock and Roll Hall of Famer Jackson Browne will perform acoustic solo shows this summer, playing guitar and piano with no backing band. The Michigan Theatre in Ann Arbor is where you will need to go if you want to take in Browne's music in a rare intimate setting. The date for that show is July 10. Browne last released new music in 2008 but is planning a new album for the fall. Rumor has it Browne may preview some of those new tracks on this tour.

- **Draft Day** a Big Letdown for Most Football Fans

Technically, *The Upside of Anger* is not a sports movie. But in it Kevin Costner plays a former professional baseball player who, during the course of the movie, gets over himself, matures considerably and learns to live with his past as a sports star. To me, his appeal as a world-weary sports warrior is greater in *Anger* than in any of his sports films, even *Bull Durham*. Hoping to see a flicker of the charm Costner can exude in this type of role is half of what sent me to *Draft Day*.

Technically, *Draft Day* is a sports movie. In it Kevin Costner plays the Cleveland Browns general manager in charge of hiring and firing. Draft day is his biggest day of the year. There is almost no football playing in *Draft Day*, which is disappointing, There is a little bit of archival footage and a little bit of invigorating chatter about the game. We're supposed to get the adrenaline charge of the game from the behind the scenes look at the play between teams as they trade picks on draft day.

As Sonny Weaver Jr., Costner is given extraordinary obstacles to hurdle on this all-important day. *Draft Day* is set up like a football version of *Moneyball*, but the sport and circumstances don't translate as easily as the filmmakers want us to believe. Costner is able to bring his trademark charm to his character, but little else in the film manages to generate much excitement.

The least interesting element in *Draft Day* is the female factor. Jennifer Garner plays Sonny's girlfriend who is the lawyer/ salary cap executive on the team. She tells

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Sonny on draft day morning that she is pregnant. She's supposed to be a tough chick sports exec, yet their affair is a poorly kept secret, a fiction she enables. And, she's such a girl and this is such a desperate-for-drama enterprise, she has to tell him her baby bump news on draft day. Rosanna Arquette shows up for one completely pointless moment as Sonny's ex-wife. As Sonny's mother, Ellen Burstyn is wasted but still funnier and sharper than everyone on screen besides Costner.

Occasionally, I'm asked what my "guilty pleasure" movies are. I'm not guilty about any movies. My guilty pleasure is professional football. That's the other reason I wanted to see *Draft Day*, and, boy, did it make me guilty. For instance, in the whole movie there are no bimbos. There is talk of one pretty-boy college player and his conquests, but unlike the NFL, we neither see nor hear of any raunchy behavior, not even any glimpses of born or bought female enticements. What a whitewash.

The whitewash continues as mostly white guys decide the fate of mostly black players. Beyond Sonny's female troubles, he's disliked by fans and franchise players and execs for firing his own father, a beloved and legendary Browns coach. To pile on more, Sonny Sr. died just days before draft day.

Sonny's detractors include owner Anthony Molina, a caricature never made more than predictable by Frank Langella who always wears his sunglasses, no matter the occasion. I guess this is supposed to suggest menace, but he comes off as A lumbering

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windbag who can't reason beyond his own ego.

Hot dog coach Denis Leary, storms around, slams furniture and yells just long enough so he can repent later in the film. Sean Puff Daddy P Diddy Combs is perfectly cast as a mumbling, slimy, self-interested, not terribly bright sports agent for a smug, pretty boy player in the draft.

A couple of players are posed as good guys. Tom Welling plays the Browns' quarterback, trying to hang on to his job after recovering from an injury that took him out for half a season. Chadwick Boseman, fresh from his role as Jackie Robinson, plays Vontae Mack, an Ohio State linebacker with a heroic back story.

The other guys who come off with little panache are the cameo dudes: Chris Berman, Jon Gruden, Deion Sanders and James Brown. Whatever naturalness they present in their day jobs is not present here. Most embarrassing is Roger Goodell who, as commissioner, leads the most successful professional sport, at least here in the United States. As he announces the draft picks, he looks like a clueless spokesman, adrift and confused, fronting for the guys who are in the game. He looks like the marionette, not the guy pulling the strings.

The NFL is famous for protecting its

brand, but recent scandals involving all manner of bad behavior of players and the huge cover up of what the league knows about brain injuries and when they knew has obviously put them off their game. *Draft Day* is a fantasyland where nothing bad happens in the game. Stadiums gleam with corporate logos ablaze. Aerial shots that never get too close to the action show all is well.

There are few hints that anything is amiss. Timing is everything, though. I'm sure when the film was in production the idea of such constant (and annoying) GM product placement seemed smart. The film is set, sort of, in Cleveland, a good ol' Midwestern locale, close to Detroit. But now GM and the NFL are two corporations in desperate need of rehab.

Just as it is clear that the NFL has known about the terrible consequences of head injuries for a long time and has done all it can to suppress what it knows in a repulsive attempt to save money and reputation, it is becoming clear that GM has done the exact same thing. Some players may be willing participants. Car buyers aren't. Is director Ivan Reitman laughing at them all or is he just playing along?

But pro football is my guilty pleasure. Draft Day has plenty of faults, but sick fan that I am, I enjoyed sideline complaining about what they were doing wrong. And Draft Day, like even a mediocre game, still has some plays and tricks that make you want to cheer.





Tops at the Box: The Russo Brothers? Captain America: The Winter Soldier took the No. 1 spot at the box office for the second consecutive weekend, selling another \$41 million in the U.S., upping the film's 10-day total to \$159 million in the U.S. and \$476 million worldwide. Horror flick Oculus, starring Karen Gillan, Brenton Thwaites, Katee Sackhoff and Rory Cochrane, took the No. 3 spot, selling \$12 million over its first three days of release. Decent numbers for a star-less horror flick released in the spring. Ivan Re-



itman's Draft Day under performed during its first weekend of release, selling just \$9.8 million. The film stars Kevin Costner as a sports agent; Jennifer Garner, Ellen Burstyn, Denis Leary, Chadwick Boseman and Frank Langella all have supporting roles. Weird that Costner is still getting lead roles in maior films.

Rounding out last weekend's Top 5 was Neil Burger's adaptation of Divergent, which sold another \$7.5 million, bringing the film's 24-day total to \$125 million in the U.S. Darren Aronofsky's Noah also continued to bring in decent numbers, selling \$7.4 million, bringing the flick's so-far sales total to \$84 million in the U.S. and \$247 million worldwide.

And last but not least we have Jim Jarmusch's latest film, Only Lovers Left Alive, which sold \$97,000 over its first three days of release while only playing on four screens. Here's hoping that \$24,000 perscreen average is a sign of good things to come for Jarmusch's latest masterpiece.

Still Life With Bread Crumbs by Anna Quindlen, Random House, 2014

Anna Quindlen's Still Life with Bread Crumbs is like a warm maple pumpkin scone. It's homey, but with subtle pretensions of sophistication, and when you buy it, you know exactly what you're going to get. It's more lovingly crafted than a Mc-Donald's hot apple pie, and it certainly tastes richer, even if it's ultimately not much more nutritious.

Rebecca Winter, the novel's heroine, is a oncesuccessful photographer whose artistic and financial situations have grown stale and unfulfilling. Years ago, when she was married to Peter, an academic whose misogynistic and lazy behavior is described as "European," she took some photos

of her disheveled Manhattan kitchen after a dinner party, when Peter had gone to bed and left her to clean up. One photo of dirty dishes became famous, and it made Rebecca into a celebrated artist.

Despite the fact that she's hardly a spokesperson for the typical harried housewife ("She had grown up ... with vacations on the shores of Long Island and the occa-



sional foray to Provence or Tuscany. These were the usual vacations of the people she knew") her photo of dirty wineglass-

es and baguette scraps on the counter of an expensive New York apartment somehow became a feminist icon.

In the present day, though, her work is getting a "what have you done for me lately" reception, and she's losing confidence in her talent. She's divorced, her son's grown and her parents are in ill health. She's not making much money; her financial concerns are not desperate (she

worries about how she's going to pay the bills while still taking care of her parents, paying her son's rent and saving some money, not how she's going to pay the bills, period) but she's not rolling in it, either. She decides to rent out her apartment and head off on an invigorating (and relatively cheap) sabbatical in the country.

Buena Vista's very good-looking animal documentary, *Bears*. Looks both adorable and beautiful. Rebecca manages to find a village isolated and backward enough that, when she asks for directions to "a gym," she's pointed toward the local high school instead of the nearest Curves or Planet Fitness. Here she rents a run-down cabin, the perfect place to find new artistic inspiration (every artist knows that squalor begets creativity). Here, also, she communes with the natives – the overweight proprietress of a coffee shop, the woman's jerk of a husband, a soft-spoken roofer/raccoon exterminator, etc. – and, like many an urban expatriate before her, she learns from these noble rural savages what's really important in life.

The conclusions that Rebecca draws and the romance she falls into are not unexpected or original. This is a story that has been popping up repeatedly ever since Baby Boomers started reaching middle age: a woman becomes dissatisfied with her static, domestic life and goes in search of something new that's at once fundamental and exciting and meets a charming man in the process. As a feminist statement, the story is showing its age, and one has to wonder if Quindlen is among the last writers to be able to write about shaking off the bonds of an early life spent serving the needs of her husband. It seems that women have very different things to worry about these days than their mothers (or grandmothers) did, and characters like Quindlen's might not be familiar to readers for much longer.

Still, Quindlen is a good, solid writer, and although *Still Life with Bread Crumbs* is essentially a formulaic romance, it sits at a different level of craft than garden variety chick lit. It's easy, comforting and devoid of any potentially off-putting surprises. It might not be literary health food, but neither is it artery-clogging junk.
