BuskerFest has come a long way since it began in 2009. At one point, the festival was combined with Taste of the Arts, and it even took a hiatus in 2011. But the growing pains seem to be over.

BuskerFest has been standalone event the past few years, growing with each incarnation. The downtown showcase of street performers adds new talent and expands the variety of acts every year, and 2014's installment is no exception.

"We try to keep the energy from previous years up while adding to the mix," said Frank Howard, director of marketing, environmental and business

services for the Downtown Improvement District, the group responsible for coordinating BuskerFest. "It's definitely a marquee event for us and downtown Fort Wayne.'

Howard shared how rare it is for a nonprofit like the Downtown Improvement District to be able to offer such a big event like BuskerFest for free. It's a feat made possible through the support of the community, local businesses and the performers themselves. Ultimately, he says, it's about making downtown events – and the arts, specifically – accessible to anyone who has an interest in participat-

"For us, BuskerFest has come to symbolize a lot of things. It means vibrancy, activity, and supporting our restaurant and retail core. The Downtown Improvement District really likes to connect individuals and foster an environment that people want to be part of. It's part of our mission," Howard explained.

"That ronment is already here, and it's happening organically. We try to be good stewards of that atmosphere downtown with events like BuskerFest. It's one of those features that people look forward to all year. We're hoping for a solid 7-10,000 people in attendance this year, weather permitting."

Even if the weather doesn't cooperate, the show will go on, as it has in past years. Howard shared how the coordinators particularly creative a couple of years

ago when a massive summer storm ripped through the area, threatening the festival. BuskerFest performers improvised without electricity to create a unique, acoustic-type show.



# Food Worth Running For

One of the great things about living in Fort Wayne is that once summer hits (actually, some of the fun begins in the spring) you can count on something going on downtown every weekend. Festivals are in full swing now, and one of the best each and every year is Greek Fest which this year runs June 26-29. For four solid days you can find some of the tastiest food the world has to offer while

enjoying the music and dance of a passionate people.

Greek Fest prides itself on being one of the most family-friendly of all the festivals to fill downtown each year. While beer and wine are available for purchase to those 21 and over, the focus is clearly on the food, music, dance and kid-centric features such as rides and free hot dogs. Maybe that's part of the reason that the event has grown so much over the years.

More than three

decades ago Greek Fest was a fairly humble event, barely resembling the fourfestival day it has grown become. Providing an opportunity for people to sample gyros and baklava was the fairly modest aim when the event began at Trinity Holy Church in the

early 1980s. Sharing Greek culture was to be something both fun and educational and has, in the last three decades, become something far more extensive than what was first conceived by early organizers Nikos Nakos and Frank Makridakis who are still key to Greek Fest's success all these years later.

Now in its 34th year, one of Greek Fest's most popular events is a relatively new feature, the 5K walk/run event which takes place on Saturday, June 28 at Headwaters Park (which, not coincidentally, is where you can find all of the other events at Greek Fest). While the obligatory T-shirt is to be expected as your reward for participating, Greek Fest does that one better by providing a T-shirt and a voucher for a gyro. New clothing is all well and good, but when you're feet have covered more than three

miles of pavement, a gyro is going to really hit the spot. Registration is \$25, and more info can be found at the Greek Fest website.

Those who want a more restful way to experience Greek culture have plenty of opportunities to do so. Each day - at 12:30 p.m., 6 p.m. and 8 p.m. - troupes from the area will feature dancers of all ages demonstrating a lot of energy while wearing beautifully authentic garb. With a dozen total dance performances over the four-day cious adventures beyond the usual stuffed pita. One of the tastiest treats may well be the lamb chop with rice pilaf and a Greek

The pork and chicken souvlaki are always a popular choice, but again there are some fun options to be had. Greek pizza is a good choice for vegetarians or can be made carnivorous with the addition of gyro meat. Greek lasagna (pastichio) is very similar to its Italian cousin, but with a slight twist, as

is the case with Loukaniko. the Greek version sausage with tasty tomato and green pepper sauce. If you have a picky or otherwise unadventurous eater, a free hot dog will be provided to any child accompanied by an adult.

Pastries will also be on the menu, with several savory and sweet options. Of course the baklava is a bit

of heaven on earth, but the feta cheese filled tiropita as well as the spinach and feta filled spanakopita are equally divine. If you're looking for something especially decadent. check out the loukoumades, delightful little dumplings covered in honey and cinnamon, or (stop the presses!) the baklava ice cream sundae which is, well, everything you are imagining right now.

Easy to understand why a 5K in the middle of that weekend might not be a bad idea.

Adding to the fun will be a raffle with money as the prize. Tickets will be sold all weekend long for the princely sum of one dollar, and when the drawing takes place at 5 p.m. Sunday evening, as the extended weekend comes to a close, the winner need not be present to cash in on the prizes.

To learn more about the 5K registration (which can be done online via RunRace. net) or the ever-growing menu of goodies (no harm in whetting the appetite a bit in advance), check out the website at fortwaynegreekfestival.org. Then get ready to celebrate. Opa!

span, there are plenty of chances to catch a performance while indulging in some great food. Live music will also be provided by

# A Theatrical Revival in Huntington

Northern Indiana has another professional theater. Located in downtown Huntington, Different Stages Theater will open its doors to the public on July 8, with its inaugural production of *The Sound of Music*.

Founded by Executive Director Rich Najuch and Artistic Director Joel Froomkin, its home will be the historic New Huntington Theater.

Built in 1904 as a vaudeville house, the New Huntington Theater's 400-seat house couldn't keep up with the demand.

"Huntington was a railroad crossover town then," says Najuch. Travelers craved entertainment, so the 1,400-seat

New Huntington Theater was built. In 1940 the theater was converted to a movie palace and remained one for almost 60 years when it was closed down by the arrival of a new multiplex in Huntington. The building changed hands several more times until 2007 when Najuch and Froomkin purchased it with the dream of bringing it back to its live theater glory.

They had been living and working in New York at the time (Froomkin as a director and Najuch in production) but wanted more artistic control and to create something they could call their

"We spent about three years looking all over the country at buildings,' says Najuch, "and came to Huntington in February of 2007. After exploring the area, we felt that this would be a fantastic place for our company. We loved the building, and it had a great location just 20 minutes south of Fort Wayne."

They immediately began renovation on the lobby space and then on the

larger auditorium space, using their own funds and the help of family and friends.

Community interest in the renovation was so great that they began pressing Najuch and Froomkin to put on a show, despite the fact that the auditorium wasn't ready.

"We feel strongly that community involvement in promoting the arts for all is a top priority for the success of the theater," says Najuch. So they came up with a short-term fix: The Supper Club.

This cabaret-style series was written by Froomkin and consisted of three or four professional singers from New York. Froomkin built the show around the talents of the singers for each production in the series. "Audiences really loved the quality of the singers and the format of the show," says Najuch. "Joel researched each song and wrote a script telling stories about the original artists and the history of the

Audience feedback for the intimate show was beyond their expectations and fueled their fire to continue working on the larger space.

Finally, seven years later, they are working on their first full-scale Broadway style musical, The Sound of Music.

Froomkin and Najuch held auditions in New York this February and March. They also saw applicants online via Skype (because it's 2014). "We saw thousands of applicants," says Najuch, "[including] over 400 for the role of Maria alone.'

They auditioned local children in April for the Von Trapp kids, but the rest of the cast is comprised of professional full-

Najuch can't help but rave over their cast. "We have six

fantastically talented young local performers for the children's roles," he says. "Our Maria, Lauren Lukacek, is fresh off the international tour of My Fair Lady where she went on as Eliza Doolittle, and our Captain, Robert Teasdale, is just off the *Shrek* national tour. One of our Supper Club favorites, Rebecca Rosky, will return to play the Mother Abbess."

Audition videos of the leads can be

viewed at www.different-stages.com. The Sound of Music runs July 8 to 27. Their next production, the play Moonlight and Magnolias, will run August 14-23. It was cast this spring as well. The next two shows, The Full Monty (November 11-22)

and The Supper Club Holiday Show (December 4-20) will be cast in September when Najuch and Froomkin return to New York to hold auditions.

Although Different Stages Theater hires professional talent, they are giving roles to a few area performers they have worked with in the past. "Our chorus of nuns is made up of students from Manchester University's vocal department where Joel is a teacher," says Najuch.

Najuch is particularly proud of Different Stage's threequarter thrust space and innovative set design by Froomkin. "Because we don't have a traditional theater set up yet for flying scenery," he says, "all of the scenery must move forward and backward - and there is a ton of it. Joel's set is lavish, full, and innovative in its execution. The space seats 310 guests on three sides, and no one is more than 10 rows from the stage. It is a very intimate space."

The production will use projections "to paint a cinematic picture of the various locations for the show," says Najuch. "It really is going to be different than what has been seen in

In fact, this innovative way of creating theater is what led to the theater's name.

"Every time someone asks us about our theater," says Najuch, "[whether it's] potential patrons, potential performers, anyone, the word that kept coming up was 'different.' It's different from other places. It's different from what people expect when they come to see a show or when they come to work on a show. We finally decided that it was really our calling card. We are just different!"

One thing that makes them different from professional "stock" theaters, in which performers rehearse one show while performing another, is their rehearsal schedule.

"We have both worked in stock theaters before," says Najuch, "and have found that we don't have the time to do the work the way we want to. We decided to create a non-stock theater. Our shows get more preparation time, almost double the rehearsal time, and we don't learn another show while one show is performing. This allows us and the performers to focus on details that we

just aren't able to when focusing on two shows at once.'

Their performers have found this approach unique but welcome. "They have all been surprised by the number of rehearsal hours and days we have," says Najuch.

Different Stages is also smaller and more intimate than many other venues. "With half of the seats of some of the other area theaters," says Najuch, "our audience will be more intimately introduced to the show and the performers. This is something that people responded to very well with our smaller Supper Club series.'

Although the theater does not have an attached restaurant, they have partnered with The Rusty Dog Irish Pub which has created a pre-theater price fixed menu so patrons can have dinner and still be assured they will make it to the show on time.

From the moment they arrived in Huntington seven years ago, Najuch and Froomkin have in-

tegrated themselves tightly into the community. They have been involved with charity talent shows and have served as board members for the Huntington County Visitor Center. Main Street Huntington and the Huntington Historical Board. They are also closely involved with the local arts council in Huntington, which helped found The Arts Initiative. "Their mission," says Najuch, "is to integrate the professional arts into the daily lives of the citizens of Huntington."

Their community ties and their love of theater have only strengthened throughout the years. The theater's blog, written by Froomkin, has a longstanding and loyal fan base. He started it in 2007 to keep their New York friends and families up to date on their Midwest adventure.

When Huntington theater lovers discovered the blog they "demanded" even more frequent posts, Najuch jokes. And once again, Froomkin happily gave the community what they wanted.

"The main comment we get from patrons," says Najuch, "is that it is clear that we love what we do. They hear us telling people about the theater, they read the blog and they read the newsletter. They get the clear picture that we love passing on our enjoyment to the patrons. We love these shows. we live and breathe them, and we do everything we can to share and introduce that love to our guests."

## **Band Without Bosses**

Question: What do you do when someone in your current band gives you walking papers?

Answer: You start your own band and call it Walkin' Papers.

That's what vocalist Joe Svec and drummer Jerry Miller did after they walked away from their former band, Pillars of Society. The long-running Walkin' Papers play a high-energy mix of classic rock, blues, and

soul tunes, all in an apparently democratic fashion.

"We're kind of making fun of the whole boss mentality when it comes to playing music," says lead singer Perry Lifsey. "Within this band there [are] no inflated egos, there's no boss. We all work together really well. So Walkin' Papers just kind of refers to, if someone's trying be the boss and trying to make a job out of it, that's not what we're in this for."

Lifsey and guitarist Devon Conroy round out the lineup, having joined about six years ago. That makes for a split in ages within the band, which Lifsey says is one of the band's strengths. "It allows each of us to bring something different to the table," he says. "We have] a lot of

different influences, but we have enough influences in common to keep it fun."

As a result, the band has been known to cover a wide variety of songs ranging from Aretha Franklin to AC/DC and Journey.

Even though they are known primarily for playing covers, Walkin' Papers have also been working on an album's worth of material and have opted to pen originals for the recording. While the album and its material are a work in progress, they're considering calling it *Paper Cuts* and hope to release it late this summer. Song titles include "Bombs Away," "Before the Fall," "Common Ground," and "I'm Tryin'."

"We want our album to be kind of like our live shows," says Lifsey. "The cover songs that we play span a pretty wide gamut, and we want our album to be the same. It's kind of blues-influenced rock n' roll, but we've got a punk song we're working on too. We've got one song that sounds like it came out of a Southern Baptist Church."

While Walkin' Papers are known for playing a wide variety of music, they consider themselves not just musicians, but showmen. The band puts an effort into making every gig a show, and not just an opportunity to hear music. To that end, they have a big percussion breakdown during their set with a conga line, where by the end of the song the entire band is playing the congas. They will also pass out cheap sunglasses to audience members during their rendition of "Soul Man," helping to get the audience involved in the show. And when it comes to audience interaction, their stage is open for dancing; the only problem with that is that it's so popular sometimes too many people try to get up on stage.

"Mostly we like people to come up and dance with us," says Lifsey. "We'll sing directly to the crowd and dance with the crowd. We get people singing along with a lot of the songs."

Walkin' Papers have been around for a long time,

but a recent development in the music world has caused them to exercise caution with how they promote themselves. Namely, there is another band from Seattle that calls itself Walking Papers (with a "g") that formed in 2012 and released a debut album that same year. A small band with a largely local following 2,000 miles away might normally not be a cause for concern, but in this case the band has garnered extra attention because their lineup includes former Guns N' Roses bassist Duff McKagen and their debut album



featured a contribution from Pearl Jam guitarist Mike McCready.

Luckily for the FortWayne locals, their band name includes an apostrophe in place of the "g," helping to distinguish them and hopefully protect them from any potential legal trouble. The organizers of their gigs don't always catch that minor but important detail. however.

"We always try to emphasize the apostrophe," says Lifsey. "It doesn't always work out. It's amazing how many clubs we play have 'Walking Papers' out

Walkin' Papers (with the apostrophe) can be seen playing about two to three times a month at Fort Wayne area venues ranging from nightclubs and bars to private parties and festivals. Some of their highlights, however, include playing specials shows and festivals like Rock the Plaza and Beatlefest.

When it comes to choosing what songs they will play, Walkin' Papers stay true to their quasi-democratic ideal of working together - at least in the sense of not doing a tune if anyone within the band is against it, but otherwise leaving things open.

Perhaps more important than what they play is how they play. The band members put a lot of emphasis on enjoying their time in the band and letting that spirit of fun spread to the audience. As a result, according to Lifsey, Walkin' Papers have to be experienced first-hand to be understood.

"The big thing [is that] people really don't know us until they see us and see us perform and hear us play. We try to advertise a lot and get out in the public a lot, but there's no way to really know our show without being there," he says. "We all get along really well; we all play well together. All the guys are good musicians, and I think that the fun that we have between us and our friendship really shows in our performance. People pick up on that, and that allows them to have fun too.'

#### **Brad Duer & the Restless Spirits**

#### A Town Called Hope

I remember the Restless Spirits when they played in last year's Battle of the Bands X. Their humble stage presence made sense for the kind of music they perform, and despite my standing close to the stage, their music was clearly understood without the volume overwhelming my ears. The individual musicians mingled nicely with each other, and their performance as a whole made me ex-



cited to know how well they would do in the competition. But while seeing them live as was one thing, hearing how Brad Duer constructs songs on record presents another experience altogether.

A Town Called Hope is Brad Duer's second full-length work and his first release with the full band of Fort Wayne musicians. With members of other renowned local acts like Elephants in Mud, the Mimi Burns Band and Afrodisiacs performing on the album, one might consider the Restless Spirits a local supergroup of sorts. Unlike a supergroup, however, and in spite of the album's 68 minutes of music stretched out over 14 songs, the Restless Spirits avoid ostentatious extremes that reek of overindulgence. The album's focus stays on music's principal songwriter. With an album of this length, there could easily be bloat, but the interesting thing about A Town Called Hope is how hard it is to tell which tracks could have been saved and developed for a later album.

"Boy, I Feel Alive" starts out like it's being played through a car radio, hinting that perhaps this music is meant to be an accompaniment on an introspective road trip to nowhere in particular. A Town Called Hope is indeed a musical adventure through different avenues of style including alternative, soul, blues, folk and even subtle hints towards rap ("Night After Night"). Fortunately, the lyrics are about as diverse as the music, and "Boy, I Feel Alive" sets an optimistic tone for the album. However, as the album progresses, we pore through a personal diary displaying both blissful highs and bitter lows.

Most of the songs truck along steadily at relatively the same tempo, making the middle part of the album seem longer than it is. A fair chunk of the album's running time is dedicated to Duer's fantastic guitar work, evident in "The Only One You Ever Need" and "Love is Crazy." "Count Back from 10" is one of many highlights, for me at least, considering how worthwhile instrumental tracks like these tend to be axed from final products.

It's hard to say who would benefit most from listening to A Town Called Hope. It's an album that has something for everyone, and won't be offended if some fans enjoy it solely as background music to everyday tasks. After listening intently to the entire work multiple times, it's clear to me that it's an album worth supporting for any number of reasons. Maybe you'll like it because of Duer's compelling guitar work. Maybe you'll enjoy it because nearly every track speaks to you in some way. Or maybe an exploration into the homespun quality of Fort Wayne's local scene is just what you need.

#### Craft Spells Nausea

Justin Vallesteros makes music that puts you in a particular place and time. He goes by the band name Craft Spells, but like many younger, shy songwriters, he's really the only guy making all that magic and putting it to tape. *Idle Labor* was Craft Spells debut for the Brooklyn record label Captured Tracks, and it



showed Vallesteros was a songwriter pulling from the early 80s alternative scene that gave us bands like Depeche Mode, New Order and a much leaner Cure. Though Craft Spells sounded like party music for a bunch of kids with eyeliner and teased hair, there was still an element of loneliness. As upbeat as it sounded, it still had the feeling of a guy alone in his bedroom making soundtracks to non-existent teen films. Three years and one EP later, Vallesteros returns with one

### Mary's Danish Gira (1991)

Another one of those L.A. bands I was able to catch during my California residency was Mary's Danish. On a musical scale, they were somewhere between X and Throwing Muses, two other great bands with strong female vocalists, multifaceted arrangements and great musicians.



This record, their third, opens with "Yellow Creep Around," a bouncy number with a dark theme and heavy harmonies (think B-52's), and goes right into the poppy, guitar-driven "Julie's Blanket." "Beat Me Up" has a sad inference, but musically is one of the better tracks and has a funky Rolling Stones vibe. "Hoof" slows things down and is a nice break on the album, as it explores an alt-country vibe. Lyrically it's one of the better songs on the release.

"Tracy in the Bathroom" comes at you with some fat horns and a fantastic bass and is another one of their ultra-funky instrumentals that they showcased in their live shows. Angry rocker "Abalone Blues" follows, and you get a chance to catch your breath again with the sultry "7 Deadly Sins."

Side two features a gritty alt-rock-ska version of Jimi Hendrix's "Foxey Lady" that works well on so many levels. "Venus Loves Leonard" sounds just like the band X. (Like they say, imitation is the sincerest form of flattery.) "Axl Rose Is Love" take a dig at the Guns vocalist and finishes up one of the best records of

of the most lush and detailed albums you'll likely hear this year. *Nausea* is a darkly lit record with the ease of a summer drive and the weight of a painful breakup.

The album opens with the title track, and the first thing you notice is the absence of electronic drums and tinkling synths. This is an album created with a band playing together. Vallesteros has assembled musicians to make this album live and breathe. "Nausea" moves and grooves slowly through four and a half minutes, as keys create a dizzying effect on the listener. Vallesteros even sings differently this time around. His voice sounding not as low, he gives the vocals a much more lovelorn feel.

Next you're treated to the absolute beauty of "Komorebi," a melancholy song that is carried along by a string part (possibly keys, possibly the real thing) and piano. Vallesteros' voice sounds as much an instrument as the piano does, delivering melody and sadness as the exquisite jazz-inflected drums carries the song along. It's a beautiful song that deserves to be played through the summer and fall on repeat. "Changing Faces" keeps the dreamy vibe going. I have to admit that this song sounds like something Vallesteros' label mate Jack Tatum might have written. Tatum's Wild Nothing has taken a similar career path, taking a drastic and wonderful turn on his sophomore album, *Nocturne*. While sounding nothing like Wild Nothing, Vallesteros has gone from a smaller concentrated sound to something much more lush and detailed, like Tatum did. This is a sound that suits Craft Spells sensibility very well.

Nausea is filled with little moments of beauty and detail, melancholy and grief. The Smiths haunt the track "Dwindle" like an unfulfilled ghost. "Twirl" bounces and shakes like the Psychedelic Furs on a sugar rush, and "Breaking the Angle Against the Tide" brings back a little of that 4AD and early 80s Sire releases sound Vallesteros perfected on *Idle Labor*, with some help from some great-sounding strings. "Still Fields (October 10, 1987)" closes the album on a beautiful and lilting note. It puts you in mind of bands like Tangerine Dream and another Captured Tracks alumni, Thieves Like Us, in particular their excellent instrumental album *Berlin/Alex*.

I can only hope that Vallesteros reads this at some point so he knows how much this album means to me and others. It's a beautiful record filled with detail, mood, emotion and heartache. He's made a wonderful musical statement, a statement heard loud and clear by these ears. (John Hubner)





## You Can't Fault Stars for Being Manipulative Early in The Fault in Our Stars we are told that most For another cinematic example of this idea watch Di-

those stories about cancer come from books and movies that turn those stories into sweet, sappy tales with improbably uplifting endings. Since we are watching a movie adapted from a novel about cancer we might wonder whether we can trust a narrator who assures us this story, her story, is going to be the honest and ugly truth.

But Hazel Grace Lancaster is no ordinary narrator. As played by Shailene Woodley, who seems to get better with every picture she makes, Hazel is too intense, wise, smart and full of sharp humor to be discounted. I knew I was walking in to a tear-jerker, and it was strangely comforting to be so blatantly told that circumstances become so grim I should prepare myself. You have to appreciate a film that wears its manipulation so proudly. A significant dose of wit and some agonizingly sincere moments cut through the manipulation.

Hazel has been sick half of her life. When we meet her she is being seen by a doctor. (Too much of her sick life has been spent being poked and advised by doctors.) Her mother is telling a doctor that Hazel has been depressed and withdrawn, and the doctor wants to increase her anti-depression meds, telling her that depression is a side effect of cancer. She insists she is not depressed and shoots back, "Depression is not a side effect of cancer. Depression is a side effect of dying."

Hazel gives us a synopsis of her disease progression. Stage four thyroid cancer was discovered when she was just a kid. She nearly died as a young teenager, but she pulled through. An experimental "miracle" drug sent her into remission. She's been in cancer limbo for years. Her illness has settled in her lungs, and she spends the movie lugging around an oxygen tank and wearing a breathing tube attached to her

Hazel spends her days watching movies and reality television and reading. Hazel is obsessed with one book, *The Imperial Affliction*, which she reads over and over. The novel is a cancer story that ends in mid-sentence and leaves Hazel with many questions.

To soothe her worried parents, she attends a teen cancer support group. Laura Dern and Sam Trammell do a good job



in the thankless roles of Hazel's parents. As Hazel says, "The only thing that bites worse than having cancer is having a kid with cancer."

At a group meeting she meets Augustus "Gus" Waters, a cocky survivor who lost half a leg to cancer but is full of confidence and has been cancer free for some time. Ansel Elgort, who played Woodley's brother in *Divergent*, is less boy band sappy handsome than the movie poster's image of him. He pulls off a believable and likable performance in a role that isn't easy, the perfect friend who becomes the perfect boyfriend.

Gus turns Hazel in to a typical teenager. She waits by the phone for his calls but easily steals his heart. He becomes equally enamored of *The Imperial Affliction* and manages to strike up a correspondence with Peter Van Houten, the reclusive author of the book who lives in Amsterdam. Gus gives her plenty of grief for that. Gus uses his cancer kid wish to set up a trip to Amsterdam for them to meet the recluse. Hazel used her wish, pre-miracle drug, to go to Disney World, a clichéd choice that Gus gives her grief about.

After perils and pitfalls, they do get to Amsterdam. Predictably Van Houten, the wonderful Willem Dafoe, is a nasty disappointment. He's mean and drunk. What's worse, he says awful things that are true; he says the ugly things Hazel promises at the beginning of the film. But Hazel and Gus have a falling-in-love trip anyway. They are on a beautiful adventure. Van Houten's misery cannot keep them down.

The time in Amsterdam is a perfect fantasy. What cancer survivors and their loved ones are looking for is a good day, or a few good days. If they are lucky, they might get a few good weeks, maybe even a good year or two. And this is where *The Fault in Our Stars* shames the healthy. Shouldn't we all be grateful for every good day, or few days, etc.? But are we? Usually not.

(For another cinematic example of this idea watch *Diana*, a movie much better than most of its reviews. Not only is Naomi Watts wonderful as Diana, the fantasy that Diana found some happiness and aspired to find happiness is a princess fantasy I can appreciate.)

In Amsterdam, Gus and Hazel visit the Anne Frank House, and the movie goes over the top. Cancer and the Holocaust are not comparable experiences, but adolescence is a common experience Hazel shares with Anne. Hearing Anne's words about how she believes, after everything, that people are essentially good makes it easy for Hazel to forget Van Houten and get back to being Hazel the Tough and Resilient.

I can imagine many teenage girls and boys drawn to Hazel and Gus. They are given the space, because of their illness, to do what they want. Isn't that what every adolescent (regardless of age) wants, to be left alone in his or her little universe? They joke about their ability to dodge stuff they don't want to do, even without having to utter the word "cancer." Patrick (a surprising Mike Birbiglia), the cancer support group leader, has settled in to an oddly comfortable adolescent life in his parents' basement. Terminal cancer has given him permission for an interminable adolescence.

Screenwriters Scott Neustadter and Michael H. Weber have taken the winsome charm they brought to 500 Days of Summer and applied it to a more sober tale. Wonderful moments far outnumber the few scenes that make you squirm. Director Josh Boone knows to keep the camera focused on Woodley, the force that makes all that surrounds her sympathetic. I'm told this team is true John Greene's novel, which means the book should be sold with something to absorb the tears.

Hazel is fond of thinking "Some infinities are bigger than other infinities." In the infinity of movies *The Fault in Our Stars* has a place in several categories. When I stop sniffling, I'll work on just where it fits. In the meantime, if you are looking for an effective weepie (and who isn't?), go see *The Fault in Our Stars*. In the dark, fewer people can see you cry.

## **An Ordinary Summer**

One Summer: America, 1927 by Bill Bryson, Doubleday, 2013

In some ways, Bill Bryson is the victim of his own success. Having

first hit the bestseller lists in the 90s with A Walk in the Woods, he established himself as a humorous travel writer, but since then he's shown himself to be a more academically-minded guy than that – a disparity that some people find hard to accept. It gets him into trouble with some of his nonhumorous, non-travel books, and his latest, One Summer, is a good example. It's a popular-history book, not a travelogue, and it's

not particularly funny. That, un-

fortunately, means those expecting the old, funny Bryson could have a bad reaction to One Summer.

BRYSOM The premise of One Summer is a comprehensive look at the historic events that happened to coincide in the summer of 1927. The big one, the one Bryson spends the most time with, is Charles Lindbergh's solo flight across the Atlantic, the first such

feat ever accomplished, but the momentous events of the summer that Bryson chronicles also include Babe Ruth's phenomenal year with the New York Yankees, a sensational murder case, a catastrophic flood of the Mississippi River and several other big news items. It was a busy summer, and Bryson aims to make the case that it was one of the busiest and most important summers in American history.

Bryson's book was notoriously ripped apart in the Washington Post by historian Douglas Brinkley who accuses Bryson of writing an inaccurate trifle cribbed from Wikipedia. He compares the book to a Danielle Steele romance, a Cliffs Notes summary, a Ripley's Believe It or Not sideshow, a pamphlet bought at Cracker Barrel and Paul Harvey "schmaltz," among lots of other detestable things. Brinkley's review is ferocious in its attack on Bryson's easy-toread history – and it's a curious approach for a guy like Brinkley, who is pursuing a career as a popular-celebrity historian and who regularly contributes to network news shows. The review is unfair in its elitist tone, and it seems written by someone unfamiliar with Bryson's books about, for instance, linguistics or the history of science

or Shakespeare.



Yes, Bryson's history of the summer of 1927 is easy to read, and it doesn't break any new ground. He includes jokes instead of lists of facts, and sometimes he lapses into hyperbole and cliché (an alarming number of people were "killed instantly" in accidents in 1927). Some of the factoids that Bryson doles out aren't accurate, but I'd wager that the same could be said of any history book, including those that are as

dry and academic as can be. None of those things are reason enough to dismiss the book entirely, and Bryson has done much more research and understands the era much better than someone like Brinkley gives him SUMMER credit for.

If there's something to take issue with here, it might be Bryson's implication that

the summer of 1927 was remarkable in any profound way. Sure, the season was the chronological site of a major technological feat, a natural disaster, a major sports story, political shenanigans and a lurid crime story in the news. If you think about it, is there any summer, in practically any year, that doesn't see most of those things happen? One could pick probably two dozen summers since 1927 during which most, if not all of those kinds of events came together over the span of a few months.

That's not to say that a lot of fascinating things didn't happen in the summer of 1927, and Bryson presents them in a way that makes them accessible to a general audience. He constructs an image of a summer that was hot, full of excitement and hope, but also characterized by an almost equal amount of trepidation and disorientation. It might not have been America's most important summer, but it was definitely one of America's most important summers. And even if Bryson's book stays close to the surface and looks at events in a predictable way, it doesn't suffer from a lack of heft. Bryson clearly is not a Wikipedia plagiarizer, and One Summer offers a much more informative and valuable history lesson than any two-minute segment on the TV news.



## Studios Cashing It In

Tops at the Box: The year's most No Thank You film, Think Like a Man Too, took the No. 1 spot at last weekend's box office, selling

Also at the Box: 22 Jump Street also had a strong weekend, selling another \$29 million, bringing the flick's 10-day total to an impressive \$111 million, good enough for the No. 2 spot at last weekend's U.S. box office. Another studio cash-in.

Taking the No. 3 spot at last weekend's box office was *How to Train* Your Dragon 2, yet another sequel. Yay sequels! Isn't it super cool how much money all these sure-thing projects are making? I love it! I wish I worked as a studio head so I could tell all the creative consultants "I told you so" every morning as we drink our delicious coffee drinks. I hope original projects go the way of the CD and we can live in a revolving series of endless sequels. Wouldn't that be great? That way we'd have more time to think about photos of our dinners, purchasing soccer jerseys and funny tweets. What an incredibly rewarding existence that would be, if only we didn't have original films to waste our brain cells on.

Okay, getting back on track: Warner Bros.' Jersey Boys, directed by Clint Eastwood, took the No. 4 spot at the box, selling \$13 million over its first three days of release. The film stars Mark Wahlberg in the lead role and director Michael Bay once again at the helm. The truth is that these *Transformers* flicks are, as far as production value goes, about as state-of-the-art as movies come. You can go ahead and assume that Bay is pulling every string he can to make Age of Extinction the year's biggest spectacle. Whether or not that spectacle is worth paying \$12 to see is up to you. Me? artists, pogo stick acrobatics and more.

"We have a few new performers this year," said Howard. "Pogo Fred is one we're pretty excited about. He is from Cincinnati and holds multiple Guinness World Records for pogo stick stunts. He'll be doing some high-flying tricks during a couple of performances throughout the day, so folks should definitely be on the lookout for those.'

Most of the talent, though, is local. That means if you see an act you like, there's a very good chance you can catch them again in the near fu-

ture.
"When we need to, we bring in regional acts, but as the momentum for BuskerFest has grown, we've focused our programming on local musicians and buskers. We've been culminating that local feel since the inception of the event five years ago," Howard went on to explain.

"Every year, we program more local entertainment - like Mark Abbati, whom you may recognize as the living army guy statue at various regional events. He's been a fixture of BuskerFest just about every year, and he has worked with us to come up with creative programming ideas like living statue workshops at other events around the city."

Howard says that even with BuskerFest, people in a market the size of Fort Wayne aren't really used to seeing buskers in the performance art community. So while the event is in part a big downtown Fort Wayne party, it's also championing the arts community and celebrating the progress made toward accepting various types of street performance art.

"In a lot of ways, BuskerFest has helped legitimize

busking as a performance art in our area. Until fairly recently there was an ordinance that labeled performers like this as a form of solicitation," he said. "Anyone who opened a guitar case and played on the street was classified as a panhandler under that ordinance. There was a movement about four or five years ago to change that. Bill Brown, the president of the Down-

town Improvement District, was one of the voices asserting that these people - street performers and buskers provide legitimate entertainment value ... and that street performances like these should be encouraged as part of our vibrant arts community. The Downtown Improvement District worked fairly diligently with other local leaders to strike down that ordinance.

"It's still been a climb to overcome the previous mindset that these individuals are just seeking funds when they are providing real enter-

tainment value. So BuskerFest has also become a celebration of street performance art. It's about visibility, acceptance and encouragement of creativity in our arts

Also, be sure to come hungry. Downtown restaurants and food trucks will serve up tasty local fare, and JK O'Donnell's will host a beer tent on Wayne Street. An art market will set up shop at One Summit Square with a variety of unique crafts and displays by local

So make a day of it with the whole family at one of the biggest downtown parties of the year. And don't forget to expect the unexpected, as you never know what wonder will unfold at BuskerFest.
