Although Styx were a constant presence on radio during the 70s and 80s, even the casual fan became aware of some simmering tension within the group.

Each member of the band had a strong musical and artistic identity, and as the band evolved, Dennis DeYoung's theatrical approach began to clash significantly

open for Styx in the new Forum," recalls Gowan. "It was my first opportunity to play in the new Forum, and I thought it would be a great experience. It was a solo show, just me on the piano with no band, and I was called out for a couple of encores. much success and whose members have been much loved for many years. He was joining a band which had been somewhat fractured and gaining an audience which may have divided loyalties. It turned out there was little need for him to worry.

"There was a lot of drama when I joined, so it was awkward. but not for me. I didn't have anything to do with any of that, so I didn't have to deal with it. Going out in front of an audience of Styx fans was a little daunting. but I had the confidence to believe that I could capture the spirit of Styx, that it was accomplishable. "Our

show was in Branson, Missouri, and wasn't until I drew my breath sing 'The Grand Illusion' that I realized that this would be the first time Styx would perform that song with a different voice. different inflections, different interpretations of the lyrics. Four minutes later I realized that the au-

Gowan has now played over 2,000 shows with the band, which still includes longtime members James Young, Tommy Shaw and Chuck Panozzo along with Ricky Phillips and Todd Sucherman. In 2003, they released Cyclorama, their first album with Gowan. It was a move that was key to his full immersion as a Styx member.

"That was pivotal, to be part of the creation of new music and a new album release. But there remains an insatiable demand for Styx to play live, so we have to realize that demand and work writing and recording around that. Getting to play live is really important because it's something you can't download. An epic rock show is something that we can give people."

More recently Styx have joined fellow rock icons Don Felder (formerly of the Eagles) and Foreigner (who also recently visited Fort Wayne) for a big arena tour and a CD, both titled The Soundtrack of Summer. Revisiting classic songs with new vocalists provided still further opportunities to stake a claim to music as-

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
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
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
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Primed & Ready to Launch

-----Feature • Jessica Hernandez & the Deltas ------

It's difficult to describe the fresh-faced yet down-and-dirty charm Detroit native Jessica Hernandez brings to her art. Imag-

ine a young and unspoiled Amy Winehouse before all the drugs and drama. Now add two parts Aretha Franklin, one part Patsy Cline and three dashes of Florence Welch of Florence + the Machine and you just might be getting close. Still, Hernandez isn't just a set of pipes. She's also got heart, drive and one hell of a story.

Here's how a reviewer with Huffington Post put it: "Jessica Hernandez has a vision that's such a wild and complex collage of creativity that nobody can really guess what she might do next."

Luckily for local audiences, one item on Hernandez's to-do list is a stop at the Botanical Roots concert series Friday, August 15 when she'll appear with her five-piece band, the Deltas. They'll be performing songs off Hernadez's debut album, Secret Evil, which will drop August 19.

Hernandez wasn't always going to be a front woman. A child

of Cuban immigrant bakers, she moved from Detroit to Chicago after high school to study fashion design.

"I loved making clothes," she told me in a recent phone conversation. Hernandez and the Deltas - Michael Krygier (guitar), Steve Lehane (bass), Taylor Pierson (keys and accordion), John Raleeh

(trombone) and Stephen Stetson (drums) were in Boise as part of their most recent cross-country tour.

"That was my thing in high school. My parents weren't so sure about it. They thought I could do fashion without a degree. My dad is pretty much a walking version of the American dream. He came here from

Cuba and opened up his own bakery. He's very self-made, and my mother is, too. I think they were hoping I'd figure out how to make my dreams come true without col-

Odd as it may sound, Hernandez's parents were thrilled when she informed them that she was dropping out of college to pur-

sue music. They had always championed her singing, even when she was convinced she had very little real talent.

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"I'd been singing since I was five, but I was sure my voice sucked, that my parents were only encouraging me to be nice and because they had to. I was super shy. That didn't help. But I got over it, mostly because I started writing my own music and it became less about performing and more about telling a story.'

The stories Hernandez tells in her songs take on everything from depression and sui-

cide to man-stealing and self sabotage. Much of what she has to say deals with her love affair with Detroit. She returned to the Motor City after her short stint in Chicago, and nothing could have prepared her for how much love and inspiration she would find there.

"Detroit can be very depressing at times, and because of that it's very inspirational; it's the perfect muse," she said. "I think it's hard for artists to get much done when they live in a place where there's always something fun to do, always something shiny to look at. Detroit forces you to be introverted, to look inside, and that's one reason there's always been such a vibrant music and arts scene here. You're sort of forced to work on what you love instead of going out every night."

Hernandez moved back in with her parents and started performing with her band in a loft space above the family bakery. Soon, music lovers were packing the place, excited to see and hear a hometown girl making good, and that led to Hernandez and the Deltas eventually hitting the road in support of their

five-song EP, Demons. Demons caught the ear of execs at Blue Note records who signed them on and sent them to Sonic Ranch in El Paso, Texas to record Secret Evil. Then, as often happens in the biz, Blue Note got bought out by Universal. Hernandez decided she'd rather go with an independent label than get lost in the shuffle. She and the boys signed with New York City's Instant Records, and now, two years later, they're on the verge of seeing their first studio album hit the shelves and, of course, cyberspace.

'It took a really long time for the album to finally be ready. It feels like I wrote the music and recorded the songs forever ago. The business side of things obviously delayed things a lot, but now we're really excited to see what happens next."

sociated with their original singers. Gowan says Styx also hopes to record again soon, to keep adding to their catalog of songs. But they also understand that people are still turning up to hear the older classics, and Gowan says the demand for that isn't just coming from the generation that grew up with it.

"About nine years ago we started noticing that there were more and more people under the age of 30 in the audiences. And they weren't just the children of or younger brother and sister of our older fans; they were finding Styx on their own. They found

videos on YouTube and came upon us in a variety of cultural references like South Park or The Simpsons or a movie soundtrack. We're reaching a point where half our audience weren't even born yet when the classic hits came out."

Gowan is kept busy with Styx but also has plans to work on his solo career, hoping to record when the opportunity presents itself. He continues to reap rewards for his own work and has been honored for having three hit songs earn classic status, a Canadian measure which means a song has been played 100,000 times or more. Having had that level of success on his own and now again with one of this country's most popular heritage bands, Gowan notes that rock music has earned its cultural place in the arts along side some of the greats he studied along the

"People still want to hear Beethoven's 'Fifth Symphony' played by the London Philharmonic, and that's how it is with classic rock songs now. I don't want to be as cliché as to say it's now 'legitimate,' but it is a bona fide, respectable form of music."

Bullish on the Region

Before his arrival in Fort Wayne in 2003, when he assumed the executive director position at the Fort Wayne Museum of Art, Charles Shepard had a choice to make about where he wanted to set down roots. Originally from Maine, he finished graduate school intent on becoming an art professor before deciding to broaden that ambition.

"I realized I could be a professor, but I could also run a university art museum, which I did at the Uni-

versity of Michigan, University of Maine, Ohio University and Connecticut College, where I specialized in starting a museum or repairing one that was in trouble. But I struggled with the notion of wanting to work more for the community. I was fortunate in that some of those universities allowed me to work with the community, but in a university system, that comes first and the community comes second."

Determined to make a mark in a community beyond university guidelines, Shepard was sought out by headhunters looking to fill positions in a variety of exciting locations, including New York, Los Angeles, England and Puerto Rico. But another option existed, one in Fort Wayne, and it was that opportunity which spoke to his ambition to build a top

notch museum in a community. Why Fort Wayne?

"For me it was an interesting combination of things. It was a new-ish museum, having been built in 1984. The museum dated back 57 years, but the building itself was young for an institution, so there was this almost brand new building downtown, in the heart of the city. And I studied the situation that they had here. At that point they were focused on an audience that was self-identified. In other words, we liked the people who liked us instead of focusing on the people who don't know you. I wanted to fix that.'

In his 11 years with the museum (Shepard celebrated his anniversary on July 1), he has grown the collection dramatically. While he inherited a museum which had 1,300 objects in its collection after almost six decades, the seventh decade saw 1,800 more items added. Instead of two galleries, a recent expansion now provides nine galleries in addition to more meeting rooms, more storage space and an expanded gift shop. The additional pieces have also allowed Shepard to completely shift the way the museum has been doing business.

"We no longer look to book 'pre-fab' shows, preferring instead to tap into our own collection and just borrowing things to add to an exhibit. Before the renovation, we would look through rental exhibit catalogs and bring in shows that were visiting Chicago or Wisconsin. Now we've become the one who rents our shows to other museums. Our recent Afro show is now in Seattle. It may take us another two to three years to get the word out that we have exhibits to share. It's just a light under the basket, but we'll let that light come out from under the basket."

Shepard is also proud of the increasing numbers

of people who visit the museum and especially touts the geographic and demographic diversity. Upon his arrival he began to target people who lived within a 90-minute drive, tapping into the largeness of the overall northeastern Indiana community and bringing in shows which attract a more racially diverse audience as well. He's found working within the confines of a city the size of Fort Wayne a refreshing change from other larger metropolitan areas.

"Anybody can get involved and make something happen. You don't have to be a special person to sit

> down and talk to the mayor. A lot of cities are structured very differently, and you have to be there for 20, 25 years before you can do anything. The professor in me knew I wanted to go somewhere where people would pay attention. People talk about New York, Los Angeles, Boston and think the people all know about art and theater. But, of course, they don't. People here don't try to do that. They aren't pretentious. It makes it easier to do

> Having accomplished a lot in just a decade on the job, you might wonder if Shepard is looking for greener pastures, considering another place to repair and grow a museum. But he says he sees another 10 to 20 years of growth possible for the Fort Wayne Museum of Art and has a lot of plans for

how to make it even better.

"Right now we have about 3,500 objects, but I'd like to take it to 10,000 to 12,000 in the future. I'd also like to take the museum's endowment to \$10 to \$12 million to make the future more secure. I also want to generate a sculpture collection that would bring scholars here to publish about the collection and have shows that feature the sculptures.'

Shepard says the recent series of glass exhibits have brought international audiences to the city. Those visitors not only benefit the museum and help grow its reputation, but it has helped generate good publicity for the city.

"People who come for these exhibits will stay an extra three days just to spend time in the city. They'll take in a ballgame or enjoy the restaurants, and no one has ever had anything but good to say about those times they spend in Fort Wayne. Plus, we can bring in these artists and show Fort Wayne these influences while returning the favor and showing them our city."

All of this growth and innovation – in a downtown area which has grown tremendously in his short tenure with the museum - has validated Shepard's choice of Fort Wayne over cities that might have been higher on a director's list of possible choices. But Shepard reiterates what he sees as the city's greatest strength.

There's a real can-do environment here. I'm bullish on downtown and bullish on the region. If you say you want to do something, you're going to be able to do it. Other places have so many obstacles. I grew up in Maine and had someone complain to me that even if you live in Maine for 30 years, you can't run for city council because people think you're an out-of-towner. But it's not like that here."

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

Hypnotic Eye

Hypnotic Eye, the new album by Tom Petty and the Heartbreakers, has the sound of an album that was just announced this spring. It has an immediate, jammy feel to it that indicates it was recorded live in a spontaneous setting.

Which isn't to say that it's underdeveloped – the songs are well put together, and there are few (if any) actual mistakes, but it's



definitely not overworked or overproduced. The guitars are raw and grimy, and Petty's sometimes nasally tone is often delivered through some form of distortion.

The amped-up, distorted effects have a heightening effect on Petty's mystique as a singer-songwriter. At surface level, his lyrics are often deceptively simple, yet deeper meanings seem to be harbored underneath. What seems to have come to the forefront on *Hypnotic Eye* is his cynicism.

Take album opener "American Dream Plan B," in which the narrator says "I'm half-lit / I can't dance for sh**," but in the chorus repeats "I've got a dream and I'm gonna fight 'til I get it." People who only listen in passing might mistake it for having a rah-rah style of American sloganeering, but "American Dream Plan B" may just join a batch of well-known songs – Springsteen's "Born in the U.S.A." Neil Young's "Rockin' In the Free World," and John Mellencamp's "Little Pink Houses" – where the actual meaning of the song is the opposite of the wholehearted anthem it's taken for. Later in the song the narrator reveals a sense of uncertainty if not outright hopelessness: "Daddy's just mad / 'cuz I ain't gonna have the chance he had / My success is anybody's guess / But like a fool I'm bettin' on happiness."

But just as it's not an anthem, neither is it exactly a stinging indictment. Themes of dilapidation ("Burnt Out Town"), escape ("All You Can Carry") and questionable characters ("Power Drunk," "Forgotten Man," and "Shadow People") litter *Hypnotic Eye's* lyrical landscape. But it's not a gloomy or completely sardonic record. As a primo songwriter, Petty may have a curmudgeonly outlook, but he's also able to capture the humanity and complexity in his cast of characters, avoiding simplistic, two-dimensional readings.

While the album has sonic and songwriting strengths, where it may fall short is in comparison to some of Petty's past successes. It isn't exactly the parade of hits that, say, *Damn the Torpedoes* or *Full Moon Fever* were. In fact, while the majority of the album may standout singles that may land a slot on the Top 40 charts. That's not a bad thing; it just means that the material contained within may miss some of the casual audience who like his hit singles.

For those willing to dig a little deeper, however, *Hypnotic Eye* is the kind of album that rewards the repeat listen. (*Ryan Smith*)

White Fence

For the Recently Found Innocent

I'll start by saying that, unlike so many others, I'm not the diehard fan of this garage rock revival. I recognize the greatness of guys like Ty Segall, John Dwyer and White Fence's Tim Presley possess. Their musical output is quite staggering, and to the newbie it can be rather intimidating. Much like someone walking into



the Guided By Voices vault and wondering where to start, these guys tend to put out two or three albums a year, making finding a proper jumping off point rather difficult.

Presley seems to be the less prolific (though four albums as White Fence since 2010, as well as a collaborative record, *Hair*, with Segall is nothing to turn your nose up at). For The Recently Found Innocent is his first release since 2012s Family Perfume Vol. 2 and last year's leftovers-turned-full-on-album, Cyclops Reap. It's a tight 40 minutes of paisley-tinted psych, late-60s British invasion pop, and good old rock n' roll.

"The Recently Found" opens up the album strangely, with noises and echoing in the background before "Anger! Who Keeps You Un-

Fragile (1972)

The fourth album from Yes was also the debut for keyboardist Rick Wakeman who replaced co-founder Tony Kaye. This was the record that featured "Roundabout," one of their most familiar songs, and several other compositions that clocked in at almost 10



minutes. It was progressive rock in every sense but also dabbled in classical and psychedelic.

In "Roundabout," Yes' band members are up to the task with strong keyboards, bass and drumming. It's an eight-and-a-half minute jam that appears to open a fantastic release.

But the guys (and their egos) follow with "Cans and Brahms" a classical piece that takes the tempo down, followed by the sugary, harmonic "We Have Heaven." Side one closes (and is saved) with "South Side of the Sky," a groovy jam with brilliant arrangements for guitars and keyboards. In my opinion, it really is the best song on the album.

Side two features another radio-friendly track in "Long Distance Runaround," the B-side to "Roundabout." Singer Jon Anderson wrote the song to show his aggravation towards religious hypocrisy, and yet everybody apparently missed the message. I do enjoy "The Fish" which is sort of the instrumental piece that sounds like it's part of "Long Distance." "Mood for a Day" is Steve Howe basically playing his 12-string for three minutes – very well, I would add. It's kind of show-offy for my taste, but they were Yes; it's what they did.

The album closes with "Heart of the Sunrise," a prog-rock template with a dreamy opening that features crafty musicianship from the band. It slows in the middle but finishes a pretty good record with a few minor setbacks where pace is concerned.

Fun Fact: Yes released their 21st album, *Heaven & Earth*, last month, but neitherAnderson nor Wakeman are still with the band. (*Dennis Donahue*)

der?" comes rolling in like splash of mid-60s Stones. Presley seems to have a more madcap lean to his work – something like a less freaked out Syd Barrett or a more in-the-clouds version of Ray Davies. The Kinks are mined quite frequently on this album and that's a good thing. "Like That" is a bouncy track that would've been comfortable sitting alongside "David Watts" or "Harry Rag." Sonically the song has the sound of an old basement jam session, dehumidifier humming in the background as a lava lamp glows in the distance while the afternoon light barely makes its way through the dingy basement window.

"Sandra (When the Earth Dies)" sounds like a Donovan B-side with a hint of Jim Noir's *Tower Of Love* thrown in for good measure. "Wolf Gets Red Faced" has a sound that brings to mind early Kinks singles combined with the breezy California jangle of The Byrds. Then "Goodbye Law" comes out from nowhere and knocks it out of the park. Leaving the echo box in another room, it's a sparse, acoustic-strummed track that doesn't sound distant but close and personal. "Arrow Man" is a hell of a rock n' roll song that owes more to The Stranglers than the British Invasion. "Hard Water" has more of that sleepy acoustic vibe, much like buddy (and *Found Innocent*'s producer) Ty Segall's 2013 album, *Sleeper*, with some great slide guitar and pedal steel to give it breezy late-60s California vibe. "Afraid Of What It's Worth" sounds more early 80s Liverpool than mid-60s Liverpool, owing more to Echo and the Bunnymen than any mop tops.

Throughout For the Recently Found Innocent, Presley makes great psych and garage-tinted pop and rock. He hits all the staples: The Kinks, The Stones, The Beatles, plus some other surprises. This is White Fence's most straightforward rock album and accessible record to date.

Plenty of reverb? Check. Fuzzy riffs? Check. Psychedelic imagery? Check. Breezy, stoned pop? Check. Drop the needle and enjoy. (*John Hubner*)

Even though nobody buys their albums anymore, **Limp Bizkit** continue to tour and play to those who remember nu-metal through rose-colored glasses. **Fred Durst** and company will join with rapper **Machine Gun Kelly** to let people know they're releasing another new album that they shouldn't buy. That album, the ridiculously titled *Stampede of the Disco Elephants*, should come out this fall. In the meantime, you can catch Limp Bizkit September 28 in Chicago, October 1 at the Murat in Indianapolis or October 3 at The Fillmore in Detroit.

Rob Zombie is bringing his Great American Nightmare to Villa Park, Illinois, near Chicago. The haunted house experience will feature three attractions based on Zombie's horror films: *The Lords of Salem In Total Black Out, The Haunted World of El Superbeasto 3D* and *Haunt of 1,000 Corpses*. The event takes place September 26-October 1. Tickets are already on sale. Opening night will also feature a live concert by Mr. Zombie as well.

Melodic Rock Fest has trimmed its run from three dates to two, going with a Friday night show and a Saturday night show only rather than include a Sunday show as well. The lineup was inevitably trimmed as well but there are many great bands still on the bill. Work of Art, Adriangale, Maxx Explosion and Johnny Lima headline the Friday event while H.E.A.T., Jimi Jamison of Survivor, Guardian, Tango Down and Paul Laine of Danger Danger headline Saturday's show. Oh year, the ticket price got cut too, from \$65 per day to \$25. These are bands and artists that don't play the U.S. often, so if you are a fan of melodic rock, the awesome H.O.M.E. Bar in Chicago is the place to be October 3-4.

Could there be a **Kiss** without **Gene Simmons** and **Paul Stanley**, the two remaining original members of the band? Longtime manager Doc McGhee confirmed speculation recently that there are plans to replace all four current band members. "I believe that KISS can go on forever," explains McGhee in a documentary about the band. "I believe that there is a way – and we are talking to people and we're pretty close to finding the four new members of KISS." A televised talent show (well, there's an original idea) is being talked about in order to find the new KISS lineup and keep the band alive for another generation. No matter what happens, you can be sure Simmons will continue making money off the Kiss name. The man never met a dollar he didn't like.

For Lucy, Leave 90% of Your Brain at Home

Luc Besson, the writer and director of Lucy, is a reliable visual stylist, which often helps him slip and slide past limp plot twists and stories with holes in them – even in stories, like this one, that he has written. He is also quite comfortable, even enamored, with strong female characters. Lucy has both visual style and a strong female character, but these elements don't completely carry the film over or through a predictable story and a string of cliché characters.

The idea that humans use only 10 percent of their brain capacity is one of those statements that gets repeated and repeated, despite being untrue. Lucy imagines what human experience would be like if we did only use 10 percent of our brains, but one person gained access to the use of her entire brain. The results aren't pretty. Well, they are kind of pretty because this mind-blowing experience happens to Scarlett

Lucy begins with cells dividing, and they fill the screen with vibrant blues and vibrating bits of other colors. The message is that there is more going on in the world than is visible to the naked eye. But some things are visible and recognizable to anyone using even a small percentage of her brain capacity. When we meet Lucy (Johansson in her party girl, streetwise persona), she is trying to drag her boyfriend off to do something fun. They haven't been together long, and this isn't a serious relationship. Still, she reluctantly agrees to deliver a briefcase for him.

Big mistake. Somewhere in her brain she knows it, but she does it anyway. We know she's going to make this mistake because this movie has to get going. The briefcase belongs to Mr. Jang (Choi Min-sik), the leader of a brutal gang in Taipei. Bodies start dropping and blood flows, so we know just how serious these guys are.

All the hubbub is about a new synthetic drug in the form of blue crystals. Jang uses mules to transport the drug, and he implants some in Lucy. Her packet ruptures, and as the drug



leaks into her system, the effect is mind-expanding. But this is not your usual high; she starts to gain access to more of her "little grey cells," as Hercule Poirot would say.

This idea should be so much more fun than it is. There are scenes of action and menace and amazing effects, but the smarter Lucy gets, the more ridiculous the story gets. Lucy becomes less and less appealing, more zombie-like and less interested in anything human. She goes from wearing a cheesy leopard print jacket to clingy T-shirt with a very sexy lacy bra underneath.

Besson is having some fun with us with odd touches like this. I wish there were more silly flourishes. Johansson recently played a character who has a voracious expanding intelligence. In Her, we never see her, and she isn't even human, but as a voice and an operating system she is a more compelling presence.

One of Lucy's few resources during her evolution is a brain researcher. The film occasionally cuts to Dr. Samuel Norman who is lecturing in Paris about brain function. This device of schooling the audience on how the brain works perhaps could have worked, but we'll never know because Dr. Norman is played by Morgan Freeman. He has taken a break from playing God to play a God-like character. This may be one of Besson's jokes on us, but for me, Freeman has exhausted my interest in seeing him play this kind of role.

Lucy occasionally checks in with Dr. Norman. She knows that her powers are distorting her. She wants to get all the blue drug she can and get to Paris to talk to Dr. Norman, but this mission isn't compelling.

At first, Lucy does things like walk into a hospital, shoot the patient being treated and demand the doctor take the drug packet out of her. Her expanding brain means she can read X-rays, so she knows the patient she killed is terminal, as if that makes killing him okay.

After this, Lucy and her feats just get more and more outlandish. As her brain expands, the percentage of her brain in action appears on the screen, and it keeps increasing. She can learn a language in a car ride. She can read all of Dr. Norman's research in less than a day. She can freeze people in their tracks. She can see the electronic web of cell phone conversations and tap into them at will. She can change her appearance or make her hands webbed. Eventually, she will be able to slip through time and defy gravity.

I expect movies to move to their own logic and make only movie sense, but Lucy doesn't even bother to make sense on its own terms. The further along the movie goes. the more every frame exists to allow Besson to show us what he wants to show us. Visually, Lucy is a pleasure, but even at a short 90 minutes, Lucy runs on and on. Hey, if the director wants to inter-cut animal footage of hunting or mating, why

A cop named Del Rio (Amr Waked) hangs in with Lucy because she needs a human companion and perhaps because that gives Besson an excuse to revert back to human-like action sequences as he sees fit. We've seen Lucy stop time. Why are we in a chase scene in the middle of Paris?

If you're really needing a dose of a hot, gun-toting super chick, Lucy will satisfy, as long as a film that stops making sense early on is okay (and you can overlook egregious Asian gangster stereotypes). But Lucy is the kind of film that will be in cable rotation soon, so you could just wait and see it from your couch, glorying in not bothering more than 10 percent of your brain.

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Short Leash Works Best

The Girl Who Loved Tom Gordon by Stephen King, Scribner, 1999

The plot of Stephen King's *The Girl Who Loved Tom Gordon* is extremely simple. Nine-year-old Trisha McFarland is on a Saturday-morning day hike with her mother and older brother on the Appalachian Trail near the border of Maine and New Hampshire. It's the kind of trip that the kids' mother has been taking them on regularly since she and her husband split up, and the trips are typically characterized by tension between Trisha's mother, Quilla, and her brother, Pete. In order to

get out of range of the bickering

between the two, Trisha is hanging

back on the trail, and when she

makes a quick off-trail pit stop to use the bathroom, Pete and Quilla don't even notice and just keep walking.

The trouble begins when Trisha tries to make her way back to the trail. She decides to take a shortcut—something experienced hikers know is never a good idea—and within minutes she is hopelessly turned around

and lost. The rest of the book follows Trisha through panic and resolve. She stumbles and falls, gets attacked by all manner of insects, struggles to find food and water and is, apparently, stalked by some snuffling, menacing, but unseen creature in the deep woods. She moves through the wilderness, very quickly understanding the real possibility that she could die out here.

Trisha keeps herself going by reaching out toward sustaining memories. She has a radio with her, and she uses it to listen to broadcasts of Boston Red Sox games. The games keep her connected to memories of her father, and eventually she comes to think of her favorite player, Red Sox relief pitcher Tom Gordon, as a ghostly guardian who is keeping

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her safe during her ordeal.

This novel is Stephen King at his most compact, without all the tangents and fillers that have tended to make his novels heftier than they need to be. Here King stakes out a single story thread, and he sticks to it with unusual discipline. He gets Trisha lost in the woods at the very beginning of the book, and he stays with her throughout. There are no grand, ancient evil monsters whose backstories need to be explained, no lengthy list of characters, all of whom must wan-

der around doing things of only moderate interest. On the few brief occasions when the point of view shifts from Trisha, it's only to provide context for the story. Even the hallucinatory encounters with the phantom baseball player who gives his name to the book are surprisingly restrained and understated.

King also keeps himself under control in terms of the voice in which he writes the book. Unlike in Claire Cameron's The Bear, where the author was so self-consciously trying to write in the voice of a small child that the book became very difficult to read, King doesn't go out of his way to try to make Trisha sound like a child. But neither does he - and this is significant compared to the way King tends to write - make her sound like an old guy from Maine. In fact, the book is so light on the typical King-esque slang and jargon that it's not even easy to tell that it was written 15 years ago. Trisha's voice is clear and unaffected, and it doesn't get in the

Some of King's shorter books that have been rising to the surface lately (this one was written in 1999, and I only picked it up because my library happened to get a new copy of it recently) have shown a side of the writer that's much more flattering than much of his output from the 80s and 90s. Like last year's Joyland, a similarly short and disciplined novel, Tom Gordon stays focused. Compared to Doctor Sleep, the bloated sequel to The Shining that was also published last year, these two relatively short novels show what King can do when he keeps himself on a short leash.

The Newest Must-See TV

I recently saw a pilot that hit like a shiv to the eardrums. (Both ears. One then the other. *That hard*.)

HBO's *The Leftovers* is off to a painfully promising start thanks to some creative direction from Peter Berg – so painfully promising that I asked myself the following silly question: "Is S01E01 of this show the greatest pilot I've ever seen?"

I suppose that if I'm asking the question then the show at least deserves to be a part of that conversation, which in itself is a big deal, right? It's that good.

Berg, who has certainly done some notable work in the past as a director (e.g. his Friday Night Lights film), here seems like one of the most stylistically exciting art house directors of his day. Or something. Producer Damon Lindelof, best known for the two new Star Trek films, Lost and World War Z, is getting a lot of the credit so far for this Tom Perotta adaptation (Perotta is also a producer), critics and fans alike praising the show's creative bravery and stylish production choices.

Writing about such a complex show — especially when you've not yet read the source material—is a tricky task. We, the audience, are dropped into a future reality set three years after a mysterious and catastrophic event (some writers are calling it a "global rapture") has changed mankind's idea of normality. Through a series of notably artsy vignettes, we meet our cast and are introduced not only to their worlds, but given tastes of how they've been effected by The Event. (The Event. That's what I'm calling it for now because I don't want to spoil anyone's viewing experience and I also don't like using the word "rapture" unless I'm being sarcastic or talking about the band The Rapture.)

By the time of the 72-minute pilot's conclusion we've learned that there is a broken family at the center of the action that's led by Justin Theroux (finally in a proper breakout role) as the town's chief

of police, and a mute, chain-smoking Amy Brenneman. Theroux is a tough, brooding cop-type, Brenneman is in a cult, and their kids are super sexy young adults. Happening in the world around our cast (which also includes Liv Tyler, Ann Dowd and a host of breakout-ready actors) is an endless feed of mysterious events, not at all unlike what we saw on early episodes of *Lost* (which was, mind you, also produced by Lindelof).

So what is it that I like so much about *The Left-overs* (aside, of course, from the sexy young adults), you ask? Well, the filmic production value, for starters, really does it for me. While recently talking with a friend about the show, I said, "Imagine if David Lynch directed a *Lost*-like show draped in 9/11 subtext and John Hillcoat-friendly grit." Sounds at least remotely promising, right? Me, I think it's the best pilot since forever. Since *Mad Men* or *Breaking Bad*, even. The most potential I've seen since those two shows first hit the digital airwaves.

That all being said, it's most definitely not a show that everyone will enjoy. From what I've seen, *The Leftovers* is uncompromisingly artsy and bold, which I love, but I also understand that it may not be the best approach when trying to make a hit show.

I could hang around for several hundred more words, waxing nerdy about Justin's sweatpants and Amy's bite. But instead, I think I'll cross my fingers and go watch S01E02. And I expect you, dear reader, to be up-to-date with this great new show by this time next week. So get hoppin', pals.
