


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Making Music That Matters

----- Feature • Jars of Clay ------

It might be hard to believe, but it's been 20 years since Jars of Clay hit the radio waves hard with "Flood." The song, which deals with the themes of shame and forgiveness, as well as Moses' time on Mt. Sinai and Jesus' 40-day fast, became one of the most popular Christian crossover hits in the history of American music.

But the guys from Jars of Clay did not rest on their laurels. Since achieving that

early success, they've put out nine studio albums, toured the world and started a charity aimed at ensuring that Africans living in destitute, rural areas have access both to clean drinking water and HIV/AIDs prevention education.

It's been an amazing journey for these four college friends who met on the campus of Greenville College in Greenville, Illinois in 1994. Little did they know that when they started covering Toad the Wet Sprocket and Nirvana songs in their dorms that their future would hold several Grammy

and Dove awards as well as decades of music-making in a notoriously fickle business.

Jars of Clay will perform at C2G Music Hall Saturday, June 21 at 8 p.m. While not the first time this foursome has come to Fort Wayne, it could be Jars' most intimate Summit City show to date.

I caught up with guitarist Stephen Mason by phone a few weeks ago. He and his mates - Dan Haseltine (lead vocals), Matthew Odmark (rhythm guitar) and Charlie Lowell (keys) – were in the studio, working on Jars 20, a project meant to commemorate their 20-year anniversary. Thanks to the wonders of social media, fans chose 18 of the songs on the album. The other two are tunes written for the group's Inland record which came out in August of last year.

"It's been really, really fun at this point in our career to reexamine and revisit songs we recorded 10, 15, 20 years ago," Mason said. "There's a cool energy to it, and it's a fascinating embodiment of where music is going these days."

By that, Mason means a more grass roots approach to album recording and a sincere effort on the part of the band to involve fans in the process. Jars of Clay have always shown their fans a lot of love, and this project is no exception. This fall, the guys will host fans for a weekend at their Franklin, Tennessee studio. Ticket holders will get the chance to tour the Jars' recording space

(affectionately known as "Gray Matters"), interact with the musicians on an individual basis and, of course, see and hear the band perform their favorite songs.

'We're excited about the event," Mason said. "It's a wonderful way to curate 20 years of making music together as well as to honor the people who have been with us, engaged with us in our musical conversation all these

That's exactly how the members of Jars of Clay view their songs - as conversations, story isn't necessarily a typical one. After college, Mason and his mates moved to Nashville, hoping to record their first album. Most bands who move to Music City, U.S.A. struggle for years, trying to find support for their art. Jars of Clay, on the other hand. were almost immediately signed to Essential Records, an imprint of Silvertone. They put out their self-titled debut in 1995. Adrian Belew of King Crimson fame produced two of the debut album's hit singles, "Liquid" and "Flood."

Mason said it was a heady time for him and the rest of the band. "I was hardly a man. I would argue we were initiating ourselves into true adulthood, and that's clumsy and not always pretty. I'm glad. though, that when we were just starting out there were so many people encouraging us, challenging us. suggesting to us that our work mattered. And I'm grateful, too. for the fact that during all this time, even when success was harder to come by and our records weren't selling quite as well as they did at the be-

ginning, that we hung on, that we've stayed true to the process and the music and each

They've also stayed true to their desire to make the world a better place, hence their founding of Blood:Water Mission, a 10year-old effort to bring clean water and AIDs awareness to rural Africans.

"Did you know one U.S. dollar will provide one African with clean water for an entire year?" Mason asked. "It's astounding what power we have to make positive change. I guess this is my Sally Struthers moment, but seriously, the kinship we've found through Blood: Water has been extraordinary and life-changing, and you know. if as a band all we were ever about was rock n' roll, I'm not sure we'd still be here. Making a difference has been once force keeping us together."

But let's not forget about the music, which has clearly spoken to fans, both on the Christian and secular side of the fence. for 20 years.

"As musicians, we want to make great songs and as Christians we try to ask big questions," Mason said. "We feel like it's our duty to wonder. That's why we don't really fit the evangelical mode. We're much less interested in certainty than in exploring the mystery. Information doesn't change people but music invested with heart, soul and mind

not only with each other and their fans, but with big, timeless ideas. While an openly Christian act, Jars of Clay are less interested in answers and dogma than they are with questions and doubt and what makes us human. The band's name comes from this verse in Second Corinthians: "But we have this treasure in jars of clay to show that this all-surpassing power is from God and not from us."

"When we first got together in college, we connected with each other because we liked a lot of the same music - Sarah MacLachlan, James Taylor, Peter Gabriel and we had a lot of the same questions about the world and our place in it. I think those bonds encouraged and formed a really vulnerable and creative space that we value to this day," Mason said.

Not many rock bands form because of shared vulnerability, and, like their emphasis on profundity, the Jars of Clay success

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Pushing Empowerment

By the late 1990s Marshall White had already amassed an impressive list of credentials. Raised in the church and surrounded by music as the son of Bishop Jesse White, the younger White was already - without formal training - playing piano and organ for his church choir by the age of 13. He studied at both IPFW and the American Conservatory of Music in Chicago before ultimately taking over the directorship of the True Love Baptist Choir for a 22-year tenure. During that time the choir performed with everyone from the Fort Wayne Philharmonic at the Embassy to Foreigner at the Allen County Memorial Coliseum while garnering admiration and raising the profile of gospel music in the city.

Later, White founded and directed the Contemporary Chorale Choir at Northrop High School before heading to Purdue University in West Lafayette to serve as director of Black Voices of Inspiration from 1994-2000. During his years at Purdue, he took a little known choir and raised their profile to rival that of the university's Glee Club and provided them their first trip to international competition and performance. Yet even during those years, White had bigger dreams, a vision for what was possible - and he was hoping to accomplish it back home in Fort

"I wanted to increase minority participation in the arts in Fort Wayne," he says now, 20 years after his plan began to form. "There was less than three-percent minority participation in Allen County at that time. I was born and raised here, and I wanted to change that. I started having dreams during the night about how to do it, so I would wake up and start writing the concept down."

Although he concedes that not all of his midnight stream of consciousness notes were fully formed, they did provide the beginning of what he began to pursue in earnest in 1997 and brought to fruition in July 2000: the Unity Performing Arts Foundation. But even as he worked to develop the foundation's mission statement and vision, he ambitiously sought to provide more than an outlet for artistic adventure.

"This was always going to be a vehicle for youth development. We were seeking to shape their character, to develop their leadership. We wanted to build their confidence, their self-esteem and give them pride, opportunities and hope. We wanted to give them the things that family used to provide kids but don't have the time to do anymore, to empower them with qualities of discipline and professionalism.

"But you can't just try to sell kids on youth development or they aren't going to be interested, so we provided a singing vehicle, a dance vehicle, a writing vehicle. We had to get the kids' attention or the youth development wouldn't come. We wanted to build an umbrella, a one-stop shop, for exposure to all of the arts disciplines and with that would

come a support system that would take them through their school years. It's a powerful thing, building the essence of a kid.

White's unique understanding of how best to approach 21st century kids in a complicated world has been matched by his updated model for raising funds and staying vital in the current political, economic and social climate where arts funding has been



scarce and luring in new funders and participants can be dicey.

"Traditional arts programs are struggling to survive because the model is old. It's 20th century-inspired, 20th century-driven and 20th century-functioning. It's not relevant to the 21st century. There's an overwhelming struggle to survive, and you can change either willingly or by force. The programming has to be relevant to a new generation if it's going to move forward. Kids are already making the transition, and now hip-hop isn't just for black kids. Now white kids are being influenced by it. They're crossing over racially now. Sports have made that crossover already, and that's why it's become so lucrative. You need to make the arts relevant to all minorities and attract them to orchestras and ballet and other arts institutions if they're going to be relevant to the next generation who will be funding these arts in the future.'

While his goal was to increase minority participation in the arts, White says the great achievement of Unity Performing Arts Foundation is its diversity. And other programs have taken notice of his success in fulfilling that promise. What Marshall terms "Soulful Art Forms" is a new concept and one that he eagerly shares when he attends conferences and workshops around the country. White is quick to point out that the definition of "soulful" - "full of or expressing feeling or emotion" - makes no distinction about who is expressing that emotion.

'Soulful' has nothing to do with color,"

he says. "It's how you experience the art form. 'Soulful Art Form' means you experience, communicate and inspire. And that's what we try to do. It's for all kids, not just black or white, but programming that speaks beyond race.'

White's talents go beyond music to a highly detailed form of administration when he shares the statistics of the students who have been part of Unity for the last 14 years. While the early numbers did reflect a focus on minorities (with 89 percent of the original 64 students African-American), the current group of 123 reflects five distinct demographics, including six African, 44 African-American, 15 biracial, 21 Caucasian and 13 Hispanic. He also touts the diversity of his staff and the audience who turn out for the popular choir performances.

The success of the Voice of Unity choir has provided additional exposure for UPAF. particularly when it won gold in the 2010 international competition in China. (This year's national competition will take the choir to Carnegie Hall in New York City this month and Riga, Latvia in July for the international gathering.) But White is quick to point out that the program also includes creative writing and an arts academy. He plans to expand to include other arts like dance in the near future. But the support doesn't end at graduation. White touts the success of UP-AF's alumni who go on to college and successful lives. He also helps connect them to mentors, something he experienced himself along the way.

"Chuck Surack at Sweetwater Sound is the one who taught me all of these computer programs I use to track our students. He was a mentor to me, and I want our kids to have that same opportunity to learn from people in the community. So we connect them to CEOs or arrange for them to see surgeries or make it possible for them to sit in a courtroom and learn from experiences so they see the possibilities. You plant the seed of aspiration and track that and connect them to people who can help them make it happen."

Some of those mentors now are the very alumni White helped years ago, those who helped chart the course for UPAF, including Jimmie Jones, a recent grad of the Kelley School of Business at Indiana University who will be joining White's staff this summer. And as he works to continue his longterm goals (which from the beginning charted out to 15 years, 20 years and beyond), he sees his new model for success in the arts making it possible to fulfill those dreams that once woke him during the night.

'We are finding funding through our efforts to attract people to our program. The old model was to target, but now you have to attract. And you shouldn't have to chase money because that means it's running away from you and doesn't want you to catch it. You have to create something that attracts money. What has happened here with Unity has happened organically, not by happen----- Feature • Joe Justice

One Very Busy Guitar

A man stands alone onstage, with a guitar in his hands. It's a sight that's not unfamiliar, only in this case the guitar he's holding is electric, not acoustic. And he sounds like he has a full backing band playing with him, even though he's all by his lonesome.

The man in this case is Joe Justice (real name), a veteran of the Fort Wayne music scene who embarked on a solo career about two years ago. In the 70s he spent time as a folkie playing local coffee houses, and in the subsequent years played in a Christian rock and

classic rock band.

If you're familiar with the band Daystar, then you may have already heard some of Justice's music. While Daystar is now a classic rock covers band, it first started out as a Christian rock band playing originals.

After years of playing in Daystar, Justice decided that he wanted to take a different direction musically than classic rock. He now plays sets of classic hits from the 60s, 70s and 80s along with the occasional original to a diverse set of audiences. And while he has now found success as a solo musician with backing tracks he himself has recorded (he says some songs like Motown hits would be impossible to pull off solo without them), he was apprehensive at first about using them while he played live.

"A couple years ago I was going to join a band, but they used backtracks, and my response was, 'No, I hate backtracks.

That's cheating. I'm not gonna do that," he explains. "And then I decided, well, if I'm going to be a solo guy, how many gigs can I really get if I'm just sitting on a bar stool with my acoustic guitar? I'd really kind of limit myself. And I wanted to play bigger and better venues and all kinds of events, so I started investigating and studying how to make backtracks and all that stuff, and then I started using them. I hated them, and now I love them because it's opened up the world to me, performance-wise."

The backing tracks may have helped to open up new opportunities for him, but so has a change in his schedule. Justice is a recently retired Fort Wayne Fire Department captain. His retirement opened up daytime gigs that contrasted with the late-night gigs he tended to play in Daystar. By playing classic pop and soul hits in daytime gigs, he has found a niche for himself, typically playing venues such as luncheons, wineries, dances and festivals. His exposure and busy schedule have even begun to allow him to shape his own career

"This year I'm doing about 120 shows. I don't think I can do any more than that, but I can maybe

do some that are the most fun for me," he says. "I'm at the point where I can start picking and choosing a little bit. It's not like I'm trying to be a star or anything. I just enjoy it. It's just kind of a part of who I am, entertaining people. Like the last couple summers I've played the Georgetown farmer's market; I hardly make any money, but it's just a fun atmosphere and I like being a part of that."

With all of those shows, putting together the backing tracks and pulling the whole thing off live, Justice would seem to have his hands full, but he still manages to get the audience involved when he plays live.

> "I'm very interactive with the audience. I hand out tambourines and shakers and get the crowd involved with it," he says. "I really try to get the people up and dancing and having fun. I think, people who come to my shows would say that."

> His choice of music probably lends itself to audience interaction as well. His favorite hits from the golden age of rock n' roll makes for singable tunes that can connect with a wide variety of audienc-

"I really love the old Motown music of The Drifters and The Temptations and the Four Tops," he says. "It's fun, great melodies, but it's all kind of back in the era where it [was] a little bit more of an innocent time, musically. I do a lot of familyfriendly things and sometimes I have kids coming up and joining in.'

The cover songs may be a popular choice for his live show, but Justice is hoping to be able to record some originals in the

near future. After all, he has decades of music experience that runs the gamut from playing to writing and recording. But between his schedule, preparation and recording the backing tracks, he is short on one fundamental resource: time.

"I really want to record some more music and get it out there so I can offer that at my shows as well," he says. "It's just another time-consuming thing; I almost have to take a break from performing to do that. So I don't really have any recent recordings that are available for the public at this time."

His experience and long history in the music scene have also enabled Justice to engage in another fun element in his live show: improvisation. With all of the preparation and backing tracks, one might expect a strictly by-the-numbers performance. But he manages to find ways to incorporate spontaneity into his performance as well.

Every time I play it's different, so I don't necessarily have a locked-in lead that I do," he says. "I guess I've been playing guitar so long that I just kind of feel it and have fun with it."





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Returning to the Arena

One of the most common threads in these actor profiles is the shyness of actors.

Pam Good is no exception.

"I was very shy as a child," she says. "I'm still shy."

It was music that brought her out of her shell at a young age.

"My father has a beautiful voice, and sang for weddings and in the church choir for 50 years," she says.

Good sang in the high school choir, which led to chorus roles in school musicals.

Then she started to take her singing to a new level.

"During my junior and senior years I was in a musical group called Conglomeration," she says. "Our choir director, Jim Markiton, was a former member with Up with People, and Conglomeration used the similar show style. We performed in many different states with a live show of singers, dancers and a full band. We recorded an album every year in Ohio. It was a wonderful experience.'

Soon, she took it a step further. "In 1983, four of us got together and formed an a capella group," she says. "We sang a lot of Manhattan Transfer. And we started performing."

As she performed more, she gained courage and the following year decided to audition for a role in a community theatre musical.

That musical was Stephen Sondheim's Company which was being produced by Arena Dinner Theatre and directed by Phillip Colglazier who would go on to become the executive director of the Fort Wayne Civic

Her experience in an a capella group paid off. She was cast as Kathy, one of the three girlfriends of Robert, the perpetually single man whose best friends are five married couples. Her character sang "You Could Drive a Person Crazy" with Robert's other two girlfriends in tight three-part harmony.

'At that time," she says, "Arena used the Fort Wayne Chamber for the shows. The stage would be set up and torn down each weekend. It was a great experience and I was

From there she continued to do shows back to back.

As is often the case, theater allowed the shy young woman to showcase her inner strength. Over the years she performed in 32 shows, playing many confident women, including Emily Arden in Civic's State Fair, Miss Mona in Best Little Whorehouse in Texas and Lola in Damn Yankees.

She never formally studied theatre, but when she reached her 20s, she started taking voice lessons, first from Ben Wiseman and then from Becky Menzie who went on to a very successful career in Chicago as a

As ubiquitous as she once was in Fort Wayne theater, Good hasn't performed onstage in 11 years. Her last theatrical performance was in the ensemble of Smokey Joe's Café at the Civic in 2001.

A career change left little time for her former hobby. She currently works as the business manager for Garrett-Keyser-Butler Schools.

She formed new hobbies, taking up golf,

becoming involved in other volunteer activities, including the DeKalb County Fair Association and serving on the St. Martin's Healthcare board in Garrett.

Occasionally she is called upon to give a presentation, and she treats it as she would any other stage performance.

"I prepare, prepare, prepare," she laughs. "If I'm prepared, I'm ready to go."

As the years went on, the theater seemed more and more distant. She would continue to read audition notices and consider trying

"I'd go see shows and think, 'Oh, I'd love to have done that show," she says. "But when I would start to think about going back to it, other things would take priority.

As she got older, the excuse of time constraints gave way to a new reason not to audition: "I started to wonder if there was even a part I could still play anymore," she says.

But in the back of her mind, she missed the theater.

She and actor/director Christopher J. Murphy started chatting on Facebook, and he encouraged her to audition for a musical he was about to direct.

In true full-circle form, that musical was Company, and it was being done at Arena Dinner Theatre.

The memories of her first show came flooding back. She missed performing. She missed Arena. She missed the challenge of singing Sondheim and creating a character. "I was hesitant," she says. "Eleven years had gone by. I asked myself if I could keep up with life and the rehearsal schedule."

She decided not to audition.

Then she reconsidered and ended up being cast as Joanne, the role made famous by Elaine Stritch. The middleaged Joanne sings the powerhouse song "Ladies Who Lunch," cynically berating these frivolous women who do nothing with their lives but fill their time trying not to grow old. Like any good Sondheim song, it has many layers, and it becomes clear by the end that the bitter alcoholic is singing about her-

Good credits Murphy as helping ease her back into the challenge of creating a character. "Finding a character takes a while for me," she says. "There is always the apprehension that I won't

"But Chris analyzes every line that every character says. He has so much insight and depth, and he shares that knowledge with his actors.'

The actress has taken that insight and written a back story for Joanne which she politely declines to share. She has revisited the show via YouTube videos and online articles as well as

photos from her 1984 production.

She has a different take on the show 30

years later. "I've gone from playing the youngest character to the oldest character in this show," she says. "All my memories are of the young girls. I only vaguely remember the married couples."

Another challenge for this role is that she hasn't sung in 11 years. "I was worried I wouldn't be [vocally] strong enough to come back and do the role," she says. But as rehearsals have progressed, she has felt the confidence build.

"What's fun is the energy and excitement from the rest of the cast," she says. "It's exhilarating."

So will this production of Company be another trigger to a spate of back-to-back productions, or was this just a one-time

"I am having a great time," she says. "Getting the chance to reconnect with friends, meeting new people, and listening and watching all the talent [has been] fantas-

As to future shows? She makes no promises, but admits, "I would like that."


It would appear that the theater bug has come out of remission.

Dream District

Stranded Dreams

Here's something you don't run into every day, especially when it comes to local music. True, I don't get out much, but it's very rewarding to hear something out of left field now and then. Something uncompromising. Especially when the left field it's coming from happens to be War-



saw, Indiana and the artist happens to be a known popsmith with a penchant for tunes known for their vocals and lyrics.

Yes, John Hubner (he of Goodbyewave, Sunnydaymassacre, Cambodia Highball, et al.) presents another fresh collection for our ears. But this time he eschews the vocals, the drums, the keyboards. Stranded Dreams is all about soundscapes, namely glistening sonics improvised on guitar, run through a chain of effects and recorded to a good ol' 4-track machine.

Before you scream, "Indulgence!" and scare the bejesus out of your neighbor who's standing in her driveway, understand that Stranded Dreams is anything but. Give your head a chance to let the drones and repetitions and dreamy arpeggios do their thing, and you'll get what Hubner is after. In fact, you may actually become part of the process; latch on to the harmonics at work in these tunes and you'll hear ghosts that aren't even there.

No, Kevin Shields didn't guest on opener "Some Other Time," but you may think he did at first listen. It's a hypnotic track, trailing delays and pulling you further in by the minute. "Amare (To Love)" establishes a friendly riff that becomes part of a slow swell, an ocean of sound that's all-encompassing but never overwhelming. Minimalist percussion keeps time during "So Lost," with its slightly menacing distorted guitar/bass line.

Throughout the album, Hubner treads the line between repeating motifs and building and tearing down walls of sound. The music breathes, always. Fuzz, feedback and formless vocalizations pepper the closer, "Damage/Stars in Ecstasy." At nearly 22 minutes, it's a doozy. By the 16-minute mark, though, the clouds part and the song becomes a thing of twisted beauty. The closest comparison I can make between Stranded Dreams and existing work is a fairly obscure soundtrack to the mid-80s film Captive by U2's the Edge.

You don't have to be a fan of instrumental music, shoegaze, or experimental sonics to enjoy the hell out of this record. My advice? Turn off the iPacifier and listen to Stranded Dreams all the way through, actively, without interruption. It's a mood-altering drug; no chemical additives necessary. (D.M. Jones)

Swans To Be Kind

"Swans are majestic, beautiful looking creatures. With really ugly temperaments."

The above quote from Swans band leader Michael Gira only scratches the surface of all the dichotomies his music has aimed for in the past 30 years. With Swans as his main vehicle, Gira has test-



ed his audience's ability to find charm in aggression, and their capacity to withstand unrelenting bursts of catharsis. Obviously, such tactics have never helped Swans gain a mass audience, much less radio airplay. Also, given how the last album before their 1996 hiatus was a two-hour soundscape odyssey called Soundtracks for the Blind, you'd think Gira's potential career as a film composer is long overdue. After what Gira called a "reconstitution" of Swans in 2010, his expertly crafted sonic experimentations grew more intricate, developed and maybe even friendlier. I've always said that those looking to get into Swans would probably benefit from prerequisite bands like Sonic Youth, Jesus Lizard and/or Tool. As the title suggests, their 13th album, To Be Kind, invites potential listeners to abandon all caution and take the plunge.

But how can I begin to tell everyone reading this that To Be Kind resembles an endurance contest and simultaneously urge you to buy it and listen to it immediately? Swans have created an arguably superior successor to their 2012 epic, The Seer, in terms of how willing it is to induct new members into their cult, and make them wonder what the back discography sounds like. Though To Be Kind

Metallica

Kill 'em All (1983)

About a month before I started college, a friend of mine lent me this cassette tape. I was already into heavy metal (Iron Maiden, Motorhead), but this was my first introduction into the thrash metal genre. As a 17-year-old, I was pretty blown away, and I still con-



sider this to be one of the better records from a band I ended up seeing 10 years later.

"Hit the Lights" comes right at you with reckless drumming and mind-blowing guitars behind the screaming vocals of James Hetfield, a 20-year-old kid from the same hometown (Downey, California) as The Carpenters and Weird Al Yankovic.

The Black Sabbath-sounding "The Four Horseman" follows, and a songwriting credit from Dave Mustaine should be mentioned. Mustaine was with the group during the early stages of recording Kill 'Em All but was booted from the band before its release. He went on to form Megadeth, another great band.

"Jump in the Fire" is also a very tight track (with a satanic undertone), and "Pulling Teeth" is an instrumental from bassist Cliff Burton who was killed in a tour bus accident in 1986. "Whiplash" continues the metal thunder, as does the rest of side two. No monster ballads (e.g. "Nothing Else Matters") on this one. "Seek And Destroy" appears on this album and may be one of Metallica's most recognizable "classic" tracks. There's filler here, just pure metal; it's a great place to begin your Metallica journey.

The band has nine great records (Metallica fans will always defend the newer stuff) and will be back in North America (Montreal) in August.

Fun Fact: The original title of Kill 'Em All was Metal up Your Ass, but the label refused to release the record unless the band changed it. You can still get T-shirts with the original title which I have to admit is pretty cool. (Dennis Donahue)

is the Swans' gateway album, it matches every epic trait of *The Seer*, including the two-hour running time. As much as both albums beg to be heard in their proper order, the band is likely aware that not everyone has two hours to devote to a single album, so it is possible for any one song to be cherry-picked to fit the occasion.

Swans have never been anything short of confrontational and exhilarating, so the idea of them releasing a listener-friendly album would seem to carry the stigma of selling out (though by "listenerfriendly" I mean that the album pulls you in from the moment you hear the opening Tool-like bass riff to "Screen Shot" and dares you to turn it off until it has had its say). While the majority of *The Seer* seemed to dwell in abstractions, To Be Kind is a surprising break where the songs veer towards grooving ("She Loves Us!") rather than brooding - even though there is still some of that evident in tracks "Just a Little Boy (for Chester Burnett)." There's also nothing "pop" about having a blinding 34-minute monstrosity, "Bring the Sun/Toussaint L'Ouverture," as the centerpiece.

Those who get easily daunted by such lengths need not despair: Swans have always used repetition to their advantage to create incantations with moving parts, so that everything you hear exists to drive the album. In other words, you'd be hard pressed to find wasted moments. Even some of the less intriguing tracks like "Kirsten Supine" and "Nathalie Neal" fit into the album's cohesion with ease and provide balance to some of the more overwhelming tracks.

Up to this point, I've only been talking about the music. The use of vocals throughout are a haunting entity of their own, providing relatively equal amounts of ambience and sheer dementia, often times in the same song. "Oxygen" stands as one of the most claustrophobic, harried vocal performances of any artist who claims to challenge listeners. Appropriately, the song documents Gira's longtime battle with asthma and was inspired by a severe asthma attack he suffered during a show. He was subsequently hospitalized but still struggled to get oxygen into his system. The song's brisk eight minutes will feel like prolonged suffocation.

As of the moment I type these words, To Be Kind is at No. 116 in its second week on the Billboard chart after its debut peak at No.

There's a cliché people like to use a lot when referring to local musicians who've gone on to find success elsewhere. We are, of course, thinking of the phrase, "hometown boy makes good." Sometimes hometown boy makes very good, and that's certainly true of Nic Roulette, who, along with Kenny Taylor, Jerry Sparkman and Jamie Simon, founded Fort Wayne's own Blue Moon Boys back in the late 90s. Much to the eternal sadness of their Fort Wayne fanbase, the Blue Moon Boys broke up, and in 2004, Roulette moved to Nashville and started Hillbilly Casino, a rockabilly quartet, who'll be at the Phoenix Saturday, June 14 at 9 p.m. along with Delilah Dewylde.

Hillbilly Casino's sound is part classic country/honkytonk (think Johnny Cash), part punk (the Ramones), all rock n' roll – but the real star of the show is, of course, Roulette, who, in this newspaper, once described himself as a "song and dance man." During his Fort Wayne days, Roulette made a name for himself as one of the most entertaining frontmen around, and a change of state hasn't altered that one bit.

As a critic who took in a 2009 HB show put it for lostinreviews.com, Roulette "was non-stop motion, dancing, singing, running back and forth across the stage, hanging from the rafters (literally!), leaping off the speakers ... During every song he would whip out a comb and try to smooth back his pompadour, only to have it messed up within 20 seconds ... you would have had to been there to believe it."

Regulars at Nashville's famous Layla's Bluegrass Inn, Hillbilly Casino – Roulette (lead vocals), "Radioactive" Ronnie Crutcher (guitar), Geoff Firebaugh (bass) and Matthew Arnn (drums) – have three studio albums to their credit (2006's Sucker Punched, 2008's Three Step Windup and a Christmas album, Hang Your Stockings ... and Say Your Prayers) and a stubborn DIY attitude that's earned them fans

around the country and even around the world. They also have a loyal following in Fort Wayne, thanks to Roulette's reputation for rocking it Elvis style and readiness to return to his roots.

Hometown boy makes good indeed.

Colorado has given this country many things – NORAD, John Denver and the inspiration for *South Park*, just to name a few – and now we can add to that already impressive list the nu metal-meets-Southern rock foursome A Memory Down who'll be at Carl's Tavern Thursday, June 19 at 8 p.m.

A Memory Down – Phil LeBlanc (lead vocals), Alex Boccia (lead guitar), Ryan Nicholl (bass/accoustic) and Yuli Papastergiou (drums) – came together in 2008 and did their due diligence for four years, playing in small bars and rocking out local festivals before getting signed to the Turkey Vulture label in 2012.

That year the dudes released their debut album, *A Man Apart*, which, according to Rick Lindner with RockRevolt Magazine, is a triumph of old-school hard rock. "The songs on the album are by and large inspired by real life experience and challenges, done in a way that inspires listeners to rise up, live strong and proud while waving the American flag in one hand with a rock fist firmly thrust in the air in the other," Lindner wrote.

Since that album dropped two years ago July, LeBlanc and company have been touring the country alongside acts like Parabelle, Gemini Syndrome, Motograter, Red Jump Suit Apparatus, Machina, Surrender the Fall, Throw the Fight and Straightline Stitch. They've also shared the stage with Hurt, Candlebox and 12 Stones.

A Memory Down's main goal is, in the words of LeBlanc, for the fans "to physically feel and experience the power of lyric and sound and come away with a different aspect on life."

If that sounds like your cup of Long Island Iced Tea, mark your calendars, get to Carl's and make some memories.

She wrote a catchy song, followed it up with a somewhat less catchy song and now she is the "it" girl of the industry. If you like Lorde, and I can see why you would, you can catch her show at the LC Pavilion in Columbus, Ohio September 23 or at the Nautica Pavilion in Cleveland September 24. I think I'll skip paying to see the angst-ridden, somewhat strange teenager on stage. If I want to see that, I'll just go to the mall.

Perhaps a Little Less X-Men Would Be More

There are so many things going on in X-Men: Days of Future Past it can make you dizzy. The X-Men franchise gets bigger and bigger, and at some point may spin out of control. Director Bryan Singer, who has directed many of the X-Men pictures and is incredibly talented, does manage to land this plane, barely. Leaving the theater, several people were having the conversation I had been having with my movie buddy: "So, they are just going to keep making 'X-Men' movies forever, I guess?" Even now, superhero ex-

In X-Men: Days of Future Past the new gimmick is time travel which allows the use of two sets of actors to play our favorite mutants. The film begins in the future, a dark and desolate place with a war raging. The mutants are under attack from super powerful robots determined to destroy all mutants. The Sentinels, as they are called, appear in the sky on board terrifying air ships. There is an army of them, and they have the power and ability to combat the special powers

In this world Professor Xavier and Magneto are played by Patrick Stewart and Ian McKellen. Usually on different sides of the fence about how mutants fit into this world, they have joined forces to try to survive. The situation is so desperate that the only hope for their survival is to send Wolverine back in time to convince the very young Charles Xavier and Erik Lehnsherr (who will become Magneto) to play nice. If they can change the past, their circumstances in the future will be much brighter. This is not going to be easy since who will really believe a guy who says, "I come from the

Wolverine, good old Hugh Jackman, is the only mutant strong enough to survive the rigors of time travel. Sending him back in time is the job of Kitty Pryde. Poor Ellen Page spends most of the movie sweating and eye rolling as she holds her hands near Jackman's head while his spirit or essence travels back in time.

So while the ragtag future mutants guard a last strong-

hold from the Sentinels (they can't slip away or move Wolverine without disturbing his mission), Wolverine wakes up in a strange bed next to a stranger – a nice-looking, naked blond stranger – as Roberta Flack's "The First Time Ever I Saw Your Face" appropriately plays in the background. Yes, we have arrived in the 70s, and this is where most of the movie takes place.

And not just any moment of the 70s. We arrive in the past during the Paris peace talks. The Vietnam War is ending, so the movie can play off a zeitgeist of paranoia and government deception. X-Men: Days of Future Past includes scenes with Richard Nixon, and they are not the high point of the

The best scenes are Wolverine assembling the team. James McAvoy plays the young Charles Xavier. After some arguing and fighting, he is on board. Other team members include Nicholas Hoult as Beast and Evan Peters as Peter, the boy who will be Quicksilver. His character has the most fun in a tickle of a scene in the Pentagon filmed with stop action so he can move between combatants and fix the fight.

Two players are a little harder to recruit. Erik Lehnsherr, who will eventually become Magneto, is in jail. He has been blamed for the Kennedy assassination and is closely guarded. Michael Fassbender plays Lehnsherr. He's a little too tall and good-looking to be matched up with Ian McKellen, but he makes a good angry mutant. Even angrier is Mystique or Raven, a very blue, very feisty Jennifer Lawrence.

Once the gang is assembled, they start working on changing the future. The villain on the scene is a weapons manufacturer named Bolivar Trask. He hates mutants and has convinced key elements of the government that they should

be destroyed entirely. Trask is played by Peter Dinklage. He makes a great villain, but I wasn't taken with the visual of a little person obsessed with destroying big, strong mutants. When the focus of the film is on the characters of the

X-Men, X-Men: Days of Future Past has charm and drive.

There are little flourishes of fun, and they are enjoyable. It is the big battles that weigh down the movie. And time travel isn't the novelty it once was. The fighting culminates with two showdowns, one in

the future and one in the 70s. The film cuts back and forth between these two fights, and neither of them seems that urgent. In the 70s, Erik puts on a scary but silly mask and uproots a sports stadium and flies it over to the White House. In the future, there is a lot of blasting.

While these scenes are sort of impressive, hopping back and forth between them isn't very effective. After a while, you just want say, "Are they done yet?" There should be a moratorium for perhaps a decade on staging climactic battles at The White House or the Capitol. If you need to slip out for a bathroom break while the stadium is landing on the White House lawn, go ahead. You will have plenty of time.

Crawling from the wreckage are our heroes. Having achieved a brighter future for mutants, what will come next? Because there will, of course, be a next. Wolverine's wideeyed amazement when he wakes up in the film's present (which is the future and things are better) is almost worth the

I don't know where they will go from here, but go they

At the very end of the credits is the usual tease of things to come. It is a purposely odd call-and-response between a leader and a hoard of folks, all in an uproar. Costuming for this quick snippet is primitive, and the language not anything I could recognize. Maybe by the time the next X-Men comes out, I'll be interested, but X-Men: Days of Future Past is for more ardent fans than I.

The Pains of Being Pure at Heart

Days of Abandon

There has been a gradual move for New York City's The Pains of Being Pure at Heart - from a rougharound-the-edges sound on their debut to something resembling a sunny 80s pop sheen on their newest long player, Days of Abandon. The change is subtle, but there.

On their debut album there was a slight darkness to the fuzzy pop hooks.

You got the feeling My Bloody Valentine and Teenage Fanclub were spun quite a bit in the band's formative years. On their sophomore effort, We Belong, the band traded 4AD grit for Smashing Pumpkins grandiosity. Big guitar crunch took the place of shoegaze and post-punk flair. With Days of Abandon the Pains' have embraced 80s FM radio and junior high dance soundtracks. It works for them, but I can't help but pine for some of that darkness that's been lit up

"Art Smock" opens the album with a whispered vocal and musical refrain. At times this track sounds like Ezra Koenig stopped in to help out in the vocal department. "Beautiful You" could have been playing over the closing credits of any John Hughes film. "Coral and Gold" is an atmospheric little gem. You get the feeling there's some pain behind the words, "I've been waiting for you, just waiting for you, When you gonna turn? I've been tracking your spine, mixing your blood with mine, When you gonna turn?" The song builds into a beautiful crescendo before lilting at the end. "Eurydice" is that Bruce Springsteen and Pat Benatar collaboration we never got. At one point towards the end of the song, I swear that Benatar is singing the song's refrain. "I turned cold in September air, I wanted to follow you anywhere, but you weren't anywhere I could go," Berman sings as the band pumps up the chest-thumping moxie. "Masokissed" is big guitars and big keys that makes one long for a convertible and a sunset to drive into.

Days of Abandon is one lilting heartbreak put to 80s sunshine after another. It's a solid album. The biggest problem here is the lack of grit and grime that The Pains used to their advantage back in 2009. There's nothing wrong with some sunshine and optimistic synths. It's just that once in a while a fuzzy melody and terse vocal help to make the album a more relatable experience. The once dark and tragic is replaced with

something more universal, more "one size fits all."

Regardless, it's a solid album that will soundtrack many summer parties and drives at dusk. (John Hubner)

So if you have any time in the next five to six months that you really want to have a good time (and especially if that plan might involve drinking), you'll definitely want to check out Pedal City which is taking reservations now. 

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Not All Books Should Be Films

The Monuments Men: Allied Heroes, Nazi Thieves and the Greatest Treasure Hunt in History by Robert M. Edsel with Bret Witter Little, Brown and Company, 2013

There's not an obvious Hollywood movie in Robert Edsel's *The Monuments Men: Allied Heroes, Nazi Thieves and the Greatest Treasure Hunt in History.*The work of the Monuments, Fine Arts and Archives program – the Monuments Men – to preserve culturally significant buildings and artwork during World War II is not heavy on action, and the usually clear good guy-bad guy dynamic of the

war is surprisingly murky when all the facts are laid on the table.

The book follows the efforts of the Monuments Men as they attempt to keep the Allies from bombing important buildings and the Nazis from making off with all of Europe's most famous and valuable pieces of art. The book's heroes are a small group of men, most of them art experts from Harvard, whose contribution to the war effort is their knowledge of what art and monuments are worth saving. Special attention is paid to two looted works - Michelangelo's "Bruges Madonna" and Jan van Eyck's "Ghent Altarpiece" both of which were stolen by the Nazis and hidden somewhere in Europe.

Two of the Monuments Men were killed in action, but for the most part, it seems that the unit did its work far away from the fighting, making lists of monuments and significant artworks before the fighting began and coming in to pack up the looted art after it was found. The heavy lifting of saving the art and monuments

was done, in large part, by military commanders who respected the recommendations of the Monuments M e n and spared significant buildings, as well as the

actions of civilians who went out of their way to defend artworks from both the Nazis and

the Allies

Although much is made of the actions of Hitler's underlings who amassed art collections for their own glorification and who were quick to destroy the art once it was obvious the war was lost, Hitler himself gets off relatively easily. He's presented as having truly loved art (modern art aside, which he detested and was eager to destroy) and as having no intention of ever destroying historic works. He hoped, when his death was imminent, that the looted art would be displayed in a new museum in Austria built in his honor. It could even be argued.

perhaps, that the Nazis' squirreling away of art in underground bunkers saved some of it from de-

struction by Allied bombing.

The ones who really get off easily, though, are the French. Two of the book's celebrated heroes are Jacques Jaujard, the director of the French National Museums, and Rose Valland, one of Jaujard's employ-

Stars Romps, Cruise Bombs at Box

Tops at the Box: Drama *The Fault in Our Stars* opened bigger than anyone could have expected last weekend, selling a stellar \$48 million in the U.S. over its first three days of release. Add to that another \$17 million in sales abroad, and Fox has a major hit on its hands - not a comic book film, not a Tom Cruise film, not a Weinstein film, but a little indie-styled drama based on a book that sold a whole lot of copies at Target and your local supermarket. The film stars wannabe It-Girl Shailene Woodley, relative newcomer pretty boy Ansel Elgort and some funny-faced champion named Willem Dafoe. Go for the Dafoe, I say. But really, decent job here America, picking a pseudohip drama over a seemingly played out sci-fi action romp, a big budget Disney film and a star-studded comic book film. You've surprised me. Maybe next month you'll be watching Lars von Trier's Nymphomaniac films on iTunes.

Also at the Box: Maleficent took the No. 2 spot at last weekend's box office, selling another \$33 million, bringing the film's 10-day total to \$127 million in the U.S. Thus far the movie has made a whopping \$335 million worldwide, making it officially a hit flick despite looking truly awful.

Taking the No. 3 spot at the box office was Doug Liman-directed action flick *Edge of Tomorrow*, starring Tom Cruise and the great Emily Blunt. The film sold \$29 million over its first three days of release. Not exactly a great start for a film that cost about \$200 million to produce. Oof. Time for TC to rethink this sci-fi action blockbuster kick he's been on.

Taking the No. 4 spot at last weekend's box office was Bryan Singer's *X-Men: Days of Future Past*, which sold \$14.7 million last weekend, bringing the movie's 17-day total to \$189 million in the U.S. and \$609 million worldwide. Yay superheroes. Thank you for once again saving the industry from having to tell interesting, original stories. You're swell.

Rounding out last weekend's Top 5 was Seth MacFarlane's *A Million Ways to Die in the West*, a comedy that I think looks very not-funny. Sorry *Family Guy* and *Ted* fans, but I'm still not sold on the idea of MacFarlane-as-relevant-filmmaker. *West* sold \$7 million last weekend, bringing the movie's 10-day total to just over \$30 million in the U.S. and \$50 million worldwide. ees. Together Jaujard and Valland kept track of the location of looted art – by appearing to work in collaboration with the Nazis – so that it could be recovered after the war. What isn't discussed as fully is how much of the art they were trying to keep in France had been looted from other countries by the French in centuries past.

The "Nike of Samothrace," an ancient sculpture that Edsel uses as an example of how the Louvre's collection was secreted away before the war, had been "discovered" by a French diplomat on a Greek island in the 1860s and immediately removed to France. The bulk of the Louvre's original collection had been looted by Napoleon from churches, museums and private collections throughout Europe, and some of the plundered art remained in the Louvre's collection at the start of WWII. Ironically, both the "Ghent Altarpiece" and the "Bruges Madonna" had been previously stolen by the French from their rightful owners, although both had subsequently been returned.

What also gets lost in the story of the treasure hunt is the sad fact that, after the vast caches of stolen art are recovered, there's no question of returning much of the art to its rightful owners. Eventually, the "Bruges Madonna" and the "Ghent Altarpiece" find their way back to where they were before the war, but much of the artwork taken from private individuals—most of them Jews—had no homes to go back to. While the Monuments Men oversaw the recovery of thousands of precious objects, the scope of what was lost during the war easily overshadows the result of any successful treasure hunt.

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
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
